The yard reduces terminal time of freight cars at Moneton, Hub of the Maritimes, by as much as 80 per cent. When it is operating in co-ordination with another Canadian National automatic yard at Montreal, to be opened in the Spring, it is expected that existing freight achedules between the Atlantic Provinces and Central Canada will be as much as halved.

1. Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1 tsp. salt. Cool to lukewarm.

Auditors Report

Chairman and Members. Municipal School Board of the District of Digby, Digby, Nova Scotia.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and records of the Municipal School Board of the District of Digby for the year ended December 31, 1960, and have received all the information and explanations we have required. Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests Accounts Payable: of the accounting records and other supporting evidence as Other School Boards we considered necessary.

The Surplus as at December 31, 1960, was \$1,163.89, an increase of \$396.77 over the previous year. This increase resulted from a net adjustment of prior years of \$202.30 and an excess of revenue over expenditure for the year of \$194.47.

The total revenue for the year was \$473,360.07, an in Other crease over the previous year of \$70,153.29. This increase came from Tuition Revenue \$2,376.87, Grants from the Province of Surplus Nova Scotia \$40,802.00 and increased appropriation from the Municipality by \$26,974.42.

The total expenditure increased by \$58,419.44 over the previous year. Although there were increases in costs of all foundation program servcies, a major portion of this increase resulted from charging to conveyance expense the purchase of four buses costing \$25,340.36 and the construction of the Weymouth garage costing \$10,945.08.

Investment in Capital Assets for school purposes during 1960 totaled \$50,081.07. This expenditure was mainly for the municipal portion of the cost of the annex to the Digby Regional High School. Financing of these expenditures plus \$163,009.65 balance of temporary financing outstanding from the previous year was effected by a \$95,000.00 debenture issue, by a grant from the Province of Nova Scotia for \$58,997.00, by providing Digby, Nova Scotia. \$10,945.08 from school revenue funds and by providing \$48,-148.64 from municipal general revenue funds.

We have examined the books and records of the considered necessary in the circumstances.

We report that we also examined the books and records of the Municipal School Board and the Hydro Electric Distribution System for the year ended December 31, 1960. Our report on these examinations form a part of this report and such schedules are attached hereto.

Taxes outstanding have increased over the previous year by \$27,512.61 to \$116,302.35. This represents 42% of the current levy, a 2% increase over last year. Tax collections during the year amounted to 88.7% of the current levy.

The bank overdraft as at December 31, 1960, was \$73,175.-94. There were, however, amounts receivable from the Government of Canada, the Province of Nova Scotia and the other Municipalities totaling slightly more than this amount.

Total revenue for the year increased by \$98,982.19. This \$130,551.53 was brought about mainly by an increased tax levy of \$58, 267.57 and increased provincial grants of \$39,645.63.

Total expenditure for the year increased by \$73,344.01 327,644.22 over that of the previous year. Social Welfare costs decreased by \$4,345.26. This would appear to be the only neteworthy decrease among three substantial expenditure increases. The appropriation to the Municipal School Board was increased by \$27,079.42 and there was Capital Expenditure out of Revenue for school purposes of \$48,994.14, an increase of \$44,241.64 over the previous year. Joint Expenditure proportion was \$5,854.96 greater than in 1959.

> The total Revenue for the year was \$396,749.04, the total Expenditure \$371,105.53, resulting in an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$25,643.51 to be transferred to Revenue Fund Surplus.

> After effecting minor adjustments of prior years, transferring the Balance from Snow Removal Reserve of \$1,992.19 and transferring \$17,400.09 to the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes the balance of Revenue Fund Surplus Account, before the transfer of the excess of revenue over expenditure for the year, was \$37,166.36. After transferring the Excess of Revenue over Expenditure for the year of \$25,643.51 the Revenue Fund Surplus was \$62,809.87.

The Capital Fund Balance Sheet includes only the Fixed Assets applicable to the Municipal General.

Civil Defence

Although any effort toward Civil Defence in Digby has in the past been at a minimum, steps are now being taken to put a bit more effort into protection in case of nuclear attack and also to have qualified people to help in case of any type of disaster. As announced by Thomas Cleveland, Civil Defence Director for Digby town, last week, nursing classes are being organized and also police auxiliaries will be operated in town. Civil Defence is being stepped up all over Canada, Gov-

ernment emergency centres are to be constructed. Prime Minister John Diefenbaker stated that this is not to be taken as evidence of worsening of the international situation or imminent fear of attack but only as an idea for preparedness.

There are several classes of people to contend with in speaking of Civil Defence. There are those who panic at the thought and refrain from any participation to avoid facing the issue. There are those who say, "What's the use? If a bomb drops there'll be no one around to tell the tale. Then there are the more optimistic and stable type who admit that being prepared for an emergency is good common sense. The latter is a more reasonable attitude to take. Civil Defence knowledge can be useful in any case of disaster, fire, flood and rescue work of any nature. There need not be the dread of nuclear attack but in case of such is it not better to be prepared to save all the lives possible and to comfort those who are injured?

We would urge all possible to take advantage of the nuising classes that are now being organized under Mrs. Sydney Smith and Miss Valerie Squance. We further suggest that you talk Civil Defence to your neighbour, at your group gatherings and arouse the interest of others in your commurny. No harm in being prepared.

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About This and That

Not Even Diamond Jubilee

Not even the Diamond Jubilee of the Digby Board of Trade could budge the members or should-be interested residents of Digby from other more luring engagements to attend a meeting of that organization on Thursday night What should have been a gala occasion, attended by probably some two hundred business and professional or otherwise interested men and women turned out to have an attendance of less. than thirty. Our sympathies were with the president. John Nichols, who was in the embarrassing position of trying to make the guest speaker feel comfortable in such a situation. The lack of audience, however, did not deter the speaker, Niels W. Jannasch, of the Maritime Museum of Canada from delivering an interesting and educational address. Those who missed

the address were, indeed, the losers.

But there is another side to this apparent disinterest in sharing the heavier problems of the town. We have no quarrel with curling or any other sport in town. Interest shown in these and a winning team can bring the name of Digby to the forefront. But this is the lighter side of the problem. The weightier side, the problem of industry coming to the area or the expense of thousands of dollars seems to be left on the shoulders of a very, very few. This is not as it should be. Here we have the Digby and other local boards, the Affiliated Boards of Trade and town councils trying to encourage a new ferry service across the Bay of Fundy and yet the majority of people do not even turn out to hear progress reports on any such endeavours. They are not enough interested to even give attendance support to such campaigns. The question is. are we interested in getting new boats, learning how to improve our tourist industry, attracting other industries or assisting the employment situation so much in the foreground of news and conversation these days. Does it sound as though we have a genuine problem in this regard?

Another meeting which should have had an attendance of at least two hundred, a meeting which had a much wider territory to draw from, was that of the Digby General Hospital the previous week. Again, some thirty to forty persons showed an interest in a \$250,000 business and in the construction of a million and a quarter dollar structure. The report given by the president, F. C. Purdy, that evening was worthwhile to hear. No doubt, his school teacher experience in imparting knowledge, was an asset in preparing and presenting such a report. We assure you it was presented in such a way that even the dullest could follow the steps as they were presented and have a clearer understanding of how this million and a quarter dollar business for Digby can be accomplished. Again our sympathies were with the president who had a story to tell and only a "hand full" of people were there to hear it. We hope the account in The Digby Courier last week got the story over to some extent to a much larger audience. 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

2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl. Crumble and add I cake Best Yeast OR stir in I tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with I small envelope (or 1 tbsp.) Best Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, l well-beaten egg. I tsp. grated lemon rind and 21/4 c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Mix in 11/4 Sultana-type raisins. Work in

3. Knead on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk-about 11/4 hours. 4. Punch down dough. Turn

out and knead until smooth. Divide into 3 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel; let rest 10 mins. Form each portion of dough into a roll 8 inches long and cut into eight 1-inch pieces. Shape each piece into a smooth ball and place in a greased muffin cup. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk-

It is part of a system to hoist men, food and fuel to mountain-top sites on the 1,200 mile Canadian National Telegraphs microwave network between Grand Prairie, Alta, and the Yukon-Alaska border. When completed late in 1641, the network will be a vital defence and civilian communications link between Alaska and the United States and will improve telephone and telegraph communications throughout the Canadian northwest. For most of the route, the microwave towers follow the Alaska Highway. The Canadian National Telegraphs now operates a \$9 million microwave system linking sydney, N. S., and St. John's, Nfld. What is believed to be the longest over-water microwave hop n the world, 69 miles tower to tower across Cabot Strait, is contained in this system. Microwave has also been extended east from Quebec to Carleton, Que., with a Dalhousie, N. B., to Moneton link expected to be in operation early in 1961

V.O.N. Costs Up

While we are on the subject of health, we note in the rary, for it will prove enter of his climb along life's Re-V.O.N. story in last week's issue of The Digby Courier that the cost per visit to the Digby V.O.N. association has increased to \$3.32. Considering that the cost per visit not so long ago was \$2.50, this is a drastic increase as the story states.

One of the reasons for this increase in cost per visit is because of decrease in the number of paying patients. A health service is like any other business. It must have paying customers to make it a financial success. While the Victorian Order of Nurses is an organization designed to aid those who cannot afford to care for themselves yet it is also un organization which caters to persons who are able to pay their way. Naturally as in any commercial business the nonpaying patients give a rise to costs of operation. The fewer there are to pay, the higher is the cost per visit. In order to keep the service in the vicinity at a reasonable rate per visit -ome way must be found to overcome these rising trends and getting more paying patients seems to be the logical solution. Expansion of territory might be the answer in part. Keeping the services of the order before the public by publicity might also help to attract paying patients.

The other reason given for the drastic increase in the cost per visit is increased expenses. This is no new problem. Anyone engaged in business, in civic and municipal life, is well acquainted with increased expenses. There is the ever increasing demand for more and better facilities and to meet these, of whatever nature they be, there is bound to be greater expense. In general business the expense is either borne by the business or passed on to the consumer of goods. In civic. municipal or provincial government circles the only solution to the problem is higher taxes to meet costs of demands. Anyone who has worked in any of these bodies will sub-

With the Victorian Order of Nurses the same thing applies. The cost must be met. To meet the rising cost the paying patient load must be kept at a certain volume or failing this greater amounts will have to be forthcoming from grants and campaign contributions to keep the service







FIRST FOR CN'S MONCTON YARD. A high speed teletype, modified by Canadian National Railways' technicians to produce routing labels for railway freight cars, is one of the many firsts the company can boast for its new \$15 million automatic classification yard at Moncton. The labels are attached to the side of individual boxcars and serve to guide them through to final destination. This and a host of other technological developments, employed at the new yard, including an electronic brain, closed circuit TV, radar and radio, are helping reduce terminal time of freight cars at the Hub City by as much as 80 per cent. Moncton Yard is part of a CN programme to integrate freight handling on a nation-wide basis that when it is completed will revolutionize the freight transportation industry in Canada as far as speed, efficiency, dependability and economy are concorned. It has been estimated, for instance, that when Moncton Yard is working in co-ordination with Montreal Yard, soon to be completed, the running time of freight trains between the Atlantic Provinces and Central Canada will be reduced by as much as half. CN yards also are under construction at Toronts and Winnipeg. (CNR Photo)


1. Measure ½ c. lukewarm water into a large bowl. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast OR stir into the water I tsp. gran ulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast, Let stand 10 mins., then

3. Punch down dough. Turn out into 3 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel; let rest 10 mins. Roll out each portion into a 9-inch square. Combine 1/3 c. thick raspberry jam and 1/4 c. shredded coconut; spread to within 1/2 inch of edges on two squares of dough; pile in greased 9-inch square pan; ton with remaining lough. Press down edges lightly. Grease top, Cover, Let rise until doubled in bulk -about 45 mins, Bake in mod, hot oven (375°) 25 to 30 mins. Turn out; place top side up on wire rack.

4. Combine 1/2 c. sifted icing Sugar, few drops vanilla and suffi-cient milk to make a rather stiff icing. Spread hot cakes with 3 theps. raspberry jam. Cool cake slightly then drizzle with icing and sprinkle lightly with a little coco-nut. Yield: I coffee cake.

Parents Help Prevent Fires

Unlikely as it may seem, Nova Scotia is nearing the tane of year when it annually records its greatest number

or forest fires April and May All winter long, officials of the Department of Lands and Forests have been preparing to renew their battle with the forest fire menace. Equipment has been over-hauled and Litest techniques in forest five control have been examined.

Looking back at last year when 605 fires burned 21.265 acres of Nova Scotta woodland, Mr. R. H. Burgess, director of forestry for Nova Scotia, said it was extremely, fortunate Josses were not much higher, considering the hot, dry summer

that jurned the woods into finder boxes. Last year's forest fires were attributed to a variety of causes, but the biggest single menace was smoking which most common cause, and the one that generated most concern. was children playing with matches or hiding out in the bush for a smoke, he added. In 1960, 104 forest fires were attributed

.co children. Mr. Burgess said the expanding extension program being Royal Bank Bldg. carried out in Nova Scotia schools by the Department of Lands and Forests would have to be stepped up even more so 27:tfc to impress upon the children the danger of fires in the woods and the need of conservation. He said parents would have to be made aware of the problem and of their responsibility to supervise and instruct their children.

From 194049 Nova Scotia had an annual average of 225 fires with 15,298 acres lost, each year, he said. From 495059 Nova Scotia averaged 285 fires per year but the overage yearly loss dropped to 6,500 acres, he said. An incre ise in the number of people using the woods for recreation was responsible for the larger number of fires per year, and more and better trained personnel and improved forest firetichting equipment were responsible for the drop in acreaze lost, he

The two months with the highest gran per of thes flast year were April (149 fires) and May (173 fires) On the 13st day of April last year. Honew outbreaks were reported.

Putting together a newspaper requires much longer time than picking an article off a shelf and exchanging it over the counter for cash. Do you know that it takes one hour to set up a column of type on the linotype? Count the columns in your newspaper and figure out the hours of, work. Advertising copy also takes hours to do. Without it we cannot start running the paper. Can you see why it is so essential to have the advertising copy early. The copy must he set into type and made up into a good looking advertise-

ment. That takes time. With the price of paper what it is, with the number of hours of work involved, seven cents per copy hardly pays for a newspaper. Advertising is the only source of revenue to keep a newspaper operating.

Or course even if you lived safely through the H-bomb strack and sat out the next two weeks safely in a shelter, your troubles would just be beginning. Especially if the Reds had saturated the U.S. and Canada with multimegaton weapons. You would have to get used to living a long while in a badly contaminated world.

Much of the land could be contaminated, the roads, the roof of your house, your car, the food and water supply, the crops growing in the fields, the fresh milk.

You would have to be careful how long you stayed outside, when you walked, what you wore. You would have to learn how to decontaminate your roof, car, yard, food. But these things could be done.

You might have to change your eating habits, go easy on milk and dairy products, maybe eat less meat and some the question is familiar: what is the law governing the right, kinds of fresh fruits and vegetables for awhile, step up your consumption of wheat and corn or other grains and cereals.

You could expect private companies and the Government to clean up the water supply, get electric power and other services going again rather quickly, and to get under way

Sizeable areas of highly-contaminated land might have be abandoned for years. But much could be farmed right on the left to yield Conscientious drivers might think seriously away.
