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

#### Club Root Resistant Turnig

It is more apparent each year that we need disease-resistant plants to produce satisfactory crops. With many crobs it may take many years to produce such stock. With turnips a fair amount of resistance to club root has been obtained in several warkites. The variety which probably how given the present a fairners in the product of the probably how given the present Sections is several varities. The variety which pro-bably has given the greatest resistance is bably has given the greatest resistance is one known as Wilhelmsberger, an impart ation from Burope. Together with this variety are a few Bangholms which have stood up well against the desease. The Heroing strain, Charlottectown, Nappan and Kentville strains van De relied upon for a fair amount of resistance and will usually give a satisfactory yield on soil moderately infested with the club root organism.

The three latter mentioned strains have been developed by the Experimental Stations in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scota respectively. They are not however, fully proof against clubbing, but are very superior in this respect to the commercial varieties now grown. During the past three years further selections and crosses have been made in an endeavor to secure more highly resistant and heavier yielding strains than are now available. This work is still in the trial stage, but some of these selections show promise of superiority over any existing varieties tested locally. Further trial and selection will be necessary before such new strains can be distributed.

In the meantaine, any growers desirous

In the meantime, any grower desirous of obtaining seed of club root resistant turnips should endeavor to procure seed of one of the varieties mentioned above and preferably gin the order given. A light application of lime if the land is sour will enhance the chances of a cleaner crop of turnips. If, however, the land is to be used soon for potatoes, time is not desirable as it encourages the development of potato scab.



Rocky Mountain sheep and mule deer, at an estimated ten thousand head each, lead the list of varied Alberta, according to the recent ensus taken by park wardens.

grizzly bears, as well as numerous smaller species, abound, it is pointed out that the sheep and deer react at once to measures of pro-tection: While sheep have always, tection: even before the creation of the game reserve in 1907, been plentiful in the territory later to be known as Jasper Park, the fact that they are not hunsed now has drawn them down from the highlands to valleys where they may be readily observed.

The mule deer, too, has comdown to the floor of the Athabaska valley where the nearness of man far from being a danger, affords him some surety against the coy-otes and wolves along the northern border of the park. The mountain goat, on the other hand, whose numbers are fixed at about three thousand remains on the high rocky peaks, his natural retreat from molestation.





### Securing a Good Stand of Mangels

There are many farmers in the Mari-time Provinces who would grow mangels for their dairy cattle and poultry if they had any assurance that they could as-cure a good stand. The increase of club-root in swede turnips has also induced many to turn to mangels which are com-paratively free-from disease and insect-nests.

The mangel is a maritime plant and requires plenty of moisture for germination of the seed and for the growing crop. 

Burroughs, President and Manager of the Diatom Pro-ducts Company, said that the turn out was perfect in every detail, the plant was working right and his company had every confidence in the future of the industry. 



#### More Tourists in Province

F. G. Comean, chairman of the Tourist Committee of the Halifay Board of Trade states that the total incr ase in inward summer travel through the Yarmouth gateway in June was 23 per cent as compared with thesame month last year. In July the increase in inward passengers was around 11 per cent in comparison, with July, 1927, taing juto account both the Boston and New York services.

There was a falling off in the number returning from Yarmouth to Boston in July as compared with last year, indicating that many tourists entering the Province by the Yarmouth gateway were retutting via other routes.

The motor trayel entering Nova Scotia The motor trayel entering Nova Scotia via Amberst shows an increase of over 100 per cent in June and July, as compared with the corresponding months last year. The Digby and Halifax gateways figures are not yet, compiled, but it is asset to assume that both will show an increase.

The toutist registrations in Grand Pre Memorial Park in June were 65 per cent and in July 28 per cent in excess of regis-trations during these two months in 1927 All of which indicates the absorbing inter est taken in Nova Scotia's historic attractions of which Grand Pre Memorial Park and Fort Anne Park, Annapolis Royal are among the major attractions of this historic Province.

Reports from Saint John, N. B., indi-cate that this season has been the largest in its history, and so far is equal if not greater than during the whole of last s ason, Touiss started arriving into New Branswick earlier this spring and lawe continued to come in much larger numbers than in other years.

It can be taken for granted 'that drinking surface water is never absolutely safe. The fact that surface water can drain into a well is clear proof of the fact that ggms can get in a well should they lie in its pith. If a barnpard or any place where waste is thrown is situated on a higher level than the well, then sewer, matter may easily be carried into the well.

His was the first factory in Eastern Canada to instal Good-year machines in manufacture of shoes, and was also the first to unstal electric motors. The branch warchouse at Winnegg of the Varmouth factory was the first branch of a maritime manufacture to be established in the west. 





### MOTOR CONSTABLE



THE Motor Cycle Constable is appointed to enforce the Motor Vehicle Act in the interests of highway safety. It is his duty to protect the motorist. a motorist disobeys the law in regard to speeding the Constable acts under the following instructions.

"(1) Inform the offender that he has the option of paying then and there, the sum of \$10.00 as a deposit which is to be forwarded by the Motor Cycle Officer to the Provincial Highway Department for its con-sideration as to whether or not it will be accepted, under section 45, as full satisfaction, release and discharge of all penalties and imprisonments incurred by such offender for such violation."

(The Constable is given this authority for the convenience of the motorist. If the motorist is not satisfied that he has in-curred a penalty, he may so inform the Department of dighways and the case will be tried in Court.) be tried in Court.)

(2) Either forthwith arrest the

offender and bring him before a Magistrate to answer to the charge."

School is not a place to send a child just so mother or guardian can be free of day. It is not a place, or should not be, confinement and discipline re the outstanding influence upor the young mind.

This year, parents should make a resolution that they will visit the school at least a few times during the term. It will show that at interest is being taken and pupils will do better work for the encouragement, which the indications of aterest will give.

How many children attend school who are working under a handicap of physical inferiority? All too of physical inferiority? All too many, and the best sign that Nova Scotia is making feal progressis the increased attention which is being paid to the removal and correction of minor ailments which, not though serious of themselves, have a great deal to answe for in the form of backward pupils ndifferent attendance and inatten

#### Clarence Jameson Died Early Thursday Morning

Was Twice Elected to Parlia ment and Was Member of the Civil Service Commission

Clarence Jameson, Digby's most noted son. Member of Federal Parliament representing the constituency of Digby and Digby Annapolis from 1908 until appoint ed to the Civil Service Commission in October 1917, died at six o'clock yesterday morning at the Myrtle House. Death was due to angine pectoris. He was fifty eight.

Mr. and Mrs. Jameson arrived in Digby on September 4th on a visit of recuperation for Mr, Jameson. He was greatly improved in health and interested in the forthcoming provincial election, and all during his visit here had seemed in fairly good health, saving a slight cold contracted early in this week.

Early yesterday morning he was suffering pain and Mrs. Jameson administered a hypodermic, but he failed to rally and died shortly before six o'clock.

Mr. Jameson was a son of the late John and Sophie Jameson. He was associated, in his youth, was associated, in his youth, with the late T. C. Shreve, Barrister of Digby and shortly after Mr Shreve was elected Mayor was appointed, on April 25th, 1895, Town he resigned to accept the nomina-tion of the Conservative Party to contest the riding with the late A. J.S. Copp. Winning that election life held dar the good name and the tuned Digby from a Liberal good fortune of Digby town and surety to Conservative riding and again in 1911 repeated his success of the 1908 election. Aids to Navigation

In Hud on Strai

During the summer of 1927, three radio stations were established in Hudson strait by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the purpose of handling the reports on observations—of ice, weather, and other conditions—made by the expedition sent there for that purpose. The stations were located at Nottingham island, Port Burwell and Wakeham Bay, these points being considered at the time the most advantageous as bases for observing the drift of ice during the winter months the lest-named being the control station which main-tained uninterrupted communical tion with Ottawa. Valuable in formation was obtained concerning the movements of ice in the strait during the past winter and spring! not only from shore observations, but with the aid of aeroplanes which made numerous flights even during the extreme cold weather. Thes planes, having now served their purpose, have just been brought out, and the stations at Wakeham Bay and Port Burwell are closed. The preliminary work of investi-gation through the strait having een concluded, the establishmen of further stations on a permanent basis as aids to navigation will be undertaken during the coming

way water. A hundred mile trip with esquimanx dog team, accom-pany patrols to the Mounted Police, flying, boat and cance trips all along the Strait are only some of the experiences he had.

### Bringing the Pullets into Winter Quarters

Buildings which were used before should be thoroughly cleaned, repaired and disinfected before putting new stock into them. In addition to removing the litter, all the poultry fixtures as, for exitter, all the poultry fixtures as, for ex-imple, mash hoppers, dribking fountains and nests, should be taken out, the walls and ceilings brushed and the interior lives a good coat of white-wesh. This will improve the appearance of your louses and, at the same time, kelp to itsisfect them.

As you bring the pulletts in off the range, handle each bird as it will save you much time and money later. Pullets with shaltow bodies, small pelvic regions, crooked breast bones, and slow in maturing, are more profitably sold to the local market than put into laying houses. The only kind to keep is pullets that are of a tarilty appearance, in good health, active, alert, well matured and in good flesh.

This is also a good time to treat the pullets for lice, Birds that have been properly dusted with sodium fluoride or some good louse powder will remain free of lice all winter Give the pullets every chance possible to make a nice pro fit for you this fail and coming winter.

In handling young pullets remember that they are easily frightened; handle them has geptly as you can and for the first few weeks, while they are in the new quarters, move allowly about the house. Talk to the birds as you move through their pean. It is well to have the equipment as, for example, the meath hopper and drinking fountains, should be as near ly alike as possible to that used on the range. Care must be taken not to close the pullets in too suddenly. If you do, you may set them back two or three weeks.

It is advisable to move the pullets to It is advisable to move the pullets to their, permanent quarters a week or two previous to their consing into egg produc-tion. Moving them after they have started laying is almost certain to mean an upset and likely a partial or complete molt. All pullets should be off the range into the winter quarters sometime before

The expedition is the third important one Dr. Gates has conducted in recent years during the ammer, months, when he is free from his duties at the University of London, where he heads the botanical department. Three years ago he went up the Amazon River in South America, and two years ago he crossed the northern part of Russia with Russian cointies.

Dr. Gates is at present engaged on a second edition of his most important book, "Heredity and Fugenics," which has been widely translated:

The book is an attempt to bring to-gether for the first time all that is known of the subjects it treats. He is also the author of a book entitled. 'A Botanist in the Amazon Valley" and several other Important contributions to the world of scientific lettess.

Twenty-two years ago Dr. Gates was credited with one of the most importr ant discoveries ever made in the field of botony, when he proved that many plants which had been commonly thought to be which had been commonly thought to be shybrids, were actually the result of mutations, occurring spontaneously, and which could be detected by a count of the chromosomes which are found in regular number in various plants. This formed the busis of the now generally accepted cell theory of mutation, which has pointed to the origin of the false wild oat, the spittoid wheat, and many other harmful species found among plants which are winely cultured for commercial regasons.



#### Limit Trawlers

Ottawa, Sept. 14—And entirely the province of Nova Scotia has been adopted by order in council to effective September 30 these regulations to replace the special regulations in force since April 1922 which are rescinded. The regulations cover sport and nercial fishing.

Non-residents except those own ng summer homes, or owning or leasing fishing rights, are required to secure permits from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the fee being one dollar a day or five dol lars for the season. In angling, no one shall use more than one line or nore than three hooks on the lin Except by angling, bass is not to be between March 1 and Sep-ri 30. The minimum weight of bass which may be legally taken is fixed at two pounds.

During October and November no net shall be set for bass in any stream frequented by salmon and all nets be raised between Saturday vening and Monday morning Bass fishing by seine is prohibited

The export of soft shell, long neck or squirt clams in a raw state taken in the province between May and June 30 is prohibited.

No person shall carry on cod fish ing with seines at a less distance than a half mile from any fishing grounds where fishing hoats are anchored and where fishermen are ctually engaged in fishing for cod fish with books and lines.

Penalties and foreitures in cases of infraction of the regulations are to be paid to the Dominion Govern-ment where federal officers prosecute, and to the province where provincial officers prosecute.

Gaspereeu gill nets may be use in non-tidal waters until May 31 and until the same date in tidal waters, except in stream tributary to Minas Basin, Chignecto Bay and the Strait of Northumberland in which case the date is June 15.

SCALLOP FISHING

Regulations governing scallops provide a closed season in territorial waters from June 1 to October 15 and in extra territorial als waters from August 16 to October 15 and a minimum size of four inches.

With some exceptions the season for melt fishing with gill nets is from Octo ber 15 to February 28.

The closed season for trout is from O-ober I to April 30, except in Pictou an Antigonish counties, where it ends Marc 31. No one shall fish for trout except b angling. Jigging is strictly prohibited as is also fishing through the ice.

TRAWLER LIMITS

The use or operation of trawlers ing beam, otter, or other trawls of a milar nature is prohibited within the critorial waters of the Dominion.

Special regulations are provided for the county, Those for Halifax county ach county. Those for Halifax count imit seining to those holding license rom the Minister of Marine and Fisher and the applicant for a license a scine of fixed dimensions at not smaller than seventeen feet be boat not smaller than seventeen feet be a resident of the selaing district and have therein adequate facilities for storing and curing. A license shall entitle the holder to a catch of 20 barrells of mackeral the license terminating when this limit is reached. Seining districts in Halfax county are designated as follows: West Dover, Upper Prospect, Sambro District, Lower Prospect and Terence Bay, Pennant District, Herring Cove District.
