Digby Lashed **By Storm**

Mountainous seas of water swept across Montague Row and Water Street on Digby's waterfront here yesterday as a heavy gale, accompanied by snow and rain, raked the area.

During the height of the storm in the morning traffic detoured along 1st Avenue because of heavy waves and spray sweeping across the waterfront between the Salvation Army citadel and the government tourist bureau.

Gravel, seaweed and driftwood were carried up onto the roadway by the sea during the storm and in several places the waterfront was eroded almost to the edge of the pavement.

A portion of the foundation of the town bandstand was undermined by the pounding waves and a good deal of the bank was carried away at the rear of the tourist information bureau. Here, too, one of the cannon, which was placed there some years ago after it had been rescued from another storm, was tipped from its stand when the bank underneath was eroded by the waves.

At the long wharf damage by the storm was also quite heavy. pier was carried away by the pounding waves and the floating slip was torn from its moorings. On February 7, 1958, a drift bottle containing a card was released by the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in collaboration with the Fish and Wildlife Service and other government agencies at 44 degrees 49.5 N. latitude and 66 degrees 08.2 W. longitude. The bottle was picked up on March 10 at Smith's Cove by Lloyd Sanford.

Mr. Sanford received a note of thanks and small reward from the institution. This bottle was one of several thousand released in a study of ocean currents and the drift of floating objects along the Atlantic sea



Boards and Chambers in the Atlantic Region are represented nationally through their affiliation with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce which has a regional office in Moncton to service the individual organizations. Through workshops, know-how booklets, and other material aids as well as the personal services of staff members, the Canadian Chamber offers the local Boards. and Chambers every assistance in order that they will remain active and a force for good in their respective communities.

THE DIESEL FIREMAN DISPUTE ON CANADIAN PACIFIC

TWO YEARS AGO, in April 1956 the Firemen's Union demanded wage increases and other benefits involving substantial increased costs.

AT THE SAME TIME Canadian Pacific proposed that, as firemen were not necessary, they should no longer be carried on diesel locomotives in freight and yard service.

CANADIAN RACIFIC also proposed dropping both arbitrary wage payments for which no service was rendered and differential wage rates in mountain territory.

IN DECEMBER 1956 a Federal Board of Conciliation recommended substantial wage increases and other benefits. At the same time, it found that firemen were not required on diesel tocomotives in freight and yard service and made provision for protection of their employment. It also found that payment of arbitraries and mountain differential should be modified.

CANADIAN PACIFIC accepted the Conciliation Board's report.

THE FIREMEN'S UNION rejected the report and called a strike on January 2, 1957.

THE STRIKE WAS ENDED on January 11, 1957 on the following basis:-

- 1. Canadian Pacific agreed to pay the substantial wage increases retroactive to April 1 of the previous year and other benefits recommended by the Conciliation Board.
- 2. The Union and Canadian Pacific agreed to refer the DIESEL ISSUE as well as payment of arbitraries and mountain differential to a ROYAL COMMISSION.
- 3. The Union and Canadian Pacific agreed to negotiate these issues in the light of and immediately following the publication of the ROYAL COMMISSION'S Report.

THE KELLOCK ROYAL COMMISSION of three senior judges devoted ten months to hearing 119 witnesses and, at the request of the Firemen's Union, made on-the-ground investigations across Canada and also made observations on four major European railway systems. It was the most extensive and thorough investigation in the history of labour relations in Canada.

IN ITS UNANIMOUS REPORT published February 4, 1958 the ROYAL COMMISSION found that:--

- 1. Firemen are not required on diesel locomotives in freight and yard service on Canadian Pacific either for safety or any other reason.
- 2. The proposal of Canadian Pacific for protecting firemen from loss of employment and seniority is fair and generous.
- 3. Arbitraries have become unrealistic and should be dropped and payment made on the basis of service rendered.
- 4. Mountain differential payments should be dropped and replaced by valley differential.

CANADIAN PACIFIC accepted the report of the KELLOCK ROYAL COMMISSION as it had undertaken to do when the Commission was appointed.

THE UNION rejected the report, stating that nothing in it was acceptable to them. They did so knowing that not one fireman would suffer loss of railway employment who was hired before the proposal to discontinue fireman an freight and yard diesels was made in April, 1956. All across Canada there are less than 100 firemen hired after that date and now working who face possible lay-off.

ALL EFFORTS of Canadian Pacific to settle the dispute through negotiations with the Firemen's Union have failed.

FOR TWO YEARS firemen have enjoyed substantial wage increases. During these two years action on the diesel issue has been postponed while the Union had every contention it could advance investigated by two enquiries.

CANADIAN PACIFIC has a duty to the public to operate the railway efficiently and economically.

CANADIAN PACIFIC, to fulfill this duty, has given notice to the Firemen's Union that the findings of the KELGEK

ROYAL COMMISSION will take effect on May 11, 1958.

THIS ACTION is in accordance with Federal labour law.

A dauntless young St. Stephen woman is in Dorchester, Mass., today awaiting an eye transplant that may stave off blind-

She's on her own financially. No service club or organization iting Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Wilis picking up the bills.

She's been working two years in a local restaurant, valiantly combatting the handicap of diminishing sight in both eyes to save the necessary funds to get her to a Boston eye clinic. And she did it.

Twenty-eight year old Miss Gertrude Atkinson has had a lot of hurdles to overcome. Her staunchest ally is her courage. Her story had its beginnings

3 years ago when her eyes began to wane as the result of glaucoma, a disease of the eyes which results in impairment of vision and ultimately in blind-

Then began a discouraging trek to various doctors in St. Stephen, Fredericton, Saint John and finally Boston. There, Dr. G. Robert Foote, an eye specialist, advised a transplant in her right eye, almost sightless since last spring.

"You have nothing to lose by a transplant and everything to gain," he told her.

She received word to be in Boston by the end of February 30th, 7.30 p.m. Special speakers, and left Feb. 23 by train to be nearer the eye bank. She had been tormented by a fear that if the doctor did call her in St. Stephen, she might not be able but you cannot afford to be to fly to Boston because of possible poor weather.

A letter to her mother reveals Miss Atkinson is waiting patiently in Dorchester at a friend's home for the operation. Cause of the holdup, she explains, is the necessity of finding a cornea to match the pigment of her skin and blue eyes.

On the economic side it's been a rough deal, too. But the blonde, slim woman has managed. Out of her income she financed her first pair of contact lenses for \$150 and a newer pair at a cost of \$200. Each year they had to be polished for \$30. Somehow, she also put aside \$400 towards regaining her sight, over the last two years

"I don't think the doctors would do the operation unless they were pretty sure it will work and save my daughter's eyesight," he added. "She'll probably have to stay two weeks in the hospital after the operation before the bandages are removed and before we know for sure whether it was successful. But Gertrude never complained about anything and she won't complain even if all her struggle has been for nothing."

May Campaign Aimed At Unsafe Vehicles

Highway accidents and deaths caused by unsafe vehicles will be the target of a national campaign to be sponsored through out Canada during May by the Canadian Highway Safety Conference. The drive, called "Check Your Car, Check Your Driving, Check Accidents", will have the active support of automobile dealers, service station and garage operators and all users of the highway, including truck and bus companies. Letter to the Editor

In these days of shortages in many of the professions there is often a clamour that standards should be relaxed as a means of countering this short-

No greater folly could be propounded. To suggest that, because a shortage of teachers doctors, nurses, clergymen, and other such professionals exists, a lowering of standards to permit qualification of a greater number should be put into effect is utterly ridiculous.

Surely, one of the greatest safeguards that the public has concerning the quality of education received by its children, the medical care it gets, the spiritual guidance available, is in the maintaining and even, perhaps, in raising the standards required by those who would practice in these fields.

Today, too, in the field, of science we need the assurance that the standards for qualification of those who serve the nation in scientific endeavour and who are our hope in the scientific race, which we must win in order to survive, are kept high. To reduce these standards in order to combat a shortage of trained scientists would be to concede the race.

In these important fields of education, medicine, theology and science, and indeed in others, expediency cannot be allowed to panic those upon whom rests the responsibility of maintaining standards inviolate, into relaxing these standards as a means of combatting a shortage no matter how much public attention this shortage may get.

The folly of so doing is readily apparent. What benefit would accrue to us as a nation or as a people to lower these standards? True, there would be more people who could wear the title of teacher, doctor, reverend or other such professional label but would this result in an improvement in the education received by our young, medical care for the ill or advances in medical discovery? Would it mean spiritual advancement or Increased scientific achievement?

It is not enough that a person carry a professional title or wear the garb that, in the eyes of the public, sets that person apart as a member of an honoured, respected and qualified profession. These are merely outward signs of the qualifications of that person.

It is true these things are important and must not be lightly treated. So long as the standards required to secure them are maintained they must be held in high regard. In fact they can only be held in this high regard if those standards are maintained and if only those qualified by these standthe outward signs which set them apart from those who measured by such standards. 

the world, I suppose. You can see it in the way the Russians are letting up on some of their production campaigns and putting on the pressure to get as many little Pobedas and Moskvitches as they can into the hands of the peasants.


They got some help, although unwillingly, from Germany. After the war, the Russians relieved an Americanowned auto factory at Russelsheim of most of the dies and jigs which had been used to make a popular German car called the Opel Cadet. They called it war reparations.

So now the Opel turns up on the streets of Russia, looking a little forlorn and pre-war, as the Moskvitch, which means "Son of Moscow."

The Pobeda, which is pronounced Po-veeay-dah, is, like the Moskvitch, a little four-cylinder car which, the experts tell me, is quite sturdily made. Its performance is uninspiring, for the Pobeda takes 34 seconds to accelerate to 60 miles an hour. A four-cylinder American car of similar price will do it in 18 seconus.

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About This and That

A Remarkable People

It has always been quite remarkable to us to see how well blind people manage their lives. Whether it is crossing a busy street or engaging in some activity of the business world, the blind go about with a confidence and surety which is often not understandable to an onlooker who is endowed with the precious gift called sight. We do not expect that the blind can forget about the precious treasure of eyesight which they have lost, or have never known, but they have fended for themselves very well, and have in the bargain learned not only to be happy in their Quebec. She will also visit in affliction but useful too.

But all this confidence and faith in their ability and usefulness is something which has to be learned. It must be nourished through education and practice with existant or acquired skills. The blind do not want pity or sympathy, at least not only pity and sympathy, they want interest of a different sort. They want the interest which will help provide them with the tools and necessary equipment to engage in the useful lives they are seeking to live. On Friday, May 16, and Saturday, May 17, we have an opportunity to show our interest in this manner. On these days the Zelma Rebekah Lodge is sponsoring a tag day in Digby on behalf of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind The Canadian National Institute for the Blind has two objects to ameliorate the condition of the blind and to prevent blind ness. They depend on public support for 75 per cent of the funds required to give this service. They are deserving of help. In Digby County alone there are 62 blind people. Any as-

sistance given by the Digby County people will return in aid to these, our very own neighbours.

Food For Thought

Many took advantage last week of the opportunity provided by the Digby Board of Trade to hear a brilliant and fluent speaker in the person of John Fisher, director of tourist promotion for Canada. While it is not expected that everyone agreed with all the ideas advanced for promoting the tourist industry in Digby, yet there was much food for thought in Mr. Fisher's remarks and his ideas were presented in such a way that they could not help but strike home. When John Fisher suggested the entrance to Digby should be indicative of the scallop industry the mental picture of huge scallop shells on either side of the highway became one difficult to erase from the mental vision. When John Fisher said that if each tourist were entired to remain in our country another 15 minutes we could sell 635,000 more eggs, the idea became realistic instead of some far off abstraction. The 126,000 lbs. of butter began to look like a large warehouse of vellow gold.

It was quite evident from Mr. Fisher's address that he favoured a loosening of Nova Scotia liquor laws but he did endeavour to convince those who think otherwise that less restrictive liquor laws was not the whole answer to the tourist industry nor would such a move bring more tourists.

However, disregarding the apparently contentious subject of liquor restrictions, John Fisher did set forth a number of ideas for tourist promotion which can be started right now and which might prove to remedy much that is detrimental to the industry.

Firstly, we must realize that tourists are not a people set apart. Whether we visit Ontario, Quebec, the Maritimes, Canadian West or the United States we are just as much tourists as the people who come to our country. We know the things which appeal to us - friendliness, consideration, good food, comfort and cleanliness. These are the same basic qualities and standards which are expected of us by the visitors to our land. We want to be treated fairly, we want to pay no more than a thing is worth. That is just what the tourists who come here want to find. Tourists are still only people, whether they travel from the East to the West or from the North to the South or vice versa.

Then if we follow up the John Fisher address we will not rest on our laurels and say "My, we have one of the most scenic" countries." We'll have those beauty spots so marked that no tourist can miss them. We'll have the beauty unmarred by untidyness. We'll provide fishing and boating and beach picnics and sing-songs so that the tourist will want to watch that beauty more and more. Otherwise they'll become restless and go on to the beauty spots further along. We can start at once to entice the tourists by doing the thing nearest at hand or as John Fisher put it — "start doing first things first." There is much food for thought in that statement.

Citizenship Day

Tomorrow, May 16, is Citizenship Day. Tomorrow is a day when Canadians should count their blessings. Tomorrow is a day when all Canadians should give thought to what it means to live in Canada — a nation endowed so generously with good things. It is a time to give thanks for these blessings and resolve to share with others less fortunate. It is a time to reflect on the important place which Canada holds in the nations of the world today and a time to resolve that the nations who look to Canada with a critical eye will see nothing but what is decent, upright and good in its citizens.

Tomorrow is a day when special consideration should be directed to Canadian youth. What sort of person do we wish the young Canadian to be? What will he be like if he embodies the best in Canada around him? His Excellency the Right Honourable Vincent Massey, Governor General of Canada, puts it this way:

"He will have some reverence for the past, a respect for what has gone before. He will have kept some of the simple virtues of an earlier time which will help him to sort out the real from the counterfeit. He will think for himself with respect for the views of others. He will work hard and play hard and know how to use his increasing leisure. He will have resources within him to keep him independent of the mechanized pleasure of the age. He will be able to laugh at the absurd and will become angry at the sight of injustice. He will not be ashamed of good manners. He will show an inherited instinct for freedom. He will nurse a personal devotion to the welfare and the safety of his country. He will have a deep and quiet belief in what she is and what she can do."





Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steamfilled oven for ½ hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with commeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing

them with cold water 2 minutes

before removing baked buns from





Family Day Service in the United Church in Weymouth from Rev. John Stuart, principal of the Church's Atlantic Christian Training Centre, and Miss Mona Mayhew, who attended the Centre and graduated during the past winter. Mr. Stuart's and Miss Mayhew's remarks about the Centre at Tatamagouche were well illustrated with personal experiences, and samples of the handicrafts, leather billfold, plastic foam flower and a fine engraved copper design were to be seen. A table at the entrance to the church held pictures from the Centre, pamphlets of coming events in the program and artist's sketches of the proposed new building. The need for more space to accommodate students at the Centre has brought its work and aims to focus in the Church during: the past few weeks especially. married at Halifax on Satur-

Twenty-four young people at tended the Centre during the past winter and have now gone back to their local churches better equipped to lead in young people's work, teach Sunday School and take part in their Church activities generally. Miss Mayhew intends next winter to serve as a volunteer teacher in a part of the Gaspe where it is usually hard to secure teachers for the schools. She also indicat ed that she has always been interested in missionary work and may eventually become a missionary teacher.

Most of the graduates from the Centre have been visiting churches in the Maritimes since March, telling the people about the opportunities for training and service through the Atlantic Christian Training Centre and making clear the need for its support. Miss Mayhew told of present inadequacy of the building, serving as it does for residence, class-room and dining-room space and having no place provided for either Phone 452 recreation or chapel.

Mr. Stuart in his talk in each

of the churches on Weymouth charge told how the Centre came to be, how it is partly an answer to the unconscious belief among most people that leadership in making a better world must come through the church. He told how fifteen interested laymen gave \$15,000 to buy the property at Tatamagouche three years ago and how the idea has caught on of a centre for lay leadership and training in the Maritimes. Many people were doubtful that any Monday please call would give time to training to give better service in the church and the first winter session began with only three students. But those who have been there have gone back to their homes full of enthusiasm for the church and anxious to do more other six days of the week," so in learning to serve it better. Narrow Escapes Food For Talk

"There", said one of the men, "I was. My hands on the steering wheel, my foot on the gas pedal. Suddenly, right in front of me another car pulls out of a side street without stopping. I jam on the brakes and when I put the extra pull on the steering wheel I feel the whole column start slipping. Some place it had come loose and the wheel was actually coming off in my hands. I couldn't steer. Imagine how I felt then!"

"I was driving," said another of the men, "down a steep hill on Mark Street, the one that dips under the railroad bridge. Up ahead, the traffic light turned red against me and when I put my foot on the brake pedal it went right to the floor. My car had no brakes!"

Put a group of men together in a club or at lunch, introduce experiences like that and immediately you have a string of dramaspiced recollections of accidents and narrow escapes. It will be surprising how many of them refer to unsafe vehicles. They will talk of lights that went out at 50 miles an hour, tires that blew. broken exhaust pipes that sent fumes into parked cars, windshield wipers that blinded drivers, horns that went mute at the wrong times, and many more.

"After a hard winter of driving," warns the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, "the only way to drive without fear of your vehicle's mechanical faults is to have it thoroughly checked. After all, a car is only a machine; it can't cry out in pain or complain of an ache in the crankcase. Find trouble before it finds you, and eliminate it."

(13) To have outgrown temper tantrums and ordinary fears. (14) To be content without his parents and go places without them.

(15) To tolerate frustrations and delays, and not sulk or

(16) To play with other children without too much quarreling, to share, and take part in group activities.

(17) To respect the property of others, and understand the meaning of ownership.

(18) To recite his full name, address, phone number and the name of his parents.

I feel if a child can do these things then the mental age should be the important factor

The Digby Board of Trade is becaming very insistent that something be done to "permit the sale of beers and wines in first class hotel and easting establishments" in our province. Their zeal may be commendable but it is surely blinding them in their perspective on the situation as it exists.

To the Editor:-

For example, in the Halifax Chronicle - Herald May 22nd under the caption "Support Bid for Hotels Liquor Sale" the statement is made under quotes (apparently from the Board of Trade resolution) that the original move by the Digby Board of Trade to bring about a liberalization of the Province's Liquor Laws has been endorsed in principle by "bodies representing a large portion of the province" and "opposed by only a small minority group."

I would like to challenge that statement. It may be true that the majority of Boards of Trade that have taken action (presumably at the suggestion of the Digby Board or Annapolis Valley Allied Boards of Trade) have Arcadia. registered themselves in favor. Yarmouth, North Sydney, Midmdleton. Hantsport, New Glasgow and others (as we have small minority group" is to say the least uncomplimentary.

But is the voice of the Boards of Trade the only one to be considered? In the very issue of the paper referred to and on the very same page is the statement of the resolution of the Yarmouth Presbytery of the United Church. Are they not good citizens? Is their voice of no consequence? In their meeting they made strong representations regarding the sale of liquor as well as liquor advertising, at the same time commending the Provincial Government for its stand in the matter of cocktail bars for hotels. I am sure that if the Premier and Hon. E. D. Haliburton could speak they would tell of a great volume of similar voices coming from scores of Presbyteries, District Meetings, Churches, W. M. S. Groups and individuals from all parts of the Province expressing themselves against any liberalization of our laws. These folk are not narrow minded bigots, but those who look! at this problem not from the commercial viewpoint of dollars and cents reaped from lucrative tourist traffic in liquor sales, but from the viewpoint of the largest and longest social good of

our province. Furthermore consider this: Our plebiscites in recent years have shown us that there are many people who favor the Government Liquor Store, who do not favor the wider sale of liquor in hotels or eating places, or in taverns. These people are not against all drinking but they are not in favor of what the Boards of Trade are seeking.

The zeal of the Digby Board of Trade might well be commended to us in worthier causes, but might we ask the members of that Board to face the situation — deplorable as it may seem to them - a bit more realistically and even more charitably. Those who are not with them are not "only a small minority group" but a large. strong and articular group of worthy citizens of our province whose opinions on this matter rather than the chronological should be listened to and reckoned with in an attitude of re-

the Boards of Trade, invited speakers at various conventions or other gatherings, et al. anticipate that the people at large accept their blasts against the iquor laws of our province, and the efforts to control the sale of liquor, and to solve in some way the alcohol problem, as 'home product", or whether they just hope they will do so. It is a fairly well known fact that "inspiration" is provided by those paid for the purpose among other things. Some of the people know who makes the balls that are fired. And there is a very sufficient reason for this recent rash of demands for more liquor outlets. It is found in the fact that the liquor interests know that fewer and fewer people are drinking. (Which of course must mean that some people are drinking more, or prices are going up, since total sales show an annual increase.) These figures, taken from the Gallup "Public Opinion News Source", seem to indicate a reason for anxiety on the part of the liquor industry, in the USA at least. (Are there any valid reasons for thinking that things are different with us?) In 1945 the figures for drinkers were 67% of the population, while those for abstainers were 33%. In 1947 the percentage for drinkers was 63%; in 1949 the figures were 58%; in 1951 the figures were 59%; in 1955 the figures were 55%. That "small minority" a Board of Trade






