I always dreaded it when "Max" would tell that you are the largest press in Spain at the fact that we always spread an outside door to know the others on the continent.

One of the jobs I had to do, besides janitor and printers devil on the staff, was to fill in the morning paper. One day not long after I started my job at the printing plant, I decided to check the floor that apparently hadn't been checked in some considerable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you doing out Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily. He thought the remark pretty good and funny.

Sometimes the gasoline required to power the machinery would refuse to work, and the "Mac" the fix-it man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. "Mac" would then stand back and curse quite strenuously, then he would immediately start working. "Well," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of cussing."

On other occasions when some angry refusal duty for the soul, seemed to be broken. "No," would say, "use a little oil" and sure enough after that is all it took. Thus often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the most home right place and, in the right way.

Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world war and Korean, was awarded the Victoria Cross, Sully L. Smith, now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale haberdashery merchant, and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". A "Mac" and I read at least two somewhat different stories about the man who was found marooned on a beach at some point on the French Shore off St. Mary's Bay, Duxbury County. When I read this man's tale, he had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

Digby 172 Years Ago

Comment by David Sanford

From the files of the Chamber of January 22, 1967, the following account has been copied concerning Dwight D. Davis:

Among a number of old newspapers kindly sent to us by friends is a copy of the *Salem Times-Tribune* of May, 1882, says the *Tribune* and among other advertisements contained in the issue referred to is one mentioning the town and forwarding of Daply, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this ad we are told the ownership of Daply "rests from the fact of Annapolis appearing in the certificate of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 100,000 acres." The town plot is there described.

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Bay, and twenty miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles distant from the head of H. Mary's Bay. This land, and not from the water's edge, partly is level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Bay, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent, it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. It was secured by Loyalists from New York in 1782, the point of which went nearly to Britain, as, moving to other countries, left the shore

free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students, one of which was "J.J.'s" daughter, Florence (now Mrs. Morton of T. B. Proctor, Digby Co.). Some days after the debate a man from some part of Nova Scotia came to the printing shop looking for Florence, one of the successful debaters. I had the impression that this man was interested politically but, maybe I was wrong.

Well, I felt that I had learned considerable from my short experience at "The Wallis Job Print." I was learning to do beginner jobs, receiving some knowledge about things like embossing, stapling, perforating, coaming, cutting and crumpling paper stock, mixing inks for certain desired colors, and so forth, too. The only experience I had at setting type was just enough to make a "go," the printers name for a completed name.

There was a taste of trying to do it all inside the plant. Work was a little slack one early fall day and so "Mac" said to me, "how about trying your hand at taking orders for printed personalized Christmas cards?" I took it, made several calls, spent most of the time alone particularizing orders, and got an order, but

Dalhousie Head Writes Book

Dr. A. E. Kerr, president of Dalhousie University, is the author of a new book published this spring by the Ryerson Press. The book is entitled "The Ten Words", the name by which the Ten Commandments are known in Hebrew.

The book is in substance a lecture delivered by Dr. Kerr to the class in Jurisprudence, in the Faculty of Law, and subsequently revised and expanded for general readers. There is a foreword by the Honourable John E. Read, at one time Dean of the Faculty of Law and after that Judge of the International Court of Justice.

Dr. Kerr was prompted to speak to the Law students on the Ten Commandments when he listened to a lecture by Mr. Justice Read to the students, on the Code of Hammurabi. As he remarks in the preface "As I followed the speaker's account of the oldest known collection of laws, and noted in particular his remarks about the resemblance that some of its regulations bore to those preserved in the Old Testament, it occurred to me that the students might be interested at some time in examining that other ancient still more famous, and certainly more familiar code, which was also inscribed in stone, the Ten Commandments." The book is paper-back, and is one of the Ryerson Press' Saddle-Bag Series.

Coming Events At Acadia

Province Supports Cruises

Report From Parliament Hill

Probably you will be reading in the morning newspapers of the budget at about the same time as this column appears in the local papers. At least present plans call for the budget to be delivered on the evening of Thursday, March 31st.

There was a time when budget night was a gala social event. The galleries were crowded, all Cabinet Ministers appeared in white bow and tails, as did many Members of Parliament. The ladies were in full evening dress, and there were private dinner parties both before and after delivery of the budget.

All this pomp and circumstance disappeared with the outbreak of the Second World War. The galleries are still crowded on budget night, but the dress is distinctly informal. However, one tradition still lingers concerning the dress of the Minister of Finance. He is required to wear a new pair of shoes on that occasion. No one knows when this habit started, but it has apparently been handed down from Minister of Finance to Minister of Finance through generations and it has now become a fixed tradition. It apparently does not prevail in any other part of the Commonwealth.

It is traditional, of course, that the budget speech be delivered in the evening. There is a very good reason for that. Canada with its four time zones always presents problems

when announcements are made of financial implication. If the budget, for instance, was delivered in the afternoon, the stock market in Montreal and Toronto would have closed before the Minister started his speech, whereas those in Calgary and Vancouver would still be open. Assuming that substantial changes were being made in taxation laws, it would be possible for those with access to those stock markets to make substantial killings, whereas those in the East would, of course, have no opportunity to do so. Obviously the budget at times does create changes in tax laws which could have a very important effect on the stock market. Hence the budget does not come down until all of the exchanges are closed and those who wish to buy or sell can start off even the next morning.

I hope that no one will assume that the foregoing that one should expect any marked changes in taxation law in this budget. Naturally the budget is a closely guarded secret. Only the Minister of Finance, the Prime Minister, a few of their Cabinet colleagues, and a few trusted officials know the contents of the budget speech until shortly before it is delivered. Then, of course, it is revealed to all the Cabinet Members. The general assumption here among the journalists and the banking fraternity is that there will be no substantial changes this year. No one is optimistic enough to expect a tax reduction and everyone hopes that there will be no tax increases. This year Mr. Fleming budgeted for a deficit of something less than four hundred million dollars. He has known, of course, that tax revenues have kept up with his expectations, but also expenditures have been a little higher than he had first anticipated. Assuming that he was right in his forecast of approximately four hundred million dollars deficit this year, one has to anticipate a substantial increase of revenues during the coming year if the budget is to be balanced without increased taxation. Generally speaking interest in this area is concerned with that point rather than with the actual contents of the budget itself.

Also if the usual customs

The OCF Party particularly were demanding that the Government should register an official diplomatic protest with the Government of South Africa. This probably would have been politically a popular thing to do. However, as the Prime Minister pointed out, the Government had grave responsibilities in this matter. It is not necessary to develop the arguments pro and con on this subject because those who run can read. The Prime Minister in very strong terms expressed the regret that he personally felt and the people of Canada felt at these unfortunate events. But the Government did not go so far as to register an official diplomatic protest with another member of the Commonwealth.

The Bomarc missile is a controversial matter and I had better leave it alone. Certainly I have heard of nothing where more misunderstanding has been created than this particular subject. As the Minister of National Defence said flatly over the weekend, "there is no defence against an ICBM missile". I think everyone knew this before, but this is the first time when that tragic possibility has been set forth in clear and uncertain terms. The only thing that we can defend ourselves against at the moment are man made bombers. They are on the way out. Khrushchev has stated, and probably truthfully, that the Russians are no longer making any bombers, have discontinued their manufacture for some considerable time. That explains, of course, why the CF-105 was cancelled. This plane was designed to shoot down bombers and could not be finished for at least two more years, and at that time the possibility of a bomber threat would be over. The Bomarc is designed to fill the gap in case war should come, and in the remote possibility that some bombers would be used in such attack. In other words, the Bomarc missile might be determined as an anti-aircraft battery. The Bomarc A has been in production for some time but the Bomarc B has a much longer range. It was for that reason that both the American and Canadian Governments decided to install some Bomarc B missiles to fill the interregnum during the possibility of a bomber attack.

RELAY FRENCH RADIO STATIONS
April marks the extension of the French CEB network into the Maritime Provinces. It consists of relay stations of short coverage, maybe, but which will convey the French Canadian culture to the French minorities of these regions.

Since April 1st, four Nova Scotian relay CBAF's programs, from Moncton. As it is known, CBAF is the great French relay station of Acadia. These relay stations are the following: CBAJ, Yarmouth, which operates on 1230 cycles; CBAH, Meteghan, on 1490; CBAG, Weymouth, on 1550, and CBAE, Digby, on 990 cycles.

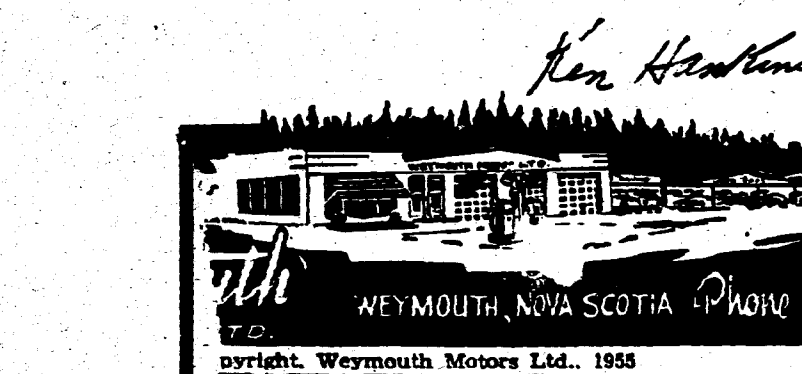

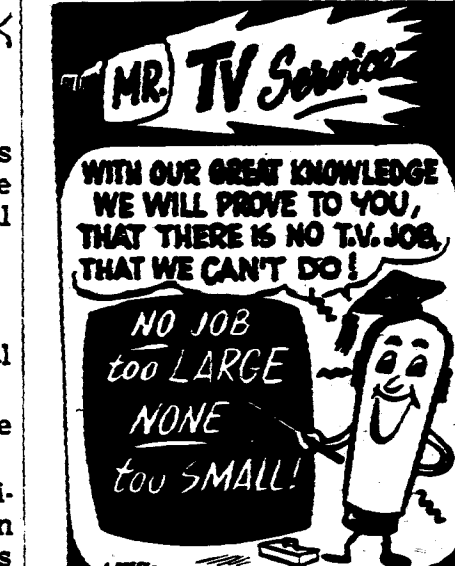

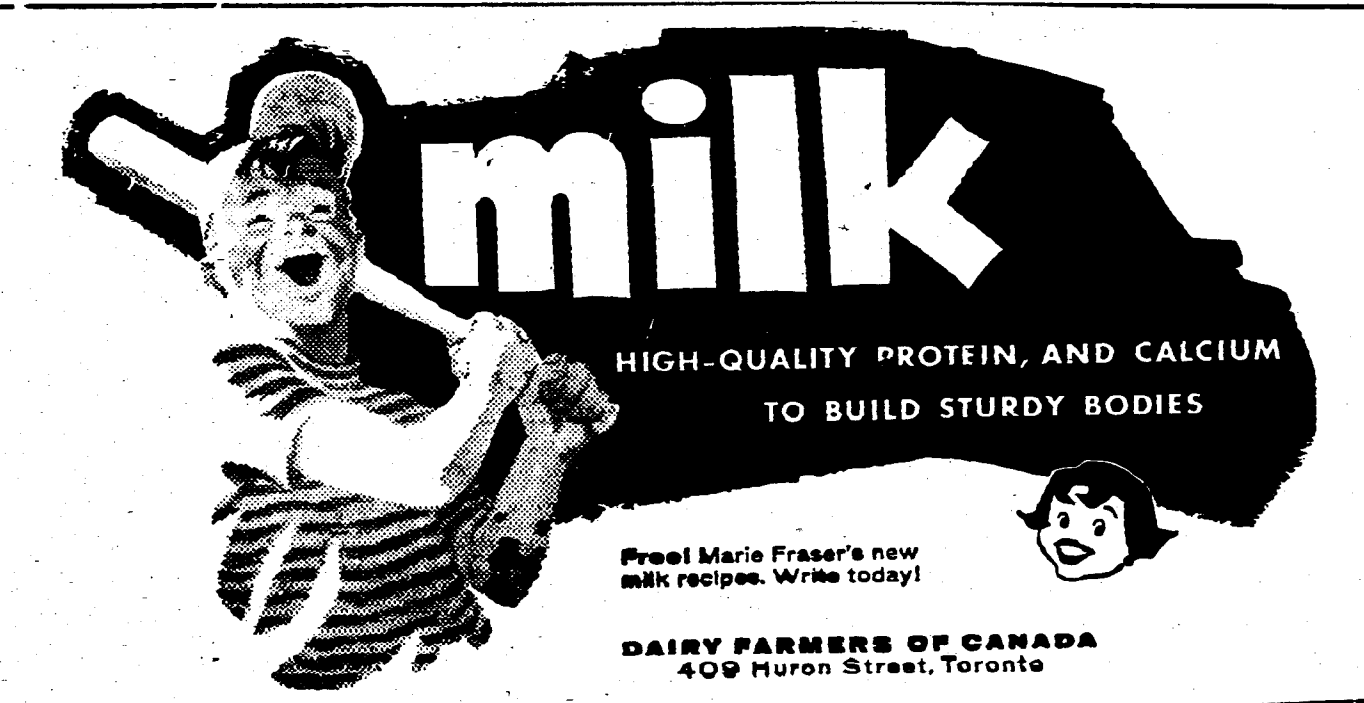

COCONUT-BUTTERSCOTCH BUNS

1. Scald 1/2 c. milk. Stir in 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar, 1 1/2 tps. salt, 1/2 tsp. baking soda, 1/4 c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cool to lukewarm.
2. Measure into large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water. Stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar. Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast or 1 cake Fleischmann's compressed yeast, crumbled. Let stand 10 minutes. THEN stir well. 6. Punch down dough. Knead on floured board until smooth. Cut into 2 equal portions. Roll into two 12" squares. Spread with coconut mixture. Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, and cut each roll into 9 slices. Place in 2 greased 8" square pans, a cut side up. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 1/2 hr. Bake in mod. oven, 350°, 25 to 30 mins. Yield: 1 1/2 dozen buns.

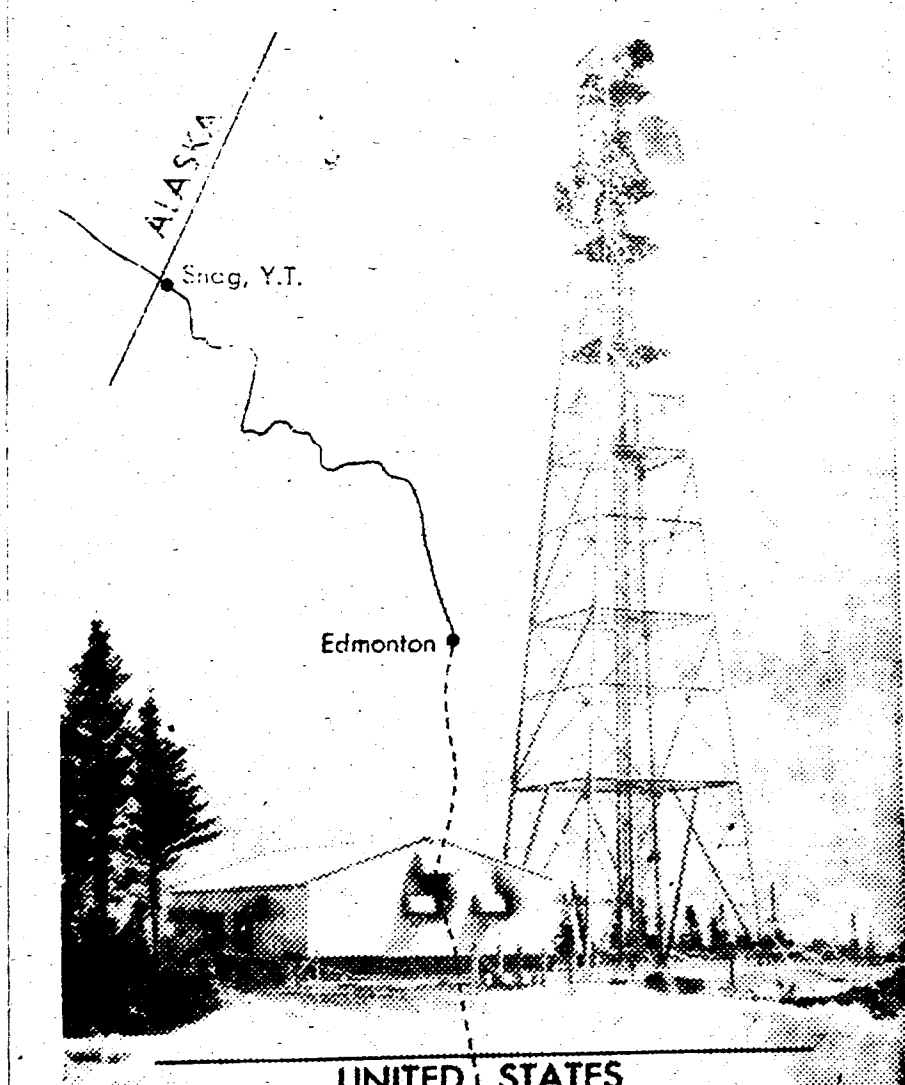

MICROWAVE LINK -- Award of a \$25 million contract for construction of a microwave radio relay system to Alaska is announced by Canadian National Telegraphs. The network will enlarge substantially communications between Alaska and the rest of the continental United States. The contractor, RCA Victor Company Ltd., of Montreal, expects to complete the network in two years. This past June, Canadian National Telegraphs completed a \$9 million microwave system linking Sydney, N. S., and St. John's, Nfld. What is believed to be the longest over-water microwave hop in the world, 69 miles tower to tower across Cabot Strait, is contained in this system. Microwave is being extended east from Quebec with work under way between Rimouski and New Carlisle, and a Dalhousie, N. B., to Moncton stage planned later.

Is Guest Speaker At Closing

John MacEachern, supervisor vocational correspondence courses, department of education, was guest speaker at the annual closing exercises of the adult study classes of the Digby vocational evening school, held last week.

Mr. MacEachern, who is a native of Inverness county, received his B.A. and B.Ed. degrees from St. Francis Xavier University. During the second world war he served overseas with the Canadian Army. He later became vice principal of the Bras d'Or school and the principal of the Andrew Dobson Memorial School at the naval base in Sydney. In 1957 he was appointed assistant supervisor of the correspondence study branch and succeeded to his present position in 1959.

In his address at the closing exercises here Mr. MacEachern outlined the offerings which are made available through the correspondence study branch and stressed that these courses provided opportunities to all Nova Scotians to further their education both academically and in technical studies.

Baden Powell, local administrator of the vocational evening school, stated in his report that total registration for the first classes was seventy-two. Of this number forty-four were attending at the conclusion of the term. Fourteen students have successfully completed their courses over the past three years and thus are entitled to certificates.

In his address Mr. Powell stated it took a great deal of determination to attend the courses for three terms for a period of 270 hours and he commended (Please turn to page 5)

Our board of directors have asked me to come here tonight and request you to make a grant of funds available to the clinic." He outlined the financial setup of the clinic and stressed the need for local support. "If we are to have any hope of maintaining clinic premises in this town we have to have local support." He spoke of the support given by the Annapolis Valley to the recently opened branch clinic in Bridgetown and also of the support given by the Yarmouth branch of the mental health society to the branch there. He also told of the increase in work being done by the clinic in Digby.

Anthony - I think Dr. Angus has made the matter very clear. Mayor - I want to assure you your request will receive consideration, if not at this meeting, at our budget meeting later.

E. Twohig - I don't know whether I am appearing as a representative of the Recreation Commission or anybody in particular, nor do I know if the council can enter into this but I have been talking with a Lieut. Commander from Cornwallis who is retiring at the end of this month. He is an engineer and quite a sportsman. I found out he was interested in remaining in some small town in Nova Scotia. Windsor has been after him to move there and take the position of recreational director. The Digby Recreation Commission has a plant up there on the hill that is not nearly being utilized.

What it needs is somebody with full time to devote to using this large investment that the town has and I just wanted to try to draw some support out of any place we can in town or opinions on this. I don't know whether the town council can share in this in any way. The problem is finances. A man can more than pay his way in a short time. He is liable to have some difficulty in financing in the start. I don't know what has happened in the matter of your civil defence appointment.

Anthony - The civil defence could tie in with this.

Twohig - The question would be whether we could afford to pay his full salary.

Woolaver - As a member of the council, I would like to ask the Mayor just what our position is as a council. Does the town council have anything to do with running the rink? (Please turn to page 9)

Tax Rate Up 3 Cents

Tax rate for the Town of Digby for the year 1960 was set at \$3.17 at a special budget meeting of the Town Council here this week. The new rate is an increase of three cents over the 1959 rate of \$3.14.

The 1960 tax rate which has been set by the council is composed of a rate of \$1.08 1/2 for education, which is unchanged from 1959, and \$2.08 1/2 for general purposes.

Included in the budgeted expenditures for 1960 is an appropriation of \$40,982.65 for education. Also included is \$22,491.25 for debenture debt charges; \$18,975.00 for public works; \$18,800 for protection to persons and property and \$17,980.00 for hospital care and social welfare.

Total revenue for 1960, less real and personal taxation, has been estimated at \$30,826.63. Total expenditures for the year have been estimated at \$150,288.71, leaving an amount of \$119,462.08 to be raised by taxation. Total assessment for the year is \$3,768,520.00.

Kiwanis Club To Aid

The Digby Kiwanis Club will aid in the raising of funds to assist the Nova Scotia Committee for World Refugee Year, it was stated here by Kiwanian Chester M. Levy, chairman of the club's program committee, and club president Edgar T. Chan.

The club's assistance will take the form of an "austerity dinner" at their regular meeting on April 28th. This dinner will tie in with World Refugee Austerity Week which is being marked across Canada during the week of April 24th to 30th.

Mayor Victor Cardoza, who is a member of the Nova Scotia Committee for World Refugee Year, stated that during the week individuals, families and organizations will be urged to "austerity" meals, typical of those eaten by the hundreds of thousands still in refugee camps in Europe and donate the difference in cost between these and their regular meals to the World Refugee Year committee.

A typical meal, the Mayor said, is a bowl of beans and unsweetened coffee. This is the type of meal which will be served to the Kiwanians at their meeting April 24th. They will be asked to pay the regular price and the difference will be forwarded to the Refugee fund.

Meet At Bridgetown

To Hang Flower Baskets

A project aimed at beautification of Digby's main business section will be undertaken by the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society. It has been learned.

The project will take the form of the provision of hanging baskets of flowers on the electric light posts along the main street.

First step in the new project was taken at the April meeting of the Digby Town Council when the council made a gift of a number of electric light standard brackets, which are no longer of use to the town, to the society. Permission was also given to erect the hanging flower baskets under supervision of the streets and electric light committees.

It is understood a recent meeting of the horticultural society authorized the purchase of ornamental baskets and various floral and decorative plants for use in the baskets.

Forum Finances Improve

An interim report on the operations of the Digby Forum from the end of the last fiscal year, June 30, 1959, to March 31st, 1960, which was presented at this week's meeting of the Digby Recreation Commission, showed a marked increase in utilization of the Forum by the people of the area this year and a corresponding increase in revenue.

According to the report there were 19,803 paid admissions to activities at the Forum during the seventeen week winter season, or an average of 1,165 a week. Average attendance at hockey games was 275. Total attendance for skating sessions during the season amounted to 10,504.

Acknowledgement was made in the report of a sum of \$2,995.41 added to the revenues of the Forum through the efforts of the promotion committee. This committee, representatives of nearly all organizations in Digby, was set up at the beginning of the winter season to promote greater interest in the Forum as a means of securing the additional revenues needed to keep the plant in operation.

Gross revenue of the Forum for the period June 30, 1959, to March 31st, 1960, was \$8,071.28. Operating expenses for the period amounted to \$6,148.83, leaving an excess of revenue over expense for the period of \$1,922.45.

During the period current operating expenses were paid as they occurred and payments were made on current liabilities as funds were available. According to the financial report presented to the meeting \$2,467.73 was still outstanding on current liabilities as at March 31st. A number of these accounts were ordered paid.

A hearty vote of thanks and appreciation was tendered to Mr. Douglas Jewkes, who has been acting as assistant treasurer of the commission during the winter season. Mr. Jewkes stated because of pressure of work and his studies he would not be able to carry on the job any longer.

The body of Bear River bank manager David Archibald Purves, who had been missing since early Friday morning, was recovered from Digby harbour Sunday afternoon by navy frogmen.

Mr. Purves' body was found in his car at the harbour bottom some fifty feet from the end of the spur pier. The car was first located through use of an echo sounding device aboard the dragger "Olwen", skippered by Captain Reginald Hazelton.

Naval frogmen from HMCS Cornwallis and HMCS Granby assisted in the underwater search for the vehicle and after it had been located the navy divers helped in the recovery operation. Cables from the "Olwen" were attached to the submerged vehicle and it was raised to the surface and then towed to the CPR wharf where it was taken up to wharf level on the elevator.

Digby County Coroner C. T. Nichol ordered an inquest into the fatality and a coroner's jury under the formanship of Charles Hall examined the body Sunday afternoon. Mr. Nichol then adjourned the inquest until April 20th.

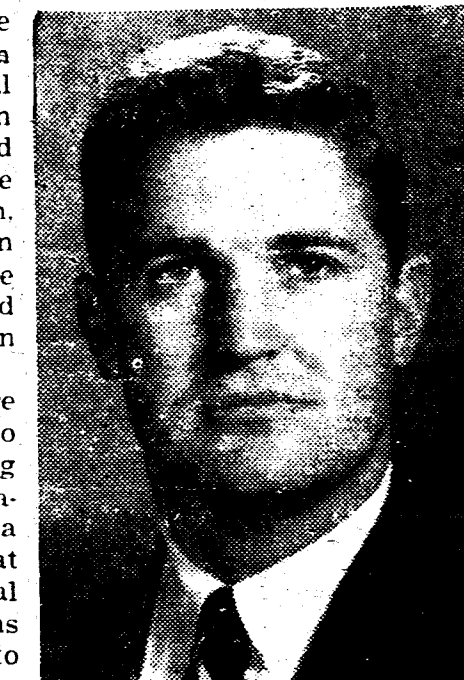
The deceased, who was first reported missing Friday morning, had been manager of the Royal Bank of Canada in Bear River for the past eight years. Prior to coming to Bear River he had served the bank in Truro, Halifax, Berwick and Parrsboro.

Born in North Sydney, Mr. Purves was a son of Stanley R. Purves and Alice Louise (Sleep) Purves of that place. He attended Rothesay Collegiate School in Rothesay, N. B., and during World War II served with the Canadian Merchant Marine. He was a member of The Keith Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Bear River.

Surviving are his wife, the former Florence Mackenzie, of Truro, and one son, James, at home. A sister, Mrs. Mary Dunberry, of Montreal, also survives, as does a brother, C. C. Purves, Victoria, B. C.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon from the Kennedy Memorial Home, Truro, with Rev. Stanley McQueen officiating. Interment was in Robie Street Cemetery.

Heads Digby Trade Board



John R. Nichols, Digby barrister, was elected president of the Digby Board of Trade following acceptance of the report of the nominating committee at the April meeting of the board, held here Tuesday evening.

Other officers elected included Philip Woolaver, 1st vice-president; Gregg Gilliat, 2nd vice-president; Mrs. Marion P. Gott, secretary, and Ray MacDonald, treasurer.

The meeting decided to prepare and forward a resolution seeking endorsement of the Chignecto Canal proposal by the annual meeting of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, scheduled for early May.

Opinion was expressed the construction of the proposed canal would bring benefit to the entire western Nova Scotia area as well as to the port of Digby and it was stated the combined efforts of the trade boards in the Annapolis Valley area should be added to representations already being made concerning the canal.

The Digby Board of Trade also endorsed a resolution passed by the Fundy Board of Trade, petitioning the provincial government for the construction of a causeway or bridge across Petite Passage linking the mainland of Digby county with Long Island at the tip of Digby Neck.

In moving that the Digby trade board endorse the resolution concerning a crossing for Petite Passage, Victor Cardoza of Digby stated such a permanent type crossing would be beneficial, not only to the people of the islands but also to the town of Digby in that it would make Digby accessible to people from the islands wishing to do business and attend activities in Digby. The motion was seconded by Edward Twohig, immediate past president of the Digby board.

A further motion concerning the Petite Passage crossing was introduced by H. M. Warne. This resolution, which was passed by the meeting, empowered the president of the Digby Board to contact the president of the Fundy Board to ascertain if that board intended to seek the support of the AVABT for their Petite Passage resolution. Let us all rejoice in this miracle of Easter, let us avail ourselves of the opportunities which are ours to experience the glory of the Easter message. Let us take advantage of the uplifting of the spirit which the Easter message affords. This can best be done in fellowship with others in the church of our choice.

Good Driving

Do you consider yourself a good driver? Most people think they are quite expert behind the wheel — and yet, the tragedy and hardship of accidents goes on. What makes a driver a good driver? Keeping a car on the road at high speeds? Managing to squeeze out of tight spots? Weaving through traffic without slowing down? Zipping through intersections ahead of others? No, says the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council — those are not the marks of a good driver. It's better to drive carefully. The good driver drives at such speeds that he can keep his car under control all the time. He stays out of tight spots by thinking and looking ahead. He stays in the proper lane until he's sure it's safe to change. And he goes through intersections cautiously, even when he has the right-of-way. These are some of the measures of a good driver — a driver who will protect his and other's life and well-being and happiness — and a driver who will get where he's going in plenty of time — with safety.

Wild Life Week

National Wild Life Week, April 10 to 17, is not a week designed to promote the sale of some dusty merchandise, but on the contrary is strictly an educational week to help awaken interest in the conservation of not only bird and animal life but of all God's natural resources, and generations to come will be on the receiving end of the efforts put forth by men, women and children of today.

Through the Provincial Educational Departments all schools have been asked to make it strictly an educational week stressing the need of Conservation. The Provincial Fish and Game Departments have asked all sportsmen's clubs and outdoor organizations to make special observance of the week.

In Canada National Wild Life Week was created on April 18, 1947, by an Act of Parliament of the House of Commons, Ottawa, and by the Members of the Canadian Senate.

The week as set forth by the Government is always to fall on April 10th which is the birthday of the late Jack Miner and is such an appropriate time of the year as it comes when the birds are returning from the south to nest and raise their young in Canada's breeding grounds.

The week thus acts as a living memorial to the late Jack Miner, Canadian Naturalist, whom Edgar A. Guest, the Detroit poet, always referred to as "the best loved Christian in America."

Expensive Cheating

Unemployment insurance rolls contain thousands of "cheaters" who quit their jobs to draw benefits, especially seasonal benefits, declares The Financial Post. Until these are exhausted and the cheater has to find another job, he turns down job offers because he is quite content with a painless \$36-a-week supplement to what he earned earlier.

And some employers may be no less guilty of cheating the Unemployment Insurance Fund, adds The Post.

Anyone who applies for an unemployment insurance cheque must explain why he left his job. The cheater who quit will say he was laid off, and so entitled to benefits. By writing to the employer, the commission tries to verify this. But quite often according to the commission, the employer won't reply and the commission must take the man's word and pay benefits.

There is speculation, too, that the employer sometimes "verifies" false statements because he wants to hire the man again next season.

Last fall, a 30% increase in contribution rates restored the Unemployment Insurance Fund to a precarious balance which years of milking had disturbed. One reason why UIC officials are afraid the fund may not stay in balance is that unemployment cheating is on the upgrade.

YOUNG IDEAS from Polly Ponds

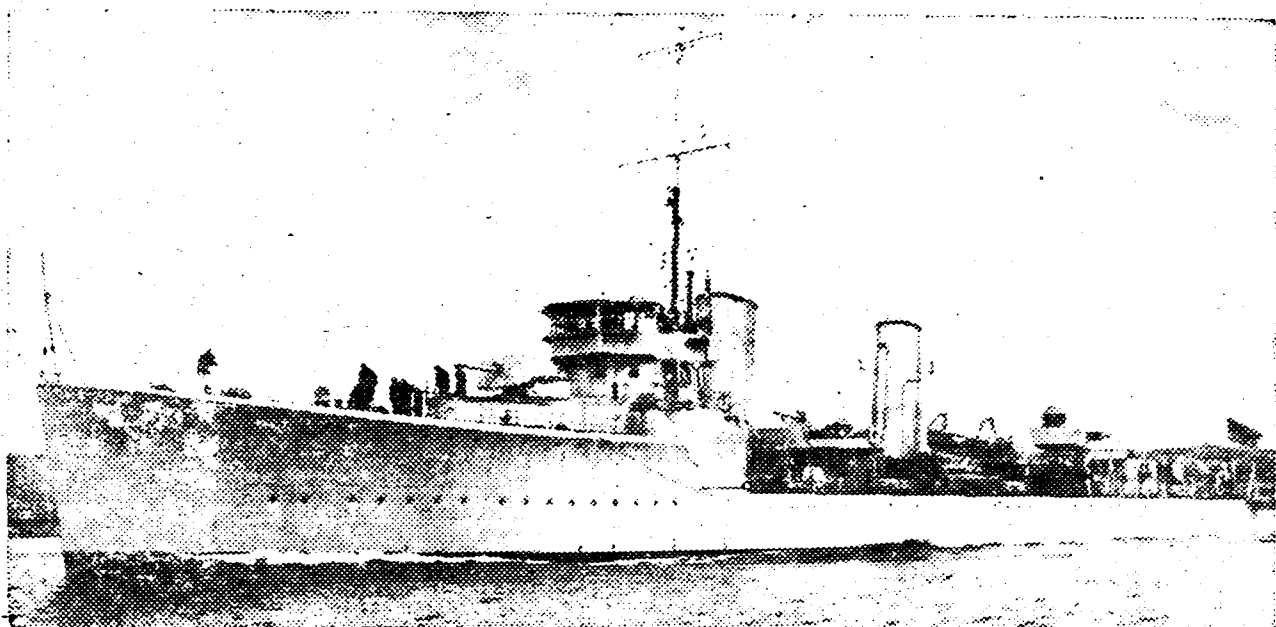
Q "I'm thirteen and would like to start wearing make-up. Do you think my mother would approve?"

INTRODUCES INDIVIDUAL OF MARITIMES

Travellers aboard Canadian Pacific's Bay of Fundy steamer Princess Helene will have the Maritimes at their fingertips this summer when the company introduces individual copies of an attractive, three-color map of the New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island land and coastal water areas. The maps may not be of practical use for planning detailed itineraries, but they will more than serve their original purpose as paper place mats in Princess Helene's dining room.

Superintendent for the Canadian Pacific Railway at Saint John, K. R. Perry, said that the design of the 10" x 15" table mat was determined after discussions aimed at utility and summer tourist interest. Mr. Perry said arrangements have been made with the printers, University Press, Fredericton, for supplies to fill basic requirements and to meet anticipated tourist souvenir requests. The railway official drew attention to the extensive advertising program which Canadian Pacific will conduct through April-July, in 22 leading magazines in Canada, the United States and abroad.

"This is a campaign to impress readers with Canadian Pacific's land, sea and air facilities," said Mr. Perry, "and the resulting promotion barrage is expected to realize a total circulation of 17,000,000." Mr. Perry added that whatever the general effect of the campaign, the Maritimes can anticipate a good share of Canada's 1960 summer tourist traffic, and he said that CPR rail, hotel and steamer services in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are preparing now to meet demands.

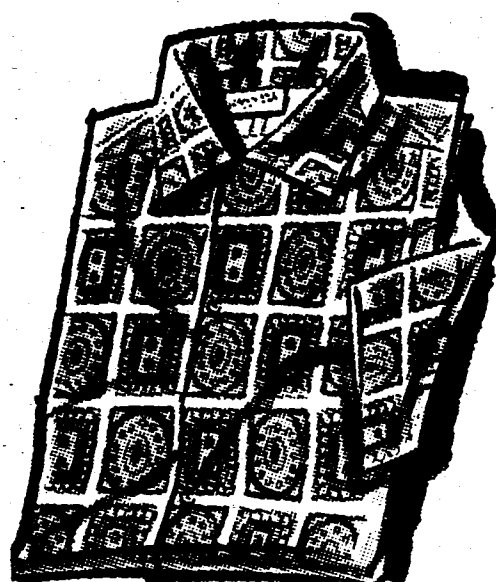

In bowl, blend biscuit mix, milk, and parsley to form a soft dough; roll out on a lightly floured board to form a rectangle about 1/4 inch thick. 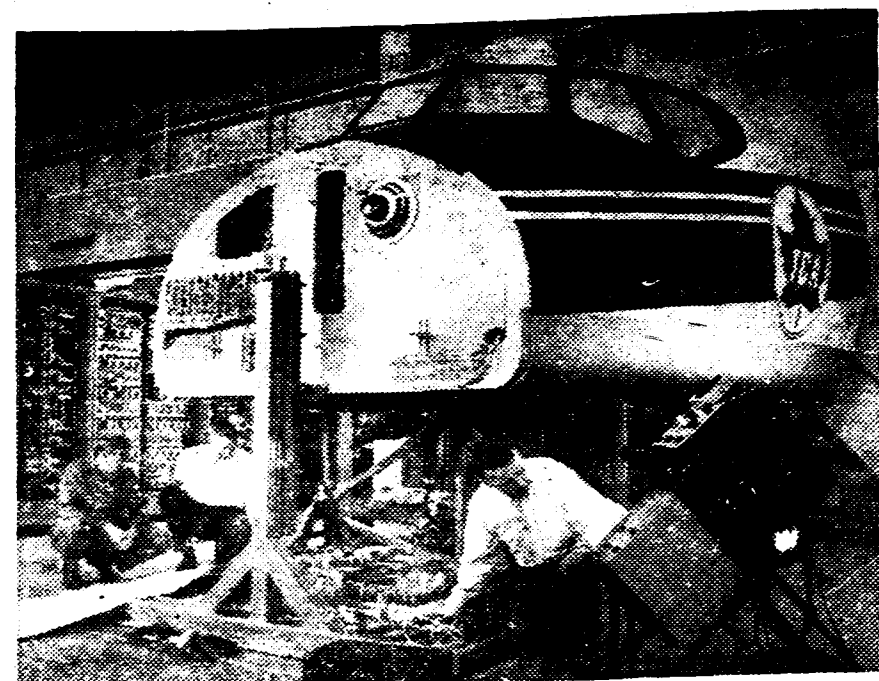

Technicians assemble Trans-Canada Air Lines highly complex Douglas DC-8 simulator in the company's new training building at Montreal. The \$1,000,000 machine, built by Link Aviation Company, is capable of doing anything the aircraft can do — except leave the ground. It even simulates random passenger movement while the aircraft is in flight. The simulator will be used to supplement training of pilots for the 550-mile-an-hour, 127-passenger DC-8's, cutting costs and leaving the aircraft themselves free for revenue passenger service. More than 128 miles of wire, some thousands of vacuum tubes and hundreds of amplifiers and servomotors are included in the simulator complex, which has been called the largest analogue computer in the world. TCA pilots began training on the simulator at the end of February.

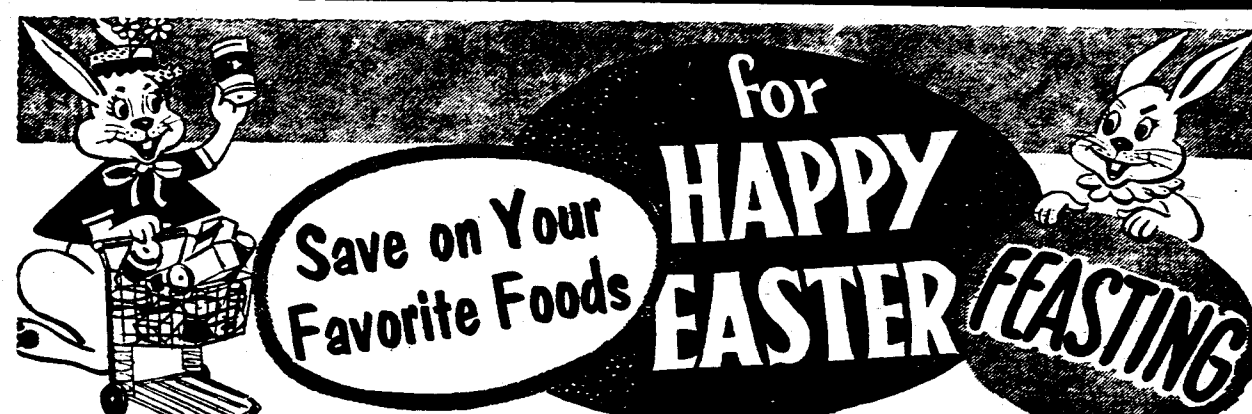

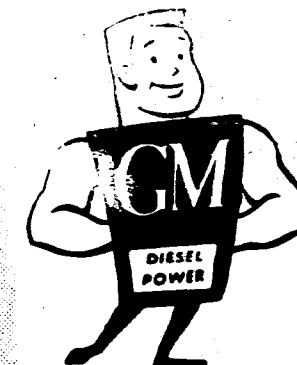

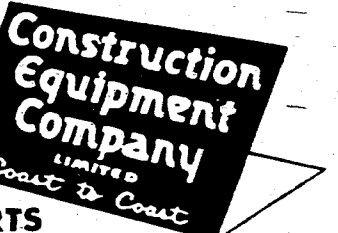

to do so, the president of the Digby Board is empowered to enter a resolution in this regard on behalf of the Digby Board of Trade.

The meeting unanimously endorsed efforts being made to secure the services of Lt. Commander MacIntosh, who is shortly to retire from the navy, as recreation director for Digby. A sum of two hundred dollars was voted as a starting figure to be contributed by the board toward the expenses involved in meeting salary requirements necessary.

Edward Twohig, who brought the matter before the board meeting, stated he was contacting all the organizations in the community seeking their support for the project. He outlined the advantages of such an appointment in Digby and said it had long been his opinion that, under proper organizational leadership, the Digby Forum could be made a paying proposition with year round utilization. He said a recreation director could coordinate all of the recreational activities and various youth programs in the town.

Speaking on the matter, Victor Cardoza said he felt, if the appointment of a recreation director was considered vital to the success of the Forum and recreation programs in Digby, the board should forego other activities in which they have been engaging that have been using up-board funds and concentrate on this matter as their project. This organization, he said, along with others, has long been dissipating its funds and energies on too many fronts so that maximum success has never been achieved with any one project. The recreational program in Digby at present, he said, is a matter of bits and pieces and some effort should be made to tie all such activities in together.

Rector Appointed For St. Clements

Word has been received that the Rev. Harold A. Kay has been appointed as Rector of the Parish of St. Clement. He will take over his new duties early in June.

The Rev. Mr. Kay is at present Rector of the parish of Wichita Falls in Texas. He and Mrs. Kay, however, are both natives of Yarmouth.

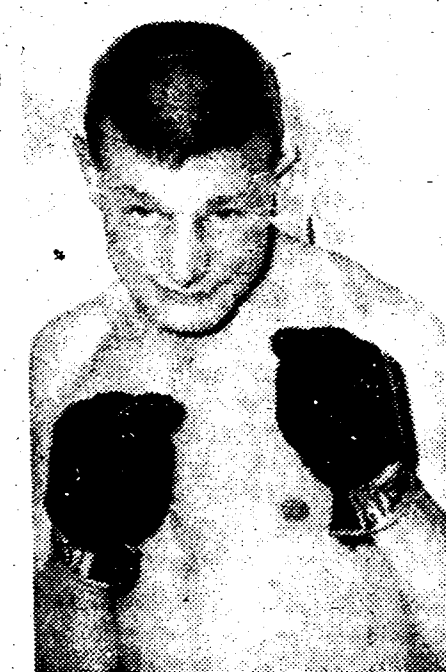

Nova Scotia has an objective of \$50,000 and the purpose of the fund raised will be to clear out all the remaining refugees from Camp Heidestrasse and resettle them in Austria.

In resettling these people it is hoped to end the requirement for continuing charity hand-outs by enabling them to be self-supporting in the communities in Austria in which they will be accepted. It is interesting to note that while the countries close to the problems of the unwanted, the refugees who have existed in camps, many of them

since the end of World War II; besides supplying day to day necessities for thousands of these people have also subscribed between fifty and sixty cents per head of population to the special appeal for World Refugee Year. In Canada the figure is only between four and five cents per head and, even if the Nova Scotia objective is reached, it will still only mean about fifteen cents per person.

World Refugee Year has been organized by the United Nations Assembly which is gravely concerned over the problem of fifteen million refugees still needing a permanent home, food and shelter or loans, grants and training to become self-supporting. Patron of the organization in Nova Scotia is Lieutenant Governor E. C. Plow and Chairman is Rear Admiral H. F. Pullen.

Town Council Report

(Continued from page 1)

Mayor - Our position is that when called upon to do so, because of the decision of a ratepayers' meeting some years ago, we have to assume the obligation of paying the principal amount and interest on an issue of bonds in respect to the Forum. As far as the actual operation of the Forum is concerned the council is involved in this respect. The Mayor and Deputy Mayor by virtue of their office are members of the Recreation Commission. So also is the chairman of the town school board and the president of the Board of Trade by virtue of office. The town clerk and treasurer is treasurer of the Recreation Commission. So far as the day to day operation of the Forum is concerned, that is the Recreation Commission's job; we are responsible by guarantee for the interest and principal of an \$85,000 bond issue made by the Recreation Commission.

Anthony - What else can be tied in with the Recreation Commission?

Twohig - A children and adult overall program is the thinking that is developing. In Halifax as assistant director of recreation has been appointed.

Anthony - How does Hantsport operate there?

Twohig - I believe they do not have a full time director, it would be part time, the same as we have. As I said before, I think a man here can more than pay his salary.

Woolaver - Does he say so? Have you asked him that? How is the rink standing now financially?

Twohig - I would say it was doing very well. That is a winter season, the summer is yet to come. This man is a sportsman. He has refereed a lot of boxing in Halifax. A fellow with that kind of experience could tie in with other boxing teams. He could develop other kinds of sport and tie them in with Cornwallis.

Mayor - Are there any other questions? If not we will go on, Mr. Warner.

H. M. Warner, Mr. Mayor and Council, I am here regarding insurance on the Forum. The Mayor has already stated quite definitely the position of the town council in regard to the Forum, and I quite appreciate the fact that we have three members from the council on the commission. I got these figures on Friday and found that 10,000 people skated this year and there was an average attendance of 275 at games showing an active increase in interest in hockey. 91 boys played hockey Saturday mornings. We had 2,895 kiddies that come up on Wednesdays from the school with 1,200 at the firemen's carnival, making a total of 19,800 that were at the rink this winter. That does not include curling. I am not stating any revenues for the operation because that statement hasn't been released as yet but some general knowledge would show some signs of progress. I didn't know that Mr. Twohig was going to be here tonight and I thought this matter of insurance should be brought to your attention. We have \$150,000 on the hill. At our last meeting a motion was made that we drop \$25,000 of the insurance and leave us \$40,000 insurance which covers the interest of the town. As chairman of the commission I didn't think it was advisable to take any further action until we made a notation to the council, knowing that the matter could be further discussed at our meeting a week from Monday night and get the thinking of the council whether we shouldn't have \$50,000 more insurance. The plant equipment is \$60,000 to replace. That doesn't take in the equipment or anything else except the ice plant. We hear numerous approaches after something happens to a place like this. The recreation commission has made it possible to get these people there this winter. It seems to be too much of an item to run a chance on and not have more insurance. If anything happens to this place the chairman and your council would be criticized.

Mayor - What is it you want us to do?

Warne - I stated that. You would come to the meeting and discuss as to whether the \$40,000 is adequate insurance on the rink as of today Mr. Brittain has \$25,000 policy on the building and \$15,000 on equipment. Mrs. Denton's policy of \$25,000 was dropped.

Mayor - I may misunderstand, but should it not be the decision of the recreation commission?

Bent - Are you suggesting that the council should back or pay for this insurance?

Warne - I am not suggesting that the council take any action. The presentation has been made. It is in the clear as far as I am concerned.

Mayor - Any questions that you wish to ask Mr. Warner?

I am not sure as to what is wanted here. Are you asking our help or . . . ?

Anthony - If we feel that the \$40,000 is not enough to protect our interest up there, we have a chance to go to the commission and suggest that they carry more insurance.

Bent - I was at the meeting where they set this insurance not below where it would cover all of the town's interest in the recreation commission.

Woolaver - The recreation commission must have voted to cut it down and Mr. Warner you say you are chairman of this commission.

Warne - I was in the chair. I hope I have made myself quite clear and what I am doing is suggesting there is \$40,000 on it.

Mayor - If something happened to the rink the present insurance is for the amount outstanding on the town's guarantee but we would have no rink. Are there any other questions?

Anthony - I think we understand it but it needs discussion. Re: Matter of Survey by Mr. Hiltz.

Mayor - Mr. Hiltz was in to see me and I suggested he get in touch with Mr. VanTassell, chairman of the streets committee with respect to the matter of the survey of drainage problem on Water Street. He told me the work he proposed to do would not exceed in cost \$200.00 to the town. This would include the survey, detailed report and recommendations together with whatever plans were necessary. I told him our problem was that we were not sure from his letter what in dollars and cents would be involved.

VanTassell - Along with this \$200.00, if we go through with his recommendations and it costs \$2,000, we would have to pay 2 percent.

Mayor - I understand he would not expect percentage payment with respect to supervision of the job that was done in this instance. I feel a letter should go to Mr. Hiltz if council desires, asking him to make the proposition to the chairman of the streets committee. The facts I have given are only as I recall them.

Anthony - I would move a letter be written to Mr. Hiltz. Carried.

Re: Police car.

VanTassell - There is no report.

Re: Sidewalk on King Street.

VanTassell - I was talking to our superintendent of streets about that; it would require a lot of money to do as was suggested at the last meeting. He said he can go up here in spare time and put in a sidewalk, times when the men are around the town hall or doing something just putting in time; that way it would give you a sidewalk for little cost except for hauling a little gravel or soil and the men will be putting in time anyway to fill in their day. I would move that the streets superintendent be instructed to start at the first slack time in his work.

Mayor - Is there any discussion? Might I ask if some effort will be made to determine definite street boundaries so we will not be involved with property lines? I am thinking of one instance where a resident's

lawn extends pretty near the perimeter of the road as it now exists.

Anthony - I think a surveyor should go up there and survey the outside street line.

Mayor - That is my question. Would some effort be made to determine where it should go. Perhaps with the permission of the second it might be included in the motion that following a survey of street lines . . .

McKenna - I doubt if you will have too much trouble on that side of the street.

Motion put and carried.

Re: Parking fee for doctors.

Mayor - It was left on the table at last council meeting for further thought. Would you care to have the matter put over until the . . .

Bent - As I understand the motion, it was moved the matter be tabled.

Mayor - Tabled it means it can be removed from the table any time the council so decides.

McKenna - Might I ask what our traffic authority's thoughts are on this matter.

Police Chief Dunn - I have thought it over very carefully. I think it should stand as is.

Woolaver - If it was changed wouldn't we have to change the by laws or something?

Mayor - After we went into the matter we discovered the present arrangement is a voluntary one on the part of the doctors. It is an arrangement whereby they pay an amount each year which relieves them of the necessity of putting penalties in the meters. They are exempt under the by-law. Is that right, Mr. Solicitor.

Solicitor - Yes.

Woolaver - And have they been paying the five dollars.

Clerk - Yes.

VanTassell - I move that it be left as is.

Bent - How was this brought up in the first place?

Mayor - It was a recommendation of the police committee.

Motion put and carried.

The Clerk read a letter from the Acadian Bus Lines in answer to a request from the town re off street parking of buses. The letter stated "It is not practical to park buses on our lot".

Mayor - Are there any further questions you would like to ask on this?

VanTassell - Ask them to release the lot for parking.

McKenna - This could be taken up when Mr. Thompson calls at the town office.

Mayor - If you are going to present any such proposal to Mr. Thompson you would have to have authorization of the council.

McKenna - I would move that the town clerk be authorized to discuss with Mr. Thompson of the Acadian Bus Lines the proposal of having town traffic park in the terminal parking lot. Motion put and carried.

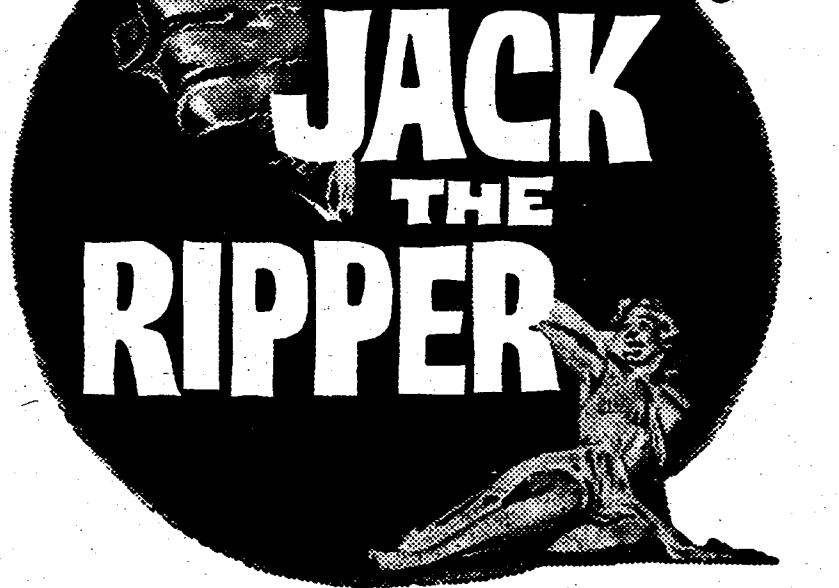

Council Report Continued

Police Report - Twelve complaints were received of which eight required some further investigation. All complaints except one have been terminated to the satisfaction of the persons concerned. Six cases warranted court action. A total of 27 parking tickets were given during the month. Three motor vehicle accidents were investigated.

Fire Committee Report:

Bent - Three fires during March - two chimney and one grass. No damage. The No. 1 pumper is out of action temporarily. It is being repaired. I want to give notice about the filling of ships with water and the use of fire hose. They have been watering ships at the wharf and have been using fire department hose. There has been objection from the fire department because while the hose is in use for that purpose it is not available for fire use. I got in touch with Mr. Turnbull, the chairman of the water commission and I understand from him that several years ago there was correspondence about laying a permanent line on the wharf for the ships and it would be paid for by the federal government. Now, that was not done. Mr. Turnbull is waiting to look over the correspondence and he has already talked to his commission and they are in agreement that something should be done about it and that the commission should pay the expense of the hose if they should pay for it and can well afford it. That's the way it stands at present. Mr. Turnbull wants this correspondence from Mr. Eaton so they can carry on from where they left off two or three years ago.

Clerk - I don't think there was much correspondence. I couldn't find anything definite on it. There was a letter to the department in Halifax outlining what was required and they sent an engineer down here. I know this as I was with him. We went down to the wharf and he looked it over and said there was no question it should be there and they would pay for it.

Bent - The fire department wishes that their hose be no longer used for this purpose. Bent - It is rather interesting the amount of money coming from these ships out of that service. About \$200.00.

Clerk - Oh no, nowhere near it. That is way, way too high. It is generally \$30.00 to \$35.00. Mayor - Do you wish to make any recommendation that fire department hose no longer be used for watering ships.

Bent - No. Not at this meeting. They are working on it and within the next month they will probably have the situation in hand and have equipment of their own. I might say with respect to the matter that Mr. Humphrey, the fire chief, told me some weeks ago when a ship was being watered that a considerable amount of hose was taken for this purpose and he was greatly concerned what would happen in the event of fire while this hose was in use for watering the ship. He also made a statement that when the hose was returned, it was dumped off in the fire station and some considerable effort had to be made by the fire department members to get the hose ready again for use as fire hose.

McKenna - I would move that the Fire Committee and Water Commission meet to arrive at some solution concerning use of fire department hose for watering ships. Passed.

Re: Streets Committee report.

VanTassel - I don't think there is much that need be said. The streets are at the moment as bad as they will be, due to the time of the year. We have made an effort to keep them graded. I might also mention there has been roughly \$150.00 worth of breastwork repair done on the Shore Road.

Re: Relief Committee report. Anthony - There were nine families on relief during March with a total of \$357.37 expended. There are six cases at present.

Re: Building Permits. Permits were granted to E. B. Robertson and Son for renovation to their building on Montague Row and to the Digby congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses for the construction of a new Kingdom Hall on their property on Victoria Road. (Please turn to page 5.)

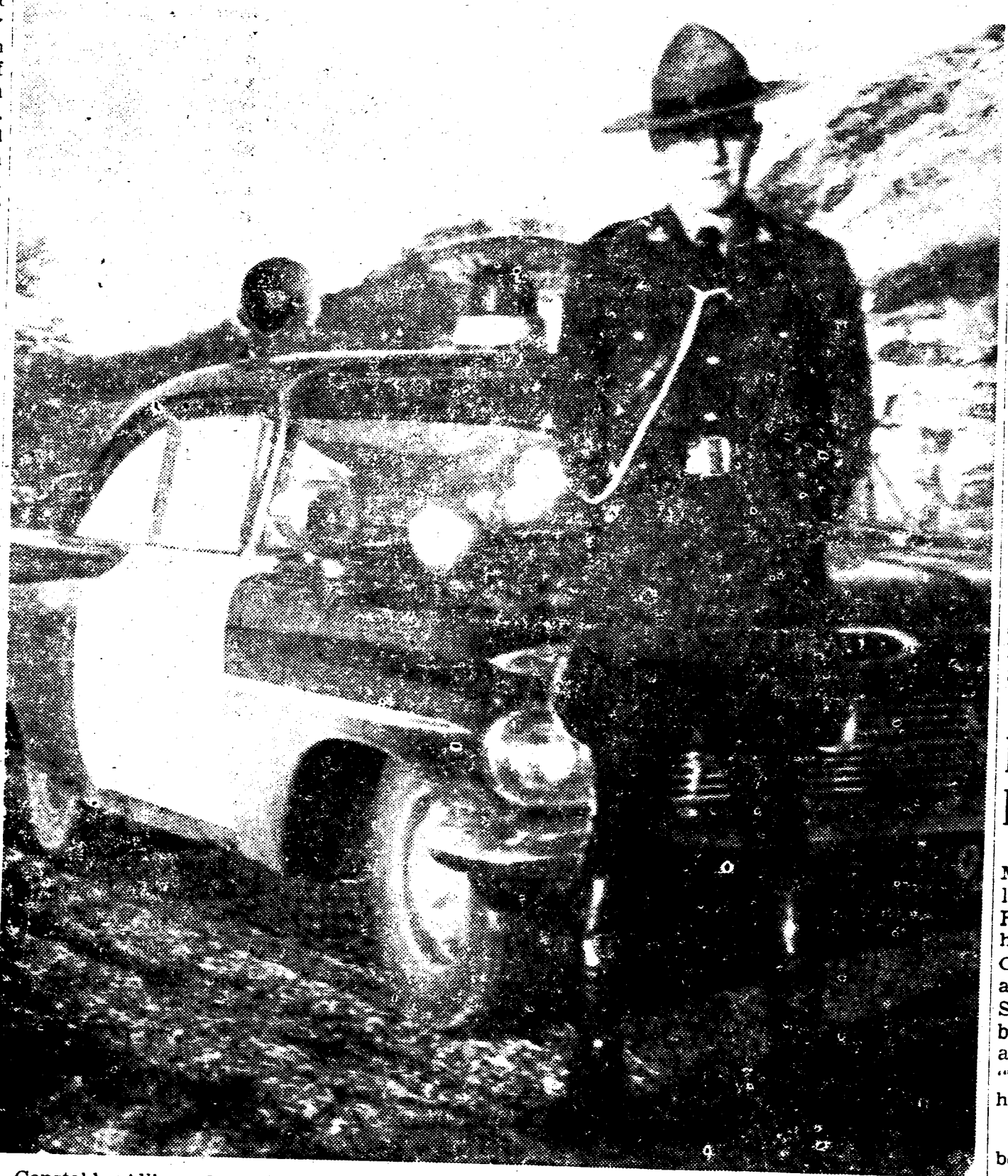

Fire fighting equipment from HMCS Cornwallis and Weymouth were summoned but could do little to save the building.

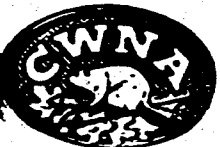
Mr. and Mrs. Haight and three of their children still living at home were rendered homeless by the blaze.

ABOUT THIS AND THAT

"Take A Refugee With You"

For many in Canada, the astronomical figures on the number of refugees (at least 15 million) who still exist in our "free" world transcends the imagination. The problem is too often shrugged off with "what can I, as an individual citizen, do about it?"

Something which every one of us can do is "Take a Refugee with Us" by exercising some personal sacrifice, and turning the saving over to the World Refugee Year. Next week is "Austerity Week" with the slogan "Don't Spend it, send it to World Refugee Year". There is a fund set up to clear the Refugee Camps of Europe; to provide vocational centres and training for refugees in the Middle East; to help the million Chinese refugees in Hong Kong; and to provide transportation for 8,000 refugees still on the mainland of China. So why not take one of these refugees with you from April 24 to 30.

You can "Take a Refugee with You" in innumerable ways. You go into a restaurant for lunch or dinner. Take your refugee with you — by setting aside the price of an extra meal, or even a glass of milk. You take your morning coffee or tea break. Take your refugee with you — by treating your refugee to the price of a cup (you might have had a second cup, if your refugee hadn't been with you). You take the bus or train to visit friends. Take your refugee with you. This refugee child or adult has never enjoyed a trip. Be sure to tell your friends about your constant refugee companion during Austerity Week. You go to the movies. Take your refugee with you — and set aside the price of an extra admission. Shopping for the weekend? Take your refugee with you — by contributing the price of a pound of butter, a tin of soup, a dozen of eggs.

Nova Scotia has the objective of clearing Camp Heidestrasse (50,000) and resettlement of the present occupants in Austria. Patron for Nova Scotia is His Honour Lieutenant Governor, E. C. Plow, and leading the Nova Scotia project is Admiral H. F. Pullen. Mayor V. G. Cardoza is on the Provincial committee from Digby. Contributions can be sent to the World Refugee Year Committee, P. O. Driving In Fog

As spring nears, the motorist has a pair of weather bug-bears on his heels — fog and darkness. The seasonal clash of cold and warm produces sudden fog, usually at night. But, at any time, fog makes a driver nearsighted and unless he compensates for this restricted vision he can get into serious trouble, day or night.

A motorist driving in fog should reduce speed, be particularly cautious in ravines and near bodies of water where fog tends to be thickest, and drive with headlights at low beam. He must remember that his headlights at high beam blind oncoming drivers, and the parking lights on a moving vehicle are either confusing, useless or, in some places, illegal.

Keep the wipers going and drive as close as possible to the right-hand curb or shoulder.

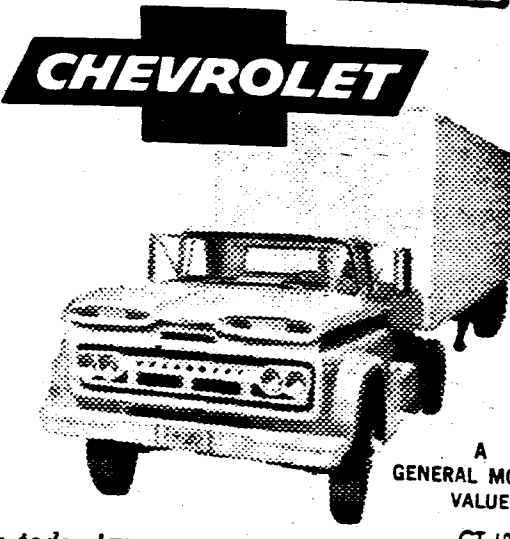

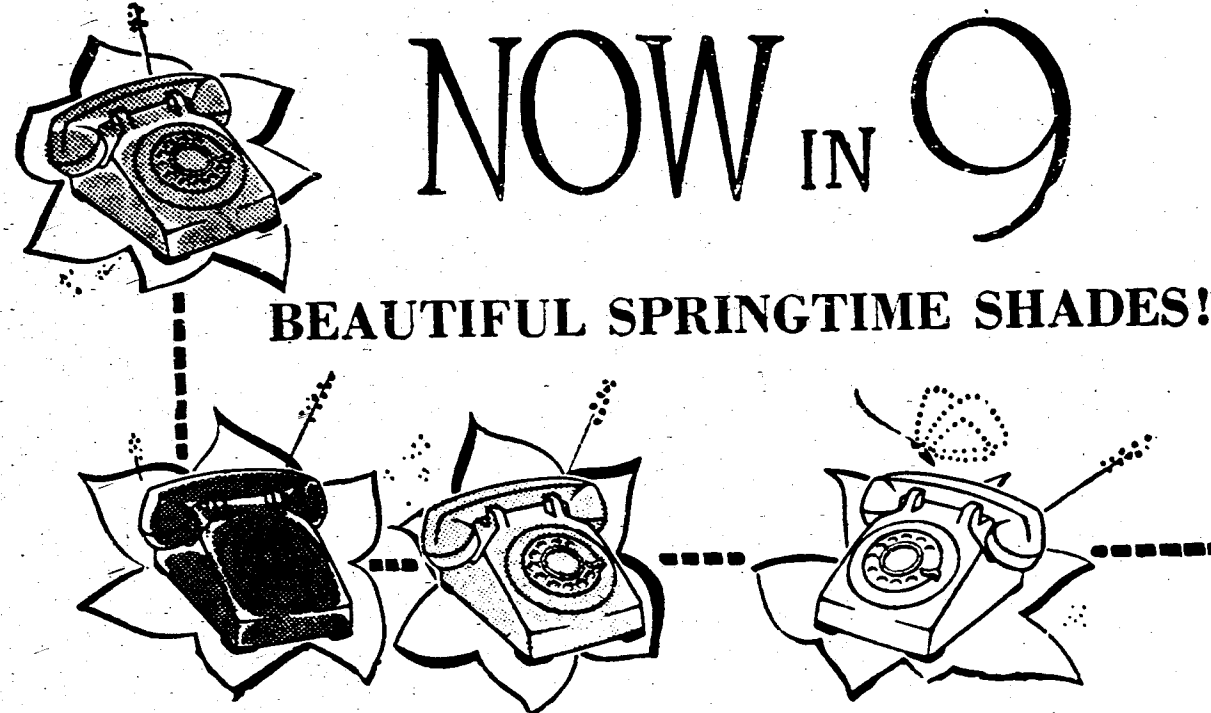

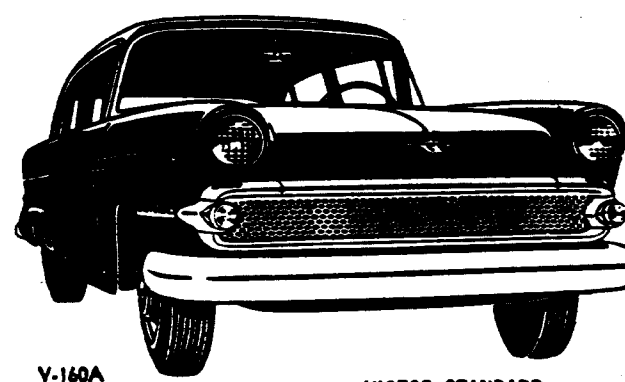

Abattoir Right Move

The Co-operative Abattoir and meat packing plant, just opened is a move in the right direction," said Ralph Loomer President of Nova Scotia CCF speaking to a public meeting at Clementsport. "This takes the farmers part of the way toward some control of their own markets." He warned of strong opposition ahead. "The packing house monopolies will not give up their hold without a struggle. We should remember these and other great corporations are the financial sponsors of the two old parties. A CCF government is needed to give full support for the new meat packing enterprise in the interests of the farmers and consumers of Nova Scotia.

"More such processing, marketing and storage services are needed," said Mr. Loomer. "Blueberries and other small fruits and vegetables will be provided for under a CCF government. Nova Scotia is buying large amounts of staple farm products that can be produced here as well or better than anywhere else. This drain on our wealth must be stopped. Growing and processing of these crops here will put some of our unemployed to work and restore agriculture in the province."

Magnus Eliason, CCF organizer, also addressed the meeting. He listed government automobile insurance, comprehensive health insurance, relief of overburdened municipal taxes and planned industrial development as some benefits the people of Nova Scotia should expect from a CCF government.

"These are the things the people of Saskatchewan are getting through their CCF government," said Mr. Eliason. "Such things do not come on a silver platter of empty election promises. They come when we organize our own CCF party and work them out for ourselves. The parties sponsored by the profit seeking monopoly corporations will only go as far as they are forced to go by the CCF," he declared.

Louis Beeler, of Upper Clements, was chairman of the meeting. He expressed satisfaction with the good representation and attendance. "This shows support for the CCF is growing in Nova Scotia," he said.

COUNCIL REPORT

(Continued from page 1)

Re: Tag-Days. Permission was granted the Zelma Rebekah Lodge for a tag day on July 15th and to the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society for a tag day on July 29th.

Re: Electric Light Committee. Mayor - Councillor Atkinson, I believe you have a request from the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society for the old street light standards.

Atkinson - Mrs. Nichols got in touch with me. She would like to have a gift of the old light standards. The horticultural society wants to use them to put on the poles along the front street to hold hanging baskets of plants. It is like what has been done in Victoria, B. C. to beautify the place.

Mayor - There are, I understand, about eighteen of these. Are they of any further use? Do you feel they could be donated?

Atkinson - They would put them on the light poles. Mr. Ayer says there is no reason why they could not put them on these poles.

McKenna - What about the traffic?

Mayor - There is no suggestion that the town maintain them is there?

Anthony - I think there should be some oversight or supervision. They could be given them providing they are used to beautify the town.

Motion put and passed that the discarded electric light standards be given the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society provided they are used to beautify the town.

Clerk - Should we write them. Anthony - I think it would be very nice to write.

A letter was read from the federal department of public works advising of the sale of the old post office building to David Garson, Yarmouth. A letter was also read from the municipality of Kings County concerning change in status of the municipal home there. A letter was also read from the Digby hospital board addressed to the Commons Commission asking permission for construction of a proposed new hospital on lands adjacent to the present structure.

Re: Matter of proclaiming Monday, April 18, as a public holiday.

Mayor - I have had a number of phone calls already as to whether or not Monday would be a holiday. If it is to be it must be proclaimed locally.

McKenna - We are the only town in the valley who have had a holiday.

Mayor - Last year we didn't deal with this at Council. At

the time I was at home with the flu. After several phone calls on the matter I polled the merchants and it was the opinion of most that they wanted a holiday and I as Mayor proclaimed it. I think that this year the council should deal with it.

McKenna - I think we should go along with other towns.

Anthony - Perhaps if we have it as a holiday other towns will follow suit. I move that Easter Monday be declared a holiday. (There was no seconder).

Mayor - We move on to the next item, temporary borrowing for the school.

McKenna - I think it would be advisable for the Mayor to contact the other towns in the area and if they are having the holiday then we could and he could proclaim it.

VanTassel - I would move it be left with the Mayor and if other towns are going to have it then we would have it also.

Mayor - In other words, we don't want to be different. The motion is that the Mayor contact adjacent towns and if they are to have a holiday on Monday then a holiday be proclaimed for Digby. Is there a seconder?

Bent - I think your course of action last year was a good one.

Mayor - I might say that last year I had phone calls from at least two merchants asking why we had not proclaimed it a holiday. I decided then to poll the other merchants to find out what they wanted. Almost without exception I found they wanted it a holiday or were willing to do like the council tonight - pass the buck - and leave it up to me. What most said was that they'd go along with what the rest were doing. What if the outside towns are not having it and our merchants want it? Personally, I think the council should act on this as a council, regardless of what others are doing. What if some outside towns are having the holiday and others not? The Mayor shouldn't have to ...

VanTassel - I will make another motion, maybe I will get it a little better. I move that Easter Monday be declared a holiday.

Anthony - I second it. Passed.

Re: temporary borrowing for the school of \$15,000.

A formal resolution covering this borrowing was read and passed.

The clerk reported on the matter of payments in lieu of taxes on federal buildings. He stated nothing so far had been received on either the old or new federal buildings. Mr. Hubley, the assessor, has written Ottawa on the matter but so

far no reply has been received, the clerk stated.

The matter of the request from Dr. Angus re a grant to the clinic was left for the budget meeting.

Mayor - Now we come to the matter of Mr. Twohig's presentation re Lt. Commander MacIntosh. Should this be left for some committee or referred to the recreation commission?

McKenna - I think we should give him 80% of the profits.

Anthony - I think there are so many angles to be discussed. I think it should be put to the recreation commission.

Mayor - Would a motion that the matter be referred to the recreation commission, perhaps also the school board and the civil defence committee take care of it? I think that would cover all the angles that you ...

Anthony - I think they should all be joined in this. There are a lot of things in which the Forum could be involved. For instance, we spent \$200 last year on the tennis courts. There is no reason why tennis could not be played on the cement floor at the Forum. Could the tennis club be involved in this?

McKenna - I would move that the recreation commission meet with the civil defence committee to see if something can be worked out regarding this matter.

Anthony - It should be worked out first from the recreation commission's point of view before bringing in the civil defence.

Mayor - As I understand Mr. Twohig's presentation, this gentleman is interested in locating in Digby as a director of recreation. The questions to be answered are, first of all, where is the money to come from, at least in the beginning, to make sure this man's services are available. I think a number of other organizations would have to be involved outside the recreation commission and the town council. The amount of money he wants is not out of the way.

Anthony - I think it would be a good idea if it could go through.

After some further discussion it was passed that the town's representatives on the recreation commission be requested by council to refer the matter to the next meeting of the commission. Passed.

Will Not Re-offer



Hon. Malcolm S. Léonard, who has represented the electoral district of Digby in the provincial legislature since 1956, announced his withdrawal from the active political field last Thursday.

Mr. Léonard's announcement was coupled with the appointment of the former legislature speaker, Hon. W. S. Kennedy Jones, as Minister of Welfare, to succeed Mr. Léonard in that post.

Late last year Mr. Léonard suffered a severe heart attack and was forced to resign the Education portfolio which he had previously held. Because of a further setback this year he was unable to attend only two meetings of the 1960 legislative session.

A Digby barrister, Mr. Léonard first entered the provincial legislature following the 1956 election. He was named Minister of Education that year and later became Welfare Minister. In announcing his retirement last week Mr. Léonard said it had been "a very satisfying experience" to serve the government and particularly Premier Stanfield.

The Premier, in commenting on Mr. Léonard's resignation, said it was a matter of "deep regret to me". He pursued his task with great devotion and ability, the Premier said. He expressed the hope that now Mr. Léonard was relinquishing his departmental duties he would regain his health and vigour.

To Sponsor Campaign

The annual Clean-Up campaign in Digby will be sponsored again this year by the Digby Fire Department. Dates for the campaign are May 5th to May 14th.

This year the fire department is making an all-out effort to make the campaign as successful as possible. Other organizations in the community are being asked to cooperate by taking on sections of the town for which they are responsible.

It is understood an actual action campaign for cleaning up public areas of the town will be put in motion as well as the usual urging of home and property owners to brighten up their own properties.

The fire department points out that the campaign is a multi-purpose one. Not only does an all-out clean-up effort brighten and improve the appearance of the community itself but fire hazards created by such things as rubbish clogged cellars and attics are eliminated.

Visitors to a community are invariably impressed by their first view of the area and one thing which tends to create a favorable impression is a clean, well kept community where homes, business premises and public areas are neat and tidy and well kept.

Nova Scotia Election June 7

Premier Robert L. Stanfield announced late Tuesday afternoon that a provincial election would be held in Nova Scotia on June 7th.

At the time of the dissolution of the 46th Assembly on Tuesday the Progressive Conservative party, headed by Premier Stanfield, held twenty-four seats; the Liberals, headed by Henry D. Hicks, held eighteen, and the lone CCF member was the party's leader, Michael MacDonald.

Already a number of nominating conventions have been held by the various parties throughout the province in anticipation of the election.

In the electoral district of Digby where the sitting member, Hon. Malcolm S. Léonard, recently announced his decision not to re-offer to the forthcoming election because of ill health, a nominating convention has been called by the Progressive Conservatives for Saturday afternoon, April 30th. The P.C.s have also set April 30th as the date for their nomination in the District of Clare. So far the Liberals have not announced a date for their convention in Digby.

Library Tea Included All Ages

Thursday, April 21st, the library committee at Weymouth had a tea, to which the children came representing book titles. Adults were supposed to guess the titles which proved to be both difficult and amusing. We are open only on Thursday afternoons from 2:30 to 5:30. Books may be kept out for 2 weeks, without charge, but if not returned a fine of a cent a day is imposed. There are two young adults who get books, and enjoy them!

On cold days we have a big pot of cocoa on the stove, along with one of coffee, and cookies for all, which adds to the fun of getting books. These refreshments have also been donations, and the Library Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our friends for making this little Library a success, while we are hoping and hoping that we may some day soon have a Regional Library in this Municipality, because it can do what we cannot possibly do, and that is to reach everyone who wants to read."

Clean-up Week — May 8-14

President Is Guest Speaker

Mrs. Margaret Norrie, President of the Nova Scotia Liberal Women's Association, was guest speaker at the Monday evening meeting of the Bear River Liberal Women's Association.

The meeting was presided over by Mrs. J. H. Cunningham, the President, and minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mrs. Wilfred Miller, the Secretary. Well over sixty were in attendance, including a number of guests from Digby and Annapolis.

In her address, Mrs. Norrie told of the work which women can do in the field of politics and told of the increasing need for women to make a more active part in the political life of the country, province and community.

She contrasted the performance of the present government in Ottawa and Halifax with the record of Liberal administration and stated the performance of Conservative governments fell far short of the promises made in the platforms of the party when its candidates were seeking office.

Mrs. Norrie took as the keynote of her address the watchwords of the Liberal party — "Unity - Security - Freedom" — and stated these were not only the standards of a political party but essentials in the life of any free nation.

The present government, she said, is endangering all three of these in Canada. The unity of our nation is being threatened, she said, by the failure of the present government to consider Canada and its welfare in the light of the needs of the nation as a whole and the specific needs of the various areas which make up the nation.

The security of Canada is being threatened, she said, by the lack of clear-cut policies in defence and the "muddling" that has occurred in defence matters since the Conservatives have taken over the government of Canada.

In her address Mrs. Norrie cited a number of instances, which she stated were clear-cut examples of the ineptitude of the present administration in both domestic and foreign affairs and she stated the very threats which the actions of the present government were posing in the field of unity and security in Canada must of necessity threaten the freedom of the nation and its people.

A vote of thanks to Mrs. Norrie for her address was moved by Mrs. B. R. Fraser and seconded by Mrs. George Jefferson. This was passed unanimously.

Victor Cardoza, of Digby, a former member of the provincial legislature, also spoke briefly. Mr. Cardoza stated one need of all political parties was devoted, dedicated and energetic workers and he urged the members of the women's organization to cooperate with other groups in the Liberal party to help in the carrying out of the many tasks which must be done to ensure a successful election campaign.

Another speaker at the meeting was Peter Nicholson, M.L.A. for Annapolis West. Mr. Nicholson reviewed the program of the present government of Nova Scotia since it came into office.

B., in the Annapolis Royal Regional Academy. The choir comprised of fifty voices, rendered negro Spirituals, Classic Anthems and Gospel favorites. Annapolis Royal was the only location in the Annapolis Valley where the choir presented a program this Spring.

Hope To Clear Refugee Camp

The meeting of Nova Scotia's objective of \$50,000 for world refugee year will mean that one of the refugee camps in Europe, Camp Heidestrasse in Austria, can be closed and its inmates removed to become useful, productive citizens in Austria, Digby Mayor, Victor Cardoza, stated in an address at last week's meeting of the Digby Kiwanis Club.

Two hundred and thirty-seven refugees live in Camp Heidestrasse, Mayor Cardoza said, and most of them have been there since the end of World War II. Of the number half are handicapped by tuberculosis or some other disability. There are 54 families and 63 single adults. About 20% of the inmates of the refugee camps, he said, are children under fourteen who have known no other life but that of the crowded, uncomfortable quarters of the refugee camps where privacy hardly exists and where long hours are spent just waiting.

For the most part, the Mayor said, the refugee camps were never intended as any more than just temporary shelter. They were made up of old army barracks buildings, Nissen huts and the like. Over the past fifteen years, he said, living conditions had steadily deteriorated until now many of the camps were just a collection of old shacks.

There are still fifteen million refugees who need a permanent home, the Mayor said, and 32,000 of these are living in refugee camps in Europe. The countries in which these refugees have been existing since the end of the war, he said, have been providing for their care and shelter and have spent an average of \$1.40 per head of their own population on the care of refugees.

When it is considered, he said, that these countries were all badly hit by war themselves and faced with the great problem of their own rehabilitation, such an expenditure for the welfare of refugees is most significant. It is all the more so, he said, when one considers that over the same period of time Canada has spent only four cents per head of population on the refugee problem. Even if the Nova Scotia objective of \$50,000 in the current campaign is reached, he said, it will mean a contribution of only fifteen cents per capita.

The \$50,000 which Nova Scotia is asked to raise to help clear out Camp Heidestrasse is only half the amount required, the Mayor stated. The balance is being put up by Austria who will also take care of the physical requirements of the job, finding homes for the refugees, taking care of their training and education, looking after those who are ill and in general handling the task of their rehabilitation within the Austrian community.

Mr. Cardoza explained the principles of Austerity Week, which is being marked across Canada April 24th to the end of the month to focus attention on the refugee problem. He said Nova Scotians could help in many ways. No house to house canvass is being made, he said, but everyone in the province is being asked to "take a refugee with you" during the week. In other words, he said, in every activity on which money is spent during the week, the Nova Scotian is being asked to consider that he has a refugee with him whose way he is paying. The money that would be involved is to be sent to the World Refugee Committee in Halifax.

Gets Safe Driving Award

Reginald L. VanTassel, of Digby, recently received an enamelled pin and certificate from the Canadian Pacific Railway symbolic of the fact he has driven a truck for the railway for a period of fifteen years without an accident.

Mr. VanTassel has actually completed twenty years of accident-free driving for the railway but permanent type records leading to the presentation of pins were not established until fifteen years ago.

The driving record established by Mr. VanTassel is particularly significant since his driving is a year round affair, handling freights over both main and secondary roads in western Nova Scotia.

Mrs. Morash and her grandchildren took a stroll in the woods on the Bay of Fundy side Monday afternoon. After being out for a while one of the children, a ten year old girl, became separated from the rest and got lost.

ABOUT THIS AND THAT

Deserving of Consideration

We are not construction engineers at The Digby Courier, therefore, we cannot argue whether or not a causeway from East Ferry at the end of the mainland on Digby Neck to Tiverton on Long Island would be feasible either physically or economically. We would not venture a guess on the cost of a suitable bridge across either Petite Passage or the Grand Passage. These questions could be more easily answered by others. One thing we do feel very strongly about and that is if either of these constructions are deemed physical or economic possibilities then every effort should be made by the people of Digby County to urge such an undertaking. The people who live on Long Island and Bear Island are deserving of consideration in this matter, construction that is long overdue.

Grant you, we must give credit for the reduction in cost to travel from the Islands to the mainland within the past few years. There was a time not too many years back when the cost made it very difficult for a man to consider taking his family over the ferry for a Sunday afternoon ride on the mainland or a weekend vacation. The ferry charges even today add considerably to an Island family's dentist bill or to the cost of other professional and business service.

But regardless of travelling expense, the Island people are deserving of something more in the line of convenience. Car accommodation is entirely dependent on tide, weather and daylight. Mainland people can start off for the big provincial city with little or no thought about conditions in this regard but if the Island people have reason to motor to the town of Digby, only thirty miles away, they must have regard for the tides, watch the wind and weather and race with the hours of daylight for the return trip.

We have a feeling that with better and more convenient passage crossing these quiet scenic fishing villages would be a tremendous attraction to tourists — a boon not only to the Islands but to the tourist industry on the mainland as well.

Another item for consideration is the quantity of fish for commercial purposes which is shipped by truck across the passage on the ferries. A causeway or bridge would facilitate operation of the fishing industry.

The greater percentage of residents of Long Island and Bear Island own cars. They are deserving of easier access to the use of the main highways of our province. Let us push this project to the utmost unless it is proven to be impossible or altogether impractical.

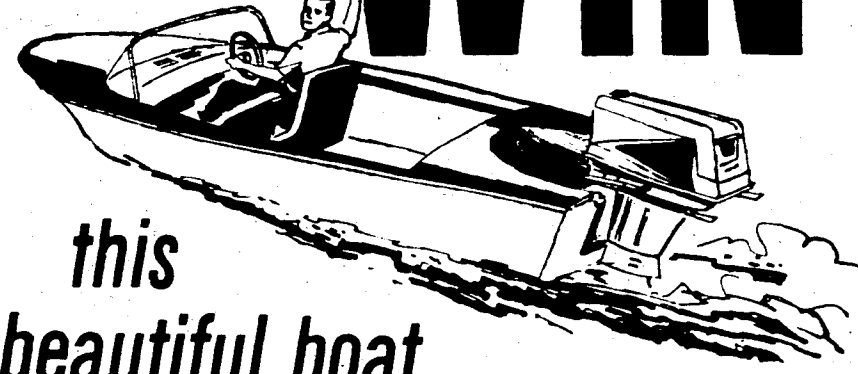

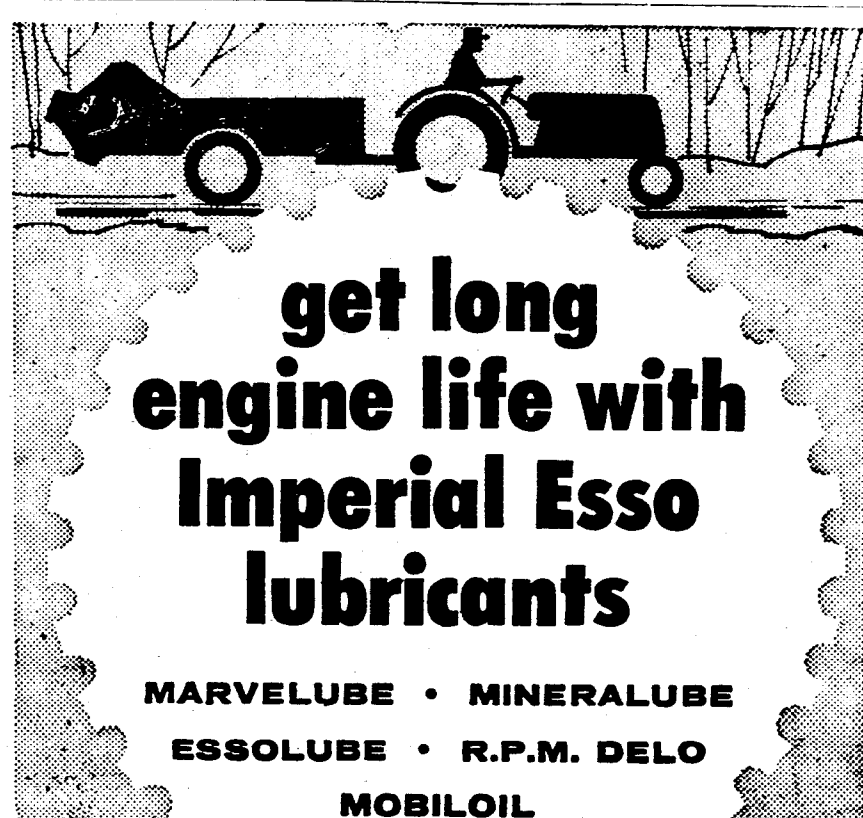

Review Area

Problems

A sizeable increase in numbers and dollar value of the fish catch along the French Shore of Digby County over the ten year period between 1949 and 1959 was noted by Fisheries Officer Adelard Comeau during a panel discussion which featured the opening meeting for the year of the Clare Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Comeau stated in 1949 the fish catch along the shore was 3,464,500 pounds for a value of \$275,110, while in 1959 the catch was 9,135,000 pounds with a value of \$674,629. Lobster catch in 1949 was valued at \$207,594, and in 1959 was \$295,858.

Dr. Julius Comeau, who was substituting for Bernard Comeau of Sarnierville who was unable to attend, read Mr. Comeau's speech to the gathering.

He spoke on the fisheries, mainly the processing of fish. Fishing is one of the largest industries in the Municipality of Clare along the French shore. Larger draggers are being constructed and already a fleet of four scallop draggers are getting ready for the spring and summer scallop season, to wish on George's banks.

The introduction of draggers along St. Mary's Bay has created new jobs. Mr. Comeau stated that with the larger boats operating more captains are required as well as cooks and crew members.

Edouard LeBlanc opened his talk with the advice "Tend to your affairs, but do tend them". There are 2,000 families in the Municipality of Clare, he said, and with an average of \$2,000 per family this would bring the

amount \$4,000,000 to be spent annually.

Thousands of tourists pass through the district and we may well ask: "Where are they going?" Something should be done to make them stop off here for a short period of time. We should develop the "gold mine" we have at our disposal by making it interesting for the tourist to stop off, he said.

Ernest F. LeBlanc, retired local bank manager, gave a brief outline on what the Chamber of Commerce was and what it could do.

He also did not point that Acadian Fest organized by the Acadian Fishers Association to encourage fishing, including St. Mary's Bay.

Others who took part in the panel discussion were Mr. Comeau and E. LeBlanc. Gerald d'Entree, local bank manager, was also present.

Halifax, April 25, 1960.

Chairman, Digby Progressive Conservative Association, Digby, N. S.

Delay Calling Of Meeting

Action on approval of a resolution to call a ratepayers meeting in the town of Digby concerning the borrowing of \$80,000 to finance the town's share of the costs of constructing a proposed new hospital for this area was deferred at the May meeting of the town council.

It was decided the council would defer calling the meeting until they are "satisfied all parties concerned are agreed on the division of costs".

The resolution seeking approval of the borrowing of \$80,000 to cover the town's share of the proposed hospital construction was secured from the municipal affairs department following a report that the negotiating committee, representative of the hospital and the various municipal units to be served, had agreed on a cost division.

Following this the district of Clare approved their share of \$20,000 and the municipality of Annapolis approved \$40,000 as their share. No agreement was reached by the Digby municipal council concerning the amount of \$160,000, which is to be their share of the construction. It is understood, however, the matter is to be brought before the semi-annual meeting of the council which is in session this week.

No definite commitment has been received, it is understood, concerning the amount to be contributed by the federal authority because of the involvement of service wives and families at HMCS Cornwallis.

Decision was made at the council meeting to purchase a warning siren for the north end of the town. It was stated by Councillor Bent, chairman of the fire committee, that complaints were being received from firemen and residents of the north end of the town that the fire alarm could not be heard, except under most favorable conditions, in a large section of the north end of the town. Mr. Bent stated the proposed new siren would be coordinated with the two other sirens and would also serve to complete the civil defence signal system.

The council also decided to give temporary custody of the bell of the minesweeper HMCS Digby, to the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club for display on the wall of the main lounge of their club house. The bell was presented to the Town of Digby when HMCS Digby was decommissioned after serving with distinction as part of Canada's navy during the war.

HMCS Digby received her name in honour of the Town of Digby and was christened at Lauzon, Que., by Mrs. E. J. Theriault, the wife of Digby's Mayor at that time, E. J. Theriault, Q.C. When the ship was decommissioned the bell was presented to the town and was received on behalf of the civic corporation by the then Mayor, the late James W. Merkel.

Routine business occupied the remainder of the May session of the council.

Clare P.C.'s Name Weaver

The Clare Progressive Conservatives Saturday nominated Kenneth Weaver of St. Bernard, a forty year old RCAF veteran of World War II, as their standard bearer in the June 7th provincial election.

Mr. Weaver has been active in community affairs in the district of Clare and has played a prominent part in the Acadian Festival arrangements, as well as the Chamber of Commerce and the cooperative movement in Clare.

Two other names were submitted to the convention. These were Desire Comeau, a former legislature member, and Fred Gaudet, who contested the seat unsuccessfully in 1956. Both men withdrew in favour of Mr. Weaver.

Mr. Weaver said if elected he would do his best for the constituency and said he was confident that the people of Nova Scotia would endorse the record of the Stanfield government over the past 3 1/2 years and would return a Progressive Conservative government to power on June 7.

Felton Legere, MP for Shelburne-Yarmouth-Clare, praised the improved Progressive Conservative policies on snow removal and road grading of the Stanfield and Diefenbaker governments.

Leaders Urge Cooperation

Active cooperation in the Clean-Up Campaign being sponsored in Digby May 8th to 14th by the Digby Fire Department has been urged by the leaders of a number of organizations in the town.

Various aspects of the benefits to be derived from active cooperation in the proposed program have been stressed by these leaders in statements which appear in today's Courier.

Among the statements issued is one from Mrs. H. A. Nichols, president of the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society, in which she urges a sharing of extra plants by householders as a means of beautifying the town. In her statement Mrs. Nichols says: "By conducting a plant swap in your neighborhood, you'll vary your own garden and that of your neighbors, at the same time increasing the flowering beauty of Digby. As you thin out your perennials and annuals, don't throw the surplus in the trash. Call a neighbor and offer your plants. And don't forget your neighbors who have never gardened — this is the opportunity to introduce them to the joy of growing things and gain their support in making Digby a more beautiful place in which to live."

Active support of the Clean-Up program is a concrete way to protect your family's health, Dr. D. E. Lewis, Medical Health Officer for Digby, stated.

In his statement Dr. Lewis said that by getting rid of trash and rubbish, disposing of old rotten wood and generally cleaning up, you will deprive disease carrying rodents and flies of food and shelter.

"Cleaning up vacant lots, spraying and draining low and swampy areas will help a great deal to reduce the mosquito population", Dr. Lewis said.

"Germs of many kinds will fall before the attack of scrub brush and paint brush, and the community as a whole will be a healthier place in which to live. Particularly for the sake of our children, I urge you to participate fully in the campaign", the health leader said.

Fire Chief George Humphrey also urged support of the campaign in a statement. He advised householders not to let fire hide in their homes and stated they could help to eliminate this menace by cooperating fully in the clean-up campaign.

"That old box of cast-off clothing, the pile of newspapers in the basement, the oily mop in the closet, and the store-room's flammable liquids are all hideaways for fire's threat", the Fire Chief explained. "And unpainted wood is ready fuel for fire", Chief Humphrey continued.

"For the protection of your family and home, get rid of old clothing, magazines, mattresses and papers. Protect wood surfaces with paint. Dispose of oily mops and rags and all flammable items. Get rid of dried grass and leaves, especially those near the house foundation. Check your wiring to be certain it is adequate to meet present-day electrical requirements."

"Fight fire before it starts by getting rid of its hiding places", Chief Humphrey requested.

"Doing More" Says Stanfield

The present Conservative government of Nova Scotia is assisting the municipalities of the province as a whole by an amount ten times greater than the Liberals did in their last four years of office, Premier R. L. Stanfield told a nominating convention in Digby on Saturday.

"Our assistance to the municipalities, he said, is more than three times what Hicks promised in 1956". He stated that in the case of Digby municipality the new provincial assistance from the present government is twenty times what the Liberals gave in the last four years they were in office.

Under three items alone, the abolition of the highway tax, the social assistance and relief from indigent hospital accounts, the Premier stated, Digby town and municipality have received a total of \$57,400 a year in provincial assistance since the Conservatives took over. The total new assistance received by the constituency from the Liberal administration during the last four years of the Liberal regime was \$29,00, Mr. Stanfield said.

Speaking of increasing costs, the Premier stated these were a burden not only to the municipalities but the provincial government as well. The province is being hard put to pay its share of these costs, he said. The province, he said, cannot continue extensive borrowings for capital costs without endangering its credit position. To suggest that the great projects that we have embarked upon and which we hope to continue can be continually financed only through further borrowing is sheer folly, he said.

Although today the Liberals take a different stand with regard to surpluses than they did when the late Angus L. Macdonald was the premier, he said, we must recognize that some part of our capital cost program must of necessity be on a "pay as you go" basis and we intend to use surpluses to improve our net debt position.

Appeal Court For Islands

Provision has been made by the Digby Municipal Council for the holding of a session of the assessment appeal court next year in the island community of Freeport.

Councillors Victor Finigan, of Freeport, and Whitney Derby, of Westport, brought the matter to the attention of the council.

Both members stated ratepayers of the island communities of Freeport, Westport and Tiverton were at a serious disadvantage in the matter of bringing their assessment appeals to the attention of the appeal board.

There is a great dissatisfaction in these communities concerning assessment, both councillors Derby and Finigan stated. They said, however, many ratepayers were unable to properly bring their appeals to the attention of the appeal board which has previously held its sessions only in Digby.

In order to present their appeals in person to the board ratepayers of the island communities must travel some forty miles and, in the case of Westport, cross two ferries. The appeal board meets in January. It was noted, and very often weather conditions prevent travel across the ferries.

The uncertainty of having appeals heard in Digby in time to avoid an overnight stay also acts as a deterrent against trying to present an appeal, it was stated.

Councillor Derby cited a case where it cost one resident of Westport eighteen dollars to secure a three dollar reduction in his property tax.

The council approved unanimously a resolution authorizing the assessment appeal board to hold a one day sitting in Freeport in January to hear appeals of the ratepayers of the three island communities.

Councillor John Woolaver, chairman of the licence committee, reported twelve taxis had their 1960 licence and these had been approved by the committee. Another application had been received he said and seemed to be in order.

It was decided, on recommendation of the licence committee, to limit the number of taxi licences to be issued in Digby for the year 1960 at fourteen.

Presbytery W.A. At Bear River

Mrs. Norman Estey, Pictou, was guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Annapolis Presbytery Women's Association which met at the United Church, Bear River, on Friday. In a question and answer period Mrs. Estey dealt with the new One Woman's Organization which is contemplated will be organized in the United Church of Canada by 1962. All church women should be interested in the whole program of the church, Mrs. Estey said, and there should be no division in the work. There should also be closer work of men and women in the church and women should have a voice on boards of the church at all levels, the speaker continued. In keeping all that is best in the W.A. and the Women's Missionary Society and combining them should give a wider outlook for more women and a deeper interest in the church.

In speaking of the work of a Presbytery W.A., Mrs. Estey said that the Presbytery W.A. is not an end to the work of women in the church but an avenue to greater accomplishments. The avenue provides a wider vision, greater fellowship, better access to literature and leadership training. Mrs. Estey is treasurer of the Maritime Conference W.A.

Mrs. Lloyd C. Marshall, Bedford, President of the Maritime Conference W.A., spoke in the morning on Workshops in the W.A. and on Regional Rallies. At an executive meeting later in the day it was decided to hold three Regional W.A. Rallies in the Annapolis Presbytery in September or early October.

The meeting was presided over by the president, Mrs. W. T. Roop, Middleton, and opened in the morning with a worship by Mrs. Estey. Mrs. D. S. P.C.'s Pick Potter



E. Keith Potter, of Plympton, was nominated on Saturday as Progressive Conservative standard bearer for the electoral district of Digby in the June 7th provincial election.

Mr. Potter's name was the only one placed before the convention in the report of the nominating committee, presented in the absence of the chairman, Dr. G. V. Turnbull, by Eugene Outhouse, of Tiverton.

Formal nomination of Mr. Potter was made by Mrs. P. K. Gates, of Weymouth, and was seconded by Wilfred Swift, of Westport.

Mr. Potter, who was a member of the legislature from 1949 to 1953, did not re-appear in 1953. He attended the village school at Plympton and completed his Grade XI at Digby in 1929. In 1935 he graduated from Acadia University with a B.A. degree.

At Acadia he was active in student affairs, president of his class for one term, treasurer of the Students Union in his senior year and Life Treasurer of the class of 1935.

From 1939 to 1956 he carried on extensive lumbering operations in the counties of Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne and in north Queens.

In 1938 he was named president of the Conservative Association for the county of Digby. He has been active in the party's constituency organization ever since and in November 1959 was elected president of the Progressive Conservative Association for the Electoral District of Digby.

In 1949 he served as the party's standard bearer in this constituency and was one of the first eight members returned to the Legislature under the leadership of Hon. Mr. Stanfield. He did not reappear in the 1953 campaign.

In December 1956 he was appointed by the Minister of Highways, Hon. G. I. Smith, as acting Division Engineer for the county of Lunenburg. In May 1957 he became a member of the staff of the Right-of-Way Dept. of the Department of Highways. He served in this capacity throughout the province until December 1958 when he resigned to accept an appointment with the Progressive Conservative Association of Nova Scotia, as Assistant-Secretary. In this position he did considerable organizational work for the party throughout the province and was attached to the provincial headquarters in an executive capacity.

In 1938 Mr. Potter married Ruberta Rand, of Weymouth North. They have six children and reside in Plympton. Patricia is a Junior at Acadia University; Shirley is a student nurse at Saint John General Hospital; Joe is a Grade XII student at the Regional High School in Digby; John is a Grade VIII student in Junior High School in Digby; Michael and Danny attend the Elementary Consolidated School at Barton.

Brought Honor To Digby

Friends of Hon. M. S. Leonard learned with regret some weeks ago that due to reasons of health he had decided to withdraw from active politics. It was with more than general concern that his friends, irrespective of any political affiliations, regretted his decision to retire for it seemed to be a well known fact that the Hon. Mr. Leonard's devotion to his duty was the cause of his forced retirement.

Mr. Leonard brought a worthy honor to Digby and municipality, having been the first Minister to serve the Digby area with a Government Portfolio since 1878. At that time Hon. William Berrian Vail had been Minister of Militia and Defence in the Provincial House from 1874 to 1878, and had been Liberal member for Digby County from 1867-1874. He was born in Sussex, N. B. and married Charlotte, daughter of Charles Jones, Weymouth.

Mr. Leonard carried on a thriving law practice in Digby and was interested in organizations for the betterment of his town and county when the opportunity presented itself to enter the Provincial Legislature for the Progressive Conservative party in 1956. In August of 1957 Mr. Leonard took on the arduous task of Minister of Education and later on January 2, 1958, he assumed another heavy burden with the portfolio of Minister of Public Welfare. Both these duties were carried out by the Minister in an extremely conscientious manner, giving of his talent and abilities without restraint for the benefit of the people he served. Illness slowed his activity in 1959 until later it was necessary to relinquish the portfolio of Minister of Education, one which had demanded a great deal of time and strength to administer in the capable manner in which it was done and for which Mr. Leonard had the necessary qualifications to do.

Liberals and Conservatives alike in this area look back with gratitude to the accomplishments attained for the benefit of Digby County during Mr. Leonard's term in the Provincial House. They have a deep sense of pride in the fact that after more than 80 years the Digby municipality was again honored in being served by a Minister in the government and by a man who carried capably while health permitted two of the most difficult portfolios. Mr. Leonard's many personal friends wish for him continued renewal of his former good health. The Digby Courier joins in extending these good wishes for his complete recovery.

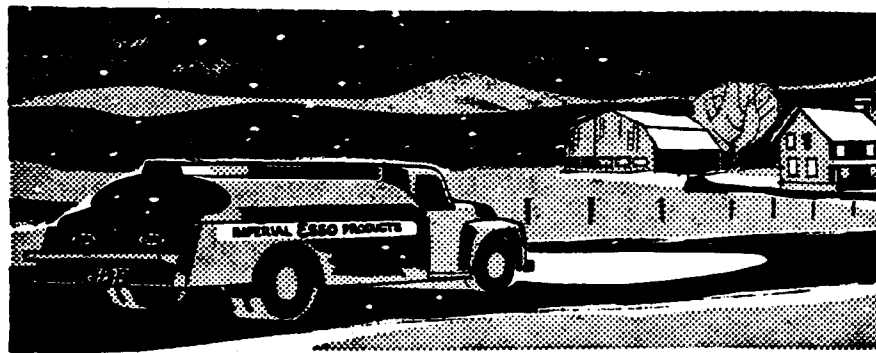

Makes 3 dozen rolls
Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar and 2 1/2 tsp. salt. Cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into large bowl; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 small envelope (or 1 tsp.) Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour and 1/4 c. melted shortening; beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 3 c. (about) sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on floured board until elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled—about 1 1/4 hrs. Punch down dough; grease top and again let rise until almost doubled—about 30 mins. Punch down dough again; divide in 3 equal portions. Form each portion into a 12" roll. Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces; form into smooth balls. Roll each ball into an oval 2 1/2" x 3 1/2"; fold in half crosswise. Place touching each other, on greased cookie sheets. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins. Bake in a hot oven, 400°, 12 to 15 mins.

5. Combine 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar, 1/4 c. flour, 1/4 tsp. grated nutmeg and 2 tbsps. melted butter or margarine. Brush dough generously with melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with crumble. Bake in mod. oven, 350°, 20 to 25 mins. Yield: 2 streusels.

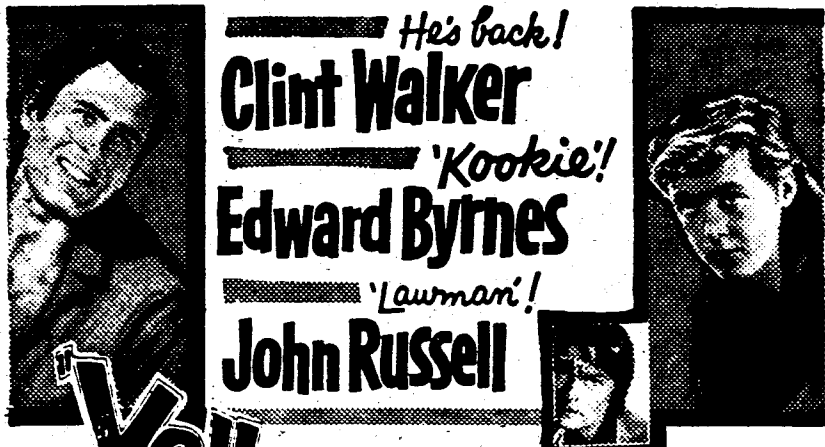

Although we have been criticized because the hospital tax revenue exceeded in the first year the cost of the program it was expected this would be so, the Premier said. He stated as more beds became available the cost of the program would increase and the surplus was being put aside to meet this increase.

It is anticipated, he said, that the revenue from the hospital tax will not be enough this year to meet the cost. This cost, Mr. Stanfield said, has been forecast to increase as much as ten percent a year. "We will be fortunate, he said, if the present tax continues to cover the increase".

Speaking of hospital construction, he said that during the last five years of Liberal rule the provincial government refused to authorize any new hospital projects.

Referring to education, Mr. Stanfield said his government plans further modification in the sharing formula on these costs to bring about a more equitable sharing of the tax load. Review must be made of the burdens placed on the municipalities through the sharing of education costs, he said, and he suggested a review of transportation costs might be made.

"Municipalities, he said, must be prepared, however, to accept the responsibilities for the financing of their own decisions in education". Our aim is to distribute the municipal share of the costs of education as fairly as possible with the province carrying as much as it can", the premier stated.

Speaking of Liberal criticism of the study made of government services by the firm brought in to make this study, Mr. Stanfield stated that under the Liberals, government organization had grown up "willy nilly" and "we made sensible use of the services of these people to incur large annual savings". Less than one half of

one percent of the year's budget had been spent for the service. "The profit on beer bottles alone will give us more than half a million dollars in four years. This was the profit the Grits gave their friends", he said.

The Conservative government has not been afraid of new techniques to encourage and expand industry, the premier said in referring to Industrial Estates Ltd. He said this corporation had saved the Weymouth Industries Ltd. and housed it after the plant had been destroyed by fire.

"We are doing all we can to develop industry in this province, he said, and the directors of Industrial Estates are succeeding despite the efforts of the Liberals".

Referring to the pulp mill in the eastern end of the province, Mr. Stanfield said a market for one hundred thousand additional cords of pulpwood a year would increase the demand and bring about improved prices for this commodity. "It will mean a substantially better price than today", he said.

The premier also referred to the power development at Weymouth on the Sissiboo River and said the cost of this would exceed eight million dollars.

Other speakers at the convention included Mrs. Lloyd MacRae, president of the Provincial Women's Organization, James Harding, M.L.A., Shelburne, and Premier Stanfield.

A resolution of appreciation to Hon. M. S. Leonard for his services to the constituency, the party and the province and expressing the hope his health would soon be fully restored, was presented by Mrs. H. J. Anthony and unanimously endorsed by the meeting.

Mrs. A. J. Dillon presented a resolution expressing confidence in the leadership of the Rt. Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker, and his government at Ottawa. Keith Raymond presented a resolution of confidence in the

leadership of Hon. R. L. Stanfield and his provincial government. Both were unanimously endorsed by the meeting.

my fellow Ministers. I have found them all, without exception, to be dedicated Nova Scotians. They are all just plain, good, ordinary fellows, with great abilities, each with a great task to perform.

Navy Week Observed

Battle of the Atlantic Sunday was observed May 8 in memory of those who served and gave their lives at sea in the Second World War.

Church parades and special services were held in naval commands and establishments across Canada, and in ships at sea, to commemorate the long and bitter battle in the North Atlantic. In winning this battle, Canadian ships and men played a major role.

Observances this year were part of the 50th anniversary program of the Royal Canadian Navy which was established with the passage of the Naval Service Act May 4, 1910.

May 8 also marked the opening of Navy Week under the auspices of the Navy League of Canada. Royal Canadian Sea Cadets and Wrennettes were on parade during the week, and in many communities Sea Cadet establishments held open house.

The Navy League, which administers the Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps, has sponsored Navy Week for the past 20 years, to focus attention on maritime affairs and the importance of the sea to Canada's security.

A Ray Of Hope

One of the qualities that goes toward sustaining human life is that of hope. Inspire a man with hope and he has something to look forward to; something to live for. Doctors and nurses confirm this theory and put it into practice. They know that health and even life depend largely on the measure of hope within a patient and the progress he or she is likely to make.

Up and down our land there are people who need the inspiration of hope, which is akin to faith. They are people who have come through a trying period of adversity, met with some frustrating experience, or have been discouraged in the long hard climb of life. They need the friendly word, the helping hand.

Probably The Salvation Army has done as much for this class of people as any similar body of welfare workers. Its members are well versed in the art of helpful counsel, they know the hard knocks that life can give a person, and they understand the deeper needs of the human heart. They are, too, a hopeful people — they despair of none — and are capable of inspiring others with hope.

No matter whether marching the streets with bands and banners, dealing with the alcoholic, visiting the prisoner in his cell, or the sick in hospital, or serving the people in any capacity whatsoever, the Army radiates its gospel of hope and cheer and is an asset to any community.

It is an organization that merits the encouragement and support of all citizens. Let us bear this in mind during the present Red Shield Drive.

Planters Wanted Assurances

Evidence that the New England Planters were not anxious to take up settlement in Nova Scotia until they had received assurances concerning their protection, their freedom of worship and the encouragements that would be forthcoming to them to settle on the lands from which the Acadians had been expelled is seen in an interesting and newspaper clipping recently found in Digby.

The clipping, which was found in an old prayerbook which bears the imprint, "Presented by the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge, 1812," is from an 1888 newspaper. Unfortunately there is no masthead but it would appear from advertisements it is a valley paper.

The article which has been clipped is headed "New England Immigration to This Province" and is evidently part of a series entitled "Historical Nova Scotia." It was written by Dr. Benjamin Rand.

Dr. Rand points out "it was not until after the governor of Nova Scotia had caused two proclamations to be made and circulated with reference to the vacated lands that the desired people could be obtained to emigrate to this province." The first proclamation was adopted in council October 12, 1758, in conformity with the directions the governor had received from the board of trade. The second and enlarged proclamation bears the date January 11, 1759.

In his article Dr. Rand also points out historical evidence indicates the expulsion of the Acadians was not at all motivated by "the mere desire

of territorial aggrandisement." This is indicated, he says, in the message of the governor of Massachusetts to the legislature in 1760 in which he refers to the expulsion in terms solely of congratulations upon the successful termination of a long existing struggle and consequent security to the English people. "Unassailable proof of this position, he says, is afforded by the fact the land lay waste for five years before its resettlement."

The first proclamation, which merely told of the excellence of the lands, was circulated in the New England States by the Nova Scotia agent there, Thomas Hancock. The necessity of the second more definite proclamation, Dr. Rand says, "reveals clearly the sturdy character of the intending emigrants. No mere desire for places new nor emigration circulars would suffice to tempt these people to leave their comfortable homes. A complete charter of rights was the first desideration of these descendants of the Puritans."

Among the assurances they required were whether "any allowance of provisions will be given at their first settlement; what quantity of land will be given each person; what quit rents they are to pay; what the constitution of the government is; whether any and what taxes are to be paid and whether they will be allowed the free exercise of their religion."

The Planters also were not willing to consider emigrating until they had examined for themselves the lands which they were being urged to settle. In April of 1759 Major Dennison, Messrs. Jonathan Harris, Joseph Otis and James Fuller from Connecticut, and John Hicks from Rhode Island, came

to Halifax as agents of the Planters to view the lands and secure the assurances from the government here.

After viewing the lands the group returned to Halifax and the four from Connecticut, who represented 330 possible emigrants, secured details concerning grants which were to be in fee simple, subject to a proposed quit rent. Blockhouses were to be built and garrisoned for the defence of the new settlers. Fifty families were to have from the government an allowance of corn of one bushel to each person per month or an equivalent in other grain for one year and arms and ammunition for defence. The people with their moveables, stock, etc., were to be transported at the expense of the government. Two hundred families were to be settled at Minas, joining on the river Gaspareaux, and 150 families at Canard. These latter were to be on the same terms as the former group.

Regarding the actual arrival of the Planters Dr. Rand says that the tide of New England emigration "undoubtedly set toward Nova Scotia in the following year, 1760 — although the exact date, manner and circumstance of the departure of the people from New England are in a measure undetermined."

In his article Dr. Rand takes issue with Haliburton's History of Nova Scotia concerning the settlement of the township of Cornwallis by the Planters. While he says the date of June 4, 1760, is probably correct he casts doubts on the number of ships which Haliburton says were involved in the landing. Haliburton in his history claims that "they (the Planters) sailed together in a fleet of twenty-two vessels conveyed by a brig of war mounting sixteen guns, commanded by Captain Pigot."

In his article Dr. Rand says, "Concerning the number of ships, we have more reason to doubt this historian since it is hard to believe so large a body of people could ever have left any part of New England on a single occasion without some extended reference to the event in local histories."

As an explanation of what might have happened Dr. Rand advances the theory that the ships referred to may have been

collected from different parts of the New England area under the convoy of the man-of-war and thus arrived at the same time in Cornwallis. He does, however, say that "nothing is more surprising than the failure on the part of the more important New England historians to discover and note such a large and widely extended migration."

He concludes his article with extracts from Haliburton's history concerning the settlements or additions to the population of a number of Nova Scotia communities by reason of the emigration of the Planters. Reference is also made to a report given on December 12, 1760, to the Board of Trade by Jonathan Belcher who temporarily succeeded Governor Lawrence who died in October of that year. This report states the townships of Horton, Cornwallis and Falmouth "are so well established that everything bears a most hopeful appearance". Belcher refers in most favorable terms to all the districts where Planters had settled. With respect to Amherst he says "many of the inhabitants are rich and in good circumstances". . . . Liverpool "they have sixteen sail of fishing schooners and though several of them came late in the season they have cured five hundred quintal of fish". Few proprietors had come to Dublin and Chester, he reported, but prospects looked good for the following year. Thirty proprietors had settled in Annapolis and the same number in Granville but "as they came late in the season they did not bring their families but are preparing against their arrival in the spring at which time the rest of the settlers are expected".

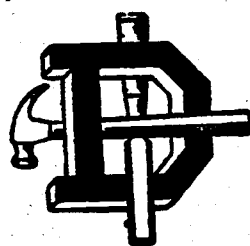



We presented the Council's case with respect to the recapping job. It was the opinion of the Streets Committee that it was unsatisfactory and it too, exceeded the budgeted amount, but the estimated amount by too large a margin. In the course of the discussion, it was stated that the amount of highway for which the government would help pay was a twenty foot width. Of the engineers who were here, one of them stated that he had inspected the recapping job before coming to the meeting. Except for one spot (I believe by the bandstand) the job was in his opinion satisfactory. He points out that the heavy rain that followed the immediate recapping caused the chips to separate and this was a matter over which the Department of Highways had no control. It happened in other sections of the Province and a certain amount of the chips were carried off. The meeting was left at that point for the Committee to report back to the Council.
VanTassel - Didn't he say if you wanted to take the matter further...
Mayor - If after this discussion, the Council wished to continue the complaint, it would have to be taken to the Minister of Highways or the Department heads.

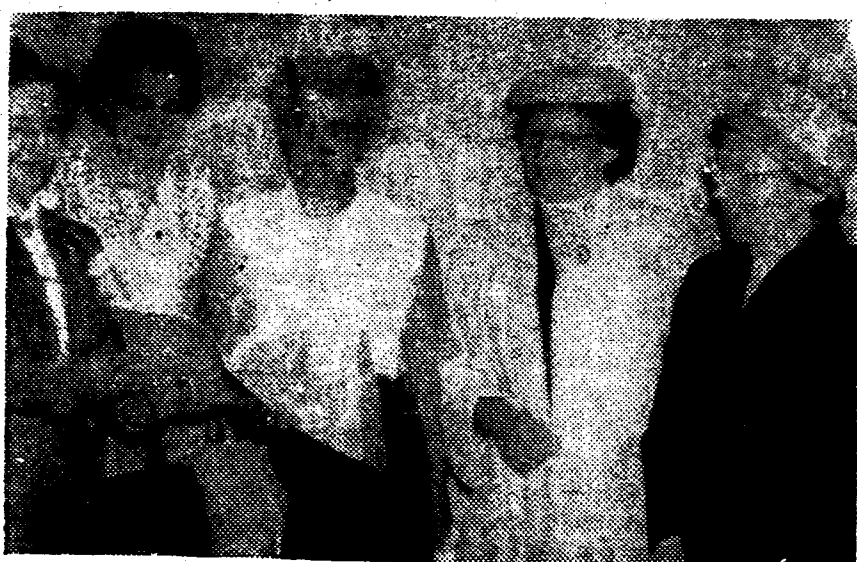
Eaton - I think that...

VanTassel - You seem to have covered it pretty well.
Re: Matter of Director of Civil Defense:
Mayor - Mr. Twohig phoned me late this afternoon and told me that Mr. MacIntosh who was considering this was no longer available, so that leaves this matter of Civil Defense director open. Mr. MacIntosh informed him that other towns, including the Town of Dartmouth were... He felt in fairness to Digby, in his opinion money wise, the job had gone beyond the ability of this community to compete.
Re: Fire hose for watering ships:
Bent - I was hoping that Mr. Woolaver would be here. The matter was discussed at the meeting of the Water Commission. It was agreed that something had to be done. They recommended the laying of a pipe and requested me to ask for prices on pipes from different firms to get an idea of the cost. They requested that Mr. Amoro meet too with the... and see if there would be any objection to the laying of the pipe. Mr. Amoro reported that they had been in contact with Halifax and it would be necessary to clear the matter with the Department in Saint John. The Commission were in favour of going ahead with something to alleviate the situation.
McKenna - Might I ask what (Department or Depot?) in Saint John has to do with the wharf.
Mayor - The Department of Public Works constructs the wharves and the operation of them is turned over to the Department of Transport.
Clerk - He said that one of the heads of Department would be here tomorrow and that he was sure it would have to go to Saint John.
Re: Matter of Bus parking:
Clerk - Mr. Thompson was supposed to come to Digby and has not been.
Mayor - That concludes the business arising from the minutes.
Reports of Committees:

Police Committee:
VanTassel - Ten complaints were received; five required some field investigation; all have been terminated to the satisfaction of those concerned. Three cases warranted court action, two under the Nova Scotia Liquor Act and one under the Motor Vehicle Act. Fines and Parking Tickets - \$238.00.
VanTassel - The motion is that the Report of the Police Committee with respect to the activities of the Department for the month be received.
Anthony - I second it.
Question - As above. Declared a vote.
Streets Committee:
VanTassel - The streets, there has been a lot of grading done on them. A catch basin was put in on Warwick Street, a hole was patched on the Pines Road. Four tons of calcium left over from last year has been put out and there has also been a carload of calcium ordered, forty tons.
VanTassel - I move adoption of this report.
McKenna - I second it.
Question - Report of the Streets Committee be adopted. Declared a vote.
Sewer Committee:
Bent - The matter of the sewer at the head of the government wharf. Mr. Robinson approached me as to what we are going to do about it. I thought that probably if we get approximate figures, we could tender properly, in the proper manner, if we have permission to do so. In the meantime, we have these figures.

The motion is that the Town advertise for the replacement of the sewer line on the north side of the government wharf to be 12 x 12, length 350 feet, to be constructed of 2½" wooden plank, planned on one side. You have the motion.
Question - As above. Declared a vote.
Bent - Mrs. Anthony wants us to do something about the sewer on First Avenue. From Mrs. Olsen's house to her cottage, a matter of some 300 feet or so.
Mayor - Isn't this a matter that should be brought to your Committee. How deep is the sewer on Montague Row. (Considerable discussion about depth and length, etc.)
Woolaver - I would like to make a motion that Mrs. Anthony's sewer be taken up with the Sewer Committee and find out if it is feasible and find out if they are agreeable.
Bent - I second it.
Woolaver - A few more facts should be brought.
Bent - Last year this came up and it was decided it was too expensive to go down that street and the best thing was to go across the property, but the Town did go along with that at that time.
VanTassel - Didn't you have to hire a surveyor?
Bent - I was up there just a little while ago...
Mayor - The motion is that the matter be left with the Sewer Committee and Mrs. Anthony to discuss the possibility and report back.
McKenna - There is no involvement on the Council for...
Bent - At the same time would it be brought up for the Front Street.
Question - The matter of the Anthony's sewer be left with the Sewer Committee to investigate and report back to the Council.

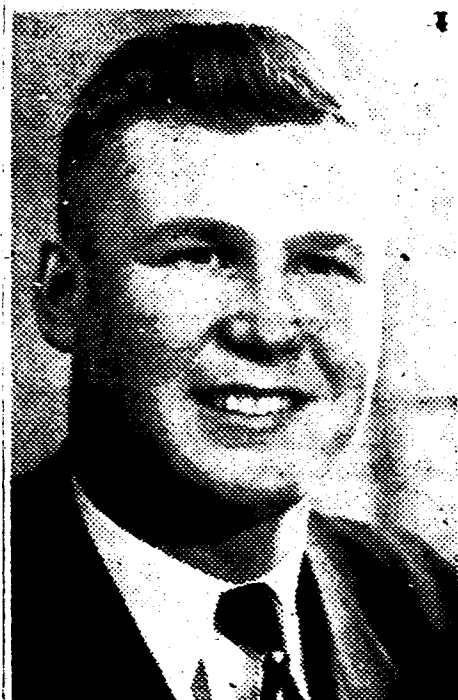

PROCLAMATION

By the Honourable
E. D. HALIBURTON
Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or
whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it neces-
sary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia
under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth
hereby set aside on, from, and after the fifth day of May, A.D. 1960, until
the fifteenth day of September, A.D. 1960, unless this Proclamation is
sooner revoked, every area of forest land as an area of forest land upon
which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fish-
ing or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local
Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification,
of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip with dates, and
having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or
other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest
land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his
or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Voluntary Rangers,
fire fighters and land surveyors:

Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this
Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not
less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars:

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves
accordingly.

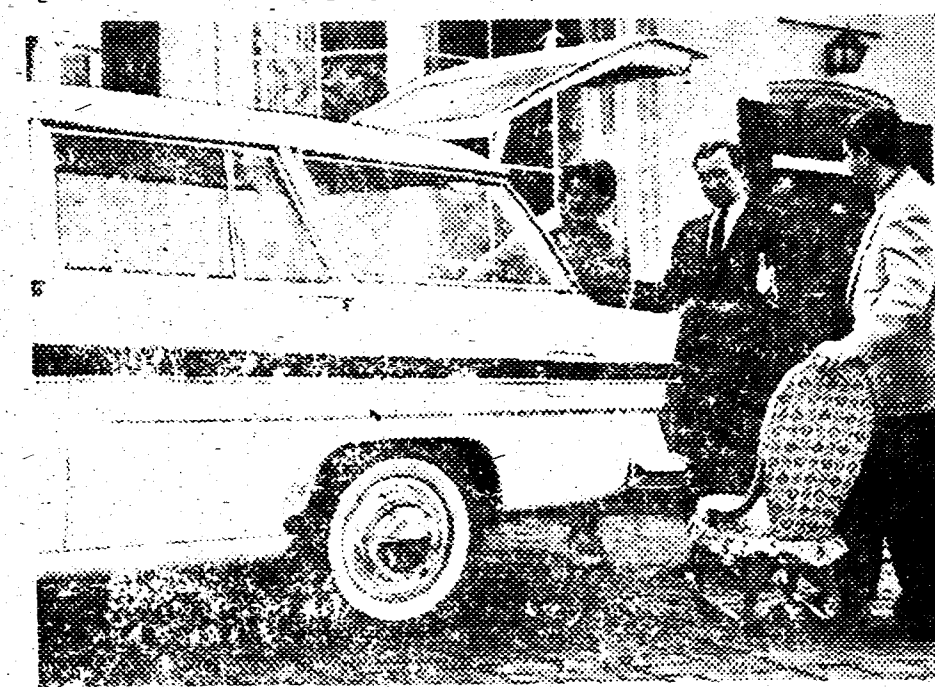

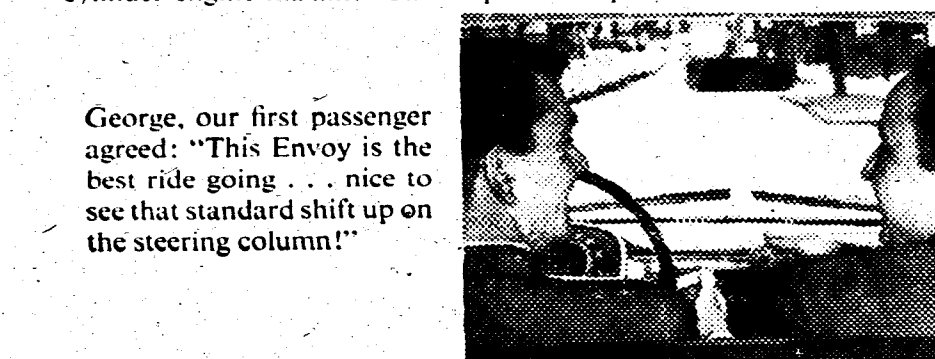

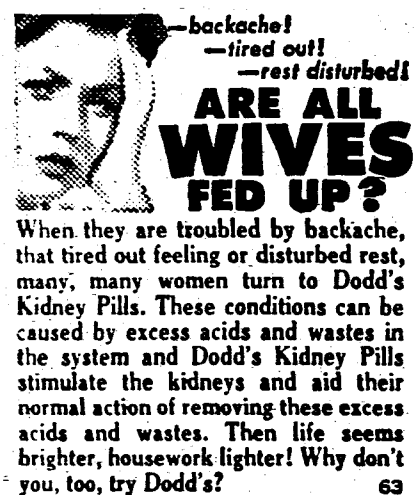

He referred to municipal taxation and said this had increased greatly over the past three and one half years despite claims made at election time that the election of a P.C. government would halt this rise.

Other commitments in the field of education, highways and industrial development had not been fulfilled either, he stated. In the matter of highways he referred to the soil-cement experiment carried out on the Ridge Road and said this had cost a total of \$136,454.38 for a distance of 5.8 miles. Despite the results of this experiment, he said, it is understood further road surfacing of the same type is to be done.

Other paving laid by the present government in this area, he said, had not been up to the standard of that laid while the Liberals were in office.

In concluding his remarks Mr. Cardoza said his only reason in allowing his name to go before the meeting as a nominee was that he might have the opportunity of serving the people of this area in the legislature again. He pledged himself to work wholeheartedly for the best interests of the area and its people and to promote and support projects designed to further these aims.

Guest speaker at the convention was Mr. D'Arcy Sullivan, of Halifax. He gave a detailed account of canvassing procedures and told how workers could help ensure maximum support for their candidate with careful attention to details.

Mr. Sullivan referred to the Jerome Barnum Associates and the cost of the services of this firm to the taxpayers. Lobster Firm Appeals Decision

Clayton D. Snow, of Digby, president of the lobster firm of C. D. Snow Company, has left Digby for Ottawa where he has entered an appeal in the Supreme Court of Canada against a decision of Chief Justice Mr. J. L. Ilesley of Nova Scotia over an action taken by the Snow firm against the Liberian ship "Maria Luisa" for damages to lobsters allegedly caused by oil pollution.

The original action arose out of the loss of some 30,000 lbs. of live lobsters, stored in pounds at Digby harbor by the Snow firm. The plaintiffs alleged loss of the lobsters was caused by pollution of the waters of the harbor by oil pumped or released from the ship "Maria Luisa" which had been in port at Digby just prior to the loss in June, 1957.

Mr. Snow's firm sued for some \$34,000 for loss of the lobsters and general damages. After hearing the case Chief Justice Ilesley found in favor of the defendants.

The appeal is scheduled to be heard in Ottawa, commencing May 18. Mr. Snow will be represented by L. F. Daley, Q.C., of Halifax. Appearing for the respondent will be H. P. McKen, Q.C., of Halifax.

Car Ferry Possible Here

Possible replacement of the Princess Helene plying the Bay of Fundy between Saint John and Digby with a ferry similar to the Princess of Vancouver capable of carrying 800 passengers were seen Friday by the CPR's operations vice-president George H. Baillie of Montreal.

Mr. Baillie, in Saint John on an inspection, said in an interview this has been under consideration for some time. The 29-year old Helene carries only 400 passengers. A new ferry would also be capable of ferrying railway cars.

The project was an "engineering possibility" and it would be "only a matter of money" to erect the massive dock terminals needed to cope with the Bay of Fundy's enormous tides.

Whether such a ferry would be authorized would depend on the results of a survey of its potential earning power to be completed in about two months. There was no urgency but the CPR was "quite serious about it."

Makes 2 dozen buns

Measure 1 c. lukewarm water into small bowl; crumble and add 2 cakes Best Yeast—or stir in 2 tps. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 2 small envelopes (or 2 tps.) Best Dry Yeast. Vote \$80,000 For Hospital

By unanimous vote the meeting of Digby ratepayers here last Thursday evening authorized the borrowing by the town of an amount not to exceed eighty thousand dollars as the town's share of the costs of providing a new ninety bed hospital for Digby.

Some eighty ratepayers were present at the meeting. The resolution concerning the borrowing was moved by Deputy Mayor Vernon L. Bent who outlined the financial arrangements that had been made in respect to the replacement of the hospital. He gave a breakdown of the sharing of the costs and also dealt at some length with the urgent need for the construction of a new hospital. Councillor John Woolaver seconded the resolution.

The chairman of the meeting was Mayor Victor Cardoza.

Store Destroyed, Boat Damaged By Fires

Digby was hard hit over the weekend by fire. About nine thirty Sunday evening a fire, which is believed to have started from a refrigerator motor in the basement, completely gutted the store building of Central Market in the north end of the business section of the town.

Fortunately the blaze was discovered early or the results might have been even more disastrous. The store is located in a congested area of the town where wooden buildings, many of them very old, stand side by side with only a few feet between them.

The fire was a stubborn one to fight and it was not until shortly before eight o'clock Monday morning that the Digby fire department felt the blaze was really all out. The building has been remodelled several times and hidden spaces between floors and ceilings provided pockets for the fire and these kept breaking out despite the fact tons of water were poured on the blaze.

One of the buildings menaced by the fire Sunday night was the Digby Courier building. The roof of this structure caught several times and only the alertness of the firemen kept the blaze from taking hold. Considerable damage was done inside the building by water.

Shortly before nine o'clock Monday morning as the weary firemen were rolling up their hose at the site of the Central Market fire a flash fire swept the fisheries patrol vessel Limanda as she was fueling up at the spur pier in preparation to leave port.

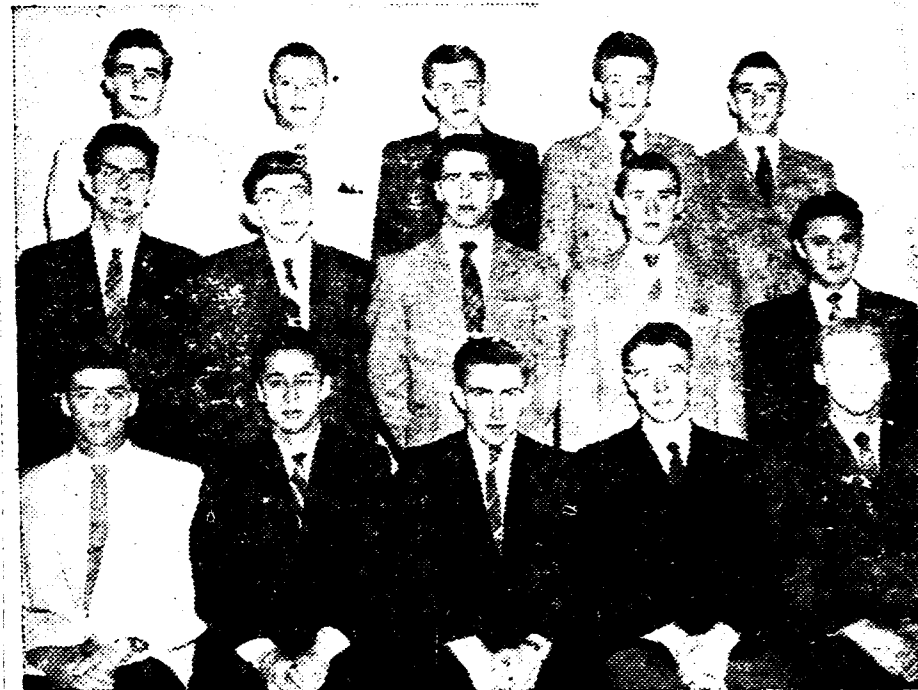
Within seconds the fire department were on the wharf and, through the cooperation of Captain Reg. Hazelton, of the dragger Olwen, who also assisted the firemen at the Central Market blaze by towing floats to the back of the building for use of the firemen who were hampered by the high tide, had an auxiliary pump aboard this craft pouring water into the Limanda. This blaze proved stubborn too and it was nearly an hour before it was fully under control.

Captain Owen McGrath, of the Limanda, said the fire seemed to start around the end of a hose through which fuel oil was being put aboard the ship. He said he was standing on the deck and saw a great flash of flame come from around the oil vent. He said he and his crew grabbed extinguishers and for a moment or two thought they had the blaze under control. Unfortunately, however, it was burning in the galley and fore-castle of the vessel and within minutes the whole forward end of the interior of the ship was a mass of flames.

Considerable damage was done to the interior of the Limanda by the fire and water and valuable radar and other electronic equipment was badly damaged.

No accurate reckoning of the loss in the two weekend fires has been made but an estimate of some \$25,000 loss in the store fire has been made. Only partial insurance was carried.

Princess Helene Gets Award

Keeping a weather eye on the cloud ceiling and winds over the vigorous Bay of Fundy has proved doubly profitable for deck officers of Canadian Pacific's Bay steamer Princess Helene. Director of the meteorological branch of the federal Department of Transport, J. D. McTaggart-Cowan, Toronto, announced recently that an "Excellence Award" for marine weather observing will be presented to the Princess Helene for services performed in 1959. Individual awards for outstanding contributions in assembling and forwarding weather data will go to the vessel's Chief Officer W. J. Goodwin, and Radio Officer C. F. MacMillan.

While observing weather conditions for their own purposes, Princess Helene's officers contributed a total of 608 reports to the meteorological branch in the course of routine sailings across the Bay of Fundy, and it was officially noted that the accuracy of observations was much higher than average.

Accurate weather maps and forecasts based on them are heavily dependent on regular voluntary reports from vessels like Princess Helene, Mr. McTaggart-Cowan said.

To Press For Better Service

The Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade will continue to press for improved ferry service across the Bay of Fundy between Saint John and Digby. A. L. Robinson, AVAFT president, stated last Thursday following an executive meeting of the board.

Mr. Robinson said a committee of three, consisting of himself, Gordon Goucher, of Middleton, and Emanuel Adelaar, of Weymouth, had been set up by the executive meeting to pursue this matter.

This committee, he said, will make a thorough study of the whole matter of ferry service across the Bay of Fundy, including the possibility of increased summer service by the CPS Princess Helene. They have also been empowered, he said, to discuss the matter with CPR president Crompton and with the district passenger agent, G. J. Fox, of Saint John.

Future developments in ferry service between Saint John and Digby, Mr. Robinson said, will have a great bearing on the economic life of the whole valley area of Nova Scotia. A \$44,400 contract has been awarded by the Department of Public Works to Campbell and Grant Company Limited of Antigonish, N. S., to carry out breakwater repairs at Sandy Cove (West), Digby Co. This was announced today by the Hon. George C. Nowlan, Minister of National Revenue, on behalf of the Hon. David J. Walker, Minister of Public Works.

The company submitted the lowest bid of seven in response to advertising for public tenders. The work is scheduled for completion in six months.

The repairs to the breakwater will consist of the reconstruction of the inner 152 feet of the structure in creosoted timber cribwork and reinforced concrete. When repairs are completed the structure will measure 222 feet long by 27 feet wide. The breakwater provides shelter and wharf facilities for the fishing fleet based at Sandy Cove.

Plans and specifications were prepared in the Halifax office of the District Engineer of the Department of Public Works. Supervision of the work will be under the District Engineer, Mr. J. A. Brown of Halifax, N. S.

But maybe he was talking about the people who really never had it so good — the beneficiaries of Industrial Estates (but not the sub-contractors who can't collect their bills); The Barnum experts from Boston — Nova Scotia has paid them \$500,000, our subsidy to the depressed New England States. Quite a lot of people around here never had it so good as it has been for three-and-one-half years. But they weren't taxpayers, they weren't fishermen, or farmers, or men working in the woods, or our army of unemployed. They had it better before 1957. The people who never had it so good are the "insiders": the people who got big contracts without tenders. They never had it so good as it has been under the Stanfield Government. But how about you?

Kelsey Raymond

(Montreal Gazette)

The little picture gallery at Arts Classica on Sherbrooke St. W., is host at present to a delightfully straightforward and stimulating one-man show of Nova Scotian landscape and seascapes by Kelsey Raymond of Smith's Cove, near Digby, in that rugged maritime province.

Immediately upon entering the exhibition, one's imagination catches a whiff of fresh, salt air. One senses at once

the invigorating atmosphere of the Atlantic ocean and the turbulent Bay of Fundy.

Thickly painted by use of a palette-knife, Kelsey Raymond's interpretations never become sentimental or "touristy" in appeal. Lobster-pots, nets and wharf-litter have consciously been set aside by the artist in favor of the fundamental qualities of movement, mass and form. Rarely, if ever, have I seen rocky landscapes and raging seas painted with more characteristic strength and artistic honesty.

Cool, unpretentious and almost casually powerful, Ray-

mond's authoritative statements make use of the darkly glowing sheen of slate and of the colors of Canadian Labradorite. Gray, steely-blue, browns and subdued greens predominate.

Raymond's work contains a certain elemental quality, strongly reminiscent of early pioneer settler stock. Life may be hard, his paintings seem to say, as hard and unyielding as these rocks and as cruelly devouring as this sea. But life must be faced with confidence. Compensation can be found in the quiet contemplation of nature and in appreciation of her awesome beauty.

"Church at Smith's Cove", a thickly painted and solemn interpretation of a small white-washed, wooden chapel by the sea, perfectly illustrates the fisher-folk's lonely life and devotion to duty, as well as a trusting capacity for worship.

An almost sculptural painting of a fishing-boat, titled "Dory", concentrates its dramatic appeal on a sudden shaft of sunlight penetrating the gloom of winter quarters.

From this painting one derives the sensation of Spring

and resurrection. What makes this work even more remarkable is the fact that only cold shades of grey-blue combined with white have been used. Yet the picture radiates feelings of release and optimism. It also is a work of art.

In other of Raymond's paintings of Nova Scotian coastal scenes, the distant boom of surf is suggested, rather than depicted. This effect is achieved by clever use of broad and rhythmic application of blue-grey pigment laced with white.

This particular lack of bright color gives to Kelsey Raymond's work its mark of definite individuality which also is apparent in his one portrait-work shown. Here again, we observe Raymond's strong feeling for sculpture. Uncomplicated and informal, this lively likeness of "M. L." displays no trace of contrived pose or of artificiality.

Kelsey Raymond studied at the Art Students League and National Academy of Design in New York. More recently, he attended Mount Allison University School of Fine Art, where he studied under Alec Colville and Lawren Harris, Jr. Although there undoubtedly is a certain vague connection apparent between the work of those two widely divergent artists and that of Raymond, his own work remains completely apart in personal interpretation. As a younger Canadian representational painter of his native province, Kelsey Raymond's art impresses as being both technically and artistically exceptional.

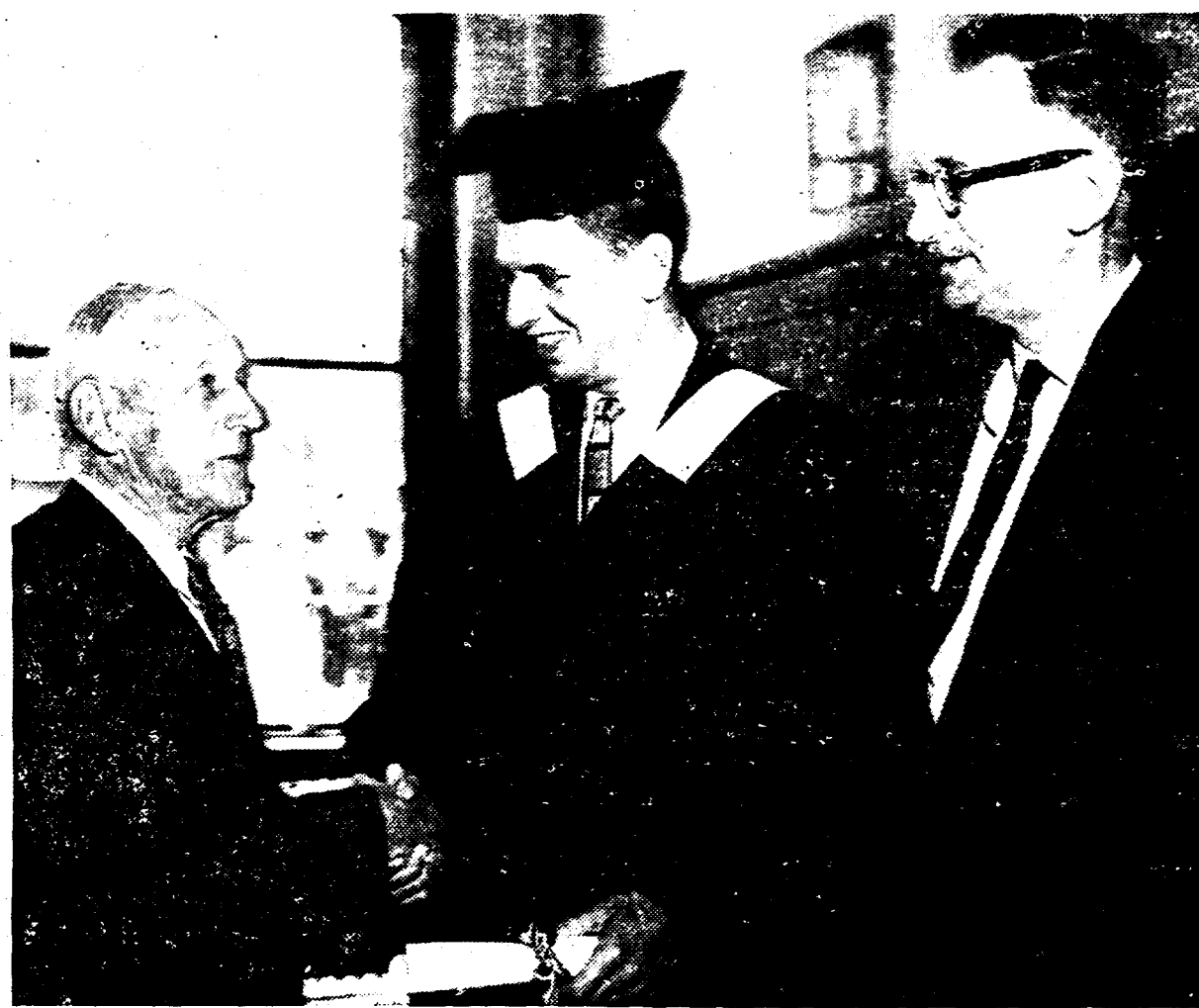

Three Generations



Marking the third generation of his family to attain the honor, David Leonard, 20 (centre above), of Digby, received his Bachelor of Arts degree at the 117th convocation of Acadia University.

Proudly attending the event were his father, Hon. Malcolm Leonard, B.A., LL.B., class of 1931, a member of the Stanfield cabinet, and his grandfather, Robie Stewart Leonard, who graduated with the class of 1900.

History of the Leonard family in Nova Scotia goes back to the siege of Louisbourg in 1758, when Johnathan Leonard served under General Wolfe. Later, Johnathan went to Connecticut, but in 1760 he returned to this province with the New England Planters, the 200th bicentenary anniversary of which is being celebrated this year.

Johnathan received a grant of 1,000 acres at Granville. Some

years later he sold the property and moved to Paradise, where he bought a farm which the Leonard family have continuously operated since.

Robie Leonard, grandfather of David, was born on the home-stead which is now being operated by the sixth generation of the family. He entered Acadia University in 1896 and graduated with the class of 1900 with his B.A. He then took post-graduate work at Harvard University where he received his Master of Arts degree. He has since operated the farm, until his recent retirement. While an outstanding farmer and fruit-grower Mr. Leonard was also director of publicity and statistics for the Nova Scotia government from 1926-34, and was also acting deputy minister of agriculture in 1930.

His son, Malcolm S. Leonard, was born in Paradise. He graduated from Acadia University in 1931 and was then principal of Canning school for several

years, and later on the staff of Kings County Academy, Kentville. He entered Dalhousie Law School in 1934 and received his LL.B. degree in 1937.

He married Lillian Aileen Watkins, of Digby, in 1933 and practiced law in that town until 1957. He was elected to the Legislature in Digby in 1956 and became minister of education and minister of welfare in the Stanfield government. Due to ill health he gave up the portfolio of education a year ago and was minister of welfare until a month ago, when he retired from that position and is present minister without portfolio.

David is a graduate of Digby High School and is well known in athletic circles. He majored in the classics and was president of Acadia Athletic Association. The farm is now operated by Malcolm's brother, Mark, and his son, Allan, both prominent in the fruit-growing industry.

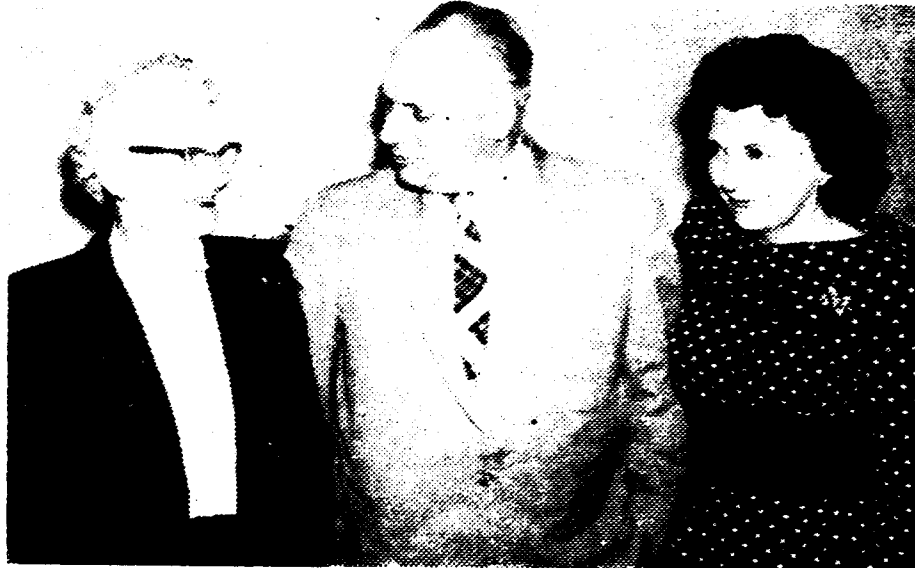

PC's Prevented Tax Hikes

Without the \$10,000,000 in increased and new assistance provided to municipalities by the Conservative government, municipal taxes would have risen by that amount, Highways Minister Smith told a meeting here Saturday night.

Speaking in support of Progressive Conservative candidate Keith Potter for Digby, and Kenneth Weaver for Clare the Highways Minister said the present government had given the municipalities \$3,800,000 in entirely new assistance, in addition to an additional \$6,000,000 (over the 1956 figures) for educational costs.

"Does this look to you like a government which, as Mr. Hicks and his colleagues say, is not interested in the problems of the municipalities, or does it look like the action of a government which is deeply aware of and deeply concerned with the problems of the municipal taxpayers?" he asked.

Digby candidate Potter said the Liberal attempt to create an issue out of municipal taxation was similar to the campaign carried out by "greedy and irresponsible Grits" in 1928 when they campaigned against the TB testing of cattle, and in 1933 when they attacked the Harrington government's conservation act.

"This was the greedy element, not the good Liberals", he said.

"I have been in every constituency in this province," he said, "and if anybody tells me the Stanfield administration is not going to be returned, I will show you a man who does not know what he is talking about — the people of Nova Scotia are going to give Stanfield more time to finish the job".

Mr. Potter said the CCF was putting candidates in many constituencies only to convince the voters of Cape Breton that the party was strong on the mainland.

"But the people of Cape Breton are well satisfied with what Prime Minister Diefenbaker and Premier Stanfield are trying to do for them", he said.

The Digby candidate announced to the meeting that laborers at the Sissiboo plant being built by the Power Commission had had their wages raised to 90 cents from 85 cents per hour effective May 2.

Mr. Weaver, the Clare candidate, said the pulp mill being constructed at Point Tupper was the first major industry brought to Nova Scotia in 23 years.

In other aspects of industrial development, he said, loans to fishermen had reached record levels under the present Conservative government, tourist loans were four times as large in number and Land Settlement loans were more than double in amount than under the Liberal administration.

The benefits of Industrial Estates could be seen in Weymouth, he said, where the major industry was rebuilt with the Crown corporation's help after a fire.

He referred to the Liberal promise of a tax rebate — "the method Hicks is taking to bribe the people," as "a mockery to the people."

Mr. Smith in his address said the record of the Stanfield government "has never been equalled and certainly never surpassed in the political history of this country."

"Proof of this," he said, "is the fact that you don't hear Mr. Hicks and his colleagues complaining about that record. They avoid this issue like the plague... because it wouldn't do them any good."

"What they do excel in is setting up imaginary straw men and then knocking them down," he said.

Referring to the Liberal slogan of "Bridge the Gap," between the standard of living in Nova Scotia and in Ontario for example—Mr. Smith said, "They were in power for 23 years and their friends were in power in Ottawa for almost the same period. If any difference in living standards exists it did not spring into existence overnight... They had 23 years to bring the standard of living up to where it should be."

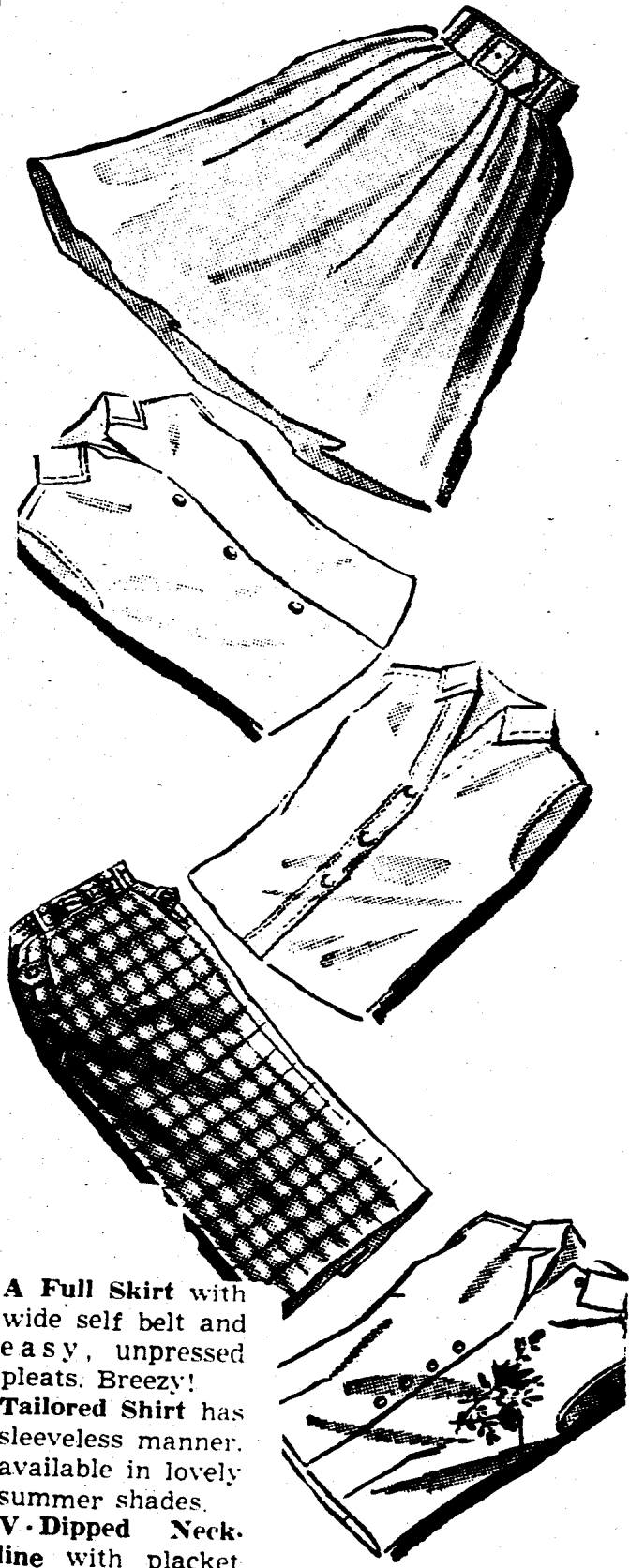

Church 99 Years

With the prospect of celebrations for the 100th anniversary of the Digby United Church in 1961, no special occasion was made of the 99th anniversary on Sunday last with the exception of a special sermon preached by the minister, Rev. James Brooks. His sermon dealt with three anniversaries, that of the Digby United Church, the 35th anniversary of the United Church of Canada and Pentecost.

The United Church, Mr. Brooks said, had increased from a membership of 600,000 to 1,000,000 in 35 years. The M. & M Fund had increased from \$3,751,000 in 1925 to an objective of \$10,000,000 in 1960. He chose as his subject "A Growing and a Living Church". He said that all God's best gifts were universal, men's highest achievements international and yet people try to limit the scope of the church and confine Christianity to their home church. To cease to be mission minded is to cease to be a living organism of the church. A church also must be protected by adhering to standards of faith and practice, he said. Christ never lowered standards and a church separated from Christ soon dies, the speaker said, quoting the passage of scripture "Apart from me you can do nothing".

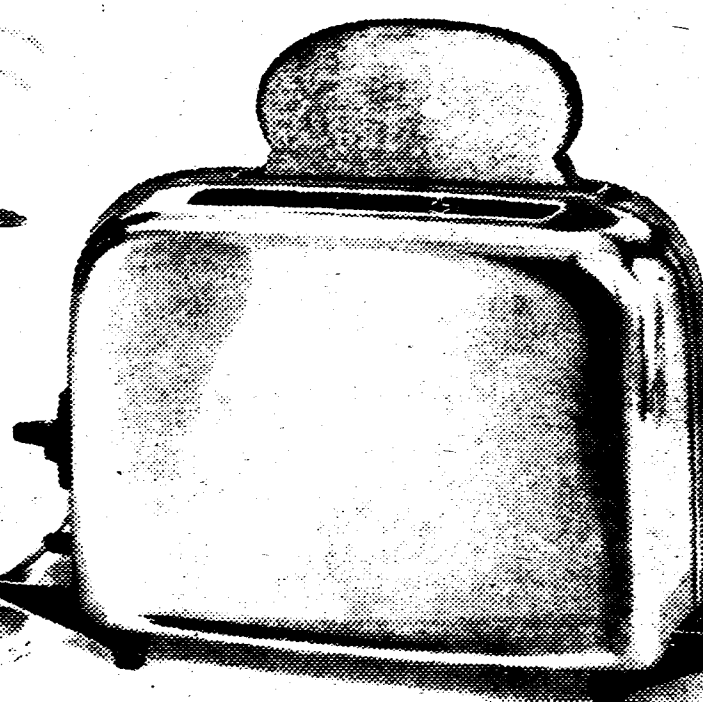

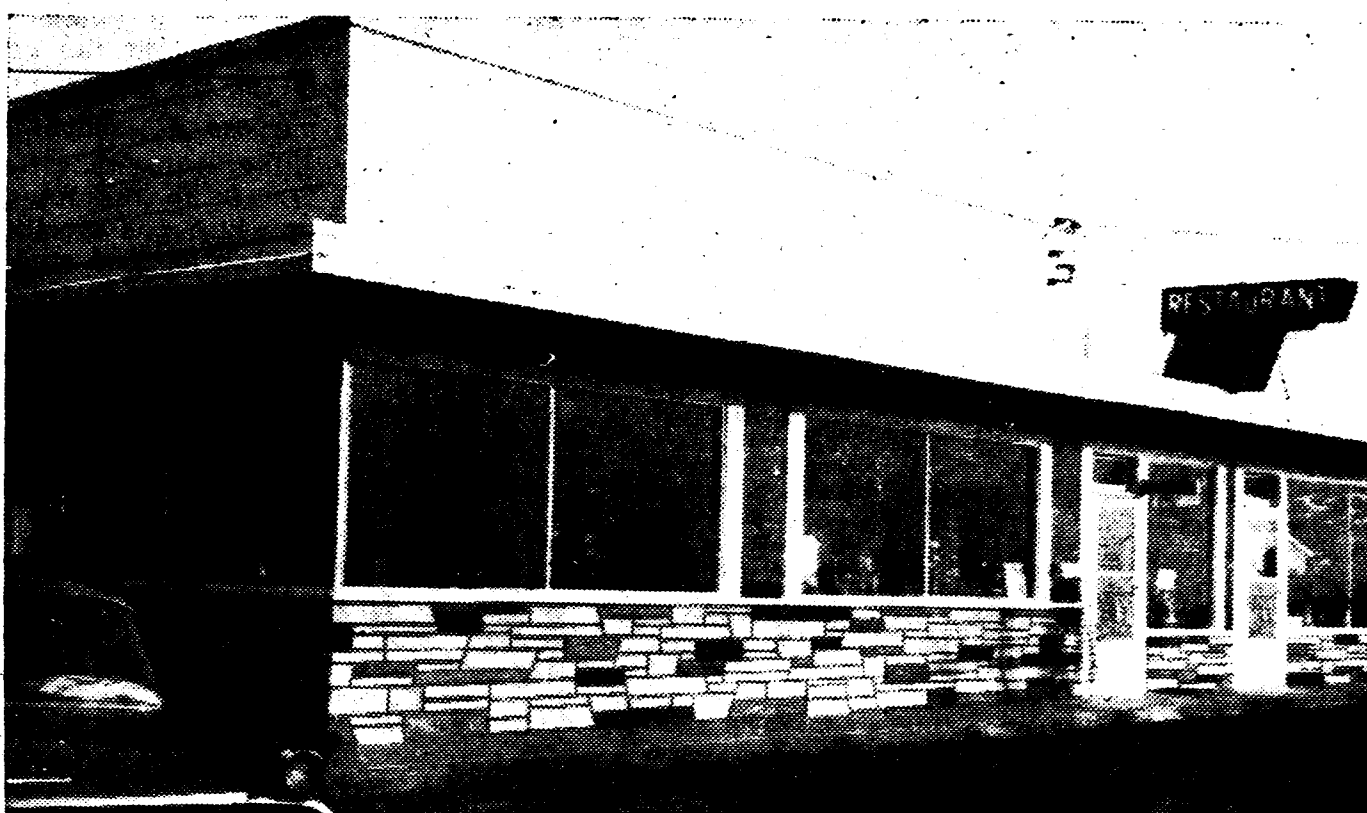

Another improvement to the

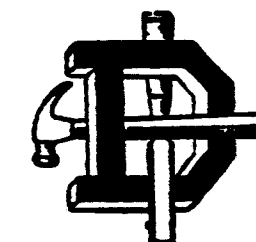

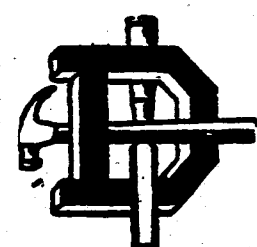

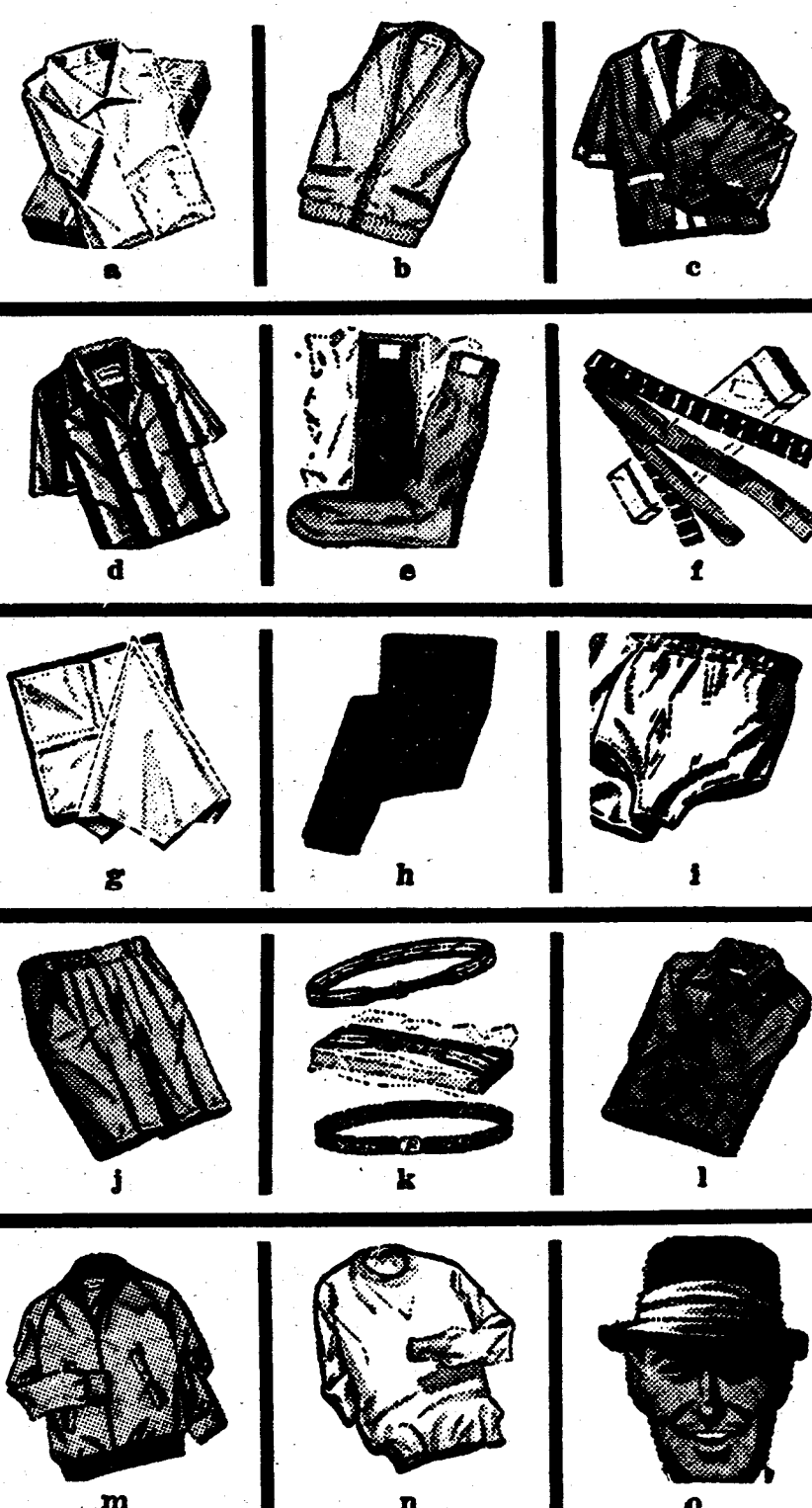

The Board of the Victorian Order of Nurses confirmed the appointment of Miss Valerie A. Squance as Nurse-in-Charge of the Digby Branch at the regular June meeting held on Tuesday, June 14th. Miss Squance, a graduate of the University of British Columbia, will take over her duties on August 1st when Miss Joyce Dickey, the present Nurse-in-Charge, retires.

During this time 17 pupils were seen for various reasons, 31 pupils were given rapid inspection and 1 pupil was given a vision test. Assistance was given for one day at the Crippled Children's Clinic sponsored by the Digby Kiwanis Club. A talk was given on the Care of the Patient in the Home at a Girl Guide Meeting. The hospital was visited weekly and one doctor in his office.

There will be no July meeting of the V.O.N. Board. The meeting in August will be held on August 9th.

Close Parallel

(Contributed Editorial)

While this is a strictly independent newspaper we think there is a parallel to be drawn from the recent provincial election in this constituency when compared to the 1956 election. In the recent event, while the Conservative tide was still evident throughout this province, we cannot help but feel that Mr. Cardoza was against the tide successfully. In 1956 Hon. M. S. Leonard was not assisted by any Conservative tide in this part of the province. Mr. Leonard then won the only Conservative seat between the Kings and Shelburne County lines. He then defeated Mr. Cardoza. We now congratulate Mr. Cardoza on his personal victory. His victory in 1960 was quite like Mr. Leonard's victory in 1956, a personal victory. True in both cases, the victorious candidates received gallant support from their many workers. But the hard work and the personal calls made by the candidates must not be forgotten, as it so often is. Another observation we would make. The town of Digby appears to be normally a Liberal town, or slightly Liberal in majority. In 1956 Mr. Leonard received 479 votes in Digby. Mr. Porter received 485 in 1960. 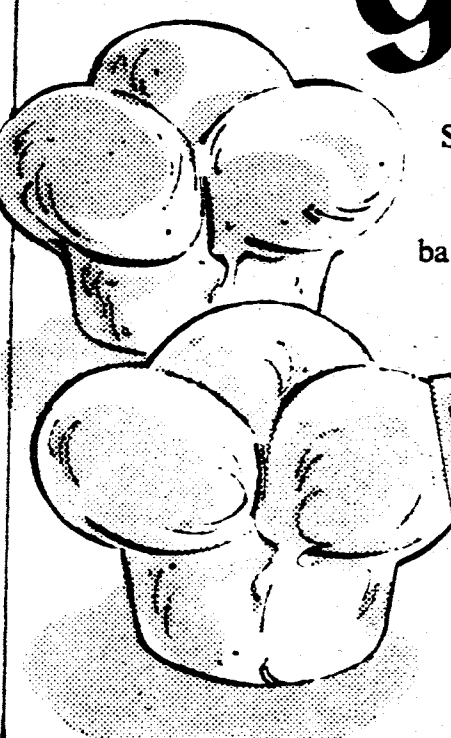
Scald 1/2 c. milk; stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 1/2 tps. salt, 1/2 c. shortening and 1 1/2 c. bran flakes. Cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl; crumble and add 2 cakes Best Yeast—or stir in 2 tps. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 2 small envelopes (or 2 tps.) Best Dry Yeast. VanTassel - Any more special meetings and this will be a permanent job.

Mayor put a motion that those present be permitted to address council.

Declared a vote.

Wm. Troop - Your Honor and Councilmen regarding the junk yard situation again. I notice by your motion, it was put through in the regular meeting, the Clerk was notified to serve Notice on this man. That was a month ago and it is a year and a half since the by-law was passed. How much longer do I have to wait, or is there going to be any action? The Clerk told me someone told him to take pictures of it. Personally, I can't see what purpose photographs have in serving a Notice. The last regular meeting authorized this Notice and it was going to be followed through. After all, I have wanted to build there for over a year now. We have a law in this Town that says it isn't supposed to be there. The junk is still going in there. One of the employees there told me that sometime there is a presser coming to take the old bodies away and there is always some endless line of excuses. I would like some action on it.

Clerk - The circumstances at the present minute are, I have an appointment with the Solicitor to prepare a proper Notice. Photos were taken yesterday. I was advised that in order to present the case properly, photographs should be taken. Yesterday I found someone to take the photographs.

Mayor - The situation at the moment is that you have an appointment with Solicitor to prepare a Notice which will be served.

Business arising from the minutes -

Mayor - The hose for water-

ing ships. What is the story on that?

Clerk - I was instructed to write to the Department of Transport in Saint John to ask for permission to lay the 2" pipe. I received a reply from them enclosing a draft with the wharf lay-out as it is and asking that job of the proposed line be indicated on the copy. I interviewed Mr. Robinson and Mr. Amiraull regarding the matter and immediately placed the information on the chart and wrote a letter to the Department of Transport and requested their immediate action.

Mayor - The Water Commission is considering a permanent pipe line laid there.

Re Police Department Costs.

VanTassel - As you noticed in the minutes we sent away to various towns to get the cost of their Police Departments. We have received five of them back. It seems the comparison through the book secured by Mr. Eaton was for a year ago. When this was taken, they were in most cases dealing with one man, and since then most of these have come up with two or three.

Mrs. Anthony's sewer got put in okay and also a sewer was put in for Amiraull, Brad Amiraull.

Mayor - It was a connection in the sewer there.

Fire Committee Report.

Bent - There was a total of five fires with \$43,200. damage. Also two or three lengths of one and one-half inch hose were ruined at that fire (grocery store). I move adoption of this report.

Mayor - Adoption of this report authorizes replacement of this hose.

VanTassel - There is not too much we can do about it. If they were damaged, they have to be replaced.

Question - The report of the Fire Committee be adopted. Declared a vote.

Relief Committee Report.

Anthony - A total of 6 families were on relief with a total of \$230. (?) I move adoption of this report.

Question - Report of the Relief Committee be received as read. Declared a vote.

License Committee Report.

Woolaver - The only thing the committee has to report is there was one more application received and it was approved, making a total of fourteen, the maximum number of taxis for the Town.

Question - The report of the License Committee be received as presented. Declared a vote.

Other Committees.

Mayor - There are no other Committees to report.

Relief Accounts - Read by Clerk.

VanTassel - I move they be paid.

Woolaver - I second it.

Question - Relief Accounts as read be paid. Declared a vote.

Health Report.

Clerk - There were three: May 17, June 2, no two, and they are all satisfactory.

Mayor - Fine.

Mayor - We have a request for a Tag Day for the V.O.N. for the date of August 26th.

VanTassel - Twenty-sixth, that is the last Friday in the month.

Anthony - I move we grant them permission to hold tag day on August 26th.

Mayor - This will be on file for study by Council if they so desire.

There is a letter re Workman's Compensation for volunteer firemen. This is a matter of information only.

Mayor - This is a matter of extreme importance to this Council and to the Town in general, the sale of lots to the Digby General Hospital.

Bent - I think Mrs. Anthony is probably the only one who hasn't seen this plan.

It is just a matter of wording a motion, is it?

Councillor Bent outlined the areas in specific terms that would be sold to the Digby General Hospital.

Bent - We will have to get Mr. Theriault probably to draft it out properly.

Considerable discussion took place in describing the area that would be sold.

Woolaver - You said sell it. What do you propose to sell it for?

Bent - I recommend this should be given for a sum of \$100.00. I will make it a motion.

Considerable discussion took place trying to determine if this sum of \$100. would cover legal fees or any other charges on the land.

VanTassel - If there is no doubt that it will cover it, we are ready for the question.

Question - The land described by Councillor Bent be sold to the Digby General Hospital for a sum of \$100.00. Declared a vote.

Budget Statement (prepared by Clerk).

Mayor - That is our standing for the present time. Some time ago, it was suggested that it should be wise to have a statement as it existed at any given time. In brief, Mr. Clerk, how do the various accounts stand?

It was noted that the total taxes received to date was "the highest we had received to that date for some time".

Mayor - Have you received any word from the Dominion Government with respect to the old Post Office?

Clerk - The assessor has had a letter regarding it: it has been their policy in all cases of that kind not to pay taxes. On the expenditures, I think everything is pretty well. I have watched it pretty carefully.

Mayor - I hope that the heads of the various Committees will take these and watch their expenditures in each of their various Committees. Are there any questions in respect to this?

Clerk - I would suggest that Council members look this over.

Mayor - Perhaps if they took this with them and if there are any questions you can ask the Clerk as he suggested. That completes the printed agenda. Are there any other items of new business which are to come before this evening's meeting?

"The Telephone", 1902

The Digby Courier received from Mrs. Cyril Wade, Shore Road, Digby, a copy of "The Telephone", April 16, 1902. This was a newspaper published in Bear River in the interest of Digby and Annapolis Counties. This was volume 6 number 5, which indicates "The Telephone" was first published in March 1896. Editor at the time of the above issue was J. L. DeVany. The price per copy was two cents and the price per year was \$1.00 with advance subscriptions at seventy-five cents per year.

Interesting items in "The Telephone" copy were Peace Coming Nearer in reference to the Boer War, Canada's Army will be increased to 100,000 Men, the Funeral Procession of Cecil Rhodes Five Miles Long and other items and articles of not too local a nature as compared with the weekly press of today.

ABOUT THIS AND THAT

Urges Salk Vaccine Treatments

Dr. A. Donahoe, Minister of Public Health, today
with the development of a second case of Polio-myelitis
over the weekend, there is indication of the
serious situation. Polio-myelitis has a tendency
to strike in the form of a pandemic. Nova Scotia had its
first case in 1953. With the general increase all over
the province in our neighboring Province of New
Brunswick, expect more cases, particularly in those not
vaccinated.

Recent cases, one child had not only one dose of
vaccine, the other child did not have any.
The health department is now trying to get all persons who
are in the age group of one to four years old to have
the vaccine. Those who have not had a
dose should get it as soon as possible. If the last dose was
given in 1953, a second dose is recommended.

There have been set up in various towns, the Depart-
ment of Health provides, very thing at these clinics except
the vaccine. This must be arranged for by the
individual.

Persons in the Province are prepared to look
for patients. So see your physician immediately
if you have a child in the age group.

It is important to remember that it takes at least several
months to develop after receiving Salk Vaccine —
the matter is urgent.

Small young children should receive Salk Vaccine
as a protection against Diphtheria, Whooping
Cough, and all in a single injection.

A special immunization clinic will be held Monday
at the Lions Club Hall from seven to nine p.m. This
clinic is open to all residents of the area and is

Sail From Conn. In Outboard

Two yachtmen from Greenwich, Conn., piloted their 18-foot outboard motor boat into Digby harbour Sunday afternoon after sailing from Greenwich Friday, June 17.

The two, John G. Shea and his son, John F. Shea, are members of the Greenwich Boat and Yacht Club. Their boat was designed and built by Mr. Shea, Sr., particularly for the trip which was originally destined to end in Mahone Bay, Nova Scotia.

Mr. Shea said Monday he designed and built the boat, the Grenova, to demonstrate the feasibility of using outboard motor craft for offshore trips.

The Grenova is powered by two 40 h.p. motors and is similar in design to a Mahone Bay craft with a higher freeboard. A windscreen is also incorporated with tarpaulin top and sides. Storage space is provided forward and two bunks are built in.

Mr. Shea, Sr., paid tribute on his arrival in Digby, to the abilities of his son who acted as navigator. Although they travelled for two days in heavy fog, he said, they never strayed off course.

Leaving Greenwich Friday, June 17, they first made land at New London, Conn., from there they went to Matunick, R.I. and then to Plymouth and Newburyport, Mass. They were two days forebound in Cutler, Maine, and when the fog lifted sufficiently to sail they left for Digby, travelling north of Grand Manan. They made the trip to Digby in approximately five hours.

After a two or three day stay in Digby the two Sheas will be met here by Mrs. Shea, Sr., and return their craft to Greenwich. This time, however, they will sail on dry land, making the return trip by trailer.

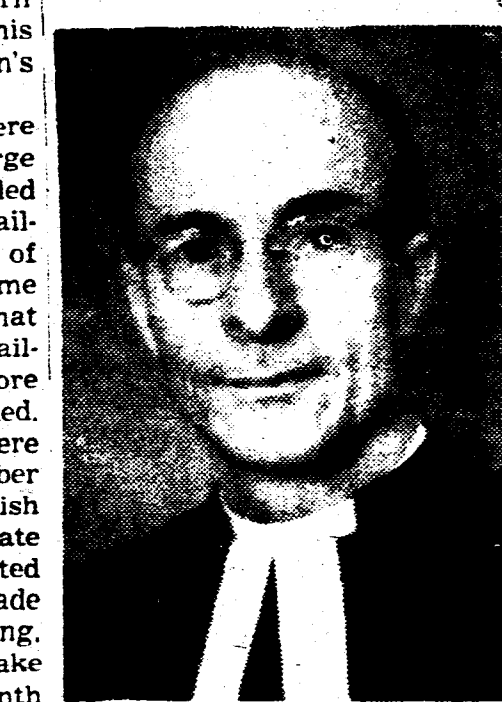
Honored At Party

Somewhere in Belgium August 21, 1916.

To The Editor of the Courier: Dear Friend Mr. Dunham: Just a few lines from two of the local boys, Percy Cousins and Lee Peck. I met Percy in the trenches. We did not know that each other was so near until I asked a fellow in the R.C.R.'s if they had a fellow by the name of Cousins and he said, "Yes, he is right here with us now," and just then the order was given to stand to, but I found him before I left as they had to march by us. Just had time to shake hands and wish one another the best of luck; but thank God we pulled out of that scrap all right and here we are tonight both together. Believe me, it feels like home today as I received a letter from mother and also a couple of COURIERS. I will now close and give Percy a chance at the pencil.

Yours truly, Gr. Lee A. Peck, 90202, 3rd Canadian Div. T.H.B., B.E.F., France.

Dear Mr. Dunham: I am glad of this chance to write a few lines to you. Peck has just finished a short letter. We are both in the best of spirits, although our nerves are shaken up a bit.

The Battery that Peck is in was mentioned for good work this time. Believe me, we are two pleased boys to be together tonight.

I suppose there are lots of tourists in town now. We are having lovely weather here.

Well, it is impossible to write very much from here, would like to see a certain sheet of salt water tonight.

Tourist Business Promising

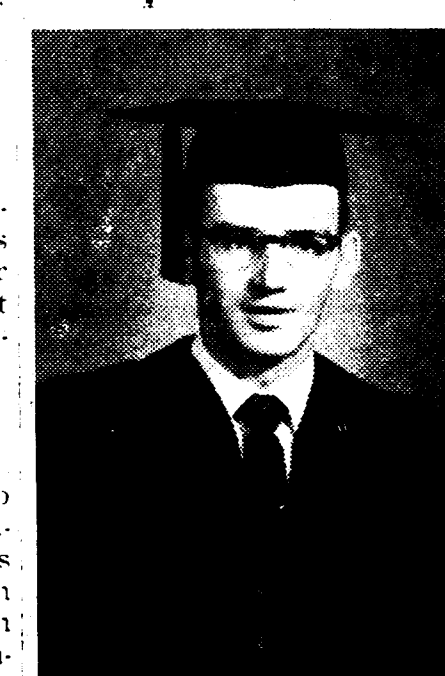
Reports of a booming tourist industry for the Maritimes in 1960, have been supported with a record number of American visitors making the six-hour ocean crossing from Bar Harbor, Me., to Yarmouth, N.S.

Canadian National's international ferry "Bluenose" carried more passengers Saturday, May 28, than on any other May sailing since she went into operation in June 1956.

The bumper crop of tourists the Bluenose carried, three weeks before her summer schedule began, included 277 passengers and 86 automobiles. Last year it was June 16 before the ferry carried as many passengers.

Records indicate that on May 28 last year, the ship carried only 101 passengers, and that it was June 14 before the figure reached this year's mark in 1958.

Contract For Wharf At Weymouth North

A \$49,945 contract has been awarded by the Department of Public Works to the Liverpool Lumber Company Limited of Liverpool, N.S., for the reconstruction of the wharf at Weymouth North, Digby Co., N.S. This was announced last Saturday by the Hon. George C. Nowlan, M.P. for Digby-Annapolis-Kings, on behalf of the Honourable David J. Walker, Minister of Public Works.

The firm submitted the lowest bid of thirteen in response to advertising for public tenders. The work is scheduled to be completed within six months.

The contract calls for the reconstruction of the ell of the public wharf. It will be rebuilt as a cross-tied timber pilework structure, 180 feet long and 40 feet wide. When completed the entire ell of the wharf will be in good condition. Weymouth North harbour is the shipping point for large quantities of lumber and pulpwood.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the office of the District Engineer, Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Department of Public Works at Halifax. Supervision will be under J. A. Brown, District Engineer at Halifax.

Seek Vandals

Digby firemen are seeking the vandals who have caused nearly three hundred dollars damage to their building on Maiden Lane.

The damage has been caused since the fire department resumed their weekly entertainments in the building some months ago. It takes the form of window breaking and, since the vandalism started, it has been necessary to replace some eighty panes of glass in the windows of the building.

Still to be repaired are all the storm windows which had to be removed to prevent total destruction of the glass in them. The department has also been forced to buy quantities of heavy wire screening to protect windows in which the glass has been replaced.

So heavy has been the vandalism that in one week ten panes of eighteen that were replaced, after having been smashed the week before, were again broken.

Officials of the fire department say they cannot continue meeting the heavy expense entailing in coping with the vandalism and have asked parents to caution their children about the seriousness of such an offence. One official stated that if the vandalism continues and the vandals are caught efforts will be made to have heavy penalties invoked.

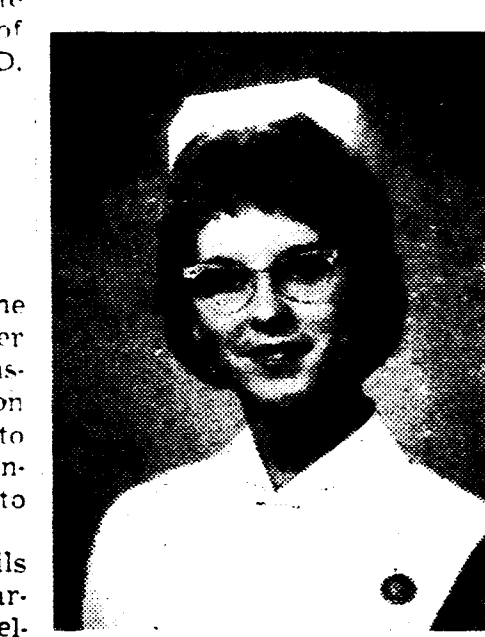

Limestone Price Reduced

As a means of making it easier for the farmers of Nova Scotia to purchase more ground limestone and, by so doing, improve crop production in the province, the price of ground limestone to farmers in the province is being reduced to \$2.00 per ton, in bulk car lots, effective July 1st.

An announcement to this effect was released today by the Honourable E. D. Haliburton, Minister of Agriculture and Marketing, who advises that the government had taken action to reduce the price from \$2.50 to \$2.00 because it believed that the use of ground limestone should be encouraged, if profitable crop production is to be secured and maintained on the majority of farms in the province.

"It is common knowledge," said Mr. Haliburton in making the announcement, "that 95 per cent of the soils of Nova Scotia are acid and require applications of lime to bring them into a state of fertility that will encourage and ensure profitable crop production. It is unthinkable that any farmer in Nova Scotia interested in crop production should attempt to grow crops without using ground limestone. The use of such a soil conditioning agent is elementary. The government of the province of Nova Scotia recognizes this and it is on this account that it hopes that the distribution and use of ground limestone will be encouraged through the reduction in price to \$2.00 per ton, in bulk car lots, delivered at the farmer's nearest railway siding, or at the quarry."
