

PRESERVING TIME RECIPES.

The Canada Food Board calls the attention of house wives to the importance of jam making. It large quantities of jam be made this year, the demand upon Canada from over seas for butter can be me to a much greater extent than otherwise would be possible. When jun is used, butter is not needed with bread strawberries; of the sugar.

Mix the strawberries and sugar in a kettle and let them stand over night. In the morning set the kettle over the fire on an acheestos mat, and bring the contents slowly to a boil. Do not stift the fruit any more than is absolutely necessary. Boil genity with muttiring until it is sufficiently thick and then put it wawy in sterile jars.

CURRAST SELLY.

4 lbs currant inica-



GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern,—GREETING:

A Proclamation of conditional amnesty respecting men belonging to Class 1 under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Class 1 under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in Our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada.

NOW KNOW YE that we in the exercise of Our powers, and of Our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known THAT THE PENALTIES OF THE LAW WILL NOT BE IMPOSED OR EXACTED as against the men who belong to Class 1 under Our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed Our Proclamation aforesaid; or who have received notice from any of Our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report; or who, having reported and obtained leave of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave, or have become deserters from Our Expeditionary Force, PROVIDED THEY REPORT FOR DUTY ON OR BEFORE THE TWENTY FOURTH DAY OF AUGUST 1918.

AND WE DO HEREBY STRICTLY WARN AND SOLEMNLY IMPRESS UPON ALL SUCH MEN, and as well those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that, if they persist in their failure to report, absence or descrition until the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law, SUBJECT TO THE JUDGMENT OF OUR COURTS MARTIAL WHICH WILL BE CONVENED TO TRY SUCH CASES or other competent tribunals: and also that those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfatures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern,—GREETING:

A Proclamation of conditional amnesty respecting men belonging to Class 1 under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

E. L. NEWCOMBE, Deputy Minister of Justice, able numbers of men belonging to Class I under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under Our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

Have failed to report for duty as lawfully required of them under the said Lilitary Service Act and the regulations thercunder, including the Order in Council duly pessed on April 20 last.

Or have deserted,
Or absented themselves without leave from our Canadian Expeditionary Force,

And it is represented that the very serious and unfortunate situation in which these men find themselves is due in many cases to the fact that, notwithstanding the information and warning contained in Our Proclamation aforesaid, they have misunderstood their duty or obligation, or have been misled by the advice of ill-disposed, disloyal or seditious persons.

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in Our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their boundern duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada.

NOW KNOW YE that we in the exercise of Our powers, and of Our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known THAT THE PENALTIES OF THE LAW WILL NOT BE IMPOSED OR EXACTED as against the men who belong to Class 1 under Our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed Our Proclamation aforesaid; or who have received notice from any of Our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report; or who, having reported and obtained leave of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave, or have become deserters from Our Expeditionary Force, PROVIDED THEY NEFFORT FOR DUTY ON OR BEFORE THE TWENTY FOURTH DAY OF AUGUST 1918.

AND WE DO HEREBY STRICTLY WARN AND SOLEMNLY IMPRESS UFON ALL SUCH MEN, and as well those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that, if they persist in their failure to report, absence discertion until the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued any instance with all the ricour and severity of the lew, SUBJECT TO THE JUDGMENT OF OUR COURTS MARTIAL WHICH WILL BE CONVENED TO TRY SUCH CASES or other competent tribunals; and also that those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.



500 ENTER BRITISH ARMY IN ONE DAY

New Record Made In New York City.

Five hundred applicants for admission into the British military service, were accepted one day last week at the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission, No. 220 Weets Forty second street, and hundreds of other applicants who besieged the office were turn ed away on account of the inability of the examiners to care for the crowds. Never before in the history of the mission have more than 350 men been accepted on a single day. The aver age last week was two hundred a day. Owing to the inadequate facilities for handling the crowds that througed every available inch of space in the criize, at two o'clock it was found necessary to close the doors. The rest of the afternoon was spent in disposing of the applicants, some of whom, had been waiting since early in the morning.

One hundred and seventy three of

been waiting since early in the morning.

One hundred and seventy three of the applicants accepted joined the Jewish battalion for service in Pales, time. Four thousand Jaws have en listed in the battalion in New York in the last six months. The first detach ment of 268, who went to England for training on Petruary 28, and the sec and detachment of 400, who followed on March 21, have seen two months of service in the trenches in Palestine. Many of the recruits were British West Indians, of whom 1,500 have englasting the service of the servi

listed at the New York office in the last seven weeks.
Under the British American draft treaty, which goes into effect on Sep tember 28, British subjects in the United States will be eligible for draft service in the American army. The British and Canadian Recruiting Mission will be closed, and British subjects who have passed the physicall examination, but have falled to report for duty, will be rounded up by the American authorities.

FACTS ABOUT THE MOON.

The apparent size and brightness of the moon depends upon its nearness to the earth, and the biggness and bright est full moon we have enjoyed this century was that of Janary, 1912, which came as near to earth as any moon can ever ecome—about 221,520 miles, that is to say. For another moon to rival that we must wait untill 1930.

The greatest distance the moon can ever recede from the earth 252,830 miles; when, of course, she appears smaller and dimmer.

The phases of the moon, since the shines by reflected sunlight, depends upon the continually changing the position with regard to the earth. It is because of this that the horas of the crescent moon in its first quarters always point to the left, while the last quarter the position is reversed, the hores then pointing to the right.

She always turns the same face to us so that what the other side looks like we do not know. The probability is however, that it does not differ materially in appearance from the one we are acquainted with, for the moon is a cold, dead world, a huge mass of burno out slag.

How Two British Airmen Escaped from Enemy Territory.

Reuter's special correspondent with the American Army in France tele

Router's special correspondent with the American Army in France tels graphs:

Two British airmen have just achieved an adventure which must seem incredible to those who are only acquainted with conditions in other parts of the lim. They were returning from a bombing expedition when their machine was disabled by and aircraft fire, and they were forced to make a landing in German territory.

In order to avoid observation, they treated to the meagre light of the moon to effect a landing, but their cantion almost proved their undoing, as they crashed into a quarry, which, however, had the advantage of completely concessing their machine. Only slightly injured, they savred at once towards the German lines, run ning most of the way, their only chance being to reach them before daybreak. The distance proved to be over twenty miles, in the course of which they had to cross a river, apparently the Seille, a tributary of the Moselle. One of them swam the river three times, once to ascertain the conditions on the further bank, and returning to bring his companion over.

On reaching the enemy communication trenches, they had several breathless escapes from discovery, but by extreme adroitness and good fortune they encoeded in getting to the front trench, and crawing through the barbed wire into No Man's Land, in which, in this part of the line, con siderable vegetation still flourishes. Luckily, he seemed almost as scared as they were, for they remained unlik. TO UNITED STATES CITIZENS IN CANADA.

By the United States Military Service Convention Regulations, approved by the Governor-in-Council on 20th August, 1918, MALE. CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES IN CANADA, WITHIN THE AGES for the time being SPECIFIED BY THE LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES prescribing compulsory military service, except those who have diplomatic exemption, ARE MADE SUBJECT AND LIABLE TO MILITARY. SERVICE IN CANADA, AND BECOME ENTITLED TO EXEMPTION OR DISCHARGE THEREFROM, UNDER THE CANADIAN LAWS AND REGULATIONS. The regulations governing this liability are published in the Canada Gazette (Extra) of 21st, August, 1918; copy whereof may be obtained upon application through the post to the Director of the Military Service Branch of the Department of Justice at Ottawa.

UNITED STATES CITIZENS of the description aforesaid who were IN CANADA ON 30th JULY, 1918, HAVE SIXTY DAYS FROM THAT DATE within which TO EXERCISE AN OPTION TO ENLIST or enroll IN THE FORCES OF THE UNITED

STATES, or TO RETURN to the United States; and THOSE WHO for any reason SUBSEQUENTLY BECOME LIABLE TO-MILITARY SERVICE IN CANADA HAVE THIRTY DAYS FROM THE DATE of the accruing of SUCH LIABILITY within which to exercise the like option. It is stipulated by the Convention also that certificates of diplomatic exemption may be granted within the optional periods aforesaid. EVERY CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES TO WHOM THE REGULATIONS APPLY is required to REPORT TO THE REGISTRAR under the Military Service Act, 1917, FOR THE province or DISTRICT WITHIN WHICH he is, in the manner by the regulations prescribed, WITHIN TEN DAYS AFTER THE EXPIRY OF HIS OPTIONAL PERIOD and will be SUBJECT TO PENALTIES IF without reasonable excuse HE FAIL SO TO REPORT. For the information of those whom it may concern Sections 3 and 4 defining the requirements of registration, with which it will be necessary strictly to comply, are set out substantially as follows:—





HOW SHIP ARMOR IS MADE.

Take a British navy list, and read the description of one of our modern fighting ships. The Iron Duke, for instance, which is one of our newest superdreadnoughts.

This means that the main armorbelt on the outside of the hull consists of twelve inches of steel. This belt covers the whole of the ship, and decends to some depth below the waterline.

P. D. signifies "protected deck." This is a kind of turtle-back covering the engines. It is 2 3.4 inches thick. It is not so thick as the rest, for it is so constructed that the enemy's shells will glance off it. The guns—the big 13 1-2 in. guns—are in turrets walled with 12 in. steel, while the C. T.—which is the coming tower, the brain of the ship—has a similar protection.

Armor is made of soft steel, the surface of which is hardened by a secret process, so that it resists penetration by shells.

Had the plate the same degree of hardness all through, it would crack like glass under the enormous impetus of the projectile. But as the face alone is hardened the face resistance combines with the toughness of the softer steel behind to give the best possible protection against splitting or shattering.

The new process for making armor is secret, but the method by which the Harveyized armor of our older ships was produced is roughly as follows:

Plates of steel are planed smooth. The plate is than put into a special furnace, with the planed surface upwards, and covered with a layer of an indicate the steel.

Victories by Berlin

LONDON, Sept—A remarkable story is told by a Belgian correspon-dent who personally saw the inci-dent, of how the Germans are manufacturing victories for home

amufacturing victories for home consumption.

Recently at the Courtrai railway station he bought a copy of the Berlin Tageblatt in which a big German victory was reported on the western front, where von Boeln's and von Hutier's armies were said to have captured 100,000 French, Belgian, American and English soldiers.

Almost immediately after he had purchased the paper a German officer stopped the news vendor and took away his remaining copies of the Tageblatt, substituting for them another bundle.



Khaki is an East Indian word, meaning dust color, or earth-color In the dry season in India the fields and vegetation turn brown and the roads are heavy with dust, which, carried by the winds, soon covers the foliage of the trees and shrubbery, so that the whole landscape presents a sombre aspect in one brown, dust colored hue.

Has any other soldier in history been exposed to a greater strain upon his faculties than Sir Douglas Haig has endured and triumphed over in the last three years less three months? Moscow Cathedral Hiss Dome of Copper and Gold.

The Cathedral of the Holy Savior in Moscow, says Stray Stories, is probably the most magnificent. In the world. Its five cupolas are covered with pure gold one-half inch in thickness. Its internal decorations are magnificent and very costly. This church is the nation's thank offering for the deliverance of Moscow from the French. It took fifty years to build, and its cost has been estimated at \$160,000,000.

In the Cathedral of the Assumption, situated inside the Kremlin, is the most sacred picture in Russia, the Virgin of Vladimir, said to be painted by St. Luke. The jewels which adorn it are valued at \$1,250,000, one emerald alone being said to be worth \$250,000. Napoleon took from the church five tons of silver and 500 pounds of gold, but its most precious treasures were concealed previous to the French invasion, and afterward restored. Nearby is the Cathedral of the Annunciation, with its many golden domes. It has a pavement of agate and jasper. The celebrated icon of the Virgin of the Don is its most prized possession.

The dome of St. Isaac's Cathedral in Petrograd, from which the Royalists fired machine guns during the revolution is the most conspicuous object in the capital. It is covered with copper overlaid with pure gold, no less than \$1,000,000 of gold being melted down for the pirpose. The total cost of this cathedral is estimated at \$125,000,000.


