Judging of the value of our fisheries for the remainder of the season, by the estimate of them made by the Halifax commission, we are just giving them \$500,000 worth of fish, in order to prevent trouble, and in the hope that Congress, when it meets, will remit the duties on our fish and give us some sort of reciprocity that will be an equivalent for the surrender we are willing to surrender we are willing to for the surrender we are willing to make. It appears that the President has no power to suspend the laws respecting the duties we are paying, and that matters in that regard must remain as they are until Congress meets. So far as this goes we are placed at a manifest disadvantage, but if the evident desiration or way to meet them more desire on our part to meet them more than half way, does not produce the than half way, does not produce the desired result when that body meets, then we must shut down short and sharp, rigorously exclude every American fisherman rom pursuing his avocation inside of the three mile limit, and maintain to the letter our treaty rights. We have shown that we do not wish to take any advantage of the fact, that the treaty vantage of the fact that the treaty expires in the middle of the fishing on and that we are acting fairly and with greater generosity than they have any reason to expect.

It is considerably in our favor that the President and his cabinet are Democrats, it would be much more so, if the majority in the Senate more so,if the majority in the Senate belonged to the same political party. The Republican government have never shown themselves practically friendly toward us, and if a satis-factory settlement of this vexed question is ever to be arrived at, we believe it will be at the instigation of the Democratic party.

#### An Improved Anchor.

The Morrison anchor is an im-rovement on the Pettis' anchor, adér a patent granted to Captain horrison, Jan. 31, 1885. The fol-wing description will convey an lea of its construction and of its

idea of its construction and of its special merits:—
The shank, which has no stock and needs none, ends in a pair of lags taking the form of an inverted U; the lower part of each lug has a shoulder fitting into a recess in the head, which is of an elliptical form, and a bolt passes on its shortest diamater through both lugs. The recesses in the head give great strength in tension and relieve the holt from strain. To this bolt is attached a shackle holding to the buoy repe used to show the position of this shackle is that if the fluxes strike foul of a rock, the boay repe strike foul of a rock, the boay repe the anchor. A special advantage of this shackle is that if the flukes strike foul of a rock, the buoy rope hauled will lift the flukes to the same line as the shank and clear the anchor so that it can be immediately lifted to the bow. This will be better understood when we say that the flukes are welded on the elliptical head at right angles to its circumference and are traversed by the bolt. The advantage of the elliptical head is that if the anchor falls flat the tension of the chain lifts the head on its longest diameter, and so the flukes immediately seize bottom, and as these are parallel we have two strongly anchored flukes instead of only one, as in the common anchor.

The Watkins anchor, a patent was in the navy, loses advantage in comparison with the Morrison anchor, from the fact that as the fastening of the flukes into the bottom depends on a vortical fall of the shackle against bottom any faiture to fall vertically will make a failure to fasten the flukes, while the Morrison anchor fastens the flukes, no matter how it falls, for the strain on the chain turns it over on its long diameter and anchors immediately. For fishermen this anchor has a great advantage as there is no danger of the cable fouling around the projecting fluke and tripping the fisherman finds himself adrift in the morning. For trawl fishing it is indispensable as it lies flat on the bottom on the dory and takes less room than an oar.

#### Found Guilty of Manslaughter.

#### HOUSEHOLD HINTS

TEA CAKE.—One cup of milk, two of flour, one egg, two teaspoons cream of tartar, one of soda and a little sugar. Beat well and bake in a quick oven. Eat while hot, with butter.

butter.

FRIED SQUASH.—Peal and slice a young squash in pieces two or three inches square and half a ninch thick. Let it stand for an hour in a deep earthen dish with a slight sprinkling of salt between each layer. Thon wipe the slices, pepper them, roll them in flour and fry them brown in smoking-hot fat.

BRAN SLAD.—WAX heans make

in smoking hot fat.

Bean Salad.—Wax beans make a delicious salad. Choose young beans, remove the strings, break in inch-long pieces and cook in salt and water. While still warm coverthem with a dressing of oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Be sure and remember in mixing salads the old saying, "A spendthrift for oil, a miser for vinegar, a wise man for salt and a mad man for mixing." Use at least twice as much oil as vinegar.

Orange and Apple Pie.—Cover at in pie plate with puff pastry, and place a layer of sliced oranges, with the pipe removed, on it, and scatter sugar over them. Then put a layer of sliced apples, with sugar, and cover with slices of oranges and sugar. Put an upper crust of nice patry over the pie and bake it for half an hour, or until the apples are perfectly soft. Take the pie from the tin plate and scatter sugar over top.

CURRANT, RASPBERRY OR BLACK-BERRY JAM.—Pick over and mash the fruit; allow one pound of sugar to a pound of fruit. Put the fruit and one-quarter of the sugar into a granito or porcelain kettle; when boiling, add another quarter of sugar; boil again, add more sugar, and, when all is used, let it boil till it hardens on the spoon in the air. Apples, pears, peaches and quinces should be pared, cut small and treated in the same way. Cooking in only a little sugar at times prevents the fruit from becoming hard.

GRAHAM PUFFE.—One and a half

Graham Peffer.—One and a half cups of graham flour, one cup of sifted wheat flour, two teaspoonsful of sugar, half a teacaphul of butter, half a teaspoonful of salt, two cups of new milk, three eggs. Mix salt and flour, add the milk and beat smooth; froth the yolks of the eggs separately from the whites; cream the butter and add the eggs sand then the butter. Bake in buttered stoneware cups of iron gem pans from thirty to forty minutes. #### How to Grease a Wheel.

How to Grease a Wheel.

Few people are aware they do waggons and carriages more injury by greasing too plentifully than in any other way. A well-made wheel will endure constant wear from ten to twenty-five years if care be taken to use the right kind and proper amountof grease; but, if this matter is not attended to, it will be used up in five or six years. Lard should never be used on a wagon, for it will penetrate the hub, and work its way out round the tenons of the spokes and spoil the wheel. Tallow is the best lubricator for wooden axle-trees, and castor oil for iron hubs; but many of the patent axle-greases are also excellent, and have the merit of being cheaper and more convenient to handle. Just enough grease should be applied to the spindle of a wagon to give it a slight coating. This is better than more, for the surplus put on will work out at the onds, and be forced by the shoulder-bands and nut-washer into the hub round the outside of the boxes. To oil an iron axle-tree, first wipe the spindle of a few drops of castor oil near the




