Max would then stand back and come over dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of fixing."

On other occasions when some people would say, "let's be a little off" and vice versa, often that is all it took. They often since have a respect of the value of that remark and the actual need of "off" in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Anderson, veteran of two wars (second World War), Kenneth, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale hardware merchant, and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day, I was asked to write about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two times what I had written about the man who was found marooned on a beach in some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. ## Murder Hearing Adjourned

Twenty of the thirty-nine Crown witnesses slated to be heard in the preliminary enquiry into the murder charge against 25-year-old Antoine Joseph Comeau, of Salmon River, gave evidence Thursday during the opening day of the enquiry.

Comeau is charged with the murder of Joseph Henry Robicheau, also of Salmon River, whose body was found November 26th, riddled with shotgun pellets and hidden in tall grass alongside the road at Bear Cove some distance from a wood's camp where Robicheau had last been reported as staying.

Robicheau had returned to Digby county on November 14th, in company with the accused, from Ontario. He was last seen that evening in company with Comeau with whom he had visited a wood's camp owned by Robicheau earlier that evening.

Giving evidence at Thursday's hearing was RCMP Constable W. R. Haines, of the identification branch, Halifax. Constable Haines entered 17 photographs as exhibits. These included pictures of the Robicheau camp showing stains on the floor and stairs; the body of the deceased showing wounds about the body and wrist.

Constable Haines also identified some more than thirty exhibits entered in evidence which he stated he had taken to the crime lab in Sackville. These included clothing taken from the deceased at the autopsy, linoleum from the floor of the Robicheau camp and stair treads from the same camp. Also included were seat covers from a 1953 Chrysler car recovered by RCMP in Yarmouth and said to be the property of the deceased.

Dr. Ian Maxwell, associate professor of pathology at Dalhousie University, described the autopsy performed on the deceased. He said death resulted from multiple puncture wounds in the heart. He stated he recovered a large number of shotgun pellets from inside the body and the skin. He did not attempt to recover all of them, he said, and estimated there were many hundreds. He told of removing internal organs and specimens of tissue.

Dr. Maxwell said the wounds were from a shotgun discharge from in front of the deceased. He said there was evidence of heavy bleeding but stated there was no injury to the face. He said at the time he performed the autopsy the deceased had been dead 10 or 12 days.

RCMP Corporal Baptiste told of being at the inquest and receiving from Dr. Maxwell clothing and other items from the body of the deceased. These were later taken to Sackville according to evidence given by RCMP Sgt. Cyril Goodyear of the CTD Halifax. He also stated he took a jar containing pellets and zipper, which had been retrieved from the side of the door of the Robicheau camp, to the crime lab.

Madame Rolande Rotten, crime lab chemist, told of analysis she made of the deceased's stomach. This showed it to contain no alcohol. A sample of blood showed .07 parts per 1,000 of alcohol. The blood was type O. She said she found human blood on the stair treads but could not group it as an attempt had seemingly been made to wash it. She stated the found human blood, type O, on the linoleum, and on a chrome table leg, and found the preliminary blood and pellets were found hearing into a charge of murder against Antoine Joseph Comeau, of Salmon River, the sweater, Human blood, until January 6th, after hearing type O, was found on seat, in connection with the death of Joseph Henry Robicheau, whose body was found on the road at Bear Cove, on November 26th.

The bodies were also recovered by Madame Rotten on November 26th. At Friday's hearing, Alvin Jones, of Digby, brother of Antoine Joseph Comeau, was called to the stand. He said he had seen his brother when he last saw him. He said there was someone in the car with him. He said he had refused to let him have it and he had left.

Monette Marie Robicheau, 11-year-old niece of the deceased, told of going to her uncle's woods camp on the evening of November 11 with Henry Robicheau and Antoine Comeau, her parents and brothers. She said her uncle and Comeau were at her home when she returned from school, they ate supper and then went to the camp. She said her brother, Raymond, showed the accused a gun which was behind the couch in the camp. Comeau said her father had not cleaned it after he had used it last. She said her uncle got shells which were in two bottles and after looking at them returned them to the bottles. She said her uncle drove them all back home later.

## Four Injured In Accident

A highway accident Friday, December 23, at Deep Brook, Annapolis County, sent four persons to hospital. The mishap occurred when a car, driven by Homer Potter, skidded out of control after having passed a small truck. The vehicle plunged down an eight-foot embankment and came to rest against a tree.

An ambulance from the Cornwallis naval base rushed Potter and the three passengers to the hospital at Digby. Most seriously injured was Wayne Potter, son of Homer Potter, who sustained a broken jaw. He was later taken to the Victoria General Hospital in Halifax. The driver received facial lacerations. The two other occupants of the car, Wayne Potter's wife and Allan Smith, Homer Potter's grandson, were discharged from hospital following treatment.

## MV Bluenose Rates Increased

Increased passenger and vehicle rates on Canadian National Railways Yarmouth, N. S. Bar Harbor, Me., ferry MV Bluenose were announced yesterday by the company.

Effective January 15, passenger fares are increased by 20 percent, automobile and truck rates by 10 percent.

In making the announcement, CN vice-president D. V. Gonder said the increases were made necessary by a wage boost granted the vessels' licensed personnel last August.

Mr. Gonder said the tariff revisions would help defray the resultant increase in operating costs. As of January 15, the one-way fare for adults will be \$6, up a dollar. The return fare, \$10.85, up from \$9. Children five years old and under twelve will pay \$3 one-way and \$5.10 return, as against \$2.70 and \$4.50 at present.

The new one-way rate for automobiles will be \$17.60, it was \$16. The return automobile fare will be \$31.90 as against \$29. The charge for transporting passenger automobile trailers will go up to \$12.50 per foot of overall length from the present 75 cents. Cabin accommodation goes up 10 percent, the new one-way rate for a mezzanine deck cabin with toilet being \$3.50, without toilet \$1.10. They have been \$5 and \$1 respectively. Effective January 15 it will cost \$1.65 a foot of length to transport a truck or empty, with a minimum of \$22. It has cost \$1.50 with a \$20 minimum. On and after

Jack Nichols, of Digby, was re-elected president of the Digby East Fish & Game Association at the annual meeting here Thursday evening. Other officers include Aubrey Adams, 1st vice-pres., Chester Murley, 2nd vice-pres., and R. L. Taylor, sec'y-treas.

The association decided to press for a shortening of the deer season in Digby by two weeks with the suggested opening for the season October 15 to November 15. It was also decided to seek a limit on the deer kill to one of either sex.

The banning of the commercial sale of rabbits in Digby county will also be sought by the association. A bag limit of five rabbits per day was also asked for, with the season to open at the closing of the deer season and remain open until February 15.

The Digby East association will renew its efforts to secure a closed season on heavier Digby county. It was decided for the past several years the association had recommended this and vigorous protests were made when the land and forests department decided on an open season for heavier in the county for 1960.

Resolutions covering the Digby association's views will be presented to the annual meeting of the provincial fish and game association in Halifax in mid-January. Charles Hall, Jack Nichols and Charles Balse were named as delegates to the meeting with Dr. P. C. Outhouse and Aubrey Adams as alternates.

R. L. Taylor reported that the association will have spent by the end of the year \$3,255.51 on the development of the lodge project at Haines' Lake. Appreciation was expressed for donations of labour and materials made by association members to help in the development of this project.

It was decided a board of management should be set up to direct and control the operation of the lodge. President Jack Nichols named Charles Hall, R. L. Taylor, E. B. Richardson, A. R. Payne, Ross Mullen, P. C. Outhouse, Ronald Winchester, Lawrence Thurber, Chester Murley, Aubrey Adams, Boyd Milbury and Reginald Weir to this committee.

A trophy for the buck deer with the widest antler spread shot in the 1960 season was presented by its donor, A. R. Payne, to Fred Thibault of Doucetteville, Me. Thibault shot a buck during the season with a 21 inch spread and weighing 190 pounds.

The MacDonald Motor Co. Ltd. trophy for the largest trout caught in 1960 was presented by R. L. Taylor to Denis Belliveau, who also won the trophy in 1959.

A committee was appointed to meet with the Digby municipal council to press for a bounty on raccoon, fox and wildcat in the county. ### Year End Review

A considerable increase in public interest in Civil Defence has been evident during 1960. As evidence of this, 15 municipalities have organized for Civil Defence this year.

There are now 34 municipalities organized for Civil Defence, and taking part in the Financial Assistance Program.

This increase has been reflected in the heavy demands for assistance and training received by the provincial co-ordinator's office.

To aid in meeting this increased workload, a provincial Civil Defence training officer was added to the co-ordinator's staff in April of this year.

In May, 1960, Nova Scotia took part in the National Civil Defence exercise TOCSIN 1960, and senior officers from 10 provincial departments participated in the exercise, headed by the deputy provincial secretary and the deputy minister of municipal affairs.

In July, the co-ordinator received a supply of the federal government's new pamphlet on radioactive fallout protection, "Your Basement Fallout Shelter".

Copies of this shelter pamphlet were mailed to the lieutenant governor, the premier, members of the Cabinet and all members of the Legislative Assembly. In addition, copies were also mailed to all mayors and wardens and directors of Civil Defence. A bulk supply was sent to each of our three zone controllers, with instructions to distribute pamphlets to each council in every town and municipal district.

Advantage was taken of the Provincial Exhibition at Truro which took place during the period August 30 to September 3, inclusive, to display to the public one of these shelters which was erected according to the details provided in the plan supplied with the pamphlet.

This shelter aroused considerable interest, and of the large number who visited the booth, 591 persons entered the shelter and asked questions of the members of our staff stationed inside.

In the booth adjoining the one housing the fallout shelter, the Civil Defence staff displayed an exhibit of the "Emergency Pack" prepared by the federal Department of Health and Welfare. The pack consisted of a selection of packaged food supplies sufficient to last one person 14 days.

Other items of emergency survival equipment recommended for inclusion in a shelter were also on display.

It is also planned to show a similar display in Halifax, Sydney and Kentville as soon as possible.

In October, Lt. Col. Gordon Grant was appointed provincial co-ordinator to replace Mr. George A. Boggs, who had previously resigned.

With respect to training the provincial Civil Defence staff has held:

(a) Three orientation courses, one each in Halifax, Sydney and Kentville.

(b) One radiological monitoring course in Truro.

(c) Six welfare courses, consisting of: (i) Two general welfare; Liverpool and Pictou County; (ii) Two registration and enquiry; Liverpool and Truro; (iii) One emergency feeding; Liverpool; (iv) One emergency clothing; Liverpool.

(d) One public information officers course; Halifax.

(e) Thirty home nursing courses held this year throughout the province, of which 14 are still running.

(f) Thirty-five first aid courses, of which 10 are still running.

Last year, some 2,000 Civil Defence volunteers were trained in home nursing and

approximately 4,000 in first aid. It is expected that the number trained this year will exceed the figures for 1959.

Rescue courses have been held in Caledonia, Liverpool, Truro and Digby. Currently, similar courses are being conducted at Pictou, Middleton, Truro and Liverpool. A rescue self-help course, rescue course is also being held at Truro and Digby.

During the severe forest fire situation this past summer, the provincial Civil Defence office co-ordinated all requests for assistance, obtained assistance from Headquarters Eastern Command which, in turn, obtained for us valuable aid from both the RCN and the RCAP.

A Civil Defence emergency communications network was established between the provincial (Lands and Forests) operations at Indian Field, the Mersey Paper firefighters at Jordan Lake and Civil Defence headquarters in Liverpool.

In addition, a Civil Defence

volunteer emergency feeding unit from Liverpool served meals for five days during the forest fire at White Point in Queens County, and a similar unit from Truro led the firefighters at the Collingwood forest fire.

At Halifax, in November, the provincial Civil Defence Headquarters staff put on a demonstration of an advanced treatment centre in the Halifax Armouries, for the benefit of the student nurses studying at the Victoria General Hospital, the Halifax Infirmary, Grace Maternity Hospital and the Children's Hospital.

Fifty-one nurses also attended from Camp Hill Hospital, 350 graduate nurses from the Halifax division of the V.O.N., and doctors and nursing sisters from the armed services. A total of 807 attended the demonstration.

## Year End Review

The Department of Lands and Forests expects another busy and successful year in 1961.

While the fire losses of 1960 are an unpleasant memory, steps are already in progress to improve the department's forest protection service. Additions already have been made to fire fighting equipment, another fire tower will be erected, and the communication system will be improved and expanded.

The Crown land survey, which has now covered more than 2,600,000 acres, will be continued, and the main blocks of Crown land should be surveyed and monumented in another two to three years.

A considerable portion of the Crown lands are old fire barrens where natural tree growth is sparse. For a number of years efforts have been made to reforest these barren areas and in 1961 the department will attempt to surpass the figure of some two hundred thousand trees planted in 1960.

Forest nurseries have been operated for some time at Lawrenceport, Annapolis Co., Kemptville, Yarmouth Co., the Chignecto Game Sanctuary, Cumberland Co., Blue Mountain, Pictou Co., and two additional nurseries are in the development stage at Upper Manchester, Guysborough Co., and Coxheath, Cape Breton Co.

During colonial times no attempt was made to retain woodland in public ownership in the peninsula of Nova Scotia, consequently little woodland of value was retained. For a number of years the department has attempted to correct this situation by adding to the Crown lands by the purchase of private holdings. An objective of one million acres was set and to date better than half the objective has been reached.

In the light of present developments, this policy of land purchase appears wise, since it guarantees more stability to the forest industries, provides shelter for game, clean water for human consumption and for fish, and recreational areas for an expanding population.

Year by year Crown land stumpage is becoming more important to both the sawmills and pulp mills of the province, and the public lands which were neglected and often plundered in the past must be made more productive in the future.

During the coming year very considerable improvement work will be carried on. In addition to planting the barrens, thinning and improvement cuttings will be carried out, roads and trails will be built, and more Crown land will be brought under intensive management.

The program of providing camp and picnic sites will be continued, with new sites developed and sites already established will be improved.

The department co-operates with the Nova Scotia Forest Products Association and the Maritime Lumber Bureau in their work of promoting the forest industries.

In the past year some sawmills in the province commenced the production of pulp chips from sawmill waste. While only one pulp mill is buying these chips at the present time, the new pulp mill at the Strait of Canso, which will go into production late in 1961, will increase the demand for both chips from sawmill waste and for pulpwood.

This growing market for sawmill waste is likely to cause drastic changes in the sawmills of the province. It is likely that a few stationary sawmills will be set up at strategic locations to which logs

While, undoubtedly, a number of small mills will go out of business, a better type of mill will produce better lumber, which will compete more successfully with lumber from the West Coast and from Northern Europe. This larger type of mill will also provide more permanent employment under improved working conditions.

Over 85 percent of the land area of Nova Scotia is forest land or fire barren, and since this area is unsuited for agricultural purposes, it should remain in forest and no effort should be spared to improve its productive capacity.

In a province like Nova Scotia, the greatest possible production from forest land must be obtained through multiple use. The forests must provide the raw materials for the forest industries, shelter for fish and game and fur bearing animals, and recreational areas for the general public.

The department is very keenly aware of these values and needs, and during 1961 will carry out a number of studies to determine how these valuable natural resources should be managed to provide continued sport and recreation.

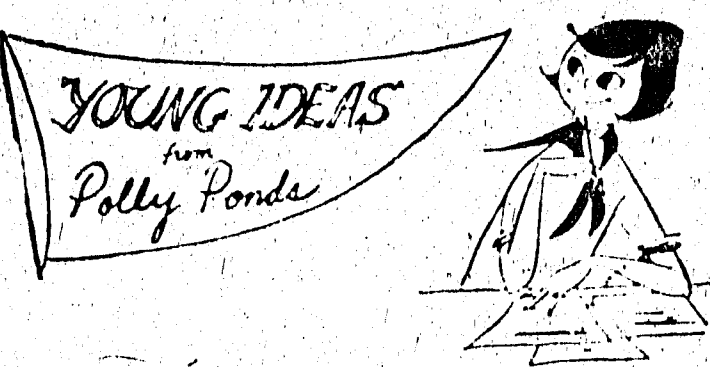

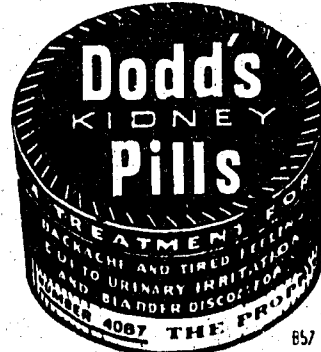
A game period followed with Peggy Thompson and Penny Kenney in charge. A social hour followed.

## Book On Alcohol Clementsvalle

"Very few people can even voice the words, 'beverage alcohol' without feeling some emotional reaction," says the report of The United Church of Canada Commission on Temperance Policy and Program to the 19th General Council, Edmonton, September 1960, and just released for general distribution throughout the church. Entitled "The Church and the Alcohol Problem", the report was prepared by a committee composed of doctors, psychiatrists, clergymen, farmers, teachers, housewives, and business men across Canada. John L. Grogan, Q.C., Toronto, was chairman, and Rev. Harry M. Morrow, director of the University Settlement, Toronto, was secretary.

The report points out that while the problems arising from the excessive use of alcoholic beverages "have troubled the mind of thinking man almost from the dawn of recorded history, it may come as a surprise to many to know that it is only during the last 200 years that temperance societies... have been in existence. In the minds of many, temperance became equated with prohibition," says the report but "it should be obvious that the two words are not and cannot be synonymous."

The 56-page pamphlet, issued by the Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the United Church, includes a historical review, a section on the Bible and beverage alcohol, and seven major resolutions on such subjects as personal practice, alcohol education, social control, advertising, nationalization and rehabilitation. Copies have been sent to ministers of all pastoral charges with the recommendation that since it outlines an alcohol education programme for a local church, it be used for study by adult groups as well as the basis for sermons and addresses.

## Year End Review



Hon. R. A. Donahoe

Minister of Public Health  
In the year which has just ended Nova Scotia has continued to be fortunate from a health point of view.

We have had no serious epidemics; only eight cases of poliomyelitis were reported, the tuberculosis death rate shows a further drop, the preventable communicable diseases were low in incidence and there appeared to be a continuing interest in the prevention of disease.

Considerable support for research programs into the causes of cancer, arthritis, heart disease, etc., was also a notable feature. It is becoming increasingly evident that it is better and less expensive to prevent disease than to treat disease after it has occurred. More emphasis is needed on programs to deal with preventable accidents on the road, in the home and in industry.

There is also developing a new awareness of the importance to health of our environment. Such matters as smoke abatement, stream pollution, fallout from atomic explosions, water supply and ground pollution are under active discussion. With increasing urbanization these matters become more urgent and their control more important.

During the year the department continued the operation of eight health units. These, together with the Halifax City Health Unit, cover the entire province. Nova Scotia is the only province in Canada with a complete coverage of health units, the recommended method of providing a preventive health service. These units are staffed with trained medical and nursing personnel, together with sanitary inspectors and clerical assistants. They have available nutritionists, rehabilitation officers and other consultants to assist with any public health program.

The department also was responsible for the operation of three tuberculosis sanatoria and one mental hospital. Late in the year, due to the drop in requirements for treatment beds, the tuberculosis section of the Rosedale Hospital was closed and it now operates as a small general hospital for the area.

The new building at the Nova Scotia Hospital has been very satisfactory. The older buildings are in the process of rehabilitation in order to bring them up to a high standard of sanitation and changes have been carried out to improve treatment and to handle the large number of admissions. Close to 1,300 in 1960. Five years ago, the number of admissions was 800. Due to improved methods and drugs there are more short-term admissions; people come earlier for treatment and thus usually avoid the long drawn-out treatment required in chronic illness.

New mental health clinics, staffed with psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers have been opened, the last two being at Truro and Antigonish. There are now six such clinics being supported by the department throughout the province.

The program put into effect in municipal mental hospitals to control tuberculosis is showing its effect; in fact, there has been such a good result that we are now planning on closure of tuberculosis wards in mental hospitals, with the remaining cases being placed in the Nova Scotia Hospital. The newer drugs have proved their worth in this field.

There have been definite improvements in the municipal mental hospital field. Over two-thirds of chronic mental patients are now in approved institutions, which receive government assistance. Planning is now under way for a new municipal mental hospital in Kings County. It is also expected that one of the smaller institutions will be closed permanently soon.

With the coming into effect of the Hospital Insurance Plan there were increasing demands on our Central Labor

At present, a major addition to the Pathology Institute on University Avenue, Halifax, is almost completed. This will not only enable expansion for routine work and teaching but will give space for newer developments in virus diseases which are becoming increasingly important. It is interesting to note that in one laboratory — Biochemistry — there was an increase of 54 per cent over last year's work. A difficulty in the laboratory field has been the shortage of trained personnel, despite a continuous training program supported by federal health grants.

A new program to assist those suffering from diabetes was started during the year. This is a disease which, when developed, lasts for a lifetime and dietary care, insulin or drugs must be carried on, often in those unable to afford the cost. To date, almost 3,000 persons are being assisted under this program.

Despite the continued lowering of the death rate, we are continuing to find a large number of active cases of tuberculosis. Older persons are frequently involved, indicating the need for health supervision at all ages. Further, about a fifth of the active cases are in those with a previous history of tuberculosis, again emphasizing the need for regular examinations. A larger number are receiving treatment at home due to the efficiency of the newer drugs, nevertheless, rest still remains the basic requirement in treatment.

There is increasing interest in tuberculin testing, a method to indicate those infected with the germ. If everyone were tuberculin tested and the positives x-rayed, we would soon have better control of this insidious disease which spreads from person to person.

In the field of dental health we had major difficulty in obtaining personnel. The three mobile clinics were only in operation part of the year; 40 rural communities were visited and some 2,100 children were given treatment.

Six dental hygienists were employed during the year, largely in the school program and they dealt with some 15,000 children.

Other services provided through the Department of Public Health included Public Health Nursing, Nutritionists, Well Baby Clinics, assistance in programs investigating maternal and neonatal deaths, consultant services to maternity section of hospitals. Many of these were on a continuing basis under the direction of the Health Unit Directors.

Federal assistance in the health field was continued and approximately 1 1/2 million dollars was utilized under the general program together with a much larger sum under the Hospital Construction Grant. This latter is a matching grant; however, the province does better in this regard, making \$3,000 provincial money available for \$2,000 federal on a per-bed basis. With this assistance a large number of new hospital beds and nurses' home beds are under construction or in the planning phase.

could not see who it was.  
He stated he saw the accused at the liquor store in Meteghan on November 18 and asked him where Joseph Henry Robicheau was. The accused told him not to worry about Joe he is alright, he slept at the camp the first night, at Norwood the second night, and now we're in a camp on an island. The witness said he told the accused if he knew where his brother was to bring him home as his mother is sick.

The witness said he had been to his brother's woods camp on November 16 but saw nothing and returned later with another brother, Francois, who climbed a ladder and looked through an upper window of the camp. The witness said he went to the RCMP about his brother on November 20th after talking with his mother and Francois.

On cross examination the witness stated the deceased sometimes drank too much.

Francois Robicheau, another brother of the deceased also gave evidence. He stated he last saw Joseph Henry Robicheau in company with the accused. He said the deceased had talked about what price he might get for his car around Meteghan and said he might want to sell it and fly back to Toronto. He said both the accused and deceased were sober when at his home. Joe told mother "see you tomorrow," that's the last time I saw him alive. He identified a 16 gauge shotgun among exhibits as his and said it was at his home on November 14. He first noticed it was missing on November 16 and on the 21st he saw it at the home of John Robicheau at Salmon River. John Robicheau testified Thursday that he bought it from the accused.

The witness testified he saw the accused at Salmon River on the morning of November 20th. He asked him if he knew where the 16 gauge shotgun was and the accused said he had given it to Joe. ## Unpaid Taxes Cause Concern

Concern over the "tremendous amount of unpaid taxes" in Digby municipality was voiced by Digby municipal Warden Ronald Morehouse in his address to the opening meeting of the annual session of the Digby municipal council here Tuesday.

Warden Morehouse said these unpaid taxes "threaten the credit of our municipality" and stated every effort must be made to collect them in order to put the financial operations of the municipality on a "more stable basis".

The job of collecting tax arrears, the Warden said, would not be a popular or an easy one but "it is one which must be done and one which it is our duty to do".

In his address Warden Morehouse criticized the present system of tax collection in Digby municipality. He termed it "out of date, expensive and cumbersome" and said it was his sincere conviction it was "incapable of doing the job that has to be done". He stated it was his hope the council would see fit to change the system "to bring it more in line with modern business practice".

Tax collections in the municipality are made by collectors appointed for each municipal district who are paid a percentage on collections made, including current taxes. It is understood tax arrears in the municipality at the end of 1960 amounted to \$116,300, which is an increase of \$27,500 over the figure at the end of 1959. Completely accurate figures will not be available until completion of the audit which is expected before the week-end. The tax levy for 1960 was a \$275,000 which was an increase of \$38,000 over 1959. Total tax collections in 1960 amounted to 89% of the current levy. In 1959 the figure was 92.1%.

The possibility of new school construction in Digby municipality was forecast by Warden Morehouse in his address. He stated school inspector C. E. Edwards had recommended to the municipal school board a consolidation of the schools on the islands of Digby Neck and pointed out the need for additional classroom space at Weymouth.

The Warden stated the council "will therefore be called upon to decide on the building of additions to the schools at Weymouth and Freeport and something for Westport".

In his address Warden Morehouse welcomed Mr. Donald Fiendel of the department of municipal affairs who, he said, was attending the council session in order to assist with the preparation of a budget and other financial matters. Mr. Fiendel stated he hoped he could be of assistance to the council and said he and his department were anxious to be of the utmost help to municipal councils across the province.

Other speakers at the opening session included H. C. Morton, manager of the Digby branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia; and Victor Cardozo, M.L.A. for the electoral district of Digby.

Mr. Morton commented briefly on the need for an adequate tax collection program and said councils were faced with great tasks in the conduct of municipal business.

He stated it was his opinion the present tax arrears situation so far as Digby municipality is concerned is not a result of a lowering economy in the area.

Dr. R. A. Armstrong, executive director of the Digby mental health clinic, appeared before the council seeking a grant toward the continued operation of the clinic.

This school is attended by the high school pupils from Tiverton from Grade 8 and up.

Mr. Edwards stated all the teachers in the schools are doing a good job and the pupils show real talent but the opportunities and facilities are not available. He said he felt these pupils deserve the same opportunities as those in other parts of the county.

## About This and That

### Winter Driving

The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council says the two worst troublemakers for the winter driver are slippery surfaces and poor visibility. To avoid these death-dealing hazards the Council tells us that it's wise to drive slowly and steadily, reducing our speed well in advance of intersections. For smooth, safe stops, pump brakes rapidly instead of jamming them down and spinning into a skid. Use the chains for ice and snow because chains can cut down emergency stopping distance to about half. We'll have a lot better visibility if the windshield wipers and defroster are in good working condition. Then too, it pays to keep all of the car wind-up clean of snow, ice or grime. It pays to take a little extra time to scrape off blurry windows. Remember, we've got to be able to see the danger to avoid it. Winter driving is tricky; it takes real skill and leaves no room for carelessness. A chance-taking, S.S. watch out for slippery surfaces and poor visibility.

These are some of the valuable rules which the Safety Council has submitted. While we are on the subject we'd like to mention one or two general driving problems noted recently by our own observations. Firstly, there is the hazard of the one-light car. Recently on an outing we met no less than four of such. We began to think there was an epidemic. Often the one-light car driver is quite innocent of the offense. He is still just as great an offender in case of accident and as great a hazard to the other driver at any time. For this reason we would caution all drivers to check their head lights before setting out for a ride at night. Check the stop lights and direction signals to see that they are in working condition. Check the dimmers and furthermore use the dimmers when necessary on the highway.

The other problem we want to mention again is that of the pedestrian at night. Just last week we read in the provincial press of someone being killed while walking along the highway. We know nothing of the circumstances of this particular accident but it prompts us to remind the pedestrians of their responsibility when walking along the highway. All too often, the clothing of the pedestrian blends exactly with the color of the pavement making it difficult for a driver to see the pedestrian at night. This difficulty is made much more so when the driver is facing on coming car lights.

Remember a life extinguished cannot be brought to live again by blaming another nor will sorrow or remorse return life. The time to be cautious is at the present.

### That's For The Birds

Did you ever hear anyone make the expression "As crazy as the birds"? Have you heard anyone refer to a strange character as "He's a bird"? Or, anything strange and ridiculous passed off as "That's for the birds"?

Why should such expressions be used when birds are known to be such intelligent little beings? Take, for instance, the habit of the birds told to us last week by an alert bird watcher, "Do you know," he said, "that it has been found that birds from the Annapolis Valley do not take a direct route when flying north or south? Instead, they travel down the valley, on to Digby Neck to Westport and there take their flight where less time will be spent over water? You might call it intelligence or instinct or whatever but the birds are not crazy or ridiculous little creatures. They are worth preserving.

One way of preserving the birds through the long, cold and snowy months is to feed them. Try it once and see how intelligent they are. They'll return again to see what you have for them. The next time you use the expression "that's for the birds" make it refer to the crumbs, seed and other foods you have tucked away for a purpose.

### Employment

Not only the birds need to be fed during the winter months. Families of human beings need food during the winter too. We do not suggest here that we hand out food as to the birds. Here we suggest to hand out "Do It Now" jobs.

The rush of Christmas has passed and by the way the stores in town had a booming business. "Just don't know where all the money comes from," said one merchant. But right now there could possibly be a lull. In another month or two, however, things will begin to pick up. Housekeepers will get anxious to get on with the Spring house cleaning. Repairs will have to be made. Re-decoration will be required. Gardens will have to be cleared up. Everybody will be wanting work men at the same time. Instead, why not start "Now" to make the renovations and spend the employment a bit. Even our door work can be done in the winter with plastic protection from the weather.

And speaking of employment as far as Digby is concerned we had a visitor from Boston last week who predicted more American tourists for Nova Scotia this year. Why? Because of the nearly equal value of the American and Canadian dollar. We note by the press that Hon. George Nowlan also sees a substantial increase in Nova Scotia tourism because of the near parity of the two currencies. Why not prepare for the increase of tourists NOW and spread employment over the winter months.

Remember unemployment affects everybody. The loss of wages is felt by merchants and indirectly by everybody in the community. Keep the home town bread winners employed NOW for greater prosperity.

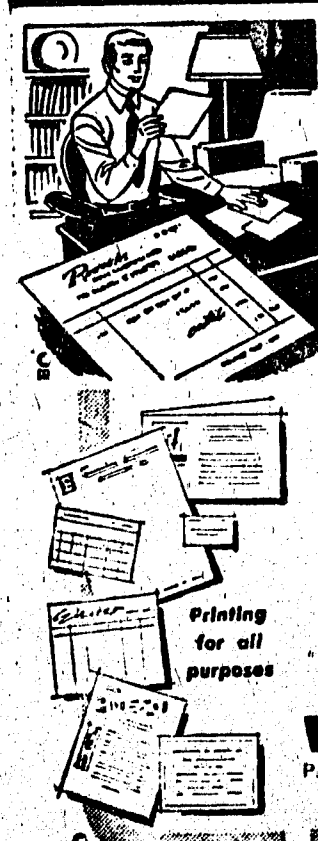

## Cornell Team In Nigeria

The mental health problems facing people whose whole way of life is being drastically altered will be studied by a group of Cornell University social scientists, headed by Dr. A. H. Leighton, who left Friday for Nigeria.

In that newly-independent nation they will try to discover some of the effects on mental health when a country emerges from its ancient tribal ways into a modern, forward-looking nation.

The study will be valuable as it will shed light on the mental health problems of people engaged in rapid and drastic transition and provide insights into methods of prevention and treatment of the psychiatric disorders often attending such transition.

The work in Nigeria will mark a new phase in the ambitious program in social psychiatry which has been carried out by Cornell social scientists over the past ten years in Nova Scotia, Mexico, Alaska and New York City.

By their studies of mental illness among people of widely different cultural backgrounds the Cornell research workers hope to shed light on the social factors which in some instances cause psychiatric disorder and to discover what may be effective in terms of prevention.

In Nigeria, which has been independent only a few months, people are turning toward urban centres and the outside world for cultural leadership; their ideas about work are changing; tribal authority is breaking down; people are moving to cities to work in new industries; and modern farming, health and nutritional practices are being adopted.

The effects of such changes on the mental health of the people is a problem with which a new nation must be prepared to deal. The forward-looking Nigerian government is concerned with the reaction of the people to these changes and their effects on the future of the country.

The program to be carried out in Nigeria will be supported by grants from the National Institute of Mental Health and the Milbank Memorial Fund. Dr. Leighton directs the Cornell programme in social psychiatry, which is sponsored jointly by the department of psychiatry at the Cornell university medical college and the Ministry of Health of the western region of Nigeria.

Five members of the group who left last Friday for a three month pilot study are from Cornell. They are Dr. A. H. Leighton, psychiatrist; Prof. Charles C. Hughes and research associate Dr. Jane M. Hughes, anthropologists; all of whom are well known in Digby; and David C. Macklin, social psychologist. The others making up the pilot study team are Dr. Raymond Price, of Montreal, and Dr. Charles Savage, of Woodside, Cal.

At the end of the three month pilot study, the social scientists will return to the States to plan the larger study which Cornell hopes to conduct in Nigeria. This study, the Cornell scientists hope, will contribute greatly to the understanding of ways of preventing the mental health problems faced by a people who are adjusting to rapid and drastic change.

Mr. Edwards stated it was hoped this outmoded school could be eliminated within a year or so. "It would mean the salvation of that area," he said.

## To Tour Western Provinces



Rev. L. R. Atkinson, Secretary Evangelist for the Maritime United Baptist Convention, has been invited by the Baptist Convention of Western Canada to tour the Western Provinces and assist their Director of Evangelism, Rev. E. T. Roberts, in Conference on Evangelism.

A one day workshop has been set up in several central areas and pastors and key workers within that area will gather and take part. An afternoon session, supper meeting and evening service is being arranged for each Conference. Mr. Atkinson is being asked to speak on the program of Evangelism that he has been directing for some years in the Maritimes. He will outline and discuss the Deeper Life Conference which several of the churches have conducted, take part in a panel on Visitation Evangelism, and give the closing evangelistic message at the evening service.

The first workshop is to be held in Victoria, B. C., on February 7th. Other central areas where workshops are scheduled are: Vancouver, Kootenay area in B. C.; Grand Prairie, Red Deer, Lethbridge, Calgary and Edmonton in Alberta; Saskatoon and Regina in Saskatchewan; Winnipeg in Manitoba. Sunday services will be held in High River and Nanton in Alberta; Nepeawa, Brandon and Dauphin in Manitoba.

Mr. Atkinson leaves by TCA for Vancouver on February 4th and expects to be home on February 22nd.

Rev. Mr. Atkinson resides at Bay View, Digby County.

## Hydro System Shows Profit

Operations of the hydro electric distribution system of the municipality of Digby showed an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$6,059.93 for the year 1960, it was reported to the municipal council Friday by superintendent James Ayer.

Operating revenue for the year amounted to \$127,974.61 and operating expenses were \$108,867.20. Debt charges amounted to \$13,396.17 and non operating revenue was \$318.66.

Mr. Ayer reported that the 1960 operating revenue showed an increase of \$6,518.37 over 1959. He stated new capital expenditure for the year totalled \$22,201.04.

Extensions were made to the distribution system in three locations, Mr. Ayer said. At Smith's Cove trailer park a single phase line was built for a distance of 2,600 feet; two phases were added to the line at Centreville for one and a quarter miles, and at North Range 1,850 single phase transmission line was built.

In 1960, Mr. Ayer said, the municipal council had imposed a tax on the distribution for the first time. He said \$2,500 was taken from profits to meet this new expense.

## Injured In Bus-Car Crash

Nathan Jacquard and Joseph Haley, of Yarmouth, and George Wade, of Annapolis Royal, were injured Tuesday afternoon in a head-on collision between their car and a school bus driven by Frank Robinson Jr., of Digby.

The accident occurred at Brighton some five miles from Digby about 4:30 Tuesday afternoon as the school bus was returning to Digby from Weymouth. Only passenger aboard the bus was Courtland Adams, of Brighton, who is teaching school in Weymouth. The three accident victims are crew members of the C.G.S. Mohawk, which is docked in Meteghan. It is understood condition of Jacquard and Wade is considered serious, with Haley, driver of the car, less seriously hurt. All are patients in the Digby General Hospital.

## Anxious About Ferry Plans

Considerable concern is being expressed in the Digby area about seeming reluctance on the part of the CPR to make any firm announcement with regard to the future of its ferry operations across the Bay of Fundy from Saint John to Digby.

Although a good deal has been said by railway officials about a proposed new car ferry service for the Bay of Fundy run, no firm commitment that such a ferry will be provided has yet been made by the railway despite efforts by the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, the Digby Trade Board and other organizations in the matter.

Leading business men and organization heads in the Digby area claim lack of definite knowledge as to the CPR's plans for its Fundy service may result in Digby losing out in some alternate transportation development if the railway's long talked about plans do not materialize.

They point to the fact a provincial subsidy is being sought for proposed additional ferry service from Rockland, Maine, through Yarmouth and state that, if the CPR proceeds with plans for a car ferry service across the Bay of Fundy to Digby, tripling its present service and providing transport for trucks and trailers as well as cars, this could rule out the necessity of the additional service from Rockland.

Opinion is being expressed locally that the province might check into the position of the CPR with regard to its Fundy ferry service before deciding on a subsidy for the proposed Rockland to Yarmouth development.

While it is not known here what obstacles may stand in the way of the proposed ferry service from Saint John to Digby, it is felt financing will play a big part in any decision made. A subsidy from the provincial government or joint action by that government with federal authorities toward

## Plan Centenary



Grace United Church is 100 years old according to a brief history of the church prepared by Dr. T. W. Hodgson for the annual meeting held at the church hall on Wednesday evening. It was announced that the centenary would be celebrated on June 25, 1961, when Rev. Dr. A. E. Kerr, President of Dalhousie University, will be guest speaker.

It is learned that Methodism began in Digby many years before there was any established place of worship. Digby was settled in 1783, and two years later, William Black visited the settlement and found 78 people who called themselves Methodists. These were mostly colored people. This group, along with a number from Shelburne and other Loyalist towns were moved to the west coast of Africa by the British Government shortly after 1783.

The building of the first Methodist Church in Digby was started by a man named Sampson Busby, who came from Annapolis in 1819. This church, however, was not completed until 1831, and was erected on the land now occupied by the present Parsonage.

The present Church was finally completed, dedicated, and opened for public worship on July 29th, 1869.

The Church Hall was built in 1881, during the pastorate of the Rev. W. H. Henzle. (Please turn to page 5)

## Municipal Tax Up 10 Percent

Digby Municipal Council has voted to increase the tax rate by 10 per cent, setting the rate of taxation at the municipal level at \$2.14 per \$100 of assessed value.

The rate in 1960 was \$2.50 per hundred. According to budget figures presented at the meeting, sundry revenue for 1961 was estimated at \$129,561. Total expenditures for the year were estimated at \$399,719, leaving an amount to be raised by taxation of \$270,158.

Based on total collection the rate of \$2.75 per \$100 of assessed value should produce a surplus of \$1,354. Net assessment in Digby municipality for 1961 is \$9,824,940.

Budget figures for 1961 showed sizeable increases in some departments or figures for actual expenditures in 1960. The social welfare budget for 1961 was set at \$30,000. In this department \$25,823 was spent in 1960. The child welfare budget figure for 1961 was set at \$15,000. In 1960 \$12,337 was expended for child welfare.

Hugh Outhouse, Tiverton, is receiving much deserved credit for saving the lives of three Tiverton boys, ages 9 to 11, the boys, Josie Outhouse, Michael Outhouse and Douglas Cann, were playing on the beach called Munroe Cove in Tiverton. They wandered from gulch to gulch, not noticing that the tide was coming in.

When the boys started back to the Cove after their explorations they found the tide had risen so that they could not return and the cliffs were so high that they could not climb over them. Before long they found themselves in water up to their waists.

Sensing their plight they called for help. Mr. Outhouse, who was lobster fishing, heard their screams but with high seas too dangerous to get near the shore, he was unable to see anyone or detect any difficulty. He had just decided that no one was in trouble and he would go home when he again heard screams and a call for help. He dared nearer the shore and discovered the boys in their dangerous plight.

Mr. Outhouse instructed the boys to jump to the boat for with the heavy seas and hazardous coast he was not able to get too near. The boys carefully followed instructions given, disaster was averted, and three young lives were saved.

Under the new procedures the system of having twelve tax collectors, one for each municipal district, will be discontinued. Instead, one tax collector, the municipal clerk, will be appointed for the whole municipality. An assistant collector will also be appointed on a salary basis to work under the clerk to cover the various municipal districts.

The interest clause of the assessment act will also be implemented to provide a two percent discount for taxpayers who pay current taxes, or before June 30th. After that date interest will be charged at the rate of 6%. An effort will also be made to encourage taxpayers to utilize the installment method of paying arrears and current taxes.

In discussing the tax situation in Digby municipality with the council, Mr. Fiendel pointed out that in the past five years arrears had risen from \$58,000 in 1956 to \$116,300 at the end of 1960. It is important to note, he said, that in the same period the tax levy had risen from \$183,200 in 1956 to \$276,759 in 1960.

Mr. Fiendel said that in 1956 81% of the current roll had been collected while in 1960 the figure was 77.1%. The percentage of the current roll and arrears collected in 1956 was 92%. In 1960 this was 88.7%.

He stated that, in 1960, the ratio of the total outstanding taxes to the current levy was 42%. The outstanding taxes at the end of 1960 was \$116,302.35. He pointed out that the situation, while "not alarming", did indicate there are entirely too many taxes outstanding.

Mr. Fiendel said Digby municipality was the only one in the province retaining the old system of separate tax collectors for each municipal district. At the rate of 4% commission they were paid \$6,836 in 1959 and \$8,102 in 1960.

provision of docking facilities or other aid might be a deciding factor, it is felt.

Tourist operators and other business firms in the area claim present service between Saint John and Digby is not consistent with present day needs. They point out the CPS Princess Helene carries only a limited number of cars on its once a day run to Digby and a three to four week wait is often necessary, especially in the tourist season, for car reservations. Trailers and trucks cannot be handled by the ship. Extra handling of freight is also necessary for transshipment across the Bay.

A good deal of business which might otherwise flow through this port is being lost because of this, these people claim. Provision of a modern car ferry service with an increase in the number of daily crossings, as talked about by railway officials, would remedy this situation, they say.

Engineering surveys have been carried out by the railway for such a service and possible docking sites have also been checked, it is understood. Information from the Maritime Transportation Commission is that the CPR has the Bay of Fundy ferry service plans high on its agenda for decision.

### PEANUT-BUTTER COFFEE RING

1. Scald 1/2 c. milk, stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 3 drops shortening. Cool to lukewarm.
2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into large bowl. Crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast OR stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 small envelope for 1 tsp. Best Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 well-beaten eggs and 2 1/2 c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 1/2 c. additional flour to make a soft dough—about 2 1/2 c. more.
3. Knead on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 1/2 hours.
4. Combine 1/2 c. liquid honey and 1 c. peanut butter.
5. Punch down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Cut into 2 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel. Let rest 10 mins. Roll out 1 portion of dough into a rectangle 9 x 18 inches. Spread centre third of dough, lengthwise, with half of the peanut butter mixture; sprinkle with 1/2 c. shredded or flaked coconut. Cut 17 parallel slashes in dough from filling to edge on each side. Fold the little strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Lift carefully, onto greased baking sheet and shape into a ring. Join ends securely. Knead with other portion of dough. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins. Bake in mod. hot oven (375°) 20 to 25 mins. Makes 2 coffee cakes.

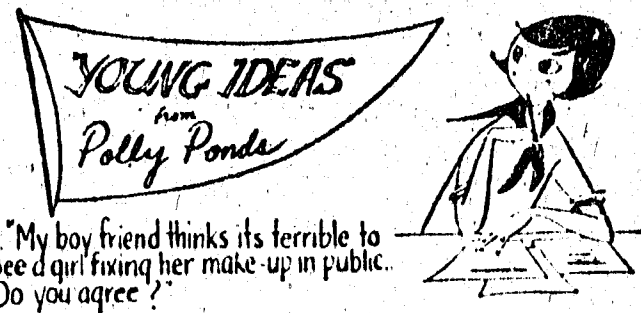

### POPPY SEED FIGURE 8'S

1. Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1 tsp. salt. Cool to lukewarm.
2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast. Stir into the water 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 min., then stir well.
3. Cream 1/2 c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine; gradually blend in 1/2 c. granulated sugar. Add 2 eggs and 1 egg yolk. Beat a time, beating in well after each addition. Work in sufficient additional flour to make soft dough about 1 1/2 c. more. Knead dough on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 1/2 hours.
4. Punch down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Divide into 3 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel. Let rest 10 min. Shape each portion into a 10-inch roll, cut each roll into 10 equal pieces. Roll each piece into a pencil-like strip 12 inches long and shape into a figure 8, place on greased cookie sheets. Cover with a tea towel. Let rise until doubled in bulk—about 1 hour. Beat 1 egg white and 1 egg yolk. Beat until stiff and use to brush buns, sprinkle with poppy seeds. Bake in mod. hot oven (375°) 12 to 15 min. Yield: 2 1/2 dozen rolls.

**PEANUT-BUTTER COFFEE RING**

1. Scald 1/2 cup milk, add 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup salt and 1/2 cup shortening. Cool in refrigerator.
2. Measure 1/2 cup lukewarm water into large bowl, add 1/2 cup yeast, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup salt and 1/2 cup shortening. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup shredded or flaked coconut. Cut 1/2" parallel slits in dough from filling to edge on each side. Fold the little strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Lift carefully onto greased baking sheet and shape into a ring. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes. Repeat with other portion of dough. Grease tops. Cover. Let rest until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in mold for oven 175° to 200° for 25 minutes.
3. Knead on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Cover top. Let rest in a warm place for 1 hour. Roll out into a large sheet. Cut into strips about 1/2" wide. Roll into a ring. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes. Repeat with other portion of dough. Grease tops. Cover. Let rest until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in mold for oven 175° to 200° for 25 minutes.
4. Combine 1/2 cup hard-boiled eggs and 1/2 cup peanut butter.
5. Pour down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Cut into 2 equal portions. Cover with a towel. Let rest 10 minutes. Roll out 1 portion of dough into a rectangle 9 x 18 inches. Spread centre third of dough, lengthwise, with half of the peanut butter mixture. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup shredded or flaked coconut. Cut 1/2" parallel slits in dough from filling to edge on each side. Fold the little strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Lift carefully onto greased baking sheet and shape into a ring. Bake at 350° for 15 minutes. Repeat with other portion of dough. Grease tops. Cover. Let rest until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in mold for oven 175° to 200° for 25 minutes.

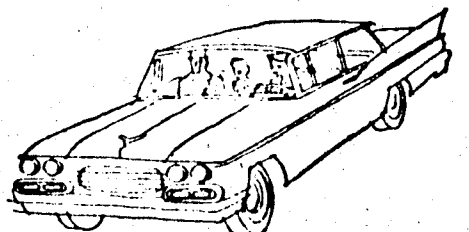

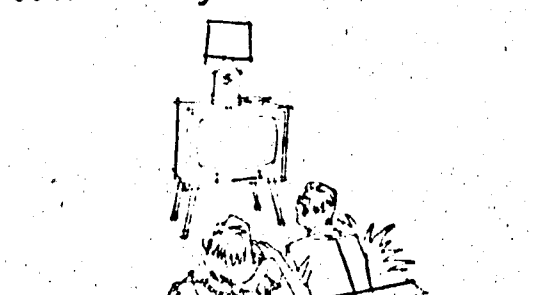

## Three Cruises Proposed

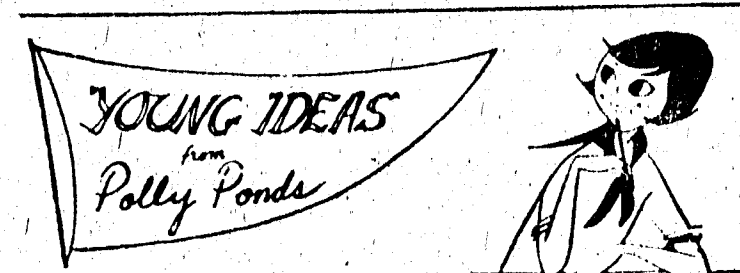

# IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

## Annual Meeting, January, 1961

January, 1961.  
The Council for the Municipality of the District of Digby met at the Court House, Digby, on Tuesday, January 17th, 1961, at 2 p.m.

Present were Councillors Roy Snell, Walter Wood, Ronald Morehouse, Victor Finigan, M. W. Derby, Clyde Cosman, W. L. Cossaboom, Sidney Westcott, Cecil Jones, Aubrey Forrest and Percy Gates.

The Warden was in the chair.

The meeting opened with prayer by Councillor Snell.

The Warden addressed the Council as follows: To the officers and members of the Municipal Council, I am pleased to welcome you again for an annual meeting. Since we last met in annual session many things have transpired both good and bad, affecting the welfare of our municipality.

So far as transportation is concerned, it is pleasing to observe that the job of paving roads in our Municipality is being continued by the Provincial Government. Last summer saw completion of the roads on Long and Briar Islands, paving of which has long been sought.

One of the most troublesome things affecting our municipality is the tremendous amount of unpaid municipal taxes which, in fact, threatens the credit of our municipality and which we must make every effort to collect in order to place our financial operations on a more stable basis. This will not be an easy or a popular task, but it is one which must be done and one which it is our duty to do. It is a pleasure to welcome Mr. Donald Feindell of the Department of Municipal Affairs who is here to assist us with tax collection suggestions. So far as our present system of tax collection is concerned, it is my sincere conviction it is out of date, expensive and cumbersome and incapable of doing the job which needs to be done. It is my hope the Council will see fit to change this system to bring it more in line with modern business practice.

In the field of education it has been a pleasure to welcome Mr. C. E. Edwards as school inspector for this district. Mr. Edwards is no stranger to this area and is familiar with our educational problems and needs. He has recommended to our Municipal School Board the consolidation of schools on the Islands and has pointed out the need for additional classroom space at Weymouth.

Our Council will therefore be called upon to decide on the building of additions to the schools at Freeport and Weymouth, also something done at Westport.

With regard to our hospital there isn't much to report at this time except that preliminary plans are to arrive in the near future.

During the late fall it was my pleasure to attend a conference on civil defence in Amherst, Ontario, at which the relation of municipal, provincial and federal governments in this important endeavour was outlined, which I found very interesting.

There is much more I could say in this address but I feel we have a great deal of important work before us and we should now get along with it.

I wish to take this opportunity of thanking our Municipal Clerk and Deputy together with all the members of our Council for their support and cooperation in the carrying on of all municipal business.

We sympathize with Councillor Westcott with his recent loss of his wife.

Mr. Westcott submitted this 17th day of January 1961.

### Auditors Report

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and records of the Municipal School Board of the District of Digby for the year ended December 31, 1960, and have received all the information and explanations we have required. Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of the accounting records and other supporting evidence as we considered necessary.

The Surplus as at December 31, 1960, was \$1,163.89, an increase of \$396.77 over the previous year. This increase resulted from a net adjustment of prior years of \$202.30 and an excess of revenue over expenditure for the year of \$194.47.

The total revenue for the year was \$473,360.07, an increase over the previous year of \$70,153.29. This increase came from Tuition Revenue \$2,376.87, Grants from the Province of Nova Scotia \$40,802.00 and increased appropriation from the Municipality by \$26,974.42.

The total expenditure increased by \$58,419.44 over the previous year. Although there were increases in costs of all foundation program services, a major portion of this increase resulted from charging to conveyance expense the purchase of four buses costing \$25,340.36 and the construction of the Weymouth garage costing \$10,945.08.

Investment in Capital Assets for school purposes during 1960 totaled \$50,081.07. This expenditure was mainly for the municipal portion of the cost of the annex to the Digby Regional High School. Financing of these expenditures plus \$163,009.65 balance of temporary financing outstanding from the previous year was effected by a \$95,000.00 debenture issue, by a grant from the Province of Nova Scotia for \$38,997.00, by providing \$10,945.08 from school revenue funds and by providing \$48,148.61 from municipal general revenue funds.

Subject to the foregoing, we report that, in our opinion, the attached Balance Sheets and related financial statements are properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the position and affairs of the Municipal School Board of the District of Digby as at December 31, 1960, according to the best of our information, the explanations given to us and as shown by the books and records.

### Auditors Report

To Warden and Councillors,  
Municipality of the District of Digby,  
Digby, Nova Scotia.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and records of the Municipality of the District of Digby for the year ended December 31, 1960, and have obtained all the information and explanations we have required. Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of the accounting records and other supporting evidence as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We report that we also examined the books and records of the Municipal School Board and the Hydro Electric Distribution System for the year ended December 31, 1960. Our report on these examinations form a part of this report and such schedules are attached hereto.

Taxes outstanding have increased over the previous year by \$27,512.61 to \$116,302.35. This represents 42% of the current levy, a 2% increase over last year. Tax collections during the year amounted to 88.7% of the current levy.

The bank overdraft as at December 31, 1960, was \$73,175.94. There were, however, amounts receivable from the Government of Canada, the Province of Nova Scotia and the other Municipalities totaling slightly more than this amount.

Total revenue for the year increased by \$98,982.19. This was brought about mainly by an increased tax levy of \$58,267.57 and increased provincial grants of \$39,645.63.

Total expenditure for the year increased by \$73,344.01 over that of the previous year. Social Welfare costs decreased by \$4,345.26. This would appear to be the only noteworthy decrease among three substantial expenditure increases. The appropriation to the Municipal School Board was increased by \$27,079.42 and there was Capital Expenditure out of Revenue for school purposes of \$48,994.14, an increase of \$44,241.64 over the previous year. Joint Expenditure proportion was \$5,854.96 greater than in 1959.

The total Revenue for the year was \$396,749.04, the total Expenditure \$371,105.53, resulting in an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$25,643.51 to be transferred to Revenue Fund Surplus.

After effecting minor adjustments of prior years, transferring the Balance from Snow Removal Reserve of \$1,992.19 and transferring \$17,400.09 to the Reserve for Uncollected Taxes the balance of Revenue Fund Surplus Account, before the transfer of the excess of revenue over expenditure for the year, was \$37,166.36. After transferring the Excess of Revenue over Expenditure for the year of \$25,643.51 the Revenue Fund Surplus was \$62,809.87.

The Capital Fund Balance Sheet includes only the Fixed Assets applicable to the Municipal General.

Subject to the foregoing, we report that, in our opinion, the attached Balance Sheets and related financial statements are properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the position and affairs of the Municipality of the District of Digby as at December 31, 1960, according to the best of our information, the explanations given to us and as shown by the books and records.

Agreement: This Agreement made the 19th day of January, A.D. 1961 Between

The Municipality of the District of Digby hereinafter called the Obligor

of the one part and

THE DIGBY GENERAL HOSPITAL, a body corporate, organized and existing under Chapter 137 of the Acts of 1925 of the Province of Nova Scotia, hereinafter called the Oblige

of the other part

WHEREAS by Sec. 9 of Chapter 129 of the Acts of 1960:

The Municipality of the County of Annapolis, the Town of Digby, the Municipality of the District of Digby, and the Municipality of the District of Clare are authorized and empowered to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of said Municipalities or of the said Town respectively, or pay out

any specific purpose, the sums mentioned in Subsection (3) to be used for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of the construction, furnishing and equipping a hospital at Digby; and the Municipalities and the Town are authorized and empowered to pay over the said amounts to the Corporation for the purposes aforesaid, whether or not said hospital is within or without the boundaries of any of the said Municipalities or Town.

AND WHEREAS by Section 9 (3) the amount so fixed in respect of the Municipality of the District of Digby as shall not exceed the sum of One Hundred and Sixty Thousand Dollars

AND WHEREAS the Obligor proposes, at an early date, to proceed with such construction and in order to do so must have assurance that said sums of money or so much thereof as will be required will be forthcoming and available when necessary.

AND WHEREAS by resolution of the Council passed at the Annual Meeting on the 21st day of January, 1961, the Warden and Clerk were authorized to execute an agreement as herein written:

NOW THIS INDENTURE witnesseth that in consideration of the promises and of the sum of One Dollar of law-

ful money of Canada paid by the Obligor to the Oblige, the receipts whereof is hereby acknowledged, the Obligor agrees to raise and pay over to the Oblige a sum not exceeding One Hundred and Sixty Thousand Dollars towards the cost of constructing, furnishing and equipping a hospital at Digby on the fol-

lowing terms and conditions: 1. Such sums shall be paid in installments when requested from time to time by the Obligor and upon production of architects progress certificates.

2. Each such installment shall be the proportional part of the Obligor's total obligation in relation to the aggregate obligation of the contributing

Municipalities or Town mentioned in (3) of Section 9 of Chapter 129 of the Acts of Nova Scotia 1960.

3. Only such parts of said sum of One Hundred and Sixty Thousand Dollars shall be paid over as is required for the construction, furnishing and equipping of said hospital.

### RASPBERRY-COCONUT COFFEE CAKE

1. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast. Stir into the water. Top with 1/2 c. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well.
2. Sift 1/2 c. milk, stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1/4 tsp. salt and 3 tbsps. soft shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add to dissolved yeast; stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 1/2 c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Work in sufficient additional flour to make a soft dough, about 1 1/4 c. more. Knead dough on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.
3. Punch down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Divide into 3 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel; let rest 10 mins. Roll out each portion into a 9-inch square. Combine 1/2 c. thick raspberry jam and 1/2 c. shredded coconut; spread to within 1/2 inch of edges on two squares of dough; pile in greased 9-inch square pan; top with remaining square of dough. Press down edges lightly. Grease top. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 45 mins. Bake in mod. hot oven (375°) 25 to 30 mins. Turn out; place top side up on wire rack.
4. Combine 1/2 c. sifted icing sugar, few drops vanilla and sufficient milk to make a rather stiff icing. Spread hot cakes with 3 tbsps. raspberry jam. Cool cake slightly then drizzle with icing and sprinkle lightly with a little coconut. Yield: 1 coffee cake.

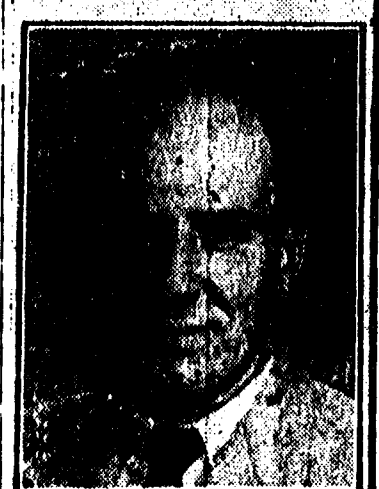

## About This and That

### Wanted — Twenty Men

Wanted — twenty men! How good the sound of those words should seem! But, when you hear further "Wanted — twenty more men to peel pulpwood and can't get them" the world begins to seem a bit confusing. Amidst a cry of unemployment, amidst a welfare budget for the town we hear the above story.

This winter has brought one of the busiest seasons in a number of years to Digby port. Ships have been awaiting their turns to load pulpwood at the piers. How has all this affected the unemployment situation in the town. The Digby Courier asked, Has it made any great difference in the sad story of unemployment we have become accustomed to hearing?

To get an answer to the questions The Courier turned to one of the proprietors of the pulpwood yards. Have you had many men seeking employment during this rush? How many have you had to turn away?

That question clinched it. We soon found that no men had to be turned away. Instead, the true fact was that this particular yard was employing ten to twelve men at peeling. But, we were also informed that they could use twenty more to work if that many could be found who were inclined toward being employed.

So far as we could gather, even a bonus was not enticing. According to our informant the price for peeling is \$1.00 per cord but a bonus of 50 cents per cord was being offered. This did not seem to impress the so-called unemployed to fill the 20 man vacancy. You know, said the proprietor, "we're hiring men, not firing them. That is all I write now on the forms that come to me to confirm a 'lay-off'."

It all makes us wonder about the merits of unemployment insurance. Are we breeding a race of lazy people? Or do they reason as we have heard a prominent person say — "It is better to spread the unemployment insurance than to have so many working as to deplete our natural resources of the forest."

When twenty men are needed for work in town and you can't get them, when able bodied men are getting unemployment insurance at the same time, then we think our unemployment insurance scheme and its operation should be investigated on every level right from the unemployed person upward.

Who has another answer?

### A Dedicated Body

When a crowd of Nova Scotians gathers at the scene of an accident someone among them is almost certain to have had sufficient first aid training to help the victim through the long, dangerous minutes before a doctor arrives. The credit for this is due entirely to the Order of St. John, a dedicated body that has taught human misery for eight hundred and fifty years.

The teaching arm of the order is the St. John Ambulance Association, the body responsible for first aid instruction in many areas. Civil defense personnel, policemen and firemen are among those who have this instruction. Nova Scotians who have been qualified to render first aid as the result of training by the Association's one hundred and thirty instructors. The first aid classes are held in many parts of the province, and are conducted by medical men.

The work and activities of the Order of St. John in Canada is its aim is to raise the proportion of qualified personnel in Nova Scotia to one of the highest in the world. Public safety is necessary for its continued operation, and its financial support comes from the monthly contributions of its members. ### White Cane Week

"White Cane Week" is like a born, bred, absorbed Mrs. J. T. Patterson, president of the Canadian Council of the Blind. She provides a community service, both mental and physical, to the blind. She is the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, the Week is a national event and has been held annually since 1946. Mrs. Patterson, who has been associated with White Cane Week since it began in 1946, recalled how a casual suggestion made at the 1945 conference of the Council inspired the organization of this annual event.

"Someone observed that people knew that the white cane signified blindness," she said, "and someone else said we ought to have a week devoted to let Canadians know about it." The idea was quickly taken up and national White Cane Week came into being.

The first few campaigns dealt with the problems of blindness and urged the sighted to assist blind persons on the street. As time went on the community service side came into the picture and the blind of Canada urged the sighted to make use of their eyes. Themes such as "Be Wise — Take Care of Your Eyes", "Pride Your Eyes", and other constructive slogans were used to awaken in the public an appreciation of good vision. "The impact on Canadian citizens of the blind warning the sighted to take care of their eyes had an effect far beyond our dreams," Mrs. Patterson said. This year White Cane Week invites you to "Share Your Sight With The Sightless." The president pointed out several ways of sharing your

vision. When you walk with a blind person, describe the store windows, tell of any business location changes, and talk about the unusual incidents that often unfold before your eyes. Offer to write letters for your blind neighbours or to read to them. If you're sports-minded share your sight as a bowling coach, a curling guide or a swimming instructor. If you are free during the day and drive your own car, offer to act as a volunteer driver. Across Canada 73 clubs with 4500 blind members need your assistance. To drive a sightless person to the dentist, to the shopping centre or a trip down town is a wonderful way to Share Your Sight.

## Weymouth Man Passes



The funeral of J. Edgar March, veteran newspaperman and former CPR public relations chief, was held Saturday in Saint John, N. B., his native city.

Mr. March, 69, died of a stroke Wednesday night, February 8, at Kentville, while on his way to a Halifax hospital from Weymouth North, where he resided.

Mr. March, a son of the late Dr. and Mrs. John March, of Saint John, N. B., is survived by his widow, the former Marie DesBarres of Advocate Harbor and Sackville, N. B.; one son, William, of the editorial staff of The Halifax Herald Limited; one daughter, Marie (Mrs. Peter Clemens), of Hudson, P. Q.; and six grandchildren. Another son, John, predeceased him several years ago.

Until his retirement in 1956, Mr. March had spent thirty years with the Public Relations Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway, rising to the office of Manager, and in that service had played a principal role in making the story of his company's rail, air and water operations known throughout much of the world.

Mr. March, a recognized man of the press, started his newspaper work as a reporter on the Saint John Standard in 1911.

A native of Saint John, where his father, Dr. John March, had served as port physician, he started in newspaper work as a reporter with the old Saint John Standard in 1911.

Upon the outbreak of war three years later he interrupted his career to join the 26th Infantry Battalion. He rose through the ranks to win a captaincy on the field in France and was twice wounded in action, the last injury resulting in his being invalided back to Canada in 1917 for instructional duty at Newcastle, N. B.

Mr. March was Chief of the Montreal Star's Ottawa bureau when he transferred to the field of public relations with the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1926. In 1954 he succeeded J. Hugh Campbell to the office of manager of the Public Relations Department.

Mr. March participated in the organization and direction of press coverage for a number of royal tours in this country and, during World War Two, was also responsible for the Atlantic Ferry Command.

Upon superannuation from the CPR five years ago he and Mrs. March, also a Maritimer, returned to the Atlantic coast and acquired "Mispah Cottage" at Weymouth North.

## Cardoza Makes Announcement

Probably stirring up the most excitement in the House since the Provincial Legislature opened last Wednesday was the announcement by V. G. Cardoza, M.L.A. for Digby, that the Opposition would withdraw from participation in the Throne Speech debate.

In his speech in the debate, Mr. Cardoza said that the Opposition feels that it cannot in good conscience, and indeed will not, further participate in this debate while our people look to this government and this Legislature for prompt, courageous and efficient leadership. One of the reasons which Mr. Cardoza gave for having reached this decision was because the premier's speech on Monday offered no concrete proposals to deal with this province's greatest problem, unemployment.

Mr. Cardoza said the Liberals had been waiting expectantly for the premier to make his address and had hoped it would reveal definite constructive proposals "to relieve the present chronic difficulties, only one of which is unemployment, and the resultant social consequences."

"We waited in vain," he said, for the news that this government "which promised so much, which promised action, was at last going to come to grips" with the province's problems.

He said the premier's speech had offered no ray of hope for the unemployed or the depressed areas of the province.

He charged that the premier had "glossed over" the hard economic facts of life in Nova Scotia, that he had told the people there was no reason for gloom.

George O. Lohnes, (P.C.-Lunenburg Centre) told the House he disagreed with the member for Digby that there was gloom in western Nova Scotia. "I live in western Nova Scotia and I don't see gloom," he said, particularly with the reopening of the boat-building plant in Mahone Bay just announced.

In his own constituency of Lunenburg Centre, he said, there was unemployment but the economy was not bad. It had been a good winter for lumbering, he added. It was true, he said, that many areas of the province needed more industry to provide employment, but much was already being done.

Commenting on the announcement made by Mr. Cardoza, the Hon. G. I. Smith, Minister of Highways, told the Opposition that he wished "to compliment them on realizing they have nothing to contribute."

He added that if the Liberals had made their decision on this realization, they might have followed tradition and notified the government party whip that they were not going on with the debate.

"They would have been acting more in the tradition of this House and would have facilitated the business of this House if they had notified the whip on this side," he said.

He said that the Liberals, however, had failed to communicate any such decision, and that the Conservative and Liberal whips had continued to discuss, even after the start of the previous day's session, the arrangement of speakers.

"In the circumstances it might well be suggested that this was a deliberate attempt to execute a sharp political manoeuvre," Mr. Smith said.

A calf belonging to a young 4-H Club member, John Dickie, of Digby, is dead. According to information given the Courier someone broke into the barn on the Hugh Dickie farm on Tuesday night, mistreated a 6 months old calf of holstein breed, eventually resulting in its death from peritonitis.

Veterinary Dr. Gerald Sheehy, Middleton, was called but the calf's life could not be saved. Three children of the Dickie family belong to the 4-H Club, which meets at Conway. They are Peter, Christopher and John. The story was given the paper so that others might be warned and guard against anyone who would do such a despicable and cruel action.

For many years he has been doctor for the Municipal Home at Marshalltown, and was port doctor at Weymouth North. In his 36 years as general practitioner in Weymouth, he has been noted for his speciality in obstetrics. His kindness and understanding have drawn him close to all his patients and friends. He was the typical country doctor, who attended his patients through fine weather or stormy times, when he himself, should have been the patient. He received patients even during the past weeks, giving comfort and help as long as he was able.

Besides his many patients and friends, he leaves to mourn their great loss, his widow, the former Alvina Brideau, of Tracadie, N. B.; one daughter, Sister Albert Marie (Claudette), of Notre Dame du Sacre Coeur, Moncton, N. B.; and one son, Albert, a student at St. Anne's College; two brothers, Daniel, of East Boston, Roger, of Corberrie; and two sisters, Rita, at home, and Mrs. Emma Comeau, of Meteghan.

Requiem Mass was held on Thursday at 10 a.m., in Saint Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, Weymouth. Funeral arrangements were in charge of Nicholls' funeral service.

## Municipality Of Clare In Red

Expenditures exceeded revenue by \$14,910 in 1960, Clare Municipal Council learned when the financial statement was presented at the annual meeting, continuing at Church Point until Wednesday.

But the council expects to cut down on expenditure in the future by closing the Clare Municipal Home, which cost \$6,419 to run last year, and had only three inmates for the past six months.

The home needs a sprinkler system, and a renewed heating system, and councillors consider the cost of providing these too great in relation to the use made of the institution. They feel that old age assistance and disability pensions has altered the need for the home in Clare.

The council is faced with demands for further school facilities in 1961. Ratepayers of the Salmon River area want a consolidated school to service Hectanooga, Mayflower, Lake Doucet, Salmon River and part of Maville, all in the parish of Salmon River.

Districts in the parish of St. Bernard have asked for a consolidated school with up to eight rooms to replace the present two room school at St. Bernard and the Bellevue Cove school. A new consolidated school is also being asked for by the districts of Southville, Havelock, Hassetts and New Tusket.

The council's revenue in 1960 was as follows:

Mr. Stanley MacDonald and Mr. James Ayer reported to the meeting the plans that have been made for this Bonspiel. It is possible that 18 teams will play. Donations were received for prizes.

The Board accepted the resignation of Mr. A. Kenney with regret. Mr. Kenney leaves Digby for Liverpool, N. S., in the near future.

Miss Squance reported that 80 home visits were made in January. Nineteen visits to adult patients for nursing care, 8 to expectant mothers, 10 to new mothers, 21 to newborn infants, 8 to older infants, 8 to school children and 2 to adults. Two of the nineteen patients admitted to the order were for nursing care. One child attended the Child Health Conference due to inclement weather. 29 hours were devoted to school work during which time 268 pupils were seen. Routine vision testing was completed. The parents concerned were notified of the Kiwanis Speech Therapy Clinic now in progress. Eleven elementary school pupils received immunization at the Department of Health High School Clinic.

The Firemen equipped the truck with a plywood body fitted to carry their equipment and a 500 gallon tank is ready to be hooked up.

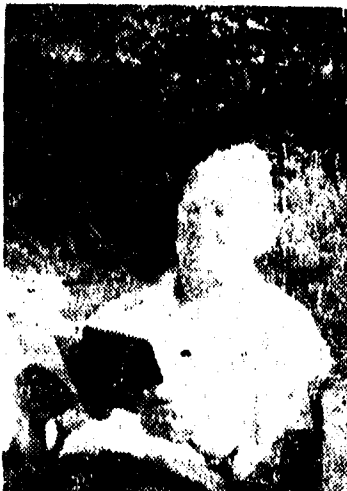

## About This and That

### Support Ferry Move

The Digby Courier adds its weight to the move of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade to encourage the Canadian Pacific Railway to replace the present Bay of Fundy service between Saint John and Digby with a new, modern car ferry capable of carrying passengers, passenger trucks, trailers and railway cars. At the same time the Courier wants to congratulate the A.V.A.B. of T. for the stepped up plea in this regard and the Town Councils, the Mayor of Digby, the local Boards of Trade, who have so promptly come to the support of the A.V.A.B. of T.

We like the word "encourage". Private enterprises cannot be forced into making improvements and spending money which they may or may not have but to know that the people are calling for better service, to know the people are ready to cooperate in whatever way possible is a lift toward the direction of improvement.

Others are screaming for greater and more efficient transportation accommodation in other parts of Nova Scotia. While the benefits of such services are bound to spill over to Digby and the Valley areas eventually, yet to cure the ills of this area needs a more direct approach than better transportation in other quarters. To even intimate that Digby and the Valley are adequately served by the present accommodation across the Bay of Fundy would be stretching the imagination a bit. There are no people in a better position to speak on the situation than A. L. Robinson and E. W. Twobig, president and secretary respectively of the A.V.A.B. of T. Both these gentlemen live in Digby where the Princess Helene docks and takes her departure each day. Both are aware of the long waiting list for car transportation on the Princess Helene during the height of the tourist season.

Digby is a tourist town as is most of the Valley area. The province itself is fast becoming one of the best tourist meccas around the Atlantic seaboard. Disappointment in transportation can influence tourists to travel elsewhere. This can ill be afforded, particularly in the case of Digby, where other industries are lacking. In order to improve the particular industry of tourism, for this area what is needed far above anything else is adequate means for the tourists to get here.

With the accommodation suggested by the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade other industries will also be encouraged to locate in this area. It would provide a convenient way to ship products from this area and give a boost to the lumbering, farming and fishing industries.

We hope that the "powers that be" will see fit to replace the present Fundy service with more adequate means of transportation and thus help give this area a real boost in economy.

### Public Urgently Requested

For several weeks the Board of Directors of the Digby General Hospital has been advertising the annual meeting of the hospital for tonight. The advertisement urgently requests the public to attend.

Why do they urgently request attendance? For one thing they know that this is your hospital. They know that this is your business. While you have either by your presence or through your absence elected these men to take care of this business for you, they know that it is proper that you should know what transpires from year to year.

But why should they have to urgently request the "shareholders" of The Digby General Hospital to attend a public meeting of their own business? This would not happen in commercial life. In commercial life the owners of a business would be most anxious to hear how the business has prospered. They would be most anxious to know how well the stewards can account for their labors. Besides, your interest in health, itself, should prompt you to attend the annual meeting of the Digby General Hospital. Health is everybody's concern. The health of each and everyone affects the health and happiness of each and everyone else either directly or indirectly. To have a hospital near at hand where the ill can be efficiently cared for is a tremendous asset to any area. It is your business. You are expected to attend the annual meeting of the Digby General Hospital tonight to show your interest and lend your support to your own business.

### Civil Defence

Although any effort toward Civil Defence in Digby has in the past been at a minimum, steps are now being taken to put a bit more effort into protection in case of nuclear attack and also to have qualified people to help in case of any type of disaster. As announced by Thomas Cleveland, Civil Defence Director for Digby town, last week, nursing classes are being organized and also police auxiliaries will be operated in town.

Civil Defence is being stepped up all over Canada. Government emergency centres are to be constructed. Prime Minister John Diefenbaker stated that this is not to be taken as evidence of worsening of the international situation or imminent fear of attack but only as an idea for preparedness.

There are several classes of people to contend with in speaking of Civil Defence. There are those who panic at the thought and refrain from any participation to avoid facing the issue. There are those who say, "What's the use? If a bomb drops, there'll be no one around to tell the tale. Then there are the more optimistic and stable type who admit that being prepared for an emergency is good common sense. The latter is a more reasonable attitude to take. Civil Defence knowledge can be useful in any case of disaster, fire, flood and rescue work of any nature. There need not be the dread of nuclear attack but in case of such it is not better to be prepared to save all the lives possible and to comfort those who are injured?

We would urge all possible to take advantage of the nursing classes that are now being organized under Mrs. Sydney Smith and Miss Valerie Squire. We further suggest that you talk Civil Defence to your neighbour, at your group gatherings and arouse the interest of others in your community. No harm in being prepared.

### W.I.N.S.

Speaking of Civil Defence we were interested in reading an article in the publication Home and Country by the Women's Institute of Nova Scotia of the role that women can take in Civil Defence. The article was also forwarded to us by A. J. Wigglesworth at Liverpool, N. S., Civil Defence Co-ordinator. It is a timely and informative article which we hope to publish in this paper either in full or in installments very soon.

Our comment today is to be on the wide range of subjects and projects with which the Women's Institutes deal. Last week the editor had the privilege of sitting in again on a Bear River Women's Institute meeting. We have also been privileged to attend a meeting of the Smith's Cove Institute and had close connection with the Institute which functioned

at Rossway. It never ceases to amaze us at the many accomplishments and the variety of interests which these women have.

Not only are these women interested in protection by Civil Defence but they have always taken very seriously the peace of the world. One way in which their interest in this respect is made manifest is in their contribution to the maintenance of the Peace Gardens on the U.S.-Canadian border.

Besides the above the Women's Institute shows its interest in health, home economics, agriculture, youth and education, scholarships, history, culture and art. They have shown interest in 4-H clubs, farm forums and community welfare of various forms. Patriotism is a noted characteristic of the Women's Institute. Citizenship, legislature and international affairs are among their topics for discussion.

Though, we believe, Women's Institutes are designed particularly for rural areas, advantages of urban life, culture and the best in living is brought to the rural communities in many respects by the W.I. At Bear River last week we were particularly impressed with the interest in music, with the aid to Home and School and the interest displayed in fine arts by taking a membership in the Canadian Council of Art.

Optimism seems to be a key note in W.I. As expressed in an editorial in Home and Country -- "We feel that we are entering an era of great progress and prosperity for Canada and the world. As we think about how we, in our families and communities, can help to make our dreams and wishes come true by giving of our time and talents, we are sure the years ahead hold much in store for us."

### Unity Without Uniformity

Next week, February 19 to 26, is Brotherhood Week, sponsored by The Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, Inc.

While not disregarding work on the world wide level, the CCCJ concentrates on brotherhood at home with the idea that the man who can live in harmony with his neighbour is well on his way towards living in harmony with the world. How very true that statement is.

They emphasize that CCCJ is The Canadian Council of Christians and Jews and not "for Christians and Jews." 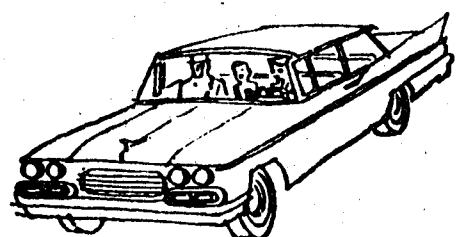

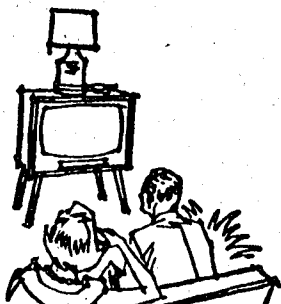
### Wanted - Twenty Men

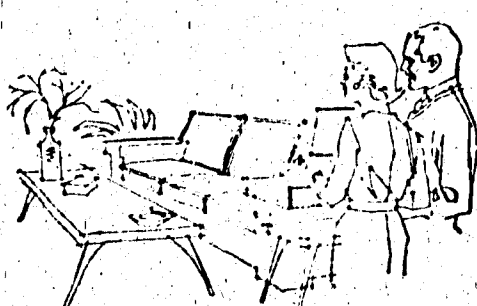

PEANUT-BUTTER COFFEE RING

1. Scald 1/2 c. milk, stir in 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 1 drop shortening. Cool to lukewarm.

2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into large bowl, crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast OR stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 small envelope for 1 drop Best Dry Yeast. 4. Combine 1/2 c. liquid honey and 1 c. peanut butter.

5. Punch down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Cut into 2 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel, let rest 10 mins. Roll out 1 portion of dough into a rectangle 9 x 18 inches. Spread centre third of dough, lengthwise, with half of the peanut butter mixture; sprinkle with 1/2 c. shredded or flaked coconut. Cut 17 parallel slashes in dough from filling to edge on each side. Fold the little strips at an angle across filling, alternating from side to side. Lift carefully onto greased baking sheet and shape into a ring. Join ends securely. Repeat with other portion of dough. Grease top. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins. Bake in mod. hot oven (375°) 30 to 35 mins.

Donald Grant, co-ordinator of civil defence for the province, was guest speaker at the annual dinner meeting of the Clare Board of Trade, held at the Riverside Inn at Meteghan.

River, Mr. Grant explained to the group, which numbered over 80, what was expected of the municipality and described the need for the preparation of civil defence in the area.

Denis Soule, of Meteghan, was elected president; J. Medrie Comeau, of Meteghan River, was named vice-president; Denis (E. M.) Comeau, Meteghan, treasurer; and Marcel Valente, of Church Point, was reappointed secretary.

Directors are: J. Albion Comeau, Meteghan River; Herman Doucet, Cape St. Mary; Dr. Philip LeBlanc, Little Brook; Urbain Belliveau, Bellevue's Cove; Ernest P. LeBlanc and Albert P. Melanson, Church Point; J. Medrie Comeau, Meteghan River; Dr. Julius Comeau, Meteghan; Gerard d'Entremont, Meteghan Station; Denis Soule, Meteghan, and Felix Thibodeau, Church Point.

Retiring president, Albert P. Melanson, outlined the work that the board had accomplished during 1960. Among the two most important projects were the Acadian Festival and the organizing of the Cape St. Mary's Anglers Association. The Acadian Festival proved successful and the program was planned to meet the theme of the National Acadian Convention which was held during the festival at which more than 150 persons from outside the province attended.

The Cape St. Mary's venture was to encourage deep sea fishing and the Cape St. Mary's Anglers Association was organized by the board with the president appointed president of the Anglers Association.

The Fishermen's Richelleu and Lions Club of Church Point and Meteghan, respectively, had a representative on the board of directors. The Association had a very good season with deep sea fishing consisting in part of tuna fishing

parties and the records show that 39 tuna were landed and an equally large number hooked but lost. From the date of the first landing on August 26 to September 18, when the last tuna was caught, thousands of tuna were seen schooling in the area.

The new President, Denis Soule, stated that the Board of Trade will continue to sponsor the Cape St. Mary's Anglers Association and also try to promote tuna fishing in the area.

a verbal report Mr. Stoddard said already in 1961 the month of January showed an increase of 118 x-rays over 1960. He highly recommended a second technician. The laboratory report of technician A. R. Dickie, showed a total 17,906 units. Mr. Dickie, during the year, was elected president of the Provincial Laboratory Technicians.

In his report, the president, F. C. Purdy, paid tribute to the excellent service of the nurses and domestic staff under Mrs. Cossaboom, superintendent. This was more worthy of note, he said, with the standard kept at a high degree under difficulties due to high utilization of the highest in the province of Nova Scotia. He also acknowledged the work of the medical and office staff, Ladies Auxiliary and Board. He expressed appreciation to The Digby Courier for its news and editorial support. He, however, expressed disappointment in attendance at the annual meeting when the work of the people's \$250,000 yearly business was in review. He also mentioned that after announcing that the 1959 reports were available at the hospital last year, only one person had requested a copy.

In reviewing the history of the hospital, Mr. Purdy said the Digby General Hospital was incorporated as a small cottage hospital in 1925; designed to provide emergency hospitalization for the residents of the Digby area. In 1930 the original hospital was replaced by the present one to provide 12 hospital beds, necessary auxiliary services and nursing staff living quarters. Later this service was extended to 28 beds and more recently to 47 beds. With the advent of the Provincial Hospital Insurance Plan as high as 58 patients had been hospitalized at one time. According to Hospital Commission standards the occupancy of beds has been 135% and has at times exceeded 200%. Beds available according to commission standards should be 69 per 1,000 population, average in Western Nova Scotia at present is 2.2 beds and in Digby we have the lowest in the province, 1.7 beds per 1,000 population, Mr. Purdy reported.

Faced with the facts, the president said it seemed wise to activate a program for better hospital facilities. Mr. Purdy then gave a resume of activities to date regarding the construction of a new hospital. This included the estimates of costs and a program proposed to meet the costs.

Amendments to by-laws were approved at Thursday night's meeting, mostly to bring the by-laws up to date with Nova Scotia Hospital Commission regulations. The amended by-laws become effective immediately after approval by the Governor-in-Council.

## Stocking Streams With Trout

Close to two million small  
trout were placed in inland  
fishing waters of Annapolis,  
Kings, Queens and Lunenburg  
Counties during 1960, and an-

Nictaux Federal Fish Hatch-  
ery under supervision of Fred

## BRAN SCONES

1. Sift 1 1/2 c. milk, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2  
c. shortening and 1 1/2 c. bran  
flakes. Cool to lukewarm.

2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm  
water into a large bowl, crumble  
and add 1 cake Best Yeast OR  
stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar  
and sprinkle with one small enve-  
lope (or 1 tsp.) Best Dry Yeast.  
Let stand 10 mins., then stir well.

3. Stir in lukewarm milk mix-  
ture, 1 well-beaten egg and 1 1/2  
c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour.  
Beat until smooth and elastic.  
Work in sufficient additional  
flour to make a soft dough—  
about 1 1/2 c. more. Knead on  
floured board until smooth and

elastic. Place in greased bowl.  
Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a  
warm place, free from draft,  
until doubled in bulk—about  
1 1/2 hours.

4. Punch down dough. Turn  
out and knead until smooth. Cut  
into 4 equal portions. Cover with  
a tea towel, let rest 10 mins.  
Shape 1 portion of dough into  
a ball, roll out into a round 1/2  
inch thick. Mark into quarters,  
score fashion, with the back of  
a large knife. Place on a flour-  
dusted cookie sheet. Repeat with  
remaining portions of dough.  
Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until  
doubled in bulk—about 45 mins.  
Deepen markings in dough with  
back of knife. Bake in a hot oven  
(400°) 15 to 18 mins. Dust tops  
of scones with flour. Makes 16  
scones.

## Sad At Razing Hotel

"It makes me rather sad to hear of the old Winchester Hotel being torn down," wrote Mrs. Linwood Eldridge, age 82, to her daughter, Mrs. Ted Dakin, in Digby. Mrs. Eldridge, who lived her life in Digby but who is spending the winter with her daughter, Mrs. Lloyd Hersey, Annapolis Royal, does not remember when the hotel was built but she does have much information. The hotel had been built originally 132 years ago by Mrs. Eldridge's grandfather, Edward Marshall. It was to this house that Mr. Marshall took his seventeen year old bride, the former Clara Everett, Plympton, N. S. Mrs. Marshall lived in the same home until she died at the age of 85 years.

It is interesting to note that the village of Marshalltown in Nova Scotia and the town of Everett, Mass., were named from the forefathers of the family of Marshalls and the Everetts mentioned above.

Edward and Clara Marshall had five children: two daughters and five sons. One daughter, Henrietta, married W. E. Brown, a civil engineer, who had come from England. Mr. Brown, incidentally, was the engineer for the building of the present Victoria Bridge over Bear River and his first engineering job when arriving from England was a bridge at Weymouth, the village in which he met his bride, the former Miss Henrietta Marshall. Of this union there were two daughters, one who died a spinster. The other was Helen, Mrs. Linwood Eldridge, who is the only living granddaughter of Edward Marshall, who built the hotel as it is now known.

Mr. and Mrs. Eldridge had four children, Mrs. Dakin, Mrs. Hersey, Mrs. Gordon Burnham, Saint John, N. B., and William Eldridge, Digby, who are great grandchildren of the builder of the hotel now being dismantled. A number of great great grandchildren also take their last glimpse at what was generally known as the Winchester Hotel.

The structure built in 1829, according to Mrs. Eldridge, was purchased by Robert Feltus, Lawrencetown, in 1902, who operated it as Grand Hotel. From the hands of Feltus the building went to a man by the name of Frank Eaton, who operated the business under the name of Eaton's Hotel. Under the name of Travellers Inn the hotel was operated by the late James Merkel, who was later postmaster in Digby. Following this period the Travellers Inn became known as the Winchester Hotel and was operated by Mrs. Maye Winchester. While it still adhered to the name Royal Hotel, the building was latest used as an apartment house.

The dismantling of the structure is being done by Wallace Amero for what he can make from the sales. Some interesting items have been found by Mr. Amero and much is learned about the building of homes in the early eighteen hundreds.

Mrs. Eldridge informed The Courier that her grandfather was a shipbuilder by trade and owned shipyards from the Long Pier to the house now owned at Jew Cove by B. Webster. The now B. Webster place was originally built by Mrs. Eldridge's grandfather as his store. Mr. Marshall at one time had seven ships sailing out of Digby, said Mrs. Eldridge.

Mrs. Eldridge says she spent many happy childhood hours in her grandfather's home. She was about twelve or thirteen years old when her grandfather passed away and her grandmother lived alone in the big house at the corner of Maiden Lane and Prince William Streets for many years. The house which is now to be no more.

## Thrice In A Lifetime

In a conversation with Capt. Fred LeCain, of Clementsport, about the recent amount of ice in the Annapolis Basin caused by the extremely low temperatures, he recalls of such a sight in 1888 and in 1942, making 1961 the third time during his lifetime. He recalls that above the island it was at one of these times frozen completely across.

## Want Farmers' Taxes Delayed

The monthly meeting of the Maple Leaf Agricultural Society was held at Conway on February 27th. Lloyd Jefferson was chairman for the meeting.

Due to the absence of the secretary, Roger Freeman, William LeForte was appointed secretary to take the minutes of the meeting.

Two letters from M.C.S. in Moncton were read by the secretary. ## Bear River Man Heads Seminary



The trustees of Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary and Eastern Baptist College in Philadelphia, Thursday named Rev. Thomas B. McDormand, D.D., a native of Bear River, N. S., now of Acadia University, Wolfville, as president of the joint institutions.

The Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary, founded in 1925, has a student body of close to 250, this being the largest enrollment of any seminary within the "Northern States" territory of the American Baptist Convention. It is located at Oxbrook, on the outskirts of Philadelphia. Seven miles away, on a 100-acre campus at St. David's, Pa., is located the affiliated Arts College known as Eastern Baptist College. Organized 10 years ago, the "College" has an enrollment of some 400, and anticipates annual growth to a "ceiling" of probably 1500.

Dr. McDormand will head both institutions, working with an executive vice-president at each institution, both of which are fully accredited in their respective fields.

Dr. McDormand, son of Mrs. Charles McDormand and the late Mr. McDormand, Bear River, N. S., became executive vice-president of Acadia University in October 1959 and will remain in his present post until September 1, when he assumes his new responsibilities at Philadelphia. Prior to assuming his position at Acadia University, he was general secretary of the Baptist Federation of Canada, general secretary of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, and editor of Canadian Baptist Publications. He resided in Toronto during the 17 years spent in these posts. He moved to Toronto from Edmonton, Alberta, where he had served both as pastor of St. Athanasia Baptist Church and director of Christian education for the Baptist Union of Western Canada.

## About This and That

### Not Even Diamond Jubilee

Not even the Diamond Jubilee of the Digby Board of Trade could budge the members or should be interested residents of Digby from other more luring engagements to attend a meeting of that organization on Thursday night. What should have been a gala occasion, attended by probably some two hundred business and professional or otherwise interested men and women turned out to have an attendance of less than thirty. Our sympathies were with the president, John Nichols, who was in the embarrassing position of trying to make the guest speaker feel comfortable in such a situation. The lack of audience, however, did not deter the speaker, Nick W. Jamnash, of the Maritime Museum of Canada from delivering an interesting and educational address. Those who missed the address were, indeed, the losers.

But there is another side to this apparent disinterest in sharing the heavier problems of the town. We have no quarrel with curling or any other sport in town. Interest shown in these and a winning team can bring the name of Digby to the forefront. But this is the lighter side of the problem. The weightier side, the problem of industry coming to the area or the expense of thousands of dollars seems to be left on the shoulders of a very, very few. This is not as it should be. Here we have the Digby and other local boards, the Affiliated Boards of Trade and town councils trying to encourage a new ferry service across the Bay of Fundy and yet the majority of people do not even turn out to hear progress reports on any such endeavours. They are not enough interested to even give attendance support to such campaigns. The question is, are we interested in getting new boats, learning how to improve our tourist industry, attracting other industries or assisting the employment situation so much in the foreground of news and conversation these days. Does it sound as though we have a genuine problem in this regard?

Another meeting which should have had an attendance of at least two hundred, a meeting which had a much wider territory to draw from, was that of the Digby General Hospital the previous week. Again, some thirty to forty persons showed an interest in a \$250,000 business and in the construction of a million and a quarter dollar structure. The report given by the president, F. C. Purdy, that evening was worthwhile to hear. No doubt, his school teacher experience in imparting knowledge, was an asset in preparing and presenting such a report. We assure you it was presented in such a way that even the dullest could follow the steps as they were presented and have a clearer understanding of how this million and a quarter dollar business for Digby can be accomplished. Again our sympathies were with the president who had a story to tell and only a "hand full" of people were there to hear it. We hope the account in The Digby Courier last week got the story over to some extent to a much larger audience. But this does not solve the problem of a few dedicated men and women trying to shoulder such a responsibility by themselves. Think of the time and energy put into preparing reports. Think of the time consumed in preparing for and attending board meetings. Think of the time and energy consumed in studying ways and means to accomplish these projects. Credit goes to all the members of the Digby General Hospital Board for their cooperation with the president and for their efforts in their respective offices and committees but none deserves more credit than the man at the helm at the present time, F. C. Purdy has navigated at times almost sinking ship successfully for ten years. He has been a valuable member of the hospital board for more than fifteen years. Figure the number of hours of work donated to the Digby General Hospital in all those years. Think of the number of hours of recreation and relaxation which could have been enjoyed.

Such men as Mr. Purdy are a credit to the town of Digby. The projects they direct are for the benefit of the citizens of the area. The least the citizens can do is to show a genuine interest.

### Stay In School

Next week, March 5 to 11, is Education Week. The theme is "Stay In School". There are many good arguments for staying in school. One is the pleasure which is derived from an education. The man who can enter the world of literature and science and the arts and who can follow current affairs intelligently, has a faculty for enjoyment the uneducated man is denied. He has developed his thoughts and the ability to write and speak them well. People listen when he says something. Because he knows many things his interests can be deep and varied. He has the self-confidence that comes from a developed sense of judgment. Each of the subjects learned in school opens its own avenue of interest and understanding. Some unfold the past and teach judgment and perspective, others form the habit of thinking quickly, precisely and logically. Some give an insight into the language of other countries and enable us to understand more fully our own language.

This year, however, the emphasis is being put on education in relation to employment. Unemployment seems to be one of the major problems in our country today. Educationists, unemployment insurance personnel and others are interested in finding a solution to the problem. They have come up with the idea that a well-trained mind is the best bet for employment today. All modern business requires skilled workers. Teenagers who drop out of school before getting a good educational background are not able to fill the types of positions open in this modern age. There was a time when a poorly educated boy or girl might succeed through sheer energy and drive. That feat can still be accomplished but only by making use of spare-time educational facilities, and by real hard work and application.

Regarding a high school education in relation to dollars and cents, recent studies have proved these advantages:

1. The high school graduate is better educated than are 80 out of 100 other Canadians his age.
2. By the time a man reaches his peak earning period, the high school graduate is making 30 per cent more than the man who dropped out of school early.
3. Each year in school yields an additional return in yearly income. Each year of high school adds \$238 and the matriculation year adds \$460!
4. The less schooling a man has had the more likely it is that he will be unemployed at any given time.
5. Young people who drop out of school end up with many more of the low-paying jobs than high school graduates do.
6. Finding a job is more difficult for the non-graduate, especially as he gets older and is less able to do physical work.
7. Most good jobs today require a high school graduation certificate. This trend will become more pronounced with the coming of the automation age and as workers require more and more basic understanding of the work they are doing.
8. The competition for better jobs is steadily becoming greater as more young people are better educated.
9. All the professions — law, medicine, engineering, forestry, architecture, dentistry, nursing, etc. — require at least matriculation standing for entrance into the professional schools or universities.

## The Role Of Women In Civil Defence

(Continued from last week)

Which inoculations are especially important in Disaster? All of the available ones are; and for the adult, polo and tetanus shots in case of injury are especially important. Your doctor or public health nurse can advise you on this.

How Can We, as Women in the Community in Groups and Organizations, Learn More of this Emergency Planning? Women have the strongest political and voting influence in the country. If you, as women, are sufficiently convinced of any cause, and put on enough pressure, you can accomplish an amazing amount for your family and your community. For emergency planning, the province has been divided into three (3) geographical zones, with Halifax as the fourth (4) Zone. There are full-time controllers for these areas who co-ordinate the plans for the individual communities and counties. If you have no local director, then the Zone controller can advise you how your community can organize through your local council's authority. We, at the Provincial Headquarters, are only free to act after the local community or county has organized. A wide awake local director is necessary; and we, through the federal organization, can provide him with excellent training program and plans for you to adapt to your community.

Don't expect too much of your local director, because a good director does just that. He directs and recommends, but he must have interest, and co-operation from the whole community. He is not an expert in all things, but is responsible for your community's overall plan and for finding the right people to be trained for specific jobs (fire, rescue, police, health, etc.) We will then prepare to provide or assist him in training you for these specific jobs.

In the Meantime, Can We Get Such Training as Home Nursing and First Aid and How? — Yes! — St. John Ambulance First Aid; St. John Ambulance and Red Cross Nursing; Civil Defence sponsorship to pay for such training; Civil Defence complete training kits supply equipment where needed in rural areas, and both agencies include Civil Defence training in their classes whether you enrolled or not; because they are firmly convinced that this training is vital.

### Civil Defence of Major Value

The critics of CD need a little friendly chiding! When they say that CD is a waste of time, they don't know what they are talking about. The worst you can say of CD is that it is too little. If a nuclear war did come, our CD would be woefully inadequate — though it would be better than nothing. But even the present inadequate CD has already proven itself wondrously valuable in peace-time. A Vancouver woman who fell down a mountain slope would have died . . . except for a CD crew. A Digby woman trapped in an overturned car in six feet of water would have drowned . . . except for a CD crew. In Manitoba, 118 travellers were snowbound on impassible roads . . . until they were rescued by CD men. Let the critics of CD chide heedlessly, because CD is good training for anyone and CD has had (and will long have) many emergency roles to play in our varied communities, even if there never is (Heaven forbid) a nuclear carnage! (Editorial — "Fire Fighting in Canada, August 1960)

## Good Sign

(Of Many Things - Ambrose Hills)

A storekeeper who had heard his customers talking a lot about the unemployment problem, the farm problem, the industrial problem, etc., etc., finally had an inspiration. He prepared a big sign and put it up on the wall where everyone could read it. It was a very provoking sign which read:

"Are you helping towards the solution or are you just part of the problem?"

To answer that question a man is forced to take a look at himself. Is he leaning on society, or is he contributing to it? Is he asking for handouts or is he giving? Does his scheme for the welfare of the country call for any sacrifice on his own part; or is it a scheme to force others to sacrifice? Such a sign made customers less inclined to talk glibly about solutions to serious problems.

There is another statement that might well be set up in bold type and used as a sign for all to read. It's a quotation from a salesman, who said:

"There is nothing wrong with the Canadian economy that a 20% increase in sales wouldn't cure."

That makes sense. Today we are not able to manufacture and sell enough Canadian products to absorb the manpower once employed on farms but now seeking city work. Farm policies over the past twenty years have led to surplus after surplus, and there is no realistic solution in sight. Somehow our manufacturing industry must take up the slack. More Canadian goods must be made and sold on world markets.

How can these sales be accomplished? Only by becoming more efficient, by keeping our quality high and prices low. Any person who is not working towards that solution is part of the problem.

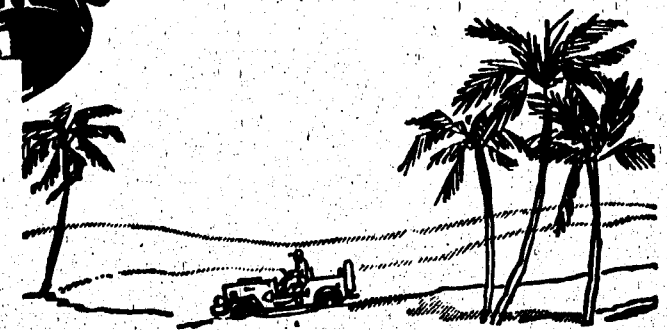

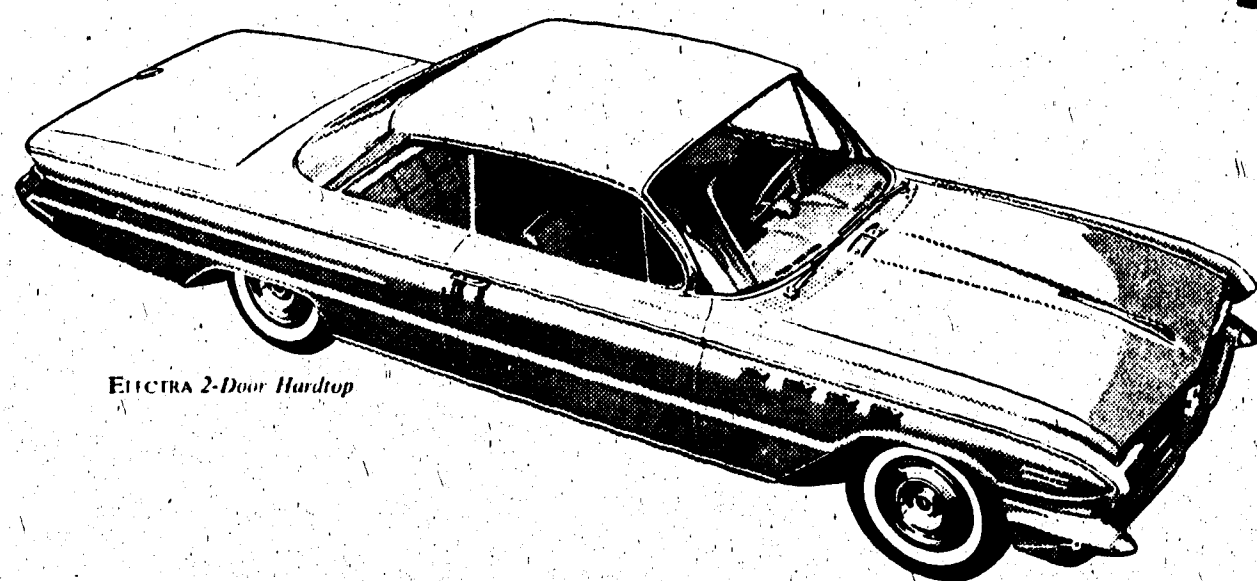

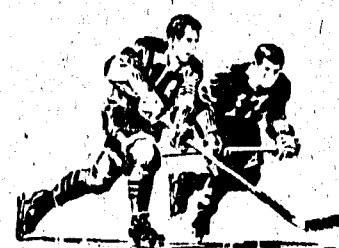

## Diary Of A Vagabond

(By Dorothy Barker)

I admit I was as prejudiced as the next fellow. I turned every cup and saucer in the shop over and if they had "Made in Japan" stamped on them, I refused to buy. Last summer I was fit to be tied. I bought two dresses on sale, one hot and sticky day. When I started to alter the shoulder-line I found a little tag stitched into the seam "Made in Japan". The thing that really jarred me was that I had remarked to a friend how much better made these "Canadian" ready-to-wear articles appeared to be. The seams of the dresses were all pinked, the shoulders taped, the hem even and the material charming. I hadn't purchased any garment as well made as they were since the last war. And cheap! I had bought both for the huge sum of \$9.00!

Possibly I should have known for certainly never before in this period of inflated prices had I found such a bargain. I can remember that I remarked to my friend, "Why you couldn't even buy the material in these dresses for \$9.00." Perhaps I harboured a cunning thought that the shop might have made a mistake in marking the gowns and includ-

ing them in the sale. I remember I hastily made my purchase and hugged my parcel covetously every inch of the way home aboard the six p.m. train.

Now, if I had really had the courage of my convictions I would never have worn either dress. Fortunately, I happened to include in my roster of friends several public spirited citizens who can see beyond their noses. Their knowledge of the nation's economic problems is not all befuddled by outraged loyalty to their country as mine appeared to be. And so I listened intently to their explanation of why, in this era of trade blocs and international commercial restrictions, Japan appears to be shaping up as one of Canada's most desirable overseas markets. In the trade lanes of the world, you cannot sell without buying.

Perhaps my thinking is now more flexible than the average housewife's who might spurn "Made in Japan" goods because I have crossed the great Canadian prairies many times and from my train window have seen the acres and acres of wheat that must find a market if the western farmer is to survive. Japan has become one of Canada's greatest customers for wheat. These sales influence our prosperity in another way as well. Freight is the life blood of our railroads.

Grain moves to the coast by rail.

If the citizens of this country could look back a few years, they would learn that Japan, in early post war years, bought far more from this country than we ever purchased from it. That balance has changed, though trade between the two countries is still in favour of Canada.

W. E. Williams, president of the Toronto Board of Trade, who recently returned from a trip to Japan with a trade mission, believes that Japan is the key to the entire Asiatic economic and political situation. In a recent speech to the Canadian and Empire Clubs he said: "Unless we in North America and the world felt Japan sell enough merchandise to us, then she cannot survive and feed herself, and 93,000,000 people are not going to starve as a matter of principle. They have only one other place to go, and that is back to North Korea and Red China, where steel, coal, limestone, and an unlimited 'consumer goods' market await them."

These little people with the funny toes have contributed much to the beauty of Vancouver's gardens. Canadian-born Japanese youngsters have infiltrated into eastern communities following the forced move of their parents from the west coast during the war. They are contributing their natural horn talents to factories and artistic endeavour in this country. They are becoming a challenge in their native output to our industrial survival that is true, but it is not too difficult to reason, that, if they are to eat, we must make it possible for them to live with the west rather than turn to communism.

It is a crazy mixed up world and our enemies of yesterday are our customers of today. Certainly I would rather the Japanese return our deluge of grain with a barrage of bangles and merchandise, than a shower of nuclear fallout. I, along with hundreds of women who spurn that certain stamp on goods from overseas, must learn to help our breadwinners put their best competitive foot forward, be broadminded and learn to live with the times.

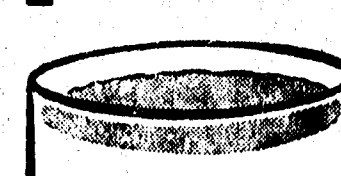

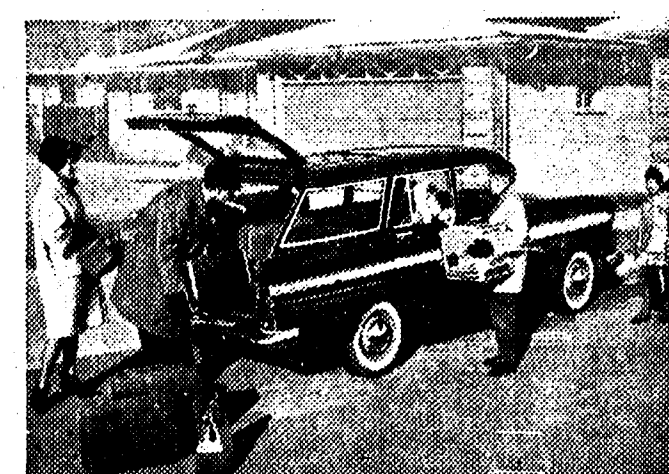

## Child Health Conferences

Health and health habits are a part of a country's culture. To change or improve a health pattern involves a process of persuasion. To convince people that their attitudes and habits are wrong or are based on misinformation is not easy to do, says Miss Cecile M. Amiraault, R.N., D.P.H. of Yarmouth.

Some of us are hard to convince. We all dislike or even fear the prick of a hypodermic needle. "Taking your medicine" has always stood for something unpleasant. Miss Amiraault says. The public is not properly informed to realize that behind the hypodermic needles, lies immunity to diseases. That is why Child Health Conferences are held.

Some of these are held at Weymouth Consolidated School on third Monday every month, 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.; at Saulnierville Gay School, second Tuesday every month, 2 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.; and at Meteghan School, Meteghan, last Thursday every month, 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

For the most part in Canada there are two types of Public Health services, Miss Amiraault states, namely, the official and the voluntary. The official service is supported by the government through the tax payer. In this area the service is known as the Western Health Unit which comprises of a Director who is a medical officer in health, the Public Health Nurse, the Sanitary Inspector, Nutritionist, Rehabilitation Counsellor and the Clerical Staff. The objective of the service is health education in the prevention of disease and the promotion of health.

The voluntary service is supported through the efforts of the community and is controlled by a Board of Directors. The financial support is usually obtained through an annual campaign for from patients, donations, and a grant from the local town or city, and a small government grant. In Digby town this service is given by a Victorian Order of Nurses. The objective of the service is bedside nursing and health education.

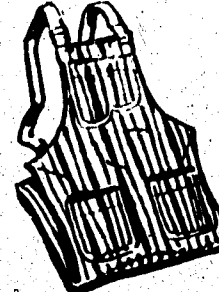
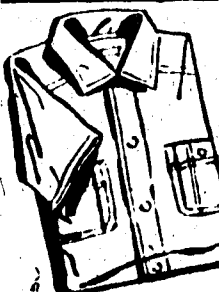
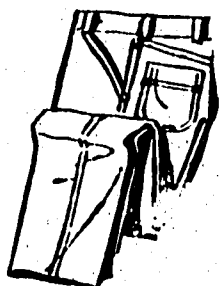

In 1942 he went to the Montreal Canadian Camp. He played 16 games, got 5 goals and 6 assists and a broken arm.

In 1943 playing for the Montreal Canadiens he played 46 of the 50 games and got 32 goals.

During the next six years he missed 8 games.

In 1944-45 he got 50 goals in 50 games and set a new record, as yet unbroken.

Road conditions are exceptionally deceiving at this time of the year. The days become warm, thawing the turning ice and snow deposits which during the afternoon are very innocent deposits of water. It is when the afternoon sun has disappeared and night falls that the water again turns to ice and becomes a hazard. Then, too, the difference in afternoon and evening temperatures often results in a treacherous moisture which deceives the unsuspecting driver.

Then, too, we want to warn the children, particularly about the weakening ice on ponds, rivers and lakes. What might have been a sure board of ice in January could in March be greatly undermined or weakened by the flowing stream and warmth of the sun. Night freezing in March can thaw rapidly during the day and become very dangerous to the unsuspecting feet. We ask parents and children to be aware of these dangers.

## David Livingstone

David Livingstone, a Scot, was born on March 19, 1813, at the village of Blantyre, not far from Glasgow. He was the son of a greener and had to work as soon as he was old enough. After attending the village school for a year or two he went to work in a cotton mill at the age of ten, working fourteen hours a day. After working a few years he saved enough money to spend a winter at Glasgow University, walking nine miles to the college and nine miles back again every day. He made up his mind to become a doctor and missionary. In 1838 he was interviewed at the London Missionary Society in London and spent two years taking his degree as a Doctor of Medicine. He wanted to go to China but the Society sent him to Cape Town in December, 1840. He journeyed to the missionary post in Bechuanaland and from there he began a series of trips into unexplored regions seeking a place to establish a missionary settlement.

David Livingstone soon learned that Africa was indeed "the dark continent" full of wild animals, thick forests, deserts, high mountains, swamps and warring tribes. He found that the people of Africa had many diseases. They were constantly at war among themselves. Evil traders bought the war captives for slaves, shipping them to foreign countries. He established his first post two hundred miles north of the one in Bechuanaland, and built a house. He married Mary Moffat, a woman of tremendous personality. On a lion hunt with some natives he was attacked by a lion, it leaving eleven teeth wounds in his arm. He laboured for ten years at Malotsa and the other missions he established in this area, teaching and ministering to the natives and winning their confidence and love. The Dutch farmers opposed his work and in 1852 an army of Boers and natives attacked the town near Livingstone's settlement. They killed many people, destroyed his books, medicines and missionary station. He was away when this happened but on returning he established a new post to the north.

In 1852 he sent his family back to England and he made his first great journey as an explorer to open up the country to white travellers. In 1848 he and two English hunters reached the Lake Ngami. Next time he went alone except for native guides and bearers. He was stricken with disease many times but never failed to take notes of the land, people, animals, etc. He made friends with the chieftains and warriors. Accompanied by the chief, Sekeletu, and two hundred Bakollos, he came to the place known as "The Smoke That Thunders" on the Zambesi. These great falls which flung spray high into the air he named the Victoria Falls. He then turned east and six months later he arrived at Tullimane, on the coast of East Africa. From there he returned to England.

He received high honors from the Royal Geographical Society, his best books being "Missionary Travels" and "Researches in South Africa". The Government sent an expedition to the Zambesi with Livingstone as commander with the title of Her Majesty's consul at Tullimane. He brought with him a steam-launch which they used for exploring lakes and rivers. They discovered Lake Nyasa. Livingstone was used to working alone and his men found him difficult to work with. In 1861 the party including his wife and other missionaries went inland; here Mrs. Livingstone died of fever. The group was recalled to England in 1863.

Livingstone sent out again, this time without white commission. When no word was heard from him he was believed dead. The government sent an expedition which did not find him, but proved he was alive. A correspondent of the *New York Herald*, Henry Stanley, was sent to find Livingstone. Livingstone, now out of trinkets and supplies, had to be carried on a litter due to illness. He arrived at Ujiji in 1872, almost dead and sent shocking reports of the slave trade to England. Here he met Stanley and after he regained some strength he set out

## Sir Wilfred Laurier

Born at St. Lin, Quebec, exactly 200 years from the day that his first Canadian ancestor landed, Laurier was educated at L'Assomption College and McGill University. After practising law for awhile he entered the Provincial Legislature, and in 1874 was elected to the Dominion Parliament. He soon became leader of the Liberal Party; and in 1896, Prime Minister, holding that position until 1911.

Sir Wilfred Laurier in office bridged over the old century and the earliest years of the new century which, he once said prophetically, would belong to Canada. From the moment in 1887 when he succeeded Edward Blake as leader of the Liberal Party, this accomplished man of Quebec was marked out for distinction at home and abroad. His courtly figure and great gifts of speech commanded attention and respect and it was a new thing in Canadian politics to have a French speaking Roman Catholic of liberal views in the highest office in the land.

Laurier headed a very strong government which has sometimes been called the "Ministry of All the Talents", with Laurier himself as the dominant figure. He was a great orator both in French and in English, a keen debater and a man of very sound political judgment. His own people in the Province of Quebec gave him almost solid support and looked on him as the greatest man Canada had produced. His ideal was to win the co-operation of the two peoples in Canada to make a great country, and he was well fitted for his task. While he himself was French and Catholic he was a great admirer of the English liberals, and in many ways understood the English speaking people of Canada better than any other French-Canadian had ever done.

The Laurier regime lasted from 1896 to 1911; it saw the rapid development of the Canadian West through the Government's vigorous immigration policy which produced the population for this area, and through its railway policy which enabled the newcomers to send their products to market. While Laurier professed to be a believer in free trade he did very little to lower the tariffs, which had been set up by the Conservatives. He did, however, introduce a scheme of Imperial Preference under which British goods were admitted to the Canadian market at lower rates of duty than the products of other countries.

Laurier had some difficulty in maintaining the support of the stronger members of his government, and one by one his ablest helpers resigned. In 1911, when he was supported by only one of his 1896 ministry, Laurier decided on an agreement with the American Government but the Canadian people voted against it. In the election of 1911 the Nationalists in Quebec opposed Laurier because they feared that he favored the British too much, while many people in Ontario voted against him because they thought he was not British enough; therefore, Laurier was defeated. During the early years of the First World War, his position was made increasingly difficult because of his unbending but thoroughly consistent attitude on the question of compulsory military service. In 1917 he found a number of his former followers throwing in their lot with a coalition ministry which brought enforced enlistment into effect. This was a bitter conclusion to his long life of political devotion to the highest ideals of the state. His death came in 1919.

There have been few Canadians who made such a deep impression upon the political life of their times. Laurier grew up in a school of politics distinguished by its courtesy and affability, but he began a tradition of continuing importance in his insistence upon the autonomy of Canada. He and others recognized that the logical outcome of Responsible Government and Confederation was an independent nationhood. He lived to see great steps toward this ideal taken at the end of his own long career.

## King Louis XI of France

King Louis XI, reigning from 1461 to 1483, was perhaps the most real character portrayed by Scott in his novel *Quentin Durward*.

Louis XI enjoyed mingling with the common people, and when first viewed by Quentin, he appeared to be just a common merchant. His face, fairly attractive but yet forbidding, was composed of strong features, his hollow eyes having a commanding and sinister look. On his head he wore a cap with a Virgin Mary brooch of lead which a poor pilgrim might wear. When King Louis paid a visit to his vassal, the Duke of Burgundy, his dress was anything but that of the King of France. With his threadbare cloak and his hat stuck with many images, King Louis was greatly in contrast with the Duke, who on that occasion was richly attired. From these and other incidents we learn that King Louis seldom dressed like most kings of his time.

The King's guard consisted of Scottish soldiers. They could be trusted, so Louis XI thought, more than the nobles of his country. Lord Crawford, in command of these Scottish Archers, was completely trusted by the King, and La Balue, Quentin's uncle, was also a Tristan Archer and favoured by King Louis. Tristan L'Hermite and his assistants Petit-Andre and Trois-Eschelles were in the King's employ as the Provost-Marshal and his two hangers: Petit-Andre was comical and frisky, jesting and giving the hanging victims a laugh or two, while Trois-Eschelles was very grave, inspiring the victims religiously before their imminent deaths.

Other associates of King Louis were Oliver Eain, the barber, unofficial prime minister, and probably the closest friend of Louis; and Galeotti, the fortune teller and philosopher in whose sayings Louis put great faith.

King Louis XI of France had a character which was generally calm, crafty, and slow. His dishonesty was overwhelming, as he was the most false and insincere of mankind. The Duke of Burgundy accused Louis of underhand dealings in the former's territory and the accusations were certainly justified as the King wanted the Burgundians to revolt against the Duke to keep him off Louis' back. This incident also showed the French king's love of intrigue. Because of Louis' superstitious trait he employed the aforementioned Galeotti Marti as his fortune teller, abiding by and believing in everything he was told by this philosopher. Nevertheless, King Louis had great courage: he was brave for every useful and political purpose and appeared very calm and collected when the continuation of his life was questionable; he seemed sure of himself in any sort of danger and would take the consequences, fearing little.

Even though Louis was evil in practically every way of life, to me he appeared fun-loving, witty, and a very real person. One might even call him a dare-devil. He proved to be most interesting, causing a laugh, an exclamation, or perhaps a sigh from the reader. This French monarch makes the book alive and gives it the touch which every successful book must have.

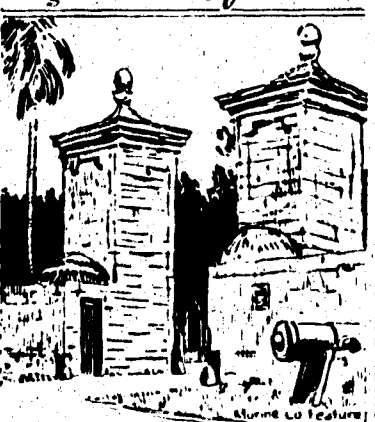

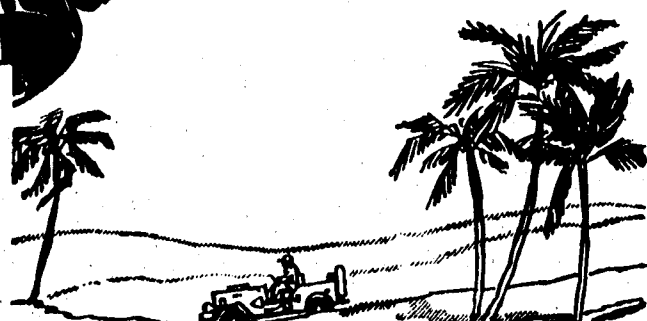

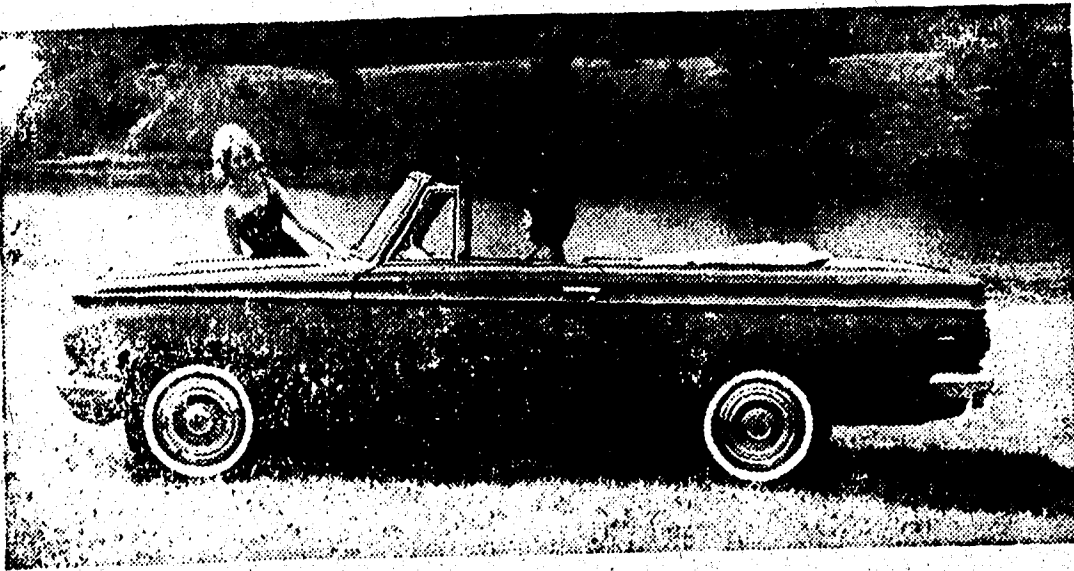

## Among 1909 Students

F. A. Read, Bear River, was  
among those who attended the  
Nova Scotia Agricultural Col-  
lege back in 1909. Volume I,  
Number 1, of the Maritime  
Students Agriculturalist of that  
year which was recently given  
to Nova Scotia Farm News  
lists the names of the students.  
The Students' Agriculturalist  
was a publication by the  
Agricultural College students  
and first appeared in January  
1909.

E. M. Straight, who was the  
Editor of the publication, later  
became the Director of the Ex-  
perimental Farm at Stanich,  
B.C. W. B. Gornall and W. H.  
Porter were shown as assist-  
ant Editors. The former, for  
years, filled the post of Fruit  
Trade Commissioner in Lon-  
don, and later that of Com-  
mercial Secretary in the De-  
partment of Trade and Com-  
merce, at London. Mr. Porter  
will be remembered as the  
Editor of the Farmers' Advo-  
cate, a post from which he re-  
tired not so long ago, and one  
in which he became recog-  
nized as one of Canada's lead-  
ing agricultural editors and  
authorities. M. B. Davis, As-  
sistant Manager, later became  
Dominion Horticulturist for  
Canada, and his influence was  
recognized from coast to coast.

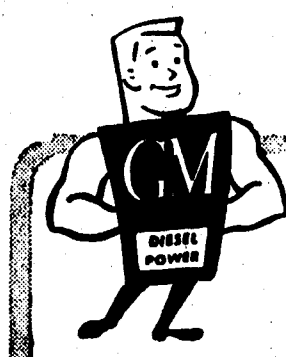

## POPPY SEED FIGURE 8's

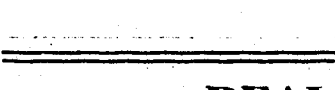
1. Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1 tsp.  
salt. Cook to lukewarm.

2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm  
water. Crumble and add 1 cake  
Fleischmann's Yeast OR stir  
into the water 1 tsp. granulated  
sugar and sprinkle with 1 en-

dough on floured board until  
smooth and elastic. Place in  
greased bowl. Grease top. Cover.  
Let rise in a warm place, free  
from draft, until doubled in  
bulk - about 1 1/2 hours.

4. Punch down dough. Turn out  
and knead until smooth. Divide  
into equal portions. Cover with  
a tea towel. Let rest 10 min.  
Shape each portion into a 10-  
inch roll, cut each roll into 10  
equal pieces. Roll each piece  
into a pencil like strip 12 inches  
long and shape into a figure 8,  
place on greased cookie sheets.  
Cover with a tea towel. Let rise  
until doubled in bulk - about 1  
hour. Beat 1 egg white and 1  
tbsp. cold water together and  
use to brush buns, sprinkle with  
poppy seeds. Bake in mud, hot  
oven (375° F) 12 to 15 min.

Yield: 21 1/2 dozen rolls.

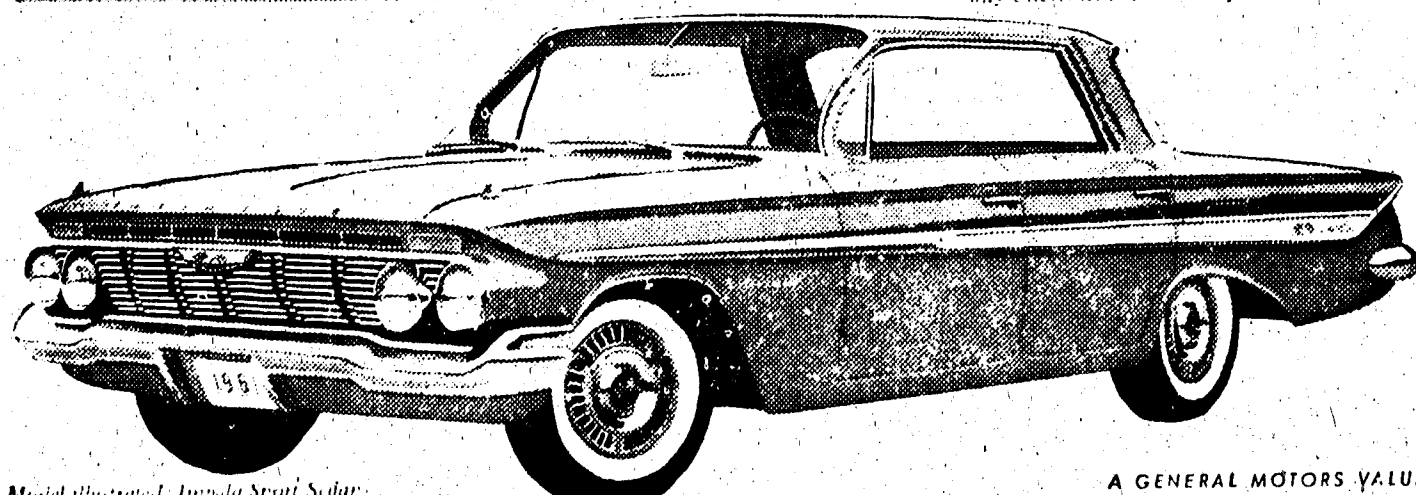

Again, he said, the government had an opportunity to bring in some constructive measures when the budget was brought down. Again there was nothing but review. The only diet offered was one of greater taxation.

In speaking of the present hospital plan, which was inaugurated a few years ago, Mr. Upphart said it had been presented in a package deal. If you voted against taxes you voted against the hospital plan. He said at the end of 1959 there was a surplus of \$150,000 in the government and the plan only cost \$100,000. The first year's accounts, he said, showed the hospital plan could have been paid out of the surplus. In his opinion there is no need of further hospital sales tax at the present time.

In dealing with the gasoline tax, the speaker said the government wants the people to think that no highway program can be carried out unless the gasoline tax is imposed. He said the same \$200,000 is available this year for new highway construction and payment in the province as previously. There is to be expected over \$1,000,000 increase in funds from increase in registrations and gasoline tax.

The government, he said, must live within its income and must not burden people with more taxes. He predicted that the present government with an appetite for increased taxes which would not end would next be taxing for education.

Speaking of the current session of the legislature, Mr. Upphart said: "The Premier stated in the House Friday that he would like an opportunity over the weekend to try his hand at playing a resolution to do with the Cape Breton problem, but it was his opinion he should have tried his hand long ago."

The economy of Nova Scotia in general was scored by Mr. Upphart. He said more than 10,000 people are unemployed at the present time. Mr. Upphart was thanked by John Nicholas, president of the Digby Labour Association.

V. G. Campbell, MLA for Digby, who introduced the speech, said he spoke at some length to the young people who had come to visit the legislative assembly in Halifax and had at that time expressed to himself and Mr. Upphart their desire to organize an association.

Mr. Cardozo charged that the only acknowledgement he got from the government side of the house when he tried to place the needs of this constituency before them was one of callous indifference and an attempt to deride. In speaking of industry for Digby, Mr. Cardozo said that the Premier, Hon. Mr. Stanfield, was provoked one day to say that it was uncomfortable people in Digby sold stock to put into industry, then the member from Digby would not have to complain.

He said during election time there were high sounding phrases and statements to gain election but that in industrial Estates and the Industrial Loan Board which was supposed to develop industry in areas where it was needed had failed to do so. He said these same promises will be trotted out again at the next election.

Mr. Cardozo said that when he asked the Minister of Highways, the Hon. G. J. Smith if he could tell him when the Digby Landfill would be completed and ready for the transport of cars, the answer he received was "The Honorable member from Digby will have to wait to see". It was stated that last year a truck containing rescue equipment had been left in the town for training purposes. When the truck was removed to one of the other Nova Scotia towns interest in C.D. here reduced to a low ebb. With the present setup it was found that municipal bodies were unable to finance more than mere organization of Civil Defence. Mr. Bent brought to the attention of the councillors that the already organized groups in the town were being utilized for C.D. purposes and it was a matter of adding to these already organized bodies such as those concerned with transportation, medical, etc.

The Zehna Rebekah Lodge was granted on Monday night permission to hold a tag day on July 11, 1961, for the Walter Callow fund. Seventy-five dollars was also granted to the Digby Horticultural Society.

Approval to the raising of the price per student from the town to the School for the Blind and School for the Deaf from \$800 per year to \$750 was recorded and a letter to that effect authorized to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities.

To a request by the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Co. to have a portion of Water Street in front of their building designated as a loading zone it was decided to make it a place of no parking in the driveway at the discretion of the traffic authority.

Permission was granted to Shortliffe Grocery to make renovations and extensions to their building on Water Street. Through complaints that 2nd Avenue was poorly lighted it was decided to investigate the matter and obtain the cost of new lights or the possible rearranging of lights to give better service.

The matter of sewerage disposal on Mount Street towards Victoria Street came in for much discussion. In most cases it was found that cesspools were too small and not deep enough so that the sewerage was often found coming out into the ditches. The soil being of clay nature was also given as a reason for sewerage trouble in the area. It was a matter, it was thought, to require being rectified in the not too distant future.

## Going To Australia

A student nurse at the Montreal General Hospital has turned photographer. Next month she'll combine photography with reporting, but not to leave her chosen profession.

Her name is Wendy Du Vernet, and she is the first M.G.H. student nurse to be sent to the 12th Quadrennial Conference of the International Council of Nurses meeting in Australia in April.

Her 11 classmates are paying her way. This is the reason for the photography practice.

"I have to be able to bring the conference back alive to them. It's a lot of money — \$1,700 — to send one girl so far, so this is my responsibility," said the pretty 20-year-old in an interview.

Although she feels indebted to the other members of her class, Wendy did help to earn the money. She was chairman of the money-raising project back in December. She never imagined that some of the \$1,300 raised would go to her.

Choice was made on the basis of general qualifications, rather than just on scholastic standards. The members of the third year class wanted an all-round girl, one who doesn't just sit back and let others do the talking, said the blond student, admitting she never "sits back."

Ten girls were chosen by a nominating committee of students. Head nurses, clinical instructors and the hospital's teaching department cut the list down to eight. The student body voted on the eight.

Apart from photographing all her fellow-students with a movie camera lent by the M.G.H. School of Nursing Associates, she is doing homework for the conference.

Wendy is finding out "how the Canadian Nurses Association works, subjects like retirement and insurance plans, things I never bothered about before." And she is reading dozens of travel folders about her trip. She leaves March 31 and will be away a month.

This is where pleasure comes in. In a group of 21 nurses going to the conference, Wendy will fly to Vancouver, Honolulu, the Fiji Islands, New Zealand and finally Australia. The conference will be held in Melbourne, but she will also visit Sydney.

"All those places are only costing the M.G.H. girls \$200, because to go direct to the conference would cost \$1,500," she said.

Once she gets to Australia it will be fall, she has discovered in her reading. A warm fall, more like Canada's late summer. "So for that, and for Honolulu and Fiji I'm taking summer clothes."

As far as Wendy knows she is the only student going to the conference from Montreal. A total of 3,000 nurses are expected to attend, about 2,500 of these graduates.

The student nurse has travelled before, having had a "bird's eye view of Europe." A native of Ottawa, she plans to do podiatric nursing in Ottawa and Vancouver, following graduation in 1963, and then travel in Europe for a year.

"That's why this conference is so wonderful. My two loves are nursing and travel," she said, smiling.

"Wendy" is the eldest daughter of Fred P. Du Vernet of Ottawa, formerly of Digby.

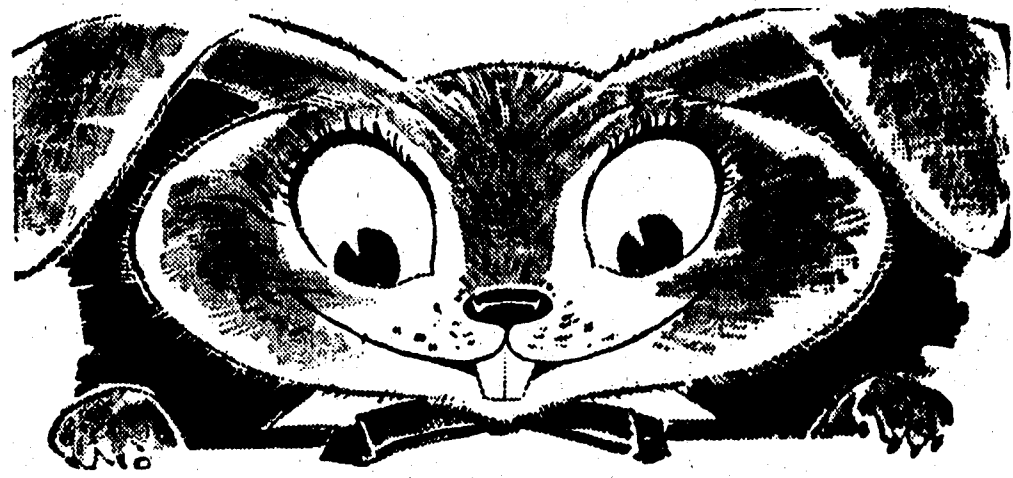

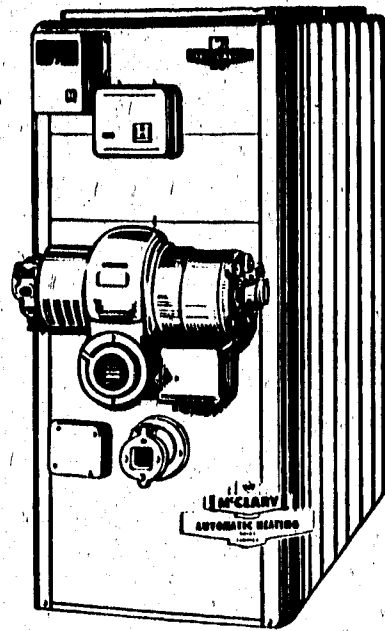

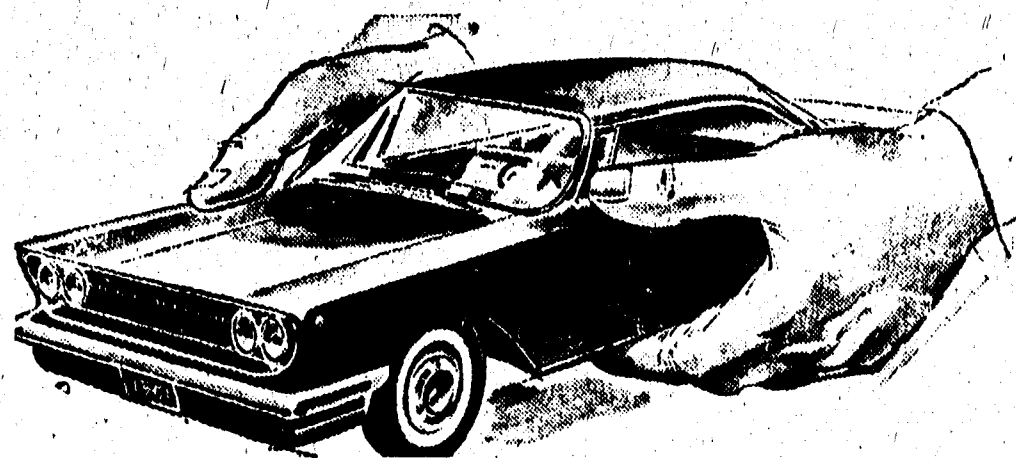

### Canadian Mental Health Association

A number of people in the County have decided to restart a branch of the C.M.H.A., which has been in abeyance here since 1956.

As in all other parts of the world, there is a great need for a more liberal outlook towards mental disturbances and a gap in our education regarding what may be done to achieve better health in its widest meaning.

It is proposed to have the first meeting of the Branch this evening, Thursday, at 8:00 p.m., in order to elect officers and decide on future plans. Of necessity, the meeting will take place at the Psychiatric Clinic, Digby; all who are interested will be welcome and given an opportunity to voice their opinions.

Future meetings will likely be held elsewhere.

### Education Group Report

The study group on Education, which was recently formed in Bear River, has held six sessions, and drawn up a report which will be forwarded to the head convenor, Mrs. G. D. Anderson in Halifax, to be tabulated. Conclusions in brief are:

1. That there is a need for more auxiliary classes and teachers for slow learning pupils.

2. That there should be more vocational and trade schools.

3. That the Dept. of Education should provide a list of all scholarships, bursaries and terms of student loans to both town and country schools.

4. That mathematics should be a compulsory course for all students up to and including Grade XII.

5. That parents of school children should show more interest in the school by attending the Home & School meetings and annual school meetings.

6. That there should be more Adult Education classes.

7. That more and larger scholarships should be provided.

8. That education up to and including Grade XII should be free to those students who qualify.

Interesting research was done on Oakdene School records for the past ten years.

A Grade 2 class, starting in 1946-48, with 34 pupils showed 33 reached Grade 7, and 24 reached Grade 10, 13 reached Grade 11 and 4 graduated from university, a very fine average as compared with percentages across Canada.

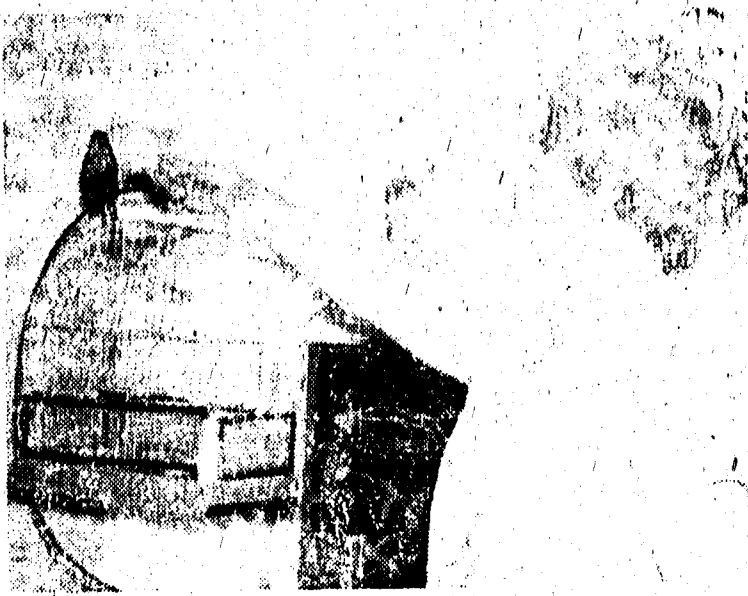

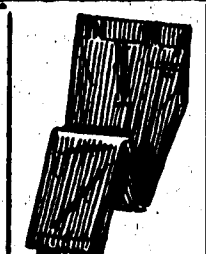

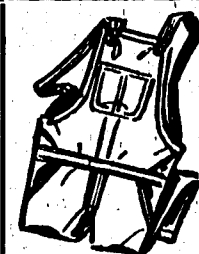

Funeral service for Saulnier took place Tuesday morning at 9 in Salmon River Roman Catholic Church. Service for Mr. Theriault was held Wednesday at 9 a.m. in Heenanogga, Rev. J. L. Comeau of Salmon River, officiated at both services.

## Protest Tax Levying

A resolution is to be presented to the Digby Municipal Council in May by the Maple Leaf Agricultural Society protesting the action the council took during the past winter in levying a 6% interest on municipal taxes unpaid by June 30, 1961. The resolution was drawn up at a special meeting of the society called for the purpose on Monday evening. The resolution, which will be presented by Mrs. Penny Gott, Lloyd Jefferson, Lloyd MacNeill and Arthur MacKay, points out that the economic condition, applicable to all the society members, depends on the summer months for earning money to pay taxes. The resolution stated, "Therefore be it resolved that the undersigned do hereby serve notice on the Digby Municipal Council that we will pay our taxes on or before October 30, 1961, but will not pay any interest of 6% levied from July 1st, 1961, to October 30, 1961."

The meeting was presided over by Lloyd Jefferson, president of Maple Leaf Agricultural Society. As the secretary was not present Lloyd MacNeill was appointed secretary.

Mr. Walter Wood, Councillor for Brighton District No. 2, was the only councillor present. He was called to give reasons why, at the Council in January, the councillors passed a motion to charge 6% interest on unpaid taxes from June 30th to October. He stated the main reason was because the Municipality needed the money to pay their monthly bills, such as office staff, teachers, bus drivers, operation of buses, gasoline, labour, etc. Every Spring the Municipality has to hire money from Bank to pay their accounts, he continued.

Questioned if the Council would rescind the motion to collect the 6% interest, Mr. Wood's answer was in the negative, stating that it's too late to do that now for this year.

Mrs. "Penny" Gott, Hedley House, Smith's Cove, asked the question: "What authority did Council have to put 6% interest on taxes?" Mr. Wood replied by order in Council by authority of Union of Municipalities.

Mrs. Gott suggested to Councillor Wood that Council could obtain extra money by hiring a tax collector, pay him 10% to collect \$111,000 back taxes. Mr. Wood replied that this had already been done. Mr. Frank Miller, Smith's Cove, it was stated, had been appointed to the tax collecting job at a salary of \$5,000 per year.

After much discussion on the tax interest problem by all present the resolution was drafted, presented to the meeting and passed unanimously.

## Firemen Lead Hockey Finals

The Digby Fire Department Smokeaters are just one game away from winning their first Industrial Hockey League championship. After dropping the first game to the Digby Crows 6-3, the Firemen came back strong and took the second and third games 5-3 and 7-3, to give them a 2-1 lead in the best of five series for the title.

Last evening these two teams met again, the results of which were not known at press time. If the fifth and deciding game is necessary it will be played at the Forum Monday evening at 8 o'clock. It is understood that both teams will be ready with power-packed line-ups. If the Crows should win, it will be their first championship in five years. The Firemen are newcomers to the league, but feel confident they can win the crown.

Both games that the Smokeaters won were fiercely contested with rugged and heavy checking throughout and kept the crowd wondering what would happen next. Flying pucks as well as tempers and fistfuffs were flying too.

## Humanities Take High Place

Two phases exist in university education. One is to find the proper balance. Along with scientific and technical knowledge, a place must be made for the liberal arts, for the humanities, for the values, for the character, for the training and the attitudes of various kinds. If we lose sight of humanities we are a lost nation. This was the expression of a group which met at Digby Regional High School on Tuesday to make a study of education under the theme "The Future of the People".

The meeting was chaired by Mrs. Margaret LeGrand on the staff of Digby Regional High School. Leading the discussions were F. C. Purdy, supervisor and Mrs. Eva Wendell, Secretaries for discussions were Mrs. Victor Jeffrey, Mr. Frank Picketts and Miss Grace Vincent. The meeting was open for public participation.

It was recommended by the group that stronger liaison exist between the high school and universities.

One question dealt with the role of the university in training teachers and the relation of the university to the Teachers' College. One observation made on this particular question and in relation to the new provincial teacher training college was the duplication of academic training which already could be obtained at university. The opinion was expressed that one year professional training instead of two would suffice for rather than to duplicate university courses the year could well be spent in training teachers to design and teach general courses.

Study groups similar to the one held in Digby are meeting throughout the province in preparation for the Nova Scotia Invitational Conference on Education to be held at Dalhousie University on May 11 and 13 and sponsored by the Nova Scotia Education Association. The conference is designed to promote an opportunity for exchange of ideas and information between the public and those responsible for the direction and encouragement of education at all levels.

In enlarging further on the questions for discussion on Tuesday, it was agreed that this is an age of technical war and more effort should be put into training better technicians. Without practical education students come out of university with only a philosophy and often fail in their technical job. Apprenticeship was favored or instruction by people who are or were in the occupation requiring particular technical skills.

The importance of records giving information about pupils through from primary to high school and thence to university was stressed. It was suggested that university might save time by resorting to high school records or have a three-week probationary and screening period at the beginning of the university year to understand more fully the student or teacher potential or qualifications. Guidance for students planning to attend university were advocated.

## Homeless After Fire

An unemployed man and his family were homeless after their seven-room house burned at Clementsvalle on Monday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Stoddard had taken their five-month-old baby to the doctor in Annapolis Royal when the blaze started and razed the house in 20 minutes.

When firemen from Bear River, some six miles away, arrived at the scene, there was nothing they could do. "It was a mass of flames a total loss", said a fire department spokesman.

Cause of the fire was not known.

Mr. Stoddard was formerly employed at HMCS Cornwallis, but has been unemployed for some time. Red Cross fire and disaster and comfort committees are assisting the couple and their baby.

There is still insistence from some quarters that the famous Thomas Alva Edison's great grandfather, John Edison, lived nearer to the Joggin Bridge. We can see no hope that the restoration of the historic site will take place immediately, at least not until the question is settled by competent authority as to which is the proper historical property.

After our request in The Courier of March 16, Mr. Russell Savary offered the information as he had been given it by some of the older residents of the community and which seems to have been similar to that handed down to Winchester families and Roops, who were related to the Edisons.

According to Mr. Savary, a house stood where his house now stands. That particular house had originally stood on a spot where the highway now runs through. The house was moved up to the spot where his house now stands for the construction of the railway.

Originally the house had belonged to Adam Walker, who had come from Germany. Mr. Russell has in his possession the land grant certificate.

## About This and That

### Mental Health

Last week was National Health Week. So far as we know, the reorganization of the Digby County Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association was not planned particularly to coincide with this particular week. However, no organization would have a better right to the spotlight in National Health Week. More hospital beds are occupied by the mentally ill at any one time in Canada than by patients suffering from all other types of illness combined. We are told. Adding to these the number of people treated in general hospitals whose illnesses have psychological origins and those who have mental disturbances without attention, we find mental illness easily becomes our number one health problem.

Despite the literature distributed and the education to the contrary attempted during the past few years, there are still people who live in fear, ignorance and superstition regarding mental illnesses. People fail to realize how important it is for mental patients to know that someone cares and is interested in their welfare. Not all know the importance of rehabilitation of patients after hospitalization. Not many realize the immense amount of research which is needed for improved treatment and prevention of mental illness. These are but a few conditions which the newly formed Digby County Mental Health Association will attempt to combat by education, example and influence within the Digby County area.

A person is no more responsible for a mental illness than he or she is for a heart condition. Mental illness should be treated as any other illness and professional help sought as soon as the first symptoms appear. You can help improve mental health in your own area by joining the association which is working toward better understanding of mental illness and treatment and is interested primarily in building good mental health within the communities of Digby County.

### Community Participation

What causes traffic accidents — weather conditions, road conditions, vehicle conditions? These all have some part in the total traffic picture. But it's the driver's own conditions, both mental and physical, that cause a great many of the accidents that you read and hear about day by day. You may find somewhere in the accident report that the driver in an accident was tired, angry, inattentive, or had been drinking. Harder to find in the report would be the driver's mental state at the time of the accident. In many cases the driver didn't know, didn't think or didn't care about the possibility of having an accident. How can he be made more aware of the danger he is causing to himself and everyone else? The Nova Scotia Highway Safety Council suggests: One good way is by an active community campaign against such thinking. And that's where you come in. Our community and our local safety people need your active support. Let's all accept our responsibility to join the fight for life . . . and help save lives.

### V.O.N. Costs Up

While we are on the subject of health, we note in the V.O.N. story in last week's issue of The Digby Courier that the cost per visit to the Digby V.O.N. association has increased to \$3.32. Considering that the cost per visit not so long ago was \$2.50, this is a drastic increase as the story states.

One of the reasons for this increase in cost per visit is because of decrease in the number of paying patients. A health service is like any other business. It must have paying customers to make it a financial success. While the Victorian Order of Nurses is an organization designed to aid those who cannot afford to care for themselves yet it is also an organization which caters to persons who are able to pay their way. Naturally as in any commercial business the non-paying patients give a rise to costs of operation. The fewer there are to pay, the higher is the cost per visit. In order to keep the service in the vicinity at a reasonable rate per visit some way must be found to overcome these rising trends and getting more paying patients seems to be the logical solution. Expansion of territory might be the answer in part. Keeping the services of the order before the public by publicity might also help to attract paying patients.

The other reason given for the drastic increase in the cost per visit is increased expenses. This is no new problem. Anyone engaged in business, in civic and municipal life, is well acquainted with increased expenses. There is the ever increasing demand for more and better facilities and to meet these, of whatever nature they be, there is bound to be greater expense. In general business the expense is either borne by the business or passed on to the consumer of goods. In civic, municipal or provincial government circles the only solution to the problem is higher taxes to meet costs of demands. Anyone who has worked in any of these bodies will substantiate that.

With the Victorian Order of Nurses the same thing applies. The cost must be met. To meet the rising cost the paying patient load must be kept at a certain volume or failing this greater amounts will have to be forthcoming from grants and campaign contributions to keep the service available.

### Talking Shop

Correspondents not only do a service to their newspaper in writing the happenings in their villages. They also do a service to their communities by keeping the village in the public eye and by keeping their native sons and daughters, now living in other lands, interested in the home community. Villagers in the community can assist the correspondent by letting the correspondent know about items of interest. How often we have heard the expression "My name is never in the paper." The question is "Have you told your correspondent about what you have been doing or where you have been visiting?" A correspondent cannot be everywhere at once. A correspondent who visited our office a few minutes before we sat down to Talking Shop said "The people complain to me that I don't send in enough news but they don't let me know about themselves. I can't guess what they are doing." How very true. A correspondent can't telephone every person in the village. Villagers must also co-operate. The same applies to the larger centres.

Weekly newspapers are never short of copy. More than enough of interesting material sent from every corner of the country has to find its way to the waste paper basket. It is the local news that our readers want. It is the local news which serves our particular area best. How about it readers? Can you see that your correspondent gets your copy? Just a telephone call will do.

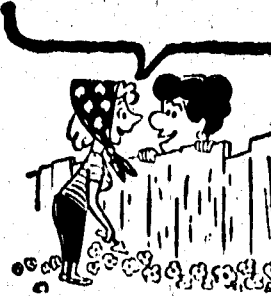

## Celebrated Birthday

Capt. Charles Burke, of Church Point, one of Clare's oldest sea captains, recently celebrated his 84th birthday. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Burke, of Church Point, and resides in the dwelling in which his father lived before him. Seven children made up the Thomas Burke family.

Capt. Burke has seen a colorful sea career. At 17 he went to the United States where he was employed ashore for four years. Prior to going to the United States, Capt. Burke sailed on coastal vessels until 1894.

In 1898 he joined the United States Navy when the Spanish American war was declared and was seaman on the USS Wasp. This war was to last until 1902.

In the battle of Nape Bay in Cuba July 21, 1898, Capt. Burke was seaman at the forward gun on the USS Wasp with Jimmy Lavin as gunner. Jimmy made a direct hit on the big gun port of Don Jorge Juan and in the encounter sent the warship to the bottom of the bay.

Ernest R. Duff of Charlotteville, Virginia, with whom Capt. Burke has been in communication in recent years,

was ward room steward in charge of the aft powder magazine and supplied two guns.

The ammunition shells were stored in the aft bosun's locker and they had to be sent up with pulley from down below. They kept the guns red hot and burned the grey paint off the guns. Capt. Burke remembers the cat that was found swinging in the wreckage of the sunken cruiser. The crew of the USS Wasp named the cat "Civera" after the admiral of the Spanish fleet.

Following the war, Capt. Burke returned to sailing the seven seas. He sailed on the Foster Rice, a topsail schooner; the Dixon Rice, a square rigger; the Frances Rice and the Alexander, both a three masted schooner. He also sailed on the George M. Warner, the Levesque, the barque P. A. Lovett and the barque Aurora which sailed from Yarmouth to South American ports.

Later he sailed on the SS Gorman Dingley and the SS Cobb on the Yarmouth to Saint John route. He also sailed on the United Fruit steamship San Jose to Puerto Rico and South American ports.

Capt. Burke sailed on the first "Boston" steamship which operated from Boston to Yarmouth and also on the first "Yarmouth" boat, the Prince Rupert, which was a side-wheeler, the Northland, North Star and the second Yarmouth and the Evangeline. On the New York run he sailed on the Robert E. Lee, the George Washington and the General Warfield.

He joined the Eastern Steamship Lines in 1905 with which firm he remained for 30 years. In 1935 he retired after rising from third officer to first officer while with the Eastern Steamship Lines. He married Mary Mulcahy, of Boston, and on his retiring from active service, they moved to Church Point, where they resided in his ancestral home.

Capt. Burke lost his wife, after a long illness about a year ago. He is very active for his age and is an avid crib-

bage player. He can be seen at the Church Point Men's Social Club every Thursday evening in the weekly cribbage tournament. He won the championship last year in the season's play and is a contender for the championship this year.

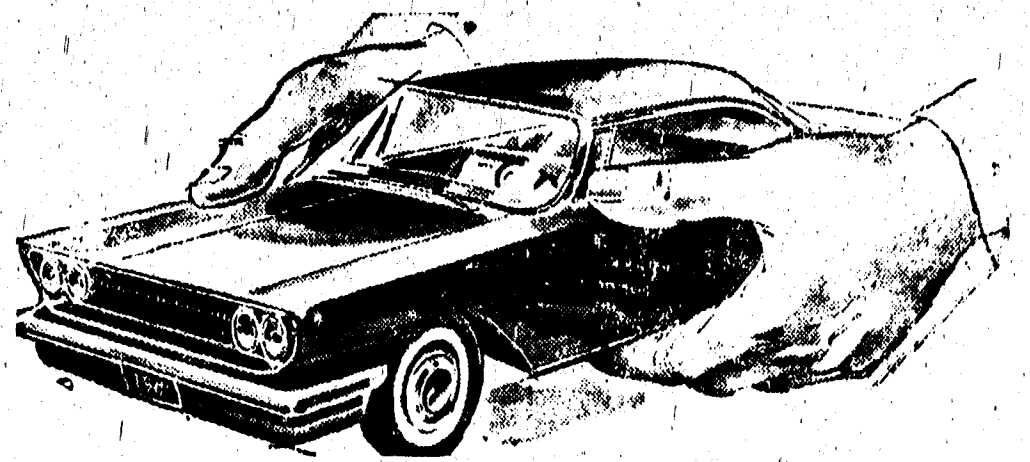

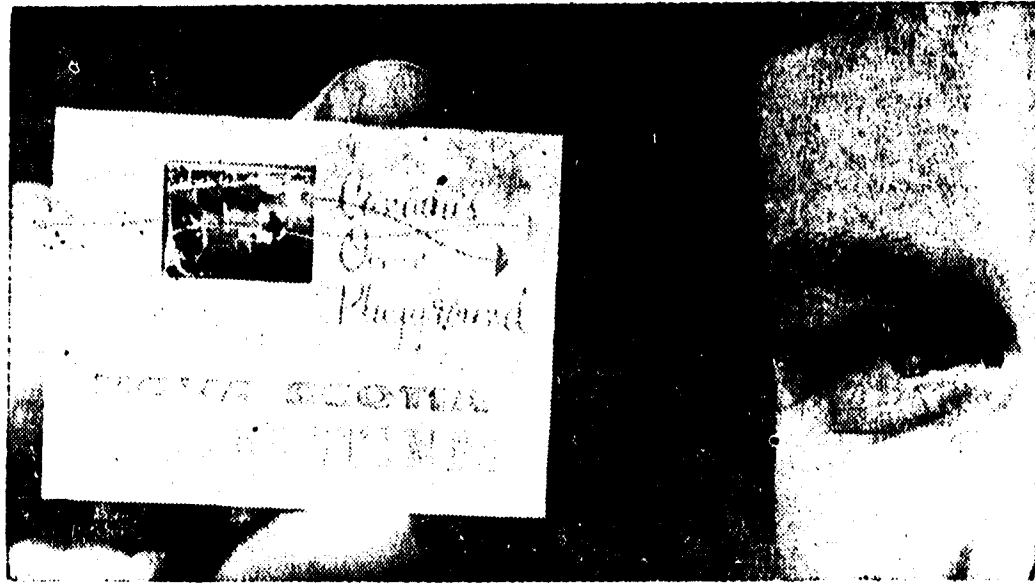

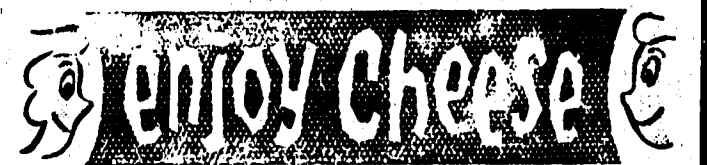

## Highway Ban Heavy Traffic

Highways Minister Smith said Monday that all highways in Lunenburg, Queens, Shelburne, Yarmouth, Digby, Annapolis, Clare and Kings counties would be closed to certain classes of vehicles from midnight Tuesday until further notice.

All public highways west of but not including No. 2 in Halifax and Hants counties will also be closed.

Highways will be closed to the following:

Vehicles having a single axle weight in excess of 8,000 pounds gross load where such axle is equipped with two pneumatic tires.

Those having a single axle weight in excess of 10,000 pounds gross load where such axle is equipped with four or more pneumatic tires.

Those having a tandem weight in excess of 12,000 pounds gross load with no single axle of the tandem pair exceeding 7,500 pounds where each tandem axle is equipped with two pneumatic tires.

Those having a tandem weight in excess of 15,000 pounds gross load with no single axle of the tandem pair exceeding 9,000 pounds where each tandem axle is equipped with four or more pneumatic tires.

Those having a triple-axle assembly weight in excess of 15,000 pounds with no single axle of the triple assembly exceeding 7,000 pounds where each axle is equipped with two pneumatic tires.

Those having a triple-axle assembly weight in excess of 18,000 pounds with no single axle of the triple assembly exceeding 8,000 pounds where each axle is equipped with four or more pneumatic tires.

members were appointed to the Board of Directors of the Mental Health Service with branch clinics at Digby and Bridgewater. Six members will be appointed to the Board from the Annapolis County Mental Health Association. Further members of the Board will be from councils, medical associations and clergy, and in both counties.

The Western Nova Scotia Mental Health Group Inc., which provided services for some years to the western Nova Scotia area of Yarmouth and Shelburne, now have their own service. The Mental Health Service Board for Digby and Annapolis will look after the requirements in Digby Annapolis area. Clinical service in Mental Health was first established in Digby under a Cornell University Research program. Later it was aided by both federal and provincial finances and a Board was set up to manage affairs locally. The new Board replaces the Group disbanded.

Dr. R. A. Armstrong, in charge of the Mental Health Clinic here, was chairman for the meeting and introduced the guest speaker, Andrew Crook, Halifax, Executive Director of the Nova Scotia Division of Canadian Mental Health Association. Mr. Crook outlined the history of the Association and spoke on the four-fold program of education, service, rehabilitation and research.

Mental health, the speaker said, is still too often treated by people in communities as shameful. Old ideas and superstitions still exist. People are still not aware of the causes of mental illness and the restoration to mental health. By education this situation can be remedied, the speaker continued. He stressed the positive approach, educating parents and teachers on how homes and schools can build mental health and prevent illness in an understanding of human behaviour.

Patients in hospitals progress more rapidly when they know someone cares and wants them to get well. Mr. Crook said. This is where the volunteer worker can help. They can bring the community into the hospital and make life more meaningful for the patient. Another service which can be rendered by association members is the collection of funds for the formation and benefit of Mental Health Clinics to treat disorders outside of hospital. It is estimated one out of every ten has a mental disturbance. Besides treatment service there is also reaching out to teachers, doctors and clergy in consultation and in discussing methods of dealing with people with whom they come in contact.

Sometimes patients who leave hospitals feel insecure and apprehensive, the speaker told his audience. Here is where the volunteer worker can assist in rehabilitation. At the hospital, too, social and recreational activity can be set up by leaders provided from the Mental Health Association.

Regarding research, Mr. Crook said there was not enough money spent for this purpose. The estimated cost of treating the 100,000 patients in Canada is about \$75,000,000. Add to this the cost of clinic programs, treatment of psychiatric patients in general hospitals and loss to industry of working days and the figure is estimated to be three quarters of a billion dollars in cost because of mental illness. Mr. Crook felt if more money was put into research this figure could be greatly lowered. There are many avenues need research in regard to mental health but one particular avenue mentioned was the relationship of body chemistry to mental illness.

The next meeting of the Digby County Mental Health Association is scheduled for April 13.

Should the quilt not be "out" at nine o'clock then refreshments are served the guests before they leave for home. In a few days another member of the group will take her turn.

Each home averages two quilts per season. The finished product is an eye-catching achievement and many have found their way into city homes in Canada and the United States.

## Heirloom To Ontario

A hand hewn bowl carved at Clementsport, Nova Scotia, in 1819, has been passed on to Terry Dittmars, Fort William, Ontario, in a family tradition dating back more than 100 years. Intended originally as a chopping bowl, it was hollowed from a single knot of silver birch trunk, and measured two feet by eighteen inches with a depth of fourteen inches. Because of its size it has often been used as a bath tub for young members of the Dittmars clan.

Tradition demands that the bowl be given to the eldest surviving son of each generation. It has moved with the family from Nova Scotia to Maine and to its present home in Kakabeka Falls, Ont., 20 miles west of here (Fort William). Van Dittmars recently presented the heirloom to Terry. "It is supposed to go to my eldest son", he said, "but being an old bachelor, the rightful owner is my nephew, Terry, oldest son of my next oldest brother." Next it will go to Terry's son Jeffrey, 4 years of age.

This item from Ontario is of interest to Clementsport as well as Deep Brook, there having been a Vanderbilt (Van) Dittmars in Deep Brook whose only son, Frank, still resides here. Whether or not this is the same Dittmars family or riches, of another branch?

## About Edison Homestead

Smith's Cove, N.S., March 18, 1961.

I noted your request in this week's Courier regarding the situation of the Edison property and was interested to know that others like myself, would like to know the correct situation.

On page 103 of Wilson's History of Digby County you will find this statement: "Samuel Edison, Senior, and John Edison settled in Marshalltown, One located on lot now occupied by Melanson; the other where John Abbott lives," on page 151 is the following: "Ephraim Thibault, a relative succeeded Edison on farm opposite George L. Marshall's residence at Marshalltown." Marshalltown was in Digby Township, hence the statement, no doubt, that Edison lived in Digby. I have seen that same mistake with regard to another subject but do not seem to have the article at hand this morning from which to quote.

The property near the big Juggin Bridge now owned by Mr. Savary is often known as the "old Edison property" but I doubt that Samuel Edison ever lived there, although it would be possible since when land was cheap, usually a gift, folk seemed to roam about which makes it hard for us to trace them. On page 351 of Wilson's History, second line from bottom of the page, you will see that Marcellus Edison married Susannah Roup, a relative of the Misses Winchester, George and Robert of Smith's Cove. They tell me he claimed to be a brother of the inventor, a claim which was doubted since he left for Germany, professing to be in search of family fortune and did not return. He lived on the Savary property which is also the old Roup homestead. The Winchester family have the old Edison deed, I was promised information concerning it but so far have not received that information. The only way to be certain with regard to the Samuel Edison property would be for someone to trace backward or forward as the case might be, through deeds. Probably a lawyer would have no trouble to find out.

Mr. Savary tells us that the Edison house on that property was in the field back of the present house and that the old lilac bushes and trees are still there.

Perhaps someone can give you more definite information than I can, but just in case they do not, I will tell you what little I can.

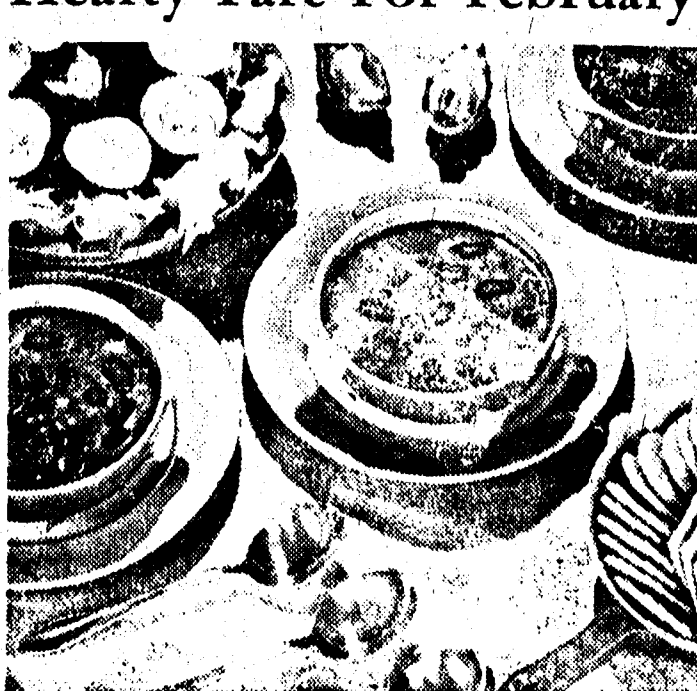

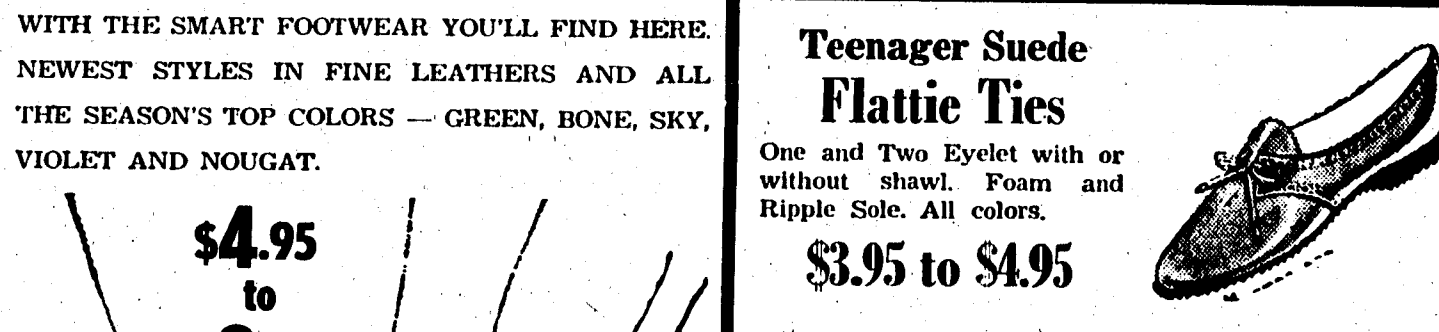

Moncton Yard is part of a CN programme to integrate freight handling on a nation-wide basis that when it is completed will revolutionize the freight transportation industry in Canada as far as speed, efficiency, dependability and economy are concerned. It has been estimated, for instance, that when Moncton Yard is working in co-ordination with Montreal Yard, soon to be completed, the running time of freight trains between the Atlantic Provinces and Central Canada will be reduced by as much as half. ## Old Catalogue

One of the most interesting items sent to The Digby Courier recently was a T. Eaton Co. Ltd. Spring and Summer Catalogue of 1907. It was sent to the paper by Mrs. Elie Comeau, Digby, and was given to her by Augustin Comeau, of Meteghan River. A collection of these catalogues had been kept by Mr. Comeau's father, Etienne Comeau, a former postmaster at Meteghan River.

Being a woman, the editor of the Courier naturally sought the fashion page of styles for 1907. Headings on pages read "Latest New York Styles", "New York's Latest Fashions". The fashion was definitely high neck and long skirt, right to the floor, even for street wear. Skirts were full at the bottom but nipped at the waist line. Basque style waists, full sleeves and braid prominent in trimming. These special New York styles were really the posh thing for they ranged from \$22.50 to \$27.50 with a \$5.00 extra charge for special or extra sizes. Some of the more moderately priced suits made of vicuna cloth ranged from \$7.95 to \$12.00. Dresses of lawn and organdie were \$2.50 to \$10.00. Colors seemed to be limited in number, mostly black, navy, white with blue. There was, however, one special page devoted to bridal and evening costumes up to \$12.00 for the bridal dress.

Ladies' hats in 1907 had all the flowers, feathers, veiling and ribbon imaginable, even for today's creations. In fact, some were not too dissimilar to the 1961 numbers. High laced boots were in style. Prices in 1907 ranged from \$1.25 to \$10.25 high.

Ladies' clothing have changed no more in style than have the children's. Little girls' dresses, a far cry from 1961, were anywhere from below knee to ankle length, with dresses and coats ranging from seventy-five cents to \$3.75. Hats and bonnets for girls were very different from today and could be bought for prices from thirty cents to \$1.50.

If little girls' clothing changed in style in the last 55 years, the styles for young boys

changed that much more. We see no belted jackets nearly to the knees on young boys suits today. Prices ranged from seventy-five cents to \$5.00. Men could possibly get away in 1961 with the same suit as 1907 but there certainly were no sport styles to match those of today. Everyday suits ranged from \$5.00 to \$16.50 but the evening, dinner and clerical suits went as high as \$25.00.

Yard goods ranged from nine cents per yard for chambrays, ginghams, ducks and prints to \$1.50 per yard for satins, wool cravenette. Drugs were peculiar in name and low in price. One pint bottle of finest Norwegian Cod Liver Oil was fifty-five cents. Hydrogen Peroxide was ten cents for a two oz. bottle. Few of the medicines listed were similar in name to drugs seen displayed today.

A nice English China 40 piece Tea Set sold for \$5.75. Beautiful lace curtains could be bought for \$1.25 a pair and the Nottingham lace as low as 35 cents per pair. Flat silverware was low in price. Tea spoons in brand name patterns \$3.00 per dozen large, \$2.85 per dozen small.

Noticeably lacking were radios and T.V.s. In their place were "talking machines" with large horns and phonographs. Prices up to \$35.00. No electric washing machines appeared on the pages but you could buy a nice hand rotary machine for \$7.00.

The catalogue itself lacked the glamour of today's colored pages. Everything in the 8x10 size page catalogue was in black and white with many of the pages appearing blank.



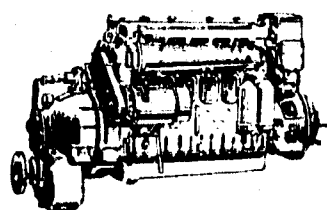

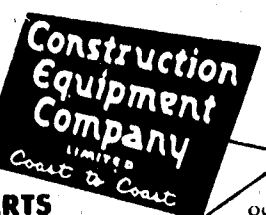

### RASPBERRY-COCONUT COFFEE CAKE

1. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast. Off stir into the water 1 cup granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well.
2. Scald 1/2 c. milk; stir in 1/4 c. granulated sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 3 tbsps. soft shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Add to dissolved yeast; stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 1/2 c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Work in sufficient additional flour to make a soft dough—about 1 1/2 c. more. Knead dough on floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl. Grease top. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 1/2 hours.
3. Punch down dough. Turn out and knead until smooth. Divide into 3 equal portions. Cover with a tea towel; let rest 10 mins. Roll out each portion into a 9-inch square. Combine 1/2 c. thick raspberry jam and 1/2 c. shredded coconut; spread to within 1/2 inch of edges on two squares of dough; pile in greased 9-inch square pan; top with remaining square of dough. Press down edges lightly. Grease top. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 45 mins. Bake in mod. hot oven (375°) 25 to 30 mins. Turn out; place top side up on wire rack.
4. Combine 1/2 c. sifted icing sugar, few drops vanilla and sufficient milk to make a rather stiff icing. Spread hot cakes with 3 tbsps. raspberry jam. Cool cake slightly then drizzle with icing and sprinkle lightly with a little coconut. Yield: 1 coffee cake.

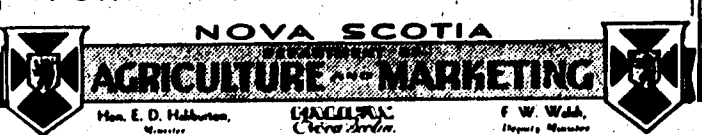

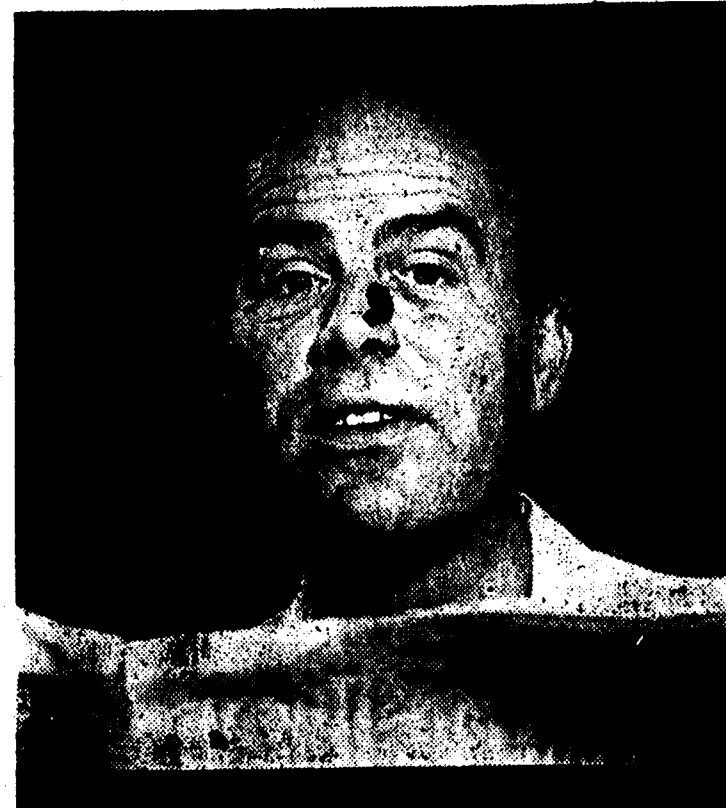

to Mr. Walker registered in Halifax by G. E. Barkle, in January 1789. The grant is given under the Great Seal of the province of Nova Scotia signed by wellbeloved John Parr, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over said province in the 29th year of reign. This is supposed to be the second grant given in Digby Co., the first being to a man by the name of Craig, the property

now owned by Thomas Franklin.

As Mr. Savary learned the story, the John Edison house was built some few yards away from the Walker house. The cellar, which was thought to be the cellar of the Edison home, is still there. Red oak trees, thought to have come from New Jersey, are found on the property, as are also roses and flowering plants, thought to be from the original Edison flower garden. In a cemetery on the property, Mr. Savary believes is a slab of

slate/rock bearing the Edison name.

John Edison had a son, Samuel Sr. Samuel Jr., the son of Samuel Sr., was born on August 6, 1803. He was the father of the inventor, Thomas Alva Edison, who was born in 1847 after the family moved from Digby area. They had moved to Ontario and later to Milan, Ohio, where Thomas was born.

Thomas Edison had an uncle, Marcellus Edison, who married Susanna Rouse, daughter of Jacob Rouse, who was the

1st sheriff of Digby County. Rouses and Winchesters, descendants of these people, still live around Digby.

Some confusion might arise from the fact of two Samuel Edisons and because of property which belonged to a colored family who lived in Conway by the name of Ediso, possibly getting their name from the Edisons if they followed the one time custom of the servant taking the name of the master.

According to Mr. Savary,

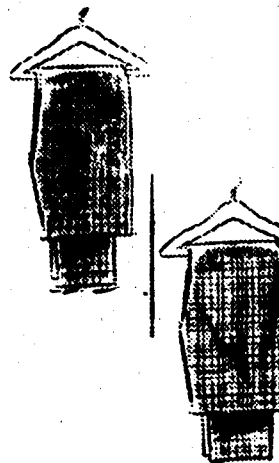

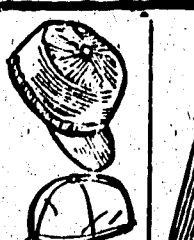

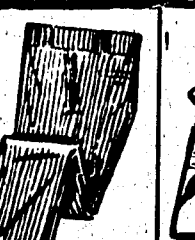

Mr. F. C. Purdy, supervisor of schools, spoke on the subject of town planning at the town council held in the Digby Forum last Thursday.

Legislation of interest to Digby people included liberalization of the province's liquor laws to come into effect on May 15; tax increase of two cents on gasoline, ten cents on diesel fuel and an increase of the hospital tax to five per cent.

Approved during the session of the House was the province's first income tax advance a previous act. Was passed in 1947 and which would enable the province to collect personal and corporate income tax fields.

Another of the session's bills was amending the Fishery Act, approved of a permit, which would allow a person to fish for salmon and trout in certain areas of the province.

During the session approval was given to an amendment to the Industrial Estates Act which permits interest-free loans for five years to approved industries. The amendment is intended as an additional inducement to industry in depressed areas.

The final report of the Royal Commission on the subject of the province's economy was accepted. The report recommended a number of changes in the province's economy, including a reduction in the province's debt and a reduction in the province's expenditure.

A report on the newly formed Alcoholism Research Commission was also received.

Approval was given to a bill which will permit the government to increase the harvesting of fish mussels in some areas of the province.

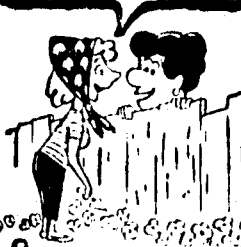

### FILBERT CRISPY BUNS

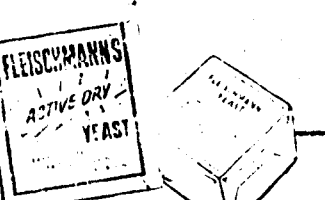
1. Scald 1/2 c. milk; cool to lukewarm. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast OR stir into the water 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well.

Sprinkle with 1/2 c. of the filbert mixture. Roll up gently to form a roll. Cut roll into 12 equal slices. Place slices on a greased cookie sheet. Repeat with second portion of dough. Cover with a tea towel. Let rest 1 hour.

4. Sprinkle baking sheet with filbert mixture. Roll out each slice of dough on the cookie sheet, turning once, to a diameter of 4 inches. Place on greased cookie sheet. Cover with a tea towel. Let rise until almost doubled in bulk, about 15 mins. Bake in a hot oven 125-135 mins. then turn buns with spatula and continue to bake until golden brown, 5 mins. longer. Yield: 2 dozen buns.

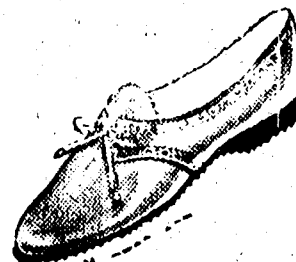

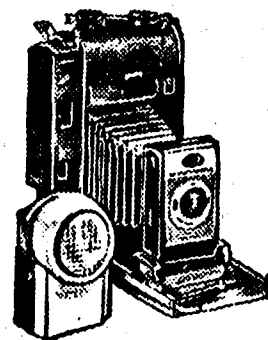

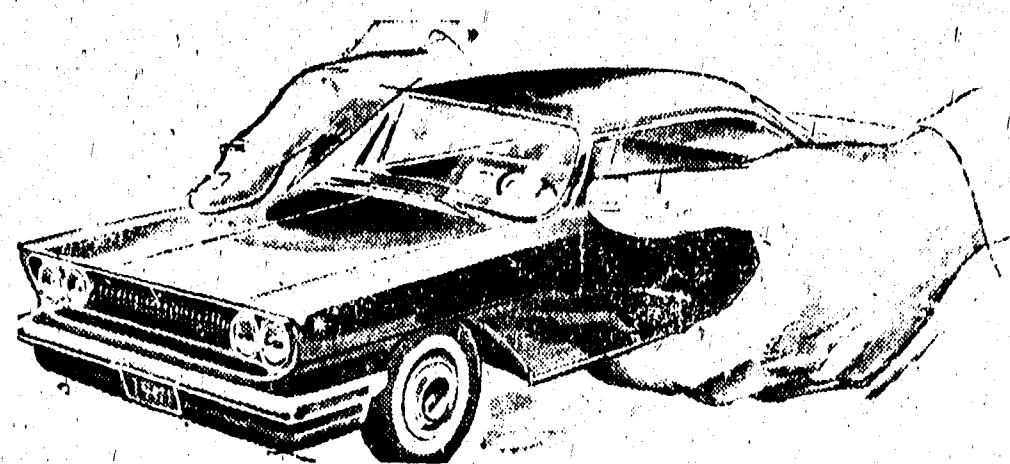

### Parliament Hill

March 20, 1962

The past week has been a busy one, both on and off of the Hill. As the readers of this column will remember,

I was away from Parliament during the preceding week on rather a rough trip, visiting various Canadian Clubs in the Maritime Provinces. I got back to Montreal in time to catch the train, and had a good sleep for the first time in a week before I arrived in Washington at noon the next day. My colleagues, the Ministers of Finance, Trade and Commerce and of Agriculture, together with various advisers and officials, arrived by plane Sunday evening. During the preceding week there had been various briefing sessions in which the Canadian Ministers considered the many documents which had been prepared by the various Departments concerning all aspects of the American-Canadian relations. I had that week and I spent a good part of Sunday night and a good part of early Monday morning putting up on these various documents. One who has not been on one of these conferences has no conception of the amount of preliminary work which goes into them. Perhaps some of it is unnecessary, but most of it is very helpful. Then on Monday morning we had another briefing session in the library of the Canadian Chancery, at which the Canadian Ambassador and some of his senior officials discussed with us the latest American viewpoint on the matters which would be raised during the conference.

The conference opened Monday afternoon in "the New State Building". We laughingly decided amongst ourselves that we should have brought with us the Minister of Public Works so that he could see what kind of public buildings we should build in Ottawa. Suffice it to say, that there are very few, if any, Government Buildings on this continent (or probably elsewhere) which would compare with this either in size or in appointments.

The importance which our American friends attach to this annual conference was indicated by the delegation which they had to meet us. This was headed by Dean Rusk, the new Secretary of

State, and together with him there were the Secretary for Trade and Commerce, the Secretary for Agriculture, and the Secretary of the Interior. In addition there was Mr. George Ball, the Under Secretary of State for Economic Affairs, and many other advisers, as well as Under Secretaries and Assistant Secretaries. Altogether it was a pretty imposing delegation. We were very favourably impressed with the personality, and the calibre of the various Cabinet Ministers and their advisers. The Secretary of Commerce, former Governor Hodges, was approximately my age. The others were much younger. The proceedings were, of course, held in camera, and I cannot report upon them except that a very frank and very free discussion ensued on all matters with which we had time to deal and conducted at all times in a very friendly and informal atmosphere. At evening we were entertained by Dean Rusk at an informal dinner, which was very pleasant.

Things were resumed the next morning, and were concluded in the afternoon. After that the communique was drafted and agreed upon by the two delegations and given to the press. To show the importance that the President attaches to Canadian-American relations, he had asked us to call upon him at the White House. We went there at 4 o'clock, accompanied by our Ambassador, and here we spent a very pleasant and useful time in discussing various issues which affect Canadian-American relations. This meeting too was completely off the record, but all one can say is that the President made a very favourable impression upon each of us. Instead of standing up at the end of a half hour to signal our departure, he continued the discussion for about forty minutes and then following that he had the White House corps of photographers in to take our pictures. Altogether we spent about fifty minutes which is an unusual length of time to spend on a delegation which was presumably to meet only his Cabinet Ministers. Leaving the White House we were rushed back to the Chancery where we had a press conference with the correspondents representing Canadian papers in Washington. Following that we were driven out immediately to the airport where the plane already had the propellers turning over. The Washington Airport is relatively small and I am told that it is one of the busiest in the world. At any rate, some of my friends who know how much I enjoy flying, will appreciate how I felt when

after we rumbled out to the end of the runway, we had to sit there for about thirty minutes, while planes landed in front of us at the rate of one a minute. It was a wonderful summer evening and one could see the lights of the planes for miles away, sometimes as many as seven or eight at once, each of which had to bump down in front of us. I thought on a few occasions that the incoming pilot was going to tear off our propellers but I guess that is what is called an optical illusion. Finally, after staying out there for what seemed forever, the control tower found a hole in the air thru which we could depart and away we went. As I said, we left Washington on a summer's evening, and we arrived in Ottawa in a blinding snowstorm. Altogether it was a trip which one will always remember.

On Friday morning the Prime Minister returned from the Commonwealth Conference. Today it is a common expression that the world is very small. This truth was again brought home to me when I, together with others,

met him at the Ottawa airport at five minutes to eight in the morning. The plane, of course, had been down for quite a few minutes before that, as it taxied back to an airhome in sub-zero weather. The Prime Minister told us that he left Buckingham Palace at 3 o'clock that morning (Ottawa time). Yet five hours later he was in Ottawa. Considering the pressure under which he had been working during the days of the conference, and the short time that had elapsed from his departure from London to his speaking in the House of Com-

mons that morning and again addressing that largest dinner gathering ever held in the history of Ottawa that evening, one has the answer to the question as to the Prime Minister's health. How he does it, some of us know.
