

#### Cut Hay Early

Hay, one of the most important crops in Eastern Canada.

is often wasted by being harvested too late. W. S. Richardson of the Lennoxville Experimental Farm, there on Thursday evening, mays the most ideal having time for red clover is at the half bloom stage, alfalfa at one tenth bloom and timothy at the first bloom.

As it is almost impossible to harvest all of the hay crop at the best stage of development, Mr. Richardson advises farmers to start having early to ensure quality hay for the livestock.

Hay plants in their growth and development pass from a watery substance to a hard fibrous material at maturity. The early growth is high in protein and the mature plant is low in protein. Red clover starts out with approximately 20 per cent protein and when mature has a protein content of less than 10 per cent.

As plants grow they increase in total crop but a considerable part of this later growth is fibre. Therefore the farmer has to consider whether to cut his hay for quality or high yield. These two periods do not coincide so a compromise between the two must be made.

#### The Watery Grave

Many a summer holiday in Canada which has been looked forward to with eager anticipation during the winter months ends in tragedy. In some cases a well loved child loses his or her life, sometimes the father, the mother or the entire family. In summertime the toll soars into thousands. People who can't swim dive into deep water and can't get out, or hit their heads on submerged rocks through not investigating first. Secondly to learn methods of artificial respiration to revive those who have been under water long enough to lose consciousness. This last point is of great importance for drowning victims will often exhibit symptoms of death and be given up for such, when artificial respiration will help. The victim may stop breathing, and have no apparent heart-beat and no eye reflexes.

On file at The Health League of Canada are cases where people have been brought back to life after being immersed for half an hour.

There are cases where people have been restored to life after eight hours of artificial respiration. Artificial respiration should be begun immediately the victim has been removed from the water, and not stopped, even in an ambulance on the way to the hospital until he comes around, or rigor mortis sets in. Four hours of artificial respiration is the bare minimum of time be most happy to give any information or instruction.







Montreel - Fifty years or more for a single crop. That's how iong it takes for most trees to grow from seedlings to maturity.


During their long growing period, trees, just like a farm crop, must be tended and protected. When the crop is mature it must be harvested. If it is not, the trees will be wasted as they rot in the forest or fall prey to insects, wind storms, and disease.

These are the facts of forest management about which professional foresters and woods operators talked at the 40th annual meeting of the Woodlands Section of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, held recently in Montreal.

The Woodlands Section of C.P.P.A. plays an active role in the management and protection of the forests. Working committees of the Section participate in research projects, investigate new protection techniques, and belp design new logging equip-

It provides the continuing and overlapping cycles of natural reaccding growing and harvesting that will bring forth sustained annual crops to earlich Canadians and the nation.

The new plant for Weymouth Industries Limited, the announcement stated, is expected to be completed and in operation within the next two months. It will consist of a large prefabricated factory. Plans and specifications have been completed and construction of the new plant is now underway.

The agreement between Cossor (Canada) Ltd., and Industrial Estates, the announcement continued, calls for the erection of modern plant facilities on the Woodside Estate in Halifax county. The plant will be essentially a one-storey structure of 57,000 square feet of floor space. Building plans are substantially completed and a general contract for construction is expected to be let during the latter part of July.

#### Leaflets Three - Let It Be

If it has three leaves on each stem — avoid it. That's the best advice the Health League of Canada can give you, on how to protect yourself against poison-ivy. The innocent looking plant that runs wild along the roadside, up river banks, frequently around the best looking picnic spots and sometimes dangerously near summer cottages and playgrounds, can cause a great deal of summertime discomfort and even serious infection, warns the Health League of Canada.

If a word of warning is not sufficient and you find yourself in contact with poison-ivy or even with the smoke from burning poison-ivy then here is what to do.

## Techage Briving; Salk Vaccine To How Can In Re Improved?

In the Maritimes and across Canada, statistics show that teen-age driving habits are cause for concern. Last year teen-agers, in proportion to the number of teen-age drivers, had twice as many accidents as all other age groups, and they killed more people in their accidents. Even when fatalities were not involved, the statistics show that the teen-age accident caused twenty-five to fifty dol-

lars more damage. But, while insurance companies raise their rates and the courts hand out speeding fines, the positive programs of driver education in the Maritime Provinces can be counted on one

The agencies directly concerned with traffic violations can list the probable causes of the teen-age accident rate and they differ somewhat on just how the education program can effectively be carried out.

## Be Continued

Health Minister R. A. Donahoe cheau has announced that the program of immunization against policmyelitis will be continued this vear and expanded to include adult age groups.

Since 1955 the provincial Department of Health has organized public clinics throughout Nova Scotia to carry out the school and pre-school immunization program, using the Salk vaccine. At present, it is estimated that close to 90 per cent of children of pre-school and school ages in the province have received at least one dose of anti-poliomyelitis vaccine.

In this period 599,000 doses of vaccine have been administered to 255,456 children. This represented an outlaw of \$299,060 for vaccine, with the cost shared equally by the province and the federal government. We recall the story just a few weeks ago of the O. F. Woodman general store at Joggin Bridge which got its beginning on a mere ten dollar bill - an example of opportunity plus initiative and energy. Within a few weeks we shall see the business of Fritz Dakin Ltd. celebrating eighty years of existence.

While listening to reports on a recent Industrial Estates meeting and hearing discussions on industrial developments at a meeting of the Digby Board of Trade held at Camp Arcadie, Sandy Cove, last week, we were reminded of the saying "strong oaks from little acorns grow" so far as Camp Arcadie itself is concerned. We understood from the proprietress, Mrs. Helen Anthony, that she purchased sixty acres of land for one hundred dollars on which she built one building. In 1936 she opened the girls camp known as Camp Arcadie, with six campers enrolled. This year of 1958 she has 94 girls ranging from age 51/2 years to 15 years besides several counselors and cooks. The one building which in its beginning was 33 x 55 ft. has now reached the dimension of 50 x 75 and there are eight other buildings besides. During the present year an enlargement was made on the kitchen. bedrooms, canteen and coolers were added; two cabins extended and a shuffle board court installed.

Many, many more such incidences might be mentioned where even larger businesses have grown from small beginnings. These are just a few which in some manner have appeared in the Digby Courier news or advertising within the past few weeks. Others are deserving of mention also. Some will say "luck was with them." Maybe so, but quoting from the address of Maurice Fulton of the Fantus Factory Locating Service "luck is what happens when opportunity meets preparation."

In our business and industrial planning let us take advantage of any assistance available but let us not minimize the importance of self help.

#### Sun-Tan - Avoid That Lobster Look

Sunburn can be tricky. On the beach, you may look as white as a lily all day long, and it won't be until you have reached home again that you will realize that you have achieved the Lobster Look in one uneasy lesson, warns the Health League of Canada.

Taken in proper doses, sunshine improves your health, but make your first sun-bath brief. Just ten minutes the first day, fifteen the second and so on, remembering it takes sixteen days to safely sun-tan a child. Blondes and red headed people are especially susceptible to burns. If you do get a bad burn, treat it as a burn. When using a commercial sun-tan lotion, select a greaseless preparation. Baking soda and water or salt and vinegar lessen the discomfort. If sunburn is severe, see the doctor.

There is a simple test for boneness which you can employ. Press the exposed skin with your finger. A white mark will remain momentarily when you release your finger. If the white is very white, and there is a faint pink ridge surrounding the mark, cover up at once. The skin of children is particularly tender, and they should wear T-shirts or other types of light shirts when exposed to the sun for the first few days. Test them occasionally for doneness too.

#### **PROCLAMATION** By The Honourable B. Clifford Levy Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or

whom the same may in any wise concern: Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth hereby set aside on, from, and after the tenth day of July A.D., 1958, until the fifteenth day of September, A.D., 1958, unless this Proclamation is sooner revoked, every area of forest land as an area of forest land upon which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fishing, or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification, of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip with dates, and having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Voluntary Rangers, fire fighters

and land surveyors: Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars:



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

### Faith In Digby

We draw your attention to the results of a Community Agency Survey conducted in Digby by Cornell University and which appears elsewhere in this paper. Instead of the usual stock taking in the amount of material possessions or potentialities for increased material wealth or other concrete data, it was a survey dealing more with the thoughts and habits of the Digby people but yet none the less important. Information of this kind is usually valuable.

We were interested in the first paragraph which indicated the faith which the majority of the citizens put in the financial future of Digby at a time when a few were taking a pessimistic view and proclaiming the same loudly. The fact that three-quarters of the people want to stay in Digby is an encouraging sign for the future. When people want to do a thing they generally work hard toward that end and prosperity in their endeavours is the usual result. Action is often delayed because we have no idea how the majority of people think on matters or what support might be expected regarding an action. Twothirds of the people as indicated must have some reason to have faith in the future of the town and the knowledge of this gives encouragement to those who are looking toward business expansion or venture.

Other results from the survey make interesting topics for discussion and we shall probably make use of them as they suggest themselves in the future.

## **Prevent Forest Fires**

Fire hazards in the forests in hot dry weather call for maximum precautions by all travellers in wooded areas, warns the Canadian Foresty Association.

"When a campfire is needed for cooking," says an Association bulletin, "it should be built on a rocky shore, where possible, and drenched with water before moving on. In no case should any fires be kindled anywhere near inflammable litter. Smokers can cooperate by avoiding cigarettes or pipes while travelling along a forest trail and at all times should snuff out every sign of fire before discarding remnants of tobacco.

"Four in five of all forest conflagrations are due to personal carelessness and, in most instances, one minute devoted to common sense precautions would have avoided such catastrophes. Upwards to fifty years may be required to restore the timberlands gutted by public carlessness, not counting the extensive damage done to streamflow and the habitat of fish and game."

Mr. A. M. MacKay, President of the newly formed Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council, announces the appointment of Mr. Lawrence M. Delbridge, manager; as noted on another page of this issue of our newspaper.

The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council was formed as a spontaneous effort on the part of the citizens of the entire Province, with the support and approval of the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia.

Earlier in the year the Premier of this Province had called a meeting of business and economic leaders of Nova Scotia to consider what could be done to reduce the tragic loss of life and property on our highways. As a result, an organization meeting was called at the end of April, at which 28 Directors, representative of all parts of Nova Scotia, were elected. From these Directors a President, four Vice-Presidents and an Executive Committee of five members were selected, and it was decided that an office should be opened and a full-time

Manager and the necessary Secretarial help employed. Thoroughly familiar with the highways of this Province, Mr. Delbridge is fully alive to the vital challenge of his new job. We feel sure that our readers will give the council every possible support in this drive to lower substantially the apalling loss on our highways. Vary the car speed. Tune the radio to lively music. Now and then, when it's safe, glance at the car's hood or the decoration over the radiator to change you eye's focus. Ask one of the passengers in the car to watch the speedometer; an inattentive driver runs the speed to a dangerous level without noticing it.

Driving at night is even more hazardous. Run the windshield wipers at intervals, keep switching the light beam from low to high to low. Turn dash lights off or almost off.



### CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 3½ c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 ths. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each

portion into a long roll about 11/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for ½ hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from Cover with a damp cloth and set oven and bake the rolls in steamfilled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

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


# tie Firm Marks 199th Anniversary



Here is a list of some of the DON'TS for Swimmers. It is an old list and many of the DON'TS have been repeated many, many times. However, they are DON'TS that bear repeating and, certainly, if appreciated and remembered, will go a long way towards reducing the accident toll among those who frequent the beaches and streams during the summer swimming season.

Don't swim alone or at unsupervised swimming places. Don't dive into unknown waters where rocks and branches

Don't swim when overtired.

Don't swim too far from shore. Swim parallel to the shore. Don't swim until you become exhausted, particularly if the days count.

Don't panic if you get into difficulties. Try to think clearly.

Don't duck or push bathers into water. Don't go out in a small boat unless you are a good swim-

Don't overload any boat, large or small. Be firm about will you be more exhausted than leaving behind any person or luggage which would at the beginning, or instead, inmean overloading.

Don't use a boat that is not completely seaworthy. Don't go out in a boat in stormy weather.

#### DIGBY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Thursday, September 4th, 1958, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1958-59, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1958. Immediate application will expedite approval from the Municipal School Board. Weymouth Area students are eligible for admission to Grade XII Commercial on application as above.

Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion

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



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

The mystery of that ship, the Atlantic Ocean in December, 1872, has never been solved and never will. More has been written about the Mary Celeste, most of it wild and unbridled To make the matter a little fiction, than about the Titanic, Lusitania and the Flying Dutchman all rolled into one.

The ninety ton Nova Scotia brig sailed from New York on November 7, eighty-six years ago, bound for Genoa with a cargo of alcohol. Aboard were her skipper, Captain Benjamin Briggs, a Massachusetts man; his wife and their two year old daughter and a crew of seven.

Four weeks later, yawing on an erratic course and headed in the wrong direction, the Mary Celeste was hailed by the brig Dei Gratia, also a Nova Scotian, out of New York for Gibraltar. In August ice was common half an inch thick and almost all vegetation was killed in America and Europe. September, October and November continued progressively colder, but December was mild.

A great deal of panic was exhibited because of the strange behaviour of the weather, the clipping records, and many people showed great anxiety about the world's future.







#### Not A Child To Spare

a newspaper's being.

"Nova Scotia Has Not A Child To Spare" is an appropriate slogan for the Child Traffic Safety Campaign sponsored by the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council. The campaign gets under way on September 2, just about the time when thousands of children will be either starting school or returning to it, and 17. therefore will be exposed to traffic hazards. The campaign will continue with the intention of reducing deaths and injuries among the children in Nova Scotia. During 1957, 52 of Nova Scotia's 141 motor vehicle fatalities were pedestrians and 24 of those 52 were in the age group 1-14 years. In addition, 371 children in that same age group were injured while walking, playing or cycling on Nova Scotia streets and highways.

The following points in the campaign are being emphasized — For Children

1. The importance of knowing and constantly applying for their own protection the safety rules that apply to walking, cycling or playing.

2. Their responsibility towards younger children, i. e. to help protect them and to teach them safe traffic habits.

3. The fact that safe traffic habits are just plain common sense, and that only foolish people take unnecessary chances in traffic.

4. That motorists, no matter how careful or willing they may be, cannot always protect children who ignore safety rules, and that a child's avoidance of death or injury in a traffic accident is largely dependent upon his own actions. For Parents

1. Their primary responsibility to teach safe practices to their pre-school age children.

2. Their continuing, joint responsibility with the schools for the safety of their school age children.

3. The need for them to play an active part in parents' organizations, civic groups, etc., to achieve safe traffic conditions for children, and to promote greater safety knowledge among

4. The importance of their supporting and co-operating fully with police, public officials and the schools, in any and all

efforts made through education, legislation and law enforcement, to reduce accidents to children. 5. The contribution which parents and all adults can make by always setting a good example in their own pedestrian and

driving actions. For Teachers 1. Their major responsibility to supplement, through adequate emphasis on safety knowledge and practices, the parents'

efforts to make children safe young citizens. 2. The need to help parents in order that a co-ordinated approach to traffic safety teaching in the home and the school

may be achieved. 3. Their responsibility to provide for the children as safe an environment as possible in the school, the school grounds and

the immediate vicinity of the school. We hope parents and teachers will plan or start now to teach the children the traffic safety rules so that we are not forced to spare one child in Nova Scotia through highway accidents.



#### **Opening Notice** DIGBY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Thursday, September 4th, 1958, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1958-59, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1958. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Thursday, August 21st, to Wednesday, August 27th, between the hours of 10.00 to 12.00 a.m. and from 2.00 to 4.30 p.m. daily, except for Saturday.

Students from the Islands seeking admission to the Grade XII Academic or Commercial classes must have applications approved by the Digby Municipal School Board prior to September 1st. Requests for application forms should be addressed to F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S., prior to August 23rd. Immediate application will expedite approval from the Municipal School Board. Weymouth Area students are eligible for admission to Grade XII Commercial on application as above.

Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

Break up with a fork



1/s tsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. celery salt 34 c. shredded process cheese 1 thsp. finely-chopped

1/2 c. finely-chopped celery 2 thsps. chopped parsley

Cut in finely 1/2 c. chilled shortening Make a well in dry ingredients; mix in 36 c. milk

1/4 c. condensed

mushroom scup

1% c. once-sifted

all-purpose flour

or 2 c. once-sifted

4 tsp. Magic Baking

pastry flour

1/2 tsp. salt

business when you couldn't tell a sedan

from a roadster without a guide book. By the end of the First World War, most of America's cars had stopped looking like the horse-drawn carriages of

a generation before and had started to look like cars. But they held on to the old names like Victoria, Landaulet and Brougham to describe basic body styles. The names meant little, and new names cropped up, or were

tacked on to the existing names. An early wholesale book lists more than 300 different names used to describe the few basic body styles.

A Phaeton, for instance means a four-door convertible

with no window glass. The name-happy ad boys called them a Sports Phaeton, Special Phaeton, Touring Phaeton, Convertible Phaeton, Phaeton Sedan and a long list of other names like Tourer, Torpedo and Pursuit which didn't even have the word Phaeton in them.

At one time, one manufacturer had a car on the market which he called a Phaeton — it had four doors and no window glass. At the same time another manufacturer brought out a car which had two doors with window glass. It, too, was called a Phaeton.

And one manufacturer (who is no longer with us) put a car on the market with the unfortunate name of Collapsible Sedan.

Today, at least, we know what we mean when we say Sedan and Convertible, and most people roundabout know where the best Sedans and Convertibles are. They know they're here, because we're as careful with our cars as we are with the names we call them

#### Leonard Makes *Announcements*



Minister of Education, announced that a new School for the Deaf, to be built jointly by the governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will be located in Amherst, Nova Scotia

This decision followed a meet ing held in August of the interprovincial committee established by the governments to survey proposed sites for the school. The site selected by the committee, comprising approximately twenty-five acres, is located approximately one mile from the centre of the town of Amherst and in the opinion of the committee is suitable in all respects for the erection and operation of the school. The town of Amherst has promised full co-operation in providing facilities for the school and in making the school a part of the community.

The proposed new school will facilities, and in particular, space and equipment for the vocational training of students, which have been urgently needed for some time in the Halifax School for the Deaf. Detailed plans are now being prepared and following their approval, construction will start immediately, the minister announced.

#### About This and That

#### Garbage Throwers

An article in the current issue of the Financial Post deals with a problem which has been an irksome one in this area for many years. We refer to the problem of dealing with those who persist in throwing garbage along the highways.

Many otherwise beautiful drives in this district have been spoiled by those who carelessly and thoughtlessly deposit garbage along the roadside. In some places great heaps of rubbish have been thrown into the ditches, creating an unsightly mess as well as a health hazard. In many more places papers, bottles, cans and other garbage are dropped by motorists as they pass or left as the remains of a roadside picnic.

The Financial Post says that legally at least they do not fool about tossing rubbish along highways in the U.S. No less than forty states have enacted laws to punish litterbugs. Most of them are content with stiff fines but in Missouri a man who tosses an empty on the highway can get a maximum punishment of a \$1,000 fine and a year in jail.

Many Canadian provinces also have penalty provisions in their laws covering litterbugs but these are no good unless they are enforced. Over the years in this province signs have been posted along many highways stating it is illegal to dump rubbish but there seems to have been little enforcement, for the practice still continues and, as a matter of fact, seems to be on the increase.

Surely we, as a province interested in the tourist trade, should go "all out" to have the law in this respect enforced. As a householder is rated by the condition in which he keeps his property so to is the province in the manner in which it looks after its public places. We in Nova Scotia have been blessed with some of the finest scenery outdoors. Let us make sure insofar as we are able to keep that scenery unspoiled by curbing the efforts of the uncivilized who would make our highways driveways through "litterland".

#### HONEY BUN RING

Scald ¼ c. milk, ⅓ c. granulated sugar,

11/2 tsps. salt and 1/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm

water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour: beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour. Kneed on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic.

Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9" wide and 24" long; loosen dough. Combine 1/2 c. lightlypacked brown sugar and 1/2 c. liq honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased  $8\frac{1}{2}$  tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.



Education is an essential weapon against highway accidents. The weekly press which reaches possibly 6,000,000 readers in Canada through its 1,700,000 subscribers has played an important role along with schools, police radio, T.V. and magazines to curb the highway menaces. Industry, too, has played its part in this humanitarian cause by providing funds for education in traffic safety through advertising or other means. Here in Digby the school in conjunction with MacDonald Motor Co. has been carrying on a splendid program for highway safety by its instruction to young drivers. Such a program is bound to reap returns in fewer highway accidents.

We emphasize that education, in whatever form, is an important weapon in the battle against highway accidents. The opportunity to provide such a public service whether by school, press, industry or other means should not be overlooked. With traffic continually on the increase, driving becomes continually more hazardous. Education in safe driving and in general highway safety becomes more important each day.

#### The Fall Fair

The Digby County Exhibition, the important fall fair in this area, is over and although the weather man chose to come out in full adverse force for part of the time the exhibits and program planned were probably superior to any year. A better opportunity for display was provided this year too by having a fine new building ready for more booth space and to ease congestion in the other quarters. Housed in this building were farm implements and other commercial booths along with a well planned booth by the Weymouth Cancer Society.

The usual fine quality of farm and garden products, home cooking, home crafts and school exhibits occupied the older building.

As can be expected of the Bear River women, they rise to the occasion. Unexpectedly, for the last day of the exhibition, the dining room was more than usually patronized. This was probably due to the fine day following the wet ones which had hampered the previous attendance or it might have been due to the fine reputation of the excellent meals served. Whatever the cause of the welcomed excess patronage, it did not ease the concern which must have been felt by the caterers when the supply of food became exhausted. But the women were equal to the -situation and showed no outward display of embarrassment as they detained their patrons at the table for possible further supplies. As one out-of-town gentleman said "I'm glad I had to wait. I fared even better than the early people and got the dishes I especially requested."

While on the subject of exhibitions we noted the absence this year of the Maple Leaf Agricultural Fair which had been staged at Conway for several years. We have not enquired into the reason for dispensing with that fair but we can see that two such similar fairs in such close proximity both in distance and time are bound to conflict from the angle of attendance and exhibits. It might be wise to concentrate on one larger fair.

#### **Excellent Peach Crop**

We were interested in seeing at the Digby County Exhibition a fine display of excellent looking peaches. It brought to our mind that this comparatively new venture in fruit growing in this area has thrived most unexpectedly. Not too many years ago, maybe ten, we heard of an orchard in Deep Brook experimenting with growing peaches. To-day there are several of the fruit growers showing excellent varieties of fine peaches. In fact, we understand the market is flooded and the price has been as low as sixty-five cents a basket. Another venture which has proved a gain.

#### Fish Week

We know of no area which should be more interested in National Fish Week September 22-28 than Digby County. Fishing is still ranked as one of the county's major industries. Advantage of National Fish Week to boost the industry should be taken by everyone interested directly or indirectly. "Make Fish your dish!" is the slogan to be used next week by the Fisheries Council of Canada in an effort to further the industry which provides a livelihood for so many. Digby has reason to support the Fisheries Council in spotlighting the fishing industry by urging special fish menus next week. This, it is hoped, might serve as a springboard for menu inspiration throughout the whole year. Our prosperity here depends much on the advancement of the fishing business.

#### In India



Miss Kena A. Keans, a native of Port Wade but working as a teaching missionary in India since 1922 except for furloughs, has written the Courier and sent a splendid book marking the graduation and seventy-fifth anniversary of the Hird High School in Narasaravupet.

The book sent to the Courier by Miss Keans contains many photographs of the school staff. pupils and graduates and also show enes around the various parts of the school.

Historical sketches included in the book trace the progress of the school since it was founded. It is stated there was already a school in the Christion hamlet of Narasaravupet when the first missionary went there to live in 1883. At that time the community was an outstation of Ongole, 61 miles

The early missionaries took an interest in the education of girls which had previously been considered unnecessary. In 1911 the school at Narasaravupet was made the central boarding school for the northern area, and in 1930 the cornerstone for the Hird memorial school was laid. This school, which is used seven days a week, is considered a model and it is interesting to learn that 90% of its graduates are in Christian work.

The history of the school from 1943 to 1958, contained in the book, was compiled by Miss the last five years the strength of the school has doubled. Records show the enrolment for 1952-53 as 255 and for this school year the number has

reached 537. In early days the school was a primary and elementary educational institution but since 1948 it has been a complete high school. Pupils at the school participate in the school parliament; have a company of Girl Guides; six Christian Endeavour chapters. In 1955 Stillman Hostel, a residence of women teachers was added to the campus. This building also provides living quarters for fifty girls at

present.

CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 3/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 31/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 ths. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold

in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for ½ hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steamfilled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from into 2 equal portions; shape each the oven. Yield-18 rolls.
