"Typhoid Mary" Breaks Her Parole SOUED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF THE

As the result of an epidemiological investigation conducted by the Ty phold Fever Division of the Bureau of Infections Diseases into the "tecent outbreak of typhoid fever in the Sloane Hospital for Women, the source of infection has been found to be none other than the well known bacillus carrier, Mary Malion, popularly nick-named "Typhoid Mary." I b will be recalled that this carrier was originally discovered in 1907 by Soper, who was able to trace ber asso-ciation with some twentyfive cases of typhoid fever in the bomes of those where she had worked as a cook. These facts having been brought to the attention of the Department of Health, Mary was taken to the Recep-tion Hospital and detained as a person whose continuance at large would be a mennece to the cours were denied, the court holding that the Department of Health was fully within its rights in

The general movement of the lobsters is towards shore in sum mer, and out into deeper water in the winter, so that if a particular area is fahed out, its will not be speedily re-populated by lobsters from other portions of the coast, but must mainly depend on fry being carried there during its free swimming stage. While a large lobster has a large number of eggs, the proportion that come to mat-urity is very small, and in a compartive way the number of eggs produced is small. For instance, a hearing yields double the number of eggs produced by an average lobster, a mackerel four times as many. While the Canadian Atlantic Cosst

Though the catch has not declined as much be expected it must not be forgottan that the efforts to keep it up have greatly in creased. The general use of mota boats has enabled much more inten sive and extensive fishing to be carried on.

All these conditions points with un-wavering clarmss to the fact that if the fishery is to be maintained in a flourishing condition, the regulations governing it must be sharply restrict ive; but the usefulness of such regula-tions must be measured by the degree to which they are observed. The high price of lobsters in recent years has been a strong lure to carry on illegal flabing and canning during the close season, and there seems little room for doubt, to eay the least, that such has not in all instances, been discourged by important canner. It is, however, very gratifying to note that illegalities are realidy disspearing. Not only is the Department much better equiped than is 'ever has been to cope with such practices, but it is wident that those energing in the industry are realizing that it is to their permanent advantage to have the fahery properly


