100th Birthday

The hundredth anniversary of the Digby Weekly Courier has brought to mind some fond memories as recounted in the following historical chapter of the paper. For first, I want to congratulate the current editor of the Courier, Mrs. J.M. (Edith) Wallis, for a job well done over the years and still being well done, good service rendered with great fortitude.

According to my recollection, I have at hand, the Digby Courier, in one hundred years of publication, was controlled under the same family management for 42 years, 1837 to 1979, under the control of Wallis Print Limited. The late J.J. Wallis became editor of the Courier in the second time, in 1929, and at the latter time of the second time, in 1929, and at which he had been running for some time previously and which became Wallis Print Limited sometime between 1929 and 1931.

I well remember the last year of the twelfth when I worked in the office with the husband and father of the Digby Courier. Sometime in 1919 or early 1920, the late J.M. Wallis (Mac), son of J.J., engaged me to work every day after school hours, Saturdays, and for some months after for the office of work was in the building of the present Digby town hall on First Avenue. J.J. Wallis then worked occasionally at the print shop but mostly across the street at the Courier office which was then located on land in the general area where The Royal Bank of Canada is now.

Wallis Job Print operated in this building of four consisting of J.J. Wallis, J.M. Wallis, Miss Elva Haynes, who later became Mrs. George Kicop, and myself. I was in the staff in early 1920.

Mac's job was to run the staff in the left upstairs. J.J. occasionally printing plant but mostly at the Courier office. "Mac" worked nearly full-time at all the different jobs at the Job Print, and I worked at various duties most of the time being spent at operating printing presses.

We worked ten-hour days, six days a week. J.J. and "Mac" sometimes worked overtime. I worked only the regular hours being paid a weekly wage which was comparatively good for those times, and my lack of experience. I received five or five dollars a week for working after school hours to six o'clock and on Saturday all day, and nine dollars a week for half weeks after finishing school. A two or three dollar a week raise was offered to me in the fall of 1920 for me to stay on at printing, but I had made up my mind to enter a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, starting salary of \$200. The bank salary started out about the same per hour as for the printing plant those days, and experience however short, were helpful and appreciated to me.

J.J. was very jovial in his occasional trip to the print and did consider the kidding all in good fun. "Mac" was a witty person who noised in a good deal of sarcasm now and then for no reason or another. Elva must always had good answers to all the kidding she was called upon to take, and she usually held her own in a quiet sort of way, always in a setting type. We four all got along very well together. However, I do remember that some days all seem long and weary because of the transitory of some repetitious jobs.

In spite of the great demand for printing those last happy days of the twelfth, business generally being brisk, it looked in his that people had to work long and hard to make any decent profit. There was

however, trials and finger ends were used and I was sent back to work.

Now and then a printing job had to be put on a piece of paper which required a new kind of printer's ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would say that it was the largest press, it was at the factory as always spread an outside door to lower the air on the construction.

One of the jobs I had to do, with the paper and printers devil on the staff, was to do a printing job and then, one day not long after I started my job at the printing plant, I decided to show the floor that apparently hadn't been cleaned in some considerable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you getting on Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily, he thought the remark pretty good and amusing.

Sometimes the gasoline engine or a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "Mac" the fix it man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. "Mac" would then stand back and cross one arm, and then he would immediately start working. "Mac" would say, "all it needed was a bit of cleaning."

On other occasions when some piece refused to work for the and, seemed to be broken, "Mac" would say, "use a little oil" and sure enough after that is all it took. How often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and, in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring month of 1920 got together just before dark one evening and decided to utilize the newly built outdoor Fern Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits up to the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Scouts Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the boys? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world and Korea; now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale hardware king merchant; and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome." I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions about the man who was found marooned on a beach in northern point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Digby County. When I read this man's tale, and then read and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

"Jerome" appeared to have been a man of some considerable social standing and, possibly, of some considerable wealth. However the way the man could or would ever say after being found and cared for by some family in the French shore was, something that sounded like the story of a hero. He either would not, or would not, write anything about who he was or why he was left there. Well, it was, and is, one of Digby County's best kept secrets, and, different ideas have been written over the years concerning this man. However, the name of "Mac" was, I felt no urge to write anything about different about this man. The story seemed to have been very well explained in the story of many people, and he was a sort of a hero and many people who liked ways he was.

Digby 172 Years Ago

From the files of the Courier of January 22, 1967, the following account has been compiled concerning Digby in 1745.

Among a number of old newspapers kindly sent to me by friends is a copy of the first issue of the Digby Courier, dated January 22, 1967. The issue contains a number of interesting items, including a list of the names of the Digby 172 crew, and a list of the names of the Digby 172 crew.

Work was a little slack one early fall day and so "Mac" said to me, "how about trying your hand at taking orders for printed personalized Christmas cards?" I tried to make several calls around town, spent most of the time at one particular

Barristers Meet At Pines

The final session of the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society annual meeting, which took place at the Pines Hotel here, saw William H. Jost, QC, Halifax, elected president of the society, succeeding Simon J. Khattar, QC, Sydney. George B. Robertson, QC, Halifax, was elected first vice president and R. F. MacLellan, QC, Truro, was elected second vice president.

Besides the business sessions social and recreational functions, including banquets, dances and golf tournaments were held.

Special speakers during the annual meeting were Donald McInnes, QC, Halifax, president of the Canadian Bar Association, Hon. S. H. Hughes, Ottawa, and Donald G. Grant, Halifax, who delivered a paper on estate planning.

At the final business session on Saturday a resolution was forwarded to the Attorney General of Nova Scotia requesting that a person or persons be appointed to study the feasibility of setting up family courts in Nova Scotia.

Many other resolutions were discussed some of which were passed on to council.

One resolution called for an amendment to the Motor Vehicle Act whereby a magistrate or judge would be allowed to recommend to the registrar of motor vehicles the period of revocation of the licence of a person convicted under the Criminal Code or the Motor Vehicle Act.

The suggested amendment would retain the present maximum suspension period of two years, but would give the judge or magistrate more freedom to act on the merits of the particular case at hand.

Another resolution forwarded to the Attorney General of the province was in regard to improving land registries.

One of the chief social functions at the meeting of the Nova Scotia Magistrates' Association held at the Pines Hotel during the last weekend was a testimonial dinner given in honor of Provincial Magistrate Horace B. A letter was also read from Attorney General Richard Donahoe, QC. In his letter Mr. Donahoe said that "Mr. Dickey in his judicial capacity for more than a score of years has brought in the solution of the innumerable problems presented to him, wisdom, understanding and a depth of legal knowledge."

Other expressions of valued service rendered by Magistrate Dickey were made and he was presented with an engraved set of matched pipes.

Special guest for the testimonial dinner was Mrs. Malachi Jones, QC, representing the Department of the Attorney General.

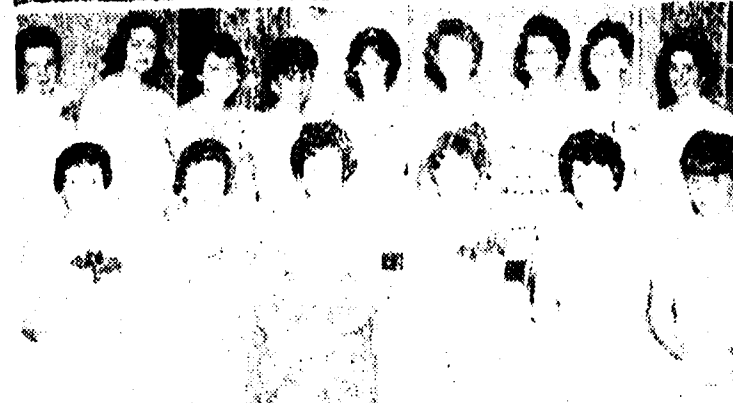
Mrs. Melanson has many visitors who call to see the rose bush growing through the corner of a nearly new window.

Fair Counted Great Success

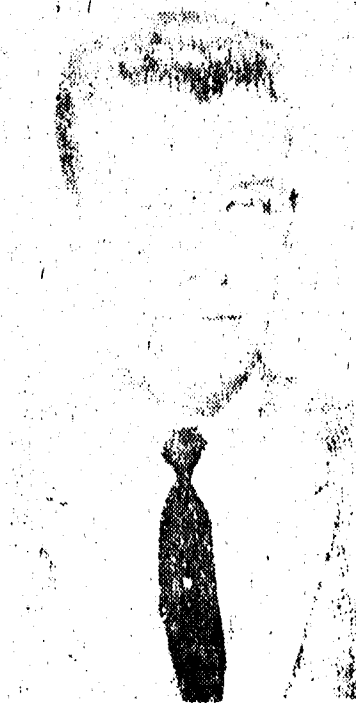

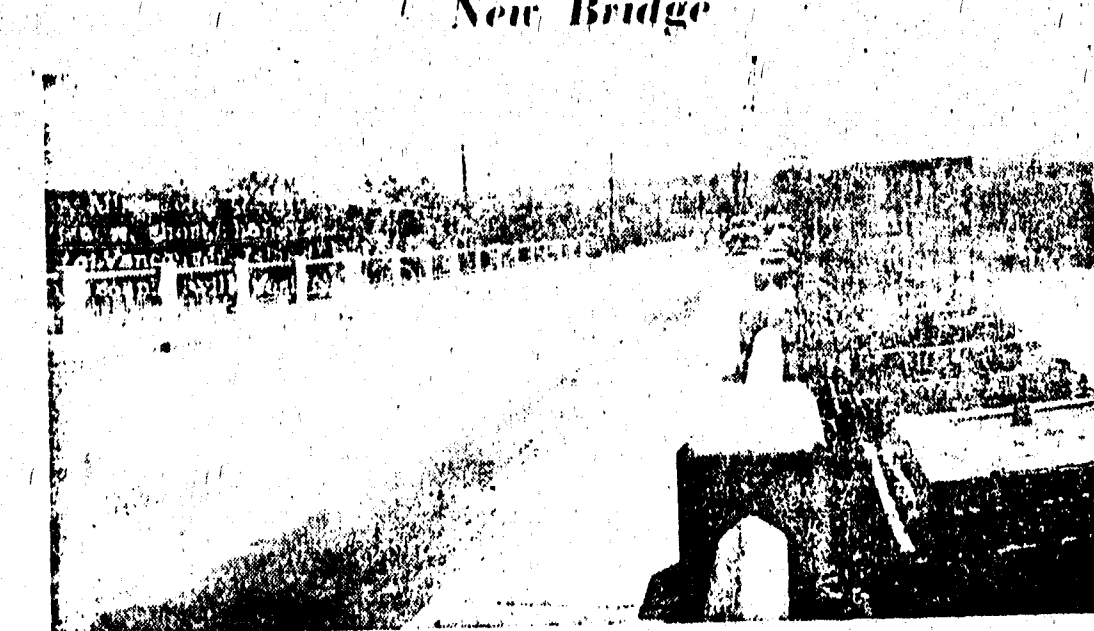

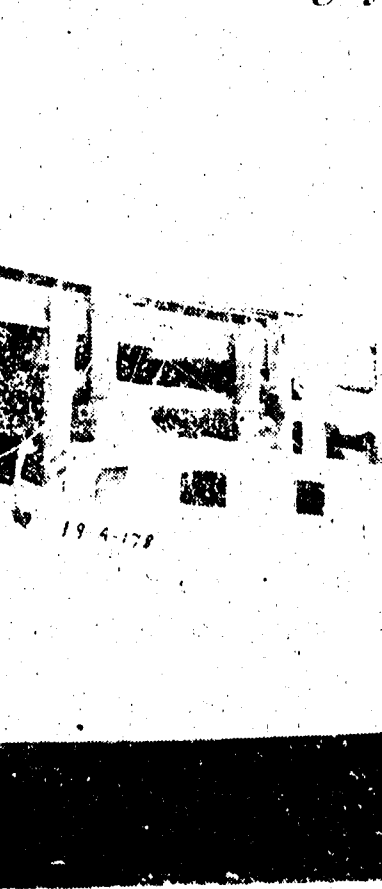

Puts Into Digby

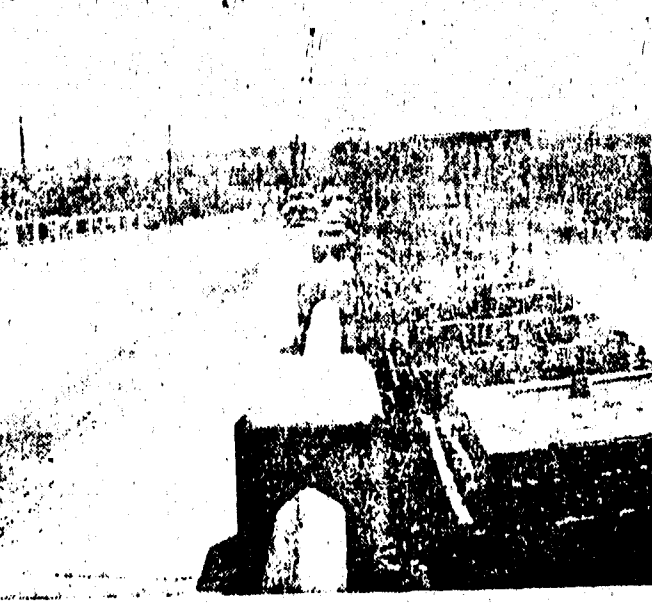

Arouses Interest In Cannon

The letter written to The Digby Courier last week by John Russell on Digby's old cannon aroused the interest of Miss Bessie McMullen who forwarded, to us the following history on the cannon as taken from a Courier in August 1908:

History of the Old Cannon Mounted at the Townsend Cottage, Rattling Beach

This old smooth bore 24 pr. cannon, weighing 41 cwt. 31 lb. which dates back to the reign of George III, King of England, 1780, was brought out by the British with three others and was placed in a horse shoe fort on the west side of "Digby Gut" (Digby Narrows) for the defence of Annapolis Royal against the French. It remained here undisturbed for more than 125 years. On Aug. 4th, 1908, Fred G. Paul, of Brookville, N.Y., (by permission) had this cannon transferred from the site of the old blockhouse and fort to the Townsend Cottage, Rattling Beach, Digby, N.S., under the supervision of Capt. Gilbert Ellis and his nephew, Mr. Isaac Ellis.

It took three span of oxen to do the work. It was mounted, painted black and varnished and the letters G. R. and the crown above finished in gilt. On Aug. 5th, it was successfully fired, after 125 years, by Ernest and Horace Ellis, Esqs.

The cannon proves to be a handsome decoration of the Shore Road, and if the old relic could speak it would be proud of its treatment and resting place.

The Digby Courier is indebted to Bernard Smith, of River, for sending in a copy of The Digby Weekly of September 11, 1896. The copy was originally addressed to Albert Yarmouth at the time it was published. Subscriptions at that time were \$1.00 per year with single copies for three cents.

The copy of the Courier, Volume XXIII, No. 1, is unique at the present time and one which has received much attention in the last few months as it contains the story of the trial, confession and execution of Peter Wheeler, who was found guilty of the murder of Miss Anne Kempton, of River. Pictures of Mr. Wheeler, the Kempton home, Mr. and Mrs. Kempton and a Kempton sister are included on the page as well as a picture of Peter Wheeler, who was not only serving in a capacity of order but as a spiritual adviser for the accused man. The confession of Wheeler, which appeared in the Courier, and bears a copy of his handwritten signature also contains a warning to young men, not to fall into the hands of Satan.

A description of the monument erected in memory of Anne Kempton is included on the pages with a copy of the inscription on the monument. The same issue contains two related editorials: One on the subject which has been on the minds of so many recently, that of whether or not capital punishment should be retained and the other on the fact that for the benefit of the entire community the River tragedy should not be dropped. About This and That

All Tarred With Same Brush

The destructiveness at the Admiral Digby Horticultural Society park around the Welcome to Nova Scotia sign on Prince William Street deserves all the publicity it got in the news columns of The Digby Courier last week. The publicity it received on Neighborly News broadcast from the Courier story, the news story and editorial in The Chronicle Herald and by person to person. The regrettable thing is that all of Digby becomes more or less tarred with the same brush through publicity. The destructiveness of a few reflects on the whole town in more ways than one. Yet to refrain from giving press and radio coverage to such destruction would be contrary to the policy of unbiasedness and would not be doing the offenders any good by hiding their vandalistic acts for them. So with the offenders we all suffer.

We all suffer because the wanton acts of the few reflect on the whole town and we live in the town. Any commendable publicity which individuals in a town receive, which a group in a town receives or any part of the town receives reflects to the credit of the whole town. The reverse is also true and the fact that it shouldn't be has no influence on the subconsciousness of another's impressions.

We suffer because outsiders unconsciously connect us with the adverse publicity of the recent event. We suffer more because the wantonness of these people have caused the Horticultural Society to give up the project of beautifying that particular part of the town which was so important to the impressions received by our tourists and general travelling public via New Brunswick to Nova Scotia. In this way, too, the destruction of a few people casts its reflection on the whole town. The very same thing happens at Christmas time with the outside Christmas decorations. The whole Christmas decorating scheme within the town is impeded by a few reckless individuals. People just cannot afford to decorate with the destruction of their efforts as reward and therefore they would rather forget the whole project. Individual gardens have also been the object of attack by these vandals and by lazy thieves through the years so that people have refrained from planting and cultivating gardens for the use of others.

What is the answer? Any suggestions would be welcome. The radio suggested that it would pay the town to have more police protection. We wonder if that is necessary. There used to be a policy in school teaching of appealing to the students' pride, a policy of class spirit. We think it is still followed in many schools including our own and works well. The answer may be to bring up the next generation with more community pride and community spirit. This community pride and community spirit cannot be left to the police to bring home by force. To instill this community pride and spirit and to instill a respect for other's property and rights will need the cooperative efforts of parents, schools (religious, sabbath and secular schools), organizations, police and town officials. Of these, the parent must be the leader and foremost instructor.

Let us not for a moment think we are the only town with this same problem. But neither let us think that there is any comfort in this fact for ourselves. The solving or unsolving of the problem in other towns is not meeting the problem in Digby.

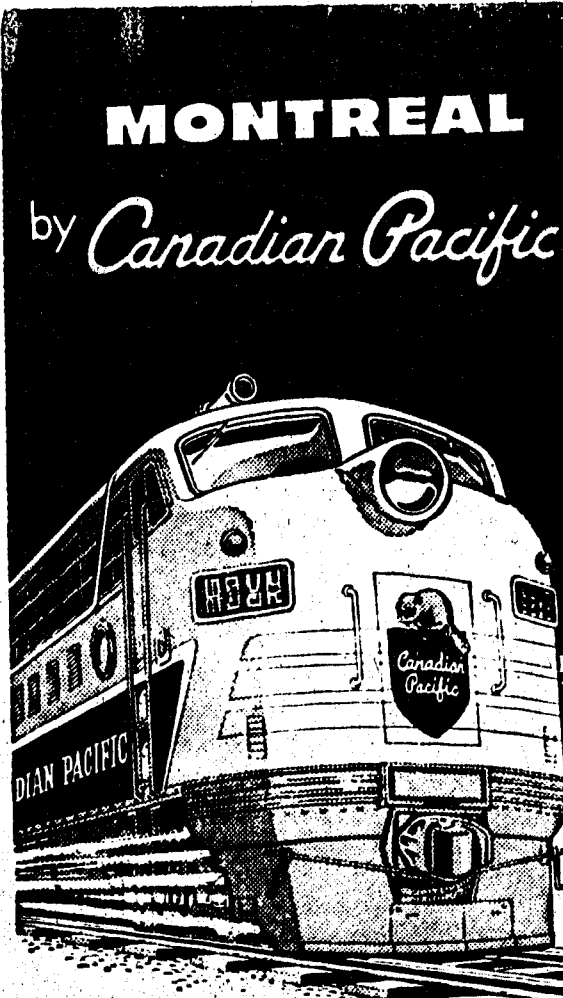

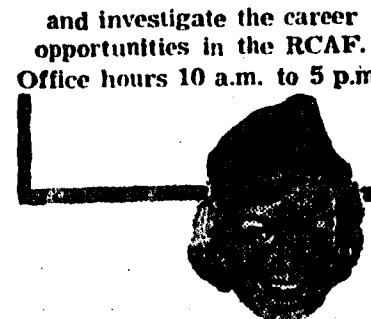

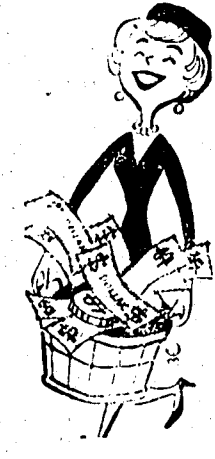

Allied Youth Camp

The Allied Youth summer camp will be held at the Berwick Camp Meeting Grounds for one week, August 7 to 13.

Allied Youth is an international organization of teenagers for educational, social, and recreational activities, with special emphasis on temperance education. It is sponsored in Nova Scotia by the Temperance Education Unit of the Department of Education. The movement was organized here 10 years ago. Nova Scotia was the first province of Canada to sponsor this activity.

The purpose of the summer camp is to assist in training executive officers in their duties and in means of developing better Allied Youth Posts. The camp is entirely non-denominational. The cost is \$12 per delegate. In several areas, service groups, home and school associations and other organizations have sponsored delegates to the camp.

During the past year, some 35 Allied Youth Posts have participated in activities on the local, provincial and international levels. Allied Youth rallies were held in several counties, a provincial conference was held and a large delegation from Nova Scotia attended the International Allied Youth Conference in Pennsylvania.

Last year approximately 90 teenagers from Grades 9 to 12 inclusive attended the Allied Youth summer camp; more than that number are already registered this year and more than 100 are expected to attend.

The camp is under the supervision of D. R. Gilchrist, supervisor of alcohol education, department of education; and the camp manager is R. G. Fredericks, principal of Central Kings Rural High School, Cambridge.

In addition to a staff of 10 who will guide the camp organization, and supervise recreation, music activities and lectures, five high school students who are provincial officers of Allied Youth will serve as group leaders.

Special speakers will include Everett Dorr, international executive director for Allied Youth; Dr. Glenn Olds, president of Springfield University; Keith Ellimwood, author, lecturer and counselor for alcoholics; Dr. Albin Roy King, Professor of Philosophy at Cornell University and Mr. Gilchrist.

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To Prosecute For Unsightly Premises

Persons owning or occupying properties which do not comply with the recently passed Unsightly Premises Act, may be subject to prosecution in the near future if action is not taken to alleviate these unsightly conditions, it was announced Monday by Hon. C. I. Smith, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia.

The Act was passed in 1960 to provide a means of insuring that such premises throughout the province be cleaned up as part of an effort to make Nova Scotia a more attractive province. Under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Highways, the Act applies to all premises within 300 feet of the centre line of the travelled portion of any highway.

The Act is not intended to apply to actual buildings that may be dilapidated or otherwise unsightly. It is however to strictly apply to ashes, junk, rubbish, refuse, and bodies and parts of automobiles or other vehicles or machinery which cause the premises to be unsightly or offensive to the travelling public.

"Realizing that it would impose substantial hardship on a considerable number of persons to insist on immediate

action, following passing of the Act last year, some time was allowed to lapse in the hope that those concerned would make suitable arrangements, in their own time, to clean up their premises," the Minister said. "A few did so but most made little or no parent effort."

"Accordingly in the spring of the year members of the Department of Highways made personal calls on the owners or occupants of premises which appeared to be in violation of the Act," Mr. Smith added.

During these calls a person at letter signed by the Minister was delivered which drew attention to the Act and that the particular premises appeared to be in violation of the Act. The letter went on to request the owner to clean up the premises and indicated that failure to do so would result in prosecution.

"Some people acted on this request but I regret to say that many seem to have ignored it," the Minister said.

"This has compelled me to arrange with the Attorney General that formal notices under the Act be served by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in appropriate cases, requiring the premises be cleaned up and stating that in default offenders will be prosecuted."

The Minister emphasized that prosecution will take place in all cases in which the notice is ignored.

"It is with regret that I find it necessary to take this action. In an effort to solve the problem by cooperative action I have already delayed a long while. No one can properly complain that he has not had time to make any necessary arrangements," Mr. Smith concluded.

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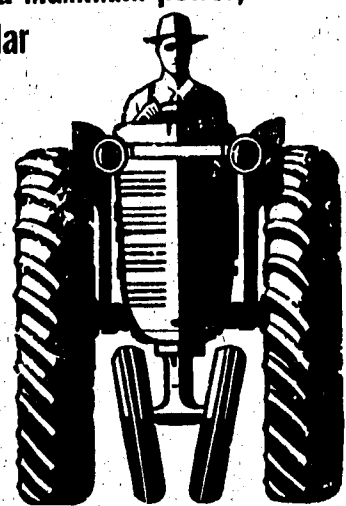

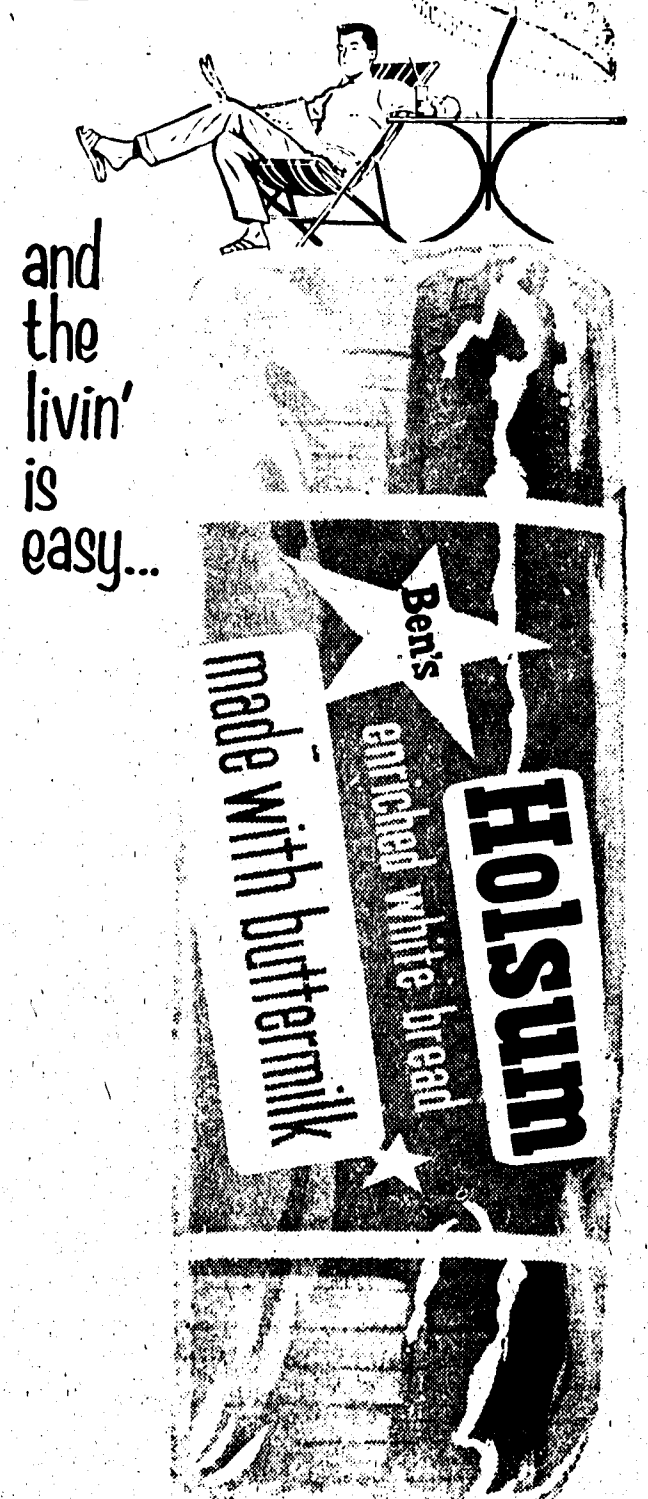

Perhaps the scallops are shipped, in the shell. If you could and would be kind enough to pass our letter to any firm or individual who might be interested we should like to have a few samples, by parcel post, please, sent to the beach headen. We shall be glad to repay payment for such samples at a reasonable rate of about 10¢ per lb. for the samples, if you wish to pass along.

Improper Use Of Snorkel Gear In Public Service

For the benefit of our reader parents and a warning to young swimmers we copy the following from the Chronicle Herald of Tuesday, August 1, by Robert Warren.

A warning against putting underwater swimming equipment in unskilled hands came from three sources Monday following the weekend drowning of 13-year-old Brian Hollingsworth of Truro who was wearing a snorkel breathing tube and mask.

Leslie Pouchard, chairman of the Nova Scotia Red Cross water safety program, said snorkel-like devices should not be used by the inexperienced and when they were used it should be in a supervised and safe area.

"Anybody who uses one of these things," he said, "should be able to do just as well without it."

"With breathing gear an inexperienced person will find he can do all sorts of things under water he couldn't do before — and then, when something goes wrong, the immediate reaction is panic."

And the result of panic in or under water is, only too often, drowning.

Both the Red Cross and underwater swimming clubs are trying hard to enforce control over the use or sale of underwater breathing apparatus.

"It's likely that some regulations may be passed next year — just as they were for water skiing this year," Mr. Pouchard said. "The equipment itself is quite safe — it's the people who use it that we're worried about."

In Ontario and in the United States water safety authorities are working towards legislation over the sale and use of the equipment.

Stewiacke Coroner Dr. H. B. Havey, who investigated the Sunday drowning in Little Dyke's Lake, near Glenholme, of the Hollingsworth boy said: "I don't think it was safe for a youngster to swim by himself with one of these things."

An RCMP spokesman said it was likely that previous drownings had been due to panic when an inexperienced swimmer found he could not breathe through his snorkel.

The drowned boy was caught in underwater lily stalks, and the breathing equipment was still attached to his head, although the tube was not in his mouth. No inquiry is being held, because the drowning has been clearly established as an accident.

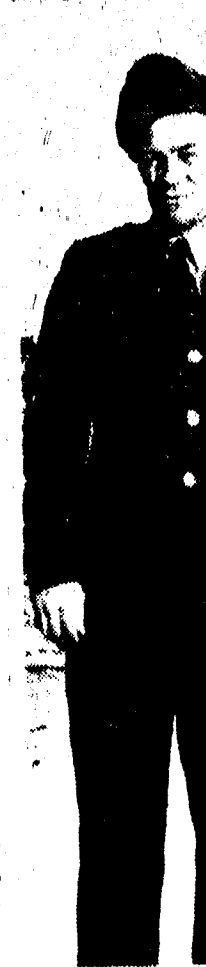

P. C. Comeau

The Alberta forest ranger with the longest service record is Peter Clarence (Pete) Comeau of Grovedale station, south of Grand Prairie. He joined the forestry staff on a seasonal basis at Grand Prairie in 1931 under superintendent Donald Buck. Since then he has worked with five successive divisional superintendents, always in the same district.

Pete came west from his birthplace in Digby, Nova Scotia, around 1920 and, after working about in Alberta's Crownest region and interior British Columbia, settled in Creston, B.C., in 1924. He became a logger for the C.P.R. logging company, married the daughter of a Nelson fruit farmer and embarked on a family career that assumed creditable proportions. Pete and Dorothy Comeau have six children, four boys and two daughters. The daughters have made them grandparents and the sons have all been attracted by the same lure of the woods, that captured their father.

Pete attends to the many responsibilities of his job from headquarters in his modern farm home at Grovedale. He is a genial, easy-going person with a quiet reserve that promotes confidence and trust among his associates. He is dependable, a good man to have around when things get rough and, though he speaks softly, his long and unblemished term of office in the Grovedale district lends authority to his words.

Naturally Pete Comeau loves the woods and their inhabitants. As a hunter, fisherman and story teller he has few peers. Sociable he is also and has been known to travel up to 50 miles to attend one of those lively country "hoe-downs" for which the rural neighborhood is famous.

In nearly 30 years of forestry life ranger Comeau has left many monuments. An accomplished trapper, farmer, carpenter, horse wrangler, logger, road builder, and fire fighter, he has seen a virgin block of woods become the centre of Grande Prairie timber operations. He marked and traced many of the trails which now accommodate forestry, lumber and petroleum traffic. He built ranger cabins throughout his terrain with professional skill in both axmanship and carpentry. He has assisted in the construction of most of the fire lookout towers in the Grande Prairie forest division and some in other regions. A notable achievement was the construction of the 45 foot wooden pole tower at Puskawaskau, recently replaced with a modern steel edifice. Pete's extensive knowledge of district forest lands has enabled him to locate lost woods visitors. He once travelled for five days on snowshoes in mid-winter before finding his man. In the terrible summer of 1938 he fought forest fires for three solid months with only a handful of equipment, a task of enormous frustration.

In all, this stocky, quiet dependable fellow has been a pretty remarkable civil servant. His fellow workers regard him with deference, his supervisors with confidence and his family and many friends with real affection. The figures used at North Sydney, to arrive at the total number of cars, are not complete. From June 13 to the end of the month, there were 381 cars compared to 663 tabulated last year from June 2 to June 30.

Last year Cape Breton played host to 2,078 vehicles.

Town Council Meets

John Nichols, on behalf of the Digby Board of Trade, addressed the Digby Town Council on Monday night requesting assistance to the amount of one hundred dollars or more to help pay for folders which were printed for the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade. Three hundred of the well designed, multi-colored folders had been sent to Digby for distribution here. As part of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade the Digby Board of Trade had a responsibility in this regard but as the Digby Board of Trade was dormant at present there was not enough funds available from this source to meet the obligation. It was also learned that in some other towns responsibility for the price of the folders was shared with the Trade Boards by the town concerned. It was understood from discussion on the subject that the Digby Board of Trade had paid one hundred dollars towards the folders and what was requested from the town was in addition to this. The matter was tabled for further information as to total cost of the folders and to obtain information on amounts paid by other towns.

Permits were granted on Monday evening to Mrs. Lucy Syda to erect a residence and garage on King St. on land between the residences of Norman Wright and Jack Rosenthal. Permission was also granted to Wilbur VanTassel to erect a building between his residence and Wallis Print Ltd. in place of the canteen style building which at present stands there. The new building is to be a two story building in front. Permission was also granted to William Troupe to dismantle the Troupe apartment building on Water St.

Reports by the Health Department on milk and water were satisfactory. Frank Robinson, Supt. of Streets, said that Mr. Godfrey, from Saint John, N. B., had been here studying the peculiar taste to see what could be done to improve the water in this regard. The cause of the taste was low water and vegetation in the lake, it was thought. Questioned as to the water situation at the lake this summer Mr. Robinson replied "There is lots of water."

Reporting for the streets committee Mr. Robinson said that there is now available a complete and up to date draft of the town's sewage plan and the water plan from Lily Lake to the town, all the inlets and outlets, the hydrants and gates. He reported on a matter of repairs at a spot around the Racquette where difficulties arose to keep in repair because rocks had been hauled away. The matter was to come under the attention of the streets committee. Mr. Robinson made the report for the chairman of the streets committee, Deputy Mayor Vernon L. Bent, who presided at the meeting.

Ten complaints had been laid with the police department, six of which needed further investigation, one resulting in court action. Two motor vehicle accidents were investigated.

Department of Municipal Affairs correspondence re \$3,000 surplus sinking fund was presented. By regular motion this was transferred to a special reserve fund and permission to be requested to have the fund applied to the amount of \$15,000 which the town had to borrow for school building.

Permission was granted the Digby Fire Department to hold a Firemen's Day Fair on September 4 and to sell souvenirs on August 18 and September 1. The request for August 25 was refused on the grounds that permission had been given for the V.O.N. to hold a tag day.

Correspondence was read from the Windsor, N. S., town council seeking any experience or information that Digby town might have had with a Junior Town Council organization for training young men to become good future town councillors and to keep up the interest of citizens in town affairs.

A letter was also read from the Fundy Flying Club in Saint John, N. B., regarding possibility of an airport in Digby.

Appeal Presented

Four main arguments from 31 were made by Phillip Woolaver in his appeal against the conviction of Joseph Antoine Comeau, tried and found guilty in June of murder of Joseph Henry Robichaud, of Meteghan, last fall. The main points were failure of the trial judge to charge the jury as to an alternate verdict to include manslaughter instead of a charge based on a verdict of only guilty or not guilty of murder; admission before the court of inadmissible evidence dealing with statements made by the accused; lack of evidence for the basis of the charge; and misdirection by the trial judge on the law with relation to reasonable doubt.

Malachi Jones, counsel for the Crown, argued that the facts presented at the trial, substantiated a charge of murder and there was nothing to substantiate a reduction to manslaughter.

Comeau, formerly of Toronto and now a prisoner in the county jail at Digby, was convicted June 8 before Chief Justice Hisey with jury. Woolaver was counsel for Comeau. He was sentenced to hang August 10, but an order for a stay of execution has postponed the execution date until October 12.

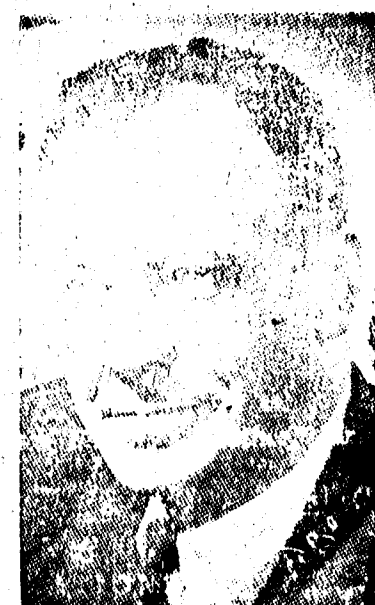

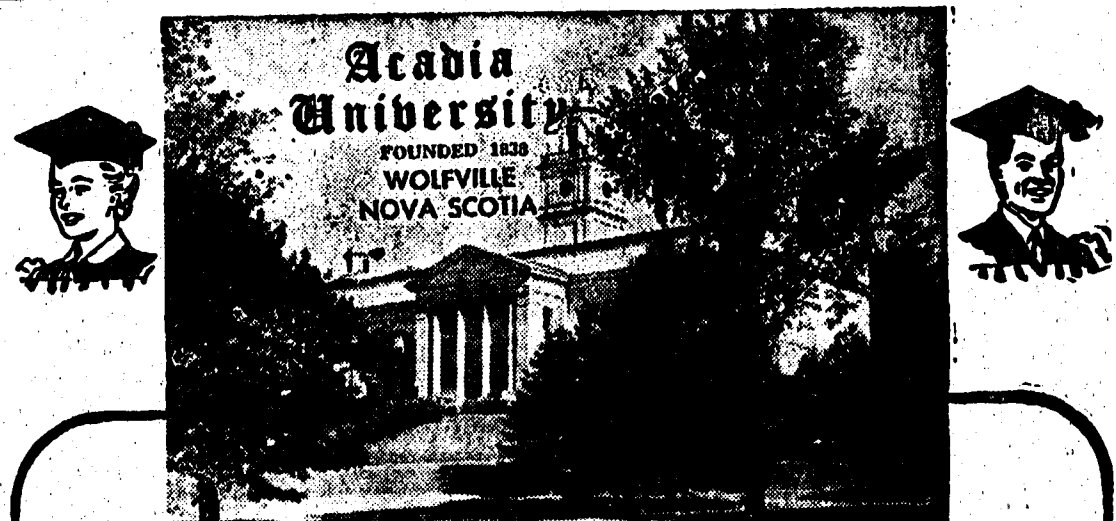

On Monday evening Christian Men's Fellowship convened at the New Tusket United Baptist Church, with a good attendance, ladies being invited guests.

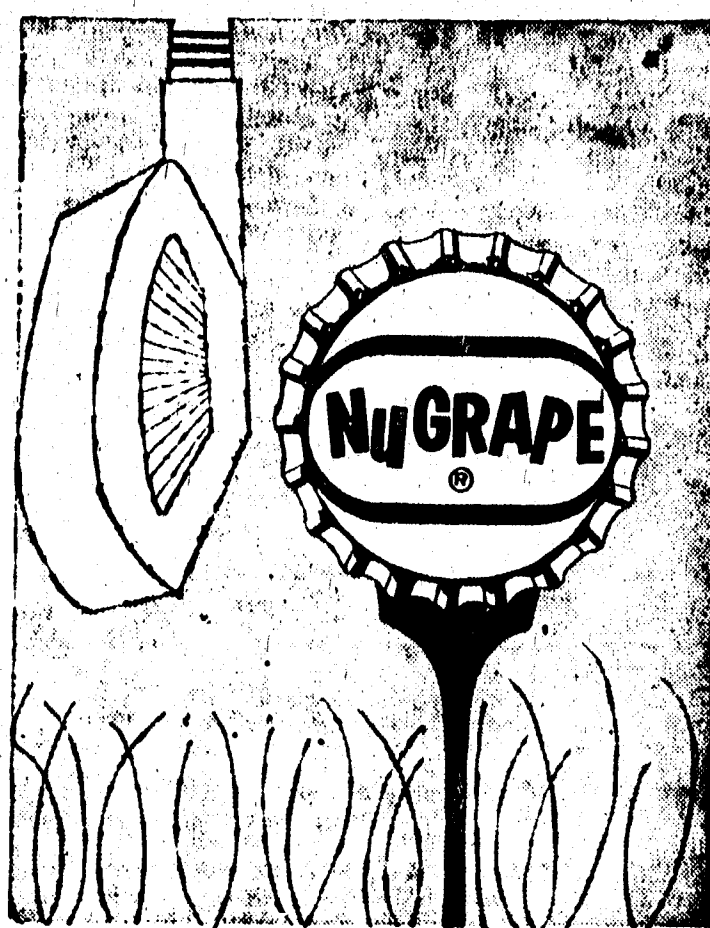

revelation, which is sometimes called "French nights", will predominate. A large campfire will be lighted about 10 o'clock around which folk singing by all those wishing to sing will be held. Servings at the chicken barbecue will commence at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

The barbecue is held on a historical site, where a memorial chapel marks the spot where the first Acadian Cemetery is located. The site is near the shore of St. Mary's Bay and to reach the site one must take the road that branches off the main highway at Grosses Capres bridge, going towards the shore for about three-quarters of a mile. It is an ideal spot.

Sunday afternoon, August 15th, will see a parade of religious and historical floats wend its way from Saultierville G.S. School, commencing at 2:30 and terminating the parade at St. Anne's College campus grounds at Church Point. During the afternoon, commencing at 1:30 p.m., a softball tournament will start with four teams participating and the finals being held after the parade. Members of Les Jeunesses Sociales clubs will enter teams.

On Monday evening the Richelieu Club will hold their annual charter night banquet at which persons so desiring may attend. 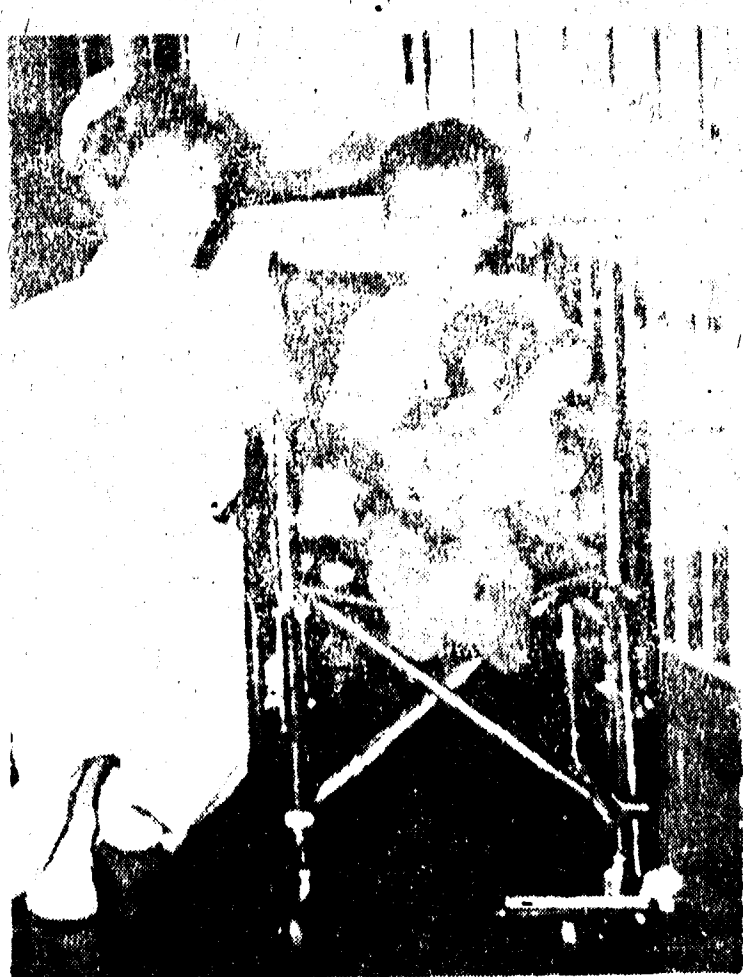

Ship Aground

After failing to free herself from a sand and mussel shoal late Saturday at the mouth of the Sissiboo River, the Swedish freighter, "Viktor", after repeated attempts was forced to unload cargo into barges and float clear. At this point to press one snow load had been unscapped and it was thought by the ship's agents two would be needed. One snow load per day is the rate of unloading.

An attempt to free the ship at high tide late Saturday using both turbine engines at full power was unsuccessful. A spokesman for the agents said effective steering mechanism may have caused the vessel to miss the buoy and run aground.

The ship, commanded by Capt. Alphonse, carries a crew of 26. Spectators said the "Viktor" was sailing slowly down the channel when it suddenly veered to starboard and came to a stop several feet inside the buoy.

An examination of the ship's hull revealed only negligible damage. The vessel, almost completely high and dry at low tide, was lying about 300 feet from shore. She was bound for Amsterdam, Holland.

The stalk of the rhubarb was 4 1/2 inches in circumference and weighed approximately one pound.

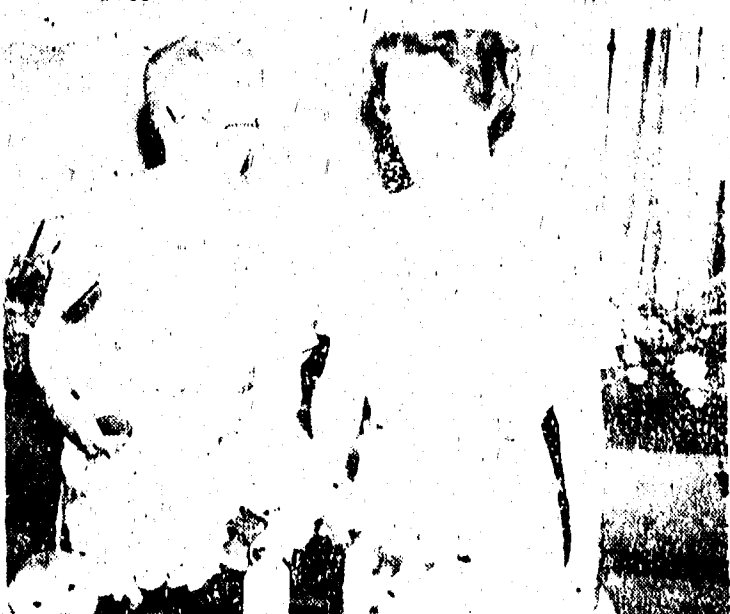

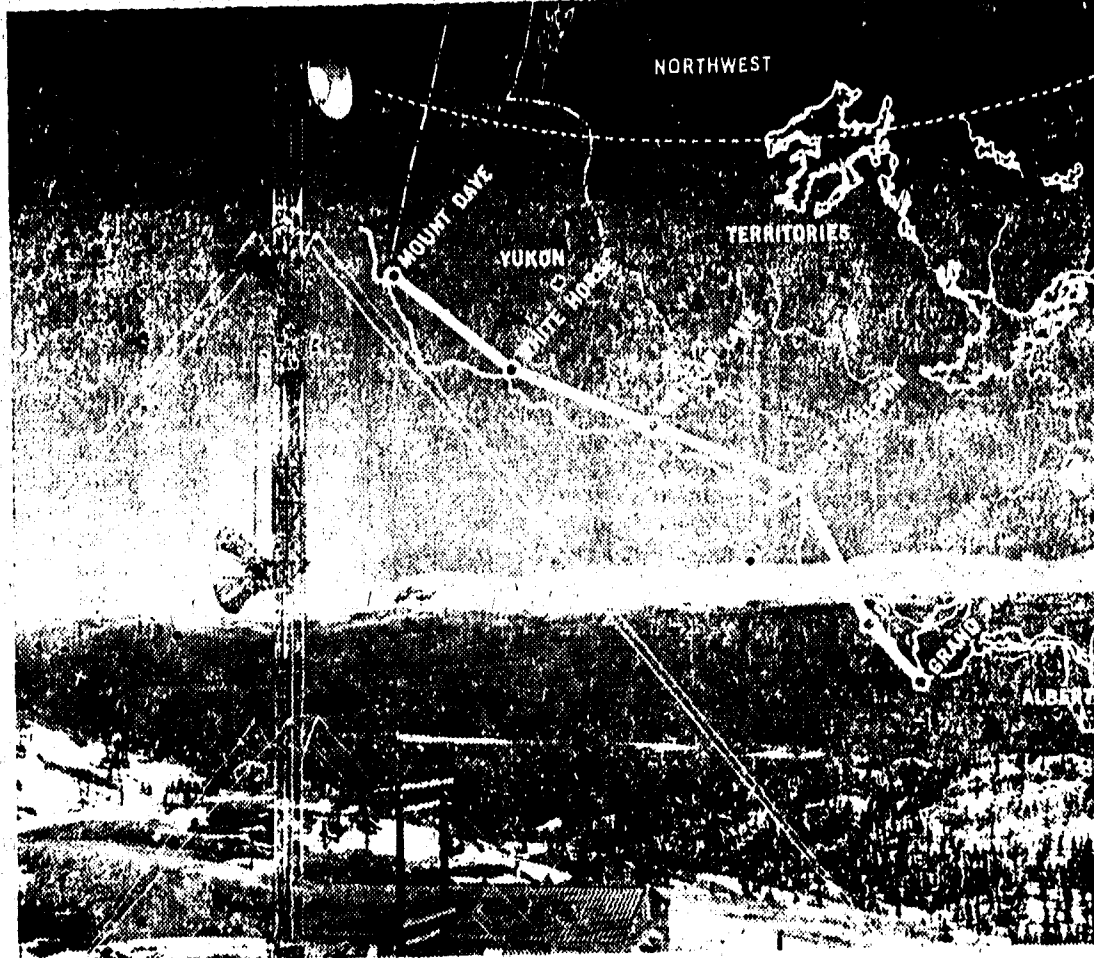

The Digby Regional High School, the Digby Primary School and the Digby Elementary School will re-open on Wednesday, September 6th, 1961, when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making the return trip at 3:00 p.m.

Students entering the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to the opening day of school. Immediate application will expedite approval from the Municipal School Board. Weymouth Area students are eligible for admission to Grade XII Commercial on application as above.

Admission standards to the Academic course of Grade XII will be a pass certificate of Grade XI from the Atlantic Provinces Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board. For registration in the Grade XII Commercial Course a student must have completed at least one year in Grade XI and be approved by the Promotion Board for admission to this Department.

All prescribed high school text books are available at a rental fee of five dollars payable on the opening day of school. Students wishing to take advantage of this plan will come prepared to make this payment.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health Regulations regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

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Addresses Conference



Hon. R. L. Stanfield, Q.C., Premier of Nova Scotia, addressed the 65th annual Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference at their second session on Wednesday morning at the Pines Hotel. Each year, said the premier, governmental services—municipal, provincial and federal—become more important to the citizen, they increase rapidly in scope and importance and create acute financial problems on every level. In all services relating to streets, highways, school and educational and health a minimum standard must be maintained, extravagance avoided, but still the public services necessary. Because you feel the weight of this burden, the premier told the delegates, you feel that more help should be coming from provincial and federal governments. He reminded them that the provincial government problems were just as acute but any suggestion coming from the municipalities would be carefully considered.

Any assistance which the government gives Mr. Stanfield felt should be in removing inequities in existing sharing programs rather than new programs. Referring to earlier resolutions submitted by the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities which were not accepted by the government, he said these were not accepted because they did not remove inequities but rather increased them. They were of assistance to the wealthy municipalities rather than to those which were more in need.

He suggested that accomplishments already made should not be overlooked and that a drive around the province would reveal dramatic development in fields of education and health. He congratulated the municipalities on their participation and development not only in general hospital care for citizens but also for those with mental illnesses and welfare needs. He noted the challenge in vocational education in which the federal government will participate to three-quarters of the construction costs for such schools built before March 31, 1963.

In putting forth suggestions for the municipalities to consider Hon. Mr. Stanfield said that it was wise in calling tenders for construction of building to accept the lowest bidder except if that bidder cannot fulfill specifications. This is not always done and tends to undermine the whole tender system so that contractors fail to consider tenders seriously.

Referring to the birth of the new city of Dartmouth, the premier noted some complications which accompanied the change and which were bound to make us ask the question whether the machinery of changing municipal boundaries is adequate. He mentioned that population changes may require shifting of municipal polling districts. These were matters, he said, which were cause for concern and attention by the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities.

Mr. Stanfield expressed appreciation in some local affairs and that it injects a note of realism and a sense of responsibility which cannot be supplied in any other way.

The session was chaired by H. V. Corkum, Mahone Bay, who introduced and thanked the speaker.

It is expected, from indications, that the produce will take a marked increase in space and school and home-entertainment also promise to be of wide variety. Wednesday will feature a talent contest; Thursday will see the Digby Majorettes perform in the afternoon and evening and also feature decorated doll carriages and bicycles. Each evening, Thursday and Friday, will end with a dance.

To Deliver Sermon

Rev. W. P. Clayton, Conway, was chosen to deliver the next association sermon when the African United Baptists of Nova Scotia convene at their 109th annual convention next year. This was decided at the Association meet at North Preston last week when an estimated one thousand persons were in attendance.

The theme of the convention was "Evangelism Through Stewardship" and addresses on the topic were given by outstanding speakers. Deacon B. Howard Lawrence, of New Glasgow, was re-elected as moderator of the association. Among other appointments was that of Mrs. W. P. Clayton as president of the Ladies Auxiliary. Rev. H. D. Thomas and Mr. Clayton were appointed to attend the Maritime Baptist Convention in Wolfville.

Among the matters discussed were the housing situation for the colored people in the city of Halifax. Reports had been received of excessive difficulties to negroes in the implementation of Ordinance 50 leaving many negro owner occupants of houses unable to purchase or rent in Halifax following the demolition of their homes.

In her social service report, Mrs. W. P. Oliver, Halifax, cited gambling and drinking as two of the most difficult vices which affect her race. She asked that more interest be taken in the problem of nuclear fallout in case of nuclear war.

Greatest Problem Is Financing Education

"Of all the problems that have come to the fore in municipal life in Nova Scotia during the past five years, there is none greater than the problem of financing education", said M. T. Sullivan in a presidential address given at the opening session of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference at the Pines Hotel on Tuesday evening. Mr. Sullivan, first vice-president and councillor from Cape Breton, was made acting president at an afternoon executive meeting to preside over the sessions because of the recent death of the president, Ralph Gilroy, Springhill. A minute of silence was held to the memory of the late Mr. Gilroy.

In his address Mr. Sullivan said that in all fairness he must say that the Province of Nova Scotia is paying more money today proportion wise than it has ever paid before towards the cost of education. "But", he said, "the provincial authorities have indicated that because of lack of funds their assistance must be limited. Many of the municipalities feel that, because of lack of funds, their efforts must be limited. We have virtually come to an impasse. Yet it is our duty to provide our youth with better and better educational facilities." "I believe", he said, "it is our duty at this conference to come up with an answer to this ever present problem." His plea was that the provincial and municipal authorities work out the solution together. Briefly mentioning other problems which exist in municipal government, Mr. Sullivan challenged the delegates to their job "to make sure that we make Nova Scotia each year a little better place in which to live."

Short addresses of welcome were given by Mayor Harry Smolensky, Bridgetown, Mayor V. G. Cardozo, Digby, Warden Emile Boudreau, Clare, Peter Nicholson, M.L.A., Annapolis West, and Dr. Pierre Belliveau, Clare.

Rev. R. H. Hughes, of Grace United Church, gave the invocation.

Members of the National Retail Lumbermen's Council of Canada met at the Mountain Gap Inn, Smith's Cove, on Wednesday night of last week when they were presented with certificates of the Order of Good Cheer. The presentations were made by Gerald Redmond, Halifax, Director of the Nova Scotia Travel Bureau.

Speaks On Productivity

More than three hundred delegates and guests sat down to the tables when the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company Limited sponsored a luncheon on Wednesday, August 30, at the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference at the Pines Hotel. Speaker was G. D. Anderson, Provincial Engineer with the company, who used as his topic Productivity. The chief discussion was on the National Productivity Council established by the Canadian government. In explaining why such a council was necessary Mr. Anderson reviewed the conditions of devastation, hunger and homelessness which existed in Europe during the war. Europe has progressed to prosperity and on into the lead in the economic race where the unemployment fund is running out in Canada. West Germany needs no unemployment fund for at least a year. All this, he said, is not the result of luck but of team work. Canada has to pull up its economic socks, he said. Politics, envy, labor strikes, must be forgotten as in the time of war and every body must work together for the future is not bright. Up until the past few years, only produce was necessary but to day there is a change and there is competition in the world market.

England, the speaker said, started in 1952 with a British Productivity Council and the next year the European Productivity Agency was formed. The Canada Council is to be fashioned from both of these which have accomplished so much.

The program of the National Productivity Council, Mr. Anderson said, included promotion of production and sale, management, public relations, training program, retraining, industrial research and co-operation of all groups or team work. All national effort, he said, must be directed to the Gross National Product or sum total in dollar value of all produce and service rendered. This, he said, was not to be confused with the National Budget. He made comparisons of increase in output since 1950 for eight different countries. Canada was at the end of the list, he said. We must get down to business.

The National Productivity Council, Mr. Anderson said, would work through such bodies as APEC, Maritime Boards of Trade, local Boards and Provincial and local governments.

Mr. Anderson was introduced by Mayor Lloyd of Halifax, and thanked by Mayor R. G. Urquhart, Sydney, M. P. Armstrong, Middleton, introduced the head table.

Yesterday afternoon's program continued with an address by Hon. N. Layton Ferguson, Q.C., Minister of Municipal Affairs, and a panel discussion on Education, Finance, both of which will be given coverage in future issues of the Courier. Chairing the panel were Irving Pink, Q.C., Yarmouth, and members of the panel were Hugh S. MacGlashen, Revaluation Commissioner Department of Municipal Affairs; Dr. H. P. Moffatt, Deputy Minister of Education, and Warden Charles Walters, Municipality of Lunenburg. An extended discussion aroused by Mr. Walters' statement and remarks that "Ed. does not work in practice" was in progress at time of going to press.

Chairman for the afternoon program was Mayor M. S. Horsburgh, Berwick.

The Conference began on Monday when Mayor I. W. Akerley, Dartmouth, chaired committees on resolutions and will continue through Friday when the conference closing banquet will be held. Hon. R. A. Donahoe, Attorney General and Health Minister for Nova Scotia, will be guest speaker.

Thursday's and Friday's speakers will also include Dr. H. M. Nason, Director of Elementary and Secondary Education; J. A. Houston, Central Mortgage and Housing; Dr. Clyde Marshall, of Mental Health Services and F. C. Hudson who will speak on Contracting and Tenders.

Soon a Bible school was established and a Christian endeavor was organized. A women's missionary group was formed and the church through the Maritime Society and the foreign society, extended its mission to the world as well as locally.

Later the church grew. MacGlashen, H. Outhouse, W. E. Outhouse and the late J. Cossaboom to the ministry. William A. Cossaboom, who was an elder at that time, is at present active in all church work, and is superintendent of the Bible School.

Minister J. W. Derby, who so pastorate began in 1911, faithfully held services in three churches each Sabbath Day: Briar Island, Tiverton, and East Ferry. He is now pastor. He and his wife reside at Freeport.

Making A Meal Of Vegetables

Autumn's bounty of plump tomatoes, golden squash, and eggplants with purple skins is suitable for a main course luncheon or supper dish. Try one of these when you are feeling in a creative mood.

Tomatoes With Corn Stuffing

- 6 large tomatoes
- Salt
- 5 slices bacon, diced
- 1 1/2 cups fresh or frozen whole onion, chopped
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon sugar
- Pepper to taste
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 cup cream
- 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs or grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons butter

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees.

2. Remove the stem end of each tomato and scoop out the center, leaving a shell about 1/2 inch thick. Sprinkle cavity with salt and drain.

3. Cook the bacon until almost crisp. Add corn and onion and cook, stirring frequently, until lightly browned. Add the sugar, one-half teaspoon salt and pepper.

4. Blend the flour with a little cream, add remaining cream and add to corn mixture. Cook until thickened.

5. Arrange the tomatoes in a shallow cooking dish and fill with corn mixture. Surround with a little water. Cover tops with crumbs or cheese and dot with butter.

6. Bake until tomato skins wrinkle and tops brown.

Yield: Six servings.

Squash With Chicken Stuffing

- 3 medium-sized, tender yellow squash
- 2 cups chopped cooked chicken
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1 medium onion, grated
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 1 cup tomato sauce

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Cut the ends from the squash and then cut each into pieces about two and one-half inches long. Use an apple corer

Some Fashion News

For fall, a graceful fit and flare silhouette. Dresses, suits and coats are generally fitted to the waist, but flare gently from waist to hem. The waistline wanders; but is often high, either clearly marked or hinted. The new necklines are neat little turtles, and on suits, slim lapels. Hemline stops at mid-knee. Colours are rich - bright navies, dark reds, evergreens. Orange is the gayest colour around.

The fashion feature of the year is the goat. Designers have made it the most interesting in years. Some appear flared and double-breasted, some with large stand-away collars, some nipped with darts under the bosom, suggesting a high waistline, but falling straight in the back.

The "separate suit" features different fabric in a suit and jacket combination. This suit may have a tweed jacket worn with a flannel skirt - skirt not too wide, nor too narrow, gently flared or bow-pleated.

New all knits, in coats, dresses and sweaters. Sweaters are long and heavily ribbed, worn over widely pleated skirts. For campus, the sleeveless shift in tweed is a fine foil for sweaters, smart also worn all by itself, either belted or free. Adding up to a suit are capes, worn with a matching skirt and a blouse.

Dressiest of the toe shapes for fall is the pointed toe. It turns up most often with a slender, medium high heel, usually in the late afternoon or evening. Parent And Child

(Excerpt from a New York Times article called "Children Under Pressure")

Competition between children in all areas - academic, social, and physical - has stepped up mightily since the days when today's parents were young.

In this highly pressured atmosphere it is understandable that many parents have a gnawing sense of insecurity about how their youngsters "measure up". Some hover anxiously over all aspects of the children's development. Others try to spur their young to greater heights by incessant pushing.

Specialists who work with children are beginning to see the effects of all this parental anxiety. School principals and counsellors report mounting tensions in children.

Helping the child learn and grow, the specialists point out, is a normal and happy part of parenthood. But there is a vast difference between stimulating children and driving them. Children are motivated by a desire to please, and parents have many ways of showing approval or disapproval. Nearly all of them must apply pressure sometimes in bringing their children to maturity, but relentless parental urging is usually a symptom that something has gone awry. Perhaps the goals set are unrealistically high. Perhaps the point of the parents' efforts has not gotten through to the child. Perhaps the message is understood but the child feels unable to meet the demand.

Whatever the cause, when children fail consistently to respond it is because, basically, the parent has been unable to ignite the fires within. Parents can sometimes awaken a child's interest, but they cannot sustain it. The child has to do that himself.

The first step in helping the child who fails to live up to the standards set for him, the specialists hold, may well be to reduce the demands. The child's desire to grow and achieve is most likely to develop in an atmosphere of acceptance of himself as he is. The child who feels comfortable with his parents and teachers and finds it safe to ask questions and express ideas, will usually formulate realistic goals for himself and gradually build the inner power and will to move toward them. Berating a child for poor performance, the psychiatrists hold, may only result in a worse performance the next time.

What is the best course then, for parents who feel that their children are capable, without undue strain, of achieving more than they are doing? It is meaningless for parents to talk about motivating their children if they themselves have no enthusiasm about life and learning to give them. Parents can offer encouragement by pursuing real interests of their own, by conveying the feeling that they stand foursquare behind their child apart from his performance at school or on a baseball diamond.

A clap on the back as he sets out for the day can do more for his ability to learn than continual corrections, reminders and anxious editing of term papers.

In the long run, children will prosper best if parents pay more attention to fostering their strengths than carp on their weaknesses. Warmth, understanding and assurance go a long way in helping a child or adult overcome the anxiety and tension that can prevent both young and old from realizing their potential.

A few weeks ago the writer sent in a letter to your paper re the school situation on Long Island.

The situation now is worse. To date the proposed school hasn't been built. Westport has gone on their own and well organized and Tiverton and Freeport are up in arms. It seems that while waiting for things to get organized, the School Board of Digby County arranged for the pupils from Grades 1 to 6 to use the Tiverton School and those from 7 to 11 to use Freeport School. This seemed O.K. but the parents of the Freeport kids said they weren't going to let their kids go on a bus to Tiverton and immediately got up a petition to stop them. And last week at a quickly arranged meeting they suggested setting up desks, etc. in their old Community Hall for the pupils until a new school is built. Surely the School Board of the County won't allow this to happen with such a good schoolhouse in Tiverton. This would mean that some pupils from Tiverton would have to go to study in a makeshift old schoolroom, leaving a good heated, ventilated, and good toilet facilities. Are their kids any better than ours? Sure, it's O.K. for the Tiverton kids to go via bus to Freeport but not for the Freeport kids to go to Tiverton.

This has brought the smouldering question aflame now as the Tiverton people are very irked by their latest measure and they are going to demand action at once. The Tiverton people now feel that there is only one place to build the new proposed school and that's in the Central Grove area, the centre of the Island where kids from both Tiverton and Freeport would have equal distances to travel, the land, weather, and general conditions would be better for all. The land now picked as a site hasn't been cleared by the Board of Health because it's stated that it was formerly an old cemetery and also that a polluted swamp is nearby.

It's high time that some of the work of local officials be brought in the open. Why should Freeport get more than Tiverton. The Tiverton people have now found out how they were led by fast talking in their last meeting. They now ask that the Minister of Education clear up this situation. Why close a good school like the Tiverton one when taxes, high costs, etc., are such as they are.

It's felt here that both schools should be used for all grades at the present time until a new high school is built in Central Grove, then use each school for the lower grades.

Let's get action now and get let the people of Tiverton be run over by any decision from Freeport.

History

There is no doubt but that the history of the North Range Methodist Church must go well back beyond 1898, but the only records available indicate that in that year there was a congregation in existence and names like Cook, VanBuskirk, Armstrong, Marshall, Sabean and Smith appear on the roll. This was compiled by Rev. R. A. Turner, the pastor who evidently served from about 1898 along to 1901. The residence indicated

of these folk were: Bloomfield, South Range and North Range. In 1903 the name of Rev. R. O. Armstrong appears and is followed in 1906 by C. O. Munro who served these people till 1909 or 1910. Then came Rev. W. Nightingale, 1911 to 1914, Rev. Harry Burgess 1914 to 1917, Rev. D. M. Farquhar 1918 to 1921.

R. M. Jost's name appears in 1923 and then that of Rev. A. G. Pentz during whose pastorate the Methodists entered the United Church of Canada. Mr. Pentz served from 1924 to 1930. His successor was Rev.

M. R. Ewing 1930 to 1935 and then W. McNevin 1936 to 1940. Mr. McNevin's pastorate, we understand, was the one which saw the last of regular church services in the old North Range church, for his successor, Rev. R. H. Barker when appointed became minister not only of the Churches of the Weymouth side of Saint Mary's Bay but of the Digby Neck United churches as well. And no regular services were held here at North Range since then.

In recent years an effort has been made to hold at least once a year, a memorial service and the offerings received at these services have been used in their entirety for the upkeep and maintenance of the little cemetery, adjacent to the church. The work and leadership of Mrs. William Wambolt, who though advanced in years has given faithful attention and leadership in keeping the resting place of families of this area maintained decently and in order has been the inspiration behind this annual church service. A service was held at the church on Sunday, August 13.

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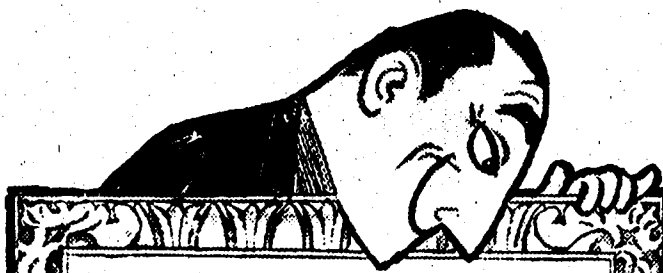

Lauds Merits Hospital Plan



Hon. R. A. Donahoe, in an address at the closing banquet of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference held at the Pines Hotel last week, lauded the Nova Scotia Hospital plan and the wisdom of imposing a tax, all the money from which would be earmarked for hospital purposes. One by one, he said, those provinces which selected a different method are following suit and abandoning the premium plan.

In correcting errors made by people regarding the hospital financing plan the Hon. Mr. Donahoe said that hospitals were not paid a per diem rate by the commission. They submitted their budgets in advance and these were examined by a competent rate board and then carefully reviewed by the commission. He said every effort was made to see that each hospital received sufficient money to provide the highest standard of service.

"Of course no hospital can be permitted by reckless or careless budgeting to receive any amount in excess of that required." Any other course would be an improper use of public money and unfair to every other hospital," Mr. Donahoe said.

Budgets were reviewed at the request of the local hospital at the end of each year and if an over expenditure had been made for approved purposes the amounts due the hospital were adjusted upwards and paid, he said. If the hospital had received an overpayment this was credited to the following year's payments.

Mr. Donahoe compared the available hospital beds now with those of 1956 and revealed plans for the future. He said that we now have 231 more beds in this province than we had in 1956. There are 540 more beds being built and without figuring replacements this will add another 377 to the total. With the additional program planned there will be when completed 1401 additional beds provided over those of 1956.

To operate each hospital bed the Minister said, costs in excess of \$5,000 per year. With the substantial increase in the pay of nurses and hospital personnel, standards of service are under careful scrutiny at all times and all this costs money which will probably bring an increase to the cost per bed operation.

In reviewing the hospital tax provisions, Mr. Donahoe pointed out that the tax yield in 1959 was something over one million more than was required for operating cost and construction grants. In 1960 it yielded about the same amount under the requirements and thus the two years averaged out. With the increase in tax rate it is expected that there will again be an excess over needs but with construction accelerating and operating costs increasing it can only be hoped that by the time construction grants have dwindled that operating costs will not have increased beyond the amount then realized by the hospital tax.

Community Planning Reviewed



Planning is necessary in the municipal field generally, said N. Layton Fergusson, Minister of Municipal Affairs for the province of Nova Scotia, before the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Conference at the Pines Hotel, and since municipalities are called upon to provide many things which involve people it is necessary to seek a plan that includes the human and social aspects of all about us and a plan within the limits of available resources. There are many things which require planning such as school building programs, assessment programs, budgets, town planning, etc. Mr. Fergusson continued. He dealt with Community or Town Planning chiefly and outlined in detail the provision of the town planning act and its use and dealt with official town plans, zoning by-laws, regulations on subdivisions, control over new buildings and the Metropolitan Planning Commission.

The official town plan was made for the purpose of planning future development of a city, town or municipality, the minister said. The main purpose of the zoning by-laws is to divide the municipality or any portion into districts and designating certain districts in which it is lawful to erect, construct, alter, reconstruct, repair or maintain certain types of buildings or carry on certain businesses or trades, and other districts in which it is unlawful to do so. Height, area, size of yards, courts, architectural design, character and appearance of buildings are among other considerations.

Mr. Fergusson said that it had been the view of the Department of Municipal Affairs that community planning was not something that could always be carried out with complete satisfaction within the limits of a single city, town or municipal unit but rather felt that planning was more properly done on a regional basis. Zoning too might better be on a regional rather than a single unit basis in some cases.

In reviewing the Town Planning Act in Nova Scotia since its enactment in 1912 and the revisions to 1954, Mr. Fergusson said that this was a field which had been somewhat neglected during the years. Now interest has been revived and particularly since the appointment of a community planning director some few years ago. The appointment of D. J. Bird in this capacity (Mr. Bird has been in Digby in his official capacity was chiefly to encourage greater interest in community planning and the results, the minister said, are encouraging).

Pickles To Pack

Many a homemaker likes the satisfaction which comes from making at least a few jars of her own pickles. Volumes have been written about their virtues. The Romans are said to have fed pickles to gladiators to keep them in form, and even the citizenry imbibed a little pickle juice each day for health's sake. Generally speaking there are two basic types of pickles: the fermented and the quick. Fermented pickles generally take several weeks to mature. The quick pickle is ready to eat within days. Two recipes for quick cucumber pickles are listed below: for the German pickle known as "senfgurken" and for bread and butter pickles.

BREAD & BUTTER PICKLES

- 24 medium cucumbers, unpeeled and thinly sliced
- 3 medium onions, thinly sliced
- 4 cup coarse salt
- 1 cup olive oil
- Powdered or lump alum
- 4 whole hot red peppers
- 4 to 8 cloves garlic
- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 1 cup yellow mustard seed
- 1 cup black mustard seed
- 1 tablespoon mixed pickling spice
- 2 tablespoons celery seed
1. Arrange the cucumber and onion slices in layers in a large crock or bowl, sprinkling each layer with some salt. Let stand 5 hours.
2. Drain, rinse in ice water and strain again well. Add the olive oil and toss until all the slices are coated.
3. Put one-half teaspoon powdered or one lump of alum into each of four sterilized one quart jars and fill the jars with vegetables. Add one red pepper and one or two cloves garlic to each.
4. Bring the vinegar and spices to a boil. Pour over the vegetables in the jars. Seal and let stand one week before using.

Yield: Four quarts.

SENFURKEN

- 12 large ripe cucumbers
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 2 pounds sugar
- 1/2 cup sliced fresh horseradish
- 4 hot red peppers
- 1 cup mustard seed
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 pieces cinnamon bark
- 1 tablespoon whole cloves
1. Peel the cucumbers, cut them in half lengthwise and scrape out the seeds. If desired, cut in quarters. Add salt and let stand overnight.
2. Drain the cucumbers, rinse them in cold water, drain again well and dry.
3. Boil for five minutes the vinegar, sugar, horseradish, and the spices, which have been tied loosely in a cheese cloth bag. Stir until the sugar dissolves.
4. Add the cucumbers and return to boiling. Discard the spice bag. Pack the pickles at once into sterilized jars. Seal.

Yield: About two quarts.

School Enrolment Increased By 135

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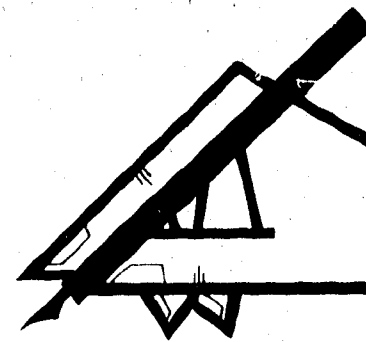

The committee has been responsible for extensions and improvements to the property so that displays can be more effectively arranged and more entries accommodated.

Each year brings something new on the local exhibition scene. In 1961 it was a Talent Show consisting of mostly musical numbers - vocal, instrumental and dancing to music. In all, the talent show was termed a success, both attendance-wise and in participation, and hopes were expressed that it be continued another year. And why not? There are other exhibitions which feature talent shows or sing songs to develop that particular phase of life. It has its place along with raising of good crops, fine horses or home cooking.

One thing we have had on our minds for sometime is that Digby County has been essentially a fishing County but never have we seen a display pertaining to the sea at the exhibition. We note that Yarmouth has added this phase to their exhibition for 1961. At least it is something to think about for 1962 and we've heard the committee say they are always open for suggestions. But, the committee, without co-operation or initiative from the public at large cannot give the exhibition maximum success. It's a wonder some fisherman or fish dealer in the vicinity had not asked for space to promote one of Digby's chief industries - fishing.

Our Biggest Industry

Speaking of industry - how many counted up the number of teachers on the Digby school staff? According to the list in last week's issue of The Digby Courier there were 73. Add to the teaching staff those who are bus drivers, janitors, secretary and whatever other employees necessary and what industry in the town of Digby compares with 47? The schools use not only an expense column on the town account books but indirectly they also make the revenue column. The foresight of those responsible for the Digby educational system have been only to provide the best in education for our children but as a result we also have a "major" industry as far as Digby town is concerned.

A Language All Its Own

Dr. F. W. Walsh, Deputy Minister, dropped in at the Digby County Exhibition, Bear River, last week, and when he left he was very enthusiastic about the showing of home work in the school. There were two or three fine, six rows with 100 pictures entered and as is the case at every exhibition where these are to be found, they were the centre of attraction. As popular as the exhibition audience was concerned, there was no doubt about it - a show with later attracts more of the attention of all exhibition visitors, young and old alike, than any other single class.

Dr. Walsh found, too, that there was a pretty good vegetable and fruit show at Bear River; an excellent flower show and, of course, the usual good exhibit of oxen. At Bear River, the ox pull is one of the feature attractions and it so proved to be again this year. The section set aside for the display of ladies' handicraft and needlework was large and worthy of commendation.

As he is presently holidaying in Nova Scotia since their visit to the show coincided with a meal home, the party ate in the dining room on the grounds in which local women served a home-cooked meal in which everything served was the product of their own kitchens and their own genius.

"My" Aunt Jess is reported to have remarked, "that is the best meal I've had for ages. My goodness, it's worth visiting a fair such as this for no other reason than to enjoy that kind of a meal. If restaurants always served that kind of food, there would be a line-up a mile long waiting to get served."

What Mrs. MacLeod observed is absolutely true. There's nothing to beat good food. It speaks a language all its own. (N. S. Farm News)

We Have Grown

Growth in a small town is so gradual that those who live in it usually do not take note of it. It is when you have been away for a number of years that the growth strikes you on return. Two young men who returned to Digby last week after an absence of five years had noted the changes which had taken place during that time. One from Toronto said "I hardly knew the place, the front street had undergone such a face lifting." BLACK CURRANT ROSEBUD ROLLS

1. Scald 1 c. milk; stir in 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 c. granulated sugar and 1/2 c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cool to lukewarm.
2. Measure 1/2 c. lukewarm water into a large bowl. Crumble and add 1 cake Fleischmann's Yeast (8-oz. size) top granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., then stir well. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture, 2 well-beaten eggs and 1 c. pre-sifted all-purpose flour. Beat until smooth and elastic. Cut into ten 1 1/2-inch slices. Place a cut side up in greased muffin cups. Repeat with remaining portions of dough.
4. Using scissors, cut a cross 1/2-inch deep in top of each bun. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk - about 45 mins. Bake in a mod. hot oven (375° F.) 12 to 15 mins. Yield: 20 dozen rolls.

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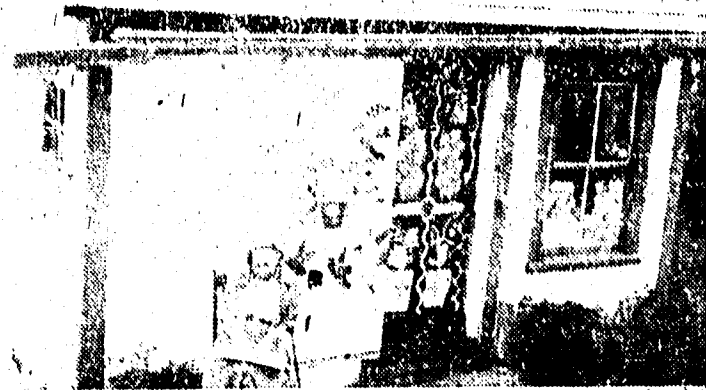

Shortage of Classrooms — Not Teachers

Due to the proposed classroom extension not ready in time for the opening of schools, Weymouth's main problem as school opening was a classroom shortage.

This was a new slant on school opening as in previous years a major problem has often been the teacher shortage.

Weymouth student enrollment figures were swollen this year by pupils from the closed school at Danvers and the grade 4 pupils from Weymouth Falls school, brought in to relieve last year's overcrowding at the Weymouth Falls school.

By using the library, laboratory and the principal's office as classrooms, space was found for all classes. There are 21 classes this year, in place of last year's 21 classes.

There are also two classes at Weymouth Falls and at Weymouth Mills, as last year, teachers being Mrs. Amy Lewis and Mrs. E. Barton at the former, and Rev. Sisters Marie Gilbert and Marie Majella at Weymouth Mills.

The enrollment for Weymouth schools in 1960-61 was 638, for 1961-62 is 200. Entire enrollment for the year in 1960-61 was 760, and for 1961-62 is 803.

Teachers for the Weymouth schools are: Mr. L. D. Stockdale, principal, grade XI; Mr. J. R. Doucet, vice principal, grade XI; Mr. G. P. Campbell, grade XII; Mrs. E. Annault, grade X; Mrs. N. Where Does That Road Go?

Many years ago, in a neighboring province, we were led to write a series of articles dealing with little known side lights of streets and their names and some incidents connected thereto in the city in which we then lived. We rather enjoyed doing this and think perhaps others enjoyed it too, but pressure of other things led us to discontinue, unfinished, the series. Also we did not get prepared for publication, another series which we had entitled in our mind's eye, "Where Does That Road Go?"

Now, if you are one of the kind of folk who have never asked yourself or others that question, this series is not for you. Turn elsewhere for what interests you. But for some who still are curious enough to want sometimes to leave the main paved roads, these will, we hope, be of interest. As we learn something of new country to us, hereabouts, we hope to share it with you, as we ask and find for ourselves "Where does that road go?" We would be happy, indeed, if others who know of particular interests pertaining to some area, if they would drop us a note telling us so.

Where does that little road go that turns off to the right just beyond Weymouth and before one comes to the railroad crossing? The road is marked New Edinburgh. What on earth is New Edinburgh doing down here just where the French shore commences? It must lead to the shore. We wonder if it does. Well here goes. Just a scant quarter mile on a day in the driest month of August in many a year, we come to where a lovely spring of water has been captured and pours forth in copious abundance by the roadside. To just see, and find that in itself a benediction on the hot, hot day in which we start our explorations. Well, what's beyond? Let's find out.

We went and found out the road is gravel road for about two miles and then one may drive right down to the fishing wharf and having viewed the mouth of the Sissaboo from the west side of the harbour and the lighthouse guarding its entrance we may follow along the shore about three more miles to ultimately come back on pavement not far from the great stone church at Saint Bernard. Or, if you are less venturesome and the first two miles of travel over dusty roads have sufficed, you may retrace your car tracks to the top of the hill and take the pavement there that runs approximately parallel to the shore road. As you drive along you may be led to reflect that here are the roads originally conceived, no doubt, as the township of New Edinburgh way back in 1783 when the land was first settled by — you've guessed it — three Scottish Loyalists who laid out a town, made streets, and they and others built many homes. Well, that is where that road goes.

Next week, the road from Barton that leads off inland to North Range.)

It's back enough to be a quitter. But it's worse to finish something you never should have started.

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About This and That

Roadside Parks & Museums

Official opening of the Laurie Park at Grand Lake, Halifax County, last week adds another convenience in Nova Scotia for the travelling public. Major General Hon. E. C. Plow unveiled a plaque in memory of Col. John Laurie and four of his sons. The land for the park was presented to the Province of Nova Scotia by Lt. Col. K. C. Laurie, another son of the late Col. John Laurie.

Laurie Park is a picturesque peninsula of about sixty acres of land. The park will provide tenting and camping facilities, a wharf, and a beach. It is one of a number of country recreational places planned by the Department of Lands and Forests. There are now thirteen provincial parks.

Tenting has become an increasingly popular means of spending a vacation, not only by those who feel they must economize financially but also by those who feel a need "to get away from it all." We have talked with operators of parks this summer who have told us that professional people are using the parks more and more. Church ministers, college professors, doctors and many from other professions seem to feel the need of a place where they are free from answering a telephone every few minutes and have freedom from the expected "collar and tie" every hour of the day.

Respectable and clean park sites are becoming a necessity in catering to the travelling public. The care of these should be such that improper use and careless disposal of refuse is impossible. We recall mentioning during the summer how much we missed the roadside tables. We now feel that with the parks being established the lack of roadside tables was not such a serious matter. The newer and better facilities will compensate for temporary shortage of tables and the improvement, we hope, will dim the memory of those not too few roadside tables which had become an eyesore and anything but a booster to the appetite.

Camping sites shouldn't necessarily remind us of museums but it has been on our minds for a few weeks to mention an outstanding attraction to tourists. Uniacke House at Mount Uniacke, Ross Cameron of the MacLaren Advertising Co. entertained the ladies at the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Convention at a tea there this past summer. By ladies from Vancouver to the extreme East of Canada, highest praise was voiced for that particular museum. A recent American visitor at our office also said, "I have never visited a museum which could quite equal Uniacke House." Needless to say, the word of mouth advertising by these happily impressed people will draw its share of future visitors to Nova Scotia.

Good Publicity

On the subject of tourists, we think that Ina Scott in her column between the Gates in her husband's weekly paper, "Gananogue Reporter", has given Digby a nice bit of publicity. Before returning to Ontario after the C.W.N.A. meeting in Halifax, the Scotts toured Nova Scotia. For weeks Mrs. Scott has been telling the Gananogue people about the trip. Here is her description of their visit to Digby.

"We stayed overnight at Honey Hill near Yarmouth and proceeded to Digby next day, where we visited Mrs. Wallis of the Digby Courier. That night we had dinner and stayed at Digby Pines Hotel.

During the evening it was suggested that we go down to the wharves to see the fishing fleets come in. This was a revelation.

Just around dark, the boats began streaming in - 25 to 30 boats going out and returning each day.

The scallop draggers, or boats, come in one side of the dock and the fish draggers on the other. The scallop draggers arrive first.

Before the boats arrive, the oil trucks come down onto the docks ready to refuel the boats. Then, along come trucks loaded with empty plastic garbage cans. Then the boats come in each one had from four to six plastic garbage cans full of scallops, all removed from the shells. These are poured into the plastic containers on the waiting trucks.

At one time wooden barrels were used, but the plastic is much better we were told. Each garbage can holds a hundred pounds. The cans are raised by cranes onto the trucks and away they go. Scallops sell for 25 or 28c a pound.

About the time the scallop boats were cleared, the fish draggers began speeding in - surprisingly fast. Big dump trucks had assembled, backed up to the edge, on that side of the wharf. The holds of the boats were filled with fish - mostly cod - and a number of other varieties also, and there were hundreds of fish thrown on the decks as well.

The men in oilskins and rubber boots walked right over and through the mess of fish and then, began taking them via pitch fork into huge wire baskets which were lifted into waiting trucks which hold 1000 yes four thousand pounds of fish. These sell at 4 to 6 cents a pound. The ships leave at dawn or before and return about dark.

We passed H.M.C.S. Cornwallis, where the lads were out drilling, and proceeded to Annapolis Royal, where we paid a visit to Fred Beattie, editor of that town's weekly newspaper.

We are sure the Digby people are grateful to Mrs. Scott and the Gananogue Reporter for that descriptive explanation of the "coming in" of the scallop fleet. We expect a few more Ontario visitors in Digby next summer as a result. Wish we could find out in some way who came because of the story in the Gananogue Reporter. Thanks to the Scotts at any rate.

A Good Crop

The editor was the recipient last week of a beautiful basket of peaches grown on the farm of Russell Henshaw, Deep Brook. They were "delicious" both to the taste and to the eye. Peaches were exhibited at the Digby County Exhibition and we had been told by the exhibition manager that peaches there were judged "among the best in the province." We know Mr. Henshaw had prizes on all his peaches exhibited so we expect these were some of the best in the province. If the basket received by the editor was a sample, they very well could have been.

Some few years ago the raising of peaches in the Deep Brook area was a novelty. We believe we recall when someone was experimenting with peach growing there. Now that it has been proven a successful venture there seems to be no reason why a fair size peach industry could not develop. Mr. Henshaw reports he's had a good crop this year. If Mr. Henshaw's peaches are a sample of what can be raised there

is no reason why the industry shouldn't flourish. Possibly we might have to educate ourselves to buying Nova Scotia grown peaches to give the industry a boost.

The uses for peaches are varied. But a nice time-saving dessert is ripe peaches in season with cream just like ripe strawberries in season with cream. Yum! Yum!

P.S. They are growing tobacco around Kentville, why not go in for growing peaches around Deep Brook? There surely should be a market.

Immunization Week

During this week all Canada will celebrate its 49th National Immunization Week.

This annual event is designed to call public attention to the fact that there are communicable diseases which may be prevented by immunization. The most outstanding of these are: smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis and one should add tetanus and tuberculosis, the latter of which is in a measure preventable by immunization.

Canada's record in connection with these diseases is, on the whole, very good. For example, there has not been a case of smallpox in Canada since 1916. In 1959 there was not a single death from diphtheria in the whole of Canada for the first time in history. The fact, however, that eternal vigilance is the source of success and that any letting up of this vigilance is proven and the fact that in 1960 there were 53 cases of diphtheria and 7 deaths. Polio, with the advent of the Salk vaccine, has shown a rapid decline, but nevertheless there were 909 cases in Canada in 1960 with 83 deaths. Whooping Cough, still a dangerous disease has been reduced from a maximum of 19,082 in 1943 to 6,014 in 1960.

We cannot relax our efforts to fight diseases which could be abolished if we cared enough. In knowledge is power, ignorance is weakness! National Immunization Week is calculated to provide a means whereby we may present a united front in our attack on these preventable diseases.

Should anyone from the Digby area have missed the immunization clinic held at the Court House yesterday, we urge that you take advantage of the clinic which will follow in another few weeks.

Steaming Ahead

(Of Many Things, by Ambrose Hills)

There are indications that very good times are on the way.

I always hesitate to make such predictions because prosperity is never just around the corner for anyone who isn't prepared to go looking. Yet things are picking up rather quickly, and it will be a big surprise if there isn't something in the nature of a small boom in Canada before another fall rolls around.

The U. S. economy has already started to drive forward. Our own is almost certain to follow.

For these reasons, it seems to me it is a good time to buy essential items. Government spending is likely to increase, and when it does it always causes a number of price increases in the process. I put in an order for a new typewriter on that theory, anyhow, so I am following my own advice. Good times, too, are inclined to lead labor union leaders to start a round of huge wage demands. If these demands exceed the increase in productivity that brings about a boom, they soon kill the boom and cause a further and deeper depression.

Nevertheless, it is good to know there is still a lot of steam in our economy and that with any kind of common sense we can take big steps ahead in the 60's.

"That barrier", said the speaker, "is sin, not the big sins we read about, not the sin of riotous living engaged in by prodigal son which is recorded in the 15th chapter of St. Luke's Gospel, but the husks which tempted him and which which he would have filled himself had he not turned to the Father for security. It is the husks of sin that are breaking us and instead of turning to the Father as did the prodigal, the Christians of this twentieth century are filling themselves with the husks and at the same time wondering why the Father has not opened His arms with the same security shared in by the prodigal on his return. It is the husks of sin, the smaller, personal, accepted sin that is keeping us from the Father", charged the speaker. "The sin of selfishness, greed, indifference, self-righteousness, faultfinding and hundreds of others including smoking and drinking", he continued. "These latter two sins having been almost accepted as part of church theology are destroying us and keeping from us that vital experience of salvation". Mr. Nethercott declared. "Too often we are afraid to speak out against these sins for fear of hurting some individual but as your pastor I have no other choice but to tell you that smoking is a sin because it contains nothing that is good. It is a destroying agent and is no part of God for God is good", the preacher went on. "Social drinking cannot be accepted while alcohol is condemned - they must go hand in hand. Social drinking leads to alcoholism. It is that first drink that makes an alcoholic."

"These are the sins, my friends, that are keeping us from knowing the salvation of Jesus Christ and will with out a doubt destroy us", said Mr. Nethercott. "We must come out of it and stay out of it. If the church continues to tolerate these things then we might as well quit, close the doors and live by our own desires. The church must speak

out for God (Good) and His righteousness (right living). If Christ's way of life is to exist", the sermon continued. Mr. Nethercott implorers the faithful to separate themselves from these things by saying, "Do as Jesus taught and let us as your personal apostles would lead you, but aim for that perfection which is found in Christ Jesus and you will know without a doubt the gift of salvation promised you by the Master."

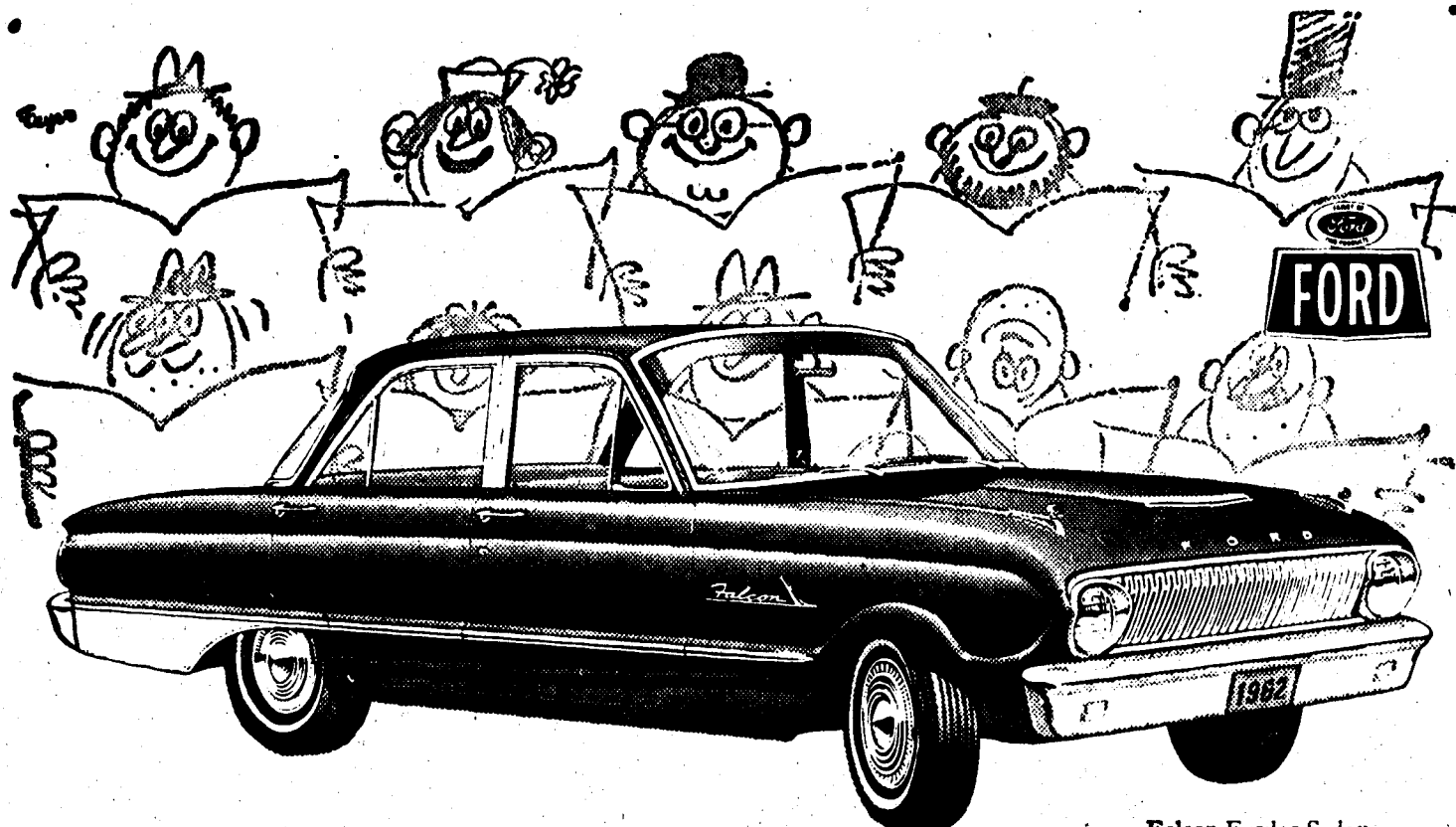

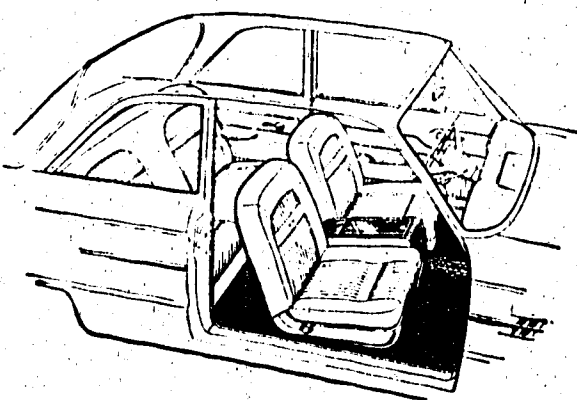

Preparing Parents For School

It may be as important to prepare the parent, as it is the child, for school. Dorothy Barclay writes in the New York Times Magazine: "Although countless articles have been written about preparing 5 and 6-year olds for their first adventure with formal education, very little attention has been paid to getting parents 'ready'."

Some parents will adjust readily to this new influence in their child's life, while others may be troubled by the scholastic surprises in store for them.

Too often, whatever confusion and conflicts arise, grow out of parents' unrealistic expectation, their illusions about what schools are, and their

Skim milk powder may be used in a great number of desserts. Combine the skim milk powder with the dry ingredients and complete according to directions on the package, using water in place of the milk.

For drinking purposes the taste of the skim milk mixture can be improved by refrigerating it, or by mixing it with an equal amount of fresh milk. The lacking vitamin A can be made up by other foods containing it, such as green and yellow vegetables, yellow fruits, butter, or fortified margarine.
