The attention of Hon. Geo. P. Gra ham having been drawn to a despatch from Halifax hinting that a syndicate of Maritime Province capitalists were seeking an option on the Intercolonial, and that MacKenzie & Mann were also after the road, said he had nothing to add to the declaration upon the subject made by him at the commercial trav-ellers banquet in Toronto last week. The question of re-organization of the management of the Intercolonial was under consideration, but whether the solution would be the placing of the road under the management of a commission, or its sale to a company, or a continuation of the present system with improved methods introduced was not yet determined.

Honeful financial and commercial cor ditions for the year 1909 are glowingly perdicted in R. G. Dunn & Co.'s annual of trade conditions. review asserts that the recuperative powers shown by the Wall street interests during the year just ended "were beyond the hopes of the most sanguine."

One of the biggest lumber deals in the history of the Maritime Provinces has been put through in England. Un. der it the properties of the Alfred Dickie Lumber Company in Nova Sco-tia past to an English syndicate head-ed by Sir Thomas Trowbridge. The price to be paid for the Dickie proper-ties, which include 405,000 acres of simber lands and eight mills, is \$1,567-500. The deal was put through by the Royal Bank of Canada. The purchas-ers are to build a railway from Halifax of Canso. This railway will tap all the properties evcept that at Tusket, which is on the line of the H. & S.W. T. N. McGrath, manager of and one of the partners in the Tusket mill, is to be manager of the new concern at a handsome salary.

## Annapolis Royal has Investment of \$225,000 in Shipping.

## Two Cargoes of Apples Sent Direct to Hull, England, Brought \$53,000.

F. C. Whitman, secretary of the Annapolis Royal Board of Tarde has the following able and interesting contribution in the Halifax Herald's New Years number, on the past year's bus-iness of that town:

The impression of everyone in the spring of 1908 was business would be dull, and a feeling of depression exist-ed in nearly every branch of trade. ed in nearly every branch of trade. Farmers found that the high prices of apples, and hay particularly, could not be sustained. There was a sudden drop from \$18 a ton for pressed hay to \$10 a ton, and buyers of apples at \$2.00 a barrel had to ask sellers to re-bate in order to make a settlement. Dry fish that sold for \$4.25 in the autumn went down in price to \$2.50 on the opening of the market, with a fur-ther drop to \$1.75 a quintal. In many ther drop to \$1.75 a quintal. In many other things, however, prices were remarkably steady. Lumber and wood held to last year's figures, with only a slight break in price for a short time. By Jane trade was on the upturn, and from that time to the end of the year there was no reason to complain of full. there was no reason to complain of dull times in Annapolis Royal. This is not a factory town, but what manufactures there are have been kept going. The usual number of vessels have loaded lumber, with the export only slightly below normal. For at least three months in the year there was a demand for labor that was difficult to fill, and outlying districts were drawn upon for men to work in town. Twelve, fifteen and twenty cents an hour are current wages, depending on time employed and the kind of work done.

THE HIGH PRICES.

EXPORTS TO BRAZIL

There is the Buckler Brick Com pany, limited, with an annual output of 6,000,000 bricks. In winter there is all the kiln wood to haul, and as soon as the frost will permit, operations start in the spring, and run full blast until frost comes again, employing every year a large number of men. A. M. King's larrigen factory turns out a superior class of goods. It is run on piece work and the factory lights burn late and the hum of the sewing machine can be heard long af-ter hours when a rush of work is on. Receipts of fish begin to come in about August and the fish drier starts up, giving employment all through the winter to the average of fourteen men. Last year's receipts were 17,000 quin-Last, this year about 11,000 quintals. Carloads of dry fish, packed in tubs and drams, start out about every fortight billed through on a long trip to Brazil or the West Indies. THE LUMBER TRADE.

From four to five million feet of ex-From four to five million feet of ex-port lumber is the regular stock in the town. Summer and winter, a contin-uous stream for teams keep adding to the stock coming from the mills at-Legoille, Greywood, Milford and wort beyond," where the eggs come from, as far south as Queens county, from Clements, Perette and Dalbonsie. For one team of horses there will be ten of oxen. 1,600 to 1,800 of freship cut lumber is a load in winter, bad roads in the spring cut them down to 1,200 feet, then, with better roads and drier lumber, the loads increase to 2,000 feet. Notable loads of 3,000 feet, baufed ten miles or more, by one pair of oxen, have occasionally been brought in. 

Paradise.

Considerable interest has been aroused among fruit growers and others interested in apples by an announcement made by the apple inspectors of the Province to fruit dealers at Kentville last week. All those prominent in handling apples were notified to be present at Kentville on a certain day to meet the Government Inspectors of Fruit.

Then and there they were warned that the sections in the Dominion Fruit Act, in regard to the size of qualities i. e., No. I fruit to be not less than 2½ inches in diameter, and No. 2. not less than 21 inches, were to be rigidly enforced during the remainder of the season.

This entails the overhauling and repacking of every barrel of apples to be shipped from the Valley, and almost entirely does away with No. 1's in such varieties of apples as Nonpariels and Golden Russets. The law was generally considered as

arbitrary and merely intended as an indication but not an absolute guide, as to the way in which apples should Le packed.

When it is considered that a King or Blenheim is put in the same class as a Golden Russet or Nonpariel, so far as size goes, the absurdity of the law is seen at once.

The success of the "Farmers' Warehouse" at Lawrencetown, Annapolis Co. has encouraged fruit growers in other parts of the Valley to make a move in a similar direction. Already there are warehouses at Berwick and Lawrencetown, controlled by the apple growers themselves, and the orchardists in Aylesford, Middleton and Paradise are organizing preparatory to making a move in the same direction. Bridge-town and Round Hill also are expected fall into line.

The object of the "Farmers warehouses" is to have uniform packing, reduction in freight rates for the individual shipper, less use for the middle man and consequently more profits for the growers.

### **NOVA SCOTIA FRUIT** IN LONDON

### Digby as an Apple Exporting County, will be Interested in this.

From the Fruit, Flower and Vegetable

The most interesting exhibit, from a commercial point of view, was, undoubtedly, the magnificent collection of applies and other hardy fruits shown under-the auspices of the Nova Scotian Government. Upwards of 400 cases of apples were comprised in this exhibit, and the wealth of color, spot-less condition, and fine quality of the fruit well merited the gold medal and 15 other medals, including the highest individual award obtained at the ex-hibition which fell to its share. A splendid record indeed; well in keeping with the high reputation acquired by Nova Scotian fruit on the British

A special exhibit of 150 varieties, shown by Mr. H. Dalman, of Wolf-N. S, attracted much attention. In this collection we noticed some magnificent specimens of Blenheims, and among others the following favorite varieties:—Bismarck, Glori Mundi, Smith's Winter, Liwoer, Grimes' Golden, Hunt's Russet, Bietzheimer, Arlington Pippin, King of the Pippins, Ben Davis Red Ball, Greening, Smith's Red, Bank's Grovenstein, Tullaman's Red, Bent's Grevenetein, Tulumoris Sweet, Priace George, Gloon Stark, Manson Sweet, Chaste Sordling, Bulle de Bokkop, Perk's Pleasant, Gillidwer, Maween, Cornish Aromatic, Baldwin, and many others. This individual exhibit also included a few print, and buttled fruit; and was awarded a ellert Knightian medal.

The varieties of apples chiefly grown in Nova Scotia are Gravenstein and Bank's Red Gravenstein, Baldwin, King of Tompkin's County, Nonpariel, Ribston Pippin, Golden Russet, Ben Davis, Belle Fieur, and Bishop's Pip-pin, introduced by Bishop Inglis, the first Bishop of Nova Scotis, Blenbelm, Orange, Fallawater and Rhode Island Greening. It, however, the growers for the British market confine their operations to a comparatively few sorts, the diversified selection comprised in the collective exhibit, amply demonstrated the fact that almost all kinds of apples known to commerce can be, and are, successfully grown.

Seeking to obtain some information concerning the favored land which produces splendid fruit in such abundance, we gathered the following parti-culars from the representative of the Nova Scotia Government, which we feel sure will be of interest to our read-

The principal fruit growing district in Nova Scotia is in the Cornwallis and Annapolis Valley. This favored apot is one continuous valley of about 100 miles in length, and varying in 100 miles in length, and varying in width from 6 to 11 miles, situated between two nearly parallel ranges of bills affont 600 feet in beight. The North Mountain shelters the valley on the north-west, and from the strong vides of the Bay of Fundy; the South Mountain, which is a little higher, beautiful. bounds it on the eastern and southern side, and runs N E. to S.W. In the middle of the valley there is a watershed, the Annapolis River running S. W., the rivers of the Cornwallis Dis-

w., the rivers of the Cornwallis Dis-trict running N.E.

The soil of the valley is rartly form-ed from the disintegration of the Trap Rock of the North Mountain, partly from the syenitic granite of the South Mountain, together with the red loam and coarse-grained sand of the new red sandstone in the valley, which abounds in oxide of iron, lime of gypsum, forming a fertile soil admirably adopted to the cultivation of apples, plums and various fruits, as well as of potatoes, various fruits, as well as of potatoes, sweet turnips, cats, maize, pumpkins, beans, etc. Whest growing and beef production been lately decreased, owning to the compatition of the western provinces, but more attention is now being paid to the rearing of stock by the farmer. The apple certainly thrives here, and the orchards are neatly laid out and well cared for; the growth of the trees is more rapid, and they attain a larger size than is common in England. The fruit is large, well colored, and abundant, and of pleasant flavor, while the average period of full bearing is from 80 to 100 years.

Throughout the valley there is a telephone system which connects rail-way stations, shops, doc ors' dwellings, and many of the farmers' houses, and a spirit of co-operation is practised in every department, thus reducing the cost of production to a minimum and facilitating distribution Packing and grading, too, has been studied, until these important essentials have reached a high standard of excellence.

### DIED FROM EXCESSIVE DRINKING.

A tragic death at South Side, Cape Sable Island, in the early hours of Sun-day morning, Dec. 27 was that of James Stoddart a finely built young man of 27, who had come home from Gloucester only a week ago and was living at his sister's. Dr. Brown was hurriedly called at about three a. m. and reached the house shortly afterwards to find Stoddart just b his last. The circumstances justified an inquest which was held in the forenoon by Dr. Brown, corner. Several witnesses were sworn, and the evidence went to show that the deceased had teen drinking quite freely on Christ-mas day, and had but partly recovered from the effects on Saturday evening, from the effects on Saturday ovening, when ho obtained some Bay Rum and Jamsies ginger which he mixed and proceeded to drink though warred not to do so. Later in the exening he was found alone on the road, dazed and helpless. He was carried to his sistery house and put in hog, being mable to talk coherently. After midnight the family around the school was considered to the control of the coherently. family, aroused by a noise in the bed-room; found him unconacious and ap-parently in convulsions, when the Dr. was called but the poor fellow was past help, expiring in a few minutes. The jury found that he came to his death from the effects of alcohol or

An appetite for intoxicants which manifests itself at every turn even in well-ordered society, is a thing to be well ordered society, is a thing to be deplored; but a depraved appetite for bitting beverages—a latter day growth entirely—is more unnatural and more deadly. It is becoming clear that there is a practice, not unknown in small communities, of "mairing drinks," in a manner that speedily produces ef-fects. Liquids of any kind, with a large proportion of viru spirits in them, are mindful and comfid in the season are mingled and quasified in the same quantity as if the rank compound were the best of Islay Blend. Whether the object is to get quick results, or to make the drinks hold out when the real stimulant runs short, does not appear but the awful fact remains and its fatal results are getting rather frequent. There was one noted instance of it in Yarmouth not long since; an other nearer home has just startled the neighborhood, while dozens of mysterious deaths farther away have been re-ported, with any cause assigned but the right one.



Many of the old residents through. out Annapolis and Digby counties particularly in Digby, Annapolis Royal, Weymouth and the district of Clare, will be sorry to learn of the death of the Rev. Philip Walsh, parish priest of Londonderry, for the past thirty years, and one of the best known and most scholarly priests in the archdiocese. The deceased Priest, who was about 60 years of age was a native of Ireland and was a nephew of the late Archbishop Walsh of Halifax. ### Nova Scotia Leads in Apple Shipments.

Boston, Jan. 7 .- By the compila tion of statistics of the apple ship-ments from the eastern ports of North America it is shown that there was a large decrease in the number of barrels shipped from every city except St.

John, N. B., and Halifax, N. S.,
which shipments were larger than ever

From Boston 153,542 barrels were

From Boston 135,342 hereis were seut, compared with 275,810 in 1907 and 430,940 in 1906. The New York shipments this year showed a decrease of 75,559 herreis. The total number of barrels of ar-ples shipped during the season of 1908-09 from St. John, N. B., Halifax and Annapolis, N. S., were 367,006, an increase over the preceding season of 77,994 barrels, and 188,659 barrels

over 1906-97.

Among the other ports Montreal was the only one whose shipments exceeded these of Helifax, shipping 556. 845 barrels, against 336,982 irom Halifax

Portland, Maine, was also far below Portland, Mance, was sist far below its last year's record. After seading away last season 170,291 barrel, a gain of 23,158 this year but 53,271 barrels were shipped, a decrease of 115,020.

Most of the fruit sent from these

ports go to Liverpool, London, Man-cheeter, Glargow and other foreign places. This year a considerable quar-tity was shipped from Halifax to South Africa, where the freight rate is \$2.65 a barrel, or about twice the cost of the

## THE DIGBY RECORD.

DIGBY, N. S., Jan. 20, 1909.

Halifax is waking up. A meeting of citizens was held at the School for the Blind, Halifax, on Tuesday of last week, to devise means of advancing the cause of temperance and moral reform. About 25 were present, among them being Bishop Worrel, Judge Russell and others. After resolutions had been passed, favoring cutting the number of licenses from ninety to fifty, inspecting liquor, keeping a "black list" of habitual drunkards and doing away with the open bar, it was decided to refer the whole matter to committee to draw up a platform, arrange for a public meeting and do everything to arouse interest in the matter.

Edward Smaney, the fifteen-year-old gammer school student of Roselle Park, N. J., who invented a wireless telegraph instrument that puzzled experts recently, has perfected a wireless tele phone with which he is giving practical demonstrations. He has established communication with the home of a friend, distant several hundred feet, and is gradually extending the distance. He refuses to discuss his system. Young Smaney has been visited by scores of electical experimenters, who regard him as a prodigy.

Everybody is interested in the remarkable showing of the life insurance business as reported by Superintendent Kelsey, of New York. The falling off has been enormous between the years 1906 and Dec. 30, 1907. The point of Mr. Kelsey's report is the great decrease in the amount of insurance last year, \$241,496,308. Of the 370,000 policies which terminated only 53,167 were by death and 14,247 by maturity, while 99,554, amounting to \$211,008, 495, were surrendered, and 210,565, amounting to \$307,639,953 lapsed.

The Railway Commission in session at Ottawa announces that existing classifications and rates for all Canadian express companies were abrogated, and the whole business summarily returned to the position it occupied prior to the first day of the year. Even the rates charged since the New Year were pronounced to have been illegal. The companies were absolved from any wrong intent.

Two thousand men waited the other night in line on the Bowery at New York to get free a cup of coffee and a slice of bread. All were hungry and presumably all were workiess. There is much wealth in New York, and much liberality, but the poverty that keeps it company is vast and is not decreasing.

There is a big falling off in the private legislation of the coming session of the Dominion Parliament except divorce. Only sixty-eight applications have been made for the passage of priyate bills and twenty of these are for divorce. This is the divorce reco d.

The total losses of property by fire last year, according to incomplete reports, amounts to something like \$190-000,000 which is several millions of dollars in excess of the losses for the year preceding.

In twelve months to December 31 last the debt of Canada was increased by \$37,830,315, or over \$3,000,000 a month. During the time also the revenue fell off and all kinds of expenditure increased.

## **NEW VESSEL FOR CLEMENTSPORT** MAN.

A recent Boston paper contains a full description of Schr. Stanley M. Seaman, launched Dec. 22, by the Cobb-Butler Co. The Seaman is a beautifully modeled and substantially built double deck four masted schooner, designed for the coastwise and Porto Rican trade. She is 189 feet in length, 39 feet in breadth and 20 feet in depth. She has a gross tonnage of 1060 and net tonnage of 963. The frame is of oak, hardwood and hackmetack, and the planking and ceiling are of yellow pine. She is square fastened and extra strong. There is an unusual amount of galvanized work in the vessel's equipment. One of her boats is fitted with a six horse power gasoline engine. The two houses are 32x26 and 29x23 feet respectively. The after house is beautifully finished in hard wood with panelled ceiling. It includes main cabin, dining room, captain's cabin, a bath room, two spare state rooms. rooms for the mate and steward, and pantry. All rooms heated by steam. The forward house contains engine room, galley and forecastle. An unusual feature is placing the windlass Miss Purdy, who has been visiting inside the engine room. ## THE WINTER KOUS-ING OF SWINE.

It is at this season of the year that the housing of swine becomes a more or less difficult problem. This is more particularly true in regard to the housing of sows due to farrow in the spring. It is chiefly on the housing that the vigor of spring litters depends. The revised edition of Bulletin No. 10 of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, treats this question in a very practical manner. It says:

"Much of the encess of hog-raising depends upon suitable housing. Suitable housing does not, however, demand expensively built houses and pens designed so as to provide sammer temperature during the winter season. For broad some due to farrow in the late winter or early spring months there is no better shelter than the movable cabin. A number of these can be ranged side by side in or near the barnyard. If kept comfortably bedded four or five large sows will lie very comfortably in a cabin constructed according to directions given further on. The old style of rail creep beneath a straw stack, so long as it is closed on three sides, affords a fine bed for breeding sows or even growing pigs. On some of the most extensive hogbreeding establishments the only shelter given the sow in winter is an old barn or shed, lined up to keep the draught out, and having a constantly open door which affords free and unlimited access to the open air. The feeding is done in the open, which compels the herd to take a good amount of daily exercise, upon which good health so much depends. Sows thus housed and fed on foods composed of pulped roots and chopped grain, bran, etc., given in a rather dry consistency, will maintain a fine condition for success ful motherhood."

Value of Farm Lands and Stock.

OTTAWA, JAN. 14-The census department issues a report for last year on live stock and farm land values and on farm wages. The report gives average value of farm lands (of the whole Dominion at \$35 70 per acre. The average in Nova Scotia is placed at \$21.40. Prince Edward Island \$33.70. The average value of borses at end of year is placed at \$46 for yearlings or under \$130 for one to three years old at \$143 for borses over three years. Horses of three years are below \$120 in the eastern provinces but up to \$170 in the west. Average value of cows in the Dominion at the end of the year was \$34, the Nova Scotia price being

### DEEP BROOK'S BIG SUMMER HOTEL.

A correspondent sends the following lescription of the new summer- hotel being built by Capt. John D. Spurr on Pinkney's Point, juacacross the harbor from Digby: Work has been suspended for a few

Work has been suspensed for size the weeks on the new hotel to give the carpetters a chance to make up the window frames, etc., so as to have them ready to resume work when the days get a little longer and the weather leget a little longer and the weather less severe. Perhaps a little description of the building would be interesting to many readers. The think building is 75x88 feet with ell 20x36. All thee stories in height. The dining room extends the whole width on west end and will be 38x85 feet in one room. Next to the dining room is the main ball, 20 feet wide, and on other side of hall are parlors and offices. The two upper flats are laid off with two rows of bedrooms on each side of main hall the outside rows being lighted by win-dows and the inside rows by the light dows and the inside rows by the right shaft, which is the whole width of main half and 60% red by a cupola, making four stories in all. There will be about one hundred bedrooms, eight private bath rooms, and six public bath.

The eye looks almost directly down on Bear Island, to the south four miles up Bear River, to the west across to Digby and overland several miles down over the St. Mary's Bay district, to the north out through the Gut, and on a clear day to the New Brunswick shore, to the east the heaptiful hasin as fee Annapolis and the intervening fields and settlements. 





### Deep Brook's New Summer Hetal.

IT WILL CONTAIN ONE HUNDRED BED-ROOMS, AND FOURTEEN BATH ROOMS

A Deep Brook correspondent sends the following description of the new summer hotel being built by Capt J. D summer hotel teing built by Oapt J. D. Spurr:—Work.has been suspended for a few weeks on the new hotel to give the carpenters a chance to make up the window-frames, etc., so as to have them ready to resume work when the days get a little longer and the weather less severe. Perhaps a little description of the building would be interesting to many readers. The main building is 78x68 feet with ell 20x36 All three stories in height. The dining room extends the whole width on westend and will be 36x68 feet in one room. room extends the whole width on west end and will be 36x88 feet in one room. Next to the dining room is the main hall, 20 feet wide, and on other side of hall are parlors and offices. The two apper flats are laid off with two rows of bed-rooms on each side of main hall, of hed-rooms on each side of main hall, the outside rows being lighted by win-dows and the inside rows by the light shaft, which is the whole width of main hall and covered by a cupola, making four stories in all. There will be about four stories in all. There will be about one hundred bed-rooms, eight private hath-rooms, and six public bathrooms. The view, especially from the upper windows, is magnificent. ### THE DIGBY RECORD.

Digsy, N. S., Feb. 3, 1909.

An analysis of the personnel of the new House of Commons with respect to places of birth and religions gives the following interesting figures: In the last House there was 200 native born Canadians, in the new House the native born number 204. There are six English born, as compared with four in the last House. Ireland sent four sons to the old House, but there are only two native Irishmen in the new House. In each House the membership included three men who were born United States. Scotland had three re-presentatives in the last House; now it has only two. The new House also includes one member who was born in includes one member who was born in South Africa. By religions the figures are equally interesting. The Roman Catholica are exactly of the same force as in the old Rouse, the figure in each case being 70. The Presbyterians number 46 in the new House; last year, they had 47. The Methodist Church is represented by 50 in the new House, as against 40 in the last Parliament. The Church of England has 41 as against 42. The Baptists numbered 8 in the former House; in this shey are 6. One addition to the this they are 6. One addition to the religion is a Universalist. The Congregational figures are 2 the same as last year. And there is one Lutheran and one Farring don independent, just as there was in the last House.





to be satisfied that a special committee ought to be appointed.

Mr. Foster said the committee should be a small one and should be confined to the fisheries.

Mr. Brodeur announced that the government accepted with pleasure the suggestion contained in the resolution, and the change would soon be made As to the industry generally, the gov-ernment had been doing something for its development, an important move being the paying of a portion of the express rates on fish shipments from the Maritime Provinces, one effect being to greatly simulate shipments. The dog fish reduction works were an experiment, and he hoped that when it could be shown they were a commer-cial success the public would take hold of the industry. There was no politics in the administration of the fisheries, said Mr. Brodeur, but it could not be beped that all the regulations would be observed. 



As mentioned in the columns of this paper a few days ago, the Department of Agriculture has employed the services of Mr. H. G. Payne, of Granville Ferry, to inspect those parts of Digby, Annapolis and Yarmouth Counties in which the Brown Tailed Moths have teen discovered. For various reasons, which cannot but appeal to the public, the Department has decided to discontinue the giving of bounties. It tran-spires that a number of people in the sections which have been infested with the Brown Tailed Moth have collected nests and are holding them with a view to obtaining the bounty. If a bounty were to be paid, we would be quite in sympathy with these people, but as it has been definitely decided not to pay a hounty, we hope that these people will see to it that the nests of these pernicious insects are immediately destroyed.

Up to February 13th, Mr. Payne secured and destroyed 168 Brown Tailed Moth nests, It is to be sincerely hoped that, with the hearty co-operation citizens throughout the sections of the country infested, he will be successful in getting and destroying almost, if-not all the Brown Tailed Moth nests there are.





#### COLD STORAGE

#### Opens up New Possibilities for our Farmers.

(From The St. John Evening Times.)

That St. John is to take its place among the largest cold storage centres, if not become the largest in Canada, would seem to be indicated by the volume of business done by the New Brunswick' Cold Storage Company during the last year during the last year.

It is estimated that 2,000 cars of

goods have been handled, with a valu-ation of about \$1,000,000 (one million) dollars. The bulk of the goods were, of course, of a perishable nature. The largest quantity of any one class stored was apples, which totalled 90,000 bar rels, probably the record of any cold storage plant in Canada. Probably the feature of the business here has been the western market for New Brunswick sheep. There has been shipped to Winnipeg the immense number of 15,000 carcasses. The open-ing of this market bids fair to mean much for New Brunswick farmers, as the sheep already shipped have sur-passed the western article to such an extent that the New Brunswick pro-duct is in demand. The fish business mounting to 100 cars within the last three months, has been a feature.

The feature in the fish haviness has been the shipment from here of large quantities of eels to the United States,

guantities of eets to the United States, English and German markets, about 50 tons being exported. Haddock and cod, too, have been exported largely. A considerable quantity of butter and eggs has also been handled by the

company Superintendent Crawford, talking with a Times man, said his company had been most unfairly criticised on this score, having been accused of being responsible for the high price of these articles during the past winter. "I will say," said Mr. Crawford, "in the butter and egg question, the cold stor-age company had nothing to do with the prices. People here haven't taken up the idea to the extent that it would

While the people locally have not taken hold the way the company would have wished, Mr. Crawford says there is every indication of improvement in this regard. BROWN-TAIL MOTH POISONING.

So far very little is known in Nova Scotia of the highly poisonous proper-ties of the Brown-Tail moth caterpillars. This poisonous quality appears in the tiny caterpillars in the nest and continues with increasing force as

the caterpillars approach maturity.

The writer has at different times taken a dead Brown-tail moth catertaken a dead Brown-tail moth caterpillar and just brushed it against his arm with a result that the poison or dirmstitis as it is called, would develop just as readily as front the living insect. In conclusion, the only satisfactory way of combating this pest is to collect the winter nests as soon as the leaves have fallen enough to see them and the spraying in the caterpillar season with some poisonous mixtures. A good exspraying in the caterpilis season win some poisonous mixtures. A good ex-ample of the reduction of these insects by the collecting of the winter nests can be seen in the first annual report of the Gypsy and Brown-tail moth commission of Massachusetes, where Tällian Allen, Assistant Superintencommission of Massachusetes, where Lillian Allen, Assistant Superintendent, of Mount Auburn Cometery, collected during the winter 1903-5, 700 bushels of Brown-tail moth nests, averagering 300 to the bushel or a total of 231,000 nests. Estimating these at the average figures 250 caterpillars nest. We have 57,750,000 caterpillars

destroyed by this operation.
