About This and That

An Alarming Situation

Everyone in Digby who gives thought to matters which affect the welfare of the community and its people will be shock ed to learn from an advertisement which appears in another part of today's Courier that the Digby General Hospital is facing an alarming financial situation.

According to this advertisement the hospital has a bank overdraft of \$14,267.27. This is indeed serious but what is even more alarming is the reason for this drastic financial position. This is apparent from further figures which appear in the advertisement to the effect that accounts receivable by the hospital amount to \$49,057.14.

This means simply that people are not paying their hospital bills. No doubt there is a certain percentage of people in this area who simply cannot pay their hospital bills. However, from the figure quoted as outstanding receivable accounts there are a lot of people who are shirking their financial responsibility so far as their debts to the hospital are concerned.

foregone conclusion that if the financial position of the hospital ors followed, the hospital will be forced to close in the near future. is not shortly improved drastic measures, even to closing the institution, will have to be taken. This is nothing but sound logic and plain reasoning.

A homely adage says that "you never miss the water 'til the well runs dry" and this is tragically true with regard to the services which a hospital renders to the community it serves. Surely we in this community cannot afford to risk the lives and health of those we love by letting our hospital close.

What can we do about it? That is a large question but it can be answered simply and the answer is this - each and everyone of us can begin to take a closer and more active interest in the welfare of the hospital. We can attend the annual hospital meeting at the Digby Regional High School tonight and add the weight of our efforts and opinion to those who are now trying to solve the problems with which the hospital is faced.

So far as the main problem of failure to pay bills owed to the hospital is concerned, we can help there too. If anyone who reads this owes an account to the hospital then he or she should make immediate arrangements to pay it. If anyone has knowledge of those who owe the hospital and who are able to pay but are not paying, then it is their civic duty to remind these people of the obligation they have to themselves and their fellow citizens to pay up, that the life giving services of the hospital will continue to be available to them and to those of their fellows who may need them.

Journalism, Management Offer \$900 In Bursaries

Entrance bursaries for freshmen registering in Journalism or Printing Management at Ryerson Institute of Technology were announced this week by E. U. Schrader, director.

"Students entering from high school have only two months in which to earn money, and the advisory committee has designated a special fund of \$900 to aid them," Mr. Schrader said.

Bursaries are: Fairchild Canada (for the son or daughter of a weekly editor or a student recommended by a weekly editor) \$200; Saskatchewan Weekly Newspapers Association (for a student from Western Canada) \$100; Canadian Weekly Editor magazine (for the son or daughter of a weekly editor, or a student recommended by a weekly editor) \$100; The Ault and Wiborg Co. of Canada, \$100; The Canadian Fine Color Co. Ltd., \$100; The Canadian Linotype Co. Ltd., \$50; Canada Printing Ink Co., Ltd., \$50; Latimer Ltd., \$50; Saturday Night Press, \$100; The United Church Publishing House, \$50.

Qualifying examinations based on high school work are written in September to decide the winners.

Students completing first year may compete for \$950 in scholarships. Second-year Printing Management and Journalism each have \$900 available for scholarships. An extra \$800 is available in a bursary fund to be awarded to students on the basis of academic standing and need.

Things To Do

We are on the threshold of the two great holiday months of the year and Nova Scotia's program of planned events for the entertainment of visitors during that time is now complete.

Two characteristics emerge from the galaxy of things to do. First, as might be expected in a province which, except for a narrow isthmus, is completely surrounded by water, is the sea and the pleasures it affords. Second, again as might be expected in a province whose name and traditions derive from Scotland, is a gaelic flavour in games and functions.

Apart from the general pleasures of sand beaches with their swimming, boating and casual playtime occupations, July and August this year will see many planned entertainments. Special sea shore events will be the 8th Biennial New England-Halifax Yacht Race from Marblehead, Mass., to Halifax, Nova Scotia on July 8, Chester Yacht Race Week from July 28 -August 3, ending with the Coronation Cup Series, Lunenburg Race Week on the week ending August 3, Halifax Race Week from July 22-27, the Canso Regatta on August 7, the Armdale Regatta on August 10-12 and the Water Carnival at Bridgewater on August 14.

Events possessing a Scottish flavour are the Gaelic College Summer School at St. Ann's in Cape Breton which extends throughout the two months and, from August 6-11, the famous annual event of the Gaelic Mod. On July 6, there will be the Highland Gathering at Truro, and, on July 16-17, the Highland Games at Antigonish. Pugwash combines both Scottish and sea enjoyments with its Gathering of the Clans and Fishermen's Regatta (July 1).

These are merely a sample of the things-to-do in Nova Scotia during July and August. The Rose Show of the Halifax Horticultural Association, the Bear River Cherry Carnival, July 17, the Garden Party at Bridgewater, the Annual Orchards Tour of the Annapolis Valley and the Flower Show at Truro and Halifax, will also have their adherents. Sportsmen's and Guides' Meets, golf and tennis tournaments, exhibitions, fairs, dramatic and artistic entertainments will add even more variety to the list. The Acadian Festival in the Church Point and French Shore area is something which visitors to that district from August 8-15 will not wish to miss.





Scald % c. milk, 1/3 c. granulated sugar, 11/2 tsps. salt and 1/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten ess and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flow; beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flows. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic.

Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9' wide and 24' long; loosen dough. Combine ½ c. lightly-packed brown sugar and ½ c. lightly-packed brown sugar and ½ c. liquid honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with ¾ c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased 8½' tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

Conducting Survey

Cornell University is currently conducting a survey in the Digby area as part of a new community study recently begun at Cornell, in Ithaca, N. Y. The work here takes the form of interviews with a sample of the population, chosen by chance. The survey is being administered by a team of specially chosen interviewers.

The focus of the Cornell study is on the relationship of certain types of community agencies with the communities they serve. Little work has been completed in this field, but it is needed if agencies are to serve most usefully. The work here in Digby will be related to work done in many other areas along

similar lines. The study is being carried out by Dr. and Mrs. William Longaker, now research associates at Cornell. It is a new unit within the larger Cornell Program for Research in Community Development directed by Dr. Alexander H. Leighton, which has previously also carried out studies in this area. Dr. and Mrs. Longaker, former residents of Digby, who now live in Ithaca, are spending much of the summer here while this survey is in progress.

Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steamfilled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with commeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

to the cats, who developed paralysis.

The first boats which engaged in scalloping here were ordinary fishing boats, Captain Wormell says, and it was not until much later that specialized draggers were introduced. The drags which were first used, too, were crude affairs and not at all like the efficient ones of today, he says.

Early drags, he says, were made of marlin and later rigging wire was used for the bottom with marlin on top. The rope was done away with altogether later. Steel rings later replaced the wire and then trailers and spreader bars to increase the efficiency of the The Digby Ravens smothered drags were introduced. At first, Captain Wormell says, there were no restrictions on the size of the drags and fishermen were trying to outdo one another with bigger and bigger drags. Finally as a conservation measure a limit of eighteen feet was placed on the drags and the size of the mesh was also limited.

During the early years of scalloping, Captain Wormell game. says, the scallo is were found more in bunches than at present and were much larger than those caught today. Most scallops were caught in the early days about four miles off Broad Cove in the Bay of Fundy, he says. Today the boats go much further off and the fish are scattered rather than found in heavily populated "beds"...

One of the first real scallop draggers was the Lizzie B. which Captain Wormell and Ernest VanTassel operated. This vessel had a length of 45 feet and beam of 14 feet. Another early scallop dragger was rors. the sloop "Boudreau Bros."

The only extinguishing agent entirely safe is a dry chemical. No attempt should be made to move the set outdoors and no one should stand in front of it. Windows should be opened in the home in case of

Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays." These figures, striking in themselves, tell only a part of the story. A man whose life work was concerned with road safety once stated a personal opinion that, if the full facts were known, over 99 per cent of traffic accidents would be classed as due to

What he meant by "the full facts" was that, where an accident may be put down to the failure of a vehicle's brakes, (and therefore classed as a mechanical fault), if the driver was aware of a weakness in his brakes before he set out on his trip, the fault is wrongly classed — it should really be classed as a human one.

So, if the cause of accidents is human failing, it is entirely up to ourselves whether we have accidents or not. We all know the rules of safe driving - make sure we are rested, keep clear of strong drink, take it easy on long trips, with occasional stops for a cup of tea or coffee, obey speed limits and traffic signs, be especially cautious in bad weather or at night.

These are but a few of the things we can do to save life on the road. A little thought would produce many more.

Road safety is not really a difficult problem. A mathematician would delight in its simple logic. Two stationary vehicles can- 49:2i not collide. Two moving vehicles colliding do so at the sum of their individual speeds. It's as simple as that — the faster we go, the greater our danger. If we want to live, we must slow down.

During his term of postal service Mr. Vroom also carried the mail from Deep Brook Railway station (removed in 1956) to and from the Post Office. During the building of the Cornwallis Naval Base and up until the Post Office was erected at Cornwallis, all mail passed through Deep Brook office. Mr. Vroom also served the rural route, including Waldec West, which has been delivered by horse and buggy, by jeep, and by automobile.

His wife, Winnie, who served faithfully and graciously as assistant, will also be missed by the public. During Mr. Vroom's time spent in the Army service she carried the postal service on alone for 13 months.

Even postmasters get "lashed to the mast", Mr. Vroom said, recalling the time he was quarantined in the Post Office building during a poliomyelitis outbreak in the family in 1942.

View of NSPC Gulch Plant, Bear River





About This and That

Health Care For Children

In the next few weeks children will be going back to school. For many — the beginners — it will be the first time they have had wide contact with other children. Such contact likely means exposure for the first time to communicable diseases, so

parents can expect several bouts with different illnesses.

For the more serious diseases, children should be immunized — and if they have been immunized as infants, they should have booster doses before they start school. These diseases in at North Weymouth. clude diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and smallpox. Diphtheria and smallpox have almost been eliminated in this country who have spent the past month by immunization and so little is heard of them now that parents are apt to become complacent and forget the dreadful damage they can cause. However, these diseases are not by any means ed to their home in Windsor, wiped out and there is a continuing need for immunization if Ont., on Friday. they are to be avoided.

Early recognition of symptoms and prompt treatment will help to lessen the severity of communicable diseases and to prevent complications. Parents should watch for these symptoms:

Sore throat, fever and head cold.

Vomiting and loss of appetite.

Irritability or unusual drowsiness:

Muscle weakness and neck rigidity.

Rashes and sensitivity of the eyes to light.

A child showing any of these symptoms should be put to kept warm and quiet and given plenty of fluids to drink (if Mass., is visiting her brother, he is not vomiting). He should be kept apart from other children Henry Sulis. until it is certain whether or not an infectious disease is develop-

A doctor should be called as soon as the child appears ill. In addition to immunization, a child's resistance to infection can be increased by seeing that he:

Obtains sufficient sleep and rest.

Eats regular meals and has an adequate diet.

Gets sunshine, fresh air and exercise each day.

Gives prompt attention to cuts, abrasions and other wounds. Wears suitable clothing in cold and wet weather.

Keep his person and surroundings scrupulously clean, paying particular attention to clean hands and finger nails. He should be taught to keep hands, pencils, pens, money and other such





"The rising accident rate has been a matter of concern for some time to the departments of education and highways", Mr. Leonard said, and it was decided that an experiment in training high school sutdents to be competent drivers should be undertaken.

The course at Digby will not affect any time alloted to academic studies but will be given during time alloted to other than academic subjects, after school hours and on Saturday mornings. The course will be given to two groups of students one course commencing soon after school opening this week

The instructor will be Clinton MacInnes, of the staff of the school, who completed a special course in driver instruction in Ontario in July.

All pupils must have the written consent of their parents or guardians and must possess beginners' licenses issued by the department of highways, which means they must be over 16 years of age.

"The final result of the course," Mr. Leonard said, 'should be the qualification of most of those taking it as regularly licensed, competent drivers.'

Similar courses in the United States, he said, had apparently had good results. In a study by the American Automobile Association, he said, it was found that drivers so trained and licensed under such circumstances had a lower accident rate, with less loss of life and injury

had not received the training. The car to be used will be provided on a loan basis, Mr. Leonard said, with the cost of equipping it with dual controls to be borne by the department of education. There would be no cost to the municipal school

board, he said. The course has been planned for some months and Digby was selected — early in the summer — "because it has taken the lead in many new educational developments."

Watch For Children

Children, carefree for the summer, will be back to school by the end of the week. Some of these children are going to school for the first time. They are full of excitement and anxiety. School is their main concern and getting there will not present a major

problem as far as their young minds are concerned. Nevertheless, most children at school-beginner age have not had much experience in navigating their own way across streets and around traffic. It is up to parents to impress on children as vividly as possible the necessity of observing highway safety rules and to ever place before them their own example of highway safety. Children must be warned to cross streets in the town's particular safety lanes. They must be taught to look both ways for traffic before crossing or entering a street. A problem which has appeared within the past years is that of children loading and unloading from busses. Parents should warn children to watch for traffic before scampering away to the classroom. Or. safety zones for loading and unloading school busses might be considered. In any case, parents cannot be too cautious in preparing their children for a safe jour-

To motorists, we would give the reminder that adult minds cannot be put on the school-child shoulders. A child's actions cannot, in most cases, be predicted and the motorist must be ever diligent near school zones or at the time of the day when children will be going or coming from school. Watch when school busses are stopped. Better not pass from either direction than to witness a child killed or maimed for life. Be courteous - give the child the benefit of the doubt in any case. Remember, a child rarely deliberately walks in front of your car. The attention of a young child can so easily be attracted to something far different from traffic responsibility. Yours are the adult shoulders.

Courtesy To Tourists

We have no intention of burdening our readers with an account of the editor's vacation tour through part of the beautiful -and scenic Eastern Nova Scotia and Northern New Brunswick. However, anything which is beneficial to the tourist industry in Nova Scotia is worth mentioning here. Truck Overturns

Clementsport.

A loaded freight truck, owned by Smith Transport Ltd., overturned here early Saturday morning shortly after making the corner near Warner's Service Station on Montague Row.

The truck was proceeding into town on the main highway when the accident occurred. It is understood some mechanical failure caused the truck to go out of control and overturn on the embankment at the site. 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About This and That

A Real Need

The Courier was impressed with remarks made at the opening of the Digby County Exhibition this year by Mr. William LeForte. Agricultural Representative for Digby County, with regard to the need for development of "4-H" Clubs among the farm youth of this county.

It seems to us this is a most worthwhile suggestion and one which should be followed up by those who are interested in agriculture in this area.

Far too often we hear sad stories about our youth leaving the farms to seek fame and fortune elsewhere. The result of this exodus from our farm lands is an impoverishment of our county, especially so far as agriculture is concerned. It is disheartening, too, for parents to see their youngsters leave the family farm for this means that improvements, modernization and the like that are being made by farmers in their holdings can only be envisioned as something for their own lifetime alone.

For many years city life has had a great deal of glamour for youth but there seems to be growing up in this age a feeling that, perhaps after all, city living may not be all that youth in years gone by have thought it was. If this feeling does exist then the time is certainly ripe to do something to capitalize on it in such fashion that country life and life on the farm may increase in its appeal to our youth.

Establishment of "4-H" Clubs is an important way of doing this for through these clubs youngsters from an early age are, through their own participation, taught to see the real values that are inherent in rural life. They learn the true joy of accomplishment in raising a calf to show at the local exhibition; they participate in the excitement of friendly competition at county fairs and they learn to cooperate and work together in an organization that provides a centre for both education and fun in their community.

As a matter of fact, the establishment of a "4-H" Club in a rural community will do much to dispel the complaint that there is just nothing for young people to do in the small rural community. Not only does such a club provide a means for development of real community spirit, among the youngsters but it also binds farm youth everywhere together in one common organization with identical aims and purposes.

In Digby County there is much said about the decline of agriculture and the exodus of our youth — it does little good to bemoan this fact if we are not prepared to do something about it. So far as agriculture goes, we have conditions in this county that are as conducive to the successful conduct of this industry as they are in many other areas in the province. Our soil is good, well suited to the production of many crops; opportunities exist here for the development of a successful stock raising industry; we are favorably situated so far as markets for small fruits and garden produce are concerned and many other factors exist that point to the possibility of sound expansion in agriculture.

It is true there are many handicaps that must be overcome. Perhaps our farm units are too small for economic use of modern and expensive farm machinery but here lies a challenge that can be met if it is properly faced in the right spirit of cooperation and desire to overcome. Through organizations such as "4H" we can get expert advice and assistance in dealing with these problems so that the coming generations of farm dwellers in this county will be able to cope with the problems that do exist in a more efficacious manner than did their parents.

All in all, we feel there is great merit in what Mr. LeForte had to say about "4-H" and we voice the sincere hope that his efforts in this direction will meet with the necessary support to enable them to succeed.

CD's Dual Role In Peace And War Explained

Created by the modern need to protect whole nations from war's destruction, Civil Defence has a valuable place in peace as well. It can reduce loss of life and property in any form of disaster, which can strike anywhere, anytime, the Provincial Civil Defence Co-ordinator, Major George A. Boggs explained today. This year for the first time, a day — Friday, October 4 —

has been designated as National Civil Defence Day. To meet the threat of war, essentially the same services are required by Civil Defence as are required to offset the threat of destruction from fire, flood, earthquake, tornado, explosion

or any other form of sudden and unexpected disaster. The advantage of Civil Defence in any disaster is that it provides a co-operation of these services. It enables them, once trained and adequately prepared, to move quickly and smoothly

into united action. Services co-ordinated for action under a Civil Defence director and his staff, acting under advice from planning Committees, include:

Police, with volunteer auxiliaries, to maintain law and

Firemen, with pre-trained volunteers, to meet additional

fire hazards in disaster, peace or war;

Health services - doctors, nurses, first-aid specialists and others trained to help — for treatment of injuries and maintenance of community health;

Rescue workers trained to rescue persons trapped in buildings damaged by blast, fire, earthquake, whatever;

Information services to minimize fear and shock reaction by keeping people informed of what is being done to help them; Welfare services to provide food, shelter and other similar help to the homeless;

Engineering service to help restore public utilities electricity, gas, water, sewer — to normal;

Radiation monitoring service, in event of atomic war, to let the public know when areas are safe from radiation hazards. All of these services, already in existence, are the basis for a sound Civil Defence organization. Once the preliminary planning is ready to meet disaster, man-made or natural.

National Immunization Week

National Immunization Week is being observed September

22-29 for the 15th consecutive year.

The event, said Dr. H. B. Colford, provincial director of communicable diseases control, Department of Health, is part of the continuous campaign carried on by official health departments against the communicable diseases which can be prevented by immunization.

To immunize against an infection, he said, means to stimulate the human organism to protect itself against the invasion of the germs of disease. The diseases in question include smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, and now poliomyelitis. The vaccine called BCG vaccine is effective in the prevention of tuber-

National Immunization Week, organized by the Health League of Canada, in co-operation with official health depart-

ments, is an annual reminder to parents that immunization will protect their children from these diseases. The prevention of certain communicable diseases by immunization is one of medical science's most dramatic victories. All parents should see that their children receive this protection from their doctor or local health

"It is important that immunization commence at an early age, namely about three to five months. It is important, too, that parents who have had their children immunized, must remember that the protection is not permanent and that it has to be maintained by booster injections at regular intervals," said Dr. Colford.

Through the co-operation of parents, physicians and research workers, there is no doubt that poliomyelitis, like small pov, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, will be a prevent able disease. However, it is the responsibility of parents to avail themselves of the immunization procedures which will protect their children from diseases which no longer should menace their health. happiness and right to a full life.
