From the files of the Chamber of January 23, 1967, the following account has been copied concerning India in 1965:

Adding a number of 60 newspapers which sent it to be friends is a copy of the Saint John Gazette of May, 1881, says the Telegraph and among other advertisements contained in the issue before us is one describing the town and township of Digby, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this area we are told the township of Digby "extends from the Gut of Cansimble westward to the extremity of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 124,000 acres." The town plot is then described.

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Bay, and twenty miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles distant from the head of H. Mary's Bay. This land, and not from the water's edge, partly is level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having with an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Bay, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in where it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. 

Gerald V. Bishop
Gerald Vivian Bishop, president of Jack and Company Limited and one of Halifax's best known insurance executives, died suddenly Friday night, June 19, at his home, 2 Brenton Place. He was 63.

Mr. Bishop became president of Jack and Company in 1947 after having been associated with the company for a number of years. He was a past president of the Nova Scotia Board of Insurance Underwriters.

Born in Digby, Mr. Bishop was a son of the late George and Margaret (Guthrie) Bishop. He entered the bank of Nova Scotia in 1909 and went to Halifax in 1913 to work with the bank of Nova Scotia and held various positions with the bank, including manager of a Bell Island, Newfoundland, branch.

He returned to Halifax and joined the insurance company in which he held the controlling interest at his death. Only recently he had purchased the property formerly occupied by Mrs. John Scott Trust Company and transferred his business operations there.

He was survived by one of the city's outstanding philanthropists and gave generously support to scores of charitable campaigns and to local institutions. An ardent hunter and fisherman, Mr. Bishop was a member of the Ashburn Golf Club, the Mayflower Golf Club, the Halifax Club, the C. G. Club, and a member of the Halifax Board of Trade.

He is survived by his wife, the former Rena Anne Adamore of Halifax, one son Keith, who has been associated with his father in business; two daughters, Misses Louise E. Mott, Halifax, and Jean, at home; eight grandchildren and two brothers, Walter in Weymouth, and Doug in California.

He was predeceased by three sisters and two brothers, including a twin brother. The funeral service was held Monday at 10:30 a.m. at the Halifax Funeral Home, 90 Dorel Row, and interment was in Gate of Heaven cemetery.

A warning that democracy is in mortal danger "because we who extend its stricture are not prepared to accept its restrictions" was voiced at Murray Bay by Prof. Marcus Long of the University of Toronto. Discussing Canada's role in helping to improve the lot of the world, the noted educator stressed that "in the first place we use our influence in the International field to stop major nations from trying to shape other nations in their own image."

Camps this year are held from July 4th to 18th; July 20th to August 2nd, and August 4th to 22nd, with 20 children attending each. If enough girls wish to be guests at Camp Digby, there is a possibility that the third camp will be for them only.

New Act Announced

In a press release June 20th, the Honourable G. I. Smith, Q.C., Minister of Highways, Province of Nova Scotia, announced that

the new Motor Carrier Act will be proclaimed on July 28th, 1959, to come into effect on and after September 1st, 1959. The new Act, passed by the Nova Scotia Legislature in 1958 and amended in 1959 provides for

the issuance of public certificates of public convenience and necessity are issued to operators of public passenger vehicles and school bus certificates are issued to school bus operators.

The new Act applies not only to persons who carry on a business of a public carrier of passengers and operators of school buses but also to all persons who operate freight vehicles for the purpose of carrying goods or merchandise or a motor vehicle and trailer having more than two axles.

Persons to whom the new Act applies are required to obtain a motor carrier license from the Board of Motor Commissioners of Public Utilities and applications should be filed with the Board on or before August 1st, as far as possible in advance of the September 1st deadline.

Under the new Motor Carrier Act carriers of freight in the Province to whom the Act applies, are now for the first time subject to regulation and are required to be licensed. This means also that under the Motor Vehicle Transport Act (Canada) 1954 persons operating extra-provincial undertakings into or through the Province of Nova Scotia will now be required to obtain licenses from the Board upon the like terms and conditions and in the like manner as the extra-provincial undertaking so operated were a provincial undertaking.

A series of Canadian topics which arise daily in our conversation, supplied by the publishers of "Quick Canadian Facts", the pocket annual of facts about Canada.

The first formal royal tour of Canada was in 1860 when the then Prince of Wales, who became Edward the 7th, visited here.

Except for Newfoundland, Canada's most easterly province is Quebec; along the north shore of the St. Lawrence, Quebec extends nearly as far east as the city of St. John's, Nfld.

The six Ontario villages that had to be moved because of the St. Lawrence Seaway power dams are combined in the new towns of Inglewood and Long Sault.

The towns of Rock Island, P. Q. and Derby Line, Vermont, share a public library that straddles the international boundary. One of Canada's largest print shops, the federal government printing bureau, employed 1,670 workers in 1958.

The Canoe Canyons, the land bridge linking Cape Breton on the mainland of Nova Scotia, is nearly a mile and a half long and carries both railway and highway traffic.

There are about 13,000 bob in Canada now.

Canada's largest bird sanctuary is James Bay, Akimiski Island, 1,300 square miles.

Alexander Muir, a Toronto school teacher, wrote the words and music of the "Maple Leaf".

Alberta hosts all Canadian provinces in sheep raising; second by Ontario.

audience," according to W. H. "Bill" Cranston, head of the Shoe Corporation of Canada. Addressing the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association in Regina, Mr. Cranston said, "No audience will remain 'captivated' for long simply by repeating some physical limitation of media."

TV or radio signals. "Captivated" for advertisers basically not because of any limitation of competitive strength, but because their horizons are coincidental with those of the editors, the reporters and the advertisers who jointly create the community journal.

Newspaper "captivation," Mr. Cranston told the convention attended by some 400 Canadian publishers and their wives, consists essentially in the fact that their news, comment and advertising is personally purveyed by persons their readers know and can, therefore, personally evaluate.

"Other mass media seldom if ever approach the degree of consumer acceptance and influence which the good newspaper receives as natural and therefore, fails to merchandise to potential advertisers. The community-minded newspaper introduces its readers to the new and the novel in terms of the known. It thus attains a degree of 'captivation' which is unknown to more remote and therefore more 'artificial' media. It is an acknowledged fact that the best selling method is person to person, that is, face to face," Mr. Cranston continued. "But the cost of selling this way is for most manufacturers prohibitive."

"So the next best method is for a known person, that is, a local dealer, to sponsor a product or service over his own name in a medium known and respected locally. This is where the local newspaper, with its 'captivated' audience, can do such a good job. It can be and is a key link between consumer, marketer and manufacturer."

To illustrate this point, Mr. Cranston disclosed that dealer-localized national advertising, placed experimentally last year in over 100 Canadian daily and weekly newspapers, had "increased the volume of their Hewlett-Packard footware by over 47%."

"If newspapers, weekly and daily, ever exploit the full potential of this merchandising partnership with the national advertiser, they will never need to fear the loss of their role as the nation's preeminent advertising medium," he concluded.



A folding table and chairs will be useful for games, homework and letter writing. Don't forget ample lighting and a large bookcase. Just might encourage a return to reading as a family hobby!

Weeklies Report News Accurately

Canada's weekly newspaper has been prosperous and stable than they have ever been. The trend away from the news has not dulled the vitality of the small town weekly.

So said Leslie E. Barber, Chief Editor (B.C.) publisher who was elected president of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association at Regina July 17. Asked how the trend toward "lighter" news was affecting the weekly newspapers, Mr. Barber said weeklies are growing and changing with their communities.

"Times that sleep for 100 years are suddenly bursting into activity. New factories, oil fields, new mineral discoveries and the general trend toward urbanization in Canada are turning small towns into large ones," he said.

"The result is a new generation of publishers, many of whom are skilled in certain aspects of the business far beyond what their fathers thought was necessary."

"We have larger plants which are better equipped, more efficient. We have high wages and unions. Like most businesses we are faced with the awful spectre of costs rising our dollar volume."

"But there is this difference. No matter how large our businesses are becoming most of us still owe to our communities and our people. We are perhaps more conscious than big city businessmen are about it. It is this which makes us more reluctant to participate in the spiral."

Mr. Barber urged the publishers to continue the traditional attitude of the weekly newspaper. His approach toward news. He suggested they keep these questions in mind:

"Have we still the same kindly, understanding and competent approach to news or are we falling in the delectable but banal sensationalism of some of our city journals and other media?"

"Do we still report the news fully, decently, reflectively and with a measure of human understanding?"

"Is it his view that weeklies have been able to carry out their function in keeping with the traditions established by pioneer publishers."

"This is what makes us different," he said. "This is what makes us clean, decent and an asset to the country. This is why I know we can be proud of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association and all it stands for."

Indian Campsite Excavated At Deep Brook

By Lillian Henshaw

During the past two summers (1957-'58) some interesting historical finds have been made by Mr. J. S. Erskine of Wolfville and Miss Jane McNeil of the Nova Scotia Museum, Halifax, in the interests of the Nova Scotia Museum, on the property of "Colonial Arms" at Deep Brook, Annapolis County.

Information of the old Indian campsite recently excavated was first obtained from John McEwan, an old man of Indian descent living at Bay View Digby, by County, who remembered having camped there in his boyhood days with other Indians until a superstition of ghosts made the spot inhabitable.

Excavation shows there were three wigwag sites levelled out of the gravel hillside, varying in age from 100 to 1000 years ago.

During the first excavation the skeleton of a seven year old girl was found. She had died in the winter for a bone fastener (used on cloak) was found and the skeleton was buried in a birch bark bundle. The old Indian custom of those dying during the winter was to wrap the body securely in birch bark and hang it in a tree until the following summer: the found being frozen too hard to bury their dead during the winter months.

During the excavation of 1958 bones of another person have been found on the same campsite. Possibly this burial may have been a century later than the first one found and was that of a woman of about forty years on whose breast lay the skeleton of a newborn baby. Nothing

A PEER AT THINGS TO COME

There's been a lot of talk lately about waterless batteries. But it's a subject I'm not going to become involved in - at least for the present. However, I will say that any battery will operate for a while without additional water. . . and even the so-called waterless batteries will generally last longer if water is occasionally added.

But while I'm on the subject of batteries I would like to pass along a word of caution. That is when you're doing extensive engine work on your car be sure to disconnect the storage battery as a safety measure.

This will prevent someone from accidentally touching the starter button, while you're working under the car. It will also eliminate the possibility of your closing the starting circuit by touching the starting motor terminals under the floorboard with a long-handled screw or crow bar.

Also, before re-connecting the battery cables be sure to clean and coat them with petroleum jelly . . . and make sure that the ground connection is clean and tight. A final word of caution is to never hold a lit match over a storage battery that has unescaped venting. If the battery has been "shorted" an explosion may result which could seriously harm you.

It pays to be cautious, too, when you're shopping around for a used car. You won't get stuck with any canny dealer's junk on lot. Every car has been thoroughly checked and adjusted to give you more miles of trouble-free, economical driving. Drop around anytime and look over our fine selection.

Late blight conditions continue to prevail in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia.

At Charlottetown the average relative humidity was 83.1 per cent and some rain fell on each of these days. Since August 15 the relative humidity has been in the nineties and showers have been common. It is therefore important that strict attention be given to the spray schedule.

Adult populations have been building up in most fields during the past ten days. Second brood flea beetles are also gradually increasing. Athabasca spray or dust should be applied at regular intervals to keep them under control.

To Link With

Network

Establishment of relay transmitters in Digby, Weymouth, Meteghan, Wedgeport and Yarmouth to link Acadian communities in these areas with the French language network of the CBC was forecast this week in an announcement from the CBC that it "will attempt" to switch on seven low power relay transmitters in the Maritimes before Christmas to link the Acadian communities of the Maritime area with the French language network.

It is understood from a statement from a CBC spokesman in Halifax that plans are to locate five of the forty watt transmitters in the western section of Nova Scotia. Negotiations are now underway between the CBC and the telephone companies to ward the construction of towers, which will be set up on telegraph or railway property.

Digby and Wedgeport will tune in on a frequency of 990 kilocycles; Meteghan will use 1490; Weymouth has been assigned a frequency of 1550 and Yarmouth listeners will tune in on 1230.

The board of broadcast governors gave approval in July to the CBC plan for the establishment of the transmitters which will relay French network programs from Quebec to the Acadian listeners. In the past few weeks orders-in-council by the federal government authorized the work and final approval was given Friday by the department of transport.

Council To

Consider Zoning

The Digby Town Council will consider the adoption of zoning by-laws for the town and the setting up of a town planning commission, it was decided at Tuesday night's meeting.

In presenting the proposal Mayor Cardoza said that over the years the town council had often been placed in a difficult position in dealing with applications for building permits because of the lack of zoning regulations. Home owners, too, he said, lacked protection without zoning regulations.

The Mayor presented the council with copies of two books, one produced by the provincial department of municipal affairs some years ago and the other by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, explaining zoning and town planning procedure and asked that council members study these in preparation for further discussion of the matter at a later meeting.

Permission was granted at the meeting to the Rev. John L. Denchfield of the Church of God for the construction of a church building on Sydney Street. In presenting his application Mr. Denchfield said the proposed building would cost some \$10,000.

Council also granted permission to Mr. George Trudeau for the building of a house on his property on Sydney Street and to L. M. Saunders for the renovation of his store building on Water Street.

Town clerk E. S. Eaton reported dog tax receipts to date amounted to \$153. This figure was the highest since 1952. Mr. Eaton said. He said notices had been sent to all known dog owners in the town and that out of 117 notices sent 71 had paid. He was given authority to proceed with warrants against those who had not responded.

It was decided to contact Major Church of the provincial land survey school in Lawrence town to get an estimate on the cost of surveying town streets for the purpose of installing permanent corner boundary markers.

Decision was made to call for tenders for roofing the south side of the fire station on 1st Avenue when a letter was read from the fire department drawing attention to the need for this work.

Tender in the amount of three hundred dollars was accepted from Frank Ryan for a lot of land owned by the town, being part of the former Merkel estate property.

Issues Money

Statement

Curtailment of credit and rationing of loans have been forced on the chartered banks by a combination of tight money and the six percent ceiling on chartered banks' lending rates, according to James Muir, Chairman and President of The Royal Bank of Canada.

As a result of an interview, Mr. Muir made the following informal statement:

"It is clear from comments arising from some quarters and from articles appearing in certain papers that the statement made by the chartered banks last week relative to the present tight money situation is widely misunderstood.

"As far as we are aware, neither the Canadian Bankers' Association nor any of its member banks have sought to increase bank earnings by asking for a rise in the legal maximum rate of interest, viz. 6 per cent, which the banks may charge on loans. This is a point which cannot be emphasized too strongly.

"However, as the Canadian Bankers' Association statement intended to make clear, when the Bank of Canada's minimum lending rate rises above the legal maximum of 6 per cent which chartered banks are allowed to charge, the banks are no longer able — through no fault of theirs — to implement Bank of Canada monetary policy by further increasing the going rate at which customers may borrow.

"It must be made clear to everybody that the Bank of Canada and not the chartered banks controls the volume of money and credit within our country. It is the Bank of Canada which decides when money and credit should be increased, or tightened, or left constant. The machinery which the Bank of Canada uses in order to carry out any given policy works through the chartered banks. For example, let us say the decision of the day is to make money easier — in these circumstances, the Bank of Canada increases the cash reserves of the chartered banks. This makes them flush, and at such a time money becomes cheaper, i.e., the rate of interest is lower. This induces the banks to loosen up their lending policy — a situation which borrowers readily take advantage of, and so we have an expansion of business in almost every direction.

"Now let us examine what happens when a tight money policy comes into force, such as has been the case since last fall. The Bank of Canada decreases the cash reserves of the banks or holds them constant in the face of a growing demand from bank customers for more loans. The net effect is the same in either case. Money and credit grow scarcer and inevitably dearer, the yield on Government Treasury bills rises, the price of Government bonds drops, which increases the yield, the "bank rate" rises and, as part of the cycle, the rate of interest charged by the chartered banks to their customers has to go up. The higher bank rate is thus passed on to the public and this goes on and on until the cost of money to borrowers becomes unprofitable, at which point they start to trim their sails, and so what might be called a period of restriction or a calming down takes place in the whole economy and a boom or an unhealthy active condition is gradually brought to a stop.

"Now, what is the Canadian picture at the moment? First, the Bank of Canada has pursued for months and is pursuing a tight money policy in a battle against inflation. This policy has driven up interest rates to levels seldom, if ever, seen before, but — and here is the nub of the whole question — these interest rates have hit an impregnable barrier, as it were, in the shape of the legal lending rate established under The Bank Act. From this point on, quite obviously the banks are rendered impotent so far as being able to assist in implementing the Bank of Canada's monetary policy through the forces of increasing interest rates.

Conduct Inquiry

Into Death

A magisterial inquiry into the death of Jack William Amoro, nineteen year old Weymouth youth who died in the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, on July 26th, was conducted here Friday afternoon by Halifax magistrate J. MacManus.

The Weymouth youth was injured when he jumped from a car driven by his brother, James, early in the morning on Thursday, July 22nd, while the car was enroute from Digby to Weymouth. He was taken to hospital in Digby following the accident and later to Halifax, where he died.

Evidence concerning the matter was given at the hearing by the driver of the car, James Amoro, brother of the deceased; his mother, Mrs. Payson Amoro; a sister, Nellie (Mrs. Timothy Tebo); a sister, Carol, all of Weymouth, and by Martha Garden, of Plympton, who was also in the car when the accident happened.

The driver of the car, James Amoro, stated as he was leaving Digby on the night of July 22nd with members of his family and Miss Garden his brother Jack, was in the back seat on the right hand side. Near the hospital Jack asked to get out and he let him out. After driving a short distance he turned at the request of his mother and went back. His mother asked Jack to get back in the car and he did so.

At Marshelltown, some distance from Digby on the way to Weymouth, Jack again asked to get out, James stated. He said, "I saw he had his hand on the door handle and I slowed." Next, he said, Carol said, "He's jumped." "I stopped the car and went back and found him lying on the shoulder of the highway."

James Amoro stated his brother had not been drinking. He stated after he found him on the pavement he stopped a car which took the injured boy and his mother and sister back to the hospital in Digby. He said it was a very foggy night. The car was in good condition, he said, and the lights were on.

Martha Garden, 15, of Plympton, said she was a passenger in the front seat of the car on the night of the accident. She said near the hospital in Digby Jack Amoro asked to get out to hitchhike home. She said the driver let him get out and then went back and picked him up.

At Marshelltown, she said, Jack said to his mother, "Mom, I want to get out." The door opened, she said, and when she turned around she saw the deceased's sister, Carol, trying to stop him from getting out. She stated there was little time between his remark and when he was out. She saw the deceased later lying on the edge of the highway, he appeared unconscious and did not talk.

Mrs. Timothy Tebo, sister of the deceased, said at Marshelltown she heard him ask to be let out of the car. She stated she heard her mother say, "Don't let him out. I don't want him to walk to Weymouth." She said she heard Jack say he would jump and that he would hitch-hike home.

Mrs. Tebo said the car went about 75 feet from the time Jack said he would jump until he did. She said he had said he would give the driver a cigarette if he would let him out. The car was going about 30 mph at the time, she said. It was foggy. Earlier during the ride, she said, she heard the deceased say he felt he was going to smother. She did not hear him say he was scared. She said she was scared and that the driver would drive fast, slam the brakes and slow down. "The car was all over the road," she said.

Carol Amoro, 17 year old sister of the deceased said she heard him say he would jump but at that time he did not but sat back. He later unlocked the door next to him on the right side of the car. She said she grabbed him but could not hold him. She said she did not hear anyone else in the car say anything.

Miss Amoro said the car slowed down after the deceased asked to get out. She said she told her brother, "He's going to jump." She said she had hold of the deceased when the door was open, but could not keep him in the car. The car was going about 30 mph, she said.

After hearing local evidence the magistrate stated he would file his report at a later date. E. J. Theriault, Q.C., appeared at the hearing for the Crown while Philip Woolaver represented the family of the deceased.

About This and That

Pedestrians Too

Last week we cautioned the motorist to watch for the children, especially those who are trotting off to school for the first time. Their young minds are focused more on the school to which they are going than on the road which leads them there.

Since last week our attention has been drawn to another matter, one which has been on our minds for some time too. Have you ever noticed how difficult it is to see the road ahead when facing oncoming traffic while you are driving at night? Even if the other driver dims his lights conditions are none too good especially on a wet and rainy night.

This is a case where pedestrians must take every caution to protect their own safety. Blinded by lights, there is little a motorist can do when a pedestrian suddenly looms up on the pavement ahead but to apply the brakes right quickly. This might not be so serious if a possibly following car has had opportune time to prepare for such incident.

We especially direct these words to the teenagers who often congregate in numbers stretching from the white line in the middle of the highway to the edge of the pavement. What chance has a motorist in such a case? It is much simpler for the pedestrian to step aside the pavement and be secure than to spend weeks in a hospital after having been mowed down in ones, or twos or threes by a passing vehicle. Or, it should be much more comfortable to step aside than to have the guilt of causing an accident.

To Keep Highways Clean

Motels and hotels in Nova Scotia have been asked to assist in keeping provincial highways free of litter by having disposal barrels on their premises and by distributing litter bags to motorists.

Hon. E. A. Manson, Minister of Trade and Industry, said he has written to motels and hotels in the province asking that they assist in the campaign to "Keep Highways Clean."

Mr. Manson said the Nova Scotia Travel Bureau, a division of the Department of Trade and Industry, has a keen interest in the neatness of Nova Scotia highways.

"One of our major industries in Nova Scotia is the tourist business," he said. "People who throw trash on the highways of the province are creating a costly nuisance to the Department of Highways and to the province's travel bureau."

Mr. Manson said the Nova Scotia Travel Bureau is co-operating in a Department of Highways campaign to educate motorists not to throw waste on highways. Other government departments also were assisting in the campaign.

The Department of Highways now is working on the design for a sign to be placed at regular intervals along provincial highways, asking motorists to "Keep Highways Clean. Use Litter Can."

Litter cans, to be painted a distinctive color, will be placed at convenient locations, wherever possible. An order for 100,000 litter cans, to be distributed by service stations, motels and hotels, has been placed and delivery is expected within the next few days.


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Keep Highways Clean

Infractions Of Act Total 247

Infractions of the Unemployment Insurance Act brought prosecutions and convictions to 131 employees and 116 employers in the Atlantic Region during the past fiscal year, R. P. Hartley, Q.C., Regional Director, said recently.

The employee infractions, which were mainly for failure to report earnings, drew fines from \$6 to \$250. In addition, those found guilty were required to pay back to the Fund the money that had been received illegally. Other infractions were for claiming dependency when there was none and for claiming benefit while self-employed. There were only two of those in the whole Atlantic Region.

Employer infractions resulted in fines from \$5 to \$150 and were for a variety of charges including failure to have insurance books for employees, failing to keep records, failing to deliver the contribution records when requested by an officer of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, and failure to release insurance books on time. Mr. Hartley pointed out that jail terms have been given at times for infractions when they refused to pay fines.

He cited a recent case in the province of Quebec where an employer in Charlevoix County was charged with ten counts and was sentenced to six months prison for each count to run concurrently. This employer had been found guilty of falsifying

his payroll records to assist employment insurance auditors employed to qualify for unemployment insurance benefit. The amount of benefit obtained was \$1,797 and all these claimants must now reimburse the money illegally obtained.

Mr. Hartley explained that in the Atlantic Region there are eleven enforcement officers who are continually investigating infractions of the Act, and, in addition, checks are made by un-

employment insurance auditors and insurance officers in each local office. The Regional Enforcement Branch during the past year has also imposed penalties under the Act. For the first three months of this year, have totalled 585 under Section these penalties to employees 65, which is for making false statements or misrepresentation. Nine convictions in the area served by the Yarmouth Local Office, mainly, employee infractions, in failing to report earnings, were registered between February 1958 and June 1959, resulting in fines totalling \$650.00. In one case a thirty day jail term was served.

Lift carefully into a greased 8½" roll pan and join ends of dough to form tube pan and join ends with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately-hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

CAR CLOCKS DO VARY... HEATERS STOP HEATING

Don't blame it on the clock if your car clock gains or loses. Nor is any such inaccuracy grounds for believing it is going haywire.

Car clocks, you see, operate on direct current, while home electric clocks operate on alternating current... which is corrected daily at the electric company's power station.

So your car clock may gain or lose as much as seven minutes a week... a gain or loss of half an hour in a month's time. Some clocks can be adjusted for less inaccuracy but the regulating screw must be handled with care.

Something else often misunderstood are car heaters. If yours isn't throwing enough heat, check it for circulation of water. First, feel heater fittings where they connect to hoses. If both fittings aren't about the same heat as the upper engine fitting there may be an obstruction... such as, an overlooked shut-off; faulty control valve; clogged hose or heater core; or air trapped in too-high curve of heater hose.

Also be sure to check for circulation of air. Make sure heater fan runs... listen for it. Then determine if air ducts and dampers are working right. A simple test here is to hold a cigarette in front of the air intake. This will give you an accurate smoke-check on the operation of these valves.

Understanding your car better and attending to minor maintenance details yourself will mean more enjoyable driving for you. 


