I had the impression that this man was interested politically but, maybe I was wrong.

Educators Meet In Halifax

The creation of a more favorable public attitude toward schools and the teaching profession, higher salaries and financial

assistance for student-teachers more consolidated high schools and better living and working conditions for the rural school teacher are imperative to the solution of the teacher shortage problem in the four Atlantic Provinces.

These were the findings of living conditions in many areas.

6. Large classes and heavy teaching loads.

7. Poorly equipped schools.

Steps recommended to improve recruitment of teachers (Nova Scotia needs 500 annually for the next two years, according to the Phillips-Report) were as follows:

1. Discontinuance as soon as possible of short-term courses.

2. Scholarships for all who qualify for entrance to the teacher training institutions.

3. Adequate salaries.

4. Creation of a favorable public attitude toward the schools and the teaching profession.

5. The conference suggested the procedure, being followed in Nova Scotia, of having a representative committee consisting of school trustees, teachers, parents and the public.

6. The committee should be empowered to make recommendations to the school board and the public.

Less Time Loss Through Work Stoppages

Time loss through work stoppages in Canada during February, 1953, declined sharply from the preceding month and was less than half the amount of time lost in February, 1952. There were 19 strikes and lockouts in existence during February, 1953, involving 1,737 man-working days, as compared with 14 work stoppages in January, 1953, with 2,136 workers involved and a time loss of 31,060 days. In February, 1953, there were 22 strikes and lockouts involving 13,046 workers and a time loss of 17,000 days.

More than 73 per cent of the total time lost during February, 1953, was caused by four work stoppages. These were clothing and heavy factory workers and paper mill workers in Montreal, freight elevator workers at New Westminster and Vancouver, B.C., and a textile, clothing and rayon mill workers at Lewiston, N.S. These four disputes involved a total of 1,425 workers and time loss of 17,750 man-working days.

Last year Canadian children working through the organization of the Junior Red Cross raised more than \$107,000 for the Welfare Fund and Handicapped and Crippled Children's Fund.

Int drinking of beverage alcohol. Probably more than half of all alcoholics began their use of alcohol without any physical, mental, or personality deviation from normal.

This group became abnormal chiefly because of their excessive and in the first place, "moderate" and socially acceptable use of alcohol, which created for them many problems similar in character to those seen in psychopaths who make up somewhat less than half of the chronic alcoholics.

The susceptible, weak, willing, selfish or otherwise deviant and deviate person is not an alcoholic until after he succumbs to excessive repetition and habit.

True, an alcoholic, acute or chronic, occasional, continuous, compulsive, habitual, or as a victim of his addiction, is a sick person.

The state of alcoholism, a sickness, is self-induced and so different from the common conception of a sickness as not to be properly described as such, but as a self-induced poisoning by a narcotic drug.

Temperance Notes

Furnished by the Order of the Sons of Temperance

Dr. Haven Emerson, author of *Alcohol and Man*, Professor Emeritus of Health Practice, Columbia University, Former City, and certainly an authority on alcoholism, said in *The Christian Science Monitor*, October 26, 1951:

In speaking of alcoholism as a sickness, we have been led into a shrewdly centering of our attacks and are decoupling ourselves from the truth.

The currently popular theory that alcoholism is simply a lack of will and that the man is responsible for excessive drinking in misadventure and mismanagement.

A great deal of rapid thinking and writing and lack of clean, healthy, unhappy effects.

The use of the statement "alcoholism is a sickness" tends to remove all sense of personal responsibility, choice, or even

This attitude is welcomed by the liquor industries because it tends to build on, they appear before the public as blameless, claiming merely to "serve the universal needs of the people," a few of whom are found to be unfortunate in respect to personality, emotional development, and some medical and social problems.

True it is that some people are prone to resort to alcohol as a means of self-deception, as an escape from their own inadequacies and frustrations, and as a social crutch that they find gives them from their inferiorities and anxieties.

Acceptance of alcoholism as merely one other kind of sickness, which society is troubled with and must provide for, has and some probably useful effects. There has been an enormous increase in provision for ambulatory and care, rehabilitation, and other services at the taxpayers' expense.

The cause of alcoholism is, of course, the excessive and persistent use of alcohol.
