Digby 172 Years Ago

From the files of the Chamber of January 22, 1967, the following account has been copied concerning Dufur in 1965:

Among a number of the newspapers kindly sent to us by friends is a copy of the latest *John Gavette* of May, 1907, says the *Triumph* and among other advertisements contained in the issue referred to is one concerning the loan and forwarding of Dugby, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this area we are told the "sweeping" of Dugby "retains from the Gulf of Annapolis" amounted to the extremely of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 150,000 acres. The town plot is then described.

The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Bay, and twenty miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles distant from the head of H. Mary's Bay. This land, and not from the water's edge, partly is level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Bay, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent, it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. It was secured by Loyalists from New York in 1782, the point of which went nearly to Britain, or, moving to other countries, left the shore

free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students, one of which was J.J.'s daughter, Florence (now Mrs. Morton of Tibet, Prescott, Digby Co.). There was a taste of trying to sell *Mac* outside the plant. Work was a little slack one early fall day and so "Mac" said to me, "How about trying your hand at taking orders for personalized Christmas cards?" I tried to make several calls. I spent most of the time at one particular sweet shop and got an order, but

The judges for the contest were Dr. and Mrs. A. G. Shennstone, of Princeton, N. J., and Mr. Elliott D. Odell, of New York City.

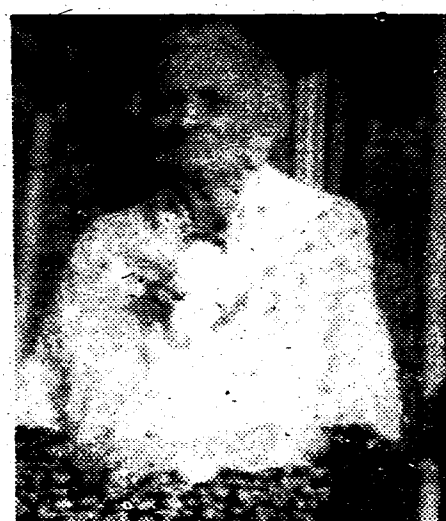

Has Narrow Escape

The first time the boy could not get the rope but the second effort succeeded and the lad was pulled aboard.

Prospects For Canada Greatest

Canada has the greatest prospects for the future of any nation on earth, stated G. R. Love, president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, speaking at a recent dinner meeting of the AVABT at the Pines Hotel in Digby.

Canada's great future could be most fully realized, he said, through the avenues of private and free enterprise and warned that increased interference by governments in the operation of business and the encroachment of governments at all levels into fields which could best be served by private enterprise could hamper that future.

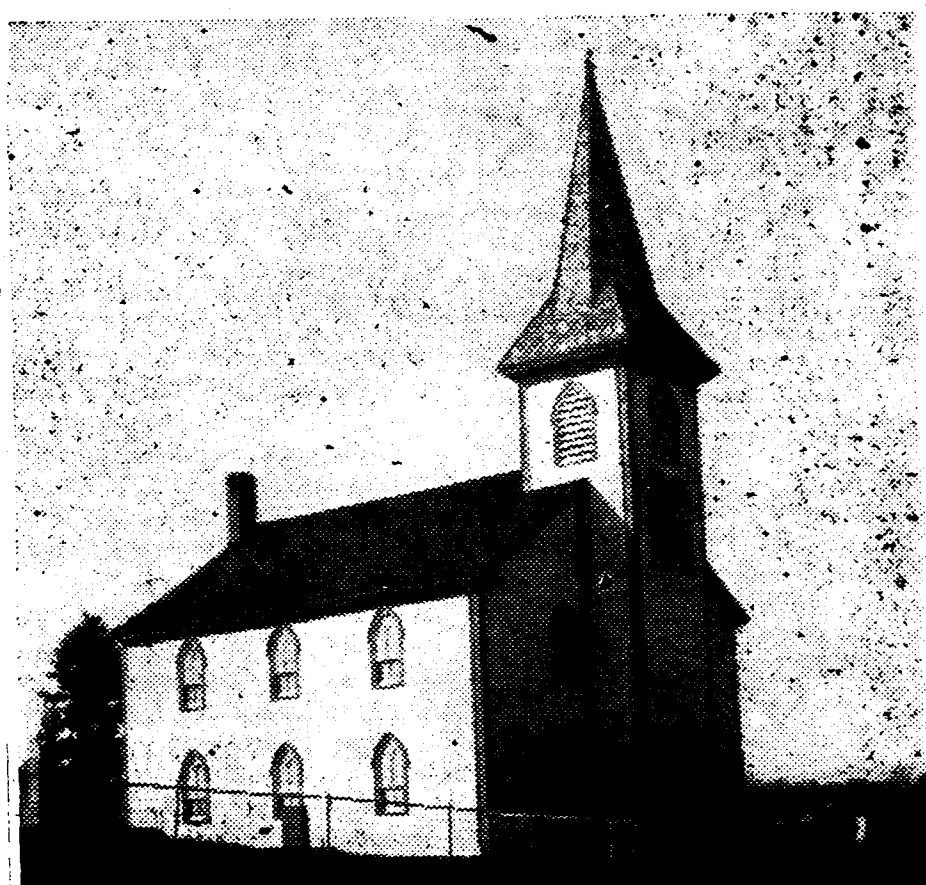
Mr. Love said tremendous increases had occurred in government spending since the end of World War II and the number of civil servants had increased enormously. The rate of tax increase has far outstripped the rate of increase in private and corporate income, he said, and stated this was a matter which could have a serious effect on the nation's future.

Governments, Mr. Love said, are not to blame entirely for these things. So long as the public continues to demand more and more in the way of service and benefits from governments then taxes and the employment of more and more people by governments must also increase.

He stated the whole system of taxation should be overhauled and said the present corporate tax structure was stifling business. What is needed, he said, are more incentives to business and to individuals to expand and develop so the economy of the nation might be improved.

Mr. Love was introduced by Harry Mathers, of Halifax, vice president of the Maritime Boards of Trade, and the thanks of the gathering, which was representative of trade boards from Windsor to Weymouth were expressed by Gordon Goucher, Middleton, vice president AVABT.

Holds Roll Call Services



The Annual Roll Call and fellowship services of the Hill Grove United Baptist Church was held on Thursday, June 30th, commencing at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and continuing with the evening meeting at 8 o'clock.

To Mark 175th Anniversary

Plans are being made here for the 175th anniversary of the establishment of Trinity Anglican parish in Digby which occurs this autumn.

It is understood that Sunday, October 16th, has been chosen as the date for the marking of the anniversary of the establishment of the parish. Special anniversary services will be held on that date. Included in these will be the administration of the rite of confirmation on a number of candidates by Rt. Rev. W. W. Davis, Bishop of the diocese of Nova Scotia.

Trinity parish in Digby was actually created on Michaelmas Day, September 29, 1785, when Loyalist residents of Digby who settled the community two years earlier, decided they wanted to establish a parish and build for themselves a parish church.

Church services had been held in homes in the community by Rev. Edward Brudenell, chaplain aboard Admiral Digby's flagship, which conveyed the Loyalist settlers to Digby in 1783, and the Rector of Annapolis Royal, Rev. Jacob Bailey, first conducted a service in Digby on September 11, 1785.

Two weeks after Mr. Bailey officiated here the inhabitants of Digby "professing themselves of the Church of England" met at the home of John Roome for the purpose of electing wardens and choosing a vestry. Mr. James Willmot and Col. Isaac Hattfield were chosen as wardens with John Roome, John B. Moore, Ebenezer Street, Thomas Bayeaux, Jonathan Fowler, John Burket, Thomas Davenport, Richard Hill, Captain Patrick Haggerty, Dr. Christian Tobias and Dr. Joseph Marvin as vestrymen.

On October 3rd the wardens and vestry met again and drafted a petition to Governor Parr asking him to prescribe limits for the parish and allot land for the church and glebe. They asked that the parish be given the name of Trinity Parish which had been the home parish of many of the Loyalists who settled in Digby.

The boundaries of the new parish were assigned by Governor Parr on March 31st, 1786, and included the original grant of the township of Digby and a wide area surrounding.

The Rev. Roger Viets, of Simsbury, Conn., a clergyman who had suffered greatly because of his Loyalist sympathies while ministering in Connecticut, was appointed by the society for the propagation of the Christian Gospel as rector of the new parish. He was inducted into office by the Rev. Mr. Scovill, of Saint John, who was visiting Digby, on August 28, 1786.

According to a letter to the gospel society, a copy of which is included in the original minute book of the parish, started on September 29, 1785, and which is still in existence, the new parish of Trinity "though many of us are in very narrow circumstances" had subscribed a salary of £25 for the new rector. The letter further stated that £176 had been raised "to be paid in money and labour" toward the building of a church.

The letter, written on September 29, 1786, said that although the sum was a small one, the parishioners would start to build their church. The hope was expressed that contributions might be forthcoming from brethren in England.

In connection with this the wardens sent a letter to Admiral Digby, who had returned to England, asking him to donate "for this infant settlement something toward enabling us to build a small but decent church". In making the request the wardens and vestry pointed out that they considered themselves as "under the patronage of a gentleman in your exalted station and fortune" and stated that they "doubted not from your Honor's known benevolent disposition" that he would accede to their request.

At the same time they also wrote to Rev. Dr. Charles Inglis in Halifax asking him to seek donations for the building of a church in "an infant settlement of poor unhappy Loyalist refugees, for with such only is this town settled".

While the vestry was engaged in seeking assistance from notables in Halifax and in England toward the building of their new church they learned that one of the Loyalist settlers of Digby, a man by the name of Francis Conihane who with his wife had promised £20 toward the building of the church, had advertised that he was

Triple Drowning

A St. Alphonse, Digby Co. man and two of his daughters were drowned at Cape St. Mary on Friday last when the Irish moss laden punt capsized as it attempted to get through the heavy swell to the shore.

Losing their lives in the accident were thirty-eight year old Joseph Vital Jeddry and his two daughters, fifteen years old Priscille and ten years old Addie.

The bodies of Mr. Jeddry and Priscille were recovered Saturday morning. A search for the trio was started Friday when they were reported missing. The overturned punt was discovered but it was not until Saturday morning that two of the bodies were recovered. Search continues for ten years old Addie with navy and civilian skin divers assisting.

Funeral service was held from the St. Alphonse church for Mr. Jeddry and Priscille Monday morning with Rev. Father Edward Theriault officiating.

Zelma Rebekah Lodge getting special mention. For commercial floats the Digby Esquire Store took first.

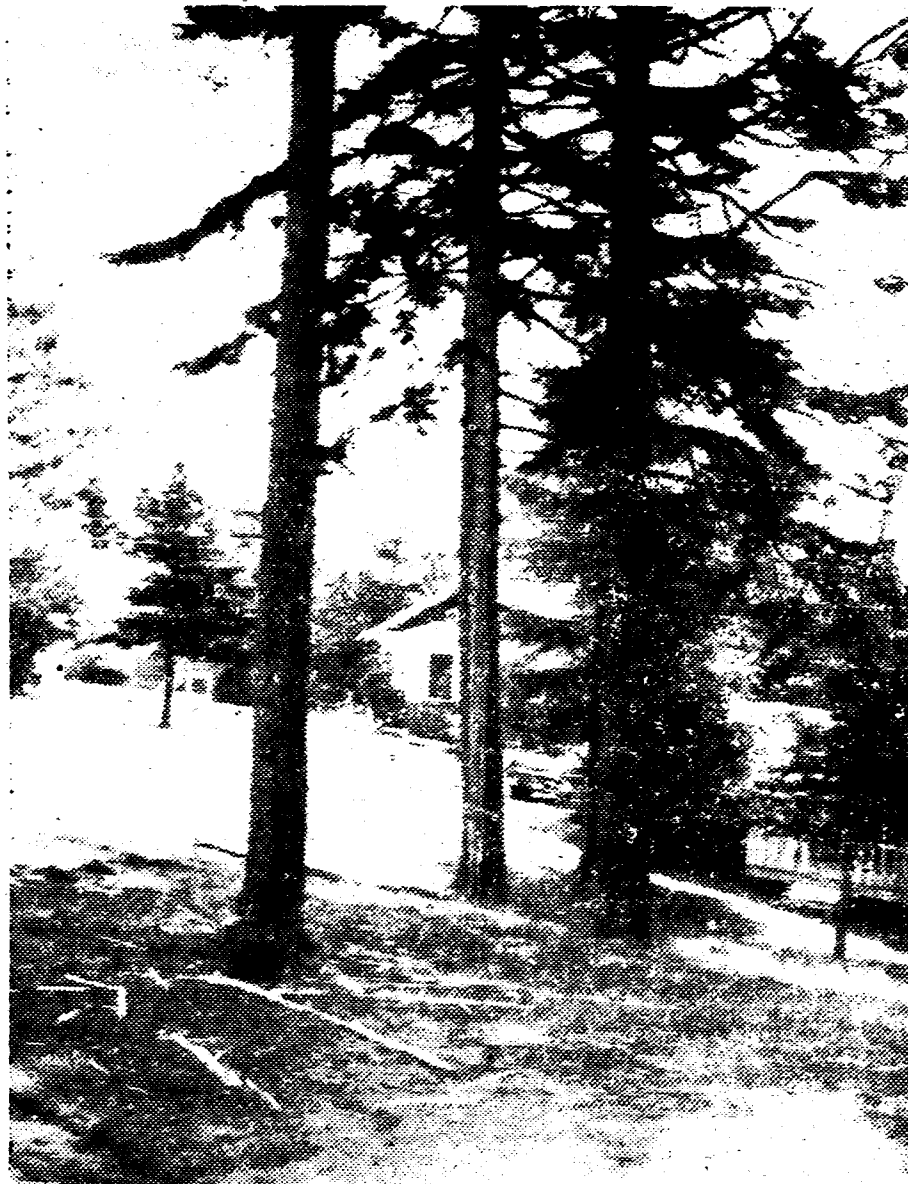

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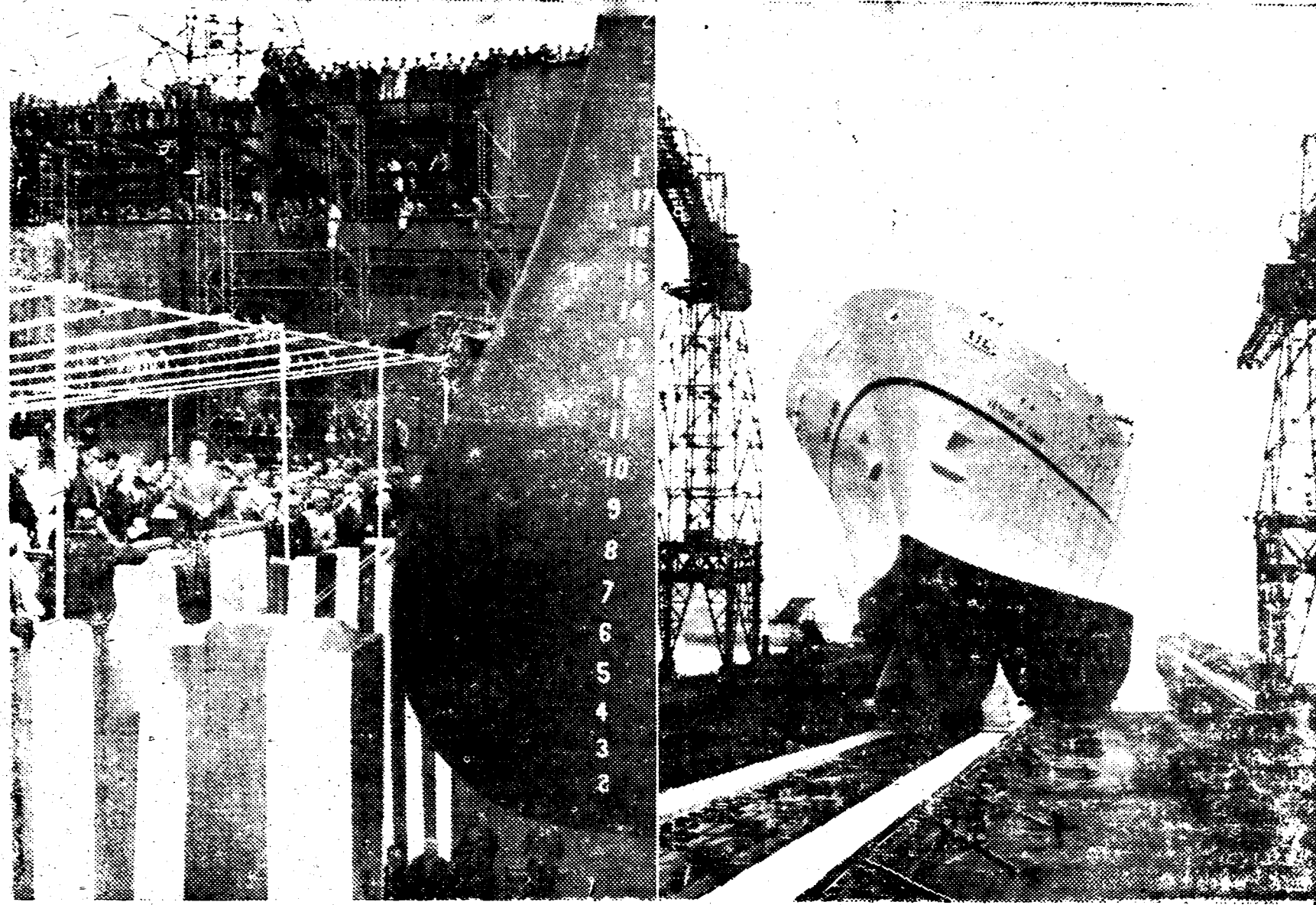

St. Alphonse area and one-room school at Cape St. Mary's were closed due to the fact that suitable teachers were unable to be obtained for these schools. The St. Alphonse school buildings were old and had outlived their usefulness. Pupils from both school sections had originally been transferred to the enlarged Meteghan school.

The congestion at the Meteghan school has made it impossible to take care of all of the St. Alphonse and Cape St. Mary's pupils and in 1959-60 school term a portion of the pupils were transported to the Saulnierville school. Further difficulty has resulted from an unforeseen increased attendance at the Clare District High School at Meteghan River necessitating the transferring of two of the grade seven classes to Saulnierville and Church Point in the last school term.

New difficulties will be encountered in the next school term when the unprecedented number of school pupils who have given their intention of entering grade twelve at the Clare District High School, which is estimated will number 35. This is considered a great improvement over other years when it is noted that prior to 1956 when the new high school was opened, there were but 5 grade twelves in the Municipality of Clare. All grades from seven to twelve have increased.

It is felt that the time will soon arrive when the Clare District High School will not be able to handle any grade seven, but will comprise grades eight to twelve inclusive.

Enrolment in the commercial department of the Clare District High School has been very promising since the opening of the high school and many pupils have been able to follow classes which would not have been made available to them otherwise. It is noted that the

students have shown that they are interested in completing their grade twelve or similar grades in the Municipality of Clare.

The Municipal School Board has asked the Clare Municipal Council to construct a new consolidated school at Salmon River as the present school is not adequate to meet the needs of Salmon River and surrounding districts. A school at Salmon River would look after the needs of Hectanooga, Mayflower and Mavillette area.

Central heating systems and indoor toilet facilities will be installed in the Church Point, Comeauville and Concession schools this summer, the Council has advised. The Bellevue Cove school is expected to be made into a large consolidated school at a later date and will serve St. Bernard's, New Edinburgh, Weaver Settlement and Bellevue's Cove area, which would require a six or eight room school.

The Clare school system is beginning to be able to hold its own with any system in the province. Not too many years ago it was the lowest. Great

strides in improving education in these parts have been shown when the consolidation of the smaller school districts was embarked upon with the Saulnierville consolidation being the forerunner of consolidation in the Municipality. Funeral services will be held from St. James Anglican Church Thursday afternoon at 2:30 with the rector, Archdeacon L. W. Mosher, officiating. Interment will be in Oak Grove cemetery.

going to leave the province to go back to New York to reside.

The vestry decided they would not let this man get away without first honoring his pledge, and ordered the church warden to wait on him and "demand it of him". The answer they received was that he intended to pay "when the church is building". This did not satisfy them as he had said nothing of this when he signed his pledge. The vestry therefore issued an order "to forbid all masters of vessels or boats of any kind to carry off the said Francis Conihane (as they will be dealt with according to law) until he has paid the said £20 or given satisfaction for the same to us, the rector, church warden and vestry of said parish".

Difficulties continued to plague the vestry in securing the money needed to build their church but in October, 1787, they learned that "the government had been pleased to give the province of Nova Scotia the sum of £2000 sterling to be distributed among the different settlements of the province toward building and repairing churches". They immediately dispatched letters to Dr. Inglis, John Robert Uniack, Philip Marchinton, Thomas Milledge and others asking their efforts to secure as large a share of this as possible for the new church in Digby.

As a result of these efforts £300 was obtained and plans for the new church were approved at a meeting of the vestry on January 11, 1788. These plans called for a building 36 x 47 with altar, pulpit, pews, gallery and an east gable. This plan was later discarded in favour of one approved by Bishop Inglis calling for a building 52 x 36. It was intended the church should be built of wood on a stone foundation.

The cornerstone of the new church was laid on July 30th, 1788, by Bishop Charles Inglis, DD, Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, and was the first church cornerstone laid by the Bishop in the diocese of Nova Scotia.

In the parish minute book it is recorded that Bishop Inglis stay in Digby on July 30, 1788, was "so short that he had only time to thank the vestry verbally for their affectionate address and went and laid the cornerstone of Trinity Church and immediately after went on board a sloop for Saint John".

On his return to Digby Bishop Inglis replied formally to the address from the warden and vestry of the parish. In his reply he pointed out that "as loyal refugees" the settlers in Digby had "sacrificed everything but a good conscience".

31 Baptized At Joggin

Special music was furnished by the local choirs and individuals from New Tusket, South Range, Christian Church, Weymouth, Ingleswood and Middleton Mission.

On Sunday, June 26th, a baptismal service was held near the Joggin Bridge at which time 31 persons were baptized. The same afternoon a service was held in the Acaciaville church when 18 were received into the fellowship of the church. That evening a service was held in the Weymouth Falls church and 13 were received into the fellowship there. Communion services were held at each church. Rev. M. L. Anderson, pastor of these churches, was unable to attend because of illness.

Rev. L. R. Atkinson was in charge of all services, assisted by the deacons.

He reminded them also that, as many of the people here had been his parishioners formerly, "it affords me great pleasure to have that tender connection in some measure renewed and that you are again under my pastoral charge".

Bishop Inglis also referred to the progress made in the community and said "It is with the greatest satisfaction I see you placed in a delightful situation, where the bounties of providence both by land and water have been so plentifully bestowed; and that you have so assiduously improved those advantages by industry, as the face of the country shows, instead of a gloomy forest which covered it only five years since. I now view a beautiful town and well cultivated fields".

It was some considerable time after the cornerstone was laid that construction of the church was actually completed. In the meantime services continued to be held in a private home.

A great many difficulties had to be overcome by the church warden and vestry in their efforts to get a church built. First of all they received word from Admiral Digby that he would be pleased to subscribe £100 and collect another £50 from his friends in England toward the building of the church provided, however, that it was

to be built of "such materials either brick or stone that it might be lasting and permanent".

The vestry, considering the value of the proposed gift, decided to comply with the Admiral's conditions despite the fact they had previously decided to build a wooden edifice. Later, however, because of the costs involved and the difficulty of obtaining materials, reverted to their original decision to build a wooden structure.

They communicated this information to the Admiral, explaining the reasons, and were advised by him that, while he was disappointed they had not built the church of "durable materials", he would remit £100 toward its construction. In a letter of thanks the vestry asks that the Admiral forward his coat of arms that they might erect it on a pew which they had reserved for him in the church. They state they already had the King's Arms placed on the Governor's pew.

It was not until January 16th, 1791, that the first service was held in the church and then, according to the minute book, only because the church was in arrears for rent of the house used for worship, and not because the new building was ready for use.

By the summer of 1792 pews had not yet been installed in

the church and a dispute arose among the vestry as to the style of these with some favoring square ones while others wanted rectangular. On the matter being put to a vote the majority favored the long, narrow pews. The question was not settled, however, for on September 15, 1792, the date set for auctioning off the pews, the rector, vestry and warden met again and adopted the plan calling for square pews.

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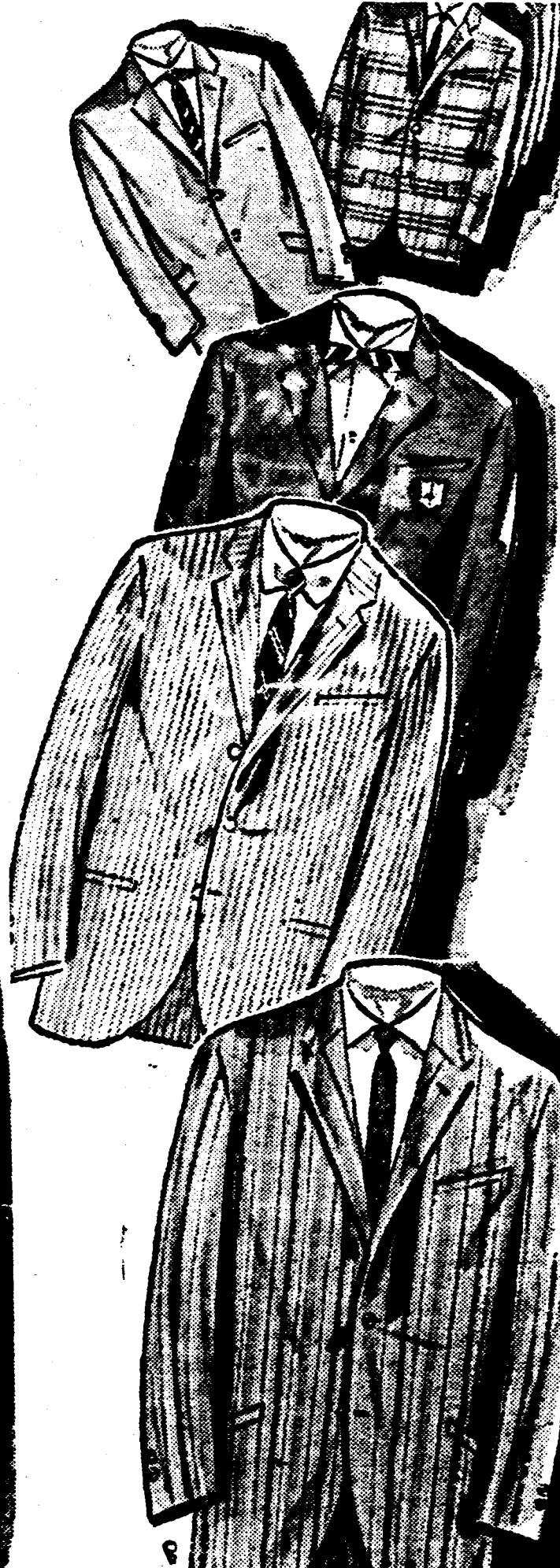
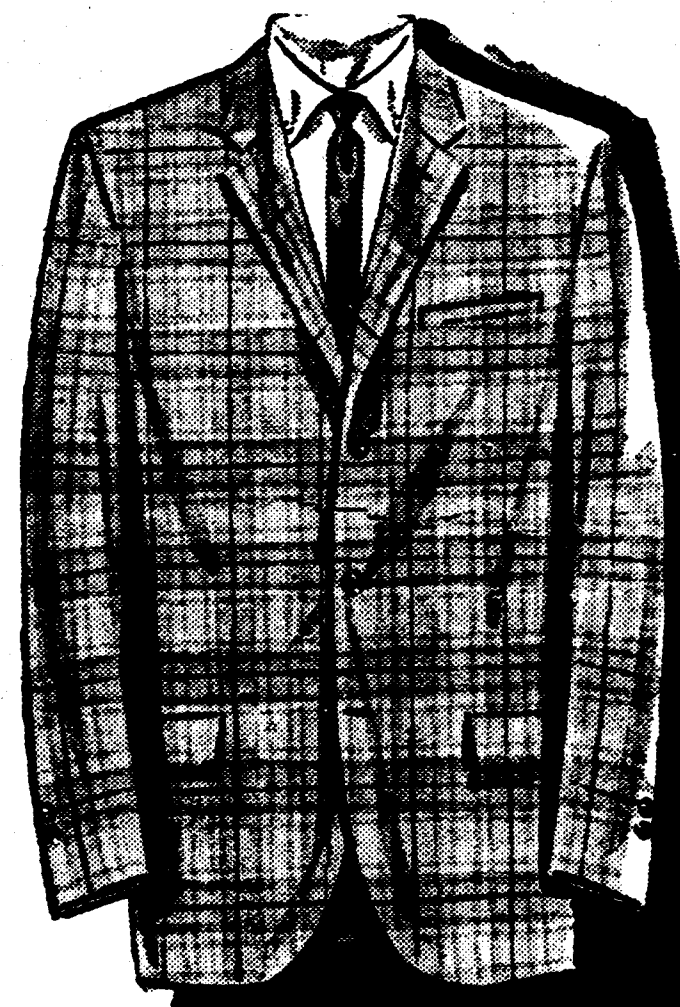

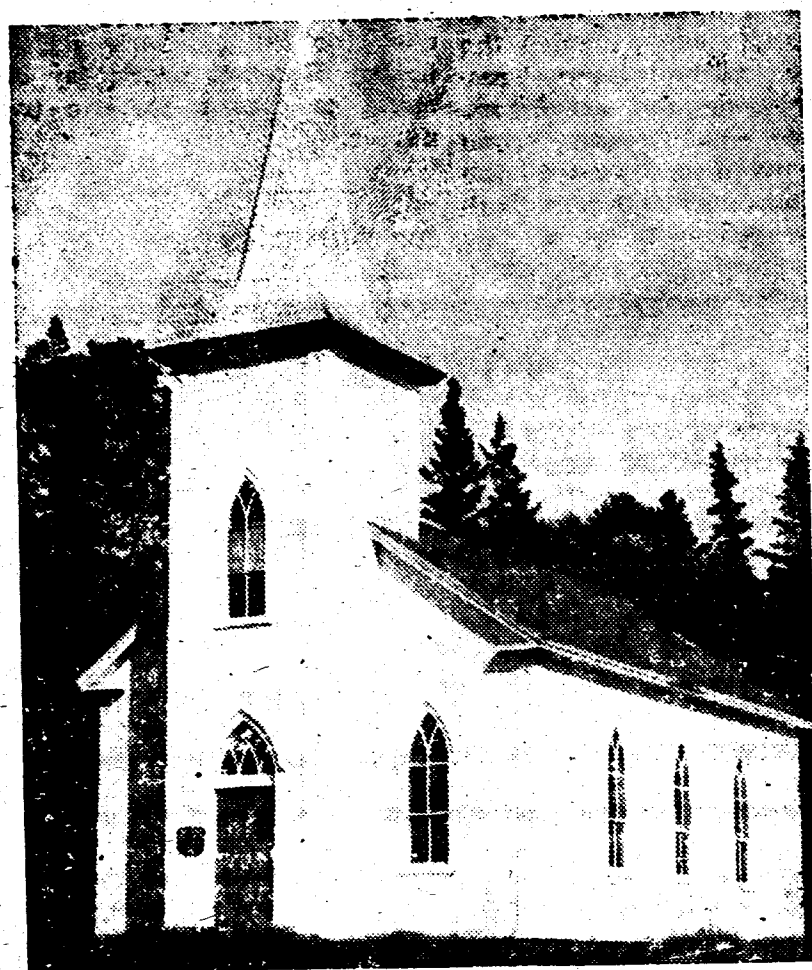

Church Marks 150th Anniversary

In May, 1810, Rev. Israel Potter, of Upper Clements, Annapolis Co., Nova Scotia, wrote the following to a friend: "The ordinance of baptism has been administered for five Sabbaths successfully. Forty five have been admitted to this sacred rite, and a church has been constituted upon the Gospel plan, consisting of sixty five members, to which we expect further additions."

Little did he think or even dream that 150 years later, on Sunday evening, July 3, 1960, his great, great, great grandson, Licentiate Elliott Castillo, of Boston, Mass., would occupy the same pulpit, preach the sermon, read the Scripture from the same Bible, hold the seated and standing congregation, upstairs and down, spellbound with his magnificent voice singing Stuart K. Hines' popular hymn "How Great Thou Art".

What a thrill it must have been for this promising, talented young man and his mother to have such a wonderful experience. (They had flown to Nova Scotia for this special service.)

Surely Elliott Castillo's message and voice must have reached his great, great, great grandfather sleeping peacefully in the churchyard outside, as well as touching the souls and hearts of his many relatives and friends who had travelled from several parts of the United States to attend this 150th anniversary of the Upper Clements Baptist Church.

The quaint box pews with little wooden buttons on the doors were filled to capacity, the balcony was filled, while others stood in the back and doorway, commemorating the founding of this Church founded by Rev. Israel Potter, which today and down through the years means so much to the descendants of Rev. Potter.

The interior of the Church had been scrubbed and painted until it fairly shone with pride in its age. Several beautiful baskets and bouquets of cut flowers were placed on the platform, little old organ and pulpit having been placed in memory of departed ones by relatives and friends.

The yard had been trimmed and cleaned, the lawn mowed, the whole presenting a quaint friendly picture, brought through hours of labour of interested workers.

Rev. Sidney Whitehouse, of Deep Brook, resident pastor, conducted the service.

A letter of congratulations and blessings from a former pastor, Rev. Reginald S. Dunn, was read by Mrs. Sable McNitch, of Clementsport.

Mrs. Edna Gates, a great, great granddaughter of the late Rev. Israel Potter, read the Highlights of the History of the Church.

Capt. Fred McCain and Mr. Sable McNitch, of Clementsport, passed the original long handled wooden collection boxes for the offering.

Rev. Carol Armstrong, of Annapolis Royal Baptist Church, personally extended a word of blessing and congratulations from his pastorate.

Miss Mabel Ingham, of Somerville, Mass., was the organist, the organ claiming to be at least 75 years old.

Lie. Elliott Castillo read the Scripture, Revelations 21, from the same large Bible used by his great, great, great grandfather in 1810. Mr. Castillo rendered the solo "How Great Thou Art" in his usual magnificent manner. He voiced his pleasure and good fortune in being a descendant of the late Rev. Israel Potter, who had a family

of 15 children, and also left a stirring and thoughtful message.

Following the service the congregation were invited to accept the gracious and generous hospitality of Mrs. Alice Cosman (also a Potter descendant) whose spacious home "Maple Vista" at Upper Clements was then the scene of a friendly gathering and reunion of relatives and friends. Delicious refreshments were served. Mrs. John Saunders, of Connecticut, and Mrs. W. Haviland, of Upper Clements, both of whom are great, great granddaughters of Rev. Israel Potter, assisted Mrs. Cosman as hostesses.

Israel Potter Sr. was born in Worcester County, Mass., November 28, 1763. In 1780 he served in the 2nd Batt. Mass. Reg. during the Revolution. After the war he came to Nova Scotia, settled on his father's estate and lived on the old homestead in Clements at a place called Potters Point where he carried on farming and the herring fishery. He spent approximately 37 years of active service for God, which included about 25 years as an ordained minister of the Gospel, passed away on the 17th day of August, 1847. In his 84th year to rest above. He was succeeded by his son, Rev. Israel Potter Jr., who, after his father passed away, was placed in full charge of the work his father had begun. He settled in Clementsvale, where a branch of the church was established.

According to data the Upper Clements Baptist Church founded by Rev. Israel Potter, was the "corner stone" of the now Bear River, Clementsport, Smith's Cove and Deep Brook United Baptist Churches.

To quote, "In 1822-1823, the second Clements church was organized at East Bear River. In the beginning of 1832 the work in the first and second Clements churches proved to be too much for the then aged (Please turn to page 4)

Integration Of Women's Work

A report on the proposed integration of work of women in the United Church of Canada as presented at the Maritime Conference Branch of the U.M.S. was given at the Grace United W.M.S. on Tuesday by Mrs. J. M. Wallis.

Dr. Dorothy Long, Toronto, led the discussions at the Conference. Mrs. Wallis said, by presenting a graph of the whole missionary enterprise of the church and indicating the channels through which the work of the W.M.S. and that undertaken by several of the church boards run parallel. Work of the W.M.S. and church boards can be combined, she said, in overseas missions, home missions, finance, missionary education and periodicals. Dr. Long, who is past president of the Dominion Board of the W.M.S. and a member of the commission on women's work, also presented a preliminary draft for unification of all forms of service in which the women of the United Church of Canada are committed.

Mrs. Wallis, in reporting on other items of business and addresses at the conference held at Sackville, N. B., in June, said that in every part of the program emphasis was on the whole church engaged in total mission. The theme of the conference was "Into All The World Together".

Worship was conducted on Tuesday by Mrs. Philip Kaye, assisted by Mrs. Elton Arnold and Mrs. Oakley Turnbull.

Council Meets

After seven unsuccessful attempts due to lack of a quorum the Digby Town Council held its regular July meeting, originally slated for July 4th, Tuesday evening.

At Tuesday evening's meeting only a bare quorum of four members was present. Councilor H. J. Anthony, involved in a car accident some weeks ago, is still recuperating, and Deputy Mayor Vernon L. Bent was called to Halifax due to the death of his sister, Mrs. Hazel Frizzle.

Decision was deferred at the meeting on two applications for tax licences. Licence committee chairman J. A. Woolaver stated his committee would have to consider the whole matter of tax licences before making any recommendations. He stated council had already by resolution set the number of taxis to be licensed this year at fourteen and this number would have to be increased before any further licences could be issued.

A resolution was passed authorizing the temporary borrowing by overdraft of a sum not to exceed eighty thousand dollars to cover the town's share of the cost of the proposed construction of a ninety bed addition to the Digby General Hospital.

Building permits were issued to Mrs. Alice Mason for the addition of a sunporch to her home on Church Street and to Rev. J. T. Davies for the building of a porch on the Bethel Tabernacle building on Queen Street.

The streets committee was authorized to have a hazardous condition on the Shore Road near the former Bryant estate corrected.

Department of Health reports showed weekly tests of the town's water supply, taken at various check points in the town, indicated it to be satisfactory. Water commission superintendent F. W. Robinson stated that, while water level at the lake was low, there was no need yet for cutting down on usage.

Gives Plaque

A bronze plaque has arrived in Westport from Boston, to be erected at Southern Point to honor Capt. Joshua Slocum who was the first man to sail around the world alone. Slocum spent his boyhood in the village of Westport and Westport was also his first international port of call. This plaque commemorates his solo voyage of 1895-1898. Slocum and his sloop "The Spray" were lost at sea in 1909. "The Spray" was 36 feet long and rebuilt at a cost of \$553.

The marker will be placed on a monument base to be built by the Nova Scotia government and dedicated next year. It is a duplicate of one dedicated last year at Fairhaven, Mass. It was at Poverty Point, Fairhaven, that Slocum launched "The Spray", converted from an abandoned oyster boat. The plaque was brought to Westport by Mr. and Mrs. Philip Shea, Boston, Mass.

Joshua Slocum was born in Wilmot in 1844 and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Slocum. They all moved to Westport when Joshua was eight. Mrs. John Slocum was laid to rest at Westport cemetery. Joshua helped make leather boots and at 14 years of age left to cook on a schooner.

During his lifetime he sailed around the world five times.

Cherry Carnival

A Success

Despite the fact that native cherries were noticeable by their absence, Wednesday's annual Cherry Carnival in Bear River was a tremendous success.

Hundreds of people from all parts of the province, as well as many tourists from the United States and upper Canadian provinces began arriving in Bear River at an early hour Wednesday morning for the Cherry Carnival, an annual event that has attracted international attention.

The day's program began with a splendid parade, headed by the bugle band of HMCS Cornwallis and featuring many beautifully decorated cars and floats. Winner of first prize in the best decorated car division was the lovely entry of the Bear River Girl Guides, depicting the fiftieth anniversary of the Guide movement. Second prize went to Riverview Lodge and there was a tie for third place with the Rose Garden entry and Good Luck horseshoe sharing the honours.

In decorated floats the Bear River Rebekah Lodge took first with the Philathea Class placing second and the Neighborly Club third. The entry of the Micmac Indians of a woodland scene took first place in that division, with the Bear River Boy Scout troop placing second.

In the doll carriage parade Sylvia Langley, the "Queen of Roses", placed first; Sheryl Wagner, "Queen of Butterflies", second and Carol Brydon third. Paul Doucet took first in decorated bicycles and John and David Munster with their "house moving" entry took first in decorated carts.

During the afternoon a full program of both land and water sports was featured. Many entries in the various events were received from the campers at Camp Arcadia and Camp Champlain in Sandy Cove and Camp Aldercliffe, in Weymouth North.

Dinner and supper were served and in the evening a dance was held to conclude the day's festivities. The whole program was sponsored by the Bear River Fire Department and Board of Trade. Lack of cherries was attributed to a late killing frost which blighted the blossoms before the fruit had formed. Normally Bear River is noted for its abundance of delicious cherries and carnival officials were greatly concerned over the lack of the fruit this year. The parade entry of the Philathea Class pointed up that there were no cherries with a banner announcing the fact and the ladies on the float sang most melodiously a parody on the familiar song, "Yes, We Have No Bananas", with verses announcing all the attractions but "no cherries".

Annual Flower Show Planned

Many "summer colony" members of Smith's Cove and Acadia Valley were welcomed back to the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society when it met last week at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Warne. After an informal session in Mrs. Warne's garden, the members adjourned to the house where a discussion of the various club projects provided the program for the evening.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. H. A. Nichols, the meeting was conducted by Mrs. Warne. Plans for the forthcoming Flower Show in August, was one of the main topics, with the chairman, Mrs. Ralph Wright, leading the discussion in reference to classification of flower categories. It was felt from past experience that some revision was necessary before this year's exhibition and the drawing up of a new entry list was entrusted to the committee. Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Jack Keen, After consideration of all available buildings, it was decided that the Baptist Church Hall would provide the most suitable space for the Show, and a committee comprising Mrs. G. R. Weir, Mrs. Burton Ellis and Miss Dora Warne appointed to make further arrangements. Plans for the afternoon tea were left with the Entertainment Committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Winfield.

Plaque Unveiled At Victoria Beach

In a short but exciting chapter in the history of Nova Scotia, during the era when the telegraph made its initial mark on Eastern Canada, competitive news agencies serving the continent relied on a more "conventional" type of news carrier in the province to ensure the fastest service to their customers.

The Pony Express played an important role in Canada's news world of 1849.

A nine-month battle between two Pony Express companies, working for separate news agencies, is the basis for a historical plaque which was unveiled at 3 p.m. Wednesday, July 13, at Victoria Beach near Digby Gut.

The plaque commemorates the period from February to November 1849 when telegraph service was in operation in Halifax but had not yet been linked with the New Brunswick telegraph centre in Saint John. The Pony Express was utilized to run overseas news from the Nova Scotia port city to Digby Gut — 144 miles — thence by boat to Saint John for international transmission.

Miss Edna Anderson, the granddaughter of one of the King Brothers who operated one of the two services between the Nova Scotia centres, unveiled the marker which has been affixed to a boulder on Highway 1A leading to Victoria Beach.

The restoration of this plaque, the original was destroyed in 1953, is sponsored by the Historical Association of Annapolis Royal, whose president, J. C. Farish Owen, was chairman at the ceremony.

Frank W. Doyle, managing editor of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald and the Halifax Mail Star, was guest speaker. Dr. C. B. Fergusson, Nova Scotia representative of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, also gave a brief address. A prayer of dedication was offered by the Rev. W. Evans Jefferson, of Granville.

The Associated Press sponsored one of the two companies. The name of the other wire service is not known.

The telegraph link to Saint John was completed in November, 1849, thus bringing to an end the nine-month race for news supremacy via horse-back.

The original plaque was destroyed in 1953 when the highway to Victoria Beach was widened. The boulder that held the memorial was smashed during remodelling.

Fined For Lobster Irregularities

Joseph J. Robichaud, Brighton, and James A. Wagner, Plympton, Digby County, were fined \$25.00 each and costs of \$2.75 or 10 day jail term in lieu of payment for violation of lobster fishing regulations being in illegal possession of lobsters.

The case was heard before Delbert Forrest, Justice of the Peace, information having been laid by Fisheries Officer G. Watson.

In referring to the cast it was stated that the public should be aware that special patrols regarding lobster protection are being maintained by the Department of Fisheries in the area for conservation reasons.

Hook Big Turtle

Heavy Run Of Bass

An exceptionally heavy run of bass is being experienced on the Bear River, it has been learned.

Local and visiting sport fishermen are finding the bass run most exciting and every day, in the evenings particularly, the banks of the river near its mouth are lined with ardent bass fishermen.

Last week two nine year old fishermen each landed a good size bass and many more were caught by other fishermen who, though older in years, still retain that eternal youth that is the mark of every true fisherman.

Honoured

Mr. C. W. Crowell, of Yarmouth, who recently retired after twenty-one years service with the Department of Education as a School Inspector and as supervisor of education for the western Nova Scotia area, was honoured recently at a special presentation dinner and meeting at the Lord Nelson Hotel in Halifax.

Previous to his appointment as an Inspector Mr. Crowell was for eighteen years supervising principal at Wolfville.

The presentation address to Mr. Crowell was given by School Inspector Murray W. Campbell, of Windsor.

Another retiring Inspector honoured at the dinner was B. C. Silver, former Halifax county School Inspector. Mr. Silver is well known to many in the Digby area who have been associated with Home & School Association activities.

Market For Irish Moss

A well high unlimited market in the United States exists for Irish Moss. It has been stated here by Joseph Casey, of Casey Fisheries.

Mr. Casey says the market can handle at least five million pounds of the type to be found on the shores of the Bay of Fundy district of western Nova Scotia.

Efforts are being made to get seaside residents to collect and ship this Irish Moss. There is no need for these people to dry it, Mr. Casey says. As a matter of fact, he states, the processor would rather have it wet as it can be mechanically dried at Middleton prior to shipping.

Experiments have been made in the drying process and it has been found possible to dry twenty thousand pounds every three hours.

Fire Under Control

A bush fire on the back road near Plympton, which began Tuesday evening, was reported under control Wednesday afternoon.

Local fire wardens and volunteers fought the blaze all night before getting it under control.

Local Woman Elected



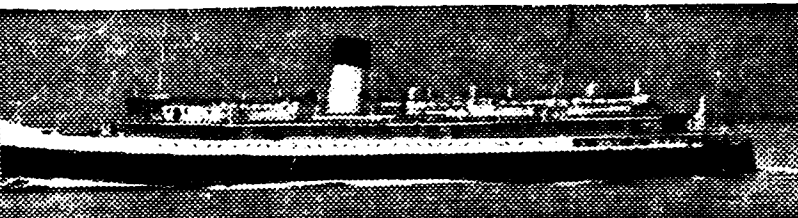

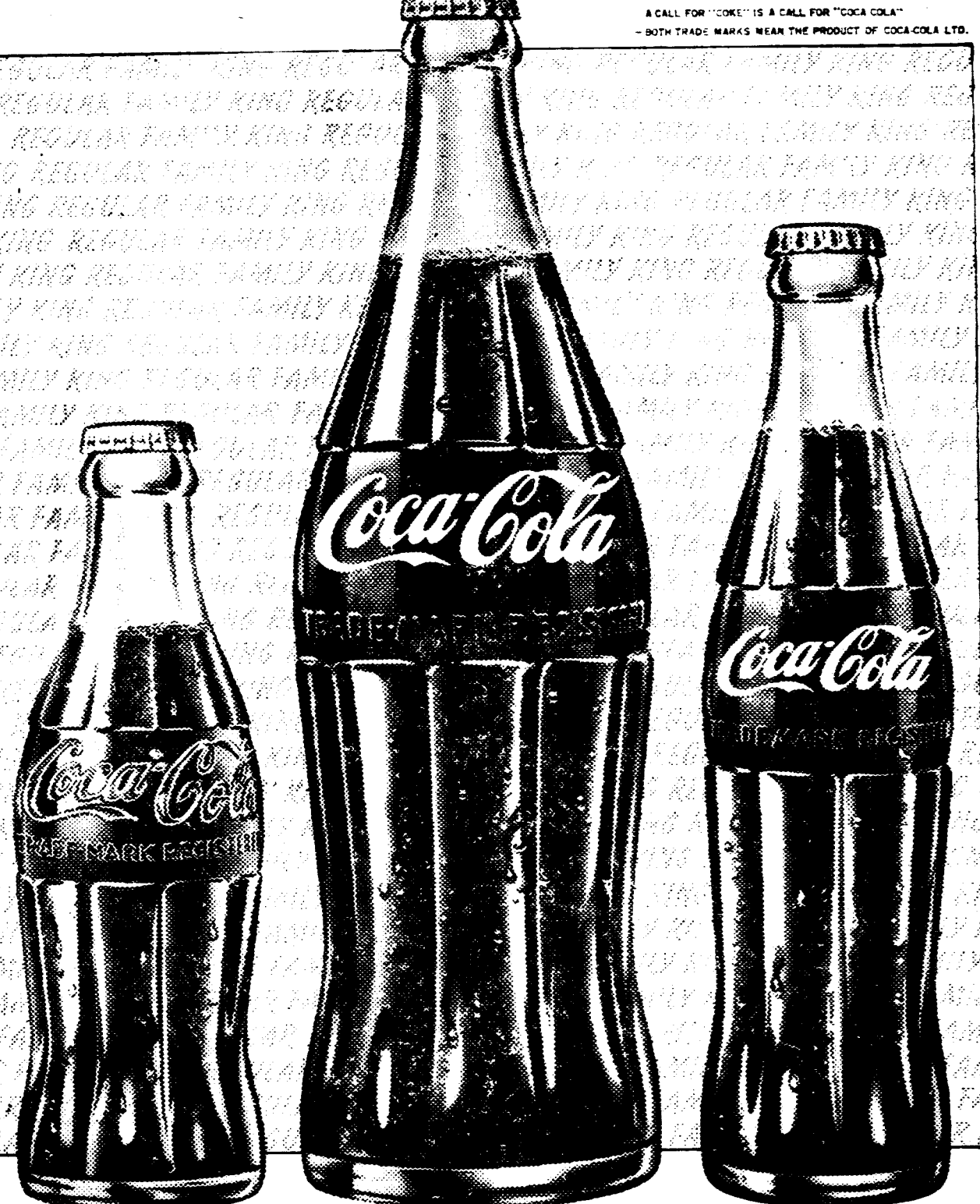

School Closing At Freeport

On Tuesday evening, June 21, the closing exercises for the primary, elementary and junior high including nine and ten, was held in the Community Hall.

Revenue Minister Congratulated

National revenue minister George Nowlan found himself covered with praise and glory in the Commons this week.

Economies and better efficiency which he has inspired in his customs excise and taxation divisions, won commendation from members of parliament as he stated his departmental estimates through the House.

Mr. Nowlan in a brief statement, said revenues of his department climbed by 12.5 per cent over the preceding year. There had been increased work at border crossings and in administration of dumping regulations, but a deduction in expenditure had been made of the sum of \$608,000.

"You will agree with me," he told the House, "that this is indicative of a very high commendation on the part of the House of Commons of the virtues of efficiency and economy."

"I take no credit to myself," he said, "except for the diligent and exacting manner in which I have endeavored to pay a well-deserved tribute to the officers of the Customs who have been able to achieve this economy and at the same time do more work than has been done in the past."

"The savings," he said, "have been brought about by bringing in more efficient methods, computing devices and other means. It has also meant a transfer of personnel to bring about better service."

A comparable result had been achieved in the taxation division, he said.

"This is one department of government which two years in succession has reported a decrease in expenditures and an increase in the work load," he said.

pastor, Rev. Israel Potter (who was born in 1763) and to lighten the burden the Rev. Henry Saunders was engaged by the second Clements church, as co-pastor. This church, then known as 2nd Clements Baptist Church, is today the Bear River United Baptist Church. The people in Smith's Cove worshipped in what was then known as the United Hall, owned now by the Sons of Temperance. In 1867 the Baptists built a church for themselves, naming it the Smith's Cove Baptist Church.

In 1888 (August 9) a resolution was passed to divide the church. On September 20th, 1888, the following branches, Goat Island (now Upper Clements), Clementsport and Clements West (now Deep Brook), obtained their dismission and formed themselves in a separate Baptist Church, under the name of Clementsport Baptist Church. During the ministry of Rev. J. L. M. Young the Smith's Cove Church, then known as the 2nd Hillsburg Church, withdrew from the 1st Hillsburg Church (now Bear River Baptist Church) and united with the Clements, Clementsport and Clements West, thus completing the pastorate which today includes Upper Clements, Clementsport, Deep Brook and Smith's Cove.

Following the division of 1888 the brethren in Clements West (now Deep Brook) worshipped in what was then known by the name of the "Union Hall Company". On September 16th, 1918, at a meeting held in the Hall, it was resolved that the Union Hall be sold and the proceeds divided equally to shareholders share and share alike.

The Union Hall was bought by the Baptist congregation during the pastorate of the Rev. Abner M. McNinch and in 1919 was remodelled and has since then been known as the Deep Brook United Baptist Church. A home was also purchased for a Baptist Parsonage in Deep Brook, it being the centre of the Pastorate.

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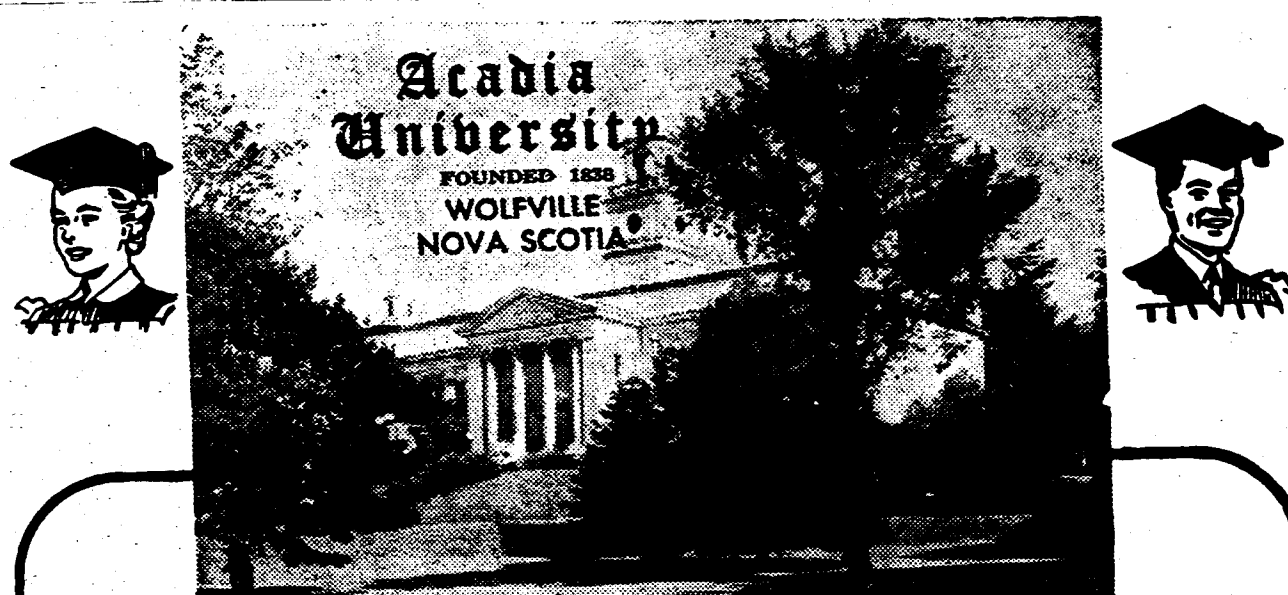

To Mark 175th Anniversary

(Continued from last issue)

In connection with the auctioning of the pews, it is recorded in the minute book that "to prevent jealousy and confusion no pew is to be assigned to any person but by auction to the highest bidder". It was arranged, however, that "there is to be a certain number of pews left for free pews — also there is to be pews left for negro pews in the back of the church, also the Christening pew, the ministers' pew and a few for straining gentlemen".

The auctioning of the church pews was not accomplished without dispute. Commissary Frederick William Hecht, who was a pre-Loyalist settler of the community and who had been appointed as government agent

to handle the distribution of seed, tools and other assistance to the new Loyalist settlers, evidently took his office very seriously and felt he should be accorded special recognition both by the state and the church.

In any event, Mr. Hecht evidently wrote to the Bishop complaining about the treatment he had received in the matter of the pews. The Bishop in turn wrote the vestry concerning the matter and the vestry replied and outlined the situation in no uncertain terms.

The vestry's letter points out that Commissary Hecht wanted two pews next to the pulpit. At the time of the auction he told one of the vestry this but did not stay to bid on them "as others did stay". His reasons for wanting the two pews, the vestry says in their letter, was "for the convenience of his family and visiting friends". The

letter goes on to say "what have we to do with his visiting friends, a single pew will conveniently hold five persons and he has but three in family".

The letter from the vestry points out what the vestry feels is Mr. Hecht's real reason for wanting the two pews. It says "But no, he wants two pews from our small number for no other end than to gratify his pride of vanity by making them into one that he may be seated in grandeur". They say they will not comply with this "especially to oblige a person to whom the church is not a mite beloved and we have reason to think never will be. But he is a proud, haughty, imperious man who supposes that all the people in this place should give way to his humour; in which he finds himself mistaken".

The vestry was evidently more kindly disposed to Mrs.

Hecht than to the Commissary for their letter says "She is surely a very amiable and agreeable young lady, endowed with every engaging qualification, and her mother is also a very worthy agreeable person. Both of them we should be happy to oblige but not to gratify his caprice and vanity whose study we believe is to promote confusion and discord in the church as he can't rule".

Many years later Trinity Church was to receive indirectly from Commissary Hecht his home for use as a rectory. In his will he left the property to a woman he and his wife had cared for, a Miss Jane Totten, with the stipulation it was to go to the church at her death. His children attempted to dispossess Miss Totten but she barricaded herself in the house and when they found out the property was to go to the church at her death they raised

the siege. From the record of the auctioning of the pews in Trinity Church in the year 1792 it is interesting to note that Samuel Edison, grandfather of the famed inventor, Thomas Alva Edison, purchased pew No. 36 for the sum of thirteen shillings and sixpence. Annual rent for this pew was five shillings. In 1796 Samuel Edison was among the inhabitants of Digby taxed for the support of Trinity Church. His assessment was two shillings and sixpence.

That the first rector of Trinity parish was greatly concerned over the moral well being of the infant community is seen in his address to the vestry which is recorded in the original minute book. Given on September 29, 1788, Mr. Viets says in his address, "Tis with the greatest grief and indignation that we perceive vice triumphant and virtue ridiculed and

trampled underfoot. Drunkenness, idleness, profane swearing, tavern haunting, slander, backbiting, lying, defrauding and stealing call loudly for the exertions of the Magistrates to the use of the sword of law and justice for the suppression and punishment of those vices and for reformation of manners among us". Mr. Viets felt the "chief source and origin of these calamities lies in the neglect and contempt of the Lord's Day and the public duties belonging to it". He said "great numbers not only neglect and despise public worship but insult us by idly strolling about the streets by sauntering from house to house, by doing business and by frequently travelling in an idle manner by the doors of this house while we are at our devotions".

Tuna At St. Mary's

A five hundred-pound tuna was caught in a herring weir at St. Bernard's last Thursday and Charles LeBlanc, of Saulterville, stated that he saw a school of tuna in St. Mary's Bay the same day on his return from the fishing grounds. The tuna were following his boat and Mr. LeBlanc stated that they came to within a short distance of his boat.

Tuna have been sighted several times and on two occasions they have been hooked by pollock fishermen while out hand-line fishing but unfortunately they were not landed. Prospects for a good tuna season along Cape St. Mary's area in Digby County appears very good and the Cape St. Mary's Anglers' Association will have boats out this week to try to land the first tuna by rod and reel.

The Cape St. Mary's Anglers' Association will offer a \$100.00 prize to the party that lands the first tuna at Cape St. Mary's this season, operating from the Association's registered boats. Capt. Bennett Cormack, of Cape St. Mary's, has been appointed manager of the association and the office and club room will be in his residence.

It is expected that last year's record of over 70 tuna caught at Cape St. Mary's will be broken this year due to the fact that fishing is expected to start earlier with the appearance of the giant tuna in the surrounding waters. Cape St. Mary's is an ideal tuna fishing ground and lines may be cast upon leaving the wharf. Tuna have been landed but a few hundred feet from the harbour and from a spectators point of view, the Cape has no equal. Hundreds will watch tuna fishing from vantage points at the Cape this summer.

Bless Houses At Belliveau Cove

Less than two years ago six residents of Belliveau Cove went into partnership and formed the first "rural" group to undertake building of their own homes as a joint project.

On July 19 at 7 p.m., the completed dwelling of each member was blessed by Monsignor T. J. LeBlanc, of Moncton, and mortgages were signed in a brief ceremony at the building site.

In August, 1958, loans of \$1,500 per unit were granted by the Nova Scotia Housing Commission to J. Mel Donette, Pierre Belliveau, J. Lemah Comeau, J. Adelard Theriault, J. Phillip Belliveau, and Emile J. Comeau. These men formed Belle Vue Housing Limited.

By procuring their own lumber, undertaking their own mill work and assisting in the construction of their homes generally, they were able to complete the buildings at a savings of \$1,500 each as against similar homes built by urban groups.

This was the first rural group of its kind in the province but since 1958, other residents of villages and smaller communities have pooled their respective talents to undertake similar building projects including ones in Cheticamp, North Grant and Pubnico.

Following the blessing congratulatory remarks were addressed to the successful group.

It is also expected that the Male Quartette, of Weymouth Falls, will bring messages of song.

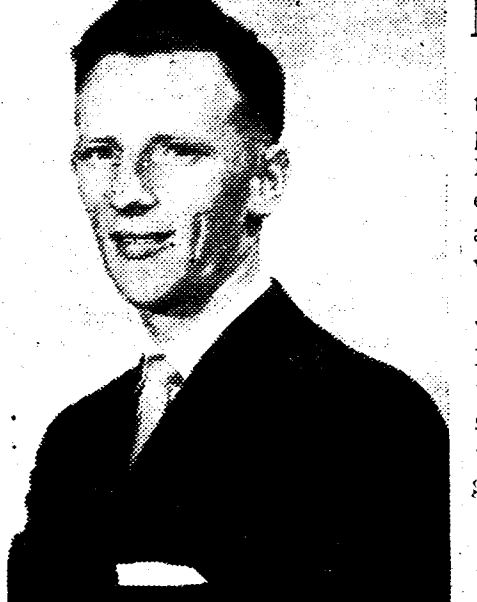

Report Record Run Of Bass

Local and visiting sports fishermen are enjoying the greatest run of striped bass on the Bear River in its history.

Even novices with no previous experience in sport fishing are being successful in catching numbers of the fighting game fish.

Many experienced game fishermen who have fished in waters over a wide area of the American continent say the run of bass at present in the Bear River is phenomenal. Mr. E. A. Kaiser, of Cincinnati, Ohio, who with his wife is a guest at the Harbour View Hotel in Smith's Cove on their first visit to Nova Scotia, says that although he has sport fished in many areas of the United States and Canada, he has never experienced such a thrill as bass fishing on the Bear River.

On their first time, on the river, accompanied by Bear River guide William Morine, Mr. and Mrs. Kaiser caught seventeen good size bass and many more smaller ones free. On their second trip they hooked thirty of the fighting fish, ranging in size from five to twenty pounds.

Since this trip the management of the Harbour View has been featuring striped bass on the menu, courtesy "Isaac Walton" A. E. Kaiser.

The waters of the Bear River are easy of access for sports fishermen and for the past several weeks the edges of the river have been lined with fishermen casting out into the tidal waters. Many fishermen are also making use of boats in their fishing expeditions. The bass respond well to lures, trolling and bait fishing and, once hooked, put up a tremendous fight before they can be landed. Ideal conditions seem to occur as the tides water get close to the full mark, especially when this occurs near dusk or dawn. Many fishermen prefer night fishing, however, and it is not an uncommon sight to see the fishermen casting out into the waters of the Bear River in the "wee small hours".

Although no scientific reason has been advanced for the unprecedented increase in the numbers of striped bass on the Bear River, many local people feel the closing off of the tidal waters of the Annapolis River by the recently completed Annapolis River dam has had a great effect on the numbers of the fighting salt water game fish going up the Bear River.

They point out that, while a fishway has been provided in the Annapolis River dam, the former wide mouth of the river estuary has been practically closed off and they feel the bass are turning in much greater number to the Bear River, which has long been a favorite haunt of bass.

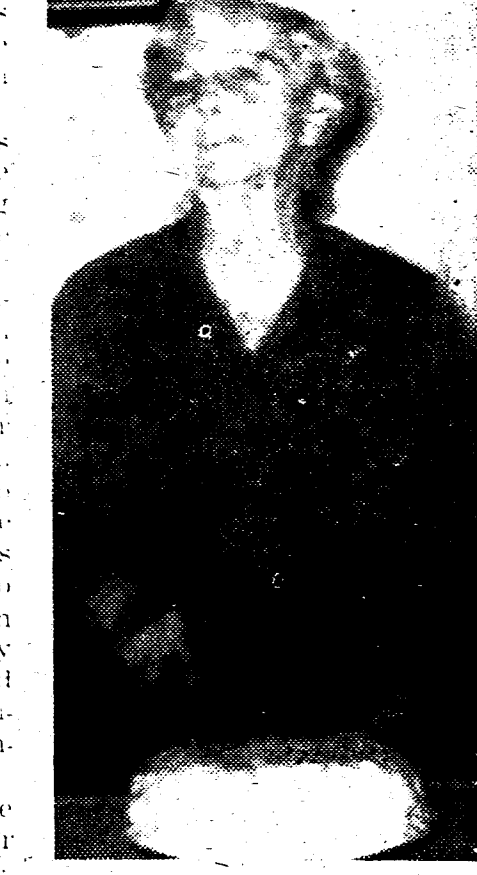

Four newly erected cabins and a new fireplace in the main building at Johnston Christian Park, South Range, were dedicated at an impressive service near the shore of Porter's Lake on Sunday afternoon.

The Johnston Christian Park, sponsored by the Midtime Christian Missionary Society of the Church of Christ Disciples, first came into being when the late Rev. R. M. Johnston, and Mrs. Johnston, donated the property in 1953. At that time one main building (erected in 1954) was erected, serving as a dining hall and kitchen. Tents were used for campers. During the present year the entire beautiful Johnston property surrounding the Park was purchased, making 75 acres in all, and by the generous financial and manual effort of the church people, four new cabins were erected. The cabins, attractively white with green shutters, have a large open veranda of hanging their appearance. Each cabin accommodates 16 campers and 2 faculty members. Besides the camps a large 200 ft. x 100 ft. building in the main building is one of its uses to be for holding worship when weather prevents open air worship. The building of the camps was sponsored by E. M. Macdonald, of Dartmouth, and with a work force of 50 men for 2 days of May, the cabins were completed. The fireplace in the main building was spearheaded by E. M. Macdonald, of Halifax. Special note of the undertaking was given by Wilfred Cosman, of Weymouth, president of the M. C. M. S. of Nova Scotia.

The dedication service on Sunday was held at 2 p.m. by Rev. R. Watson, Halifax, formerly of Indiana, U.S.A.

Wilfred Cosman, of Weymouth, presented the dedication of the cabins and the fireplace. He said that these cabins were erected to provide a place of worship for the poor and indigent.

After considering all the applications the vestry voted to pay, on six of them. Of those who were rejected was one H. J. Jones of whom it is recorded "her parents are at present in Digby, have three children and are poor".

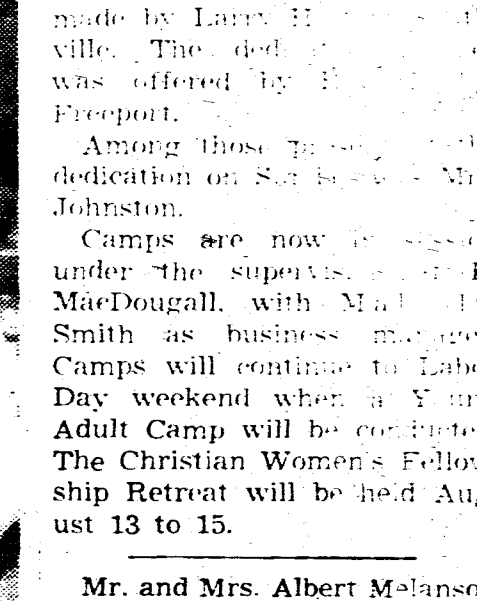

that Mr. Anderson is unable to do heavy work. He would like now to make application for himself to have the amount of licensed taxi drivers extended to five, including himself, so he may keep up his employment as a taxi driver. He owns property in the Town and has owned property here in the Town for many years. He did operate a taxi for a number of years. He has several recommendations which were made by the Town Clerk, Mr. A. R. Pyne, Mr. Miller, Mr. McNeil and Mr. Norman. Mr. Anderson felt he would be a valuable taxi driver. I would like to submit that the by-law be extended and has been extended in the past. I don't know but perhaps Mr. Anderson would like to say a few words for himself.

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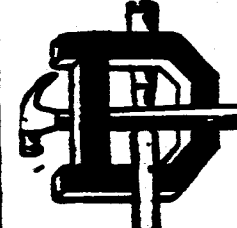

Question: The report of the Relief Committee be received. Declared a vote.

License Committee: Woolaver: There are two applications in for a taxi license. As Mr. Nichols pointed out, Mr. Anderson has an application in and Mr. Curtis Harris has had one in for some time. The License Committee will have to get together on that and find out if we are going to increase the number to sixteen. There has been one license paid for a Gift Shop at the Pines Hotel by Bradley's. A letter has gone out to Duplessie stating that he has to have a license for that canteen.

Mayor: The number of taxi licenses is set by resolution of Council. If it is your desire to proceed to make any recommendation you could meet sometime this evening and report back to Council.

Woolaver: I would agree with that and I would ask that our Chief of Police sit in on that meeting later on.

Mayor: We have completed the written agenda. You may meet and then come back and report. I believe that the Hospital Planning Committee which is now operating under some other name has had a number of meetings and I believe that correspondence has been accepted by the Nova Scotia Hospital Commission and the Hospital Building Committee and also the Planning Committee from Mr. Turcotte. This is the architect who is adapting plans that he already has to the needs of this area. I believe there is some discussion with respect to the actual number of beds. I believe, however, that the Committee at present finds things are going along fairly satisfactorily and that sometime early in August the thing can be finalized to the point where tenders might be called for the construction of the building.

Are there any other Committees to report.

Correspondence — Clerk: We have a letter from Mrs. Alice Mason. "I would like permission for a permit as I am wanting to put a sun porch on the front of our house which is on Church St."

Mayor: By the looks of things it is fairly well completed. (There was another request from Rev. Mr. Davies. I believe for a building permit.)

Mayor: What is your pleasure in connection with this? Permission be granted Mr. Davies and Mrs. Alice Mason for the building that they request. Is there any discussion? Question: As above. Declared a vote.

To Present Pageant

Wednesday evening, August 3rd, will be an historic occasion in Digby. That evening the Kilwanis Club of Digby will sponsor a Planters' Pageant at the Digby Regional High School. This event will be one of the series being held throughout the Annapolis Valley area of Nova Scotia to mark the bicentennial of the arrival of the Planters from New England.

Although Digby's history is mainly associated with the Loyalist migration from the eastern United States into this province, a number of the earliest settlers of the area which now comprises Digby town and environs were in fact Planters who moved into the area from their original settlement in Annapolis and Granville. Included in these were many of the descendants of the original Planter families who came to Granville in the "Charming Molly" in 1760.

One of the earliest settlers in the Digby area or the township of Conway, as it was then called, was William McDormand, who was born in the Valley of the Brandywine in Pennsylvania. He was one of the original Planter settlers of Granville.

After James B. Franklin, of Windsor, son of Hon. Michael Franklin, once Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, secured a lease from the original grantees of the township of Conway for that area of the grant now included in the district of Digby, he set about to colonize the district. He persuaded William McDormand, William Fitzgerald, Robert McDormand, Joseph Webber and John Lawson, farmers; Joel Webber, a sea captain, and William Barbancks, a school teacher, to remove from Annapolis to Conway. William McDormand settled north of the Racquette; Robert McDormand at the head of the Grand Joggin; Joseph Webber settled north of the Racquette and the other two on the town waterfront. Barbancks operated a day school and boarded with his employers as was the custom then.

Many others of the early settlers of Digby who came here prior to the settlement by the Loyalists were either Planters or first generation descendants of the Planters. Included among these was Elkanah Morton, the first male child born in the township of Cornwallis, after having been accidentally shot in the leg by Lieutenant Governor Mariot Arbuthnot at a militia review in Cornwallis he returned to New Brunswick but later returned to Kings County where he became a Justice of the Peace. In 1802, at the urgent solicitation of Governor Wentworth, he removed to Digby where he was appointed Justice of the Peace, Registrar of Deeds, and later became Justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas and Judge of Probate for Digby and Clare. He later assured Governor Dalhousie these positions did not yield one hundred pounds sterling yearly and styled them "arduous, expensive and perilous". He represented the township of Digby in the provincial parliament in 1827. Mr. Morton died in 1848 at the age of 87 and was buried in Trinity churchyard, Digby.

Among the descendants of the Planters who arrived in Granville aboard the "Charming Molly" who later settled in Digby was Phineas Lovett 3rd, grandson of Phineas Lovett, who was among the Planters who arrived on the Molly. He married a daughter of Henry Rutherford, noted Loyalist merchant, businessman and provincial legislator of Digby and succeeded his father-in-law as representative of the county of Annapolis in the provincial parliament in 1808. Mr. Rutherford had previously represented the township of Digby but was later chosen for Annapolis County. Mr. Lovett is among those buried in the old Loyalist cemetery in the south end of the town of Digby, located on part of the original homestead property in Digby and now being restored by the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society.

During the Planters' Pageant next Wednesday evening in Digby, Mayor R. S. Longley, of Wolfville, will give a brief sketch of the Planter story and a film of the Valley Princess Planter New England trip early this summer will also be shown.

Music for the Planters' Pageant will be provided by the band of HMCS Cornwallis through kind permission of Captain F. C. Frewer. Jean Marshall, a former resident of Digby and now well known as a vocalist with the CBC, will present several vocal selections and a film of the Valley Princess Planter New England trip early this summer will also be shown.

Also included in the program, which will be emceed by S/Lt. Pat McQuaig, of HMCS Cornwallis, will be a number of feats of legerdemain by Edward Lowe.

Grade XI First

The Department of Education of Nova Scotia has announced that this year's Grade 11 Provincial Examinations for the Province of Nova Scotia will be marked before the end of Grade 12.

One reason for the change in procedure is that the marks of the Grade 11 pupils provide an important guide for principals of schools in determining the sizes of their classes for the coming school year.

Another reason is that because pupils of this grade make up the bulk of those who will have to write supplementary examinations, early notification of their exam results will give these students more time to prepare.

Ralph W. Kane, Secretary of the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board, said there are more than 100,000 individual papers to be marked. This year 3,187 Grade 12 students and 6,774 Grade 11 students were registered to write the examinations. Both were record numbers.

Two hundred teachers and clerical workers now are engaged in marking the papers at Acadia University, Wolfville. It is expected that examination marks will be released to the Departments of Education of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland before the end of July and that students can expect to receive their results early in August.

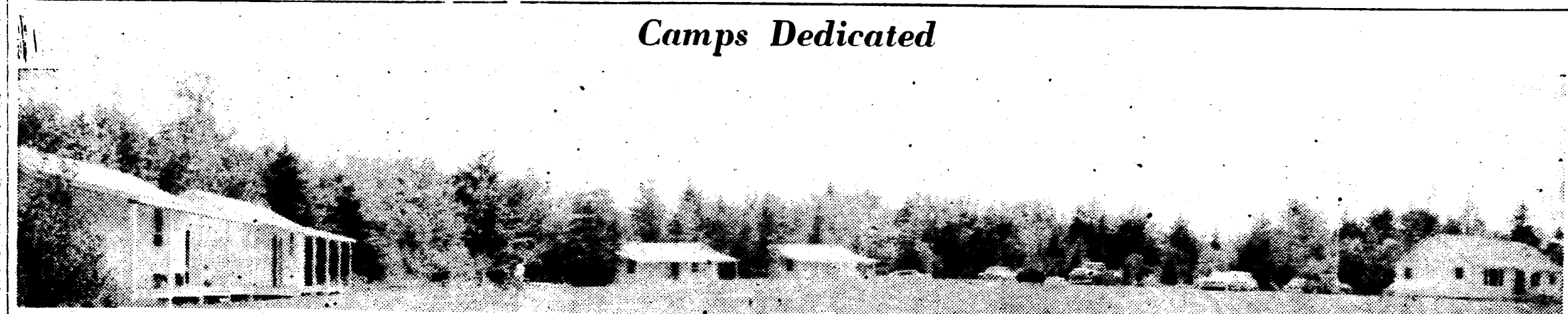
Supplementary examinations will be written from August 22 to August 25.

To Mark 175th Anniversary

(The following is a continuation of the history of Trinity Parish, Digby, which will mark the 175th anniversary of its founding on Sunday, October 16th.)

(Continued from last week)

The vestry also set the term for the new schooling and decided to send the term for the present sessions for six months. They also, despite the fact that the schooling was "free," decided that every parent should send half a cow to the entrance of the school, and in the charity school.

Over the years, from its founding, Trinity Church had its ups and downs. Many of the westerners, the early Loyalist settlers, and the community and returned from the United States, even though they were less disaffected than the rigours and hardships found here. The first pastor, Rev. Roger Viets, died in 1817. He was buried on August 15, 1817, in the churchyard. He was succeeded by his son, Rev. Roger Viets, who was appointed by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in 1817. He was inducted on May 9, 1815.

By 1817 the church had, however, advanced to the point where a choir was formed and the minute book records that "the choir pews in the gallery do belong to the singers." By 1817 also it was decided that any pew holder shall be liable to appear at church one Sunday in the course of each and every month their pew shall be forfeit and sold.

In 1819 a public meeting was held on January 22nd for the purpose of considering the most efficient means of raising the required salary and for providing a house for the residence of the minister. Previous to this the clergy serving the parish had received their income from the society for the propagation of the gospel. A letter was read at the meeting from Miss Taylor offering a plot of land on which to build a parsonage. It would appear from the minute book the parsonage was built although some disputes concerning its size and proportions are recorded.

After a period when the parish was served by a visiting clergyman, the Rev. William Bullock, well known hymn writer whose famous hymn, "We Love The Place of God," is familiar to churchgoers today, was appointed Rector. The actual date of his induction was July 25, 1842, but he is recorded as having chaired meetings of the vestry during 1841. Dean Bullock was an ancestor of the Venerable G. W. Bullock of Cornwallis who recently retired after a distinguished military and clerical career.

In 1849 the residents of Ross- way, a part of Trinity parish, decided to erect a chapel in their village. The new chapel was consecrated by the Bishop on May 29, 1849.

First mention of the ladies of the parish having any part in the operation of the church is contained in the minutes of a meeting of the vestry of August 3, 1852, when a letter was read "from the ladies who con-

ducted the bazaar". The letter said in part "The ladies who conducted the bazaar in Digby have appropriated \$60 for the purpose of painting and finishing the interior of the parish church respectfully request your permission to proceed with the said painting..." The letter was signed by M. R. Gray, wife of the Rector of the time, Mary Budd and E. C. Lightfoot, wife of Dr. Lightfoot. The vestry by resolution gave the ladies permission to spend the money and appointed a committee to confer with them "relative to the expenditure".

That Trinity Church did not only look after the spiritual welfare of the inhabitants of Digby and the education of their children but also provided the first lending library in the town is seen in an entry in the original minute book. Bearing the date of June 10, 1854, the entry records the thanks of the parish to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge "for their recent liberal grant of books to form a lending library in this parish".

First mention of a church assembly or synod at Halifax is found in the minute book in October, 1851, when a vestry meeting voted to "decline sending sundry lay delegates to the assembly held by His Lordship on October 12". The parish on April 24, 1856, again voted against sending delegates to the "church assembly or synod". They repeated in 1858.

In the year 1856 Rev. Arthur Gray, the rector, suffered a serious heart attack and after "having read a certificate from three of the most skillful physicians of Halifax, to the effect he had a disease of the heart, precluding much exertion in his ministerial labour", the vestry voted to authorize him to select an assistant missionary to whom they would pay \$50 per annum. He selected a Rev. Arthur Milledge.

Despite the fact the parish was instructed by the Bishop to either send delegates to the synod or report their reasons for not electing them, in 1860 Trinity parish continued to refuse to send these delegates and on Easter Monday, 1860 passed a resolution disapproving of the synod "as at present constituted and respectfully decline to elect delegates to said synod". They repeated this resolution again in 1862.

Although the original minute book of the parish seems to carry no references to it, Anglican services were carried on at Marshall's Town, near Digby, and a part of the parish, from shortly after 1783. These services were held first at the home of Isaac Keen, one of the earliest settlers. In 1842 land was deeded by William J. Hunt and work of building a church at Marshall's Town was started. The new church was consecrated in 1844. It was completely renovated and a bell installed in the steeple, later destroyed by lightning, in 1903.

The present day parish of Trinity still encompasses the villages of Marshall's Town and Rossway although for a time Rossway was a part of the parish of Westport which later succumbed to the inroads of "dissenters".

The original minute book of

the parish ends with an entry dated November 10, 1862, and carries this notation, "So ends this book, the first book of records of Trinity Church, extending over a period of 77 years. Commencing without a resident minister and ending the same way".

According to the second minute book, the parish remained without a resident cleric until 1863 although considerable correspondence is recorded between the vestry, the Bishop and several clergymen regarding the parish. The book records the presence of the Rev. H. L. Yewens as Rector in the spring of 1863.

From the records, it appears the church continued to expand, despite the difficulties which often beset it. One of these difficulties occurred in 1866 when the vestry passed a resolution granting the rector \$200 a year for three years. Rev. Mr. Yewens objected to this, stating the rector was appointed for life. He said when he came he had been told his salary was to be not less than \$200 and he had the impression not much of the parish was outside of Digby. He said he was told he could walk to Marshall's Town and therefore would not be obliged to keep a horse. The resolution was withdrawn and another substituted that the rector receive \$200 for three years and the use of the Totten rectory. This was evidently acceptable to the rector, although in 1867 he complained of his inability to meet his expenses and of the condition of the rectory property.

Although Mr. Yewens ministered to the congregation of Trinity parish from 1863 he was not inducted as rector. In 1869 the matter came to a head with Mr. Yewens informing the vestry he would not stay unless inducted. The vestry and parish meetings debated this matter at length on a number of occasions but because of difficulties involved regarding glebe lands and other factors did not decide to induct Mr. Yewens. He resigned the parish in 1870. The Bishop named Rev. John Ambrose to succeed him in July, 1870.

The dispute concerning the induction of a rector continued with various opinions expressed concerning the authority of the governor of the province to order this done. In 1871 Mr. Ambrose informed the vestry that it had been decided by the British government as regards the colonies generally that induction by the Governor was not necessary. Mr. Charles Budd, a prominent Digby churchman, expressed the opinion the Lieutenant Governor had no power over the church and that the church in Nova Scotia had been disestablished.

The first move to provide free pews in the church was made in 1872 when Mr. Ambrose proposed that after the church bell had ceased all pews in the church still vacant be made available to those who wished to use them. It was decided that "Some members of the corporation be appointed to wait in each aisle each service on Sunday and show those wanting to any seat that may be vacant". In 1874 all pews were made free as an experiment for 6 months.

At their meeting on March 16, 1874, the vestry passed a resolution of condolence in the death of "Very Rev'd. William Bullock, D.D., Dean of St. Luke's cathedral, Halifax, and former rector of this parish". In this they noted he was "the means of building at Westport, Sandy Cove, Rossway, Marshalltown, South Range and Smith's Cove as well as a new rectory and the Sunday School house in this town". These, they stated, "are among the remarkable monuments of his pastorate of six years".

By 1874 the original church was becoming too small for the

needs of the parish and the first discussions are recorded concerning the building of a new edifice.

Comment by Mr. Ambrose on the situation of the church is contained in the minutes of the annual meeting of 1875. He said, "Peace and quietness seem now to be supreme in the church, the old sores apparently healed." Mr. Ambrose also commented on a subject that was later to cause a rift in the congregation when he said, "he did not hold with the extreme views, not holding with ritualism on the one hand or low church on the other, that he held with a middle course and was a prayer book clergyman".

In his report to the annual meeting in 1875 Mr. Ambrose also commented on the "African school at the Joggin". He said the Bishop of Zanzibar, Rev. Mr. Abbott, the agent of the S.P.G., and others, had visited the school which was found to be very satisfactory and "the best African school in the province".

The question of the difference between "high" and "low" church sympathizers flared again in 1876 when the matter of induction of the Rector came up again. A portion of the congregation favoured the induction of Mr. Yewens as Rector rather than Mr. Ambrose. Many pages of the minute book are devoted to the matter. On a vote being taken Mr. Ambrose was chosen.

It was at this time a rift occurred in the congregation with some leaving to form their own church under the regulations of the Reformed Episcopal Church. They constructed a church in 1876 at a cost of \$7,000 and secured the Rev. Mr. McGuire as Rector. The new church flourished for a short period but soon many returned to old Trinity and others of the new congregation went to the Presbyterians or Methodist churches. The church building was later sold to the Baptists for \$2,000 and is still used as a place of worship by the Baptists in Digby.

Other problems arose in the parish during 1876. These revolved around the desire of some in Marshalltown and Ross- way to have their churches separated from Trinity parish and combined in a new parish to be called the "Parish of St. Mary".

The years 1877 and '78 were taken up with plans for building a new and larger church, the cornerstone of which was laid on July 3, 1878. Builder of the new church was M. L. Oliver, of Digby, and when it was nearly completed the vestry accepted an offer from Mr. Oliver to buy the old building for \$70,000. This was protested by a petition from the ladies of the parish, presented at the annual meeting on March 29, 1880. Judge Savary moved at this meeting that "the old church be offered to the municipal council for use as a court house free of charge provided the tower and chancel be removed, they to move it before June 1st next, if not the building to be pulled down". This motion was lost and one moved by W. B. Hawkesworth that the old church be pulled down was passed. It was decided to present the font from the old church to St. Paul's, Marshalltown.

Unfortunately, when the old church was destroyed many priceless historical relics it contained were lost. These included coats of arms of Admiral Digby, Bishop Inglis and Governor Parr, as well as beautiful hand-painted panels which formed a retables behind the altar. For many years the wrought iron steps leading to the pulpit and the old pulpit and sounding board were in the garden at the rectory but they have since gone.

The new church was consecrated on October 13, 1880, by Rt. Rev. Hibbert Binney, Bishop of Nova Scotia.

In 1882 the problem of high and low church sentiments came to the fore again. On March 10, 1882, a parish meeting discussed at length the matter of a "very handsome metal cross with the figure of the crucifix lined or etched on its base, which has been kindly presented to the church by a Reverend Friend and benefactor". The discussion centred around the question, "whereas conscientious scruples exist among members of the congregation in reference to the permanent use of crosses on or near the Holy Table". A resolution was moved that the rector "be respectfully and affectionately requested not the use or display the said cross in the position it now occupies only on the great feasts and high festivals of the church or other similar occasions". It was also stated in the resolution that "it is not intended to be in derogation of the cross as the ordinary emblem or banner of the Christian faith".

An amendment to this motion that "the cross remain where it is" was moved by Charles Budd and seconded by T. C. Shreve (who later became Digby's first Mayor). It is reported "A sharp discussion took place upon the question before the meeting. On vote being taken the amendment passed by a large majority, only six voting against it".

The decision to send the church bell, which originally came from England and was a relic of the first church, to Troy, N. Y., for re-casting, is recorded in the minutes of January 12, 1884. Although no reference is to be found in the minutes, history has it that the original bell contained a high percentage of silver which gave it a particularly sweet and melodious tone. After its re-casting many of the church people were of the opinion the tone was no longer so sweet and some question as to the replacement of the bell's silver content arose.

A great deal of deliberation is recorded in 1887 concerning the matter of accepting an offer made by Rev. John M. Davenport of Trinity Church, Saint John, for the sale of their church organ, which was to be replaced by a new one, to Trinity in Digby. It was finally decided to accept the offer and the organ, which is still in use in the church, was purchased at a cost of \$800 plus another \$100 for transferring it to Digby.

In 1888 Rt. Rev. Frederick Courtney, Bishop of Nova Scotia, visited the parish and was tendered an address of welcome. In this address of welcome to the people of the parish to Britain is commented upon. Reference is made also to the fact that "blood is thicker than water and, though living under different flags, the people of this country and their neighbours in the United States have always maintained friendly feelings and relations with each other". The development of a closer communion with "our sister church" in the United States is seen in the address which comments on the fact that the Bishop of Maine participated in the consecration of Bishop Courtney.

Reference to the destruction by fire of the Totten Rectory on September 6, 1890, is found in the minutes when it was decided that the parish should "without delay" replace the building. The Totten rectory fire was the first fire in Digby in which the community's first fire engine, the "Victor", was used. Previous to securing the engine the town had constructed reservoirs of water for fire use and it is recorded that in the rectory fire all the water available was exhausted in the vain attempt to save the building.

The building of the new rectory was not accomplished without a great deal of discussion at several vestry and parish meetings. By May, 1891, the matter had still not been decided and the Rector was still living in a rented house. At the parish meeting on May 7th, 1891, the Rector's salary was agreed upon at \$850 out of parish resources and the rent of house now occupied by him to be paid by him.

The proposed retirement of the Rev. Dr. Ambrose as Rector of the parish is recorded in the minutes of May 18, 1892. In September of the same year the Rev. H. A. Harley was appointed Rector. A motion commending Dr. Ambrose for his years of faithful service to the parish was passed by the annual meeting in 1892. This resolution pointed out that in more than 21 years of service Dr. Ambrose had succeeded in building a new parish church, securing the recovery of school lands to the ownership of the parish and improving revenues of glebe lands.

The parish also agreed to pay Dr. Ambrose a retirement allowance of one hundred dol-

lars annually during his lifetime.

Discussions continued concerning the building of a new rectory, through the year 1894 with the chief matter in dispute being the location of the new rectory, whether it should be on the site of the old one or in a new place north of the old building. It was finally decided in August, 1894, to build on the new site and the tender of Mr. Fenwick Young of \$2750 was accepted for the building.

Mr. Harley continued as Rector of the parish until 1907 when he submitted his resignation after fourteen years in the parish. He was succeeded by the Rev. William Driffield, who remained as Rector until 1929 when he retired and Rev. A. E. Gabriel was appointed his successor. On his retirement Mr. Driffield was also granted a lifetime pension from the parish of one hundred dollars. Mr. Driffield did not live long to enjoy his retirement on pension, passing away in 1929.

A number of Rectors have served the parish of Trinity since Mr. Gabriel resigned his charge in 1936. These include Rev. E. M. Caldwell, Rev. E. B. Gaskill, Rev. H. Y. MacLean, and the present incumbent, Rev. James Pike. During the summer seasons the church and parish over the years have been served by many noted clergies from other dioceses and from the United States. Included in these was Rev. Dr. Frederick Kirkus, a long-time summer resident of Digby.

In the years which have intervened since the new Trinity church was built many beautiful stained glass windows have been installed and many beautiful memorials erected to enhance the beauty of the church, one of the most structurally beautiful church buildings in Nova Scotia. Included in these are an intricately carved font cover and a beautiful reredos in memory of Rev. William Driffield; impressive pavement lights in memory of the late Stanley Keen, long time vestry clerk and secretary of the cemetery commission; ornamental lighting fixtures throughout the building in memory of Elizabeth Adelaide Jenner, widow of a former vestryman.

Every window in the church is of stained glass, each depicting scriptural scenes, and all giving a beautifully soft glow to the interior of the church. Particularly beautiful are the three windows above the altar, the three above the font and the great rose window in the "east" end of the church. Bronze plaques in the church are to the memory of many members, now deceased, who served their church faithfully and well during their lifetime. Included in these are plaques to the memory of T. E. G. Lynch, vestryman and warden; A. D. Daley, also vestryman and warden; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dakin, faithful choir members; Rev. Dr. Ambrose, a former Rector, and Rev. Roger Viets, first Rector of the parish.

Around the huge arch which frames the chancel entrance is inscribed in beautiful script "Glory To God in the Highest" and around the rose window are the words, "Suffer Little Children to Come Unto Me". Previously the sides of the nave were inscribed on one side "This is the House of God" and on the other, "This is the Gate of Heaven", but in redecorating some years ago these were erased.

On October 16th this beautiful church will be the scene of impressive ceremonies as the parish marks the 175th anniversary of its establishment. Present for the special services marking the occasion will be Bishop Davis and other church dignitaries from the diocese of Nova Scotia and other parts of Canada and the United States.

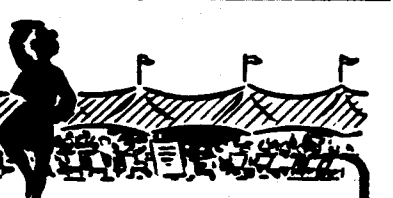

of the fire alarm system, but also the operation of call box for the Police Department. We will have the Clerk contact Mr. Marshall of the Maritime Tel. and Tel. to arrange a meeting.

Mayor: The next item is the borrowing resolution for the Department of Municipal Af-fairs of \$80,000. for the Hospital. That is, \$80,000. to be used as payment of the Town's share of building a hospital in the Town of Digby. We have to re-turn two copies for the approval of the Minister. We will have to have the resolution read and the name of the Bank and the rate of interest inserted.

Clerk: Read resolution.
Mayor: What is required to be inserted is the name of the Bank and the rate of interest which is the same in both banks 5 1/2%. Will someone move this resolution?

McKenna: I so move it be borrowed from the Royal Bank and the resolution be accepted.
VanTassel: I second it.
Mayor: Moved by McKenna and seconded by VanTassel to the effect as read by the Clerk that \$80,000. be borrowed by the way of overdraft from the Royal Bank of Canada at 5 1/2%.

Question: The resolution con-cerning the borrowing by over-draft a sum of \$80,000. from the Royal Bank of Canada at 5 1/2% for the Town's share of the construction of the new hos-pital be accepted.
Declared a vote.

Clerk: There is a letter, re-assessment from Mr. D. G. Gar-son. This is the matter of the old Post Office building. What it says is "we are in receipt of your notice of assessment for \$101,000. Please advise if this is correct."

McKenna: You have advised. Just tell them it is correct.
Clerk: That completes the correspondence with the ex-ception of the customary resolu-tion which has been given the Bank every year which has not been given to them this year.

Mayor: Will someone move that the customary Bank resolu-tion giving authority to the Mayor, our Deputy Mayor and the Town Clerk to sign cheques in the name of the Town.
Question: Customary Bank resolution be given.

Declared a vote.
Mayor: This completes the written agenda for Council. If someone will move we recess for ten minutes then perhaps the License Committee could meet.

Question: Recess for ten minutes for the purpose of hav-ing the License Committee meet.
Declared a vote.

(RECESS)
Mayor: Have the License Committee a report to make?
Woolaver: As Chairman of the License Committee I wish to report that we would have to have more time to consider the matter. We can't increase the number of licenses tonight until we look into the taxi situa-tion further and by the next Council meeting we will bring in a report that should give a definite answer. This is now the 12th of July; the next meeting will be the first day of August. I make that a resolution.

Mayor: The motion is that the License Committee bring in a report and recommendation with respect to additional licen-sed taxi drivers at the August meeting. Is there a seconder to that motion? It has been moved and seconded, now is there any discussion of this motion?

Question: The License Com-mittee meet and bring in a re-port and recommendation with respect to additional taxi licen-ses at the regular August meet-ing of the Town Council.
Declared a vote.

Mayor: We have an offer from a man, Thomas Charles Francis, for the sale of a piece of property at Jordantown which he claims contains a sizeable amount of gravel. The Superintendent, together with the Chairman of the Streets Committee, checked into the property and the deed should be submitted to the Solicitor. Mr. VanTassel, have you any report on this investigation? Did you go with Mr. Robinson to look it over?

Mr. Robinson: I was out and looked at it. There is just enough to gravel your town once. There is a house there; you could push it over.

Solicitor: There is supposed to be eight acres. It is part of the Sweeney property.
Mr. Robinson: I would like to mention about Bryant Hill down there. That is where we had the land slide there last winter. It is about two days work. If you ever have another land slide there, will they have room to get by?

Mayor: We are still with this matter of the gravel pit. Mr. Francis made an offer to the town. Does the Council wish to act on this now? Are you pre-pared to accept the Superin-tendent's report and drop the matter. I feel we should dispose of the matter.

McKenna: I so move that we inform him that we are not

interested in this piece of land at this time.

Question: As stated.

Declared a vote.
Mayor: The Superintendent of Streets has brought up this matter which I had in mind to bring up a little later on, that is the Bryant Hill. It has been brought to my attention on a couple of occasions by tourists as well as by local people. What is the Council's wish with re-spect to this?

Woolaver: I would like to make a motion that tenders be called on that job. I know the particular hill. It may run into two days and it may run into four days and I think that any-thing taking that length of time should be done by calling tenders.

Mayor: What is the nature of the work to be done?
Mr. Robinson: It would be, I imagine, three feet from the centre of the road.
Woolaver: Any further land slide ...

Mr. Robinson: You can ditch it in ten to twelve hours; push it off and widen it out. That is all there is to it.
VanTassel: I will second Councilor Woolaver's motion for discussion purposes only.

Mayor: I would like to say that it is necessary for a job like that where all our street work has been done by the Superintendent under the Streets Committee; I don't think it is necessary to call for tenders.

Woolaver: That is one way that you can look at it. The work of the town of Digby on the streets should, everyone should have a chance if there is anything to be hired. By giving tenders, it certainly shows that everyone has a chance to tender on it.

Mayor: Your motion would mean that the Superintendent of Streets would become ...
Woolaver: It means that we call tenders for the rental of equipment for two or three days.
Mayor: Are there different rates from different people?

Woolaver: I have hired quite a bit of equipment and some-times a bulldozer in one hour would cost \$8.00 and could do more than a loader could do in five or ten hours. I don't know

if it calls for a loader or a dozer.

Mr. Robinson: We could do it in three or four days with a pick and shovel if you don't want to get a dozer. You get a bulldozer you would pay him from the time you get him. They will do it when they are in the area. You get the bulldozer when he is in the area within three or four days.

Woolaver: What I was trying to get is, is it a job for a loader or a bulldozer? I don't know that. Tenders wouldn't cost anybody any money. (Further discussion)

Mayor: The motion is that tenders be called for it. The work must be described.
Woolaver: The Superintend-ent should be able to explain that more clearly than I; how many feet is it?

McKenna: Is it a street, a road or a highway?
Mayor: It is a road within the town of Digby. It does con-nect with a secondary highway, but it is not under any agree-ment with the Department of Highways. To the Pines is under agreement. The land would be owned by a Mr. Har-ris in Halifax who owns the Bryant estate. If you do any-thing on his land you should have his permission.

Mr. Robinson: We keep up the abutments. The town has had the job of also looking after it ever since it was built.
Mayor: What is your pleas-ure? Is there any further dis-cussion?

Question:
Mayor: I think to simplify it, you should say, to call for tenders for the widening of the road next to the Bryant prop-erty.
Solicitor: Don't say widening it, say improving it.

Mayor: Well, if you are going to call tenders, the Clerk will have to get together with Mr. Robinson.
(Further discussion.)

McKenna: The Superintend-ent's job is to carry out the instructions laid down by the Council. I move that this be left to the Streets Committee and they carry it the way they see fit.
Question: The matter of im-provement to the road next to the Bryant property be carried out by the Streets Committee

and handled as they see fit.

Declared a vote.
Re: Meters —
Mayor: The Police Chief re-ported at the last meeting that ten new meters were required. Mentioned that several travel-ers had visited trying to sell parking meters to the Town and explained how these would be purchased.)

Report From Parliament Hill

In last week's column I reported that the estimates of the Department of National Revenue had been passed and that the House was proceeding to deal with those of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Since the CBC estimates and those of the Board of Broadcast Governors have both been carried by the Commons and it is my turn to sit back and watch the other Ministers shepherd their departmental figures past the shepherds who sit on the Opposition benches.

There were no changes in any of the estimates for the Department, the Corporation, on the Board, for which I report to parliament. There was, however, a suggestion by Douglas Fisher, Member of Parliament for Port Arthur, that the C.C.F. group in the House had given "very serious consideration, just as a gesture of disapproval, to moving that the estimates of the Board of Broadcast Governors be reduced to one dollar".

I advised Mr. Fisher that in my opinion this showed grave irresponsibility on the part of his group because his charges against persons of the integrity of Dr. Andrew Stewart and his associates on that Board were based on innuendo and rumour and entirely without fact or foundation.

The criticism of the B.B.G. was largely directed by the Honourable Member for Bonaville-Twillingate, J. W. Pickersgill, and by Lionel Chevrier, in the Member for Laurier, on behalf of the Liberals, and by

Mr. Fisher on behalf of the C.C.F. They questioned the recommendations by the Board for television licences, particularly in Toronto, Edmonton, Halifax, and Ottawa. They tried to make out a case that the Board's recommendations had been political but ignored the fact that Mr. Grattan O'Leary, the Editor of the Ottawa Journal, had been passed over in Ottawa and that the C.B.C. had been given the recommendation in Edmonton where a number of Conservatives had been associated with four competing groups there. This is one of the unfortunate aspects in dealing in innuendo and rumour, that it can reflect on Canadians who are trying sincerely to do a public service job.

For the sake of the records, I would like to repeat here one paragraph of what I said in the House on the afternoon of Wednesday, July 13:

"I stand here this afternoon and say that Canada can be very proud of its Board of Broadcast Governors and the fact that we have Canadian citizens like Dr. Stewart and his associates on that Board who are prepared to assume the responsibilities that they have assumed, and who deserve some credit and praise, although they never expect to get it, rather than criticism based on misleading rumours and propaganda."

However, despite all the criticism aimed at the B.B.G. by three Opposition Members, one of them Mr. Pickersgill, did me a favour and that is like him occasionally by asking me in the House when I was going to give television coverage to the constituency of Digby, Annapolis and Kings. With an understanding smile he added, "I know it would be an embarrassing thing for him to ask himself."

This good-natured and helpful query enabled me to put on the record the following answer, which I add here for the edification of members of my constituency:

"Well, Mr. Chairman, the constituency of Digby, Annapolis and Kings does receive television coverage from private stations which are affiliated with the C.B.C. in Saint John. Part of my constituency receives television coverage from the C.B.C. station in Halifax. That depends on contours. In the little town in which I live the people who live on the hill

receive excellent service from C.B.C., Halifax, but those living down where I live at the foot of the hill do not receive it at all. If I were a Private Member sitting in this House and someone else were standing in my place, I would be urging that improved coverage be given to the banner constituency of Digby, Annapolis and Kings so it would have the coverage it deserves. Modesty, of course, and my sense of responsibility toward all hon. members dictate that I have to look after their needs before pressing on the corporation the demands of my own constituency.

Some of the forward planning of the B.B.G. also was brought before the Commons in inquiries about the setting up of a second television network in Canada. It is now common knowledge that the licensees and prospective licensees of the new second television stations met in Winnipeg on Sunday and Monday, July 17 and 18 to discuss the putting together of an application for such a network at a public hearing by the B.B.G. in Ottawa on September 1 and 2.

In this connection, I was happy to quote to the House an extract from an editorial which appeared on the editorial page of the Toronto Globe and Mail on July 9, 1960. After referring to the possible establishment of the new network and the danger arising from domination of the private network by Toronto and Montreal, making it local instead of national in its policies and presentation, the editorial concluded:

"The B.B.G. rulings are designed to avoid this; they would spread control across Canada, and so encourage television production across Canada. The B.B.G. is to be applauded for its foresight. It has gone the full distance to ensure that the new network will not only be national, but will serve the national interest."

Taken all in all, it was an interesting debate even though it did not deal too much in fact but rather in fantasy. Both the C.B.C. and the B.B.G. came through it with their feathers ruffled a bit but with their wings uncuffed. The President of the C. B. C., Alphonse Cuiet, and two of his officials sat on chairs in front of me during the discussion of the C.B.C. estimates, and Dr. Andrew Stewart and one of his officials took over the same positions during consideration of the B.B.G. estimates.

There is no clear idea yet as to when Parliament will adjourn. Various dates keep cropping up as educated guesses but there is still much work to do including the consideration of estimates as well as new legislation. Fortunately, the weather in Ottawa this July has been quite pleasant, a welcome change from the heat and the humidity of last summer.

Officers and men of the West Nova Scotia Regiment from many centres in the Annapolis Valley and South Shore are well into their week's summer training at Camp Aldershot.

Arriving here over the weekend under the command of Lt. Col. C. A. Eaves, commanding officer of the famed unit, the regiment is the largest unit in camp.

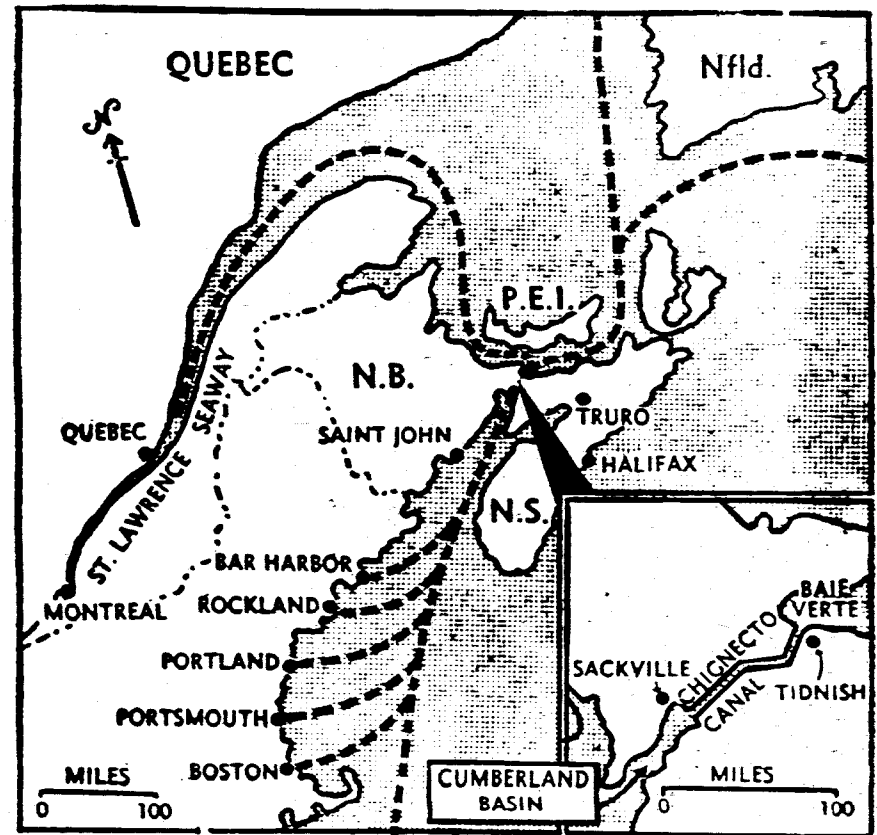

Counting The Cost

Some states have appointed commissions to study and to estimate the approximate cost of drunkenness and care for the victims of drink: police, courts, jails, hospitals, aid to dependent children and rehabilitation. Conservative estimates indicate a minimum cost of \$3 for each \$1 collected in taxes from the industry. These are the direct costs only and do not include cost of accidents, broken homes, etc.

One major American city has furnished the following record of one individual case, a 54 year old alcoholic addict who was jailed 285 times in 32 years. He has some working skills, but prefers to be drunk to working. His cost to the city to date: Police and court costs, \$60; per sentence — \$17,000; Jail keep, \$2.86 per day — \$26,873; Hospital care for D.T. (delirium tremens, and alcohol withdrawal disorder), \$1,400; Total — \$45,273; Less fines paid, \$510; Net cost to date, \$44,833.

Though this is undoubtedly an extreme case, it illustrates the cost of alcohol addiction, not only to society but to the individual as this person's life is totally useless.

Problems on Recovery from Alcoholism

Alcoholism is generally accepted as an illness, although it cannot be compared directly with such diseases as pneumonia or tuberculosis. It is not caused by the action of a germ or virus in the body. Except in general terms, it is difficult to identify a set of symptoms which is common to all suffering from the disorder.

All alcoholics drink in an uncontrolled fashion although the quantity they consume and their degree of loss of control may vary widely. During the progression of the disorder, all use alcohol for purposes of self-gratification frequently at non-conscious level. All experience complications associated with uncontrolled drinking which, on a logical basis, should convince them, from direct experience, that they must eliminate alcohol from their lives. Yet they continue drinking which further complicates an already disturbed and precarious existence.

Alcoholism is a chronic condition accompanied by intermittent acute episodes. It is difficult in many cases to determine specifically the point at which the symptoms of the illness become established. In retrospect, this identification can be made, although often only on a superficial level. It is usually characterized by denials from the drinker that anything is wrong, accompanied by rising anxiety in the family. When an acute phase is reached and the patient for the first time accepts medical help, there is a feeling that now the problem is solved, there will be no more drinking following recovery from the immediate effects of the last spree. The patient, too, having acknowledged his condition, may feel that he has learned a lesson and that he is now ready to do something constructive about his situation.

Recovery from alcoholism is an extremely difficult and prolonged process for every alcoholic. For the family, it can be a period of fluctuating hope and anxiety. The emotional scars, accumulated through the years of contending with an alcoholic in the family, do not disappear because he has accepted treatment and maintained sobriety for a few weeks, or even months.

Report From Parliament Hill

July 25, 1960

This is being dictated on Monday morning, much to everyone's surprise, the House of Commons is still in session and the Provincial Premiers are gathered downstairs for the opening of the Dominion Provincial Conference within a few minutes. Many months ago, the cabinet in discussing this matter decided that it would be perfectly safe to have the Dominion-Provincial Conference open at this time because the House of Commons would probably close by at least the end of June. But the end is at least ten days away, and in the meantime Parliament and the Conference will be sitting in the same building at the same time.

Certainly more drastic action will have to be taken next year to streamline the rules of the House and eliminate much of the waste of time which has taken place this year. Hours and hours have been wasted in repetitive questions and debates on points of order which prevented the House from dealing with the more important business which is supposed to consider. The Rules Committee in its report this session recommended that a similar Committee be set up next year with authority to carefully review all of the procedure of the House and I am sure this is one recommendation which will be thankfully accepted by everyone.

Of course, the House now is making real progress. Last week a good part of the time was spent upon the estimates of the Department of Public Works under the Minister, the Honourable David Walker. This was the first time that he had appeared in the Committees of Supply to pilot through his estimates, and everyone knew that he would have rather a rocky road. Two years ago when

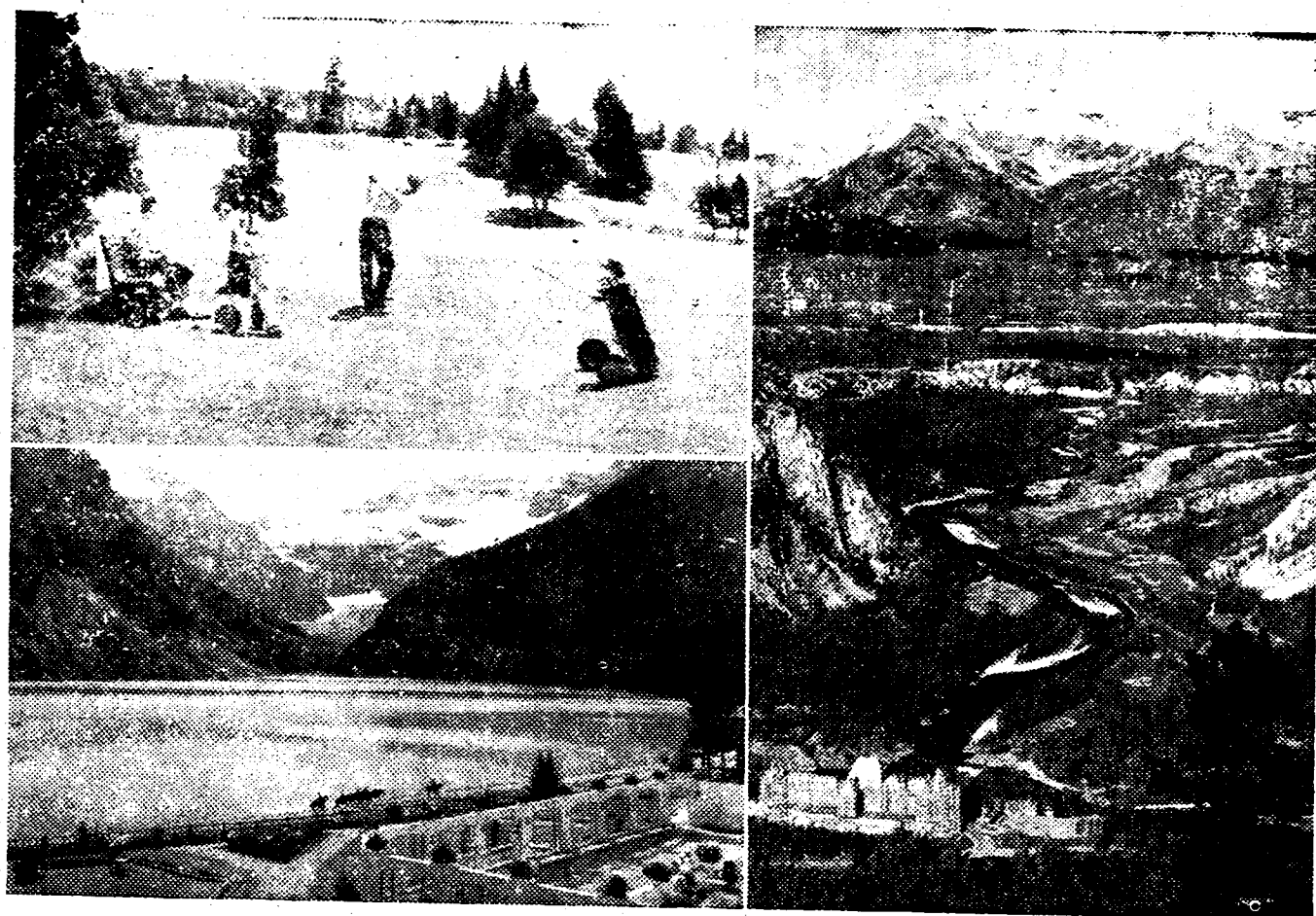

Abusing A Good Thing

Someone has suggested that a commission should be appointed to investigate the operations of unemployment insurance. There is ample evidence that this public service is being abused. It was instituted solely for temporary assistance of persons who were out of employment through no fault of their own. But no less an authority than Richard D. Thresher, parliamentary secretary to Labor Minister Starr, declares that the list of registered applicants is no longer a register of genuinely employed persons who are actively seeking work. Some, he says, are registered only for the purpose of obtaining benefits.

Although it is my own personal opinion that there is a responsibility on the state to assist those who through no fault of their own are not able to obtain employment," says Mr. Thresher, "if we are to protect our unemployment insurance system as an insurance scheme we must beware of an attitude that would regard the fund as a panacea for any and all sorts of financial needs and that benefits should be paid to all persons who are not working, regardless of the duration of their unemployment or the circumstances that gave rise to it."

The present system was introduced to take the stigma out of the old "dole" or "relief" payments. But the unemployment insurance fund has drifted away from its original purpose of providing temporary assistance to needy jobless. It is said to be frequently regarded as a source of supplementary income, rather than a means of alleviating hardship for those who are unable to find work.

From my own limited knowledge of these things, I have known of a case where a so-called "self-employed" person, a farmer, supplemented his income by registering as out of work in intervals between one contract job and another. I am told that the unemployment offices in Toronto are crowded with women of all ages, many of them recent immigrants, who are only seeking work in order to qualify for unemployment insurance. I am not trying to belittle the unemployment situation; it is probably bad enough, but it is being worsened by the abuse of this insurance system, which was only intended as a temporary relief from the stress of genuine unemployment.

It should be remembered that the fund is maintained by regular premiums paid out of wages by all workers supplemented by payments by their employers. The insurance is similar to fire or accident insurance. No insurance company would last very long if it had to meet the accident claims of all and sundry who paid premiums sporadically and were repeatedly running into accidents. They would be struck off the rolls as too great a risk. It would be interesting to discover what proportion of the present unemployment figures is represented by these out of work malingers.

Brochure On Available Craft

This is one of the biggest "fish stories" ever to come out of Nova Scotia.

Deep sea fishing, a millionaire's sport in every respect except cost, is fast becoming one of the province's greatest tourist attractions.

Because of the increasing interest in the salt water sport, the Nova Scotia Travel Bureau has recently published its first brochure on available charter craft in some 48 centres throughout the province. These vessels are fully equipped and rigged to do battle with the a-

bundant supply of game fish found in the waters off the coast.

You don't need a licence to fish in Nova Scotia waters nor do you need your own fishing gear.

A number of the 73 boats listed in the Travel Bureau brochure have equipment for rent for those who don't own or haven't brought their gear to the province for their visit.

The brochure includes the names of the masters, where they may be contacted, and the sizes of their boats. The boats range from 20 to 112 feet in length.

All boats listed are subject to government regulations under the Federal Department of Transport.

The masters have all passed examinations and hold temporary master's certificates, and these skippers know the local waters "like the back of their hands".

Rates for charter or hire of the boats vary, depending on location. They range from \$25 to \$50 a day depending, in part, on the boat and the number of persons in the party. Boats may also be hired by the hour or half-day.

The Travel Bureau, again for the first time, has distributed a sports fishing boat log to all masters of the charter craft.

These will enable the captain to keep a record of the passengers, the type, number and weights of fish caught by each, and the hours spent at sea.

These statistics will be forwarded to the Travel Bureau for compilation of record catches and for use as tourist information on Nova Scotia's fastest growing sport.

A Great Achievement

To forget self is to be of greatest value to others. This goal is not easy to attain. It is far more common to defend self-pride, to indulge in self-pity, to be oversensitive and long and easily hurt. It is the aim of many to get everything possible for themselves, even if they have to walk over others to do it. Quite thoughtlessly, it is possible to drift into the evil of making an idol out of self, then the next step is to offer everything to the pleasure of that idol.

Selfishness is at the root of all vice. Someone has noticed that the "I" of the famous pronoun is at the centre of the word "sin".

There is a refreshing story of a small boy who was asked to donate blood to his sister who was ill. He consented without question, but became very quiet and meditative. At the close of the transfusion he was told to sit up. "But don't I have to die?" he replied. Then it dawned on those around that no one had told the boy that he wouldn't have to give all his blood to his sister. The point is that he was willing and ready, however, to die for her. The third annual Institute for Hospital Personnel sponsored by the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission, will be held at the Victoria General Hospital nurses residence September 21-22. It was announced today by Provincial Health Minister R. A. Donahoe, QC.

Purpose of the institute, as in the two previous years, will be to keep the 48 member-hospitalists informed of the latest developments in the plans of the Insurance Commission, to discuss hospital problems and to encourage improvement of standards of patient care.

Permission was granted on Monday night to the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Co. to erect a telephone pay station at the corner of Birch and Prince William Sts. Permission was also granted Vernon Everett to renovate his dwelling on King St. by the addition of a veranda.

No serious fire damage in town during the month was reported by the Fire Committee but it was reported that a volunteer group from the Digby Fire Department helped to fight the fire at the Municipal Home in Marshalltown. The civil defence truck was used for this purpose.

It was decided that no further tax licenses be granted in the town and that the figure remain at fourteen.

It may be remembered that Canada does not have a written constitution to the same extent as do some other countries, for instance, the United States. What we do have is the framework for a constitution by which certain powers are given to the Federal Government and certain powers to These have been amplified and developed by Federal and Provincial statutes, as well as by Court decisions. This framework is contained within the British North America Act, which is a statute passed by the Parliament of the United Kingdom. Every time we wish to have an amendment to this Act it is necessary to go to the Parliament at Westminster. Probably Canada is the only country in the modern world which does not have the power

The second problem - the fiscal one - also arises out of the British North America Act. Under that Act the Provinces are restricted only to imposing "direct taxation." This means of course, a tax which is paid

These agreements come to an end on the last day of March 1962. The problem before the Dominion-Provincial Conference is to decide what form they shall take in the future. All the Provinces are demanding more money. Some of the Provinces are urging the Dominion Government to vacate these fields entirely, turning the revenues over to the Provinces and let-

All of the original Provinces, including Nova Scotia, have been jealous of their provincial


economy and wary of any change in the constitution. The leading autonomist has been the Province of Quebec, and since its Premier has now taken the lead in this matter, the situation is more hopeful than it has been at any time in the past.

Report Of Construction Committee Of Bear River Swimming Pool

With the purchase price of the property and the cost of previous work done at the site using all but \$246. of the monies raised last year by public contributions, your committee met on July 4th, at the site and decided to attempt to construct a suitable swimming area by using a tractor dozer for excavating and building an earthwork retaining wall.

The services of a tractor dozer and operator were obtained and work was started on July 6th. When 20 hours of dozing had been completed and our funds on hand depleted, your committee decided, whereas it was apparent that this operation could be successful, to continue the operation until a suitable swimming area would be assured. We therefore made arrangements that were satisfactory to the dozer owner, whereby he would complete the dozer work and await our raising of the balance within a reasonable time.

After the dozer work was completed volunteer workmen and tractors donated by interested citizens graded the area in preparation for gravelling. With the grading work completed another force of volunteer workmen with a loader and four trucks worked all day on Thursday, July 21, hauling and spreading gravel which has made the pool much more attractive place for swimming or sun bathing. Further work was done on the following evening when another force of volunteer help and equipment removed rocks from the surrounding area as well as opening the water intake channel into the river which started the water running into the pool, and after the pool filled, has twice been drained in order to ensure the cleanliness of the water.

The construction of the drainage system, the spillway, the intake area, the temporary spring board, etc., have all been done by your committee and volunteer help. Protective measures are being taken to ensure that these efforts will not be destroyed by spring freshets.

Your committee wishes to express their appreciation to all who have contributed in any way to the successful construction of this pool and particularly the owners of trucks, loaders and tractors without whose help the job would have been more costly and required much more time.

As at present your committee requires an additional \$600 in order that all expenses may be paid.

Your committee is pleased to note that upwards of 100 children and adults are enjoying the swimming at the pool each fine day and we sincerely hope that from this start, with the help of more volunteer labour we can continue to improve the pool site and then the surrounding area which we believe, with the co-operation of the citizens, can be made into one of the most attractive and useful parks in the Province.

Eddie, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Cartier (nee Eleanor Warrington) was thrilled to think he was fortunate enough to find the bottle here when visiting for only a few days. Eddie will return the card contained in the bottle to the Institute and will then be informed where the bottle was set adrift. The young finder, who is 13 years of age and entering his Junior High School year, is excited about taking his find back to his school companions and teachers and have a geography lesson following the course of the bottle and the ocean currents which effected the course.

The bottle was one of several hundred released to study ocean currents by the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, Fish and Wildlife Service and Fisheries Research Board of Canada.

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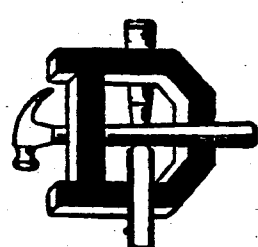
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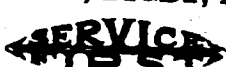

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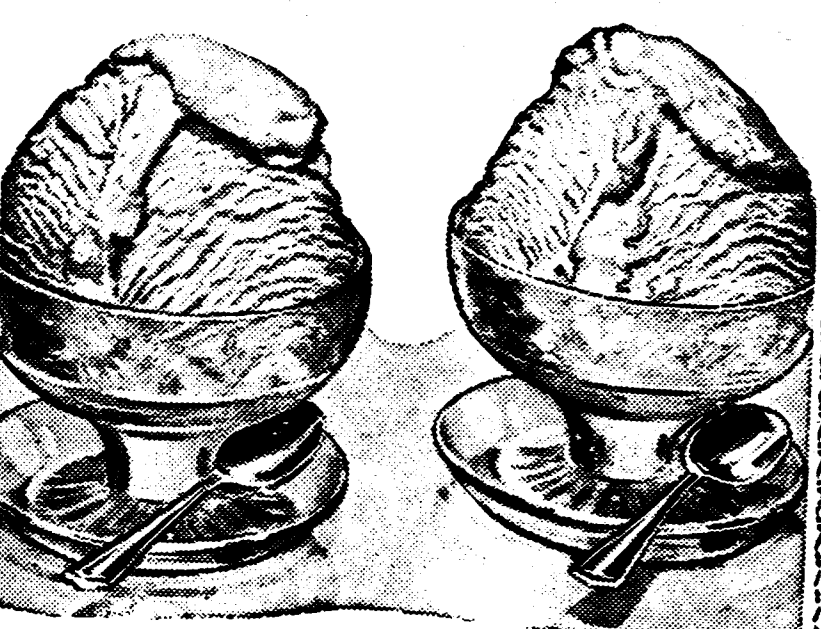

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Opening Notice - Digby Public Schools

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Wednesday, September 7th, 1960, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1960-61, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of October, 1960. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 24th, to Tuesday, August 30th, between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 a.m. and from 2:00 to 4:30 p.m. daily, except for Saturday.

Students from the Islands seeking admission to the Grade XII Academic or Commercial classes must have applications approved by the Digby Municipal School Board prior to September 1st. Requests for application forms should be addressed to F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S., prior to August 21st. Immediate application will expedite approval from the Municipal School Board. Weymouth Area students are eligible for admission to Grade XII Commercial on application as above.

Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

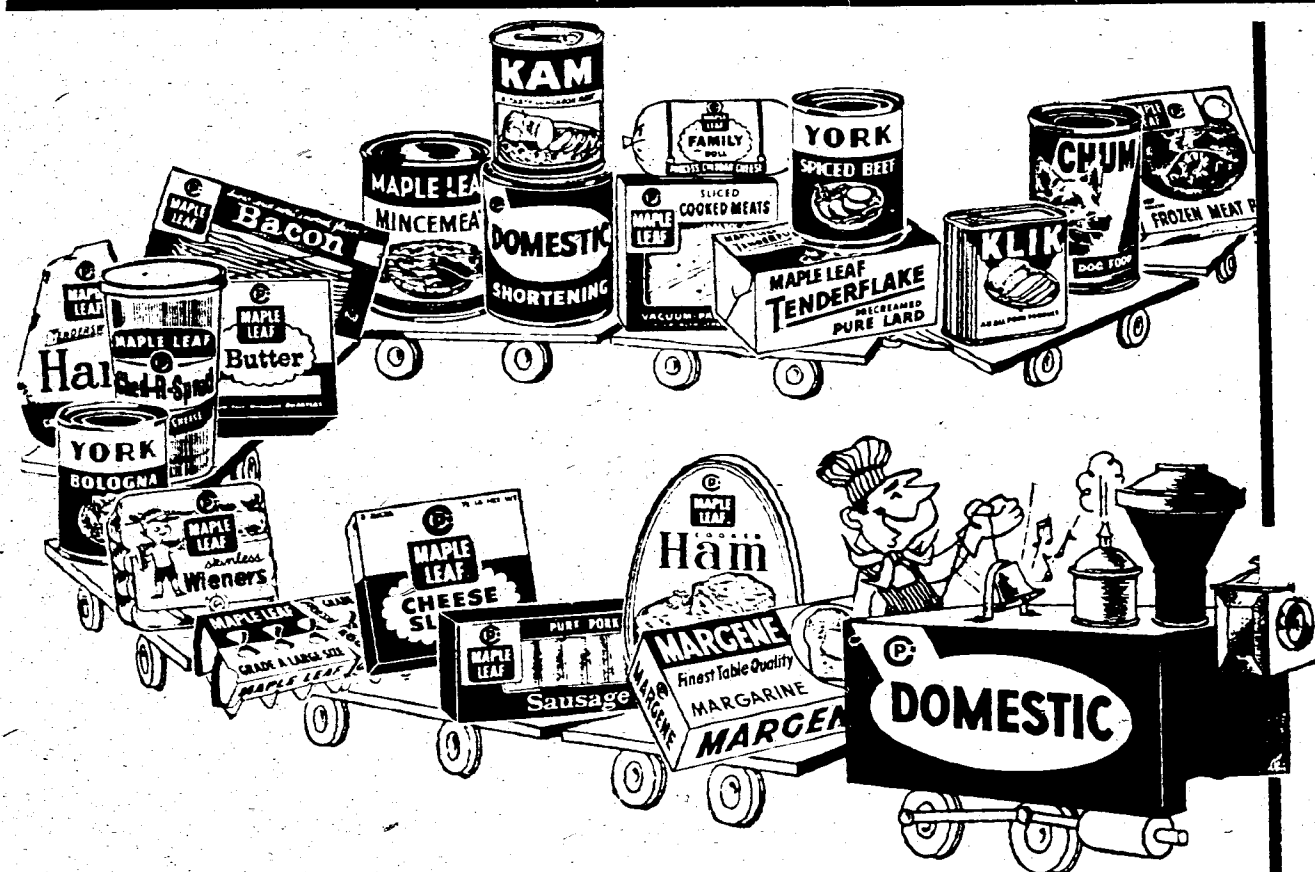

New Inspector Meets Boards

Mr. C. E. Edwards, Bridge-town school inspector for Annapolis County, who recently has added to his inspectorial district the municipality of Digby, met Monday evening with the Digby board of school commissioners and the Digby regional high school board. Mr. Edwards took over as school inspector for the municipality after a recent redistribution of inspectorial districts following the retirement of C. W. Crowell, former inspector of schools for Digby and Yarmouth municipalities.

Mr. Edwards who was introduced by Digby school supervisor, F. C. Purdy, expressed his pleasure at meeting the boards and he looked forward to his association with education in Digby municipality.

Following his introductory remarks Mr. Edwards spoke at some length regarding the new arrangements for supervision of feeder schools in consolidated school areas and provision of principals for school units. He said these regulations were permissive in nature and allowed the various school boards to make such appointments with the provincial government sharing in the salary costs.

Mr. Edwards stated increasing importance is being placed on the role of the supervisor and principal in the education program. This is particularly so, he said, in the case of feeder schools whose pupils later become students of a central school. A program in which a supervisor works with the teachers in these feeder schools to help in the development of a standard program can be most effective in improving standards and assisting the pupils as they move on to the central school, he said.

Digby school supervisor, F. C. Purdy, reported all staff positions in the regional high school, the primary and elementary schools in Digby have been filled. He stated all schools would open September 7th with a preschool staff conference slated for September 6th.

Mr. Purdy, in reporting for the regional school, stated he was most happy with the results of the provincial examinations as they affected pupils from the regional school. He said that in Grade XII 79% of those writing the exams had secured a complete pass. The percentage of complete passes and those eligible to pass by writing supplementary examinations was 93%, he said. In Grade XI, Mr. Purdy said, 63% of those writing had secured full passes. The percentage of those who secured full passes and who are eligible for a pass by writing supplementary examinations was 91.5%. The pass average for the Digby regional high school was above the provincial average. Mr. Purdy said. He said the teaching staff deserved special commendation, particularly in view of the fact the school operated short staffed all year and with a heavy absenteeism because of staff illness. This was covered, he said, by staff personnel and no substitutes were used.

Fair Grosses Over \$3,000

Although a full financial report of the proceeds of the recent Digby General Hospital Fair is not yet available, it was learned this week that gross returns for this year's fair were \$3,017.61.

The fair committee is planning publication of a financial statement as soon as this is available.

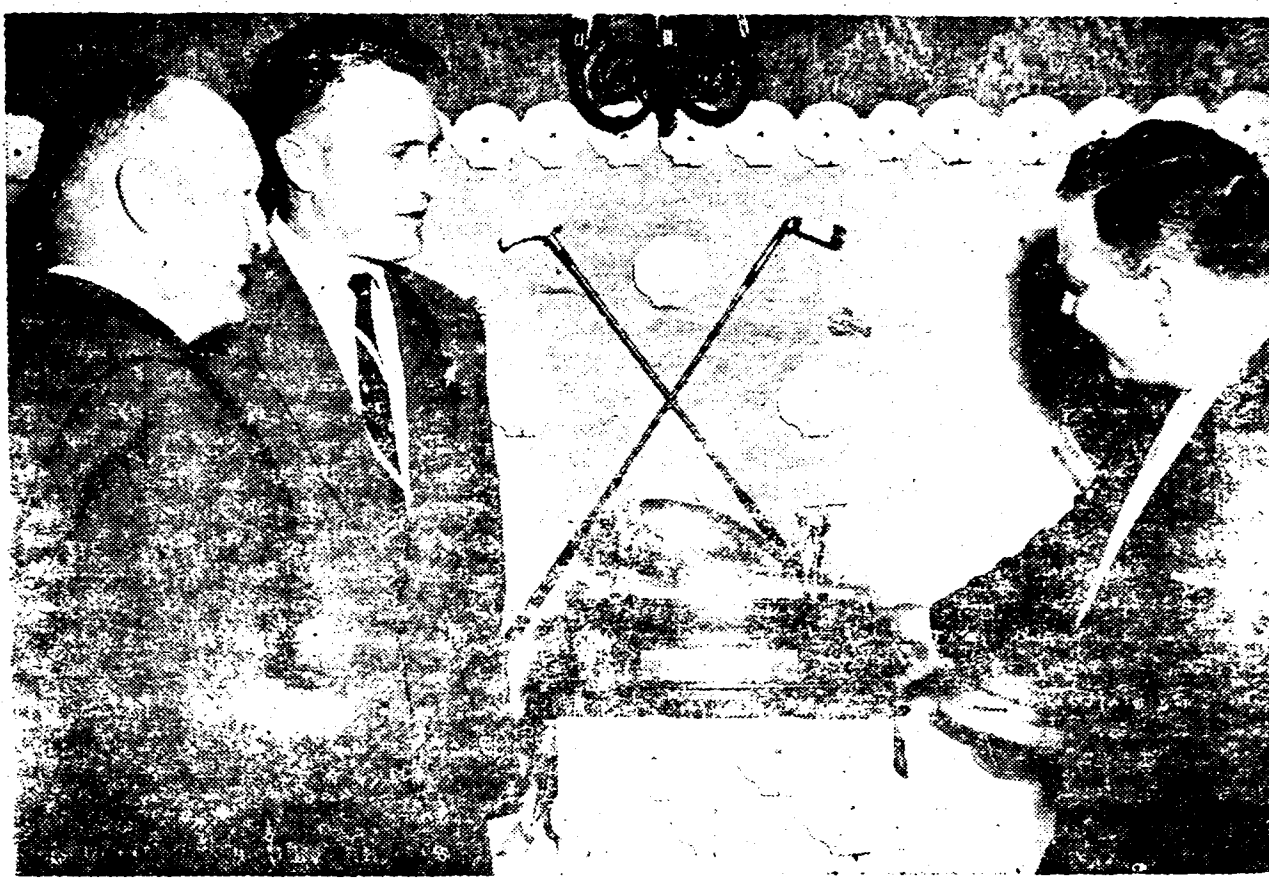

Water Shortage Serious

Due to continued dry weather a serious water problem is developing in Digby. It was stated yesterday by Digby water commission chairman, H. Milton Turnbull.

Mr. Turnbull stated that while the problem has not reached the acute stage, the level of water at Lily Lake, the town's source of supply, is dangerously low.

He said cooperation of town residents in curtailing water usage has slowed down the rate of drop in the lake water level but, due to the lack of rain, the level was still dropping steadily.

The water shortage problem in Digby was worsened, Mr. Turnbull revealed, when a break occurred near the bottom of a storage dam at the lake, resulting in the loss of a sizeable reserve supply of water. This break has now been repaired, he said, but the water stored in the dam has been lost.

Mr. Turnbull stated every effort would be made to secure the continued cooperation of the public in curtailing water usage. If the dry weather continues, he said, it might be necessary to impose more rigid restrictions on water usage in order to conserve the rapidly dwindling supply.

He stated that, although the present situation could not be termed "acute", a fire requiring a heavy usage of water to extinguish could place the town in a most serious and dangerous situation so far as water supply is concerned.

Salesmen Active In Area

Addresses Convention

The integration of power systems in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will result in a \$20,000,000 saving in capital expenditure, Nelson Mann, executive vice-president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, said Tuesday.

Speaking to the 25th annual meeting of the Canadian Institute of Plumbing and Heating, Mr. Mann said integration of the power systems of both provinces was an APEC-born idea and the group's "most spectacular" accomplishment. The power grid goes into operation next month. It will also mean a greater and cheaper service for the consumer.

He was outlining the various accomplishments of APEC during its first five years of operation.

Mr. Mann told delegates that a basic knowledge of good management whether in business, labor or government must be realized for the future success of the region.

"Our problems must be defined clearly and their solution can only be achieved if we face the problem squarely and honestly,"

He said the training of people in good management techniques has just begun and must be expanded. It was one of APEC's most important projects.

Of the four committees formed at the first meeting of APEC's directors five years ago, electric power, agriculture, trade and tourism, only the tourism committee has failed to get off the ground, the delegates were informed.

"There appears to be some obstacle, difficult to define, that keeps those interested in promoting this potentially great economic stimulator from availing themselves of the support APEC is capable and waiting — to provide," Mr. Mann explained.

The realization that "self help" was probably the most important single factor leading to a better standard of living for the people of the Atlantic region was the first concrete accomplishment of APEC, he stated.

The trade committee has instilled in the region's merchandisers a new appreciation of the great possibilities in the north. A water cargo service from east coast ports to Goose Bay has been established, and considerable additional traffic has resulted for Maritime Central Airways.

In addition, three large Atlantic products shows have been held, and in one instance a firm enjoyed a gross sales volume increase of more than 400%.

APEC's five year research plan he went on, has resulted in an outstanding analysis of the economy of the region by economic sector, "probably the most important document in its field to be published in many years." It was produced by the APEC research office at the University of New Brunswick.

"One role we have is to urge that we pull our weight with the other regions of Canada. To date, the founders of APEC can look at our concrete results as worthwhile achievements of APEC's first five years," said Mr. Mann.

This issue of The Digby Courier marks another milestone in the history of the publication. But by and large it will be found that a weekly paper has one purpose above all others — to serve its community and its people and aim toward betterment for both. To Learn Of Maritimers

Boston city school children will learn of Maritimers and the contribution which they have made to American life and to the world in general. Boston children will hear of Digby, for among the Maritimers they will hear about are the sea writer, Evelyn Eaton, and the inventor, Thomas A. Edison.

The book from which the Boston students will learn of the Maritimers is "Imprint of the Maritimes", by J. Ernest Kerr. The announcement was made by the chairman of the Boston School Committee, John J. Tierney Jr. The book will be put into use when the fall term opens in September. It is said by Mr. Tierney to be the only book of its type available and had been previously approved by the official screening committee of the school department.

Although born and educated in Boston, the author's association with the Maritimes and its people has been constant. Mr. Kerr's parents were born in Nova Scotia, he enlisted in World War I in New Brunswick battalion and married a girl from Prince Edward Island. Publishers of the "Imprint of the Maritimes" are Christopher Publishing House in Boston, at 1140 Columbus Avenue.

Evelyn Eaton who is included among the Maritimers is known personally in Digby and more particularly Victoria Beach where she has come from New York to spend her summers. She is well known for her writings which center around the Bay of Fundy scene including "Quietly My Captain Waits".

The Maritime claim of inventor Thomas A. Edison is that his father, Samuel Edison Jr., was born near Digby in the early nineteenth century.

The introduction of Maritimers to Boston children through "Imprint of the Maritimes" can have far reaching effects with the younger generation. It can help in keeping alive the spirit of goodwill between the United States and Canada and publicize the Maritimes for tourist trade and merchandizing. Further it can impress on the youthful minds the contribution which Maritimers have made to the New England States and further affirm and give just recognition to such contribution.

Fall Exhibitions

This week sees the Annapolis County Exhibition at Lawrencetown opened in all its glory and on time to attract tourists who happen to be travelling in this vicinity at the height of the tourist season. Later exhibitions, like the Digby County Exhibition on September 7, 8 and 9, at Bear River, provide an attraction to bring visitors here at a later date and thereby help to stretch out the tourist season.

However, tourist patronage was not the original plan or is stated as the object of fall fairs and for the most part all exhibitors in the province keep to the original purpose of promoting local products and improving livestock for general farming. These farmers see the latest developments in farm machinery, they discuss the prize breeds of cattle, the finest of the harvest of the soil. Every farmer goes home with a bit more added to his knowledge on farming and filled with enthusiasm for the coming year.

The fall exhibitions also cater to the womenfolk. There is the handicraft, the cooking, the preserving and other features which lend to the talent particular to women. Children, too, find an outlet for their energies in displays of school work, crafts and other talent. They view the exhibits of others and are encouraged to improve on their own.

But all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy, so the fairs in late years have added features of entertainment. Meals are provided, too, when friends can get together and talk over olden times or look into the future while enjoying an all too frequent, for some, "eating-out".

All these features and more will be found at the Digby County Exhibition in September. For promoting the Digby County fair for this year, in particular, we want to pay a well earned tribute to Mr. Howard Yorke, Bear River. There have been others who have preceded Mr. Yorke in the Digby County Exhibition management and their accomplishments have been and are acknowledged. Mr. Yorke has his helpers whom he appreciates and to whom we also would show our appreciation. But when a man writes hundreds of letters from a hospital bed to promote a cause, when from a wheel chair at home he takes care of detailed business for the fair, and when with crutches in hand and foot in cast he hobbles over pebble and stone to make personal calls in a great many villages of the county, then such a man deserves special recognition. Such a man is Mr. Yorke. This is not Mr. Yorke's first attempt at managing the Digby County Exhibition. He has had several years of experience but since the exhibition of 1959, someone in Mr. Yorke's family has been almost continuously ill, in hospital with broken bones or other reason. The last calamity was when he himself fell from a staging in early summer and suffered a broken leg. Mr. Yorke entered the Victoria General Hospital again on Tuesday of this week for attention to his injuries. He hopes to be out on time to care for last minute details of the exhibition. We wish for him the best and we ask, when one man does so much to promote an exhibition, shouldn't thousands attend to see what he has done?

Father & Son Drown

A 45-year-old Saint John man and his two-year-old son, drowned Sunday afternoon at Dartmouth Island near Hampton, N. B., when the child fell from a boat and his father tried to save him.

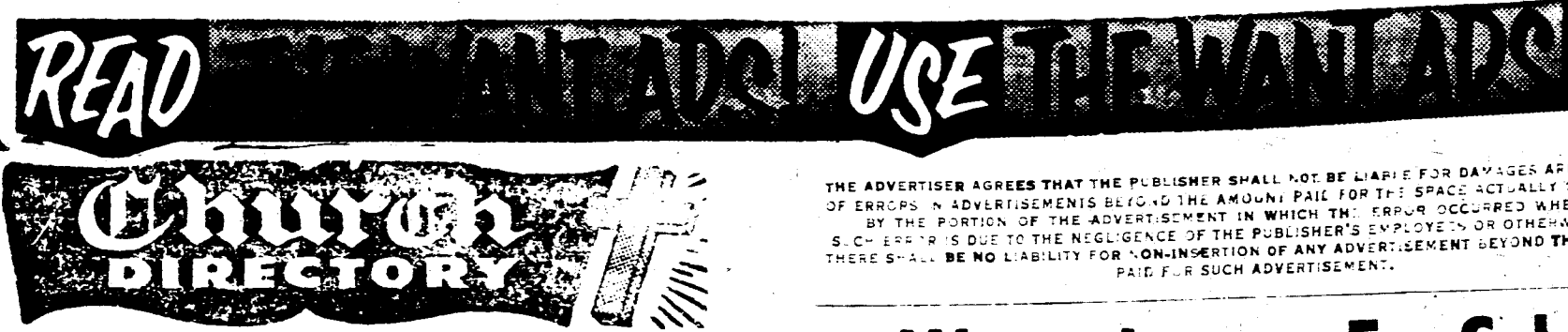

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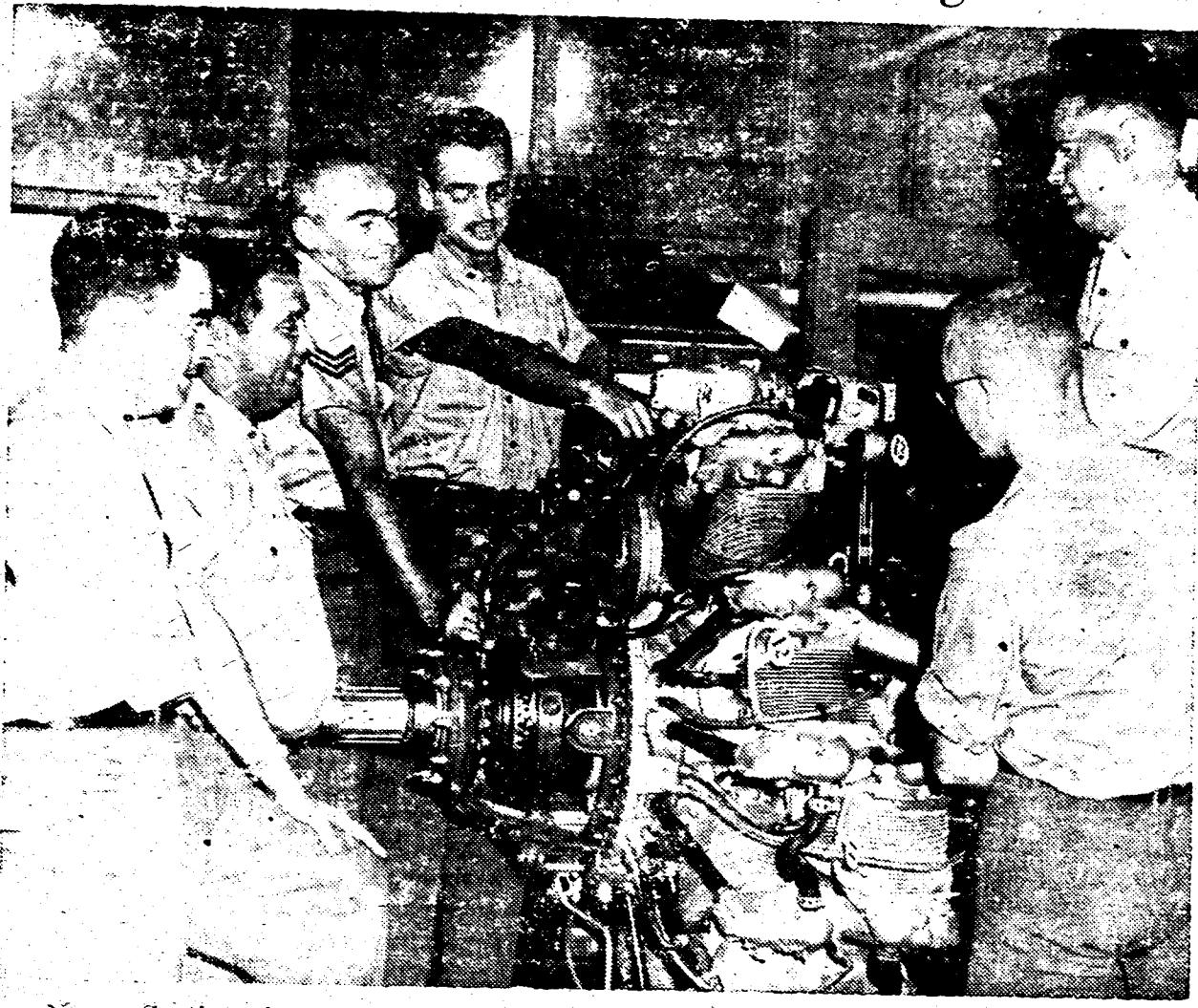

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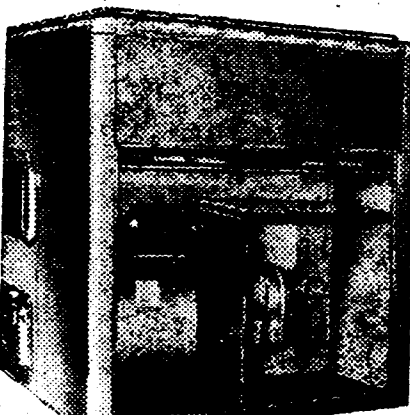

The Editor,
The Digby Courier.

I am filled with admiration at the tenacity shown by the President and the Secretary of the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society in protesting the proposed abolition of the Water Street boulevard and the trees adorning it. Also I admire the Courier's editorial reminding the two ladies that progress must not be interfered with by beauty. This, when I see front lawns on the streets, is a state of mind quite understandable.

However regrettable it would be to deprive our visitors, and of course our local bums, of the chance to sit and rest and look out upon the thousands of pleasure craft weaving back and forth upon the waters of our lovely Basin, before I refer to the visitors, not the waters) moving on to spend their delectable dollars in our various stores, more money Arthur must continue to be our watchword, and so space must be given to these spendthrift Americans to park their cars. Otherwise they may take them to Annapolis and we lost out.

Therefore, beauty must go! After all, it really doesn't matter about those trees, for whenever you look at them you realize that each tree has been so hacked by our barbarians that it now resembles, not a tree, but an ugly letter Y, so there's not much lost in cutting them down. To have the hydro in the middle of the front street is more important than to have trees. Progress must go on.

My suggestion to our City Fathers, which of course they will spurn, is to not altogether deprive us of our boulevard, sitting place and view over the Basin, but to narrow the grass plot to about three feet, plant the same to bright flowers, interspersed between seats and very young trees, and keep the strip refreshingly green. The argument that the trees hinder trucks using the street would have no force, for it would take years for these saplings to interfere with anything, and in the meantime, both citizens and visitors could enjoy the boulevard.

If we desire to have Digby a sort of pig-sty into which outsiders enter expectantly (because of its appearance from the water) and from which they depart with some such expression as "glad to get away from that dump" all we have to do is to look with scorn on the efforts of the fanatical ladies, and the few fanatical men who make up the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society, and give them as little support as possible. If, on the other hand, we desire Digby to be a town into which visitors enter with pleasure and from which they depart with the hope that they come again, we can have that desire fulfilled by giving our support to those who are striving to bring that state into being.

Payzant Golden Wedding

Two lines of French Huguenot descent were joined when on August 16, 1910, Miss Mary P. Payson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter W. Payson, of Deep Brook, became the bride of the Rev. Arthur S. Payzant, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Y. Payzant, of Halifax. The French lines traced back through the bride's mother and the groom's father, to ancestors who had left France for the English Channel Isle of Jersey near together and just in time to escape death in the infamous Massacre of St. Bartholomew's Eve, when so many Protestants were murdered. A further migration brought them to the New World, the Payzants to Nova Scotia and the Journeys to Staten Island, N. Y. Records and family tradition indicate that the groom's ancestress of that date was a sister of General Moltcaim, of Canadian history and was also the heroine of a well-known episode in Nova Scotia annals.

Mr. and Mrs. Payzant met at Dalhousie University, Halifax, where he graduated in 1905 and received his M.A. in 1906, while she, after doing the course in three years, graduated in 1907. The marriage in 1910 was solemnized in St. Matthew's Church, Deep Brook. Mr. Payzant took his bride to Erie, Pa., where he was Vicar, and later became the first Rector of Trinity Church. A few years later they moved to East Cleveland, Ohio, where he was rector of St. Paul's Church for almost 16 years, with a remarkable growth in the parish necessitating the addition of a large parish house to care for the Church School especially, as well as other growing parish activities. Beverly, Mass., became their next home, where a new church and parish house were built. Ten years later Mr. Payzant became Associate Rector of Emmanuel Church, Boston. His parish ministry ended with the Church of the Advent, Medfield, Mass., where he was installed out of parish work after 40 years of ordained ministry, being limited since then to temporary substitution and assisting. He has officiated frequently at Trinity Church, Digby, in Annapolis, and in the parish of Clement, as well as in New Orleans and elsewhere.

During all the years Mrs. Payzant was a most effective and wise helpmate to her clergyman husband. She also made a name for herself, until their retirement, in the fields of painting and lecturing, and many friends in the Digby area have enjoyed her frequent and gracious hospitality in her over-150 year old ancestral home in Acadia Valley.

The Payzants established their legal domicile, after retirement, with her sister in Belkows Falls, Vermont. The Golden Wedding was observed there, very quietly on account of the measure of invalidism of the two principals. Their son, Dr. Arthur R. Payzant, head of the radiology department of Touro Infirmary and Hospital in New Orleans, joined them for a brief visit and helped in the celebration; and many messages of congratulations and good wishes were received from many directions.

Digby Men On Scallop Program

One of Nova Scotia's newest industries, the scallop fishery, will hold the spotlight on "Summer Fallow", Monday, September 5, at 9:30 p.m.

"The Scallopers" is the story of the "baby giant" of the fishing industry, and interviews with veteran fishermen will add still another "touch of the sea" to the program. Host Ken Homer will interview Captain Douglas Mosher, of Lunenburg, Captain Lorne Ritchey, of Shelburne, and Captain Roland Wormell, of Digby. He will also talk with Ernest Richardson, of the National Sea Products firm in Digby, and with Dr. Carl Medcof, of the Fisheries Research Board of the Biological Station in St. Andrew's, New Brunswick.

When the Canadian Army recently decided to include scallops on its menus, the Nova Scotia fishery received a stimulus of considerable proportion to the already fast-growing industry.

Scallop fishing is a colourful and interesting — if sometimes dangerous — pursuit, and within a short time it has become an industry of million dollar proportions in some Nova Scotia ports. "The Scallopers" deals extensively with the industry and the men who work in it.

Injured In Congo

Mrs. Mary R. Muise, of Digby, has been advised by the national defence department that her adopted son, Sgmn. George Edward Muise, who was among the Canadian contingent that went to the Congo last week to serve with the United Nations forces, has been injured.

Advice received by Mrs. Muise stated Sgmn. Muise was a patient in Kintambo hospital as a result of injuries to wrist, ankles and neck. It was stated his condition "is not regarded as dangerous."

A later telegram advised Mrs. Muise that her son would be evacuated by air to Canada within seven days and would be taken to the Canadian forces hospital in Halifax for treatment.

No information as to how Sgmn. Muise received his injuries has been received by Mrs. Muise.

Precautions were taken at both fires to prevent the spread of flames to nearby woods. It is understood that in both cases no insurance was carried.

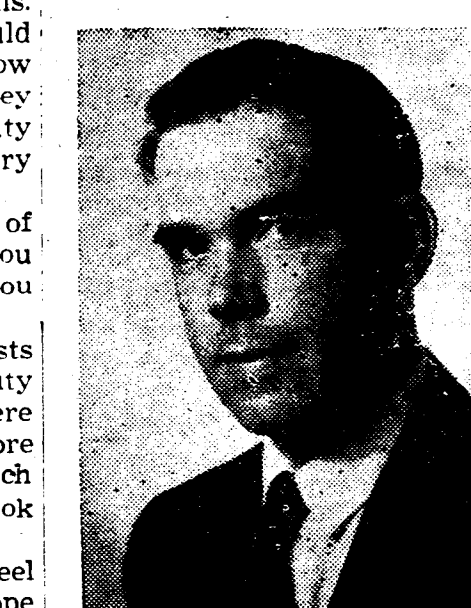

Sets New Bass Record

Largest striped bass to be caught on the Bear River to date was hooked and landed Saturday afternoon by Ronald Hood, who was fishing from the bank of the river off Hood's rock when he hooked the huge striper.

The huge bass, which measured forty-one and one-quarter inches in length and weighed twenty-seven pounds when placed on the scales an hour after it was caught, gave Mr. Hood quite a tussle before he landed it.

Using a light rod and twenty pound test monofilament line, Mr. Hood first hooked the fighting bass at two o'clock Saturday afternoon and several times in his half hour long struggle with the big fish he despaired landing it. Three or four times it took off at high speed, running out eighty-five or ninety yards of line, which on occasion emitted the high hum which is often heard just before the strain becomes too great. Carefully playing his fish, however, he was able finally to land it and become the envy of the great host of other bass fishermen who have been fishing the Bear River this summer.

Labour Day Safety

Death takes no holidays. As a matter of fact, unless the desire to live is carefully protected, death will be busier than ever in the province of Nova Scotia during Labour Day Weekend.
The above warning was issued to all road travellers — motorists and pedestrians alike — by L. M. Delbridge, manager of the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council, as thousands of people are preparing to enjoy the last major summer holiday weekend.
Mr. Delbridge's advice for staying alive when you drive was this:
1. Always keep your car and tires in good condition.
2. Be doubly alert in crowded traffic areas.
3. Stop for coffee breaks at least every two hours.
4. Watch speed limits, and observe all traffic laws and regulations.
The Council's manager also urged pedestrians to keep an eye on traffic at all times, to cross only at intersections and only on green light signals.
"When walking along highways, be sure to walk opposite to the traffic and always carry a flashlight at night", Mr. Delbridge added.

Along with the Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council this newspaper urges all drivers to slow down in school and residential areas, and be sure you could stop in time to save a little life and protect your own conscience.
"Twixt home and school the children go, Watch out for them and let them grow."
Parents, too, have a great responsibility to see that their children don't get into situations that could result in tragedy. Parents have, perhaps, the greatest responsibility — and the greatest loss when they don't live up to those responsibilities. Do you, as a parent, know precisely where your child is at this very moment? Is he fully aware of the dangers of playing near traffic? Is he of school age, do you know the route he takes to school? Is it the safest route?
Remember, the shortest way isn't always the safest way. Children should know enough to recognize and obey traffic lights, signs, and lines. They should know what jaywalking is and how dangerous it can be. And, they should know how to cross every street with careful feet. It will be a strange new world for the child — both fascinating and frightening — and as a tenderfoot pedestrian, he will need all of the guidance and help you can give him. Don't let your child down.
If your children ride the school bus, do they follow the important school bus safety rules? Check to see that your child doesn't indulge in horseplay in the bus. Remind him of the importance of keeping his head, arms and hands inside the bus. If you know your child wants to be safe, you'll have much more peace of mind while he's away from you.
Most of the children are back in school . . . but not all of them! There are still pre-school-age children seriously and happily playing their games. And foresight, the ability to predict dangers, is not one of the traits they are best known for at this age.
Near traffic, one of the greatest faults a child has is that he acts like a child. Without rhyme or reason he will often do the most unpredictable things. For instance, when a ball rolls into the street, he may not consider the time, the place or the dangers. He just wants to retrieve his ball. The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council urges each and every driver to watch for and protect these precious young lives — with cautious driving.

Hints For Exhibitors

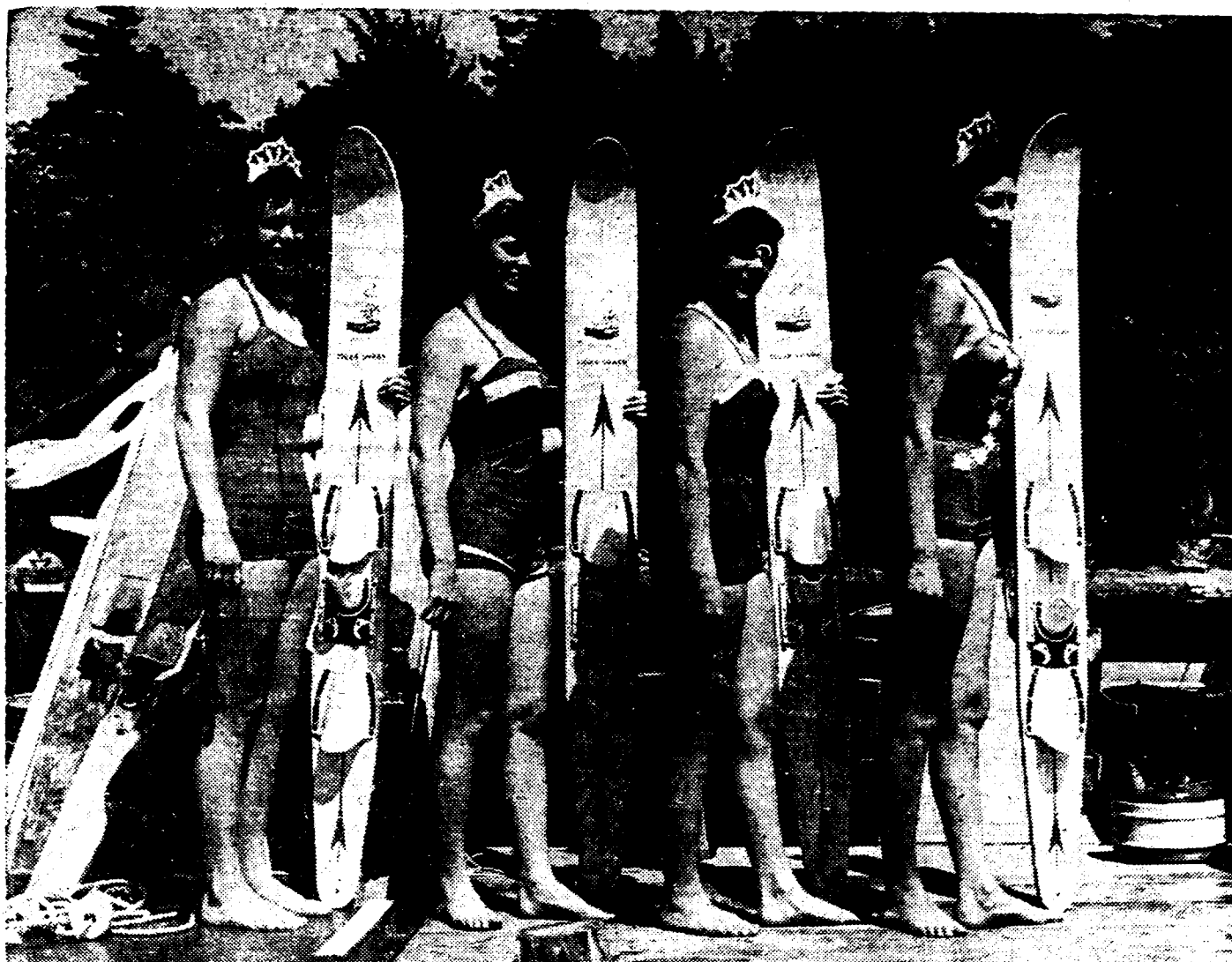
This is the time of the year when exhibitors are considering exhibits for the annual Fall Fairs, and how these exhibits can be presented in such a light that they will receive the judges' approval and the ribbons that accompany the top placings in various classes.
No group of exhibitors takes more interest in the fall fair circuit than do the exhibitors of flowers and vegetables and the exhibitors, as a result, are all the more enjoyable from the standpoint of the visiting audience.
Here, from the Farm News, are a few hints for flower and vegetable exhibitors which have been suggested by officers of the Horticulture and Biology Services Branch of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College:
1. Have entries in exhibition rooms early.
2. The best time to cut flowers is in the early morning while the dew is still on them.
3. Cut flower stems as long as possible.
4. With most varieties it is an advantage to leave some of the foliage on. Be sure it is free from any markings of disease, insects or insecticides.
5. Be very careful in the handling of your exhibits. Be sure they are free from any mechanical injury when put on display. It is an advantage to bring extras of each variety with you when you bring your entries in so that if necessary, you will have replacements for any damaged entries. Be sure, however, that you only enter the correct number.
6. In entering Glads, get stems as long as possible. If bottom flowers are beginning to wither, pick them off. However, points will be lost if more than one is picked off.
7. Do not wash your vegetable entries, merely wipe them with a soft cloth.
8. Bring any flowers of good quality.

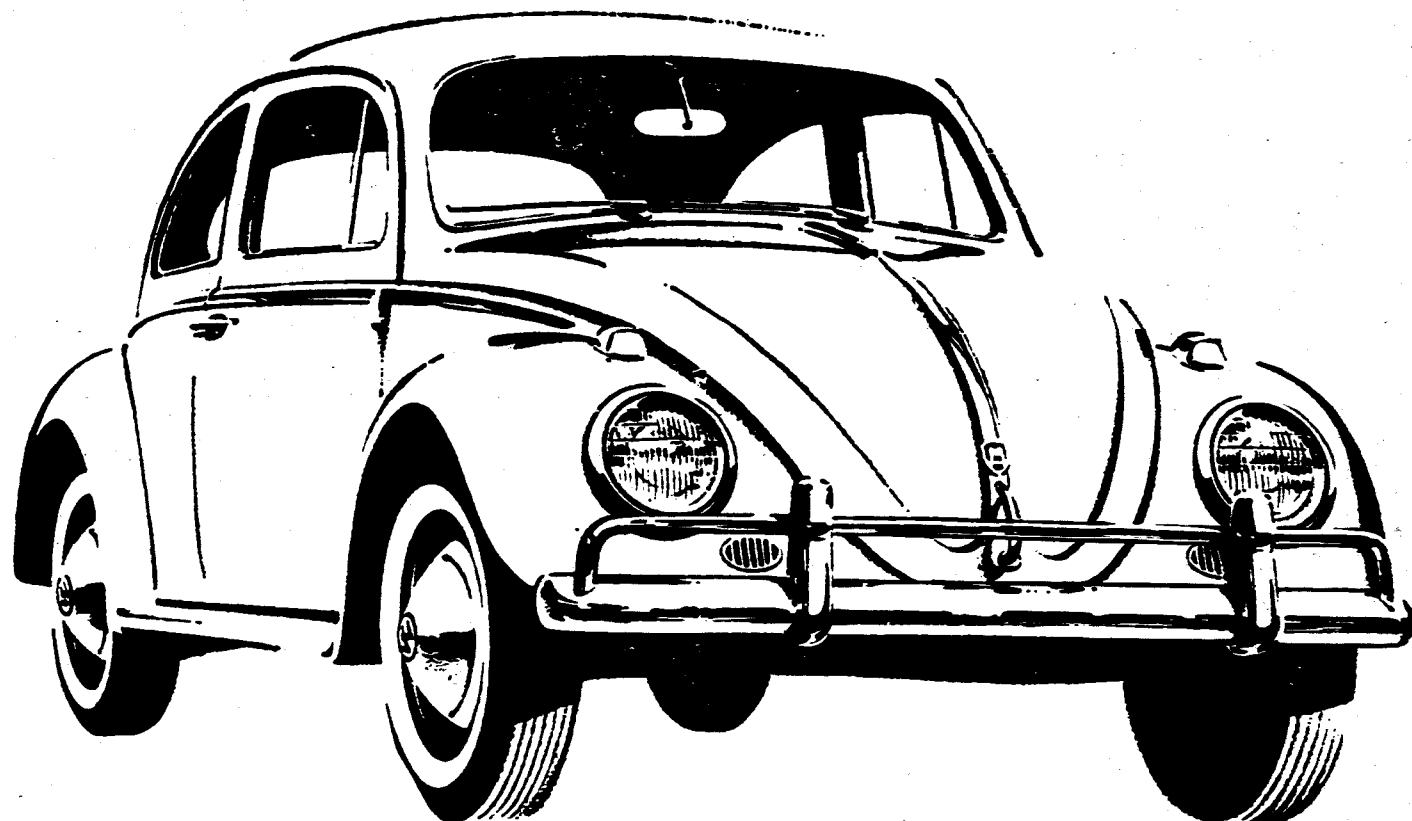

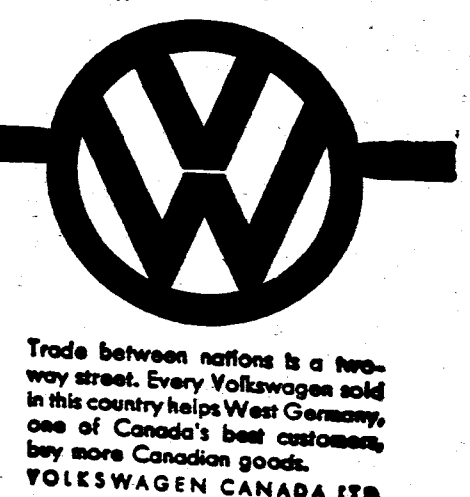

Cossaboom, Mount Healthy, Ohio; M. H. Outhouse, Bellevue, Ky.; and Wilfred L. Outhouse, of Birmingham, Ala., who was guest speaker at the centennial service. The congregation at Tiverton and their sister church in Westport welcomed to their communities the Rev. E. Neil Burt, from Saskatchewan (with his Prince Edward Island wife, and their baby son), who has recently taken over the double pastorate from the Rev. J. W. Derby, retired after serving these two churches for a total of 27 years.

The special Roll Call service, Sunday, August 21st, was attended by old members and friends from seven different towns and Halifax, of Nova Scotia, as well as several from the United States: Halifax, Weymouth, Freeport, Westport, Little Harbour, Shel. Co., Guysborough, Medford, Mass., Birmingham, Cambridge, Mass. The Rev. Chester Sommer, who was student pastor here in 1931, and his wife, were present from Port Elgin, Ont.

The Rev. E. Neil Burt led the anniversary service, with the Rev. J. M. Derby dedicating new hymns made possible by personal subscriptions in memory of loved ones. The books were then distributed for use by the congregation. Special music for the occasion included a solo, "This Day", by Miss Sylvia Lent, and a solo, "After", by Melbourne Outhouse.

During the calling of the roll, letters of congratulation and reminiscence were read from Oliver McCully, General Church Secretary for Canada, Malcolm Outhouse, a past pastor, now in Bellevue, Ky., Mrs. W. 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Popular Tuna Grounds

Dr. A. S. Baileys of 299 Main St., Port Washington, N. Y., landed a 300 pound tuna at Cape St. Mary's this afternoon after fighting 40 minutes. He was with Capt. Billie LeBlanc in the B. & M. Wedgeport boat. This is the fourth tuna landed at the Cape since August 17th.

No boats had been out to the fishing grounds since Friday's storm warnings were issued. The Wedgeport tuna fishing fleet has moved to Cape St. Mary's from where they will battle with the giant bluefins. Six boats will be on the fishing grounds on Wednesday with the possibility that more will go out if sufficient parties arrive.

The arrival of tunas at the Cape is somewhat earlier than last year when the first fish was caught on Sept. 11th by John D. Gilsh, weighing 410 lbs., with Capt. Jacquard. Mr. Gilsh went on to land 8 tunas in 4 days, two on the 11th and five on the 15th. Over eighty tunas were landed in 1959 and this season's prospects appears better than last year.

It is quite possible that the international collegiate fishing tournament may take place at Cape St. Mary's, stated Israel Pothier of Wedgeport recently as the prospects for tunas at Wedgeport is rather dim for this year. The collegiate tournament of last year was held at Wedgeport where a successful pollock fishing expedition was held in the latter days of the tournament. The collegiates were slated to try their luck at Cape St. Mary's with the tunas but inclement weather prevented any boats to venturing to the fishing grounds.

With the influx of sports fishermen from the United States who are arriving, Cape St. Mary's will be a busy spot and all eyes will be focused on this quiet fishing village, 20 miles from Yarmouth in Digby County. Cape St. Mary's has some advantages over Wedgeport tuna grounds due to the fact that the grounds are but a few minutes away from the harbour. There is plenty of room to battle with the giant bluefins and in most cases they can be driven to the shallow waters of the cove near the fishermen's wharf.

From a spectators point of view it is an ideal spot and with another successful year, Capt. St. Mary's will be on the map to stay and improvements to the buildings will be undertaken to make Cape St. Mary's the best fishing centre in west-

Today, more than ever, in the history of the World, the importance of words is being brought home to us. One word spoken at the right time by the right person, could help control the seething cauldron in the Middle East, or temper the torrent that is engulfing the whole world. Never before have words presented such fine shades of meaning, that the only definite understanding comes from the decisive Yes or No, the two words that do not admit of misinterpretation. But, with the fine shades of meaning, which, in the spoken word can be emphasized by the slightest gesture of facial expression, a definite and peaceful conclusion seems often impossible. To the patients who come to them for advice, leading psychologists and psychiatrists are devoting much time to this subject.

Many declare there is a marked difference in the treatment given to those who adopt certain forms of speech and vocal inflections, than others with a different method of approach. Reasons are being sought regarding the great number of people suffering from nervous maladies, when to outward appearances, they have everything they need with never a care in the world. Then come the psychiatrists, with probing questions to discover the thoughts that create these conditions, and since thoughts are but unspoken words, it all reverts to the words we speak and how we utter them.

For much depends on speech presentation. This can control a person from the cradle to the grave. It can keep homes unhappy, it can render the life of a young person really devastating, unless he can really rise above it. I well remember a

certain Form Mistress, with a fiendish gift of sarcasm, which she used frequently. 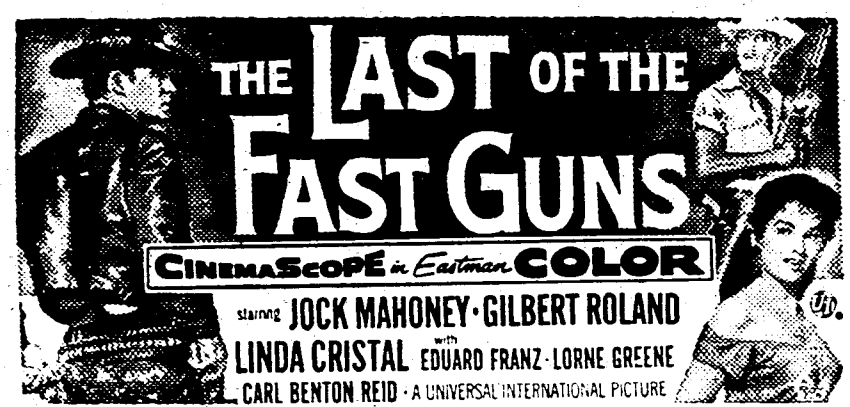

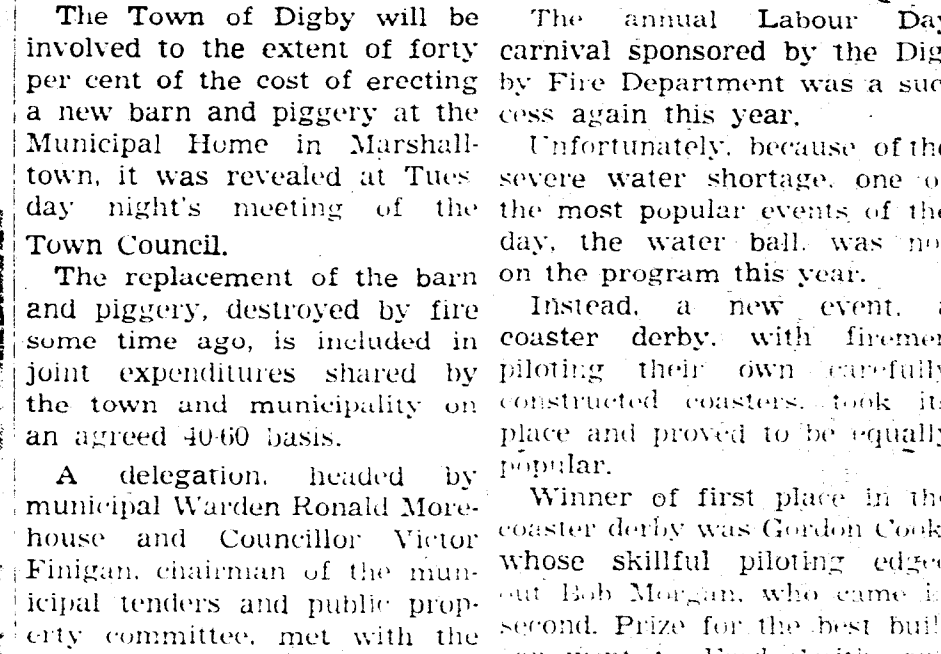

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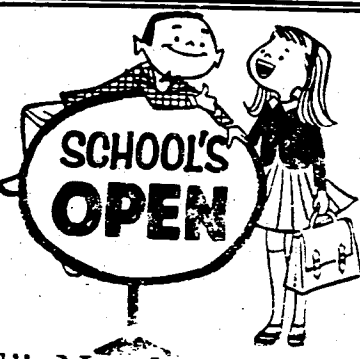
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Orange Blossom Buns



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ORANGE BLOSSOM BUNS

Makes 16 buns
Scald 1/2 c. milk; stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 c. shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl; crumble in and dissolve 2 cakes Best Yeast - or stir in 2 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 2 small envelopes (or 2 tbsps.) Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 well-beaten eggs and 1 tsp. grated orange rind. Sift together 2c. sifted all-purpose flour and 1/4 c. sifted ground mace. Stir into yeast mixture; beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 2 c. (about) sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on floured board until elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled - about 1 hr. Punch down dough; divide in half. Form each half into an 8" roll; cut each roll into 8 equal pieces; form into smooth balls. Place in greased muffin pans. Brush with melted butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cover. Let rise until doubled - about 45 mins. Dip 16 cubes orange juice; press a cube into top of each bun. Sir:

In response to action taken at the Digby Board of Trade meeting, Tuesday, Sept. 13, re Brief to Royal Commission re Liquor Laws, I wish to make the following public statement, as given below. I make this statement because of what appears to be the purpose and tone of the Board of Trade Brief. I strongly question certain words used in the Brief such as the word "Numerous" when I believe the word "few" would be closer to fact, and I invite anybody to show where I am wrong in this respect.

Also, it surely is to be regretted that over half of the members who attend Board of Trade meetings when the liquor question is on the agenda do not attend at all or hardly ever at other Board of Trade meetings.

Whereas the question of having to do with making or changing of liquor laws is a partisan question, causing many people to take sides for conscience sake, so that, if any Board of Trade or Chamber of Commerce deals with the liquor question, it should do so only for the sake of encouraging sobriety for any and all communities so concerned.

Whereas the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages have never enriched or helped the general welfare and happiness of the people of any community, but, on the contrary, many people have been harmed by its use.

Therefore the Digby Board of Trade should not present to the Nova Scotia Royal Commission re Liquor Laws, any Brief that would, in whole or part, in any way encourage liquor consumption for anybody living in or visiting within any community of Nova Scotia.

Oickle's Team Places First

A magnificent performance by a splendid team of heavy draft horses owned by Gerald Oickle, of Bear River, in the horse hauling contest featured Thursday afternoon's program at the Digby County Exhibition. Before Mr. Oickle decided his team should call a halt, all the weights used in the haul were exhausted and several men had been pressed into service to add their weight to the drag.

Mr. Oickle's team, weighing 3,498 pounds, pulled a total of 10,125 pounds for 2.60 to take top position in the heavy draft double horse pull.

Taking second place in the heavy draft class was the team of Leon Fiske, of Bridgetown. This team, weighing 2,805, pulled a total of 6,375 pounds, for 2.28. Third place position went to the team of Arnold Adams, of Smith's Cove, weighing 3,045, this team pulled 4,775 pounds, for 1.56.

In the light draft double horse pull the teams of Hector Holdwright, of Maitland Bridge, and the team of William Phalen, of Bridgetown, tied for first place. Holdwright's team, weighing 2,702, pulled 7,785 pounds, for 2.88, while Phalen's team, weighing 2,416, pulled 6,975 pounds, also for 2.88.

Second place in the double light draft class went to Harry Height's team. This team, weighing 2,399, pulled 6,575, for 2.78. Third place went to Basil Porter's team, weighing 2,793, this team pulled 5,755, for 2.71.

During Thursday morning and afternoon judging of the record number of entries in every division at this year's Digby County Exhibition continued.

In the 4-H Calf Club entries Allan Read took first in the beef calf section. Second in this division went to Bruce Prime, while third place was taken by Paul Hamilton.

In the dairy calf section David Read took first honours with Garnet Cress placing second and Garth Prime third. In yearlings Lloyd Jefferson Jr. took first with his sister, Shirley Jefferson, placing second. Third place award went to Junior Melanson.

Winners of the awards presented by the Hereford Breeders' Association were Ralph Pierce, Bear River East, for best registered bull; D. R. Andrews, Rossway, second, and Preston Andrews, also of Rossway, third. In Hereford females Douglas Andrews, of Rossway, took first with Ralph Pierce second. Top award for the best Hereford herd went to Ralph Pierce, with Douglas Andrews placing second.

Bruce W. Read, of Bear River, took all top honours in the best Jersey dairy herd class, with Lloyd Jefferson, of Marshalltown, taking first for purebred Shorthorns. First prize for grade Guernseys went to Louis I. Gates, of Bear River, while B. C. Chisholm, also of Bear River, took top honours in the calf section.

Top honours in Ayrshires went to Leslie Wright, of Deep Brook. B. C. Chisholm placed first in grade Holsteins, while first prize for grade Brown Swiss went to Guy C. Adams, of Bear River.

The special award for best matched team in working oxen was won by a beautifully matched yoke owned by Lorain Wright, of Deep Brook. Demetrius Amiraull, of Weymouth, placed second, with Leslie Wright, of Deep Brook, in third place.

Top award for best matched pair of heavy draft horses went to Starrett Gates, of Bear River, with Gerald Oickle placing second. In the medium class Arnold Adams, of Smith's Cove, placed first.

Tusket Team Takes Tournery

Trafton White's team of oxen, from Tusket, in Yarmouth County, won the free-for-all ox pulling contest at the Digby County Exhibition last week.

Weighing 2,914 pounds, Trafton's yoke pulled a total of 9,175 pounds for 3.14, to take top honours in the contest.

Running White a close second for first place honours was Lloyd Joudrey's team, from Upper Cornwall, weighing 2,577 pounds, this team pulled a total of 8,075 pounds, for 3.13.

In third place position was Darrell Watkins' team from Hebron. This team, weighing 2,365 pounds, pulled 7,375 pounds for 3.17.

Donna Does Little Damage

Despite all the fanfare that heralded her approach, hurricane Donna did very little damage in the Digby area.

Fortunately, the hurricane veered from its course as it approached the Maritimes and, instead of passing over Saint John as it might have done, the storm took a more northerly course and passed over northern New Brunswick.

The result of the change in direction was that western Nova Scotia got only the edge of the storm. During the height of the hurricane Monday night winds were extremely heavy and there were periods of very heavy rain.

Limbs were broken from a number of trees in the town and some windows smashed. A storm window at the elementary school on Mount Street was torn loose and completely smashed. Farmers in the Digby area report many apples shaken from the trees but little other crop damage.

Members of the Digby Fire Department and the civil defence rescue squad stayed on duty at the fire station, during the night in case of emergency but fortunately their services were not required. No fires were reported during the storm and there was no power failure.

Local fishermen and boat owners took all precautions to protect their craft from storm damage and, so far as could be learned, these efforts were completely successful.

A flag pole at the war memorial in Digby was toppled by the wind but no other signs were damaged or other damage reported from the main business section of the town.

To Have Speaker From Africa

Rev. Maynard Booth, secretary of the British & Foreign Bible Society for the Rhodesias and Nyasaland in Africa, will speak at a number of gatherings in Digby County next week.

Mr. Booth, who has a first hand knowledge of many of the problems facing Africa at present and a keen insight into the needs of the African people, as well as their potential with regard to the formation of democratic type government, is expected to give extremely interesting addresses on behalf of the Bible Society at his meetings in the Digby area.

On Thursday, September 22, Mr. Booth will be guest speaker at the supper meeting of the Digby Kiwanis Club and will also address a public meeting at eight o'clock that same evening in Grace United Church. He will speak the following evening, September 23, at a public meeting in the United Baptist Church in Freeport. Time of this meeting is eight o'clock.

A minister of the United Church of Canada, Mr. Booth has served in Dolbeau and Arvida, Quebec. He also taught for three years in a Christian college in Beirut, Lebanon. For ten years before going to Rhodesia in 1955 he was district secretary of the Bible Society in Montreal.

In the 1960 Bible Society report, Mr. Booth comments that too few Europeans will recognize that there is a growing section of educated African men and women who could fit into a democratic form of government. He said this is resented by these Africans who are tired of being treated as children and continually told what they must do.

Mr. Booth in his addresses locally will outline Africa's position and its needs with emphasis on the work of the Bible Society in the meeting of these.

ABOUT THIS AND THAT

A Dangerous Practice

Now that school has re-opened motorists are hearing and seeing the customary warnings to watch out for youngsters so that tragic accidents involving school children may be avoided.

There is a double-barreled responsibility here, however, in that the children themselves must accept their share of the care and caution that must be exercised if such accidents are to be really avoided.

In this connection we would refer to the practice being induced in the school which has opened this year in Digby of pupils from the public schools of the town walking eight and nine abreast and in groups down the Church Street hill to the main street.

This is a most dangerous practice and one which could result in a real tragedy if it is not stopped. Every day since school has opened it has been most hazardous for motorists to attempt the use of the Church Street hill, particularly at noon time, because of the fact school-children are using the whole width of the street, seemingly oblivious of any danger to themselves or of the rights of motorists who use that road.

It is not because these children have not been warned of the dangers involved or the illegality of their actions that they continue the practice. It has been learned the matter was thoroughly dealt with at a recent school assembly.

If, therefore, these youngsters choose to ignore the efforts made by school authorities to warn them of the dangers involved in such action, sterner measures should be taken immediately to control the problem.

It is not merely a matter of traffic control or discipline. It is a matter of actual survival. If the present practice continues with hundreds of youngsters deliberately exposing themselves to danger and light-heartedly ignoring traffic safety rules, then sooner or later someone will be killed or injured.

This must not happen! Parents, the children themselves, school and police authorities must act with speed and despatch to put an end to this practice. It is not, in this case, the motorist only that is involved. The children themselves are creating the hazardous condition and they must be made to correct it.

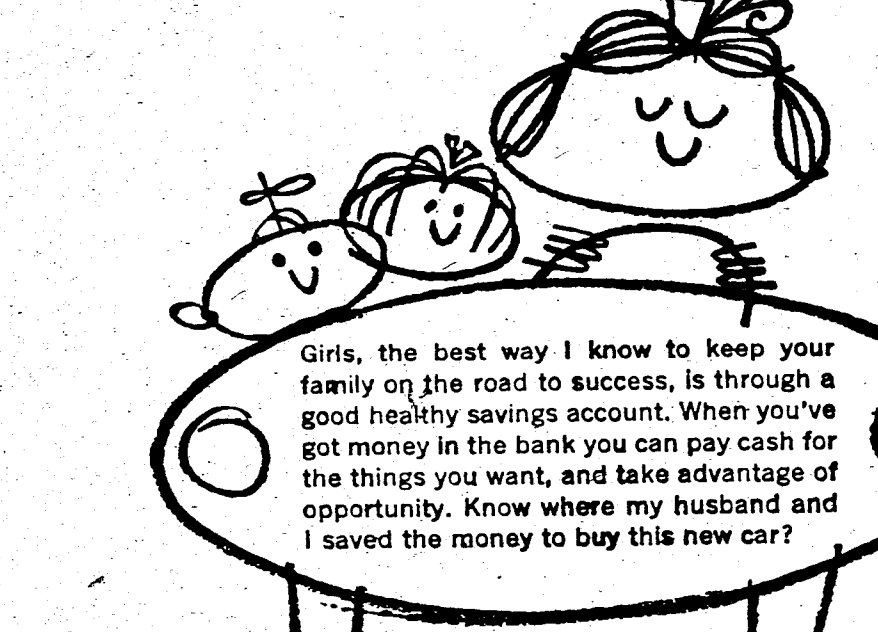

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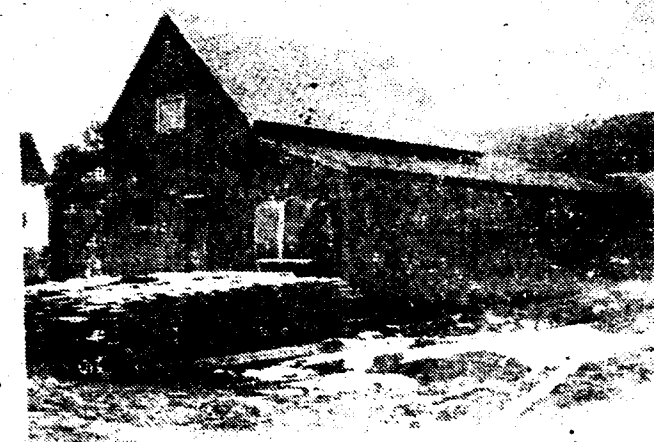
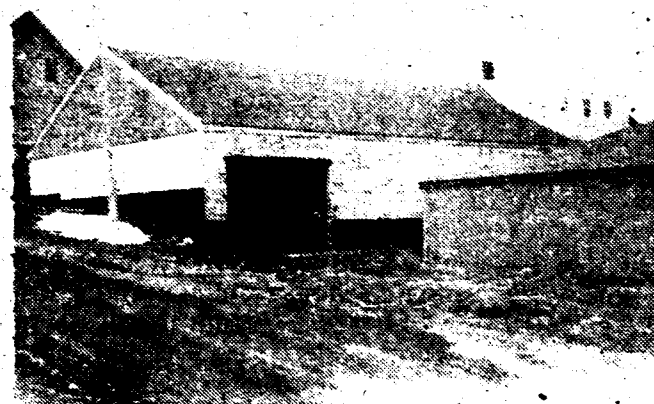

A Real Saga Of Success

The story of the business accomplishments of Raymond E. Robicheau, of Westport, on Brier Island in Digby County, is one of the brightest sagas of success in this area and points up the value of determination, application and a willingness to take chances in the achievement of success in any field.

Following his return from service overseas with the Canadian armed forces and using as his only financial resources fourteen hundred dollars in war service gratuities, Mr. Robicheau started his meteoric business career in his native village in 1948 when he purchased the grocery store owned by Arthur Hicks, opposite the ferry landing in Westport.

For a man with the ambition and desire to succeed of Mr. Robicheau, this grocery business was not enough, however, and he began to branch out and involve himself in the fish processing and handling business. He went into this with the same energy that marked his earlier entry into the grocery business and in 1952 completed construction of a fish plant and a dryer. The actual work of constructing these plants was done by Mr. Robicheau himself, another factor in the development of Mr. Robicheau's businesses which has helped to assure them of real success.

As Mr. Robicheau's fish processing and handling business expanded he added to his plant and equipment and in 1959 built a cooler capable of handling a million pounds of pickled fish. He had in 1956 purchased the fish business of E. C. Bowers & Co. and consolidated this operation into his own business to help build up production and ensure supply.

Although kept busy with his fish interests and the original grocery enterprise Mr. Robicheau was still unwilling to overlook any opportunities for expansion and in the spring of 1960 he purchased the former store property of E. 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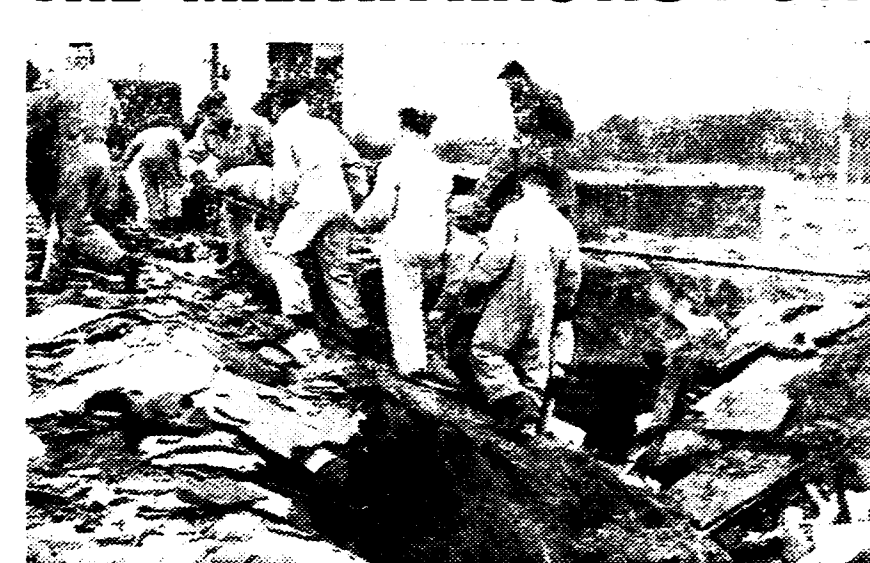
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PARKER HOUSE ROLLS

Makes 3 dozen rolls

Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1/4 c. granulated sugar and 2 1/2 tsp. salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into large bowl; crumble in and dissolve 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 small envelope (or 1 tsp.) Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins. THEN stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour and 1 c. melted shortening; beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 3 c. (about) sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on floured board until elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place until doubled—about 1 1/2 hrs. Punch down dough; grease top and let rise again until almost doubled—about 30 mins. Punch down dough again; divide in 3 equal portions. Form each portion into a 12" roll. Cut each roll into 12 equal pieces; form into smooth balls. Roll each ball into an oval 2 1/2" x 3 1/2"; fold in half crosswise. Place touching each other, on greased cookie sheets. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins. Bake in a hot oven, 400°, 12 to 15 mins.

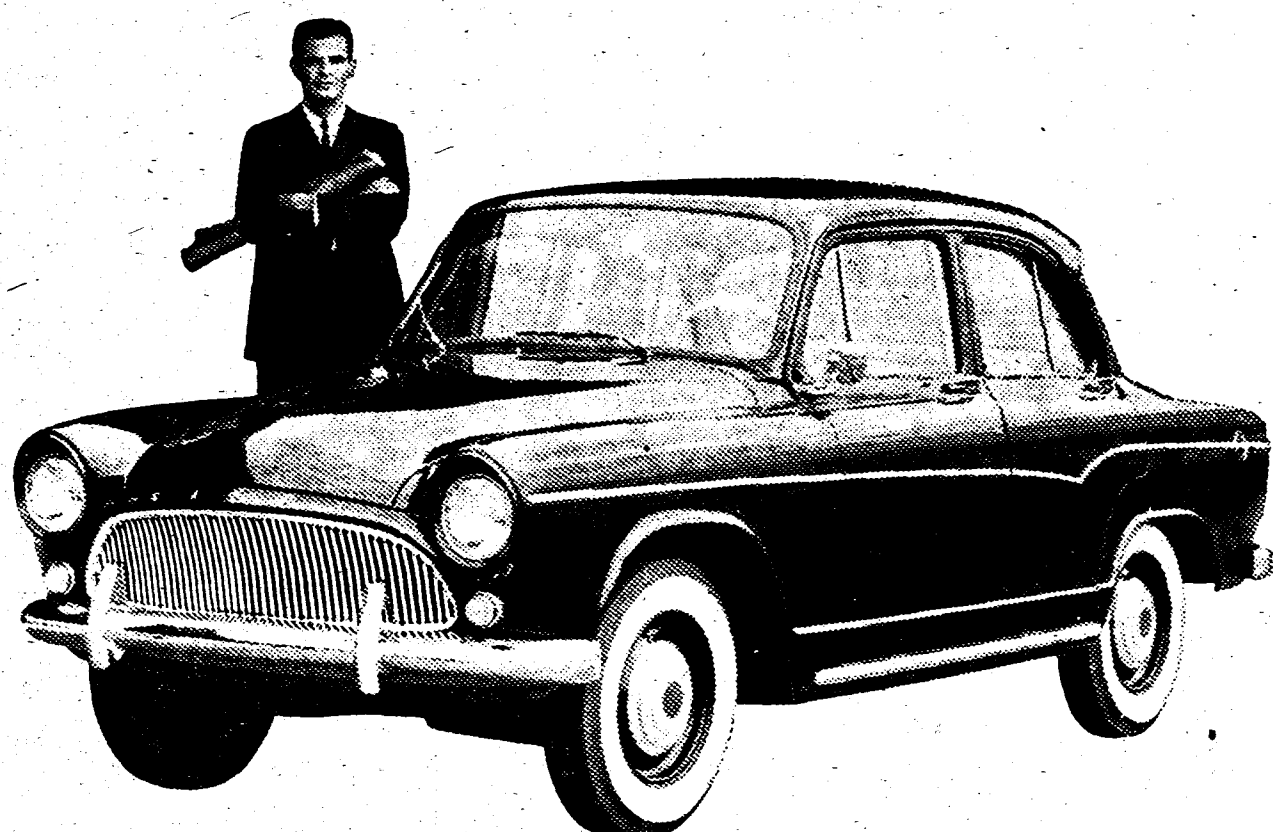




Speaks On Africa

"Democratic government as we know it may never have a place in Africa," stated Rev. Maynard Booth, secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society for the Rhodesias and Nyasaland, in an address to the Digby Kiwanis Club Thursday evening.

Mr. Booth said native African leaders are unable to tolerate opposition to their programs and political philosophies. Their rule must be absolute, he said, and opposition parties and leaders are not accorded the freedoms we regard as necessary to a democratic form of government.

This attitude, he said, stems from centuries of tribal living in which the tribal chief ruled without question and opposition to his decrees was fatal.

Lack of education is holding back the development of the African countries, Mr. Booth said. He stated that many, many Africans are totally uneducated and independence that have come with the establishment of the new republics. Many, he said, do not even know what freedom or independence mean.

Much has been said, Mr. Booth stated, about the numbers of native children attending school in the new African countries. The figures quoted, he said, apply to primary type schools with most of the students dropping out after three years. School attendance drops to 22% at the secondary school level and only .001 ever reach college.

Another factor which is holding back the development of the new African nations is the hold which witchcraft and fear has on the people. This is far more widespread than the western world realizes, he said, and plays a great part in the reaction of the masses in the African countries to innovations in government, health services and the like.

Mr. Booth was critical of the conduct and example being set for the African people by the representatives of the western world who go to the new African nations. "Our businessmen, he said, must be worthy representatives of the western culture which is Christian."

The actions and attitudes of those who have come to Africa representing western culture have done a great deal to destroy the work of the church and its missionaries in these nations, he said. "It is time we took a more serious look at ourselves as Christians because the quality of the spirit is far below the level it should be."

Referring to acts of violence in the new African nations in which Western people are the targets, Mr. Booth said, "cars that were stoned often ought to be. Often, he said, there is no display by these westerners of proper courtesy or consideration for the African as a fellow man. Our representatives in the African countries must be fit to properly display our culture, he said. We cannot expect to have this culture make a proper impression on the African people if its representatives continue to act to bring discredit upon it."

Mr. Booth was introduced to the meeting by Vincent G. Snow, and the thanks of the gathering were expressed by Kiwanian Dr. J. J. Joyce.

Mrs. Potter had twelve children of which all are living except one. The oldest is 79 and the youngest 55. She also has forty grandchildren, 68 great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren.

Yes, it is expected that many more fine boats will be built in this little boatshop, as even now, while the new owner, Llewellyn Young, is making this, the first boat, secure at the wharf, the men are setting up the molds and laying the keel for another one, which should be completed within five or six weeks.

The best of luck to you, builders of the "Little Fundy fishing boats" build them strong and rugged, for "These that go down to the sea in ships" And occupy their business in great waters. These men see the works of the Lord And His wonders in the deep."

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An Expensive Lift

Seek Protection For Beaver

An all-out effort is underway by the Digby East Fish and Game Association to have the provincial department of lands and forests to reverse its recently announced decision to open the beaver season in Digby County.

At a recent meeting of the association a resolution was passed protesting the decision to open the beaver season. Contacts have also been made with the provincial Fish and Game Association urging their support for efforts being made locally to have the ban on beaver trapping in Digby County restored.

Spontaneous in Digby County claim that beaver are only now coming back in numbers in the county and that to open the season this year will mean beaver will again be well nigh extinct here.

Three years ago a closed season on beaver trapping in Digby County was established by the provincial lands and forests department after representations were made as to the scarcity of beaver here. Each year since the ban was enacted the Digby East Fish and Game Association has passed resolutions urging its continuance.

At the annual meeting of the association this year a similar resolution was also passed which was later endorsed by the provincial body and passed on as a recommendation to the lands and forests department.

Members of the Digby Association say they were shocked at the announcement a trapping season for beaver would be allowed in Digby County this year. They state also that the bag limit of five beaver is far higher than ever before and claim there is no justification for the opening of the season and particularly for the high bag limit.

In its efforts to have the decision regarding the beaver season reversed the Digby Association has urged the department to carry out an immediate survey of the beaver population of the county. Experienced hunters in the area state such a survey would prove that, while beaver may be coming back in this area, there are not very few and that to open the season would destroy what benefit which has been derived from the closure over the past three years.

With a membership of only four hundred, the Digby East Fish and Game Association has been very active over the past year or two in promoting an active program of conservation in the area. The executive of the association claim that without such a program hunting and fishing in Digby County will be most seriously and adversely affected.

The association has recently secured a park area on the shores of one of the local lakes and are developing this so that an active program of education in game conservation and safe hunting procedures can be carried out. A concerted effort is being made to interest the youth of the area in this project so that they will realize the importance of the conservation-game resources.

A program of stocking of lakes and streams with game fish has also been carried out together with trapping and poisoning of poisons in the wooded areas of the county.

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ABOUT THIS AND THAT

Excellent Service

To describe a trip to Vancouver, B. C., in this column would be rather superfluous when so many of our readers have already travelled from coast to coast on this continent and have had the privilege of visiting other countries. We would suggest to those who might not have visited our sister province on the Pacific coast that there is a rare treat in store for you if you have the opportunity to be a tourist on that approximately 3,500 mile away shore. You would find the scenery similar in many respects to the Eastern coast except for the magnificent mountains. Our hills or what we term mountains are miniatures in comparison with Mount Temple, 12,000 ft., the highest on the trip. The Canadian Pacific Railway, to the Pacific Coast. The sight is one of greater wonder and grandeur to behold when you view the glaciers 100 to 300 ft. thick at the mountain summits and with the same glance see the brilliant blooms of hardy plants growing in the yards of residents along the way. The editor of your weekly paper had the privilege of seeing the magnificent scenery for the first time when she attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association held in Vancouver this month.

The purpose in writing this bit of information is not so much to extol the glories of the West as to write a word of appreciation for the excellent opportunity to view such grandeur when travelling on our Canadian railways. We say railways for the editor took advantage of the privilege to travel C.P.R. in one direction and C.N.R. another.

On the dome car travelling West by C.P.R. the whole grandeur of the mountains and valleys was open before the passengers. Those who chose the observation cars also had a panoramic view of the rivers and valleys below as well as a view of the glaciers on the mountain peaks. A friendly conductor on one division in the Rockies in an amusing and interesting manner answered questions of curious passengers and drew attention to historic and notable spots. Maybe he felt the passengers needed some distraction to get them calmly through the 3,255 ft. spiral tunnel or over the trestle bridges which are the answer for any adventuresome spirit. Descriptive booklets were provided for passengers' use but the courtesy of the informed conductor added greatly to the enjoyment of the passengers.

Returning via C.N.R. the route following the scenic and mountainous Fraser River and through the Athabasca Valley also provided a wealth of beauty. Railway personnel on both C.P. and C.N. routes spared no consideration in making the travelling customer as comfortable as possible. A fine gesture on the C.N.R. was a courtesy glass of orange juice during the afternoon. It brought to mind a motel in Cape Breton where courtesy refreshments of toast and tea were served each evening. Such gestures are not easily forgotten by the tourist and could well pay off for any hotel or tourist establishment.

On the return trip we travelled as far as Edmonton with Mrs. Dorothy Barker, who writes a column "Diary of a Vagabond" for the weekly papers for C.N.R. Dorothy is well known to weekly editors having published a weekly in Aurora, Ontario. Her column is most interesting and we often wish we could use it more frequently. Digby County news, of necessity, however, must take preference in our limited space. On arrival home we read the September 12 "Diary of a Vagabond" which we thought just a little ill-timed for the benefit of editors and publishers and wives. It dealt with what to pack for a train trip, what to wear, what to budget and tip. Well, we made out alright, possibly because of our experience in travelling to previous conventions. Speaking of tipping (sometimes we feel it's overdone) we were pleasantly surprised on leaving the C.P. train to visit in Winnipeg enroute, and fishing frantically in pockets for quarters, to hear the red-cap say, "That's all right, don't bother, you can tip another time." Maybe time was an important factor for the red-cap but again the gesture more than made up for the pocket contents of dimes and nickels. Something similar happened in boarding the D.A.R. in Halifax. Many said there are still people around who are not always looking out for the most they can get. "These and similar courtesies make travelling by rail from coast to coast an extreme pleasure."

Why Gamble With Communicable Diseases?

When a serious illness or death to your family is caused by a communicable disease, it is not immunized against smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus, lockjaw, and poliomyelitis. These diseases cost only a few cents and a few minutes of your time. Why take chances? Clinics will be open from October 4 to October 14.

Now, what smallpox is, though many of us have never seen it. Perhaps that is why we forget that smallpox is a disease. We forget how disfiguring it can be. There

is no natural immunity against smallpox. Anyone who has not been vaccinated may catch it. It attacks people of every age. Vaccination is the only protection we have against it. Vaccination should be repeated every seven years, or during an epidemic, and for international travel every three years. Every child should be vaccinated before he is 6 months of age.

Poliomyelitis is perhaps more feared than any other infectious disease of children because of the permanent crippling and disability that may result. The usual public health measures for control of infectious disease, such as strict isolation of the patient and quarantining of contacts, proved of little help in checking the spread of the disease. . . . Parents in all parts of the world rejoiced at the news that a safe vaccine for poliomyelitis had been developed by Dr. Jonas Salk, of Pittsburgh, and his collaborators. This news was of particular interest to Canadian parents, for much fundamental work in relation to the vaccine was carried out at the Connaught Medical Research Laboratories of the University of Toronto.

Poliomyelitis vaccine in Canada has been established as entirely safe and studies confirm that it is effective in greatly reducing paralytic polio incidence. Three doses, with one month's interval between the first and second, and not less than seven months between the second and third doses, are recommended. Immunization should be started at the age of three months.

Diphtheria, too, is a "germ" disease which spreads very rapidly from one person to another, either by direct contact or by means of "carriers". Poison from the germs spreads through the body. It attacks all ages, and even when apparently mild it may leave serious heart and nerve complications. And here toxoid comes to the rescue. Toxoid will protect our children against taking the disease.

Of all communicable diseases whooping cough is most likely to affect the youngest members of the family. Many cases occur in infants of six months of age or less, while the largest occurs between the ages of one and three years. In older children, while the disease may not be so severe, there is still the long drawn out convalescence, with its nights of coughing and wakefulness — which are perhaps harder on the parents than on the child!

Whooping cough vaccine provides protection in about 80% of children and if the disease is contracted it is much milder.

Tetanus, or lockjaw, is a rather uncommon but extremely serious disease which sometimes follows puncture wounds or other injuries. Fortunately, a highly effective toxoid has been developed for immunization against this malady. It is used in exactly the same way as diphtheria toxoid and should be given in time to establish protection before the falls and injuries incidental to learning to walk and play occur. Continued protection is secured by "booster" or "reinforcing" doses at intervals through the succeeding years as advised by your physician.

Immunization will protect your child from diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis, and every child should be given this protection.

Immunization should be begun any time after three months of age.

Booster or reinforcing doses should be given at intervals through the succeeding years as advised by your doctor.

Dear Sir:

For the past two years I have been studying the history of an 1872 sea tragedy that took place off the western entrance of the Straits of Magellan. The barque, James W. Elwell, bound for Valparaiso with a cargo of coal from Wales, burned and her crew of thirteen, including Sarah Farrington, Stewardess, spent seventy-two days in a lifeboat along the coast of Chili.

Ten of this crew died of starvation and exposure but the captain, John Wren, a native of our town of St. Andrews, N. B., and Sarah Farrington and a sailor by the name of Wilson survived. They were rescued by Cunard White Star steamer Tropic. One version of the story of this tragedy appears in F.
