

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Bring In The C. P. R.!

Bring In The C. P. R.! In a letter to the Chignecto Canal Editor of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal, also published in The Halifax Chronicle-Herald and The Halifax, MaitStar, Gordon B. Isnor, M.P.-elect, makes the interesting suggestion that before the Chignecto Canal is under-taken "favorable consideration should be given to the establishment of a car ferry operating between Saint John, N. B., and Digby, N. S., in this way linking up the Canadian Pacific Railway at Saint John with its subsidiary line, the D.A.R., at Digby, and thus mak-ing Halifax the eastern terminus of the C.P.R. Of all the great ports in the Dominion, Halifax is the only prevalue is not served directly by both of the great national' trans-portation systems, and the fact that the C.P.R., as a transcontinent-al railway, has no direct connection with this port has worked to its detriment for many years. While we are at least twenty-four hours nearer the great ports of Liverpool and Southampton than Saint John, Halifax has been for years and continues to see occan linere pass us by and take the longer route to our sister city, simply because the latter is and has been served by both the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National laukays.



For more than half a century the people of Nova Scotia have been agitating to bring the CP.R. to this province, and Mr. Isnor has now suggested a practical method of doing so. It is true that difficulties are involved in placing a car ferry (similar to that operating between Borden and Tormentine) on the route between Saint John and Digby, but what worthwhile project is free from difficulties? There is the first cost of construction of the ferry, probably somewhere in the vicinity of five or six million dollars. Then there is the problem of the great rise and fail of the tide at Saint John and Digby which can only be overcome by special terminal facilities at both ports, but the cost of such facilities, while substantial, is by no means prohibitive. In these days when all methods of transportation have their problems, not the least among them are the railways. With high costs of construction and abnormally nigh operating costs, it is too much to expect that the C.P.R., a privately owned company, should bear the whole cost of establishing the link which Mr. Isnor has suggested should connect its transcontinental system with this great.port. The Government should certainly provide the terminal facilities, and we think should also subsidize both the construction of a suitable ferry and its operation. In the light of large governmental expenditures being made to maintain railway services to P.E.L and Newfoundland, in the light of the huge sums paid annually from the public funds for the maintenance of the St. Lawrence waterways, including the up-keep of the canal system—it does not seem to us that the necessary governmental assistance for the establishment of this car ferry is too much for Nova Scotians to ask or expect, and we believe that Nova Scotians would enthusiastically welcome the C.P.R. to Hal



The above figures so familiar to the newspaper world, marking the ending of a story, have been writ-ten to mark the end of a career for a man to whom the newspaper, the smell of printing ink, and the clatty of the presses were the very elements of life.

James MacNaughton Wallis, Associate Editor of he Digby Courier, has gone, but his memory and the narks of his living will long remain. His career as a newspaperman was but a brief one in span of years, but it was one filled with rich experience and marked by a devotion to the trade and avocation which he foi-lowed which is shown only by those who truly believe in and love the work they do.

"Mac", as he was familiarly known to his asso-clates and his wide circle of friends, can truly be said to have sacrificed his life on the altar of his profession for it was his single minded devotion to his work and his labours for long hours and for weeks unending during the wartime rush in the printing industry which lead to the illness that finally marked him as its fatal victim.

Even in the last few days of his illness when, all unknown to him, the shadows of death hovered close around, it was his fond hope to return soon again to the work which he loved; to hear again the rumble of the press, to know the joy of laying out, setting up and running a job, of writing a story or a feature' article. These things have been denied him, but in every line of copy and in every sheet from the presses of The Digby Courier will his spirit remain for many years to come.

Those with whom he worked mark his passing as a close, personal loss, but count their lives the richer for knowing him and enjoying the privilege of associ-ation with him.

What precisely is meant by that familiar phrase, "freedom of the press?" I Fundamentally is not a special privilege reserved for newspaper publishers. C., we have compiled the following account of the his-tory of the legal profession in this County. This account is by no means a complete one, but will serve to give an impression of the development of bench and bar in this area. and reputations. Notable among the earlier resi-dent practioners in the town of I Digby were James A. Dennison J and John C. Wade. The former had an office on Water Street in the building now occupied by Yates Studio. He was a man of sound judgement and had the confidence of the people, many of whom regarded him as a guide and philosopher and friend. He lived to a ripe old age and many of his descendents still reside here. bar in this area

In its early days, apparently, most of the legal business in not attended to by this county, lived to a ripe old age and many of his descendents still reside here. John C. Wade was a man of a different type. He was more of a politician than a lawyer, although he enjoyed a good practise. He became a member of parliament for Digby County and experien-ced the ups and downs of a po-litical career which was in those days perhaps more stormy than those of modern day politicians. Two of his sons, Harry and Alan V., also became lawyers. But Harry, a young man of much this county, not attended to by the magistrates, was transacted by lawyers from other parts of the province, mostly from An-napolis and Halifax. 





Tall and graceful in figure, deeply learned in law and gifted with eloquence and originality, he quickly took the lead in his profession. He, i too, turned to the political-field and represented Digby County af. He was later offered and accepted the position of first County flocurt Judge for this district. He performed the duties of that of-fice with distinction and efficien-cy until the time of his retire-ment. 'Digby Acadian" Early Digby Paper

The Digby Acadian, which was established in 1859 by Albert E. Dodge of Annapolis and Ingram Gidney of Sandy Cove, was a predecessor of the Digby Courier. This paper continued from 1859 until 1863 when its plant, which was located on Water Street be-tween Sydney Street and Birch. Digby Celebrates **Dominion** Day

Dominion Day From the time of Confedera-tion until the early 1900's, Digby citizens went in for celebrations on Dominion Day in a really grand style. Large amounts of money were subscribed by local stores and business houses to make the day a success and every one joined in the celebration. From the files of the Courier of July 6, 1838, we have taken the following account of one of these gala celebrations. "Digby presented a gala scene on Monday Early in the morning visitors from the im-mediate neighborhood, were fil-ling the streets and later, as suc-cessive trafns of the Western Counties Railway arrived, large assessions were made to the num-bers by arrivals from Yarmouth. Weymouth and all along the line. The parade of the Polymor-phians at S o'clock aroused the laggards from their beds with the music of brass bands which headed the parade, containing the usuic act brass bands which headed the parade, containing the usuic act actures and local hits. The most prominent among them was "The Scott Act" and the "Missing Link", the latter being the name of a celebrated grog-shop. The idea which was conveyed was that the Act was dead and liquor selling much alive, as was fully evidenced la-ter in the day. This caricature received the prize given for the best local hit. Grotesque repre-sentations of the rivalry between the Amherst boots, sold by Let-teney Brgs, and those sold by R. C. Cann and J. Daley was much enjoyed. Atter the parade, a special train bearing the Yar-mouth fire Company under di-rection of Captain Sweeney, ar-rived and was met by the Digby company. The two bodies united and paraded the principal streets. The music furnished by the Dig-by Band was excellent, and the hose reels were tastefully deco-rated. That of the Yarmouth fire-men was especially so. It was hose reels were tastefully deco-rated. That of the Yarmouth fire-men was especially so. It was supposed to be drawn by two white swans guided by reins in the hands of miniature firemen and produced a most pleasing ef-fect. At the close of the parade, an alarm called out the Dark. Town brigade to extinguish a fire in a shed put up for the purpose at the railway crossing. The grotesque manner in which this burlesque was carried out, eli-cited peals of laughter from the crowd and was one of the most amusing events of the day. The horse races at twelve o'clock were held about a mile out of town, near Syda's corner, and thither large numbers on foot and in carriages wended their way.

Small Pox Victims **Buried Here**

Buried Here It is recorded in the early re-cords of the Anglican Church here that, in the latter years of the 1700's, a tranpsort with small pox on board put into the port of Digby. Seven persons were dead aboard the little craft, five adults and two children. The bodies were given over to the care of the Rector, Rev. Roger. Viets, and there being no consecrated burial ground in the town at that time, he gaye them a Christian buriat in his own pasture, which was situated on the cannon bank, near the foot of Carletor Street. It is reported the piece of ground was on the edge of the water, sepa-rated from his house by a cattle road; As the years went on the un-

road As the years went on the un-derground springs or the tide washed away the land and the coffins were exposed. The Rec-tor, faithful to his sacred trust, attended to a second burial. The coffin scontaining the two chil-dren and one adult, were missing ord the others in such a state of coffin scontaining the two chil-dren and one adult were missing and the others in such, a state of decay that new ones were needed. These were provided by the Rec-tor and the bodies re-interred in the middle of his orchard across the road from the original scene of burial. All were buried in one mound over which Mr, Viets planted beautiful white roses. It is recorded in the Courier of May 14, 1897, that a Mrs. Chea-tam, living in Digby then, could remember this second burial. The article in the Courier, from which this story is taken, goes on to say that "many of the pre-sent genetation remember the tangle of sweetness in the Viets orchard." The Rev. Roger Viets had a little still, in which he used to distill the blossoms gathered from this mound. It was the duty of one of the Viets daughters to collect the blossoms and they were then made into sweet smiel-ling attra of roses.

Feeling, after tracing the story surrounding them, that these relics of human-ity were an ancient trust of the Viets family, she had the bones removed to consecrated ground.

Disposition American Lights **Poacher Recorded**


Confiscated for Violating the Fishery Treaty of 1818.

In the Admiralty Ot 1818. In the Admiralty Court yester-day, Chief Justice MacDonald de-livered judgement in the case of the American fishing schooner, "David J, Adams". His Lordship confiscated the vessel to the Crown. This was the first poach-er captured after the abrogation of the treaty of Washington. She put into Digby basin, hid her name under canvas and purchaput into Digby basin, hid her name under canvas and purcha-sed a quantity of bait. The crui-ser, Landsdowne, was telegraph-ed for by Collector Viets and happened along just as the Adams was making her way out of Dig-by Gut. She was promptly cap-tured and placed in the Admiralty court Her defence was undertured and placed in the Admiralty court. Her defence was under taken by the United States go-vernment and a test case made of it. The prosecution was conduc-ted by Graham and Borden. When the purchase of the bail was fully proven, the defence made the point that the word "fishing or preparing to fish" meant that a vessel must no!

meant that a vessel must not fish or prepare to fish inside the limit, but when in British waters she might "prepare to fish" out-side the limit. Chief Justice Mac-Donald elaborately reviewed the treaty and statute, the facts con-nected with the seizure and the arguments of counsel and susarguments of counsel and sus-tained the position taken by the consul for the Canadian govern-ment in every particular. In refe-rence to the "preparing to fish" arguments of the defence, the judge held that the whole intent of the treaty and statute was to prevent the Americans making the Canadian coast a base for their, fisheries. ,The judgement, though a lengthy one, has no

their fisheries. The judgement, though a lengthy one, has no important bearing on the fisher-ies question. The point at issue was the bait question and that was pretty effectually settled by law enacted in 1886 which pre-vents American vessels entering Canadian waters for any purpose except "wood, water, shelter and repairs".
