Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around and the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, up in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story was something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pease Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars (second world war and Korea), was awarded the Vietnam Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent draughtsman for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale importer and distributor; and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself, and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions about the man who was found marooned on a beach in some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. When found this man's torso had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

From the files of the Chamber of January 22, 1960, the following account has been copied concerning Dwight D. Davis:

Adding a number of 60 newspapers which sent it to be friends is a copy of the Saint John Gazette of May, 1881, says the Telegraph and among other advertisements contained in the issue before us is one describing the town and township of Digby, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this area we are told the township of Digby "extends from the Gut of Cansimble westward to the extremity of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 124,000 acres." The town plot is then described.

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Basin, and extends miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles across land from the head of W. Mary's Bay. This land not only has water's edge, partly on level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Basin and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent, it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students, one of which was "J.J.'s" daughter, Florence (now Mrs. Morton of T. B. Proctor, Digby Co.). Some days after the debate a man from some part of Nova Scotia came to the printing shop looking for Florence, one of the successful debaters. I had the impression that this man was interested politically but, maybe I was wrong.

Well, I felt that I had learned considerable from my short experience at "The Wallis Job Print." Temperance Notes
Established by the Order of the Sons of Temperance
September 29th, marked the 110th anniversary of the founding of the Order of the Sons of Temperance, No. 76, now in the city of New York in 1842.
It is the oldest Temperance organization on the continent with State and a National Headquarters. The Order administers a total abstemious pledge to its members which is emphasized by a strict, progressive ritual, and the regular meetings are to educate its members and combat intemperance work, as well as providing social and fraternal meetings.
The Order, after its location, spread everywhere all over the U.S. and in 1847 the first Division of Digby was organized. It is now the largest of its kind in the world, from which it is spread to many parts of Canada.
Grand Divisions were coming to have charge of the work in the various States and Provinces and the National Division in America was formed in 1847.
Members from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, including the first Division in Great Britain, which came to the U.S. in 1847, were present. The Division was formed there, their charter being presented to them by Sir Leonard Tilley, then head of the Order in Nova Scotia.
There are now five National Divisions in various parts of the world and its ritual has been translated into six other languages.
A check up of reports made in two years ago showed that some ten millions of people had been members since its institution.
The first Division in Nova Scotia was instituted at Yarmouth on November 17th, 1847, since then spreading rapidly all over the Province.
The Grand Division of Nova Scotia has ever carried on active temperance work. It publishes Forward, bi-monthly, which is the only all temperance paper in the Maritimes, edited by Rev. Dr. George E. Levy, of Acadia University.
It keeps a full time field agent, visiting various parts of the Province. It supports temperance essays in the public schools, distributes a temperance message, to the public schools; furnishes weekly, notes and facts to all applicants. It also sent free to all applicants. October 5th to 11th
Observe These Single Safety Rules:
1. Fuses are for your protection—under no circumstance place pennies behind fuses.
2. Do not place cords in door jams. Squeezing like this breaks the protective coverings.
3. Cords should never be run over radiators or steam pipes. Insist on approved cords made for use in damp places. They become worn quickly and you are not aware of their condition.
4. Never run cords under papers. They become worn quickly and you are not aware of their condition.
5. Never leave heating appliances connected when not in use. Fires too frequent are caused in this way.
6. Do not disconnect appliances by pulling on the cord. This disconnects the cord from the plug and frequently causes trouble.
7. Cords should never be used as substitute for permanent and properly installed wiring. Have an experienced electrician check the "load" on each outlet. Overloading may cause a serious fire.
8. Cords should be examined regularly. Worn out cords should be replaced immediately to prevent short circuits.
9. Insist on approved labeled cord with appliances, lamps and cord attachments. They wear longer and are safe.
10. Be sure to have all electrical repairs and wiring made by a competent electrical contractor.

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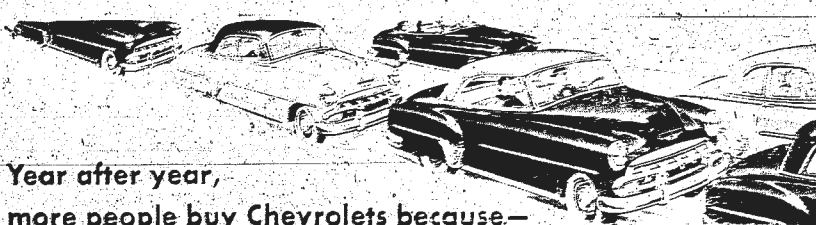

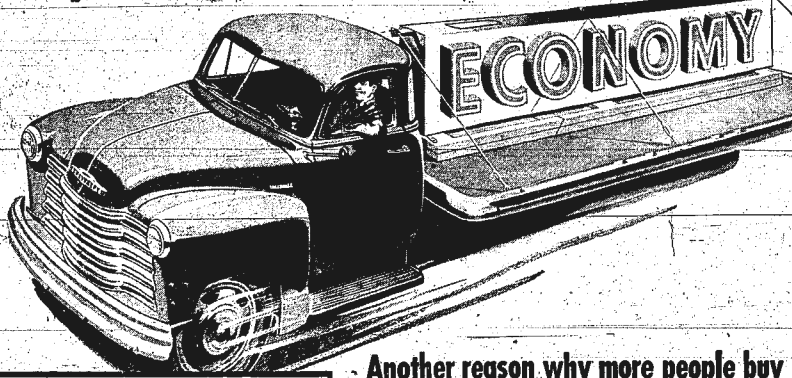

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sublimity, and in most states, three times that much—.15 per cent—is required as proof that the driver is "under the influence."

The Swedish experiments, which were made under the oversight of Dr. Leonid Gelfand, revealed that even a small amount of alcohol "caused a deterioration in the driving performance of expert drivers of between twenty-five and thirty per cent, and on some tests, made the average deterioration 41.3 per cent." In the light of these revelations, it must be held that the drinking of even two bottles of 32 beer may have dangerous effects.

The terrible effects of drinking by drivers of automobiles are the fact that alcohol causes "drunkenness," a false condition, is responsible for an interference in aggressive impulses, judgment, concentration, delay of vision, of memory, of every member of your family is endangered by the drinking of others, and the chance of multiple events on the highways of Nova Scotia every autumn. Today Highway's Minister, Merrill D. Ingham, issued a plea to motorists and pedestrians alike to be "more careful now that days are shorter and the hours of darkness longer."

Especially after dark, he warned, pedestrians should walk on the left of the roadway and keep an eye on traffic. Motorists should make sure their lights are adequate, comply with the "dimming law" in meeting oncoming vehicle, and above all reduce speed.

At this season of the year, Mr. Ingham said, "with longer periods of darkness, drivers of motor vehicles and pedestrians

on the highway must observe greater care to avoid collisions and to be required. Lives are being lost through careless walking and negligent operation of vehicles."

Where no sidewalks are provided, pedestrians must, by law, walk on the left side of the highway as is practicable. They must also, for safety, occasionally look behind, particularly when lights of a car approaching from the rear are discernable, because a motor vehicle may be overtaking and passing and the driver may not see the pedestrian before attempting to pass.

Drivers must be particularly alert and also make sure that the lights of their vehicles are adequate. Headlights are required to be adequate to distinguish a pedestrian at 200 feet distance under ordinary conditions and drivers and owners should now improve by having the vehicle checked at a well-equipped garage.

The motor vehicle law requires the driver to deflect his light beams at not less than 500 feet distance from an approaching car. To fail to do so can result in police action and a penalty.

"One hazard which is probably not well known is that if the reflection of the beams is not immediately accompanied by a drastic reduction in speed, the driver is driving into a blind area which may contain pedestrians or hazards. Always reduce speed when deflecting the headlights."

"The Royal Canadian Mounted Police are now paying special attention to the lights of vehicles. Those found to be inadequate or improperly used will result in the driver, and in some cases the owner, being penalized."

"Have your lights checked immediately to avoid a penalty and to save a life—possibly your own."

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

Twice married, his first wife being the late Gertrude Kennedy, he leaves to mourn his second wife, nee Margaret Harris, one son, George Lyman Warren, of Winnipeg; one daughter, Miss Rosalind Warren, R.N., Halifax; and three grandchildren of Winnipeg. One of a fast-disappearing type of citizen who takes his citizenship seriously, Mr. Warren always gave of his best for his home town. He was president of the Bear River Board of Trade, secretary of the Cemetery Committee, and several years he headed the Red Cross campaign in this district.

In religion he was a Baptist; he was a member of The Keith Lodge No. 18, A.F. & A.M., and was almost eligible for the fifty year jewel. He was also a member of the Eastern Star.

The funeral was conducted from his home at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Brooks of Digby. Burial was in Mount Hope Cemetery, serviced at the grave by the committee by The Keith Lodge.

Western Nova Scotia Folskool

The third session of the Western Nova Scotia Folskool is to be held this year at Meteghan River in Digby County. It will be recalled that for the past two years the Folskool has met at Sandy Cove in the Digby Neck area, but in accordance with a plan which was conceived some time ago, and endorsed at the 1st of 12 Folskool—Committee meeting in Yarmouth on October 22 of this year. It has been decided to alternate the School between areas with a predominant English background and areas where the French element predominates. It is felt that in this way the School can best fulfill the needs of the region from which its students are drawn.

The School will be in session during the period January 12 to 23. It will be sponsored jointly by the Farmers' Association, the Home and School County Councils, and the Women's Institutes, organizations of the three counties. The School will be broadening and staffed by the Division of Adult Education, the Department of Agriculture, the Fisheries Division, and the Physical Fitness Division of the Department of Health.

The Nova Scotia folskools, which have been conducted during the past three years, are akin in spirit to the famous Scandinavian Folskool. The primary purpose of these schools is to help the members to think, to read, and to express themselves clearly, and to take their part in community life. The theme of the whole course is a broadening of interest in rural community life. To this end, the course centers around the "general studies" each day of the farm, the community, and the province. The Western Nova Scotia School will be adapted to suit the requirements of fishermen as well as farmers. In addition, group singing, dramatics, and recreation form an integral part of the daily program.

Reading, discussion, and participation in group-activities are the basic educational methods of the folskools. The entire program provides the members in attendance with a rich experience in continuing living.

During the two weeks of the course there is an opportunity for our rural young people to live, think, study, and play together under the guidance of a staff group with diverse skills. The whole program is aimed at the growth and development of the members in personality, in ideas, in reading and speaking ability, and in their outlook on the possibilities of rural life in Nova Scotia.

"Under the banner of peace are the graves. Dazzle and motley, in long, bright waves. 'We mustn't approach 'em. They're young, you see.' 'We mustn't' the dead men, 'so were we'."

The next of the program was a poem read by Mrs. McElbourne. "Our Gallant Dead," followed by two more. "The Blooms of Flanders," read by Mrs. John McElbourne, and "Flanders 1914" read by Mrs. Edson Specht.

The meeting closed by singing "God Save The Queen."

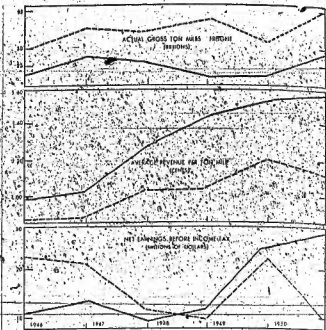
The meeting, which was presided over by the president, was opened by singing "Sweet Feet of the Gift of God's Love," followed by prayer by Mrs. John Winchester.

The charts shown above were used as exhibits by the Canadian Pacific Railway at recent hearings before the Board of Transport Commissioners at Ottawa to refute arguments that the burden of freight rates is borne largely by the western provinces. The first chart for gross revenue per mile shows that the railway service in western Canada is substantially greater than that in eastern Canada. The second shows that average revenue per mile is much greater in eastern Canada and that the difference has been increasing since 1914. The third chart shows that the net earnings of the company before income tax, once higher in western Canada than in eastern Canada, have been lower since mid-1920 despite the fact that two-thirds of the C.P.R. mileage is in the west.

A churchman, John Pierpont, composed the very Christmas song, "Jingle Bells" which has been popular for almost a century. A new Christmas song that is non-religious in theme, "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas," by Irving Berlin is fast becoming a classic favorite of the season.

So, today the American people have a rich heritage of glorious Christmas carols that make the Yuletide season lovelier and full of meaning year after year, and each year become even more beloved.

At this season of the year it is customary for enterprises to discontinue operations long enough to take an inventory in order that they may know of their accomplishments and the progress made during the past twelve months. Likewise, it is natural for individuals to pause in the hurry of modern life and pause in a little mental stock-taking, inasmuch as most of us are engaged in the pursuit of money, this sobering thought usually of our efforts.

Nearly 15,000 Canadian soldiers based in 14 far-flung countries across the world won't see the night red and green of a Canadian Christmas this year.

In Korea, where life from day to day is precarious, it's a little hard to bustle forth with the spirit of St. Nicholas, but already, Welfare Officers and others are making preparations to bring the traditional turkey and plum pudding to the men of Canada's 27th Infantry Brigade.

In the Philippines, in the line-back of the year celebrations and in the hospitals there will be Christmas "dinner" today.

through special railroads, gifts decorated trees and Christmas carolling. It won't be like home, but every soldier knows there's a warm heart and a vacant chair waiting for him on his return.

On the other side of the world, in Germany, Canadians of the 27th Infantry Brigade on Christmas morning will warm to the spirit of the Feast when the church bells ring out in Hanover. For 1900 of them, it will be the first Christmas away from home, having arrived late last month as reinforcements for the European 1st Infantry Division.

In other countries, where Canadian military attaches and officers have been serving, the

celebrations will be widely varied. Military attaché posts and countries where other Canadian soldiers are on duty include the U. S., Italy, the Netherlands, Sweden, Turkey, India, Pakistan, Japan, Australia—the United States, Yugoslavia, and Russia.

In most of the faraway places it will not be a white Christmas for Canadians — but it's pretty safe to say that it will be a merry one.

Over 2,500 calls were received by Home Services of Nova Scotia during the Christmas season.

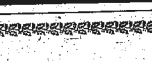

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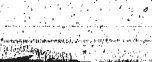

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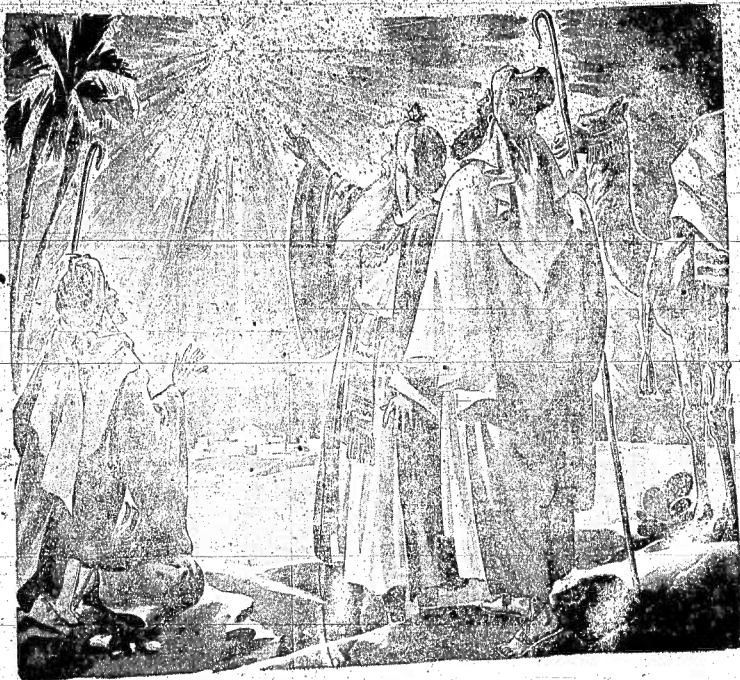
