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STOCK SPECULATION.

A Straightforward Article on Wall Street, told in Plain Every-day Language.

The opportunity conveyed to the public by the expression "gambling" is somewhat softened by substituting the word "speculation."

And indeed, for one who gives a portion of, or his entire time, to following and endeavoring to profit by the fluctuation of security values, the latter word is not only more graceful, but correct.

Gambling implies a positive gain or loss upon an event, a chance, or a contingency. A loss, if sustained, is not recovered in that individual transaction in which it has occurred.

A profit, if secured, is not subject to subsequent loss unless it be in a following transaction. The loss that may be incurred, or the gain that may be made, is limited and positive; the chances are usually known in advance.

The result of the transaction is not subject to change, and a more satisfactory result upon an individual transaction may be attained at one time than at another. Likewise the opportunity for obtaining a loss is afforded to the speculator—a help which the gambler never receives.

Curiously enough, the Standard Dictionary makes no figure of the difference in meaning between a "gamble" and a "speculation."

Various phrases are presented by the Standard Dictionary in the use of the word "stocks" includes the securities listed and traded in on the New York Stock Exchange.

The master of "Wall Street" and his followers are not necessary to consider here, as they are too palpably fraudulent to interest anyone of even limited business acumen.

Mining and oil are no exception to such stocks and bonds, but reliable promotions are seldom financed by means of lurid advertising.

In every instance speculative issues are radically different in character from the securities of the "Wall Street."

We would recommend such an act should contain clauses relative to the opening of dams, sluices of fire, and injury to domestic animals. In fact to all such acts of unscrupulous parties coming within the scope of the law.

With their statement that the act is working advantageously in other Provinces, we cannot agree. Hundreds of thousands of acres in Quebec and Ontario have been leased to syndicates of rich Americans. They control the fish, game, and the citizens of the country are forbidden to catch a trout, or shoot a rabbit on these laws.

Twenty-one years of use will establish the right of way, and surely a hundred fifty years continuous use has established the right of our people to prospect, hunt, fish, and on land which has no agricultural value.

As long as our rivers run into the sea, we wish our people to have access to them, without the possibility of their being arrested by the negro cook employed by some American millionaire.

Digby's New Industry.
THE BATH PHOTON COMPLETED AND
ALREADY DOING A GOOD BUSINESS.

A Courier representative, accompanied by Mr. G. J. McCormack, proprietor of Digby's Bath, visited that establishment a few days ago and was shown accounts of the new industry, the proprietor who explained the working of the plant from basins to the bath. The main building, which is situated at the foot of Queen street, South End, has a frontage of 70 feet and is 10 feet wide with ice storage 215 feet and 20 feet high.
