Now and then a printing job had a save in parchment paper which required a special kind of printers' ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would take you to the largest press in spite of the fact he always opened an outside door to lessen the odors on the room itself.

One of the jobs I had to do, besides putting and
grinding down the staff, was to... I cleaned one
and then... One day not long after I started to get to
the grating plant. I decided to climb the floor that
apparently hadn't been cleaned for some con-
siderable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you making out Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily. He thought the remark pretty good and whole.

Sometimes the gasoline engine, a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "fix-it" man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. Max would then stand back and come over dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of fixing."

On other occasions when some people would say, "let's be a little off" and vice versa, often that is all it took. They often since have a respect of the value of that remark and the actual need of "off" in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I built "Mac" and four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1958 got together and before dark one evening decided to mutate the newly built outdoor Four Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just east of the pool; nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, so in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Plains Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world war and Korean, was awarded the Vietnam Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale apothecary, pharmacist, and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day, I was asked to contribute about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two times what I had written about the man who was found marooned on a beach in some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. When I read this man's tongue had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

"Jerome appeared to have been a man of considerable social standing and, possibly, of considerable wealth. However, the only thing I could or would ever say after being asked for by some family in the Forest was something that sounded like the name of either, yulid nut, or, would not, yulid nut, who he was or why he was left there. It was, and is, one of Digby County and, different ideas have been put forward as to the reasons concerning this man. However, "Mia" was, I felt no urge to say anything different about this man. The only thing I have been very well explained to me."

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Delegation Goes To Ottawa

A delegation of weir fishermen from the Digby Neck section of Digby County left here Monday for Ottawa to carry their protests concerning the operation of New Brunswick sealers in St. Mary's Bay and the Bay of Fundy near the shores of Digby County to the government in person.

These weir fishermen claim activities of New Brunswick sealers in the Bay of Fundy and St. Mary's Bay off Digby County are ruining their weir fishing and forcing them out of business. They claim the sealers drive away the herring which are normally caught in large numbers at this season of the year and making it impossible for the weirs to operate profitably.

Harold Crowell, who operates a large weir off Sandy Cove, says that if the sealers are not stopped it will mean he will have to abandon his weir operations. "It costs in excess of \$3,500 to build and equip a weir," Mr. Crowell says, and you cannot pick it up and move it away after the sealers have ruined the fishing."

Mr. Crowell says experience has proven that everywhere the sealers have operated the weir fishing has been ruined. This has occurred off Grand Manan, around Port Maitland in Nova Scotia, in the harbour at Digby, and elsewhere, he says.

It is claimed the sealers move in when it is learned a good catch of herring has been made in a weir and drag up as many fish as they can surround in successive casts of their huge seine nets. Within a short while, weir fishermen say, the schools of herring are broken up and leave. Other fish are driven from the area because of the fact the bottom is dirtied from the litter of dead fish left by the sealing operations.

To substantiate his claims with respect to the effect the sealers are having on the weir operations Mr. Crowell says last Saturday and Sunday his weir was filled. Capacity of the weir is about one hundred thousand pounds of herring. Sunday he dipped 68 hogheads from the weir and on Monday took thirty-one.

Mr. Crowell says Monday night the sealers moved in and on Tuesday there was not a herring to be dipped in his weir. Wednesday he got four hogheads of herring and five of mackerel. These were the first mackerel this year, Mr. Crowell says, and their presence is proof the bottom has been dirtied since mackerel come when this happens. Since Wednesday catches there have been absolutely no fish in his weir at all, Mr. Crowell says.

Both Mr. Crowell's weir and one operated off Mink Cove in the St. Mary's Bay by Conrad Gidney have been seriously affected by the sealing. So far weirs further up the Bay at Griffin Cove have not been hit, and there catches of herring are running very high. It is understood the sealers have not worked as yet that far up the bay and may be hampered by the shallow water.

In the Bay of Fundy the sealers are reported operating off Sandy Cove and weirs of Bailey Gidney and Hugh Morehouse have been hit seriously by their operation. Weirs operated by Truman Wentzell and Henry Lewis off Gulliver's Cove in the Bay of Fundy so far have not been affected. It is understood, as sealers have not been operating that far up the bay.

The weir fishermen say the operations of the sealers are not only ruining the actual fishing but are also destroying the markets for the weir operators. The sealers are completely filling the sardine market, it is claimed, and weir fishermen are being forced to sell their catches for fertilizer. This means they are getting four dollars a hoghead for their herring instead of fifteen dollars for large and twenty dollars for small herring.

St. Mary's Bay weir fishermen claim the sealers are not satisfied just to seine in the bay but are moving in closer than the two thousand foot limit from a weir which they are allowed by law. It is claimed the sealers are night fishing and they have been observed within two thousand feet of weirs at Sandy and Mink Cove.

The sealers which are reported operating in St. Mary's Bay and the Bay of Fundy are from Grand Manan and Wilson's Beach in New Brunswick. It is understood that the boats are

"Exercise Honey Bee"

"Exercise Honey Bee" took place at Deep Brook Friday afternoon, June 20, when a swarm of bees from Vaughan Henshaw's hives at Waldeck West were seen at 4 o'clock to be heading toward the open barn of Mrs. Lillian Henshaw, where Vaughan's bee equipment is stored. They were approximately one half hour crossing the road, some pedestrians and school children having to detour around the Halifax Storage Building, not caring to risk a few "rheumatism and arthritis shots" from the busy bees. Several were found lying dead on the highway, having been struck by passing motorists.

The previous day (Thursday) these bees had "swarmed" and were seen high up in a spruce tree near the orchard where they are "hived". Around 2 o'clock Friday afternoon a young chap passed the travelling swarm in the woods on his way up to Waldeck.

The "queen" directed her followers to hives in the barn and made themselves at home in 3 supers where they spent the night and until Saturday afternoon when their keeper sent their chosen home out in the field where they will reside for the summer months.

Bluenose Started Daily Round Trip

Passengers and automobiles carried in the luxury auto ferry M.V. "Bluenose" operated by the Canadian National Railways increased in 1937 compared with the previous year, the company has announced.

In the twelve-month period of 1937, 96,527 passengers were handled in the ship between Yarmouth and Bar Harbor, an increase of 3,014 persons. Vehicles totalled 30,651, an increase of 1,905 units over the previous year.

Sailings during the peak summer tourist season when the M.V. "Bluenose" makes a daily round trip between the Nova Scotia and New England ports, accounted for the majority of the traffic carried in the ship.

The "Bluenose" commenced her daily round-trip summer schedule this year on June 21 and will continue it until September 15. She leaves Bar Harbor at 8:00 a.m., arrives Yarmouth at 3:00 p.m., and sails at 4:30 p.m., arriving at Bar Harbor at 9:30 p.m., local daylight saving time.

Since January 1 of this year, with the exception of the period the "Bluenose" was in dry dock for annual overhaul, up to May 12, she carried 4,667 passengers and 2,301 vehicles. The CNR ship has accommodation for 600 passengers and 150 automobiles.

An interesting sidelight of the increased number of smaller sized European cars being driven in Canada and the United States today is that with a typical assemblage of tourist automobiles the CNR's luxury ferry "Bluenose" can accommodate about 165 autos, instead of the 150 the space was originally planned for.

operating. Their catches are herring which are sold to New Brunswick and Maine processing plants.

The Digby Neck weir fishermen are greatly disturbed about the operations of the sealers and all of them say if their efforts are not curtailed it will mean the end of successful weir fishing off the Digby County coast in the Bay of Fundy and St. Mary's Bay. Estimates of the costs of constructing the huge weirs used by the weir fishermen range from in excess of \$3,500 to over \$5,000. It is necessary to drive heavy poles into the sea bottom, lighter poles and brush are also used and the under sea portion of the weir, its pond and leaders are covered with net which must be placed by divers who also check the positioning of the supporting poles and brush "fence".

Once the weirs are constructed the fishermen must await the schools of herring which come up the bay. As the tides recede the herring follow along a "leader" fence of brush into the pond of the weir from which they are dipped.

The weir fishermen claim the sealers are breaking up the schools and driving off the fish and are also dirtying up the bottom which keeps the fish from returning.

Study Industrial Development

An Industrial Development Seminar jointly sponsored by Industrial Estates Ltd. and Nova Scotia Light and Power Co. Ltd. was held at the Nova Scotian Hotel, Halifax, on Thursday. Attending from Digby were E. Scott Eaton, Town Clerk; Roscoe Handsaker, Municipal Clerk; Vincent Snow, President of the Digby Board of Trade, and Mrs. J. M. Wallis, editor of The Digby Courier.

Maurice Fulton, of the Fanus Factory Locating Service, New York and Chicago, consultants to Nova Scotia Light and Power Co. Ltd., was one of the principle speakers at the Seminar, taking as his subject "What Industry Looks For In The Community". The attraction of industry to a community takes an infinite amount of patience and it must be remembered that there are many communities competing for the same small branch plant. Mr. Fulton said. He dealt with the aspects which make industries seek certain areas for location under special attributes and general attributes. Chief among the former, he said, were the location with reference to the industry's raw materials and markets and the cost of transportation to and from the location. The industry, too, must be able to procure the necessary amount of water power and fuel at reasonable prices. Adequate and suitable labor supply is also important.

Discussing the general category of attributes the speaker pointed out that one of the many things the investigator pays closest attention to is the experience of other manufacturers and employers manufacturing in the area. The nature of the people is important. The treatment an industry gets is a major factor and the willingness of the local labor to give an honest day's work.

While local property tax is given serious consideration, Mr. Fulton said, that low taxes are not always the inducement that they appear to be. The plant location investigator, like anyone else who is interested in establishing a new home, is conscious of environment, culture, civic background, school and recreation facilities. The general appearance of a community has much bearing on the choice of location for a plant. It is said that lack of pride in the place of residence generally means lack of pride in the neighborhood, community, plant and job. A manufacturer, the speaker said, is always anxious to know that he is wanted in a community.

Another interesting address was given by John B. Essery, general manager of Industrial Estates Ltd. Industrial Estates Limited is a Crown Company formed by the Government of Nova Scotia, for the purpose of promoting the industrial expansion of the Province. It operates as an autonomous body under the authority of its Board of Directors, devoted solely to the accomplishment of its primary purpose — the development of industry. It is essentially a non-profit organization. It not only has a purpose of attracting new industry but it also encourages the expansion of established industry and growth of local industry by providing modern factory space at low rentals, but it does not lend money, said Mr. Essery.

When the management of any Canadian or foreign industry visits Industrial Estates, it is the company's responsibility to point out the various counties, municipalities and areas which are advantageous to the particular problems of production, he said. The potential industry requires full information on the sites suggested.

Mr. Essery urged the formation of local industrial development committees, either in each town or group of communities, to determine the facilities available. Care should be taken in selecting the members of the committee so that men with specialized knowledge of land, local labor, transportation and other factors are utilized to the full.

The Industrial Estates depends greatly on reports from these local industrial committees for assistance in providing true and suitable information to industries seeking locations. Everything hinges on the accurate information supplied.

Premier Makes Presentation In Boston



When the "S.S. Yarmouth" left Yarmouth on July 1st, for Boston, on the return leg of her first round-trip of the summer season, included in her passenger list was a delegation from Nova Scotia, headed by the Honourable Robert L. Stanfield, Q.C., Premier of Nova Scotia, whose duty, upon arrival in Boston, was to present to His Excellency Honourable Foster Furcolo, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, an Illuminated Scroll, forwarded to him on behalf of the Province of Nova Scotia by His Honour, Major-General, the Honourable E. C. Plow, CBE, CD.

The presentation of this scroll, which Governor Furcolo had signified his willingness to accept — and which was scheduled to take place at a ceremony in Boston on July 2nd — served to record the important position which natives of the New England States held in Nova Scotia, 200 years ago; the contribution which many of these people made to the development of Nova Scotia and to the planting of free political institutions in this country as members of Canada's First Parliament, convened in Halifax on October 2, 1758; and recorded, as well, the strong bond of kinship which has existed between the people of the New England States and the Province of Nova Scotia over the span of two centuries.

Of the 20 newly-elected members who constituted the first General Assembly in 1758, 19 were sworn into office at the opening session on October 2nd. The remaining representative, Malachi Salter, who was born in Boston in 1717, and who died in Halifax on July 13, 1781, took his seat on October 30th.

In addition to Mr. Salter, records indicate that at least 10 others were natives of the New England States.

CNR Official Addresses Boards Of Trade

Canada has weathered "far worse than the present economic storm" and no country holds a brighter future, the annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade was told last week at Charlottetown, P.E.I.

The optimistic outlook came from D. V. Gonder of Moncton, vice-president and general manager of the Canadian National Railways Atlantic region.

As evidence of the CNR's faith in national prosperity, Mr. Gonder pointed to its continuing program of improvements to equipment, facilities and operating techniques.

Mr. Gonder assured the gathering of industrialists and business men in the Charlottetown Hotel that the Canadian National is ready to carry the burden placed upon it in the

present. But previous had to be accompanied by change. The publicly-owned corporation wanted to carry out its responsibilities with efficiency, Mr. Gonder said. He added: "If this immense asset, Canadian National Railways, is not to depreciate in worth to its owners, it must be adapted to necessary changes in the transportation environment as the years advance. . . no single word is more descriptive of the modern railroad picture than this word 'change', while not synonymous with progress, you cannot have progress without change."

Mr. Gonder said Canadian National's influence is "woven well" into the industrial life and development of the Atlantic provinces. It did not just build lines and sit back in hope that prospective industries would pass this way.

"You boards of trade know how vigorous and active our development department and industrial engineers are in seeking out and bringing in suitable industries," he added.

Mr. Gonder said that while it was true there are geographical

disadvantages in the position of the Atlantic provinces, there are also advantages. Government had recognized some of the detriments and provided such aids as Maritime freight rates assistance, subsidies on coal and subsidized steamship services, among others.

He reminded his audience that in its Atlantic region the Canadian National operates 20 ships, first class hotels in St. John's, Nfld., Halifax and Charlottetown, and in the four Atlantic provinces alone Canadian National Telegraphs owns nearly 5,300 miles of telegraph poles.

"In the Atlantic provinces Canadian National operates 3,305 miles of first main track, they have 1,013 bridges, 686 of them steel, with a total length of almost 20 miles," and further, Mr. Gonder said, "the CNR's traffic control system in the Atlantic provinces now extends over 315 miles."

A railroader since 1925, when he began his career in the CNR shops at Stratford, Ont., as an apprentice, Mr. Gonder told the trade board that "Canadian National Railways are not decadent, dying by inches, super-

seded and made obsolete by reason of other transportation agencies. . . I like to think of Canadian National as not only growing with the times but ahead of them; not just following the course of events, but helping to shape them.

"Our president, Mr. Gordon recently pointed out that if the 1957 traffic had been carried at the 1928 level of efficiency, the CNR would have required 1,100 more locomotives, 80,000 more freight cars, and \$280 million more money. His own words were: 'I cite these facts to refute the suggestion that railroads are old fashioned, unimaginative, apathetic about their customers' needs, and slow to take advantage of technological developments'."

In looking ahead to the future it could be said that the railway's new terminals, signalling installations, equipment and other improvements anticipate increased transportation needs in a growing, vigorous Canada.

"The Canadian National Railways is one of the greatest assets this country possesses," Mr. Gonder said. "It is a most

important factor in the economy of these Atlantic provinces. When you grow, so do we. When you suffer, so do we. We look forward to continuing our strong partnership as far along the avenue of the foreseeable future as the keenest foresight will reach."

Grow, Harvest, and Protect say Forester Farmers Planning For Future

Research too Plays Big Role in Modern Forest Development

Montreal — Fifty years or more for a single crop. That's how long it takes for most trees to grow from seedlings to maturity.

During their long growing period, trees, just like a farm crop, must be tended and protected. When the crop is mature it must be harvested. If it is not, the trees will be wasted as they rot in the forest or fall prey to insects, wind storms, and disease.

These are the facts of forest management about which professional foresters and woods operators talked at the 40th annual meeting of the Woodlands Section of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, held recently in Montreal.

The Woodlands Section of C.P.P.A. plays an active role in the management and protection of the forests. Working committees of the Section participate in research projects, investigate new protection techniques, and help design new logging equipment.

Forest management, as it was discussed at the meeting, is more than a conservation and protection program. It is creative. It includes and makes use of advanced scientific research. It provides the continuing and overlapping cycles of natural reseedling, growing, and harvesting that will bring forth sustained annual crops to enrich Canadians and the nation.

Commenting on the future of Canada's forest resources in his address at the Montreal conference, W. A. E. Poplar, manager of the Section, said, "Over the next twenty-five years Canada will have the exciting opportunity of doubling its output of pulp and paper and, at the same time, increasing its income 50 per cent its output of

Reports On Hospital Plan

A comprehensive report on the anticipated effects of the hospitalization plan on the Digby area was given to the monthly meeting of the Digby Town Council here by Councillor Vernon L. Bent who represents the Town Council on the Board of Directors of the Digby General Hospital.

According to Mr. Bent's report it is anticipated a seventy-five bed hospital will be needed to provide hospitalization for the area to be served by the Digby hospital. The 75 bed figure is one arrived at by a local committee studying the situation, Mr. Bent reported, and comes close to the 85 bed figure given by Dr. Stewart who conducted a survey on behalf of the province some time ago.

Under the hospitalization plan the Digby hospital will serve an area not much different than that presently covered by this hospital, Mr. Bent said. The area is the district west from Digby to Little Brook, east to a point beyond the Cornwallis naval base and north and south to the limits of settlement.

Mr. Bent reported that Dr. Stewart's survey indicated that Digby was one area in the province most inadequately supplied with hospital beds. He said that although the present 35 bed Digby General Hospital was doing a remarkably efficient job in caring for patients it is "simply too small to take care of the number of patients who should use it."

At present, Councillor Bent said, the Digby hospital is overcrowded in the matter of floor space requirements and, if nothing is done to provide the suggested number of hospital beds here to meet the needs anticipated through implementation of the hospital plan, it may be necessary for the present Digby hospital to drop back to 25 beds in order to comply with floor space regulations set by the government.

S., was presented with a Pastor's Record Book. Ellen Arnold made the presentation.

Trade Board Camp Guests

Officers and members of the Digby Board of Trade were guests Tuesday evening of Mrs. Helen Anthony at her internationally known girls' camp, "Camp Arcadia," at Sandy Cove.

Prior to the business session the visitors were dinner guests of Mrs. Anthony in the dining room of the main cabin. They were then taken on a tour of the many cabins which make up the campsite which is located on a wooded hillside on the shores of St. Mary's Bay at Sandy Cove. Nearly one hundred girls from all over North America are in residence at the camp.

At the opening of the business session trade board president, Vincent G. Snow, expressed the sorrow of the board at the sudden passing of its secretary-treasurer, S. C. Denton, several weeks ago. Mr. Denton's death, he said, is a severe loss to the board and to the community.

Richard Levy was elected temporary secretary until the nominating committee is able to secure a successor to Mr. Denton.

Mrs. Anthony, reporting on the progress of efforts to reorganize a tennis club in Digby, stated club headquarters were being readied at the Hotel Champlain and clay had been placed on the courts at the hotel. All that remained to be done, she said, was to put down tapes, install the nets and wiring. It was planned to call a meeting to reorganize the club as soon as a definite date could be set to start tennis, Mrs. Anthony concluded.

Considerable discussion was had concerning plans for catering for and entertaining the tremendous crowds of people expected in Digby on the occasion of the visit of Princess Margaret to the community August 9th.

It was reported a meeting of the heads of six service organizations had been held at the request of the Mayor to discuss the matter and H. M. Warne, chairman of the trade board's economic council, had been named to head up efforts to coordinate the activities of these clubs in providing catering and entertainment for the crowds expected to visit here on August 9th. Net proceeds of all activities will be shared equally by all participating organizations up to \$1,000 each, any balance will go to the Digby Recreation Commission, it was reported.

Mr. Warne stated a further meeting of the service club group would be held and at that time the role of the board of trade in providing services for the public on the occasion of the Royal visit would be finalized. It was decided a meeting of the trade board would be called as soon after this session as possible to work out details of the job allotted to the board.

The board decided to renew its campaign for construction of the Digby to Shelburne cross country highway. It was pointed out there appeared to be renewed interest in the construction of roads into the hinterland of the province and the federal government had expressed its willingness to share in costs of such projects. This being the case, it was decided it would be advisable to renew efforts for the construction of the Digby-Shelburne road which was shelved by the board some time ago.

It was reported several projects recommended to the board through its economic council were being put into action. These included an advertising campaign aboard the CPS Princess Helene, erection of a bulletin board near the tourist information bureau under the auspices of the Digby Kiwanis Club and preparation of leaflets advertising local attractions for distribution to visitors arriving in Digby.

An expression of thanks was voiced by H. M. Warne on behalf of the board to J. J. Brittain and Thomas Cleveland for the excellent job done in heading up the annual Dominion Day fair. Thanks was also expressed to Joseph Hattie for his work on the publicity program.

Reporting for the fair, Mr. Brittain said all accounts were not yet in so it was not possible to give an accurate figure on the net return. It was expected to exceed \$1,000, he said.

Refreshments were served.

Seek Meter Law Change

The Town of Digby will seek a change in by-laws governing use of its street parking meters to meet the change in store operating hours adopted by local merchants, it was decided at the regular monthly meeting of the Town Council here.

At present meters are in operation in the evenings only on Saturday nights. The change sought after will make it obligatory for motorists to contribute to the meters on Friday evenings also. Some weeks ago local merchants voted to open their stores on Friday evenings instead of Saturdays but since that time a number of them have reverted to Saturday night opening.

In response to a request from a number of citizens owning properties on 2nd Avenue between Sydney and Church Streets it was decided to construct a sewer on this street if a petition was received from 50% of the property owners on the street. It was also decided to fill in a gully at the south end of the street and extend the street from the present dead end to Church Street.

Complaints were aired at the meeting concerning dogs running at large in the south end of the town. It was reported these dogs were worrying pets that are confined according to law and were also molesting children. Mrs. Alma Melanson was appointed assistant dog catcher to aid in dealing with the matter.

Mayor Turnbull, reporting on the forthcoming visit of Princess Margaret to Digby, stated the helicopter carrying the Princess would land some distance from town on a field owned by Frank Larche and a motorcade would then bring Her Royal Highness and her party and welcoming officials in to the town. It is expected the helicopter will land at 4:15 p.m. on Saturday, August 9th.

On her arrival in Digby the Princess will proceed to the bandstand where she will meet the people. Following this she will proceed to the Digby Pines Hotel where a dinner will be held.

Mayor Turnbull stated a detachment of naval personnel from HMCS Cornwallis will provide traffic control, assisting local police and RCMP. The Digby fire department will be asked to assist with car parking on the town's ball park.

In his report Mayor Turnbull said citizens of the town, particularly those living on the route to be followed by the Princess, will be asked to decorate their homes and business premises for the occasion.

G. C. Sollows was granted a building permit to erect a home on his property on 2nd Avenue.

Town Clerk E. Scott Eaton gave a brief report at the meeting on the industrial seminar held in Halifax recently, sponsored by the Nova Scotia Light & Power Co. Ltd. and Industrial Estates Ltd.

Permits were given to St. Patrick's Church to hold their annual fair on July 23rd and to the Hospital Aid for a tag day on August 1st.

Open Inquest Into Death

A coroner's inquest into the death of 48 year old Ralph William Trimmer, of Mount Pleasant, which occurred at the Digby General Hospital on Tuesday morning, was opened here Tuesday.

The jury, under foreman H. R. Peters, viewed the remains and the inquest, convened by Coroner C. W. Ramsay, adjourned until Monday evening.

Trimmer's death, which occurred about 5:30 Tuesday morning, followed injuries received last Friday afternoon when he reportedly fell from the back of a truck near his Mount Pleasant home.

Unmarried, Trimmer lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Trimmer at Mount Pleasant. He has been an invalid all his life.

Digby Boat Chief Honoured

Hugh J. "Sam" Macdonald, of 94 Queen Street, Saint John, joined the Canadian Pacific Railway's Princess Helene as chief engineer two weeks after the ship's first revenue trip between there and Digby, in September, 1930. He retired as chief engineer at the end of June, and on Monday night his shipmates and friends honored him at an official retirement party during which he was presented with a television set "to help him while away his idle time."

Railway assistant superintendent J. G. Dow made the presentation on behalf of Mr. Macdonald's associates and friends and paid high tribute to the engineering genius of the retired chief engineer. Never in the history of the Princess Helene's operations in the Bay of Fundy, has the vessel been held out of service or failed to make its regularly-scheduled run because of mechanical defect, he said. In his turn Mr. Macdonald said he could not speak too highly of the ship's engineering staff and firemen, whose co-operation and good work helped establish the enviable service record.

Mr. Macdonald was born at sea in 1889, aboard the barque Nicosia, off Samaranga in the East Indies, the son of Captain Angus Macdonald and Minnie McDermott, of Saint John. He remained at sea for many years, sailing out of the port of Saint John, and later went into engineering. He was with the engineering staff of the Saint John sugar refinery before he joined the S.S. Princess Helene in September, 1930.

Mr. Macdonald married Regina C. Lawlor at Saint John in May, 1924, and a son, Edward J. Macdonald is also a Saint John man.

First prize winner in senior high was David Brooks; 2nd prize went to Joseph Potter, while Larry Smith won third prize.

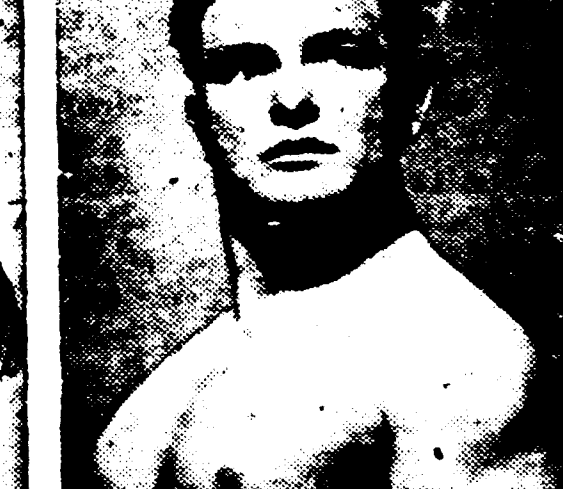
In junior high Irene Pittas won first prize, with second going to Bernice VanTassel. Third prize went to Della Merritt.

Local Firm To Be Assisted

Agreements have been entered into between two Nova Scotia companies, Weymouth Industries Limited and Cossor (Canada) Limited, and Industrial Estates Limited for the construction and leasing of factories. This was the subject of a joint announcement issued by Hon. E. A. Manson, Minister of Trade and Industry, and John B. Essery, general manager, Industrial Estates Limited.

The new plant for Weymouth Industries Limited, the announcement stated, is expected to be completed and in operation within the next two months. It will consist of a large prefabricated factory. Plans and specifications have been completed and construction of the new plant is now underway.

The agreement between Cossor (Canada) Ltd. and Industrial Estates, the announcement continued, calls for the erection of modern plant facilities on the Woodside Estate in Halifax county. The plant will be essentially a one-storey structure of 57,000 square feet of floor space. Building plans are substantially completed and a general contract for construction is expected to be let during the latter part of July.

On February 7 of this year, Weymouth Industries Limited suffered the loss of its existing plant through fire. At this time, the company was entering the heavy production period for the 1958 supply of pleasure craft to a large network of dealers throughout Canada and Eastern United States.

Approximately 100 employees were immediately thrown out of work. Weymouth Industries is the leading industry in its locality and, following the fire, the employees voluntarily gave their time for the re-construction of the Paint Shop and temporary quarters were set up.

The new plant will enable this company to get back into full production, provide the employees with steady work and benefit the whole community through the re-establishment of its major industry.

Though neither of the companies covered by the new agreements can be considered as new companies to Nova Scotia, the announcement pointed out that it is of equal importance to the economy of Nova Scotia to assist existing industry. The agreement with Weymouth Industries Limited will enable that company to continue its operations and that with Cossor will encourage continued expansion.

About This and That

Leaflets Three - Let It Be

If it has three leaves on each stem — avoid it. That's the best advice the Health League of Canada can give you, on how to protect yourself against poison-ivy. The innocent looking plant that runs wild along the roadside, up river banks, frequently around the best looking picnic spots and sometimes dangerously near summer cottages and playgrounds, can cause a great deal of summertime discomfort and even serious infection, warns the Health League of Canada.

If a word of warning is not sufficient and you find yourself in contact with poison-ivy or even with the smoke from burning poison-ivy then here is what to do.

1. Immediately wash the exposed parts of the body with laundry soap and warm water. Make it a thorough washing but do not scrub with a brush. Rinse several times.
2. Apply rubbing alcohol liberally to the exposed areas.
3. Next take a complete shower or tub bath.
4. Dress in clean clothing and see that clothing which may have been contaminated is cleaned either by laundering or with a cleaning solvent.
5. If a rash appears consult your doctor at once.

Teen-age Driving: How Can It Be Improved?

In the Maritimes and across Canada, statistics show that teen-age driving habits are cause for concern. Last year teenagers, in proportion to the number of teen-age drivers, had twice as many accidents as all other age groups, and they killed more people in their accidents. Even when fatalities were not involved, the statistics show that the teen-age accident caused twenty-five to fifty dollars more damage.

But, while insurance companies raise their rates and the courts hand out speeding fines, the positive programs of driver education in the Maritime Provinces can be counted on one hand.

The agencies directly concerned with traffic violations can list the probable causes of the teen-age accident rate and they can suggest remedies, but they differ somewhat on just how the education program can effectively be carried out.

The chief teen-age driving faults are (1) the tendency to take chances; (2) speeding; (3) over aggressiveness; (4) relative lack of experience. Officials sum all of these faults up under the heading "attitude," and the problem involved is a method whereby this "attitude" can be changed.

Traffic safety officials say a definite plan aimed at the teen-age group and able to reach the majority of potential teen-age drivers is vitally necessary. In some provinces traffic safety divisions do carry on a program of lectures and films in schools and Home and School groups, but this program is simply inadequate. By the use of communication media, more publicity is given to traffic safety on a broad base, but here the message is aimed at drivers as a whole, instead of a particular group. This sort of program is effective in reminding experienced drivers of road courtesy and driving safety, but it does not function as a teaching course to instill basic road safety.

The schools would seem to be an obvious place to start driver education but many school boards, already overburdened with expense in teaching the primary school subjects, are not inclined to look on the concept with favour.

Another alternative, and one which has found some favour, is the addition of a course in safe driving as an extra curricular subject. There too there are drawbacks, for the safe driving instruction will probably find itself in competition with the many other clubs and activities which vie for the teen-ager's after school hours.

Some Maritime schools have added safe-driving courses and have found them relatively inexpensive and very effective. In New Brunswick such courses are offered at high schools in Saint John, Moncton, Fredericton, Bathurst, Woodstock and St. Stephen, where they are sponsored by the Maritime Automobile Association, who also train the instructors.

In Nova Scotia only one course is known to exist at present, a course in safe driving instruction listed as an official extra curricular activity at the Digby Regional High School. This course is typical of many being given across Canada and, while it has not been operating long enough to gather statistics, it is felt that it is making a definite contribution to traffic safety.

At the Digby School, a car is provided by a local dealer free of charge. The instructor is a member of the school's teaching staff and teaches the course after school hours. The instructor received his training by attending a special course given in Toronto, under the auspices of the Ontario Safety League. The students are drawn from the school body on a voluntary basis and, since the course is held outside school hours, it interferes in no way with the regular school curriculum.

Traffic Safety officials cite driving courses as the best method of teaching the teen-agers proper driving habits, but they list the Teen-Age Driving Road-EO as the most effective means in use to focus attention on teen-age driving and the best corrective scheme to right wrong driving habits.

The Teen-Age Safe Driving Road-EO should be preceded by a plan to educate all teen-age drivers from the moment they first sit behind a steering wheel. If this could be done the saving in lives and in dollars and cents would be impressive. With a driver education plan reaching all teen-agers and the best of the youngsters vying in road-EO competition, a plan could evolve which would appeal to the very personality traits which are now causing accidents.

Salk Vaccine To Be Continued

Health Minister R. A. Donahoe has announced that the program of immunization against poliomyelitis will be continued this year and expanded to include adult age groups.

Since 1955 the provincial Department of Health has organized public clinics throughout Nova Scotia to carry out the school and pre-school immunization program, using the Salk vaccine. At present, it is estimated that close to 90 per cent of children of pre-school and school ages in the province have received at least one dose of anti-poliomyelitis vaccine.

In this period 599,000 doses of vaccine have been administered to 255,456 children. This represented an outlay of \$299,000 for vaccine, with the cost shared equally by the province and the federal government. During this period, emphasis was placed on pre-school and school age groups as well as expectant mothers. The program was administered by the public health department through divisional offices.

"This extensive program," said Mr. Donahoe, "would not have been possible without the assistance of Nova Scotia's general practitioners, nurses, and local voluntary groups, all of which have given liberally of their time and effort."

The prescribed schedule of vaccination is an initial dose as early as two months of age, followed by a second dose one month later. This should be followed by a reinforcing dose seven months after the second dose. The prescribed schedule for older age groups should follow the same order. Medical information available indicates this schedule gives a very high level of immunity and will prevent paralysis in practically all cases.

This year the March of Dimes Organization has volunteered to administer the vaccine to the adult age groups. The Department of Public Health will continue its extensive immunization program for pre-school and school groups, but will assist the March of Dimes Organization in getting the new program underway, by providing vaccine and the initial supplies of equipment free of charge.

"Nova Scotia parents," said Mr. Donahoe, "should not fail to take full advantage of the vital protection that Salk vaccine provides for their children. And now this proved protection against poliomyelitis is being made available to the adult population generally, on a free basis, because of this important new cooperative program worked out between the March of Dimes Organization and the provincial Department of Public Health."

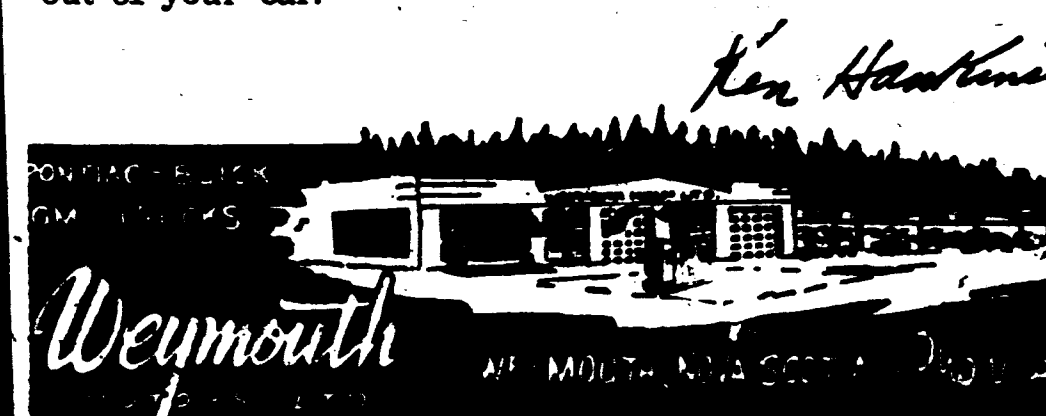

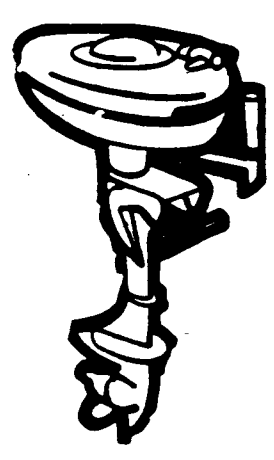

Chairman of the Bicentenary committee is the Honourable W. S. Kennedy Jones, Q.C., and vice-chairman is George H. Wilson Esq., M.L.A., both of whom were present on the Yarmouth-Boston trip. Among others on the bicentenary visit were directors, Hon. Richard A. Donahoe, Q.C., M.L.A.; Ronald M. Fielding, Esq., Q.C., M.L.A.; Michael McDonald, M.L.A.; C. L. Beazley, Esq., Q.C.; R. A. Simpson, Esq.; Dr. C. B. Ferguson, along with Mrs. Donahoe, Mrs. Fielding, Mrs. Simpson and Mrs. Ferguson, and executive director, W. J. MacLeod, Esq., and secretary Dan Wallace, Esq.

The party left Nova Scotia on Tuesday evening headed by The Honourable Robert L. Stanfield, Q.C., M.L.A., Premier of Nova Scotia, and Mrs. Stanfield, accompanied by Mayor John Hynes, of Boston, and his party of 25, who had come to Nova Scotia on the S.S. Yarmouth in the morning. Included in the parties were newspaper, radio and T.V. personnel.

The S.S. Yarmouth, adorned as a bride in her new attire of gleaming white, gladdened the hearts of many Nova Scotians and New Englanders as she resumed her three times a week sailing into their respective ports under command of Captain Paul Francoeur. The ship with full accommodation for four hundred passengers and licensed for considerably more, has been renovated to be luxurious and attractive on the interior as well as on the exterior.

New tiling on the floors, renewed upholstery on the furniture and other renovations gave an appearance of freshness and cleanliness throughout. Among the additions were 8 new cabins and a swimming pool. Every attention regarding the pleasure and comfort of the passengers and bicentennial party on the inaugural trip was given by the genial ship hostess, Miss Monte Devereau, Minneapolis, and by the vivacious and capable Miss Gerry O'Neil, Miami, manager of the advertising and sales promotion department of the Eastern Shipping Corporation. Pleasant entertainment of dancing, music and shows was under the convenship of Frank Dorman, Cruise Director.

Thousands were on hand to see the cruise liner as she sailed into Yarmouth on Tuesday morning and to witness the welcoming ceremonies. Among them and taking special part was Pipe Major Harold Sutherland, Westville, N. S., one of the world's greatest pipers, who is meeting all the tourist boats and planes at Yarmouth this summer. On hand to entertain the arriving visitors was Mrs. Auriel Mooney, Yarmouth, who gave several highland dance exhibitions in appropriate costume with Nova Scotia tartan. Mayor Robert Killam, councillors of Yarmouth, members of the Yarmouth Board of Trade, and officials from the Provincial government participated in the ceremonies.

Immediately after the dis-

embarkation ceremonies the visiting Bostonians and Nova Scotia friends were guests of the Premier at Lakeside Inn. The ladies were then entertained at an informal luncheon at the Inn while Mr. J. Leslie Fraser, executive director of the ship line, was host to a dinner for the men aboard the ship. Short addresses were given and Mayor Killam presented Mayor Hynes with a gift on behalf of the town of Yarmouth. Hon. E. A. Manson proposed a toast to the Queen and Mayor Hynes proposed a toast to the President of the United States. Capt. V. O. Pearson, port manager for the company, welcomed the visitors. The Premier personally thanked Mr. Fraser for his interest in re-establishing the steamship service between the New England and Nova Scotia port. The town of Yarmouth entertained the visitors on a tour to Wedgeport, where a reception was held at the Tuna Guides' Club House. This was followed by a tea at Braemar Lodge.

After a pleasant crossing the bicentennial party was given a warm welcome in Boston as they proceeded from the ship to the sound of the bagpipes on their way to the Sheraton Plaza Hotel. In the welcoming crowd were Mr. Beazley and Mr. MacLeod, who had spent several days in the city making final arrangements for the celebrations.

Courtesy calls were paid by Premier Stanfield on Governor Foster Furcolo at the Massachusetts State House and at the office of Mayor Hynes. Immediately following a reception and luncheon was given by the Province of Nova Scotia to commemorate the Bicentenary and in recognition of the residents of Massachusetts who were elected to serve in Canada's first parliament convened in Halifax on October 2, 1758. It was noted that the courses on the menu as far as possible included Nova Scotia products such as apple juice, smoked salmon, lobster and strawberry shortcake, and the Nova Scotia flag and the Stars and Stripes were much in evidence adding color to the occasion.

One of the highlights of the luncheon was a presentation of an illuminated scroll to Governor Furcolo by the Hon. G. I. Smith, Q.C., Provincial Secretary. The scroll presented on behalf of the government and people of Nova Scotia bore the signatures of Lieutenant Governor E. C. Plow and Premier Robert L. Stanfield. With the presentation was recalled the vital role played by New Englanders in the first assembly and a cordial invitation extended to the Governor to be present at the special session of the Legislature of Nova Scotia on October 2, 1958. From May 20, 1958, to October of the same year, the Governor was informed, had been set aside in Nova Scotia to be a time of solemn thanksgiving and rejoicing to mark the establishment of government institutions by the free will of the people governed.

In an address at the luncheon Premier Stanfield again pointed out that more than half the members of the first House of Assembly, in 1758, were New Englanders, including Joseph Gerrish, a native of Boston.

He emphasized the efforts of Jonathan Belcher, first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. He was the second son of Gov. Belcher of Massachusetts and a graduate of Harvard University. The Premier said: "If New Englanders had been averse to migrating to Nova Scotia while it was insecure and lacking in institutions, they were ready to come in substantial numbers once those impediments were removed. He said that between 1760 and 1768, New England planters and fishermen poured into the Province, to the number of about 8,000, in a substantial pre-Loyalist migration.

During and following the War of Independence, many persons in the colonies felt themselves bound by ties of loyalty which they could not break, and some 60,000 of them left this country, more than one-third coming to the Province of Nova Scotia."

Chairman of the luncheon program was The Honourable W. S. Kennedy Jones, of Liverpool, Nova Scotia, and speaker of the Legislative House. R. A. Simpson rendered a vocal selection, "A Song From Nova Scotia", by Clair Harris MacIntosh. A further activity for the day was a delightful reception given the Nova Scotia delegation by the Massachusetts Historical Society and the Colonial Society of Massachusetts at the Colonial Society headquarters, where they were received and shown through the old and historical building by the President, R. M. Gummere, Director Stephen Riley and Editor Walter M. Whitehill, who is also Secretary of the Massachusetts Historical Society.

One of the interesting features of the tour and of particular interest to the newspaper personnel was the visit on Thursday to the Boston Globe's new newspaper plant. The building, large and modern in every respect and occupied for scarcely more than one month, is on a 17½ acre site, completely landscaped and located adjacent to the Southeast Expressway. Following a tour of the plant, ably conducted by Dick Herbert, the Globe Treasurer, John I. Taylor was host at a splendid luncheon where the well laden table appeared in luxurious delicacy. The tour began at the photo engraving department after a welcome was extended by Mr. Taylor and J. A. Mutrie, manager of the resort and travel department, and continued through composing and press room and through each operation's department to the mailing room.

Speaking on the matter of financing the suggested increase in hospital services here, Mr. Bent stated provincial representatives who had met with local hospital authorities had made it plain they were not prepared to discuss the matter of methods of financing, particularly at the local level.
Tentative per bed cost, Mr. Bent said, had been estimated at \$10,000. Of this amount somewhat over 50% would be provided through provincial and federal grants. The cost of a hospital to meet the anticipated needs of the local area would be in the vicinity of \$650,000 or \$700,000, he said. This would mean the district share would be around \$300,000 for a fifty-

five bed addition to the present facilities. He pointed out one member of the municipal council at a discussion meeting on the hospital situation had urged that, in the light of experience in the building of schools, 25% should be added to any cost figures estimated for building.
The problem of financing the plan after construction and equipping of the new facilities seemed to be "under control," Mr. Bent said. The provincial sales tax would provide for hospitalization and a scheme involving a per capita assessment of \$1.00 per year to meet capital costs is to be submitted to the annual meeting of the Union of N. S. Municipalities in September, he said.
At present, he said, municipalities are paying out well over \$2,000,000 annually towards hospital operation, including capital costs. The suggested \$1.00 assessment would raise annually \$700,000 which would mean a saving of over 50%. Hospitals now are including capital costs in their operating figures, he said but under the federal Councillor Bent stressed that, although it appeared the financing of the hospital plan after needed facilities were provided seemed to be in hand, the local area was still faced with a two or three hundred thousand dollar building problem which would be its share of the sug-

gested addition to local facilities. As yet, he said, no workable method of financing this other than adding to our tax roll could be seen. Some municipalities faced with this problem are adopting a cautious attitude, Mr. Bent said. He quoted reports from a meeting on the subject held recently in Truro in which such an attitude was advocated. Yarmouth, on the other hand, he said, seems to be working towards provision of greatly increased facilities involving a heavy local expenditure.
Summing up, Mr. Bent said that it would appear from a study of the amount of monies being paid out at present by the public for medical and health services this would "comfortably pay for the plan" if increasing local hospital facilities.

properly channeled.
In his report Mr. Bent dealt with a number of other points discussed at meetings held in connection with the local hospital question. He said the matter of provision of nursing school facilities in connection with the local plan had been discussed. Dr. G. G. Simms of the provincial hospital planning board had advised the local group to think very carefully before attempting such a step as instituting a nurses' training plan, he said.
A thorough discussion of the matter by the council followed Mr. Bent's report. Consensus of the meeting was that the town should "proceed with caution" in the matter of dealing with proposals concerning increasing local hospital facilities.

Lobsters Eaten By Red-eyed Amphipod

The "one-eyed, one-horned flying purple people eater" of current popular song fame seems to have a near counterpart in marine life according to a recent bulletin of the Fisheries Research Board.

The marine creature is the "small, white, red-eyed amphipod" which, although it does not eat purple people does feast on lobsters which in their natural habitat are green. It is of interest to note the lobster after it is cooked turns red, not purple.

According to the May Bulletin, "Atlantic Progress Report" of the Fisheries Research Board, the small white red-eyed amphipod has been raising havoc around Grand Manan and St. Andrews. In 1932 these little creatures also devoured lobsters at Seal Cove.

Evidently the small white red-eyed amphipod is an elusive little creature for in 1954 when a report was prepared on their rapid consumption of lobsters at Seal Cove no specimens were available for identification of species. In 1957 Dr. Wilder who was conducting experiments on lobsters in St. Croix river found a plentiful supply and sent them to the biological station.

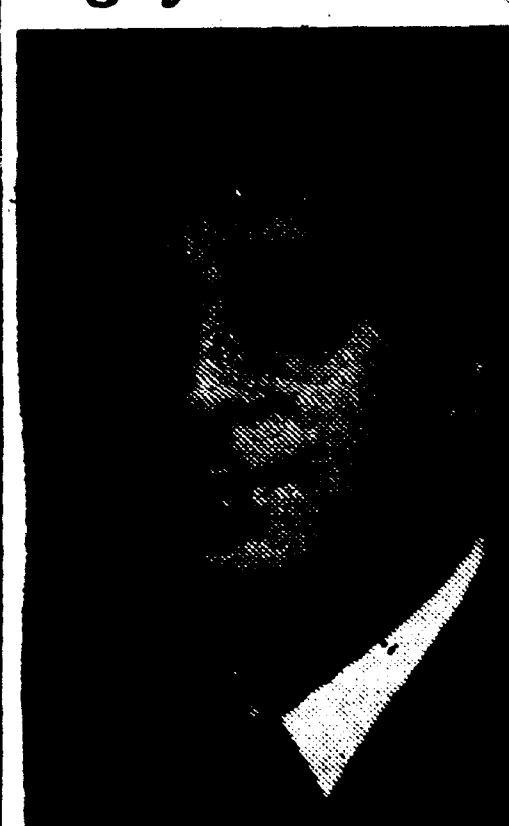
These amphipods have now been identified as Orchomenella pinguis. Despite their cumbersome scientific name and their evident red eyed appearance they have in ordinary parlance a very common name. They are called "sea fleas."

For one year he was the vice-president of the Maritime Baptist Convention, and at the present time serves as recording secretary of that body. Since going to Lancaster he also has been the chaplain of the Lancaster Branch No. 69 of the Canadian Legion.

Mr. Hartlin will leave Lancaster about the middle of October to take up his duties in Digby.

Hospital Finances Improve

A marked improvement in the financial position of the Digby General Hospital since its last annual meeting was noted by the president of the Hospital Board, F. C. Purdy, in his report at the annual meeting here.

Mr. Purdy stated outstanding accounts had been reduced from an amount near \$50,000 at the time of the last annual session to less than \$25,000 at present. The bank overdraft, which he said was in excess of \$10,000 at the time of the last annual meeting, had been reduced until it was nearly negligible as of March 31st.

High tribute was paid by Mr. Purdy in his report to Mrs. Grace E. Edwards who took over the job of hospital manager and secretary-treasurer last October. He stated Mrs. Edwards had carried out a very thorough job of collecting outstanding accounts and the present improved financial situation at the hospital was evidence of the good work she is doing.

Mr. Purdy also commented favourably on the work of hospital superintendent Mrs. Hilda Cossaboom. Under her direction and supervision the administration of patient care, nursing services and domestic staff has been most effective, he said.

The need for upward salary revisions for the nursing staff at the hospital in order to ensure the securing and retaining of a competent nursing staff was stressed by Mr. Purdy. He stated he had long felt something should be done to adjust the nurses' salary schedule at the hospital to provide payment on a basis of gross salaries rather than the present method employed. Married nurses living in the community do not get the advantage of board and living accommodation provided for staff nurses who "live in" at the nurses' residence and no salary compensation is given to equalize this.

The matter of salary revision is being considered by the finance committee of the hospital, Mr. Purdy reported. He stated it was hoped definite recommendations would be submitted to the board on this shortly.

In his report Mr. Purdy dwelt at some length with the matter of anticipated effects of the national hospital insurance scheme on the future of the Digby hospital and stated this year will prove to be a most memorable one for the hospital as decisions would have to be made that might have a tremendous long term effect on the hospital.

Two choices face the hospital board and the public of this area, he said. "Either the hospital must improve medical service to the area or revert to its standard of its early years of existence." He said it was his personal opinion the hospital should keep abreast of the times. "If we want the best in medical services for our area we must be prepared to pay for them," he said. The hospital insurance plan will mean better medical service but it will involve greater sacrifice to make this possible, he stated. Digby must either be prepared to spend more money to support a hospital in our own area or one in some other area where costs may be even greater, he concluded.

To Manage Fair

Richard Levy was named at a meeting of the Digby General Hospital Board on Monday night as manager pro tem for the Hospital Fair, which is held annually in August. Although it is felt by many that the third Wednesday in August will be the most likely date for the fair, no decisive date can be named until Mr. Levy has an opportunity to meet with the Ladies' Hospital Aid and other groups sponsoring booths.

At the present time William Troop, who has been Hospital Fair manager for several years, is vacationing in Quebec. Mr. Levy, it is understood, will carry on arrangements until Mr. Troop's return. Others on the committee are Vernon Bent, Elton Arnold, Leigh Jayne.

Present Financial Statement

According to the financial statements of the Digby General Hospital, presented at the annual meeting here, the hospital ended last year with a deficit of \$2,407.08.

In its revenue and expenditure account the hospital showed revenue from patients amounting to \$76,457.68. Grants received during the year amounted to \$7,360.25, bringing total revenue to \$83,817.93.

Expenditures for the year ending March 31st, 1958, amounted to \$87,700.18. Of this amount \$41,334.51 went for salaries and wages; \$12,645.97 for provisions and groceries and \$3,721.75 for household supplies. Operating loss for the year amounted to \$13,882.25. This compared with an operating loss of \$11,946.11 for the previous year.

Rev. Alan Sagar, of Clementsport, and Edward Twohig, of Digby, were named to the Board of Directors of the hospital to fill vacancies. Other members were re-elected. F. C. Purdy was re-elected president of the Board with Dr. L. F. Dolron as vice-president and Mrs. Grace Edwards as secretary-treasurer.

E. B. Richardson was named head of the finance committee with Dr. Dolron and W. L. Troupe as members. Mr. Richardson was also named chairman of the advisory committee with F. C. Purdy and R. W. Jayne.

Elton G. Arnold was named chairman of the building and grounds committee with V. L. Bent and Edward Twohig. Chairman of the house committee is W. L. Troupe with Richard Levy and Rev. A. Sagar as members. Dr. J. R. McCleave heads the X-ray committee and members elected are R. W. Jayne and E. Twohig. Ladies Aid representatives on the board are Mrs. B. Franklin, Mrs. Sydney Smith and Mrs. Victor Carozza.

Award Contracts For Hydro Development

Premier Robert L. Stanfield, as chairman of the Nova Scotia Power Commission, announced today that contracts totalling approximately \$1,500,000 have been awarded to two Maritime firms, the Diamond Construction Company and the Annapolis Valley Construction Company for the construction of hydro generating station works in the first of three stages in the development of the Sissiboo River in Digby County.

These works include two large dams, power houses, canals and head ponds. This first stage covers generating facilities at Sissiboo Falls and Weymouth Falls. Preliminary work has already been started and the contractors will commence work at the sites this month. These two stations are scheduled to go into service by late 1959.

The second stage will be the construction of the Riverdale development which is expected to be completed by late 1961.

Stage three consists of generating facilities at Sissiboo Grand Lake and Fourth Lake.

When completed in 1963, the combined facilities of the five separate generating stations will add 26,500 k.w. to the Nova Scotia Power Commission's western network, with an estimated additional total firm annual output of about 84 million k.w. hours and 31 million k.w. hours of secondary energy.

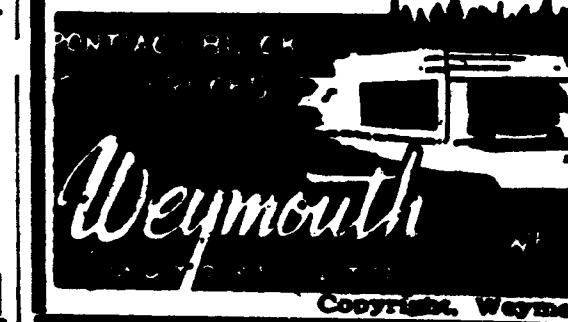

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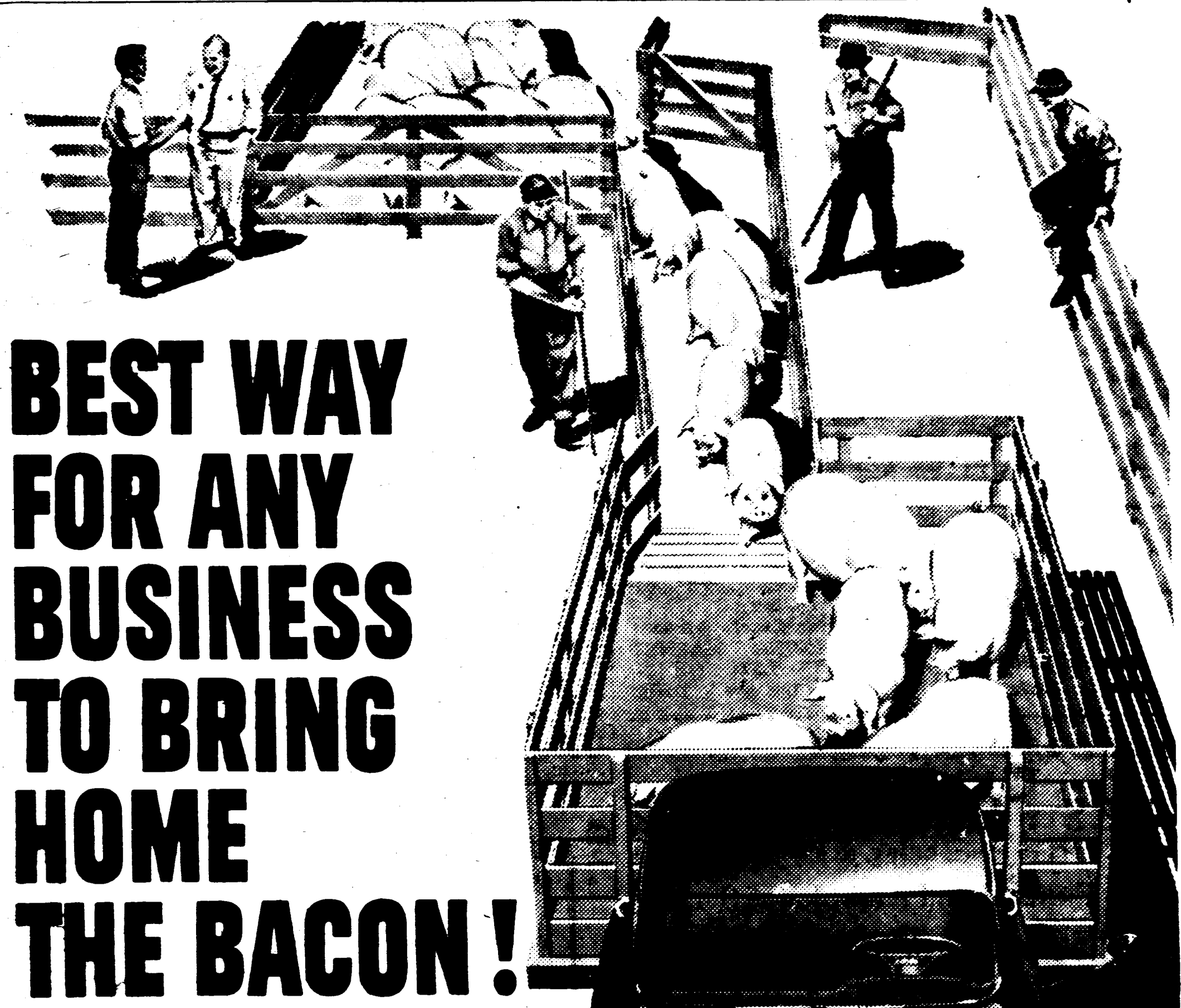

Scald $\frac{1}{4}$ c. milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ c. granulated sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt and $\frac{1}{4}$ c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure into a large bowl $\frac{1}{2}$ c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes. THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour; beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic.

Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9" wide and 24" long; loosen dough. Combine $\frac{1}{2}$ c. lightly-packed brown sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ c. liquid honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with $\frac{1}{4}$ c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased $8\frac{1}{2}$ " tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

PROCLAMATION

By The Honourable R. Clifford Levey
Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth hereby set aside on, from, and after the tenth day of July A.D., 1958, until the fifteenth day of September, A.D., 1958, unless this Proclamation is sooner revoked, every area of forest land as an area of forest land upon which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fishing, or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification, of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip with dates, and having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Voluntary Rangers, fire fighters and land surveyors:

Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars:

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

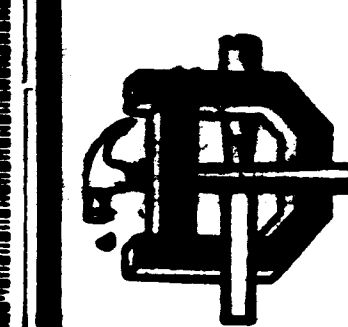

Obituary

James Felix Hillman

James Felix Hillman, well known former summer resort operator, municipal councillor, journalist and veterans' placement officer, passed away here Monday at the age of 73, after a lengthy illness.

Born and educated in Halifax, Mr. Hillman was a son of the late John Hillman and Mary Barnes of that city. During his younger years he was noted as an athlete and took an active part for many years in managing and coaching several well known Halifax hockey and baseball teams. During the first world war he served as a lieutenant with the 237th battalion, acting as recruiting officer.

Early in his business life he served as a news agent with the Dominion Atlantic Railway and later became manager of the Digby branch of one of the early grocery chains, Caldwell and Yerxa Ltd. For many years he acted as news correspondent for the Halifax Herald and covered many exciting stories in western Nova Scotia during his career.

He entered municipal politics in the early 1920's and served for several years as municipal councillor for the district of Culloden. During this time he played an active part in negotiations surrounding the development of hydro in Digby County. For many years he and his wife operated the beautiful Silver Glades hotel at Bay View as a summer resort.

For a number of years Mr. Hillman was manager of the Digby branch of the NSLC and, following the second world war, served as veterans' placement officer with the UIC, in Digby.

He is survived by his wife, the former Lola Turnbull, of Digby, two brothers, Andrew and William, of Halifax, and a sister, Mary (Mrs. Dr. Albert Fletcher), Halifax.

The remains rested at Jayne's Funeral Home, Digby, where rosary was held Wednesday evening at 8:30. The body was taken to St. Patrick's Church for requiem mass at 9 o'clock this morning. Interment was in the family lot at Bay View.

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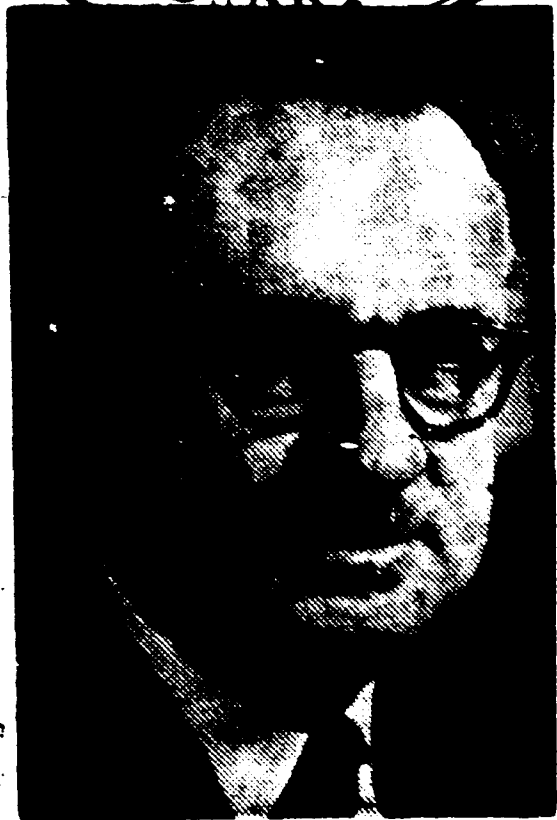
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NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATIVE LIBRARY
Ordered To Rest

After spending three days at the Victoria General Hospital for a check-up, the Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education and also of Welfare, was ordered by his physician to take one month of complete rest at his home. The examination showed that Mr. Leonard had in the past suffered a slight heart attack which had healed itself. For the past several months the minister has been under unusually heavy strain and his specialist ordered the rest without visitors. At the end of the month of recuperation Mr. Leonard expects to attend to his normal round of duties.

In the Department of Welfare Mr. Leonard has been busy with several changes in policy and new programs which have come into effect. The Social Assistance Act has now got underway whereby the Poor Relief Act was repealed and the Social Assistance Act substituted under which the Provincial and Federal authorities reimburse the municipal units for sixty-six and two-thirds percent of their poor relief costs providing they conform to certain standards set forth in the regulations supervised by the Department of Public Welfare. Mr. Leonard has this year attended several annual meetings of the Children's Aid Society which in the past has not been customary.

In the field of Education Mr. Leonard is endeavouring to bring some measure of control by the Department to the building program and has also been giving time and effort to teacher recruitment and teacher training problems and at the time of his illness was about to analyze the school curriculum. He was also working out a new school calendar for next year designed to get into the year more academic work than heretofore, particularly in the month of June, regulating the time of commencement of local examinations and providing for one uniform school closing all over the province.

There have been a series of amendments to the regulations and Education Act which yet have not been published, one of which is regarding the admission of a child to school when his or her 5th birthday falls on or before the 1st of October.

Accommodation For Visitors

Earle VanTassel, appointed by the Digby Princess Margaret Day Committee to take charge of room and board accommodation for visiting public over August 9th, reported at a meeting of that organization held at the town hall on Tuesday evening, Mr. VanTassel said he was exploring the possibilities of accommodation for the visitors in the establishments catering to the travelling public and also in private homes in Digby and the towns and villages near by. He drew attention to the advertisement appearing in The Digby Courier and said he had received some replies from interested people and was expecting that a great many more would open their homes if necessary to the visitors. Anticipating crowds above that which might be accommodated by the regular rooming and boarding houses, Mr. VanTassel is appealing to private homes to accommodate the visitors with room or board or both for this unusual and important occasion in the life of the town of Digby.

It is hoped fish dishes will be a feature on the supper menu along with other menu items typical of Digby. Scallop shells will be used for ash trays and be generally distributed in recognition of the scallop port of Digby.

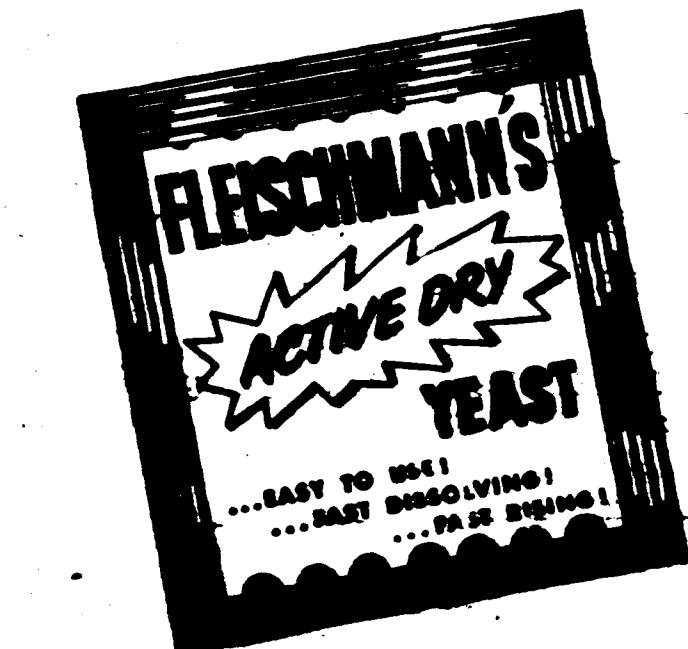

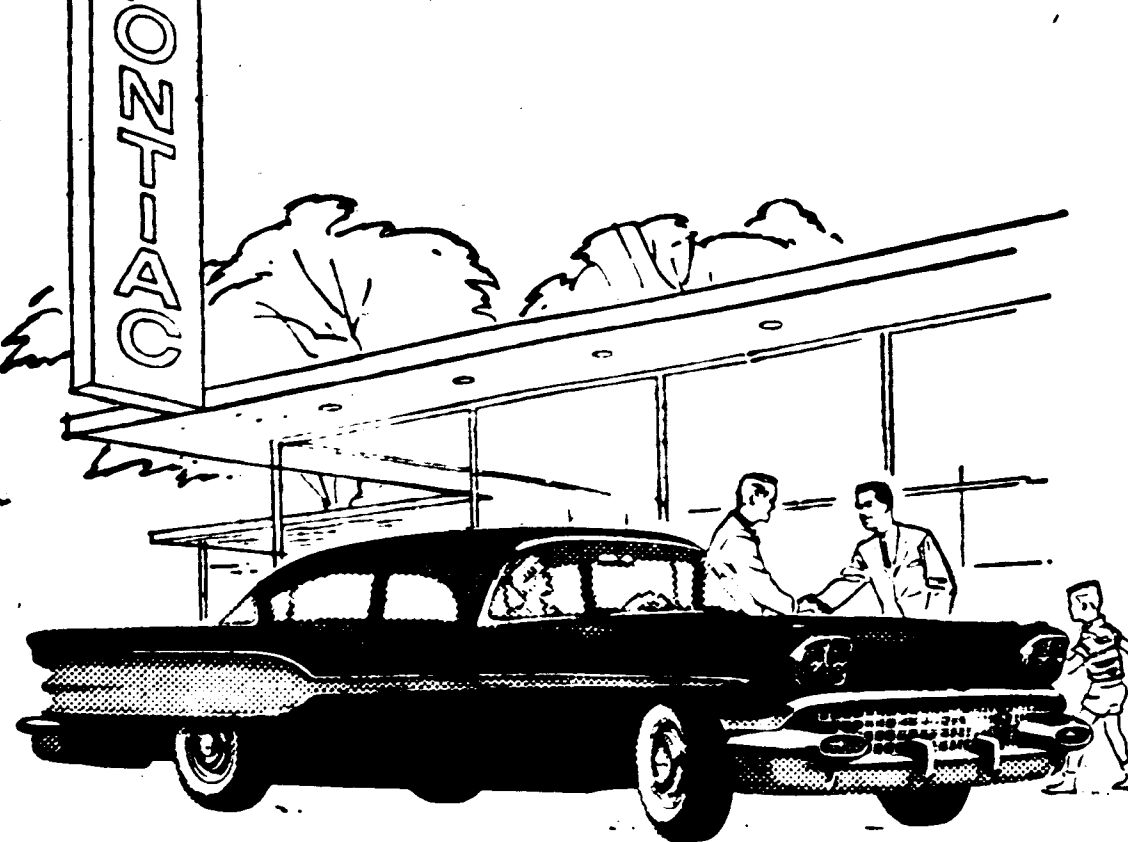

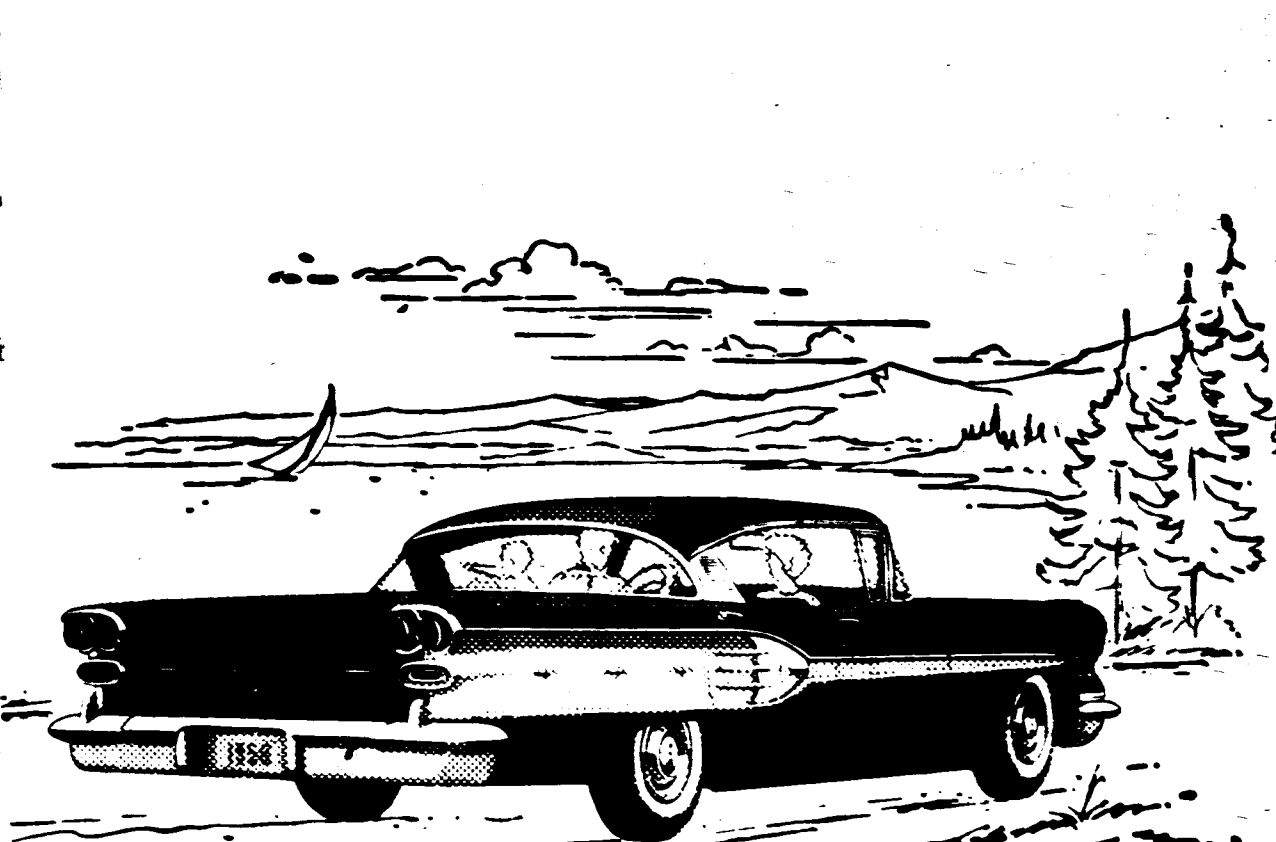

Offer Bonds

Local residents who hold Victory Bonds worth \$50 or more have an opportunity now to exchange their holdings for units of the new Canada Conversion Loan of 1938 announced Monday in Parliament. It is estimated that more than 2,000,000 Canadians hold one or more of the bonds the Government now offers to convert.

Copies of the prospectus and further information about the Conversion Loan may be secured at local banks or from any investment dealer, trust or loan company.

Described as the largest financing undertaking in Canadian history, the Canada Conversion Loan was launched on Monday.

Speaking directly to the people of Canada by T.V., Mr. Diefenbaker and Mr. Fleming stressed the importance of the loan in re-organizing the government debt as a contribution to financial stability in the country and an impetus to further economic expansion.

Under the terms of the Canada Conversion Loan, anyone holding Victory Bonds worth \$50 or more may exchange them. In return, they will receive bonds bearing a higher rate of interest, and also an immediate cash settlement. This cash adjustment payment is expected to add to investor interest in the new bonds and constitutes a premium for a lengthening of term.

Any Victory Bond — all of which bear interest at 3% — may be exchanged for new 4½% 25-year bonds. Three shorter maturities are available, at lower interest rates.

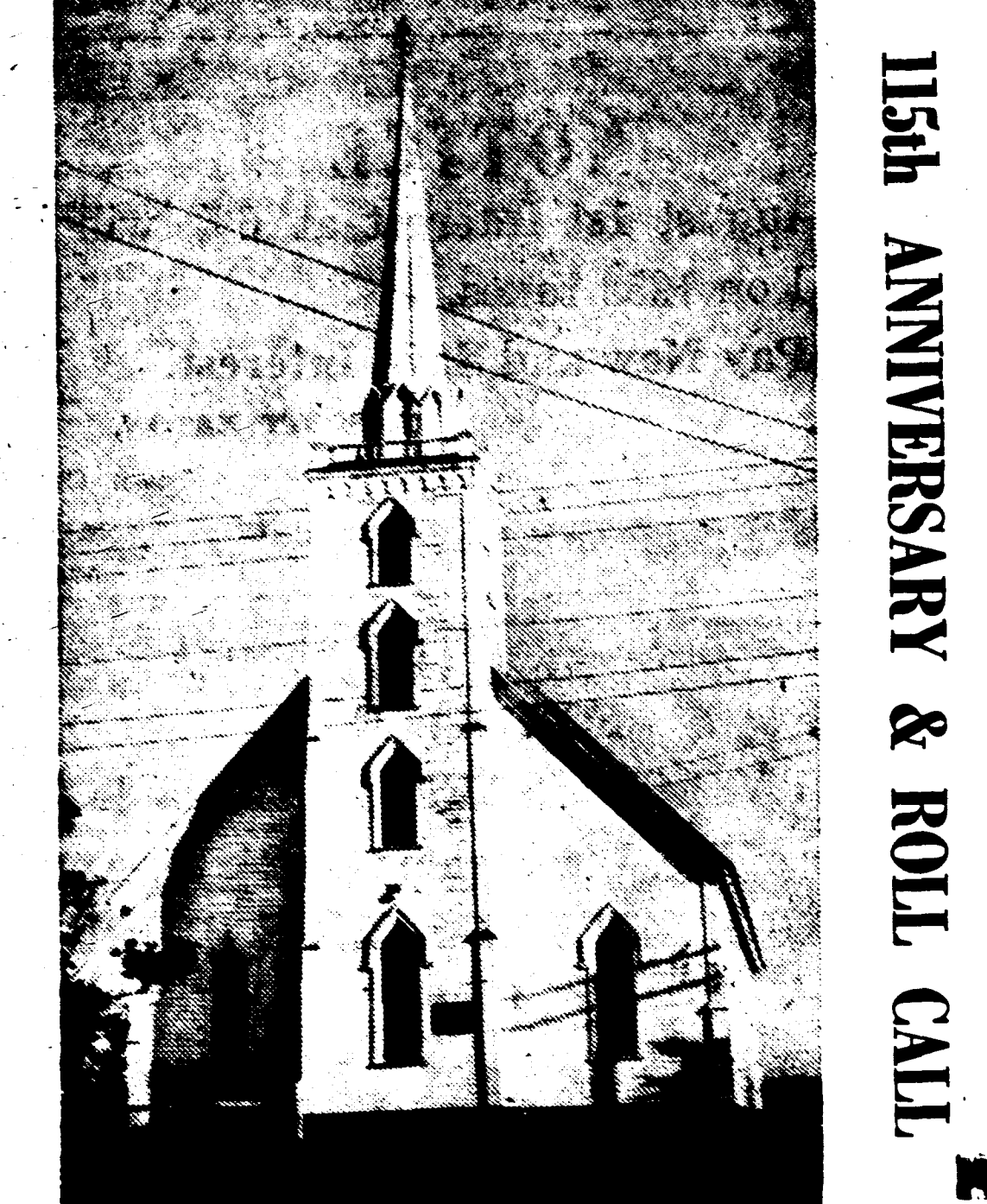

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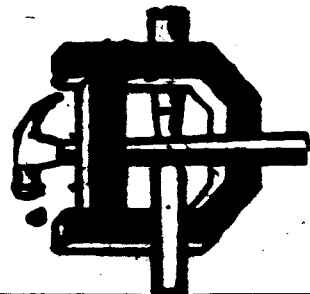

Discuss Plans For
Entertainment

A meeting to finalize plans for catering for and entertaining the large crowds of people expected in Digby for the visit to this community of Princess Margaret on August 9th was held at the Town Hall Tuesday evening.

According to a report given by Earl VanTassel two large parking lots within the town limits have been secured. These together with privately operated parking at the outskirts of the town are expected to handle the influx of cars expected.

A. Reg. Turnbull reporting on catering, stated food and soft drink canteens would be operated in a number of locations in the town. Ralph Wright, reporting on entertainment plans, stated the entertainment program would get underway Friday evening, August 8th when a Dance and Bingo would be held at the Forum. On the day of the Royal visit a Horse and Ox Pull would be held at 10 o'clock in the morning on the Cannon Banks.

Thoughts And
Habits Of
Digbyites

How do the people of Digby like living here? Do they hope to stay or would they rather be elsewhere? According to a survey made last summer, Digby is "tops" with most of its residents. Nearly everyone questioned says it is a good place to live, and three-fourths would rather be here than anywhere else. Although nearly everyone thinks more industry would help the town, almost two-thirds feel that financially, Digby will hold its own or improve in the future.

As many readers of this article may recall, questions of this sort were asked in the Cornell Community Agency Survey conducted here last summer. On the average, one adult from every four homes, chosen at random, was interviewed, for a total of nearly two hundred. The survey was part of a long-term research program which is not yet completed. Some of the results are now available and are presented here for their general interest.

While nearly a third of the respondents hope for any kind of industry, just a third state a preference for that run and sponsored locally. Slightly more favor branches of national corporations, often, they said, because of their large backlog of capital and trained personnel. The most common reason given in favor of local industry was the likelihood that it would be more beneficial to the community as a whole.

In reply to the question on labor unions almost half the respondents favor such in general giving as their reason that they are beneficial to the worker.

How about the health of the people who live here? Three-fourths reported good or excellent health during the year pre-

An appeal is made to the public at this time in connection with the visit of Princess Margaret to Digby on August 9th regarding fire hazards. Extreme care should be taken at this time in throwing matches, cigarette butts and other flammable materials around as at this time of year with dry weather and dry grass and the fact that there will be a great many people on the streets means that the fire hazard will be very high. In the event of a fire the public is asked to give full cooperation so that fire equipment can move freely. For the information of the people there will be additional fire equipment stationed in town at different points and it is important that this equipment be kept clear for an emergency should one arise. These stations will be located as follows: Headquarters will be set up at the fire station at first avenue and will handle calls north from the station and the main thoroughfare which will include Montague Row, Water St., and Birch Street. No. 1 Fire Station will be situated at the Fire Service Station at the corner of Queen Street and Warwick Street and will service calls from St. George Street north to Prince William Street from King St. to and including 1st Ave. No. 3 Fire Station will be situated at MacDonald Motors and will service St. Mary's Street north to Prince William St. and Victoria St. East to and including King St.

Those people in town leaving their homes or other places are asked to check their stoves and equipment and make sure that everything is turned off. Any one requiring information regarding fire protection can do so by calling headquarters, phone 77 where men will be on duty all day and during the evening of August 9th.

The regular meeting of the department will be held Wednesday, Aug. 6th, at 8 p.m. This will be an important meeting when a final check will be made as to each man's duties for August 9th, every member is asked to attend as this will make the plan easier to control.

Final details concerning the official program for the visit of H.R.H. Princess Margaret to Digby on August 9th have been released by His Worship Mayor Gordon R. Turnbull of Digby.

Mayor Turnbull stated the Princess is scheduled to arrive at Larche's field on the outskirts of Digby by helicopter at 4:15 p.m. on August 9th. Following the landing Mayor and Mrs. Turnbull will be presented to the Princess by Hon. George C. Nowlan, Minister of Revenue and federal member for Digby-Annapolis-Kings.

After the presentation at the field Mayor and Mrs. Turnbull will leave for the bandstand in Digby where official welcoming ceremonies are scheduled to take place.

The Princess, accompanied by Hon. Mr. Nowlan, will head a motorcade into town. In the second car will be her Lady-in-waiting and Mrs. Nowlan and other cars will carry other members of the Royal party.

At the bandstand an address of welcome will be delivered by the Mayor to Her Royal Highness. A gift, on behalf of the town of Digby and municipalities of Digby and Clare, will be presented to the Princess by the Mayor who will receive it from Miss Avril Gozma, Digby's Scallop Queen. The gift will be a necklace and earring set, fashioned of silver and Digby county agate and made by the Digby Crafts group. A bouquet will also be presented to Princess Margaret by Miss Gail Hersey, Digby Firemen's Ice Carnival Princess.

Following the address and presentations, members of the Digby town council and Digby municipal council and their wives will be presented to Her Royal Highness. Members of the Digby Branch Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., will form an honour guard near the bandstand. Members of the Digby Girl Guide troop will also be on parade near the bandstand. It is expected the Princess may inspect these two groups.

About This and That

A Highway Can Hypnotize You!

This is the time for long vacation trips on Canada's highways, many of them modern, four-way, ribbon-smooth, throughways, incredibly easy to drive on. And that, warns the Canadian Highway Safety Conference, is precisely the danger.

Driving a car along one of the modern super-highways can seem so safe and easy that it becomes a tranquillizer and subtly lulls the motorist away from concentration on his driving to a perilous condition in which he gives little thought to what he is doing. There are two major dangers here: first, he falls asleep without warning; second, he reacts too slowly in emergencies.

The result can be death, not only to him but to everyone concerned.

The Conference offers these suggestions when driving a super-highway.

Before leaving on a long trip, get plenty of sleep. Wear clothing that is comfortable and loose. Stop every hour or so and get out and walk around. Carry a thermos of coffee in the car. Vary the car speed. Tune the radio to lively music. Now and then, when it's safe, glance at the car's hood or the decoration over the radiator to change your eye's focus. Ask one of the passengers in the car to watch the speedometer; an inattentive driver runs the speed to a dangerous level without noticing it.

Driving at night is even more hazardous. Run the windshield wipers at intervals, keep switching the light beam from low to high to low. Turn dash lights off or almost off.

Drivers realizing they are becoming affected by "highway hypnosis" should fight it every way. Sing, smoke, beat a rhythm with their feet, talk to passengers, even get into an argument (but don't get too intense and forget driving!). Best and safest of all — stop!

Be always aware, cautions CHSC, that everyone, no matter how assured he might be of his own ability to drive, can become hypnotized by the highway on a long, uneventful trip.

Much Awake

Bear River town, partly snuggled down beneath the hills, is by no means a "sleepy hollow." One of the most successful Cherry Carnivals has just been staged. In a few weeks the Digby County Exhibition will be held in the "Switzerland of Nova Scotia" and all one needs to do is to attend that annual affair to see the acclaim which comes to the county mostly through the efforts of exhibitors and management from the town where the event takes place. Bear River's many organizations are actively engaged in the welfare of the community. Church, school and society take their rightful and respective places in the life of the community in accordance with the size of the town.

One of the most recent projects in mind for the citizens of Bear River is the proposed and ambitious plan for a swimming pool and community centre. Bear River with a river running through its centre is a case of "Water, water all around and no place to swim." A few civic minded people realized the need of this type of recreation for Bear River's youth and have taken the lead in proposing such a project. Others have caught up the enthusiasm including the Bear River Road Community Club, and real interest is now being displayed by the citizens.

Bear River is partly snuggled under the hills in geographical position only. Its citizens are very much awake. We congratulate them on their swimming pool endeavour.

Already Many Bonds Converted

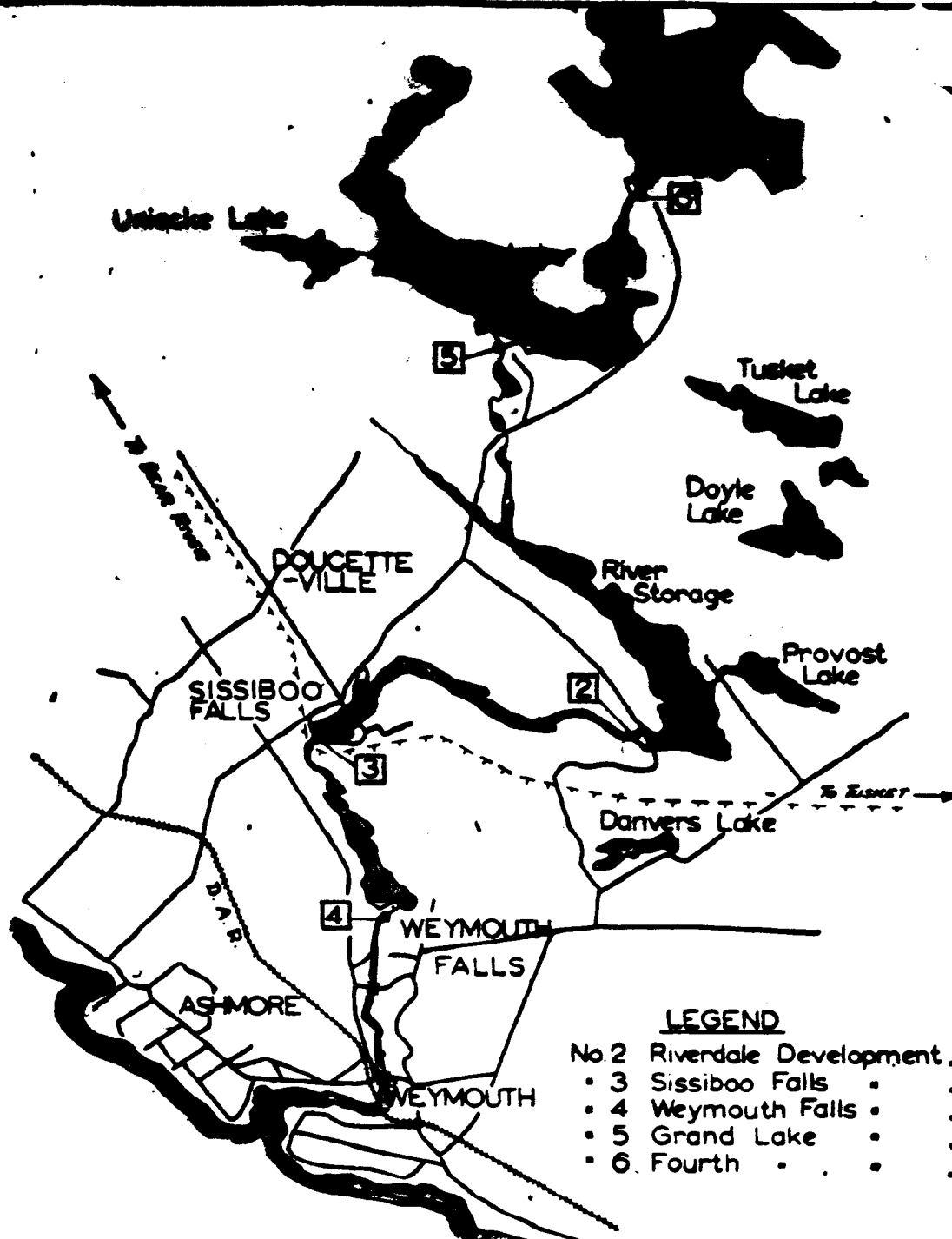

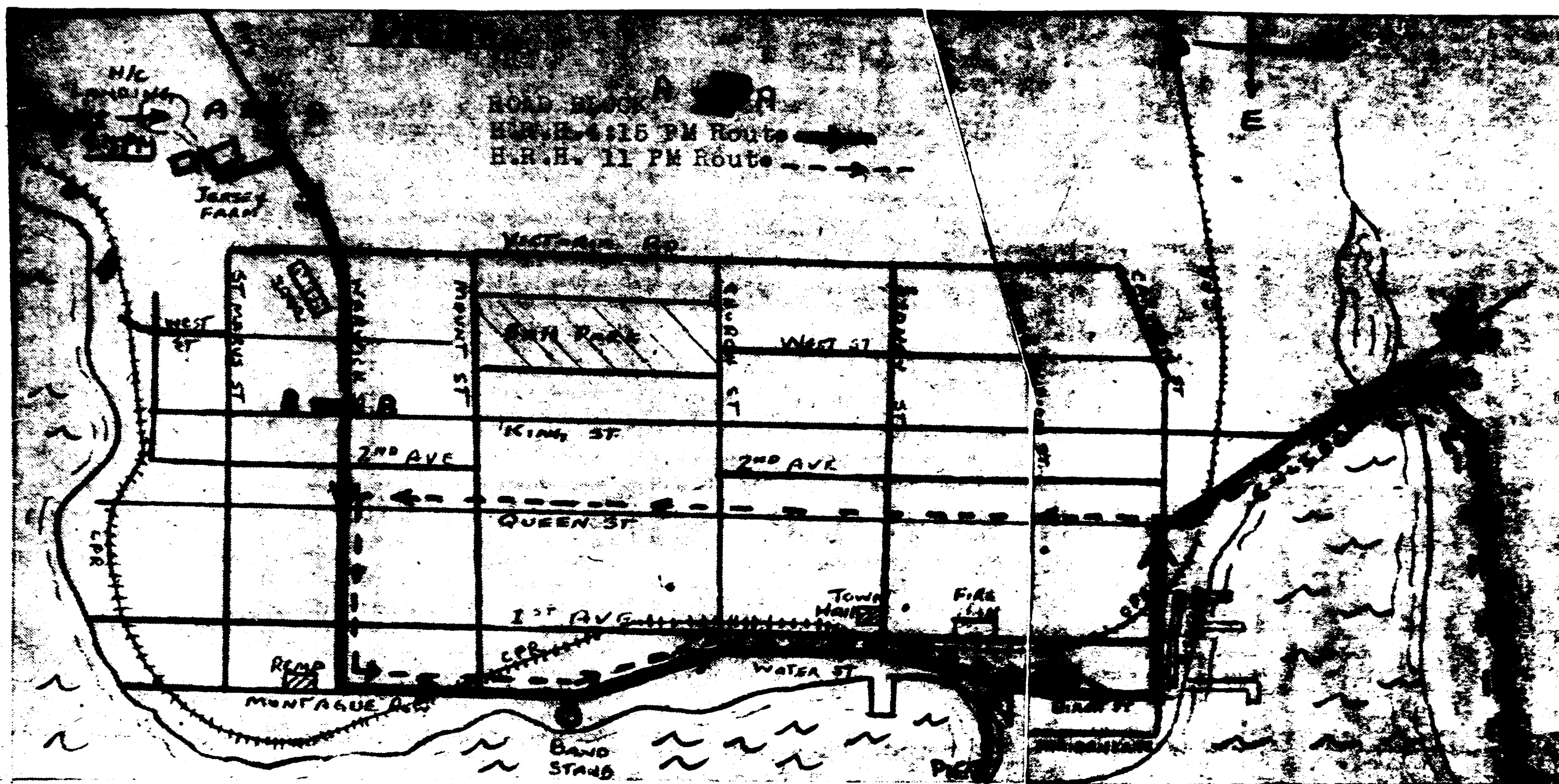

Traffic Controls Set Up For Royal Visit



Police Chief Webster Dunn, who is working with the RCMP and naval personnel in the handling of traffic in Digby and area on the occasion of the visit of H.R.H. Princess Margaret on August 9th, has issued a call for the fullest cooperation of the public during the Royal Visit in order that traffic may be handled as smoothly as possible. Traffic control on the occasion of the Royal Visit will be according to the directions below. The routes are marked on the map appearing above. On August 9th all traffic entering Digby from Route 1 after 12.30 p.m. is to enter by the Bay Road. There will be no parking on 1615 route (marked on map

above) at any time after 12.30 p.m. on August 9th. All traffic will be required to park on the right hand side of the streets with vehicles facing north and east. On leaving town traffic is to leave by the most direct route to highway No. 17 and Carleton Street then west on the Digby Neck Road. On the day of the Royal Visit the 1615 route marked on the map above will be closed to all traffic after 2.30 p.m. This applies to all sections except that between Bay Road and King Street. After 3.30 p.m. on August 9th all traffic will be stopped (excepting guests and employees of the Digby Pines Hotel) by

Road Block "C" shown on the map above. Supervised parking will be allowed on areas south of the Digby Pines road (the old Indian camp grounds). There will be no parking at all allowed on the road or street leading to the Pines Hotel. All traffic on route 1615 will be stopped at 3.30 p.m. by Road Blocks "A", "B" and "D" (shown on map above). There is to be no parking or traffic on route 2300 on the evening of the Royal Visit between 10 p.m. and 11.30 p.m. This route, marked on the map above, is Queen Street. Police Chief Dunn states details concerning traffic have been worked out carefully to

provide for the most effective means of handling the heavy flow of traffic expected in Digby on the occasion of the Royal Visit. All the details and arrangements, however, depend for their fullest success on the cooperation of the public. The Chief says. He urges all car owners to cooperate fully in the observance of the traffic regulations. Traffic officers will be on duty at all intersections during the day to assist with directing and routing the traffic. An appeal has also been issued by the police chief to all car owners resident in Digby. Mr. Dunn asks that these people leave their cars at home during the day and evening of

the Royal Visit. If they have extra parking space in the yards or driveways they are also asked to contact out-of-town friends who may be coming to Digby for the visit of the Princess and invite them to park their cars in these yards or driveways. The importance of having all traffic which leaves Digby on the day of the Royal Visit travel Route 17 (the Digby Neck Highway) is stressed by the Chief. ceeding the survey, while the remaining fourth considered their health fair or poor. Well over half the residents are quite interested in community affairs, but not all of them feel that their opinions carry much weight. About half take an active part in town affairs to the extent of belonging to organizations and a quarter of those who don't belong to any have been members in the

past. Almost everyone says that the clubs and organizations are doing at least a fairly good job, and many say, a very good job. The most common "good" mentioned is working with young people, mainly in recreation. A large number of people also cited the work that is done for anyone needing help. Slightly over half the respondents thought Digby has about the same number of organizations and clubs as similar towns, and almost as many said the num-

ber was about right. Of the ones who think there are too many, a common explanation was the large amount of time that organized work demands. The most frequent reason given by those who think there are too few is that more activities are needed for youth and children. Three-fourths of the people answering the questions belong to a church here, and of the ones who don't belong, nearly all have a preference and most of these do attend a church. Half the respondents go to church every or nearly every Sunday, and a tenth never go. More than 70 percent of the respondents had started high school and nearly half of these had graduated. And, according to the survey education is on the increase. Comparisons with information collected six years ago show that more of the people in the recent survey had started school and more had stayed there longer.

Where do the people of Digby come from? Nearly a fourth have lived here all their lives, and more than a half have lived here 20 years or more. Of all who have moved here at any time, most have come from other parts of Nova Scotia; a much smaller number have come from other Maritime Provinces and an equal number from the British Isles. A very few have come from other parts of Canada, and equally few from the U.S. About a tenth of all people questioned had lived here less than two years and altogether, only a fourth have been here less than ten years. How about the world outside contact? People seem to keep up on the news. Nearly

CRUSTY DINNER ROLLS

Measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add 1/4 c. lukewarm water and 1 tsp. salt. Add, all at once, 3 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour and work in with the hands; work in 3 tbs. soft shortening. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover with a damp cloth and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough in bowl, fold over, cover and again let rise until doubled in bulk. Turn out on lightly-floured board and divide into 2 equal portions; shape each portion into a long roll about 1 1/2" in diameter. Cover with a damp cloth and let rest 15 mins. Using a floured sharp knife, cut dough into 2" lengths and place, well apart, on ungreased cookie sheets. Sprinkle rolls with cornmeal and let rise, uncovered, for 1/2 hour. Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

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Noted Writer Dies

A funeral service was held Friday at 1 p.m. in St. George's Anglican Church, St. Anne de Bellevue, for Frederick William Wallace, novelist, historian, editor and authority on fisheries. He was 71.

He is survived by his wife, the former Laurie Lucrécia Stinson, two stepchildren, Dora-Jean and uaker Stinson; two sisters, Mrs. T. Hood, Bear River, N. S., and Mrs. Francis Boyle, Montreal, and a brother, William, of Montreal.

A resident of St. Anne de Bellevue for many years, Captain Wallace was founder and, until his retirement, editor of the "Canadian Fisherman," published by National Business Publications Ltd., of which he was a vice-president and director.

Born in Glasgow, Scotland, Capt. Wallace went to Montreal as a young man and soon established himself as a writer and authority on Canadian shipping and commercial fisheries. In 1913 he wrote his first novel, "Blue Water," which provided Norma Shearer with her first starring role in motion pictures. A subsequent novel, "Captain Salvation," was also made into a film in the late twenties.

Other novels, including "The Shack Locker," "Tea From China," "The Viking Blood," and "Salt Seas and Sailormen," were based on observations gained during numerous trips to sea.

During World War I, Capt. Wallace was master of a "Q-boat" until called to Ottawa from sea duty to take charge, as a fisheries authority, of the fish section of the Canada Food Board. In 1926, he was appointed a member of the advisory board of the U.S. Bureau of Fisheries.

Capt. Wallace was one of the founders and a past president of the Canadian Fisheries Association and was honorary president of its successor, the Fisheries Council of Canada. He had also been executive vice-president of the U.S. Fisheries Association.

Widely known as a marine historian, he specialized in compiling what have since become standard reference works of maritime shipbuilding, recording the era when Canadian sailing vessels were noted around the world for their speed and grace. These works included "Wooden Ships and Iron Men," "In the Wake of the Windships," "Record of Canadian Shipping," and "Under Sail in the Last of the Clippers." His autobiography, "Roving Fisherman," was published in 1955.

Capt. Wallace was an honorary life member of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto; founder, past commodore and life member of the Hudson Yacht Club, a member of the St. Anne's Curling Club and a life member, AF & AM Lodge of Antiquity, Montreal.

The Iron Man of Wooden Ships

Frederick William Wallace was a man of the sea of many talents. Had he been older, he probably would have been one of those ship masters of whom he loved to write: the men of iron who sped their clippers in the China trade. As it was, he was once a sailor in steam who preferred the schooner rigs of the fishing fleets, even though most of his life actually was spent at a desk as an executive and writer.

From master of a Q-boat in the Great War to the Canadian Food Board, to Herbert Hoover's Bureau of Fisheries in the U.S., to the founding of the Canadian Fisheries Association and executive work with the U.S. Fisheries Association—these are but a rough outline of his activities. He was, in addition, vice-president of a publishing firm, editor of a fisheries trade paper and a life member of at least four social and fraternal organizations.

Along the East Coast his "Wooden Ships and Iron Men" is still a classic. It was a Canadian best seller to boot. That was probably the best known of his many volumes, at least two of which were used for film purposes. But half a dozen of his books are in every reference library with a marine section, and they are to be found as well on the shelves of nearly all who love the sea as it used to be. His death, at 71, ends an important chapter in the compilation of the Canadian story.

Haying Machinery

A recent innovation known as the Hay Bale Stooker is a useful piece of haying equipment for smaller farms.

This machine consists of a platform pulled behind the hay baler and it leaves stooks of six bales. A tractor equipped with a stook loader can lift all six bales and load them on a wagon. There are also several types of field bale loaders that will pick up individual bales.

Although two men are needed to bale and stook the crop, A. I. Magee of the Central Experimental Farm points out that the same two men can later pick up the bales and store them. This, he says, reduces the size of the crew needed for the overall haying operation.

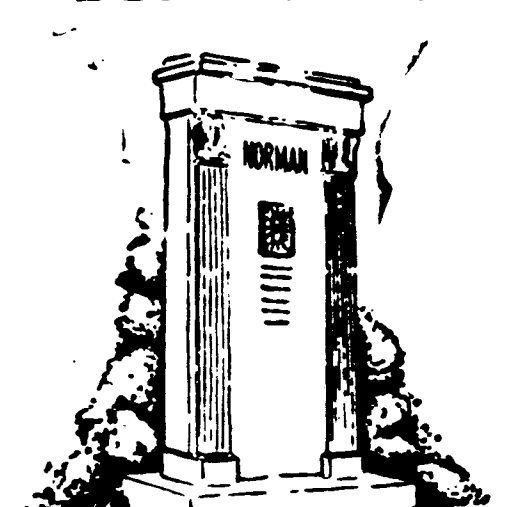

The new products have made car cleaning easier, and there are many little tricks that help, too.

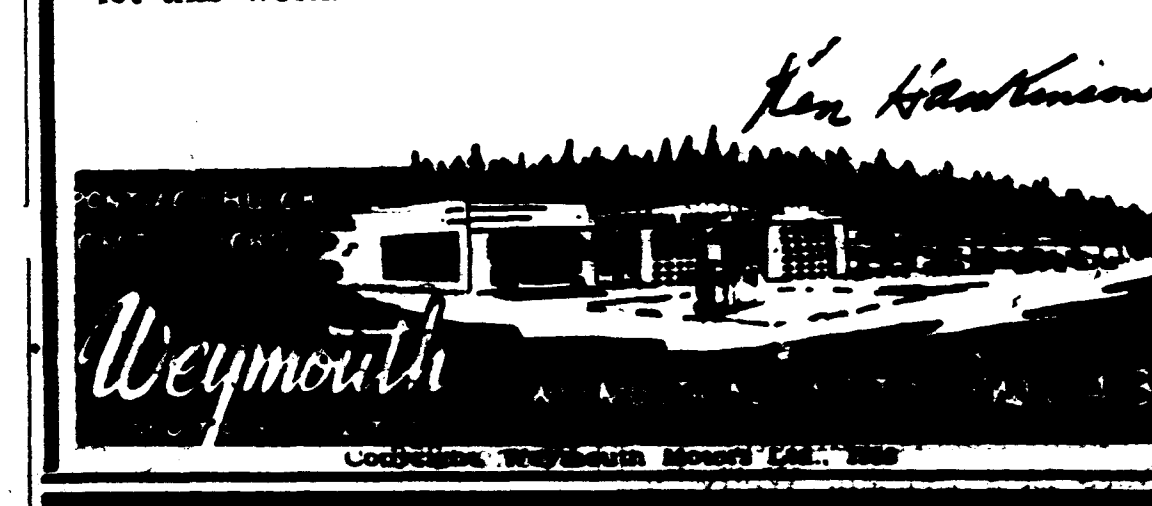

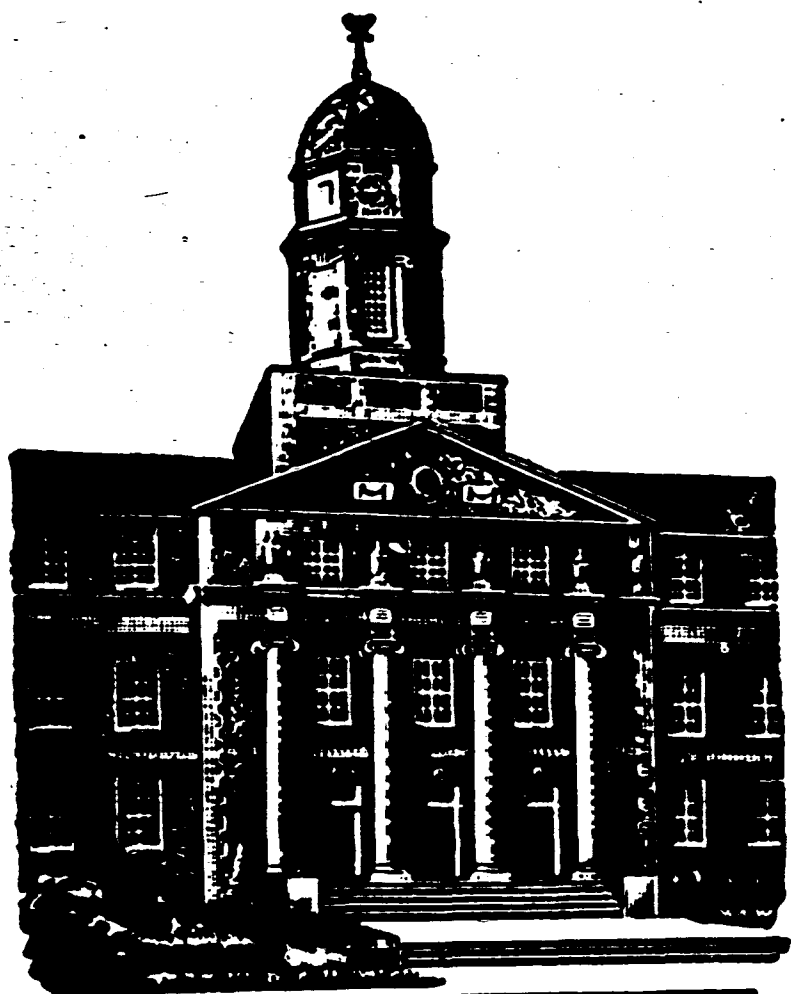

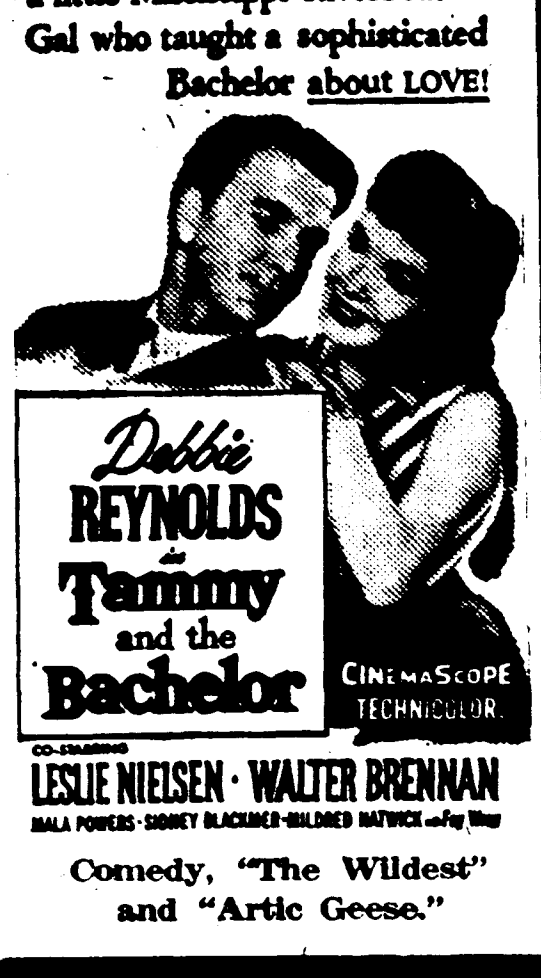

Previous Royal Visit Recalled

The visit of H.R.H. Princess Margaret to Digby Saturday will bring back memories to many of Digby's elder citizens of the last visit of Royalty to this community which occurred on August 17th in 1912.

On that occasion Digby was honoured by the visit of their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and their daughter, Princess Patricia.

The Royal party arrived in Digby by train from Annapolis Royal at three o'clock. They were joined on the Royal train at Annapolis by Clarence Jameson who was federal member of parliament for this constituency.

At Digby when the Royal train pulled in to the station a 21 gun salute boomed out over the town from the school house. The salute was fired by the local company of field artillery under command of Captain Duncan McKay. A guard of honour, supplied by the RCGA under command of Captain Heward, was inspected at the station and the national anthem was played by the RCR band.

After the inspection at the station the Royal party and local dignitaries went by motorcade to the town pavilion opposite the Manhattan Hotel (the site of Saturday's official welcome for Princess Margaret) where the welcoming ceremonies were carried out.

At the pavilion an address of welcome was read by Mayor H. B. Short and replied to by H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught. Members of the town council and other civic dignitaries and leading citizens were then presented to their Royal Highnesses. Bouquets were presented to the Duchess and Princess by Master Edgar Jones, son of H. E. Jones, and Miss Marjorie Jones, daughter of Councillor Jones.

After the ceremonies a reception was held for the Royal party. In attendance were Mayor and Mrs. Short, Councillors M. C. Denton, C. Jordan, H. T. Warne, A. A. Shortliffe, T. E. G. Lynch and Mrs. Lynch, Town Clerk and Mrs. H. Denison, Magistrate and Mrs. Havey, H. H. Marshall, MPP, and Mrs. Marshall, Mr. and Mrs. Jameson, Mrs. J. H. Jameson, the Misses Jameson, Dr. and Mrs. H. E. Jones, Warden Purdy, J. A. Grierson, Sheriff H. A. P. Smith, County Clerk H. B. Stewart, Rev. William Driffield, Rev. Mr. Daniel, Rev. and Mrs. Roy.

At the close of the reception the Duke and Duchess and their daughter were taken on a drive about the town. They later boarded HMCS Earl Grey for the trip to Saint John. The Royal party left Digby at 4:15 p.m.

The visit of the Duke and Duchess and Princess Patricia to Digby coincided with the holding of the western Nova Scotia Fishermen's Regatta, an important annual event in those days, in this community. Newspapers of the day estimated the crowds in Digby numbered ten thousand on the occasion of the Royal visit in 1912.

To Mark 161st Anniversary

The 161st anniversary of the consecration of the old Loyalist church on the hill at Clementsport will be marked Sunday afternoon at three o'clock with a memorial service.

Built in 1784 by the Loyalist settlers of Clementsport shortly after arriving in the area, the church was consecrated by Bishop Inglis, first Bishop of Nova Scotia. It contains many historic relics of the early days of settlement in this province.

Speaker at the memorial service on Sunday will be the Rt. Rev. William Wallace Davis, B.A., B.D., D.D., Bishop Co-adjutor of the diocese of Nova Scotia. Clergy taking part in the service will include the Rector, Rev. Alan Sagar; Rev. H. Y. MacLean, Rural Dean and Rector of Digby; Commander William McCully, B.D., R.C.N.; Rev. Andrew Pitcairn, Rector Musquodoboit Harbour. Visitors in the procession will include Rev. B. Shannon, chaplain H. M. C. S. Cornwallis, and Victor Cardoza, Lay Reader. Crucifer will be Russell Webb and Mrs. William Spurr will be organist. During the service the old Dutch hymn of thanksgiving will be sung partly in its original Dutch and in English.

A cordial invitation has been issued by the Rector to attend the service which will provide a fitting close to ceremonies marking the visit of Princess Margaret to this area on Saturday and Sunday.

Boer War Vet In Guard

Included among the members of the Digby Branch, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., veterans of two world wars and a police action, who will form an honour guard for H.R.H. Princess Margaret at the bandstand here Saturday, will be the slim, erect figure of a man who saw active service in a war forgotten by many today.

This veteran is George Cardoza of Digby who fought in the South African War as a member of the Middlesex Regiment of the British Army, the "Duke of Cambridge's Own." This regiment won an enviable nickname in battle, "the die-hards."

Mr. Cardoza who wears proudly his Queen Victoria South African War medal with its three bars, recalls another joyous regal occasion which occurred during his service in South Africa. This was when he took part in the celebrations of the coronation of King Edward VII. The coronation was postponed until August 1902 because of the illness of the king.

Another memorable event recalled by Mr. Cardoza of his service in the Boer War is the fact he was a member of the guard of honour formed for Sir Jos. of honour formed for Hon. Jos. ish Secretary of State for War, on the occasion of his visit to Mafeking.

Mr. Cardoza also recalls the solemn services which marked the burial of Sir Cecil Rhodes in Rhodesia. His unit stood with arms reversed as the funeral train passed.

A resident of Canada since 1907, Mr. Cardoza has lived in Digby since 1923. He is a life member of the Canadian Legion.

Announce Menu For Royal Dinner

Among many behind the scenes artists throughout the Dominion who have quietly and efficiently contributed to the current visit of H.R.H. Princess Margaret to Canada, there is one here who is excitedly anticipating the Princess' arrival at this picturesque Nova Scotia port on Saturday.

Samuel Franks began days ago to prepare for his role in the pageantry which will mark the Princess' visit to Digby, and on Saturday night at the Canadian Pacific's famous Pines Hotel here, the result of his diligent work will be set before the Royal party. Franks is head chef at the Digby Pines where the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, E. C. Plow, will be host at a Provincial dinner honoring the vivacious Princess.

Today Franks took the wraps from the tantalizing menu which has been prepared for Her Royal Highness and which, up to this time was known to few but himself and the host.

The Royal dinner will commence with soup; Double Consomme Sandeman. This is a formidable consomme with sherry added. With it Golden Cheese Straws will be served. Baked Nova Scotia Lobster Tails Royale will be the fish course feature. The main course will consist of Boneless Atlantic Squab Chicken. This is described as a very young broiler. Four vegetables will be featured. They will be Marinated Fiddleheads, Minted New Green Peas, Tomatoes Provencale and Parslaid Parisienne Potatoes. Tomato Provencale is described as fresh baked tomato rolled in bread crumbs, with a whisper of garlic flavor to add zest. Frozen Strawberry Souffle and Petit Fours will be served for dessert. Before Demi-Tasses, a Nova Scotia Savory consisting of a small pastry stuffed with fresh curried haddock puree, will be offered. The custom of savories is traditional, although it has not been featured on Canadian menus for several decades.

Franks, who makes his home at Toronto, trained in the culinary arts under some of Canada's most prominent chefs, including Beaujard, Odiau, Perault, Dreher and Virot. He joined the CPR's hotel department in 1939, working at the Royal York Hotel during the winter months and at summer resort hotels at Lake Louise and Banff.

In 1954 Franks was chosen to represent Canada in a food survey "The Food of All Nations" conducted by a large New York City daily newspaper. Following the Hungarian revolt he went on a lend-lease basis from the Royal York Hotel to the Canadian Red Cross to help coordinate the feeding of thousands of refugees in two Toronto reception centers. Chef Franks' specialty is the cold buffet. "It is most relaxing and creative", he says.

To Set Up Fire Control

Three emergency fire control stations will be set up in Digby by the Digby Fire Department on Saturday, it was reported at the meeting of the Town Council. These stations will be set up in widely separated parts of the town so that fire apparatus will not be impeded by the expected heavy traffic and congestion caused by the Royal visit here Saturday. Local fire fighting forces will be augmented by a pumper from Annapolis Royal and by a civil defence unit from Waverly, it was reported. Fire department officials told the council they are hopeful there will be no fires in the town to mar the Royal visit but are taking all steps to prepare in case this happens.

Bevis W. Turnbull, director of the Canadian Tourist Association and head of Canadian Travel Publications, appeared before the council meeting and discussed the matter of tourist promotion. He stated he had advised the head of the Board of Trade he would assist the committee with tourist promotion plans for the coming year. Mr. Turnbull is a Digby native, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Eber Turnbull of this town.

A street committee report revealed 2nd Avenue had now been opened from traffic between Sydney and Church Streets and work was underway to open 3rd Avenue between Mount Street and Warwick.

Prepare For Royal Visit

Civic authorities, householders and business operators in Digby are making preparations for the visit of H.R.H. Princess Margaret here Saturday.

The town bandstand has been completely renovated for the occasion and a large platform addition made to the structure. Paved streets in the town have been repaired and crossings repaved. On the side streets of the town a new coating of dust layer has also been applied.

As the Courier went to press flags and bunting were beginning to appear on a number of business premises in the town and there was also much evidence of fresh paint and a general air of expectancy about the town in relation to the Royal Visit.

Mayor Turnbull yesterday issued a request that all householders and business operators along the route to be followed by the Princess on her return from the Digby Pines on the evening of August 9th illuminate their premises.

A Tip For Spectators

Spectators in Digby who are anxious to get a view of H.R.H. Princess Margaret as the Royal car passes en route from the landing field at Larche's to the bandstand and from the bandstand to the Pines hotel and back to the DAR station should keep in mind the Princess always sits on the right side of the rear seat of the Royal car.

It is well also to remember the Royal car is always the first vehicle in the motorcade apart from the leading police escort. It is also the only car flying a standard.

With the above information in mind spectators should try to station themselves on the right hand side of the Royal route in order to get the closest view of the Princess.

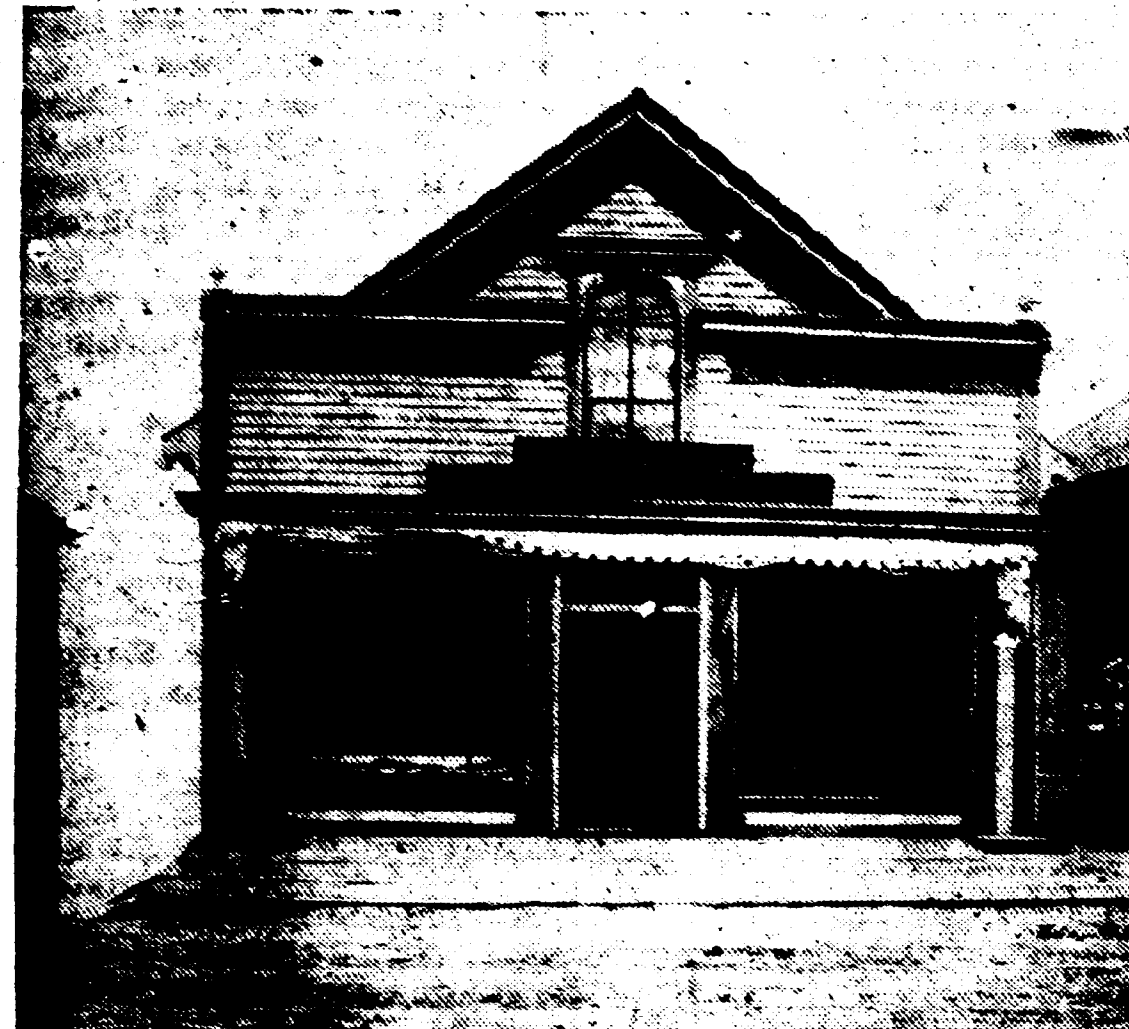
Dakin Firm Marks 80th Anniversary

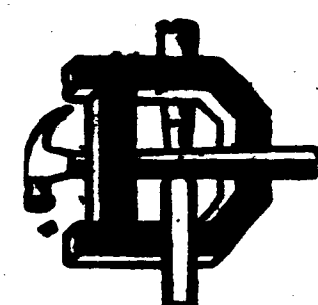

Contract Awarded Little Brook Firm

The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$148,930.00 to Clare Construction Co. Ltd., of Little Brook, N. S., for the construction of an extension to the breakwater at Seal Cove, N. B. Specified completion date for the project is July 22, 1939.

This work involves the construction of a fully ballasted crescent square sawn timber cribwork extension to the outer breakwater. It will measure 32 feet in width with a length of 152 feet on the harbour side.

The seaward side and outer end of the extension are to be of close faced construction with the harbour side open faced.

A wavebreak consisting of six tiers of ten-inch by ten-inch square sawn timber will be built along the seaward face of the breakwater. Top of the structure will be approximately four feet nine inches above the level of the deck.

Approximately 186,000 cubic feet of crescent timber cribwork, 27,000 feet (Board Measure) of crescent square sawn timber, 16,000 feet (Board Measure) of crescent decking and 10,000 feet (Board Measure) of untreated square sawn timber will be used to complete this project.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works.

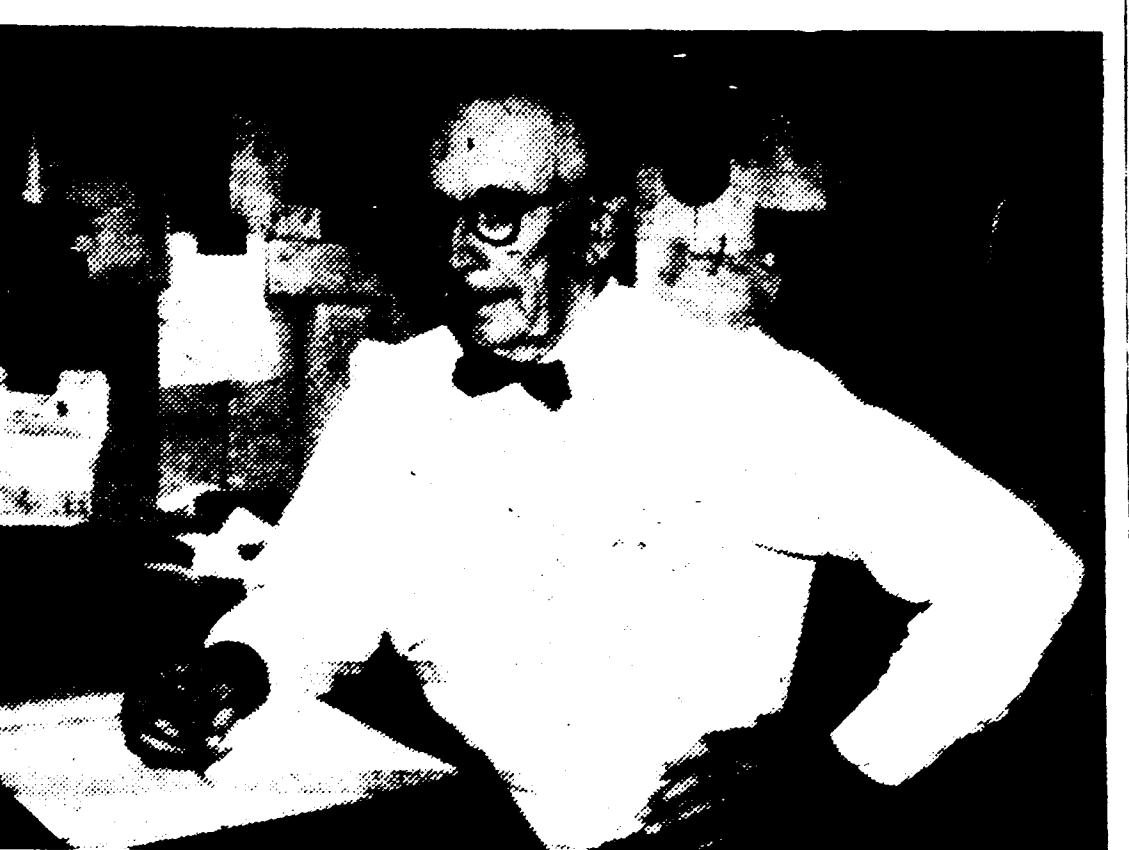

CARS ARE MY LIFE



by Ken Hankinson

You see a lot of trouble when you run a service garage. Trouble, in a way, is our business, but there's a lot more satisfaction in the other service we perform — the prevention of trouble.

Because we service so many cars that we've known all their lives, our troubles are less than a lot of garages.

And one thing that has always impressed me is the amount of trouble that a car owner can prevent himself by remembering a few simple reminders.

I'm always interested to see the figures put out by the American Automobile Association showing which car troubles occur most frequently.

This year they have found, once again, that the items an owner himself has to do the most about cause the most trouble. Tires lead the parade; 23 percent of all service calls concerned tires.

Batteries were second, with 22 percent of the service calls. Items like brakes and lights, which a garage usually looks after and which are important safety factors, accounted for only one percent each of the service calls.

It's so easy to cut down tire trouble. Check tire pressure at least once a week, both overinflation and underinflation are harmful. Tires should be rotated every 5,000 miles and wheel alignment checked at the first sign of trouble or at least every 10,000 miles.

Gradually beat in 1 c. granulated sugar. Stir in 1 tsp. grated orange rind, 1/2 c. orange juice.

Sift in dry ingredients, part at a time, fold lightly. Turn into greased jelly roll pan lined with greased waxed paper. Bake at 375°, 15 mins. Sprinkle towel with fruit sugar. Turn out hot cake on towel, peel off paper, trim edges; roll up in towel. Cool.

Add 1/4 tsp. vanilla or rum flavoring, 1/4 tsp. grated orange rind, prepared fruits, coconut. Unroll cake, spread with filling; re-roll. Chill several hours or overnight. Yield: 8 to 10 slices.

Digby Welcomes Royal Princess

Rays of brilliant sunshine breaking through the previously grey clouded skies were a fitting prelude to the welcome given to H.R.H. the Princess Margaret as she visited Digby on Saturday.

As the Sikorsky helicopter of the RCAF bearing Her Royal Highness circled Larche's field prior to its landing the sun broke through the heavy cloud cover and as the pettily beautiful Royal Princess stepped out of the plane the sun beamed forth as if to add its brilliance to the welcome of the throng who had waited long hours to greet Princess Margaret.

After alighting from the plane H.R.H. was greeted by the Hon. George C. Nowlan, who presented Mayor Gordon Turnbull, of Digby, and Mrs. Turnbull to the Princess. After chatting for a moment or two with the Mayor and his wife the Princess walked back to the helicopter where she bade farewell to the RCAF personnel who had piloted her safely on the first leg of her journey through Nova Scotia.

After a wave of greeting and a cheery smile to the several hundred spectators who ringed the landing field, the Princess entered the Royal car and, accompanied by Mr. Nowlan, began the motor trip into the town of Digby. In the second car of the motorcade which accompanied the Princess was Mrs. Nowlan and the Princess's lady in waiting. Other members of the Royal party followed.

All along the route into town groups of spectators were gathered to catch a glimpse of their Princess. As the car bearing Her Royal Highness passed these groups she acknowledged their cheers with a smile and a graceful wave of her hand.

The Princess, on arriving at the town bandstand was met by Mayor Turnbull who escorted her to the special dais which had been erected at the front of the bandstand for the official ceremonies. The band of HMCS Cornwallis played the National Anthem and then little Gail Hersey, the Digby Fire Department Ice Carnival Princess, then presented Her Royal Highness with a lovely bouquet. Mayor Turnbull then presented members of the Digby Town Council, Municipal Council and civic and municipal officials and their wives to Her Royal Highness. Also presented was Mrs. Denis Amiraault, Digby silver cross mother, whose son was killed overseas in World War II.

After the presentations Mayor Turnbull then made an address of welcome to the Princess. He assured her that nowhere in her tour of Canada would she find a more heartfelt welcome than here in Digby and expressed the hope she would shortly return for a more extended visit. He then presented her with an illuminated copy of the address of welcome.

Miss Avril Gozma, Digby's Scallop Queen, then passed to His Worship a gift for presentation to Her Royal Highness. In presenting the gift Mr. Turnbull told the Princess it had been fashioned locally of native agate and of sterling silver and expressed the hope she would accept it as a small token of the affection of the people of this area for Her Royal Highness and as a memento of her visit here.

Princess Margaret then signed the guest book of the town of Digby and the guest register of the Nova Scotia Tourist Bureau here. She hesitated momentarily when Mayor Turnbull presented her with the second book but signed when he assured her it was an official register of the province's visitors.

After signing the guest books Princess Margaret, accompanied by the Mayor, left the dais for an unscheduled walk along the ranks of the honour guard formed by the Digby Branch Canadian Legion, BESL. Here Legion President R. O. Wright was presented to Her Royal Highness and she chatted with Boer war veteran, George Cardoza. She commented to the South African war veteran that he must have been very young at the time of his Boer war service and the 75 year old ex-soldier confessed he had "fibbed a little" about his age in order to get into the army. She asked him if he had been at Mafeking and the slim, erect veteran replied, "Yes, m'am, when the siege was lifted."

Noted Cleric To Speak

Dr. H. H. Walsh, Associate Professor of Church History of the faculty of Divinity at McGill University and also Professor of Christian Sociology of the faculty of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College, will be guest speaker at the morning service at Trinity Anglican Church here Sunday.

Dr. Walsh is the author of a number of books on religious subjects. His latest, "The Christian Church in Canada", has attracted a great deal of favorable comment. It is a pioneer attempt to give a complete view of the religious development of Canada, based upon research into original sources. Among the historical facts the author has singled out as responsible for distinctive trends in Canadian ecclesiastical development are the existence of two major cultural groups within a single national framework; the clash of church and sect; the controversy over free and established churches; the close affinity of politics and religion in Canada; and the deep sense of responsibility on the part of Canadian church leaders for the national welfare of their country.

Born in Ellerslie, P.E.I., Dr. Walsh was educated at Prince of Wales College, King's, B.A. and M.A.; Christ Church, Oxford; General Theological Seminary, New York, S.T.M.; and Columbia University, Ph.D. He was ordained a deacon in 1923 and priested in 1924, and got his B.D. at the general synod in 1925. From 1924-27 he was Rector of Musquodoboit Harbour. In 1933 he became instructor in history on the staff of St. Dunstan's School, Providence, R.I. He became Rector of Christ Church, Dartmouth, in 1936 and continued to hold this office until 1945. In 1943 he became a canon of All Saints Cathedral and examining chaplain to the Bishop of Nova Scotia. From 1943-45 he was rural dean of Tangier and in 1945 he was appointed professor of Christian Sociology in the Montreal Diocesan theological college. Since 1948 he has been associate professor of church history at McGill. He was recently made an associate of the Canada Foundation.

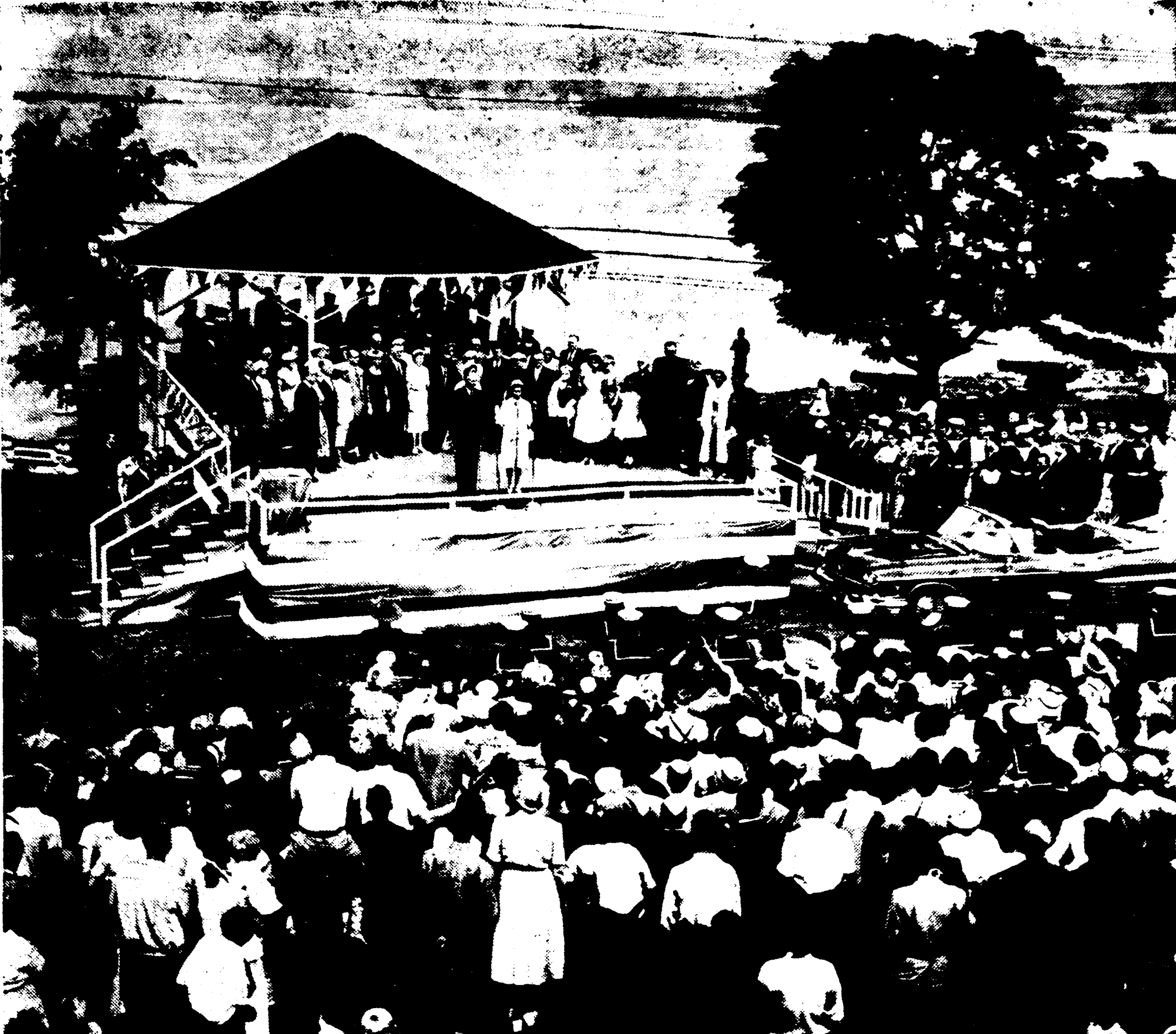

Mrs. Leonard, wife of Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education and Welfare, and Mrs. J. M. Wallis, President of Nova Scotia Weekly Newspaper Association, attended the State dinner given in Halifax on Monday night in honor of H.R.H. Princess Margaret.

The dinner was held immediately before the departure of Her Royal Highness for her home in England and guests had a mixed feeling of happiness and sadness. The young and vivacious princess resplendent in her ivory satin gown, embroidered in gold and adorned with sparkling diamonds, necklace and tiara adding still more brilliance to a radiant smile, was a fascinating picture to behold as she entered the ballroom of the Nova Scotian Hotel. The deep sincerity reflected in her voice and the detection of a note of sadness as she gave her farewell speech to the nation, made the guests most reluctant to witness the departure of a princess who had so completely captivated their hearts.

The princess in her speech said "Very soon I must leave you and start on my journey home, but the kindness which I have met from all the people in all the places I have visited makes me feel that I have a second home here, and I am left with a strong feeling that I should like to come back to Canada. I hope I may be able to do this before too long." She continued, stating that she felt "rather as Cinderella must have felt as the first terrible note of midnight struck on another entrancing occasion. It is my last evening in Canada."

"I can assure you, with deepest sincerity, that I shall be taking back to England with me the happiest possible memories of my first visit to Canada, this great nation, teeming with promise and full of energetic, adventurous people", the royal visitor continued.

In speaking of her four and a half weeks visit through Canada and of the Canadian spirit and material vigor she had seen, she said, "The wisdom and foresight of the Fathers of Confederation was aptly expressed by the words of the psalmist, 'He shall have dominion also from sea to sea and from the river unto the ends of the earth.'"

"During this last month I have seen for myself how fully their hopes have been achieved, in a time so relatively short in the long roll of history. I have seen it for myself, from the Pacific coast, bustling with the strength of present success and future endeavors, to the Atlantic provinces, old and wise and bright with splendid new prospects." Her Royal Highness continued.

The Royal Princess was officially welcomed by Premier Robert Stanfield amidst a setting of splendor fitting for the royal occasion.

For those who attended the dinner from Digby and mingled with the guests it was with pride that they listened to the praise for the commendable reception accorded the Royal Princess on her visit to their fair town and the commendation for the informality so relieving to days of arduous officialdom.

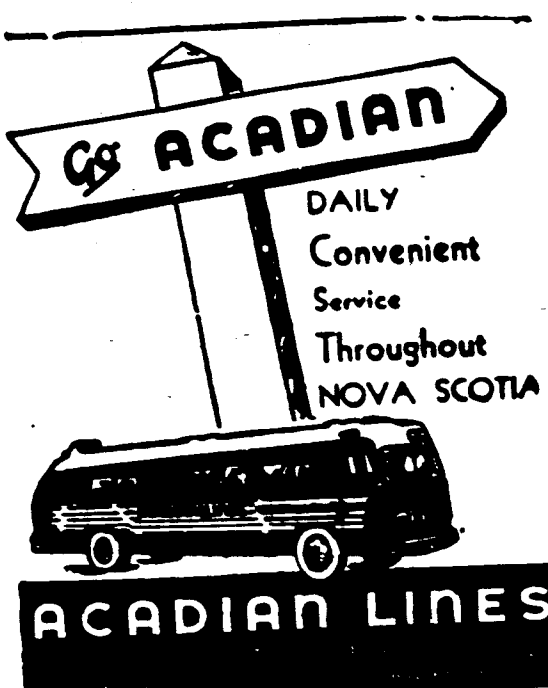

Admittance To School Age Changed

The Honourable E. D. Halliburton, Acting Minister of Education, announced today that on the recommendation of the Honourable M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education, the Governor in Council has approved certain changes in the beginning age for entering school.

Prior to the change, school boards were required to admit to the primary grade only children who had reached their fifth birthday on or before September 1 in the year in which they wished to enter the primary grade. The new regulation requires school boards to admit children to the primary grade who will have reached their fifth birthday on or before October 1.

Although children may be eligible for admission if they reach their fifth birthday at any time up to the first of October, the new children who are now eligible by virtue of the extension of time must still present themselves for enrolment at the school prior to September 20 — and preferably on the opening day. Notwithstanding the fact that a child may be eligible for admission, the school board is not required to admit him if he does not present himself on or before September 20.

Under the old regulations, school boards had the option of admitting children who had reached their fifth birthday after September 1, but were not required to do so. The practice in the City of Halifax and some other communities for a number of years has been to admit children who had reached their fifth birthday on or before October 1, and the new regulation now makes this mandatory throughout the province.

guard Princess Margaret returned to the Royal car and to the echoes of a rousing round of cheers drove off for a personally requested visit to the famed Digby scallop fleet. She was accompanied by Mayor Turnbull, with others cars in the procession carrying her lady in waiting, Mrs. Turnbull and other members of the party.

At the spur pier the Princess alighted from her car and spent some twenty minutes chatting with scallop fishermen, lined along the wharf to greet her, examining the scallop fishing vessels and receiving an unexpected gift of two beautiful scallop shells from an 82 year old pioneer of the scallop industry.

The visit to the pier seemed to be the highlight of the trip to Digby at least so far as the Princess was concerned. After chatting with the scallopers she jokingly suggested to Mayor Turnbull she might consider sliding down a ramp to get a closer look at the fishing boats. Also at the pier she walked the full length of the pier with the Mayor rather than confine her visit to a quick glimpse. On her return from the end of the pier in company with the Mayor she passed the waiting royal car and only re-entered it at the head of the wharf.

In chatting with the scallopers she showed a keen interest in the scallop industry and questioned scallop fishing pioneer Captain Roland Wormell about the history of the industry here and the fishing methods. Captain Wormell then presented her with two beautiful scallop shells of a natural amethyst colour which is peculiar to some of the scallop shells found in the Bay of Fundy. Before giving them to Her Royal Highness Captain Wormell, who with the late John W. Hayden pioneered the industry here some thirty-six years ago, gave the shells a final polishing with a square of linen. In presenting them he said their colour could be referred to as a "royal blue for a Royal Princess".

After her visit to the pier and her chat with Captain Wormell and several other scallopers Princess Margaret proceeded to the park at the site of the restored Admiral Digby well. Here she chatted with Girl Guide Commissioner Mrs. John R. Nichols, and with the president of the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society, Mrs. H. A. Nichols. She also planted a burr oak, receiving the shovel with which she planted the tree from Girl Guide Pamela Wright who won the honor when her name was drawn from a hat.

Before retiring for a rest prior to the dinner the Princess met and chatted with members of the hotel staff whose task it was to take care of the rooms used by the royal party.

Local civic, municipal and government officials were present at the dinner given by the Lieutenant Governor. Among these were the Hon. M. S. Leonard and Mrs. Leonard and the Hon. G. C. Nowlan and Mrs. Nowlan. Also attending were heads of the three services from the western end of the province.

After the dinner the Princess appeared on the balcony of the hotel to hear the Clare singers who presented several traditional French Acadian numbers. At the request of Her Royal Highness the singers presented an encore to their scheduled program. The Princess also watched young dancers of the Digby dance class of Mrs. H. R. Peters perform on the hotel lawn. She later met and chatted with the leaders of the two groups and the young dancers before leaving the hotel.

Given Bail In Montreal

Alex P. Pittas 51-year old Nova Scotia businessman, charged with attempted extortion of \$20,000 from his former Montreal employer, was granted bail of \$5,000 Tuesday following preliminary hearing.

Pittas has spent the last 10 days in jail. Sessions Judge Armand Cloutier committed him for voluntary statement August 20. Voluntary statement is a legal procedure in Quebec at which the defence may present its case if it wishes.

At Tuesday's hearing Rudolf Van Der Walde, wood-products exporter and Pittas' former employer, filed a letter he claimed he could identify as being in Pittas' handwriting. The letter was dated July 30 at Digby, N. S.

Pittas, identified as a native of Alexandria, Egypt, was not called to testify.

Attempted extortion is punishable by a maximum term of 14 years in penitentiary.

The letter filed by Mr. Van Der Walde was handwritten in ink and initialed A.P.P.

It said the writer had been approached by a government "agent" for information about Mr. Van Der Walde's business. The writer claimed ability to supply information about payroll-deduction irregularities.

The letter said in part:

"You can buy my silence for the sum of 20,000 pounds sterling or the equivalent in dollars ... for mutual interest and security let us keep this a top secret ... buy a cashier's cheque for the above sum, endorse it and mail it in a simple envelope, without the sender's address. I shall cash the cheque abroad ... act quickly and wisely."

Mr. Van Der Walde, 63, testified he had befriended Pittas, "who is the brother of a very old friend of mine."

Replying to a question by his counsel, Max Slapack, Mr. Van Der Walde said he helped Pittas get into Canada and had employed him from October, 1955, to April, 1957.

He said Pittas gave notice that "he wanted to go into business on his own" and that he saw Pittas several times later at Digby, "where he lives."

Pittas stood quietly in the prisoner's dock during the hearing. He was arrested in Digby, where he has been a resident for the past few years, on a warrant issued in Montreal.

There's a brand-new model automobile out this year but I'm afraid it's not worth waiting for.

You can't buy it, we don't sell it, and I don't think you'd want it anyway.

The U. S. Army is the owner of every one of these new models — which have been designed to eliminate the mule and the horse. It's taken two or three years to find a four-wheeled vehicle that can out-perform a four-legged animal, but at last they've done it.

This strange vehicle is a large, flat platform that covers all four wheels. It has no driver's seat and no cab.

The driver, if that's what you call him, has to walk. He ambles along behind the contraption, holding on to the steering wheel at the back of the right hand side.

This gas-driven mule hefts along its load at about one mile-an-hour. If you want to turn, it will start to turn in an instant because all four wheels turn at the same time. This gives it a turning circle of 18 feet, compared with the turning circle of 40 feet or so with any ordinary car.

And if you want to repair it, you just turn it upside down, special valves keep the gas and oil in their proper place.

If this is the car you want, I'm sorry. But if it's one mile-an-hour, there are no cleaner cars, no cars more sound reliable transportation going slightly faster than thoroughly inspected for year-round service than at our lot.

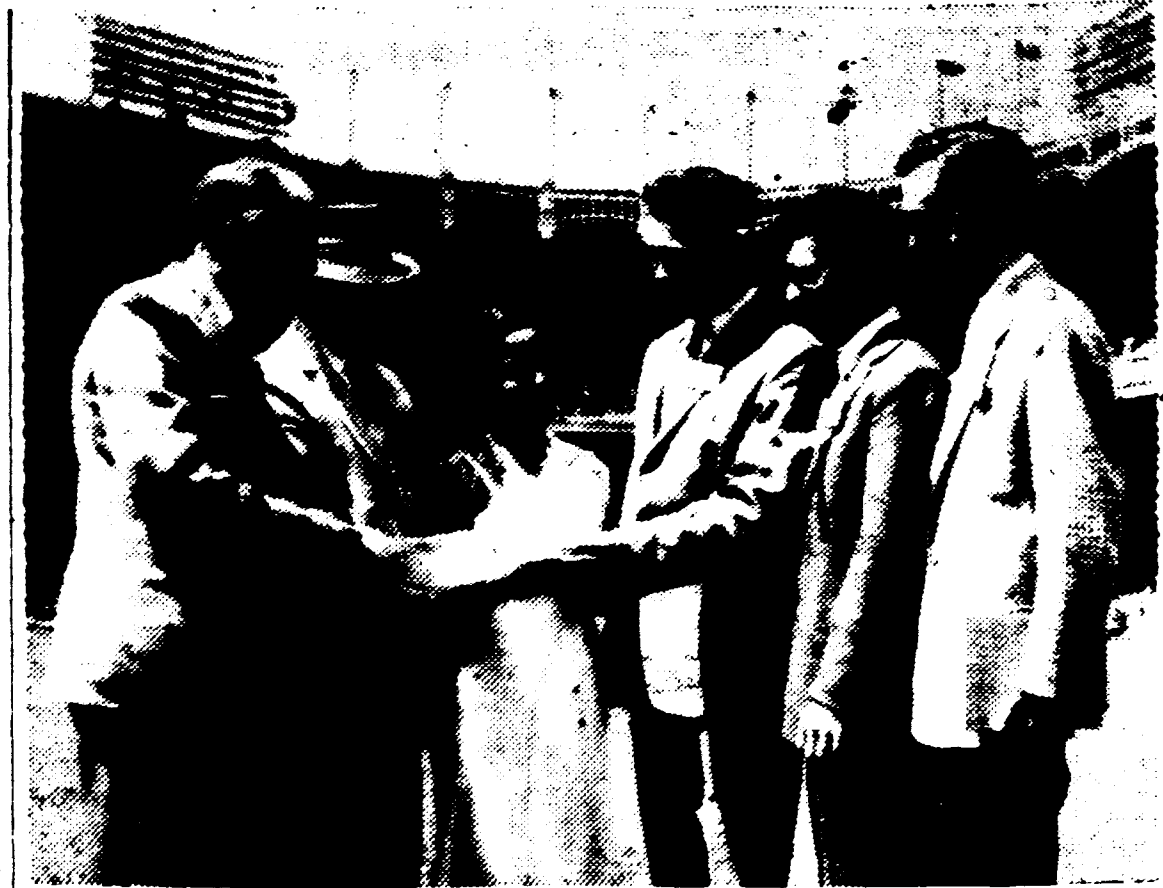

Gets Hole In One - Wrong Hole!

One local golfer achieved what is every golfer's ambition the other day, he got a hole in one but was not too elated about it as it didn't help his score a bit. The circumstances were that the golfer, who was playing off number eleven tee at the Pines golf course, hit a beautiful drive. He lost sight of the ball but was soon informed by another group of golfers that his drive had landed smack in the cup on number fifteen green. The other members of his foursome refused to allow him to score this as a hole-in-one. Another local golfer did achieve a good score but he used his opponent's ball to do it. This fellow who never slices a ball, hit one straight into the woods. He found it and proceeded to play it to the hole. After sinking his putt, he examined the ball and found it was his opponent's who had been forced to take a lost stroke for a lost ball. This same golfer had hard luck on one round, however. It took him eight strokes to get past a tree with the whole fairway in front of him. Each shot travelled about three feet, bounced off the only tree in the foreground and rolled back to its original position. It is understood this happened on another occasion but with the caddy cart as the target.

Recover Strange Device In Bay

A strange device has been picked up in the Bay of Fundy by the Digby based dragger "Loretta L", skippered by Clarence Greek. The device is a large red cone, nearly three feet high, made of what appears to be pressed paper. At the tip of the cone is a metal swivel with a length of nylon cord attached. The tip end of the cone appears to be weighted and inside is a plastic foam substance similar to that used in medicine bottles to absorb moisture. A ridge runs around the inner side of the cone about half way between the nose and the end. The open end of the cone is coated around the inside edge with what appears to be an adhesive substance leading to the belief that some other object was attached to that end. The edge of the open end of the cone also carries on the outside some printing, part of which would appear to have been on a further portion of the device. The printing reads in the part which remains and is legible - "Del... Engineering Laboratories Los Angeles, California, Fran... Handle w...". The outside of the cone is highly varnished while the inside is unpainted. It was somewhat damaged when retrieved from about mid-bay in the Bay of Fundy and the outside paint shows a break in a straight line running around the middle of the cone. People here who have seen it are at a loss to know what it might be.

Addresses Credit Men

Nova Scotia Opposition Leader, Henry D. Hicks, was guest speaker at the banquet session of the convention of the Maritime division of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association at the Digby Pines Hotel Tuesday evening. In his address Mr. Hicks dealt chiefly with the maritime economy. He stated that Maritime seemed altogether too anxious to parade our poverty and to exaggerate our difficulties. We are perhaps too willing to count on governments to do things for us, he said. Instead of this, he said, we should exploit to the full the opportunities we have. A great number of popular misconceptions exist concerning the Maritimes, Mr. Hicks stated. These misconceptions are hindering our development and should be corrected, he said. Dealing with three of them, Mr. Hicks stated first of all there is a misconception that there is a lack of capital in the Maritimes for industrial development. "I will state categorically that this is not so," he said. There is adequate capital available for the development of any sound business venture, he said. Even if private capital is exhausted there is still government aid. He said during the time he was in government no industrial loan had to be refused because capital to make it was lacking. Another popular misconception concerning the Maritimes, Mr. Hicks said, is that there is not sufficient electric power available for industrial development. He stated that so far as Nova Scotia is concerned power can be developed at costs comparable with New England and that, while it would not be possible to meet the power needs of an aluminum development, needs for other industrial development could be met as rapidly as any industry required the power. A third popular misconception about the Maritimes, the speaker said, concerns the disadvantages of freight rates to this area. In this, he said, we tend to generalize and exaggerate and that while there are certain disadvantages these are not nearly so great as is generally accepted. He stated he had been told by an official of the Enterprise Foundry in Sackville, that it cost this firm only eighteen cents more to ship a stove into central Canada than it did their strongest Ontario competitor. There are many manufacturing and industrial developments where freight rates are not a great factor and no real deterrent, he said. In concluding, Mr. Hicks said we in the Maritimes should place the accent on what we can do and the advantages we possess, rather than taking a negative view of the situation. Finally, he said, as individuals we should act rather than talk.

Credit Men Conclude Meet

The annual convention of the Atlantic Division of the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association concluded at the Digby Pines Hotel Tuesday evening with a banquet session addressed by N. S. Legislative opposition leader Henry D. Hicks. The two day convention opened Monday morning with a credit workshop which concluded on Tuesday. Tuesday afternoon a panel was held which included a top business executive, a credit manager, sales manager, bank manager and a customer. This group formed a corporation and each participant explained in detail what his particular department required in order to ensure the success of the unit.

Well Known Research Worker Passes

His many friends in this area were deeply shocked to learn of the sudden passing Wednesday evening, August 13th, of Dr. Allister M. Macmillan following a heart attack. Dr. Macmillan, his wife and family were vacationing in Wolfville and were in Digby August 9th to witness the visit of Princess Margaret here. Dr. Macmillan was well known in this area, having been associated with the Cornell University research program here since 1950. He conducted an extensive health survey in the Kings County area and also carried out sociological research work here. For the past five years he had been deputy director of the study in this area and since 1957 was deputy director of the Midtown study in social psychiatry of the Cornell medical college. Director of both studies is Dr. A. H. Leighton. Born in Boiestown, N. B., 49 years ago, Dr. Macmillan was the son of James and Marie King Macmillan. He attended school at Campbellton, N. B., and then completed two years in science at Mount Allison University. Following this he was employed for some years with the McLennan Foundry and Machine Works Ltd. in Campbellton. In 1938 he went as a teacher with the New Brunswick Department of Education. In January 1940 he joined the Canadian army and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the North Shore New Brunswick regiment. He served overseas from 1941-46 as a regimental officer in the Canadian army in England and Italy with the West Nova Scotia regiment and in the North African campaign with the British Army. He was wounded several times. He was discharged in 1946 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. After the war he returned to complete his studies and received his Bachelor of Arts degree the following year. In 1950 he graduated from Acadia with his Master of Arts degree and in 1954 he received his Ph.D. degree from Cornell University. After receiving his Ph.D. degree Dr. Macmillan remained on the staff of Cornell University as senior research associate of the department of Sociology and Anthropology and as Associate Professor of sociology in the department of psychiatry. Cornell University Medical College. Deeply interested in Scottish lore and clan histories, Dr. Macmillan was widely recognized as an authority on these subjects. He was Canadian executive-secretary of the Macmillan clan and had only recently returned to Wolfville from clan gatherings attended by the chief of the Macmillan clan. He was affiliated with the First Presbyterian Church, Ithaca, N. Y. A collector of historic items, Dr. Macmillan was particularly interested in clocks and watches and had collected a great many rare models of which he was very proud. He was a member of the national association of clock and watch collectors and of a number of professional associations. Dr. Macmillan is survived by his wife, the former Lydia Corall Bigelow of Canning. Also surviving are two sons, James Allister, and Alan Cameron; three daughters, Jean, Kathleen and Margaret, and two sisters, Frances (Mrs. Philip Desaulnier), Halifax, and Janet (Mrs. William Desboro), Dalhousie, N. B. Funeral service was held from St. Andrew's United Church, Wolfville, Sunday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. J. D. Archibald. Interment was in the Habitant cemetery, Canning. A service at the grave-site was conducted by the Habitant branch, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., of which Dr. Macmillan was a member. Leading the Legion service was Col. the Venerable Archdeacon G. W. The Digby Courier was honored on Friday by a visit from K. K. Ali of Pakistan, who has been spending the past six months in this country and the past week in the Annapolis Valley. He left via Princess Helene and will soon return to his native land. While in Western Nova Scotia he was a guest of C. M. Davies, Veterans' Land Act Supervisor, and Mrs. Davies in Clarence, N. S. Mr. Davies accompanied Mr. Ali to the Courier office. Mr. Ali is travelling on a scholarship under the Colombo Plan and has visited every province of Canada except British Columbia and Newfoundland. He is an investigation officer with the Agriculture Development Finance Corporation of Pakistan. While in Canada he is studying appraisal of farms and supervised credit in general and is working in particular with the V.L.A. administration staff and other credit agencies. Mr. Ali was very impressed with the work done by V.L.A. in establishing Canadians on farms, small holdings and as commercial fishermen. In particular he was interested in the supervision given to assist those who are established to become successful in their undertakings. In travelling through the Valley he was very impressed with the beauty of the country side and spoke again and again of the fine views from the mountain out over the valley. He also mentioned the comfortable homes which were so well kept. In speaking of life in Pakistan he told of farms which averaged 10 acres being entirely cultivated. In Eastern Pakistan the country is mostly plains and the farms produce two crops annually. The main crops are rice, jute, sugar cane and vegetables. In Western Pakistan the crops are wheat, rice, sugar cane, tobacco and cotton. Pakistan produces 88 per cent of the world supply of jute. Mr. Ali received his education in Calcutta where he graduated from the University of Calcutta. His country is trying to improve the lot of the farmer where they also have marketing problems and difficulties of transportation. He was high in his praise of the efforts of the West, through the Colombo Plan, in assisting Pakistan to develop their natural resources.

Weather Reports Essential Data

SAINT JOHN, Aug 5 - Weather observations provided by deck officers of the Canadian Pacific's Bay of Fundy steamer Princess Helene were among essential data which was compiled for the August 9th Maritime flight of H.R.H. Princess Margaret over the Bay from Fredericton, N. B., to Nova Scotia's Yarmouth airport. The consistent reliability of the marine meteorological information provided by the Princess Helene, a supplementary weather ship, was pointed out recently by Andrew Thomson, director of the Department of Transport, Toronto. In a recent message to Captain A. Roy Conley, master of the Princess Helene, the director stated that 1957 records indicated that the average accuracy and completeness of the reports received from the Princess Helene was 87 per cent, and added that this figure was considerably above the average of all ships in the Canadian Weather Observing Fleet. In recognition of the service provided by the Princess Helene, and the work of her officers, the ship will be presented with a Department of Transport Annual Ship Award for marine weather observing. Letters to the Editor

Dear Madam: I would like to comment, if I may, on certain items which appeared in the most recent issue of a contemporary of yours, the Cornwallis Ensign. Perhaps I should direct these comments to that newspaper itself but, after reading the editorial column of the recent issue, I would be afraid I might, as a civilian, be labelled as merely having the "unmitigated gall" of criticising the navy and end up by being clouted by some of the brass. It seems to me the Ensign showed the poor taste it accused civilians who criticize its ship captains of having when it allowed two articles which are in its most recent edition to appear, even though one of them was disowned by both the editorial board and through it the navy itself. What Digby did as an official welcome for H.R.H. Princess Margaret was the business of the Mayor of Digby and his associates and was approved in every detail by those in authority in the highest echelons of such affairs. To say that it was "pathetic" is an unwarranted, untrue and entirely uncalled for observation to say the least. The fact that fewer people were here than were expected is easily explained off a number of counts, one of which is the security and traffic control exercised, in which, I believe, the navy played a part. The fact that certain groups did try to capitalize on the visit of a Royal Princess to Digby by scheduling a number of entertainment events was no doubt regrettable but to label Digby as giving the Princess a "poor welcome" because of this is an outright distortion of the facts. As a matter of fact, Digby's welcome to the Princess has been hailed as one of the best given her on her whole trip to Canada for its informality, its opportunities for Her Royal Highness to meet and talk to children, fishermen and other citizens from whom she seemed to have been kept at a distance in some other places she visited. The comments of the Ensign's correspondent will no doubt receive editorial comment in your paper. They should also be more than disowned by the Ensign itself. Indeed, it does not seem to me too much to expect that the editorial board of the Ensign should see to it that an apology to this community is carried in its next issue. A paramount feature of news reporting is presentation of facts objectively and the news story in the Ensign is entirely devoid of this. While the articles in the Ensign should not be allowed to precipitate a "feud" between the Cornwallis base and its two most adjacent towns, Digby and Annapolis, wrongs must be righted and the record set straight. Greatest Marine Mystery Recalled

The death of an 87 years old lady at Lowell, Mass., a few weeks ago closed another chapter in the long history of the sea's greatest mystery.

The lady was Mrs. Alice Melanson, a quiet, fragile little woman who one would never suspect of knowing anything about such bizarre tragedies as that of the Mary Celeste.

The mystery of that ship, which was found abandoned in the Atlantic Ocean in December, 1872, has never been solved and never will. More has been written about the Mary Celeste, most of it wild and unbridled fiction, than about the Titanic, Lusitania and the Flying Dutchman all rolled into one.

The ninety ton Nova Scotia brig sailed from New York on November 7, eighty-six years ago, bound for Genoa with a cargo of alcohol. Aboard were her skipper, Captain Benjamin Briggs, a Massachusetts man; his wife and their two year old daughter and a crew of seven.

Four weeks later, yawing on an erratic course and headed in the wrong direction, the Mary Celeste was hailed by the brig Dei Gratia, also a Nova Scotian, out of New York for Gibraltar. Captain Morehouse, a Sandy Cove native, recognized the ship as his vessel and the Mary Celeste had loaded together in New York and he was also a close friend of Captain Briggs.

Repeated calls and signals brought no response and Captain Morehouse sent a party of three to board the Mary Celeste.

This boarding crew was led by Mate Oliver Deveau, who was the first man aboard and thus the first to uncover the most baffling marine mystery of all time.

Oliver Deveau was also to play a leading part in the Mary Celeste story, and the inquiry into the mystery which was turned into a Roman holiday by a self seeking prosecutor. He was also the man to come forward with the most logical explanation of the mystery, at least in the eyes of seafaring men.

This Oliver Deveau was the father of the quiet little woman, Mrs. Alice Melanson, who died a few weeks ago in Lowell. At the time that fate threw her father into the middle of a weird and sometimes horrible nightmare, Mrs. Melanson was only one year old.

In her trunk, kept carefully through the years, are musty and yellowed letters and papers that testify to much of the true story of the Mary Celeste. These papers make a mockery of the lurid tales of mutiny, cold blooded murder, fiendish plotting and creatures from the deep which have dogged the wake of the Mary Celeste since she was found abandoned that bleak December day off the Azores so long ago.

According to his evidence given at the inquiry into the fate of the Mary Celeste, Mate Deveau testified that when he and his party boarded the help-less vessel there was no sign of Captain Briggs, his family or crew although everything else was fairly normal and shipshape. The brig's boat was missing, two sails had blown out and one hatch cover was open. The craft's papers and navigating instruments were gone, also a long rope used to secure the peak halyard. There were no signs of violence and the log showed entries up to November 25, nine days before she was found abandoned.

Mate Deveau was evidently not the type who was given to romanticizing happenings in which he was involved for, although he was questioned literally hundreds of times about the possible fate of the captain, his family and the crew of the Mary Celeste, he stuck to the facts of the case as he knew them and his theory as to what happened was definitely practical in its approach.

The theory advanced by Mate Deveau and held generally by seafaring men is that fumes of

PRINCESS MARGARET DAY COMMITTEE TO REQUEST TOWN MEET DEFICIT

The committee generally known in Digby as the Princess Margaret Day committee decided on Tuesday evening to appeal to the Digby Town Council to have the town pay off the debt in the vicinity of \$1700 incurred by the committee in the program arranged for the visiting public at the time of the Royal visit here on August 9. The debt in the vicinity of \$1700 is that expected to be owing after a market can be found for several hundreds of dollars worth of goods still not sold. It is hoped that some of this will move over the coming holiday.

The meeting chaired by H. M. Warne, manager for the day's activities, was attended by the secretary, Roy Peters, five members of the committee and visitors.

It was unanimously decided by the committee members present to take the finance problem before the Digby Town Council at the next meeting which is expected to be held on Tuesday evening following Labor Day. Before the decision a discussion ensued as to whose responsibility the loss on the Princess Margaret Day activities should be.

Following the decision to approach the Town Council, the report was given that all bills for labor had been paid except those for Roy Peters, secretary, and the manager, H. M. Warne, which were agreed also came under the category of labor. The committee members present on Tuesday evening voted that \$160 owing Mr. Peters be paid and also the sum of \$400 plus expenses be paid to Mr. Warne, making a total of \$560 voted on that occasion to be paid both men. Before making the motion for payment John Woolaver enquired of Mr. Warne how long he would be willing to wait for the amount owing to him but without delaying for the reply, Mr. Woolaver made the motion which was regularly passed.

Tentative statements of transactions were prepared by the secretary and manager which showed the unitemized total amount of receipts, the wages paid to laborers before Tuesday's meeting, the value of goods on hand and not sold and the outstanding accounts against the committee. These statements it was learned needed minor adjustments but it is expected that full and complete statements will be available shortly in which the above mentioned deficit will be showing.

Present at the meeting were H. M. Warne, Roy Peters, Reginald Turnbull, Richard Levy, Ralph Wright, John Woolaver, Howard Patterson in a voting capacity. Also sitting in on the meeting were Mrs. J. M. Wallis and Bernard O'Neil as non members of the the committee.

The presentation was made on the college steps which provided everyone with a good view of the Princess. After landing on the college grounds by helicopter the Princess was driven in an open car to the main highway, passing along the road side of the church and then to the reception stand. The Clare choral group rendered a French song, being stationed along the route followed by the Princess, and she stopped the car and listened to the group for about a minute before continuing her way. This group rendered several numbers at Digby following the Princess' dinner at the Pines.

Saturday evening the chicken barbecue at Major's Point at Bellevue's Cove was better than ever with over 800 servings being dished out. A big bonfire followed by fireworks finished off the evening for the thousands who visited the historical site, the first cemetery in Clare. A platform was constructed for old time dancing with the Acadian Troubadours, led by Batiste Comeau of Concession, furnishing the music. A lot of work had gone into making the Major's Point ready for its part in the Festival. The grounds had been levelled off and hundreds of loads of gravel had been hauled free of charge to make parking lots. Refreshment and novelty booths were constructed for permanent use as this site will be used each year for the barbecue site.

Mr. Jones, prior to his appointment as assistant director, served for five years as regional representative for Annapolis, Digby, Queens, Shelburne and Yarmouth counties. He was succeeded by Keith C. Langille.

Mr. Langille was appointed regional representative in 1937.

Heavy Rains Do Damage

Heavy rains which occurred here Monday and Tuesday caused heavy flooding in some sections of the town.

The heavy downpour of rain started early Monday morning and continued for more than three hours without a letup. Heavy falls of rain also occurred intermittently throughout the afternoon and almost continuously through the evening. Several heavy showers also occurred Tuesday morning.

The rain caused flooding of many basements in the town's business section. Catch basins of the Dominion Atlantic Railway also plugged on 1st Avenue causing flooding.

Several newly opened streets were gutted by the heavy fall of rain as were a number of driveways. Gravel streets in the upper sections of the town were also badly hit by the rainfall.

For some hours following the storm the waters of the harbour were coloured a deep brown from the run-off of top soil caused by the heavy rain.

Although the rain did considerable damage in town it was not without benefit. Many wells in the rural areas about the town were reported dangerously low prior to the storm and it is expected the heavy rainfall eased this situation.

In 1935 he was Assistant Cub Master under the Cub Master Dr. G. V. Turnbull. He was later promoted to Assistant Scout Master under Scout Master N. D. Wright, who is now Commissioner for this district. Mr. Connor later became Scout Master of the 1st Digby troop and held this post until leaving for the States.

During his Scouting career Mr. Connor has attended many camps and training courses. He also attended the World Jamboree at Niagara-on-the-Lake. Since going to Boston Mr. Connor has attended round table outings at Camp Sayer, Blue Hill, Mass., and been active in other Scouting ventures there.

County Fair To Be Three Day Affair

The Digby County Exhibition, which is scheduled for Bear River on September 9, 10 and 11, will be a three-day affair this year for the first time in its long history.

Decision to make the exhibition a three day show was made following last year's fair when it was evident the regular two day show was not sufficiently long to accommodate the increasing number of events that were becoming a part of the exhibition.

A new building has been constructed to house additional exhibits at this year's fair. This building is one hundred feet long by thirty feet wide of steel construction. It will be used to house industrial exhibits and those wanting space have been urged to contact the secretary-manager, Mr. Howard York, as soon as possible.

Another new feature at this year's exhibition will be exhibits by the newly organized 4-H Club and Cal Club. These entries will be judged the first day of the fair and are expected to attract a good deal of attention.

A feature of the fair which has always been a real favorite is on the program again this year. This is the free-for-all horse and ox pull which is open to contestants from all over the province. This will be held this year on Thursday, September 11th. A first prize of \$75; 2nd prize of \$50; and third of \$25 has been offered for this. The regular horse and ox pulls will be held Tuesday and Wednesday. The ox pull will be at two o'clock Tuesday and the horse pull at the same hour on Wednesday.

Special programs of entertainment have been scheduled for the exhibition this year also and these will supplement the exhibits and contests that feature the fair.

DIGBY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Thursday, September 4th, 1958, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1958-59, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1958. Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

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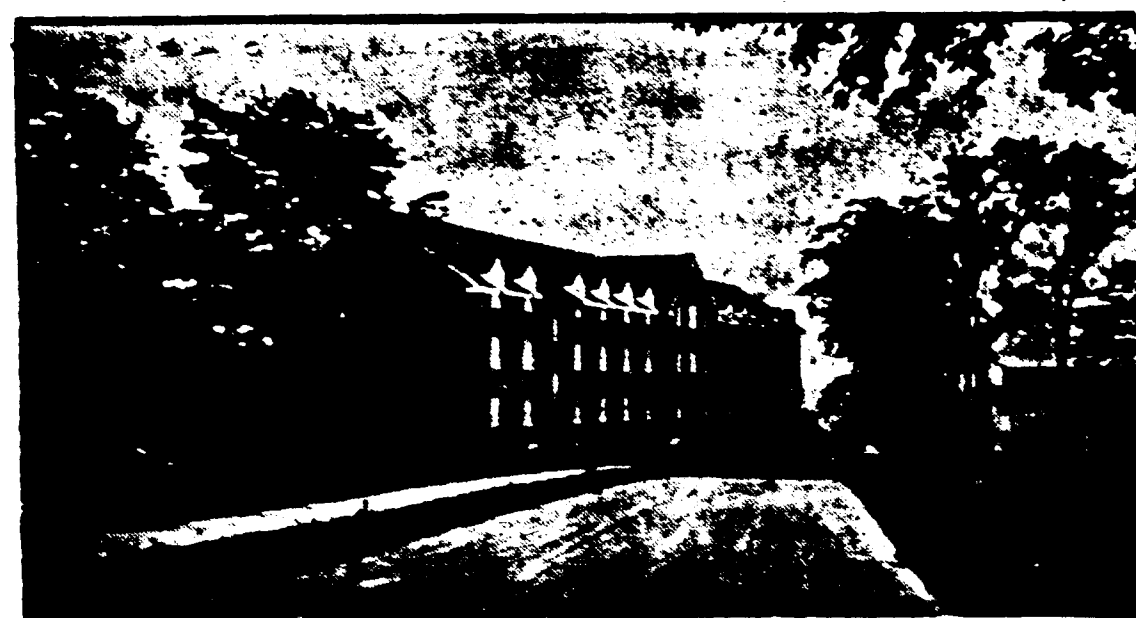
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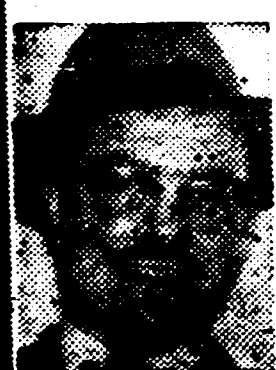

CARS ARE MY LINE

A lot has been written lately about the so-called horsepower race among automobile manufacturers.

And rightly so, because it has been one of the most important and interesting developments in the auto business.

A lot of people will probably argue about this, but the horsepower race has been one of the most important recent steps towards greater comfort and safety. Hold on a minute and we'll see why.

Speed, first of all, is not the goal in this race. There was an earlier horsepower race in the car business that was much more spectacular but attracted much less interest. Between 1937 and 1942, automobile horsepower went up 53 percent. Between 1942 and 1954 it went up only 19 percent.

To get that life expectancy, of course, an engine has to be cared for.  the alcohol stored in the ill-ventilated hold of the Mary Celeste blew off the hatch cover. Further rumblings in the hold may have convinced the captain the ship was in danger of blowing up so he and the crew together with the Captain's family took to the vessel's only lifeboat, taking the navigating instruments and papers. They took the long main halyard rope to secure their little lifeboat to the stern of the Mary Celeste in order to trail behind at a safe distance. Somehow in the excitement of the moment the rope was not properly made fast and the little boat slipped away from the Mary Celeste.

The sea was heavy and swept with high winds at the time of the last entry in the Mary Celeste's log, and Deveau and the Dei Gratia had fought heavy storms all the way to the Azores. The Mary Celeste was swept rapidly away from the lifeboat which never had a chance to catch up with the runaway ship.

The ten souls from the ill-fated craft were either swamped in the little lifeboat by the heavy seas or survived the storm only to perish of hunger or thirst.

This theory of Mate Deveau's is probably what happened although, like the more gory and wild tales that have been circulated over the years since the mystery of the Mary Celeste, it can never be proved.

Much of the goriness which was supposed to have been associated with the Mary Celeste's fate was supplied by romanticists who, even before the vessel was sailed into Gibraltar by the Dei Gratia's mate, had begun to weave fantastic tales about what had happened to Captain Briggs, his wife and family and the ship's crew. These fantasies were given impetus by the actions of Frederick Flood, attorney general of Gibraltar. At the admiralty hearing Flood proclaimed the case to be one of foul murder and as the hearing dragged on put forward one sensational theory after another. These were shot to pieces by the calm testimony of Oliver Deveau who spent days on the witness stand. Deveau told of these ordeals in letters to his wife which are among the papers kept by his daughter.

So sensational were the theories touched off by the wild ravings of Flood at the hearing that they started a chain of wild stories that is unbroken to this day. Even the famed Arthur Conan Doyle got into the act and his version, replete with intrigue and bloody axes, was seen last year on television.

Captain Deveau, last surviving member of the crew of the Dei Gratia, died in 1912. The death a few weeks ago of his daughter, Mrs. Alice Melanson, removed still another link in the chain. Mrs. Melanson leaves another sister, Mrs. Amber Fortune, of Springfield, Mass., who will now be the custodian of the Deveau papers and letters and the real heart of the ocean's greatest enigma.

Three applications for building permits were given approval by the Digby Town Council at their meeting Tuesday night. These were for David C. Landers for a house on his property on King Street; for Edward Keen for a house on Sydney Street and for Dickson Sabine for a house on King Street.

A letter was read from the Unemployment Insurance Commission in Yarmouth that the commission would set up a temporary office here to assist local claimants on October 1st. The office would be located in the fire hall and would be open from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Tic Collins appeared before the Council regarding the condition of 3rd Avenue in front of his home. He stated the road had been widened and improved below his home but the section in front of his property was dangerously narrow.

It was stated the road in that area could not be widened unless property adjoining it could be secured. A section there had been fenced and held in private possession for more than forty years and therefore was no longer town property, it was stated.

Mr. Collins stated he had been informed by one of the owners he was willing for the town to take the land needed. The Council decided to contact the owners in this regard and try to make the necessary arrangements.

TOWN COUNCIL REFUSES TO ASSUME DEFICIT RESPONSIBILITY

By unanimous vote the Digby Town Council at their meeting here Tuesday night decided against accepting any responsibility in the matter of a deficit incurred by a committee organized to provide entertainment and catering for the crowds expected in Digby on the occasion of the Royal visit here.

Motion that the town "not assume any responsibility" in the matter was moved by Councillor V. L. Bent and seconded by Councillor Wilfred Mulise. The motion came following presentation of the case for the committee by Chairman H. M. Warne and a discussion of the whole matter participated in by the Mayor and Council and a number of citizens in attendance at the meeting.

Mr. Warne stated it was the thinking of the committee at a recent meeting that "since the committee was drawn up by the Mayor" and the Mayor had sat in on several meetings the matter should be brought to the Council to "get your thinking on how the deficiency could be met". He said while there was no definite accounting yet and considerable merchandise to dispose of, it was felt in general terms there would be about \$1,700 to be made up.

The matter of the deficit is a serious one, he said, from several angles. He said it was the committee's thought the matter of the deficit should be placed before the Council to be met by them. If this is not done, he said, "I as chairman of the committee must advise those accounts outstanding that the Mayor and Council feel they have no responsibility and refuse to do anything about it".

Mr. Warne said he had discussed the matter of plans to entertain the public on the occasion of the Royal visit with officials of the provincial department of trade and industry, the Mayor of Halifax and others and had been advised this was "an opportunity for Digby to really do something" and said the matter was tied in with the promotion of the tourist industry. He stated security regulations had hampered efforts of the committee as had failure of the Mayor to prevent private individuals and other organizations from putting on activities that day. He said the committee had been assured by the Mayor no canteens other than those operated by the committee would be allowed that day and no other organizations other than the six included in the committee allowed to collect money. He said the hospital had been given permission to hold a tag day and private individuals had operated canteens.

The committee had been told by the Mayor, he said, forty thousand people would be in Digby for the visit and much of their effort was based on this figure. He criticized the Mayor for his refusal to allow printed invitations for those who were to sing and dance as part of the program at the Pines Hotel that evening.

Mayor Turnbull said he was sorry to hear of the committee's losses. He stated he had been asked to call a meeting of heads of a number of organizations in the town to deal with the matter of providing entertainment and catering for the public on the occasion of the Royal visit. He said he discussed this with members of the provincial committee and had been advised it would be alright for charitable organizations to engage in such

activities and it was up to these organizations if they wanted to do so.

He said he told the meeting of organization heads this and suggested three activities to them. These, he said, were setting up food booths, feeding the people and providing a street dance. At this point, he said, he left the meeting and had nothing to do with the setting up of the committee or choosing its chairman.

"I considered I was automatically out of the picture then," the Mayor said, as I was not a representative of any of the six organizations involved in the committee."

After that meeting, he said, the whole thing "mushroomed" with pie eating contests, horse and ox pulling and other activities added. He said he was criticized for not keeping the committee informed of official plans for the visit of the Princess here but had been advised these details should not be released until finally approved by the provincial committee.

At a later meeting of the committee which he did attend the Mayor said he informed the group of official visit plans. He said he also warned the group they were "going too far commercializing the affair and could give the town a bad name". He said at no time did he ask the committee to do anything for the town. There was no authority for them to do so and the town was to have no share of the profits, he said.

The Mayor said he had listened to demands of the committee chairman the town could have spent hundreds more dollars on the visit. He said he had refused to allow the invitations as they were not required and had also turned down demands for a red carpet at the bandstand.

He stated he had finally told the committee chairman there could be a carpet if there was no expense to the town and the carpet was not sold later.

He said he had informed the committee chairman the town could not afford to do all the things he was insisting upon and so far as official plans for the visit were concerned "I was running these".

"From my point of view, the Mayor concluded, the town was not involved in what this committee did". He said he had told the initial meeting the number of people expected here had been estimated at 40,000 but he felt a figure of 20,000 would be closer and even that was high.

R. O. Wright asked the Mayor if he felt the committee's efforts would have been "too extensive" if there had been 40,000 people here. The Mayor stated he felt this would have been so. Mr. Wright also stated he wished to correct a report that the Digby branch of the Canadian Legion, one of the participating organizations in the committee, had agreed to pay their share of the losses. What the Legion did, Mr. Wright said, was to decide the matter should go before the Council and if no aid was forthcoming it was suggested the committee be continued. The Legion pledged its "full support to that committee", he said.

Vincent Snow said he felt the six organizations represented on the committee were interested in doing something for the town. He said the town, if it wanted, could give something to help pay the bills. The amount I have in mind, he said, is not as large as they could give.

Some discussion was had concerning the fact the Recreation Commission was one of the six participating organizations and

would have received a share of the profit. It was maintained by several speakers this involved the town in the matter but it was pointed out by the solicitor this was not the case as the commission was a separate entity.

Mr. Warne, commission chairman, stated the financial position of the commission was also serious as insurance premiums would have to be paid right away or the Digby Forum would be locked. He said more than seven thousand dollars was needed to meet an outstanding note and insurance.

Referring again to the matter of the Royal visit, Mr. Warne stated the Mayor had been informed of all plans of the committee and approved them. He said that, although the Mayor had said some of the things suggested by the committee in respect to official activities could not be done because they required official approval from Halifax, they had been done. He stated he was informed the Mayor had full control and could make any arrangements he chose to make. He said he was "shocked" the Council had not been kept informed of what was going on. This remark was in response to a comment by a Council member that the Council had not previously been consulted about activities of the committee.

Vote To Pay Share

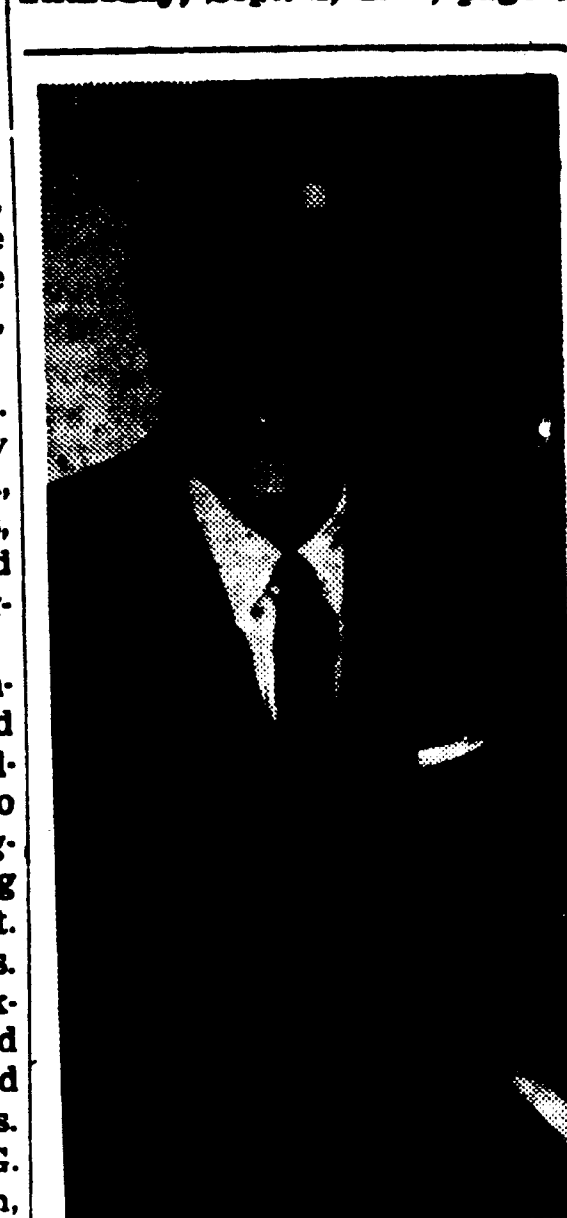

or \$5000 - it is to the owner's advantage to exchange his old bonds for new ones yielding a higher return and in addition receive a cash adjustment.

He said, too, that some Canadians may not yet realize they own Victory's, and suggested that everyone holding government bonds of any description check the serial numbers. If any number begins with "L7," "L9," "P3," "P5" or "P7," it means that bond is a Victory.

Mr. Fleming also reminded Canadians who do not own Victory Bonds that they, too, can share in the new loan. Victory's can be bought at any bank or investment dealer, giving the buyer the right to convert.

The Finance Minister said that the conversion total achieved to date meant that the loan was already a tremendous success, and pointed out that it represented an accomplishment in government financing unmatched in scale by any other country in the western world.

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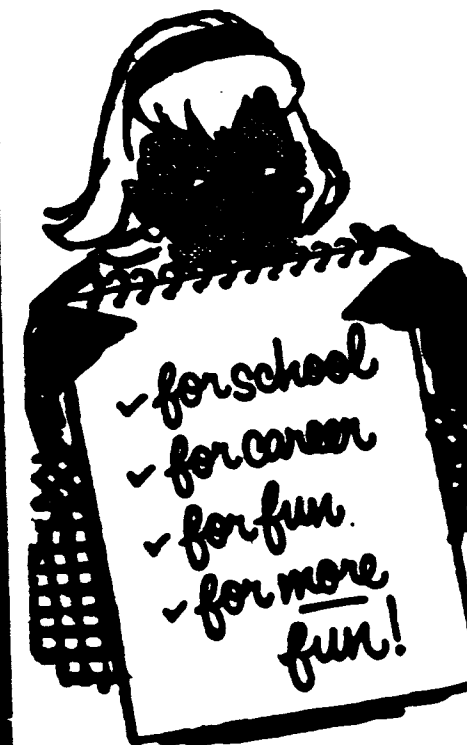

Tuna Run At Westport

Fishermen at Westport report heavy schools of tuna in the waters off Briar Island. They have never before seen so many tuna in the tide rips off the island.

Monday night Charles and Ray MacDormand while fishing for cod and pollock over the southwest ledge off the lower end of Briar Island ran into several schools of tuna.

One of the tuna took the feathered jig on the end of one of the nylon lines being used by the two fishermen. The big fish was brought to the side of the boat three times in the half hour before it was landed. When weighed it checked in at one hundred pounds. Fishermen say it is most unusual for tuna to be caught with a feather jig.

Night drifters off Briar Island also report an unusual number of shark in the area. These sharks have been getting into the drifters' bait nets and doing considerable damage. Some of them have been brought to shore for disposal in daylight.

Plan Early Payment

Efforts are underway to have all bills in connection with the entertainment of the public here on the occasion of the Royal visit paid in full at the earliest possible date. It was reported by Leigh Jayne, representative of the Digby Board of Trade on the committee, at Tuesday night's meeting of the trade board.

Mr. Jayne stated a meeting of the committee had been held at which it was suggested that representatives of the six organizations involved report back to their clubs, asking them to go along with the sharing of the deficit. These clubs will be asked, he said, to each pay one-sixth of the loss into the committee and the committee will then pay off all bills outstanding.

He stated the committee meeting expressed the view that the committee should be kept intact as a fund raising organization and that the committee would work to raise sufficient monies to repay the organizations involved their share of the deficit on the occasion of the Royal visit.

It was reported at the trade board meeting that the Digby Kiwanis Club, the Fire Department, Recreation Commission had already agreed to go along with paying their share of the deficit and that the Digby Legion branch had expressed its support of the committee. Only the Lions' Club and Board of Trade remain to be heard from, he said.

The Board meeting decided to accept responsibility for its share of the deficit but took no action with respect to its own contribution to the committee. Opinion was expressed such continuance might interfere with the fund raising activities of other organizations and the question was also raised as to what would happen should another deficit be experienced.

It was reported an attractive sign has been erected some distance west of the underpass on highway No. 1 leading in to Digby. This sign features a large scallop shell with a painting of the Digby Gut and vessels of the scallop fleet inset. The painting and lettering is the work of Mrs. R. O. Wright. H. M. Warne reported work is progressing on a similar sign for the No. 1 highway approach at Conway.

Mr. Jayne stated this program was being provided without charge to the board of trade by radio station CFBC in Saint John. Mr. Snow stated he had noted the program was announced as being sponsored by the Digby Board of Trade and expressed his appreciation of the job being done.

A discussion regarding trade board finances took up much of the time of the meeting and it was finally decided the board president, secretary-treasurer and finance committee chairman should prepare a complete financial statement showing the board's present financial position. A meeting of the board council will be called when this is finalized, it was decided, in order to deal with outstanding accounts.

Weekly Press Going Forward

Canada's rural press is continually improving in news and editorial content, the immediate past president of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association said in Moncton on Monday.

Cecil Day, publisher and editor of the Liverpool, N. S. Advance, said in an interview that the nation's weekly newspapers have taken giant strides forward during the past 10 years.

He was aboard the Canadian National Railways Ocean Limited, en route home after attending four-day annual sessions of the CWNA in Toronto last week. Mr. Day ended his one-year term as CWNA president at the convention.

Canadian weeklies are brightening their pages with more pictures of purely local interest, Mr. Day said. They are also giving readers more and better news coverage, concentrating again on events local in nature.

The home-town approach is being carried over from news pages to editorial columns, Mr. Day said. In general, weekly editors felt it was their responsibility to express views on local rather than national or international matters.

"We weekly editors feel we are the last bulwark of the truly free press," Mr. Day said. "So many Canadian daily newspapers appear stilted. Weeklies are giving a free expression of Canadian opinion not always found in the dailies."

From the advertising standpoint, weeklies are holding their own despite competition from radio and television, Mr. Day said.

MISSIONARY SPEAKS AT WESTPORT

Miss Mattie Curry, of Port Maitland, was guest speaker at the weekly prayer meeting at Westport United Baptist Church Wednesday evening. Her text was "Ye are my witnesses," and she stressed the importance of living as one should as others are always watching. "What is said is not as important as what one lives daily," she went on to say.

She told of her experiences in travelling during war time during the great dangers on the Pacific; then of her return trip and travel through Europe. As Miss Curry is speaking throughout the Maritimes, she hopes to return to Westport soon again.

Record School Enrolment

School enrolment in the public schools in Digby has reached a record high this year, it is reported. Although registrations are yet incomplete the number has already reached 1,214.

Two hundred and nine students have been registered in the primary school; 445 in the elementary school and 560 in the regional high school. Largest increase in enrolment is in Grade VII, entrance to the regional high. In this grade 165 students are enrolled and five sections have been made necessary because of the heavy enrolment.

School supervisor F. C. Purdy stated this week that, despite the heavy enrolment, it would appear at the moment that it will not be necessary to use the former air force barracks on Maiden Lane for classrooms as had been expected earlier in the year.

Mr. Purdy stated no new school sections had been consolidated in the Digby area this year and it would appear that the consolidation so far as the regional high school is concerned, is now complete.

A number of staff changes have occurred this year, it is understood. In the regional high school seven new teachers have joined the staff replacing others who left at the end of the term. Included in the new teachers is Miss T. Gerrior who returns to the school after a leave of absence.

In the elementary school there has been a change of five teachers with a vacancy as music instructor still to be filled. Only two staff changes have occurred in the primary school. These are in kindergarten primary where Miss A. Wentzell is the new teacher and in one of the Grade II classes where Miss L. Kilcup is the new teacher.

Newcomers to the regional high staff include Mr. S. Currie, Mr. D. J. Wallace, Arnold MacCallum, Mrs. M. Gorman, Mrs. N. Irvine, Mrs. J. W. Murley.

In the elementary school newcomers are Mrs. R. Wood, Mrs. M. Collins, Mrs. D. Marshall, Mrs. B. Trask and Mrs. D. J. Wallace.

Peach Picking Time

Local fruit growers, orchardists and householders in this area with peach trees in their gardens report a heavy crop of peaches this season.

At Deep Brook visitors from Halifax and Cumberland County have been enjoying their first picking of Nova Scotia grown peaches. Mrs. DeMing, of Pugwash, and Mr. and Mrs. W. Cornwall and daughter, of Halifax, were delighted with their first experience of picking peaches from the trees of Mrs. DeMing's brother, Eugene Howard, and the Cornwalls from the peach trees of Mrs. Russell Henshaw.

Peach growing has been carried on in Deep Brook with increasing success over the past ten years. Orchardists in the area find the climate and soil produces fruit of a delicious flavour, equal in size, colour and flavour to those grown in Ontario.

This season there has been a real "bumper" crop and many trees, both in the Deep Brook area and around Digby, have had their boughs laden to the ground with ripening fruit.

Unfortunately, orchardists of the area and their invited friends have not been the only ones harvesting the peaches this fall. Raccoons and marmosets have also made inroads into local orchards.

At Hill Grove one peach grower had almost his whole crop stolen and trees badly damaged by marauders who made a night time raid on his orchard. Trees were stripped and many of the limbs broken by the marauders who arrived on the scene by car. These marauders also invaded a number of gardens in the district, stealing corn and other produce.

Anselm LeBlanc and Achille LeBlanc, both of Weymouth, and Wilfred Dugas, of Meteghan, were hospitalized here Saturday following a head-on collision between a half ton truck and a car Saturday morning.

The accident occurred on the main highway near the residence of Maurice Melanson, at Marshalltown. It is understood the LeBlanc car was heading toward Digby and the truck in the direction of Weymouth when the two vehicles collided. A mechanical failure in the truck's steering mechanism was reportedly a contributory factor in the collision.

Takes Over New Parish

Rev. James Pike, former Rector of the parish of Rosette in Round Hill, took up his new duties as Rector of Trinity parish here on Sunday.

Speaking at the eleven o'clock service in the parish church Sunday morning, Mr. Pike based his remarks on our Lord's command to His disciples to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature.

Mr. Pike told of his ministry in various parishes since his ordination. A native of Newfoundland, he served for a time as curate in the cathedral at St. John's. Later he served for a period as priest in charge of a large area in the outports district of Newfoundland. Here he had fifteen stations over a very large area, during the summer he covered the district by boat for the most part but during the winter had to use horse and even dog team.

For nine years Mr. Pike was Rector at Botwood in Newfoundland and came to the parish of Rosette five years ago. He stated he had been treated with great kindness and hospitality during his service in the Nova Scotia parish and looked forward confidently to happy years in Digby. Scallop Sinks In Bay Of Fundy

Three Digby scallop fishermen had a close brush when their scallop dragger sank while heading out for the fishing grounds last Wednesday.

The dragger was about six miles out in the Bay of Fundy when it began to fill with water. The captain, Percy Hudson, and his two man crew, Berkeley Syda and Oliver Graham, lowered a small dory and rowed away from the vessel which sank a short time after they rowed away.

No other draggers were near the Hudson boat, the Perseus, as she sank and the three men were forced to row about six miles before they were picked up by the fish dragger Randar, operated by Farrell Munro.

Fortunately the weather was good and seas calm so the men suffered no ill effects from their long row. They lost most of their personal belongings when their scallop sank. No reason could be given for the sinking except that a seam must have opened in the ship's bottom.

Clare Board Favors Hospital

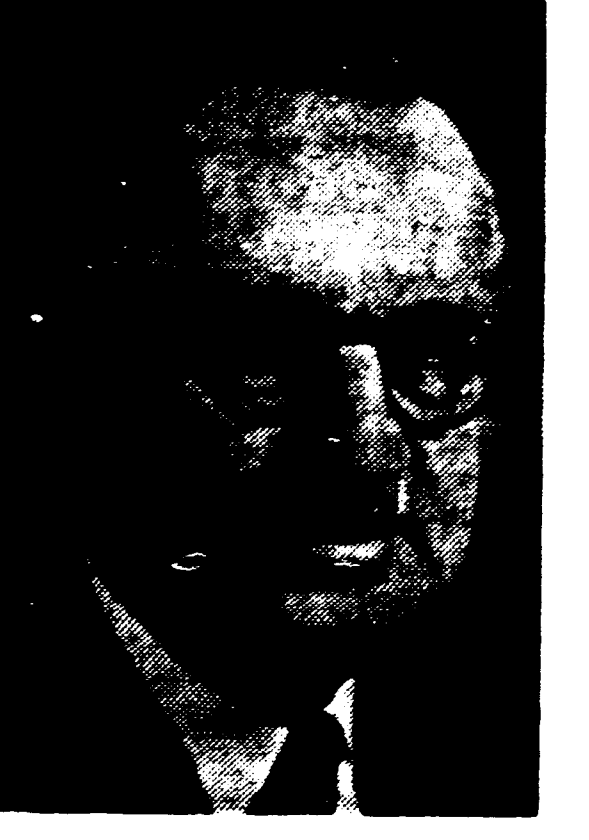
The Clare Board of Trade went on record as favoring a regional hospital for western Nova Scotia administered and operated by the Hospital Sisters of St. Joseph along with the Municipality of Clare and Argyle. The Councils of Clare and Argyle voted in favor of such a hospital when their councils last met.

It is the contention of the Clare and Argyle Councils along with the Clare Board of Trade that a hospital operated by the sisters would be more efficiently and economically operated. Dr. Julius Comeau, president of the Clare Board of Trade, was elected to represent the Board at a meeting to be held in Halifax on Monday afternoon jointly with the Clare and Argyle Council members and the Diocesan Hospital Committee of Yarmouth and the Minister of Public Health, Hon. Donahue in Halifax.

Representing 19,000 Roman Catholics of Yarmouth County and the Municipality of Clare out of a total population of 31,000, the delegation will present their views on the Hospital question to the Minister of Public Health.

Dr. Philip LeBlanc, of Little Brook, gave a brief account of what had taken place regarding the establishing of a hospital. (Please turn to page 8)

Leonard Makes Announcements



Hon. Malcolm S. Leonard, Minister of Education, announced that a new School for the Deaf, to be built jointly by the governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will be located in Amherst, Nova Scotia.

This decision followed a meeting held in August of the inter-provincial committee established by the governments to survey proposed sites for the school. The site selected by the committee, comprising approximately twenty-five acres, is located approximately one mile from the centre of the town of Amherst and in the opinion of the committee is suitable in all respects for the erection and operation of the school. The town of Amherst has promised full co-operation in providing facilities for the school and in making the school a part of the community.

The proposed new school will house approximately 225 students from the two provinces. Facilities will include classrooms, dormitories, recreation facilities, and in particular, space and equipment for the vocational training of students, which have been urgently needed for some time in the Halifax School for the Deaf. Detailed plans are now being prepared and following their approval, construction will start immediately, the minister announced.

Mr. Leonard also stated that the government of Nova Scotia is now making preliminary plans for the erection of a new Teachers' College, to be erected in Truro. The Council on Teacher Education, a committee responsible to the minister, is now preparing recommendations to the minister for the program in the new Teachers' College for the training of regular classroom teachers and for certain types of specialist teachers. Following that, a building committee will be established to determine the nature and extent of the facilities required and construction of the new Teachers' College will begin in 1959.

Exhibition Opens At Bear River

Hon. M. S. Leonard, Minister of Education and Welfare and MLA for Digby, officially opened the Digby County Exhibition at Bear River Tuesday evening. Others taking part in the opening ceremonies included Peter M. Nicholson, MLA for Annapolis West; Deputy Warden Harry J. Lewis of Digby Municipality; C. C. McCuaig, manager of the DAR, and other civic and government representatives.

During the afternoon's program on Tuesday the team of Demetrius Amiraull of Weymouth, won the light draft ox pull. Weighing 2,666 pounds, Mr. Amiraull's team pulled 6,090 pounds for 2.25.

Second in the light draft ox class was the team of Loran Wright, Deep Brook, weighing 2,199, this team pulled 4,320, for 1.96. Third place went to Otis Robbins whose team, weighing 2,116, pulled 3,844 for 1.91.

In the heavy draft class, Demetrius Amiraull's team took first place. Weighing 2,590, this team pulled 6,620 for 2.25. Second place in this class went to Loran Wright's team weighing 3,068, this team pulled 3,200 for 1.04.

The single horse pulling contest at the exhibition, produced some excellent pulling. Avon Sanford's entry from Smith's Cove, took first place weighing 1,157. Mr. Sanford's horse pulled 4,040 for 3.49. Second place went to Clinton Trimmer whose horse weighing 1,240, pulled 4,070 for 3.00. 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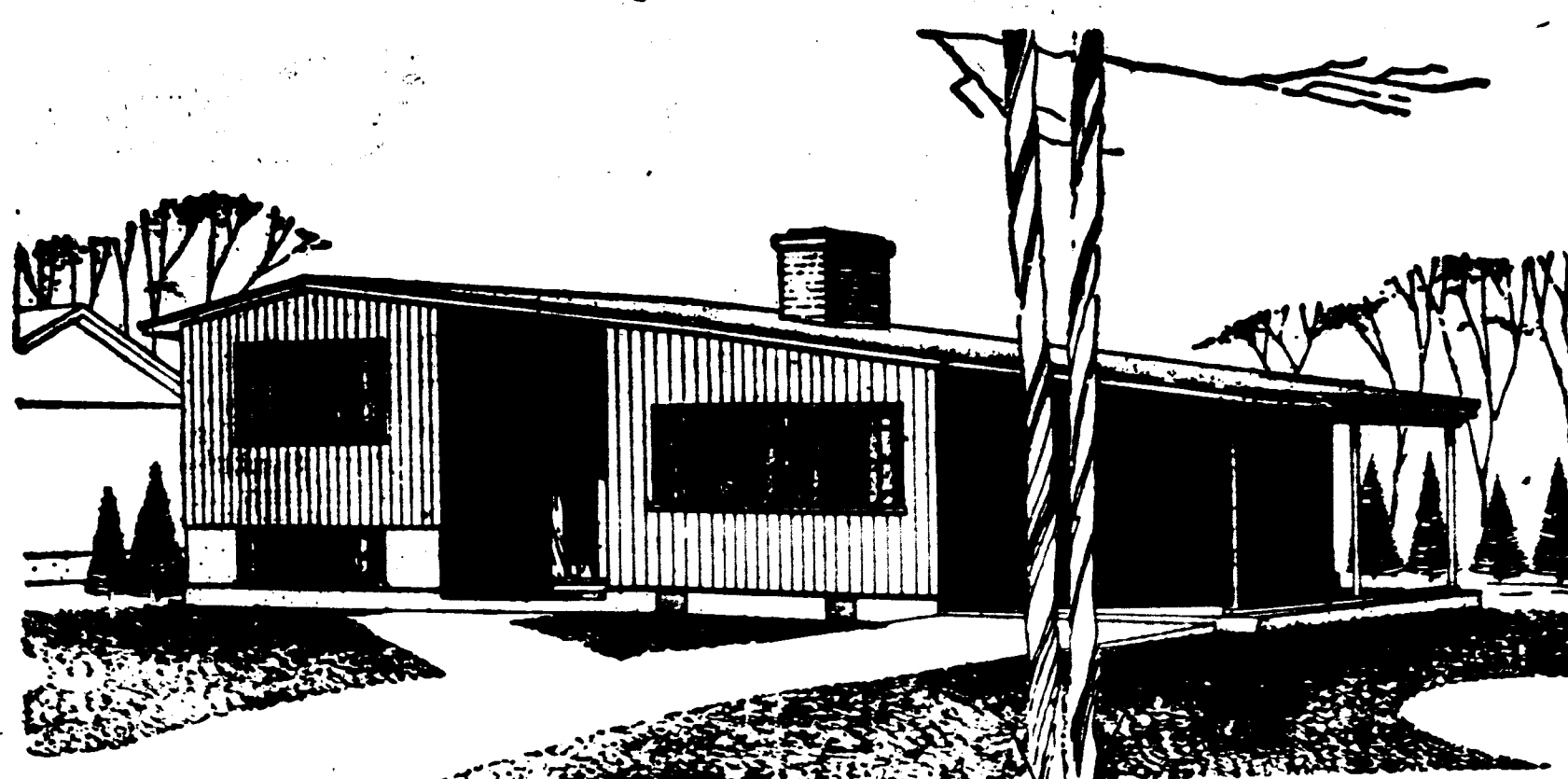
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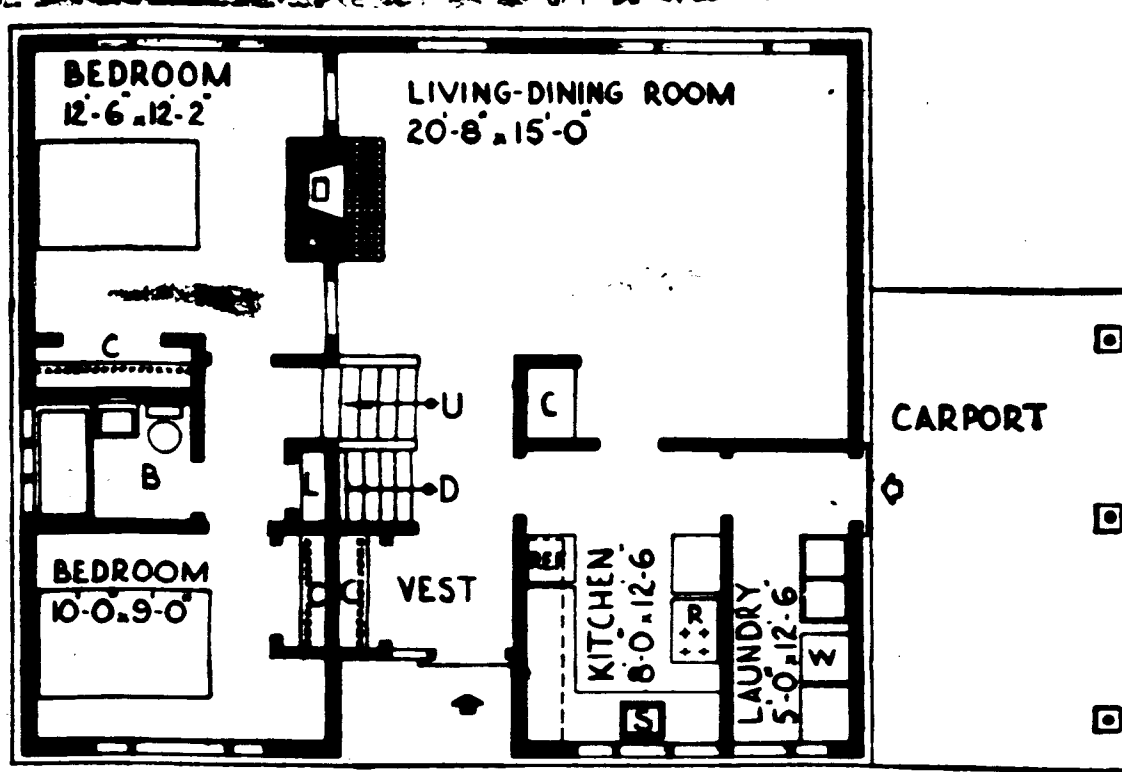
Split-Level Design Suits South-Westerly Orientation

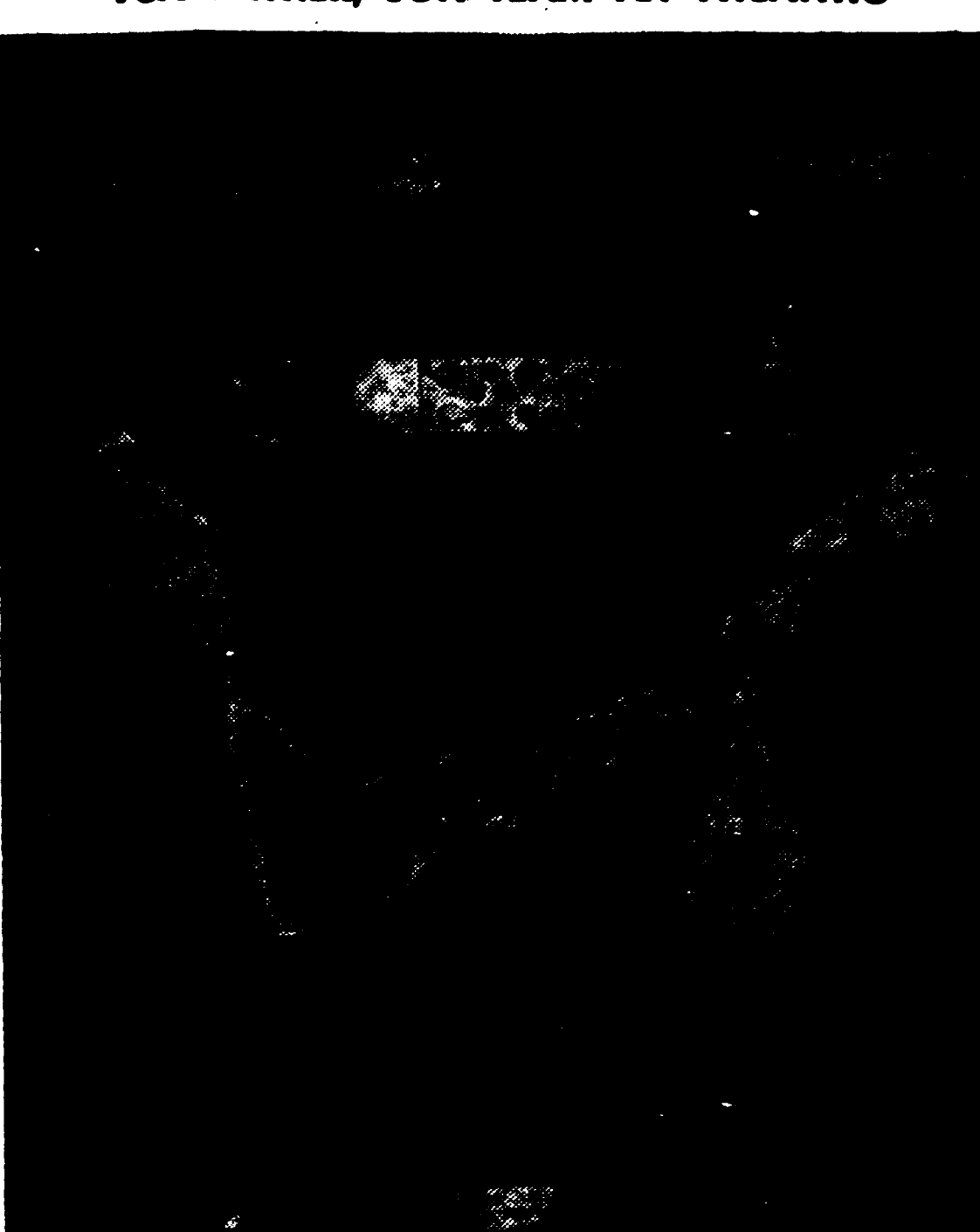
MacDonald told police he brought a friend home with him Tuesday night to sleep and the next day after his "guest" had departed discovered his new three-speed record player missing.

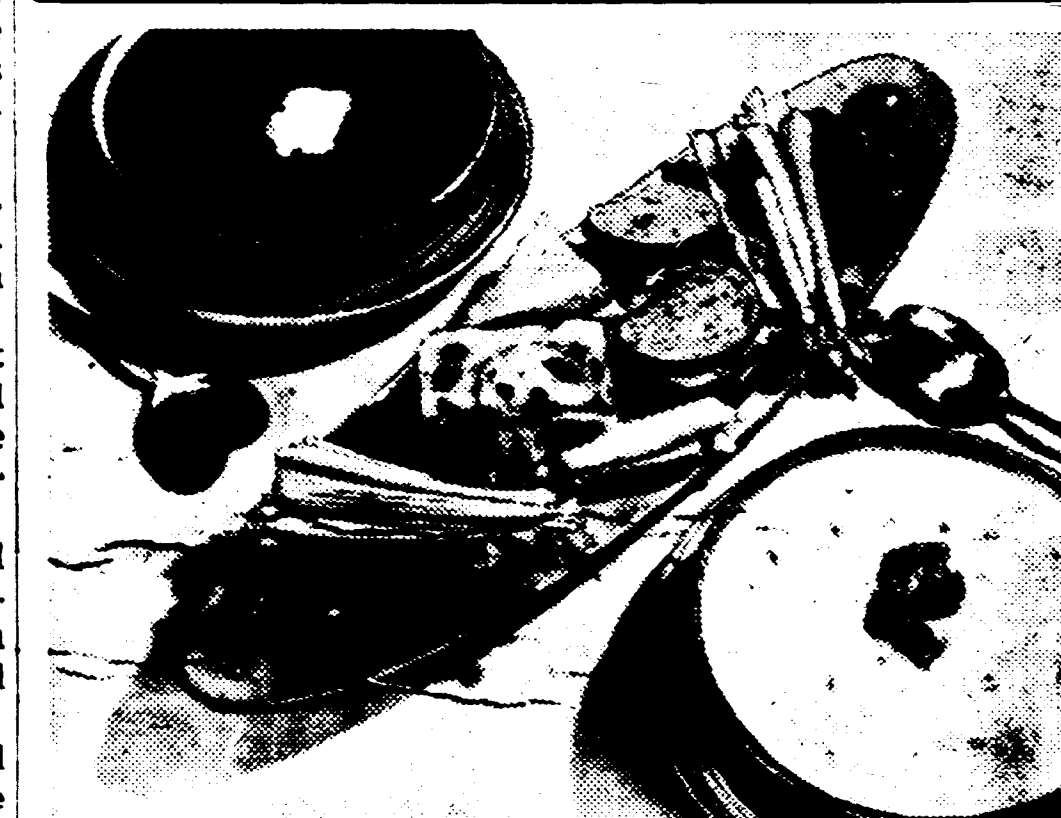



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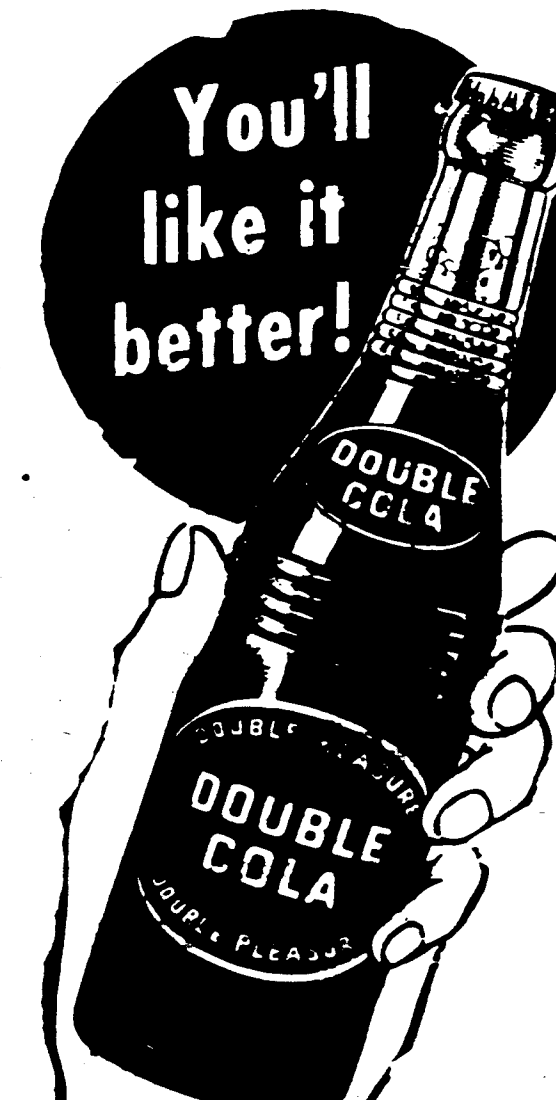

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CLARE SEES HOSPITAL

(Continued from page 1)

In Western Nova Scotia. In 1953 plans had been formulated to construct a hospital in the Municipality of Clare or other region in Western Nova Scotia. It was finally decided that it would be constructed in Yarmouth, which was thought to be more centrally located to serve the area. The plans were formulated by interested parties of the Municipality of Clare and Yarmouth County. In 1954 the Hospital Sisters of St. Joseph were contacted and they accepted the task of constructing and administering the hospital, provided that they could receive government grants. This was long before any effort had been made by the Yarmouth Hospital Commission to prepare for the construction of any hospital in Yarmouth. A brief was presented to the government of Nova Scotia in 1956 asking for the government grants in aid of the construction of the proposed hospital by the Sisters.

Since that time, the National Health Plan was introduced which changed the picture somewhat. The health plan made it quite impossible for the construction to be undertaken entirely by the Sisters of St. Joseph, and assistance from the Municipalities concerned was the only means whereby such a hospital could be built. The original plans of the Sisters was to construct a 100 bed hospital which with the old Yarmouth Hospital was felt would meet the needs of the section.

With the National Hospital Plan coming into effect in Nova Scotia January 1st, 1959, the Yarmouth Hospital Commission also planned on constructing a hospital. The Mayor of Yarmouth, Mr. Killam, suggested that a Regional Hospital be constructed which would be administered by the Sisters of St. Joseph. Some opposition to this plan was met in the Town of Yarmouth, as well as the Municipality of Yarmouth. The Municipality of Argyle in Yarmouth County favored the hospital operated by the Sisters as the Council felt that it would be more efficiently operated.

The Sisters of St. Joseph have the reputation of operating hospitals efficiently and economically, which prompted both the Municipality of Clare and Argyle to favor their operation of a hospital in Western Nova Scotia.

It was felt that the Clare Board of Trade represented the Municipality of Clare, having members from practically all areas of the Municipality enrolled. For this reason, Dr. Julius Comeau, of Meteghan, was selected to attend the meeting in Halifax to represent the will of the peoples of this portion of Digby County.

Prominent Digby Man Passes

Benjamin Henry Ruggles, 66, prominent Digby business man, chairman of the town water commission and former town councillor, died at the Digby General Hospital last Thursday after a short illness.

Mr. Ruggles, who was the youngest son of the late Saint Clair and Phyllida (Outhouse) Ruggles of Tiverton, came to Digby in 1911 and entered the plumbing and tin-smithing business here with W. L. Holdsworth.

He enlisted in the Canadian army and served in the First World War. After the war he returned to Digby and later established his own plumbing and hardware business.

During his residence in Digby Mr. Ruggles took a most active part in civic and community affairs. He served for several years on the town council and was also chairman of the town water commission. He was interested in the welfare of the hospital in Digby and served for many years on the board of directors. He was also active in the Digby board of trade, and in the Digby branch of the Canadian Legion.

Mr. Ruggles was an active member of the Digby Curling Club and participated in many out of town bonspiels.

He was also a member of the Digby Yacht Club.

Also active in fraternal circles, Mr. Ruggles was a past master of King Solomon Lodge, A.F. and A.M., and a member of the Scottish Rite. He was also a past noble grand of St. George Lodge, IOOF. He was an adherent of the United Baptist Church, of Digby, where he served a number of years on the financial board of the church and as a member of the Brotherhood.

He is survived by his wife, the former Daisy Prime of Freeport. One brother, Irving H. Ruggles of Tiverton, also survives, as do two sisters, Myrtle (Mrs. John Clifford) and Rosa (Mrs. James Outhouse), both of Tiverton.

The remains rested at the Ramsay Funeral Home here until Saturday afternoon when the funeral was held at 2.30 p.m. from the Digby Baptist Church. Rev. Firearms Must Be Registered

A further appeal has been issued to persons owning firearms in Canada who have not registered or re-registered these firearms in accordance with the Criminal Code.

According to a notice received from the local detachment of the RCMP, all persons possessing weapons who have not had them registered or who registered weapons prior to 1952 are urged to apply for a registration certificate listing all firearms in their custody.

Registration certificates may be secured by owners of pistols or revolvers that have not been registered by applying for such certificate at the nearest police or RCMP detachment. The application will be forwarded to the RCMP Commissioner in Ottawa where the registration is completed and the certificate issued and returned to the applicant.

In the case of owners of pistols or revolvers registered to them before 1952 the old certificate must be sent to the Commissioner, RCMP, Ottawa, and a new certificate will be issued. If the old certificate has been mislaid then a letter should be written advising when it was registered, the make, model, calibre, serial number, barrel length and number of shots, and a new certificate will be issued.

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H. & S. To Hold Conference Here

A modern approach to problems affecting Home & School Associations in the area of Nova Scotia between Windsor and Shelburne will be adopted at a regional conference of key representatives of these associations, scheduled to be held in Digby on Saturday, September 27th, it has been learned.

The conference will open at 9:30 a.m. with a "chain reaction" forum on the subject, "Making Home & School worth a Dollar Plus". This session is expected to spark some lively debate as it is understood there is not complete agreement in the district concerning the decision of the provincial organization at the annual convention in July to increase the annual membership fee payable to the provincial treasury from thirty-five cents to one dollar.

The whole emphasis of the conference is expected to revolve around the matter of membership in line with the province-wide drive to increase membership in the Home & School organization.

The afternoon session will feature discussion periods on communications, programs, procedure and publicity. These are all expected to be interesting sessions. In the matter of communications there is understood to be some disagreement concerning the role being played by Home & School county councils in the structure of the organization. The opinion has been expressed a new system of communications should be adopted that would place the councils more firmly in the role of a connecting link between the provincial body and local associations.

General chairman of the conference will be Mrs. Jean Pell of Bridgetown, regional vice-president for the western Nova Scotia area. Also playing a prominent role will be Thomas Jones of the adult education division of the education department. Source personnel from the provincial Home & School organization and local councils are being recruited to assist with the discussion periods and training sessions.

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Lunenburg Team Wins Ox Haul

The beautifully matched ox team of Earl Nauss, of Blockhouse, Lunenburg County, won the provincial free-for-all ox hauling contest at the Digby County Exhibition here last week.

Weighing 1864 pounds this team, expertly handled by their colourful owner, pulled a total of 6,270 pounds for 3.36.

Although two other teams in the contest pulled heavier weights their percentage was lower than that achieved by the Nauss team.

Coming second in the pull was the Yarmouth team of Chester Watkins. This team, weighing 2,669, pulled 8,510 for 3.15. Third place went to the Mc Cormack team, weighing 2,340, this team pulled 7,110 for 3.04.

In the free-for-all horse pull Clinton Trimmer's team from Clementevale took first place. Weighing 2,545, this team pulled 8,210 for 3.27. Second place was won by the team of William Phalen, weight 2,750. This team pulled 8,825 for 3.21. Third place went to Claude Lloyd's team, from South Waterville. This team, weighing 2,585, pulled 7,510 for 3.15.

The free-for-all ox and horse pulls on the last day of the exhibition attracted a great deal of attention and attendance at the fair was very good on the closing day. Seven teams of oxen competed in the free-for-all for oxen and twelve teams of horses in the free-for-all horse pull.

Howard Yorke, secretary-manager of the exhibition, stated after the close of the exhibition last Thursday night the management was not discouraged by attendance figures at this year's fair. He stated inclement weather had cut down attendance on the second day but Thursday's figures, he felt, would take the exhibition out of the red.

Mr. Yorke said exhibitors at this year's exhibition were down in number by about twenty-five but exhibits were about the same as last year. Mr. John Harrow, of Bear River, led the exhibitors in the number of exhibits with 65. He was closely followed by Miss Helen Woodworth with 62. Mrs. William Scott came third with 46.

The number of sheep shown at this year's exhibition showed a marked increase, Mr. Yorke said. This is in line with the increased interest in sheep raising in this area, he said. A heavy showing of peaches was also a feature of the exhibition this year. This also reflects the increasing development of peach growing in the area, Mr. Yorke said.

For the first time in its long history the Digby County Exhibition was a three day show this year. It is hoped, Mr. Yorke said, to continue the fair as a three day show in the future. He said the new building added to the exhibition plant this year had proven a great asset and had been fully utilized.

There had been some criticism voiced concerning insufficient entertainment at this year's exhibition, Mr. Yorke said. This lack was no fault of the management, he said, and stated early efforts would be made to line up a full program for the fair next year.

With regard to the exhibition next year, Mr. Yorke said a decision would be made early in the spring concerning the opening up of the Digby County exhibition for province-wide competition. In the matter of stock, especially horses and oxen, he said this might be necessary in order to keep up interest. It might be, however, that the exhibition would only be widened to include competition from Annapolis County. Mr. Yorke said. The decision would have to be made at a meeting held in Truro in April when all provincial exhibition heads met to lay plans.

The auto engineers were providing us with shatter-proof glass, all-steel bodies and four-wheel hydraulic brakes, there remained a safety problem that often used to give me a nervous twang at the pit of my stomach.
On the open highway sometimes, I used to think that with all the power and safety around you in a modern car, there still was the almost haunting thought of: What will I do in a blowout?
Safety tubes and self-sealing tubes came along and took most of the danger and the worry away.
They were wonderful advances, but I still couldn't quite relax. Unless you watch the tires closely, for instance, there is still a chance of having a blowout with self-sealing tubes. Nails or sharp objects in the tire treads can work around and eventually tear the tube.

Coat warm crufters with a mixture of 3/4 cup granulated sugar and 1 1/2 tps. ground cinnamon. Yield —2 doz.

Details of an Air Force aerial mapping system equipped with television viewfinders, a new, high-contrast telescope for satellite tracking, an ingenious, self-threading photo processing machine, and latest developments in photographic science, including colorprint rinses that ward off fungus growth and selenium plates that resist nuclear radiation, will be reported at the second annual conference of the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers, Oct. 6 to 10 in Rochester, N. Y.

George T. Eaton, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Scott Eaton, Digby, Kodak Research Laboratories, is president of the society which expects to attract 1,000 scientists to the conference. Mr. and Mrs. Eaton plan to visit Digby beginning Sept. 16.

In the technical program beginning Monday noon, Oct. 6, scientists from the U. S. photo industry and armed services will report progress in film drying technique and in rapid processing for both airborne and x-ray applications.

Navy ordnance experts will report on a new camera for satellite detection and surveillance.

The sessions on instrumentation and reconnaissance will also hear details of aircraft vibration-reduction studies for better aerial photography carried out at the Wright Air Development Center, Dayton, Ohio.

Two other instrument papers will cover design of a new 35mm radar recording camera for shipboard radarscopes and Xerographic methods for fast processing of military cathode-tube displays in a few seconds so they can be stored for review.

Other technical areas of the program will cover apparatus, theory, and technique for sensory and photographic chemistry and physics.

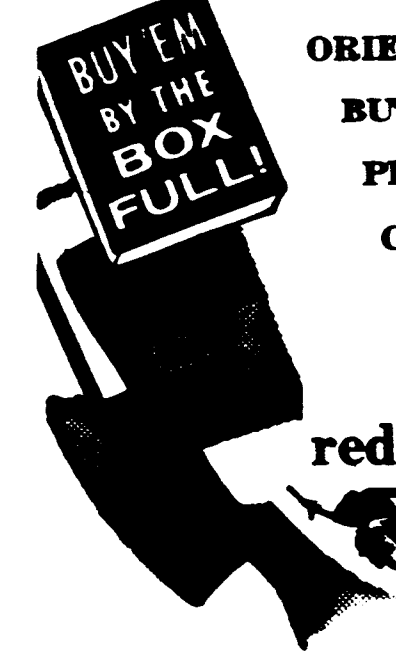

Creates Unique Rosary

What is probably the largest and most unique rosary in the world has been created on the lawn fronting the lovely twin-steeped church bordering the main highway at St. Alphonse de Clare.

The rosary is the result of an inspiration of Father Louis Comeau, rector of the parish of St. Alphonse. One morning he looked out on the lovely oval of grass with its ornamental shrubbery fronting the church and the thought flashed into his mind that this would make an ideal setting for a large and symbolic rosary.

The beads of the rosary created by Father Comeau are the glass globes, enclosed in mesh, used as floats for fishing nets. They are linked together with a chain such as used to hold a ship's anchor. At the end of the bottom chain of the rosary, however, there is not an anchor but a large wooden cross. The medallion of the rosary is of large proportions and is cast in metal.

This unique rosary, which is attracting a great deal of attention from visitors to the church, has a special significance to the people of the district of Clare because it is so closely linked with the livelihood of so many of the Clare people who gain their living from the sea.

To Decide On Payment

Expect To Provide Wood Market

The agreement with Nova Scotia Pulp Limited concerning a new chemical pulp mill in eastern Nova Scotia is in the public interest and will not be affected by the report on the "Forest Resources of Nova Scotia" recently published by the Department of Lands and Forests, Premier Robert L. Stanfield announced recently.

"This report," said the premier, "shows that as a people we have been eating into our timber resources. The report emphasizes that in future we must make wiser use of our forest resources."

"Under wise management this province is potentially capable of producing much more wood than we are producing today."

"Sound forest management means, among other things, that we cut wood when it is ready to be cut. This means that we do not cut it too soon; but it also means that we do not let it rot or become ridden with disease."

The report issued by the Department, Mr. Stanfield stated, "shows that we have been cutting much of our wood too soon. It has long been recognized, however, that we have not been cutting some of our wood at all."

"The agreement with Nova Scotia Pulp Limited is a step towards sound management of our forests. Under the agreement an average of 150,000 cords of wood a year will be cut from Crown Lands which are for the most part over-mature and in need of cutting. For the most part trees grown on these lands are more suitable for pulpwood than saw-logs."

"The agreement with Nova Scotia Pulp Limited," continued the premier, "will bring these lands into effective use and will place them under scientific forest management. Cutting must meet the approval of provincial foresters and cut-over lands which do not regenerate naturally must be restocked by the company. The Government has been advised that under such management the annual yield of these lands will increase substantially over the years."

"It is also contemplated that Nova Scotia Pulp Limited will buy a further 100,000 cords of wood a year in the open market. Some of this will be hardwood. Some of it will be slabs and other by-products of sawmills which is now largely wasted. Some of it may be pulpwood which is now exported, and some of it will come from wood lots in eastern Nova Scotia which are capable of yielding more pulpwood."

"In short," said Mr. Stanfield, "the proposed chemical pulp mill will result in better utilization of some of our forest resources which are now being under-used. Hardwood is one of these resources. Another is the balsam fir of eastern Nova Scotia."

"The proposed new pulp mill will provide a market for wood which is not being cut. It therefore represents a step towards sounder management of our forests."

Highways Garage To Be Built

A new garage to house department of highways snow ploughs and other machinery is being constructed on the main highway at Conway east of Aymar's corner toward Annapolis.

This new garage, it is understood, will be used to replace the present building on the Hill Grove road and will be heated. An artesian well is being drilled to provide water for the new building.

Church Support

"The work of service clubs such as Kiwanis should be church oriented", stated Victor Cardoza, well known Anglican layman, in an address before the Digby Kiwanis Club as the club marked its "support of churches" week.

In his address Mr. Cardoza said it was not enough for a club such as Kiwanis to devote only a part of its program to the support of churches. "All of your work should be church oriented, geared to the furtherance of Christian ideals."

He stated that in saying this he was not suggesting the Kiwanis club should seek to displace the church, to take over the job that is the church's to do. "This would be folly, he said, although it is a pattern of many organizations in our modern society." Rather, the club should seek to be an arm of the church, to strengthen and support it.

The church today, he said, is an embattled church. Surely it should not also have to fight against the appeal of a club which has Christian service as its aim. Service work through an organization like Kiwanis should be an outreaching of one's work as a churchman and its goal should be a fullness of service rather than the promotion of the organization.

In its support of churches the Kiwanis club should be an ally in the fight against compromise in the home, business and workshop, the speaker said. The real battles of faith, he said, are being fought in factories, shops, offices, political parties, homes, through the press, radio and television. It is often said the church should get into these fields but it is already in them through its laity. It is up to lay organizations such as Kiwanis to accept their discipline in these fields.

If members of Kiwanis, he concluded, along with other Christian people regard themselves as individually and collectively sharing responsibility for the corporate life and witness of the church in the place in which they live then they can feel they are doing their job in support of churches. We then can be sure, he said, we are doing our part to make the church a living centre of Christian faith, witness and fellowship.

The speaker was introduced by Kiwanian Captain Clarence Bradley of the local Salvation Army corps and the thanks of the meeting expressed by Kiwanian Dr. J. R. McCleave.

It is hoped that the people of Digby will take advantage of this opportunity to learn of the commission's requirements, so that, when they do have to file a claim, they will be able to do so correctly and thus avoid delays in payment.

Former Clinic Worker Speaks At Wolfville

Dr. W. H. D. Vernon, at present Associate Professor of Child Development and Family Life at the University of Vermont and Human Relations consultant in the extension department of the State of Vermont, was guest speaker at the tenth anniversary meeting of the Maritime Psychological Association in Wolfville last week.

Dr. Vernon, who was the driving force behind the organization of the association and served as its first president, dealt in his address with developments in the teaching of psychology over the past twenty-five years.

When the Maritime Psychological Association was formed Dr. Vernon was head of the department of psychology at Acadia University. After serving in that post for some time he became associated with the Cornell University project here and later completed post graduate studies at Cornell.

At the afternoon session, which will be chaired by James Wilson, L. D. Foster will discuss communications in Home & School. Workshop sessions will then be held on program problems, publicity and business procedure.

A panel discussion on problems concerning Home & School submitted by delegates to the conference will feature the evening program.

In India



Miss Kena A. Keans, a native of Port Wade but working as a teaching missionary in India since 1922 except for furloughs, has written the Courier and sent a splendid book marking the graduation and seventy-fifth anniversary of the Hird High School in Narasapur.

The book sent to the Courier by Miss Keans contains many photographs of the school staff, pupils and graduates and also shows scenes around the various parts of the school.

Historical sketches included in the book trace the progress of the school since it was founded. It is stated there was already a school in the Christian hamlet of Narasapur when the first missionary went there to live in 1883. At that time the community was an outstation of Ongole, 61 miles away.

The early missionaries took an interest in the education of girls which had previously been considered unnecessary. In 1911 the school at Narasapur was made the central boarding school for the northern area, and in 1930 the cornerstone for the Hird memorial school was laid. This school, which is used seven days a week, is considered a model and it is interesting to learn that 90% of its graduates are in Christian work.

The history of the school from 1943 to 1958, contained in the book, was compiled by Miss Keans. In it she says that in the last five years the strength of the school has doubled. Records show the enrolment for 1952-53 as 255 and for this school year the number has reached 537.

In early days the school was a primary and elementary educational institution but since 1948 it has been a complete high school. Pupils at the school participate in the school parliament; have a company of Girl Guides; six Christian Endeavour chapters. In 1955 Stillman Hostel, a residence of women teachers was added to the campus. This building also provides living quarters for fifty girls at present.

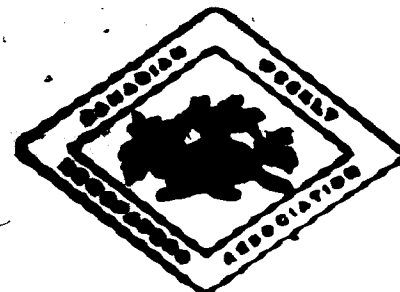
In her historical sketch Miss Keans writes that, in the ten years since India has achieved independence the news of her spectacular growth has gone around the world. "We are glad to have been alive in these changing and challenging years in India. But we live with great uncertainties. If we were certain about everything we might forget our need for God, the one Certainty. We still need the prayers of many friends for the Hird high school. We need more class rooms and dormitory space. We need consecrated teachers who will lead our girls in usefulness to India and especially in usefulness to the church of Christ in India."

Prefer Canadian Christmas Trees

Most New Englanders will decorate their homes with Canadian Christmas trees this year, according to a report in "Foreign Trade" from the Canadian Trade Commissioner in Boston. One wholesaler estimates that 70 per cent of the New England market will be supplied by Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Balsam is by far the first choice in New England, with about 90 per cent of the demand. Spruce comes second. A few Scots pine are offered but this species is still not popular. Customers want trees with even whorls and of heavy density, five to eight feet high but price is often the deciding factor. Offers of plantation stock are rare in the area because local and Canadian supplies of wild trees at suitable prices are equal to the demand.

Mushrooms

Mushroom season is here and those who ordinarily "sleep in" are now up bright and early to gather the delicious morsels for a tempting breakfast. Not only do the early hours mean getting the mushrooms in time for breakfast but mushrooms are a delicacy not always found in vast quantities. Should anyone happen to know a favorite spot the early morning-rising is most likely to keep the spot a secret or then too "the early bird catches the mushrooms." With more people acquiring an appetite for the mushroom dish, the mushroom gatherer is finding it more difficult to keep his treasured haunt a secret.

Steaming hot mushrooms with lots of butter prepared for toast or to garnish the steak can be delicious but we must still issue the warning to new mushroom gatherers that while there are only a few poisonous varieties of mushrooms there still are those dangerous few to avoid.

By the way, we thank John McBride of Rossway for the nice 9 inch in diameter specimen which he left on the editor's desk. It made a tasty meal. Another good large mushroom, ten and a half inches in diameter came from the field of Edgar McDormand, Westport.

Visit Westport

Just before the editor left for a weekend in Westport on Brier Island, Saturday, she was conversing with a gentleman who said "Westport, oh yes, they say it is lovely down there and the people are wonderful. I've never been there but I'm making a point to get there soon." The gentleman was right. It is lovely there. A poet might be able to do justice in describing it but we won't try. All we can say is that the scenery is magnificent at East Ferry, Tiverton, Freeport and again at Westport where every mile of its limited highway, no matter which point on the compass you follow, is packed full of scenic beauty. The weather over the past weekend added to the beauty and the pleasantness of a weekend there.

We think others who had ambitions like the gentleman above must have made a point in fulfilling them this summer for we understand from the Westport ferry hands that the season has been particularly busy. A record crossing of 55 cars in one day from Freeport to Westport was reached this summer and a record of 256 cars in one week was also reached. Many of the cars it is understood bore foreign number plates, some representing native sons and daughters returning to the home village but also many were tourists who had just come to see the beauty of the island. We suggest that when a tourist asks "What is there to see in Digby County?" besides the other answers you might give, do be sure to say "See Westport."

Each year you return to Westport you find the people have remained the same wonderful people referred to above. Hospitality seems to be the key-word of the place. But if the hospitality has remained unchanged there are other things which have not remained the same in Westport.

The biggest transformation noticed was that of the store of E. C. Bowers Co. Ltd. This store, according to the present proprietor, Barnard Bowers, was established by the late E. C. Bowers in 1887 and except that it was incorporated fifty-one years ago had remained unchanged to the present year. The interior was completely remodelled this summer and made into one of the modern self service stores so fashionable throughout the country. It is the only one of its kind on Digby Neck and Islands. Two things do remain the same at the store Mr. Bowers said. "You can still purchase everything here from a needle to an anchor including groceries, confectionery, hardware and numerous items. The chief difference is the convenience for customer and clerk." The other thing unchanged was the long bench-like smokers seat under which is still kept nails of various sizes and assortments. Here the men of the village still gather not so much to spin yarns to-day as to watch their favorite shows on the T.V. which Mr. Bowers installed for their convenience.

While a few hours did not give us time to note all the changes on the island in the past year we did note that H. G. Titus had purchased the grocery and lunch room business formerly operated by Mr. and Mrs. Welch. We understand that full course meals are served now for the tourists and commercial visitors.

A new Westport Fisherman's Co-operative Co. has also been set up within the past year. History shows that such an organization had also come into existence in Westport back in 1891.

Progress on the island is also noted in the work underway for the new ferry wharf. Large cement crib beds are now in the village, one of which has already been placed and the others ready to be put in place as the work on the wharf progresses. In the meantime the ferry uses a temporary landing place. Unchanged is the courtesy always in evidence by the ferrymen.

Roads to the "lights" have been widened and made more convenient for travelling. Which brings to our mind the new summer cabins which have been built on the island in recent years. Although the island is not extensive in mileage there are now in the vicinity of fifteen summer cottages or cabins all belonging to residents of the village who also own regular year round homes.

We've enjoyed fishing in Westport on previous occasions but this was the first time we left the island with a basket of mushrooms. We don't expect they are new to the island but the fall season was new for our visit there.

We still say you haven't seen Digby County until you have visited its most westerly point, Westport.

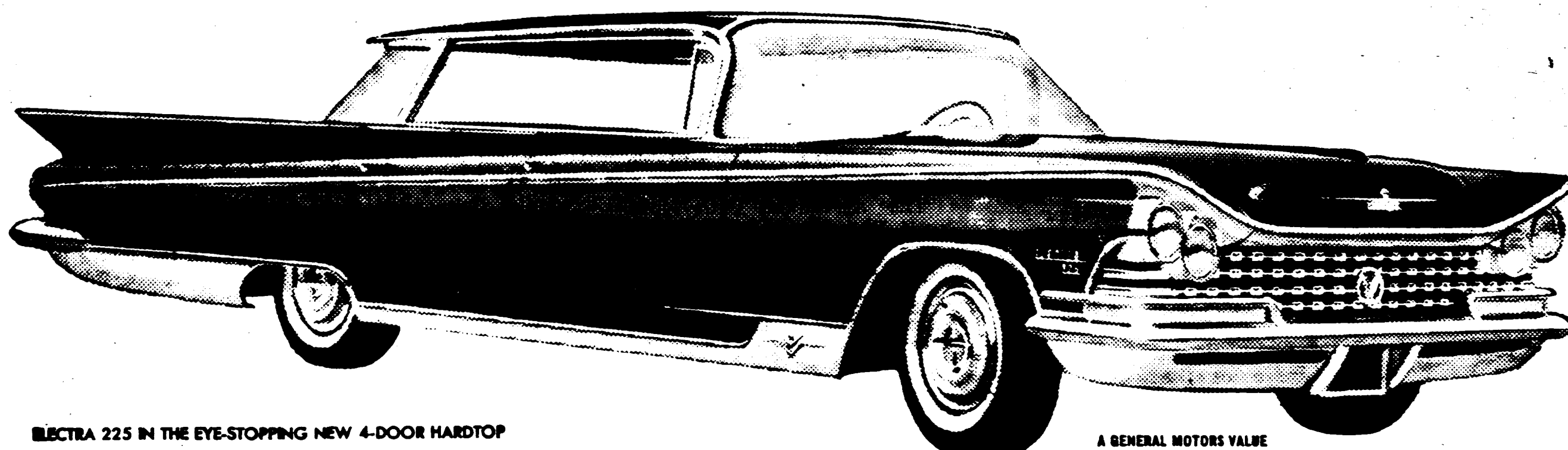

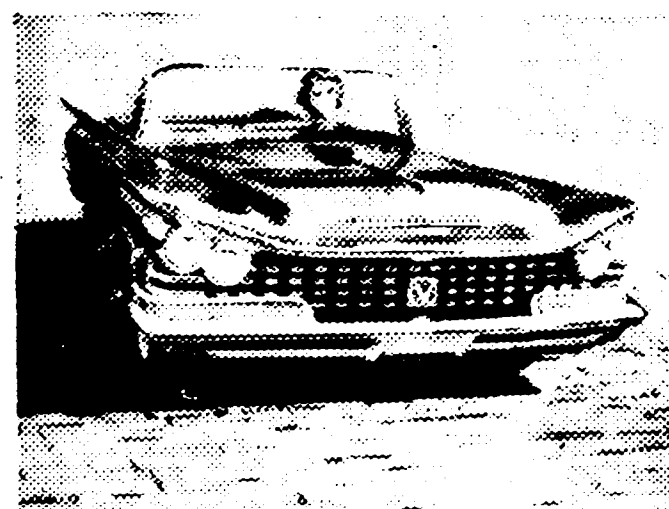

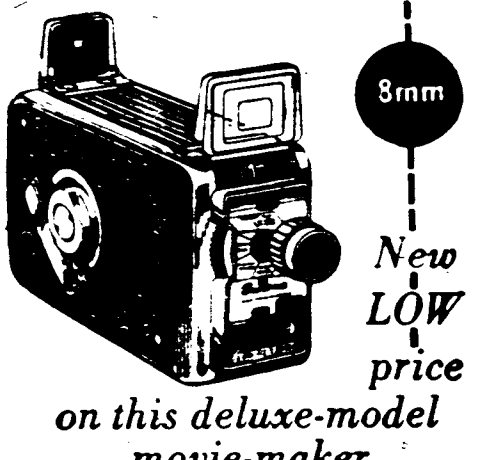

Brush with cold water and let rise another 1/2 hour. Meanwhile, stand a broad shallow pan of hot water in the oven and preheat oven to hot, 425°. Remove pan of water from oven and bake the rolls in steam-filled oven for 1/2 hour, brushing them with cold water and sprinkling lightly with cornmeal after the first 15 mins., and again brushing them with cold water 2 minutes before removing baked buns from the oven. Yield—18 rolls.

"Instantly" Broiled



The fishing industry's annual Fish and Seafood Buffet held in Ottawa to mark the opening of National Fish Week presented ample opportunity for guests to sample enticing fare representative of the finny and shelled delights of our coastal and inland waters. An impartial observer would have found it difficult to single out for particular attention one dish from the array of spicy pickled, canned and smoked fish, succulent fresh water fillets, specialty seafoods and salt water delicacies. Nevertheless there was awesome appeal for eyes and palate in the whole salmon and whole halibut decked out specially for the occasion by the chefs at the Chateau Laurier. Such dishes rank with the most regal fare.

It's not necessary to wait for a special occasion demanding the presentation of a piece of resistance such as cooked whole salmon or halibut to enjoy these fish. Steaks are always available, fresh or frozen, and prices and supplies right now are good. The control of time and temperature when fish is broiled is a sure guarantee of moist steaks, flavorful down to the last flaky morsel. The following method uses a surprise ingredient in the form of instant coffee which has an unusual effect in complementing the naturally good flavor of the fish. The Fisheries Council of Canada recommends it particularly for halibut steaks and we think you'll like it too with varieties such as salmon and cod.

BROILED STEAKS AU BEURRE CAFE

2 pounds fish steaks (halibut, salmon, etc.)
1 tablespoon instant coffee
¼ cup melted butter or margarine
¼ teaspoon onion salt

If steaks are frozen, let them thaw on refrigerator shelf or at room temperature. Combine lemon juice with instant coffee; add to melted butter with onion salt and parsley. Brush liberally on fish steaks. Broil, 3 inches from heat, 5 minutes. Turn fish; brush again with butter mixture. Broil 5 minutes, or until fish flakes when tested with a fork. Brush again with butter mixture; sprinkle with more parsley if desired and serve. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Score With Scallops



An impressive display of fish and seafood tempted guests at Ottawa's Chateau Laurier, when the president and directors of the Fisheries Council of Canada hosted the annual Fish and Seafood Buffet to mark the opening of National Fish Week. So wide was the choice that many never did get a chance to sample every offering. Colorful smoked salmon, succulent oysters on the shell, mixed seafood shimmering in aspic, whole garnished salmon and halibut, crisp deep-fried haddock fillets, tender scallops in rich Newburg sauce were some of the items, each with appropriate sauces and garnishes — the selection was such that even to think of the delectable fish array stimulates the taste buds.

Any of these fish dishes would strike a happy note on the table at home. One idea to tuck away for entertaining — Scallops Newburg. Such an elegant shellfish specialty lends itself to before-hand preparation and can be served in the grand manner from a chafing dish, perhaps at an evening buffet. And the Newburg variation is but one way to enjoy scallops. The sweet flavor of scallops will win plaudits from the family on the most ordinary occasion. A quick and easy way to fix them is to dip the scallops in tangy lemon juice, then in a savory crumb mixture, before sauteing them lightly. You'll note by the following recipe they should be cooked quickly to remain tender and flavorful — flavor that is something special, in this case set-off by a whisper of garlic.

SAUTEED SCALLOPS

1 pound scallops
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon tarragon vinegar (optional)
1 cup fine dry bread crumbs
1 tablespoon paprika
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup butter or margarine
1 clove garlic
Chopped parsley and chives

Wipe scallops, and if desired, cut large ones into two or three pieces. Combine lemon juice and vinegar. Mix bread crumbs, paprika, pepper and salt. Dip scallops in lemon juice, then coat with bread crumb mixture. Melt butter or margarine in a skillet. Add garlic. Saute scallops in hot garlic butter about 2 minutes, turning once to brown both sides. Serve immediately, offering chopped parsley and/or chives for sprinkling over the sauteed scallops. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

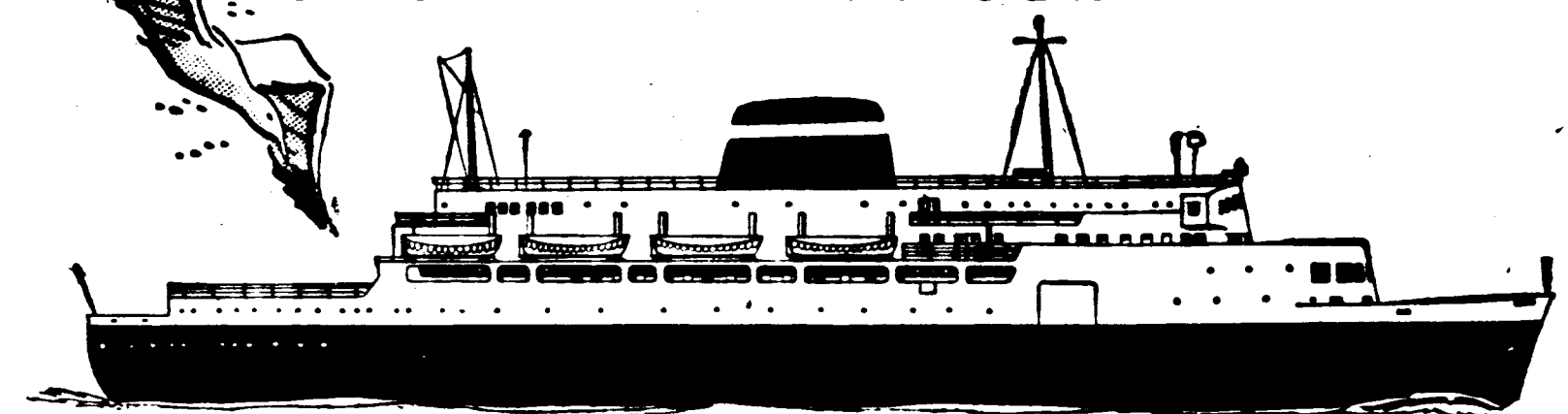

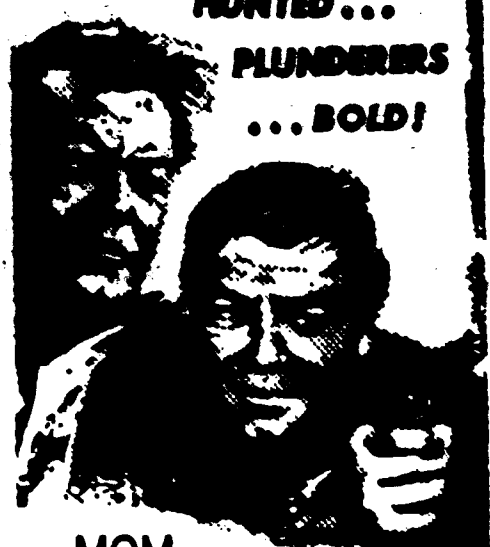

day, the General said he has found a general realization across Canada that some plan for civil defence is important. He said he also has found, however, that people at the moment feel the threat is not urgent enough to arouse their interest in participating fully in the work of an organization. He stated since the civil defence organization was first set up and plans made there have been great changes in weapons. Missiles have been introduced and even the hydrogen bomb developed since the or-

ganization was first developed. These changes have created new problems requiring a review of present plans and possible introduction of new approaches to the matter of civil defence.

This is Junior Red Cross Week in Canada. The Junior Red Cross is the world's largest youth movement, with 45 million members in 71 countries. It helps establish understanding and sympathy among the young people of the world.
