Dr. Chipman, president of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Associa. tion, writes to the Herald that the inst shipment of a cargo of Nova Scotia apples to London averaged \$2.50 per barrel clear of all expenses, and some carefully-packed Blen-heims realized \$6 a barrel there and netted the Nova Scotia grower \$4.50 per barrel. Dr. Chipman says real estate is booming in the fruit region.

TURNING LEAVES WITH WET FINGERS

The warning that has been sounded against turning the leaves of books with wet fingers, for fear of microbes, was based on investigations by the authorities among the circulating libaries at Dresden, to determine whether they were a medium for the communication of infectious diseases. Seiled leaves of books were rubbed first with dry fingers, and then with wet ones, and the result microscopically examined. No microbes, or few, were found on the dry finger, but many on the wet finger. It did not appear that any of them were infectious, but the result of the experiments was held to justify an earnest warning against putting the finger in the mouth when turning the leaves of

However strange-it may appear it is no less undoul leally true, that these islands, or portions of them have been, within not a very distant period, rising from or sinking into the sea. Last autumn the writer visited Little bay, Notre Dame Lay, in Newfoundland. The mining village, situated at the head of this long and narrow bay, is built upon a sea beach, elevated ten or twelvefeet above the present level of the ocean. The surface of the streets is composed of water-wern peobles of elliptical shape, without any admixthre of earth. At an elevation about 20 feet above it, there is another and more extensive flat which is covered with a small deposit, of black mould, which at the depth of a few inches is replaced by layers of water-worn pebbles similar in form and color to those first - named, while on the north side of the bay, near its head, and in full view from the village, there are to he seen high up on the hill sides two other well defined and parallel terraces which may have formed at the ocean.

The writer is not the first whose attention has been directed to this elevation of Newfoundland, as Julian Moreton, in the 34th volume of the Transactions of the Royal Geographical society, says: "A recent and, very observable, and many proofs point to almost identical methods. of it have been brought to my notice. For instance, a narrow tickle at the head of Green's Pond harbor, in which the water now is scarcely deep enough for a punt's passing, was, in the memory of aged people, sufficient for the passage of large fishing boats called shallops. At Parchard's or Pilchard's island. and in Twillingate harbor rocks now above the water are remembered as formerly sunken rocks, over which it was possible and usual to Frow small boats. In many cases, from the same cause, the fishermen cannot now let their boats ride in the same water where their fathers were wont to moor them. I in Trinity harbor."

Liquor Traffic.

DEAR SIE.-Long ago this traffic was strained. It was thought to be useful, and chief plea for this intervention of the Government was, that it was known, by its !ruitage, to be a terrible evil. The supposition appears to have been, that if it were properly guarded and guided by law, its influence for harm would be destroyed and its usefulness secured. The contention of these days was between free trade in intoxicants and governmental control. A permissive license

law was enacted. The courts of Sessions were authorized to grant or deny licenses for the sale of intoxicants in their several districts. Two marked results are seen of this interference of the government. First it was found that a liceuse to sell intoxicants did not lessen the harmful effects of the trade. Its respectability was increased by the patronage of law, and its power to curse the commonwealth instead of being curtailed was wonderously magnified. The manufacturers and sellers of the ardent were well satisfied with this legislation; and well they might be. Philanthrophists were alarmed at the

ruin wrought. The plague was still unstayed. A public sentiment was evoked, when the Prohibition sentiment was born-born of principle. The magistrates and grand jurors in many townships refused to grant licenses. They took advantage of the perinissive legislation and gave us prohibition. They forecast the "Scott Act." Men reasoned from fact to function-from effect to cause-and following up the stream found the poison in the fountain. A poison that no license of the government could charm into harmlessness.

Since then the contention has gathered around these two measures. Unfortunately the temprance people have been divided and hindered from doing their best. Reformers, like other folk, are slow to learn. The new converts to total abstinence have to be educated. The principles underlying the reform

IT PUZZLES THE PUBLIC. Failure of the Attempted Twenty-Four-Hour System for Watches

A Broadway retailer says in the Jewelers' Weekly: "There is no doubt about the general intelligence of New Yorkers, but it is surprising how many of them who read the newspapers know nothing about the recent effort to inaugurate the twentyfour hour system for watches and clocks. You see we have a clock with the numerals from one to twenty-four on its dial in our window, and every afternoon we have a dozen or more excited citizens hurrping in to inquire what kind of a joke we are trying to perpetrate on them, or whether we have hit upon a new advertising scheme.

"Of course an explanation is necessary, and in some cases we have to give a brief history of the system, its advantages and disadvantages, and the chances for or against its ultimate adoption. People from the country occasionally gather in front of the window and stare in open mouthed astonishment. The idea of its being 14 o'clock is a little too much for them, and sometimes from motives of philanthrophy I send out one of the clerks to explain matters to them. Then again people will rush in and inquire what changes will be necessary to have their watches arranged for the twenty-four hour system. Now the changes are very simple a new dial with the hours marked off in numerals from one to twenty-four and a new hour hand wheel with double the number of teeth in the old one: but not one person out of 500 ever has the change made. A very few expensive watches have been made to denote the hours after this system, but they are becoming scarcer every day,

An Ottawa lawyer, Mr. Gémmill, has written a text book on divorce which will interest the lawyers. In this work among other things the lawyer gives some statistics of divorces granted in Canada and the United States in 1867. In 21 years there were 25 divorces granted by parliament for Ontario and Quebec, while the courts decreed 52 in Nova Scotia, 42 in New Brunswick and 15 in P. E. I, making a total of 135, or an annual average of between six and seven for the Dominion. In the United States the number increased from 9,926 in 1867 to 26,535 in 1886 the total in 20 years being about 300,000.
