On other occasions when some group refused duty for the dead, seemed to be brokenhearted, I would say, "use a little oil" and sure enough, often that is all it took. They often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I built "Mac", of four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1958 got together just before dark one evening and decided to mutilate the newly built outdoor Penn Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just east of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, so in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water; one soon jumped in. The others followed and across the pool the stream

rest quickly followed and across the pool the boys swam. "Mac" inferred to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. One day, "Uncle" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". From the files of the Chamber of January 23, 1967, the following account has been copied concerning India in 1965:

Adding a number of 60 newspapers which sent it to be friends is a copy of the Saint John Gazette of May, 1881, says the Telegraph and among other advertisements contained in the issue before us is one describing the town and township of Digby, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this area we are told the township of Digby "extends from the Gut of Cansimble westward to the extremity of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 124,000 acres." The town plot is then described.

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Bay, and twenty miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles distant from the head of H. Mary's Bay. This land, and not from the water's edge, partly is level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Bay, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent, it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. Death Of Child Mourned

Word was received by the relatives in Westport of the tragic death of two-year-old Dorothy MacDormand, child of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald MacDormand at Victoria, B. C.

Little Dorothy was crossing the street with her four-year-old sister when she was struck by a bus and crushed.

A passenger in the bus felt a bump but the bus driver thought it was the condition of the road. When the passenger again said it could be a child, the driver immediately applied his brakes and returned to find the remains of Dorothy, who had died instantly.

Mr. MacDormand, who is in the navy, was contacted at sea and returned to his home.

Beside his parents, he is survived by brothers and sisters, grandmothers, one being Mr. William MacDormand, who resides at Westport; also a number of uncles and aunts in various parts of Canada.

Weavers Guild Holds Monthly Meeting

The Fort Anne Weavers Guild held their monthly meeting at the District Community Centre, Annapolis Royal, on Saturday, June 1st. Plans for the First Western Nova Scotia Handicraft Exhibition, to be held at the District Community Centre, July 18-19 are now complete. The response to the circular letter sent to craftsmen in Western Nova Scotia has to date been very good. The theme "Handicrafts For Every Day Use" will be carried out by the Yarmouth and Fort Anne Weavers Guilds.

The general display will include weaving, silver jewelry, leather work, rugs hooked and braided, woodwork, stuffed toys, quilts, crochet work, in fact everything that can be made by hand. Fort Anne Weavers Guild has only eleven members, and are depending on each and every craftsman, in any type of handicraft to send in as many articles as possible. There is always a possibility that some craftsmen have not received the circular letter regarding this exhibition and are asked to please contact The Fort Anne Weavers Guild, Annapolis Royal. This is the first exhibition of its kind in Western Nova Scotia.

Witnesses To Meet In Moncton

The towns of Bear River, Centreville and Digby will be represented by a delegation of fifteen at the five day convention of Jehovah's Witnesses, to be held at the High School Auditorium in Moncton, July 10th to 14th. Issues Statement Re Use Of Clams

The Federal Department of Fisheries last Thursday issued the following statement: "During the past week there has been an unexpected incidence of shellfish poisoning in the Fundy Area of St. John and Charlotte Counties. The situation was immediately investigated by officials of the Provincial Department Research Board. Of the 30 cases located, the majority were of mild nature and the more serious ones are recovering.

All of the cases resulted from eating clams that were gathered by picnickers who took them from beaches despite the fact that these were posted with warning signs by the Department of Fisheries. The department emphasizes that there is no danger whatever involved in eating commercially produced raw shucked clams or canned clams, the harvesting and processing of which are rigidly controlled by the department.

This is unusually early in the season for the onset of the danger from shellfish poisoning which is ordinarily associated with the peak summer water temperatures. It seems likely that the unseasonal period of hot may have been responsible for the early occurrence of the danger which is likely to continue for some time.

The cases reported so far have all been in the mainland areas of St. John and Charlotte Counties. Past experience has shown that under such conditions the islands off Charlotte County and the coast of Digby and Annapolis Counties, Nova Scotia, are similarly affected.

This should serve as a warning to picnickers and others visiting the beaches in the Fundy region.

Dominion Day In Weymouth

Dominion Day, the 90th birthday of Canada, was celebrated in Weymouth with record crowds thronging the Cricket Field during the entire day. Bright sunshine and blue skies were a welcome sight that morning to the many who had spent so many hours of labour during the last few weeks preparing for this affair which this year was sponsored by the Weymouth Fire Department.

Crowds began to gather early for the parade which was scheduled for ten in the morning. This was led by the band of the Halifax Rifles in their dress uniform of navy blue and in addition to their music provided the spectators with a bit of precision drill as they reversed positions several times along the route.

Floats were informative as well as being beautifully decorated. Included among the floats was a dressing group on the Canadian Cancer Society entry, Rebecca at the Well sponsored by Olive Branch Rebekah Lodge and a scale model of the Legion grounds of the future entered by the Weymouth Branch of the Canadian Legion. Products of Weymouth were on display including the upholstered furniture and cruisers manufactured by Weymouth Industries Ltd. and the products of the local soft drink bottling companies.

Rule Death Accidental

Death of ten-year-old Laurie Morrell, of Barton, who was killed on his bicycle June 18th, was ruled accidental, with no blame attached to the driver of the car which struck the lad, by a coroner's jury here Tuesday evening.

The jury arrived at their verdict after hearing evidence from the driver of the car, Harold J. Bishop, of Halifax; Dr. D. G. Black; RCMP Constable Edward Wilson, and eight-year-old John Gillespie, playmate of the accident victim.

The Gillespie boy stated that he and young Morrell had been on their bikes at the side of the road near the church in Barton. Young Morrell started off on his bike in the direction of Digby and then attempted to turn around on the pavement to go toward Weymouth. Before he had completed the turn he was struck by the car.

RCMP Constable Wilson said that skid marks on the pavement indicated the car was travelling at about forty miles an hour. Maximum visibility at the scene was some three hundred feet, he said. He tendered a drawn plan of the accident scene, showing the position of the car, body and bicycle.

Dr. D. G. Black stated cause of death was a fractured skull.

The principal then introduced Rev. W. E. O'Grady, United Baptist minister at Hebbron. He told of Rev. O'Grady's successful work with young people.

Rev. W. E. O'Grady brought a very inspiring message to the youth, stressing their great opportunities in a country so vast and developing so quickly as Canada. He praised the calibre of the youth in the Maritimes and told how the professional people such as nurses, lawyers, doctors, etc., are in the greatest demand throughout Canada and the USA.

However, he went on, one should avoid thinking of only what money they can receive from a vocation, but what can be given to mankind, and God can be the guide in all things.

As some had decided upon their profession, he felt they were fortunate as many youth take years to set a goal and thereby lose those years often times. "One should know what they want to do," he continued, "and even though a family position could be easily secured, it might not be advantageous if it is something the person has not wanted to do." He concluded by wishing the graduates all success in the future.

The diplomas were then presented to Grades VII to XII. The prize for highest marks in Grade VII was given to Gail Kenney, and for perfect attendance to Edward Titus, by their teacher, Mrs. Lorne Swift. Trophies were awarded by Mr. Everett Pugh to Arnold Titus, for the greatest improvement during the year; to Allan Welch, for sports; Grade VIII, Karen Clements; Grade IX, Karen Derby; Grade X, Allan Welch; Grade XI, Wretha Titus; Grade XII, Winnifred Shaw.

Pictures were taken as each received their diploma.

An address was then given by the principal, in which he stated how pleased he was with the co-operation of the pupils during the year, and felt they were as nice a group as one could find in any school. He told of various phases of the school work during the year, showing a map of Brier Island, drawn by pupils, a scrap book with articles and pictures of the Island, and other completed projects. He felt that the school had progressed and the pupils had learned much in conducting meetings, etc., by having a recreational club. Money was received from the Legion and Home & School to assist the High School, but the pupils had contributed largely in earning money by magazine sales, fudge sales, etc.

The attendance had been very good and for three months was over 95%. Nancy Kenney received a prize for selling the most magazines. The school received a "panda" for the most sales.

The hall was prettily decorated and the many different colors of dresses of the young ladies added to the color scheme. The intermediate teacher, Mrs. Lorne Swift, and the trustees, Mr. Arthur Titus, Mr. Walter Titus and Mr. George Clements, were on the platform.

Council Again Defers Action On Application

The Digby Town Council Tuesday night deferred action for one month on an application from Fina Oils Ltd. for a permit to build a service station on the former Excel Inn property on Digby's main street.

The application, which has been before the Council on several occasions, has been strongly opposed by a group of citizens who some months ago presented a petition to the Council urging rejection of the application on the grounds a service station in the suggested locality would be a traffic menace, devalue properties in the area and would be in other ways undesirable.

At Tuesday night's Council meeting a delegation of ladies, headed by Mrs. W. K. Ganong, appeared in protest to the building application. Mrs. Ganong and others who addressed the Council stressed the traffic safety factor and stated it was their opinion a serious traffic hazard would be created if the service station was erected.

The Council decided to further delay action on the application for another month to allow the traffic authority to make a check on traffic conditions in the area.

It was reported by the Fire Committee that there had been no fires in Digby during the month of June. There were 21 alarms in April, five in May and none in June. No property loss occurred in any of the fires during April and May. It was stated the fire department is carrying out intensive training courses with the company being broken up into small groups so that they will be trained to operate as complete units.

A permit was granted Paul Snow to build a house on his property on Carleton Street.

Red Cross Closes For Summer

The Digby Red Cross Branch closed last week for the summer holidays with a business meeting presided over by the president, Dr. T. W. Hodgson.

The Ways and Means Committee, under the convenerhip of Mrs. Ralph Berwick, reported receipts of \$10.25 from the Tea at the Baptist Hall and \$3.20 from regular Ten Cent Tea in June. After paying \$10.00 to the Branch Treasurer, a balance of \$3.95 was left on hand for petty cash. The president expressed his appreciation of the efforts of this committee in helping finance the work of the branch, which has been self-supporting in all its local work in recent years, besides having raised money for the purchase of a large number of gatch beds, wheelchairs and crutches.

The meeting concluded with the serving of tea and the motion to reconvene in September.

The high-pressure boys are starting early this year. I noticed an ad the other day that offered in big, bold type "Double the Red Book value on trade-ins."

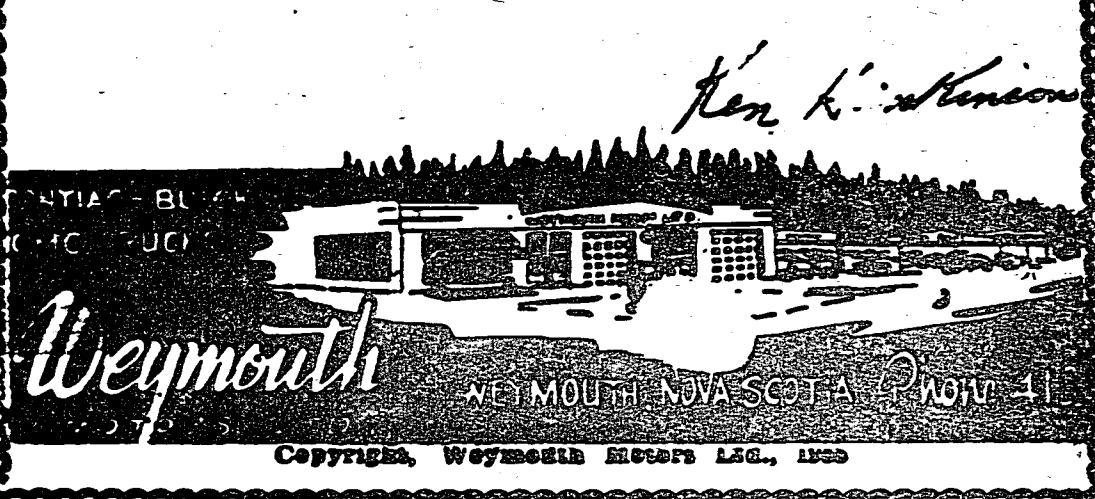
Further down, in smaller type, came the important modification that this type of ad usually has. The customer was invited to drive in and "see if your car is eligible" for the double-value trade-in offer.

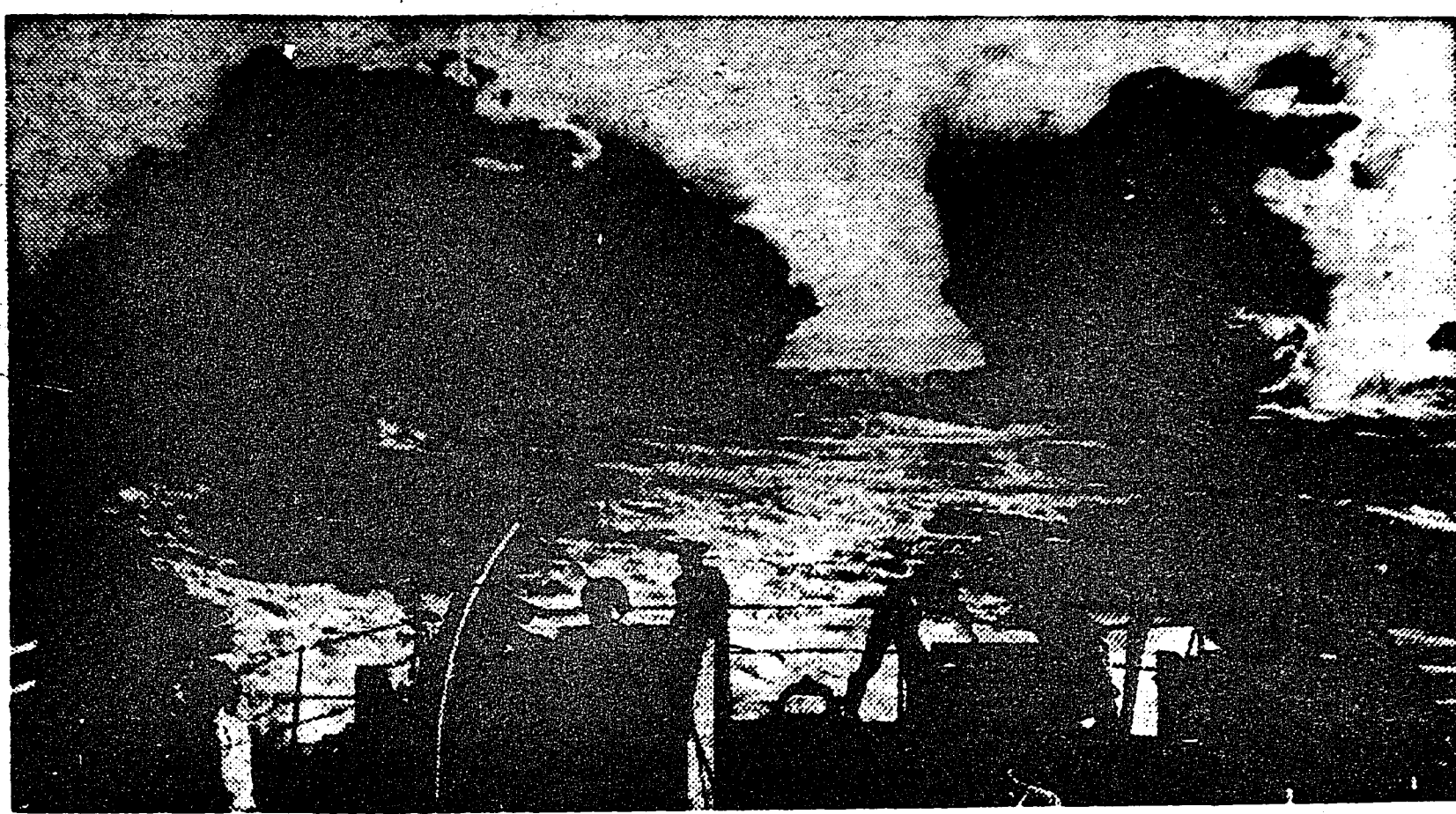

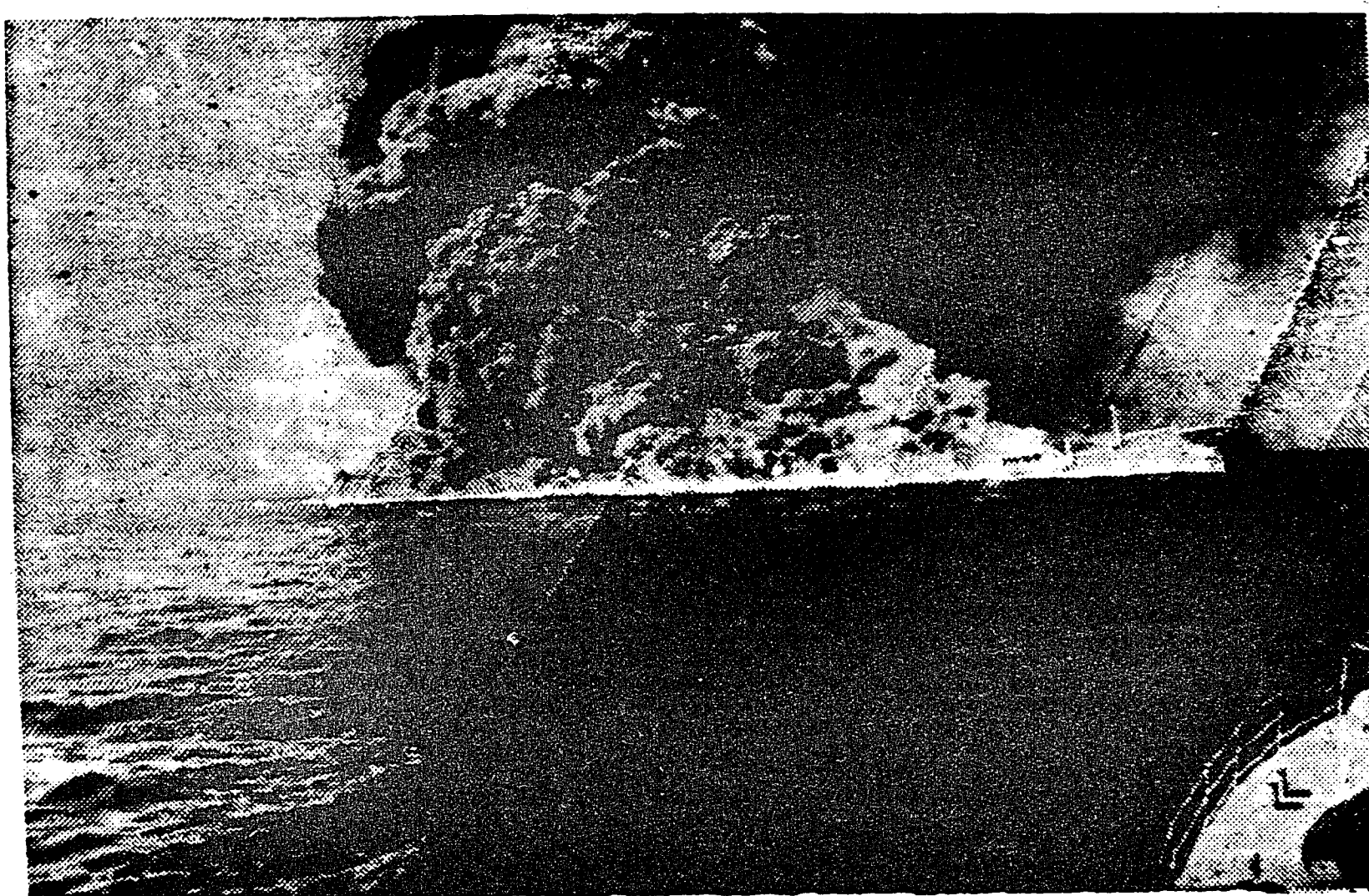

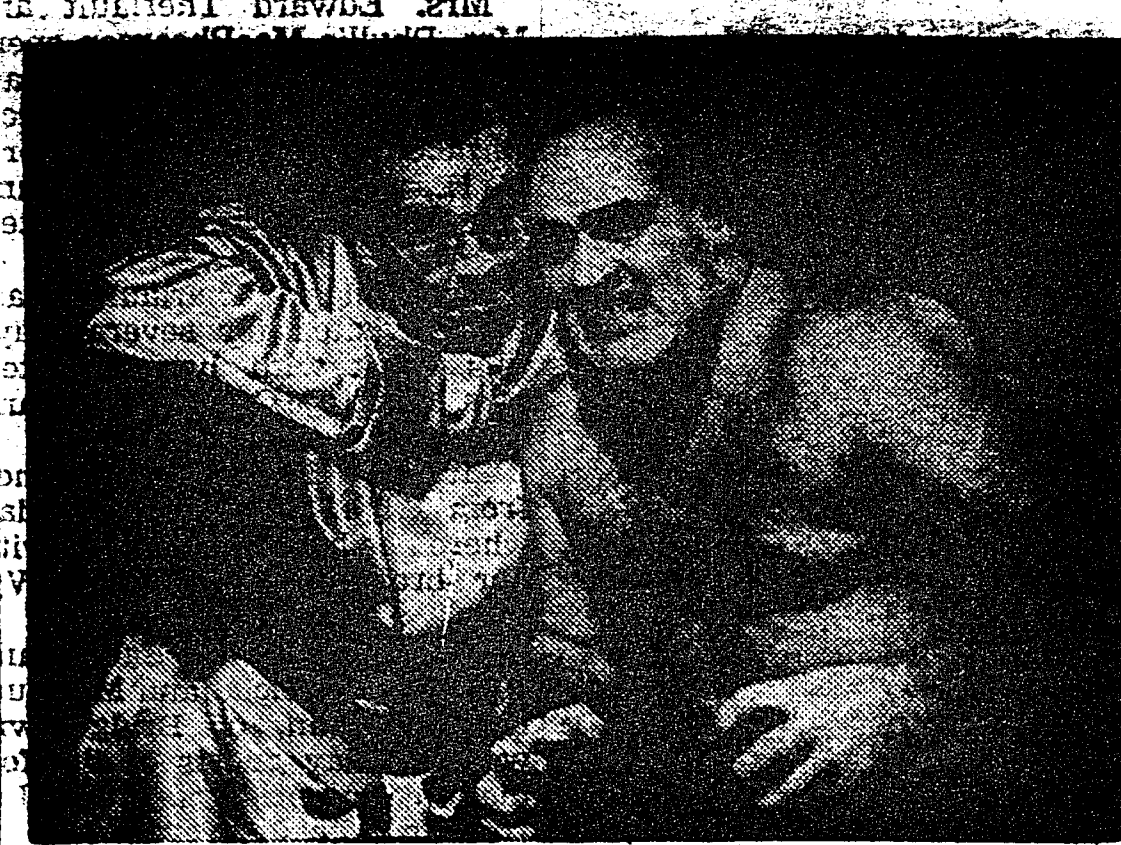

Keep Farm Buildings Sanitary

The importance of maintaining proper sanitary conditions in farm buildings cannot be stressed too much, leading bacteriologists point out.

Small buildings to be used for livestock or for storage of farm products should first be made sanitary. Farm animals too frequently become infected because of the neglect of their accommodation.

Farm produce will be quickly attacked by microorganisms residing in the dirt of a neglected storage place. There is a constant warfare waged by microorganisms: If the microorganisms get the food first and spoil it for human consumption, the fault lies mainly with those responsible for storage of the food.

The basic problem is the existence of microorganisms, but their number may be greatly reduced by means of lye. To combat them, the surfaces of the storage shed should be flooded with a solution of one can of lye in five gallons of water.

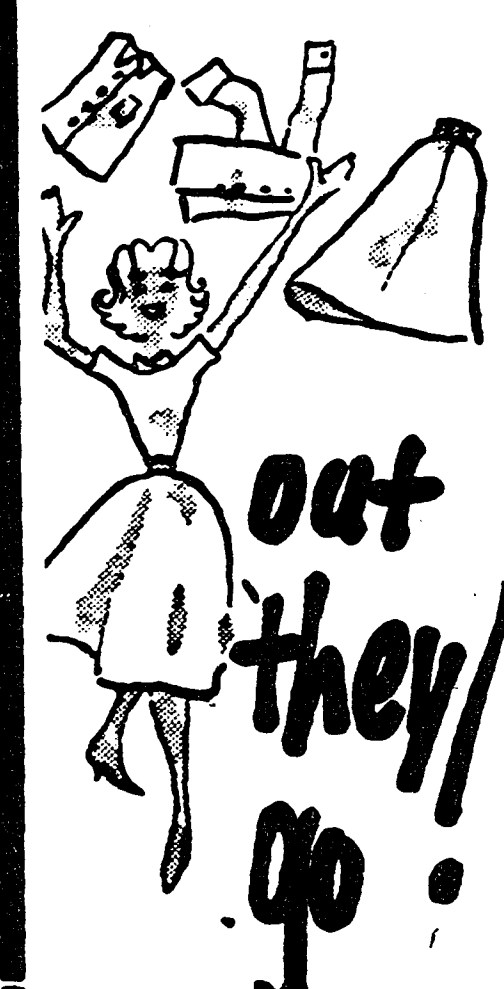

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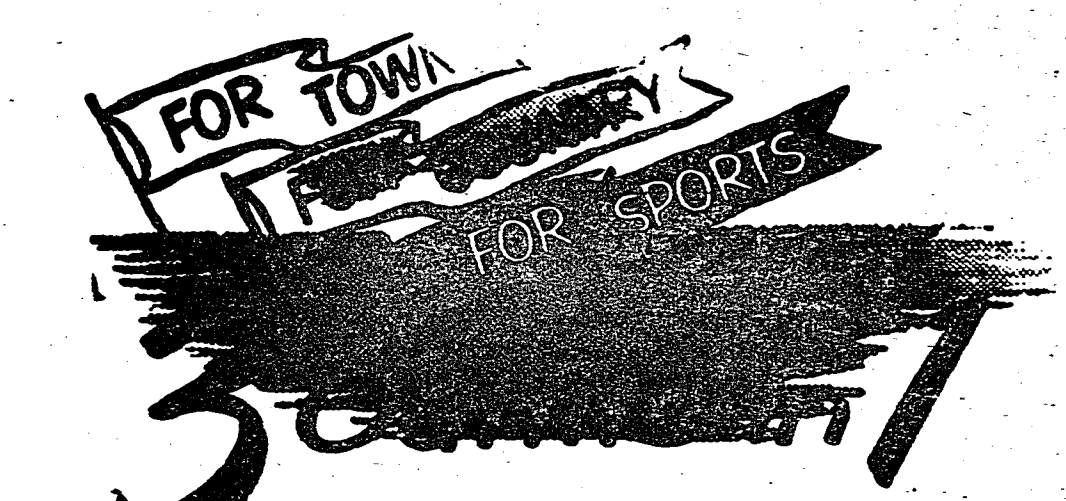

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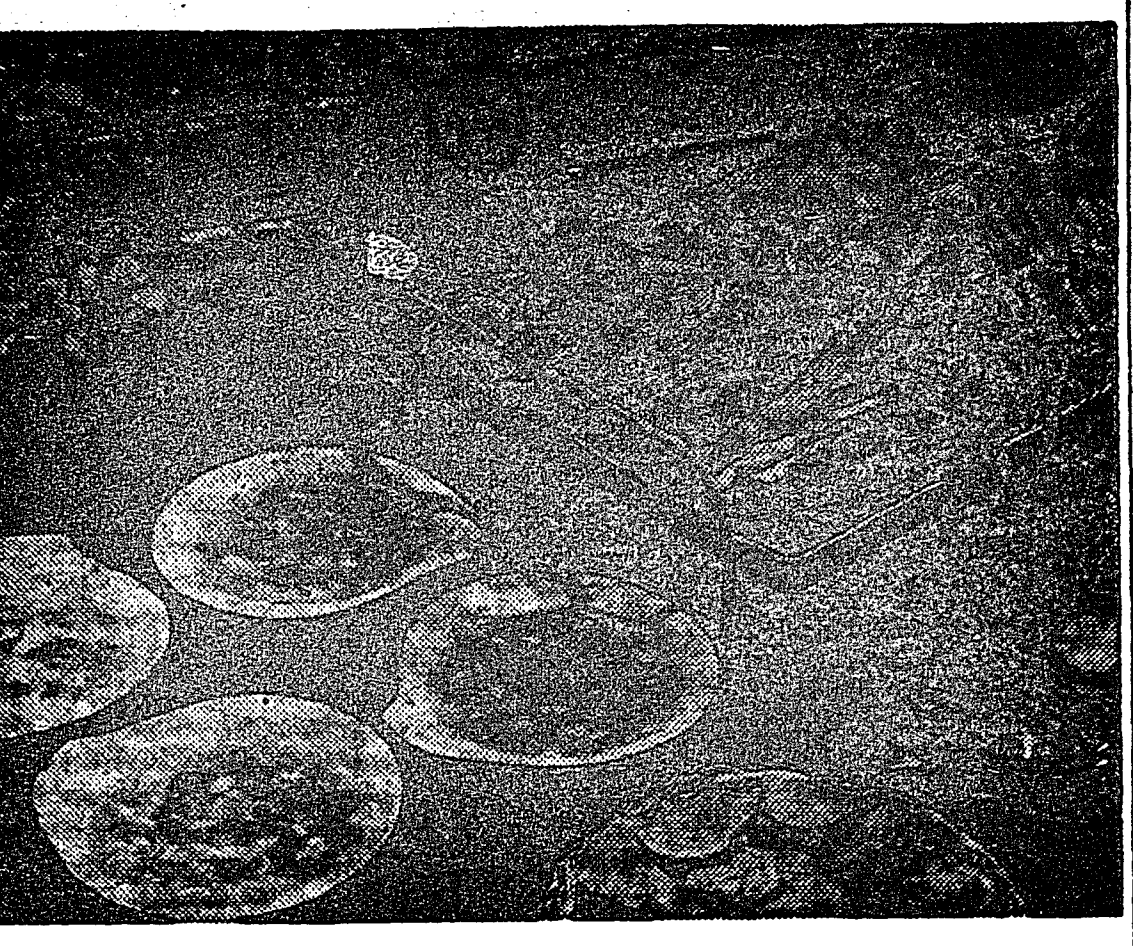

WOO APPETITES WITH SOUP, SALADS



Lunching under sunny skies, by the shade of a lacy willow tree. From such happy times come the fond memories of June, so dear to us all.

Spread the table with simple fare. Summer appetites are wooed by appetizing plain "vittles"—like hot savory soup; and makings for cool, green salads.

When you eat out on the porch or in the yard, you're eager to keep it easy. What could be easier than a pot of soup? Next to it a tray of sliced tomatoes and cucumbers, green onions, radishes, cottage cheese and/or ham strips. Then it's every man for himself; fix and mix your salad any way you like. And there's oil and vinegar to dress it. Take some potato chips to crunch with soup and salad.

The pitcher is brimful of clinking ice cubes and amber-clear tea. Just a reach-away is dessert; the glass dish heaped with sliced peaches and strawberries. Around it, chewy nut brownies.

Stir up a memorable soup to match the memorable day. Start with the good, ever-faithful soups from cans. Add one to another—for extra special like these:

- GARDEN GUMBO**
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed cream of asparagus soup
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed chicken gumbo soup
1 soup-can water

Four asparagus soup into pan; stir in gumbo soup and water. Blend and boil. Pour into 2 or 3 bowls.

TRIPLE CHICKEN SOUP
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed chicken gumbo soup
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed chicken with rice soup
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed chicken noodle soup
2 soup-cans water

Pour soups into pan; stir to blend. (For extra flavour, you may like to sprinkle in some sweet marjoram leaves.) Simmer till good and hot. Lad into 4 or 5 bowls.

Many Dads like fishing trips or similar outings. Please them by having picnic foods handy. 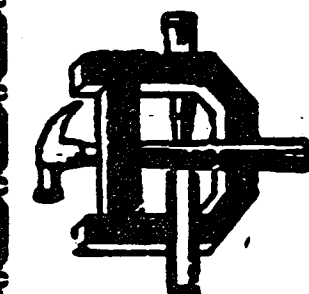

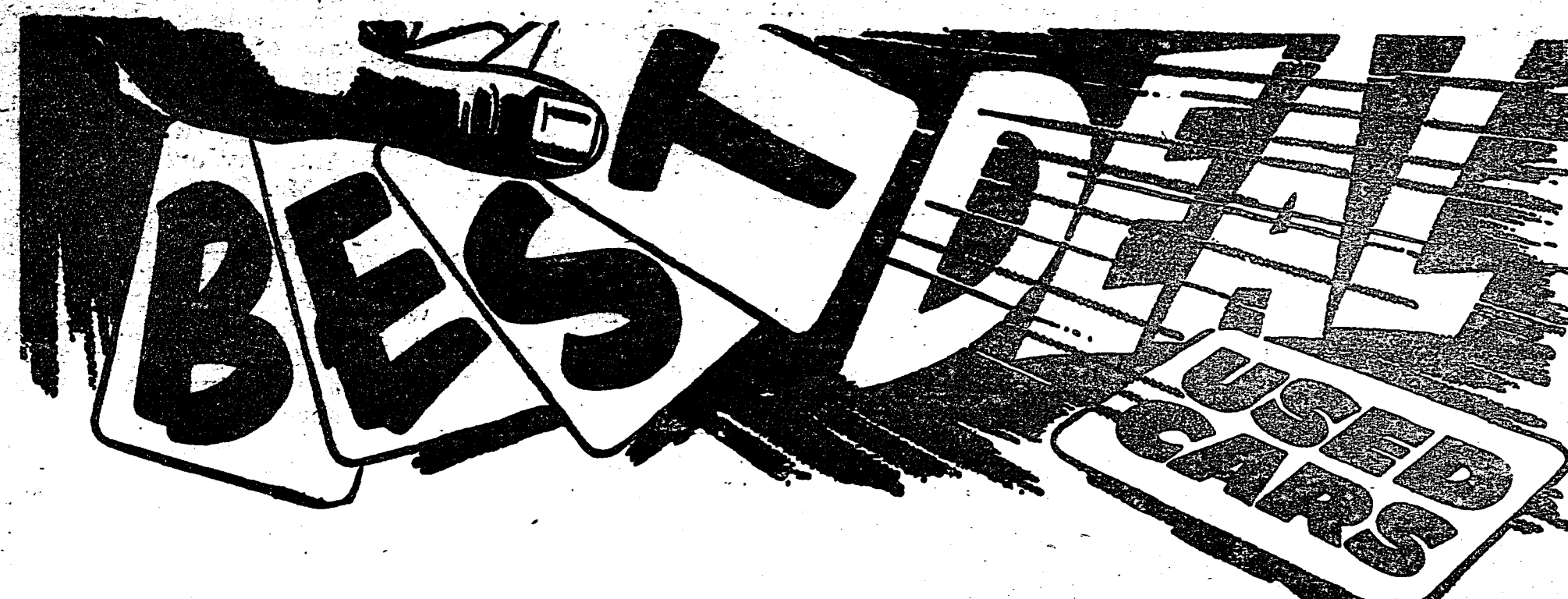

Report C.P.R. Hotels Sold

According to an unconfirmed report from Montreal, the Canadian Pacific Railway has made a package deal sale for its three hotels in western Nova Scotia—the all-year open Cornwallis Inn, Kentville; the Digby Pines; and Lakeside Inn, Yarmouth.

The latter two are outstanding summer resort hotels. The price to be received by the CPR, it is also rumored, will be a total of one million dollars. The purchaser is a company said to be headed by a Canadian multi-millionaire and is entirely Canadian-owned.

The Cornwallis Inn alone is estimated to cost almost a million dollars and the new Digby Pines more than double that amount. Lakeside Inn, it is said, cost around a million.

Canadian Pacific, following newspaper reports that the hotels were for sale, confirmed the rumor, but later gave assurance that the Lakeside and Pines would operate as usual until early fall, and the Cornwallis Inn until next January 1.

If the Montreal report is correct the loss of CPR operations to Nova Scotia will be, it is felt, a serious one, because of the tremendous amount of publicity these hotels receive both in Canada and the United States. The Montreal report also said that the "new operators" will unquestionably be seeking cocktail lounge licenses, and may base their final decision as to their keeping the hotels open on the matter of the lounges.

Electric Sales Increased

According to a statement released this week by officials of the Digby County Power Board, the consumption of electrical energy in Digby County for the first six months of 1957 was up 11.3% of the corresponding period for last year.

Increased consumption was shown in all communities in the county with rural areas showing the greatest gain. Of the four major customers supplied by the Digby County Power Board, the Municipality of Clare showed the largest increase. In Clare sales rose from 1,174,800 kilowatt hours in 1956 to 1,416,000 kwhrs. in 1957 for a gain of 20.5%. In the Municipality of Digby the gain was 11.7%, while the village of Weymouth showed an increase of 7.95%. The increase in the town of Digby was 3.96%.

The total consumption of power on the Digby County Power Board system for the first six months of 1957 was 5,881,426 kilowatt hours. It is estimated that if the present rate of increase continues, total consumption in Digby County for 1957 will be about twelve and a quarter million kilowatt hours. This will be about double the total consumption in 1949.

Power Board officials say that despite the dry weather that has been experienced in this locality this year, the number of kilowatt hours of electrical energy generated by the Digby County Power Board for the first six months of 1957 has increased 4.6% over the amount generated in the same period last year. Water resources in the Board's flowage area are said to be about normal for the time of year.

Scouts Leave For Jamboree

Queen Scout John Hawkins and First Class Scout Douglas Wright leave this weekend for Sutton Coldfield near Birmingham, England, to attend the Jubilee Jamboree of world Boy Scouts. Some 35,000 Scouts from over eighty countries will attend the Jamboree, which marks the fiftieth anniversary of the Boy Scout movement and the centenary of its founder, Lord Baden Powell.

Scouts Hawkins and Wright, from the Digby Scout Troop, will be among one thousand, three hundred and sixty-four Canadian Scouts and leaders attending the world Jamboree. The group will fly to England between July 17 to 29th, and it is understood the air lift of the Scouts and leaders across the Atlantic will establish a new record for mass air lifts from Canada to the United Kingdom.

The two Digby Scouts will leave Saturday to join other Canadian Scouts for a flight to England. It is understood the boys will fly in Super Constellation planes of the Flying Tiger Airlines, with some of the Scouts from the Maritimes travelling in Maritime Central Airways DC4's.

Financing their expenses to the Jamboree has posed a problem for many Jamboree participants. Many of the Scouts have worked long and hard to raise funds needed to help finance the trip. Financial assistance has also been forthcoming from groups and individuals in many of the localities from which Scouts are going to attend the Jamboree.

In this connection District Scout Commissioner Norman D. Wright has expressed his appreciation on behalf of the Digby Scouts attending the Jamboree for the assistance received by these boys to help them finance the trip. Commissioner Wright says that monetary donations for this purpose are still welcome as funds are still needed to help finance the attendance of the two Digby boys at the Jamboree and he says receipts will be issued for all donations received.

In many communities across the country projects have been organized to help raise the needed funds to enable the local Scouts chosen for the honour to attend the Jamboree. In this area an effort has been made to secure donations from organizations and individuals for this purpose and Commissioner Wright says donations are still more than welcome.

Well, my father was given a job at one dollar a day and I being sixteen years old, was given one at fifty cents for a ten hour day. And did we work hard. My grandfather saying, 'Boys, if we make a good showing we may get more money next year.' And it was so with fishing. There were lots of pollock in those days but we had to catch them and dry them and take them to Bear River and trade them for what we needed for \$1.50 for 112 pounds. Then at the age of 21, I went in the spring to Newburyport, Mass., and there hired on a large dairy farm, where they had sixty cows. I had 12 cows to milk. I had to get up at 4 in the morning to have my 12 cows milked at 6 in the morning. We had to sign papers that we would not leave the farm for eight months during the spring, summer and fall, and were given 18 dollars a month. If you left you got no pay, but you could draw \$5 a month. This I was told was to protect the farmer during the 'busy' year. Then I came home and remained a year, but as times had not improved, I since."

Digby Child Killed By Car

Lorraine Dale Twohig, three and one half year old daughter of Mrs. Edward Waldo Twohig, Digby, passed away at Blanchard Fraser Memorial hospital, Kentville, Tuesday, soon after being admitted, after being struck by an automobile on East Main Street.

It was the first motor vehicle fatality in Kentville since 1950. Basil Duncanson, 23, Avonport, reported to be driver of the car, is in hospital with a broken jaw and nose.

These injuries were suffered, police state, when, in attempting to avoid hitting the child, he swerved his car and it crashed into a large maple tree.

Dr. A. H. Giffin is in attendance. Duncanson, by his quick action, according to police, almost cleared striking the little girl, but she is believed to have been struck a glancing blow.

Chief of police, John H. Brown, said that according to report, the child ran directly in front of the car while playing. The child went to Kentville three days before the accident from Digby, where her father is manager of H. R. Doane and Company office, and had been visiting her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Twohig.

With coroner H. C. Lindsay presiding, an inquest was opened Monday evening and following identification, was adjourned to an indefinite date, pending recovery of Mr. Duncanson.

The remains are resting at the Lindsay funeral home, and will be taken to the Kentville United Church for funeral services at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Rev. K. G. Sullivan will officiate. Interment will be in Elm Grove cemetery, Kentville.

Her mother is the former June Sainsbury, Amherst. Surviving besides her parents are one sister, Beatrice, age 20 months, and one brother, John, 3 months.

Society Official Visits Digby

Mr. Gordon E. Brown, Director of Public Information for the State Charities Association of New York, was a visitor in Digby last week.

While in Digby Mr. Brown, who in October will become Executive Director of the State Charities Association, conferred with Dr. A. H. Leighton, Director of the Cornell Program for Research in Community Development; Dr. Herbert Davies, head of the Digby Psychiatric Clinic, Mental Health Society officials in Digby and Yarmouth and others in the area directly interested in health and welfare services.

The State Charities Aid Association for which Mr. Brown has been Public Relations Director for the past eight years and which he will head as Executive Director in October, is a voluntary organization in health and welfare and was organized in 1872. Operating throughout New York state, it conducts programs through such components as the New York State Society for Mental Health, State Committee on Tuberculosis and Public Health, State Committee on Children and Public Welfare, Child Adoption Service and others.

The organization, which was founded by Miss Louisa Lee Schuyler, great granddaughter of Alexander Hamilton, has pioneered in many fields of health and public welfare. Particularly effective have been efforts in the field of public health, in the control and eradication of tuberculosis. In this the association promoted the now familiar mass X-ray technique by means of mobile clinics.

Before leaving Digby Mr. Brown expressed himself as keenly interested in what he had learned of the research and other work being carried out in this area and stated he felt findings could be translated into action programs to assist this organization.

Priest Dies In Church

A sudden Mass of Requiem was held in St. Anne's Church, Eel Brook, Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock for Rev. Father Joseph Denis Comeau who passed away suddenly while celebrating Mass in his church Saturday morning.

Celebrant for the funeral Mass was Monsignor Emile Bourneuf, V.G., of Meteghan, with Rev. Louis LeBlanc, Eel Brook, as deacon, and Rev. Louis Surette, Quinan, as sub deacon.

Father Comeau was taken ill suddenly while saying Mass and was assisted to a chair by George Clements who was singing Mass and Regis Potcher, an altar boy. He died within minutes. Father Louis LeBlanc administered last rites and finished the service.

The remains were taken to Sweeney's funeral home, and Sunday afternoon were removed to St. Anne's church where a large number of people paid their respects.

The highly respected priest was 64 years old, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Etienne Comeau, of St. Alphonse de Clare, Digby county. Given encouragement and assistance by the late Msgr. Cote, of Meteghan, Father Comeau was ordained in 1915 and was stationed in Amherst as curate immediately after.

His first pastorate was in Weymouth. He then served as pastor at West Pubnico for a period of 18 years, and has been pastor at Eel Brook (St. Anne de Ruisseau) for almost 16 years.

He is survived by two brothers, Oreste, St. Bernard, and Ambrose, Meteghan; two half brothers, Fred, of New York, and Joseph, Berwick; and one half sister, Frances (Mrs. Alfred Cashman), in Ontario.

Conducting Survey

Cornell University is currently conducting a survey in the Digby area as part of a new community study recently begun at Cornell, in Ithaca, N. Y. The work here takes the form of interviews with a sample of the population, chosen by chance. The survey is being administered by a team of specially chosen interviewers.

The focus of the Cornell study is on the relationship of certain types of community agencies with the communities they serve. Little work has been completed in this field, but it is needed if agencies are to serve most usefully. The work here in Digby will be related to work done in many other areas along similar lines.

The study is being carried out by Dr. and Mrs. William Longaker, now research associates at Cornell. It is a new unit within the larger Cornell Program for Research in Community Development directed by Dr. Alexander H. Leighton, which has previously also carried out studies in this area. Dr. and Mrs. Longaker, former residents of Digby, who now live in Ithaca, are spending much of the summer here while this survey is in progress.

In "Measure for Measure" she played with Flora Robson and Robert Donat. Later she joined Sir Philip Ben Greet's famous Shakespeare Company and met Earle Grey.

Their son, Anthony, has literally grown up in the company. As a child he played walk on parts, and in teens he had minor roles in the annual Festival. He is Tranio in this production.

Lost Children Located

The people of Port Wade were glad to hear the report of the safe discovery of little Glendon and Ralph Sabean, who were lost in the woods for over 24 hours. Their companion, little Neil Hudson, separated from the little Sabean boys and wandered on an old woods road and found his way to the main road near Thorne's Cove. Neil arrived home about 3:30 p.m., some six hours after leaving home where all were playing happily in the pasture which leads to the mountain road, where they wandered away.

The RCMP were then notified and with their dog, Satan, assisted in the search. Over one hundred men were out, some having stayed out all night in the rain. The Search and Rescue helicopter searched the area also.

The search party from Litchfield and Hillsburn found the boys near the Thorne Road and handy to the Bay of Fundy shore. The men who found them were Maurice Longmire, Layton Hamilton, Hedley Chute, Leon Hamilton, Chester Hamilton and Curtis Chute.

The children seemed completely exhausted and badly scratched.

Rev. John MacLeod took the children home to their parents and Dr. Delory, of Annapolis Royal, gave them a complete check-up.

The parents were very happy to have the children safe and well at home.

Pioneer Scallop Reminisces

A real pioneer of Digby's famed scallop industry is Captain Roland Wormell, who some time ago passed his eightieth milestone. Retired from active fishing, Captain Wormell has been for some years Harbour Master in the Port of Digby.

Recalling early days in the scallop fishing industry in Digby, Captain Wormell says the industry was far different in those days than at present.

Digby fishermen, he says, were always aware there were scallops in the Bay of Fundy off Digby for they often brought them up in their fish trawls. It was not until the early twenties, however, that scalloping was started as a commercial venture in this area.

Captain Wormell says the first actual fishing for scallops was done in the Annapolis Basin with a hand rake type of drag which had been borrowed from fishermen in Chester on Nova Scotia's south shore.

First local fisherman to try for scallops along with Captain Wormell was the late W. W. Hayden. They got thirteen on the first try and doubled that to twenty-six on a second trip.

At this time the late John W. Hayden also began scalloping and ran two drags in the Bay of Fundy. These drags were manufactured in Digby by the late A. J. Trohon, who made them from a model which Captain Wormell supplied.

Six hundred scallops were harvested in this effort and this posed a real problem, that of marketing. Captain Wormell and his partners put the scallops in a water filled dory until they could dispose of them and Captain Wormell says this is when they first learned scallops could swim as quickly as other fish.

On the advice of Captain James Ellis they decided to ship their catch to Gloucester and received a price of \$2.50 per U. S. gallon, which is equal to nine pounds of scallop meats. Today scallop fishermen get generally more than forty cents a pound for their catch, which is bought up by buyers who wait on the wharf for the boats to come in.

Early efforts in the scallop industry, Captain Wormell says, were of the trial and error variety. A close count was kept of the scallops caught and efforts were also made to transplant them into the Annapolis Basin by dropping the small ones off inside the Basin. This was not successful. Shelling of the scallops was done in port and shells thrown on the beach, until it was learned the shells were hosts for the baby scallops, and then they were dumped back into the water.

First local knowledge that the hinge which joins the two shells together is the only edible portion of the scallop came when the fishermen made a chowder of the rims and became ill. Remainder of the chowder was fed

This year the Lions' Club has installed a number of attractively painted garbage cans along Water Street and plans to put in more as time passes.

The cans are painted green and each bears the Lions crest. It is hoped pedestrians will make use of the cans for papers and other refuse to assist the club in keeping Digby neat and tidy.

Roger Furlong was elected President of the Digby Ravens Baseball Club at the annual meeting, held here Monday night. Mr. Furlong succeeds Vincent G. Snow, retiring President of the club.

Other officials elected include Walter C. Letteney, Vice President, and David Leonard, Secretary-Treasurer. A unanimous vote of thanks was passed at the meeting for the work and efforts of the retiring officers who had headed the club for the past two years. They were V. G. Snow, President; M. S. Leonard, Vice President; and P. J. Comeau, Secretary-Treasurer.

It was decided at the meeting that the Digby club would register in the NSABA for the play-downs. Opinion was that it was too late in the season to do any further work on the grounds at the Digby Ball Park, but plans were made for an early start on a fall program for next year's baseball season. Roger Furlong was named to succeed E. B. Tufts as chairman of the Grounds Committee.

Enjoying English Vacation

A letter was received this week by the Editor from Mrs. Hugh Vincent who with her husband and members of the family is enjoying a vacation trip in England and visiting relatives and friends of Mr. Vincent in his birthplace, Bristol.

Mrs. Vincent in her letter says the trip over was most pleasant. Some excitement occurred on the liner when, two days out from port two stowaways were discovered. A passenger paid their tourist class fare so they continued the trip in freedom. They were met by police at Southampton when the ship docked, however.

Before docking at Southampton the liner on which the Vincent family travelled called at Le Havre and Mrs. Vincent says the trip across the English channel was very choppy and many of the passengers were ill.

In her letter Mrs. Vincent extols the beauty of the English countryside. At Bristol, she says they climbed to the top of "Cabot's Tower" where they had a beautiful view of the city. A plaque from Nova Scotia is on display, commemorating the visit in 1497 of John Cabot to Cape Breton.

A museum piece included in the display was a hooked rug eighty-five years old. Entered by Mrs. Charles VanBuskirk of Bear River East, the rug was hooked by her mother. It was in a perfect state of preservation and in raised design on burlap. Made with homespun and Berlin yarns, the rug has red scrolls made from long sleeved woolen underwear, home made dyes from onion skins, sweet apple wood and west India red-wood.

Bass Said Plentiful

Excellent catches of bass are reported from the Bear River. It is understood interest in the bass fishing contest which is presently underway is running high and that competition is keen. Although official returns to date are not known, it is understood a Smith's Cove fisherman with a twenty pound catch, is the highliner at present.

The bass fishing, which has proven very popular with local game fishing enthusiasts, is also attracting a good deal of attention from tourist fishermen and enquiries are common in Digby as to the locale of the best fishing spots on the Bear River.

Local fishing equipment suppliers report sales of heavy test lines, casting gear and rods as good, with many calls from visitors. Bait suppliers also report good sales, with squid being preferred by many.

Festival Opens August 8th

The "longest main street in America", a 40-mile stretch of Nova Scotia's trunk route 1 winding along St. Mary's Bay scenic shore from Weymouth to Beaver River in Digby county will be the focal point of the Acadian Festival of Clare, August 8 to 15.

This area is known as the French Shore of Nova Scotia, and is one continuous settlement of Acadians, and if it were not for sign posts one would not know where one village ends and another begins. It is for this unique blending of villages that the stretch has been tabbed the "longest main street in America".

Villages with such names as Grosses Coques, Saultville, Comeauville and Belliveau's Cove, emphasize the Acadian atmosphere of the district of Clare, settled by banished Acadians of Grand Pre, who, following their expulsion from Nova Scotia in 1755 returned some years later in an epic, overland march from Boston, Massachusetts. Finding their former homes and farmlands in the rich Annapolis Valley occupied, they pushed onward to St. Mary's Bay, where they settled and built homes from the dense forest which reached down to the sea.

Present-day Acadians cherish the customs, traditions and culture which the original Acadians loved so dearly and which they passed on to succeeding generations. The forthcoming Acadian Festival will vividly portray these heart-bound qualities and characteristics.

Dominating the French Shore — landmarks for mariners and of tremendous interest to visitors — are the beautiful churches of the Acadians, all of imposing structure and built by these master craftsmen.

Spires of six parish churches point heavenward between Weymouth and Beaver River, and two, which in particular, catch the eyes of visitors are St. Mary's at Church Point and St. Bernard's at St. Bernard. St. Mary's, its steeple rising a majestic 190 feet above the ground, towers over the nestling village. It is the largest wooden church in Canada.

St. Bernard's of granite stone, was 30 years in the building and is one of the most beautiful edifices in Nova Scotia. Year after year these devoted Acadians, through annual fairs and donations, raised money for its construction and watched it slowly but surely take shape. Visitors to St. Bernard's during the Acadian Festival in August will be given a vivid insight of the strong characteristics possessed by these Acadians of Nova Scotia.

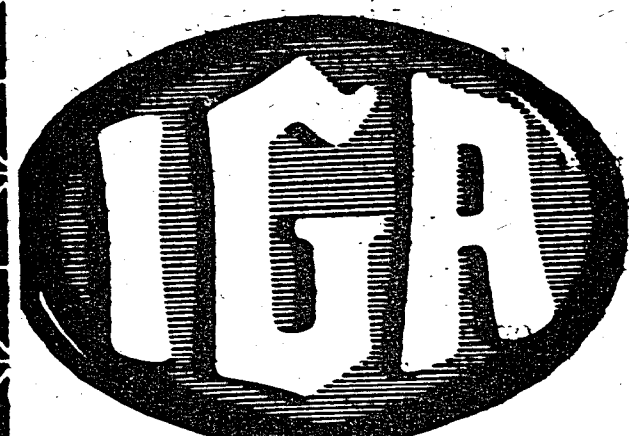

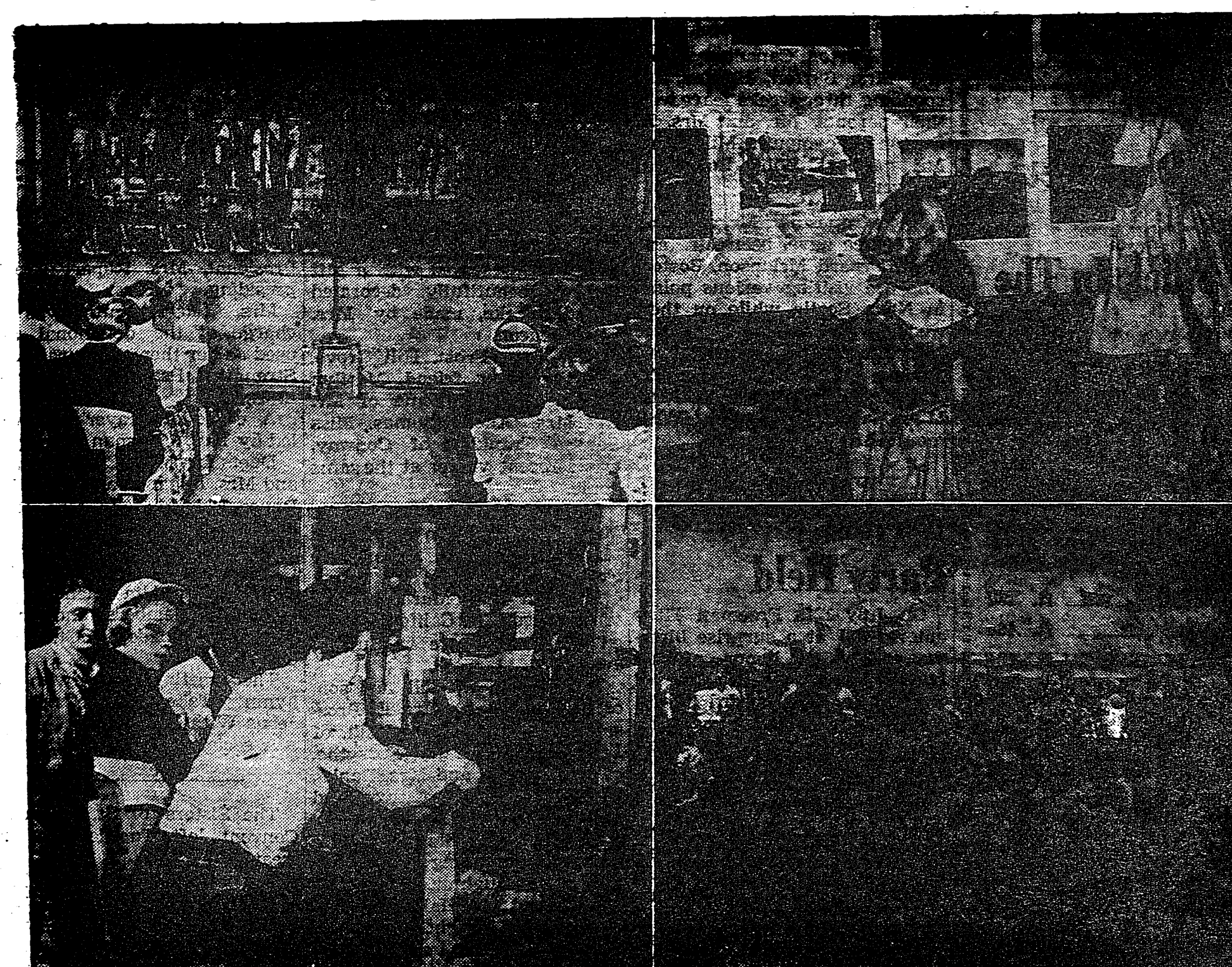

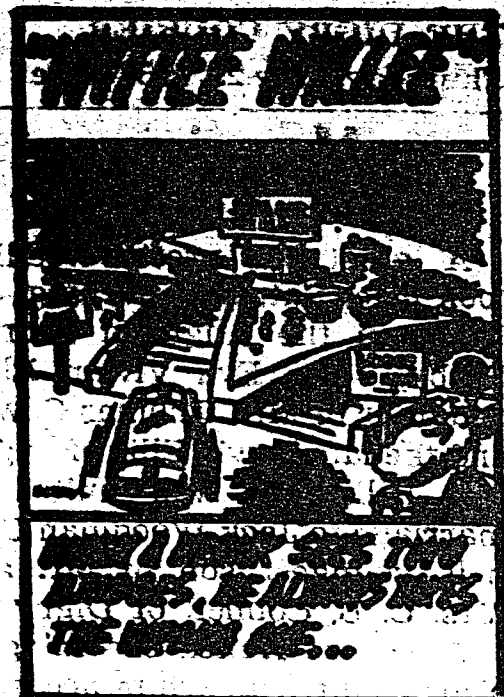

PIONEER SCALLOPER

(Continued from page 1)
to the cats, who developed paralysis.

The first boats which engaged in scalloping here were ordinary fishing boats. Captain Wormell says, and it was not until much later that specialized draggers were introduced. The drags which were first used, too, were crude affairs and not at all like the efficient ones of today, he says.

Early drags, he says, were made of marlin and later rigging wire was used for the bottom with marlin on top. The rope was done away with altogether later. Steel rings later replaced the wire and then trailers and spreader bars to increase the efficiency of the drags were introduced. At first, Captain Wormell says, there were no restrictions on the size of the drags and fishermen were trying to outdo one another with bigger and bigger drags. Finally as a conservation measure a limit of eighteen feet was placed on the drags and the size of the mesh was also limited.

During the early years of scalloping, Captain Wormell says, the scallops were found more in bunches than at present and were much larger than those caught today. Most scallops were caught in the early days about four miles off Broad Cove in the Bay of Fundy, he says. Today the boats go much further off and the fish are scattered rather than found in heavily populated "beds".

One of the first real scallop dragger was the Lizzie B., which Captain Wormell and Ernest VanTassel operated. This vessel had a length of 45 feet and beam of 14 feet. Another early scallop dragger was the sloop "Boudreau Bros."

First serious accident of scalloping was in the fall of 1924 when Captain John W. Hayden had an arm caught in the hoisting gear. The arm was so badly mangled it had to be amputated. At the time there was no hospital in Digby and Captain Hayden had to be brought into port from the fishing grounds where the accident occurred and taken over on the CPR steamer Empress to Saint John.

A later accident saw Guilford Haines taken to the bottom when his foot became entangled in the cable attached to the drags. Although he was hauled back to the surface alive, he never really recovered from his horrible experience. Since the early days many other accidents, some of them resulting in loss of life, have marred the story of scallop fishing in Digby.

In looking back over his years as a scalloper Captain Wormell says they were good years. Returns were small, he says, but scallops were quite plentiful and there was a real spirit of pioneering about it all.

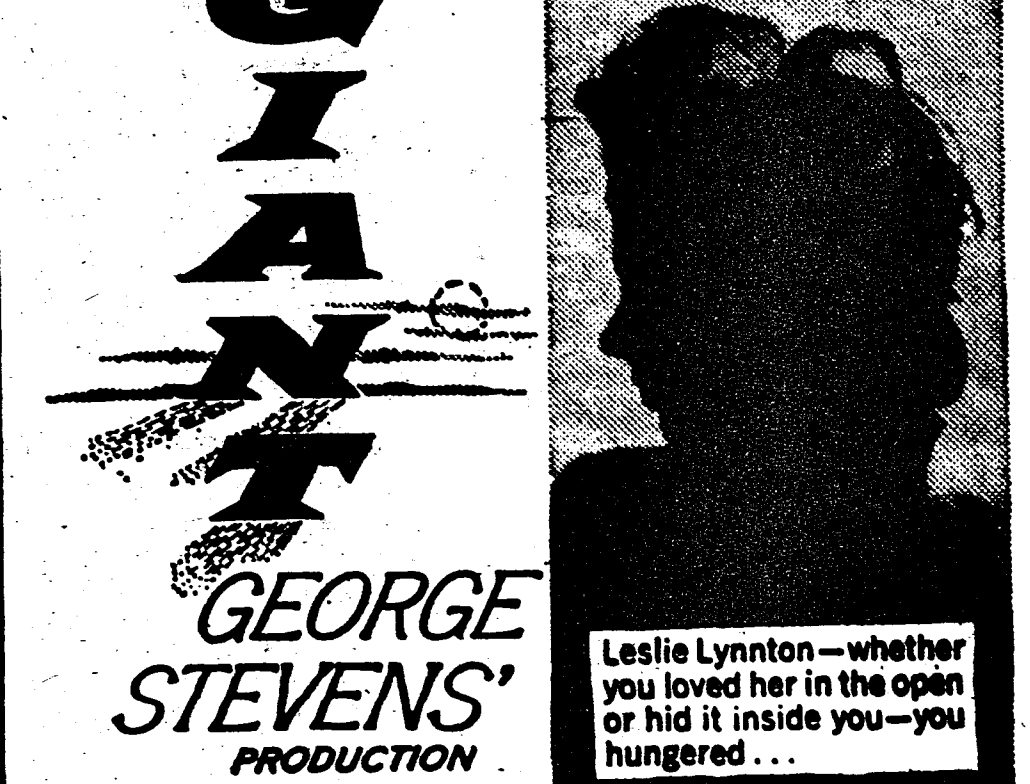

school program should make provision for those who do not desire university training, but it should guard against lowering standards for those who enter university. He was of the opinion, too, that there should not be too great a lag from the time a student leaves school until some gainful employment is found.

Increases of \$1,000 in salaries for two full-time and two part-time workers in the federation, besides smaller increases in other essentials brings next year's proposed expenditures up to \$19,490. Money expected from receipts totals only \$15,550.

The federation will also receive less money to work with in accordance with an agreement between the Nova Scotia government and the federation. The annual government grant will be \$5,000 next year, \$1,000 less than this year.

In presenting the budget, C. B. Havey, acting finance chairman, told the delegates that the federation could work on a deficit this year because of surpluses over the past two years. But, he cautioned that more money would have to be found next year to carry on the federation's work and proposed an increase in the provincial body's per capita tax on all members.

The meeting, after thorough discussion, voted to adopt Mr. Havey's suggestion that the fee be increased to one dollar a member and that this figure would cover the subscription fees to the Home and School News, published five times a year by the federation, and also the money paid by each association into the travel equalization fund. These two items were paid for individually.

The per capita fee had previously been 35 cents per member.

Among the resolutions passed was one calling for the appointment of a provincial director of music, increased dental services in rural areas and for highway legislation regarding traffic passing school buses.

The resolution regarding music also urges the minister of education to include music in the foundation program to the end of Grade 8.

The Halifax County Council of Home and School Associations endorsed a resolution that the Federation of Home and School Associations request legislation be enacted to require that all traffic moving in either direction, come to a complete stop rather than pass a school bus which has stopped to load or unload pupils, and remain stopped until either the bus moves on, or the driver of the bus signals traffic to resume.

At present, there is no Nova Scotia law or regulation to prevent traffic from passing a school bus which has stopped on the highway, and the council noted that accidents have occurred in which pupils sustained injuries while crossing the highway to enter or leave school buses.

The federation board of directors revised a resolution asking for increased dental services for children in remote rural areas.

Delegates unanimously approved a further recommendation from the board of directors asking the association to "commend the CBC on its progress made in developing a program of school telecasts". The resolution urged the development of a school television program with a view to producing an annual series of school telecasts comparable in scope to the present series of school radio broadcasts.

Early in the convention an outline of the federation's 1957-58 program was adopted. Based on the "felt needs" of members, it lists the following topics for study: (1) School education, including the philosophy behind public school education in Nova Scotia; an analysis of the technique and method of teaching presently being used in provincial schools; and the channelling of information to home and school members in order to establish a better relationship between the home and school; (2) continued study of curriculum; (3) more emphasis on teacher retention and recruitment; and (4) Canadian family life study. Teacher recruitment and re-

Many Attend Convention

The largest religious convention ever held in the Maritimes was the five-day convention held by Jehovah's witnesses in the Moncton High School Auditorium. It ended Sunday on a highly successful note as an enthusiastic audience of 2,169 Jehovah's witnesses heard Percy Chapman, Superintendent of Ministers in Canada, speak on the subject "Healing of the Nations Has Drawn Near." Tired, but happy, the conventioners left Sunday night by car, air, bus and train, while hundreds of volunteers began to quickly dismantle with the efficiency for which they have become famous. In a matter of hours, equipment was completely removed from the auditorium.

At a very interesting and colorful service held in the beautiful Natural Park Swimming Pool, 47 were baptized by complete water immersion. Delegates attended from nine provinces and ten states.

Theme of the five-day convention was "Life-Giving Wisdom". An intensive study was made of the "Wisdom" books of the Bible - Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon. Leading ministers of the organization delivered lectures and reaffirmed the aims and purposes of Jehovah's witnesses as students of the Bible.

On Saturday afternoon conventioners were delighted when Volume 3 of the New World Translation of the Hebrew Scriptures embracing the "Wisdom" books was made available to them.

Preceding the release Mr. Chapman delivered a lecture based on the New World Translation of the Bible book on Canticles, otherwise known as "The Song of Solomon." In an interview Mr. Chapman explained the present-day need for this new accurate translation: "The King James Version of the Bible compiled in 1611 no longer speaks to this generation with a living, understandable voice. Many of its words and expressions are archaic and confusing. The New World Translation is a fresh translation from the original Hebrew and Greek languages. It is designed to make the Bible speak with its original dynamic force for the average reader of English."

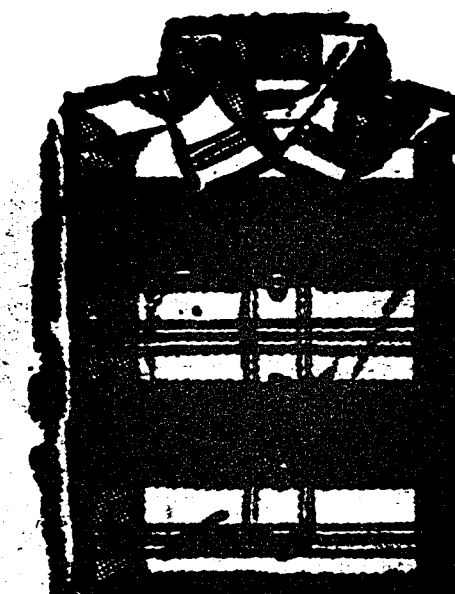

Addresses Lions Club

The situation with regard to juvenile delinquency in Nova Scotia is not very serious, stated Joseph Grandy, Supervisor of Delinquency Services for Nova Scotia, in an address before the Digby Lions Club here Tuesday night. Mr. Grandy was guest speaker at the first annual banquet meeting of the Digby Club which was organized just one year ago.

In the past year, Mr. Grandy said, there were only two cases in the province in which juveniles were committed for crimes against persons. Most juvenile crimes or delinquency in this province, he said, are directed against property.

The total number of cases of juvenile delinquency in Canada, Mr. Grandy said, has declined from a peak of 12,000 in one year during the second world war, to an annual figure of about six thousand. Statistics show, he said, that 75% of the cases occur in urban areas.

Juvenile delinquents, Mr. Grandy said, are not born that way, nor do they just happen. He said they are made and are the products of unsettled homes, economic difficulties, environment and other causes. The juvenile delinquent is a youngster whose development has been uneven and who seeks an outlet for his feelings of inadequacy and other emotional problems.

In resorting to crime the delinquent, Mr. Grandy said, is taking a short cut to an end and in vandalism he secures emotional satisfaction. Essentially the juvenile delinquent is a sick person and there is no single answer or cure for the illness that afflicts him.

It is a mistake, Mr. Grandy said, to make comic books the scapegoat in the matter of juvenile delinquency. Neither comic books nor the singing of Elvis Presley are the basic factors in the development of juveniles. Causes vary with the individual youth, and there is no "package deal" remedy. These youngsters are really sick, he said, and need help. Unfortunately we do not know all the answers to the problem of juvenile delinquency and we must acknowledge our limitations in this regard.

In dealing with the problem of juvenile delinquency, he said, the big question is how to keep the youngsters out of trouble and not so much what to do with them after trouble occurs.

We must work toward creating a healthy life for our youth, he said, for happy, healthy youngsters are not delinquents. This is a job for everyone, Mr. Grandy said. We must work together to make our homes and communities better places in which to live. No child should be allowed to suffer from economic want or to feel he is unwanted and unloved, either in his home or community.

As part of the battle against juvenile delinquency, Mr. Grandy said, it is important that good schools with qualified teachers are provided. With these must go adequate play and recreational facilities for youth and proper health services. Protection against improper influences must be provided and every effort made to see that all in the community live according to a high moral code.

Mr. Grandy was introduced by Earle Crane, Secretary of the club, who presided at the gathering, due to the fact Mr. Ernest B. Tufts, President of the Digby Lions Club, was unable to be present due to the death of his father.

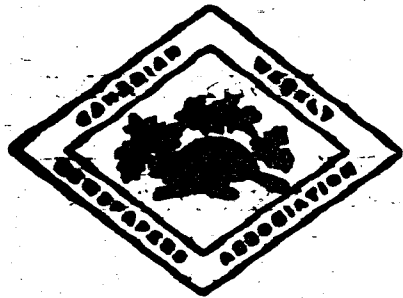

About This and That

Save The Children

In little more than a month, young children will be starting to school for the first time and anxious parents will worry through the moments until they feel their children have arrived safely at school whether they've trekked the distance by foot or encounter the dangers of entering and discharging from the school bus.

As noted by the press, members of the Nova Scotia Home and School Federation took measures regarding traffic recently which they hope will eliminate some of the hazards to the bus riding school children. They passed a resolution requesting that legislation be enacted to require that all traffic moving in either direction, come to a complete stop rather than pass a school bus which has stopped to load or unload pupils, and remain stopped until either the bus moves on, or the driver of the bus signals traffic to resume.

We suggest, however, that the responsibility be not left entirely in the lap of the vehicle operators but that it should be a two fold responsibility. Children's minds are prone to wander and drivers must ever bear regard to this, but we also go along with the Canadian Highway Safety Conference in recommending that if you are a member of a Parent-Teacher or Home and School group, constantly bring to the attention of the parents and teachers their responsibilities in keeping the children alert to traffic dangers and training them in traffic safety. Parents must always be reminded, too, that pre-school children should be taught basic safety actions and thoughts as soon as they are advanced enough to retain them.

Encourage discussions, debates, panels, speeches, special programs, motion pictures, lectures and seminars on safe driving and safe walking. Valuable aids can be obtained from various traffic councils and agencies and from the Canadian Highway Safety Conferences at 272 Somerset St. West, in Ottawa.

Born on May 15, 1914, he is descended from ancestors who emigrated from Scotland to Prince Edward Island in 1837. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Mount Allison University, Sackville, N. B., and also attended the University of British Columbia. He is a member of the Board of Regents of Mount Allison. He was married in 1952 to Gwendolyn Esther Burwash and they have three children. They make their home on his farm at Lewis.

From 1939 to 1947 Mr. MacLean served with the R.C.A.F., and while overseas was awarded the D.F.C. At the present time he holds the rank of Wing-Commander in the R. C. A. F. (Reserve). He is a member of the United Services Officers' Club, Charlottetown, the R.C.A.F. Association, the R.A.F. Escaping Society, and the Masonic Lodge, A.F. and A.M.

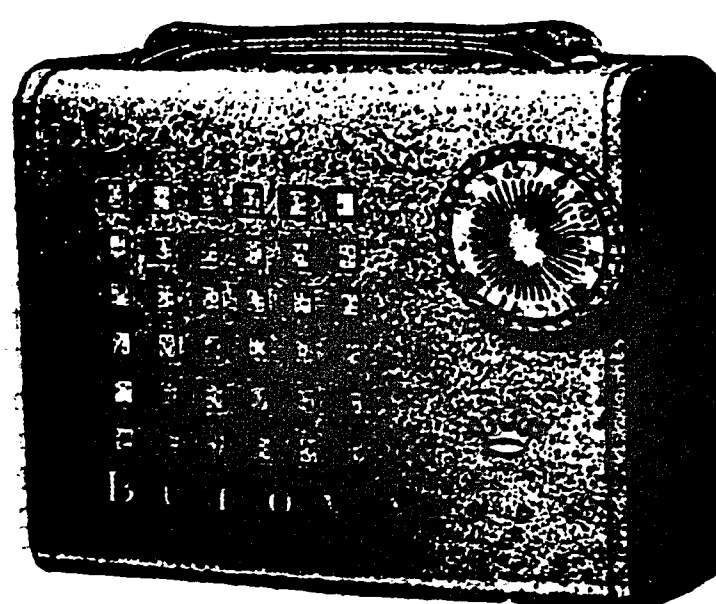

Appointed Announced



The appointment of Douglas W. Gonder as Vice-President and General Manager of the Atlantic Region of Canadian National Railways was announced here July 16th by Stanley F. Dingle, vice-president, operation, for the system. He succeeds Reginald Hayes who is retiring on July 31st under the pension rules of the company.

Mr. Gonder brings to his new position a sound and thorough knowledge of operational methods and procedures, and through his previous association with the Atlantic Region as general supt. of motive power and car equipment, possesses an intimate knowledge of this important part of the vast Canadian National Railway System. In 1953, when the C.N.R. introduced a staff training course for the training of senior officers in administration, Mr. Gonder became its first director and played an important part in its successful development.

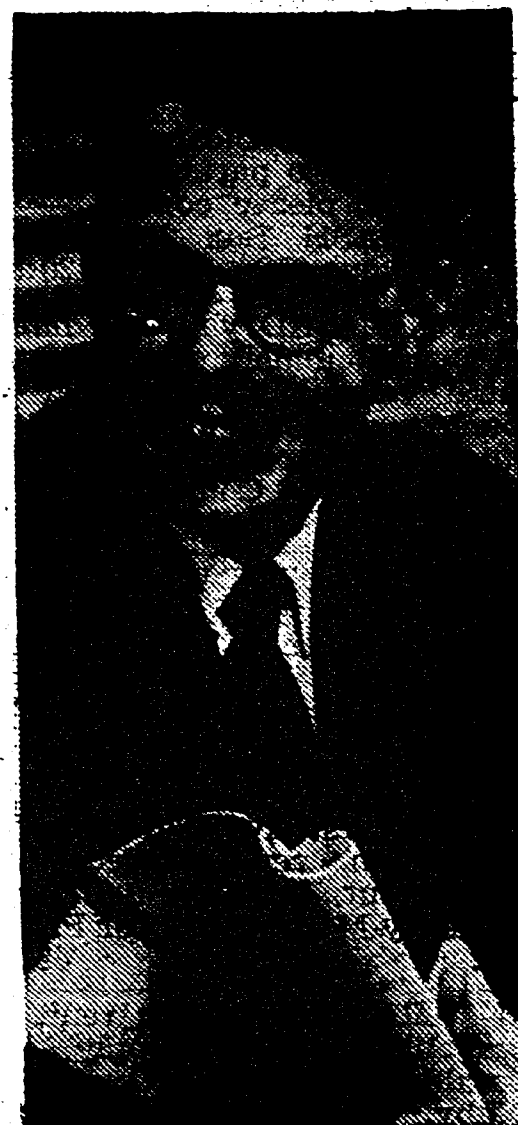

New Service For Pre-School Blind

The Maritime Division of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind is inaugurating a new service for pre-school age blind children and their parents, announced Mr. F. H. Flinn, Divisional Superintendent. Mr. Flinn explained that there is a real and urgent need on the part of blind children of pre-school age and of their parents for guidance and assistance in order to insure that such children will be given every opportunity to develop to the maximum of their ability — the ultimate goal being an adult confident in his ability to take his part both economically and socially in a sighted world.

The needs of the blind child are the same as for all children, varying only in degree. The blind child needs what all children must have to develop fully, but his need is much more intense and so makes greater demands on his parents. Love and affection — a secure place in his family from his earliest years — the opportunity and satisfaction that come from doing and achieving according to his ability — being regarded

as a person of worth. He must have these satisfactions if he is to grow into a real person. Because of his complete dependence on his parents, it must be through them that he obtains his confidence to reach out to the world around him. The parents of these children have needs also. On learning of their child's blindness, they are unprepared emotionally to accept it with all its implications for the child, for themselves and the family. They need time and help in achieving an attitude of acceptance toward

their child.

Parents feel inadequate in knowledge and skill as they face their responsibility in teaching and training their blind child. They find the demands on their understanding, imagination, time, effort and patience, difficult, and so need understanding, help and backing in their job of parenthood.

In the light of the needs of the parents and child the focus is on the provision of service which will strengthen a healthy bond between the child and his parents and will help the parents feel and grow more adequate in meeting their child's needs. The service is one of home visiting to the parents. Through these visits, the worker makes available information relating to the care and training of blind children — offering an opportunity for the parents to discuss plans for their child — telling of community resources which would be of help to further these plans. The worker acts as liaison between the family and these community resources. These visits also give parents the opportunity to ask for advice and help on specific problems dealing with the child's routine and training. There are some thirty of these children throughout the Maritimes known to the Institute at the present time, said Mr. Flinn. He pointed out that the importance of this service to the parents and guardians of pre-school age blind children cannot be over emphasized and he urged all such persons to contact without delay their nearest C.N.I.B. office to request assistance. This further service of the Institute is without cost.

Appointment Made

Hon. G. I. Smith, Minister of Highways, recently announced the appointment of John R. Fiske, P. Eng., as Traffic Authority for the province. Mr. Fiske recently returned to his duties with the Department upon completion of a post-graduate course in Traffic Engineering at Yale University. This appointment is being made, said Mr. Smith, as one step in the government's programme to deal effectively with the problem of highway safety. Formerly the duties of this appointment were performed by E. S. Campbell, Registrar of Motor Vehicles. The increase in the volume of work in the Motor Vehicle Branch and other specialized duties of the appointed Registrar make it impossible for Mr. Campbell to continue to give sufficient attention to the problems which must be dealt with by the Traffic Authority. Among matters dealt with by the Traffic Authority are speed zones, speed limits, traffic control measures and liaison with incorporated towns and villages on questions of traffic control and engineering and technical matters involved in highway safety.

The government feels that the appointment of Mr. Fiske will prove of material benefit in the continuing effort to improve safety on our highways, said the Minister. A native of Clarence, Annapolis County, Mr. Fiske was educated at Annapolis Royal Academy, Acadia University and Nova Scotia Technical College, from which he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Civil Engineering.

His appointment as Traffic Authority became effective July 1, 1957. He has held appointments with the Department of Highways as resident-engineer 1949-52 and 1954-55. He was appointed Assistant to the Registrar of Motor Vehicles in September 1955. From 1952-54 Mr. Fiske was engaged in private practice with a consulting engineer.

This appointment is one in a series of steps to be taken as the result of the government's determination to improve highway safety and traffic control. The Minister said. Mr. Fiske will maintain the closest liaison with all traffic authorities and law enforcement agencies with a view to engineering improvement in the field of highway safety.

The problem has become so acute he continued, that only by a systematic and concerted effort can we hope to approach a solution.

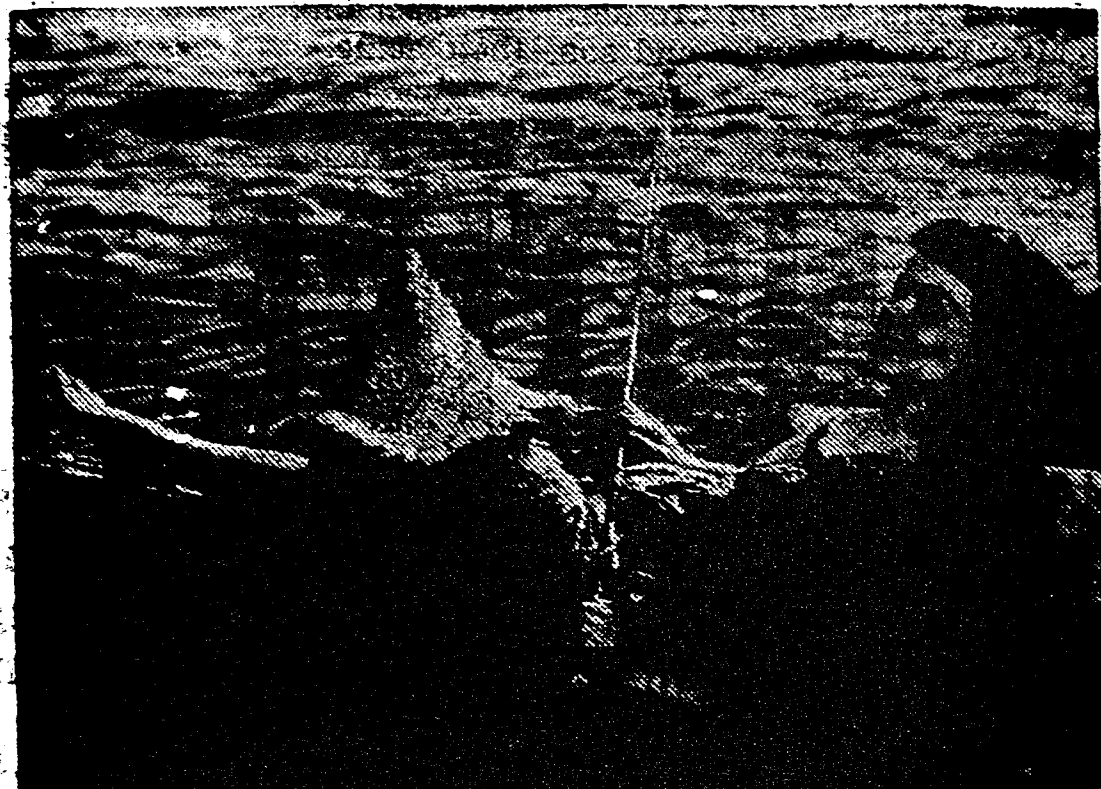

Slow Down And Live

Nova Scotia's Premier, the Hon. Robert L. Stanfield, has affirmed the support of this Province for the current continent-wide Traffic Safety campaign. A few figures taken from a newspaper report, may help to point up the urgency of this:

"The chances of a person avoiding an accident in his or her lifetime are roughly 50-50."

"The majority of fatal accidents take place within 25 miles of the 'victims' homes."

"An automobile travelling at 30 miles an hour and hitting a solid wall projects a passenger's body forward at a speed of 44 feet a second."

"In 1956, more than 56 per cent of all fatalities occurred on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays."

These figures, striking in themselves, tell only a part of the story. A man whose life work was concerned with road safety once stated a personal opinion that, if the full facts were known, over 99 per cent of traffic accidents would be classed as due to human failure rather than mechanical.

What he meant by "the full facts" was that, where an accident may be put down to the failure of a vehicle's brakes, (and therefore classed as a mechanical fault), if the driver was aware of a weakness in his brakes before he set out on his trip, the fault is wrongly classed — it should really be classed as a human one.

So, if the cause of accidents is human failing, it is entirely up to ourselves whether we have accidents or not. We all know the rules of safe driving — make sure we are rested, keep clear of strong drink, take it easy on long trips, with occasional stops for a cup of tea or coffee, obey speed limits and traffic signs, be especially cautious in bad weather or at night.

These are but a few of the things we can do to save life on the road. A little thought would produce many more.

Road safety is not really a difficult problem. A mathematician would delight in its simple logic. Two stationary vehicles can not collide. Two moving vehicles colliding do so at the sum of their individual speeds. It's as simple as that — the faster we go, the greater our danger. If we want to live, we must slow down.

Postmaster Retires

Major R. J. Vroom, postmaster at Deep Brook, Anna Co., since April 9, 1935, retired on Saturday, August 10, having served the public faithfully for over 22 years.

Mr. Vroom was born in Deep Brook and comes from one of the first families to settle in this community, first known as "Lower Dutch Shore". Mr. Vroom's grandfather, H. F. Vroom, was Deep Brook's first postmaster, serving in 1869, when 2c was the postal letter rate, and 23c would mail a letter not exceeding 1/2 ounce to England (sent in Mail Steam Packets, sailing weekly from Quebec in summer, from Portland in winter, and fortnightly from Halifax, N. S.). Quite a contrast to postal mail service today!

Mr. Vroom during his period of postal service has seen letter rates jump from 2c to the present 5c rate, and also has had the experience of seeing frequent issues of Canadian stamp designs which are of special interest to stamp collectors.

During his term of postal service Mr. Vroom also carried the mail from Deep Brook Railway station (removed in 1956) to and from the Post Office. During the building of the Cornwallis Naval Base and up until the Post Office was erected at Cornwallis, all mail passed through Deep Brook office. Mr. Vroom also served the rural route, including Waldec West, which has been delivered by horse and buggy, by jeep, and by automobile.

His wife, Winnie, who served faithfully and graciously as assistant, will also be missed by the public. During Mr. Vroom's time spent in the Army service she carried the postal service on alone for 13 months.

Even postmasters get "lashed to the mast". Mr. Vroom said, recalling the time he was quarantined in the Post Office building during a poliomyelitis outbreak in the family in 1942.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Vroom express the pleasure they have had in serving the public and hope the same goodwill and co-operation they have experienced will be passed on to their successor, Mr. Laurence L. Snell.

Mr. Snell was born in Bear River, attended Oakdene School, served in overseas service from 1917 to 1919, attended Acadia University 1919-20. He spent the next 21 years in Sydney, Cape Breton, representing the Maple Leaf Milling Co. for the greater part of that time. In 1941 he was appointed Halifax manager for the same company, residing in Bedford until 1955, when he and family moved to Deep Brook in 1956, upon retirement, residing in the residence of his late aunt, Mrs. Ada Sherman.

A Changed Picture

Residents of Digby have been witnessing over the past few weeks a complete reversal of the usual custom here so far as the fishing industry is concerned.

In years gone by hundreds of thousands of pounds of fish were brought into Digby by truck and other transport from fishing ports in various sections of the county to be processed here.

Today this picture has completely changed so that, in the past few weeks, thousands of pounds of fish landed at the pier here in Digby have been trucked almost as soon as they were landed to fish processing plants located in the villages of Digby Neck and other areas of the county. A large fish processing plant in Digby in the meantime remains almost entirely idle except for its fish meal operation.

Pitprop Business At Standstill

Purchases of pitprops have been halted by dealers in this area, due to lack of contracts, it is understood.

Cessation of this business, which has been a lucrative one for many woodlot owners and farmers in western Nova Scotia, is a severe blow to the economy of the area. Many farmers and woodlot owners counted heavily on the sale of pitprops, cut from their own lands, to provide them with a cash income at slack seasons of the year.

It is also understood pulpwood purchases by local dealers are being curtailed. This too is having a severe effect on the local economy as is the generally poor picture so far as the lumbering industry is concerned.

Local Golfers In Maritime Open

On the second day of play Mr. Snow was in competition with Mr. J. C. Sears, of Fredericton, who will represent New Brunswick on the Wellington Cup team, and who defeated Mr. Snow on the eighteenth hole.

Bluenose Traffic Tops All Records

More passengers and motor vehicles were carried on the luxury ferry "Bluenose" during July than in any month since the ship was commissioned in January 1956, officials of Canadian National Railways said in Yarmouth.

On a daily schedule between Yarmouth and Bar Harbor, Me., the "Bluenose" during July carried 28,786 passengers and 8,294 vehicles. The nearest approach to these totals was made in July of 1956, when there were 28,157 passengers and 8,142 vehicles.

Traffic was pretty evenly distributed in either direction, CNR passenger department officials said, with a slightly larger number of people traveling from Bar Harbor than from Yarmouth.

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Constable Not Blamed

A coroner's jury at Kentville has absolved an RCMP constable of any blame in the accident which on July 30 claimed the life of Mrs. Herbert Berry, 48, of Brookline, Mass. Coroner Dr. L. E. Cogswell, Berwick, presided and Jack Storie, Kentville, was jury foreman.

Verdict of the jury was to the effect that Mrs. Berry died in a collision with a car driven by a constable following multiple injuries suffered when struck by a car driven by Sgt. Robert Clifford. The verdict added "the jury does not feel that the car driver was to blame in any way whatsoever."

According to evidence Mrs. Berry, the former Beatrice Dexter, of Digby, was visiting her sister, Mrs. Ernest Buder, of West Park Street. On the afternoon in question she was crossing the street to a mail box when struck by the car. Sgt. Clifford was on duty, driving to Meteghan where he was to be relieving officer.

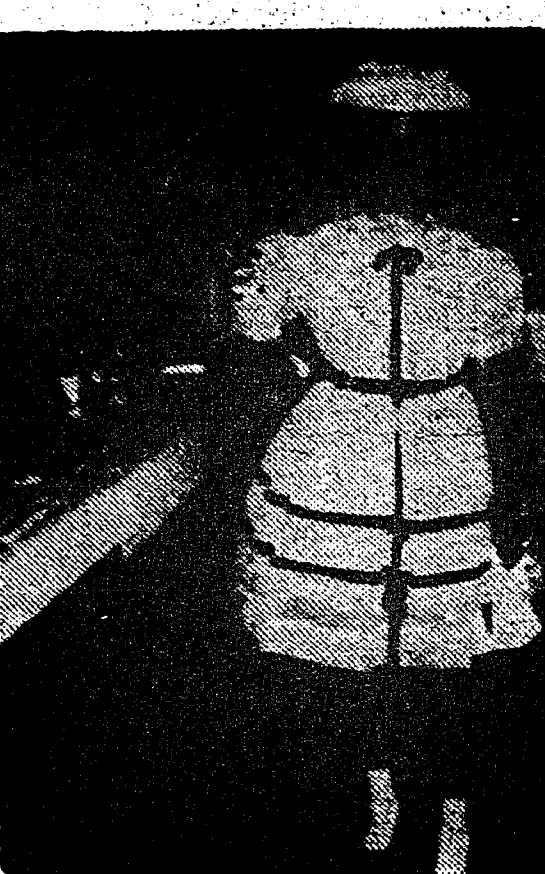
Escape Injury

The Ridge Hydro Development as Narrow Escape

The public is invited to attend today at noon the official opening of the new hydro electric development, known as the Ridge Development.

Premier Robert L. Stanfield will open the new development and other officials present will include Morley G. Taylor, Nova Scotia Power Commission Manager, H. W. L. Doane, Member of the Power Commission, and Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education. M. H. Cox, Chief of Operations for the Ridge and Gulch developments at Bear River, will also take part in the opening program.

The completion of the Ridge Hydro Electric Power Development and its official opening today at 12 o'clock noon by Premier Robert Stanfield, marks the second milestone in the complete development of the East Branch of Bear River. In November of 1952 the Gulch Development, with its powerhouse situated at tidewater and operating under a static head of 252.0 feet, was placed in operation as the first step in utilizing the potential of this river for providing electric energy for the Commission's ever expanding Western Network. The capacity of this initial installation was 6,000 kilowatts with an annual firm output of approximately 20,000,000 kilowatt-hours. The addition of the Ridge Development which is completely controlled from the Gulch powerhouse, will provide another 12,000,000 kilowatt-hours of energy annually from its new 4,000 kilowatt unit. The total installed capacity on this river now stands at 10,000 kilowatts or 13,800 horsepower. Provision has been made in the design of the supervisory equipment of the Ridge Development for the exploitation of a third and final site of approximately 1200 KW sometime in the future when the necessity arises. This site is located upstream from the Ridge Development. The full head existing between Lake Mulgrave Storage and tidewater would then be utilized on completion of this third project.

The Lake Mulgrave Storage itself was developed at the same time as the Gulch Development and provides partial regulation for both the Ridge and Gulch. Of the 66 square mile drainage area of the east branch of the river, Lake Mulgrave has control of approximately 48 square miles and has a capacity at spillway level of 62,000 acre-feet of storage or 16,000,000 kilowatt-hours through both plants. The remaining energy available from uncontrolled runoff, including excess spill from Mulgrave, is estimated to be in the order of another 16,000,000 kilowatt-hours in a minimum water year.

The Bear River Ridge Development generating station is located approximately three miles upstream from the Gulch powerhouse and is completely controlled from that station. The water from the Ridge plant after passing through the turbine, discharges directly from the tailrace into the Sam Harris headpond of the Gulch Development. The same water, after being discharged through automatically operated gates at Lake Mulgrave, is first utilized at the Ridge and then passed on to the Gulch.

Nancy Diane Wear, eleven year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Danny Wear, Upper Clements, died in Annapolis General Hospital two hours after being struck by a car Saturday afternoon near her home.

Nancy had gotten out of her uncle's mobile grocery store and was crossing the street to deliver a parcel when she was hit by the car operated by William Martin, Philadelphia.

Dr. Gordon Mahaney, coroner at the inquest held Sunday morning in the Court House, gave the verdict of accidental death.

Nancy was a student at Annapolis Royal Academy.

She is survived by her parents; four brothers, Terry, Brian, Dale, Brenton; one sister, Pamela.

Funeral services were held Monday at St. Luke's Anglican Church, Rev. Robert Neish officiating.

Small Man, Large Fish

Capt. Boyd Longmire, of the scallop dragger, "Loretta L", had a close brush with death here early Tuesday morning when he fell overboard from the dragger as the boat was on its way out to the fishing grounds in the Bay of Fundy. The accident occurred shortly after 6:30 o'clock. Captain Longmire, who was steering the vessel, was alone on deck when, in some manner, he went over the side.

Fortunately the engine of the dragger faltered and slowed down just about the same time and the crew members who were down in the forecabin, came up on deck to see what was the trouble.

Spotting Captain Longmire swimming in the water to the stern of the vessel, they immediately put her around and rescued their skipper. The vessel then put back into port. Capt. Longmire is reported none the worse for his narrow escape.

July Heavy Tourist Month

More than 2800 visitors called at the Bureau of Information in Digby during the month of July, it is understood. One thousand, one hundred and forty-eight cars came to the bureau where the passengers were advised on directions and given information to make their visit in the province more enjoyable. The previous month of June saw 780 persons and 622 cars come to the bureau. August, it would appear, has not seen any slackening in the number of vacationers.

Questioned on his particular type of reading, he said he reads practically anything he can get his hands on if it is good reading. Photography was a special hobby in his earlier years. Though slightly hard of hearing, Mr. Welch's sight is practically as good as it ever was, he said.

On Friday Mr. Welch will be "at home" to his friends from 3 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon and from 7 to 9 in the evening.

Mr. Welch was born in Westport, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Welch of that village. Of the nine children in the family, Mr. Welch has one sister remaining, Mrs. Edith Gower, of Dartmouth.

Plan Course On Driving

In response to a request and offer from their provincial Department of Education and the Department of Highways, the Digby Regional High School plans to inaugurate a course in car driving with the fall term.

In preparation for the opening of the new course, cost of which is to be met by provincial authorities, Mr. Clinton MacInnes, a teacher on the staff of the Digby Regional High School, attended an instructor's course in Toronto during this summer.

It is understood the new car driving course is being operated as a joint endeavour by the Department of Education and Highways Department in an effort to see that young people receive sound training in car driving so as to cut down on highway accidents caused by improperly trained drivers.

The Digby Regional High School is the first school to plan for the new course and was chosen, it is understood, because of previous progressive steps in education taken successfully by the Board and supervisory staff of this school. Mr. Douglas, of the Department of Highways, who was present at a meeting here where plans for the operation of the new course were finalized, paid high tribute to the School Board and Supervisor for their progressive pioneering efforts in the field of education.

The new course, which has been approved by the Regional School Board, was outlined at a meeting of local car dealers called to discuss the matter. The firm of MacDonald Motor Co. Ltd. offered to supply a training car with dual controls for use in the course, providing a survey was made indicating general approval of the move.

Explains Power Interruptions

Recent frequent interruptions in electrical service have been due to a variety of causes, Mr. James Ayer informed The Digby Courier this week.

The outage at about 7 a.m. Saturday morning was caused by a broken high voltage conductor near Mr. Arthur Ryan's house in Conway. Due to favorable weather conditions which existed at the time, the most likely explanation is that the conductor was weakened during the severe electrical storm two weeks ago.

The break was repaired when another outage occurred due to a broken pole and wires on the Digby Neck transmission line, the pole having been broken by a car in the early morning.

Outages on Monday were due to necessary blasting near the transmission lines at Acaciaville where a road widening and straightening program is under way. Although the charges were covered, the work was so close to the lines that the concussion of the blast and the debris caused a short circuit, interrupting the service.

Many of the transmission line poles through Hill Grove will have to be moved for road improved, Mr. Ayer explained, and as more blasting will be necessary, pre-arranged shut-downs will be necessary in the Hill Grove, North Range, Doucetteville and Sissiboo areas, as has already been done several times without interruption to other lines on the system.

The Digby County Power Board is most appreciative of the fact that customers have been considerate during these interruptions, he said, and he appreciates the opportunity to make the explanations.

Peck Top Man

Experience won out over youth at the Nova Scotia Guide's Meet at Lake Kedge last week as veteran guide, Watson Peck, Bear River, took top honors in the week-long meet and was named Nova Scotia's champion guide.

Peck, pressed earlier in the meet by some of the younger guides, became champion with 75 points. Eddie Crouse of Chelsea and Eber Peck of Sherbrooke, tied for second spot with 60 points each.

Watson and Eber are brothers and have had outstanding success at these meets. Eber was also top man in competition with guides over 45 years of age, with a point total of 19 in this class. Clarence Oickle of Milton was second with 17 points.

"Drinking has a devastating effect on personal appearance," she says, "I have seen young women arrive at a party with that delightful, freshly scrubbed appearance, immaculately groomed, with a look of happy anticipation toward a joyful evening. It doesn't take much liquor to distort that lovely appearance, to exaggerate the fine, telltale lines around the eyes, to slacken the facial muscles, so that the face takes on the drooping, downward look instead of the joyous, upward one. A lovely modulated voice becomes shrill. People say things that they later regret. They do things sometimes that blight their lives and of others forever."

Do young people need to drink to get ahead? Does a girl need to drink to be popular? Sometimes young people put these questions to Dale and honestly want her opinion. Just as honestly she gives it. "Liquor has no conscience. It is ruthless in its dealings with human beings," she declares. "It's an insidious menace, particularly to the young people of our country. Opening Notice Digby Public Schools

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Thursday, September 5th, 1957, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1957-58, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1957. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Thursday, August 22nd, to Tuesday, August 27th, between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A.M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P.M. daily, except for Saturday when the hours will be 9:00 A.M. to 12:30 P.M.

Students from the Islands seeking admission to the Grade XII Academic or Commercial classes must have applications approved by the Digby Municipal School Board prior to September 1st. Requests for application forms should be addressed to F. C. PURDY, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S., prior to August 23rd. Immediate application will expedite approval from the Municipal School Board. Weymouth Area students are eligible for admission to Grade XII Commercial on application as above.

Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

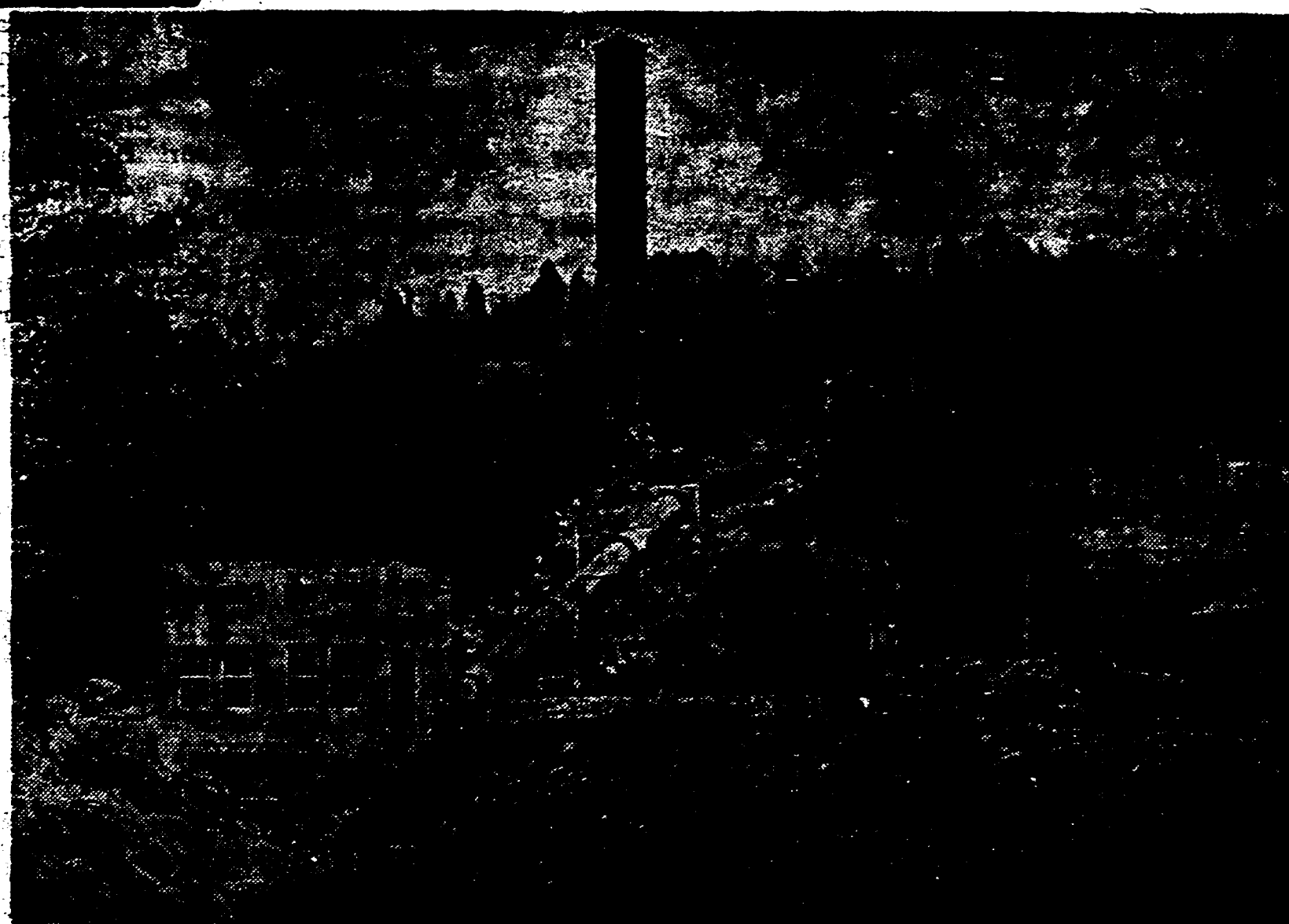

View of NSPC Gulch Plant, Bear River



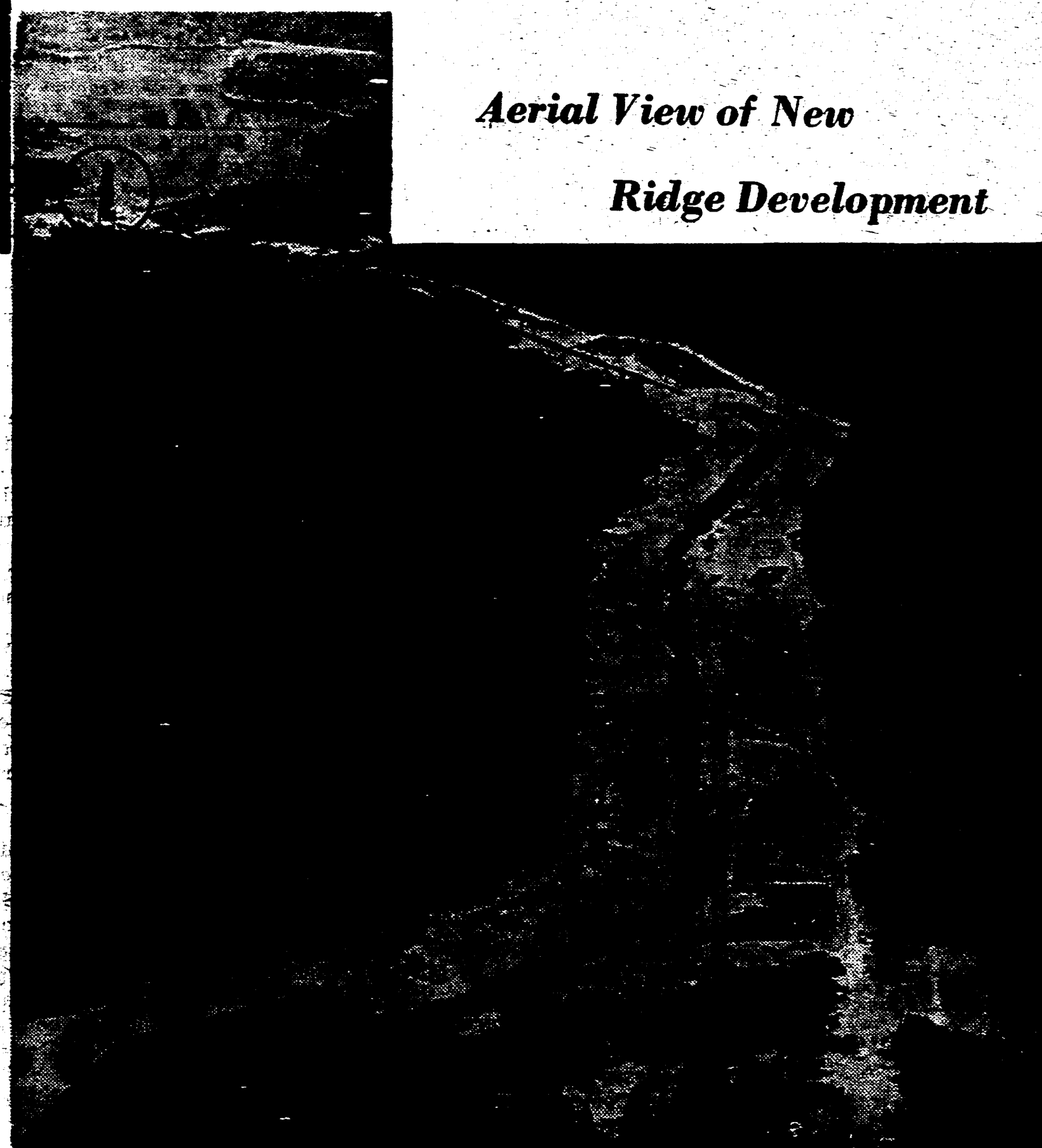

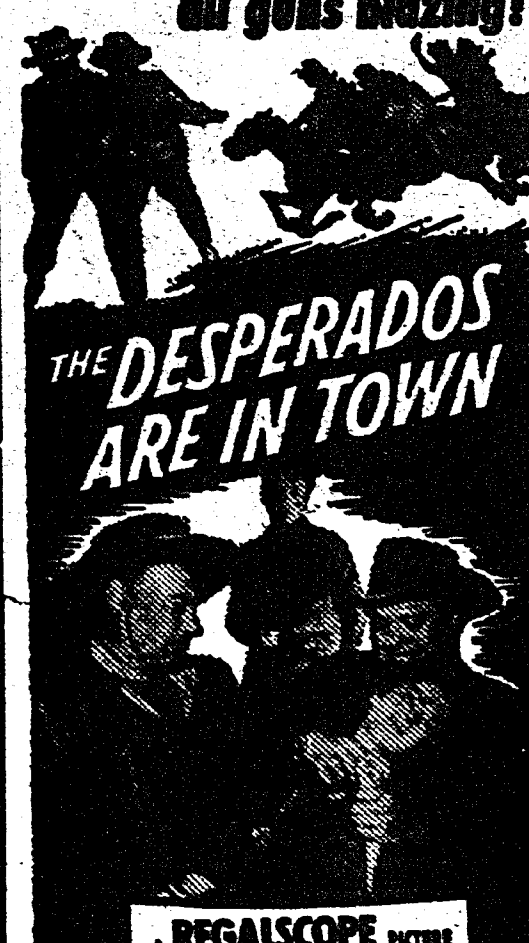

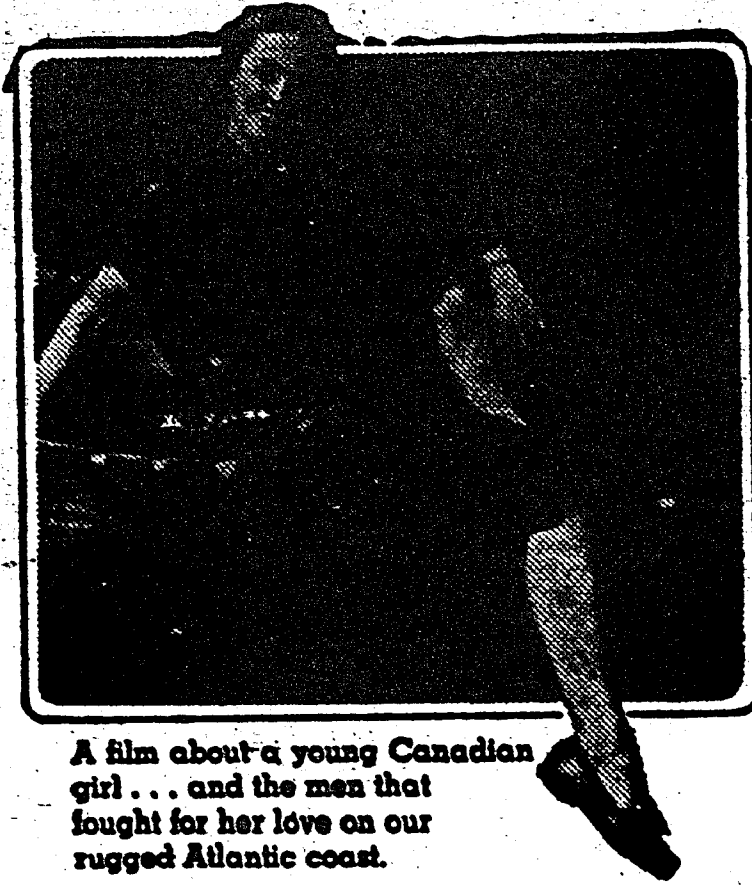

The present David Welch at Westport is a son of Percy Welch who is a nephew of the Barton David. The present David Welch lives on the old homestead at Westport.

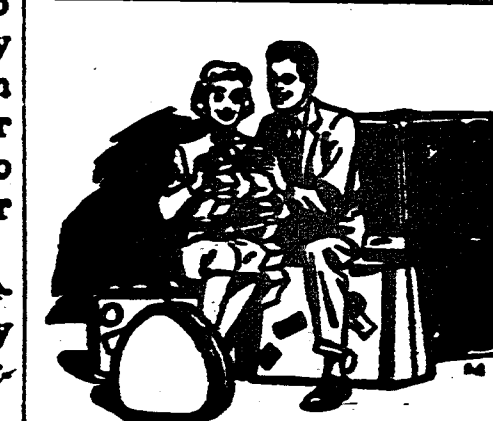

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Power Station Opened

At twelve noon on Thursday, August 15th, Premier R. L. Stanfield threw the switch which put into operation for the first time the 4,000 kilowatt generating unit of the new Ridge Hydro-Electric Power Development.

This, according to the Premier's remarks, when added to the Gulch development (situated at what is known locally as the "Head of the Tide") which was opened in 1952, just about completes the exploitation of the east branch of the Bear River. To date the total installed capacity on the river has been brought to 10,000 kilowatts or 13,800 h.p.

"There has been a steady growth in power consumption," the Premier said, "amounting to about nine percent each year. This increase may be greater in future as we hope it will, because power consumption is an indication of general prosperity."

"We expect that provision for continued expansion in future will have to come from thermal power — it is to be hoped that this can be tied in with the use of Nova Scotia coal," Mr. Stanfield said. "It is also to be hoped that power can be provided at a price that will be favorable to industries already located here and encouraging to new industries."

He said he wished to emphasize the fact that the domestic customer of power manufactured by the commission was subsidized by the public at a rate of nearly \$14 per annum.

M. G. Taylor, manager of the Nova Scotia Power Commission, chairman for the opening ceremonies, also said the Ridge development marked completion, for the present time at least, of development of the Bear River.

"There is a possibility of a small plant between the Ridge and the storage of Lake Mulgrave, but not at this time." Such a plant would exploit the final site on the river and would have a capacity of approximately 1,200 kilowatts.

Mr. Taylor paid tribute to the designers and builders of the project — H. W. L. Doane, a member of the Commission, who gave valuable service in planning the project; S. L. Fultz, director of operations, and the late chief engineer, Howard Fellows, the present chief engineer G. D. Mader, and A. G. Mahon, assistant director of operations, and W. L. Fraser, assistant chief engineer.

He also praised the builders and suppliers of equipment, practically all of which was of Canadian manufacture, he said.

Cost of the Ridge project, Mr. Taylor said, was over \$1,600,000. The power manufactured would feed into the western network which supplied much of the Valley area. The new generating station would be "unattended" and would be controlled automatically from the Gulch station three miles down stream.

On the platform with the Premier and Mr. Taylor, for the opening ceremonies, were H. D. Hicks, former Premier; M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education for the Province, Digby; and Commissioner H. W. L. Doane, B.Sc., R.P.E.N.S.

Guests of the Nova Scotia Power Commission were entertained at a luncheon in the I.O.O.F. Hall, Bear River, immediately after the ceremonies. M. S. Leonard welcomed the Premier and others to Bear River and expressed thanks to the Power Commission and all those who contributed to the development of the Ridge project which will play a big part

in the economy of this area.

H. D. Hicks, former Premier, also congratulated the Nova Scotia Light & Power Commission on the achievement, making mention of both the Gulch and Ridge developments.

Other speakers at the luncheon were A. G. Mahon, Assistant Director of Operations; H. E. Chisholm, Warden of the Municipality of Digby; Norman Smith, General Manager of Nova Scotia Light & Power Commission; Mr. Waters, of Mersey Light & Power; W. G. Dawson, of Cosmos Mills, Yarmouth, and W. H. L. Doane.

The Bear River Rebekah Lodge, under the leadership of Mrs. Lawrence Darres, catered for the luncheon, and Mrs. Walter Lent presided at the piano for the occasion. Both Mrs. Darres and her assistants and Mrs. Lent were highly praised for their capabilities and service.

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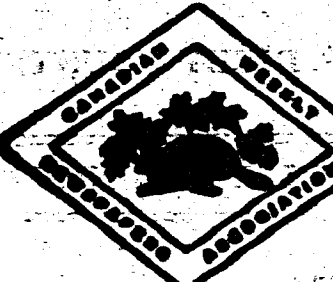

About This and That

Health Care For Children

In the next few weeks children will be going back to school.

For many — the beginners — it will be the first time they have had wide contact with other children. Such contact likely means exposure for the first time to communicable diseases, so parents can expect several bouts with different illnesses.

For the more serious diseases, children should be immunized — and if they have been immunized as infants, they should have booster doses before they start school. These diseases include diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and smallpox. Diphtheria and smallpox have almost been eliminated in this country by immunization and so little is heard of them now that parents are apt to become complacent and forget the dreadful damage they can cause. However, these diseases are not by any means wiped out and there is a continuing need for immunization if they are to be avoided.

Early recognition of symptoms and prompt treatment will help to lessen the severity of communicable diseases and to prevent complications. Parents should watch for these symptoms:

Sore throat, fever and head cold.

Vomiting and loss of appetite.

Irritability or unusual drowsiness.

Muscle weakness and neck rigidity.

Rashes and sensitivity of the eyes to light.

A child showing any of these symptoms should be put to bed, kept warm and quiet and given plenty of fluids to drink (if he is not vomiting). He should be kept apart from other children until it is certain whether or not an infectious disease is developing.

A doctor should be called as soon as the child appears ill. In addition to immunization, a child's resistance to infection can be increased by seeing that he:

Obtains sufficient sleep and rest.

Eats regular meals and has an adequate diet.

Gets sunshine, fresh air and exercise each day.

Gives prompt attention to cuts, abrasions and other wounds.

Wears suitable clothing in cold and wet weather.

Keep his person and surroundings scrupulously clean, paying particular attention to clean hands and finger nails. He should be taught to keep hands, pencils, pens, money and other such objects away from his mouth.

Makes Trip To Grenada

An exciting sailing trip from Tobago to the famed island of Grenada was made by a number of the personnel of HMCS Micmac during her spring cruise in West Indies waters. One of the members of the party to make the trip was Petty Officer F. G. McBride, of Digby.

The trip, seventy-six miles in length, was made in a whaler fitted with sails, navigating equipment and provisions. The voyage, the longest undertaken voluntarily by an RCN whaler, was made in twelve hours. This time is much less than taken by civilian sailing craft to ply the route.

After a short visit in St. Georges, the whaler party again manned their craft and set sail to meet the Micmac when she came to anchor off St. Georges. The crew of the Micmac gave the party a great cheer when they pulled up alongside after successful completion of the trip.

Some discomfort was had by the party on their voyage because of an eight foot swell and choppy seas which kept the helmsman busy. Sleep was almost impossible, a whaler thwart not being the most comfortable sleeping spot. Several gallons of sea water over the bottom boards ruled out that place to sleep so most of the lads gave up trying. Several rain squalls fell during the overnight trip and drenched the lads so they were more than happy to go ashore at St. Georges awhile to dry out their clothes and stretch cramped limbs.

During the night they sighted the lights of a large steamer which somewhat dispelled the feeling of solitude and loneliness engendered by the sudden setting in of the dark tropical night. At twenty minutes to twelve the lights of Grenada were sighted and the party knew their trip was well on the way to successful completion, although careful navigation was still necessary to make harbour.

No navigational lights were charted in the area so the whaler had to stand out from land to consider their position. Soon the loom of the flashing light on the southwest tip of Grenada became visible and a course was set to that light. At this time wind and swell increased and more frequent rain squalls blotted out the light completely. The party was all drenched and cold and quite miserable by this time but considered it not practicable to try to enter the harbour at night so the mainsail was lowered and the whaler ran free on foresail and mizzen to await daylight. At first light the whaler was five miles off land on course for St. Georges and finally after a seeming interminable period she sailed into harbour and made fast at the sea wall.

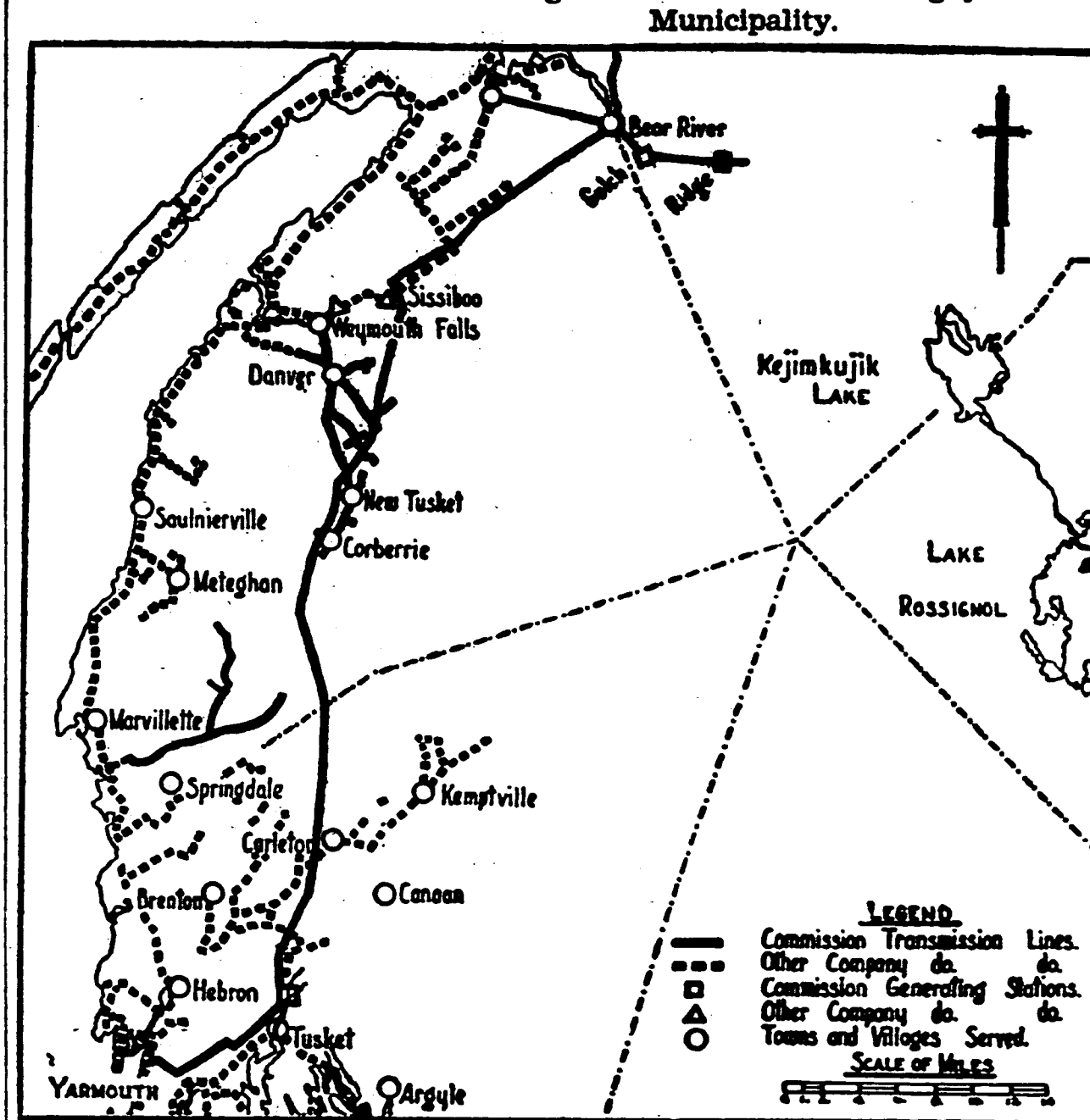

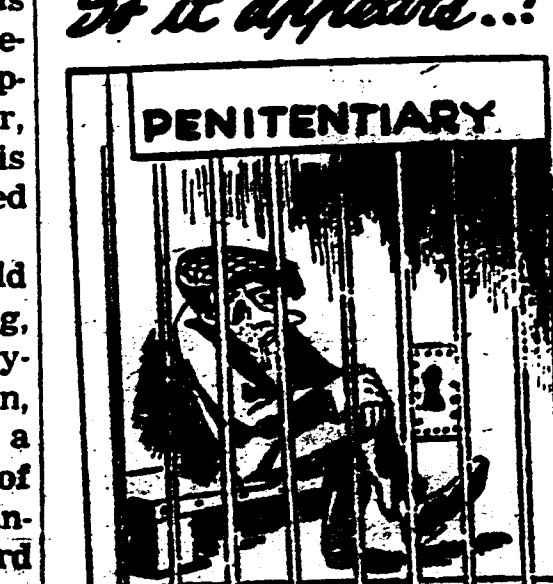

Interesting Slides Shown Here

Miss Lorna Connell left on Tuesday of last week to resume her teaching duties at the Fort George Mission School on James Bay in the province of Quebec. Enroute she will visit in Toronto and other Canadian cities and towns.

Before leaving Miss Connell showed slides depicting life in the North. Among the pictures were those of the Indian and Eskimo children who are students under Miss Connell at the St. Philips Anglican Mission residential school.

Fort George is about 900 miles north and about 2,000 travelling miles from Digby. There are two Anglican churches, Miss Connell said. One with a capacity for 200 persons is used the year around, another is used in the summer to accommodate the 900 Indians returning from the winter trapping groups. Parents go trapping in the winter and leave their children at the school.

Miss Connell showed the advancement made by the Indians in the past five years in which time the character of homes had changed from predominantly teepees to predominantly wood houses. Although the mission is 100 years old the Indians were slow to adopt a new way of life without more personal contact with that way, Miss Connell explained. The defense lines and other projects of the North have brought them in closer contact with the outside world.

Tractors are the only means of transportation other than dog sleds around the Island on which the school is situated. The ambulance to the Government Nursing Station was tractor drawn. This mode of transportation was portrayed in Miss Connell's pictures as well as landings of planes from the outside, docking of the regular x-ray boat and food and mail supply boats.

The school, which is under the Arctic Diocese, was founded by Rev. "Reindeer" Walton, who translated the common prayer and hymn book into the Cree language.

Moncton Observes Railway Week

Moncton, N. B., celebrated the 100th birthday of railroading in eastern Canada last week, marking 100 years since the opening of the first section of the European and North American Railway.

On August 20, 1857, the first train made its way from Shediac to Moncton, starting an enterprise that was to see the tiny village on the banks of the Petitcodiac grow to a city of 50,000 that today is the hub of transportation and the principal centre of distribution in the Maritime provinces.

In modern Moncton alone, Canadian National Railways now employs 6,000 workers who earn about \$20,000,000 annually, and it is to mark this tremendous growth in the transportation industry that the city planned week-long celebrations.

Among events which were held to mark the occasion were a reception and dinner sponsor-

New Navigation Device

A navigation system that provides electronic sea-lanes around Canada's eastern provinces was officially opened in Halifax on Monday, August 19, by the Hon. George Hees, Minister of Transport.

Three chains of the Bendix-Decca Navigator system are now in operation giving navigation coverage to all of the waters around Nova Scotia and most of Newfoundland. A new chain will be added later this summer at Quebec City extending coverage as far as Montreal.

Invented in the United States and developed in Britain, the

ed by the Moncton Board of Trade and the City of Moncton; the presentation of an illuminated scroll to the vice-president and general manager of the Atlantic Region CNR; and special newspaper editions and radio and TV broadcasts covering "100 years of progress".

Bendix-Decca Navigator was first used during the Normandy Landings on D-Day to guide the invasion forces through the enemy minefields.

Though extensively used in Europe, where coverage extends from Norway to Spain, and more than 4,000 ships are equipped, this is the first installation on the North American continent. Two chains are located in Eastern and Southern Newfoundland, and one in the Halifax area. Each chain normally consists of a "Master" and three "Slave" stations, transmitting a low frequency pattern of intersecting position lines which the receiving equipment in ships and aircraft interprets into continuous accurate positions.

The four Bendix-Decca chains are being financed initially by private capital. The Department of Transport is actively encouraging the installation of receivers in as many Canadian ships as possible in order that a thorough evaluation for the need for the system can be made. Over 30 ships have been fitted in the past few weeks, and future fittings are continuing at the rate of 12 per month. Many foreign vessels using Canadian ports are already equipped, and the reports of these experienced users will be taken into account by the Department. The Canadian Pacific Steamships Atlantic fleet, as well as the Queen Mary, Queen Elizabeth, and The United States are now using the system in European waters.

Commercial fishermen in Eastern Canada are expected to find the system equally as valuable as have European fishermen. Over a thousand fishing vessels in European waters are fitted with Decca.

Transmitters for the chains are located near the following places: Port aux Basques, Ram-ea Island, St. Lawrence, Shoe Cove, Port Blandford and Lewisport in Newfoundland; at Chester, Jordan Bay, Ecum Secum in Nova Scotia; and Alma in New Brunswick.

Further caution was taken over the weekend when the Dept. of Lands and Forests made available their equipment. A close watch was kept until the entire danger of fire spreading was controlled.

Cause of the fire was said to have originated from the rubbish being burned on this property. Extreme dry weather has increased the fire hazard.

Digby Lumber Mill Re-opens

Operations on a limited scale have been recommenced at the Digby lumber firm of H. T. Warne Ltd., closed over the past year.
The lumber firm, which prior to its closing last year employed upward of two hundred men, has been acquired by Rudolph Van Der Walde Canada Ltd. Last week the rotary mill at the plant was re-opened and is giving employment to some twenty men.
It is understood the rotary mill will be kept in operation for a month or more and then will be closed down for a time in order to effect necessary repairs and alterations to plant and machinery. The Van Der Walde firm is expecting to ship a cargo of long lumber from Digby via freighter to the British Isles in about five weeks.
So far no information is available with regard to the future of the box manufacturing plant at the former Warne mill which employed the bulk of the working force at the plant. It is understood, however, the new owners are assessing the situation with regard to the operation and plans with regard to the future may be announced later.
For the present the Van Der Walde firm, which is conducting lumbering and logging operations in various county centres, is providing a market for logs and pulpwood from local woodlot owners. Much of these are being stockpiled for processing and shipment from their Digby yard and at the mill here.

A plaque will be unveiled at Plympton on Tuesday, September 8th, by the Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education, to mark the home of the late Alfred William Savary, noted Nova Scotian lawyer, legislator, Judge and historian.
The late Judge Savary was Inspector of Schools for Digby County 1869-72; member of Parliament for Digby 1867-74; County Court Judge for Annapolis, Digby and Yarmouth 1876-1907. He was also author of a history of Annapolis County and other volumes. He was born in the house to be marked by the plaque and now known as Gardena Lodge on October 10, 1831, and died in Annapolis on March 30, 1920.
At the unveiling ceremonies on Tuesday, to which the public has been invited, Dr. Arthur Kelsall, past president of the Annapolis Historical Society, will act as chairman. The invocation will be given by the Rev. Cyril Gough. An address on Judge Savary's career will be given by Dr. C. B. Fergusson, archivist, and the unveiling will be performed by Mr. Leonard.

Hold Teacher's Institute

Teachers from Digby town and municipality met at the Digby Regional High School on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week for a pre-school opening institute session.

Greetings from the government of the province were expressed by Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education. Mr. Leonard also spoke of his own experiences as a school teacher and extended his good wishes for a successful teaching year to the assembled teachers.

In his remarks Mr. Leonard said there were several requirements for the good teacher. Among these are a thorough knowledge of the course or courses the teacher is teaching; an all-out effort to capture the interest and attention of the pupils; a proper classroom attitude and the need to set an example as an individual. Much of the success of an educational program depends on the teacher, he said, and every effort must be made by teachers to see that they properly perform the duties assigned to them.

Other speakers included Harold Nason, Chief Inspector of Schools for Nova Scotia; Dr. Morrison of the curriculum division; Egbert Perry of the guidance division and the provincial librarian. Following their addresses a full discussion of many problems concerning teaching methods, curriculum, guidance and other matters was held.

Leonard Banks, Rossway; Keith Ellis, Digby; Dickie Wilson, Point Prim; and a mutual friend, Dick Vickory, Haliburton, Ont., who will visit with each of the boys in turn.

Driver Course Pilot Study

A province-wide program of ver education for high school students within a few years could result from an experimental course being offered at the Digby Regional High School this year.

The Digby course will be a "pilot study" to determine the value and the costs of such training. Education Minister M. S. Leonard said in Halifax.
Actually, the study would have a three-fold purpose, Mr. Leonard said - (1) to determine the effectiveness of such a course, given by a trained driving instructor; (2) to find out if such a course, provided it is worthwhile, can best be taught during the regular activity time of the school day or after school hours and (3) to determine the per-pupil cost of such instruction in the high schools of Nova Scotia.

"The rising accident rate has been a matter of concern for some time to the departments of education and highways", Mr. Leonard said, and it was decided that an experiment in training high school students to be competent drivers should be undertaken.

The course at Digby will not affect any time allotted to academic studies but will be given during time allotted to other than academic subjects, after school hours and on Saturday mornings. The course will be given to two groups of students - one course commencing soon after school opening this week and the other in the spring. Each course will include classroom lectures and up to eight hours behind-the-wheel instruction in an approved dual control car.

The instructor will be Clinton MacInnes, of the staff of the school, who completed a special course in driver instruction in Ontario in July.

All pupils must have the written consent of their parents or guardians and must possess beginner's licenses issued by the department of highways, which means they must be over 16 years of age.

"The final result of the course," Mr. Leonard said, "should be the qualification of most of those taking it as regularly licensed, competent drivers."

Similar courses in the United States, he said, had apparently had good results. In a study by the American Automobile Association, he said, it was found that drivers so trained and licensed under such circumstances had a lower accident rate, with less loss of life and injury than comparable groups who had not received the training.

The car to be used will be provided on a loan basis, Mr. Leonard said, with the cost of equipping it with dual controls to be borne by the department of education. There would be no cost to the municipal school board, he said.

The course has been planned for some months and Digby was selected - early in the summer - "because it has taken the lead in many new educational developments."

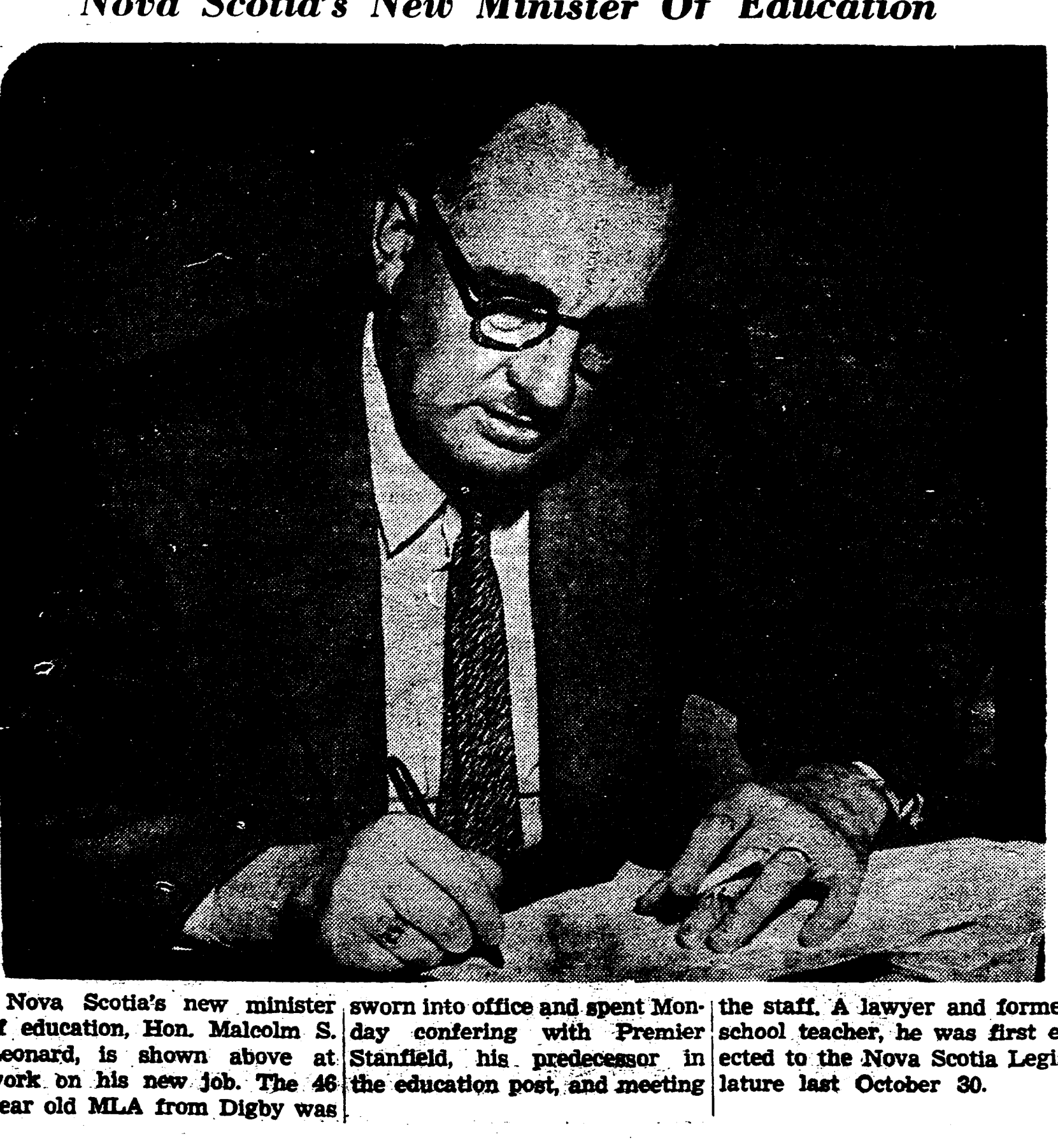

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About This and That

Watch For Children

Children, carefree for the summer, will be back to school by the end of the week. Some of these children are going to school for the first time. They are full of excitement and anxiety. School is their main concern and getting there will not present a major problem as far as their young minds are concerned. Nevertheless, most children at school-beginner age have not had much experience in navigating their own way across streets and around traffic. It is up to parents to impress on children as vividly as possible the necessity of observing highway safety rules and to ever place before them their own example of highway safety. Children must be warned to cross streets in the town's particular safety lanes. They must be taught to look both ways for traffic before crossing or entering a street. A problem which has appeared within the past years is that of children loading and unloading from busses. Parents should warn children to watch for traffic before scampering away to the classroom. Or, safety zones for loading and unloading school busses might be considered. In any case, parents cannot be too cautious in preparing their children for a safe journey to school and a safe return.

To motorists, we would give the reminder that adult minds cannot be put on the school-child shoulders. A child's actions cannot, in most cases, be predicted and the motorist must be ever diligent near school zones or at the time of the day when children will be going or coming from school. Watch when school busses are stopped. Better not pass from either direction than to witness a child killed or maimed for life. Be courteous — give the child the benefit of the doubt in any case. Remember, a child rarely deliberately walks in front of your car. The attention of a young child can so easily be attracted to something far different from traffic responsibility. Yours are the adult shoulders.

IS HIGH TEST GAS NECESSARY?
One of our friends was asking the other day whether he should use regular or premium gasoline in his car. It struck me then how few people really look into what regular and premium means before deciding.

There are many cars that are just as well off using regular gas and you won't suddenly get better mileage and less knock by switching to premium. As a matter of fact, it's never a good idea to switch back and forth. Let us know which gas you're using and we'll do the important job of setting the spark to take best advantage of that fuel.

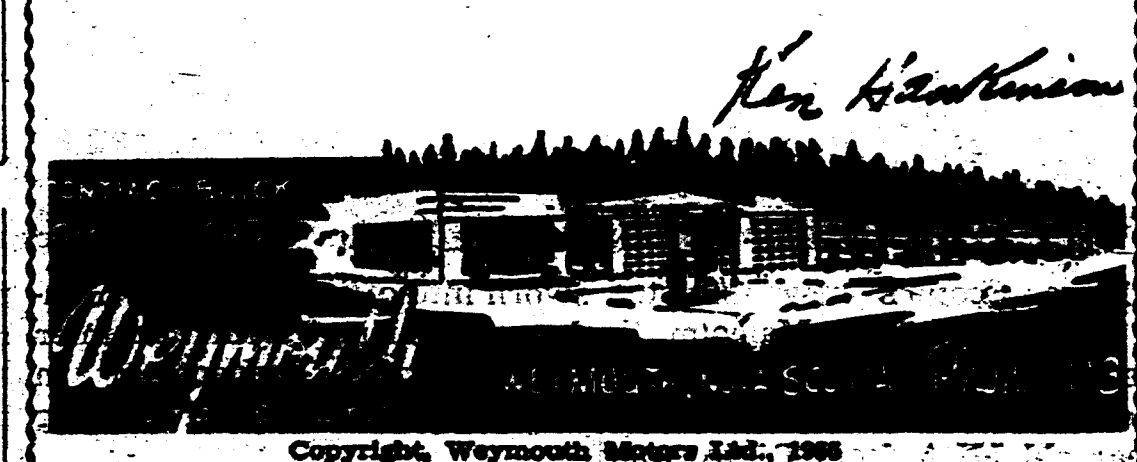
The main difference in the two gasolines is, of course, their octane rating and the addition of anti-knock compounds in the premium fuel. And what is the octane rating?

Well, if you really want to know, the octane rating is the percentage of pure hydrocarbon called iso-octane as compared to heptane. Octane ratings can run from 0, which is pure heptane, and would knock badly, to 100, which would be pure iso-octane and has high anti-knock qualities.

That still doesn't decide which gas to use, though. A good rule of thumb is that if your car has a compression ratio of 7 to 1 or less (an older car) you might as well use regular gas. With higher compression ratios in newer cars, you're better off with premium fuel.

Town Council Meets

Mayor Gordon R. Turnbull, Deputy Mayor Norman Wright and Councilor Donald Amraut were named as delegates to the annual meeting of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities to be held in Yarmouth beginning September 17th. Appointment of the three as delegates was made at the regular September meeting of the Town Council.

No action was taken at the meeting on the matter of the standing application from the Petrofina Oil Company for a permit to erect a service station on their property on the corner of Church Street and Montague Row. At the last meeting of the Council action on the permit, which has been deferred a number of times, was again deferred and the Clerk was instructed to write a letter to the oil company advising them of strong protest against the proposed building.

It was reported work by the provincial Highways Department on the Racquette Bridge had been completed. The Council decided to seek the provision of a sidewalk on the south side of the bridge for the convenience and protection of pedestrians.

The matter of the continuation of Second Avenue through to Church Street was discussed and the matter was left with the Streets committee.

A request from the firm of Rudolph Van Der Walde, Canada, regarding taxation on the former H. T. Warne Ltd. property was refused by the council.

Considerable discussion was had concerning the matter of alleged excessive car horn blowing by wedding processions in the town. This was referred to the police department.

Ferry Rate Reduction

A reduction in the off-season rates for loaded trucks using the ferry "Bluenose" between Yarmouth, N. S., and Bar Harbor, Me., was announced in Moncton September 12th, by Douglas V. Gonder, regional vice-president and general manager of the Canadian National Railways, operators of the service.

The off-season rate for loaded trucks will be reduced to \$1.50 a foot of length with a minimum of \$20.00, compared with the present rate of \$2.50 a foot with a minimum of \$30.00. The new tariff becomes effective September 17, and will continue in force until next June 20th, inclusive.

The reduced truck rate on the "Bluenose" was initiated by the CNR last year and proved highly successful in increasing traffic during the months when tourist travel on the ship is light.

Bass Run Still Heavy

The run of striped bass on the Bear River still continues heavy and is providing great sport for fishing enthusiasts who continue to flock to the river in large numbers.

Sunday evening twenty-one of the striped fighters were caught with rod and line, Fred Mulise, of Digby, accounting for seven of them.

Those who have followed up the bass fishing for the past several years claim the run will continue on for some time yet. At present there are large numbers of herring and pollock in the river and these attract the larger game fish. Last year fishing remained good until the last of October with good catches reported.

Bass fishermen are reporting good results using either squid or herring for bait. One enthusiast reports a plug has also been effective but lost several fish because the hook was not heavy enough to hold the fighting striper.

The bass fishing on the Bear River is developing into one of the biggest tourist attractions in this area and enquiries are being received from U.S. and upper Canadian points about fishing possibilities. Local sportsmen say the possibilities are unlimited and are most enthusiastic about the fighting qualities of the fish which they say put up as good a scrap as any game fish in the area.

DRIVE CAREFULLY

Provincial Group To Buy Pines

A group of Nova Scotia business and industrial men have about completed a deal with the Canadian Pacific Railway for the purchase of the Digby Pines Hotel, Cornwallis Inn, Kentville, and the Lakeside Inn at Yarmouth, it was learned here last week.

It is expected official announcement will be made toward the last of September following the return of Gordon Cowan, Q.C., M.L.A. for Halifax Centre, counsel representing the Nova Scotia group. Mr. Cowan has been attending the sessions of the Canadian Bar Association at Banff, and is not expected to return to the province for about two weeks.

No purchase figure for the three luxury hotels has been officially mentioned, although unconfirmed reports indicate the figure to be in the vicinity of one million dollars for the package deal.

It is understood a group of Annapolis Valley and Halifax business men met in Kentville last week with R. A. Mackie, general manager of CPR hotels, and Mr. Machan of the railway's real estate department to discuss details of the proposed transfer. A Quebec hotel consultant was also in attendance. Informal sources claim no hotel chain or trust company is included in the deal. One source stated the Eastern Trust Company is acting as selling agent for the railway.

Have Close Call

Captain Kenneth Oliver and the crew of the scallop dragger "D.M.L." had a close call here early Tuesday morning when the stuffing box near the propeller of their craft broke, allowing sea water to pour in. Efforts were made to hold the inflow of water in check with pumps but the vessel was taking water fast. A call was put in on the radio telephone from a dragger nearby for aid and the fisheries vessel "Limanda" came to the rescue.

A line was put aboard the "D.M.L." and she was towed to Digby where repairs will be effected.

The dragger was about an hour's run off Digby when the accident occurred.

Unemployment Insurance Case

Elmer Hatfield, Conway, was found guilty before Magistrate C. R. Rand, Yarmouth, on Wednesday on making false statements to the Unemployment Insurance Commission for the purpose of obtaining benefits. Mr. Hatfield was fined \$30.00 and costs or a ten day imprisonment.

Blaze Threatens Hospital

Damage in the blaze which for a time last Thursday evening threatened the Digby General Hospital, was estimated in the vicinity of fifteen hundred dollars.

The blaze, cause of which is yet unknown, was confined through the efforts of the Digby Fire Department to the top storage floor of the hospital building.

The fire was first discovered by Mrs. Hilda Bremner, one of three nurses on duty, at about nine thirty in the evening. Alarmed by a crackling sound from the top floor of the structure she investigated to discover the blaze breaking through the walls of a storage room used by the Hospital Ladies' Aid.

Mrs. Bremner immediately called the Fire Department and efforts were then made under the leadership of Hospital Superintendent Alice Dill, to prepare for evacuation of patients, some eighteen of whom were in the hospital, should this be necessary.

Efforts of the fire department, however, confined the blaze to the top floor and only some nine patients on the maternity second floor of the hospital were moved to rooms on the lower floor. Fears were expressed for a time a power failure might result from the blaze and arrangements were made to evacuate patients to nearby homes.

As soon as word of the fire spread off-duty and married nurses of the town reported to the hospital to aid in looking after patients and no serious effect from the fire on any patients was reported although a number of seriously ill persons were in hospital at the time of the blaze.

An investigation by Fire Chief George Humphrey Friday morning failed to uncover the cause of the blaze which appeared to have started in a linen room, housing linens placed there by the Ladies' Hospital Aid. The fact the room was tightly closed off from the rest of the floor prevented a rapid spread of the blaze. Heavy smoke, however, hampered efforts of firemen to find the source of the fire. A large quantity of linens, blankets, dishes and other articles was destroyed by the flames. Considerable water damage also resulted. Power was cut off from the hospital's emergency call system to prevent damage to this.

Earl Crane, manager of the hospital, stated that he was most appreciative of the fine work of the Digby Fire Department. Not only did the fire brigade do an excellent job of controlling and extinguishing what might have been a most serious fire, but after it was over they went to work and cleaned up the mess, mopping up the water and setting everything to rights again.

Several other students in this area also received entrance scholarships. Among these were Ruth E. Nichols, Deep Brook, who received the Jean Dumasque Smith scholarship awarded to the student having highest senior matriculation in Nova Scotia. This scholarship provides \$200 a year for three years.

Wayne L. Perry, of Freeport, was winner of the B. L. Thurber scholarship of \$450. The late Mr. Thurber was a native of Long Island who won fame and fortune in South Africa in the diamond industry.

Young Billy has been suffering from a congenital heart ailment which, if not corrected by surgery, will result in his death. Medical examination has disclosed the required operation can best be done at a hospital in Boston.

Funds needed for transportation, hospitalization and other expenses in connection with the operation are beyond the financial resources of the young lad's parents, so the Digby Legion branch is sponsoring a Tag Day October 12th to start off their fund raising drive.

Fire Wardens Meet

Inspection of a number of buildings and other properties in town which have been reported as possible fire hazards was carried out by the Digby Fire Wardens prior to a special meeting here Monday evening. Owners of the properties inspected will be notified to rectify fire hazard conditions that were found to exist.

At the meeting which followed the inspection tour a number of matters concerning fire prevention and protection were discussed. The matter of traffic control at fires was aired and various proposals discussed.

It was stated that generally speaking traffic so far had not presented a major problem at local fires, the danger of a serious tie-up of traffic and consequent hindering of fire fighting services could result if control were not carried out.

The matter of the control of traffic and other problems of control at fire scenes was left to be taken up with the Fire and Police committees of the Town Council.

Fire Chief George Humphrey brought up the matter of early detection of fires by building occupants and said this played a big part in the successful fighting of fire by the department. He said a fire detected within moments of its beginning presented far less of a problem than one which had gained considerable headway before detection.

In this connection Chief Humphrey brought to the attention of the meeting a compact reliable fire alarm which operated automatically on two flashlight batteries. This alarm, he said, when placed near possible danger points, would provide a reliable means of fire detection at the very outbreak of fire, as its temperature action point is low. The Fire Department has these available, he said, and urged the public be made aware of this.

The matter of protection for the Fire Wardens when acting in an official capacity at fires or in fire prevention was discussed, and it was decided to take up this matter with the Fire Committee of the Town Council to see if the present insurance coverage for firemen could be extended to cover the fire wardens.

Overhaul Postponed

HMCS Buckingham, which was due to go into drydock in Saint John for an overhaul on Monday, will not now enter the drydock until October 3rd, it has been announced from Saint John.

Leading Fish Exporter Passes

Delma C. Althouse, 73, for many years one of the Maritimes' leading salt fish exporters and operator of fish plants in his native community of Tiverton, Digby County, for half a century, died at his home, 7 Glenview Avenue, Kentville, Sunday morning.

Mr. Althouse was seriously injured in an automobile accident six years ago and while he was able to carry on his business interests in part, his disabilities resulting from the accident gradually increased and his condition had been critical for some weeks.

Son of the late Captain Holland D. Althouse and Lorraine (Pyne) Althouse, he was born and resided in Tiverton until 1925, when he moved to Wolfville and four years later took up residence on Connaught Avenue, Halifax. He came to Kentville in 1951.

For almost 40 years, in addition to operating his own fish plant at Tiverton, where in later years he was also vice-president of Tiverton Sea Products Limited, Mr. Althouse was representative in the four Atlantic Provinces for Gorton-Pew Limited of Gloucester, Mass., the world's largest dealers in salt cod.

Gough, vice president of the Historical Association of Annapolis Royal, gave the invocation. The President of the Advisory Council, Dr. W. R. 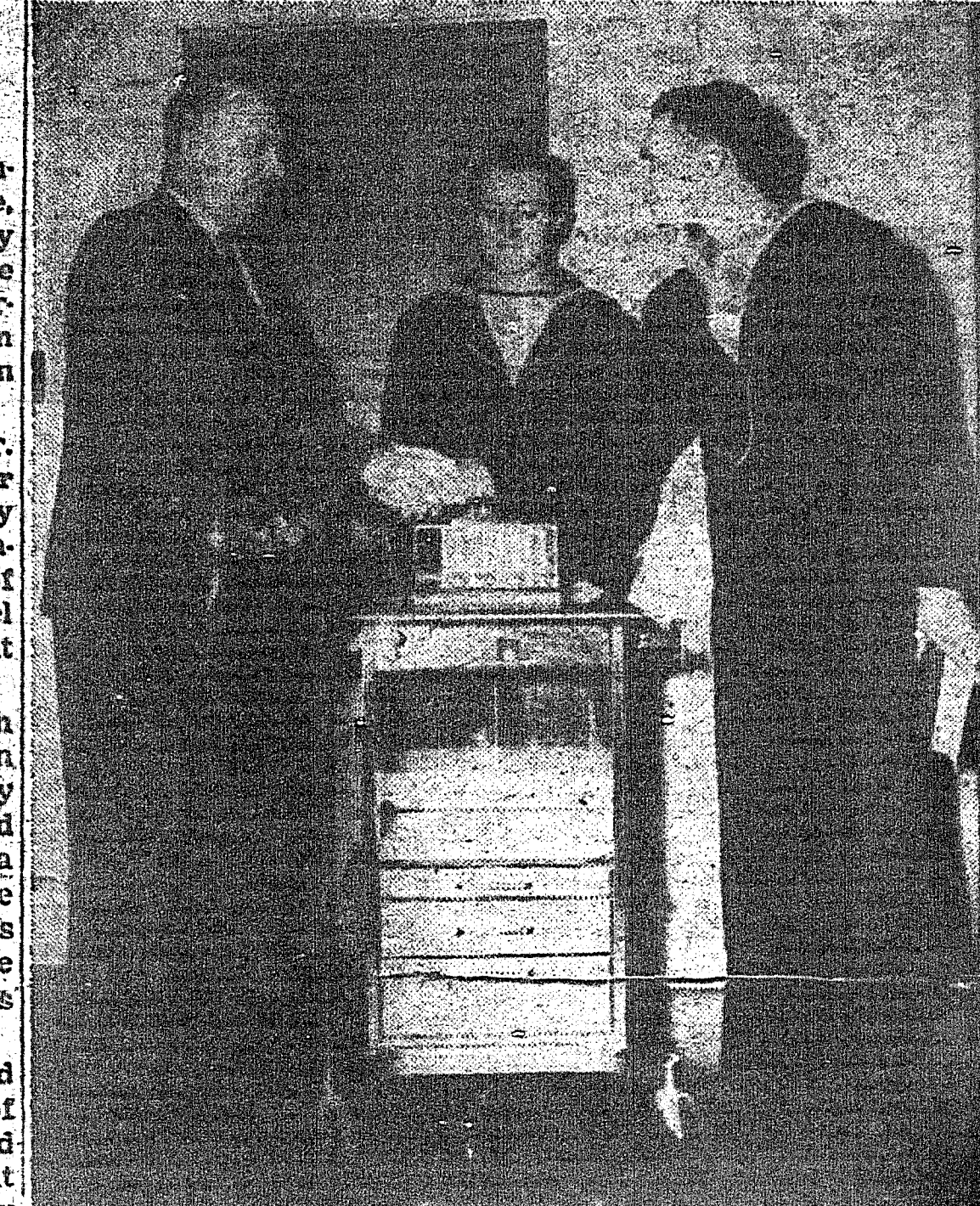
Mark 50th Wedding Anniversary

Classes Start In New School

The new Clare District High School at Meteghan River opened its doors to grades IX to XII last week with over 200 pupils enrolled. Mr. Stanislaus d'Entremont, of Little Brook, is the principal, and his teaching staff is made up of the following: Rev. Sister Noella and Rev. Sister Charles-Louise, both of Meteghan; Rev. Juliana, Church Point; Miss Juliette Saulnier, Seabrook; Miss Prescille d'Entremont, West Pubnico; Miss Rose Marie Maillet, Meteghan; Mr. Alain Doucet, Little Brook.
The building is expected to be completed in early October, but it is not expected to include grades VII and VIII until the 1958-59 term. It is expected that there will be over 500 enrolled when the grades VII to XII are included. There are 18 grade XII's registered this term, which is an increase of 8 over last season.
The new high school will have 17 academic classrooms, an auditorium, an industrial arts classroom, Home Economics, Science Laboratory, Library, and it is expected to boost education in Clare. The opening of the high school will enable the smaller schools of four classrooms to better their classes. Notably at Meteghan and Seabrook, which are schools of more than 4 classrooms, teachers have a complete class of one grade only. In the Church Point consolidated area, a teacher has the primary, grade I and II, while grade III and IV are combined with grades V and VI being individual classes with a teacher for each class. Grade VII and VIII are being taught at Comeauville school with a teacher for each grade. Grosses Coques school has been closed as it was unfit for school purposes and one classroom of the two classroom school at Lower Comeauville has been closed and pupils transported to Comeauville.
There still remains a number of one and two room schools in Clare. It is difficult to obtain efficient teachers for these schools and, in some cases, persons without a teacher's certificate are employed so as to keep the schools open. With the shortage of teachers being felt everywhere in western Nova Scotia, the school boards are finding it extremely difficult in finding suitable teachers for the outlying schools.
It is believed that by consolidation a remedy will be found and the pupils who reside away from the main paved highways will have equal chance in obtaining an education with their more fortunate friends. It is known that in one particular district only one licensed teacher was obtained in three years, yet this district boasted of at least three grade IX and two grade X pupils. Another school section has not been able to hire a teacher for the last five years.

Nutritionist Appointed

Elizabeth MacKinnon, of Berwick, has been appointed staff nutritionist with the provincial Department of Health, with headquarters in Windsor, Hon. R. A. Donahoe, Minister of Health and Welfare announced September 16th.
Miss MacKinnon will be responsible for furthering nutrition education in Hants, Kings, Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth and Shelburne counties.
Born in Berwick, Miss MacKinnon received her public school education in Halifax, then graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Home Economics from Acadia University. She received also a diploma in dietetics from St. Luke's Hospital, New York.
She has been employed as a therapeutic dietitian at Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital, London, England, and as a demonstrator with Canada Packers, Limited, Toronto.
Miss MacKinnon is one of several nutritionists employed by the health department's nutrition division. Their aim, said Mr. Donahoe, is to help improve the health of Nova Scotians by encouraging proper eating habits, and to achieve this purpose, they are available to work and cooperate with schools, institutions, and community groups.

Next year's CWNA convention will be held in Ontario — either Toronto, Hamilton, or Niagara Falls — and not in Halifax as originally scheduled. Lack of adequate hotel accommodation in Halifax has caused the change in plans. However, it is hoped that the situation will have improved by 1960 and that year has been reserved for Halifax to host the CWNA.
The 1959 convention will be held in Regina.

New Company Incorporated

According to information a new company has recently been organized here. Principals of the new company, which is to be known as Fundy Scallop Packers Ltd., are Charles Dickson Sabean, Digby; Henry Joseph Lewis, Waterford, and Thomas Augustine Sabean, of Digby.
The company, which has purchased the former Sanford's Market building in Conway, will also operate other fish processing and handling plants in Digby and vicinity. It is understood.
Objects of the 'new company' as outlined in their incorporation are to purchase, process, store, pack and sell fish and other sea products; to build, purchase and operate ships and wharves, storehouse, flakes and other kinds of building for fish processing and handling.

Miss Harris, who is employed with the Maritime Telephone Co., Digby, is leaving for Fredericton, N. B., where she will be employed with the New Brunswick Telephone Co.

Illness Strikes Naval Base

Operations at the Cornwallis naval base were heavily curtailed last week when personnel were hit by an epidemic which hit some two hundred and fifty of the men at the base.
Last Thursday night a statement issued by the navy said "there is an unusual incidence of upper respiratory disease" at the base. The statement said there was no evidence of any connection between the outbreak and Asiatic flu.
All of the cases, reported at the base were classified as "mild". A naval spokesman said the men affected were expected to be back on duty in a few days. It was reported last week some twenty men had been hospitalized while "others" were being treated without hospitalization.
Dr. J. S. Robertson, Nova Scotia's Deputy Minister of Health, said the symptoms of the outbreak at Cornwallis were similar to the old fashioned influenza but also resembled Asiatic flu. He said the illness was under investigation by provincial health laboratories.
A semi-quarantine was placed on the naval base last week as a precautionary measure to help prevent further spread of the illness. Single personnel were not allowed to leave the base, while married personnel living in the area were instructed to go to their homes but not elsewhere. Training periods for the Reserve Army and Sea Cadet Corps, scheduled for last week, were cancelled. A number of civilian non-essential help were also instructed to remain off duty for a time during the outbreak.
According to reports early this week no increase had been noted in the number of cases and it appeared the epidemic was under control.
Civilian doctors in the valley area expressed no alarm over the outbreak. A few said a number of cases of ordinary flu were being treated but nothing out of the ordinary had been found.
Doctors especially emphasized that there was no cause for alarm either with ordinary flu or the Asiatic type.

Roll Call Held

On Sunday, September 15th, at 7:30 p.m., the annual roll call service of the Church of Christ at South Range was held.
As in former years the church was filled to capacity, with some extra chairs in use. The congregational singing was of its usual heartiness and volume, as the congregation sang "The Banner of the Cross", "When the Roll is Called up Yonder" and "Sound the Battle Cry". The response to the calling of the roll was an indication of the fine interest of the members in their church and the Kingdom of God.
Following the roll call, a moment of silence was observed in memory of Brother "Jess" Marshall, who departed this life during the year.
The service was conducted by the minister, Rev. J. A. Carr, who spoke on the theme "Break Your Pitchers", taking his texts from Judges, and Isaiah, pointing out that it will not be a world church, or great prestige and influence that will save the world, but each man and woman who, with Gideon's three hundred will stand in their place, blow their trumpets, and break their pitchers and let their light shine.
The choir, under the capable leadership of Miss Muriel Marshall, rendered three beautiful selections, the first a special arrangement of "Revive Us Again", "Jesus Lives" and "Will You Walk Today With Jesus", the last a selection in which a duet was sung by Mrs. Alton McCullough and Mr. Vernon Marshall.

Attendance Records Broken

According to a report by Mr. Howard Yorke, Secretary-Manager of the Digby County Exhibition, which closed in Bear River last week, attendance at the fair this year exceeded all previous figures. An objective was set some three years ago of \$1000 in gate receipts, and this year that figure was topped by \$221.75. A three acre parking lot, constructed this year on the exhibition grounds, was filled to capacity by four o'clock each day of the fair.
Fifteen hundred and forty-seven entries were placed in the exhibition this year from 423 exhibitors, Mr. Yorke said. Leading the list of exhibitors was Chipman Chisholm, of Bear River, with 83 entries. John Harrow followed with 76; Mrs. Roy Snell, 46, and Fred Woodworth, 41.
Israel Saulnier's team from Mayflower, Digby County, was the winner of the provincial free-for-all horse pull, open to competitors from all over Nova Scotia, which was a feature of the closing day of the fair. Mr. Saulnier's team, weighing 2513 pounds, pulled 6685 pounds, or 2.77%.
Placing second in the closely fought contest was Clarence Oickle's team from Blockhouse, Lunenburg County. This team, weighing 2837, pulled 8035, or 2.73%. Third place went to L. Daniel's team from Burlington, Kings County. This team, weight 2903, pulled 7785, or 2.68%.
Plans for an expansion in the plant of the Digby County Exhibition at Bear River were announced by Mr. Yorke in his report given at the close of this year's exhibition. He said it was hoped to build a new building 30' x 60' two stories in height, to house entertainment concessions and commercial exhibits.
This year work of rewiring the buildings on the fair grounds was completed at a cost of more than one thousand dollars. The new electrical system permits hookup of any unit anywhere on the grounds.
A cement foundation was also placed under the dining hall, and sleeping quarters for farm animal exhibitors completed. A new barn was also constructed, making three barns for livestock display now in operation at the exhibition.

Says No Pledge On Liquor Bars

A report in a national magazine that a Maritime syndicate had secured a commitment from the Stanfield government regarding cocktail bars for the Digby Pines Hotel, Lakeside Inn and Cornwallis Inn before purchasing these hotels was denied by Premier Stanfield in Halifax Tuesday.
"There is absolutely no foundation for a national magazine report that the government is pledged to allow cocktail bars in Nova Scotia by next year", the Premier said. He said the government had made no commitment to any group concerning cocktail bars in the province nor was it considering legislation which would make the province "wet", Mr. Stanfield stated.
The Premier said, however, "This does not mean to say we will not consider such legislation at some future time".
The magazine article claimed the government had given a guarantee regarding cocktail bars to a syndicate of Maritimers interested in buying the three luxury resort hotels. Premier Stanfield branded the story as "simply wild assumption from the fact someone wants to buy the hotels".

Particularly does it reflect credit on Mr. Howard Yorkie, the hard working, unassuming Secretary-Manager, who each year puts in literally months of work preparing the program, selling advertising, arranging for exhibits and doing all those last minute important things which are required "behind the scenes" to make the exhibition a success.

This year the exhibition was extended and arrangements made for the display of farm machinery and equipment. This is an excellent move and one which should be extended so that further displays of machinery and equipment, veterinary supplies and other products used in agriculture could be made. Those attending the exhibition are an already assembled audience for the witnessing of demonstrations by commercial firms which would undoubtedly be glad to pay a fee for the opportunity to display their products.

Despite a dry summer, displays of fruits and vegetables at this year's exhibition were superior in number and quality to those of other years. The farmers of the area are to be commended for their efforts each year to improve the quality of their entries and increase their number. The exhibition is primarily for the display of farm produce, livestock and home arts, and successful efforts have been made each year to improve both the quality and quantity of these.

In closing we again commend all those who have had anything to do with the Digby County Exhibition for their efforts. The friendly competition stimulated by such exhibitions is one of the factors which prompts the farmers of this area to improve their produce and its production — anything therefore which is done to develop the Digby County Exhibition to promote greater competition and increase opportunities for our agricultural people to learn more about the industry in which they are engaged will bring benefit to all in this county.

What About Hockey?

Now that the baseball season, so far as Digby is concerned at least, is at an end, it is time to start thinking about another sport — hockey.

This year has shown conclusively that a local "home brew" team can go far in amateur sports. For the first time in six years Digby took the Valley championship and went on to play in the provincial semi-finals.

Once this is done then a meeting of all those interested in hockey should be convened so that a hockey club may be reorganized and contact made with other communities in connection with organization of league play.

It must be remembered that this year the St. Anne's team will have their own artificial ice rink which should stimulate added interest along the French Shore in Western Valley League hockey. Whatever is to be done in Digby in connection with hockey should be gotten underway now so that when the time comes for actual play we are really ready.

So, happy school days, boys and girls. We're glad we have you and we mean to help you because we think you're pretty important people.

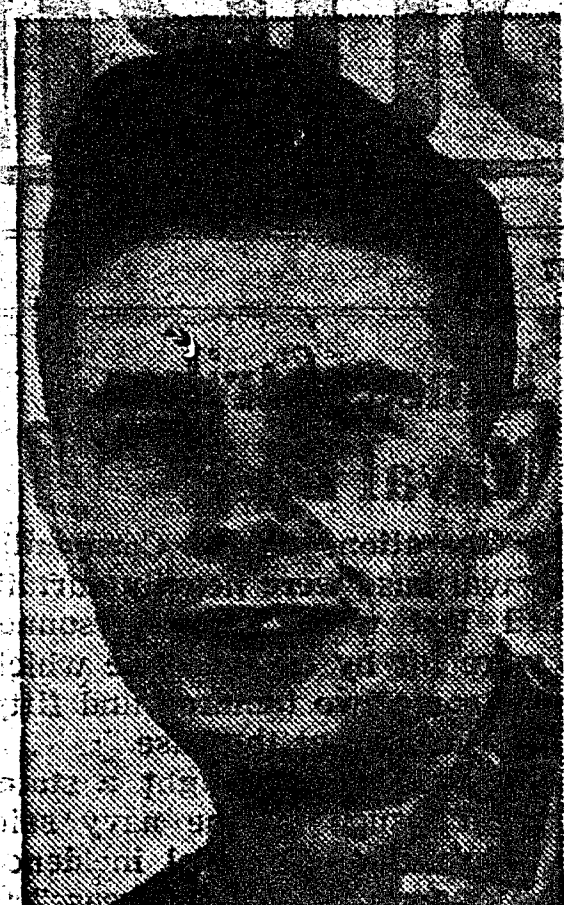

National Civic Defence Day

Every Canadian Community — the biggest and the smallest — has a part to play in Canada's Civil Defence program, stated the Hon. E. D. Halliburton, Minister in Charge of Civil Defence for the Province. If it doesn't play that part, he went on to say, the community one day might suddenly die.

The prospect of a nuclear war must be faced. And because it must be, Friday, October 4, has been designated as Civil Defence Day nationwide to remind Canadians of this necessity.

The target city can save its inhabitants only by complete dispersal. But the evacuees must have a place to disperse to. That's where the rest of the country comes in — as reception centres, except in remote cases.

The first evacuees, the non-essential people, would arrive over a period of six hours. They would be billeted on the basis of one for each member of a household in the reception areas.

The rest of the evacuees would arrive later, over a shorter period. Whether a community received the first evacuees would depend on its distance from a target area. The last evacuees would have to be put up by the communities nearest the target area. They wouldn't have time to go further.

A reception area could expect about two hours warning that a flood of evacuees was coming. Obviously, it would be too late to prepare to accommodate them once the bombs were falling. To lay out the necessary plans in advance is the purpose of Civil Defence.

It is the government's job — the federal, provincial and municipal governments — to get a Civil Defence plan started appropriate to the area its responsibility covers.

But from that point on, all government effort is a waste of public funds and effort without the essential support of its citizens. Sir Winston Churchill stated in March 1955 that No City, no family nor any honorable men or women can repudiate this Civil Defence duty, and accept from others help which they are not prepared to fit themselves to render in return. None must deny it as they live.

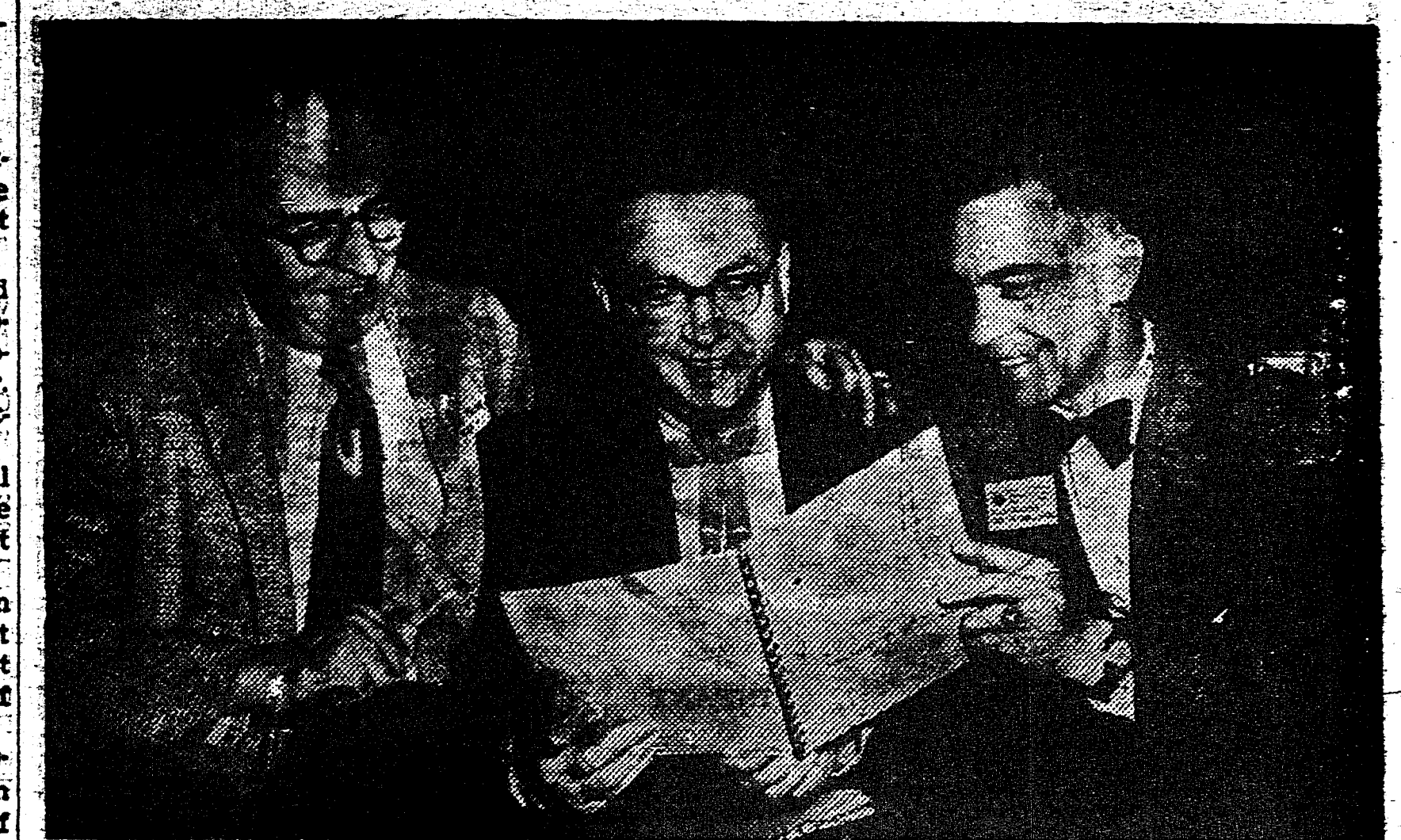

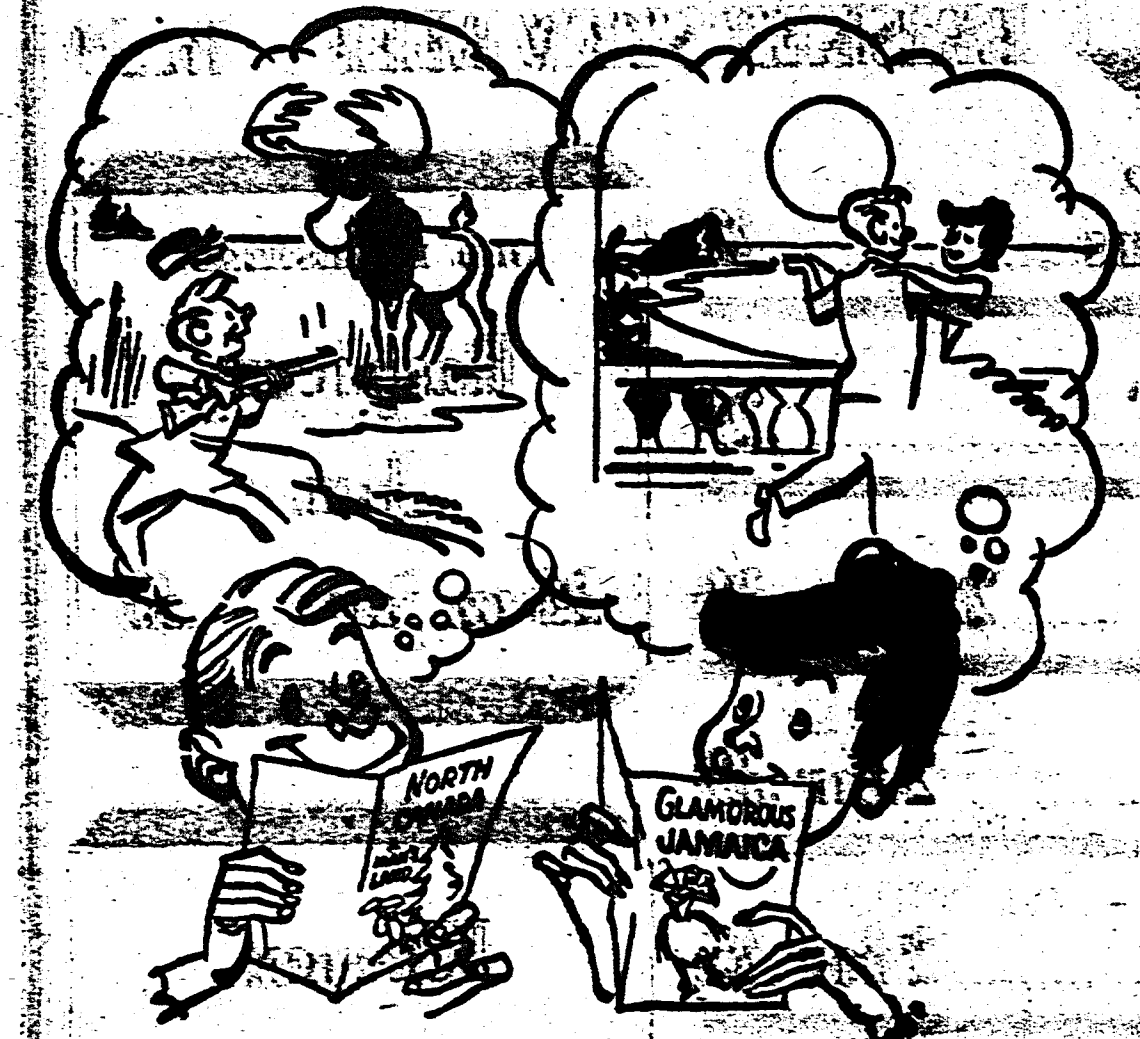

THE FIRST BOOTLEGGER
One of the first laws of the white man in North America forbade the selling of liquor to the Indians. However, there were in those days, as in these, citizens who were more interested in profit than in community welfare.
Some citizens used to ride out to the frontier with bottles of booze hidden in the long leggings that were popular at the time. It was from this practice that the word "bootlegging" came.
It's still used in connection with liquor. And it has cropped up recently in the automobile business, as well. A car bootlegger, if you don't know, sells new cars but is not franchised to do so by a manufacturer.
His new cars look like the same cars you can buy from a dealer who is franchised. But there's an important difference.
Very often, in fact usually, the car bootlegger has no service facilities to check over the new car before it's sold. And new cars do need thorough checking before they're sold. You buy blind when you buy from a bootlegger.
If the bootlegger has no service garage, or only minor service facilities, he's not interested in winning your continued confidence so you'll come back for tune-ups, oil changes and repairs. In fact, once he's sold the car he never wants to see you again.
You can imagine what kind of monkey business this leads to.
The bootlegger may offer you the manufacturer's warranty, or he may offer you his usual used-car warranty that often has so many holes in it that it should be used in the bootleg business rather than the car business.
Whatever the lures offered and however large the big type in his ads, the fact remains that once you're off his lot the bootlegger has no interest, really, in how your car operates.

Attend Convention

The Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Duncan of Bethel Tabernacle, Digby, and the Rev. and Mrs. Stuart Mulligan of Calvary Temple, Tiddville, have returned home after attending the World Missions Convention of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada in Halifax.

During the convention sessions the denomination's 1958 educational, home & foreign missions and literature departments programs were unveiled.

Pointing to the challenge of new suburban areas, the new towns and cities in Canada's expanding Northland, officials told delegates that the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada plan to establish another 100 churches in 1958. The fast-growing missionary-minded denomination now numbers approximately 680 affiliated and associated churches in Canada.

In addition to the strong "home missions" work in the seven district conferences across Canada, the denomination maintains work amongst Canadian Indians in different parts of the country and the Eskimos in Canada's Northland.

The denomination has a large foreign missions program with 120 missionaries in 12 overseas fields, with five overseas theological schools for the training of national ministers to serve their own people.

Visits Charlottetown

M. S. Leonard, Education Minister for the Province of Nova Scotia, left on Sunday for Charlottetown as part of a Nova Scotia delegation to the regular semi-annual meeting of APEC. The Nova Scotia delegation is headed by Premier Robert Stanfield.

One matter of business attended to at the Charlottetown meeting was the decision to establish an Atlantic House in Great Britain. The Atlantic premises said that Atlantic House in Great Britain would also act as a tourist promotion agency which would be of great service to the Atlantic area.

The Council took no stand on the question of Nova Scotia's liquor laws as effecting hotels in the province.

Dr. A. E. Kerr, president of Dalhousie University, said at the meeting that liberalized liquor laws turned hotels into centres for liquor distribution.

Any increase in alcohol consumption would be bad for the country and would have an adverse effect upon the young people. He said that Nova Scotia was a community of families and young people — not a community of hotels.

Dr. Kerr said that any APEC move to urge government legislation liberalizing liquor laws would be unfortunate for APEC.

Nova Scotia's liquor laws were termed by some as ridiculous and disgraceful. Others concurred with Dr. Kerr's remarks and no stand on the question was taken.

Deal With Traffic Problem

Efforts are being made by local police and fire authorities to curb traffic practices which are creating serious problems following the sounding of the fire alarm in Digby.

It is pointed out that car drivers following too closely behind fire apparatus on the way to a fire and driving or parking too close to fire equipment while it is in use.

It is pointed out that such practices are against the law and constitute a serious hazard for firemen and fire apparatus in the performance of duty.

The law states that all vehicles must pull to the curb on the approach of police or fire department vehicles giving audible signal by bell or siren and that it is an offence to follow within five hundred feet of any fire apparatus which is answering an alarm. It is also unlawful to drive or park within five hundred feet of any fire apparatus which has stopped to answer an alarm.

Fire authorities point out that so far little serious effect has resulted from the failure of local motorists to properly observe the law in this respect, but state they feel it must be firmly enforced in order to prevent possible tragedy.

Another traffic violation which is to be curbed is the practice of parking too close to fire hydrants. It is pointed out this happens frequently during shopping hours on the town's main street, particularly on Saturday nights, and it is planned to clamp down on violators.

The Meteghan detachment of the RCMP investigated the accident and Coroner C. C. Nichol of Weymouth, ruled no inquest was necessary.

Digby, Nova Scotia, Sept. 23, 1957.

The Editor, The Courier, Dear Mrs. Wallis:

May I take this opportunity of expressing, through the columns of your paper, my appreciation of the splendid job being done by the committee in charge of school exhibits at the Digby County Exhibition.

It has been my privilege, since 1952, to have charge of the exhibits placed in the exhibition by pupils of the Digby Regional High School and the cooperation and courtesy which has been shown by the committee at Bear River has certainly made my job a most pleasant one.

Heavy Haddock Catch Reported

An extremely heavy catch of haddock off Bear's Head near Tiverton was reported last week. Early in the week a large school of haddock was discovered in the area and many druggers from ports all over the county gathered to take advantage of the school.

At one time twenty-one druggers were fishing in the waters off Bear's Head and catches as high as 70,000 pounds a boat were reported. Fish processing plants along the Neck were reported flooded with the catch and some were taken by United States druggers to American ports for processing.

The fish were mostly of a large size and the market price was four cents a pound.

Speaks On A.C.T.C.

About twenty from Grace United Church, Digby, motored to Annapolis Royal on Thursday evening to hear Dr. "Bill" Clarke of the Prairie Christian Training Centre in Manitoba, tell of the work of the training centre at Tatamagouche, Nova Scotia, and of the other three similar training centres in Canada.

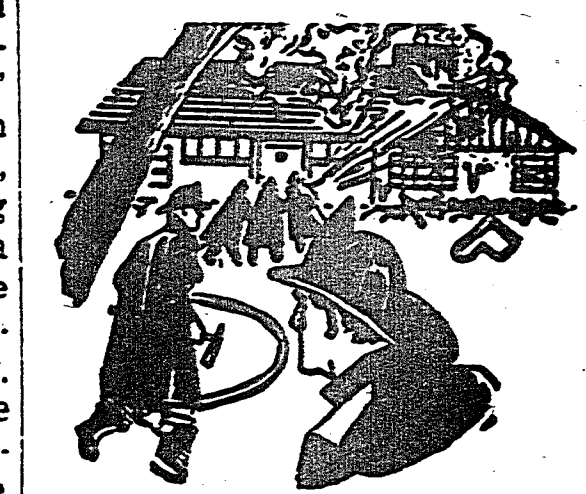
Digby Group Approves Petition

A petition, asking the Dominican government to lift its ban of last July restricting the religious activities of Jehovah's Witnesses in that country, was approved by the Digby congregation of the Witnesses here last Sunday.

Mr. Holmes, presiding minister of the Digby group, dealt extensively with the petition and told of specific instances of brutality which it is claimed were done to Jehovah's Witnesses' missionary workers in the Dominican Republic. He said these instances and names of persons involved had been personally authenticated by eight of the ten missionaries deported in August.

The Courier was impressed with remarks made at the opening of the Digby County Exhibition this year by Mr. William LeForte, Agricultural Representative for Digby County, with regard to the need for development of "4-H" Clubs among the farm youth of this county.

It seems to us this is a most worthwhile suggestion and one which should be followed up by those who are interested in agriculture in this area.

Far too often we hear sad stories about our youth leaving the farms to seek fame and fortune elsewhere. The result of this exodus from our farm lands is an impoverishment of our county, especially so far as agriculture is concerned. It is disheartening, too, for parents to see their youngsters leave the family farm for this means that improvements, modernization and the like that are being made by farmers in their holdings can only be considered as something for their own lifetime alone.

For many years city life has had a great deal of glamour for youth but there seems to be growing up in this age a feeling that, perhaps after all, city living may not be all that youth in years gone by have thought it was. If this feeling does exist then the time is certainly ripe to do something to capitalize on it in such fashion that country life and life on the farm may increase in its appeal to our youth.

Establishment of "4-H" Clubs is an important way of doing this for through these clubs youngsters from an early age are, through their own participation, taught to see the real values that are inherent in rural life. They learn the true joy of accomplishment in raising a calf to show at the local exhibition; they participate in the excitement of friendly competition at county fairs and they learn to cooperate and work together in an organization that provides a centre for both education and fun in their community.

As a matter of fact, the establishment of a "4-H" Club in a rural community will do much to dispel the complaint that there is just nothing for young people to do in the small rural community. Not only does such a club provide a means for development of real community spirit among the youngsters but it also binds farm youth everywhere together in one common organization with identical aims and purposes.

In Digby County there is much said about the decline of agriculture and the exodus of our youth — It does little good to bemoan this fact if we are not prepared to do something about it. So far as agriculture goes, we have conditions in this county that are as conducive to the successful conduct of this industry as they are in many other areas in the province. Our soil is good, well suited to the production of many crops; opportunities exist here for the development of a successful stock raising industry; we are favorably situated so far as markets for small fruits and garden produce are concerned and many other factors exist that point to the possibility of sound expansion in agriculture.

It is true there are many handicaps that must be overcome. Perhaps our farm units are too small for economic use of modern and expensive farm machinery but here lies a challenge that can be met if it is properly faced in the right spirit of cooperation and desire to overcome. Through organizations such as "4-H" we can get expert advice and assistance in dealing with these problems so that the coming generations of farm dwellers in this county will be able to cope with the problems that do exist in a more efficacious manner than did their parents.

All in all, we feel there is great merit in what Mr. LeForte had to say about "4-H" and we voice the sincere hope that his efforts in this direction will meet with the necessary support to enable them to succeed.

CD's Dual Role In Peace And War Explained

Created by the modern need to protect whole nations from war's destruction, Civil Defence has a valuable place in peace as well. It can reduce loss of life and property in any form of disaster, which can strike anywhere, anytime, the Provincial Civil Defence Co-ordinator, Major George A. Boggs explained today.

This year for the first time, a day — Friday, October 4 — has been designated as National Civil Defence Day.

To meet the threat of war, essentially the same services are required by Civil Defence as are required to offset the threat of destruction from fire, flood, earthquake, tornado, explosion or any other form of sudden and unexpected disaster.

The advantage of Civil Defence in any disaster is that it provides a co-operation of these services. It enables them, once trained and adequately prepared, to move quickly and smoothly into united action.

Services co-ordinated for action under a Civil Defence director and his staff, acting under advice from planning Committees, include:

Police, with volunteer auxiliaries, to maintain law and order;

Firemen, with pre-trained volunteers, to meet additional fire hazards in disaster, peace or war;

Health services — doctors, nurses, first-aid specialists and others trained to help — for treatment of injuries and maintenance of community health;

Rescue workers trained to rescue persons trapped in buildings damaged by blast, fire, earthquake, whatever;

Information services to minimize fear and shock reaction by keeping people informed of what is being done to help them;

Welfare services to provide food, shelter and other similar help to the homeless;

Engineering service to help restore public utilities — electricity, gas, water, sewer — to normal;

Radiation monitoring service, in event of atomic war, to let the public know when areas are safe from radiation hazards.

All of these services, already in existence, are the basis for a sound Civil Defence organization. Once the preliminary planning is ready to meet disaster, man-made or natural.

National Immunization Week

National Immunization Week is being observed September 22-29 for the 15th consecutive year.

The event, said Dr. H. B. Colford, provincial director of communicable diseases control, Department of Health, is part of the continuous campaign carried on by official health departments against the communicable diseases which can be prevented by immunization.

To immunize against an infection, he said, means to stimulate the human organism to protect itself against the invasion of the germs of disease. The diseases in question include smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and now poliomyelitis. The vaccine called BCG vaccine is effective in the prevention of tuberculosis.

National Immunization Week, organized by the Health League of Canada, in co-operation with official health depart-

ments, is an annual reminder to parents that immunization will protect their children from these diseases. The prevention of certain communicable diseases by immunization is one of medical science's most dramatic victories. All parents should see that their children receive this protection from their doctor or local health centre.

"It is important that immunization commence at an early age, namely about three to five months. It is important, too, that parents who have had their children immunized, must remember that the protection is not permanent and that it has to be maintained by booster injections at regular intervals," said Dr. Colford.

Through the co-operation of parents, physicians and research workers, there is no doubt that poliomyelitis, like smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, will be a preventable disease. However, it is the responsibility of parents to avail themselves of the immunization procedures which will protect their children from diseases which no longer should menace their health, happiness and right to a full life.

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 3 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 tbs. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each

portion into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

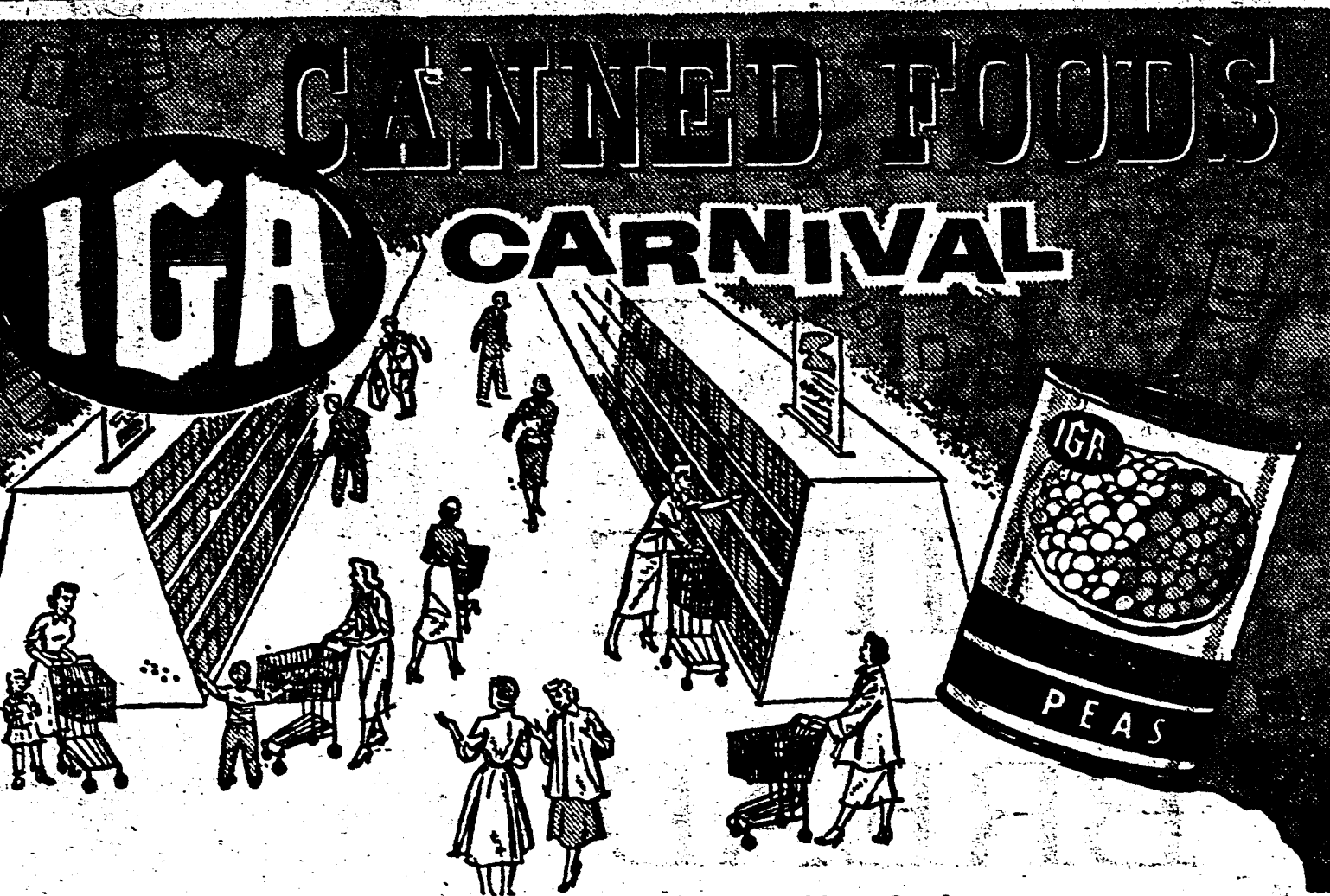

Letter to the Editor

The Editor, The Courier,
Dear Madam:

May I take a little space in your paper to bring to the attention of the public of Digby a practice which is, according to my information, being carried on at the government information bureau here which is detrimental to business in Digby, particularly the hotel and restaurant business.

I refer to the practice of advising tourists who go to the information bureau that they must go out of Digby to get a good place to eat or a good place to stay.

Time and time again this summer I have had people come to my restaurant and say they did not know there was such a place in Digby. They said they were told at the information bureau that they would have to go to Smith's Cove, Brighton or some other place if they wanted to get a meal.

So far I have not made any complaint about this but today I had a party of four people in for breakfast who told me the same story. This party came from Pennsylvania and said they had visited the information bureau Monday night and had been advised they would have to go to Smith's Cove to get a meal. After eating breakfast at the Scotia they said they were going back to the bureau to

speak to those there about the matter.

Nine years ago I came to Digby and took over the Scotia Restaurant. Since that time I have spent some \$45,000 to modernize the restaurant and install the best equipment I could get. After all this it is discouraging to hear that people are being told there is no place to eat in Digby. I have supplied the information bureau with cards and matches advertising the restaurant which I expected would be given out or at least made available to people who visited the bureau so they would know there was such a restaurant here.

I am writing to the proper government department about this matter as I feel it is a serious one. I do not expect that any one restaurant or business should get special mention at the tourist bureau, but I do feel the travelling public should be properly informed that there are good eating places in Digby and also good places in which to stay.

It is my hope you will publish this letter so that the public may be informed about this matter. It is one which affects the welfare of our town.
