Appreciate New Traffic Sign

Some weeks ago while driving in the town of Lunenburg we remarked that we had never driven in a town which was so **lacking** stop signs. The reply was that everybody seems to be careful and there are seldom any accidents. Since then we have read two similar statements about driving in Lunenburg.

We admire our South Shore friends for their careful driving and at the same time congratulate our town authorities here for erecting a goodly number of traffic signs in our town. We repeat what we have so often said before — "the traffic signs protect the stranger who is not aware of traffic hazards peculiar to our own particular town.

One new sign which is particularly appreciated is the one just erected on the approach from the Racquette to Carleton St. We at the Courier have considered that one of the dangerous spots in the town, particularly in the height of the tourist season, and have said so before. We want to voice our appreciation for the stop sign erected.

Timber Resources

There was good news for all Canadians coming out of the National Forestry Conference at Winnipeg, says The Financial Post.

There is enough timber in Canada to go on supplying the projected needs of our forest industries in perpetuity, it was reported, and, if we act wisely, there will be sufficient to supply a greatly expanded industry in future.

That is a very different picture from that which used to be painted. A decade or two ago we were told that a wood famine was inevitable: that our vital timber resources were being used and wasted faster than we could ever hope to replace them.

There has been a big change for the better in forestly

operation and thinking since then. The old idea that lumber and pulp wood was a one-crop, "slash-and-clear-out" operation has been discarded. In its place has come a growing realization that timber is and should be a regular crop, a crop like wheat or fish or fur, to be grown continuously. But realization must be followed by action, and specifically in these directions.

1. We must do much more to reduce losses from fire, nsects and decay. Each year, we lose to these three enemies enough wood to supply another forest industry as large as the

2. We can reduce losses from waste by using more of each tree cut, by using more kinds of trees, some of which are still unpopular with the mills, and more of each log delivered to th

3. We must put idle forest land to work, and we must make productive areas work harder at their business of growing wood. To do this we must take a new look at the thousands of square miles that lie along the fringes of our good agricultural land, areas that are at present neither good forest nor good farm.

We must have more foresters, more research.

The costs of a wise program are trivial indeed measured against the direct returns alone from a growing forest industry evening. with its raw material supply guaranteed in perpetuity.

(The following material for Fire Prevention Week was forwarded to our office by the Nova Scotia Fire Marshal. It contains some valuable information. We recommend it to our readers.)

Lives. Fire that in most cases was preventable continued to take a needless toll of life and property last year in Nova Scotia. 14 men, 6 women and 11 young children paid with their lives the supreme price of neglect of fire safety. This is under the average annual loss in the last ten years which is 36 lives a year. The total for the past ten years was 367 lives lost of which 154 were children. What of this year so far, or to the end of September? — The loss is 3 adults and 9 children (all under 5 years). That sounds like an improvement, some might say "that's better", but not to some 3,000 men in our fire services. They know that a few unfortunate fires can change the situation in a few days. About This and That

An Undesirable State

A poll taken last week by a daily newspaper indicated that sixty-one per cent of Nova Scotians didn't know when the next provincial election is to be held and twelve per cent had no idea that a provincial election is coming up. Such apathy on the part of our citizens in regard to a matter which should be so important to every Nova Scotian is not commendable. While the story brought amusing smiles to the countenances of a goodly number box plant. of readers and expressions such as "that can't be accurate" were heard, yet such insensibility in political affairs shown by even a section of Nova Scotia as indicated by the poll is not amusing but astounding.

Back in 1953 a poll was taken by the Canadian Institute of Public Opinion on the question of whether parents would have their children look to politics as a career. Only 13 per cent considered such a career desirable with nine per cent of those questioned rejecting the idea because of the fear of corruption and graft. Many felt that politicians could not stay honest. Two per cent contended that their children could do more good elsewhere. This, too, is an undesirable way of thinking. To be a member of a group of people governing our country or province should be considered a dignified office and a noble job, but according to the poll and according to our own observance of the few people seeking such office this is not the usual way of thinking. We do admit, however, that other factors enter into decisions to refuse running in the political field. Not least of these is the lack of sufficient funds to meet legitimate expenses in running an election campaign. There probably would be greater democracy cause it led to the general use in the idea we have heard advanced that an equality of spending of sawdust as a community under an impartial administration be set up for election cam- fuel. paigns.

But why do people show so little interest in so important a question as when and who will govern their country? And why is the desire to enter the political field so low? Could at least some of the undesirable state stem from the degrading way in which candidates are said to have carried on their election campaigns? If so, right now in Nova Scotia there is a chance to start rectifying the state and denouncing the seemingly apparent though childish attitude that all is fair in love and war and politics. Offering money, liquor, bribery of jobs or other illegal means of influencing voters has no place in so sacred an issue kiln holding thousands of yards as the use of the franchise. Any such practice indulged in can only degrade politics in the minds of future voters or future aspirants for leaders of the province. Electors, too, have a responsibility in refusing to accept voting bribes, but what can be expected of the sheep if the prospective shepherd stoops to offer care of dressing, ripping, splitor grant requests of bribery for voting.

Election day is approaching. Let us resolve to make it a ming boards into finished clean one both from the standpoint of the candidates and the electors. As the day approaches all Nova Scotians should resolve to cast their ballot and cast it in the same way as they would perform a sacred act and thereby help to maintain freedom and right in the province. A chain is only as strong as its weakest link so let the constituencies in Digby County be one of the strongest links in the clean 1956 Provincial Election Campaign.

Meteghan Firm **Shows How To** Succeed-

(This is the second in a series of articles written exclusively for the weekly newspapers of Nova Scotia, dealing with various phases of the province's industry. The articles are the result of a four-week, 1,800 mile tour of Nova Scotia by a Department of Trade and Industry writer. Each article deals with a specific firm and is designed to give readers of the weekly press a general idea of how the respective industries are contributing to their communities and to the province's economy as a whole.)

In the back pages of most pulp magazines you'll find advertisements telling you "How To Succeed" if you'll but send one dollar for a booklet which will reveal the formulae used by successful men of the ages.

However, when Edmund M. Comeau founded the business now bearing his name in this Acadian village there were few pulp magazines and he had no time for them anyway. That was 50 years ago and Mr. Comeau did not need any prescribed formula for success because he devised his own.

The Comeau formula was simple. Raise six sons—and a daughter-encourage them to stay at home and keep them in business with you. Such a formula mightn't be universally workable, but in the case of Mr. Comeau it worked like a charm. The box shook business operating under the name of E. M. Comeau & Sons Limited stands today as a monument to the elder Comeau's recipe on "How To Succeed."

While steady progress was made, the plant was not always attended by good fortune. A yard fire in 1942 destroyed more than 300,000 feet of lumber ready for market, and in the following year fire razed the

There was no discouragement. A new plant was built. As the elder Comeau said: "In a way. it was a good thing for business we were burnt out. A lot of old home-made equipment. The fire ridded us of that and we were able to make a fresh start."

And make a fresh start they did. A new mill was erected. equipped with electric power to replace a previous electric and diesel combination.

Faced with heavy power costs. the firm made another move to check that expense. They installed steam power which is fueled with sawdust. The later proved a double blessing be-

In 1948 the box plant was enlarged. Now large trucks can drive inside for unloading lumber and loading finished shooks. and space is there for storage of lumber necessary for several days operation.

Most of the lumber for shooks is cut live-edge and air-dried for three months or more in the storage yard. A steam-fed dry takes care of emergency re-

In the New England states last fall, for example, the deflood was greatly lightened in many areas because towns and cities, under the threat of the H-Bomb, had set up civil defence organizations.

In New Haven, Connecticut, the damage was light within the city itself. But its civil defence rescue units were able to come quickly to the aid of nearby communities hard hit by the elements. The New Haven civil defence units alone were credited with rescuing almost 1,000 persons who otherwise might have perished or at least under-

gone prolonged discomfort. The same thing happened in Manitoba's Brandon area when floods hit there last fall. The residents, through their extensive civil defence organization, were able to protect themselves. They did not have to call on the armed forces for aid.

The little civil defence organization just beginning to blossom in Nicolet. Quebec, had a part in rescuing some of that village's residents when a section of it slid into the river in October. Afterwards it set up a welfare







National Fish Week

Vincent Massey and Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent will act the tone for thousands of Canadians when their household menus feature at least one species of Canadian fish during Nation-M Fish Week October 29 to November 3.

This was made known today by the Fisheries Council of Canada which announced that special gifts of fish will be made to the Governor General and Prime Minister during the special

The presentations will be made by Mr. Willoughby Ritoey of Riverport. N. S. President of the Fisheries Council, which reprecents all phases of the fishing industry from Newfoundland to British Columbia

Mr. St. Laurent will accept his gift from Canada's fishing industry October 31 and the Governor General will receive his is at the home of Mr. and Mrs. the following day.

National Fish Week, first held last year, is part of an industrywide campaign to encourage more Canadians to eat fish The Fisheries Council pointed out that such an increase in consumption is vital to the future of the thousands of Canadians who are dependent, wholly or in part, on this basic industry.

"Real security for these people rests with the Canadian consumer," the Council statement said. "At the moment Canadian housewives are buying only 35 per cent of the annual catch. This percentage must be increased for the good of the industry now Sunday. and proportionally increased as production rises during the next 25 years."

Mr. Ritcey, a prominent Nova Scotia salt fish exporter, said in an official statement announcing National Fish Week dates that this industry-wide promotion "is vital to a basic industry which depends on foreign sales for 65 per cent of its income."

Although the industry presently is in a healthy state and expects substantial increases in production during the next two decades, the President of the Fisheries Council pointed to the dangers to the industry inherent in a prosperity based on the vagaries of foreign markets with their accompanying tariff evils.

"That is why the Fisheries Council, which represents all phases of the industry from Newfoundland to British Columbia, has decided to promote the consumption of fish on a year-round basis with special emphasis during National Fish Week."

"The fishing industry, which handles products valued annually at approximately \$200,000,000, is essential to the Canadian economy", Mr. Ritcey said, adding that it gives employment to nearly 100,000 persons and, in some areas, it provides the only available source of employment.


To our neighbours in Springhill we extend our sympathy we give thanks with them also that many were spared, and we join in expressing the hope tragedy so overwhelming may never strike again.

According to the journal the wardens waited on Mr. Conihane and he told them he would pay "when the church was building". The wardens informed him he would be in the States then and they could not demand it of him. They evidently took his reply to be a refusal and province until he had paid his subscription.

The letter to Admiral Digby makes mention of the fact he had also stated he would attempt to get pledges of a further £50 from friends in England if the church were "built of such materials as will be permanent that it might not only be an ornament to the town but centrical and convenient to all inhabitants".

In their letter to Admiral Digby the vestry explain why they had started the church construction of wood and not so large as had been originally planned. They ask that the Admiral not alter his first intention to seek the extra £50 and assure him they have secured "the King's arms about four feet square to put on the Governor's pew" and stated they would be happy to have "your Honor's arms to put up in your pew".

Conditions in Digby in 1788 were very bad if one can judge from a copy of a speech delivered to the church vestry by Rev. Mr. Viets, the first rector, contained in the journal.

This speech reads in part: "It is with the greatest grief and, indignation we perceive vice triumphant and virtue ridiculed and trampled underfoot. Drunkenness, idleness, profane swearing, tavern haunting, clandering, backbiting and lying, defrauding and stealing call loudly for the exertions of the Magistrates to use the sword of law and justice for the suppression and punishment of those vices and for a reformation of manners among us".

Rev. Mr. Viets spoke out strongly in his address against those who did not attend church. He said in part: "The chief source and origin of these calamities lies in the neglect and contempt of the Lord's Day and the public duties belonging to it". He quoted the law regarding due observance of the Lord's Day and public worship and said: "In defiance of these laws great numbers among us not only neglect and despise public worship but insult us by idly strolling the streets, by saunter-

Safe Driving Week

The week of December 1st to 7th inclusive has been designated across Canada as "National Safe Driving Week" and efforts are being made to direct the attention of the motoring public to the need for the development of safe driving habits if we are to cut down on the ever increasing toll of deaths and injuries caused through traffic accidents.

Mr. Antoine Rivard, chairman of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, in announcing the safe driving week campaign stated that most of the highway accidents that occur in Canada and their consequent loss in life, limb, time and money are entirely unnecessary.

"Of all accidents, 85 per cent are directly attributable to error on the part of the driver or pedestrian," said Mr. Rivaard, "and until the majority of our citizens become interested in this problem we need expect no reduction in the nation's accident toll."

It has also been predicted that, if present trends continue unchecked, 75 people will die in traffic accidents in Canada during the first week of December. A breakdown of these figures claims that three of these will be in Nova Scotia: four in New Brunswick: 20 in Quebec and so on.

We heartily endorse the efforts of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference in promoting "Safe Driving Week" and commend it to our readers. On many occasions we have carried editorials advocating the use of more caution and the closer observance of the commonsense rules of driving in order to avoid accidents.

Every day that passes we are shocked to read in the news accounts of traffic accidents which have taken lives or resulted in lax over the weekend. crippling injury to those involved. These accidents must be curbed and everything humanly possible done to cut down their toll.

The observance by drivers and pedestrians alike of the commonsense rules of the road; the exercise of care and caution and a strict adherence to the rules and regulation of the Motor Vehicle Act will in measure aid in bringing this about. Mr. President, Officers and Members of the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society:

It is my pleasure to present the second annual report of the Admiral Digby Horticultural So-

This past year has been a highly successful one in many ways. A comparison will be made, from time to time, of the work of 1956 to that of 1955, in order that you might fully appreciate the progress which has been made this year.

Eleven meetings were held throughout the year. Our average attendance was 12.9, as compared to 10 of last year. The average would have been even higher for the attendance has been excellent, but for the exception of two meetings held during the winter when travelling was hazardous. We have a membership of 48 paid members, as compared to 33 last year, or an increase of 15 members. The fact that meetings have been so well attended shows both enthusiasm and interest in the programmes presented and work being accomplished on the projects. Our finances have been sound throughout the year. Including halance in bank of \$93.27 on Nov. 4th, 1955, our cash receipts totalled \$240.18. Our expenses last year were light, only \$7.42. Bank Of N. S. Reports Another Record Year

A partner in Canada's expanding economy, The Bank of Nova Scotia in its annual statement for the year ended Oct ober 31st shows assets of more than \$1,270,000,000. This was an increase of 61/2% over the previous year, and an increase of more than 23% since the bank's assets first passed the billiondollar mark two years ago.

The greater portion of the increase in assets last year was in the U.S. dollar and sterling divisions of the bank's business. The increase in Canadian assets was comparatively small, reflecting the policy of credit restraint pursued by the monetary authorities.

Total deposits increased by \$56,000,000 over the previous growing needs of the economy. The rate of increase was slower than last year, and loans tapered off noticeably towards the year end. Securities at \$308,447,level as the previous year.

During the year, shareholders' investment rose to \$68,431,-000, an increase of one-third. The increase resulted largely from the response to the bank's offer on May 31st of 300,000 shares of new stock.


The easiest way to tell a car story is to trap a mechanic in a grease pit, stand over him and shout. He just can't escape. The advantage of being a reader is that you can leave any-





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

Fire Safety Belongs At The Top Of Your Christmas List

Every year, from a few days before Christmas to the week following New Year's, an ever increasing number of dwelling fires make headlines across the country. Gay and colorful, but highly inflammable decorations and carelessness, are the cause burning head loses itself among item. Christmas parcels. The following is a list of rules for a Fire-Safe Christmas: (1) THE TREE

into one outlet. Never leave tree lights on when leaving the house.

(3) DECORATIONS AND WRAPPINGS. Don't let Christmas wrap-

pings accumulate. Put in your fire breaks out. trash barrel or burn in your incinerator as soon as possible. Use non-combustible material to decorate the home. (4) GIFTS.

Toys operated by kerosene, alcohol, etc. are especially dangerous: they may upset and set fire to children's clothing, the dy. tree or to the house itself.

Don't set up electric trains near the Christmas tree.

(5) DON'T FORGET. Don't allow smoking near the yourself.



In many homes, the holy day has become a series of "holidaze". A mixture of last-minute shopping, home celebrations, office drinking parties (on which there has been a justified crackdown in recent years), distracting holiday sights and sounds, can lead to this sometimes tragic state.

But Christmas is still a holy day. It is the anniversary of the birth of a Man who came, not to sing carols, eat turkey or trim Christmas trees, but to give the world one gift — the gift of love.

Why not make this Christmas a holy day in your home. Have fun, enjoy your gifts, your children, the feasting and all that goes with a family Christmas. But take a minute or two from the day's festivities and consider our Christmas hope for the world as we approach a New Year which, in itself, brings suggestion of courage and of hope.

Christmas Hazards

The gaily decorated Christmas tree — traditional symbol of happiness in many parts of the world - can cause tragic death and injury unless careful precautions are made, warns the All Canada Insurance Federation.

Officials of the Federation, which represents more than 200 fire, automobile and casualty insurance companies in Canada, said Christmas trees and decorations were potential fire hazards and should be chosen with extreme caution.

Children's toys, too, should be chosen with care. Chemistry sets, firearms and to's requiring kerosene and other inflammable liquids should not be given to young children. In addition, the use of such toys should be supervised by adults.

To help minimize the danger of fire and accidents during the holiday season, safety experts recommend the following precautions:

- 1. Choose a small tree rather than a large one.
- 2. Keep Christmas trees and boughs outside as long as possible; remove them from the house as soon as needles begin to fall.
- 3. Never place trees or other decoration in front of doorways, staircases or near fireplaces.
- 4. Whenever possible, use a pot of water as foundation for tree.
- 5. Christmas presents should not be placed under trees until Christmas Eve; elaborate wrappings should be removed and disposed of as soon as possible.
 - 6. Never use candles as tree decorations.
