Town Tax Rate Lowered

The tax rate for the Town of Digby for the year 1958 will be two and one-quarter cents on the hundred dollars of assessment lower than the 1957 rate, it has been decided by the Town Council. The 1958 tax rate has been set at \$3.12. The 1957 rate was \$3.14.

Total expenditures budgeted for 1958 by the town amount to \$137,869.30. Included in these are \$18,786 for protection to persons and property; \$19,210 for public works; \$11,350 for health and social welfare; \$36,679 for education and \$6,525 for community service. \$21,985 has been budgeted for debenture debt charges; \$6,300 for joint expenditure and \$5,150 as provision for reserves. General government estimate is \$6,986.

Included in budget figure for revenue in 1958 is \$17,711.33 in contributions, grants and subsidies. This is an increase of some \$5,000 over the amount actually received last year.

Digby Lashed By Storm

Mountainous seas of water swept across Montague Row and Water Street on Digby's waterfront here yesterday as a heavy gale, accompanied by snow and rain, raked the area.

During the height of the storm in the morning traffic detoured along 1st Avenue because of heavy waves and spray sweeping across the waterfront between the Salvation Army citadel and the government tourist bureau.

Gravel, seaweed and driftwood were carried up onto the roadway by the sea during the storm and in several places the waterfront was eroded almost to the edge of the pavement.

A portion of the foundation of the town bandstand was undermined by the pounding waves and a good deal of the bank was carried away at the rear of the tourist information bureau. Here, too, one of the cannons, which was placed there some years ago after it had been rescued from another storm, was tipped from its stand when the bank underneath was eroded by the waves.

At the long wharf damage by the storm was also quite heavy. Much of the facing of the spur pier was carried away by the pounding waves and the floating slip was torn from its moorings. Fears were expressed for the safety of boats of the fleet, moored in the lee of the spur pier, but little damage to these was reported.

All along the waterfront of the town logs and drifting debris were tossed about by the huge waves and as the tide receded the beach was littered with broken planks, pilings and other wreckage.

The CPS Princess Helene did not make her scheduled trip to Digby from Saint John due to the storm.

Local maritime authorities claim it is fortunate the storm did not strike at the height of the extremely high spring tide expected Sunday. Had this happened, they say, serious damage would have resulted to the whole of the Digby waterfront. It is expected Sunday's high tide will be in excess of 29 feet and a gale from the north-east such as that today would raise the water another four to six inches, it is claimed.

The storm, which began Tuesday evening, cut power and telephone service and some sections of the town were without power for several hours during the night. Maintenance crews of the power board and telephone company were on the job, however, and service was fully restored by mid-morning.

A number of ornamental trees were broken down by the storm and street light fixtures damaged.

During the storm five calls for chimney fires were received by the fire department. One of these was for a fire at the home of Fire Chief George Humphrey and another for a chimney fire at fire pump driver, Wilbur VanTassel's. The



Retiring After 26 Years

Mr. J. Elie Comeau, collector of customs-excise and registrar of shipping for the port of Digby, ceased active duty in that capacity on March 17th, commencing the six-months retirement leave accorded to civil servants. At the expiration of this leave, in September, Mr. Comeau will be placed on the retired list, after service with the Department of National Revenue for more than 26 years.

Mr. Comeau, a native of Lower Saultville, Digby Co., saw service with the 26th (New Brunswick) Battalion, Canadian Infantry, throughout World War I, serving in France continuously for more than three years. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal and the Military Medal during these years of active service, having enlisted as a private in 1914 and retiring with the rank of lieutenant in 1919.

After World War I Mr. Comeau spent several years in New York City, returning to Canada in 1921. He received the appointment of sub-collector of customs and excise at Meteghan River in 1932, and became collector at Weymouth in 1939. He has been in Digby since 1948, succeeding the late Mr. W. McMahon as customs officer here.

His successor in office at this time is Mr. Allan N. Harris, who has been assistant collector for the past 17 years.

Mr. Comeau is wished many happy and pleasant years of retirement by his friends. It is his intention to continue and expand his interest in his hobby of wood-turning and cabinet making.

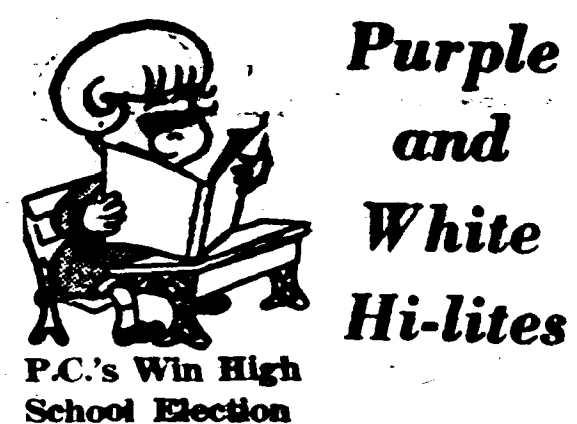

A record smashing victory

was scored by the government of Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker at the polls on Monday. Latest figures give 209 seats to the P.C.'s; 47 to the Liberals and eight to the CCF with one seat still in doubt. The Social Credit party was wiped out in Monday's voting and CCF leader M. J. Coldwell and deputy leader Stanley Knowles also lost their seats.

The P.C. victory at the polls on Monday was the greatest in Canada's parliamentary history since Confederation, 91 years ago.

All of the ministers of the former P.C. cabinet were re-elected including Revenue Minister George C. Nowlan, P.C. candidate for Digby.

The P.C.'s made a clean sweep in Nova Scotia, taking all twelve seats, including the riding of Yarmouth-Sheburne. Clare held in the last parliament by Liberal T. A. M. Kirk. Mr. Kirk was defeated by Felton Legere, P.C. candidate who is a newcomer to federal politics.

In Digby Municipality Mr. Nowlan secured a majority of 492 over his Liberal opponent. Election results in the municipality follow:

Mrs. Ada McGrath, of Victoria Beach, who celebrated her one hundredth birthday last August, has at least one regret this week. Her regret is that she was not able, because of illness, to vote in the general election on Monday.

For many years Mrs. McGrath walked the one and one-half miles from her home to the polls in Victoria Beach to cast her ballot and was among the voters in that area who voted last June.

Her brother, James Everett, Digby, who is in his 96th year, was among the first in town to cast their ballot on Monday and he says he plans to vote on election day just as long as he is able.

Mrs. McGrath, who is the widow of Henry McGrath, is the former Eva Everett. Her husband died sixty years ago. She had eight children, six of whom are still living and there is a total of 98 descendants, including seventeen grandchildren, 47 great grandchildren and 28 great great grandchildren. Among these are eight sets of a fifth generation.

Always known to her friends as "Aunt Ada", Mrs. McGrath has retained all of her faculties to an exceptional degree. At the time of her one hundredth birthday she had not a grey hair and did not use glasses.

Until just recently she kept a beautiful flower garden about her home and many tourists visited to chat with her and hear her reminiscences about early days in the area.

Mrs. McGrath recalls that in her early womanhood she used to walk some six miles to Karsdale to do housework at the rate of twenty-five cents a day, and then had to walk home again.

She was also a practical nurse and on many occasions acted as a midwife, helping to bring a great many babies into the world, including many of her own descendants.

Plans were made for a tag day and a plant sale in the near future and projects for the season were discussed and arranged.

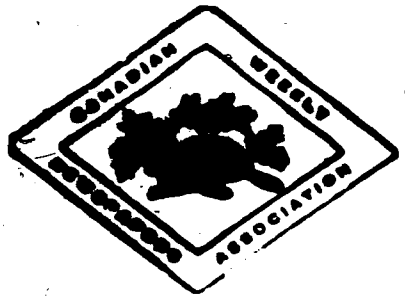

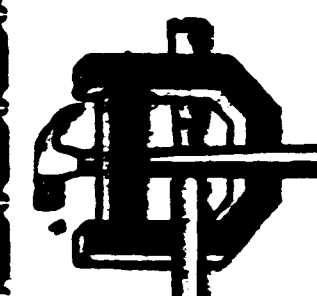

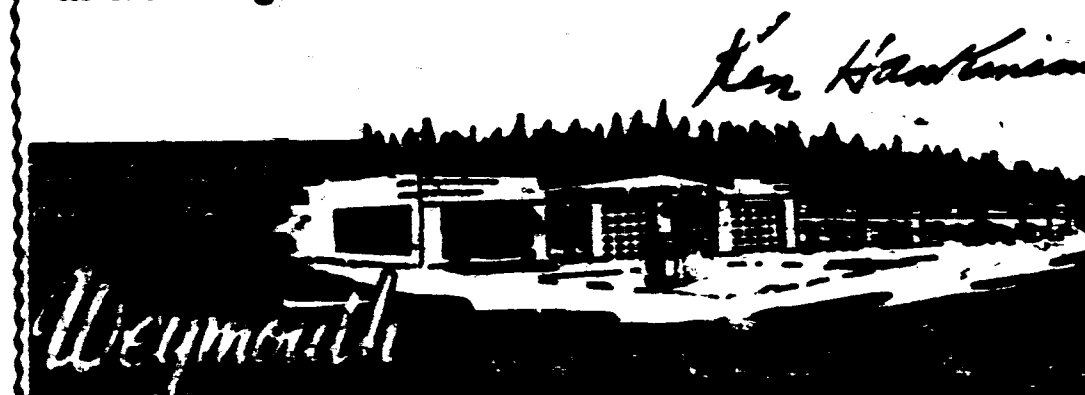

Free Labor Rebuilt Plant

No-pay labor is expected to put burned-out Weymouth Industries Limited back into operation in time to catch the summer's boat market.

L. C. Ruby, manager of the Weymouth boat-building plant, said in Halifax Wednesday that the industry—levelled by fire six weeks ago—will return to normal operation in one of its lines by the end of this month.

The comeback has been made possible by free labor supplied by 100 non-union employees of the industry. They offered two weeks work without pay after a flash fire Feb. 6 caused more than \$300,000 damage to the main industry in the Digby county town of 2,000.

Mr. Ruby was a member of a three-man delegation from Weymouth that met recently with Premier Stanfield, Trade and Industry Minister Manson, and Education Minister Leonard. Dr. H. J. Pothier, a Weymouth physician, R. S. Hallett, the town's postmaster and Mr. Ruby indicated certain transportation and tariff difficulties confronting the industry.

Mr. Stanfield, in a statement following the meeting, said he assured the delegation the government would "do what it can" to assist the industry. However, both problems are federal matters and the delegation realized this, he said.

Mr. Ruby said transportation costs hit hard at the industry, which draws the bulk of its market from the U. S. Atlantic seaboard. The boats produced at the plant are shipped by rail, leaving Weymouth via the Dominion Atlantic Railway.

Some shipments are also transported by the Canadian National Railways ferry Bluenose.

He said the industry also faces a 20 per cent Canadian tariff on African mahogany marine plywood. The company is looking for

a cheaper means of getting boats to the Florida market, Mr. Ruby said. Entering the southern states' market would insure a longer boat-building season at Weymouth, he added.

Meanwhile employees are carrying on far-flung operations at Weymouth. A saw mill, two barns and a boy scout hall—all widely separated — are being used to tee up operations.

In another step to contribute to this year's market, the company has decided to cut two models from their production schedule. The firm planned to produce six lines this year, but will make only four.

Mr. Ruby indicated the company will not accept any of the several invitations from Nova Scotia communities to transplant any of the industry's operations. He said highly skilled workmanship is available at Weymouth, and the town's availability to materials compares favorably with any other area in the province.

No decision has been reached regarding the industry's other operations, chiefly furniture manufacturing. But their boat-production goal for 1956, between 500 and 550 units, will likely be reached, he said.

The production season extends normally from January to June.

The factory was the town's largest employer when it was wiped out by fire. The buildings covered two acres and included boat-building sheds, milling departments, upholstering shops and wood drying kilns.

Boats and furniture destroyed in the fire were valued at about \$50,000. Half a dozen demonstrator boats were saved.

The plant, established by T. P. Warner in 1939, built Fairmile submarine chasers for the Canadian navy during the Second World War.

About 75 of the men are married and have families.

The blaze was first noticed in the building about two o'clock and rapidly spread throughout the interior of the large, two-storey structure. Firemen were forced to cut holes in the roof to get at the fire, which was burning in the partitions.

Much of the furniture in the parsonage was rescued by neighbors but the interior of the building was severely damaged by fire and water.

Early Education In Digby

Early Education

Today with our modern schools and educational facilities let us look back upon the early schools of our town so as to appreciate our own more. Like us, the pioneers who first settled in Conway wished to have all the educational advantages of the time. One of their number, William Barbanck, was appointed tutor and he went daily from house to house teaching each family reading, writing and arithmetic.

When the United Empire Loyalists came here they came from places which had educational facilities. They provided facilities for their children by engaging Lieutenant James Foreman, a graduate of a High School in England as teacher. He commenced the school in 1784 in the front room of his unfinished dwelling with an enrollment of seventy-five pupils.

Since this location was neither convenient nor suitable, in 1789 the first school was built on First Avenue behind where Yates Studio is now located. It was a structure that would have been of medium size for that time and was financed by voluntary subscription. If one were to enter this school they would see extension desks on either side for senior scholars and smaller desks in the center for smaller pupils. At the far end of the room they could see a brick furnace. This spot remained the center of education for residents of Digby until more convenient accommodations were made. Don't you agree that we have gone far since those days?

The Value Of Student Government

Student government consists of a group of officers nominated and elected by their fellow students to look after student affairs such as organizing social events, financing sports equipment and trips, and disciplining their fellow students. The experience these officers, a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and class representatives, receive is of value to them while they are students and after they graduate.

The officers elected receive training in leadership, responsibility to others, the proper handling of money, and the organizing of social and sports events. They must be able to win the support and respect of their fellow students.

Other students, participating in the nomination of, campaigning for, and voting for officers and operating polling booths, also gain useful experience.

The student's council widens the students' field of activity. They organize and finance inter-scholastic sports events, organize social events, and pay for sports equipment. To raise money for this, dues are collected from the students each year. A soft drink dispenser was set up, and magazine drives are held. The students selling magazines, in addition to supporting the council, gain experience as salesmen.

The students, taking part in discussions, learn to express their opinions and respect the views of others. They also learn to abide by the majority ruling. Often, the student's council takes the responsibility of helping to discipline the other students. It has been found that students accept rules imposed upon them by the council more readily than they will accept those made by the teachers or the principal, even though the rulings of the student's council may be more strict.

The student government gives the students worthwhile experience for later use in their adulthood as citizens of a community.

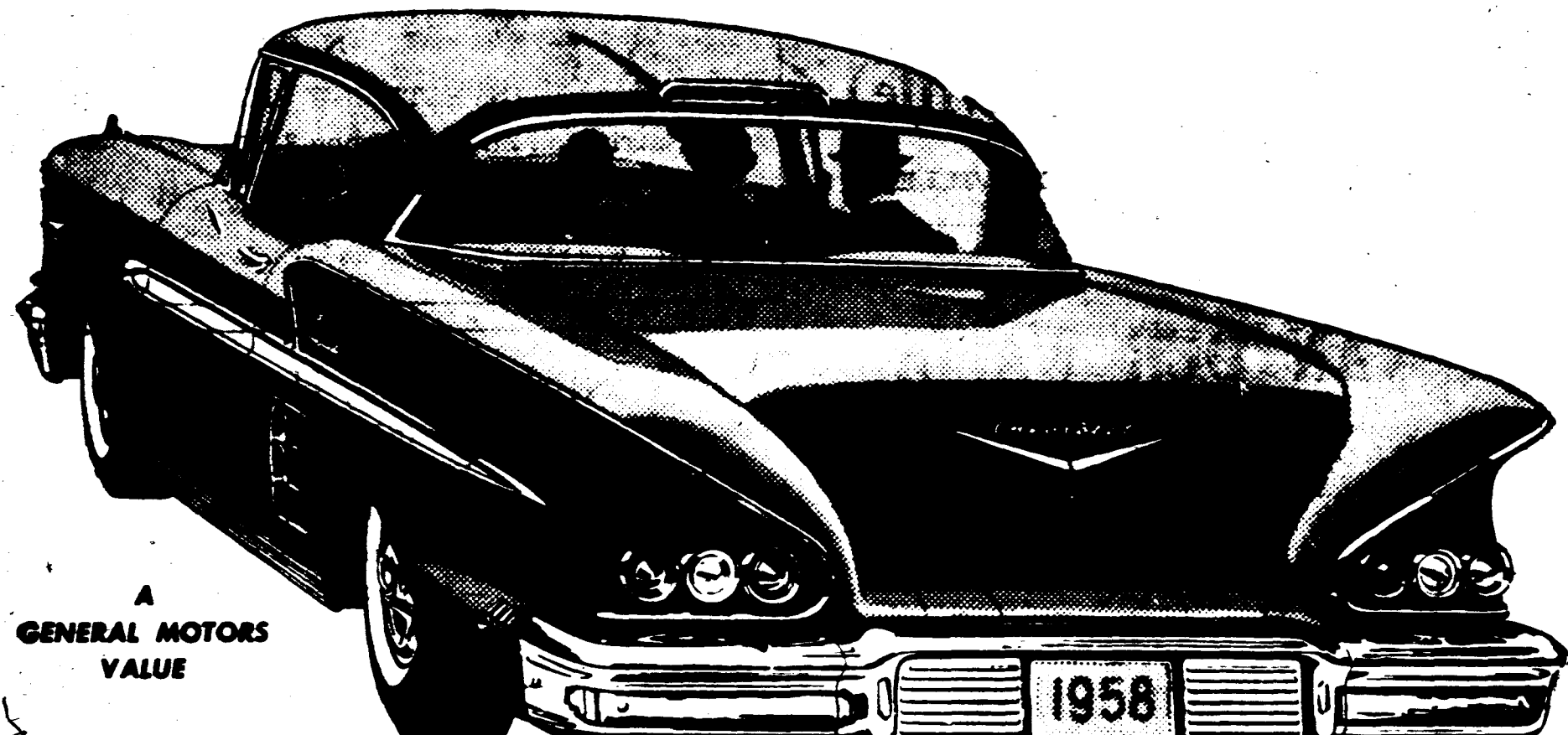

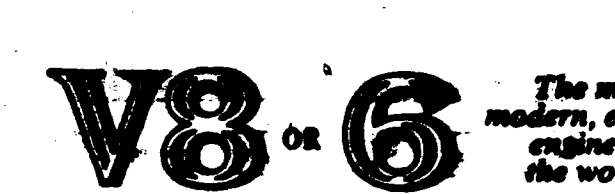

TO WHICH CHURCH did the APOSTLES BELONG?

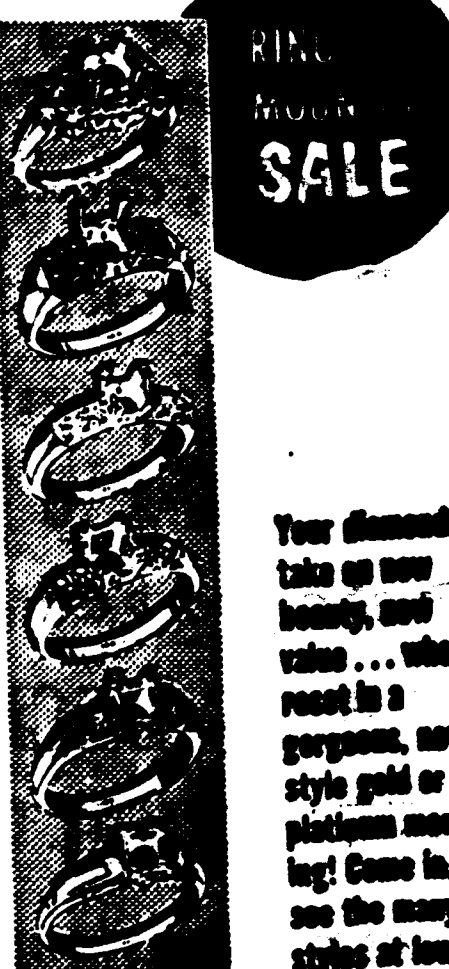

After examining the plans and plot location of the building, which it is estimated will cost in the vicinity of \$800,000, the council felt the proposed location on the lot would not provide for off the street parking for patrons of the building.

The Council suggested that a change be made in the location of the building on the lot to permit parking off the street at the front. Present plans call for the structure to be built almost on the street line of Montague Row. This street, which is a boulevard, only provides for one way traffic and it was felt by the Council serious traffic congestion would result if the building is constructed in the present proposed location.

Getting Ready For Tourists

The facilities for transporting vacationists to Nova Scotia are being stepped up in anticipation of a record-breaking influx of summer tourists who will come to share the province's celebration of the bicentenaries of two major milestones in North American history.

The summer-long, province-wide program, which will include sportsmen's shows, regattas, art, drama and music festivals, harness racing, colorful Acadian festivals and traditional Scottish gatherings, will be highlighted by special events in Halifax and Louisbourg.

In Halifax, plans are being completed for the Bicentenary of Representative Government of the Province of Nova Scotia, which was the first parliament in Canada, is 200 years old this year. The provincial government will mark the anniversary with traditional pageantry centered about historic Province House in Halifax.

In Louisbourg, Nova Scotians will honor the gallant French defenders of the great Fortress of Louisbourg and the British forces which captured the stronghold in 1758. The ruins of the fort are part of the 328-acre Louisbourg National Historic Park, which will be the heart of this year's Bicentenary.

The 49-day siege which ended July 27, 1758, at Louisbourg, had a decisive effect upon the course of Canadian history.

One of the major improvements in transportation to the province will be resumption of overnight steamship service between Boston, Mass., and Yarmouth, as announced recently by Trade and Industry Minister E. A. Manson. Eastern Shipping Corporation, Miami, Fla., will begin thrice-weekly service between the two ports June 30 with the S.S. Yarmouth, which was on the Boston-Yarmouth run under different ownership until the service was suspended in 1954.

The C.N.R.'s fast auto-passenger ferry Bluenose will make daily round-trips between Bar Harbour, Maine, and Yarmouth again this summer.

Trans-Canada Air Lines will step up its Viscount service between Boston and Yarmouth, Halifax and Sydney.

Provincial tourist accommodation establishments are readying to cope with the expected increase. Six new motels were constructed in the past year, and to meet the mounting tourist trade seven motels added units. There was also a considerable increase in the number of tourist homes.

H. J. Campbell Passes

Word has been received here of the death in Vancouver of Harold John Campbell, retired superintendent of the Digby County Power Board. Mr. Campbell, who retired from the Power Board about a year ago, had been living in Vancouver with his daughter and had been in poor health for some time.

Mr. Campbell came to Digby in 1926 when efforts were being made to organize the Digby County Power Board and was greatly instrumental in the successful culmination of these efforts and the extension of the power transmission lines of the Digby County utility to serve the whole country area. He took a great interest, not only in the development of the hydro utility in the county to provide power service to the whole county area but also kept a close check on the financial aspects of the development so that extensions and improvements were made to the service over the years and the whole operation kept on a financially sound basis.

Beside his great interest in the development of hydro in this area, Mr. Campbell also took a keen interest in other community affairs and served for many years as a member of the Board of School Commissioners of Digby and on the Board of the Digby Regional High School. He was a charter member of the Digby Kiwanis Club and served for a number of years as President and later as Treasurer of the club. He was active in the work of the Digby Board of Trade and served as an officer of the board for a number of years.

Mr. Campbell was a Past Master of King Solomon Lodge, A.F. & A.M. and was a past Grand Lodge officer of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia. He was a member of the United Church and for a number of years served as treasurer of Grace United Church here and on the church board.

Born in Northport, Cumberland County, N. S., on March 27, 1889, Mr. Campbell was a son of the late John and Hattie W. (Ross) Campbell. He was educated at Northport and entered business with the North-West Electric Company of Calgary in 1906. He joined the Maritime Coal, Railway and Power Company of Amherst in 1908 and left that company in 1912 to form the company of Campbell & Conn, electrical contractors.

Mr. Campbell was associated with Nova Scotia Tramways from 1916-18 and was manager of the Bridgetown Light, Heat & Power company from 1919-1922. He resigned that position to become superintendent of the Mahone Bay system of the N. S. Power Commission and then for a short while was with the Northern Electric Co. Ltd. before taking over as superintendent of the Digby County Power Board which position he held until his retirement a year ago.

He is survived by one son, Max, of Montreal, and by three daughters, Harriet (Mrs. Dr.) Hugh Stansfield, Vancouver, B.C.; June (Mrs. William McEwen), Vancouver, and Marilyn, also of Vancouver. His wife, the former Vivian G. Rockwell of Amherst, predeceased him some years ago. Several grandchildren also survive.

The body will arrive in Digby on Monday. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

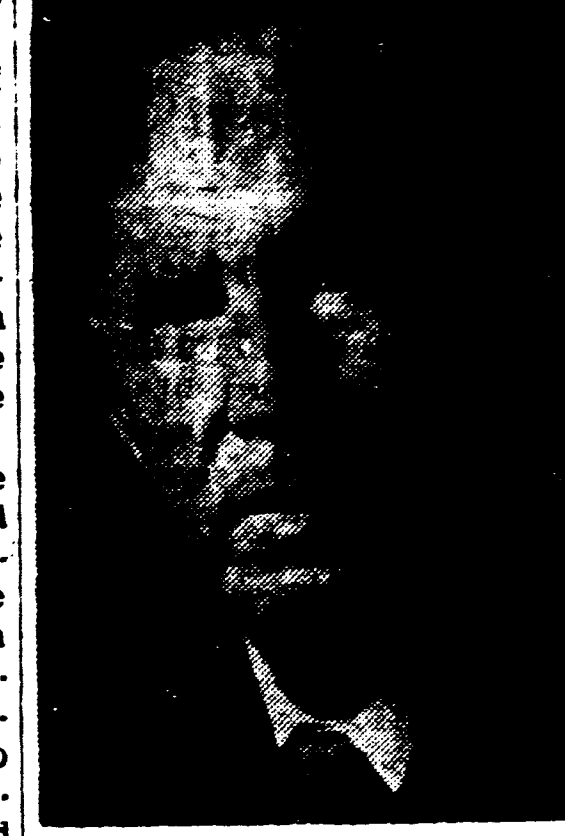
Traditional wedding decorations were used with a table laden with useful gifts for the honored guest an attractive feature.

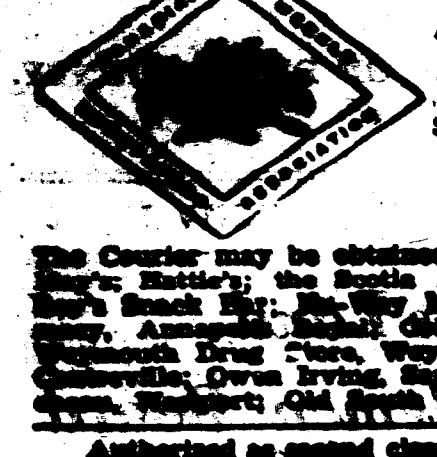
D. F. D. ACTIVITIES

About This and That

National Wild Life Week

National Wild Life Week is being observed during the week of April 6-13 inclusive. National Wild Life Week is not set aside for a promotion of sales. It is strictly an educational project and is sponsored in Canada by The Jack Miner Foundation at Kingsville, Ontario. By an act of Parliament Wild Life Week always falls on the week of April 10, the birthday of Jack Miner. Jack Miner once said "I stand for more education and less legislation." This particular week which honors his memory, is designed to awaken public interest in the great outdoors and especially for the purpose of teaching children the importance of conservation. By the practice of conservation the children are taught to guard against depletion of fish and game and products of land and sea, not only for their own protection but for the protection of generations to come.

Particularly concerned with conservation here in Digby is the Digby Fish and Game Association with its approximate 200 members. In 1957 the Association brooded and released 237 pheasants in Digby County. It has been interested in restocking a nearby lake with trout and is generally interested in retaining for the county and province the God-given inheritance of animals, birds and fish.

While interested in conservation and propagation of forests and wildlife the Fish and Game Association here has also been mindful of a greater protection — the protection of human lives — and have recently advocated greater training in the use of firearms at an early age in the interest of safety.

National Wild Life Week for 1958 comes to a close on Sunday, April 13, when preachers in many congregations will use the observance. It is understood, for discourses on subjects as God's Great Outdoors, God in Nature and God the Creator.

Fire Claims Life Of Digby Doctor

Fire which destroyed his cabin at Sandy Bottom Lake last Sunday night took the life of Dr. Walter R. Dickie, retired Digby physician and surgeon.

Searchers probing the ruins of the cabin found the body of the deceased late Sunday night.

Although there are no details as to how the blaze started, it is known that Dr. Dickie went to his cabin from Digby shortly after noon Saturday in order to get the lights on and the place ready for the fishing season.

Neighbours noticed the fire around nine o'clock Sunday night and phoned Digby to notify relatives here and find out if the doctor had returned home.

As the doctor had not returned his two sons went immediately to the cabin, which is located on the Clements road back of Annapolis, and a search of the ruins of the cabin was commenced as soon as this was possible.

By the time neighbours had noticed the fire the cabin was a mass of flames and when searchers reached the site from Digby only ashes and the foundation were left.

Dr. Dickie was 68 years old. He was born in Stewiacke and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Dickie of that place.

He graduated from Dalhousie school of medicine and first opened a practice in Barton in 1912. He came to Digby in 1927, taking over the practice of Dr. Roberts, who left here to return to the U.S.A. Dr. Dickie retired from active practice in 1950.

During his years in this area Dr. Dickie took an active interest in the community and served for many years on the Board of School Commissioners of the Town of Digby. He was also active in the planning which led up to the establishment of the Digby Regional High School.

He also served for many years as a member of the Board of Directors of the Digby General Hospital and for years headed the x-ray department of the hospital. He was a member of the first Kiwanis Club of Digby and was also a Past Master of the Masonic lodge here.

He was active in church work and served for a number of years on the official board of Grace United Church.

All through his years of active practice Dr. Dickie personified all the admirable qualities of the family doctor or general practitioner of the old school and earned the love, respect and admiration of everyone in the area. In retirement he still retained a close interest in the welfare of those who had been his patients.

Dr. Dickie is survived by two sons, Hugh and Alfred, of Digby, and by one daughter, Phyllis (Mrs. Dr. Claude Keays), Halifax. His wife predeceased him four years ago, as did a son, Dr. Dudley Dickie, of Digby and Liverpool. Also surviving is one brother, Rufus E. Dickie, of Stewiacke, and a sister, Ethel (Mrs. Roy Foss), of Montreal, with whom Dr. Dickie had spent some time in Florida this winter.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been made pending decision by Annapolis County coroner, Dr. Mahaney, of Bridgetown, concerning an inquest.

LATER: Inquest into the fatality was held yesterday morning and the funeral service was held from Grace United Church in the afternoon. The Rev. James Brooks conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Dr. T. W. Hodgson. The officers and members of King Solomon Lodge conducted a Masonic service at the graveside.

Interment was in the family lot, Fairview cemetery.

Fish & Game Association Meets

More concerted effort to destroy animals and birds which prey on pheasants is needed before wholesale distribution of young pheasants across the woodlands of Nova Scotia can become a wise move, was the view expressed by the Digby County (East) Fish and Game Association at their meeting here.

The meeting was dealing with a request from the Digby Board of Trade that a resolution be passed asking the government to distribute young pheasants throughout the province as a means of lengthening the tourist season by providing widespread opportunities for pheasant hunting.

It was stated at the game association meeting that raccoons, wildcats, snakes, crows, grackles and house cats gone wild are serious threats to young pheasants and any widespread attempt to develop large stands of pheasants would not be practicable until a serious effort was made to rid the countryside of these predators.

The meeting recommended the government seek to have increases in bounties provided so that a greater effort will be made by hunters to destroy raccoons and other such predators.

Dealing further with the pheasant question the meeting expressed the view closed seasons were not effective as a means of building up the pheasant population. It was stated the better method of handling was to keep the season open and restock each year. Predators, heavy snows and other factors take a heavy toll of pheasants over the winter months, it was stated.

Guest speaker at the meeting was Carl Sollows of the federal department of fisheries. Mr. Sollows showed a number of films and also gave an excellent address on the subject of conservation. He explained methods used in game conservation, and told of research being carried out to determine how effective these methods were and where changes and different approaches might be more effective.

Speaking in regard to distribution of fish in various lakes by the fisheries department, Mr. Sollows said that effective restocking of lakes can only be carried out after predators in the lakes had been destroyed. He also stated it was in some cases necessary to provide fertilizers to increase plant growth in lakes in order to make the survival and development of fish in these possible.

Improvement and increase in the game and fish population in a district is dependent on a number of factors, Mr. Sollows said. Among these is the amount of feed and cover available for such increase. In many areas, he said, the drop in the number of game and game fish is attributable in great measure to the lessening of available feed and cover.

Several reports have also been heard of birds who have had their wings and legs broken, squirrels maimed and pets injured by the depredations of youngsters with BB guns.

Surely a stop can be put to this sort of thing. Surely our youngsters are not all sadists who must get their enjoyment from maiming defenseless creatures.

It is not enough to say the youngsters do not realize what they are doing. If they do not, then it is the fault of their elders and indicates the whole program of Christian education has failed utterly.

Parents and educators, particularly those who work in propagating Christian teachings, should take stock at once of the situation and bend their efforts to remedy it. Like charity, these efforts should begin at home.

New Store Hours Successful

A survey of town merchants last weekend revealed that, generally speaking, they seemed to be satisfied that the new store hours adopted last week were working out satisfactorily.

Nearly all merchants interviewed stated their business Friday evening had been "about normal" for regular Saturday evening trade. Nearly all stated they were satisfied with results, taking into consideration Friday was the first night for the new store hours. Several pointed out no large pay day accounts were in circulation for business Friday night nor were there any issue of government allowance and pension cheques in circulation over the weekend.

Consensus of opinion seemed to be it would take several weeks to get customers fully accustomed to the Friday night opening. One merchant expressed severe disapproval of the new hours and stated his business had been very adversely affected.

Several of the merchants said their trade Friday afternoon had been disappointing and it was not until early evening that volume began to build up. They stated also that Saturday morning trade was slow, although some said they were busier than usual Saturday morning.

Most of the merchants stated they felt it was good policy to continue the Friday specials to attract trade to the new store hours although they claimed these specials should be in effect all day Friday.

Has Prints In Exhibit

Mrs. Eileen Jones, Weymouth, who with her husband, C. G. Jones, has been spending the winter in Sarasota, Fla., writes that she has been studying print making with a noted artist, Mr. Frank Stoddard, for the past three years and is now enrolled in life classes at the Sarasota School of Art, under the noted Syd Solomon.

Mrs. Jones, whose paintings, etchings and other are works are well known in this area, states that two of her prints, which were on exhibit at the Sarasota Community Gallery, have been sold.

The exhibit of prints which has been held at the Sarasota gallery corresponds with a national revival and awakening interest in printmaking. Mr. Solomon who is in charge of the exhibit has been experimenting with printmaking since 1951 and has developed a technique of using a combination of wax and clay from Italy to provide the best surface in which to carve the impression which becomes the plate.

The technique used by Mr. Solomon has now been widely adopted and prints made in it are now in many private and public collections including a recent acquisition by the Baltimore Museum.

The exhibition at Sarasota after completing its premiere will travel a circuit of University art departments. Twenty-three print makers, all students of Mr. Stoddard and Mr. Solomon, have prints in the exhibit.

Bear River Featured

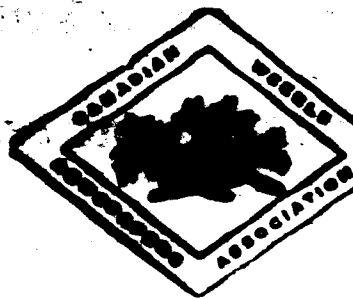
The picturesquely beautiful and historic village of Bear River is featured in an excellent article, written by L. K. Ingersoll, in the current issue of the Atlantic Advocate.

Halifax wholesalers and manufacturers will have several booths, among them being National Sea Products which will also represent the plant in Digby. Atlantic Wholesalers Ltd. will also bring the name of Digby before the visitors at the show because of its outlet in the town.

While Digby in particular will not be sponsoring a booth at the Atlantic Food Show in Moncton next week, the Digby merchants are asked to co-operate by displaying Atlantic made products in their windows during the week. The local Board of Trade has taken up this project and it is hoped that further co-operation from the merchants will be forthcoming. When we help build up the Atlantic Provinces we are beginning to build up Digby.

Boards & Chambers Play Vital Part In Community Welfare

This week, Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce throughout the Atlantic Provinces join with others throughout Canada in conducting special activities in observance of "Chamber of Commerce Week". Endorsed by Prime Minister Diefenbaker, Provincial Premiers, Mayors and Reeves of Municipalities this National "Week" is designed to focus attention on the Board and Chamber movement in general but, in particular, to create an awareness among citizens of the valuable work undertaken by local Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce for the welfare of their communities and to arouse a more active interest in, and support of, Boards and Chambers throughout the Atlantic Provinces during "Chamber of Commerce Week", which will enable them to tell their story to the public, include special meetings. In Digby the local Board has made plans for a special meeting when the nationally known figure, John Fisher, will be guest speaker. Other prominent men of the Province will also be guests. This meeting, though not held during the "Chamber of Commerce Week", is a tie-in with this particular effort and is particularly planned for the fostering of industrial and tourist promotion in the Digby area.

Among the day to day activities to which attention is given in the interest of business and commerce are industrial and tourist development, retail merchant activities, parking and traffic problems, civic services and many others of a like nature. The local Board at Digby can credit itself with the sponsorship of a goodly number of such projects as listed above.

The M.P.B.T. initiated the action that brought about the establishment of the Maritime Transportation Commission which has saved many thousands of dollars for Atlantic Provinces shippers over the years and the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council was brought into being through the recommendation and energies of the M.P.B.T., also. Highway Safety Campaigns, Producer-Consumer Conferences, in the interests of increased production and markets for agricultural products, and the current project of promoting Atlantic-made products by arranging for displays of such items in communities throughout the Region are other ways in which the M.P.B.T. serves.

Boards and Chambers in the Atlantic Region are represented nationally through their affiliation with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce which has a regional office in Moncton to service the individual organizations. Through workshops, know-how booklets, and other material aids as well as the personal services of staff members, the Canadian Chamber offers the local Boards and Chambers every assistance in order that they will remain active and a force for good in their respective communities.

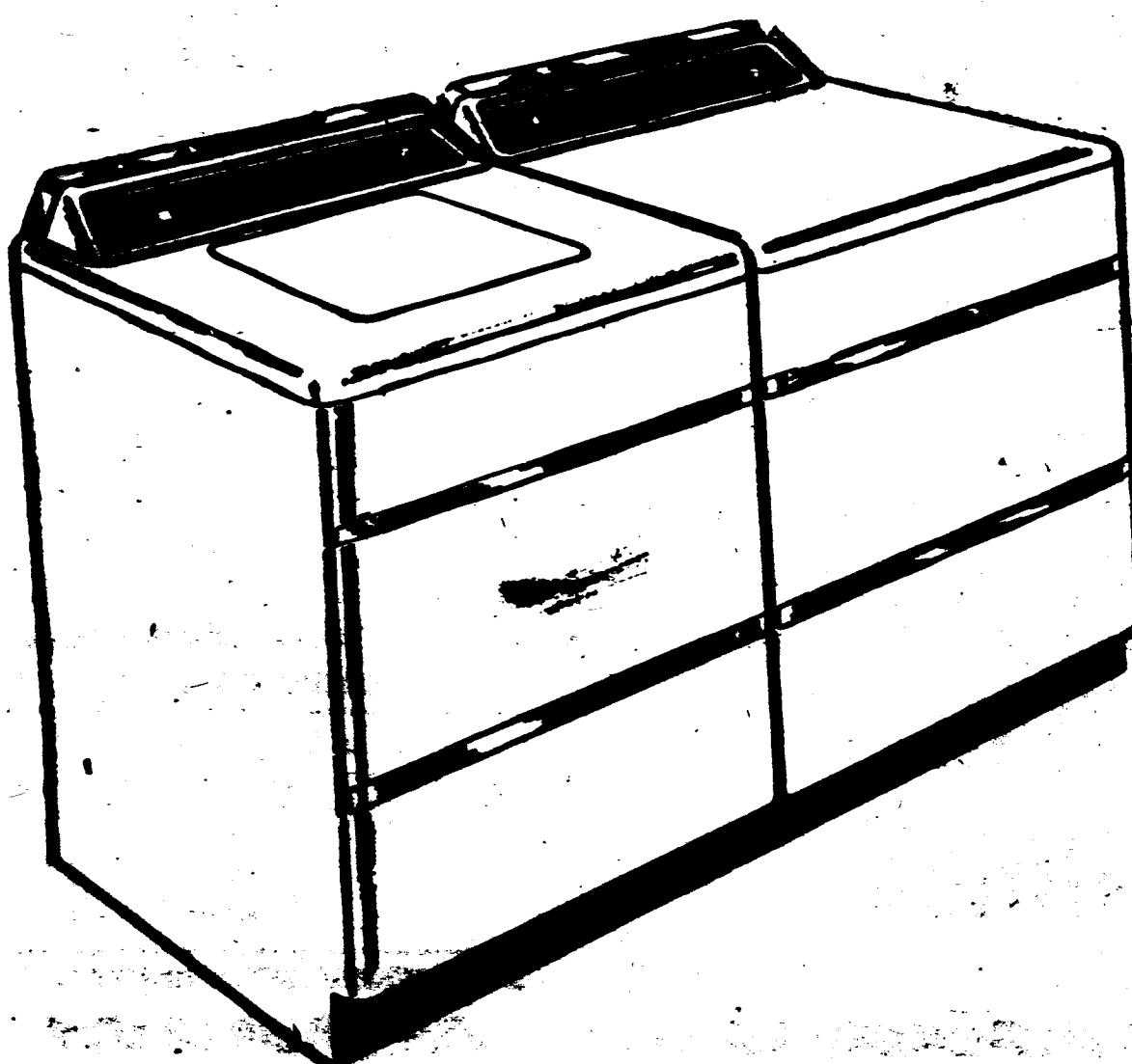

comforts of home.

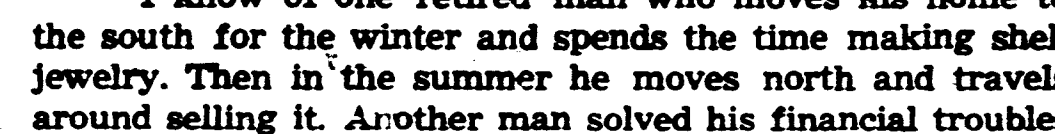
You get a good idea of the trailer's new role from

Dr. Angus pointed out several types of mental illness and their causes and he gave several interesting aspects of modern day life and western culture and the effect these have on mental health at the same time pointing out the importance of psychiatry in modern day life.

Dr. Angus has studied in various mental health establishments throughout the world and his wide experience on the subject was quite evident during the question period which followed his talk.

Enjoys Visitors At Age 97

Mrs. Jeanne Gaudet, oldest resident of Concession, is 97 years of age.

Being a widow, she lives with her sister-in-law, Mrs. Marie Rose Comeau. Mrs. Gaudet has been confined to her bed for some time. In her younger days Mrs. Gaudet was an expert at hooking beautiful rugs, many of which she donated to the church at Concession.

Island Highway Project To Start

Hon. M. S. Leonard, Q.C., Minister of Education and Public Welfare in the Nova Scotia Government and representative in the House of Assembly for the District of Digby, has announced that the highway on Long Island from Tiverton to Freeport will be reconstructed this year to paving standard.

Mr. Leonard stated that he has been advised by Hon. G. I. Smith, Minister of Highways, that the work on the Island road will be let out to contract, and that tenders for the construction will be called shortly. This project, he said, has been under consideration since the Stanfield Government took office. Last year an engineering study of the highway was made and testing conducted for the availability of gravel. After it is reconstructed it will be necessary for the road to settle before paving is laid.

Issues Statement On Schools

Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education, was interviewed over the weekend on the question of elementary school facilities in the Barton-Brighton and Plympton-Plympton Station areas, and issued the following statement:

"For some time I have been aware of the acute school situation developing in this area. The school buildings in the Barton-Brighton region and in the villages of Plympton and Plympton Station are in bad condition, and the educational facilities are because of these conditions and over crowding below par."

"There are two schools of thought regarding this matter. It must be accepted by all that the children of this area are entitled to decent, reasonable standards of educational opportunities. One line of thought is to construct in the Barton-Brighton region a three room school building to serve those two villages from Grades 1 to 6 inclusive (including Primer), with plans to be furnished by the Department of Education. At the same time a three room school building could be erected at Plympton to serve Plympton and Plympton Station in the same elementary grades, with the Plympton Station children being conveyed. This plan would envisage the North Range School remaining as it is and presently serving South Range as well. Under the above plan the only conveyances necessary would be the conveyance of the Plympton Station children to Plympton, and the South Range children to North Range. On the other hand those following another school of thought would consolidate the whole area with a central consolidated school being built in the vicinity of Barton to serve all the elementary children of the area."

"In 1956 I stated my approval of High School consolidations where it is geographically feasible, provided proper economies are followed. At the same time when dealing with elementary school problems I stated that where in a given area it can be shown to be economically sound and sound also from an educational point of view that consolidation should occur, and the people of the area favor such a consolidation, then consolidation is proper, provided that all proper economies are practised. I then opposed enforced consolidation against the will of the people. I still adhere to this point of view, and have found no reason to change it. About one year ago it appeared that the Municipal authorities were aiming toward an enforced consolidation in the area in question. I then stated my opposition to the proposed consolidation, because as then envisaged it would be an enforced consolidation and because the amount of money stated to be involved appeared to be unreasonably large."

Pines To Open June 27

Opening dates for two of Nova Scotia's leading summer resort hotels at Digby and Yarmouth have been announced by Colin M. Rennie, manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway's Nova Scotia Hotels. Popular Digby Pines Hotel, on the shore of the Bay of Fundy and close to the Nova Scotia fishing town of Digby will open its doors to summer visitors on June 27, and will continue open until September 1, inclusive.

Lakeside Inn, at Yarmouth, will also open the season on June 27 and continue operations until September 1, inclusive. The stately Cornwallis Inn at Kentville is a year-round Canadian Pacific hotel operation in Nova Scotia, and will soon be the scene of activities associated with the annual Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival to be staged there May 30 to June 1.

In New Brunswick, the Algonquin Inn, at St. Andrews by the Sea, will stage its official opening on June 8, and will continue open until September 14.

Brush Fire Out

A brush fire, which started early Tuesday along the north side of the Digby Neck highway some two miles from Digby and swept over an area of nearly a mile before being brought under control, was reported completely out yesterday morning. The rain yesterday completed the job of dousing the blaze.

The fire, which swept across scrub and brush land, was aided in its sweep by a high wind. Fortunately the wind died out before the flames reached any stands of timber and the fire-fighters were able to confine the flames to the scrubland area.

A lands and forests department pumper and hose stationed at Lake Midway were brought into play to fight the fire early in the afternoon. Fire-fighters at the time were confident they could be able to hold the fire as a stream runs across the district near the base of the North Mountain between the scrub land and the timbered area. A woods road also crosses the district on the east side between the scrub land and the wooded district.

By early evening the fire was under control and a watch was kept to see that its spread was held in check.

Vocational Class Holds Closing

Success of evening vocational classes, first established here at the Regional High School in 1949, was commented upon by F. C. Purdy, Regional High School Supervisor, in an address at the closing exercises of the evening school here.

Mr. Purdy stated the classes when first established served only adult students from the immediate Digby area. Over the years, he said, their scope has broadened so that adults from a wide area, including Plympton, East Ferry, and Smith's Cove, are now being served by these classes.

He stated he felt the interest in vocational training among adults of the area was a direct result of the program being carried out by the Regional High School in its regular classes. Many adults attending the evening classes, he said, felt the need of improving their skills through the training provided and were being enabled to better themselves economically because of the courses offered.

Commenting on the course in welding, started last fall, Mr. Purdy said this was a new departure in adult vocational classes and stated Digby and Sydney were the two localities in the province to pioneer the move.

R. Baden Powell, local administrator of the vocational evening classes, stated four classes had been in operation this year; typing and shorthand, home sewing, bookkeeping and acetylene welding. He said a total of 57 was enrolled at the beginning of the year and only eight had dropped out. This, he said, was the smallest drop out since the classes had started and in all classes the percentage attendance was higher this year than in previous years.

Speaking of the new course in welding, Mr. Powell said this class was already meeting the needs of the area in production.

Another of these evils which is becoming a real menace to true Christian Citizenship is the rapid increase in gambling in various forms. In Canada from seven to eight million people partake in some form of gambling. A stand against gambling must be taken at an early age and children must be taught to discipline themselves for the good of others and make their stand for the cause of righteousness.

"We must fill the need of the people who seek out undesirable places," stated Mrs. Murray.

In her closing remarks Mrs. Murray said: "We must be informed, be prepared, be ready and be Christian."

CARS ARE MY LIFE
by Ken Hankinson

You're breezing along the highway merrily when — oh that sickening feeling! — the engine just rolls over and dies. The first thing most of us think of as we head for the nearest farmhouse to 'phone a tow truck is the fuel pump. And rightly so, probably.

But before you head for the farmhouse, there are a few simple tests anyone can do, and perhaps solve and repair the problem in the process.

First of all take the air cleaner off, peer down the carburetor barrel underneath and work the throttle linkage back and forth. See a stream of gas? It's not the fuel pump then, and the fuel line isn't clogged either.

If there was no squirt of gas, you can sometimes fix a blocked gas line yourself. Disconnect the line where it is attached to the fuel pump and blow through — you can hear air bubbles in the gas tank if it's open. Sometimes you can blow out an obstruction this way.

Is it really that old devil, the fuel pump? Well, if the pump has a glass sediment cup, take it off, empty it, and put it back on again. It should fill with fuel when you put your foot on the starter.

If you know the line is free but gas didn't get into the glass bowl, you can be sure that the trouble is, indeed, the fuel pump.

I always think it's a lot more fun owning a car when you know just enough about it to be on first-name terms with the parts under the hood. Whether you delight in tinkering, or only know that the gas goes in one end and the oil in the other, I think you'll find it worthwhile to talk over servicing problems with our factory-trained people.

Letter to the Editor

Digby, N. B., April 23, 1958.

Editor, Digby Courier

Dear Mr. Wallis:
The "TIME" question is here again. I believe it was last year that we experienced the worst hogepodge of time throughout Nova Scotia during the month of October that we ever experienced in our time.

It very evidently appears that hardly anybody will complain about Daylight Saving Time starting the end of April if all Nova Scotians change to Daylight Saving Time at the same time.

However, many people do complain when Daylight Saving Time goes beyond September, especially the rural areas, and I think, for good reasons.

Surely, we who live in towns or cities should give first consideration to rural areas, in this matter, whereas it involves only one month, and whereas much of the rural school population has to be transported miles away from home so early in the morning. Many people think our Government should pass legislation declaring that Nova Scotia shall be on Standard Time during the months of October to April inclusive, it being the only way proper settlement will be made.

If we extend Daylight Saving Time into October, and rural areas do likewise, some very young children will have to walk long distances before morning light, and sometimes when quite cold. This statement is based on evidence presented at the last meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade held at Kentville, N. S.

If rural areas run on Standard Time, and urban centres on Daylight, during October, many families, travellers, and shoppers are then confronted with trying to live, with even temper, on two different times, at the same time — quite a task when seemingly so unnecessary. In this October time confusion, we are sometimes an hour early for some things and an hour late for others.

In regard to transportation companies, I understand it makes no difference to them whether Daylight Saving Time ends in September or October so long as they know in sufficient time for their scheduled changes and everybody changes time together.

Let us all work together to bring about settlement of this important matter for all people and for all time.

Fights To Save Her Sight

A dauntless young St. Stephen woman is in Dorchester, Mass., today awaiting an eye transplant that may stave off blindness.

She's on her own financially. No service club or organization is picking up the bills.

She's been working two years in a local restaurant, valiantly combatting the handicap of diminishing sight in both eyes to save the necessary funds to get her to a Boston eye clinic. And she did it.

Twenty-eight year old Miss Gertrude Atkinson has had a lot of hurdles to overcome. Her staunchest ally is her courage.

Her story had its beginnings 3 years ago when her eyes began to wane as the result of glaucoma, a disease of the eyes which results in impairment of vision and ultimately in blindness.

Then began a discouraging trek to various doctors in St. Stephen, Fredericton, Saint John and finally Boston. There, Dr. G. Robert Foote, an eye specialist, advised a transplant in her right eye, almost sightless since last spring.

"You have nothing to lose by a transplant and everything to gain," he told her.

Miss Atkinson has been wearing expensive contact lenses. Without them, and with any other type of glasses, everything appeared as a blur. The lenses had to be changed periodically.

Bravely, she set out to fight for her sight by working at a restaurant, scrimping and saving.

Her father, Earl Atkinson, of Thompson Ave., is unable to work and receives a war veterans' pension. A brother, Gene, 21, has been unemployed for more than a year. Miss Atkinson, beset by her own worries, has been helping out at home as much as possible.

Her mother has high hopes that her daughter's sight will be restored. She recalls of a fortune teller prophesying to a cousin that her daughter's operation would be successful.

A resident of St. Stephen for 10 years, Miss Atkinson went to Boston last spring to have her contact lenses finished. It was then she was told she needed an eye transplant. Dr. Garrett L. Sullivan of Boston will do the operation.

Dr. Sullivan told her to return home and wait for a call from him, which would depend upon the availability of an eye for the transplant. She then would have to fly to Boston immediately as the operation must be done within 24 hours after an eye is available.

She received word to be in Boston by the end of February and left Feb. 23 by train to be nearer the eye bank. She had been tormented by a fear that if the doctor did call her in St. Stephen, she might not be able to fly to Boston because of possible poor weather.

A letter to her mother reveals Miss Atkinson is waiting patiently in Dorchester at a friend's home for the operation. Cause of the holdup, she explains, is the necessity of finding a cornea to match the pigment of her skin and blue eyes.

On the economic side it's been a rough deal, too. But the blonde, slim woman has managed. Out of her income she financed her first pair of contact lenses for \$150 and a newer pair at a cost of \$200. Each year they had to be polished for \$30.

Somewhat, she also put aside \$400 towards regaining her sight, over the last two years while working at nights in the restaurant.

Before moving to St. Stephen Miss Atkinson lived with her family on the farm where she was born at North Lake in York County. The family moved to St. Stephen about five years ago.

She has made many sacrifices to save money for the operation, says her father, 61, a veteran of The First World War.

"The doctor thinks the transplant will take because the nerves and blood vessels behind the practically blind right eye don't appear damaged," he said hopefully.

"I don't think the doctors would do the operation unless they were pretty sure it will work and save my daughter's eyesight," he added. "She'll probably have to stay two weeks in the hospital after the operation before the bandages are removed and before we know for sure whether it was successful. But Gertrude never complained about anything and she won't complain even if all her struggle has been for nothing."

Miss Atkinson is a cousin of Mrs. Shirley Trimmer, Manager of Simpsons-Sears Order Office, Digby, N. S.; also a niece of Mrs. Enoch Peck, Bear River.

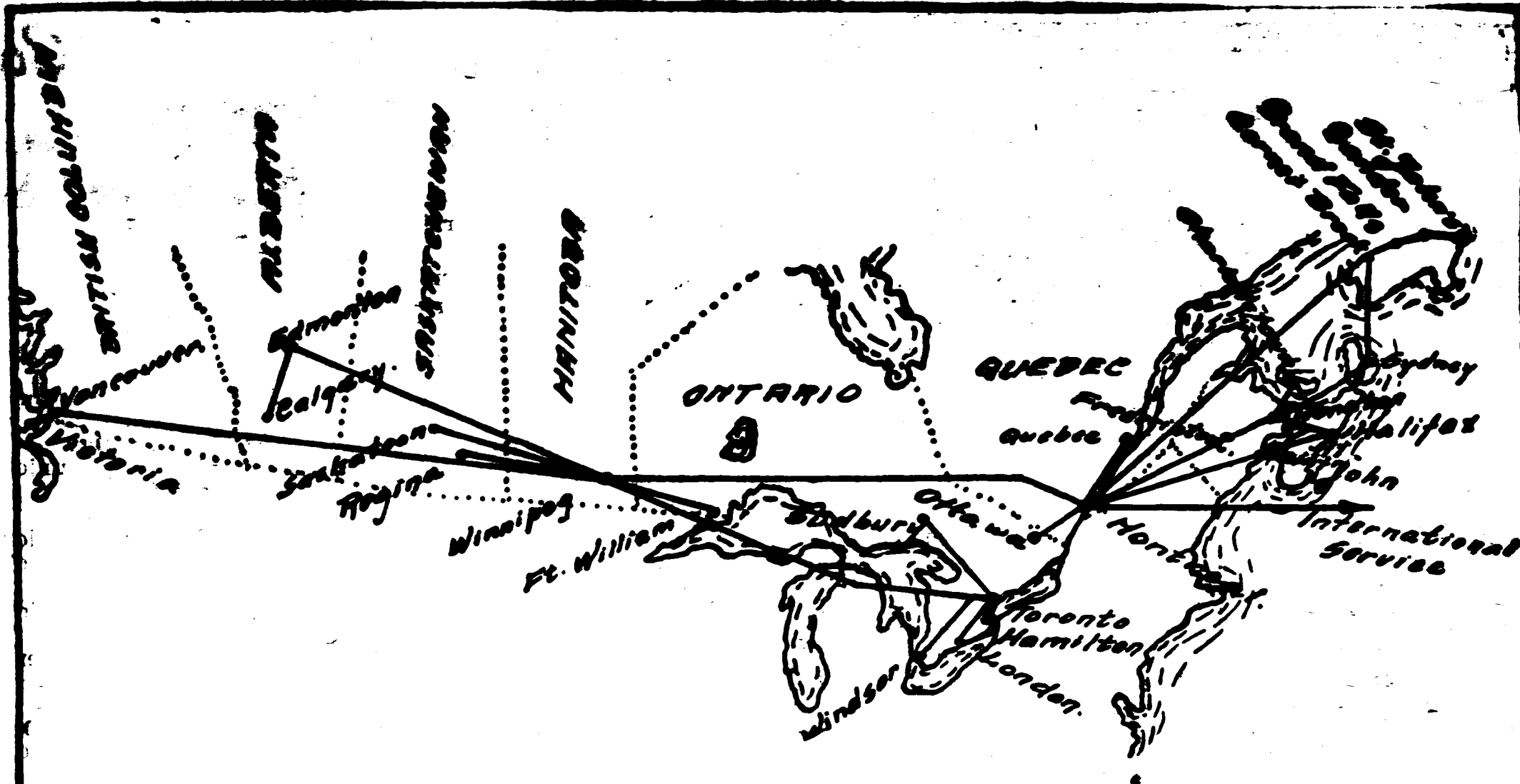

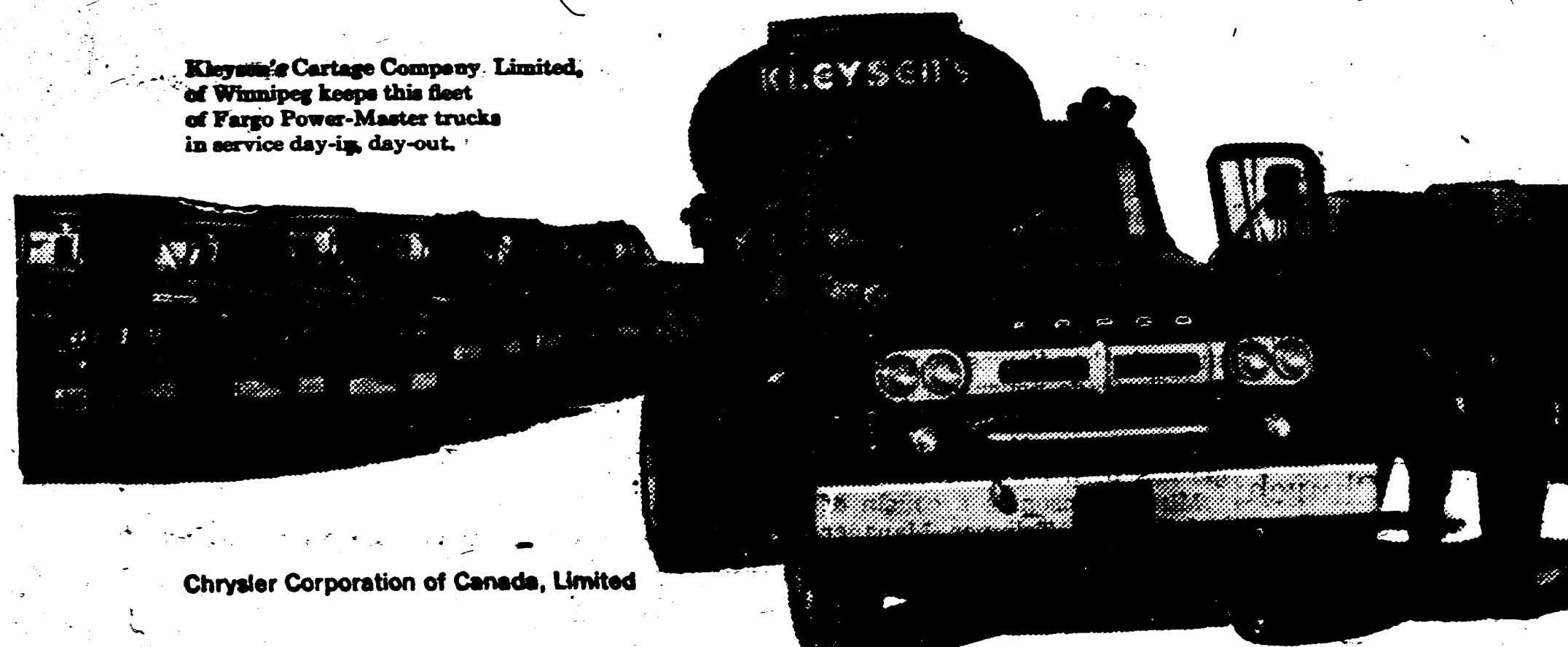

"As Minister of Education it would be my duty to give or withhold approval of any consolidation and my further duty to give or withhold approval of school plans. It therefore becomes my duty to see that no consolidation occurs unless such a step would be educationally proper, is genuinely desired by the people of the area and is a proper step to take from the stand of proper economy. It is equally my duty to see that consolidation is not withheld if such is a proper step from an educational and economic point of view and the people of the area desire it."

"It would therefore appear to be a proper step for the Inspector and Municipal School Board to translate into concrete figures the relative costs of the proposed plans, keeping in mind that any building or buildings must be strictly functional in design, that no unnecessary frills will be allowed, and that no plan will be approved until it can be shown that all proper economies have been used. At the moment it is conceded that only approximate figures could be arrived at. But the cost of some buildings economically constructed in other parts of the Province can serve as a very good guide. These same figures should then proceed to hold well advertised public meetings in each of the sections concerned to determine the will of the people concerned. At these meetings the facts, and nothing but the facts, should be squarely placed before the ratepayers present, and there should be no attempt to conceal any fact that should be disclosed. The people of the area should in conjunction with the authorities have the opportunity of weighing the merits of one plan against the other, keeping in mind that whatever is built will be required to give service for many years, and balancing this thought with the realization that our educational costs are increasing year after year and will continue to increase due to factors beyond our control, and keeping in mind also that it is the people who pay the bill."

Fishermen Rescued

Three New Brunswick lobster fishermen were little the worse for wear here Sunday despite the fact they had been adrift in the Bay of Fundy in their thirty-foot lobster boat since Thursday.

The three men left Mispec, N. B., early Thursday for Tiverton to pick up two fishing boats which they planned to tow back to New Brunswick. Two hours out from Mispec their propeller shaft broke and they were left drifting helplessly.

The small craft was not equipped with ship to shore communication and it was not possible to contact any help. Buffeted by heavy winds, the little boat drifted up the Bay of Fundy and approached the Nova Scotia coast near Margareville.

Friday night and Saturday near gale force winds tossed the little craft around and it was not until shortly before eleven o'clock Sunday morning the boat was sighted some three miles off Parker's Cove by Roy Halliday of that place.

Mr. Halliday, aware the little boat was in trouble, got in touch with the Bay View Life Saving Station and Captain Harry Adams put off with the lifeboat and took the lobster boat in tow and brought it into Digby. Repairs to the propeller shaft were made here and the men continued their trip to Tiverton.

Aboard the lobster boat were William Reid, Lorneville, and W. L. McCarthy and V. L. McCarthy, Mispec. Although suffering somewhat from exposure and very tired, the three men were otherwise unharmed by their experience. Only shelter in the little craft was a small cuddy in the forward end of the boat.

Civil Defence Exercise

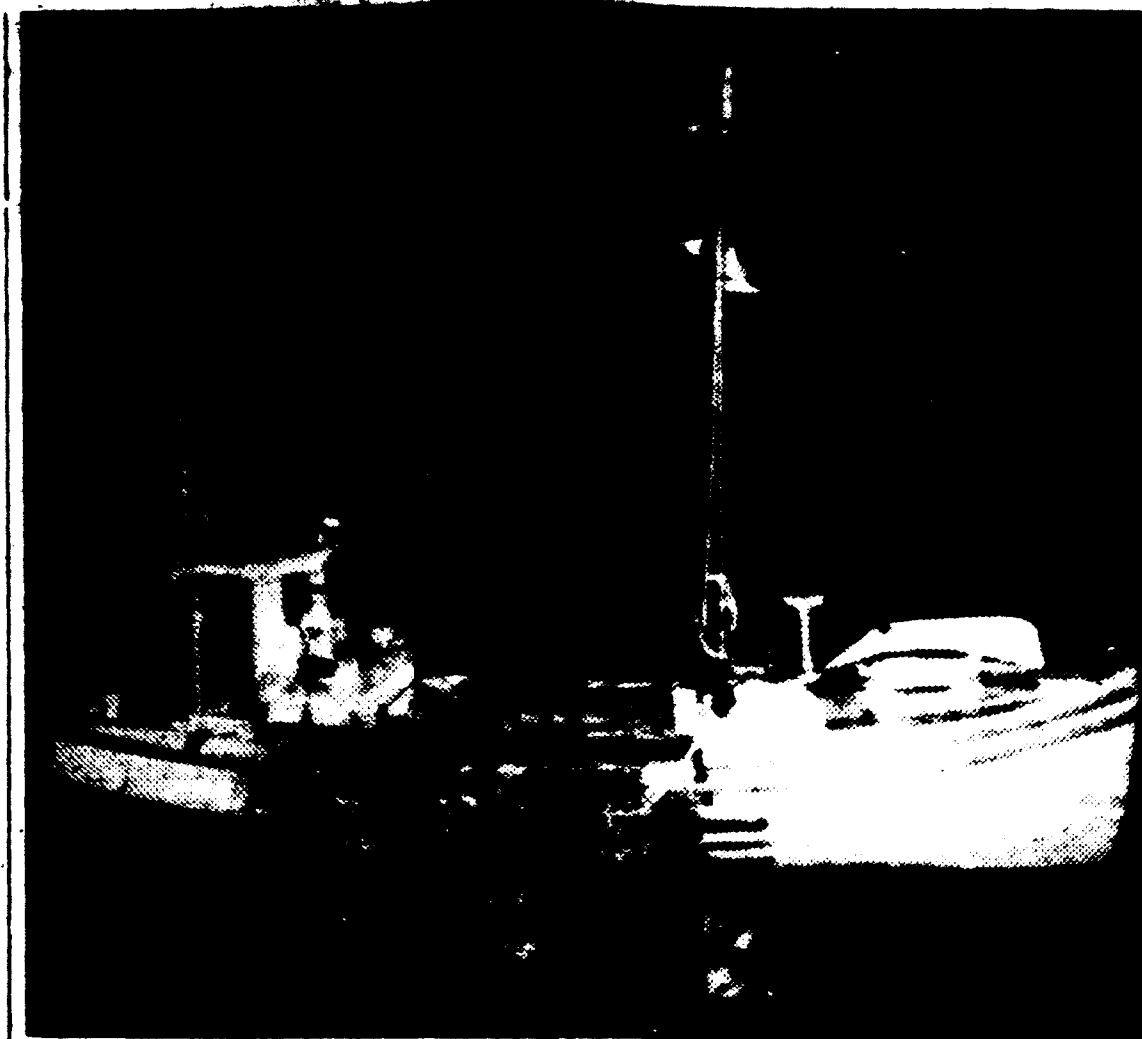

A PERFECT MINIATURE — William Lewis, Joggins Bridge, a scallop fisherman for the past twenty-four years, has painstakingly constructed a perfect model of a scallop dragger, complete in every detail. So complete is the model that it is equipped even with real scallop shells and palls of imitation shucked scallops. Miniature rubber tires hang over the sides in the same manner as on real scallopers.

The model, which bears the name "Arthur and Ruth," is patterned on the dragger operated by Captain Jesse McGasvey, which fishes out of Digby, and it bears the same name. It is now on display in the window of Wright's store and Mr. Lewis has given permission for it to be used as a head table centerpiece at the trade board banquet for tourist director John Fisher next week.

Some one hundred and eighty hours of patient work went into the making of the twenty-four inch model. Mr. Lewis said. It has a hollow hull and full keelson. The sides are planked in the same manner as a real scalloper and all the rigging is accurate in every detail.

Match-covers on the model are marked fore and aft and are removable. Loaded drags

hang over the sides. Extra planking has been placed on the model where the drags come aboard and a shucking table is on deck. All the blocks and falls are workable and great care has been exercised in the making of pulleys so that they turn freely. Brass is used in many of the fittings and bearings are equipped with grease cups.

A string of lights is provided for shucking on deck and just in front of the pilot house are two palls of imitation shucked scallops with shucking knives right with them. On the deck is a pile of scallop shells and a little shovel is nearby for pushing them overboard. The drags are filled with scallops, rocks and other material that would be found in a real drag.

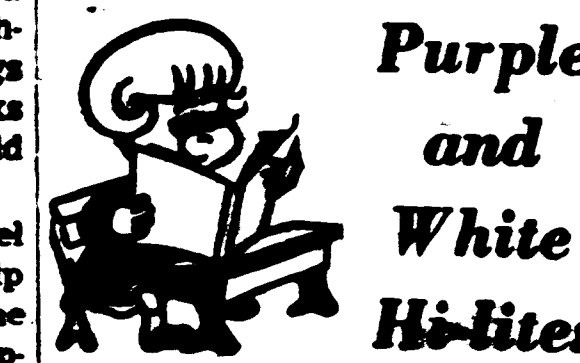
The pilot house of the model dragger is fitted with a ship to shore phone, wheel, engine controls and all other equipment found in a regular dragger wheelhouse. Hoisting gear is on deck and exhaust pipes are provided for the motors. A bilge pump is also located on deck and is workable.

In every respect the model is an excellent replica of a regular dragger and could be used to explain in a most understandable fashion the whole process of scallop fishing as operated in this area.

Red Cross Drive Nearing End

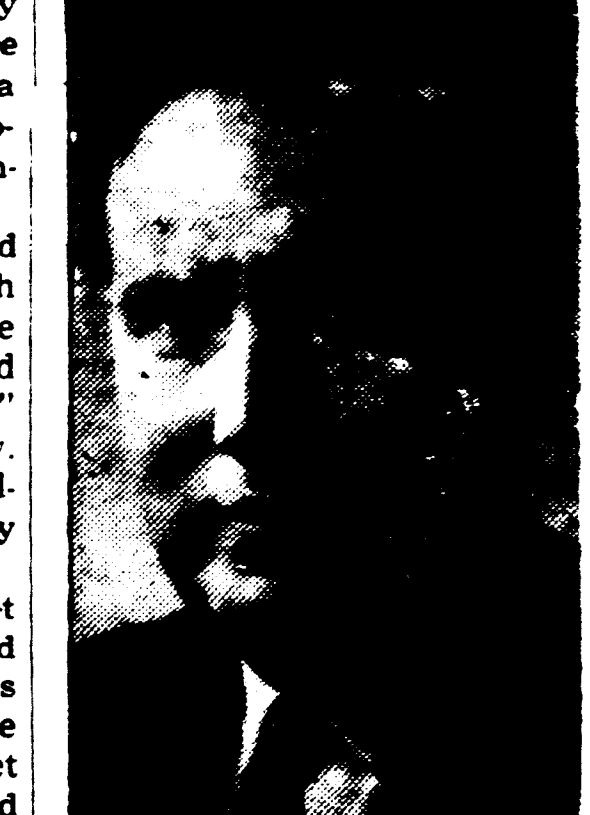

Mr. Alfred Walsh and a companion, of Rosville, launched a canoe shortly after supper from the Timpany shore, and after they were out on the bay cries were heard for help by the Thibault family, who live near by. Mr. Thibault and son, George, took their canoe to the shore, but thinking it unwise to try a rescue in such a craft went for help. Several men from the village quickly responded, and with their aid a small row boat was put in the water and rowed to the men who were nearly to the point of exhaustion, especially Mr. Walsh. Both men were numb with cold, having been in the water over half an hour.

Dr. Ross Eaton At Grace United

Dr. Ross Eaton, General Secretary Nova Scotia Temperance Federation, took as his subject "Challenge of the Christian to Non-conformity" in addressing the congregation on temperance at Grace United Church on Sunday morning. He took his text from Romans "and be not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God."

We belong to an age of conformity, Dr. Eaton said, and the trend of conformity is carried into the social drinking problem. People drink, particularly the younger people, not because they like it, not because they need or want to, but situations confront them and they conform to the social pattern. He implored his hearers to take the positive viewpoint on the liquor question and not be conformed but be transformed by renewing of minds and finding out what is the acceptable will of God in the drinking habit. The worse problem, the speaker said, is not the alcoholic but the so-called respectable person with moderate drinking habits who claims there is nothing wrong with the drinking custom. They take the selfish attitude and claim it does no harm to themselves, forgetting that they are lending influence and endorsing something which is harmful to others and contributing it to members of the younger generation. For the sake of others, the weaker, the younger and those who might be harmed he asked them to look at the problem from a Christian viewpoint.

About This and That

May Campaign Aimed At Unsafe Vehicles

Highway accidents and deaths caused by unsafe vehicles will be the target of a national campaign to be sponsored throughout Canada during May by the Canadian Highway Safety Conference. The drive, called "Check Your Car, Check Your Driving, Check Accidents", will have the active support of automobile dealers, service station and garage operators and all users of the highway, including truck and bus companies. It will coincide with a similar effort in the United States. The Conference, through the provincial and community safety organizations and industry in general, is stressing 10 vital safety checks.

They are: brakes, front lights, rear lights, steering, tires, exhaust systems, glass, windshield wipers, rear-view mirrors and horn. Defects in any of those items, warns the Conference's general manager, W. Arch. Bryce, can result in disaster. Their importance to the operation of a vehicle is seldom appreciated, according to Mr. Bryce, until they become defective. Motorists are being urged to envisage the predicament in to which they would be thrust should such defects occur in their vehicles, and to take immediate steps to prevent such a predicament before it happens.

"Every vehicle using Canada's roads and streets is nothing more than an inanimate machine, unable to cope with an emergency, but always able to create one. Drivers should at all times feel safe and secure in the knowledge that their vehicles have been given a thorough safety check and every evidence of impending defect corrected", Mr. Bryce said.

Police forces across Canada — civic, provincial and federal — are also working to promote the May campaign. Special attention will be given by traffic enforcement officers to unsafe vehicles in this national effort to safeguard the lives of the millions of Canadians using the highways.

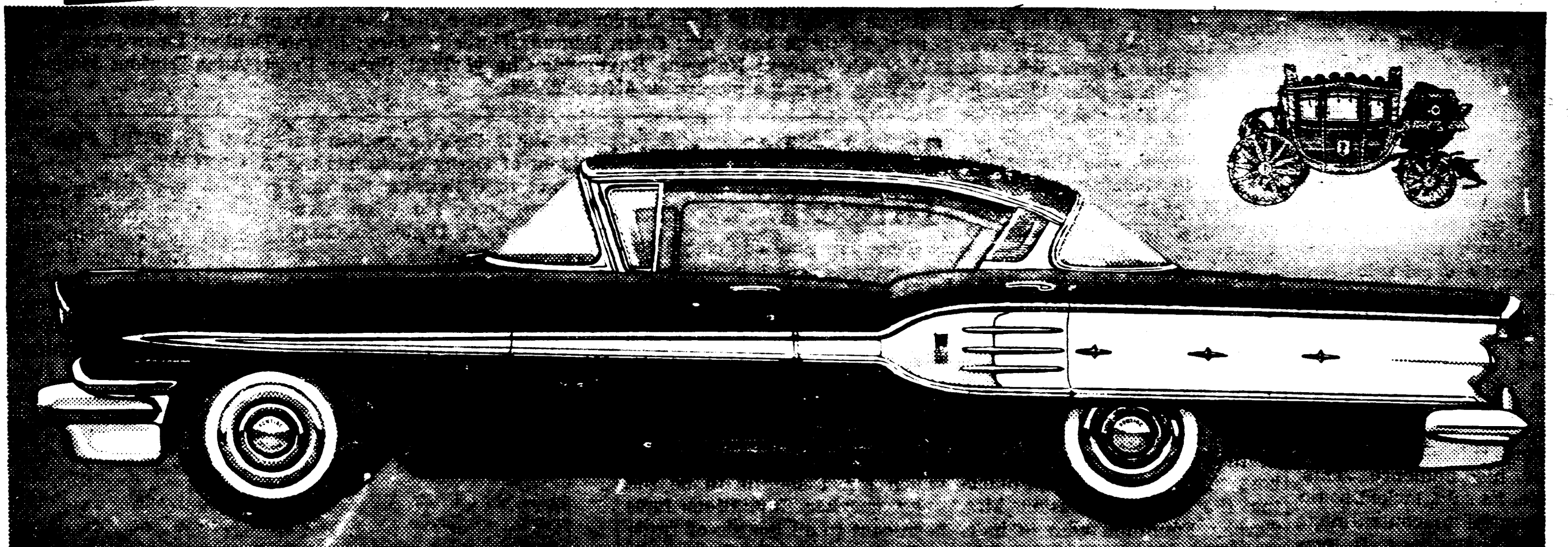

Scald 1/2 c. milk, 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast — or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry yeast. Let stand 10 minutes. THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour; beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic.

Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9" wide and 24" long; loosen dough. Combine 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar and 1/2 c. liquid honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with 1/4 c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased 8 1/2" tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

The world's largest fire engine factory, as you might imagine, uses a lot of red paint. About 6,000 gallons of it are delivered every year to the American LaFrance Co. at Elmira, N. Y., which must be a wonderful place for goggle-eyed boys. It's the factory that turns out almost half the 1,200 fire engines made in the United States every year.

Red is the most popular color for fire engines, of course, but a lot of other shades are used too, for cities that want something different. White is the second most popular color, then green. LaFrance has also made fire trucks in black, blue, chocolate and elegant gold. And there was one famous truck, they tell me that was a shocking shade of lilac.

How fast can a fire engine go? Well, the big 275 horse-power, 12 cylinder LaFrance aerial ladder truck will pull its tremendous load at 92 miles an hour. Most newer models, however, have a governor on them limiting speed to 65.

Fire engines, as you can see from almost any fire department, are durable pieces of machinery. LaFrance estimates that at least 15,000 of its 20,000 motor-driven fire trucks are still in use. It made its first gasoline fire truck in 1910 and it's still in service.

They are hardy machines, fire engines, and the most important reason is the constant and careful servicing they receive. 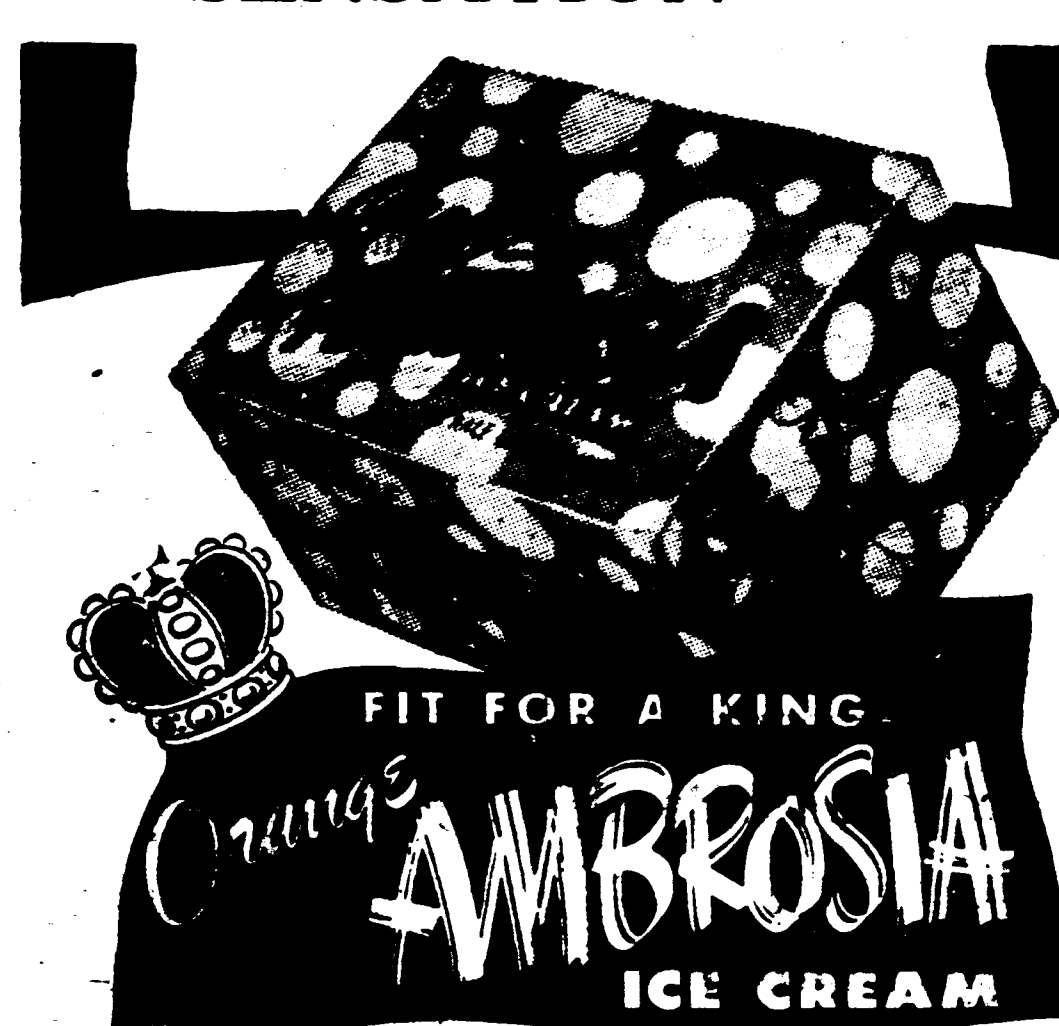

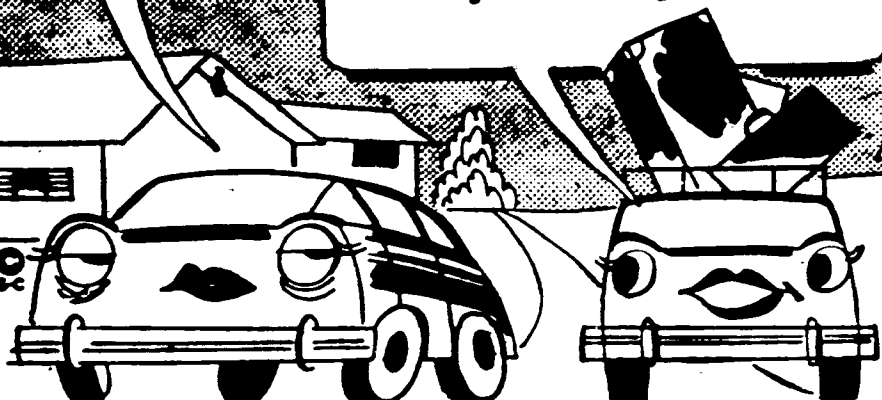

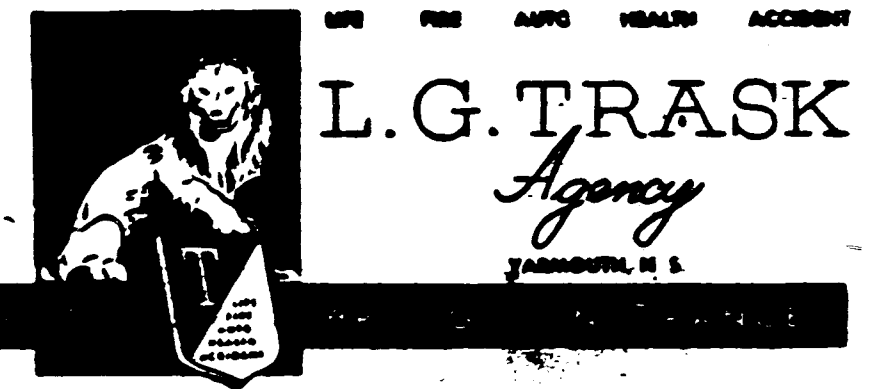

Letter to the Editor

The Editor,
 The Courier,
 Dear Mrs. Wallis:

In these days of shortages in many of the professions there is often a clamour that standards should be relaxed as a means of countering this shortage.

No greater folly could be propounded. To suggest that, because a shortage of teachers, doctors, nurses, clergymen, and other such professionals exists, a lowering of standards to permit qualification of a greater number should be put into effect is utterly ridiculous.

Surely, one of the greatest safeguards that the public has concerning the quality of education received by its children, the medical care it gets, the spiritual guidance available, is in the maintaining and even, perhaps, in raising the standards required by those who would practice in these fields.

Today, too, in the field of science we need the assurance that the standards for qualification of those who serve the nation in scientific endeavour and who are our hope in the scientific race, which we must win in order to survive, are kept high. To reduce these standards in order to combat a shortage of trained scientists would be to concede the race.

In these important fields of education, medicine, theology and science, and indeed in others, expediency cannot be allowed to panic those upon whom rests the responsibility of maintaining standards inviolate, into relaxing these standards as a means of combating a shortage no matter how much public attention this shortage may get.

The folly of so doing is readily apparent. What benefit would accrue to us as a nation or as a people to lower these standards? True, there would be more people who could wear the title of teacher, doctor, reverend or other such professional label but would this result in an improvement in the education received by our young, medical care for the ill or advances in medical discovery? Would it mean spiritual advancement or increased scientific achievement?

The answer is obviously, "No." Instead there would be put into effect a downward spiral, the eventual result of which would be a tragic lowering of the very standards of life and living itself.

It is not enough that a person carry a professional title or wear the garb that, in the eyes of the public, sets that person apart as a member of an honoured, respected and qualified profession. These are merely outward signs of the qualifications of that person.

It is true these things are important and must not be lightly treated. So long as the standards required to secure them are maintained they must be held in high regard. In fact they can only be held in this high regard if those standards are maintained and if only those qualified by these standards are permitted to make use of the outward signs which set them apart from those who have not laboured and been measured by such standards.

There are those who would

say too much emphasis may be placed on these things. This is not so. In fact, it would appear the opposite may be true. Our crying need is for more people in the professions which have been named and in others. Will it not lower the incentive and discourage those willing to labour and submit themselves to the required standards if others, by short cut means, ignoring established qualifications, can take unto themselves the outward habiliments and titles they laboured so hard to attain?

No, it would appear that if we in this nation are to go forward, to maintain and improve the reputation enjoyed by our professional people of legitimate standing, to ensure that advances so sorely needed are made in education, medicine, science and the like, we must continue to maintain and even raise the standards required for qualification. We must, too, maintain the place of honor in our society reserved for those who have earned it. This means recognition of the badges of office worn only by those properly entitled to them.

There is no real virtue in quantity without quality. Merely increasing the number of our professional people without ensuring that the standards by which they achieved their professional standing are maintained, will avail us nothing. Worse than that, it will bring disaster in the long run. Twice as many scientists half as well qualified will do nothing to aid us in the battle for scientific supremacy. To delude ourselves about this is to act like the ostrich with its head in the sand.

Civil Defence Scheme Success

R. O. Wright, civil defence co-ordinator for Digby, stated this week the civil defence scheme carried out in Digby Saturday in conjunction with other areas throughout the province had been successful.

Mr. Wright paid tribute to the cooperation received from the local detachment of the RCMP in handling messages from civil defence headquarters in Halifax and to other groups and organizations in Digby for their participation in the exercise.

Originally scheduled for a period between four and six o'clock Saturday afternoon, the defence scheme carried on until nearly ten o'clock Saturday evening with messages concerning imaginary bombings, evacuations and other details being relayed from the defence centre in Halifax.

The first message received from Halifax told of enemy attack there and asked for handling of some 8,000 evacuees from the city. Later word of a bomb dropped at Saint John was received necessitating evacuation of Digby to Yarmouth and Bridgetown. Wind direction isolated Yarmouth so plans had to be made for food supplies and other needs for that area.

Taking part in the exercise here were representatives of the fire company, salvage corps, Red Cross, Legion and Legion auxiliary and other groups. Reports concerning food and medical supplies available, transportation and other data had to be prepared and plans laid on as if receipt and evacuation of hospital patients, evacuees from Halifax were actually being carried out by the local group.

To Construct Breakwater

The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$117,495.00 to Mosher and Rawling Limited, Liverpool, N. S., for the construction of a breakwater-wharf at Whale Cove, Digby County, N. S. Specified completion date for this project is January 24, 1959.

Contract includes the removal and disposal of a departmental owned fish shed measuring 45 feet by 15 feet, which is in a state of disrepair. This will be followed by the construction of a rock-mound approach, measuring approximately 85 feet along the centre line with a top width of approximately 23 feet at an elevation of 25.33 feet above low water, ordinary spring tides.

The approach will consist of a reinforced concrete desk, 9.5 inches thick along the centre line, with a width of 20 feet. It will stretch over the full length of the approach. Reinforced concrete guards and shoulders along both sides of the work will help support the deck, which is to be 26 feet above low water, ordinary spring tides.

A close faced fully ballasted and creosoted timber cribwork stem, measuring approximately 100 feet on the seaward side and 78 feet 6 inches along the harbour side with a width of 20 feet, will be anchor-bolted to a mass concrete base of the same dimensions. Top of the creosoted timber cribwork will reach an elevation of 20.0 feet above local low water. The base will be doweled and grouted to the rock bottom. Another "L" shaped section 120 feet by 30 feet using similar design and materials will be erected.

One-hundred and thirty-thousand cubic feet of creosoted timber cribwork, 10,000 pounds of reinforcing steel, 6,000 bags of Portland cement, and various other materials will be required for the completion of this project.

Plans and specifications for this work were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch, Department of Public Works in Ottawa.

Discuss County School Situation

Tentative proposals concerning public meetings in the districts of Plympton, Plympton Station and Barton-Brighton to decide what steps will be taken to meet the needs of the area for improved and increased school facilities were discussed at the opening meeting of the May session of the Municipal Council here.

Present with the council for the meeting were Education Minister M. S. Leonard and School Inspector C. W. Crowell.

Mr. Leonard stated that proposals of the school board to meet the needs of the districts mentioned should be placed before public meetings in the areas concerned and a vote of the people taken before any action was taken.

It is understood two proposals to meet the school overcrowding lack of proper facilities in the districts of Plympton, Plympton Station and Barton-Brighton are under consideration by the school board. One of these involves the building of a six or seven room consolidated school in the Barton-Brighton area to serve the whole district. Also under consideration is the building of two three room schools. Land was purchased in the Barton area some time ago for school purposes, it is understood.

Mr. Leonard stated the two proposals should be placed before the people without emphasis on either and all the facts concerning both given to the public meetings. "We must get back to the fact that the buildings that are to be built are schools, and they must be functional in every way," Mr. Leonard said.

Questioned as to his opinion concerning the problems of staffing two three-room schools rather than a consolidated six-room school, Mr. Leonard said he felt there would be no great difficulty in securing teachers for the smaller schools. He said in the province some 45% of the teachers are married women, many resident in areas adjacent to the schools in which they teach.

Widely Known Cleric Passes

Rev. Roy Marshall Johnson, South Range, widely known retired clergyman, evangelist and former theology professor, passed away at the Digby General Hospital yesterday after a lengthy illness.

The Rev. Mr. Johnson was born in Kingston, Ontario, on January 25, 1888, and went as a young boy with his family to Alberta where he grew to manhood. He enlisted in the first World War and served three years in France. While there he contracted trench fever, from which he never fully recovered.

On his return from overseas he and his wife entered Spokane University to study for the ministry. They graduated from Cincinnati Bible Seminary in 1925. Mr. Johnson took his Master in Arts degree in 1926.

Following his ordination he served as minister of Churches of Christ in Washington, Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky, as well as in Toronto, Ont., Summer, side, P.E.I., and Milton, N.S., where he served for ten years. He also served the churches in South Range, Southville and Weymouth, N. S.

For three years Mr. Johnson was Professor of Homiletics and Pastoral Theology at Cincinnati Bible Seminary. He also served as Secretary-Evangelist for the Maritime Christian Missionary Society for several years until ill health forced him to retire some three years ago.

In 1953 Mr. and Mrs. Johnson donated a five acre lot of their lake shore property at South Range to the Maritime Christian Missionary Society for use as a young peoples' camp ground. The camp site was dedicated and appropriately named the Johnston Christian Park and its use has been enjoyed by hundreds of young people and adults since its establishment.

A devoted Christian leader and scholar with a cheerful and optimistic manner which won him a wide circle of friends, Mr. Johnson will be sadly missed by all who knew him in the many pastures in which he served, both in Canada and the United States.

He is survived by his wife, the former Bertha Maude Hines, who cared for him tenderly through his long illness, and by

John Fisher Addresses Meet

Appeal for a some sensible approach to liquor laws was made by John Fisher, noted commentator and Executive Director of the Canadian Tourist Association, in an address before a combined Digby County trade boards and service club dinner meeting at the Hotel Champlain here Tuesday evening.

In the matter of liquor laws, Mr. Fisher said, we must be realistic and present laws must be enforced. He stressed any new regulations made must be enforced to the spirit and letter of the law and those who abuse privileges granted should be severely dealt with.

Commenting on the Digby Board of Trade's action to seek approval of liquor licensing for better class hotels in the province, Mr. Fisher said he hoped this action, which he termed courageous, would not be misinterpreted.

Availability of liquor in decent surroundings under proper supervision and control would take away the "gay blade" attitude toward drinking, he said, and would make for more safety on the roads and a more healthy atmosphere altogether.

He said that three Atlantic provinces stood "almost alone" in Canada and in the world with the exception of the east in their attitude toward liquor laws. We must realize, he said, that alcohol is a part of life and, while those who do not want it should be respected, it should not be denied to those who do.

Mr. Fisher said however that provision of liquor should not be viewed as a crutch to the tourist industry. It will not bring more tourists to Nova Scotia, he said, but it will enable those in the tourist industry to provide better accommodation, better meals and more service.

While the Digby area has been richly endowed by nature, Mr. Fisher said, this is not sufficient for a successful tourist industry. We must sell people about what we have, he said, and show them the way to reach the scenic beauties and the historic spots in our area. Action must also be taken to provide the tourist with something to do while he is visiting the area, he said. He commented on the fact that little seems to be done to develop the potential tourist market right in Canada and said it was significant that only some 27% of Canadians had ever visited beyond their own provincial borders while some 75% of Canadians have visited the U.S. This, he said, could be because Canadians were bored with what we have to offer and just not merely curious about the United States.

In thinking about the tourist business, he said, it would not work to consider Digby as a single unit. You must regard Digby as part of an area and work to attract visitors to it as such. We need not only more visitors, he said, but we need them to stay longer. An estimate had been made, he said, of the effect of an extra fifteen minute stay in the country by each tourist who visited here last year. This would result in a tremendous increase of sales of foodstuffs even if each visitor only consumed an extra sandwich in the time, he said.

Speaking of those who benefit from the tourist industry, Mr. Fisher said the merchants benefited most and not those engaged in providing accommodation. Farmers, fishermen and all producers got a good share of the tourist dollar, he said, and should be vitally interested in promoting the industry.

There is a great need, he said, to develop handicrafts; to produce articles distinctly Canadian and Nova Scotian. He cited efforts of tourists to purchase souvenirs truly Canadian and said all too often it was found these items had been made in Japan, the U.S. or somewhere else outside Canada.

Courtesy is high on the list of requirements for a successful tourist industry, he said, and stated "more steaks are ruined by the cashier than the cook." It is proper to have pride in our country and its accomplishments but we must remember the visitor is also proud of his native land and resents uncomplimentary comments. He cited the matter of the attitude to foreign exchange as an example of an unfortunate approach.

Summing up, Mr. Fisher said in the tourist industry it is important to put first things first; we must erect attractive signs (Please turn to page 10)

To Attend Drama Festival

Miss Beatrice B. Thibodeau, retired teacher, will be attending the Dominion Drama Festival in Halifax May 11-18. Miss Thibodeau holds a certificate in Dramatics from the University of Alberta and one from the University of British Columbia, and is looking forward to very thrilling moments while taking in some of the Festival plays, and attending the Work Shop lectures on Dramatics.

This is the Silver Anniversary of the Dominion Drama Festival and is the first time the festival has ever been held in Nova Scotia and the second occasion it has been held in the Atlantic Provinces.

One adjudicator covers the whole of Canada for the regional festivals, working across the country either from East to West or vice versa.

The finals are judged by a different adjudicator and, upon his decisions, the national awards are made.

Enthusiasm for the forthcoming festival is running high in Nova Scotia. Even though, at the time of writing, the regional festivals are not yet completed and the program for the finals is therefore not yet compiled, advance sales are going at a fine pace.

With 1,000 of the total seats sold (bookings, incidentally, are being handled by the Halifax Board of Trade) and an army of voluntary workers engaged in all the multifarious tasks which will smooth the way of the various production staffs, there can be little doubt that the Drama Festival's first visit to Nova Scotia will prove a notable one and a worthy Silver Anniversary.

Injured In Explosion

A thirty-five year old mechanic, Fred Smith, of Digby, was severely injured about the face Wednesday afternoon when a gasoline tank he was welding exploded.

The accident occurred at Central Motors shortly after noon. Smith had filled the tank with water and tested it for fumes before proceeding with the welding job. In some manner, however, the tank exploded cutting and bruising Smith severely.

A doctor was summoned and Smith was rushed to hospital where he is reported as resting comfortably.

A brother of the injured man, Albert Smith, who was assisting him with the welding job, received a cut lip and bruises from the explosion. He received first aid treatment.

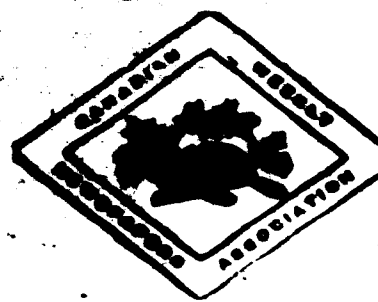

Prevent Forest Fires

Faster Freight Trains

New fast Canadian National Railways freight train schedules that will speed Atlantic provinces traffic as much as 28 hours were announced recently by Douglas V. Gonder, vice-president and general manager of the company at Moncton.

The faster freight train schedules will greatly speed the movement of export, import and domestic traffic between Halifax, Truro, New Glasgow, Sydney, Newfoundland, the South Shore and Annapolis Valley, Saint John, Fredericton, Moncton and Prince Edward Island and other parts of Canada and the United States via Montreal.

Fast Freight No. 406 from Toronto will reach Halifax 24 hours earlier than the present schedule and Saint John 28 hours earlier. Traffic from Sydney and Newfoundland will arrive at Sydney 21 hours, 45 minutes earlier and at Moncton 20 hours earlier.

In the opposite direction fast freight No. 405 will operate from Halifax to Toronto on a seven hours, 45 minutes faster timetable, Saint John 16 hours, Sydney and Newfoundland 16 hours, 45 minutes, and from Moncton on a 13 hours, 30 minutes quicker running time.

Fast freight 440 will operate from Montreal to Halifax on an 11 hours, 30 minutes quicker schedule, Saint John 21 hours, Sydney and Newfoundland five hours, 45 minutes, and to Moncton on an 11 hours, 30 minutes faster timetable.

In the reverse service, fast freight No. 441 will operate from Halifax to Montreal on a seven hours, 30 minutes improved schedule, from Saint John 13 hours, 30 minutes, from Sydney and Newfoundland 12 hours, 30 minutes and from Moncton seven hours, 45 minutes.

"We are pleased to be able to announce these innovations in our freight handling between the Atlantic provinces and other parts of Canada and the United States," said Mr. Gonder. "People residing at intermediate points throughout the region will also enjoy the benefits of the faster CNR freight service."

Large expenditures for capital improvements, dieselization, new heavier rails, high grade crushed rock ballast and other betterments have been made over the past few years in preparation for these faster schedules, he said. The work programme is continuing.

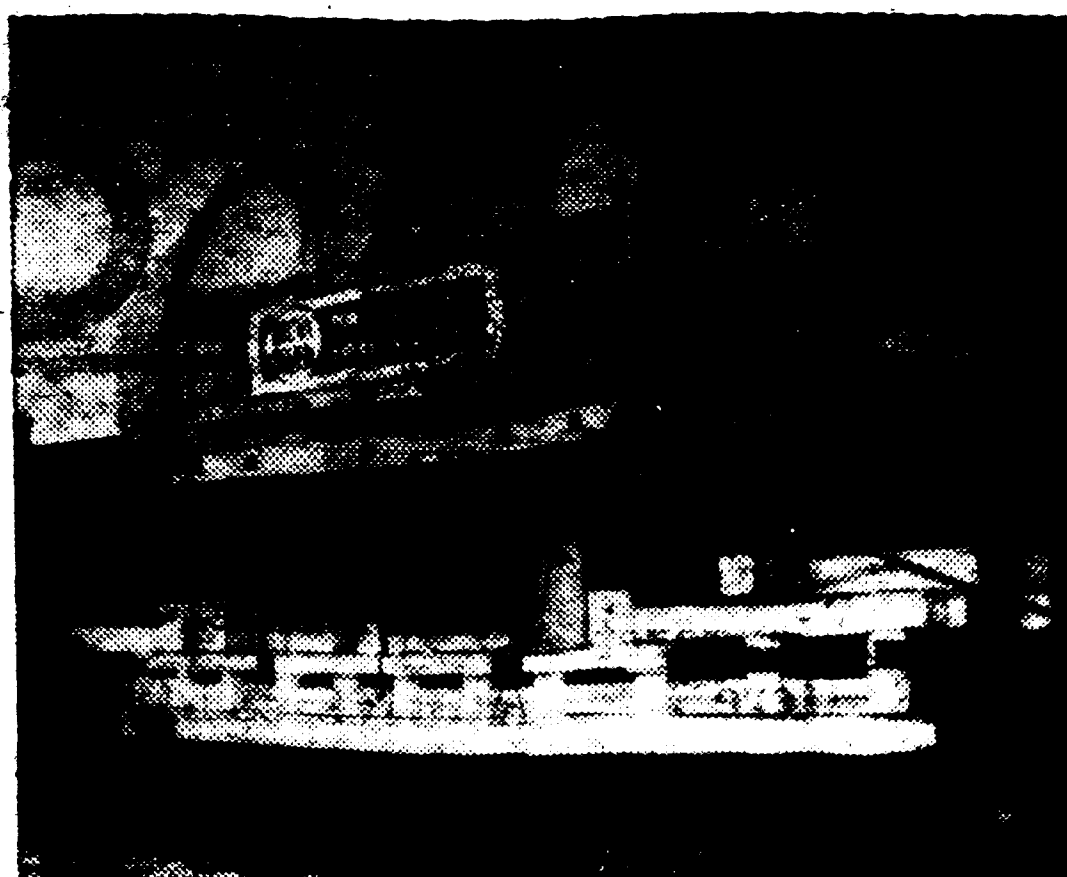

To handle the "big and wide" stator on its more than 2,500-mile trip, a CNR depressed flat car having a reinforced steel loading floor and weighing 122,000 pounds was used. Generator and car totalled 320,200 pounds or more than 165 tons.

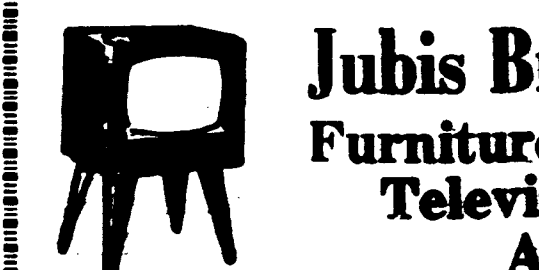

Draws Attention To Act For Fire Protection

As a precautionary safety measure to prevent destruction of valuable provincial forests from fire, Hon. R. Clifford Levy, minister of lands and forests, has directed attention to a section of the Lands and Forests Act, which reads as follows:

"No person shall make, kindle or start a fire for the purpose of disposing of any slashings, edgings, sawdust or other refuse lumber or for the purpose of clearing land or other like purposes between the fifteenth day of April and the fifteenth day of October next following in any year, nor set up nor operate a steam or internal combustion engine within sixty rods of any woods at any time without first having obtained leave in writing from the chief ranger or sub-ranger."

Persons contemplating burning brush or clearing land should consult the nearest ranger who will issue permits and advise re safety precautions, said the lands and forests minister.

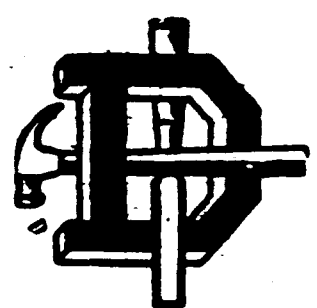

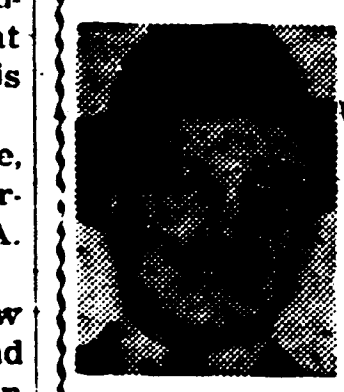

Everyone wants a car — everyone in the world, I suppose.

You can see it in the way the Russians are letting up on some of their production campaigns and putting on the pressure to get as many little Pobedas and Moskvitches as they can into the hands of the peasants.

They got some help, although unwillingly, from Germany. After the war, the Russians relieved an American-owned auto factory at Russelsheim of most of the dies and jigs which had been used to make a popular German car called the Opel Cadet. They called it war reparations.

So now the Opel turns up on the streets of Russia, looking a little forlorn and pre-war, as the Moskvitch, which means "Son of Moscow."

The Pobeda, which is pronounced Po-vee-dah, is, like the Moskvitch, a little four-cylinder car which, the experts tell me, is quite sturdy made. Its performance is uninspiring, for the Pobeda takes 34 seconds to accelerate to 60 miles an hour. A four-cylinder American car of similar price will do it in 18 seconds.

Speaking of building costs and various types of schools being constructed in the province, Mr. Leonard suggested members of the council and school board visit some of the newly constructed schools in other sections of the province. Many of these, he said, were very functional in design and built at reasonable cost. "It is my opinion enough money has already been spent in Digby county to have solved the whole situation problem here," he said.
Mr. Leonard stated, "We are in a position today when plans come in if it is felt they are too elaborate they are sent back with instructions to design something more in line with the economy of the area."
Referring again to the situation being discussed, Mr. Leonard stated it did not necessarily follow that, if a consolidated school is built, everyone who wants transportation will have it. Transportation of pupils is not required for a distance of less than 2 1/2 miles, he said, but if transportation of pupils over this distance is established those living closer than the 2 1/2 mile limit may be transported.
Councillor Ernest Ring, of Barton, stated he had discussed the school problem in his area with many parents and was of the opinion a great majority with children in school would favor consolidation. He agreed the facts should be put before the people but stressed difficulties in getting people to attend meetings to deal with these matters.
The matter of replacing the school at Westport came before the meeting briefly. In Westport some \$15,000 has been voted for repairs and alterations to the school. A delegation had appeared before the municipal school board protesting the proposed expenditure and stating that a further sum should be voted for replacement of the building as it was felt by this group repairing the old structure would be uneconomical.
In speaking on this Mr. Leonard said he had heard no outcry from the area concerning the need for a new building and felt the matter should be approached with extreme caution. He suggested a competent builder should make an inspection of the building. A new one should be provided only if the present is unrepairable, he said.
In concluding his remarks before the council Mr. Leonard urged that the council get together with civic authorities in the area to deal with the matter of daylight time. The changeover in the fall, he said, poses problems for schools in the area serving several districts where town and rural area overlap.

Building Guttled By Fire

Fears were felt here for a while Friday evening that considerable damage would result should a quantity of dynamite and percussion caps, stored in the Digby County Power Board building on Digby's main street, be exploded by a fire which gutted much of the interior of the rear of the large modern building. Fortunately approximate location of the explosives in the burning building was determined soon after the fire broke out and a heavy concentration of water was played on that area. About an hour after the fire was first discovered Digby firemen had the blaze sufficiently under control to permit Alfred Marshall of the line maintenance staff of the power board, in company with some of the firemen, to enter the building and safely remove the dynamite and caps, removing danger of explosion.

The fire was first discovered just before nine thirty Friday night as the staff of the store were preparing to close shop. An alarm was sounded but when the fire department arrived they found the blaze had evidently gained considerable headway before being noticed and the whole rear portion of the building was engulfed in heavy smoke with flames showing through occasionally. As soon as informed of the presence of explosives in the building the Fire Chief ordered an evacuation of sightseers from the immediate area of the fire and also had the telephone office, immediately to the south of the threatened building, and an apartment just a few feet north of the Power Board building, cleared. Telephone service through Digby was not restored for more than an hour, until the explosives had been removed from the Power Board building.

The fire was reported out shortly before eleven o'clock and a check of the building showed heavy damage to the rear portion as well as heavy smoke and water damage to the business offices and retail department. From an investigation it appeared the fire had started in the southwest corner of the rear part of the building which reaches from Water Street through to 1st Avenue. No cause of the blaze was determined nor was loss fully assessed at time of going to press. A number of larger electric appliances were badly damaged by the fire. Heavy smoke which accompanied the blaze was reported to be mainly from burning wallboard which lined the interior portion of the burned part of the building.

Rap Obscene Literature

Calling on fathers and mothers to maintain an atmosphere in the home which will give their children the security necessary for their proper upbringing, Rev. Clarence Thibault, Shelburne parish priest, was the principal speaker at the banquet marking the opening of the third annual convention of the Yarmouth Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada.

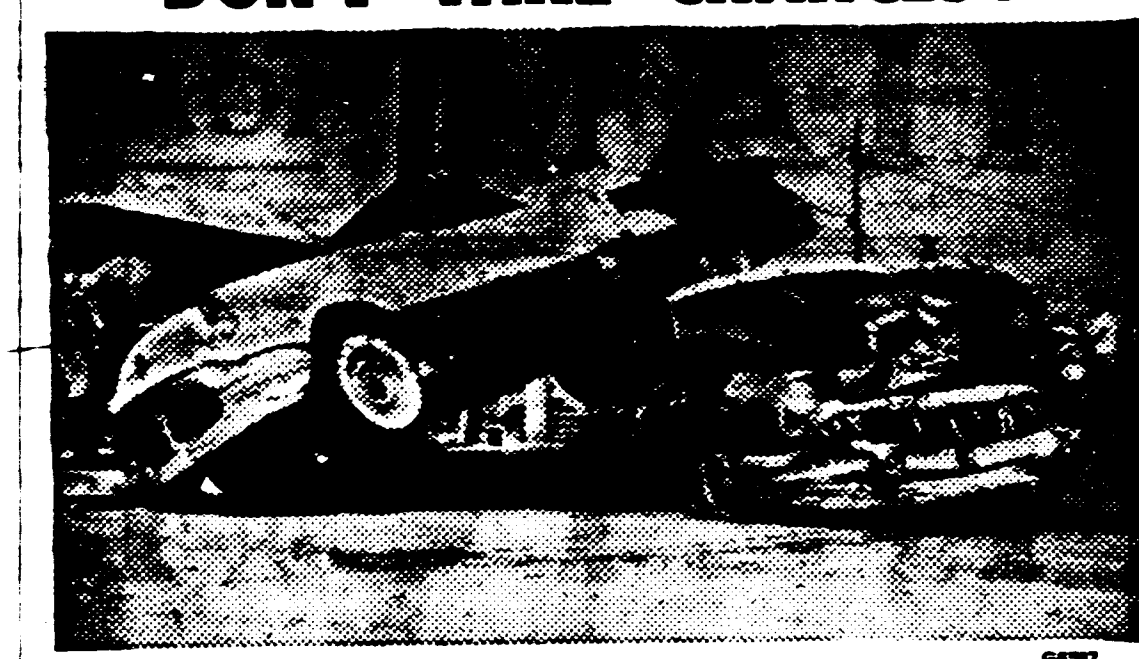

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. portion into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

Guest Speakers At Weymouth

Family Day Service in the United Church in Weymouth was the occasion for hearing from Rev. John Stuart, principal of the Church's Atlantic Christian Training Centre, and Miss Mona Mayhew, who attended the Centre and graduated during the past winter. Mr. Stuart's and Miss Mayhew's remarks about the Centre at Tatamagouche were well illustrated with personal experiences, and samples of the handicrafts, leather billfold, plastic foam flower and a fine engraved copper design were to be seen. A table at the entrance to the church held pictures from the Centre, pamphlets of coming events in the program and artist's sketches of the proposed new building. The need for more space to accommodate students at the Centre has brought its work and aims to focus in the Church during the past few weeks especially.

Twenty-four young people attended the Centre during the past winter and have now gone back to their local churches better equipped to lead in young people's work, teach Sunday School and take part in their Church activities generally. Miss Mayhew intends next winter to serve as a volunteer teacher in a part of the Gaspé where it is usually hard to secure teachers for the schools. She also indicated that she has always been interested in missionary work and may eventually become a missionary teacher.

Most of the graduates from the Centre have been visiting churches in the Maritimes since March, telling the people about the opportunities for training and service through the Atlantic Christian Training Centre and making clear the need for its support. Miss Mayhew told of present inadequacy of the building, serving as it does for residence, class-room and dining-room space and having no place provided for either recreation or chapel.

Mr. Stuart in his talk in each of the churches on Weymouth charge told how the Centre came to be, how it is partly an answer to the unconscious belief among most people that leadership in making a better world must come through the church. He told how fifteen interested laymen gave \$15,000 to buy the property at Tatamagouche three years ago and how the idea has caught on of a centre for lay leadership and training in the Maritimes. Many people were doubtful that any would give time to training to give better service in the church and the first winter session began with only three students. But those who have been there have gone back to their homes full of enthusiasm for the church and anxious to do more in learning to serve it better. This year applications from young people have had to be turned down for the winter course and delegates to the shorter courses have had to be limited to six from each church. In the meantime the church has made provision this year for a Building Campaign for the Centre by which its usefulness will more nearly approach what it is intended to be.

It is of interest that one of the most interested in coming to the Centre at Tatamagouche was a man from Bermuda who on graduation day last year celebrated his sixty-ninth birthday. A brose was so anxious to come that he closed his leather-shop for the winter and he enjoyed the activities as much as anyone. Since then two others have come to the Centre from Bermuda. They had an interesting time learning tobogganing and skating in our Canadian winters, and the other students enjoyed helping them.

The two guests from Atlantic Christian Training Centre arrived at Sandy Cove on Saturday evening and were at once welcomed by a group at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Sypher. A pleasant evening was spent there with informal conversation illustrated by colored slides and literature from the Centre. Mr. Stuart and Miss Mayhew were entertained at the homes of Hugh Morehouse and Emdon Morehouse in Sandy Cove and in Weymouth by Mrs. H. E. Wagner and the Scott-Hankinson family. The services on Sunday were well attended in spite of the weather, and the story about Atlantic Christian Training Centre was well received by all.

Other officers elected at the meeting include Mrs. Florence Melanson, Weymouth, 1st Vice-President; Mrs. Owen Irving, Sandy Cove, 2nd Vice-President; Mrs. Keith Potter, Plympton, Secretary; Wallace Hodgson, Digby, Treasurer.

Committee conveners elected include Mrs. Russell Atkinson, Arts and Music; Mrs. Victor Jeffrey, Founders' Day; Mrs. Allan Thomas, Membership; Miss Marjorie Tupper, Health; Mrs. J. M. Wallis, H. & S. publications.

During the afternoon session reports were given from various associations represented. These all indicated considerable activity through the year.

Of particular interest were the reports of the newly organized association at the consolidated school in Sandy Cove and the regional school association at Weymouth. The reports of these two associations indicated they had embarked on several worthwhile projects.

Reports were also given at the meeting from council conveners of music, health, arts, founders' day and other committees. These indicated all associations had been active in these fields with some carrying out major projects.

Speaker at the evening session was Mr. Lionel Vallee, psychiatric social worker at the Digby Clinic. Mr. Vallee dealt at some length with the matter of problems faced by children at various stages of their development. He told also of the effect the reaction of parents to the activities and attitudes of their children might have on child development. He said it is extremely important that parents react properly to situations in order to avoid aggravating problems and worsening an already difficult situation.

Mr. Vallee was introduced to the gathering by Victor Cardoza and thanks of the meeting were expressed by Baden Powell. During the supper hour the delegates were entertained in the domestic science department of the Digby Regional High School where supper was served by the domestic science staff, assisted by high school pupils. Several sing-songs were also held during the day's program.

At the close of the evening's session the newly elected president announced a meeting of the council executive would be held in Digby on the evening of May 30th and extended an invitation to all interested association presidents to attend.

Trade Board Presses Liquor Issue

A resolution, calling on the provincial government to "immediately take the necessary steps to permit the sale of liquor, beers and wines in first class hotels and eating establishments or state the policy of the government in this matter" was passed at the regular monthly meeting of the Digby Board of Trade here Tuesday night.

The resolution passed at the meeting was a follow-up to one passed some time ago by the Digby trade board calling for a liberalization of Nova Scotia's liquor laws to permit the sale of alcoholic beverages in first class hotels in the province.

In the preamble to Tuesday night's resolution it was stated the original move by the Digby board to bring about a liberalization of the province's liquor laws had been endorsed in principle by "bodies representing a large portion of the province" and opposed by "only a small minority group". It was also pointed out "certain localities now enjoy the privilege of serving refreshments to the detriment of other parts of the province". The government was urged to state its stand in the matter so that the various boards of trade might "formulate their policies and future action".

Introduction of the liquor resolution at Tuesday night's meeting precipitated a discussion which occupied most of the session and was at times heated. Charges were levelled that the meeting at which the original resolution had been introduced had been "packed" and it was stated certain persons had joined the board at that time merely to ensure passage of the resolution.

An amendment was introduced to the resolution that would require it to be laid on the table for consideration at a later meeting but this was defeated. It was pointed out at the meeting that the resolution was above the average and such action had not been taken in connection with other contentious matters to come before the board.

On a vote being called the resolution was adopted with ten votes in favour and two against.

Award Contract For Dredging

The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of approximately \$92,000.00 to the J. P. Porter Company Limited, of Montreal, Quebec, for dredging two areas and widening and straightening the course of the ships channels at Weymouth North, Nova Scotia. Specified completion date for the project is October 12, 1988.

Areas to be dredged include the entrance channel 3,250 feet by 120 feet, and the inner channel 1,050 feet by 100 feet. This work involves the removal of approximately 100 cubic yards (place measurement) of large boulders and 40,000 cubic yards (scow measurement) of sand, gravel and clay.

Cost for the removal of the boulders is at the unit rate of \$20.00 per cubic yard (place measurement) and the sand, gravel and clay at a unit rate of \$2.25 per cubic yard (scow measurement).

Oldest Veteran Receives Medals

On Saturday, May 10th, at Ceremonial Divisions on board HMCS Cornwallis, First World War Medals were presented to Mr. Rufus W. Connor, Digby, N. S., by Captain M. J. A. T. Jette, CD, RCN.

Mr. Connor is the oldest living Canadian Naval Veteran, having enlisted in the Royal Navy August 1st, 1896, and the medals he received from Captain Jette were the 1914-15 Star, British War Medal and the Victory Medal. He had been awarded these medals but had never actually received them.

Mr. Connor appeared on the dais in the uniform of a Master-At-Arms of the Royal Navy early 1900's vintage complete with frock coat and sword. This added colour to the presentation ceremony.

Highlights of M.A.A. Connor's career consisted of participation in the Boer War, the Boxer Rebellion, the Japanese-Russo War and the First World War. During his lengthy and colourful career he won several medals and awards for marksmanship and was one of the first qualified Naval Divers.

The seventy-nine year old veteran was invalided out of the service in 1917 and is now residing in Digby, N. S.

Strange Device Retrieved

A strange looking device, thought to be some scientific measuring equipment, was picked up in the Bay of Fundy by Captain Raymond Longmire in his scallop dragger about a mile off Broad Cove on May 1.

The device consisted of three pasteboard boxes joined together and banded with nylon webbing. These boxes contained some foam-like substance. Attached to the nylon webbing was a series of sturdy coil type wires which appeared to be chromium plated. These joined an eight foot spreader bar from which more wires were connected to a double eye bolt. This bolt appeared to have been a connecting link for some other part of the device which, however, was missing when the strange affair was picked out of the water by Captain Longmire.

At each end of the spreader bar was a small light. On one part of the device was a sizeable rudder. At the base of this were a number of fuses and on other parts of the device there were also fuses. At one place a metallic device was connected. This contained a cylinder type magnet.

Part of the device appeared to be missing when it was rescued and the boxes of foam-like substance were partly decomposed so they were thrown overboard. On the nylon webbing which was around these boxes there were the figures BKA4 and 306471. The name Pioneer Parachute Company Inc. also appeared on the webbing as did the figures P dash 23.

Economic Survey Underway

Conventions Scheduled

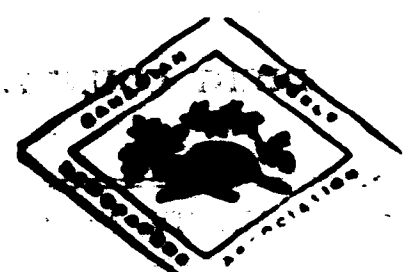
A number of conventions have been scheduled for the Digby Pines Hotel this summer, it is learned from the latest issue of the calendar of events in Nova Scotia.

Narrow Escapes Food For Talk

"There", said one of the men, "I was. My hands on the steering wheel, my foot on the gas pedal. Suddenly, right in front of me another car pulls out of a side street without stopping. I jam on the brakes and when I put the extra pull on the steering wheel I feel the whole column start slipping. Some place it had come loose and the wheel was actually coming off in my hands. I couldn't steer. Imagine how I felt then!"

"I was driving," said another of the men, "down a steep hill on Mark Street, the one that dips under the railroad bridge. Up ahead, the traffic light turned red against me and when I put my foot on the brake pedal it went right to the floor. My car had no brakes!"

Put a group of men together in a club or at lunch, introduce experiences like that and immediately you have a string of dramatic recollections of accidents and narrow escapes. It will be surprising how many of them refer to unsafe vehicles. They will talk of lights that went out at 50 miles an hour, tires that blew, broken exhaust pipes that sent fumes into parked cars, windshield wipers that blinded drivers, horns that went mute at the wrong times, and many more.

"After a hard winter of driving," warns the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, "the only way to drive without fear of your vehicle's mechanical faults is to have it thoroughly checked. After all, a car is only a machine; it can't cry out in pain or complain of an ache in the crankcase. Find trouble before it finds you, and eliminate it."

The Conference is sponsoring a national "Check Your Car, Check Your Driving, Check Accidents" campaign during May, in Canada.

A Proclamation

WHEREAS on the twentieth day of May, A.D. 1758, a proclamation was made and published at Halifax directing that a House of Representatives be summoned and convened, at Our said City of Halifax, on the second day of October, A.D. 1758;

AND WHEREAS the said proclamation so issued the election so held and the House of Representatives so convened are of the greatest historic significance and were the beginnings of Representative Government and the forerunners of the Parliamentary System of Canada and of the Provinces thereof;

AND WHEREAS the bicentennial anniversary of the first House of Representatives in Canada will be marked by special ceremonies of Our present Legislature on the second day of October next;

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that the said events should be particularly marked with due solemnity;

NOW KNOW YE THAT WE, by and with the advice of Our Executive Council of Nova Scotia, do by this Our Proclamation, publish and proclaim that the period commencing the twentieth day of May, A.D. 1958; and ending the second day of October, A.D. 1958, be a time of solemn thanksgiving and of rejoicing to be observed by all Our loving subjects and all other persons having an affection and regard for Parliamentary Institutions and the Parliamentary Systems of Government;

WE DO CORDIALLY INVITE all Our loving subjects and all others who take cognizance of this important and historic occasion to join in celebration and particularly to visit or revisit the birthplace of the beginnings of the free and unfettered assembly of elected representatives making laws for the common weal.

FOR THE AFORESAID PURPOSES We do hereby appoint and set apart the period of time from the twentieth day of May, A.D. 1958, to the second day of October, A.D. 1958, as a period of thanksgiving and rejoicing, beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless Our loyal subjects and all those who love and cherish freedom of thought and expression and the democratic and Parliamentary System of Government.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, we have caused these Our Letters to be made patent, and the Great Seal of Nova Scotia to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESSED, Our Trusty and Well-Beloved His Honour Major General the Honourable Edward Chester Prior, C.B.E., D.S.O., C.M.G., Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.

AT Our Government House, in Our City of Halifax, this third day of May, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifty-eight, and in the seventh year of Our reign.

Plan Concrete Floor For Forum

Installation of a concrete floor in the Digby Forum seemed a near certainty here as news was released that a carload of cement had been ordered for the job.

It is understood financial requirements necessary to install the floor are available and only a number of technical problems have to be settled before a final decision on the matter is forthcoming.

Hope is being expressed these matters can be cleared in time to have work on the floor started, if the decision is made to install it, in time for use by the Digby Branch of the Canadian Legion for their Legion Day program on June 14th.

First steps toward having the concrete floor put in the forum here were begun by H. M. Warne, chairman of the Digby Recreation Commission, who has been active in promoting the project.

Mr. Warne pointed out at a recent meeting installation of a permanent type floor would permit year 'round use of the forum and increase its earning power as well as make it available for greater community use.

It is understood those active in promoting the installation of the concrete floor have contacted artificial ice rink operators in other centres and have secured a good deal of information on the matter. An effort is also underway to secure local volunteer help in the work of preparing the forum for the installation of the floor and actually installing the concrete.

Veteran Printer Passes

George Henry Chisholm, 88, a printer for seventy years, principally with weekly newspapers before his retirement in 1953, died in Kentville Thursday.

He had been in failing health for the last year. Mr. Chisholm started his long career in newspaper print shops as a "printer's devil" with the Digby Courier at the age of 13 and retired five years ago after some forty years with the Kentville Publishing Company, publishers of the "Kentville Advertiser".

He was foreman of the print shop for many years. Born at Windsor, son of the late Thomas and Mary Chisholm, he moved with the family to Digby at an early age. After a number of years with the Courier Mr. Chisholm went to western Canada, and was with the Boyd Bishop Printing Company, Winnipeg, and several other printing weeklies before returning to Digby. He there rejoined the Courier and served for a number of years as foreman and also as acting Editor.

He went to Kentville with the Advertiser in 1918. His record of seventy years as a printer was regarded on his retirement as one of the longest in history of the Canadian printing business.

He was a member of the United Church and was a Past Noble Grand of Hiawatha Lodge IOOF.

Surviving are his wife, the former Arabella Higgins, of Middle Musquodoboit; three sons, John Thomas, New Westminister, B. C.; Carleton, school principal and supervisor, Saint John; Sheldon, Halifax, barrister, and one daughter, Evelyn (Mrs. Robert Middlemas), Berwick; two sisters, Miss Ruby Chisholm and Miss Gertrude Chisholm, Annapolis Royal; one brother, Avon Chisholm, Braintree, Mass., and thirteen grandchildren.

The remains rested at the H. C. Lindsay Funeral Home and were taken to Kentville United Church in time for funeral services at two thirty Saturday afternoon. The minister, Rev. K. G. Sullivan officiated. Interment was in Elm Grove cemetery.

Editors Addressed By Leonard

Guest speaker at the banquet on Friday when the Nova Scotia Weekly Newspapers Association held its semi-annual meeting at the Nova Scotia Hotel, Halifax, was Hon. Malcolm S. NSPC Takes Over Generators

First major step in the change over in control of the power generating facilities of the Digby County Power Board on the Sissiboo River to the Nova Scotia Power Commission occurred at midnight on May 24th when the Digby County Power Board ceased to generate power on the river and this job was taken over by the Power Commission.

It is understood the Power Commission will continue to operate power generators on the Sissiboo, which supply only a small portion of the power consumed in Digby County, for some five to six weeks. They will then be closed down as plans proceed for the construction of a power development on the Sissiboo by the NSPC, which it is expected will cost in excess of eight million dollars.

Following negotiations during the past winter the Digby County Power Board sold out its power generating facilities in the county to the Power Commission to facilitate plans by the commission for a multi-million dollar power development in this area to be tied into the commission's western network.

The Digby County Power Board will continue to operate the power transmission and distribution system in Digby county and will sell power purchased from the NSPC to customers in the county. Only change in the operation of the Digby County Power Board brought about by the sale of its generating facilities to the NSPC will be that the municipally owned utility will no longer generate any of its power but will purchase all requirements from the NSPC. This system went into operation at midnight, May 24th.

A story in the May 8th issue of the Digby Courier concerning the possibility that Princess Margaret would include a visit to Digby during her Canadian tour has received confirmation this week.

According to details of the Royal visit plan released by provincial authorities this week Princess Margaret will visit Yarmouth, Digby, Annapolis and Halifax during her tour of Nova Scotia this August.

It is understood Princess Margaret is expected to arrive in Yarmouth aboard an RCAF aircraft about 2 p.m. August 8th. She will later drive to Digby and spend the night here aboard the Governor General's train and drive to Annapolis the next day.

At Annapolis Princess Margaret will board the special train, continuing to Halifax, arriving about 5.30 p.m. It is expected she will be a guest of the Lieutenant Governor at Government House during her stay in Halifax.

A. D. Ross, chairman of the federal government's hospitality committee, accompanied by Major Legh of Buckingham Palace staff, James Barker, secretary of the hospitality committee, and Col. R. B. MacDougall, chairman of the tri-service committee will be in Nova Scotia next week for preliminary discussions with local and provincial officials with regard to the Royal visit.

This group will fly from Fredericton by RCAF transport arriving in Yarmouth; proceeding by highway to Digby and Annapolis, talking with municipal officials along the route. From Annapolis they will drive to Greenwood, have discussions in Halifax, fly to Sydney and then proceed to Montreal.

Jailed On Charge

Ervin William Roma, 35-year-old Ashmore man, was sentenced to fourteen months in the county jail here Tuesday after being found guilty in supreme court of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle.

The charge arose out of the January 25th death of John Daley Raymond, also of Ashmore. Raymond was a passenger in a car, reportedly driven by Roma, which was involved in a collision with another vehicle at Brighton some six miles from Digby.

The petit jury under foreman Ralph O. Wright deliberated about an hour before bringing in their guilty verdict. They recommended leniency and referred to the fact Roma is in poor health.

Radio Engineer Addresses Meet

The City of LaPaz in Bolivia has a potential of fifty thousand radios and listening posts. So said Rev. Arthur Wormald at the Digby County District Meetings of Baptist Churches held recently at Smith's Cove. The radio is one of the most useful means of evangelism in Bolivia, a country in which paganism and idolatry is prevalent. Mr. Wormald is Director of the Southern Cross Radio in the city of LaPaz, Bolivia. This station is owned and maintained by the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board. The facilities of the station are used for broadcasting musical programs, news, scientific talks, etc., as well as for the preaching of the Gospel.

Mr. Wormald said that since freedom was granted to the S. A. Indians there are three million people in Bolivia to whom the Southern Cross Radio can become a means of education, enlightenment, and information in accepting the responsibilities of their freedom. Through portable battery radio sets people in the remotest villages will be able to become informed on the issues of their country. And also the Baptist Mission Board can use this means of bringing the Gospel of Christ to these politically free people.

Mrs. Wormald addressed the Woman's Missionary Society in the afternoon. She dressed herself in native Bolivian costume, and as she put on each garment she used this medium to remind her audience of the social, political and religious customs in Bolivia. She spoke of the freeing of one hundred serf families on Pinell Hall Farm in 1954. These were the first natives to be granted their freedom in Bolivia. Peniel Hall Farm is operated by the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Mrs. Wormald, who assists her husband in the Southern Cross Radio Station challenged young women to consider the wide field of missionary service in Bolivia, which she said is an

Possible Hospital Expansion Seen

Possibility of a sizeable increase in the number of beds at the Digby General Hospital to cope with the anticipated shortage of hospital beds in this area with the advent of the hospital insurance plan in January, was seen here this week with reports that a series of meetings have been underway between the hospital board, the medical staff of the hospital and the town and municipal councils.

Concern has been expressed by local hospital authorities with respect to the possible effect of the introduction of the national health insurance plan on hospital accommodation available in Digby and the meetings which have been held arose out of this concern, it is understood.

Preliminary consideration has been given by the hospital board and medical staff to various approaches to the problem, it is understood, and discussion meetings have been held with town and municipal councils. A committee, representative of all these groups, has now been organized and will further study the whole matter.

On completion of a full study of the situation and proposed methods of dealing with it a brief will be prepared outlining findings of the committee and recommending steps to be taken to deal with the expected shortage of hospital beds before this becomes acute with the implementation of the hospital plan.

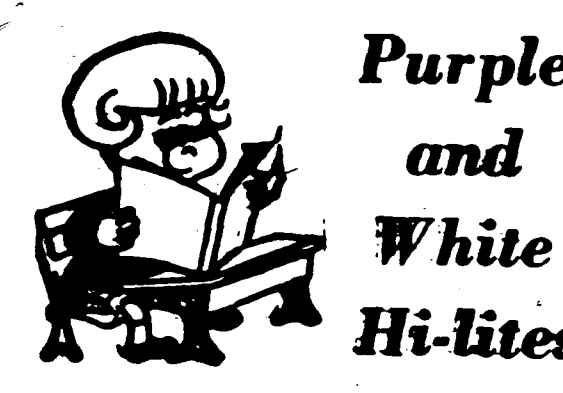
It is understood considerable discussion was had concerning the pros and cons of the new store hours as compared with those previously in operation, which featured Saturday night opening.

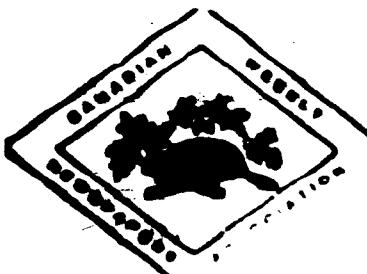

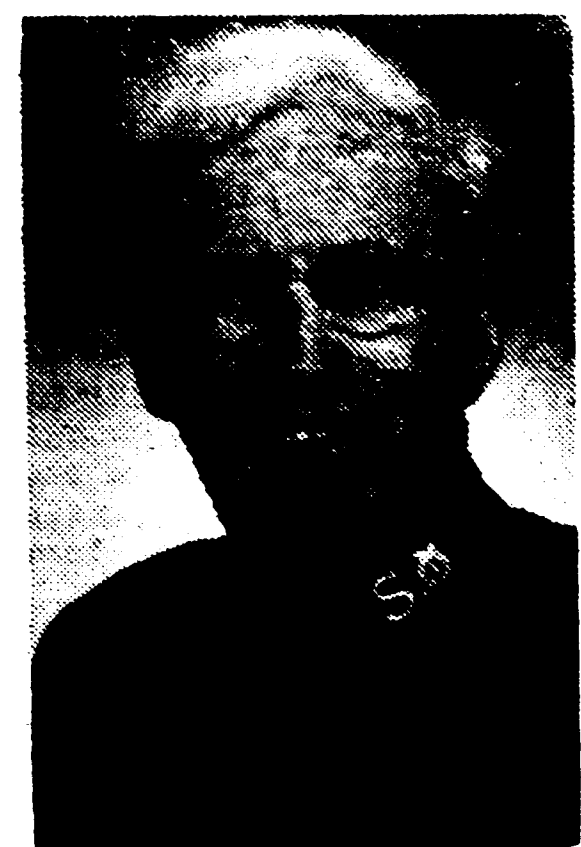
Walter E. Mullen, of Easton, will receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Eastern Nazarene College in Quincy, Mass., on May 26.

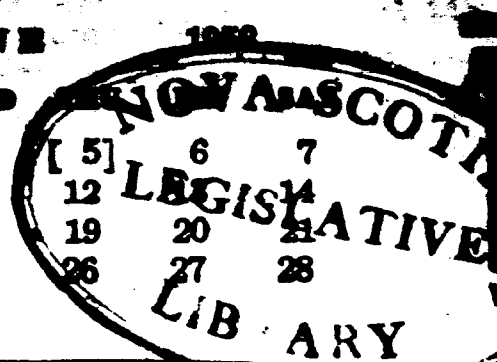

He paid tribute to the work done by those who took part in the recent civil defence exercise and said local organizations were co-operating in civil defence work.

A plan for improved street lighting in various sections of the town, presented by James Ayer, superintendent of the Digby County Power Board, was adopted by the council. This plan, which calls for an expenditure of some \$3,500 from the electric light account, will provide modern street illumination on Warwick Street from the town boundary to King Street and on certain sections of other streets in the town. It is understood the present system of street lighting will gradually be replaced on all streets as finances permit.

A building permit was granted to Herbert Theriault to construct a home on his property on 2nd Avenue. Robert Bearne was also granted permission to construct a home on his lot on 3rd Avenue. The Digby County Power Board was given permission to demolish that portion of their business block damaged by a recent fire and to rebuild on the site. It is understood the replacement will cost in the vicinity of \$9,000. Fire loss to the original building and contents was estimated at \$15,000.

Councillor Wilfred Mulne was appointed at the meeting to represent the Mayor on the Recreation Commission.

Permission was given the Digby Kiwanis Club to erect a twelve by sixteen foot bulletin board near the bandstand on Digby's main street. This bulletin board will give information about local events, scenic attractions and other information of interest particularly to the tourist visitor to Digby. The sign will be located near the provincial government's tourist information bureau.

Reigh Jayne reported to the meeting on Digby's participation in the recent apple blossom festival. He stated Digby's float had won first prize in the parade and suggested the fifty dollar award be placed in a special account to assist financing future entries in the festival. It was decided to adopt this recommendation. A letter of appreciation was also ordered sent to Carl Melanson for his efforts in assisting in construction of the prize winning float.

Mayor Gordon Turnbull reported he had received official word of the coming visit of Princess Margaret to Digby and stated he was to meet with visit officials to discuss details of the royal visit here.

Deputy Mayor D. G. Black reported on a meeting with tourist director Dan Wallace at which he represented the mayor and council. He stated matters of interest to the tourist industry in Digby had been discussed.

Apple Blossom Queen Visits

The beautifully decorated stage of the Digby Regional High School was the setting Monday afternoon for the welcome to Queen Annapolis XXVI and her princesses and attendant party.

Despite a heavy downpour of rain the enthusiasm of the crowd gathered to welcome the Queen and her party was in no way dampened. An official civic welcome was extended to the royal group by His Worship Mayor Turnbull who stressed the historic and economic significance of the apple industry and the real contribution being made each year by the annual Apple Blossom Festival.

Mayor Turnbull congratulated the new Queen on her achievement and also paid tribute to Digby's Princess, Miss Diane Scragg. He also complimented the Digby Board of Trade and their apple blossom fair committee on the work done in arranging for a princess and seeing to it that Digby was represented in the parade by a prize winning float.

Mayor Spence Horsburgh, of Berwick, chairman of the festival committee, was master of ceremonies for the visit of the Queen and her party. He introduced Reigh Jayne, chairman of the Digby Trade Board's festival committee, and presented to Mayor Turnbull on behalf of the committee a cheque and silver cup won by Digby's entry in the apple blossom parade.

Mr. Seymour Gordon introduced the Queen and her princesses to the gathering and the Queen spoke briefly. She thanked the people of Digby for their welcome and complimented the town on its princess and float. Miss Scragg, Digby's princess, also spoke briefly thanking the trade board for sponsoring her and the local committee for making it possible for her to attend.

Entertain By Film Program

The W.M.S. of Grace United Church entertained the Flamingo C.C.I.T. on Wednesday evening when they showed the film "Fujita, Orphan in Japan" at the church hall. The film was one produced by the Board of Foreign Missions of the United Lutheran Church of America telling of Fujita's survival of the air raids and other hardships in Japan to eventually become a Christian minister despite his parents' objections.

Mrs. Fleet presided at the meeting and conducted a short worship service. The C.C.I.T. sang a hymn in which Misses Carolyn Arnold and Margaret Black took the duet parts.

On Tuesday the W.M.S. held its regular meeting at the church hall when Mrs. Oakley Turnbull conducted the worship with Mrs. Milton Atkinson reading the scripture and Mrs. Gordon Arnold leading in prayer. Mrs. Turnbull conducted a program on Citizenship when the topic of Alcoholism was discussed by Mrs. Philip Kaye; Social Welfare by Mrs. J. M. Wallis; Racial Brotherhood by Mrs. Burton Fleet, and World Peace, Mrs. James Brooks. Mrs. Elton Arnold presented a paper on Japan entitled "To-morrow, Crisis and Cross," as prepared by Mrs. C. B. Parker.

Tourist Director Meets Group

Dan Wallace, Nova Scotia's tourist director, met Saturday evening at a dinner in the Champlain Hotel with local civic leaders, trade board and service club officials.

Chairman of the gathering was Robert L. Taylor, manager of the government's local tourist information bureau. In his opening remarks Mr. Taylor stated the number of tourists to visit the bureau since its opening on May 15th this year far exceeded the number who had called during the same period last year.

Mr. Taylor stated among those visiting the bureau this year were tourist visitors from Australia, the Dominican Republic and Venezuela. He stressed his interest in the local area and stated he was willing to cooperate insofar as his position would permit with local organizations and groups interested in the development of the tourist industry.

In his remarks Mr. Taylor also drew the attention of the group to the fact the "Welcome to Nova Scotia" sign had been completely refinished this year and that work of repainting the coat of arms and other portions of the sign had been done by a well known local artist, Mrs. Kelsey Raymond.

Mr. Wallace in his remarks stated there was apparent a keen interest in the development of the tourist trade in this area. He said one of the local problems was to persuade the tourist to stay a longer time in Digby. How many visitors stay in Digby and how long they stay is a matter for local enterprise, Mr. Wallace said. This matter seems to be receiving the attention of local groups he commented.

Speaking of the tourist picture generally, Mr. Wallace stated indications were the tourist traffic this year would equal and possibly exceed that of last year. Returns from advertising with respect to tourists were heavy, he said. It has been found that 80 per cent follow up a letter of inquiry with a visit and that 40 per cent of those returning coupons from provincial tourist ads in out of the province journals do in fact visit the province.

Following Mr. Wallace's remarks a general discussion of tourist matters was held. Mr. Wallace suggested that a change be made in location of signs concerning Digby at the entrances to the town. He said the visitor often times debates a possible visit to an advertised community and a sign should be placed sufficiently far from the community to provide time for this.

A method of keeping the visitor longer in Digby by interesting him in visits to places of interest in the local area was suggested. It was also suggested a local calendar of events be prepared weekly for distribution to the visitor to arouse his interest in local happenings. Provision of a bulletin board of local events at the tourist bureau was also considered.

At the close of the session at the Hotel Champlain the group visited the park at the head of the wharf and also inspected the out of town highway entrances to Digby.

H. & S. Plans Discussed

Plans and projects for the Digby County Council of Home & School associations were discussed at a meeting of the council executive at the regional high school here.

Among proposed projects for sponsoring by the council for the next school year are a parent education conference and a study conference on parliamentary procedure such as that held in Weymouth last year.

Need for closer liaison between association conveners and those at the council level was stressed at the meeting which also urged a greater effort to strengthen the chain of communication from the provincial H. & S. federation through the county councils to the local associations.

It was decided the council secretary would write the various associations a list of their conveners so that council conveners would have a list of these. A further meeting of the council is scheduled for late June.

Rossway Church Worker Speaker

Captain Lester Mullen, of the Church Army, was the guest speaker at the spring meeting of the Greater Chapter of the Anglican Deanery of Annapolis, held in St. James Church Hall, Bridgetown.

Captain Mullen, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Oswald Mullen, of Rossway, Digby County, recently completed his training at the Anglican Church Army Training Centre in Toronto, and is now in service in Kingston, Ontario.

In his address Captain Mullen traced the history of the Church Army from its formation in England by Canon Carlisle. He outlined the work of the Army in Canada and told how it serves as an important part of the church fabric in this country.

Rev. W. E. Jefferson, Rector of the Parish of Granville, reported on the progress of St. Anne's Youth Camp at Gibson's Lake, which is operated by the Greater Chapter of the Anglican Deanery of Annapolis.

In his report, which was adopted by the meeting, Mr. Jefferson stated it was recommended three camping periods be held this year instead of the four held in other years, with senior boys camp being eliminated and extending the age limit of the juniors to twelve years.

Provision of new boats to make possible more and safer use of the camp waterfront was also recommended by the camp committee, Mr. Jefferson reported. New mattresses were also required, as were other replacements in camp furnishings, he stated.

Prior to the business meeting of the chapter, which was presided over by the Rural Dean, Rev. H. Y. MacLean, Digby, the members were supper guests of St. James Church. An expression of thanks to the ladies of the parish was voiced by Rev. E. C. Irwin, Rector of Weymouth.

It was decided to send a letter of regret to Rev. Mr. McMahon, Rector of Annapolis, who is ill in hospital. The appreciation of the chapter to Mr. MacLean, Rector of Digby, who leaves this fall to take up duties in St. George's parish, Sydney, was expressed by Rev. James Pike, Rector of Rosette parish. Mr. Pike said that Mr. MacLean had given real leadership to the deanery during his term as Rural Dean and his influence would be missed by the Greater Chapter.

An invitation was ordered sent to Rt. Rev. H. R. Waterman, Bishop of Nova Scotia, to be guest speaker at the fall meeting of the chapter. It was suggested the Bishop, who is attending the Lambeth conference this summer, be asked to speak on this conference. Arrangements will be made to have the fall meeting in Annapolis, it was decided.

Due to many activities and pressure of work it has been impossible for this column to keep up with all the happenings.

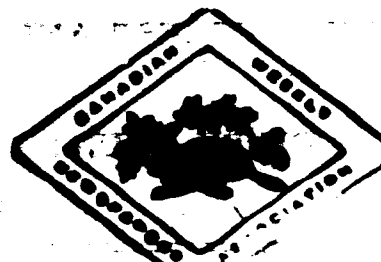

About This and That

Canadian Highway Safety Conference

Meeting recently in Edmonton was the fourth annual conference of the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, dedicated to the objective of saving lives and property on the country's traffic thoroughfares. Chairman of the gathering, Alberta's highway minister, Hon. Gordon Taylor, struck the keynote in his opening address, laying emphasis on public attitude as the most important factor in prevention of highway accidents. Nothing in the line of mechanical improvements to vehicles, engineering design, more severe laws or stricter law enforcement offered as many opportunities for increased highway safety as did an improved public attitude. Breaches of traffic rules are no longer trivial offences but today constitute a serious hazard in view of the appalling record of highway accidents.

Other aspects of the highway safety program were not ignored, however, and a large group of committees devoted much attention to such factors as education, law enforcement, safety engineering of highways, the teen-age driver and various other factors concerned in the overall problem of highway safety. Out of these committees came a host of resolutions for submission to the general conference, but two of the most controversial resolutions died in committee. These required (1) that no one under 21 years of age be allowed to register a vehicle unless financial proof of responsibility is produced; and (2) that steps be taken by individual provinces to increase the minimum age for licensing drivers of motor vehicles to 18 years.

Resolutions adopted by the conference dealt with the matter of safety education in schools, with particular reference to public school grades, and also driver training at the high school level. In this latter connection, the resolution adopted urged that a program of driver training be instituted, either as part of the school curriculum or as an extra curricular subject.

In resolutions which were passed by the Conference much emphasis was laid on standardization throughout the country, and this applied to matters of law, law enforcement, and engineering. Another resolution expressed concern about the establishment of an excessive number of marked crosswalks, fearing that such a development would lead to all crosswalks losing their effectiveness. A vast number of other resolutions dealt with various phases of highway safety.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Madam:

I was very much interested in the subject matter contained in the letter submitted by "Just Puzzled". I too, in a few years, will face the situation of a child whose birthday comes in November and will not be able to enter school until the following September.

I believe there are solutions to the situation which would work out more satisfactorily than putting the children in school if their birthdays are in September and October. Then, I would fuss, because my daughter's birthday is early in November!

There are reliable tests that can be given to a pre-school child that would help to determine whether or not he is actually ready for school. All children are different. Some are ready for school earlier than others and it does not seem fair to hold them back when their minds are eager and alert. I am referring to normal children and as a person who has been in the teaching profession I know how overcrowded classrooms are. But, schools are for the children and should revolve around their needs.

Listed below are 18 things a child should have learned before he starts school:

- (1) To attend to his own bathroom needs without supervision or reminder.
- (2) To wash his hands and face.
- (3) To dress and undress himself without assistance. There are exceptions such as shoelaces, difficult overshoes, zippers, etc.
- (4) To cross streets safely and know the dangers of traffic.
- (5) To be familiar with his neighborhood and go to school alone.
- (6) To understand the dangers involved in sharp instruments, matches and electrical apparatus.
- (7) To go nowhere with strangers, and report home before going anywhere else after school.
- (8) To have acquired a fair degree of control of the large muscles for running, jumping, climbing, etc.
- (9) To be able to manipulate materials and make simple constructions; to be able to use crayons, pencil and scissors.
- (10) To talk clearly and not use "baby talk".
- (11) To understand simple directions and carry them out.
- (12) To be familiar with common objects in his environment, name them and know what they are used for.
- (13) To have outgrown temper tantrums and ordinary fears.
- (14) To be content without his parents and go places without them.
- (15) To tolerate frustrations and delays, and not sulk or whine.
- (16) To play with other children without too much quarrelling, to share, and take part in group activities.
- (17) To respect the property of others, and understand the meaning of ownership.
- (18) To recite his full name, address, phone number and the name of his parents.

I feel if a child can do these things then the mental age should be the important factor rather than the chronological age.

I do hope there will be more items concerning the pre-school children published in the Courier, for it is a topic being discussed by many parents.

To the Editor:

The Digby Board of Trade is becoming very insistent that something be done to "permit the sale of beers and wines in first class hotel and eating establishments" in our province. Their zeal may be commendable but it is surely blinding them in their perspective on the situation as it exists.

For example, in the Halifax Chronicle-Herald May 22nd under the caption "Support Bid for Hotels Liquor Sale" the statement is made under quotes (apparently from the Board of Trade resolution) that the original move by the Digby Board of Trade to bring about a liberalization of the Province's Liquor Laws has been endorsed in principle by "bodies representing a large portion of the province" and "opposed by only a small minority group".

I would like to challenge that statement. It may be true that the majority of Boards of Trade that have taken action (presumably at the suggestion of the Digby Board or Annapolis Valley Allied Boards of Trade) have registered themselves in favor. But to suggest that Amherst, Yarmouth, North Sydney, Middleton, Hantsport, New Glasgow and others (as we have been informed) are "only a small minority group" is to say the least uncomplimentary.

But is the voice of the Boards of Trade the only one to be considered? In the very issue of the paper referred to and on the very same page is the statement of the resolution of the Yarmouth Presbytery of the United Church. Are they not good citizens? Is their voice of no consequence? In their meeting they made strong representations regarding the sale of liquor as well as liquor advertising, at the same time commending the Provincial Government for its stand in the matter of cocktail bars for hotels. I am sure that if the Premier and Hon. E. D. Halliburton could speak they would tell of a great volume of similar voices coming from scores of Presbyteries, District Meetings, Churches, W. M. S. Groups and individuals from all parts of the Province expressing themselves against any liberalization of our laws. These folk are not narrow minded bigots, but those who look at this problem not from the commercial viewpoint of dollars and cents reaped from lucrative tourist traffic in liquor sales, but from the viewpoint of the largest and longest social good of our province.

Furthermore consider this: Our plebiscites in recent years have shown us that there are many people who favor the Government Liquor Store, who do not favor the wider sale of liquor in hotels or eating places, or in taverns. These people are not against all drinking but they are not in favor of what the Boards of Trade are seeking.

The zeal of the Digby Board of Trade might well be commended to us in worthier causes, but might we ask the members of that Board to face the situation — deplorable as it may seem to them — a bit more realistically and even more charitably. Those who are not with them are not "only a small minority group" but a large, strong and articulate group of worthy citizens of our province whose opinions on this matter should be listened to and reckoned with in an attitude of respect.

Dear Editor:

One really wonders whether the Boards of Trade, invited speakers at various conventions or other gatherings, et al, anticipate that the people at large accept their blasts against the liquor laws of our province, and the efforts to control the sale of liquor, and to solve in some way the alcohol problem, as "home product", or whether they just hope they will do so.

It is a fairly well known fact that "inspiration" is provided by those paid for the purpose among other things. Some of the people know who makes the balls that are fired. And there is a very sufficient reason for this recent rash of demands for more liquor outlets. It is found in the fact that the liquor interests know that fewer and fewer people are drinking. (Which of course must mean that some people are drinking more, or prices are going up, since total sales show an annual increase.) These figures, taken from the Gallup "Public Opinion News Source", seem to indicate a reason for anxiety on the part of the liquor industry, in the USA at least. (Are there any valid reasons for thinking that things are different with us?) In 1945 the figures for drinkers were 67% of the population, while those for abstainers were 33%. In 1947 the percentage for drinkers was 63%; in 1949 the figures were 58%; in 1951 the figures were 50%; in 1955 the figures were 55%. That "small minority" a Board of Trade



recently guessed was opposed to an increase in drinking facilities seemingly has pretty large proportions — say 45%. And the point is, and the worry for the brewers and distillers is, the figure for abstainers is increasing.

Volunteers Lay Forum Floor

One of the finest examples of what can be accomplished with full community cooperation was seen here this week with the completion of the laying of a concrete floor in the Digby Forum, Digby's artificial ice rink.

A little over a week ago a group, headed by H. M. Warne and Trade Board President Vincent Snow, began preliminary checks into the feasibility of getting a concrete floor for the Forum to make possible year 'round use of the rink and to increase its earning power.

With this help the job was completed in quick order and then came the task of getting the new concrete floor down. Arrangements were made to borrow cement mixers and one of these, a four bag mixer, was secured in Kentville.

Willing hands kept the wheelbarrows in motion and the "puddlers" were hard pressed to keep smoothing off the cement as it was dumped. By late Sunday night the whole job was complete with just the work of "cleaning up" left to do. Some of this work of cleaning up included liniment rubs and blister treatment for many of the volunteer helpers, but all considered the job well worth the doing.

Assisting with technical details was Laurie Harrison, Kentville contractor, who volunteered his services to help get the job done. Trucking of the cement, some 1,200 bags of it, was also done on a volunteer basis by Charles Charlton, Bear River trucking contractor.

Letter to the Editor

Digby, N. S., June 10, 1958.

Editor, Digby Courier.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

Operation "Floor show" started at 6 A.M. Saturday, June 7, at the Digby Forum, with 25 men in action on the first shift.

They were mostly volunteer men from most all occupations from Digby and near area. They were of different creeds, color, political affiliations and from different stations of life. All immediately turned to work according to instructions and all very soon seemed to know their various jobs for the making of the concrete floor as previously planned for several weeks.

The large mixing machine was mixing four bags of cement with five times as much gravel and sand with a proper amount of water; the small machine was also mixing another bag of cement with like proportions of sand, gravel and water.

The men with the wheelbarrows were ready and wheeled the finished product from the mixers to the required spots on the rink floor, where wooden forms were filled; the mixture was quickly spread out and packed down around the brine pipes; groups of two men each then smoothed out the surface by working the edge of a board, back and forth across the top edges of the wooden forms; the forms were quickly lifted out and put in more advanced positions, ready for another batch. Then two or three men with hand trowels, pieced together and smoothed out the places where the forms left gaps after being removed. When the concrete had sufficiently hardened, a man with a packing and smoothing machine began the job of levelling the entire concrete surface.

About 60 men took part in the entire operation during a 14 1/2 hour working period of four shifts. A very congenial and efficient canteen operator was on hand the entire time, serving any and all, at any time, with tasty, freshly made sandwiches, tea or coffee, and cookies. Many bottles of soft drinks were also enjoyed.

Some began to have blistered hands, as the day wore on, but one man was equal to the occasion, and soon provided gloves where needed. Some "soffies" developed tired muscles, and the odd ache or pain, but, the greatest observation and truth of the whole "show", was the fact, not a word of complaint or profanity was heard, as far as I know; all willingly worked, operation.

The young men emptying the bags of cement, at the end of the day, after a 14 1/2 hour work stretch, were a sight to behold! They were sure coated with cement, from head to foot. But come, about 1060 bags of cement had been mixed with over five times as much sand and gravel, in addition to water, to provide concrete over a ground area of about 15,000 square feet. It was a great day with everybody working in good

Attend Polio Annals

Mrs. J. M. Wallis and Victor Cardoza attended the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia chapter of the polio and rehabilitation foundation and the national organization in Halifax last week.

During the meetings most interesting addresses were given by a number of experts on polio treatment and rehabilitation. Included in these were Dr. Sheers, of Halifax, and Dr. Feldman, of New York. Workshop sessions were also held on fund raising, public relations and other aspects of the work of a national organization.

The provincial and national groups, as well as the crippled children's association, which was in session at the same time, were entertained at dinners by the city of Halifax and the province of Nova Scotia.

Special speaker at the city dinner was Dr. Feldman, of New York, who told of work being done in rehabilitation clinics with which he was connected.

He gave graphic examples of the return to useful life of polio patients who had been so badly crippled it was felt any active participation in life was over for them. This work of rehabilitating these crippled people and the research which must accompany it in order to meet and deal with new cases is made possible in great measure through the "March of Dimes", he said.

Hon. Richard Donahue, Minister of Health for Nova Scotia, was speaker at the provincial dinner. Mr. Donahue dealt at some length with hospital insurance legislation and explained the plan to be introduced in Nova Scotia next year.

On Saturday afternoon ladies connected with the associations in annual session were guests of Mrs. Plow, wife of Lieutenant Governor E. C. Plow, at a reception at Government House. Attending from Digby were Mrs. Kenneth Beck, wife of Mrs. H. C. Morton, Mrs. J. M. Wallis and Mrs. Victor Cardoza.

To Deal With Proposal Tuesday

A report of the Economic Council of the Digby Board of Trade, calling for approval by the board of several council recommendations, was shelved here Tuesday night as the regular monthly meeting of the board ended with only two members of the board, other than members of the economic council, present for discussion of the proposals.

Members present stated they were of the opinion it would be improper for the meeting as constituted to give approval to the economic council's proposals since all but two in attendance were members of that committee.

Included in the recommendations of the economic council was a proposal that the board authorize the expenditure of \$142 for the erection of new signs at the highway entrances to the town and changing location of present signs.

Also included was a proposal that the board sponsor an information leaflet to be distributed to tourist visitors in the town, listing local events, scenic drives and other information. It was suggested this be published on a weekly or semi-monthly basis so it could be kept up to date.

Another proposal was that the Board of Trade contact the merchants' association asking that "those stores interested in tourist trade keep their stores open Saturday afternoon during July and August. Digby stores recently adopted new store hours which provide Friday night opening and noon closing on Saturdays.

The board's economic council also asked approval of efforts to secure recorded advertising of Digby's tourist attractions on transport facilities bringing visitors to the province.

In the economic council's report it was stated efforts are underway to reorganize the tennis club in Digby and already some funds have been secured and inquiries made concerning re-establishment of the courts on their former location at the Hotel Champlain.

Following Tuesday night's meeting it was learned efforts are underway to call a special meeting of the trade board to deal with the committee proposals.

Early in the board meeting a letter was read from Hugh Sutherland of Carstairs, Alta. In his letter Mr. Sutherland, who is connected with school administration in Carstairs, stated he had seen Digby's plan to get a picture of an apple orchard in bloom. Contract Awarded

The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$49,120.00 to B. & M. Comeau Construction Company Ltd., of Little Brook, N. S., for repaving at Battery Point (Victoria Beach), N. S. Specified completion date for the project is January 5, 1959.

A portion of the old cribwork for a length of ninety-four feet and varying in width from 26 to 32 feet will be removed and the site where the new work will take place is to be cleared.

This will be followed by the construction of a fully ballasted close faced creosoted cribwork which will measure 94 feet long by 26 to 32 feet wide. It will have a reinforced concrete deck, 14 inches thick. On the harbour side of the work a stairway will be constructed, and four ladders will also be secured to the sides of the new cribwork.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works in Ottawa.

Receives Appointment



The appointment of Hugh D. Perry as chief engineer of the Nova Scotian Hotel was announced June 12th by Canadian National Hotels Limited.

Parish Founder Honoured

Rev. R. W. Leo Murphy, D.P., P.P., founder and former pastor of St. Patrick's Parish, Digby, has been honoured by His Holiness Pope Pius XII, by being made a Domestic Prelate. Father Murphy was invested as a colorful ceremony at St. Mary's basilica in Halifax June 12th by Most Rev. J. G. Berry, D.D., Archbishop of Halifax.

Born in Halifax in 1899, Father Murphy was educated at St. Patrick's school and St. Mary's university. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1923 and after serving in several Halifax churches assumed the duties of pastor of Annapolis Royal and missions in 1930.

In 1941 Father Murphy became the founder and pastor of St. Patrick's parish in Digby which previously had been a mission of Annapolis Royal. He undertook the construction of a church and rectory here and in 1942 made available the facilities of his parish hall to the young men and women in training at the Cornwallis naval base for a recreational centre. In the same year he was made a part-time chaplain at the naval base.

Father Murphy, not content to rest on his accomplishments, in 1943 requested the Sisters of Charity of Saint John, N. B., to establish a school in Digby. A building was purchased by the sisters and classes started that September. The following year under Father Murphy's guidance but again at their own expense they erected a large school which they named St. Patrick's Academy. This school is still flourishing and one branch—St. Patrick's Business College—has sent hundreds of graduates into the business life of the Atlantic provinces.

On May 24, 1946, the late Archbishop McNally named Father Murphy to found the parish of St. Stephen's in the north end of Halifax. Since its founding the parish has grown until today there are 650 church families living there. A church and rectory, started in 1946, were completed in nine months. Despite his heavy organizing duties in the founding and development of two parishes over the years, Father Murphy also found time to write and has established a considerable reputation as an author. Among his works are "The Hill of Triumph," "The Golden Heritage," "Trail's End," "The Cobblestones of Galilee," "Silver Glade" and "Within Thy Heart." For his writings he has been honored by membership in the gallery of living Catholic authors. Founded over a quarter of a century ago, this organization now numbers 800 members from 32 countries.

Urges Lobster Hatchery

Senator J. W. Comeau, Clare, has called for establishment of a lobster hatchery on an experimental basis to determine whether it would help promote lobster production in the Maritimes and arrest what he called the "alarming depletion" of the fishery.

Senator Comeau, a fish dealer and former member of the Nova Scotia Cabinet, spoke in the Senate's throne speech debate.

He expressed grave concern over the future of the lobster industry on the Maritime coast and suggested if the fishery were allowed to continue unchecked, the lobster grounds would disappear within a few years.

There was some research going on in Nova Scotia to promote the industry, he told fellow members of the upper house.

The fisheries department was using divers in Nova Scotia (around southwestern Nova Scotia) to develop better lobster traps.

The traps were of metallic construction as opposed to the traditional wooden varieties, vulnerable to the sweeping North Atlantic storms.

But Senator Comeau said he would like to see the department undertake something else to increase lobster production.

It was here that he introduced his suggestion that the government establish a lobster hatchery.

One lobster, the Nova Scotia senator said, contained sufficient eggs, which if hatched, would produce enough lobsters to supply the catch for 25 lobster fishermen in a season.

He noted that the fisheries department operated trout hatcheries in the province to replenish depleted lakes and rivers.

It should be possible, he felt, to build an experimental lobster hatchery for about \$5,000.

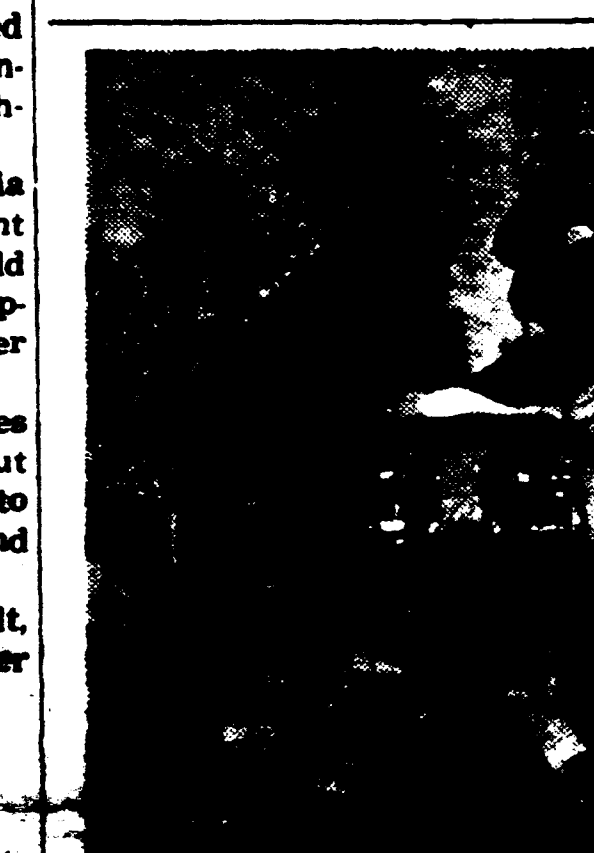
Trade Board Has Special Meeting

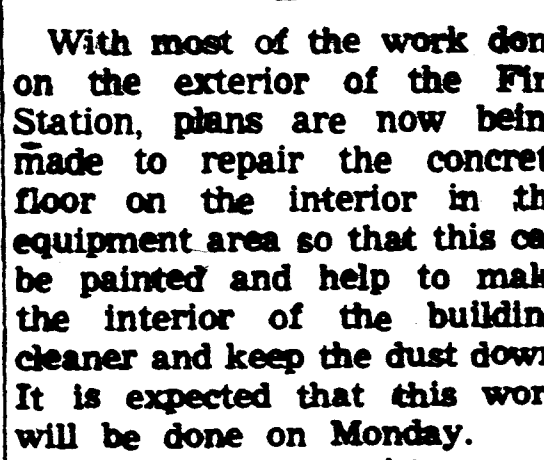
In 18 innings of completed ball Ravens pitching has allowed but five base hits, only one of these being for extra bases. They also have chalked up 20 strike-outs.

The Ravens will play host to the Weymouth squad at the Digby Ball Park this evening in what is hoped to be the last exhibition game before league play begins.

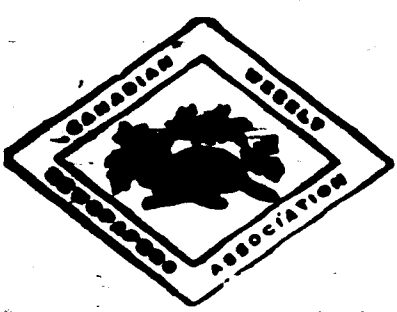
D. F. D. ACTIVITIES

Much has been said to-day about the progress made in Medical Science. Due to this progress some diseases are almost completely eradicated, and great strides have been made generally in the improvement of our health problems.

Keeping pace with this progress is the service rendered through the Victorian Order of Nurses.

One of the chief functions of the Order's service is to provide care to mothers and babies. Despite all the advances in Medical Science, too many babies have been dying at birth in a country with a high standard of living and health care. Thus maternal health is still one of the major concerns to the Victorian Order of Nurses, and many deaths are prevented with prenatal and postnatal education. Another type of service provided by the order is the care to the sick. These are the medical and surgical cases which require very careful and conscientious nursing. Care of the chronically ill is also well known to everyone associated with the Order. This part of the V.O.N. Programme has increased over 20% over the last few years. Convalescent Care, Baby Health Clinics and Conferences, School Health Service, First Aid, and care of minor illnesses are all services rendered by our nurse. She will call at the home of any sick person in the community. She works under the direction of the family physician and will visit daily or less frequently depending on the needs of the patient and the physician's instruction.

To our Digby town readers we suggest the Victorian Order Nurse is your nurse. The Board looks to you to support them in maintaining her services.

Yesterday's mail produced a letter from the Canadian Red Cross Society. The letter requested this newspaper's co-operation for the promotion of National Water Safety Week, June 15 - 21, the present week.

National Water Safety Week is a timely campaign. Already this year there have been drowning and boating accidents in our nation. It is safe to assume there will be more unless people are informed about the urgency for more water safety education.

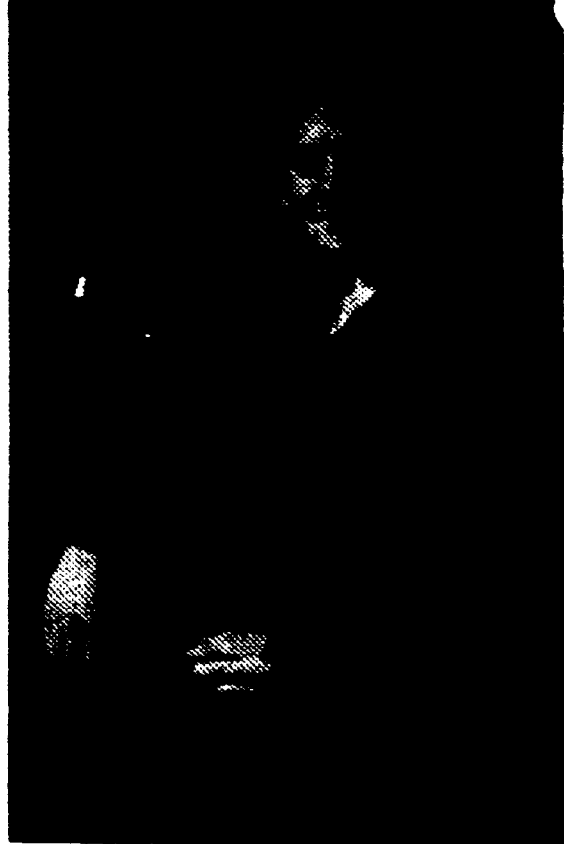

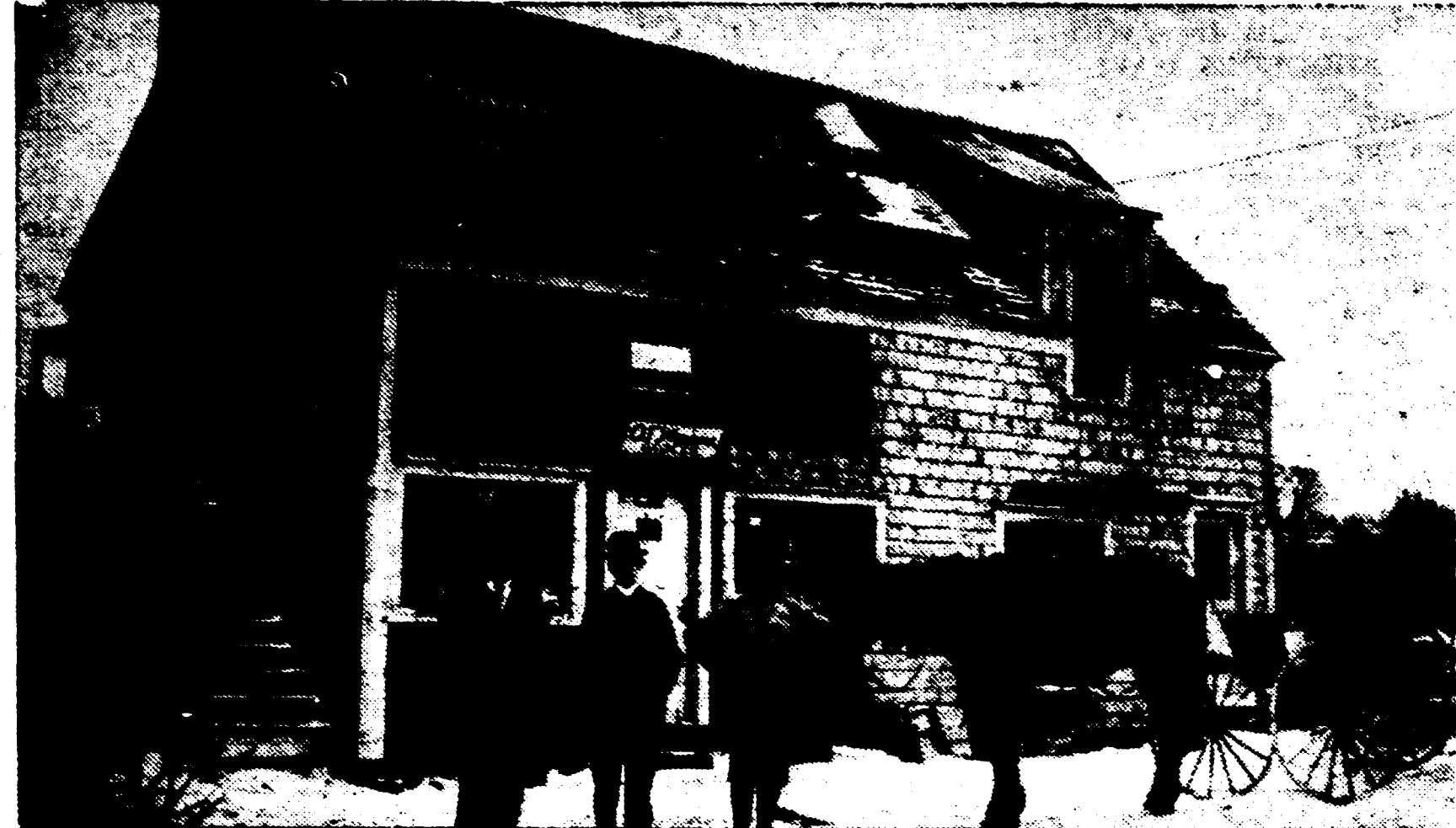

Smith's Cove Firm Marks 50th Anniversary

O. F. Woodman Co. Ltd. Celebrate Jubilee



The above photo shows the store of O. F. Woodman Co. Ltd., Smith's Cove. This building was erected in 1938 after a disastrous fire wiped out the former store building. Since its erection the building has been remodelled and modernized.

This week marks the golden jubilee of a Digby County business firm that owes its existence to a borrowed ten dollar bill and the business acumen of its founder.

This business is the firm of O. F. Woodman Co. Ltd., Smith's Cove. In June 1908 its founder, Oran F. Woodman, got possession of an old barn which he tore down to make a little canteen, size six by eight feet, near the Joggin Bridge. To pay expenses involved in tearing down the old barn and converting some of its lumber into the canteen Mr. Woodman, then only seventeen years old, picked strawberries at a cent a box.

After the canteen, a picture of which is shown in today's Courier, had been built came the task of stocking it. Young Oran had used up his capital in getting the building ready but a friend came along and loaned him ten dollars for stock. Mr. Woodman came into Digby and stocked up on candies, cigars and soda pop. The candies and cigars he secured from the late Otis Warne who operated a wholesale firm here, and the soda pop came from the Milton Aerated Water Works in Milton, Queens County.

With his new stock Mr. Woodman was ready for business and even in those days it was the tourist business that was important. Today Mr. Woodman refers to it as the "buckboard trade". In the period around 1908 it was the custom for buckboards drawn by a double span and a lead horse to take parties of tourists out from Digby into the countryside for sightseeing trips. About thirty

passengers were accommodated in each buckboard.

As Mr. Woodman says, by the time the tourists got to Joggin Bridge on their buckboard they were hungry and thirsty and the men folks were about out of smokes. The buckboards would stop and the passengers loaded up with candies, soda pop and cigars at the Woodman store. Cigars were the staple smoke of menfolk in those days, Mr. Woodman says, and tailor made cigarettes virtually unknown.

Although in the early days of his store Mr. Woodman's business came mainly from the visitors, he did not overlook the local trade and included in his stock some staples such as tea, lard, and kerosene. These items with his summer stock made Mr. Woodman's canteen quite crowded so he came to the conclusion he would have to increase its size.

In 1909 he added another six by eight section in time for the summer trade. He also increased his stock to include sugar, flour, crackers and other staple items in demand by local residents who were beginning to find the Woodman store a good place to shop.

So rapidly did the business expand that in its third year of operation Mr. Woodman, who had been supplementing his store income by digging clams, had to put on a second story to use as a warehouse.

By 1913 Mr. Woodman's business had reached the stage where he felt he could safely take unto himself a life partner and he got married. By this time he had made a further addition to his store which he and his wife occupied as a home.

Mr. Woodman in addition to

her household duties also gave invaluable assistance to her husband in the store and because she was willing to act as his clerk Mr. Woodman was able to put on a delivery service in 1914.

With his delivery service Mr. Woodman also started in a small way and was soon peddling furiously the length and breadth of "the vice" on his bicycle. By 1915 he had purchased a horse which made his work easier. In 1920 a "model T" was purchased but a horse was still a necessity for winter deliveries.

Continuously Mr. Woodman's business expanded and alterations and additions were necessary to his building. Altogether he made nineteen of these until by 1938 a one and one-half story building 74 feet by 20 feet housed the Woodman enterprise. In that year Mr. Woodman, who had been joined in business by his son, Clayton, in 1932, was hit by a really serious economic reverse.

Up until 1938 the Woodman business had undergone the ups and downs experienced by almost every business operating on limited capital while trying to expand. It had also weathered, although not unscathed, the depression. In the year 1938, however, a disastrous fire wiped out the premises and for a while the future looked dark. Only a minimum of insurance had been carried and to rebuild would mean taking on a heavy debt load.

The Woodmans decided to go ahead and construction of the building which still houses their business was started. The wisdom of the decision made then has been proven by the success attained by the business since

that time. In 1951 the business was incorporated under the firm name of O. F. Woodman Co. Ltd., and about three years ago Mr. Woodman's son-in-law, Bob Harrison, joined Mr. Woodman and Clayton in the operation of the business.

In looking back over the years since he launched the venture in 1908 Mr. Woodman says the years have been most interesting ones. Great changes have taken place in merchandising over the years, he says. When he first started business canned goods were virtually unknown in country stores. Mr. Woodman says the people were afraid of foodstuffs processed in cans and it wasn't for a good many years this prejudice entirely disappeared.

In his early days of store-keeping Mr. Woodman says almost every commodity was handled in bulk or in large containers. Lard, sugar and spices were supplied to the stores in large containers and had to be measured out for the individual customer. Crackers and cookies were in barrels as were pickles and the local store was a gathering place for the men of the community who in the winter time hitched their boxes up close around the stove and argued the merits of political parties while sampling crackers, cookies and pickles. An odd slice of cheese was also shaved from the big round cheese which stood on its block near the centre of the store to add zest to the crackers and pickles.

Prices of foodstuffs were much different in 1908 than today, Mr. Woodman says. Sugar retailed at five cents a pound, tea was 29c a pound and coffee retailed at 35 cents. Most other prices were in line as contrasted with those of today.

In 1917 Mr. Woodman started to handle gasoline as cars were beginning to appear a little more frequently on the roads. He secured an agency from the Imperial Oil Company and began the retail of gasoline. In those days there were no gasoline pumps and what was sold was put out in quart or gallon measures. Mr. Woodman says amsæu ærnb v u; stu pjos æu and it was strained into the gas tank of the car through an old felt hat. Since he first started in 1917 Mr. Woodman has continued to sell Imperial products over the years and is the proud possessor of two certificates of appreciation from the company.

Space will not permit an account of the story of the development of the Woodman business in all its detail. Over the years this business and its operators have shared in the joys and sorrows of the people they serve. Literally thousands of things have happened in the fifty years the business has been in operation, each one of which would make a story in itself. Mr. O. F. Woodman loves to reminisce and one way to get first hand some of the delightfully interesting anecdotes is to stop in at O. F. Woodman Co. Ltd. just east of the Joggin Bridge for a chat.
