

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

—In these days when so much is being said and written about the enormous cost of armies and navies and the fearful waste of war, it is well, perhaps, to listen to what may be advanced on the other side. Sir R. Griffin, who enjoys a high reputation as an authority on economics, in a recent address before the Bankers' Institute of London, advanced some reasons in defense of the expenditure on armaments by the nations of Europe. He held that expenditure as high as 10% of national income was not waste of capital but should be regarded as investment of insurance in time of peace against war. For the purpose sought, the money spent was said to be really more economical than extravagant. All experience, he avers, proves that the nation best prepared for war had the best guarantee for peace and suffered least from war if it did occur. This is not a question, he concludes, of abstract morals, but one that has to be faced with the hard conviction that weakness invites aggression. Of course, it would be infinitely better for all nations to live at peace with one another, but so long as there is a possibility of disagreement, arms must be prepared to defend itself. Military organizations, training and discipline are admitted to be good for the youth of a country, since those who are drilled are more likely to fall away from a country in times of stress, more aggressive neighbors. The evils suffered in consequence were greater, far, he held, than the loss and cost of military preparation.

—The United States will not require the payment by Spain of indemnity for the destruction of the battleship Maine and the loss of life involved, because by the treaty of peace, all claims for indemnity, national and individual, of every kind, either government or of citizens of either country against the other government are relinquished, and the government of the United States by the last paragraph of the same article, undertook to adjudicate and settle the claims of its citizens against Spain relinquished in this article. It is therefore likely that when the ship is raised no special aid will be made to the families of the cause of the explosion which resulted in her loss.

—The proposition that the Transvaal gold mines should pay a proportion of the expense of the war in South Africa will be popular in Great Britain—except among stockholders—The mine owners were largely instrumental in bringing on the war with its huge loss in blood and money, and they are getting off cheaply enough with a sum of £5,000,000, which was the cost Great Britain over £150,000,000 already, and more millions are being spent week after week. The British taxpayer will be glad to know that the mines will lessen his burden to some extent.

—The energy behind the curfew law movement in Massachusetts is abating, says the Boston Advertiser, the chief reason assigned being the practical failure of the experiments made. "The truth is," says the Advertiser, "that in hardly any Massachusetts city which already has a curfew law is that law enforced to the letter. In many cases the law is almost entirely disregarded. In view of the general failure to live up to the law elsewhere, it is not surprising that the communities are now adopting it in the state."

—Popular subscriptions for a monument to late Hon. J. B. Corbridge, Archibald Forbes, says a London dispatch, have reached such a large aggregate that work will begin this month.

**Abbott Harbour.**  
Abbott Harbour, Yarmouth County, has been proclaimed a port, and Mr. Frank U. D'Entremont, gazetted harbor master. The limits of the harbor are to embrace all the waters surrounding Abbott Island, and the following limits, viz.: North of a line drawn due east and west through the southern extremity of Brant's Island and east of a line drawn due north and south of a distance of one nautical mile due west of Abbott Harbour light-house.

**Not Satisfactory.**  
A Westport correspondent writes: "Our mail continues to arrive in a late hour every night. Saturday's mail did not get here until Sunday at 1 o'clock a.m. I should think the mail contractor would try and get the mail here to suit the people, and not keep them waiting all night for their mail. The present system is not satisfactory."
