## The Liquor Traffic.

THE FORK OF THE YALE AND DAMN  
ING. SYSTEM WILL WORK IN CANA  
DAN GEISS LONG AFTER THE  
WAR AGAINST THE HUNS  
IS OVER!"

Yes, prohibit it! See the law of Canada against it. The liquor traffic is an evil and only so evil. The drink evil is a curse, and always a curse. And in the white light of these war times the first talk about "personal liberty" to drink whiskey, that used to pass for personal independence, is now disproved and turned to railing fully.

And what was legalized evil in the province is still evil when legalized in the Dominion. In the light of the past six months in Ontario no man will stand up and with back the bar room or the drink traffic. To argue the matter is worse than a waste of time. It is an insult to the intelligence of the people of Canada. The time for argument is over. "Do it," is the duty of the hour.

The leaders in the temperance reform movement should lead. They should not temporize over methods or allow the cause to be side stepped by those with ends to serve that are not the supreme good of the men of vision, see that the full measure of prohibitory legislation is not now in advance of public opinion.

Recent months have given the lie direct to all the old time arguments of the license advocates. "You can't license an evil and keep that evil within bounds. Britain has tried to license the drink evil and has lost the social evil in the neighborly hood of military camps. What a ghastly force, what a heartbreak mood, it has proved! The sin of it is eating like a cancer into the very life of the Nation today, in spite of all the strong words of Arquist and all the stern words of Lloyd George. And the poison of the vice and damning system will work in Canada as well as in Britain. The war against the huns is over. No wonder the indignation of thousands of Canadians burns hot at the thought of the great Mother Country stopping short in the campaign against the twin evils of intemperance and vice.

But Canada's hot words lose half their burning power so long as Canada the nation delays to enact the laws that will put the liquor traffic and the drink evil, and their associated parasites utterly out of Canada's bounds. There is no use playing with this matter. If this evil is doing the devil's work with the manhood and the womanhood of Canada, then Canada, the government and parliament and the people of Canada, cannot rest with prohibitions here and there. Local laws will not do. A national evil demands a national remedy. A house divided against itself cannot stand. Quebec allowed to and "Abolish" the liquor traffic in this time of the Nation's peril. The National government is the servant of the Nation. Let the people and the leaders of the people say "National Prohibition," and then mean what they say, and Canada will be a "bone dry" country from sea to sea. The details of method matter little. First things must go first.

Nothing spoken by any Canadian, or published in any Canadian journal, against the drink evil and its accessories in England, as known directly to the Canadian soldiers in the military camps, at all compares in directness, in emphasis, and in bitter tone of denunciation with what Englishmen themselves of the very highest standing, have been saying for many weary months.

No Canadian uses stronger language, or manifests fiercer passion, than did Premier Lloyd George himself in the days when Arquist was head of the government. And every Canadian who knows the premier is confident that Britain, with its entrenched social intelligence, would not today be lagging so far behind France, and Russia were it not that the "trade," with its widely scattered financial interests has dulled the moral sense of multitudes of people prominent or influential in the state and in the church.

The dignified, sober and conservative Speaker joins the *British Weekly* unabashedly and determinedly against the liquor traffic, as an indefensible and dangerous waste, which in serious war times should be abolished. And makes appeal to the now prime minister in these straight words:

"The British people have before them the opportunity to solve the liquor problem. Will they seize it, or will they let it pass unheeded, never to return? A series of astonishing accidents, and a fortunate moment in the mood of the nation, have combined to make it possible for Mr. Lloyd George to confer a great benefit on this country, and to secure for himself a pre-eminent position among modern statesmen. If we win the war under his premiership, though there will be gratitude to him in no small measure, the Nation will feel that in the last resort it has been not our statesmen, but our soldiers and sailors, the men on the sea and the men in the trenches, who by their valor, their self sacrifice, and their invincible steadiness have made us the victors. The palm of battle must go to them. If, however, the liquor problem is not solved in a way that is reasonable in itself and just to all—the reason in which it can now be solved—the praise will be his alone."

He will be the St George who has slain the Dragon."

The latest issue of the *Spectator* has two editorials on the waste and the danger of the liquor evil, filling two pages, strongly supporting the Lloyd George government, but with this warning:

"We can assure the government that the demand for 'Down Glasses' is not going to stop. To put it quite plainly, the people of Britain are not going to risk a famine which the government have themselves brought home to men's minds, or hinder the only action which may prove effective in meeting the submarine peril—the building of a new ship for every old ship sunk—because the government have not the strength to tackle the liquor problem. If the members of a conference of shipbuilders and other necessary trades were to tell the country, as undoubtedly they would tell it, the whole hideous truth about the way in which our national industry is being impaired by whiskey and beer, we do not believe that this or any other government, however strong, would be able to stand up against the anger of the people."

A "war government" must lead the Nation, not be killed from behind into doing its duty. Depend on it, if the government miss the opportunity which now confronts them their fate is sealed."

There you have it. And the *Spectator* that speaks that emphatic utterance is no mouthpiece of Nonconformist radicalism, no exhorter of the total Methodism. It is the most staid and the soberest of all the London weeklies, sometimes called "The Parson's Weekly." And it is this same journal that gives up one whole page to the announcement of the "Strength of Britain Movement," with emphasis on points like these:

"The real waste that is helping the Germans, and draining away Britain's Strength."

"The big alcohol leak the government won't see: £300,000 a day! which, deducting taxation, represents a net waste of £120,000,000 a year."

"Alcohol wastes the people's money Every day £300,000 flows into the public houses instead of into the National Savings Funds."

"It wastes the time of the temperate workman, and the time of the steady, temperate workman who often cannot get on with his work because other men are away on the drink."

"It wastes the power of the navy by hindering the completion of war vessels of every grade and delaying naval repairs. Admiral Jellicoe states that drink causes 30 per cent inefficiency in shooting."

"It wastes huge quantities of food products, and consequently forces up the price of bread and meat. It has consumed 3,000,000 tons of food since the outbreak of war."

"It wastes coal, of which there is such a shortage, that 11,000 miners have now to be taken out of the army for the coal mines, yes, the liquor traffic takes the entire output of 6,000 miners."

"It wastes 1,800,000 measurement tons of shipping per year."

"It wastes labor badly needed for munitions, shipbuilding, mining, and other war work."

"The man power it has wasted since the war began is just as if the entire nation had stood still for 100 days."

Now those statements of fact, touching the British situation, have never yet been disproved. Their political economy is sound. The logic of their argument is unassailable. Where, then, the sense of civic dispatching London contradicting the testimony of Canadian medical men whose professional experience is fit stand with the liquor evil in London and in the neighborhood of the military camps? Medical men of the very highest character, whose word in Toronto is as good as any man's oath, have implored the *Globe* again and again, to speak out against the drink evil, and its attendant, the social evil.

And it is quite too late in the day for arguments based on the "dangers" of the drink traffic, or on the effective ness of something less than prohibition. We in Canada have tried these lesser expedients. In war time nothing short of the strict enforcement of a prohibitory law will do.

And Canada, with hundreds of thousands of picked men in the trenches of Britain and France, has earned the right to speak out. A staggering soldier is never seen on the streets of Toronto, because the traffic in liquor is prohibited. Excuses for drunkenness in England will not be heeded so long as that traffic is allowed. The legalized liquor traffic is the government's crime, the people's disgrace, the Nation's peril. This "talk about 'extremists'" would be pitiful if it were not a heart break and a crime.

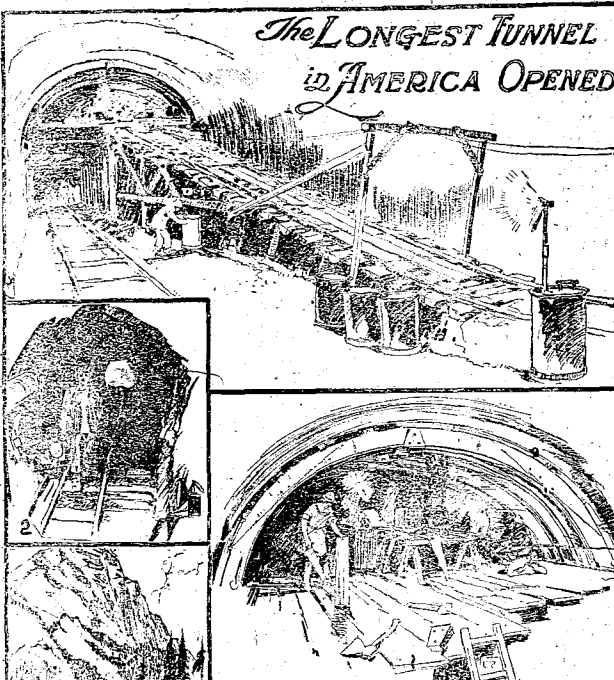

The completion of the Connaught Tunnel through Mount Macdonald in the Selkirk Mountains in British Columbia, with its five miles of double track railway lines, costing five and one half million dollars, results in many interesting developments in construction work on the Canadian Pacific Railway since the railway began operation in 1881. The first rail newspaper story after the opening of the Canadian Pacific Railway "broke" in February, 1882, near Flat Creek, near Oak Lake, near Brandon, Manitoba. That year was the worst for snow storms the prairies had ever experienced. One night, a train pulled by an engine which burned wood and had to stop to "blow up" the engine. The engine was stuck in the snow. The universal fuel on locomotives then was wood. Train No. 1 of the early days left Winnipeg at 6 a.m., stopping at Portage la Prairie, 66 miles west, for dinner and reaching Brandon at 6.30 p.m. The bulk of freight traffic at that time consisted of railroads and other construction material. Since that time the development has been rapid. The Canadian Pacific is now the greatest transportation corporation in the world.

Its mileage is 18,237, viz: C. P. R. 14,000 miles, 13,277 owned and controlled 4,856. Its equipment is valued at \$209,726,222, not including ocean, lake and river steamers. It has 65,000 employees, with a monthly pay roll of \$3,925,000 in 1916. It carried 13,833,975 passengers in 1916. Its capital stock is \$200,000,000. Its gross earnings according to the annual report for 1916, were \$129,481,885; expenses, \$80,255,565; net earnings, \$49,226,320. Its services include Canadian Pacific Trans-Alberta, Trans-Pacific Lines and Allan Line. It circles the world by land and sea.

The irrigation project of the company in Alberta will irrigate portions of a tract of 3,000,000 acres of land, east of Calgary. The western section, comprising 1,800 miles of canals and ditches providing for the irrigation of 370,000 acres of land has been completed. The great irrigation dam at Bassano, Alberta, built by the C. P. R., was opened April 25, 1914. It is 7,600 feet in length and contains more than a million cubic feet of earth and concrete.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has seen Canada increase from 4,000,000 population to 8,000,000; it has seen capital wealth increase from a few millions to \$2,250,000,000; it has seen 3,500 miles of railway lengthened to 25,300 miles, with annual salaries and wages of \$11,752,572. It has seen scientific farming produce million dollar crops, tremendous strides in medicine and surgery and a transformation in social conditions.

It has seen the trade of Canada develop for 17 months in 1916 to \$2,028,000,738, an increase of \$851,214,707 over 1915.

Canada has seen eight Governor-Generals since the Canadian Pacific Railway began operation. They were the Marquis of Lorne, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Stanley, Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Minto, Earl Grey, Duke of Connaught and Duke of Devonshire. The following premiers have held power since the inception: John A. Macdonald, Sir John Abbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert L. Borden. And the great railway company has seen Canada come third in the world's wheat crop estimate for 1916, with 276,342,600 bushels and 711,681 occupiers take farms and holdings.

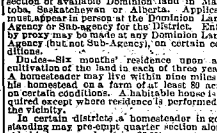

I was right beneath it, and was under the arm. My hand is the worse, but I am writing with it so it is not very bad. I was in the trench for some time but only once badly hurt, so think I must have been a small shell (why bang it so hard?) I was not hurt, but it was at that time it happened that my wounds were dressed."

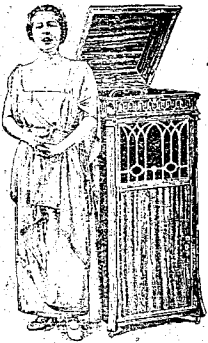

Important regulations covering the sale of bread are now in force in London. The chief orders are:

No more new bread.

Two kinds of loaf only—the round and the tin.

All bread to be sold by weight.

No bread which has not been made at least twelve hours shall be sold or offered or exposed for sale.

No crumb, crumb, or milk bread may be made.

No sugar may be used in bread making.

No baker shall exchange new bread for old.

No loaf shall be sold or exposed for sale unless it weighs one pound or an even number of pounds.

Rolls may be made but they must weigh two ounces each. The Food Controller's servants and weights and measures inspectors may at any time within thirty hours of the making weigh bread exposed for sale in shops in course of delivery.

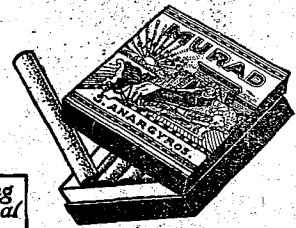

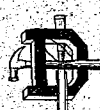
