—This is a year in which the United States will elect a president to succeed President McKinley, whose official term will expire on the 4th of March next. This is an event which always arouses the excitements of the nation to a high pitch; and the excitement this year will be no exception to the general rule; the prospect that the excitement may be greater than on former occasions. This would certainly be the case if the Candidates nominated by the two great political parties of the nation should be nearly balanced in popular favor. The issues that will be put forth in this contest will be greater considering both number and importance than have influenced a presidential contest for many years.

The elections come off early in November and the candidates to nominate the President will meet in a few weeks. There is at this date no doubt in the public mind but that Mr. McKinley will again be nominated as the candidate of the Republican party; and the present prospect is that the Democratic party will have an easy victory over any possible candidate that the Democrats can put forward. A few days some weeks ago the name of Admiral George Dewey was a prominent one as a Democratic candidate. But the name of the hero of Manila struck the political atmosphere of the nation country as a candidate for its highest office only as a meteor strikes the atmosphere of our earth—to burn itself out by its own momentum.

We notice by the Montreal papers this week that the boy who presented the pistol at his father's house with the intention of committing suicide in deadly fear in order to gain a trial, namely, permission to take a trip, probably with some other young scoundrels, and who eventually was not dead, but being treated as a dangerous lunatic by the police. The intended crime, in a moral point of view, so very near the unintended crime, that it would be a very wholesome warning to all the young fellow newspaper readers in the country had he suffered for the one which he actually and most criminally committed. The crime, as intended, would have been held mortal in some countries. There is a painful contrast indeed between the respect shown to parents and religion by parents and the public opinion in many heathen lands and in this so-called Christian one. The Japanese have long realized that they have much to learn in this respect from the west, but they open their eyes in astonishment at the disrespectful manners of our children, so utterly in contrast with the reverence and filial piety of their own. As there is no religion without reverence, and as reverence to God must be apprehended through reverence to parents, we are convinced that we have much to learn from the heathen in this respect. Another lesson to be got from the crime of this young paricide, is to see to the reading of our newspapers, and to the interesting and wholesome. A boy's reading and his companionships are likely to be very much of a piece. The parent when trying to keep his boy out of bad company, after discussing it, should be to him himself being encouraging, or at least, not watching against a worse companionship, than even bad boys. The leniency of the law is probably largely due to sympathy with the mother, who is said to be dying, and thus vicariously bearing the punishment of her son's crime. The law, the has a right to a share in it, as it would seem that she had been in the habit of siding with her headstrong boy when the father sought to control his ways.

A bag of mail containing registered letters and packages mysteriously disappeared, and no trace of it could be found. The bag contained an immense amount of money and included packages with over \$1000 from one of the banking institutions in the district. The whole police force was at work on the case and a searching investigation was made. Suspicion fell upon a person and when it became known that the treasure was in the hands of the police, the mail bag with the packages of money intact was returned as mysteriously as it disappeared.
