

> According to a letter to the gospel society, a copy of which is included in the orginial minute book of the parish, started, on September 29, 1785, and ; which is still in existance, the new parish of Trinity "though many of us are in very narrow circumstances" had subscribed a salary of £25 for the new rector. The letter further stated that £176 had been raised ("to be paid in money and labour") is toward the building of a church. The letter, written on September 29, 1786, said that although the sum was a small one, the parishioners won'd start to build their church. T hope was expressed contribu-

tions might be fertheeming from brothren in England. In connection with this wardens sent a letter to Admira Digby, who had returned to England, asking him to donate "for this infant settlement something toward enabling us to build a small but decent church". In making the request the wardens and vestry pointed out that they considered themselves as "under the patronage of a gentleman in your exalted station and fortune" and stated that they "doubted not from your Honor's known benevolent disposition" that he would accede to their request. The building of the new rectory was not accomplished without a great deal of discussion at several vestry and parish meetings. By May, 1891, the matter had still not been decided and the Rector was still living in a rented house. At the parish meeting on May 7th, 1891, the Rector's salary was agreed upon at "\$850 out of parish resources and the rent of house now occupied by him to be paid by him."

The proposed retirement of the Rev. Dr. Ambrose as Rector of the parish is recorded in the minutes of May 18, 1892. In September of the same year the Rev. H. A. Harley was appointed Rector. A motion commending Dr. Ambrose for his years of faithful service to the parish was passed by the annual meeting in 1892. This resolution pointed out that in more than 21 years of service Dr. Ambrose had succeeded in building a new parish church, securing the recovery of school lands to the ownership of the parish and improving revenues

of glebe lands. The parish also agreed to pay Dr. Ambrose a retirement allowance of one hundred dol-

BY THE HONOURABLE E. D. HALIBURTON

Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth hereby set aside

on, from, and after the fifth day of August A. D., 1960, until the fifteenth day of September, A. D., 1960, unless this Proclamation is sooner revoked, every area of forest land as an area of forest land upon which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fishing, or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification, of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip with dates, and having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Voluntary Rangers, fire fighters and land

Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars:

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves


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

Plan Winter Works Program

We note in the release from the Information Branch, Federal Department of Labour that, quote "the government has decided a Conly to renew once again the Municipal Winter Works Incentive Program, but also to substantially expand it this forning winter. The program applies to projects carried out during the period December 1, 1960, to April 30, 1961. In addition, to classes of projects already included in the incentive payment of 50% of labour costs, the program will be enlarged during the coming winter to include the construction, major reconstruction, major alteration or renovation of municipal buildings, excluding schools and hospitals, up to a Federal incentive payment not to exceed \$50,000 on each new structure. The program will also be broadened by the inclusion of certain projects not hitherto applicable, including street lighting, traffic signals, municipal parking lots, water and sewage treatment plants, pumping stations and water towers. During the past winter 860 municipalities participated in the program as compared with 700 during the previous winter. It has been estimated that more than 51,000 men received on site employment on some 2,600 projects involving approximately 2 million man-days of work. It is assumed that at least an equal number of man-days was provided indirectly in manufacturing and servicing material that went into these projects. The estimated federal government share of the costs - 50% of the direct payroll costs for the work undertaken in these projects amounted to \$12,565,000. The government will give every encouragement to the use of home improvement loans under the National Housing Act during the coming winter. Labour Day Safety

Death takes no holidays. As a matter of fact, unless the desire to live is carefully protected, death will be busier than ever in the province of Nova Scotia during Labour Day Weekend.

The above warning was issued to all road travellers motorists and pedestrians alike - by L. M. Delbridge, manager of the Nava Scotia Highway Safety Council, as thousands of people are preparing to enjoy the last major summer holiday weekend.

Mr. Delbridge's advice for staying alive when you drive was this:

Always keep your car and tires in good condition.

Be doubly alert in crowded traffic areas. 3. Stop for coffee breaks at least every two hours.

4. Watch speed limits, and observe all traffic laws and

The Council's manager also urged pedestrians to keep an eye on traffic at all times, to cross only at intersections and only on green light signals.

"When walking along highways, be sure to walk opposite to the traffic and always carry a flashlight at night", Mr. Del**b**ridge added.

To School Safety

In another week the children will be on their way to school, some for the first time, others beginning another year. Along with the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council this newspaper urges all drivers to slow down in school and residential areas, and be sure you could stop in time to save a little life and protect your own conscience.

Twixt home and school the children go, Watch out for them and let them grow."

Parents, too, have a great responsibility to see that their children don't get into situations that could result in tragedy. Parents have, perhaps, the greatest responsibility - and the greatest loss when they don't live up to those responsibilities. Do you, as a parent, know precisely where your child is at this very moment? Is he fully aware of the dangers of playing near traffic. It he is of school age, do you know the route he takes to school? Is it the safest route?

Remember, the shortest way isn't always the safest way. Children should know enough to recognize and obey traffic lights, signs, and lines. They should know what jaywalking is and how dangerous it can be. And, they should know how to cross every street with careful feet. It will be a strange new world for the child -- both fascinating and frightening -- and as a tenderfoot pedestrian he will need all of the guidance and help you can give him. Don't let your child down.

If your children ride the school bus, do they follow the important school bus safety rules? Check to see that your child doesn't indulge in horseplay in the bus. Remind him of the importance of keeping his head, arms and hands inside the bus. If you know your child wants to be safe, you'll have much more peace of mind while he's away from you.

Most of the children are back in school . . . but not all of them! There are still pre-school-age children seriously and happily playing their games. And foresight, the ability to predict dangers, is not one of the traits they are best known for at this age.

Near traffic, one of the greatest faults a child has is that he acts like a child. Without rhyme or reason he will often do the most unpredictable things. For instance, when a ball rolls into the street, he may not consider the time, the place or the dangers. He just wants to retrieve his ball. The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council urges each and every driver to watch for and protect these precious young lives - with cautious

Hints For Exhibitors

This is the time of the year when exhibitors are considering exhibits for the annual Fall Fairs, and how these exhibits can be presented in such a light that they will receive the judges' approval and the ribbons that accompany the top placings in

No group of exhibitors takes more interest in the fall fair circuit than do the exhibitors of flowers and vegetables and the cott. exhibitions, as a result, are all the more enjoyable from the standpoint of the visiting audience.

Here, from the Farm News, are a few hints for flower and vegetable exhibitors which have been suggested by officers CWF members. of the Horticulture and Biology Services Branch of the Nova Scott Azricultural College:

Have entries in exhibition rooms early. The best time to cut flowers is in the early morning

while the dow is still on them.

Cut flower stems as long as possible.

With most varieties it is an advantage to leave some of the reliage on. Be sure it is free from any markings of disease. insects i insecticides.



Meantime, measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into large bowl; crumble in and dissolve 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 small envelope (or 1 tbsp.) Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm mixture, 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour and 14 c. melted shortening; beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 3 c. (about) sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on floured board until elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubledabout 11/4 hrs. Punch down dough; grease top and let rise again until almost doubledabout 30 mins. Punch down dough again; divide in 3 equal portions. Form each portion into a 12" roll. Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces; form into smooth balls. Roll each ball into an oval 2½ "x3½"; fold in half crosswise. Place touching each other, on greased cookie sheets. Grease



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


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

1. Scald 3/4 c. milk. Stir in $\frac{1}{3}$ c. lightly-packed brown sugar. $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsps. salt. $\frac{1}{8}$ tsp. baking soda, ¼ c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cool



Roll up, jelly-roll fashion, and cut each roll into 9 slices. Place in 2 greased 8" square pans, a cut side up. Grease tops. Cover: Let rise until doubled-about 34 hr. Bake in mod. oven, 350. 25 to 30 mins. Yield: 11/2 dozen buns.

Vaccination should be repeated every seven years, or during an epidemic, and for international travel every three years. Every child should be vaccinated before he is 6 months of age.

Poliomyelitis is perhaps more feared than any other in-Little River fectious disease of children because of the permanent crippling and disability that may result. The usual public health measures for control of infectious disease, such as strict isolation of the patient and quarantining of contacts, proved of little help in home of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald checking the spread of the disease . . . Poliomyelitis vaccine in Canada has been established as on Thursday evening. entirely safe and studies confirm that it is effective in greatly reducing paralytic polio incidence. Three doses, with one month's interval between the first and second, and not less than seven months between the second and third doses, are recommended. Immunization should be started at the age of three months.

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


