Thousands Attend Dominion
Day Celebration

Miss Shirley Snow Named "Miss Digby County"

Overcast skies and threatening weather failed to prove a jinx to Digby's annual Dominion Day (not Canada Day) celebration. The big event was attended by thousands who began flocking in to town during the early hours of the morning, remaining until the big midway on the Board of Trade athletic field closed down after midnight.

Long before the parade got underway the route was thronged with spectators.

The procession was headed by a group of majorettes, young ladies of the Teeners' Club, with Miss Barbara Underwood as drum major attired in tall white peak hats, white blouses and abbreviated white pleated skirts, who marched with precision to the music of the Digby Civic Band, directly behind them.

Then followed beautifully decorated cars and other vehicles. The first on the list was the V. O. N. car, decorated as a reminder of the 25th anniversary of the Order in Digby. This was followed by the beautifully decorated car of Miss Mildred Carty.

Perhaps there were fewer entries this year than in the past, but the quality of the floats was superior to any of Digby's Dominion Day parades. The judges, Earl D. Collins, Needham, Mass.; Mrs. Burns Cameron, Dartmouth, and C. H. Landers, Montreal, all guests at the Pines, found difficulty in choosing the winners, which were announced as follows:

Floats

Non-Commercial — 1st Prize, Digby General Hospital; 2nd, Zelmah Rebekah Lodge.

Commercial — 1st, Capitol Theatre; 2nd, Royal Department Store.

Novelty — Annapolis Board of Trade — a beautiful float depicting the famous old Fort Anne.

Single Team — Mrs. Dominic Melanson.

Special — Donald Cardeau as Indian boy.

Decorated Car — 1st, Mildred Carty; 2nd, Victorian Order of Nurses.

The parade, which lined up on Montague Row, took its route through Water Street, turning at Maiden Lane, continuing back over Water Street, up Warwick to King and the Board of Trade Athletic Field. The Sea Cadet Band took a prominent part in the procession. On the return trip they were joined by the prettily decorated doll carriages in charge of the little tots of the town. This section was judged by Mrs. L. E. Shafford, Miss Margaret Stewart and Mrs. H. G. Washburn. Winners in this section were: 1st, Mary Sweet; 2nd, Marlin Haynes; 3rd, Doreen Perry; 4th, Joyce Winchester. Special prizes were awarded Mary Winchester and Fred Lombard for originality, and other special prizes for doll carriages and carts went to Roger Winchester, Chester Winchester, Sally Winchester and Dorothy Perry.

Threatening clouds and scattered showers failed to keep many away from Digby for the annual Dominion Day celebration, nevertheless, these same clouds, along with a few thunder storms which took place in various sections of the county during the early hours had an adverse effect on the ox and horse-pulling contests scheduled for the afternoon.

Oxen are naturally slow travelers and farmers who had originally intended to enter teams in the contest, decided against making the trip to Digby. The result of this threatening weather was that only three double teams were entered — no oxen — and no single horses.

We are informed that one man came all the way from St. Stephen, N. B., to witness the ox pulling contest. The three entries, however, put on a fine show. The team taking first place was that of Arch. Comeau, Plympton. This team, tipping the scales at 2685 pounds, started a 5845 pound drag

or 213 per cent of its weight. Runner up was the 2915 pound team of George John, North Range, which started 5527 lbs., or 189 per cent of its weight. The third team, that of Harry Haight, North Range, weighed in at 3000 pounds and started 5245 pounds — 178 per cent.

A good crowd witnessed the boxing bouts, staged on the grand stand during the early part of the evening, and saw Art Robar, 142 lbs., knock out 142-lb. Eddy Barr, with a smashing left hook. Referee Freddie Cookson found it useless to complete the count of ten as Barr was completely out. This was the main bout.

The semi-finals ended in a draw with Bobby Vincent, local bank clerk, and George Chipman, of Saint John, both 135 lbs. The fight was a corker all the way with both lads plenty tired when the gong ended the scrap.

A preliminary bout showed Dick Abbott, 145 lbs., winning by a technical knockout over Rit Daley, 149 lbs., who was completely in a daze when Abbott threw a stinging straight right hand, and Daley's second, who was his father, Dave Daley, threw in the towel to end the fight in the first stanza.

Layton Savary, Joggin Bridge, weighing 132, outclassed and outpunched game Frankie Oliver, 130 lbs., in a gruelling bout in which Oliver bled freely.

Ronnie Cowan, 118 lbs., outclassed 116 lb. Duke Winchester in the curtain-raiser.

The well packed crowd was more than satisfied and thanks are extended to the judges, Jack Rosenthal and Ed. Morrissey, who did a good job. Thanks are also extended to Tommy Banks for time keeping and to Dave Daley and Gregg Gilliat for seconding each fight.

Referee Freddie Cookson, ex-golden glove champion and conqueror of Johnny Greco, the number one challenger for the world's championship, was trainer, promoter and manager of these boys — and we can expect to see more of his fights in the future.

Other sports events were the baseball games. In the first game Digby trimmed Annapolis 6-8 in the closest contest seen in the new baseball series. Digby jumped in to the lead in the first inning and held the margin until the sixth when Annapolis rallied to tie the score. Digby ended the scoring by putting two more runs across during the seventh.

Large Herring Catches

Local weir fishermen are reporting good catches of herring although these catches are not as large as last week. One fisherman stated there seemed to be plenty of herring in the Bay but they were not getting into the weirs.

Some ten herring boats are here from New Brunswick ports to transport the fish to canneries and processing plants in New Brunswick.

When the herring are first seized from the weirs they are loaded into flat bottomed boats resembling large dories. These boats have slatted false bottoms to permit the herring scales to pass through. After being collected in the small boats the herring are loaded in large quantities aboard power boats for transportation to the processing plants.

Scales that collect in the bottom of the small boats after passing through the slatted false bottoms are bailed out and placed in close mesh wire boxes to drain. The scales are later shipped to processing plants. Fishermen have been getting twenty-five cents a pound for these scales. The herring have been bringing \$16.50 a hoghead.

The price for scales has taken a heavy drop from that paid early in the spring. At that time the price ranged about eighty five cents a pound and revenue from the scales amounted to more than that of the herring.

Granville Ferry School Closing

A large number of parents and friends attended the closing exercises of Granville Ferry School which were held in the schoolhouse on Thursday at 2.30 p.m.

The program started with the same excellent routine which is carried out by the teacher, Mrs. Florence Willett, each morning, namely: Salute to the flag; singing of O. Canada, followed by the Lord's Prayer; then came a chorus sung lustily by the school: "Thank You God For Everything". Scripture readings were recited by the children, even the smallest ones taking part in an intelligent manner.

Mrs. Willett then put the children through a review of the past year's work, which was carried out in a most efficient manner and shows the patience and thoroughness with which Mrs. Willett carries out her training of the pupils of which there are 35 on the register.

Remarks by Rev. H. B. Wainright were much appreciated; prizes were then awarded and the program closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

(Continued from Page 1)

pupils competing. 2nd. the Commercial Pass which is a local certificate awarded to students who have successfully completed the requirements laid down by the Department of Education for commercial studies. These students must hold either a Grade XI or XII pass certificate. 3rd. the local Pass Certificate which is awarded those who have completed the requirements of the grade concerned but not obtained a high enough standing to secure an accredited award. These allow holder to pass to next grade but are not recognized for purposes of matriculation, teaching certificates or nursing diplomas.

The report outlined some of the 1946-47 policy. It was stated that next year there would be three courses for Senior High: one, an Academic Course, designed for those seeking matriculation into University or desirous of entering the teaching profession; two, a General Course for those not seeking Academic but looking forward to a more practical course. In this course certain concessions will be given in Mathematics and Science in XI and XII with electives from Commerce and Music. Three, a Commercial course, which will be for holders of certificates of Grade XI and XII who are looking forward to a business career and a Commercial diploma. Additional electives would be given in Senior High, it was stated. These would be Music and Vocational Guidance. Arrangements have been made with local music teachers to follow the course laid down by the Department so that credit may be obtained towards a Provincial Certificate. Vocational Guidance will be introduced next term under the direction of Douglas Ormond, new vice-principal, who has supervised this course in Amherst for several years.

After delivering the principal's report Commissioner Cardoza made a few fitting remarks regarding the retirement of Miss McWhinnie. He stated the good wishes of the school board and the people of Digby as a whole would always follow her and he expressed the thanks of the gathering for the many years of splendid service given the Academy by Miss McWhinnie.

Following the principal's report Chairman Dr. McCleave outlined the proposed plan of consolidation and the development of the Rural High School in this area. He stated that the Board felt that these things were badly needed and urged the support of the townspeople in securing them. He was of the opinion that in the near future, by fall at least, the Board would be in a position to place definite facts and figures before the people. "We need this school and if we go after it we can get it—so let us leave no stone unturned," he said.

T. A. M. Kirk, school inspector, spoke briefly concerning the new development and urged the people to give full consideration to the matter.

Prizes were awarded to the members of the classes by the members of the School Board. Mayor Merkel presented the Mayor's prize for English to Ruth Lent. The Readers' Digest Valedictory award was presented to Miss Lent by Dr. Dickie. Prizes to Grade XI were awarded by Com. H. J. Campbell; to Grade X by Commissioner A. S. Warner and special awards were given by Secretary C. W. Smith. The award of a Mount Allison Entrance Scholarship of \$150. to Vernon MacKay was made by Victor Cardoza.

At the close of the evening the gathering was asked to stand while Commissioner Cardoza read the Honor Roll of the Academy, those boys who laid down their lives in the service of King and Country in the war 1939-46.

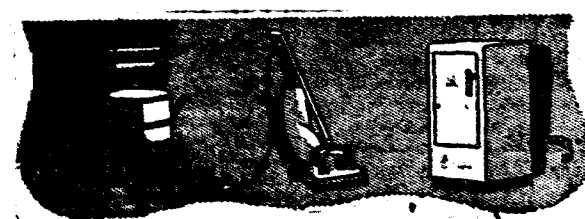

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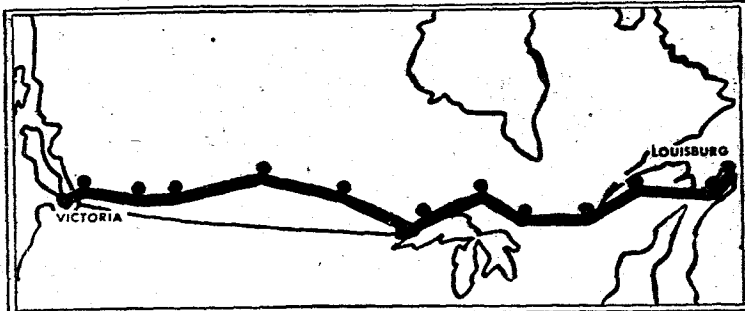

To Raise Funds For Sea Cadets

Fears were expressed that the splendid work the Sea Cadets are doing might have to be halted due to lack of funds at a special meeting of the Sea Cadet Committee Sunday afternoon.

It was decided at the meeting to put on a special entertainment on August 3rd, in conjunction with the Sea Cadet Tag Day to be held on that date to raise funds to carry on the work of the Sea Cadets. Special Boxing bouts are being arranged as well as a dance and other entertainment. The place where this event will be held has not yet been decided but will be announced later.

Over eighty boys are now enlisted in the local Sea Cadet Corps and great progress has been made since the corps was organized some three years ago. Uniforms have been secured for all members and equipment valued at over \$5,000 has been secured. Work has been done towards establishing a camp headquarters on Bear Island which was given to the youth of the town by David Landers some time ago. Less than a month ago a bugle band was established and has made splendid progress. Proof of this progress was shown by the fine appearance of the band on Dominion Day and at the Annual Inspection. The band is being trained by David Daley and Charles McBride. There are twelve members in the band but every member of the corps is receiving training and is allowed to compete for a place in the band.

Beside the actual training in Sea Cadet Work the members of the corps are receiving training in many subjects that will stand them in good stead in the years to come and it is felt that a great loss would be suffered if this training were not continued. Every effort is being made by the committee to raise funds to carry on the work. It is estimated that about \$1,000 a year will be needed for the purpose. This money will be spent for uniform replacements, expenses of trips for the cadets, band instruments and music and other expenses.



A candle lighted birthday cake, in honor of H. M. Warne and Chester M. Levy, president and 1st vice president of the Digby Kiwanis Club was featured at the regular meeting of the Club Monday. This week's meeting was held at Harbour View Hotel, Smith's Cove.

The meeting was addressed by C. H. Lander, president of the National Drug and Chemical Company, who is vacationing at the Pines. Mr. Lander, who spoke on the Drug Business of Yesterday and Today, pointed out some of the advances that have been made by the drug and chemical industry in the Dominion.

He declared that at the present time Canada was second to none in the production of heavy chemicals.

Speaking of fine chemicals, (those used for medical prescriptions, etc.) he said that before the first war 95% of these chemicals used in the United States and Canada were imported from Germany and Great Britain; by 1922 the Americans were producing 50% of their own fine chemicals and by 1926 Canadian chemists were producing 50% of their own requirements. At the present time Canada is producing 90% of her fine chemicals.

In closing he prophesied startling chemical discoveries will be made in the near future—and new "wonder drugs" will soon be made known to medical science.

New Boatbuilding Industry

Digby's newest industry, the Digby Boatbuilding Co., Ltd. is getting into full swing. Work is rapidly progressing on a sixty-five foot scallop dragger being built for Captain Burton Ritcey of Riverport. The keel of the boat has been laid, molds are in and the boat is now ready for ribs and planking.

Recently organized, the company is located in the former Reserve Army Barracks at the Racquette. A great deal of new machinery has been installed and other equipment is on its way. A steam boiler has been installed for steaming plank and the shop will shortly be fully equipped to handle all types of boatbuilding. President of the new company is A. R. Pune.

One pleasure craft, recently completed, has been shipped to the owner in Boston, Massachusetts, and several small craft have been constructed with contracts for many more. At present sixteen men are employed at the plant but it is hoped to increase this staff as soon as labour is available and new equipment is installed.

Applying for Gasoline Outlets

The Public Utilities Board will consider 22 applications for new retail gasoline outlets in their tour of five South Shore and Annapolis Valley towns this week.

Today promises to be a busy day with the Board sitting at Yarmouth, Weymouth and Annapolis Royal, hearing in all 14 applications.

Final sitting for the week will be at Kentville tomorrow when four will submit applications.

Those slated to appear before the Board at Weymouth this afternoon are Bernard J. Comeau, Concession, and Geo. O. Hankinson, Weymouth.

To Form Company to Operate Athletic Field

Decision to organize a company to own and operate the Digby Board of Trade's Athletic Field project was reached at the Meeting of the Board on Tuesday night. It was decided to set up a committee which would be given authority to form a company as they deem proper for the purpose of taking over owning and managing the skating rink and athletic field. Members of the committee are F. L. Anderson, A. L. Robinson, W. L. Troop, Sypher Morrell, B. H. Ruggles and Jack Brittain.

This decision was reached following the report of the results of the July 1st Fair by W. L. Troop, the manager, in which it was stated that the gross proceeds were about \$11,000, with a net of approximately \$6,500. Mr. Troop stated this money was being held in trust and would be turned over to the Board for the purpose for which it was raised, namely the building of a rink. He urged immediate action on this matter and suggested the setting up of a company to start work at once. The \$6,500 he felt, was not sufficient to complete the rink but if a company were formed shares could be sold and sufficient money raised. "It is not the work of a Board of Trade to build, operate or manage athletic fields or rinks," he said. "The only efficient and feasible way in which we can get immediate action on this is in the form of a company to take over the whole set-up."

Considerable discussion took place regarding the details of the proposed company, voting powers, etc. It was the consensus of opinion that the Board should receive shares in the new company in return for the assets turned over. It was pointed out that with the proceeds from the July 1st Fair, the Board's assets in the project would amount to about \$12,000.

Dies as Result of Accident

Edmund Comeau, aged 70 years, of Grosse Coques, passed away at his home Sunday morning, three days after being knocked down by an automobile driven by Mrs. Joseph Thibault, of Concession. Mrs. Thibault was driving at a low rate of speed when Mr. Comeau, who was riding along the highway on his bicycle, swerved suddenly in front of the car. Mrs. Thibault stopped and asked if Mr. Comeau was hurt, and on receiving the reply that he was all right and unharmed proceeded on her way. Mr. Comeau left the scene of the accident and stopped on his way home to speak to one of the neighbors.

On arriving home he laid down on a sofa and shortly afterwards complained of not feeling well. He later lapsed into unconsciousness and a doctor was called. He never recovered. The coroner's jury absolved Mrs. Thibault of blame. It is believed Mr. Comeau suffered from a concussion of the brain. He leaves three sons in Grosse Coques, Eli, Eddie and Emile; and three daughters, Therese (Mrs. Bonnie Robichaud, Grosse Coques, and Elizabeth and Regina, in the United States. One sister Mrs. Simon Dugas, Corbier, and one brother, Etienne, also survive him.

"Cornwallis" was advised last week that he had been chosen as one of the three Nova Scotian Sea Cadets to represent the province at the annual New Brunswick Sea Cadet Camp. Seven names from Cadet Corps in Nova Scotia had been submitted and the three representatives were chosen on merit. A telegram of congratulations was received Friday by C.P.O. Winfield from A. S. Dunlop, President Mainland Division Navy League of Canada.

After receiving his travel warrant C.P.O. Winfield left on Saturday for R.C.S.C. "Rodney" Saint John and will proceed from there to the Sea Cadet Camp.

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"Is Digby Missing a Bet"

To the editor of the Courier:

Sir:—Your issue of June 27th asked "Is Digby Missing a Bet?" You pointed out how other places in Nova Scotia were capitalizing on sport fishing, locally available, but that at Digby not a sport fishing boat was to be had. Curious. I had just been writing an article for some travel magazine, entitled, "If Ever I Saw Opportunity Go to Waste." In the article I, too, referred to the sport fishing for pollock to be had for the asking in Digby. But if only one could get at the Gut in a small boat. Moreover, to judge by conversations with local inhabitants, it will come as news to your readers that you can take pollock not only on a black bass casting rod and a white or red and white plug but even on trout tackle, on a fly-rod using a streamer fly, and let me tell you if you tie to merely a ten pound pollock on tackle like that, it's sport fishing!

But Digby is like the French Channel ports, Cherbourg, Boulogne, Dieppe. Streams of people pour through those ports but not one in ten thousand stops and stays, though the stopping and staying is well worth while. So is Digby. It offers not only potential sport fishing for the rod both in the Gut and in the Basin for which many a man would travel miles if it were but known and means of getting at it available, but excellent hand line fishing for those — the women and children and many men too — for whom the novelty of fishing is to be able to catch fish and more fish. Annapolis Basin is almost paved with flounder. It would be an eye-opener to a Digby-ite to see the the Long Island Railroad's "Fishermen's Specials" pull out of New York loaded to the guards with fishermen bound merely to catch the lowly flounder, and in not even one-tenth the quantity available here. But here, you do not even eat them but throw them back! Give me a grill of hot coals and I'll broil you a flounder drenched in lemon butter and sprinkled with parsley that will make you wonder why you eat such relatively tasteless fish as cod and haddock.

There was a point wrong in your enquiry. You referred to boats with swivel chairs as though such chairs were necessary for sport fishing. They are more or less for guns, horse-mackerel, trolling, but not at all for pollock or the like. Now, there are enough obstacles, as it is, to promoting a fleet of sport fishing boats at Digby, so let me dissipate the idea that swivel chairs are also needed, and a further item of expense and another obstacle. They are not. What you need is a fifteen foot dory, an in-board or outboard motor of 6 h.p. and a boatman who knows the sidewater and how to circle a fish hooked on a rod to relieve the strain on light tackle.

Such boats and boatmen should

Liquor fines are getting to be big business in Digby these days. It was reported that last week the civic exchequer was enriched by nearly three hundred dollars as a result of fines imposed for violations of the Liquor Control Act. Chief of Police Thibault is being kept very busy these days checking up on these cases and it is not uncommon to have three such cases on the docket for each morning sitting of Stipendiary Magistrate Peters' court.

Under new regulations passed by the Provincial Government, revenue derived from fines under the Liquor Control Act now are paid into the town rather than to the province as was the case previously.

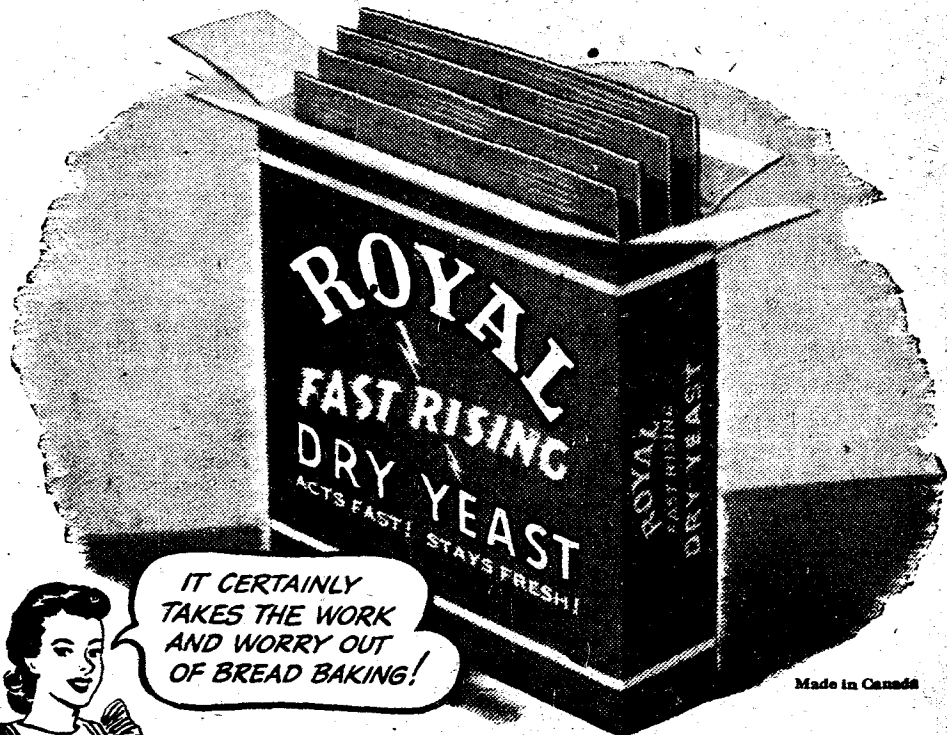

Dragger is Launched at Dayspring

Gay with flags, the Robar ship yards at Dayspring presented a festive scene on Wednesday afternoon when the dragger Janet and Douglas slipped gracefully down the ways into the LaHave river, where she slowly glided along with the tide until being towed to her moorage. The launching was witnessed by a large number of interested spectators.

The Janet and Douglas, built by Fred A. Robar, well known ship builder of over 40 years' experience and now in his 80th year, is the first craft to be launched from the Robar yards since pre-war days. The craft has a 72-foot keel and a beam of 17 feet, 8 inches. The dragger will be used in the scallop fishing industry and will be in command of Captain Albert Romkey, son-in-law of Mr. Robar, and will be operated by a newly-formed company known as the Dayspring Dragger Company, comprising the veteran ship builder, his son, Otto Robar, Capt. The dragger will be installed with a 120 h.p. Vivian engine and it is expected her maiden trip will be made to the scallop fishing grounds near Digby in the course of a few weeks.—Bridgewater Bulletin.

Haying Operations.

Under Way

Haying operations throughout the county are well under way with a good crop being reported in nearly every district. Recent heavy rains have lodged some of the standing hay but little real damage resulted.

Red Cross Will Seek The Missing

The Nova Scotia Division, Canadian Red Cross Society, announces that the Canadian Red Cross has been designated by the Canadian Government as the National Tracing Bureau for Canada for persons seeking the whereabouts of lost members of their families dispersed during hostilities.

According to an agreement concluded between the International Committee of the Red Cross and UNRRA, the latter agency has undertaken to make such investigations through a Central Tracing Bureau which it has opened in Europe, or through the National Tracing Bureau in all countries.

All persons in Nova Scotia, therefore, who are anxious to know the present address of relatives displaced during hostilities should write the Canadian Red Cross Society, 71 Morris Street, Halifax, Nova Scotia, who will forward their enquiries to the appropriate Tracing Bureaux.

Since 1939, 42,000 civilian enquiries have been dealt with on Form 1809 and 12,000 individual letters written regarding whereabouts and welfare of civilians in all countries of the world.

Saint John and Yarmouth Kiwanians Visit Digby Club

Mountain Gap Inn, Joggin Bridge, a few miles from Digby, was on Monday, the scene of a large interclub meeting of the Kiwanis Clubs of Saint John, Yarmouth, and Digby. Visiting Kiwanians were also present from Florida and New Jersey.

The Digby Club was the host club on this occasion, and Hubert M. Warne, president, presided at the head table.

Saint John Kiwanians crossed the Bay of Fundy on the Princess Helene, twenty-seven strong, returning in the afternoon.

Before the luncheon visitors were driven to Cornwallis where they were taken on a tour of inspection of the D.V.A. Tuberculosis Hospital. Dr. E. A. Ferguson, chief medical superintendent of the hospital was guide to the party.

Judge Pepperdine of the Saint John Juvenile Court was the luncheon speaker and took as his topic "Being Misunderstood", pointing out misunderstandings were largely responsible for differences between men and nations—and responsible for much child delinquency.

"If you have any juvenile delinquency", he said, "you cannot afford to be without a juvenile court". He explained the function of the juvenile court was actually that of a family welfare clinic; the point to be considered by the juvenile court judge in dealing with cases on his docket was not "What did he do" but "Why did he do it", and the working out of treatments in such cases for each specific case.

He stressed that in juvenile cases punishment was the last thing the juvenile court judge should think about—the main task is not the punishing of the offender, but to work out a program that will prove a cure for the malady. The great aim of juvenile courts should be that of making good citizens out of delinquents.

Favor Erection of Rural High School

The Digby Town Council went on record at their regular meeting Friday night as favoring the erection of the proposed new Rural High School within the town. Councillor McCreavey, who is Chairman of the School Board, stated approval by town authority was the first step needed towards securing the new school. All of the school sections concerned would have to be contacted, he stated.

Permission was given at the meeting to the British American Oil Company Limited, to erect gasoline storage tanks and a distribution centre at the Racquette. Plans presented by E. J. Theriault, who represented the Company at the meeting, showed that the proposed new development would be quite extensive. The company at present have storage facilities in the south end of town, near the firm of H. T. Warne, Ltd. but will abandon this site in favor of the new location.

The number of taxis to be licensed by the town for the present year was raised from twelve to thirteen.

A delegation from the Light House Road appeared asking that the town water system be extended beyond the town limits to serve their district. This matter was referred to the water committee with the suggestion that a joint meeting of the committee be held.

The Town Clerk stated that he had received several complaints regarding sewers along the waterfront of the town. He was instructed to have the Medical Health Officer make a check of all these sewers and report to a special meeting of the Board of Health.

Has Offers From Outside Fighters

Freddie Cookson, ex Golden Gloves Champion of Canada and later outstanding professional who campaigned with success in New York boxing circles and now is boxing trainer, promoter and manager of the Digby Boxing Club, has received offers from Sydney, Saint John, Cornwallis, and even Lynn, Mass., to compete against the best fighters. Freddie claims, however, his fighters are much too inexperienced to tackle outside fighters. He intends to produce a spectacular show for the Sea Cadets on the evening of August 3rd, and hopes for a sellout crowd to witness these bouts and also to assist the Sea Cadets in reaching their objective of \$1,000.00.

Chamber of Commerce President Here

Col. Gordon C. Cockshutt, President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Donald L. Morrell, Executive Secretary, and John W. Sheridan, Economic Development Department were guests of the Digby Board of Trade at a luncheon at the Pines Hotel here Tuesday.

Arriving in the morning aboard the Princess Helene from Saint John the party was met at the boat by H. M. Warne, Vice President of the Digby Board of Trade and driven to the Pines. There the official welcome of the Town of Digby was extended by his Worship, Mayor J. W. Merkel.

Speaking at the luncheon, Col. Cockshutt told of the Chamber of Commerce drive to establish local boards of trade in every community and stressed the value of these boards not only to their own community, but the whole country. He urged all present to attend the joint meeting of the Nova Scotia Boards of Trade being held this week in Kentville and stated he hoped much good might come out of his meeting. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Denis Belliveau of Grosses Coques and along with several other of their children, was ill for a few days. They were all treated for summer complaints but little Yvonne did not respond to the treatment and told her mother that she could not move one of her legs. The doctor was immediately sent for and he pronounced the illness to be infantile paralysis.

It is the first case of infantile paralysis to be reported in this district for years.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

Routine business matters occupied the School Board at their regular meeting Monday night. The Board made an inspection of the School Building to determine what repairs were needed before the opening in the fall.

It was found that a considerable amount of painting was needed also the replacement of a ceiling in one room. Repairs also were needed for desks and other equipment in the building.

Discussion of the proposed new Rural High School was held but it was decided no further action should be taken until a joint meeting with representatives of the Municipal School Board could be held to work out cost figures and other details.

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CABBIES TO TAKE LEGAL ACTION?

Meeting in a special session Monday night the Digby Town Council passed a resolution that the number of taxi licenses issued the town should not exceed eighteen for the current year. Previously the Council had limited the number to twelve. This number was increased to thirteen by the Council at their last regular meeting and a license issued to W. Roy Wyman, a veteran of both wars.

The matter of Taxi Licenses has been a very contentious matter in Digby for some time. Early in the year the council passed a By-law limiting the number of taxis to twelve and made the carrying of Passenger Hazard and Public Liability Insurance compulsory. Thirteen applications for licenses were filed with the town Clerk. Eleven of these were issued and, as the twelfth applicant's car had been demolished in an accident application was held pending securing another new car. The other applicant continued using his car as a taxi and several protest meetings were held by taximen of the town in which they urged the prosecution of the offender for operating without a license.

No action was taken by the Town in this matter as it was not felt advisable since only eleven of the twelve licenses authorized had been issued. Some weeks ago the twelfth license was issued to the applicant who had been without a car. At the same time an application was received from the exservice man for a license and the council, by resolution, increased the number of licenses to thirteen to accommodate this case.

At last night's meeting, it was decided, on the advice of the Town Solicitor, to increase the number of licenses authorized to be issued for the current year. It is understood local taximen will protest this and will take legal action against the town. They claim the town is not affording them the protection assured when the annual license fee was raised from two dollars to twenty-five.

Club To Hold Novelty Race

A novelty race which should cause a great deal of interest has been arranged by the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club and will be held Sunday July 21st., at 2 p.m. For this race, which is a "free for all", the competing boats will be anchored along the starting line while the tenders will be on shore with oars ready. At the starting signal the captains and crews will get aboard the tenders and row out to their boats, and once aboard they will get under way. The first boat in after completing the course will be declared the winner.

Eight hours were spent in industrial nursing at the plant of H. T. Warne Ltd. The nurse on request had addressed the Baptist Brotherhood.

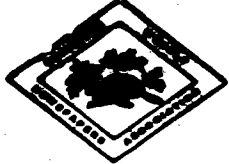
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85th Anniversary of Grace United Church

The history of Grace United Church (formerly Methodist) was told by Arthur R. Turnbull, at the evening service on Sunday. The day was observed as the 85th anniversary of the present church, and the church was filled to capacity at both services.

Special music was featured by the choir, with several lovely selections being rendered at both morning and evening services by the Berwick Male Quartette who came to Digby for this observance. During the evening service the congregation was also favored by a solo by Allan Shaw of Kentville and a duet by Mrs. Gordon Ellis and Mrs. Oakley Turnbull of Digby.

The anniversary sermon was delivered by Rev. Thomas W. Hodgson, M. A., Ph. D., minister to the congregation at the morning service.

During the evening service, Dr. Hodgson said this was the 85th anniversary of the church insofar as his records went. However, Mr. Turnbull in his historical review declared the Methodist (now United) Church in Digby went back before the days of 1861.

He told of Fregborn Garrison coming to Digby in 1785, two years after the town had been settled by United Empire Loyalists, and organizing a Methodist congregation of 78 members, most of whom were colored people. This group of negroes, along with a number from Shelburne, and other Loyalist towns were moved by the British government to the coast of West Africa a few years later.

In 1819, Sampson Busby came from Annapolis to erect the first Methodist Church in Digby. This church, completed in 1831, stood on the site of the present parsonage. The building was later moved to the corner of Sydney Street and First Avenue where it served for a number of years as a carriage shop. It was destroyed in the big Digby fire of 1899.

In his resume he told of the land on which the present church stands was donated to the congregation by one Gilbert T. Ray in a deed dated September 8, 1857. Plans for the erection of the structure were formulated ninety years ago in 1856. The building was completed July 28, 1860; Dedicated July 29 of the same year and on the following day the first sale of pews by auction was held.

(In that way Mr. Turnbull's records disagree with those kept in the parsonage. In Mr. Turnbull's opinion this is the 86th and not the 85th anniversary of the church.)

The church was built by John and William Dodge and John Harlow, whose contract called for \$700 or about \$3500. Construction was begun during the pastorate of Rev. George William Tuttle,

and the building was completed during the pastorate of Rev. William MacCarthy.

It was during the pastorate of Rev. Robert Wasson (1878-1881) that the present spire was built and the church was enlarged. The original spire was blown down during a severe windstorm some time previously. The church was enlarged by sawing the original structure in two, moving the rear portion back several feet, and building between the two sections. The church was re-dedicated December 13, 1880.

The church hall was built in 1884 while Rev. W. H. Hartz was pastor; and the chancel was added in 1897 during the first pastorate of Rev. William Phillips. The Henderson Memorial Window was installed at that time.

According to the historian during those early days the circuit of the Digby Methodist Church took in the following communities: Digby, Brighton, Barton, Weymouth, Centreville, Sandy Cove and Westport. Mr. Turnbull said that according to records in his possession Sunday collections in that period were put down in figures like \$2.03½, \$1.17½, and so on (a one half cent coin was then in circulation).

The present parsonage was built in 1900 during the pastorate of Rev. W. H. Evans.

On the occasion of these anniversary services the Board of Stewards of the church asked for a special offering to be earmarked for the purpose of installing oil heating equipment for the church stating \$400 would be required for this purpose. It was announced at the evening service that the Ea-Gi Club of the church (an organization of the younger women of the congregation) had contributed \$200 towards this fund.

Mrs. Beulah DeMone, Matron of the Nurses residence of the Digby General Hospital, was badly hurt Monday night when struck by a hit and run driver. Her right leg was badly fractured and she suffered numerous bruises.

Mrs. DeMone was returning to the Hospital about 11 p.m. when she was struck by the car. She was walking on the left side of the road just below the Hospital driveway. The car, which was proceeding at a high rate of speed, swerved over to the left and, after knocking Mrs. DeMone to the pavement, continued on up over the hill.

Lawrence Anderson, local taxi driver, who was coming into town after a taxi trip was the first to reach Mrs. DeMone whom he found lying on the pavement. He picked her up and took her to the hospital which was only a few yards away in his car. She

was conscious and stated the car had struck her only a few minutes before.

Mr. Anderson stated that, as he was coming over the brow of the hill near the hospital, a large dark car, which he took to be a taxi passed him going at a terrific rate of speed. It is thought this was the car which struck Mrs. DeMone.

R.C.M.P. and local police were called and made a thorough survey of the scene of the accident. A search is now in progress for the car and its driver.

At the time of going to press no trace has been found of the hit and run car which struck down Mrs. DeMone. Search by Police is widening and taxi drivers in Digby and surrounding districts have been questioned concerning their activities on the night of the accident. Some doubt now seems to exist that the car was actually a taxi, which was first thought.

"Empire Seaman" Arrives

The Empire Seaman arrived in port Friday to load a cargo of 2000 cords of pitprops for Manchester, England. The pitprops are being loaded by Max Nafthal for shipment through Pitwood Exporters Ltd. Moncton.

This is the Empire Seaman's second trip to Digby. She was here at Christmas time when she loaded a cargo of lumber for England. She just returned from a trip with a cargo of pitprops to Manchester.

An interesting sidelight on her recent trip to Manchester was the fact that, for her return trip down the Manchester Canal, she had to have eighteen feet removed from her mastsheads. On the trip in, even though she was fully loaded with pitprops, it was necessary to fill every available space with coal and all tanks with water in order to clear the bridges over the canal. Even with all these precautions she only cleared by a scant nine inches. If while she was passing through the locks, another ship had entered, she would not have made it as the water rises in the locks some eight or nine inches per ship entered.

It was decided to remove the eighteen feet from the mast for the return trip when it was found that sufficient ballast to enable her to make the trip would cost about £4000.

The Empire Seaman was one of the first ships to land tanks on the Normandy beaches during the Invasion. She made several trips loaded with Churchill and Sherman tanks. On one trip during bad weather two of the tanks broke loose in the hold and nearly crashed through the sides of the ship. They weighed some forty odd tons each.

Present Captain of the Empire Seaman is Captain Sorenson. He has been with the ship only a short time.

McBride, President of the Digby Branch Navy League, on one of his regular inspection trips of this property and the adjoining Navy League property.

The vandalism is thought to be the work of youngsters and took place sometime between last Sunday and when it was discovered. Persons who walked around the property last Sunday afternoon stated that all of the windows were intact at that time.

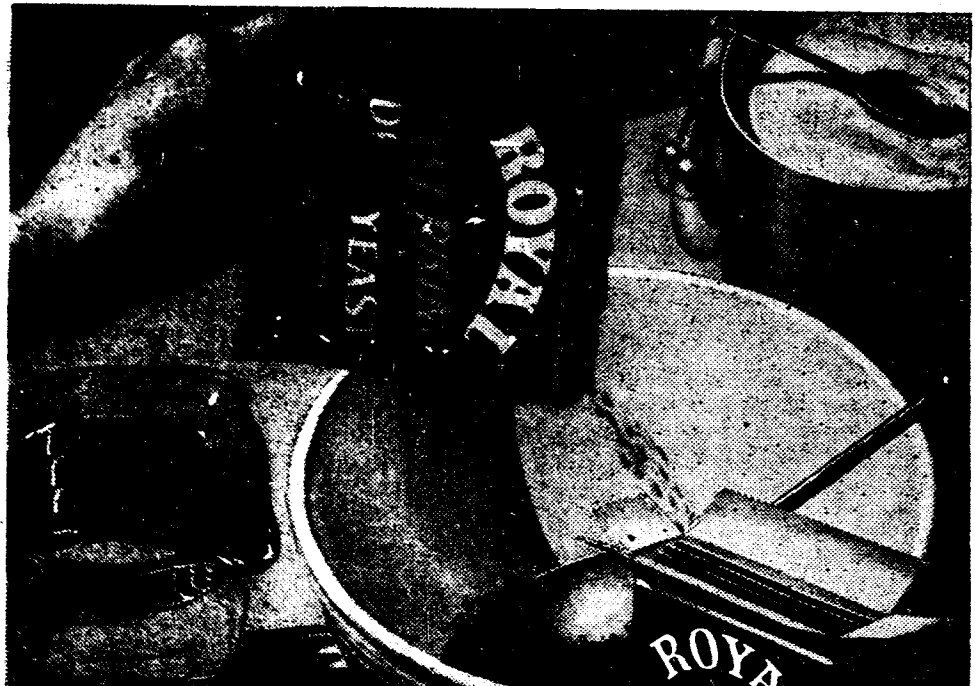

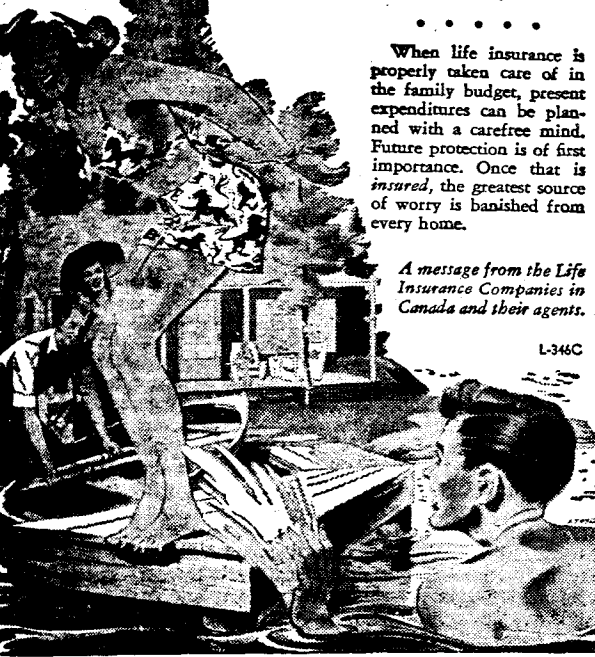
OBITUARY

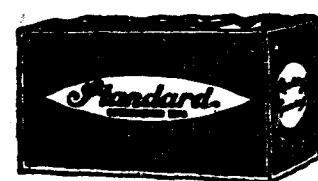

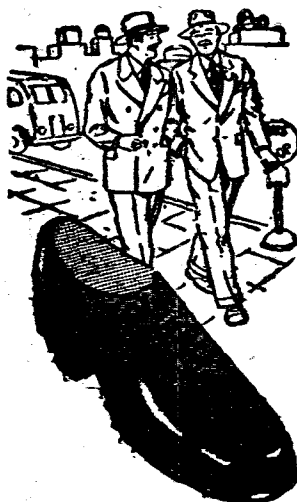

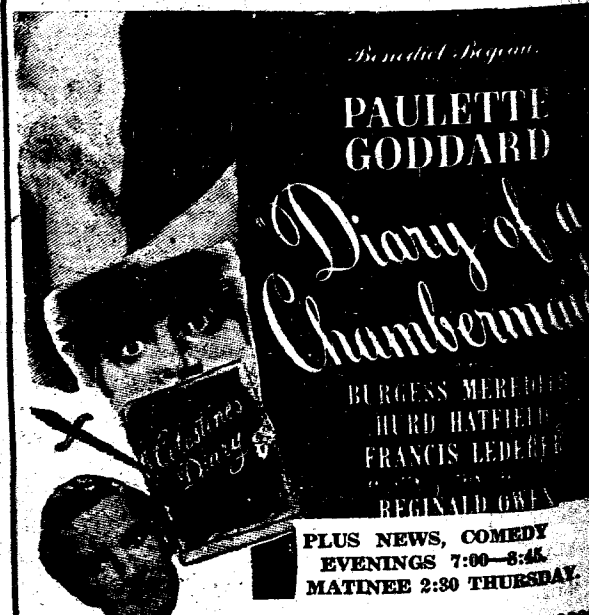

Because the Bear River Cherry Carnival, which became a "war casualty", was really an institution in former years, it brought people to Bear River from all parts of the province. Bear River Cherry Carnivals should not become an historic memory and we hope our friends in that town will begin now making plans for a Cherry Carnival in 1947.

The Coming

S. A. Drive

Objective of the Salvation Army's 1946-7 National Home Front Appeal next month will be \$2,000,000. It has been announced by Air Marshall William A. Bishop, V.C., D.S.O., M.C., D.F.C., L.D., chairman of the Salvation Army National Advisory Board.

"Increasing demands for Salvation Army social service and relief work have made it necessary to raise the objective over the \$1,500,000 asked last year," said Air Marshall Bishop.

"In the total sought is money needed for rehabilitation and expansion of Salvation Army social service activities. During the war the Salvation Army concentrated on serving the members of the armed forces, and assisting war victims. The expansion of its work in Canada was largely postponed. Even repairs were put off. Nearly one-third of the Salvation Army's total personnel was engaged wholly or principally on duties having to do with the war.

"Salvation Army efforts for the reclamation of the fallen and for the care and guidance of those in trouble constitute a national service to Canada," said Air Marshall Bishop. "Its mission of succor to erring humanity is worthy of far greater financial support than is asked."

The Campaign opens Sunday, September 15, with special services in Salvation Army Citadels across the Dominion. The Canvass for funds begins Monday, Sept. 16. It will be held in all centres except those where Community Chest or Welfare organizations provide adequate funds or in the four or five cities where campaigns have already been held.

Empire Seaman Leaves

With her holds packed tight with pitprops for the coal mines of England and a sixteen foot load on her decks, the Empire Seaman cleared for Manchester, England, on Tuesday.

The deck load of pitprops was held in place by tall stanchions along the sides of the ship, laced with cross pieces to which were lashed a row of pitprops. Across the top of the load thick wire cables were lashed. The huge cranes which were used to load the cargo were tightly lashed to the short, stubby masts before the ship sailed. Across the uneven deck load of pitprops workmen had constructed a narrow catwalk with a railing so that the crew might pass over the load from one part of the ship to another.

It is understood the Empire Seaman will return to Digby late in September for another load.

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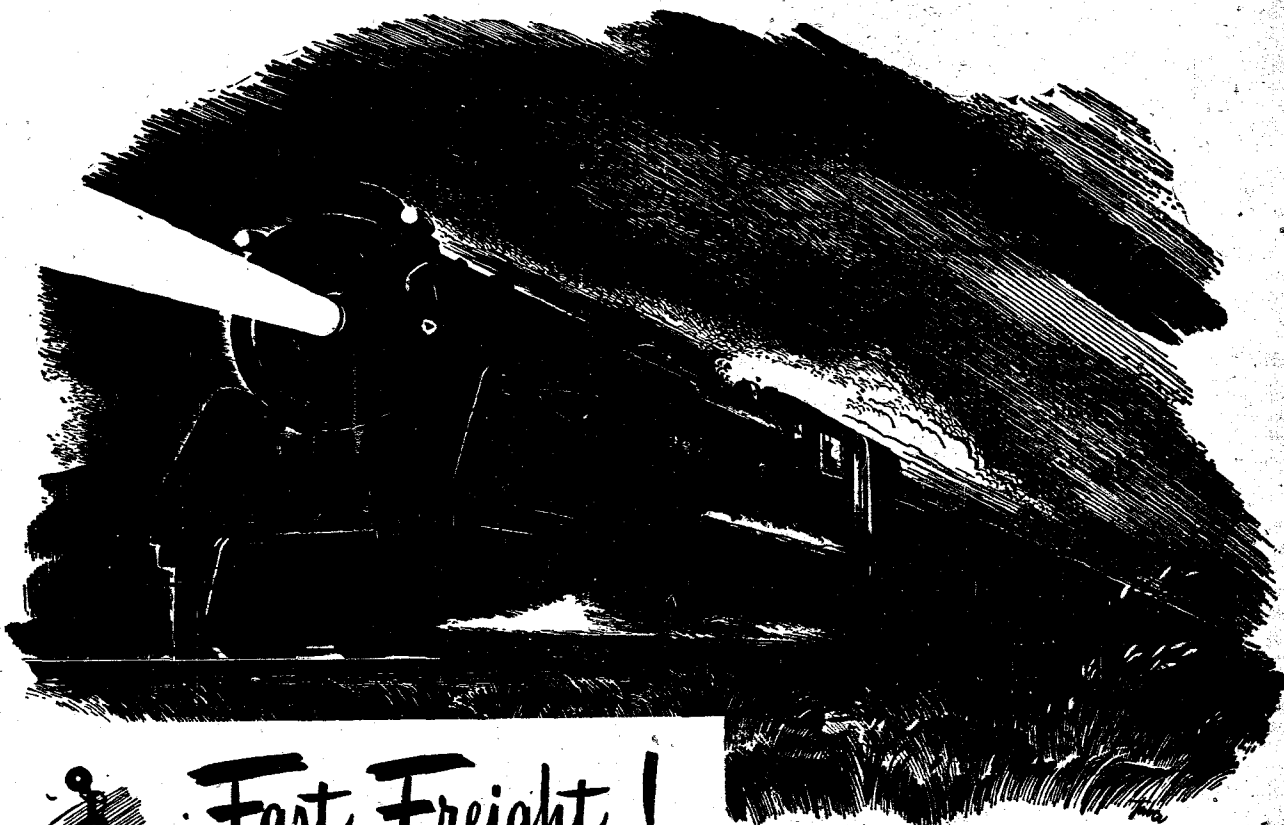
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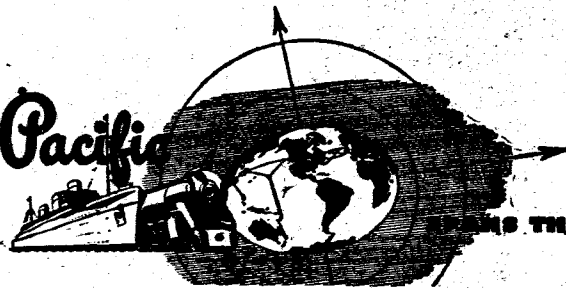

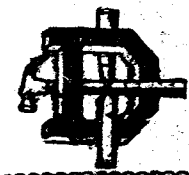

With conditions as they are, he stated, it is all our present policeman can do to regulate traffic on the main street during the day without attending to any other phase of police work. As a result petty lawlessness and disregard for the liquor laws are on the upswing in town. No patrol work is possible under the present set-up, he said, and the only area of the town which is actually receiving police protection of any sort is the front street. This, Mr. Cardoza said, was not the fault of the Chief of Police as he felt he was doing as good a job as he could possibly do, but the job was now far too big for one man.

He stated he felt the police

force should be increased so that more adequate police protection could be given. The increased cost, he said, would be met in considerable part by increased revenue from fines, especially liquor violations. "We are all paying for police protection, he said, and we should all be getting it."

In support of his contention, Councillor Cardoza moved that the Police Committee take immediate steps to secure the services of two police constables to act with the present Chief, one as a day patrolman and the other for night duty. He included in his motion that the committee investigate the possibility of combining the driving of the fire truck with the duties of the new policemen. The motion not being seconded, it was dropped.

Councillor McCleave then moved that the Police Committee look into the matter of securing more adequate police service for day and night. This motion was seconded by Councillor Baxter and passed.

Turn Down Lease On Land

Representatives of the Dominion Atlantic Railway attended Monday night's meeting of the Town Council and urged that the town lease the Railway that portion of Prince William Street directly in front of the Station between it and Birch Street.

H. M. Chase, Kentville, appearing for the Railway, stated the lease was required in order that parking might be controlled in the area to permit the railway free access to its property for the transport of mails, passengers, etc. He pointed out such free access was guaranteed by the town when the station was erected, but such was not now being provided.

After some considerable discussion the Council decided not to lease this property to the Railway but to instruct the Chief of Police to see free access to the station property was maintained.

Mr. Dunphy of the D.A.R. then asked the Town Council to instruct its Chief of Police to have the Wagner Tour busses kept off of the land belonging to the railway and lying directly south of the piece which the company sought to lease. He stated these busses added to the congestion and should be kept off this property. Since the Town receives a monthly fee for Police protection to Railway property the Police Chief was instructed to comply with Mr. Dunphy's request.

Celebrates 81st Birthday

Forty members of the family and relatives of William S. Winchester, Digby, gathered at a family picnic at Lake Gehu, near Doucetteville, on Sunday, August 4th to celebrate his 81st birthday.

A huge birthday cake covered with 81 candles featured the picnic supper and Mr. Winchester received many lovely presents, cards and telegrams. One of the telegrams was from his son, Earl who is now at sea serving with the Merchant Marine.

Present also at the picnic, besides the family and relatives of Mr. Winchester, was Mrs. Kate Rogers who is 87 years of age.

STEEL WIRE RECORDS HUMAN VOICE

This small box being demonstrated by C. J. Campbell, assistant director of communications and electronic development for Trans-Canada Air Lines, is a piece of radio magic that records the human voice on a steel wire four-thousandths of an inch in diameter. T.C.A. will shortly install the device in its principal communication centres at home and abroad to

record the huge volume of traffic on its air-to-ground radio circuits. This was formerly typed on message forms and filed. A spool of wire will now replace paper work. The magnetic wire recorder, as it is known, will not only play back what it receives over the air but can also erase it so the wire may be used over again.

TO APPOINT TOWN PLANNING COMMISSION

Decision to appoint a Town Planning Commission to zone off the town and regulate building within the Town was reached at Monday night's meeting of the Council.

The Mayor was asked to submit a number of names of possible candidates for the Commission so that the Council might make the appointments as early as possible.

A resolution, accompanied by a sizeable cash payment from residents of Mount Pleasant was presented at the meeting. The resolution called for the installation of a Fire hydrant between the residences of Claud Morrell and Orbin VanTassel in Mount Pleasant. The matter was referred to the Water Commission for action.

Applications from T. S. Matheson, F. W. Morris and L. A. Hayden for Taxi Licenses were read at the meeting. The clerk was instructed to inform these men of

the regulations to be complied with before such license could be issued.

The Streets and Public Properties Commission were given authority at the meeting to take immediate action to repair the crib work along the Shore Road. It was reported this crib work is in bad shape and fear was expressed that fall rains might carry away the road unless repairs were commenced immediately.

The Streets Committee was also asked to look into the matter of repairs to the Band Stand and the old Electric Light Building now used as a band room and sub-station by the Town. It was reported this building is badly in need of repairs.

Councillor Cardoza questioned the wisdom of having one of the pedestrian lanes on Water Street lead directly into the doorway of a garage and filling station and moved the matter be rectified. The motion was not seconded.

Among the trucks marooned were several loaded with fish for processing plants in Digby. Great concern was expressed over possible damage caused to this fish by the delay in transit.

Canada supplied the United States with a very large proportion of her import requirements of fillet of cod, haddock, hake, pollock, cusk, and rosefish, whether in the fresh or frozen stage, during the first six months of this year.

Department of Trade officials announced today that 20,344,733 pounds, or 99.8% of the quota established for the calendar year, has already been shipped to the United States, during the first months of 1946.

THERE ARE STILL OPEN SPACES

Opponents of a Policy of expanded immigration for Canada make much of the fact that, even in years when immigrants were coming in plentifully, there was also an outflow of Canadian emigrants to the United States. From this fact they argue that there is little, if any net increase in population brought about by an immigration policy.

The argument is more plausible than convincing. Immigrants and emigrants alike are seeking to better their economic condition. The immigrants we received in the old days were largely of a class who were willing and able to do heavy manual work, while the emigrants we lost to the United States were largely of the professional, office-worker or skilled-mechanic classes.

There is no relation between the arrival of a Hungarian ditch-digger in Quebec and the departure of a Canadian stenographer across the border at Windsor. What is sure is that, if enough immigrants come in, the country, with more people to share the tax load, more customers for local stores and industries, may become prosperous enough to induce Canadian emigrants to stay in Canada.

Those who think Canada is so crowded that a Canadian must leave the country for every immigrant that comes in have been doing too much driving in city traffic. They should get out into the open spaces.

All times listed are Standard Time.

Beautiful Cape Breton

Cape Breton Highlands national park is the most beautiful spot in Canada, according to Gratian O'Leary, Ottawa newspaperman. "I was amazed," he said, "at the glories of the combination of woodland, ocean, coastline and mountain terraces. It is easily the finest and most picturesque country it has ever been my good fortune to see." Mr. O'Leary thought the federal government should bear some of the cost of improving the highway approach from Baddeck to the park.

Digest of News of the Province

Sawmills Busier

Sixty-one sawmills in Nova Scotia produced 13,563,000 board feet of sawn lumber in May, 2,500,000 feet more than in April, reports the Department of Lands and Forests.

More Fish Caught

Nova Scotia fisheries continues to enjoy increased production. The catch landed in June was 56,176,000 pounds, a gain of more than 2,500,000 pounds over June last year. Landed value was more than \$450,000 greater, totaling \$2,799,000.

Veteran Visitor

Henry J. D. Small of Dorchester, Mass., has just been made a member of the Order of the Good Time by the Nova Scotia Bureau of Information at Yarmouth making 80 crossings of the Bay of Fundy on annual visits to this province. Through the years he has travelled more than 21,000 miles to and from Nova Scotia.

Nova Scotia Shipyards

Thirty-one of the 94 Canadian Shipyards building, outfitting or repairing naval and commercial vessels in 1944 were in Nova Scotia, reports the Department of Industry. The yards, big and small, employed 8912 workers, paid out \$18,111,000 in wages and the value of their production was \$39,044,000.

Farm Machinery Scarce

Shortage of farm machinery is as acute in Nova Scotia as anywhere in Canada, believes F. Waldo Walsh, deputy minister of agriculture. Orchard sprayers and tractors are particularly scarce, he said, with Annapolis Valley fruit growers getting only 20 spraying machines this year when they could have used 200.

Free T. B. Treatment

Free sanatorium and hospital treatment for tuberculosis sufferers in Nova Scotia has been put in effect by the Provincial Department of Public Health. Persons eligible for treatment are authorized for hospital admittance by the department's divisional health officer in the district concerned.

Bus Traffic Growing

No longer bothered by gasoline and tire shortages, interurban bus lines in Nova Scotia more than doubled their passenger traffic in May compared with the corresponding month last year. They carried 165,000 passengers and travelled 355,100 miles during the month as against only 71,000 passengers and 216,000 miles in May, 1945.

College In Hospital

Nova Scotia Agricultural College will occupy the military hospital and adjacent buildings at Debert Army camp for the 1946-47 term, according to an announcement by Agriculture Minister A. W. Mackenzie. These buildings were said to be more suitable than R. C. A. F. accommodation made available earlier. The Debert quarters will be used pending construction of new science and dormitory buildings on the College property at Truro.

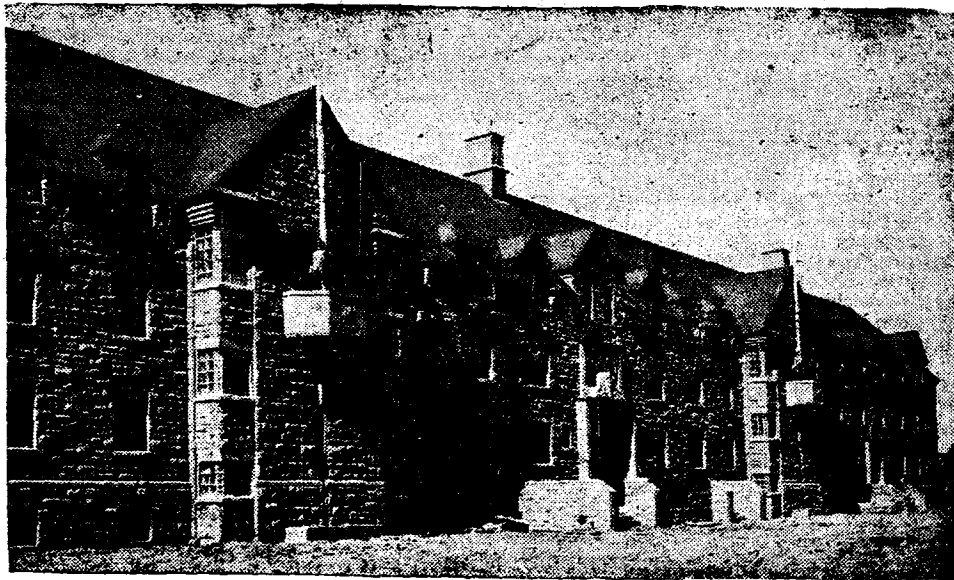

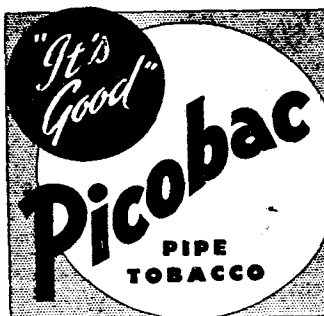

HONORS FOR BIG WAR JOB WON BY C.N.R. MEN

For their part in Canada's war effort, twenty-five members of the Canadian National Railways staff were included in the King's Dominion Day honors list. Each one had either assisted directly in the war while on loan from the company's service or had taken a prominent part in the big task of moving hundreds of millions of tons of war materials and supplies and hundreds of thousands of troops over the C.N.R.

The highest award given by His Majesty, Companionships in the Order of St. Michael and St. George (C.M.G.), went to R. C. Vaughan, chairman and president of the C.N.R. System, and to S. J. Hungerford, who retired as president of the C.N.R. in 1941 to assume the responsibilities of president of National Railways Munitions Limited, producer of nearly 5,000 naval guns and pieces of war equipment. Mr. Vaughan organized the Defence Purchasing Board for the Dominion Government just before the declaration of war.

Walter S. Thompson, director of public relations for the system, who handled the press, radio and photographic arrangements for the month-long, 10,000-mile tour of Canada and the United States of Their Majesties, the King and Queen, in 1939, was named a Companion of the Order of the British Empire (C.B.E.) for his work in organizing the wartime Department of Censorship and the Department of Public Information for the Canadian Government. Maynard A. Metcalf, executive assistant, C.N.R., was also honored with a C.B.E.

For their war work eight C.N.R. men were made Officers of the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.). They were W. M. Armstrong, general manager, Canadian National Telegraphs; R. B. Teakle, retired general manager, C.N.S.S.; John Roberts, who was managing director, National Railways Munitions Limited; John Schofield, chief architect, who did valuable war work for the Department of Transport; Department of Munitions and Supply; the British Ministry of Aircraft Production and the Royal Air Force Ferry Command; L. C. Thomson, manager of stores, who served as deputy chief, naval equipment and supply, Department of National Defence, during the war; S. L. Bryson, passenger traffic manager, C.N.G.T.R.; and W. D. Low and W. J. Atkinson, of the purchasing department, who were named to the Department of Munitions and Supply.

Memberships in the Order of the British Empire (M.B.E.) were given to Col. F. F. Clarke, D.S.O., V.D., retired chief land surveyor and property commissioner, C.N.R., who assisted in the acquisition of sites for airfields, munitions plants and



other war projects for the Dominion Government; R. W. Long, retired general freight traffic manager; D. J. O. Meyers, customs agent; W. E. Gordon, superintendent of reclamation; and William Cunningham and Leonard L. Price, of the purchasing department, who were named to the Department of Munitions and Supply.

Two other members of the purchasing department whose services were loaned to the Canadian Government were awarded the British Empire Medal (B.E.M.). They were C. B. Doherty and C. E. W. Morhead.

Five Canadian National Railways employees on leave of absence were also honored by His Majesty, H. B. Chase and A. R. Mosher both received the C.B.E. and Joseph Corbett, Frank H. Gillespie and John S. McNabb were made M.B.E.s.

Many infant's layettes have to be made this autumn and when it is realized that babies born at the present time in Normandy are wrapped in newspapers for lack of clothing, surely women young and old will help with this work. The Canadian Red Cross feels a special responsibility regarding the Normandy sector where the devastation is absolutely beyond description and caused by our own boys in their heroic effort to save humanity—a very dreadful, but a very necessary destruction.

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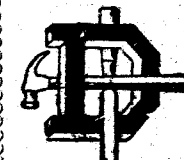

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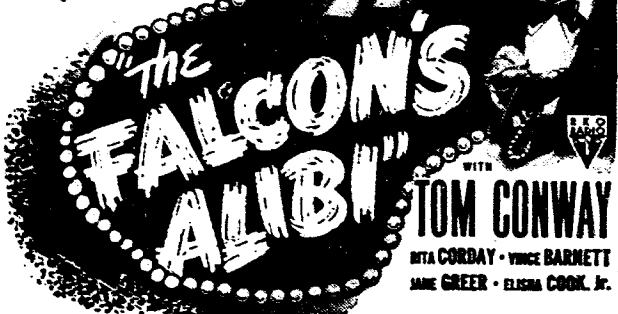

Final figures on the Board of Trade's July 1st Fair were announced at Tuesday night's meeting of the Board by Fair Manager W. L. Troop. Mr. Troop stated the gross returns amounted to \$11,160.13, with expenses of \$3,916.74, and sundry expenses of \$603.36. The net profit on the Fair amounted to \$6,640.03. Of this amount \$6,595.03 was in hand with \$45.00 yet to be paid in.

In giving his final report Mr. Troop stated he wished to thank all those who in any way helped in the work of the Fair. Without the splendid cooperation of all those who helped in the planning, arranging and operation of the Fair, he said, the day could not have been the tremendous success it was.

Plans for Rink Progressing

F. L. Anderson, Chairman of the Committee to set up a company to build, own and operate the skating rink for Digby, stated at Tuesday night's meeting of the Board of Trade that plans for incorporation of the company were progressing.

He stated several meetings had been held to discuss the matter and letters had been sent out to prominent people throughout the County enlisting their support and assistance. Response to these letters had been very encouraging, he stated, with nearly all replies promising practical support and cooperation.

Contact had been made with officials in charge of buildings and equipment at Cornwallis, he stated, and the committee were investigating the possibilities of securing the rink building from the former Naval Base.

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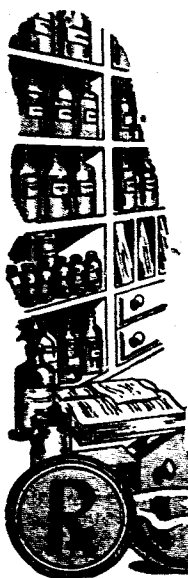

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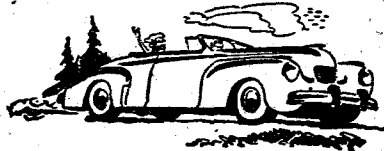

The Weather Throughout Nova Scotia

You can take your weather—
You can take it—in Nova Scotia. Records of Canada's meteorological service show that there's more variety of temperature and precipitation in this province than in the most caustic weather conditions would suspect.

Take snowfall, for instance. You can take it, if you like lots of it, at Sydney, where the average winter's snow over a long period of years has been 96 inches or exactly eight feet. In some parts of Northern Cape Breton it's even heavier. Or you can leave it, if the other inconveniences don't deter, and go out to Sable Island in the misty Atlantic, where the average fall is a mere 46 inches.

Deciding what are the warmest and coldest points in Nova Scotia could keep armchair weather experts arguing for years. Those which are the warmest in summer are the coldest in winter and vice versa. Averaging the whole year's temperatures there's a difference of only four degrees between the highest Sable Island, 45 degrees and the lowest (Mount Uniacke, 40) but the seasonal variations are considerable.

Differences in temperature are most profound in winter when the moderating effect of the Atlantic is felt in coastal areas. In February, the year's coldest month in this province, the inland sections of Hants and Colchester counties take a frosty first prize.

Stillwater, Hants County, a fish and game resort on the D.A.R., has an average low temperature for the month of only 4 degrees. Upper Stewiacke, Colchester County, has a mean minimum of 5 degrees, while Mount Uniacke does slightly better with 6. On Sable Island at the same time, however, the normal low mercury reading is a comparatively warm 23 degrees, while the next warmest spots are Yarmouth with 19 and Saulnierville, Digby County, with 17.

In the summer the story is reversed, the weather men can point out. Upper Stewiacke is then one of the warmest spots in the province with an average July maximum of 76 degrees. Other hot spots with the same normal high temperature are the hub town of Truro and Kentville and Wolfville in the Annapolis Valley. Winning honors for the next highest temperatures are Mount Uniacke, Windsor, Pictou and Liverpool with mean readings in July of 75.

Saulnierville with 67 and Yarmouth, 68, are the coolest points on the mainland in July. Sable Island goes even better with an average high of only 64.

Liverpool is one of the warmest centres in Nova Scotia winter and summer, but when rainfall is considered the Queens county town is a record-breaker. According to the meteorological

records Liverpool is without doubt the wettest town in the province. It has an average rainfall of 56.74 inches. However, Halifaxians can take little comfort from this fact for Halifax comes a close second with 55.52 inches. Glace Bay is among the damper spots with 55.23 inches in a normal year.

On the drier side, Nappan, in Cumberland County, site of a federal experimental farm, is easily first. Its average rainfall is 35.58 inches. Kentville, another experimental farm centre and home of the Nova Scotia Sanatorium for tuberculosis, is near to the driest with 38 inches. Springhill (39.93) and Wolfville 39.97, are close behind. Snowfall, ten inches of which is measured as an inch of rain, is included in these figures.

Speaking of snow, Glace Bay has plenty of that too, running close to Sydney with an average of 94 inches per winter. Truro is noted for heavy snow, having Springfield on the South Mountain in Annapolis County, and Pictou have heavy falls of 84 and 81 inches respectively.

If you don't like the snow the most promising districts in mainland Nova Scotia are Saulnierville, which averages only 57 inches, and Nappan with a normal 58.

Nets Fourth Tuna



Conrad Gidney and his sons of Mink Cove have seined their fourth tuna this season. The last one which they caught was a huge monster, weighing over 800 pounds before being dressed. It is reported that tuna have been seen in large numbers in St. Mary's Bay this season.

Molasses Barrel Staves for Bermuda

Several carloads of hardwood staves have recently been shipped by H. T. Warne Ltd. to Barbados. These hardwood staves will be used for the construction of molasses puncheons, many of which will return to Nova Scotia filled with the sticky sweetness which is so essential to Nova Scotia's traditional Saturday night feast, Boston Baked Beans and brown bread.

To prepare the staves hundreds of Birch, maple and beech trees were felled in the woods of Digby County last winter, cut into four foot lengths and hauled to the mill. In the past few months these have been passed through rip saws and edgers until they were trimmed down to the proper dimensions and then piled out in long rows in the mill yard to dry in the sun.

For several weeks now crews of men have been bundling these dry staves into standard size bundles which were then securely wired and stamped "Barbados". From the yard they are loaded into box cars for shipment to Halifax and then overseas on their 2,500 mile journey to the land of the sugar cane.

In previous years the staves were shaped and bent ready to assemble into puncheons before shipping, now the hardwood lumber is merely trimmed to the proper length and thickness for staves and shipped to the molasses producers who shape the staves and assemble them.

Beside the firm of H. T. Warne Ltd. the Potter Lumber Co., Ltd. are also shipping staves this year. Captain B. N. Melanson of Gilbert's Cove also ships staves to Barbados. These are shipped in Captain Melanson's own boats which bring back equally valuable cargoes from the West Indies.

Giant Squash Plants

Annapolis Valley towns may have their tall hollyhocks, but we in Digby have something much more important of which to be proud. That is giant squash plants.

These plants are to be found in the garden of George Cardoza who is already famed for his huge dahlias. The squash plants some fifteen in all have grown so rapidly that they have completely engulfed three rows of corn, completely covered an area 100 feet square and have climbed to the roof of a poultry house adjacent to the garden.

Not only that, but the plants have grown to the top of a cherry tree at the edge of the garden and visitors are amazed to see sizeable squash hanging from the limbs of a Blackheart cherry tree.

The plants have leaves some of which measure thirty inches across and not only are they large but also prolific. Squash are to be found on almost every joint on the plants and it is estimated there are some two hundred squash on the vines although the foliage is too thick to really get a proper idea.

Mr. Cardoza states that if the plants do not drive him off his property, he should harvest a terrific crop of squash this fall.

BAND CONCERT AUG. 29

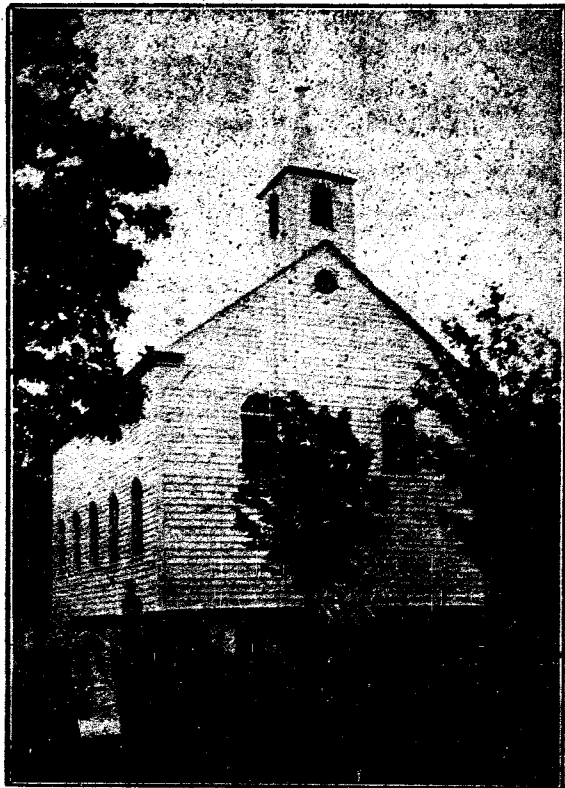

Urges Uniform Assessment

Municipal assessment was the subject of a Round Table discussion at Tuesday afternoon's session of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention being held in Truro.

In introducing the subject, Deputy Mayor V. G. Cardoza of Digby stated uniform taxation was a requisite of sound government, but without a proper and equitable assessment, uniform taxation was impossible.

He urged more uniformity in assessment throughout the province and stated he felt each town should have a permanent Chief Assessor trained by the Department of Municipal Affairs. This man, he said, should be paid enough to allow him to give full time and attention to his job.

The setting up of a Provincial Assessment Appeal Board was also urged by Mr. Cardoza. He stated this would remove the personal angle from assessment appeals which now so often features these cases.

In closing he urged the convention to give the matter of municipal assessment much thought and study so that concrete recommendations might go forward to the Provincial government regarding the matter.

Joint chairmen of the discussion group on assessment were Mayor Allison Smith of Parrsboro and Victor G. Fuller, Clerk of Amherst.

Miss Marshall graduated this year from the Worcester State Teachers College with the degree of Bachelor of Science.

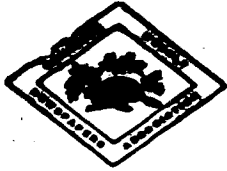

Joined Navy 50 Years-Ago

This month Rufus R. W. Connor, Lighthouse Road, Digby, celebrates the 50th anniversary of his joining the British Navy. It was in the days of sailing ships, on August 1, 1896, that Rufus signed on with the old Flying Squadron which later became known as the Channel Squadron. He was transferred to steam shortly after.

His official Naval career closed while serving in the First World War when he was invalided out in 1917.

The old adage, "Join the Navy and See the World" apparently held true in Mr. Connor's case; he saw action in the South African War in 1898; he was stationed in China during the Boxer Rebellion of 1900 and served with the British Navy during the Russian Japanese War in 1904.

While in the Navy Mr. Connor became a professional diver, and followed this profession up until a few years ago. As a diver he went down in Plymouth Harbour, England, in Britain's first submarine "A-8".

St. Ann's Alumni Holding Re-union

St. Ann's Alumni Association is holding its first re-union since World War II began today at St. Ann's College, Church Point. Hundreds of former students are expected chiefly from Eastern Canada and New England States.

A general reception takes place at 3 o'clock and at 6 there will be a banquet. At 8 o'clock a general assembly will be held in the college auditorium, followed by an election of officers.

Tomorrow a High Mass will be attended by the members of the Alumni Association.

St. Ann's Alumni Association was first organized in 1907 and in 1921 it was incorporated by Dr. Armand Melanson, of St. Anne du Rousseau, Yarmouth County. A branch in the United States was founded in 1933 by Henry Cormier and is known as the St. Ann's Alumni Association of the New England States.

The Alumni Association has

contributed various sums of money to St. Ann's College from time to time. In 1916 they donated \$500.00 towards the purchase of instruments for the laboratory and chemistry class rooms. Another \$1000. was donated the same year by a former student apart from the Alumni Society.

In 1918 they put aside \$1,125. for scholarships but in 1924 this sum was transferred to an endowment fund, the interest of which is to be used to pay the premium on the insurance policy taken by the directors of St. Ann's College. Adding \$1477. which was raised by lottery and another \$4000., this brought the amount in the endowment fund to \$7000.

One of the aims of the St. Ann's Alumni Association is to aid St. Ann's College whenever possible financially. St. Ann's is owned and operated by the Eudist Order of priesthood. The priests who operate this college, receive no personal remuneration for tireless work. They are aided, in this great undertaking by the nuns of the Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Mary, who also receive no remuneration. They take care of the domestic departments of St. Ann's, which they have done since the early years of its founding, attending their humble duties with a spirit of self-sacrifice and generosity.

It is expected that the St. Ann's Alumni Association will contribute generously towards the new proposed dormitory which the faculty of St. Ann's expect to erect in the near future. It was hoped that the new building could be under construction this summer, but through certain difficulties, it has been impossible to do so. Plans were not formulated in time and scarcity of materials retarded the erection of the building. It is now expected to make a start on the proposed dormitory early next spring.

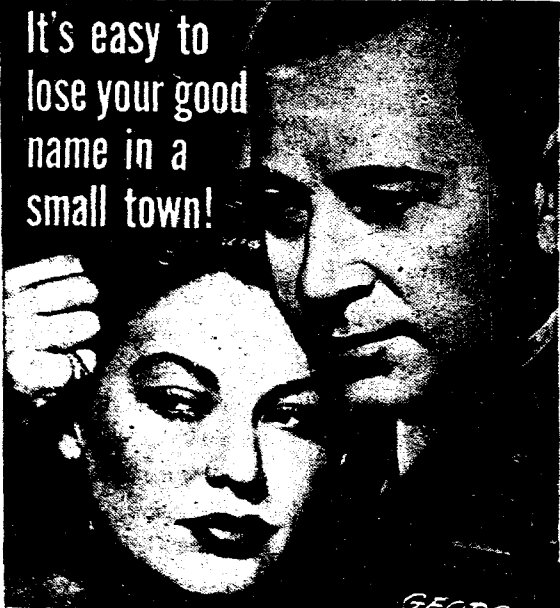

Elderly Woman

Beaten and Robbed

Royal Canadian Mounted Police of the Meteghan River detachment made two arrests on Saturday in connection with the robbery which took place at Concession early Wednesday morning, when two masked men entered the home of a 74-year old widow, Mrs. Rose Comeau, and by means of torture forced her to reveal where she kept a sum of money amounting to something over \$300.00.

The apprehended youths are Adeliard Doucet, 21, of Concession, who was placed under arrest during the early hours of Saturday morning. The police dragnet closed on 19 year old Paul Comeau from the neighbouring village of Little Brook Station, Saturday afternoon. Both are held without bail in the Little Brook jail, and will appear before Stipendiary d'Entremont to-morrow, charged with "Robbery with Violence".

Meanwhile Hospital authorities reported the condition of Mrs. Rose Comeau as "unchanged". The elderly woman, who was admitted to hospital here late last Wednesday afternoon, in a critical condition, is suffering from shock, bruises about the head and body, and a shattered left arm and left hip.

Like many of the elder residents of this interior Acadian village, Mrs. Comeau is unable to speak English. The story of the attack was told the press by those who attended the 64 year old victim.

Aroused from her sleep by a knock at her back door at about 2 o'clock Wednesday morning, Mrs. Comeau reported she had gone down stairs to answer the door. Two men demanded admittance. She refused to let them in. One of them broke the window alongside the back door, reached through and lifted the hook that served as a lock for the door.

Two men, their faces masked by handkerchiefs, entered the room and demanded to be told where she kept her money. When she refused to give the information one of them struck her with a club. The demand was repeated and another blow struck.

The second blow fractured her left arm just below the shoulder and knocked her to the floor. She revealed her money was in a box in her room alongside her bed. The men left and returned with the box said to contain more than \$300.

Before leaving the house, they allegedly smashed Mrs. Comeau's left hip with another cruel blow, and she was left lying on the floor near her kitchen range in a helpless condition. Her plight was discovered by a neighbor, Phillip Comeau, who, passing the house Wednesday morning, observed the broken window and the wide open kitchen door, investigated.

On finding Mrs. Comeau he placed her on a bed and then summoned Dr. P. H. LeBlanc of Little Brook and the Meteghan River R.C.M.P. Dr. LeBlanc described Mrs. Comeau's fractures to the press as "the worst I have ever seen."

\$300,000 For Ferry Landings

Supplementary estimates tabled in the House of Commons last week reveal \$300,000 as earmarked for the improvement of ferry landings at East Ferry and Tiver-ton and at Freeport and Westport. This announcement is one that is welcomed by every resident of Digby County, and especially by those who live on Long and Brier Islands.

Many complaints have been received regarding the ferry services between the Islands and the mainland—the lack of proper landing facilities have been the chief source of these complaints.

Landing facilities, particularly at East Ferry, were improved a number of years ago. These improvements, however, have not been sufficient to a rapid and steady increase in traffic that must be ferried across Petite Passage. The Islands are now the source of some of the heaviest traffic that reaches Digby.

There was a time when the bulk of the valuable fish catch of Long and Brier Islands were taken to their destinations by boat—boats that ran to Digby, to Yarmouth and Saint John, to Boston, Halifax, Portland and other points. In those days the present landing facilities may have been quite adequate; there were the occasional cars and trucks to be ferried across and to these, the matter of waiting for suitable tides meant no real serious delay.

Today the situation is altogether different. The boats are almost a thing of the past and heavy motor trucks carry the fish catch of the Islands across the ferries and over the Digby Neck Highway to Digby, for processing in local plants or for shipment to other points via train or boat.

Millions of dollars worth of fish reach Digby via the Island and Digby Neck Route.

Improvements to the ferry landings, along with the paving of the Digby Neck Highway, will be one of the greatest assets to Digby County. This year more than eight miles of the Digby Neck road are being torn up in preparation for paving operations. The area includes the stretch from Digby to Gulliver's Cove Corner at Rossway.

Man Eating Sharks at Flour Cove

Man eating sharks which followed the whale which recently came ashore at Flour Cove and have remained to feast on the carcass, are providing great sport for fishing enthusiasts at the Cove.

American tourists vacationing at Westport are getting real enjoyment out of the sport. Each day fishing boats go out loaded down with ardent fishermen. The boats anchor off while dories go ashore to carve off pieces of blubber from the whale to use as bait. These are placed on the end of long ropes or chains which are towed behind the boats.

Soon rectangular fins of the man eating sharks can be seen cutting the water. When they get near the boats harpoons and rifles are brought into play. One shark has already been caught and towed into Westport.

One boat load of fishermen got a real thrill while pursuing the man eating monsters. One particularly large shark decided to assume the role of pursuer rather than pursued and attacked the boat. After making several rushes he lashed out with his tail and then tried to bite the boat. Had he succeeded in upsetting the boat the occupants would not have lived to tell the tale. They no doubt would have made a tasty change in diet for the many sharks forced to feed on the dead whale.

The shark fishing will soon come to an end for the carcass of the whale is rapidly diminishing. Part of it has been buried and the remainder is now nearly all consumed by the sharks.

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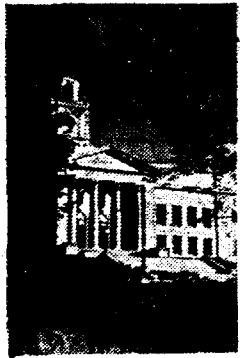

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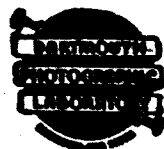

Sentenced on Perjury Charge

Pleading guilty to two charges of perjury arising out of hearings into the death of Enos LeBlanc who was killed in a motor accident at Salmon River last June, Delbert Lombard of Meteghan was sentenced to spend the next three months in the local jail by Provincial Magistrate H. B. Dickie at Little Brook Tuesday morning. Lombard was given three months on each of the two charges, the sentences to run concurrently.

Joseph B. Gaudet of Meteghan driver of the car which allegedly killed Enos LeBlanc, was fined \$50 and costs by Magistrate Dickie for failing to stop at the scene of an accident, and Delbert Lombard and Joseph W. LeBlanc, passengers in the car, were fined \$25 and costs each for aiding and abetting the driver in his failure to stop.

A charge of manslaughter has been laid against Gaudet, the driver of the car, and his case will come before the courts later this month.

Second Crash with Motorcycle

Currie Woodman, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Woodman, Conway, suffered cuts and bruises about the face and head when he was thrown from his motorcycle as he was passing through Annapolis on Friday evening. Brought to his home in Conway, it was found no bones were broken but one of the cuts on his face required several stitches to close.

This is the second time that the motorcycle owned by Currie has thrown its rider. Less than a month ago a brother of Currie's, Coleman Woodman of Cambridge, Mass., was riding the machine along the Bay Road when he was thrown to the pavement. He is still a patient in the Digby Hospital, suffering from severe injuries.

Car-Truck Collision

A car and a truck were both badly damaged—but the occupants of both escaped injury—when the vehicles were involved in a collision on the Kinney Bridge, at Gilbert's Cove, last Wednesday evening about 7:00 o'clock.

The car, driven by F. Arnold Wagner, New Edinburgh, was proceeding towards Weymouth and was just leaving the bridge as the truck driven by Clyde Specht, of Waterford, was entering. Both vehicles came together with a heavy crash, locking the front wheels of both.

The force of the collision drove the car back on the bridge railing while the truck swung across the road, coming to rest against the rail. The highway was completely blocked for some time following the accident.

There were three passengers in the car beside the driver, while the truck had two occupants.

Engineering Institute Meets Here

Delegates began arriving yesterday at the Pines Hotel for the Convention of the Engineering Institute of Canada, which opens there today. It is expected that well over three hundred delegates will be registered when the Convention opens at noon.

An address of welcome will be delivered to the delegates at luncheon today by Deputy Mayor Victor Cardoza.

Following the luncheon business sessions will be held. Addresses by noted scientists and engineers have been scheduled for the convention which is the first to be held since August, 1939 when the outbreak of World War II came as the convention was in session.

Appoint Police Constable

Roy Powell, aged 30, of Freeport, was appointed Police Constable and driver of the Fire Truck by the Town Council at their meeting Monday night. The appointment was made on recommendation of the Police Committee. Mr. Powell will commence his duties as soon as possible.

A building permit was issued by the Council to Jack Keen to erect a house on King Street according to plans submitted to the Council.

Considerable discussion was had at the meeting concerning the abutment work to be done on the Shore Road. It was decided to start immediately to have the logs cut on the Lily Lake property for the job so that much of the work on the abutments can be done before stormy weather sets in. Harold Simms was given the contract to cut the logs and brow them up so that the town truck can get them to haul to the job.

Wilbur VanTassel was appointed temporary driver of the Fire Truck until the new driver takes over the job.

Councillor Cardoza reported to the council on the sessions of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention in Truro. He stated the meetings were very beneficial and a great many problems common to most towns in the province were thrashed out. Town Clerk C. W. Smith also reported on the Convention and on the meeting of the Clerks and Treasurers held in Truro which he attended.

Another "Invasion Ship" Arrives

Another famed "invasion ship" arrived in the port of Digby this morning to load a cargo of pitprops for Hull, England. She is the S. S. Baron Elcho, in command of Captain J. S. Gates.

The Baron Elcho took part in the invasion of Europe. Her job was to unload heavy cargoes from other ships onto the beaches. She was especially fitted for this job with powerful winches and concrete ballast. When other ships came in close to the beachheads, the Baron Elcho would come alongside and with her powerful cranes unload the cargoes of tanks and war materials onto the beaches.

After the war the heavy concrete ballast was removed and the Baron Elcho became a cargo ship. She is now on her fourth trip as a cargo ship. Her first trip was to Halifax where she carried a cargo of pitprops to England. From England she went to Barcelona, Spain, for another cargo. Her third trip was to Quebec for another load of lumber for the mother country.

On her trip to Digby the Baron Elcho carried two passengers, Mrs. E. C. Robinson and her son, on their first trip to Canada. Mrs. Robertson and her son will proceed to Vancouver by train.

Registered in Androssan, Scotland, the Baron Elcho is a ship of some 4000 tons gross and carries a crew of thirty-three. She sailed from Liverpool. Her crew are all Britishers with the exception of the Chief Engineer, who is an Estonian and the Third Mate who hails from Latvia.

Receives Life Saving Award

W. Cleveland Dukeshire of Bear River was among those receiving awards from the Royal Canadian Humane Association for life saving it was announced last Friday.

The citation which accompanied Mr. Dukeshire's award read: "For heroic action and presence of mind in the rescue of Marine Agh from drowning in the ferry dock, Halifax, on July 5, 1945."

Migratory Bird Regulations

The Honorable J. Allison Glen, Minister of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, has just issued the regulations regarding migratory birds for the current year.

A summary of the Regulations as they apply to Nova Scotia, follows:

OPEN SEASONS (Both dates inclusive)

BRANT—Throughout Nova Scotia, October 1 to 31.

DUCKS (other than Eiders); GEESE (other than Brant)—In that part of the province of Nova Scotia comprising Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queen's, Halifax, Cape Breton, Guysborough, Richmond, Inverness and Victoria Counties: October 16 to December 31.

In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia comprising King's, Hants, Colchester, Cumberland, Pictou, Antigonish and Lunenburg Counties: October 1 to December 15.

EIDER DUCKS—In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia comprising Annapolis, Yarmouth, Digby, Shelburne, Queen's, Halifax, Guysborough, Richmond, Cape Breton, Inverness, and Victoria Counties: November 1 to December 31.

In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia comprising Kings, Hants, Colchester, Cumberland, Pictou, Antigonish, and Lunenburg Counties: October 15 to December 15.

WOODCOCK and WILSON'S SNIPES—In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia comprising Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queen's Counties: October 10 to November 9.

Throughout the remainder of the Province of Nova Scotia: October 1 to 31.

CLOSE SEASONS—There is a closed season throughout the year on Wood Ducks, Swans, Cranes, all shore birds except Wilson's Snipe and Woodcock, and all migratory non-game birds and insectivorous birds.

The possession of migratory game birds killed during the open season is allowed in Nova Scotia until March 31 following the open season.

BAG LIMITS—In any day: Ducks, 12; Geese (including Brant), 5; Wilson's Snipe, 8; Woodcock, 8.

In any open season: Ducks, 150; Geese (including Brant), 25; Woodcock, 100; Wilson's Snipe, 50.

Guns, Appliances and Hunting Methods

FORBIDDEN—The use of an automatic (auto-loading) gun with a magazine that has not been permanently plugged or altered so that it cannot carry more than one cartridge, or swivel, or machine gun, or battery, or rifle, or shot-gun loaded with a single bullet, or any gun larger than No. 10 gauge, or any weapon other than a gun or a bow and arrow; and the use of live birds as decoys, or of any aeroplane, powerboat, sail boat, sneak boat, or night-light, or shooting from any motor or wheeled vehicle or a vehicle to which a draft animal is attached. The hunting of migratory game birds by the use or aid of baiting with grain or other artificial food is prohibited.

The shooting of migratory game birds earlier than one half hour before sunrise or later than one half hour after sunset is prohibited.

The penalty for violation of the migratory bird laws is a fine of not more than Three Hundred Dollars and not less than Ten Dollars, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or both fine and imprisonment.

Prevent Serious Fire

Quick action by the Fire Department prevented what might have been a serious blaze at the home of Frank Hazelton yesterday afternoon.

Starting from the chimney, the fire burned several holes in the roof before being noticed. Attempts were made to extinguish the blaze with water buckets but without avail. The hose from the booster tank on the fire engine soon had it under control, however. Within twenty minutes of the sounding of the alarm the "all out" was sounded.

Clare Youths Testify at Preliminary Hearing

Two Clare youths, Adeliard Doucet of Concession and Joseph Paul Comeau of Little Brook Station, appeared in Magistrate d'Entremont's court, Little Brook, last Friday afternoon, each separately charged with unlawfully and with violence stealing a sum of \$340 from Rose Comeau. E. J. Theriault of Digby was Crown Prosecutor. The accused were undefended by counsel.

The court house at Little Brook was jammed with those who had travelled from miles around to be present at the hearing.

The cases were heard separately, that of 21 year old Adeliard Doucet being the first to be dealt with. Several witnesses were heard. 19 year old Paul Comeau gave evidence in the case of the King vs Doucet, while Doucet testified in the case against Comeau.

The hearing was adjourned until a later date when evidence will be taken at the Digby General Hospital from Mrs. Rose Comeau.

In giving evidence against Adeliard Doucet, Joseph Paul Comeau was granted the protection of the court under the Canada Evidence Act in that the evidence he gave at the hearing would not be used against himself.

He told of leaving his place at Little Brook Station at about 6:30 on the evening of August 20 and going to the home of Clarence Doucet, Concession, with his brother, Roland Comeau, and Peter Doucet. Then he met Adeliard Doucet.

Later in the evening he and Adeliard left for the home of John LeBlanc, Concession. The LeBlanc home was locked but Adeliard opened a window through which they entered. They found a dozen bottles of beer in the LeBlanc house, and took them.

He testified that between them they drank five bottles of the beer, and they took two each and started off for a wedding at the home of Lindsay LeBlanc.

On their way to Lindsay LeBlanc's, witness testified, they had to pass the home of Rose Comeau. They hid in the bushes while a car passed on the road.

After they came out of hiding the witness stated that Adeliard said "We've got to scare Rose Comeau." He continued his testimony by saying "I said yes", and went on to tell how they went to the door and threw their empty beer bottles at the window. Adeliard took a fence post and broke the window, and then went around to the back of the house and got a clothes line pole.

Witness testified he opened the door after the window was broken, went to the lamp and broke the chimney with a stick. Adeliard then entered. Later they left the house and hid in the garden because cars were coming along the road. When they returned Rose was standing at the foot of a ladder that led to the upstairs part of the house.

"I hauled her back by the shoulder," said the witness. She fell down and said her leg was broken. I helped her to a chair."

He then testified Adeliard asked her if she had any money. She said "No". There was a locked chest in the room. I helped Adeliard open it, continued the witness. Adeliard took a purse out of the chest, and we took a flashlight from the table.

(A flashlight in the court room was identified by the witness as the one taken.)

When questioned witness said he had no idea how Mrs. Comeau's shoulder was broken. He said Adeliard was alone in the house with her for about five minutes. When they left the house, he testified, Adeliard took the purse and they went to his (the witness's) cabin at Little Brook Station. "Adeliard gave me \$45 and told me he had \$45."

Witness completed his testimony by saying that the purse was burned in a stove and that he hid his money in the woods. Adeliard put his in a half pound coffee tin.

Adeliard Doucet was also given the protection of the court when he testified in the case against Paul Comeau. He told of meeting Comeau at the home of

his cousin, Clarence Doucet, and of going to the home of John LeBlanc and entering the house by way of a window and stealing 12 bottles of beer. His evidence in this connection was much the same as Paul Comeau's.

He then testified how when they came to the home of Rose Comeau on their way to the wedding party, Paul went to the door and asked for water. Rose said "No", and "I've got a gun". Each had thrown an empty beer bottle through the window.

"We started toward the party", he continued, "but hid in the bushes because a car was coming. We then went back to the house and I broke the window with a fence post. We hid again because another car was coming. When we came back Rose was nailing a blanket against the window. I pulled it down and went back of the house and got a clothes line pole."

"I put the pole through the window and started upsetting chairs in the room. Rose called upstairs to someone 'Come down and help me'. Then I began to fit against the upstairs wall with the clothes line pole and broke the pole."

"We ran back to the pasture. When we returned Rose was sitting in a chair praying. I said to Paul 'Let's go home'. He said 'No, we've got to open the door and go in.' He unlocked the door. I had a khaki handkerchief over my face. Paul had a white one over his face. We put out the lamp."

Rose was standing at the foot of the ladder. We hauled her back and she fell. She asked Paul to put her on a chair.

"We asked her if she had any money. She said 'No'. I saw a little chest in the room. When I asked her what was in it, she said 'food'."

"I opened it, and it contained food. There was another chest."

"I asked what was in that."

"She said 'It's my clothes'."

"That chest was locked. Paul helped me to open it. We saw the purse and went out. Paul followed me, and we walked to Little Brook Station."

When questioned, witness said Mrs. Comeau was sitting on a chair when they left the house. She had said she had a broken leg when she fell on the floor. Nothing else happened to her that night.

When asked by E. J. Theriault what she struck, witness said Paul struck her after she fell. He had struck her just once on the head with a piece of firewood.

He admitted: "We were quite drunk."

Detective Corporal William J. Lawrence of Yarmouth R.C.M.P. gave evidence that he had been called by Corporal Chute and Constable Marloy to investigate the beating and robbery of Mrs. Rose Comeau on August 20th.

In the early afternoon the accused, accompanied by Cpl Chute and the witness to Concession, where he led them to a spot in the woods approximately half a mile from Doucet's house, and produced a half pound King Cole Coffee tin containing \$272.50, which was turned over to the police. The flashlight was dug from the garden at Paul Comeau's, Little Brook Station.

The first witness heard during the afternoon was 70 year old Phillip LeBlanc, a bachelor, who testified he had known Rose Comeau for sixty years. He gave evidence that he made his home with his brother Frank at St. Martin's but on August 20 had been spending the day with Mrs. Comeau. He retired about nine o'clock that night, and shortly afterward heard someone pounding on the door, and stones were thrown at the window. They went downstairs and Rose sat on a chair.

From his testimony all was quiet for an hour afterwards. The intruders then returned, broke away the window, opened the front door, and came into the house. He said Adeliard Doucet came in with a man who had a stick of wood in his hand. They went to the table and broke the lamp and Rose was struck. He

Note the old Manhattan Hotel being torn down. At one time this was the largest hotel in the town. Seems a shame that it could not have been renewed and preserved, but presume it must have been past redemption.

Noted one of those old-fashioned green and brass glass water hangers in the Holdsworth Drug Store. Was a time when one of these hung in every drug store window, but they are getting scarce and are really valuable.

Attention Lumbermen and Land Owners

Re: "SMALL TREE CONSERVATION"

On and after September 1st, 1946, on woods operations involving the cutting of over 100,000 feet board measure or 200 cords or more, or an equivalent amount of wood by any other measure, the cutting of spruce, pine and hemlock trees measuring less than ten inches inside bark at the stump is prohibited unless the operator holds a license, signed by the Minister of Lands and Forests.

The felling of undersized trees, where necessary in laying out a reasonable number of roads, in clearing land for camps or for any other purpose incidental to a proper lumbering operation will not be deemed a breach of the "Small Tree Conservation Act."

PASSING THROUGH DIGBY

(by Guy Cathcart Pelton, F.R.S.S.)

When the Princess Helene enters Digby Harbor, the visitor from the West and from the cities of both Canada and the United States gets his first thrill of Nova Scotia, and that is something that makes Nova Scotia different from any other place in the world.

There is something in the air you breathe, in the deep green of the foliage and the evergreens and in the blue-green of the water that is just a little different from other parts of the world.

People who come to Nova Scotia and to Digby, come to rest and to holiday. They are not looking for big buildings, big crowds and noisy gaiety. They like Digby because it is peaceful and quiet and comfortable. Nobody seems to be in a hurry. In the cities everyone is in a hurry to get nowhere, with nothing especially to do after they get there.

We, who used to live in Yarmouth, find a few familiar names in Digby. We see the jewellery sign of S. C. Hood and learn it is a branch of S. C. Hood, the third, of Yarmouth. The wife of the rector of the Anglican church was formerly Bertie Sweeney of Yarmouth, and we regret to learn that she is out of town. The wife of the popular hardware merchant, Fritz Dakin, is a Yarmouth girl, whom we used to know as Ina Poole. The publisher of the lively Digby paper is our old friend Wallis who for many years was a very well known Yarmouth newspaper man and the son of one of Yarmouth's old time printers, who himself published a little daily paper, The Post, for many years.

We have many pleasant memories of the Wallis family in Yarmouth. The father of J. J. printed the first daily newspaper I issued and also the little magazine I used to get out when I was still in my teens. I remember one issue that had pages the size of the Ladies Home Journal and a big colored cover. When you consider that the type setting was all done by hand and the pages printed one by one on a job press, you can understand what a real job of work that was. How well I recall all the Wallis sisters and the two brothers of J. J., one of whom went to school with me, and the other whom I had the pleasure of phoning up in Oakland, California, where he was once visited by J. J., Captain Henry Wallis was a successful sea captain, going to sea fairly late in life, after several years in the printing business.

Digby has nice little rooms and eating places and the prices are reasonable. I can recall when the Misses Clinton had their candy shop and ice cream parlor and how patriotic they were in refusing to sell ice cream during the shortages of the first world war.

I hope there are still a few in Digby who remember my father, the late Judge Sandford H. Pelton, who always enjoyed his trips to Digby. He used to have the odd bridge game with A. J. MacLaren, who moved to Digby from Argyle and afterwards passed away in Glendale, California.

The Pines is as fine a summer hotel as can be found on the continent and has certainly been a great attraction for visitors from Canada and the United States.

Digby has a little more sun-

shine than Yarmouth and we have to admit it.

George Spinney, president of the Bank of Montreal, a Yarmouthian, who has been summering at the Pines, is one of the many who like the sunshine of Digby in preference to the fog of Yarmouth, and I. W. Killam, the Montreal financier, is another. Robert Clements, son of the late Hon. Edgar Clements, K. C. of Yarmouth, was another of the visitors at the Pines. He passed through Digby again last week accompanied by Mrs. Clements and his sister, Miss Elsie Clements.

Another visitor to Digby for a day this week was Ketchum, on the writing staff of the Ottawa Journal, who is the son-in-law of G. Prescott Baker, of Yarmouth.

Next summer, when the boats from Boston and New York are running to Yarmouth, Nova Scotia is going to be thronged with visitors from the United States. A lot of them are going to make the circular tour; they are coming around by way of Saint John and back by way of Yarmouth and vice versa. This is going to create a big problem for tourist accommodations next year. If the Pines was crowded this summer, what is it going to be next summer?

It seems to me that every town in Nova Scotia that is catering to tourists, should be preparing for the crowd that is coming next year. There ought to be dozens more of tourist and motor cabins and \$4 hotels, European plan. There should be more catering throughout Nova Scotia to the family parties, the families of four or five who are in their own motor cars and who cannot afford to stay at the Pines. Unless something is done to care for this type of tourist, Nova Scotia is going to lose a lot of good future business.

I spoke to a man in Digby when I went through there a month ago. He was travelling in his own automobile, with two grown kids and his wife. It cost him \$20 a day at an American hotel in Yarmouth and would have cost him more than that at the Pines. There is undoubtedly a big group of monied tourists who will next year and every year fill the high priced hotels, but there is also another group who are not in the monied class but who should be catered to.

I had a hard time finding a room at Yarmouth and if I was here with a family of three or four would probably have a hard time finding moderate accommodations in Digby. I would like to see some sort of co-operative plan worked out by the towns, the province and the federal government for providing bigger accommodation for tourists who are using motor cars and who come with their families.

Digby, with its surroundings, has everything that the tourist wants: climate, fish dinners, places to play golf, places to swim and boat and fish, but more than this. Digby has a peculiarly attractive setting, a sort of quiet little gem of green and blue set in the midst of the province. It is the between place from Montreal and Saint John to Halifax and Prince Edward Island, and it is also the between place for tourists from Boston and New York en route to other parts of the province. Digby is blessed in its location, in its climate and in its attractions of Nature. It has everything to offer, but neither Digby nor Yarmouth nor any other part of the province has the accommodations that will be required to take care of next summer's tourist business.

Cold Storage Plants

Box-packing of apples, a new departure in Nova Scotia, will begin at the Coldbrook plant this autumn.

Support School Plan

Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities in annual session at Truro endorsed the provincial government's rural high school plan, which calls for a 25 per cent contribution from municipal treasuries. In a resolution the Union said "the rural high school plan will bring to the boys and girls of this province the opportunity for a thoroughly modern Junior High and Senior high school education."

Big Navy Base has been closed up and is lying idle. While it may be ten miles from Digby that is not a great distance to the man who has his own car. Seems to me that could be made into a very fine auto camp for next summer.

I hope the people of Digby will never depart from their quiet, peaceful enjoyment of life. Visitors from the cities do not come to hear juke boxes or to see a natural old setting made modern. It is the quaintness of Nova Scotia that makes it attractive. It is a pleasant contrast to the exaggerated modernity of the American summer resorts. Tourists do not want merry-go-rounds, ferris wheels, roller coasters and painted fronts. They want rest and relaxation and the natural beauties of nature, and all these are right here in Digby.

Digby is the between place of Nova Scotia, and as such, has big years ahead in tourist trade. Next year when the Yarmouth-Boston-New York boats are on, the strikes are over, and things are back to normal again, Nova Scotia is going to be literally jammed with tourists. We must in some way prepare for them this winter, because if we cannot accommodate them next year, they won't come back. And we certainly want them back.

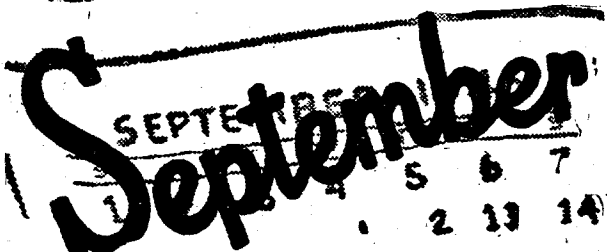
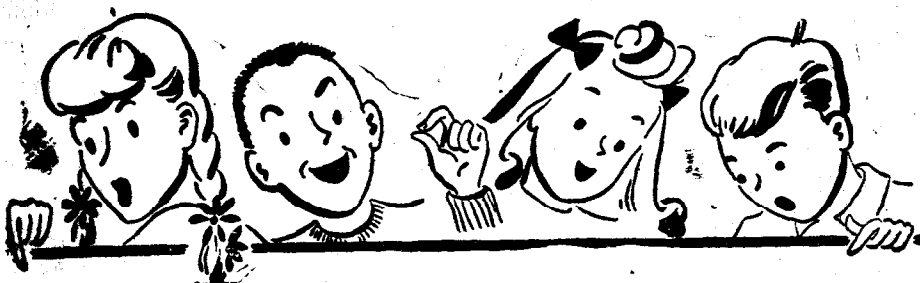

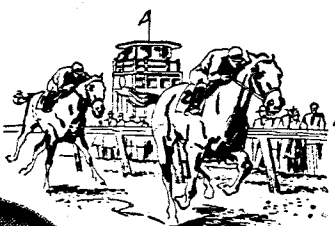

Hundreds of Red Cross workers from Digby, Annapolis and surrounding districts gathered at the former Cornwallis Naval Base last Friday afternoon to witness the official opening of the Red Cross Lodge, which will serve as a hostel for visiting relatives of patients in the Cornwallis Veterans' Hospital.

Formal opening of the lodge was made by Premier Angus L. MacDonald who turned the key in the door and declared the lodge officially open.

In his address, Mr. MacDonald paid high tribute to the work of the Red Cross. He said that the thanks of all Nova Scotia and indeed every relative of the patients of the hospital were due in most generous measure to the workers of the Red Cross who had made the lodge possible. This lodge, he said, stands as a symbol of the Red Cross is ever continuing.

Aged Victim Testifies of Attack in Her Home

Adeliard Doucet of Concession and Joseph Paul Comeau of Little Brook Station were, on last Wednesday night, committed to stand trial before a higher court by Magistrate d'Entremont at the Little Brook Court House on separate charges of unlawfully and with violence stealing a sum of \$340 from Mrs. Rose Comeau.

Still showing the effects of her ordeal, with her arm and shoulder in bandages and splints, Mrs. Comeau gave her evidence in a low voice with long pauses between statements. Speaking in her native French tongue, her remarks were translated and then taken down.

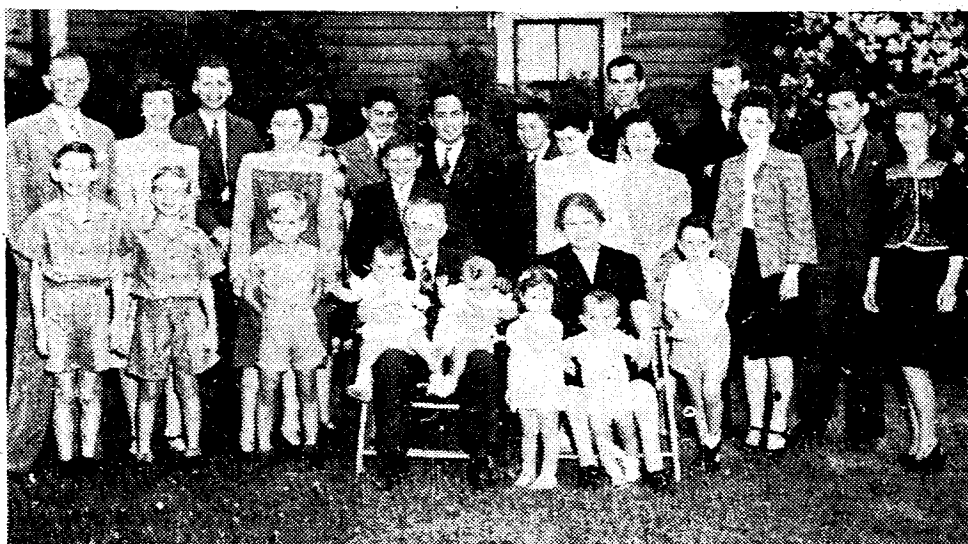
Memorial Gift to Hospital

BOAT RECOVERED AFTER GOING ADRIFT

The sailboat owned by Dr. Channing LeFebvre, which went adrift in the heavy wind shortly after midnight Tuesday night was recovered yesterday morning on the north shore of Bear Island. Not a scratch or mark was found on the boat.

The fact that the boat landed on Bear Island was considered most surprising since, at the time she went adrift, a strong southerly wind was blowing and the tide was ebbing. It was thought this would carry her out through the Gut or onto the Port Wade shore.

Record Enrollment at Digby Academy

The Digby Academy re-opened for the Fall term last Wednesday with a record enrollment of 580 pupils. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the Academy.

The heaviest congestion is in Grades 2 to 9, with enrollments ranging from 45 to 67. In the Common School, Grades 1 to 6 there are 362 pupils registered. In the Junior High, which comprises Grades 7 to 9, there are 131 pupils enrolled. The Senior High School, Grades 10 to 12, has 87 pupils.

There is this year a large enrollment of out of town pupils in both the Junior and Senior High School Departments. Pupils from Sandy Cove, Little River, Rossway, North Range, Hassett and other districts are registered. A number of pupils who planned to attend the Academy from outside districts were forced to cancel their plans because of inability to secure boarding places in town.

Principal-Supervisor F. C. Purdy states that the facilities of both the Academy and the new Junior High School are being strained to the limit to cope with the heavy registration. It has been necessary to put extra seats in the Junior High to accommodate the increase in pupils.

Mr. Purdy stated that a great number of requests from parents outside the present area of consolidation for admission of their children to the Academy had to be refused because of lack of accommodation. He said he felt it would be extremely doubtful the Academy could carry on another year under the present set up unless further accommodation were provided.

Four staff changes marked the opening of the Academy this year. These were the appointment of Douglas Ormond of Amherst to succeed Miss McWhinnie as Vice-Principal; Mrs. A. J. Dillon in the Commercial Department, succeeding Miss Beilveau; Miss Ruth Specht in the Junior High School and Miss Marjorie Banks in Grades 1 and 2.

We note the Spectator of Annapolis Royal entered its sixty-fifth year of publication with its September 5th issue. We take this opportunity of extending congratulations.

About a year ago the Spectator changed ownership when it was purchased by Beattie Bros. of Bridgetown, publishers of the Bridgetown Monitor. The Beattie boys have done an excellent job of giving the ancient town of Annapolis Royal a really good newspaper — a newspaper that has a splendid typographical appearance and records faithfully and well the news of the community it serves.

With its September 5th issue the Coast Guard, Shelburne's weekly newspaper, incorporated an eight page supplement of colored comics with its regular edition, and carried the announcement, "Today is a red letter day in the history of newspaper publishing in the Maritimes for the Coast Guard is the first newspaper in Eastern Canada, either weekly or daily, to carry comics in color."

Somewhat we have always regarded Montreal as well within the bounds of Eastern Canada. Also, we may be wrong, but we have a vague recollection of colored comics appearing in a Halifax paper known as the "Sunday Leader" that appeared for a period during the 20's.

We have no doubts but what the Coast Guard will make considerable gains in circulation because of its new feature; however, the public will continue to judge the Coast Guard — and any other newspaper — on the merits of its news and editorial columns, and not by its colored comics.

Our comments are not a reflection on the Coast Guard or its management, for frankly, we watched this paper with more or less of a parental interest. The Coast Guard is managed by Ivan Shortliffe who left us to take his present position, and who received much of his training in our plant. We are really happy and proud of the work Ivan has done and wish him continued success. However, we cannot agree the introduction of colored comics should be regarded in any way as "a red letter day in the history of newspaper publishing in the Maritimes."

Lunches Inadequate

Miss Marjorie Bell, M.B.E., B. Sc., director of home services, gave an address on nutrition. Miss Bell stated too little attention was being paid to nutrition, especially in the matter of proper food for school children. The school lunches are for the most part totally inadequate, Miss Bell said, and very often the children

do not receive a proper breakfast before starting out to school. If we are to combat disease we must act to prevent it she said.

This can be done in great measure by the provision of properly balanced, nourishing meals and lunches especially for the young. In this way, strong, healthy, disease resistant bodies will be built.

A home nursing demonstration was also carried out under the direction of Mrs. W. S. Dunlop, chairman home nursing and first aid. Members of the C.R.C.C. nursing auxiliary, Halifax, assisted in this demonstration.

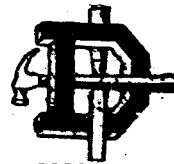

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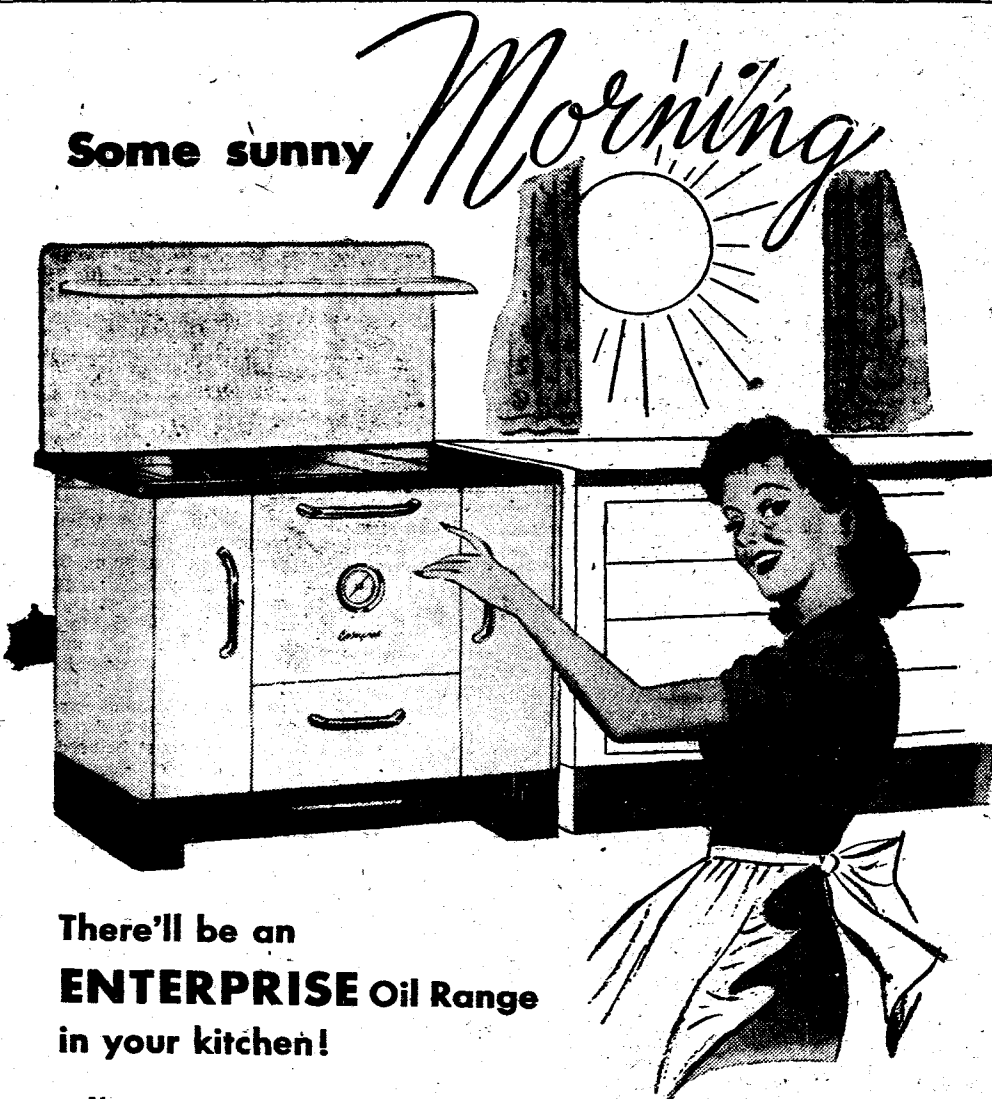

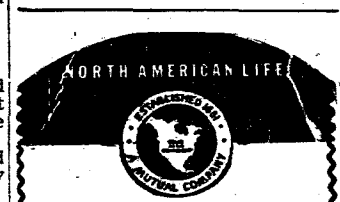

A reception was held and refreshments served, after which the happy couple left on a honeymoon to be spent in Queen's County. Out of town guests present

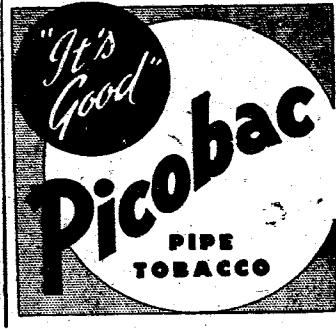

Bait Can Be Interesting

A correspondent from Westport writes: "Have you ever heard of fishermen catching squid for bait?" and then goes on to tell us about the squid and how it is caught.

The squid is a fish of the octopus family and does not possess fins, neither is it caught with a hook. It has long feelers, inside each of which is a suction pad used to hold food tightly while it eats.

One of the most unusual features about the squid is its bill which resembles that of a small bird, and is used for crushing food. Another unusual feature is that the squid seldom swims frontwards and has an amazing method of protecting itself.

When a large fish goes to at-

tack a squid it gets almost upon its intended victim when suddenly the water about the squid becomes black. The squid has squirted a black liquid very similar to ink, thus blinding its attacker and hiding itself by an ink screen.

Fishermen who use squid for bait catch them with a circular jig made up of a dozen or more steel points directed toward the line. When this is dropped over the squid wraps its feelers about the points and holds them with its suction pads. Quickly he is drawn to the surface.

Inexperienced squid fishermen are quick to try and catch a glimpse of their catch—they find themselves blinded, bewildered and wet, and soon learn the squid squirts its ink-like black liquid the moment it leaves the water. The best policy for the squid fisherman is to stand well to one side and bring his squid lines up in the direction of someone else. After all "Each man for himself".

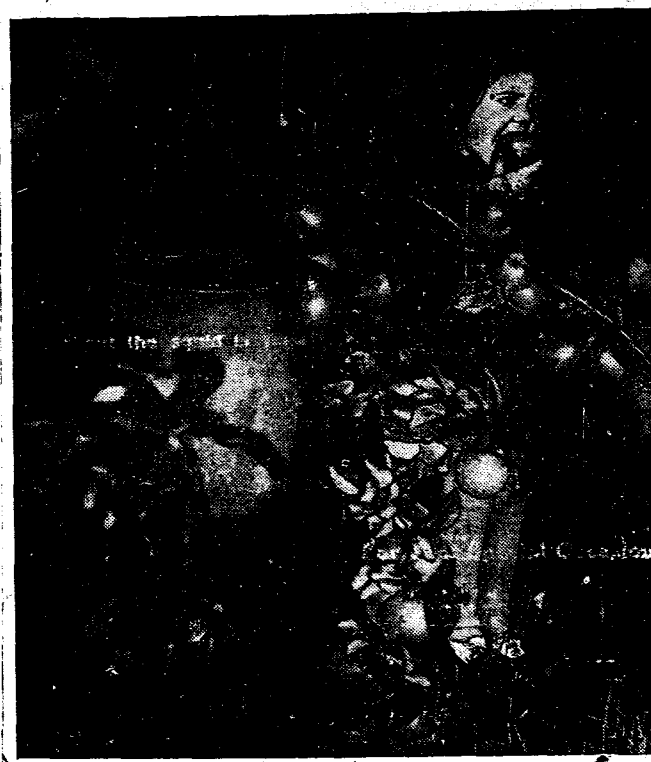

KINDERGARTEN

Kindergarten is a German word meaning "Garden of Children". It is conducted for children, during their most impressive age, three to six years. It is not, as some parents believe, a primary school training, but a pre-school training, preparing the child to associate with other children his own age. Froebel, the great kindergarten teacher, says "Little children learn only through self activity" but "This self activity must be directed into the proper channels." Kindergarten is conducted in a home atmosphere, similar to what the child has been used to. Here we find no rows of desks, but familiar toys and playmates. Behind this new playing is disguised a systematic training. The child learns to play with other children, learns self discipline and the necessity for co-operation in organized games, loses his self consciousness in group singing. Through the daily talks and stories, he unconsciously imbibes rudiments of good citizenship and lays the foundation of character. In the simple graded manual activities, he finds out how to co-ordinate hand and eye. All these activities are just play to him, but they are the stepping stones to the more serious work of later school days. The programmes are designed to instruct the child in his duties to parents, to his playmates, to his country and to his God (without denominationalism). War, strife, Bogies, Ogres, etc. are strictly avoided. Love for his fellow men and Nature is the keynote throughout. He receives good impressions at a most impressionable age. Above all, he starts his public school life with a confidence complex, the value of which cannot be over-estimated. Apart from the special pre-school training given in Kindergarten, mothers of young children find it a great help to be able to put their children in safe keeping for a few hours each day. Every mother should be free from the worry of little children for some time each day. It is not really attention little loved ones need, but suitable occupation and play mates. These are provided in Kindergarten, at less cost per day than is paid a girl to look after the children, for the same period and the parent is assured of specialized training for each child put in the care of the teacher.

With this issue the Digby Courier enters its seventy-third year of publication. During the seventy-two years the Courier has served the people of Digby town and County many changes have come to pass over the countryside—during those years the Courier has recorded the births, marriages and deaths of thousands of citizens—reported happenings in the lives of the people of the community, not only of those who have lived and died in the town and county of their birth, but also of those who have sought fame and fortune far afield.

NEW HIGH IN CIRCULATION

The Digby Courier begins its 73rd year by printing more than 2500 copies of this edition to meet ordinary circulation requirements—a new high in circulation for this newspaper, and one of which the publishers are especially proud, for no special effort has been made to add new subscribers to the mailing list.

The 2500 figure represents a gain of nearly 200 during the past three months. There are good indications this figure will be increased by another 100 before the end of the year.

On occasions when special editions have been published, press runs exceeding 3,000 have been made, but those occasions have been few and far between. At present the aim of the Courier's circulation department (paper deliveries permitting) is to hit the 3000 circulation bull's eye before another fall year rolls around.

EXHIBITION FAR ABOVE AVERAGE

The Digby County Exhibition opened at Bear River yesterday under very favorable circumstances. The weather was ideal and the exhibits were far above expectation. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning—some hours before the doors opened to the general public—128 entries had been made (an increase of about ten per cent), and in quantity and quality, the exhibits were away above average. In the main building vegetables were exceptionally good, although at that time they had not all been put in place. A garden collection by the D. V. A. at Cornwalls (not in competition) attracted much attention. Upstairs the flowers were the finest ever shown in Bear River, and the fruit was so far superior to that of last year, that there really was no comparison. Fancy work, sewing, mats and quilts—in which this exhibition always specializes—was up to the average and that is saying a lot. The school exhibit was almost double that of previous years, and the cooking, etc., showed quite an increase. Out in the yards, the livestock exhibit, even at that early hour, was good and more entries were expected.

The Exhibition will continue all through to-day and evening, when the additional features will be Horse Haul, Log Chopping, Log Sawing, Stock Parade, High Jump (boys), Moving Pictures and Band.

Reserves Decision in Taxi Law Case

He said Lawrence was parked in front of the Ideal with his taxi cards in the windows of his car. He did not pay Lawrence any money for the trip but gave Robicheau some change as "he did not want to break a bill."

Robicheau stated he asked Lawrence to take them up over the hill. When they arrived at Mrs. Tufts' he put money on the seat as Lawrence did not want to take it. He said Harris gave him fifty or sixty cents. When asked if Lawrence returned the money, he said "No."

Taking the stand in his own defence, Lawrence said he and Robicheau were buddies in the Army. When he offered to pay him he said he did not want anything. Robicheau threw money on the seat as the car was pulling away. He said it was not taxi signs that drew Robicheau's attention when he was parked but the fact that he recognized him. He said he only brought passengers into town and took them back again but did not taxi inside the town. He had never been in trouble before, he said, when he was taxiing in Yarmouth.

Chief of Police Thibeault stated he had received other complaints that Lawrence was operating within the town but could not get witnesses to testify. He asked for a conviction.

Magistrate Peters said he felt there were several things regarding the case that needed study and reserved his decision for one week.

This is the first case to come before the courts involving a violation of the new Town Taxi By-Law and is being watched with considerable interest by the taxi operators in Digby.

FIRST LAUNCHING IN SIXTY YEARS



The first ship launched in Digby in nearly sixty years slid down the ways of the Digby Boatbuilding yards at noon last Thursday.

Christened in traditional style with the breaking of a bottle of champagne over the bow by Miss Grace Richardson, the ship was named the "Dale Maxwell" in honor of the owner's grandson. She was built for Captain B. D. Ritcey of Riverport and will be used as a scallop dragger.

She is sixty-five feet in length with a width of seventeen feet and a depth of eight feet. A very trim craft, she has been painted black above the water line and maroon below. Her wheel house and fore-castle hatch have been constructed in modernistic lines and painted white.

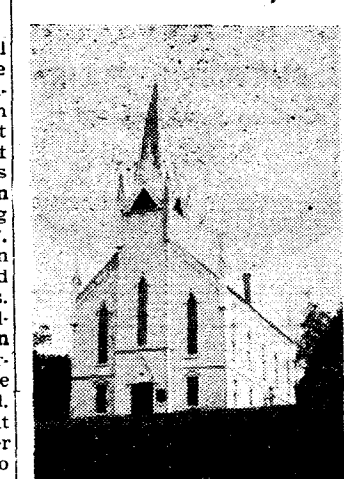
An autopsy is being made at Halifax to determine whether death was the result of polio or tetanus (lock-jaw). The report from the autopsy has not yet been received in Digby.

Principal Reports

Congestion in Schools

The first meeting of the school board since the opening of the Fall term was held Friday night at the Town Hall.

Principal Purdy presented a lengthy and detailed report covering the school re-opening. He stated existing facilities were sufficient to house all pupils during 1946-47 under congested conditions particularly in Junior High. Old desks discarded last year have had to be brought back into use and ten seats taken from the Science Room to take care of the congestion.

He stated that unless the Consolidation Plan for this area is adopted prior to 1947, the Board must give thought to the question of housing the present enrollments under some other scheme. The minimum requirement for 1947 will be one extra classroom or possibly two. Even so, he said, such a measure could provide only temporary relief.

Reporting on attendance and several cases of habitual truancy Mr. Purdy received authority to deal with these cases according to the law. He intimated that in one or two cases the offenders would have to be sent to schools of correction.

Three students from the Academy Grade XII class of 1945 were proceeding to University, Mr. Purdy said. These were Vernon MacKay, who received a \$150 scholarship, Shirley Hamilton and Philip Woolaver.

Mr. Purdy stated all planned repairs had been carried out. Hot water and cabinets had been installed in the Domestic Science room, Kindergarten tables and cabinets in the Primary grades. Some thirty primary chairs which were on order had not been received but were urgently needed. Science cabinets and tables were added to the Senior High School Department.

Surveys of mentally retarded children of the junior grades would be carried out during the term with a view to establishing an auxiliary class should the number exceed 15. Dr. Bryson, Provincial Psychiatrist, will send her assistant to help with this testing.

Aptitude tests will be administered in the Junior and Senior High Schools. These will be followed by a policy of screening based upon the results of the tests and the student's scholastic record.

There will be this year, Mr. Purdy said, a planned guidance programme for the Junior and Senior High. This matter is presently under consideration of the Supervisor and Vice-principal.

Arrangements have been completed with local Music teachers, he said, to follow the course of study laid down for Grades X to XII. Students will be permitted to plan their music program during school hours. Outside classes will be arranged not to conflict with regular school work.

Prepare for Scallop Season

There is great activity along the waterfront of Digby these days—scallop season opens October 1st. At every wharf can be seen a line of scallop boats all in the process of preparation for the opening of the season.

New engines are being installed, hoisting engines overhauled, and in some cases new ones installed. Hoisting gear nets and cables are getting a thorough overhauling. New plankings is being laid on decks and on the side where the incoming drags buffet the boat. During the summer many of the boats were repainted and all of them look very trim as they are readied for the season.

Several new boats are joining the fleet this year, several of them owned and operated by veterans. It is expected this year's fleet will be one of the largest for several seasons with over fifty boats joining in the chase. These boats come not only from Digby but from all along Digby Neck and the South Shore. It is also rumored that the fleet this year will be joined by two boats from Sydney.

Fishing out of Digby will be the new dragger, "Dale Maxwell", owned by Captain B. D. Ritcey of Riverport and recently launched at the yards of the Digby Boatbuilding Company.

A move is on foot this year to limit the length of drags to fifteen feet and representations have been made to the Department of Fisheries. The present length allowed by the government is eighteen feet. It is claimed that a number of the boats cannot handle the larger drags and this is giving the bigger boats an unfair advantage.

Newsman Conclude Annual Convention

A talk on Canada's Tourist Industry was given by D. Leo Dolan, Chief of the Canadian Travel Bureau, Ottawa, at a complimentary luncheon sponsored by Johnston, Everson and Charlesworth, of Montreal and Toronto.

John W. Fisher, C.B.C. commentator, was special guest speaker at the annual C. W. N. A. Trophy Dinner Friday evening. The programme that evening consisted of a special radio broadcast from the hall.

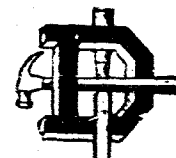

County Fair

Thousands of people from all over Digby County gathered last evening in Conway for the annual community fair of the Digby Leaf Agricultural Society. This year is the first time in several years that the fair has not been rained out. Although the weather was threatening during the morning, cleared off for the afternoon and evening. As usual, the horse and ox pulling contests proved the big attraction of the show. Results in the double horse contests were: 1st—Glendon Robbins, weight of team, 2,909, hauled 6,000. 2nd—Charles Kaulback, weight 3,123, hauled 4,700. 3rd—Earl Haight, weight 3,020, hauled 4,100. In the single horse team pull, Allan Stark's dapple gray led the field, pulling 3,300 pounds. The weight of his horse was 1,318. Bob Robinson came second, pulling 3,450, weight of horse, 1,465. 3rd—Glendon Robbins, hauling 3,000, weight 1,369. In the ox pulling contest, John Theriault's team took top honors. This splendid dark red team, weighing 3,740, pulled 6,100. 2nd—Hartley Balser, pulling 4,150, team weight 3,282. 3rd—Eric VanTassel, with 4,800, team weight, 3,025. Fruit and vegetable exhibits this year were not up to past levels either in quality or in quantity. Livestock exhibits, however were extremely good, many fine animals being shown. Winner of the first place for pure bred jerseys was Lloyd MacNeill of Marshalltown. Arthur Gates secured top honors for pure bred guernseys. The first prize for horses went to Roy Alcorn of Bear River. Judges for the fair were William Milligan, of the extension branch, Department of Agriculture, Truro, who judged the livestock and horses; Donald White, agricultural representative for Annapolis County, who judged fruits and vegetables; and Miss Mona Graham, of the Extension branch, Truro, who judged fine arts, homecraft, and flowers. A tug of war was featured in the evening's program, followed by movies and a dance. Supper in the form of an old fashioned corn boil was served right on the fair grounds. This year the fair was held on the grounds at Conway recently purchased by the Maple Leaf Society. Funds raised from the fair will go towards the erection of permanent exhibition buildings.

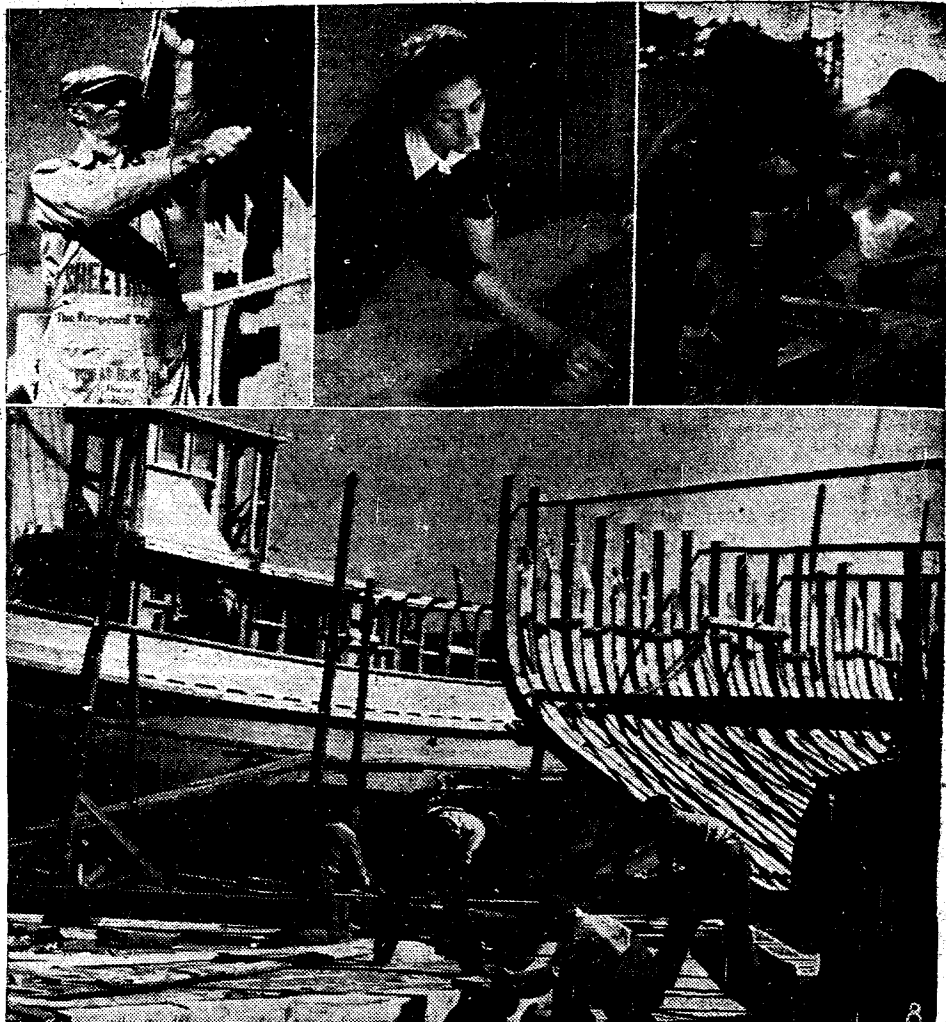
Emma H. Theriault

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SHIPBUILDING IN NOVA SCOTIA



One-third of all Canada's war-time shipyards were located in Nova Scotia—a significant fact only now coming to light as federal authorities reveal some of the secrets of Canadian war production.

1944 was the biggest shipbuilding year in Nova Scotia, one year after the Canadian peak, according to Department of Industry records. Thirty-one yards were building or repairing ships that year. In the entire Dominion there were 94.

The year's score in Nova Scotia was 858 craft built or building. They ranged all the way

from destroyers and steel cargo ships to lifeboats and barges. The big vessels were built at Halifax and Pictou, the others in smaller yards scattered along the coast all the way from the Bay of Fundy to Northumberland Strait. More than 3000 craft were launched in a little over four years.

There was an inland shipyard. At Hebbville, Lunenburg County, two miles from the water, more than 200 landing barges a year were constructed.

Value of production at Nova Scotia yards reached the sizeable sum of \$34,044,000 annually. More than \$18,000,000 a year was paid out in wages and salaries.

Capital invested was figured by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at above \$35,000,000. Payrolls carried the names of 8,912 employees, including 613 women.

Protest D. V. A. Plan to Change Hospital Location

Vigorous protest against any move of the Department of Veterans Affairs to make a change in the location of the Health and Occupational Centre slated for Cornwallis was voiced at a joint meeting of the Digby and Annapolis Boards of Trade at Annapolis Royal on Monday night. Present at the meeting were representatives from branches of the Canadian Legion in Digby, Annapolis Royal and Bear River and representatives of other bodies.

Cost of operation of the centre at Cornwallis particularly for heating was given as a possible reason for a change in location. It was stated the H. and O. would use only about five buildings at the base and only a small percentage of amount of coal said needed could be charged to it.

Although speakers stated they had been assured no alternate site was considered, others at the meeting claimed a location in Halifax was under consideration.

A change in plans would work great hardships one speaker stated. Over sixty men are already located here in connection with this, and several have bought properties and moved their families to the area. Closing down of the centre would mean also a large reduction in maintenance staff, it was said.

A resolution was passed urging the D.V.A. to give assurance plans to establish the centre at Cornwallis would be proceeded with. Copies were ordered sent to Federal ministers, to the D. V.A. meeting at Kentville and to the Provincial Executive of the Canadian Legion.

Arrangements were made for a delegation to visit on the Hon. J. L. Islev, when he arrives in Halifax aboard the Queen Mary.

The following resolution was passed at the Annapolis meeting:

"Whereas a strong possibility exists that the Health and Occupational Centre slated for Cornwallis may be moved to some other locality, due, it is stated, to the excessive heating cost and whereas only five buildings will be occupied by the Health and Occupation Centre and whereas the Health and Occupation Centre will only be charged with heating these five buildings, the balance of the cost to be borne by the War Assets Corporation and D. V. A. Hospital and whereas other projects originally intended for location at Cornwallis were subsequently established elsewhere, and whereas the possible change in location of the Health and Occupational Centre would seriously affect a considerable number of veterans residing in Annapo-

lis and Digby areas through loss of employment, and whereas Cornwallis is an ideal situation for the Health and Occupational Centre and represents an investment of some \$9,000,000 of the Canadian Taxpayers' money;

Therefore be it resolved, thus, that the Annapolis and Digby Boards of Trade, the Canadian Legion in the Counties of Digby and Annapolis, and other interested bodies, strenuously protest the possible transfer of the Health and Occupation Centre to any other area, and petition the Department of Veterans' Affairs to give assurance that the Health and Occupation Centre will be established at Cornwallis as originally intended."

"Resolved that a joint committee be setup from this meeting for the purpose of giving immediate effective publicity in support of our resolution urging confirmation of the Health and Occupation Centre at Cornwallis and that this publicity should take the form of descriptive articles by well known writers in leading newspapers and periodicals, including a pictorial review of the set-up: showing equipment housing, scenic environment, and otherwise making the public familiar with an ideal site for a health centre. Further that this programme be financed by popular subscription and by appeal to each organization present."

The above resolution was moved by Mr. T. H. H. Fortier and seconded by Mr. Harold L. McCormick

Lawman Cochrane offered prayer following the Scripture reading by Rev. T. W. The aim of the group is to spread the Gospel to lumbermen, merchant navy and other groups who find it difficult to attend church.

Enter Guilty Pleas

True bills were returned by the Grand Jury in all three criminal cases to come before the fall session of the Supreme Court which opened Tuesday morning at Little Brook in the Municipality of Clare with Mr. Justice W. L. Hall presiding.

The cases to go to the Grand Jury were those of the King vs. Joseph Benjamin Gaudet of Meteghan, charged with manslaughter arising out of the death of Enos LeBlanc who was killed when struck by a car at Salmon River, Digby County, in June of this year. Adeliard Doucet of Concession and Joseph Paul Comeau of Little Brook Station were individually charged with robbery with violence, charges arising out of the beating and robbery of Mrs. Rose Comeau of Concession, which occurred last month.

The defendants in all three cases pled guilty and were remanded for sentence to be passed at the close of the Supreme Court Session.

The Civil case of George Gilli and vs. Agnes and Henry Deveau all of New Edinburgh, slated to come before this session, was settled out of court. This was a non-jury case, and was an action for possession of lands.

At time of going to press no details concerning the civil suit of Doucet vs. Balcom were available. The petit jury for this case was drawn Tuesday. It involves damages resultant from a car-truck collision which occurred at Wellington, Yarmouth County, early in May.

Westport Boy Injured

A very serious accident occurred in Westport on Monday afternoon when the floor of the Titus fish house dropped to the beach carrying with it, Beverly Titus and many casks of fish. Other men in the house at this time were able to run to safety.

One cask of fish fell on Beverly's arm, crushing it badly. Dr. Edward Weir appeared on the scene immediately and was unable to determine the extent of his injuries until x-rays were taken at the Digby General Hospital.

Fortunately the tide was out at the time or it would have been impossible to rescue Beverly. He is the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Titus and is very popular among the young people of the community.

New Policeman On Duty

Wilbur Amoro of Saint John took over his duties as Police Constable for the town last Monday. The new policeman is a veteran of this war having served in the Provost Corps. Beside his duties as Police Constable he will serve as driver of the Fire Truck. At present Mr. Amoro is on night duty.

Final Band Concert For Season

The Digby Civic Band played their last concert for this season on Sunday afternoon. A large crowd was in attendance to hear the concert which was a particularly fine one.

Under the direction of Laidlaw F. Addison, who left on Monday for Toronto where he will resume leadership of the Toronto Symphony Band, the Band presented such splendid marches as "Colonel Bogey", "Sons of the Brave" and "Silent Heroes."

Other numbers presented were Beethoven's "Minuet in G", selections from Sullivan's Operatic Gems and a caprice, "Princess Tiptoe."

Last Thursday evening the Band presented a concert at the Bear River Exhibition. This concert was a fine one and was well received by a capacity crowd at the Fair.

Popular Bank Manager Transferred

A long and interesting history was brought to a close Tuesday, September 17, when the Provincial Government took over the "Blackford" Ferry operating across Petite Passage, connecting East Ferry on the mainland with Tiverton on Long Island.

Baden Outhouse and Howard Cossaboom, two returned men, have been appointed ferrymen.

The ferry service over Petite Passage has been operated by the Blackford family for nearly one hundred and fifty years. It was established in 1803 by Martin Blackford and handed down from father to son, Captain Byron (By) Blackford, who has been ferryman for the past sixty years, is a great grandson of Martin Blackford.

Martin Blackford was a Scotsman who fought for Prince Charlie and was taken prisoner after the loyalist forces were defeated at Culloden. He, however, escaped and made his way to America, settling in what is now called the State of New Jersey, where he married and prospered.

He was still a Loyalist at the time of the American Revolution and Martin Blackford, with members of his family, migrated to Canada. (Three sons remained in the United States.)

The Blackfords first settled at Digby. Later they moved to Sandy Cove, and during the latter part of the century, settled on the east side of Petite Passage.

In 1801 a Grant of Confirmation from George III, King of England, granted to Loyalists living in Digby County "lands and waterways of which they were in possession."

Martin who had been fishing from the Passage since the latter part of the century began a ferry over Petite Passage in 1803. The fare for each passenger was

one shilling sterling (equal to about twenty-five cents). He received from the Provincial Government, a tavern license as subsidy. After his death the ferry service was carried on by his sons and grandsons.

Captain "By" Blackford, who has operated the ferry until its transfer on the 17th of September took over the service following his father's death, about sixty years ago, as a lad of fourteen years.

Captain "By" is well known throughout Canada and the United States for his humorous remarks and jokes and for his true Scottish hospitality. He will be missed by the travelling public and as ferryman he will never be surpassed.

Petite Passage is one of the roughest parts of the Bay of Fundy and is famed for its swift tidal currents, classed as the swiftest of their kind in the world, and ranks next to Sable Island for its dangerous rips.

Yet in his sixty years as ferryman over Petite Passage, Captain "By" has never had a single mishap.

The press was advised in an interview with the management of the "Blackford" Ferry that since rates were reduced in 1941 to 25 cents for loaded trucks and other vehicles, it has been impossible to maintain adequate equipment and give good service. There was no promise of a grant in 1946. The ferry equipment was purchased by the Nova Scotia Department of Highways and the transfer made September 17th. Baden Outhouse and Howard Cossaboom were appointed ferrymen.

We understand that for the time being the ferry is being operated by Captain Elmer Wyman until final details have been completed.

Fined On Taxi Law Violation

Found guilty by Magistrate G. H. Peters on a charge of operating a taxi within the Town of Digby contrary to the provisions of the taxi licensing by-law, Alvin Vincent Lawrence, Pleasant Lake, Yarmouth County, was fined five dollars and costs in Police Court Saturday afternoon.

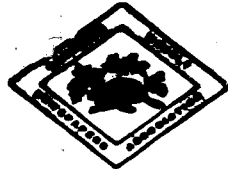

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About This and That

As a somewhat theoretical discussion but with the thought that a new car may turn up eventually, the Ohio Motorist is publishing advice on how to break it in. Most people have forgotten, it's so long since the question came up.

Chief point seems to be to assume that nothing has been checked and drive gently except for occasional short spurts of speed to lubricate the inside of the motor. It is well to watch oil pressure and gas consumption, radiator temperature and tire wear that may indicate the wheels are not quite in line. Hydraulic brakes may leak a little and the clutch may not be adjusted properly. Manufacturers used to be careful about such things, but in the stress of present production and hurried sales, something may have been overlooked.

A long trip undertaken before the car has gone through this experimental period may lead to trouble which might have been avoided easily. In the year 1946 a shiny new car is a precious object. Pampering at the start can contribute to a long and satisfactory life.

A pessimist is like a blind man in a dark room looking for a black hat that isn't there.

Scottish scientists at Edinburgh University have made the discovery that the same kind of fertilizer which makes vegetables grow will increase the fish population when sprinkled on sea water.

The fertilizer makes the water plant life flourish, and the plants supply food for the tiny animals, which feed the worms which feed the little fish and so on up the scale. Result of this chain of nourishment is that the ultimate fish gets 10 to 20 times as much to eat as their ancestors did, and in two years they grow to five year size.

So far the fish farming is in the research stage. It looks like a profitable venture for commercial fishermen, but the scientists haven't yet guaranteed that the fattened fish will stay in one place long enough to be caught.

The only thing we like about Ration Book No. 6 is the fact there is no application form to be filled out for Ration Book No. 7. Nevertheless, there are sufficient coupons in Book No. 6 to keep us on rations for another two years!

Speaking of ration books almost everywhere one goes these days some remarks are heard with regard to recent appeals to turn in unused meat coupons to local ration boards through the Red Cross and other organizations in order that meat may be purchased with these excess coupons and shipped overseas. From personal observations we would judge the response to the appeal has been rather weak. People are asking "Why do they need coupons to ship meat overseas?" By this time the powers that be should be aware how much meat can be spared for overseas shipment.

It must be admitted the Canadian meat ration is a very generous one and that few of us are using all the meat coupons allotted to us. Is there any wonder we hear suggestions that our meat ration is too generous to be necessary.

During the past few weeks we have been doing a bit of traveling here, there and elsewhere and eating numerous restaurant meals. We have no complaints with the food that has been served us, although there were instances when we were not so keen on the way it was served. However, we did notice that without exception the menus read, "tea, coffee or milk 10 cents extra." To our mind 10 cents is an exorbitant price to pay for a cup of tea or coffee or a glass of milk. We believe it is high time we resumed the pre-war practise of including these beverages as part of the regular meal.

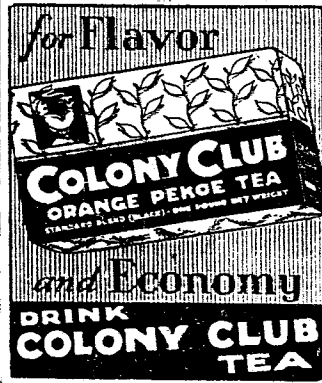

Deer Season Opens Tuesday

With the deer season opening on Tuesday, October 1, the hunter's worry again this year is ammunition. Since the outbreak of war this very necessary commodity in the life of the hunter has become scarcer and scarcer.

Many hunters have solved their problems by trading rifles for which ammunition was particularly scarce for a calibre for which lead was more plentiful. This method of beating the shortage has now about come to an end. Shotguns have been resorted from attics or purchased from not-so-ardent hunters, reinforced, cleaned up and brought into play against the wily deer loaded with ball cartridge. Now ball cartridge are practically unobtainable.

It is understood in some parts of the United States Archery is being used to fell the lordly deer. So far no reports of this method have come from this locality. However, some hunters may be forced to resort to this if they plan to bag game this season.

Lack of ammunition does not seem to be dampening the ardor of the hunters, however, and great plans are being made for the opening of the season. Hunting licenses are being purchased in quantity and careful perusal is being given the little green booklet issued by the government, that tells the do's and don't's for this year's season. Already notices have appeared in some store windows stating the shop will be closed from a certain time commencing September 30th—it could be the owner's going hunting!

Haircut and Shave Prices to Jump Five Cents

Annapolis Valley barbers from Windsor to Digby inclusive are to be granted an increase of five cents for haircuts and shaves, according to a report here today. Signed application forms from the Prices Board for the increase as requested by the W. P. T. B. were forwarded to Halifax some time ago.

Last May a movement to have barber prices increased was started by Kentville Master Barbers, and with others throughout the Valley joining in the request to the W. P. T. B. for permission to charge higher rates. The rates asked were fifty cents men's haircuts, 35 cents children and shave 25 cent.

It was pointed out that these prices are charged in the cities, and in larger towns, it was also stressed that barber tools have increased one hundred per cent in price, with supplies up over forty per cent.

Barbers feel that they are entitled to the same city prices in all lines of work, but confined the request for increase to haircuts and shaves. It is stated that for such things as massage, head rubs, shampoos, that the Valley prices are only two thirds of what is charged in the city.

It was also emphasized that many of the barbers are returned men and with the increased

cost of living makes it necessary if they are to receive a living wage, that the higher rates should prevail.

Before the depression men's haircuts were forty cents in the Valley but the hard times drew it down to thirty-five cents and while efforts were made during the war to put the prices on a fairer level, the W. P. T. B. turned down the proposed increase. While the added new cost is very small the barbers generally will be thankful for that amount.

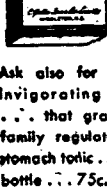

Digby County Exhibition Most Successful in Years

The Digby County Exhibition, held annually at Bear River, came to a close last Thursday night after one of the most successful shows in the history of the exhibition — certainly the most successful in many years.

Harvey Chisholm, Secretary-manager of the Fair, expressed himself as delighted with the results, stating that Wednesday's gate receipts were the highest on record for the opening day of the fair. The exhibition was also attended by large crowds on Thursday, on which day all school age children were admitted free.

Exhibits in all departments showed a big improvement both in quality and in quantity. The display in the women's departments, especially the home cooking display, was the largest in years, although still smaller than the exhibits of this kind in the pre-rationing days. However, several dishes of home made candy were included in these exhibits.

The cattle pens were well filled. Among these exhibits were 18 heavy horses, the largest exhibit of this nature in many years, and increased numbers of dairy cattle and oxen. Poultry exhibits also showed a big increase.

Showings of vegetables were much better than they have been in many years. Last year there were practically no fruits on exhibition. This year's exhibit was a real credit to Digby County, particularly to the Bear River area.

Entertainment at the fair included old fashioned blueberry pie eating contests, tugs of war, kettle boiling and wood chopping contests—and of course the usual horse and ox pulling contests, so popular with Digby County people.

There were nine entries in the ox-pulling contests, the winning team owned by Loran Wright,

weighed 2,672 pounds and pulled 5,195 pounds on the stone drag or 1.95 times their own weight.

Second place went to the team of Genos Sanford, weight 3,165 pounds, pulling 5,695 pounds, or 1.85 times their weight. The team of, Eric VanTassel pulled 1,771 times their weight when they started the drag loaded with 5,295 pounds. The VanTassel team weighed 2,977 pounds.

The team of Glendon Robbins took first place in the double horse team pulling contest. Glen's 2,910 pound team started 7,405 pounds for a score of 2.54; Maynard Millner's 2,753 pound team came second by starting 6,395 pounds for a score of 2.32. Third place was awarded to the 2,998 pound team of Harry Harris which scored 2.21 by starting 6,625 pounds. There were six entries in this contest.

Glen Robbins came away with first prize in the single horse hauling contest. His 1,369 pound horse made a score of 2.74 by starting 3,755 pounds. A 1,322 pound horse of Allan Stark came
