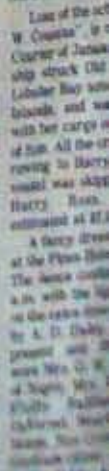

New York, July 9.—Passengers who arrived here last night on the steamship Alliance, tell a harrowing story of their experience aboard the Pacific mail steamer City of Paris, which left Panama for San Francisco on May 23. It seems that five days before the vessel reached the coast of California, a violent storm, yellow fever broke out among the crew and passengers of the big Pacific liner which caused panic on board and resulted in death of the commander of the vessel, Captain Martensen. Three-fourths of the passengers, it was said, were taken by the dread disease, and at least a dozen of them died and were buried in the Pacific. Peary will attempt to reach the North Pole. Captain Bartlett will sail with the same crew as last year. His reputation as a navigator is well known. The plan is for the Hope to return in September.

NEW WAYS OF LIVING.

During the ten years which have passed since the writing of Edward Bellamy's two bookish social economic views of which he is the exponent have not been by any means in slumber. Indeed there is more to-day than ever in the condition of the country to encourage the theories of critics, reformers, and philosophers. Unless very speedily answered there will be carried over to the twentieth century an immense number of problems which, by that time, will be as urgent as numbers. The old, old labor-capital question, women's suffrage, a half-century, naval and military disarmament, the uncertain attitude of state and power, will be bequeathed to the future, for debatable consideration. And every year brings a special problem of its own.

In his new book Bellamy insists upon the justice of equality and the injustice of any system of manner of life. In one sense, it is perfectly right. All men certainly are equal, excepting in so far as they make themselves, and improve their God-given opportunities. Talents differ but there may be a difference and still an equality. The social life of today however has not learned this.

Mr. Debs, a wealthy railway magnate of the neighboring republic, is making one of these experiments. He is about to start a co-operative commonwealth in the state of Washington, where he will put into practice those principles of equality and brotherhood which he has so much discussed. Liberty in its highest form will be the motto. All land will be owned by the state, as also all capital and instruments of production. There will be no poverty and no crime, for equal distribution of wealth will make the one impossible and the other undesirable. Time will tell how successful this scheme may be. Things are changing every hour and the rate of life change too. Debs is being much laughed at for his utopian theories but there is in them and kindred something of truth, which some day will work out into actual being.

THE TWO TARIFFS.

The tariff question is as burning as the border as it is with us in Canada. In fact its effect there has been so great that it has become the cause of the unrest in commercial circles is due to this cause and until it is definitely settled there will be no good improvement.

A Rate-Paying Digbyite Advocates a Road Machine.

To the Editor of the Courier:

You must have noticed that the old pick and shovel style of road work in this town should long ago have been a thing of the past. Numbers of us have been taking up and hoping for a change in the mode of street repairs, ever since incorporation, but so far have been disappointed. It is time that we should have a road machine, and we are sure that it will be a great improvement on the old pick and shovel business, or in building of gravel on the streets after they have become hard and settled in the spring, or in any month of the year other than November or March. Those being the months it has been done, so experts from other places similarly situated with Digby inform us, at all events we all know that a lot of loose gravel, a small stone upon a hard surface, or a small hole in the road, is a nuisance to all concerned, summer boarders, native temporary visitors, etc., and should be avoided. Water street is about the worst in town, especially that portion of it from Turnbull's corner to the Barnham House. If you don't believe it take a ride over it, either in your best buggy or on your bicycle. One reason that there are so many holes in the road is the heavy dirt from the houses and the street cleaning machine, which is a thing that could be remedied by making a small rubble drain on the edge of the road, and having it connected with whatever number of drains running to the shore below may be thought desirable.

Then take any of the other streets, and you will find the same thing. Some of our folks contend that they are not in any way liable for the state until a road machine is brought into use upon them, which will also be a saving of expense as against the pick and shovel system. We have one example right at hand, and that is the street from the corner of the house to the corner of the house, which is a thing that could be remedied by making a small rubble drain on the edge of the road, and having it connected with whatever number of drains running to the shore below may be thought desirable.

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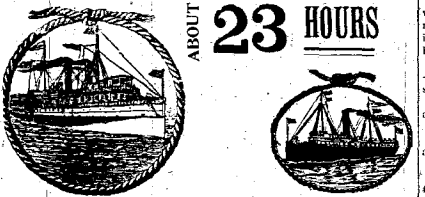

The Natural Features and Climate
of the Yukon Region.

A MAN WHO HAS SPENT MUCH TIME
IN THE RICH YUKON GOLD COUN-
TRY TELLS WHAT IT IS LIKE -
HOW THE MINERS LIVE - A LAST-
ING DIFFICULTY OF ACCESS.

Recently there was issued in Seattle,
Wash., a handbook, "Guide to the
Yukon Gold Fields." Its author was
V. Wilson, who had spent much time
in the region of which he wrote, and
who had carefully observed the phe-
nomena of the country and noted them
for reference.

According to Mr. Wilson, the trip to
the gold fields of the Yukon is one that
will tax the powers of endurance of the
most hardy, and he declares that only
such can hope to succeed. Only with
the most inveterate and packing
provisions over pathless mountains,
towing a heavy boat against a five to
eight mile current over battered bor-
ders, digging in the bottomless mud
for a few minutes, and then being
when again overtaken by the millions,
shooting scolding canyons and rapids,
and enduring the worst of the winter
a bitter cold that never rises
above zero and frequently falls to
eighty degrees below, can the diffi-
culty of the region be surmounted.

The climate of the Yukon is, in the
words of the handbook, "a mixture of
the worst of both worlds. In the winter,
in spite of the long and terrible
winters, and the summer months are
delightful.

The country is full of moose, bear,
caribou, and much smaller game. In
the summer the moose grow to a
weight of 1,000 pounds, and have a
wonderful speed of horns, while the
caribou are much smaller, but are
equally swift. Great herds of Arctic
reindeer also come as far south as the Yukon
in the severest winters. On the Klondike
River the bears are sometimes so
numerous as to keep the Indians from
going there when fish are plenty. Mountain
goats, mountain sheep, lynxes and
wolves are also plenty.

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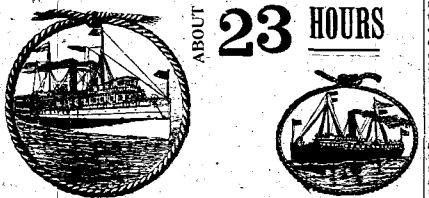

This shows that the United States by themselves, the maximum expected loss on abstainers after the fourth year of insurance was \$2,219,374, and on nonabstainers \$3,552,671, and the actual loss respectively was \$1,869,350 and \$3,552,337, the percentages being 81 for abstainers, a difference of 8 per cent. only."

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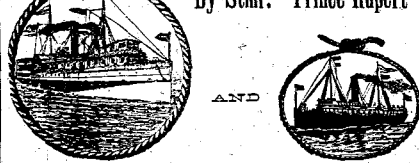

This possession of an "Empire on which the sun never sets" is no doubt a very fine thing but it brings with it a lot of duties and responsibilities from which no man can escape. The duties are contained in a smaller or greater extent in every country. The manner in which Great Britain has expanded and stretched herself out in every part of the world, has recently brought her in contact with numerous savage or half savage tribes whose natural condition is one of continuous strife and warfare. This has been especially the case in India where the outlying mountainous regions are inhabited by warlike and predatory tribes. Any of these tribes may be sufficiently numerous and powerful to control a large district of surrounding country and utterly ignorant of the strength of the British Empire, they may rush to the aid of the British in their efforts to suppress a rebellion or to defend a province. It is one of these little wars which are in one of our springs which require in its turn to be met and crushed, so that it has come to be the case that a large part of the time we are carrying on in conflict in some part of the world. In order to maintain our position we probably have more fighting than any other nation in the world. There is a lot of pugna in John Bull, and we are instinctively and naturally fighting people with a love for the fair play, which we expect to receive and are willing to concede to others.

The war at present going on in India is one of those tribal wars which will cost many valuable lives and a large expenditure of money before it is ended. Recently our troops have met with a very considerable loss, and there will probably be some severe fighting before the contest is over. As war with these tribes must end in a decided and crushing defeat for them, it is a pity that such a heavy loss should be incurred. It is a pity that we should have to fight and lose, and that these things are necessary to avoid future trouble.

A VERY unfortunate matter, not only as regards its present but its future results, is that of the shooting of the Indians at Houghton, P. M. vania, a few days ago. There is a marked and gradually increasing antagonism between the Indians in the United States which has been the cause of much trouble. The affair will do much to intensify. A score or more of men were shot down by a sheriff and men of deputation with arms and ammunition. The shooting of the Indians at present is all from the side of the strikers and is done strongly against the sheriff. But there may be another side, to be heard later on. The Indians of this kind ending in blood shed and lynchings are unpleasantly frequent in the United States. There is not the same confidence in the justice of the law as in the certainty of justice being done. There is in Canada. While minor criminals may not always get their deserts, on this side of the border it is never that serious criminals escape. If it were always believed that the long arm of justice would surely reach the violator of the law, and that no considerations would prevent justice being done, it is doubtful if there would be so much crime. There is a bad element in the United States and it will require a firm hand to restrain it. Anarchists, prize criminals and other bad men have made their own country too hot for them, will retain their old habits wherever they go, and there are large numbers of them in the United States.

It was widely reported through the Indian Press that the U. S. battleship Indiana had sustained serious injury in the dry dock at Halifax, acting Secretary Roosevelt who has investigated the matter says: "The statement is entirely untrue. The injuries of the Indiana due to her docking at Halifax were reiterated with such circumstantiality that I finally telegraphed to find whether there was any basis in the statement. The answer was not. I was aboard the Indiana the other day and talked with her captain, and she was in excellent trim. I should have been told that the injuries were gone wrong since and nothing has gone wrong excepting the reported defect in one gun, concerning which we shall be doing nothing but the ordinary expert sound. The injury sustained in the dock at Halifax consisted in the slight buckling of some of the plates, no where amounting to an inch and a half. So trivial was it that it did not cause the slightest leak. It is the kind of an accident, if it can be called an accident, that is sustained continually by heavy ships, men-of-war or merchantmen, in docking.
