PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA FIRE MARSHAL BRANCH

D. CURRIE, K.C.

By Royal Proclamation the week commencing Sunday, October 9th and ending Saturday, the 15th October, 1949, is designated as Fire Prevention Week.

It is recommended that all citizens take part in an organized effort, as follows:—

Fire Officers are requested to organize inspection of:

1. All dwellings, public buildings, stores, warehouses and factories and all conditions and materials likely to cause or promote the spread of fire be removed.

2. All Theatres, Hotels, Hospitals and other Institutional buildings be inspected and provision made for all changes necessary to protect the occupants in case of fire.

et the occupants in case of fire.

Fire drills be held for the children of all schools, for the ins of all institutions and for the employees of all factories.

4. Special instruction in the subject of Fire Prevention by teachers and municipal officers in the schools. All school authorities should make use of the Nova Scotia Fire Education Text books provided. All schools are requested to enter the Previncial Government Essay Competition commencing October 10, 1949.

5. The main work during Fire Prevention Week will fall upon the Chiefs of all Fire Departments in the Frovince. Other citizens are requested to give full support in the heavy programmes undertaken by the Fire Brigades everywhere.

6. The Fire Marshall refers to the very heavy losses of Nova Scotia lives and repeats that since January 1, 1948, eighty nine men, women and children have died in fires and there have been two thousand, six hundred fires in the same period.

7. Nearly every fire is the result of human error or neglect. It, is the things we fall to do and the errors that we commit that pile up this awful toll of death and destruction.

Everyone Has Something To Save For

Everyone Has Something To Save For

A good many millions of words have been written in the past about the virtues of thrift and saving generally. Some of them have been extremely persuasive and occasionally the writer has developed his theme with a freshness and vigor calculated to fire the dullest imagination.

But there is another aspect to the question that is so obvious it may well be unappreciated if not overlooked entirely. It is the thought that civilization today would know practically none of the amenities it now takes for granted unless someone, somewhere, had first saved some money.

The kind of saving that has led to the development of our natural resources and the building of our highly industrialized nation began back in the days of the earliest settler. Our forefathers husbanded their incomes and invested their savings in the development of the land around them, in the businesses they were building up to serve others and, in the final analysis, in the general economic development of their country.

Life is more complex today than it was then. There are more demands on our income, for one thing, and we have become accustomed to a standard of living which in those days would have appeared luxurious. But the things that have been done to make it easier for us to save go a long way toward compensating for this.

It may seldom occur to most people that our calendar, cunning though it may be, is a clumsy makeshift by modern standards. Without one for reference, only a mental genius can figure out the date of any day much more distant than a week from next Tuesday. Confusion is confounded by the varying lengths of the months, beginning and ending any old day of the week, and the erratic shift in the annual sequence of dates due to the influence of leap year. But shall we change it? A flood of amazed protests greets anyone who suggests such a thing. This crazy assortment of weeks and months is an old, familiar thing; like most familiar pestiferous things, it is loved.

It is still possible for opponents of a new idea to arrest attention, at least temporarily, by suggesting that the idea comes from abroad. There are shreds here and there of prejudice against "foreign" ideas.

Many treasured Canadian institutions come from abroad. The secret ballot form commonly used is an Australian creation. The doctrine of a three-branch government was borrowed from the French philosopher Montesquieu. The general framework of Canadian government is based on English developments,

The peculiar genius of Canada is not so much the invention of new and strictly Canadian ideas as the trait of putting old ideas to new uses.

This is the season when things seem easy to do. Wars look easier to win, which may be one reason invasions are started. Business executives turn suddenly in their offices, surprising some of the newer stenos and messengers who have been taken on strength only since the greens and fairways dried in the late spring, and therefore have not seen the boss before. Those past youth, who have no fall plowing, have difficulty getting enough exercise. A few gear this surging strength to accomplishing works conceived last spring or dreamed through the summer, or many summers.

Autumn is a very special time for a boy of eleven. It is not unlikely to be the height of his career, the height of his mental development, and the time when his life is least likely to end. Although he has many gloomy thoughts, as have children and adults at all ages, he worries less than most, and hardly at all about getting smarter or dying. He does not think either is possible.

If a boy is lucky in his environment, at the age of eleven in Canada, in the autumn, he runs with a gang. In some cities in most generations there are bad gangs of boys, but these are usually older boys. Boys of eleven in a Canadian autumn feel that life is spacious. They run and they yell. School is a burden and there may be side jobs like picking apples or working in a store, but there is energy aplenty left for running and yelling. Organized sport may claim them if they are skilled, but the great thing of autumn is the wild, ferocious, innocent pack running and yelling in the early dusk.

Don't lay a loaded gun on the ground. Wear a bright coat and cap in the woods. Never leave a gun where children will have access to it.

Fire Prevention Week, October 9 to 15

Since time began, fire has been a constant source of comfort and disaster. It has protected us from the cold — and it has put us out in the cold. Fire can be helpful or it can be harmful; a friend to man or a foe. If fire worked only as a friend, hundreds of lives would not be lost each year, and much destruction of property would be prevented.

But, fire is no respecter of law, property or persons. For that reason Fire Prevention Week from October 9 to 15 has been set aside to teach the lesson of fire's ability to destroy and to impart to young and old alike, in country, town and city, some prevention measures whereby untold misery can be avoided.

In the proclamation issued by W. P. J. O'Meara, acting Under-Secretary of State, he asked that the following measures be taken during the week:

1. All dwellings, public buildings, stores, warehouses and factories be carefully inspected by their occupants and all conditions likely to cause or promote the spread of fire be removed.

2. All theatres, hotels, hospitals and other institutional buildings be inspected and provision made for all changes necessary to protect the occupants in case of fire.

3. Fire drills be held for the children in all schools, for the in-

mates of all institutions, and for the employees in all factories, in order that a greater degree of safety be ensured by acquainting the occupants with the best and most expeditious mode of exit in case of fire.

Special instruction on the subject of fire prevention be given by the teachers and by municipal officials in the schools and that such appropriate literature as may be made available be distribut-ed to the pupils.

5. Federal, Provincial and Municipal authorities endeavour, by means of public meetings, the press, radio broadcasts, specially prepared motion pictures or otherwise as may to them seem most fit, to impress upon the citizens the national importance of protect-ing life and property from loss by fire.

- If owners and drivers have established financial responsibility be the accident occured licenses and permits will not be suspended or be reinstated as soon as such responsibility is proved.
- All motorists in the province will contribute 50 cents to the Unsatisfied adgment Fund for the protection of the victims of drivers who have no mancial responsibility and no assets.

The situation is a most delicate one and needs careful handling if a proper and workable solution is to be found.

Care must be exercised by both school authorities and parents that whatever methods are used to remedy this situation do not boomerang or create a martyr complex on the part of the pupils. It would seem the pupils need to be impressed with the full import of their present conduct and its possible effects on their scholastic career. This is a matter that will have to be handled carefully and diplomatically and as a joint venture between teachers and parents if it is to be successful. The teachers are concerned through their desire to have their pupils complete the year's work successfully and advance to higher grades and the parents should be greatly concerned since this is a matter that seriously affects the future of their children.

Remembrance Day 1949

"At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them."

Our freedom to worship, the privilege of free assembly, free speech and a free press, in fact all of the freedoms that are synonymous with our democratic way of life were protected and preserved for us through the sacrifice made on the field of battle by those who, thinking not of themselves but of a nation's need, sacrificed their lives, their futures and their all that we might live. Let us not forget these things but remember them, not only on the days set aside for special remembrance, but all the days of our lives and, remembering, strive to ensure that the things for which they died may ever be preserved.

The United Nations contest between Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia for a seat on the Security Council was a deliberate test of
strength between Great Britain and the United States on the one
hand and Russia on the other. It was a counting of friends in
the cold war. In the final count, 26 nations were found siding
with the West, 14 others siding with Russia and the Soviet Satellites. In total, Russia mustered 19 votes in the General Assembly
while the West, presumably with the vote of Yugoslavia, had 39.
While their poor showing obviously infuriated the Russians,
there is little reason to believe that it surprised them. Their line
of propaganda before the election indicated that they expected to
flose it. Nevertheless their pride has suffered a painful blow, and
there is good reason for concern over what means they may use
in the United Nations to 'try to recover face and retaliate for their
mortification.

The issue in the election contest between Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia was essentially the basic issue of the cold war. It was the question whether a sovereign nation, regardless of its relative strength and its geographic position, should be free to conduct its own internal affairs without fear of the wrath of more powerful neighbours. The opinion of the nations seems to be two to one in favor of the right of a small nation to run its own government.

Scholars of biblical literature are excited about the discovery of the scroll of the last book of Lamech, believed to deal with the early life of Noah. Their excitement must be held in check for a time, as it is expected to take several months to unroll the fragile parchment and translate its Aramaic writing. Only then will it be learned whether the scroll will be a significant contribution to the knowledge of the 'obblical period. And whatever it may say must be regarded with some question, since apparently the book of Lamech is one which was deliberately passed over by the Council which met about 90 A.D. to gather the contents of the Old Testament.

Fertilizer Demand Exceeds Supply

World output of commercial fertilizers has reached totals never before attained and is still moving upward the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations reports in a new fertilizer bulletin.

Agricultural Organization of the United Nations reports in a new fertilizer bulletin.

With a few minor exceptions, the increased post-war supply of these fertilizers. nitrogen, soluble phosphates and potash, has been used as it became available. Consumption in many parts of the world would have been greated demand outstripped supply that shortages in the post-war year had it been possible to obtain supplies. So rapidly has world demand outstripped supply that shortages in the post-war years were characteristic everywhere. Much of this increased demand is rooted in human needs and welfare. The growth in world population and a better appreciation of good nutritional practises have caused a world-wide and urgent demand for more food and for food in greater variety. Against this, the amount of arable land supplying each person is relatively smaller, and in many countries is proving inadequate. As one means of closing the gap among other important and essential agricultural measures, the greater and more efficient use of commercial fertilizers is receiving high priority. Governments, in many cases with FAO aigning more and more attention to increasing domestic production. At the same time, greatly increased sources of natural organic fertilizers are urgently increased sources of natural organic fertilizers is received and are being sought.

Without commercial fertilizers to supplement the non-commercial sources, such as farm produced manures and other organic fertilizers of the world could not be provided.

About This and That

Now Is The Time For Action

Considerable comment has been heard about town lately concerning what the future holds in store for this community. Some of those who speak are pure prophets of doom and can see nothing in store, for Digby but calamity, while others are somewhat more hopeful.

While it may be a fact the future for Digby might not look so bright as for those communities where industrial expansion is taking place, this should not be a reason for unrelieved gloom and calamity howling. What is needed instead is ACTION to remedy those things which are contributing to our position and an ore optimistic forward looking on the part of those whose job it should be to plan for the future.

In the past Digby has prided itself on being a tourist town. This pride and resultant action has contributed much to the fact little expansion has been had in the industrial field. Instead we have been content to sit back in the somewhat mistaken belief that the tourists would continue to visit Digby attracted only by the beauties that nature has provided. This has proven not to be so and today we have few tourists and fewer still industries.

This is—a serious situation and while it should be deplored it is a situation that positive action could do much to remedy. Other towns not nearly so fortunate as Digby in location and natural beauties have established themselves as summer resorts through their own efforts coupled with the facilities at hand.

Digby can and should do this if we are to revive our position as a tourist centre. If we are to succeed, however, there must be positive action and less talk of past glories. First of all a complete survey must be made of the things that contribute to a successful tourist program and which we lack. Following this there must be an honest facing up, to the fact that, as a tourist centre, there are many necessary things lacking in Digby.

Among these things are proper and adequate bathing facilities, picnic grounds where visitors may enjoy a picnic lunch comfortably, boats and canoes for hire so, that visitors

billity. We have above outlined some steps that are a civic responsibility. We have above outlined some steps that might be taken, in any program to rebuild Digby as a tourist resort. These should be considered only as guides with a full program developed only after thorough study of the needs is made. This study should be regarded not as an accomplishment in itself, but only as a means to an end and should be followed by a vigorous program, pursued through the combined efforts of all local agencies, to implement it. The future of Digby depends on immediate action not only on a program to reliven the tourist trade, but also to attract and cause the establishment of industries here. Talk and study are necessary preliminaries, but must be followed by action—positive action along sound lines and toward a known and definite goal. Now is the time for this action—not next spring, when another tourist season will be almost upon us.

It is time somebody told Canadians for sure whether or not there is a prospect for a reduced supply of coffee. Scarcely, a day goes by without someone making a public statement either that coffee is about to become a luxury or that there is positively no danger of any shortage.

This sort of thing is unnerving. It lends warmth to his lunch of sandwiches and provides an excuse for getting out of the office for a few minutes in mid-morning and mid-afternoon. In short, coffee is important in American life.

Let's face the question fearlessly. Do we, or do we not, have enough coffee for a second cup this winter?

They evidently realized that some of their requirements were impossible in some cases, and showed an unexpected tolerance. The frank verdicts handed down by these clear-eyed young judges may be studied with profit by every conscientious parent.

Nova Scotia's Safety Responsibility Law Comes Into Force In a Short Time

Do you know that financial responsibility can be established by securing a Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance Card from an insurance company, certifying that your car is covered by public liability and property damage insurance, or by posting a bond or by depositing cash or securities with the Provincial Treasurer?

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

RAMBLING REMINISCENCES—1948

(By John W. Fraser)

(By John W. Fraser)

A haif a century ago we took the printing line in tow; with childish fear, 'tho not afraid, embarking on a future trade. The town of Trenten was our home, here chimneys tall with massive dome belched forth their endless clouds of smoke (it could not happen now with coke.) This sooty substance settled down embedding almost half the town; it penetrated throat and nose and ruffled women washing clothes. Her industries were steel and glass, with workmen showing skill and class. Here tradesmen of our native sod were not constrained to go abroad. There were few unions in our day, no sitdown strikes for higher pay; no constant show of discontent and money was more wisely spent. For growing boys the average pay was scarcely fifty cents a day; while brawny-muscled grownup men received about a dollar ten. Our bathtubs then were very few, no modern gadgets yet in view; we wallowed in the family tub where we could scratch ourselves and rub. And those with buckets, nothing more, preferred their bathing at the shore; they reckoned with the rising tide to cleanse the vermin from their hide. The rich and poor alike, 'tis said, could boast a chamber 'neath the bed; the maker wisely made them white, so we could find them in the night. In winter storm or summer heat, this lad was early on the beat; we hit the trail at six o'clock, and had an early morning walk. When feeling strictly up to par; two miles were not considered far; but those with longer legs could climb the winding road in half the time. We took a long our midday lunch of bread and cookies one could crunch; no sandwiches of egg and ham, but just a thin veneer of jam. Our liking ran to plainer food, 'tho twisty doughnuts tasted good; no messy tarts or apple pie, we liked to eat our victuals dry. When came the winter frost and snow, with readings twenty-one below; our office, open as a sieve, would not encourage one to live. The Rink Situation

The Rink Situation

Long a-simmering, the rink situation came to a full boil last week. An unpopular decision of the Recreation Commission, whose job it is to own, operate and manage the rink, has been reversed due to the tremendous weight of public opinion against it. This decision of the Commission, no matter how sincere its propohents may have been or how right the premises upon which it was based may have been on how right the premises upon which it was based may have been, has been reversed and the opinion of the public has been accepted as the guiding light for action.

Now that the public has spoken and the Commission has demonstrated they are willing to be guided by their opinion so vociferously expressed, it is time to lay aside, the past and go ahead with the tremendous job which faces both the commission and the public if this new rink of ours is not to become a burden on the taxpayers.

In order to meet its obligations, both capital and operational, the new rink must take in a lot of money—money that must be raised through the paid admissions of the people of this district. In order to do this every effort must be made to see that shows of a type that will attract public attendance are presented at the rink. A good hockey team must be built up and everything must be done to see to it that no leaks or loop holes develop that will drain off even a minute portion of the revenue of this structure unnecessarily.

To accomplish these things the fullest co-operation between the Commission, the manager and the public must be maintained. All of these people are ratepayers—all will be affected if the rink does not operate successfully—therefore all must work together to see to it that if does. The failure of the rink to meet its obligations means a direct levy on the pocketolooks of the ratepäyers, an obligation to which they are inescapably committed by their own vote.

The successful operation of an \$85,000 recreational centre in a town the size of Digby is not small time; it is definitely big business and this must be fully realized by all who are connected with its operation. There is no room in such a proposition for grudges, petty grievances, slackness or slipshod handling of affairs. It must be operated as a corporation with the mericulous attention to detail and the careful scrutiny of all arrangements that characterize the successful corporation.

The members of the Recreation Commission have a big job on their hands. Giving of their time and efforts voluntarily, they have a tremendous responsibility. Much of the success or failure of the rink depends on the care with which they handle this responsibility.

ponsibility. The major share of the responsibility for the successful operation of the Commission's project on the hill, however, depends on its manager. Given the co-operation of the Commission and the public, it is up to him, using to the fullest extent this co-operation, to make the direct operation of the rink and its allied operations a success. The public have fully demonstrated their faith in his ability to do this. The job is not an easy one, it is one which will require every bit of inventive genius and organizing ability available plus the co-operation and assistance of everyone in the area. It is a job that can be done, however, and will have to be done if the project is to be kept from being landed right into the laps of the ratepayers.

This Vandalism Must Be Stopped

In the past few weeks Digby has been the scene of several of deliberate and malicious vapidalism.

Two of these cases were sactiligious in nature and involved leliberate destruction of wreaths placed on a grave and at the Memorial in honor of the dead. The third case, which hap in over the week end concerned our new Digby Rural High of which the majority of the responsible citizens of this are justly proud.

There is absolutely no excuse for this sort of thing. Evilophits to the fact it is not the work of thoughtless children, adults—persons who should have a full realization of the connect of their acts.







Brine Cure (Corning) Meat.

Use the cheaper cuts of meat such as the plate, neck, and chuck, in making crned, beef, Meat from fat animals makes better corned beef than meat from the curing is commenced.

Cure as soon as possible after cooling. Clean, hardwood barrels, or tubs may be used as containers. Barrels which have held molasses or syrup are good if they are tight enough to prevent leakage. Stone crocks are best if available.

Cut the beef into pieces on the

inches square. Cut pieces 5 or 6 form in thickness so that they may be packed in even layers in the barrels. A cool, well ventiled alred cellar is a desirable place for both brine and dry curring trolled in cold, or at least cool weather, in order that thick pieces may not have a chance to spoil before the sait has penetrated. Boll water and other ingredients, stirring until completely dissolved. Cool before pouring over meat. Pack pieces of meat in crocks or barrels, placing them as closely together as possible, until the top layer is reached. See that the meat is well covered with brine. Then cover the meat with a hardwood board and weigh down with a heavy weight (bricks or stones).
The addition of sugar keeps the meat from becoming hard and also adds flavour.



Motor Vehicle Liability Law

Becomes Effective

DECEMBER

On and After December 15, 1949, any driver or owner of a motor vehicle who becomes involved in an accident may lose the right to use the highway unless he or she can prove financial responsibility by producing a Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance Card or a Financial Responsibility Card.

Financial Responsibility may be established: (1) by carrying automobile insurance for public liability up to \$5000 for injury to one person, up to \$10,000 for injury to for public liability up to \$5000 for injury to for public liability on the property damage up to \$10,000 for injury to more than one person, and property damage up to \$10,000 with the Provincial Treasurer or depositing cash or securities totalling \$11,000 with the Provincial Treasurer companies have been provided with Motor Vehicle Liability Insurance Cards for issuance before December 15 to owners and drivers carrying insurance. Inasmuch as adequate hydro power cannot be developed before 1951 and existing hydro and diesel are insufficient, for the full needs of the area, the Commission has agreed to the purchase and installation of auxiliary diesel power of a minimum of 360 K.W. capacity to be operated for the exclusive use, at cost, of Cosmos Imperial Mills Ltd. until such time as sufficient hydropower can be developed and made available.

As Cosmos Mills already has a Diesel of 380 K.W. capacity, this means that approximately two-thirds of the company's energy needs will be provided for during emergencies without assistance from the main Tusket system.


