A census bulletin issued at Washington indicates what may possibly be the ultimate solution of the negro race question in the United States. It has been held by some observers that the black man must, in time, and by natural increase, displace the white man in the Southern States. This anticipation can hardly be said to be borne out by the facts presented, although these show a general drift of the negro to certain regions. The bulletin gives the geographical distribution of population and shows that less than ten per cent of the negroes are found in the districts directly drained into the Atlantic, and about sixty-four per cent are in lands drained into the Gulf of Mexico, the proportion in the west and on the Pacific coast being small. Everywhere where the drift of the negro is towards the sea-board, as practically none are found at high altitudes. Guided by what appears to be a distinctive racial instinct, the negro congregates in the warm and humid regions of the Southern States, precisely the parts just as instinctively shunned by the whites. Eighty-four per cent of all the negroes in the United States are found where the mean annual temperature is between 55 and 70 degrees, the greater proportion of the remaining negroes being located where the temperature is between 70 and 85 degrees. This suggests a fair idea of where the black belt will be situated, should the racial drift continue as indicated by the census bulletin. To those who believe that the negro will have undisputed possession of the southern lands, and on himself will depend his position in the future of the republic.

The Home of Commons recently by a vote of 162 to 48 declared its opinion that in order to save the young men of the country, the manufacture, sale and importation of cigarettes should be prohibited. The opinion was expressed by everyone who spoke that the use of cigarettes by boys was a distinct injury. It was pointed out that the proper way to regulate the traffic was to prohibit the sale of cigarettes to boys under 16. Several speakers stated that they considered that there was too much interference by Legislatures on matters which were leaving the work to churches and Sunday schools, and in matters of morals they wanted the State to do the work which they themselves should do.

—AN Ottawa paper is authority for the statement that emigrants are being sent through Ottawa en route to the Northwest at the rate of five hundred per day. These emigrants come from Europe via the Maritime Provinces. They are reported to do people, who are entering the country to go to look after themselves and to set themselves up in business farming. They are intelligent, clean looking and energetic men and women, and are being induced in the old land.

—The customs revenue of the Dominion for the nine months ending March 31, shows an increase of \$3,100, 021 as compared with the same time last year. The revenue for nine months was \$23,772,229, as compared with \$22,672,208 of last year. The increase for the month of March was \$21,100, an increase of \$27,783 over 1902.

—A big snow storm last Thursday night caused the isolation of Chicago from the outside world. Railway traffic was obstructed, telegraph posts were blown down and the highways in the suburbs were blocked with drifts. Meanwhile in the land of "Our Lady of Snows" they go on planting potatoes.

—A New York widow whose husband left her \$30,000 a year ago is said to have a bullet hole in her temple. She had been speculating in the stock market for some time, and was unable to pay her last week's board bill. The story is said to be true and is instructive and pathetic.

—Hon. Clifford Sifton, who has been appointed British agent before the Alaskan boundary commission, has arrived in London, where he will occupy the suite of rooms in the Hotel Cecil used by Sir Wilfrid Laurier during the coronation festivities.

### Starting Strawberries.

Select only young, red-rooted plants for setting. For a family garden two late varieties are sufficient, and one of each season would probably be better. It is best to set strawberries in the spring. Early setting is not important, but they should be planted when the ground can be, but in good condition and given clean culture until late in autumn. Care should be taken to re-

place all blossoms in the first season. Then place the plants in rows four feet wide and twenty four inches apart in the row. Turn the runnerless plants on the line of the row so as to make a matted row about one foot wide. It is well to prevent the plants from becoming matted by pulling off runnerless plants. The plants have set sufficiently to be weeded.
