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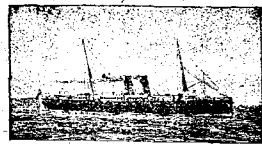

Sunday's North-Easter Caused Sad

Havoc With the Shipping.

This death has just occurred of a body whose name was and is yet a household word, "Florence Nightingale." She passed away after spending a lifetime of rare and beautiful benevolence, and her memory will ever be treasured as having been the first of those noble women, who gave themselves with genuine devotion to the cause of sick and wounded soldiers, the heroes of the battle field and the miseries and discomforts of military hospitals have been minimized, so far as it is possible to do so, by the voluntary services of the Red Cross women, wherever the regulations and laws of the Geneva convention are recognized. Miss Nightingale was the daughter of a wealthy English gentleman, who had made himself acquainted with scientific and systematic nursing as it was then taught, and had also a very considerable knowledge of sanitary questions. During the Crimean war she found a noble field for the exercise of her benevolent designs.

John Bull has often lauded in planned and unaided efforts, and always atoning for it however, and making things right in the long run. But never perhaps has this propensity been so fully shown as during the early prosecution of the war in the Crimea. The whole arrangements were miserably insufficient, and there was the confusion of a universal breakdown. The old system of supplying and caring for an army was proving totally inadequate, and no new one had been devised. Cholera broke out among the soldiers and was carrying them off by hundreds. Without adequate protection, officers and men alike were almost frozen in their tents. The poorest food was being supplied by contractors who supplied the needs of the army. Consignments of boots were found to be all for one foot, and preserved meats were unfit for food. Amidst all this chaos and confusion Florence Nightingale and her band of assistants came like angels of light. Cleanliness and order were substituted for dirt and disorder. The suitable medicines and strengthening foods which had been stored away in places where nobody could get at them, while soldiers were dying because they could not be obtained, were brought to light and applied to the use for which they were intended.

Directly after the close of the war with Russia, Red Cross societies were formed. They were associations for relieving the wounded in time of war, and carried their name from the fact that a red cross on a white ground was adopted as the distinctive badge of persons and places rendered neutral by international agreement, for the carrying out of these human objects were by their nature of international character. The sick and wounded, who were carefully tended and all their physical necessities supplied, were also benefited by the day made service as nurses. They also between themselves a medium of communication, and by the gifts and contributions collected by the people for the purpose, find their way to the soldiers who lie in the hospitals. On other days a party of ladies left their shores on this errand, and should the need unfortunately arise our own Canadian ladies have been and are blessed the kindly nurse who smooths their pillows, and whippers to them of home.

We are not getting much news from the war, and know really very little about what is going on. Lady, still is the center of interest, and there is no doubt that General White has his hands full in keeping the Boers out of it. We know that he has done so up to the present, and that General Buller will send him reinforcements as he possibly can. The time is drawing rapidly to a close in which it is possible for the Dutch to achieve any great success. Up to the present they have done nothing of importance, and the immense army now gathering at the Cape will in another month render it impossible for them to do anything more than act on the defensive. Kimberly, the centre of the diamond mines still holds out. Cecil Rhodes and the Boers would certainly crush him if they could. The Boers are repulsed, it is said, a serious assault, and Colonel Baden Powell who commands seems able to hold the fort. West of the river, the Boers have done nothing of importance, and the Boers who were killed in a fight near Kimberly, was a Halifax man. He was a son of Captain Wood, and a grandson of Jefferson Davis, who was president of the Confederate States. There are many Nova Scotians holding commissions in the British army, and they appear to be all capable and energetic officers.

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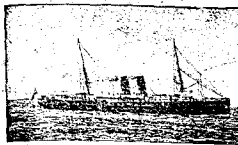

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NEW LOBSTER REGULATIONS.

Many Important Changes Made Since Original Draft.

FINALLY APPROVED BY CABINET.

WESTERN COUNTRYMEN HAVE DIFFERENT REGULATIONS - DIGBY FISHERMEN ARE LIMITED TO TEN AND A HALF INCHES.

The lobster regulations have been finally adopted by Sir Louis Davies and approved by the cabinet. They are changed in several important particulars since the draft copy was published. They provide as follows: No one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or have in possession, lobsters between the 1st day of May and the 1st day of December in each year, both days inclusive, along New Brunswick, embracing the county of Charlotte and also that part of the county of Nova Scotia, embracing the counties of Yarmouth, Queens, Shelburne, Lunenburg and that part of the county of Halifax which is situated on the north side of the county of Shelburne, and also that part of the county of Shelburne which is situated on the south side of the county of Shelburne. The size to be 6 inches in length, measured from the tip of the tail, exclusive of claws or feet.

Between the last day of June in each year, and the 1st day of January in each year, lobsters shall be prohibited in any part of the Bay of Fundy, or any part of the coast, including a line drawn from the division line of the counties of Charlotte and Shelburne, to the point of view, running outside of the line between the counties of Digby and Yarmouth. The size to be 6 inches in length, measured from the tip of the tail, exclusive of claws or feet.

Between the first day of July and the 31st day of March, both days inclusive, fishing, etc., is prohibited on that part of the coast of Nova Scotia, from the point of view, running outside of the line between the counties of Digby and Yarmouth. NO SIGNS OF INCREASING DIFFERENCES AMONG THE BOERS IN THE CAPE COLONY.—EXTRA NUMBER OF MOUNTED MEN WILL BE SENT WITH SECOND CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Morning Post's correspondent at Cape Town, dated his despatch Dec. 28th, saying that the Natal contingent are still shelling the Boer trenches round Colenso.

They have destroyed the footbridge across the river, preventing the enemy from holding a position to the southward. The Boers are taking fresh positions to the eastward, nearer our camp. The river is rising. There is a prospect of heavy rains. Inquiries lead to an estimate that the Boer losses on Dec. 15 (the date of Buller's defeat), were 100 killed and wounded. Very heavy firing was heard in the direction of Ladysmith today.

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
