Man would then stand back and come out dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of coaxing."

They often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1918 got together just before dark one evening and decided to mutilate the newly built outdoor Pease Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, so in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story was something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pease Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world war and Korea, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent draughtsman for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale apothecary, and myself.

As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read it aloud to two somewhat different groups of the men who was found marooned on a beach in some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duffy County. When I read this man's tongue had been cut out and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

Jerome appeared to have been a man of considerable social standing and, possibly, of considerable wealth. However, the only thing I could or would ever say after being asked and probed by some family in the Forest was that something that sounded like the name before either, could not, or would not, apply to the man who he was or why he was left there. I was, and is, one of Dugby County, and I am sure, different ideas have been put forward in the past concerning this man. However, "Mia" was, I felt so sure he was, that I was different about this man. The only thing I have been very well explained to me.

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## Want United Front

At time of going to press representatives of the ports of Digby, Shelburne, Yarmouth and Lunenburg are in session at Hotel Champlain, Digby, in an effort to formulate a plan of action to endeavour to get an additional New England-Nova Scotia ferry in operation.

Some weeks ago the Digby Board of Trade formed a Digby Port Committee, headed by Vincent G. Snow, and immediate steps were taken by the committee to request representatives from other Western province boards of trade and committees to meet with them. On the Digby committee with Mr. Snow are Mayor V. L. Bent; Warden Ronald Morehouse; Digby Board President, Mrs. J. M. Wallis; Ralph McIntyre; Edward Twohig; V. G. Cardozo; A. L. Robinson and Keith Potter.

The idea for such a meeting was born after a Gloucester, Mass., delegation, headed by Leo Dionne, visited Digby some weeks ago regarding a ferry. The Gloucester delegation strongly urged a unified effort of the Nova Scotia ports to bring about the realization of a second Nova Scotia-New England Ferry, with the idea that no matter where the ferry terminus would be located everybody in Western Nova Scotia and Nova Scotia as a province would benefit by the second ferry.

A full account of Wednesday's meeting will be carried in these columns in the next issue.

## Celebrates 50 Years

Tonight the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club will celebrate its 50th anniversary by having a special anniversary dinner at the Pines Hotel, with Commodore Charles McBride presiding. Surviving charter members are Fritz Dakin, C. F. McBride, Sr., M. C. Denton and G. D. Dunn, most of whom are expected to be at the dinner tonight.

The Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club was incorporated in 1912 but previous to that there had been a Digby Boat Club which dated back to the eighteen eighties, as far as can be recalled.

Original club rooms of the Boat Club, as far as can be learned, were where the Canadian Tire Corporation building in Digby now stands and which was the old Masonic Hall. The club house later was the building on Water Street which is now occupied by Fidele's Beauty Shoppe.

It is of interest to know that the present Town Council table and chairs were originally furniture belonging to the yacht club and were presented to the town before the reorganization in 1937. At that time a club house was built on the property of the Gilpins, now that of Miss Charlotte Gilpin, and later moved to the shore at the Joggins, where it now stands. The impressive looking building is one which catches the eye looking along shore on the approach of town by way of the Valley. For many years Percy Weir took a personal pride in the building as general overseer of the property.

Yachting in Digby in the early years was doubtless a much sought pleasure and participation in races evidently keen. Two sterling silver shields with the crest of the town and inscription showing they had been presented by the town to the Digby Yacht Club can be seen at the club rooms. One of the town crests, uniquely, it is understood, is on a separate plate. Commodore C. F. McBride, Jr., is anxious to learn of other trophies or materials around town which have connections with the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club.

It is expected that besides local members many American summer visitors and members will be on hand for tonight's celebration. Commander George Shay had sent word that he will fly here for the occasion.

## Mrs. Buckley Addresses Delegates

An appeal for the Women's Institute to combat prejudice was made at the 49th convention of the Women's Institutes of Nova Scotia held at Wolfville. Addressing more than 350 delegates attending the convention, Mrs. Willis Buckley, Bear River, convener of legislation and citizenship, said there was legislation against discrimination, but government was powerless to act against prejudice.

"Only we as individuals can fight prejudice," she said. "We are able to do much on the national and world level, but are we?"

Mrs. Victor Davidson, of Salmon River, who was re-elected president of the organization, urged women to reaffirm their faith in the importance of home and the need of the child for love and parental care.

Speaking on the convention's theme "Building Today for a Better Tomorrow," Mrs. Davidson said the educational role of the institute lay in continuing to encourage communities to participate in educational expansion programs.

A panel discussion at the convention concluded that parents must take a greater interest in education. Panelists also agreed that minimum standards for teachers needed to be enforced.

Panelists were Mrs. Duckworth, adult education division of the department of education; Mrs. John Aldous, curriculum advisory committee of the department; W. D. Mills, director of the vocational education division; and J. Stirling Dorrance, president of the Nova Scotia Education Association. Moderator was Mrs. John McLean, of Eureka, Pictou County.

Mrs. J. M. C. Duckworth, of Halifax, and well known in all H. & S. work in the province, said it was necessary to convince the general community of the need for high standards of education. The prevailing attitude was that "what was good enough for me is good enough for my children," she said.

Parents have an irreplaceable role in the education of their children, said Mrs. Duckworth. We have to cope in the home with the changes in society. What is needed in society is a revolution in the thinking about education.

The early childhood is a most important time, she said. What happens then is fundamentally important. It is then that the roots of a general attitude towards education take hold. Then children develop the courage to face new situations and an open mind to receive new ideas.

## French Shore Sticks To Traditions

Traditions die hard in Nova Scotia where modern generations still cherish and cling to heritages endowed by pioneering forebears.

As a result, there is much more than historical evidence of the contributions made to present day Nova Scotia by French, English, Scots, German and Irish settlers.

Accents in speech, and even customs vary in sections of the province indicating the ancestry of the inhabitants. Many place names, in addition to their practical functions often reveal a long ago longing for a far away homeland.

The two groups that have clung probably more closely than any others to the culture and traditions of their ancestors are the French and Scots.

The French association, with Nova Scotia goes back to the earliest days of the province's history. It was the French who made the first attempt to colonize the province back in 1605 when it was called Acadia. Initially, the French settlers made their homes in the lush Annapolis Valley. In 1755, after refusing to swear allegiance to the English authorities who controlled Acadia, they were driven from the Valley and taken aboard British ships to locations along the Atlantic seaboard of the United States.

It wasn't long after this that many undertook grueling journeys and made their way back to Nova Scotia. They found their old lands occupied by settlers from New England and consequently took up their lives in other parts of the province. Today, the south west shore of the province, roughly from Digby to Yarmouth, (better known as the French Shore), and the north west coast of Cape Breton, from Margaree to Cheticamp, are the two areas with the largest number of French Acadian descendants.

In both areas, many of the traditional crafts of the old Acadians flourish and weaving and rug hooking have been developed into minor art forms by present day craftsmen. Names like Saulnier, Bellevue, Aucoin and LeBlanc are as common as Smith and Jones in other parts.

The Scots were relative new comers to Nova Scotia. The movement of Highland Scottish to Nova Scotia began at the turn of the 19th century and in 30 years nearly 50,000 Scots settled in Cape Breton Island and in the mainland counties of Antigonish and Pictou.

The descendants of these immigrants have never forgotten their highland heritage and even to this day, the music of the bagpipes and the soft sing-song of the Gaelic are not unusual sounds in Nova Scotia.

The fun loving Scots provide many of the most popular tourist attractions. With their highland games and gatherings, they give authenticity to the province's Latinized name which means "New Scotland".

The first RCMP Bands came into existence three short years after the establishment of the Force itself. They were organized by the local police forces.

The Force's first band unit and others which formed spontaneously at Regina, Fort Walsh, Fort MacLeod, Lethbridge, Calgary and Battleford were not only a morale booster for the isolated members of the early Force, but also contributed to the strengthening of ties between the police and the citizens of the vast western plains. Insp. J. T. Brown was the Band's first Director.

The Band of forty-five pieces made its debut on April 30, 1939, in Regina, Saskatchewan. Less than one month later it played for Royalty when Their Majesties visited Regina.

In 1939 the Band was transferred to Ottawa. That year the Band was signally honoured by being detailed to New York as "duty" band to play for Their Majesties when they visited the Canadian Pavilion at the World's Fair.

During the dark war years, the Band played at numerous concerts and dances, and in parades for National Charitable organizations and Victory Loans.

Similar research programs are being carried on in many parts of the United States, Sweden and Nigeria. Nova Scotia is fortunate in being one of the leaders of this important mental health research.

The Maple Leaf Agricultural Society members met at the Agricultural building in Conway on July 17th with Mr. Lloyd Jefferson, president, in the chair. Mr. Roger Freeman, secretary, took the minutes of the meeting. At the roll call twenty members were there to continue the efforts that a few of the farmers were still interested in organization.

The first item discussed at the meeting was the possibility of relocating the regular Community Fair which had been held at Conway for the last twenty or thirty years. Those present did not think that they could put on a Fair like it used to be done in the past. Instead it was believed that efforts of the Maple Leaf Agricultural Society should be centered on trying to help 4-H Club members. It was suggested at this meeting that the 4-H Club members should plan to hold a 4-H Club Show sometime in the latter part of August. A tentative date was mentioned for the 22nd of August. This question of dates was to be left for the 4-H Club members to decide at their monthly meeting, which was held on Saturday, July 28th.

The other item of business was the possibility of getting farmers to grow vegetables and small fruits in the Digby area. It was thought that due to the climate and the small farms, the above crops could be grown in a profitable way. It was mentioned that due to the fact that the Research Station of Kentville was interested in doing some experiments in the area that the farmers who could possibly grow vegetables and small fruits should do their utmost to cooperate with the authorities of the Federal and Provincial Department of Agriculture. It was mentioned during the discussion that a meeting of all farmers interested in growing small fruits and vegetables would be called in the near future, probably the second week in August.

Some of the members present that they were surprised that no reports had been given. The study groups were supposed to send reports of their activities to the secretary of the Federation, who in turn would have sent a newsletter to all members. So far, no report has been given. This lack of information is in many cases the reason for failure in anything that is started in Digby County, it was said.

The 4-H Club members from Bear River were on a tour to the Research Station of Kentville on Wednesday. Four cars left Bear River with twenty-two calf and garden club members to visit the farm in Kentville. The group was in Kentville at eleven o'clock and took charge of the picnic grounds till one o'clock. During this time the members had their lunches and had time left for a few games and some investigations, so well done by teenagers. At one o'clock the group was put on a big truck and visited the different projects carried on on the farm. Host was R. P. Longley, of the Experimental Farm, who explained to all the different experiments done with fruits and vegetables. Some of our members were disappointed not to find any cattle or horses on the farm. The reason for the lack of animals is that Kentville farm is more of an Horticultural Research Station than anything else. Most of the experiments done with cattle is done at Nappan Experimental Farm.

The group left Kentville on its way back at three o'clock in the afternoon and were back safe and sound in Bear River for the five o'clock T.V. program.

Witnesses won't retire from the ministry which he regards as a life long vocation. In the local congregation, Holmes oversees the four Bible study education the Witnesses conduct in the homes of interested persons.

Holmes said he is looking forward to working at Moncton with many others from various Maritime centres who will operate the 23 different de-

## Far Away Hope For Ferry

The editor of the Lunenburg Progress-Enterprise sees only a far away hope for a second New England to Nova Scotia ferry. We know such a thing will of necessity take time but the only way to overcome the time element is to keep beating the drums. As we write these lines we are looking forward to a meeting in Digby on Wednesday (yesterday by the time you read this) at which meeting Lunenburg will have representatives as will other Western Nova Scotia towns.

From the Enterprise —

"According to the Digby Courier the local Board of Trade has formed a Port of Digby Committee to dig up some enthusiasm for the Gloucester-Nova Scotia ferry."

Lunenburg is mentioned as one of the towns for the honour of the ferry. The committee is now editing a pamphlet to be sent to the various towns before such a ferry is practicable. Several months ago the Progress-Enterprise printed a detailed analysis prepared by the Department of Transport that revenue from such a ship would not be enough to pay for the operation without a heavy subsidy.

The report held out one ray of hope that no figure could be complete without a detailed study of the amount of commercial freight traffic available. This study we presume is now being taken. Summer traffic, both passengers and cars, is no problem. The big question is What Will The Winter Business Be?

The Progress-Enterprise will always take a strong stand on any economic development that will generate more business expansion either in Lunenburg or some other part of the province.

As we see it a new ferry service would only serve to increase the federal payroll by several hundred people at a heavy cost of taxation and increasing public debt. The Gloucester-Nova Scotia ferry project shouldn't be forgotten entirely but no one should get too enthusiastic about it until such time as it can be proven that the available traffic will pay for a very large proportion of the operating costs 12 months of the year. Otherwise it will be just another government aided project that will provide jobs out of proportion to the value returned.

This is how the Enterprise sees it and one must respect its only too true comments even while we keep the drums beating.

## Even From Germany

Pardon us if we mix our position as president of the Digby Board of Trade with that of being editor of The Digby Courier once in a long, long time. We are always reluctant to take such advantage or to use this column to inflict on our readers the business and work problems concerning the Courier and for the publishers. Once in a while this happens if we feel it is to your advantage.

Right now we feel that it is to your advantage to know that many people are interested in Digby and some of them from far away places. As president of the Digby Board of Trade your Courier editor has been in a position to know this that otherwise would not have been. As president of the Trade Board we have been thoroughly convinced that Digby should never be without a Board of Trade. Digby is essentially a tourist town, and if our impressions are right it is to the Board of Trade in any town to which potential visitors look for general information about a place. Possibly the newspaper ranks second but we've certainly changed our minds on first place.

To give you an example the president of the Digby Board had this card from Braunschweig, Germany, this week — "Planning to visit Nova Scotia. Would you kindly help me plan my trip by sending me some information about points of interest at and around your city and how to get there. Maybe with a map of Digby if obtainable. Thanking warmly in advance, I remain,"

The world is small isn't it? Numerous letters of similar content come to the Board of Trade. All that can be done is to answer them to the best of one's ability. Granted, many

such letters come from school children from all parts of the U.S.A., and Canada, but even to ignore these would be cutting off potential tourists of ten, fifteen or twenty years hence, maybe. And Rome was not built in a day, you know. Besides, what parent can resist being interested in Digby if the school age child has become interested. Leave that as it may be, the question is, what do we have in ready supply to forward to these people to inform them of the town of Digby? At present, simply nothing. While we do not mind sending literature on Nova Scotia or the whole Annapolis Valley it is Digby in which these potential visitors are interested. Think it over and maybe 1963 will come up with some good literature on Digby.

Then, what shall we say we have to offer them when they come. Are boats available for fishing trips? Just last week a man came to the Courier seeking information on available sports fishing boats. We could only think of two in the area which we felt were properly equipped to government standards. One we felt was ready for business and the other, as we had heard, would oblige someone if they couldn't find other means but other interests of necessity took preference. To make sure we were not mistaken we called the Information Bureau — our answer was "There are only two registered. Now the South Shore has a great many but we seem to have only two in the whole area." The question in our minds is "Are we missing the boat? or is there no profit in such a venture?"

And while we are on the subject, and as a follow up of previous editorials, only courtesy will keep our tourists coming to Digby. We must remember that Digby is a strange town to the tourists just as new towns are strange to us. We do not know where it is best to turn or are not familiar enough with streets to be able to use them without taking time to think. For example, we saw a most discourteous Digby light truck driver one day last week. An American car, no doubt saw others doing it, decided to turn on Water Street near the post office. It took him just a little longer than most to manoeuvre his car for he was not too familiar with the layout. Our discourteous truck driver was scarcely two feet away from the American car, not by accident but with the expression and movements of "I'll show you smart alec". Doubtless, there are smart alecs among visitors as well as among our own, but tourism wise it might pay to give the visitor the benefit of the doubt.

Many other detrimental discourtesies might be added to the list but time does not permit our writing them. You think of them. Take for instance, over-charging. A lot is being written in other weekly papers about killing our tourist business with exorbitant charges. The only complaint we've had so far was a comparison of a seven dollar a night accommodation in Truro, N. S., with a seven dollar accommodation in Digby. Better watch out — standardized prices require standardized accommodation. Of course, the seven dollars figure was far from the exorbitant prices we read about. Treat the tourists right and keep them coming.

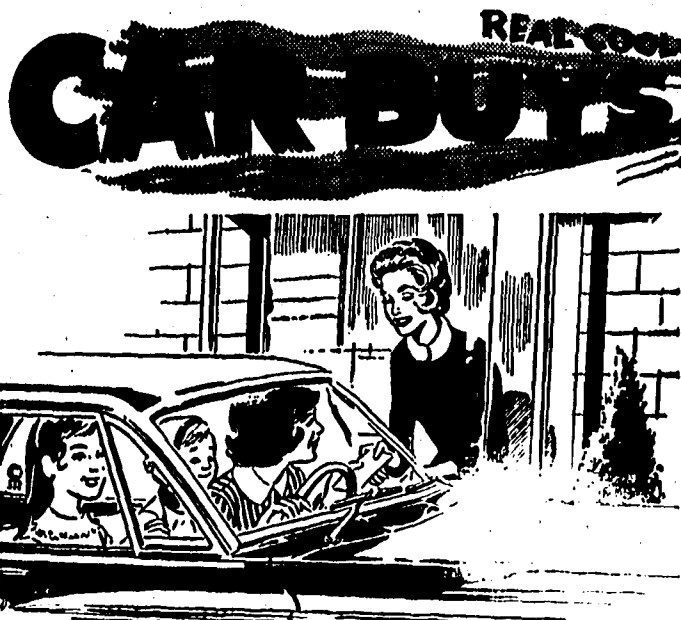

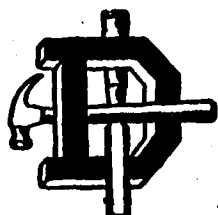

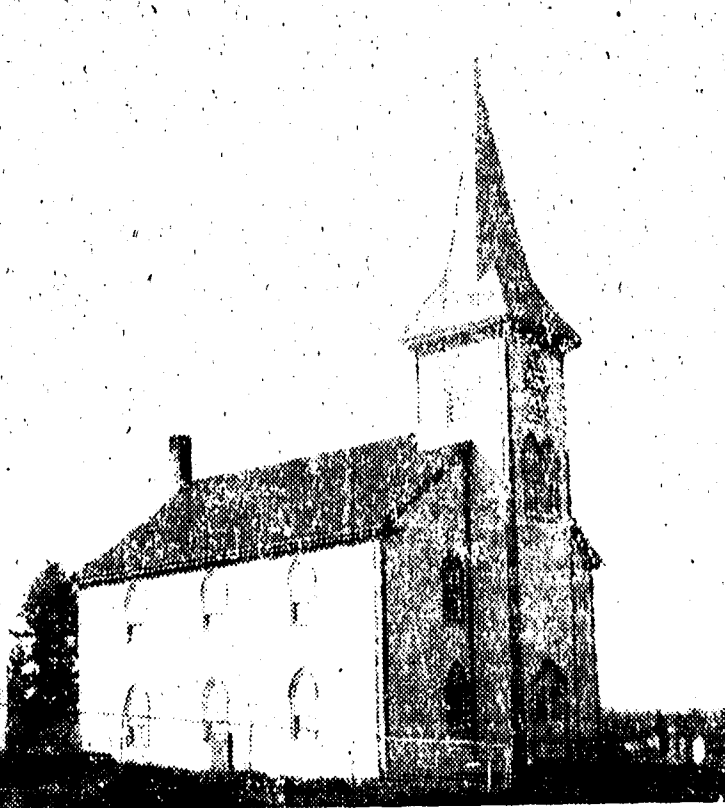

## Shellfishing Faces Ban

The fisheries department advised Wednesday that waters on the New Brunswick side of the Bay of Fundy may soon be closed to shellfishing because of rising toxicity levels in the area.

When eaten by humans, toxic shellfish cause "paralytic shellfish poisoning," the department said. The toxin comes from a one-cell marine plant which forms part of the food of shellfish. Scallops are not affected by the toxin. Fisheries officials said danger of poisoning is greatest in summer because temperature conditions are ideal for the growth of the toxic plant.

Toxic shellfish in the Maritimes were also found in Digby and Annapolis counties in Nova Scotia, on the opposite side of the Bay of Fundy.

The department says there is no danger from commercial shellfish packs which have to be certified poison-free by the hygiene laboratory in Ottawa before being released for sale.

WONDER QUESTIONS?

Is the sky a great big blue space? Or is it a solid mass of air? These are the kind of questions that children ask. They should be answered intelligently. This is a column each week that answers such questions. In cooperation with The Book of Knowledge will print these questions and their answers — most frequently asked by children of their parents.

**Could the sky fall down?**  
The sky could not fall down, because what we call the sky is really just space, the space of the universe through which the earth, the moon, the sun and all the countless number of stars are travelling. The sky does appear to some people to be a great bowl turned upside down over the earth. If it really were a great dome we should indeed wonder why it held it up and fear lest it should crash upon us.

Several thousands years ago many people believed that the sky was a great crystal sphere, or a series of spheres, which revolved around the earth, carrying on their surface the heavenly bodies.


How did the Tabby cat get its name?

It is thought that a tabby cat gets its name from the wavy pattern of the colors of its coat. Long ago the pattern reminded people of a kind of watered silk fabric that was made in a quarter of Baghdad called Attila. As the name traveled, it was altered. The fabric finally became known as taffeta, but the name of tabby cat is closer to the original.

Why does silver tarnish in the air while gold does not?

There is often sulfur in the air in one form or another. If, for instance, we burn natural gas, it adds a certain amount of sulfur to the air. No sulfur compound has any action on gold; but several sulfur compounds act on silver, covering it with a black film of what is called sulfide of silver. We say the silver has tarnished. When we brighten silver we rub this sulfide away. This is noticeable in silver plated ware. After a time the silver layer may rub off and the baser metal beneath will show through. Often people wear silver bracelets next to


Why does an owl come out at night?  
Many animals and some birds, including the owl, are adapted for living most actively at night. What is it that makes an animal more active at one time of the day rather than at another time? The answer to this question is usually found in the kind of



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food the animals prefer to eat.

Owls feed chiefly upon mice and other small creatures that are active in their turn, during the hours of the night. Because its plumage is very soft, the owl flies without making any noise and can, therefore, sweep down upon its prey before its presence is known. The pupils of the owl's eyes are very large to allow its eye to make use of even the faintest light. Because of this, owls can see much better in the dark than we can.

Can flowers talk to one another?

No. Flowers are wonderful in many ways and they can do many things that even men cannot do, but they can not talk to one another, either by words or by expression or by any other kind of movement. Only the animal world can do this, because only in the animal world has life developed what is called a "nervous system."

No plants have a real nervous system, much less anything like a brain. We know that many of the lower animals can, in effect, talk to each other but all of these have some kind of nervous system.

What happens inside a cat when it purrs?

When a cat makes a purr, it is actually a kind of vibration. It is a way that the cat is feeling good. If you put your hand on a cat while it is purring, you can feel its whole body vibrating or trembling. When a purr is strong or sings, especially if he is a man with a voice low in pitch and you put your hand on his chest, you can feel him vibrate just as the cat does. In the case of the man, we know that it is the vocal chords in his throat that he has set vibrating and they have set his chest vibrating.

Is smoke good for anything?

Yes, smoke is used in a number of ways. It has no force, such as steam has and it is even generally a serious nuisance. Yet smoke has its value, signalling by smoke has been carried on for centuries. Food may be preserved by smoke and tender growing crops can be protected from sharp cold by a blanket of warm smoke. Smoke screens in warfare on land and sea give considerable protection to the movements of a fighting force. The solid part of smoke, called lamp-black, is a coloring material for certain inks and paints.

Are there any diamonds in the sky?

Diamonds are sometimes found in meteorites which, before they came to rest upon the earth, were certainly in the sky. In that sense, we could say that there are diamonds in the sky. The diamonds found in meteorites, however, are not worth anything commercially although they are of great interest to scientists. They are usually very small and of not very good quality.

We do not know much about the manner in which diamonds found on earth are formed, but we believe that they were once carbon in the earth's crust. The carbon apparently crystallized into the form which we call diamond. This change probably occurred because of the enormous heat and pressure in the earth's crust. Perhaps it is in this same way that the diamonds in meteorites have formed, for meteorites, too, were once under intense heat and pressure.

Is every seventh wave a bigger one?

No. It is pure superstition that says that every third or every seventh or every ninth wave which the tide comes in is bigger than the others. It is untrue and without any basis of fact. There are many old superstitions about three and seven and nine. These have come to us from long ago, when numbers were thought to have some value.

What do we mean by humidity?

The temperature is 80, the humidity is 75. Perhaps you have been puzzled by a statement of this sort in the paper. What is meant by humidity?

The air is not composed of a simple substance. It is made up of a number of gases. Nitrogen is one; oxygen is another, carbon dioxide is a third. Another is water vapor, or evaporated water.

There is always a certain amount of this vapor in the air. The amount that the air can hold at any one time is determined by the temperature. The higher the temperature, the more water vapor the air can contain. When it can take up no more, we say

the air is saturated with water vapor.

When the air is saturated with water vapor, it is said to be humid. If the air is not saturated, it is said to be dry.

Humidity is the amount of water vapor in the air. It is measured in terms of the percentage of water vapor in the air.

Humidity is not the same as moisture. Moisture is the water in a liquid form, while humidity is the water in a gaseous form.

that it has reached the saturation point. If any more is added, the vapor collects in the form of dew, mist, rain, hail or snow.

Now by humidity we simply mean the amount of water vapor in the air. Absolute humidity is the weight of the water vapor per cubic foot of air. Generally, however, when we refer to humidity we mean relative humidity. This is the percent of water vapor in the air with respect to the total amount of vapor that the air can hold. When we say that the temperature is 80 and that the humidity is 75, we mean that the air has 75 percent of the water vapor that it can contain at a temperature of 80.

When the temperature is high the air can hold a good deal of water vapor. When both temperature and humidity are high, we say the weather is heavy. We feel uncomfortable. Yet our bodies need some water vapor. Where the air is hot and very dry, human beings cannot maintain health for long. We are most comfortable when the humidity is neither too high nor too low.

Do animals talk to one another?

No other creatures can talk a thousandth part as well as we do. But certainly many kinds of animals can talk to each other in their own way. You have heard a dog bark to warn of danger or to express joy or anger or loneliness. You have heard a mother robin cooing her young ones to try their wings and a calf telling its mother that it is hungry. Monkeys can make many different sounds that have different meanings.

The squeal of a pig, the neigh of a horse, the baa of a lamb, the trumpeting of an elephant, the moo of a cow, the bray of a donkey, all the sounds that animals make seem to express feeling to our ears. We know too that fear can spread among a group of animals and certainly the fear must be communicated at least in part by their cries.

Many insects can talk in their own way. This is especially true of those we call social insects, the ants and bees and wasps. We call them social because they live together in groups or societies. This they could not do if they had no way of talking. These insects have long feelers with which they can touch each other and make certain things understood.

Some programs allow more money for the second child than for the first, more for the third than the second and so on. Others specify an increase in allowance as the child grows older. All have one thing in common, the recognition that the family unit is vital to a society and must be maintained.

Canada's program, though comparatively new, was considered long before 1945 when

Canada is one of many countries (38 in 1958) which endorses with action the belief that families with children, especially young ones, should be aided financially.

Around the world various nations have established family aid programs ranging from schemes which provide funds for families with one child or more to plans which assist only families with eight or more children.

"BABY BONUS" — Now Sixteen Years Old  
A young mother walks into a supermarket with her two pre-school age children, selects several dollars worth of groceries from the shelves, goes to the check out counter and endorses a small strip of cardboard. The Family Allowances program has helped one more Canadian family.

Millions of times a year, in clothing shops, pharmacies, department stores, this scene is repeated.

The battle of freedom from want is fought on many fronts. A key weapon is, and must be, money. The means to house, clothe, feed and educate children in basic armament in this fight.

Each month more than 260,000 Canadian families, large and small, receive Family Allowances cheques. The rate is \$6 for children up to 10 years of age and \$8 for older children up to 16 years of age. The average family has whom allowances are paid.

This money is designed to assist in maintaining a healthy, happy living standard. Surveys have shown that the money, except in rare instances, is spent wisely. Many welfare and other authorities believe that one big reason for this is the fact that most cheques are made payable to the mother.

The program, now 16 years old, has earned widespread acceptance.

## SPRING FASHIONS NO CONCERN

Spring fashions don't change for millions of homeless and destitute people in overseas countries, they're happy to get all the out of style clothing they can. Getting it to them is the concern of the Overseas Relief Committee of the United Church of Canada which sends approximately 100 tons of old clothing per year to aid in European, Asian and African countries. In addition, tons of new blankets and cash goods totalling more than two million dollars have been distributed by the United Church since 1917.

At the moment, the Church's clothing depots in Vancouver & Toronto are in urgent need of supplies as a result of recent increased demands. The United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestinian Refugees, for example, has asked for 55,100 pounds of used clothing by December 31st of this year.

Clothing for men, women and children is needed in most countries, especially for children between five and fifteen years of age, according to Dr. Ernest E. Long, secretary of the General Council of the United Church, who returned recently from an inspection tour of distressed areas.

### PEACH GROWING IN ANNAPOLIS VALLEY

Before taking the plunge into peach growing in Nova Scotia it would be wise to study temperature records for several years past, even for the famed orchard areas of the Annapolis Valley.

Dr. A. D. Crowe of the federal research station at Kentville reports, on the basis of many studies of trial plantings and winter temperatures, that some points in the Valley are too cold for peaches.

In general, peach trees are injured by temperatures below 10 degree F. Temperatures as low as 15 degrees F. will kill the blossom bud and injure leaf buds, limbs and twigs. According to the temperature records at the Kentville station, peach trees have sustained moderate to severe damage in two out of every three winters in the last 48 years.

However, Dr. Crowe found that latitude, nearness to water, and especially elevation with air drainage considerably reduce the bad effects of low temperatures.

The peach orchard at the Research Station, for instance is on a slope above the location where temperatures are recorded and it is severely damaged in only one winter out of five.

In the Annapolis Basin, about 30 miles south of Kentville, the climate is milder because of the greater proportion of ocean water to land mass in the southwestern part of the province. The prevailing winds drifting from the Minas Basin to the land also exert a moderating influence on the land around that Basin.

Less generally recognized is the effect of elevation and air drainage. By mounting a temperature recording device on an automobile, Dr. Crowe was able to take recordings at different points in the Valley when lowest temperatures occurred.

In 1961, for example, he recorded a difference of 30 degrees between the Rockland Brook and Rockland school-house, separated by one and one half miles in distance and 250 feet in elevation. At the bottom of the hill it was 13 degrees below zero, enough to damage peaches, while at the school (about two thirds up South Mountain) the weather was actually mild.

These extreme differences do not occur unless the night is very calm, but records at RCAF Greenwood, show calm weather on all nights in which temperatures fell below 20 degrees F. since 1946 when records were started.

These studies suggest that the higher orchard areas suffer less frequent and less severe cold and that peach orchards on the floor of the Annapolis Cornwallis Valley run too much risk of low temperature damage to be a commercial proposition.

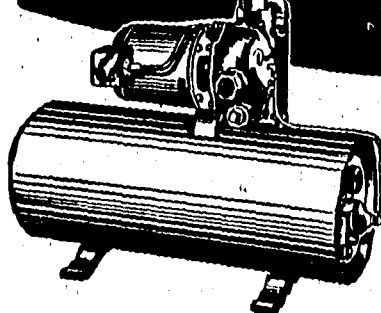

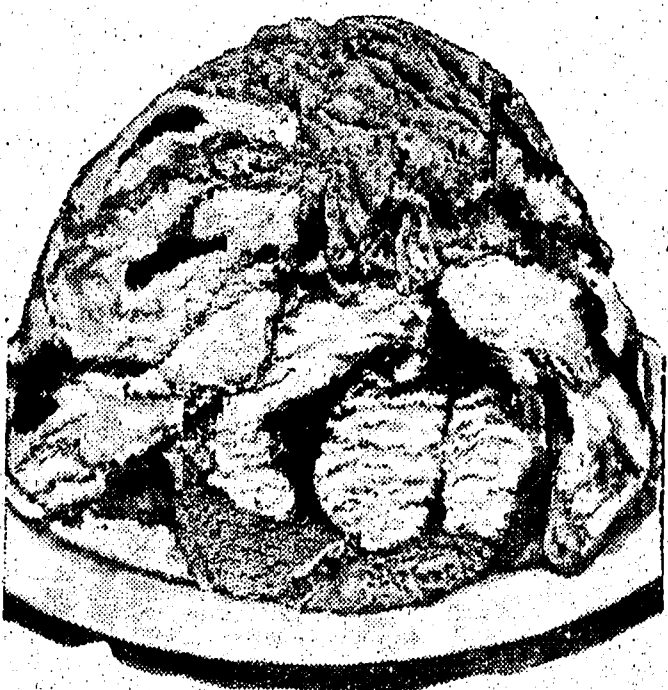

**HOSPITAL INSURANCE —  
PEACE OF MIND FOR

A house never got built. A  
promising teenager couldn't  
go to college. A long awaited  
holiday was never taken.

These were some of the cas-  
ualties of a by-gone era when  
heavy hospital expenses cou-

surance in 1958 ended this era  
for Canadians. Today, all ten  
provinces and two territories

The program was launched  
July 1, 1958 under the Hospi-  
tal Insurance and Diagnostic  
Services Act passed by par-  
liament in 1957. The Act en-  
abled the provinces and the  
federal government to make  
agreements and act jointly in  
programs.

The federal government, us-  
ing money from general re-  
venue funds pays about half  
of the provincial costs of the  
program across the country.  
In the fiscal year alone, \$270  
million has been set aside for  
this purpose by the federal  
government.

What do Canadian taxpay-  
ers get for this expenditure?  
Actually, a great deal.

The Act stipulates that the  
provinces must provide Cana-  
dians with in-patients ser-  
vices including accommodat-  
ion and meals, nursing ser-  
vices, diagnostic procedures  
such as x-ray and laboratory  
facilities, also drugs, operat-  
ing room and related services.

They are also covered for ra-  
diotherapy and physiotherapy,  
and entitled to the services of  
hospital personnel. All of  
these services come under the  
heading of in-patient services  
and do not differ from out-  
patient services except to the  
extent that the provinces cho-  
ose to implement them, since  
out-patient services are op-  
tional. Each province decides  
how far it wants to go in  
this field. So far the range of  
out patient services varies  
from province to province  
out - patient services varies  
ited emergency, or to fairly  
complete array of out-patient  
services.

Hospital insurance is avail-  
able to all residents of the  
province regardless of nation-  
ality, age, income or other cir-  
cumstances.

Tourists, people passing thr-  
ough, or visitors to provinces  
can't claim protection. But re-  
sidents can get services when  
visiting outside their home  
provinces, under stated cir-  
cumstances which vary from  
province to province.

Never before has this type  
of care been offered to Cana-  
dians on similar terms —  
either by voluntary, commer-  
cial or provincial agencies.

The hospital insurance as-  
sures everyone adequate heal-  
th protection all year round  
as well as peace of mind re-  
garding health problems and  
hospital expenses.

**SEAT BELTS**

Some drivers actually believe  
that they don't need the safe-  
ty of seat belts because they  
drive mostly in their own  
communities, rather than on  
long trips. But facts on file  
at the National Safety Coun-  
cil show that three out of  
four traffic deaths occur with-  
in 25 miles of home. The chan-

Bain Vantassel.

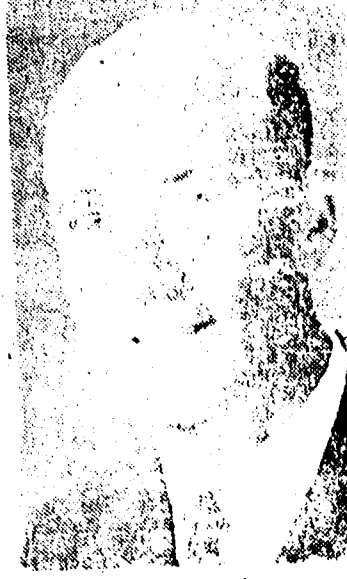

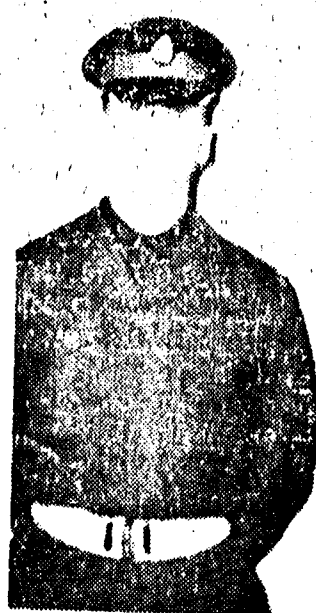

## Exhaust Fumes Damage Hedge

In the absence of the president, Mrs. Eva Wendell, the meeting was chaired by the vice-president, Mrs. H. M. Warne, who welcomed back the many non-resident members who join in the Society's summer activities.

Miss Louise Daley opened the program by showing beautiful colored slides of her garden taken during the different seasons of the year. Of special interest were the pictures of literally hundreds of birds, mostly Evening Grosbeaks, at the feeding station manned by Mr. Amaro. With the kind assistance of Mr. William MacLeod, operating the projector, a Kodak Information Film "Garden Notebook", on loan from the Canadian Kodak Company, was next on the program. For half an hour members were fascinated as one perfect bloom followed another on the screen.

Reports from the Committee Chairmen of the garden projects indicated that all work was progressing favorably with one exception. At the Cannon Bank exhaust fumes from parked cars had damaged the hedge and it was suggested this difficulty might be overcome by making the log barricade higher. The Annual Convention of Nova Scotia Association of Garden Clubs is scheduled for New Glasgow. Climaxing the summer activities for Digby Society will be the Annual Flower Show. Any amateur gardener or summer visitor who is a resident of Digby County is eligible to exhibit and compete.

## Gloucester Delegation To Digby



The Gloucester ferry delegation, which met with the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening, set forth many arguments in favor of Gloucester, Mass., as the terminus of a 2nd New England-Nova Scotia ferry service. The delegation, however, in no way committed itself to a choice of port on the Nova Scotia coast. In fact, Leo Dionne, chairman of the Gloucester Industrial Development Commission (2nd on right above), who was spokesman for the party, advocated that the five Nova Scotia towns which were seeking the ferry terminal should "pull together" so that there would be greater assurance that a ferry would come to a Nova Scotia port. A division of thought, he said, could result in no second ferry but a common goal could bring about a ferry service by which all would stand to benefit. The Gloucester delegation arrived in Digby from Halifax in the afternoon when members of the Digby Trade Board showed them, by motor trip, some of the scenic surroundings to the town and the waterfront. On their return they met with members of the Trade Board executive at a dinner at Champlain Motor Hotel, presided over by the Board president, Mrs. J. M. Wallis. His Worship, Mayor V. L. Bent, extended a welcome from the town. Warden Ronald Morehouse greeted the delegation on behalf of the Municipality of Digby, and a welcome was extended by V. G. Cardoza, M.L.A. Mr. Dionne responded.

A short business session of the general Board convened at 8 o'clock when the meeting was thrown open to discussion on a 2nd New England-Nova Scotia ferry service. Mr. Dionne said at the outset that he was convinced that the one and only logical terminal on the New England coast for the ferry was at Gloucester, Mass.

In introducing his subject Mr. Dionne said that they have set a goal of 1,000,000 tourists to Nova Scotia. More than 100,000 vacationers from all 50 States visit Gloucester now and many would welcome the opportunity to include a day-long ocean voyage to another country. More than 1,000,000 New England vacationers are of Gloucester, which is a perfect port for embarkation for Canada.

Mr. Dionne described Gloucester as a protected harbour with ships being able to reach the pier in less than 15 minutes from open sea. The ferry pier is less than 2500 feet from waterfront and port improvement an express highway, making a 45 minute route to Boston and 5 hours to New York.

In dealing with merchandise transportation he said that fifty percent of Canada's exports go to U.S.A. and 65% of her imports are from the U.S.A. He noted also the heavy concentration of population in the New England area. A second ferry for transportation of merchandise he intimated would be a help to the common market problem as U.S.A. and Nova Scotia already have a common market. Cold storage space in Gloucester is suited to such Canadian exports as frozen fish blocks exceed 52,000,000 lbs. capacity.

Mr. Hodgkins, in continuing the subject of merchandise transportation, mentioned that box instead of whole trailers would reduce freight transportation. Larger firms would have tractors on both sides of the water so that shipping could be done by trailer without tractor and thereby save space.

Mr. Spencer said that while the tourist trade is valuable and profitable it lasted only a few months so that to have a profitable venture a boat must carry cargo. He expected economic assistance on the State level if a second ferry was introduced so that Nova Scotia would not be carrying the whole ball.

Mr. Tartas said that a ferry terminal could well tie in with the Gloucester port development program where \$3,000,000 has been designated for

Facilities in Digby, estimated costs, tides and other conditions relevant to Digby were discussed. It was felt by the Digby Board that all the data in this regard should be gathered for presentation to proper authorities but in the meantime all effort should be pressed for a second ferry from a New England port to a Nova Scotia port.

Following the discussion the delegation retired when the following committee was set up by the Digby Board of Trade to be known as the Digby Port Committee - Vincent Snow, chairman; May or Vernon L. Bent; Warden Morehouse; Ralph McIntyre, vice-president of the Board; A. L. Robinson; V. G. Cardoza, M.L.A.; Keith Potter Plympton; Edward Twohig and Mrs. J. M. Wallis (ex-officio). By regular motion this committee combined the previous Eastport, Maine, committee and the Gloucester committee with power to add. At a meeting of the committee following the adjournment of the regular meeting of the Board, it was decided that each member of the committee would gather pertinent information concerning the Digby port to submit at the next committee meeting scheduled for July 17 at the Town Hall.

On Wednesday morning the Gloucester delegation left for Lunenburg. They will also visit Liverpool, Shelburne and Yarmouth, before returning to Gloucester.

A number of faithful Wardens have played an important part in the work and life of All Saints and the present Warden is Wilfred Robbins. Mrs. Oswald Mullen has been organist for some years having replaced Mrs. Wilfred Robbins, who had played in the church for many years.

The service on Sunday afternoon will be conducted by the Rector of Trinity Church, assisted by the Senior and Junior Choirs of Trinity Church, Digby.

A welcome will be given to the people of Digby Neck and elsewhere who wish to come join in the service, which will be one of thanksgiving for the past and dedication for the future.

When ferryman David Outhouse and his son, Tony, went out on the Bay of Fundy fishing, they landed more than the usual catch. A dog, Pal, had given up trying to swim the half-mile-wide Petite Passage. Young Tony spotted the struggling pup first, half-way between Boars Head and East Ferry. Pal was having a hard time in the whirls caused by the tide's eddy, and seemed tired out.

"It appeared I had got myself a dog from then on," chuckled Mr. Outhouse. "We took her home and fed her and she seemed to know I had saved her life because she wouldn't leave me... followed me everywhere."

But after making phone calls and inquiries, Mr. Outhouse took Pal aboard his ferry boat - and a young boy on the wharf told him the name of the owner.

It turned out that Pal, a Somoya, had never left her home at East Ferry before. But it's thought she followed owner Harold Theriault and his son before they boarded a dragger for a day's fishing. She was probably in the water over two hours.

Pal was sent home in a truck - hours before her master learned about her battle with the Bay of Fundy.

## Observes 145th Anniversary

On Sunday, at 3:00 p.m., All Saints' Church, Rossby, will celebrate its 145th anniversary.

This church was the first place of worship on Digby Neck, having been built in 1817, when Dean Bullock was Rector. It was Dean Bullock who wrote the well known hymn, "We love the place O God."

Among the many interesting things about the past history of this old church is that Archbishop MacKenley began his ministry as a student at All Saints'. As an ordained clergyman, the future Archbishop became a Deacon in charge of the church at Rossby. Later in his ministry, he administered the Sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, and as Bishop, Confirmation.

Many beautiful memorials have been placed in the old church. Among them is a Font dedicated in memory of a former Rector of Trinity Parish, the Rev. Mr. Driffield, and the beautiful oak Altar in memory of the Budd family, who were faithful parishioners. Other memorial gifts are the Prayer Desk, Altar Rails and Lectern.

Down through the years many divinity students, who later were ordained to the ministry, took services in All Saints', as well as Mr. Victor G. Cardoza, who as Lay Reader or took the services for many years. Mr. Cardoza is still very active in the parish and at present in a Parish Lay Reader and one of the Parish Wardens of Trinity Parish to which All Saints' now belongs.

Besides Dean Bullock and Archbishop MacKenley, the Revs. Ambrose, Merkel, Harley, Driffield, Gabriel, Caldwell, and MacLean, have been Rectors of All Saints'. The present Rector is the Rev. James Pike, Rector of Trinity Parish.

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## Best Teenage Driver In Canada



George R. Holdsworth, 19-year-old Digby native, was named winner of the week-long Canadian Teenage Safe Driving Road-o, Victoria, B.C. George, a grade 11 student at the Digby Regional High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald K. Holdsworth, won a \$1,250 university scholarship by lettering twelve other contestants.

The winner was met Wednesday by representatives of Digby Lions Club, civic officials, and representatives of other Digby organizations when he disembarked from the Princess Helene and was escorted through town by a motorcade.

Wednesday night he was guest of honour at a supper meeting of the Digby Lions Club, the organization which sponsored the Safe Driving Road-o in Digby earlier this spring. This placed him in position to win the June Atlantic Provinces competition in New Glasgow.

George scored 1,202 points out of a possible 1,500. The twelve contestants were chosen from among 30,000 teenage drivers who participated in 250 local and provincial competitions across Canada during the past several months.

Wallis tells The Courier that he has a painting of the ship and that a book published by the Yarmouth Herald on Yarmouth ships gives details of what happened to the Equator.

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## About This and That What Is Your Point Of View?

Early this year the Digby Board of Trade took up the idea of a road through from near Digby to Shelburne on the South Shore. No specific action was taken other than to appoint a committee to study the idea. This week we heard, not through the Trade Board but from a member outside that it was his idea that Digby would be better off advocating an express way through the valley from Halifax. We like to hear different points of view and think that besides the press there is no other place better than a Board of Trade to give expression to any views. Here is a good place to discuss the merits of each viewpoint and take action on the best.

If the Digby Board of Trade accomplishes nothing, more it can, at least, be a sounding board for ideas whether at meetings or among its members on the outside. Who is there who would dare say this isn't good? It shows people are thinking. A meeting which moves, seconds and passes immediately every idea brought before it does not always show signs of clear thinking. Suggestions must be discussed and studied. Maybe the suggestions are good in themselves but are not the best that could be brought forth. Other points can be submitted not for the sake of putting a damper on previous ideas or for the sole purpose of argument, but for the purpose of information and seeing the other side possibly through the eyes of others.

The idea was only one man's point of view but a valley express way vs. a Shelburne Road (or other roads) — makes a good argument. Consider the advantages, consider population, and consider the cost. Then, tell us, or the Digby Board of Trade, your point of view.

## Keep The Sabbath Holy

With summer, open roads and cottage time having arrived, more and more the attendance at church dwindles and more and more the day is given over to sport and commercialism. Truly, there are laws which protect the Sabbath but as Msgr. George W. Casey wrote in the Driftwood column of The Casket, the weekly paper at Antigonish, we cannot rely on legislature to do the whole job. The warning given by Msgr. Casey is one which could be heeded by all. Msgr. Casey writes —

"Those of us who believe in God and worship and who want a real Sabbath cannot rely on the legislature to do the whole job for us. It can repeal the invasion of commercialism but it cannot keep the day holy.

That is the job of believers and far too many are not doing it. There are no end of professed believers, nominal Catholics, Protestants and Jews, whose Sabbath is spiritually no different than any other day in the week, whose Sabbath is no different indeed from that of a stark atheist. They tumble out of bed into old clothes or sports stuff and hang around the backyard or the beach all day, or go out and clog up the highways. They do not turn their minds towards God for a single instant nor utter a syllable of prayer, let alone go to church. Their Sunday — in the case of Jews, their Saturday — has no character, no quality, no religious flavor whatever, no formality, no distinction and nothing of the sacred about it.

They are the ones who are undermining the Sabbath. If they gave evidence that for them it was really a different sort of day, with a special quality that must not be desecrated, then no commercial interest would dare offend it. Sunday would not need the constant vigilance of the civil law to protect it.

True enough those who idle around every Sunday without ever darkening the door of a church from one year's end to another serve the concept of the one day of rest in every seven. And history has proven this institution to be a social and a sociological necessity. But why worry about protecting the one day of rest in our American society when we already have two days of rest and automation is, prompting organized labor to ask for another?

What challenge is there for the churches to rally to the defense of a day, if it suffers the loss of its original character? Or why should we pray for stern laws to forbid impious activity on a day that has no piety in it?

Our first job, then, is to restore vitality to Sunday as a day of worship, to emphasize its religious rather than its recreational content. As such, it will call out the crusading spirit much more, in a society that is having much more rest than it ever had before, and somewhat less religious.

And the ones that can help out most towards this happy end are the believers — at least they who profess to believe — who are not now going to church and who never offer formal worship to God; those who hope to practice religion vicariously, by sending their children, those who want churches to keep going but never support them; those who deplore the atheism of communism and who very much want a religious framework for society but who ignore God as a person and leave religion out of their daily lives completely.

The crumbling of Sunday in modern society should be a warning to them that religion can fade out of the entire fabric of society as it has faded — to an alarming degree — out of its own special day. The unchurched majority of Americans who yet do not deny God should get back to their churches, not only to save Sunday, or the Sabbath if you will, but in order to save the religious quality of their society. They have got to show all who would lay hands on both, that the day has meaning, that worship is a prime human instinct and need and that religion is of the essence of the society they want for themselves.

A 'common day of rest' is a necessary for the health of human society but a 'Lord's Day', a church-connected, worship-centered day each week, is a bastion of religion. It's going could open a breach that may never be closed in this world. The third commandment is double-barreled, it enjoins us not only to keep the Sabbath but to keep it holy."

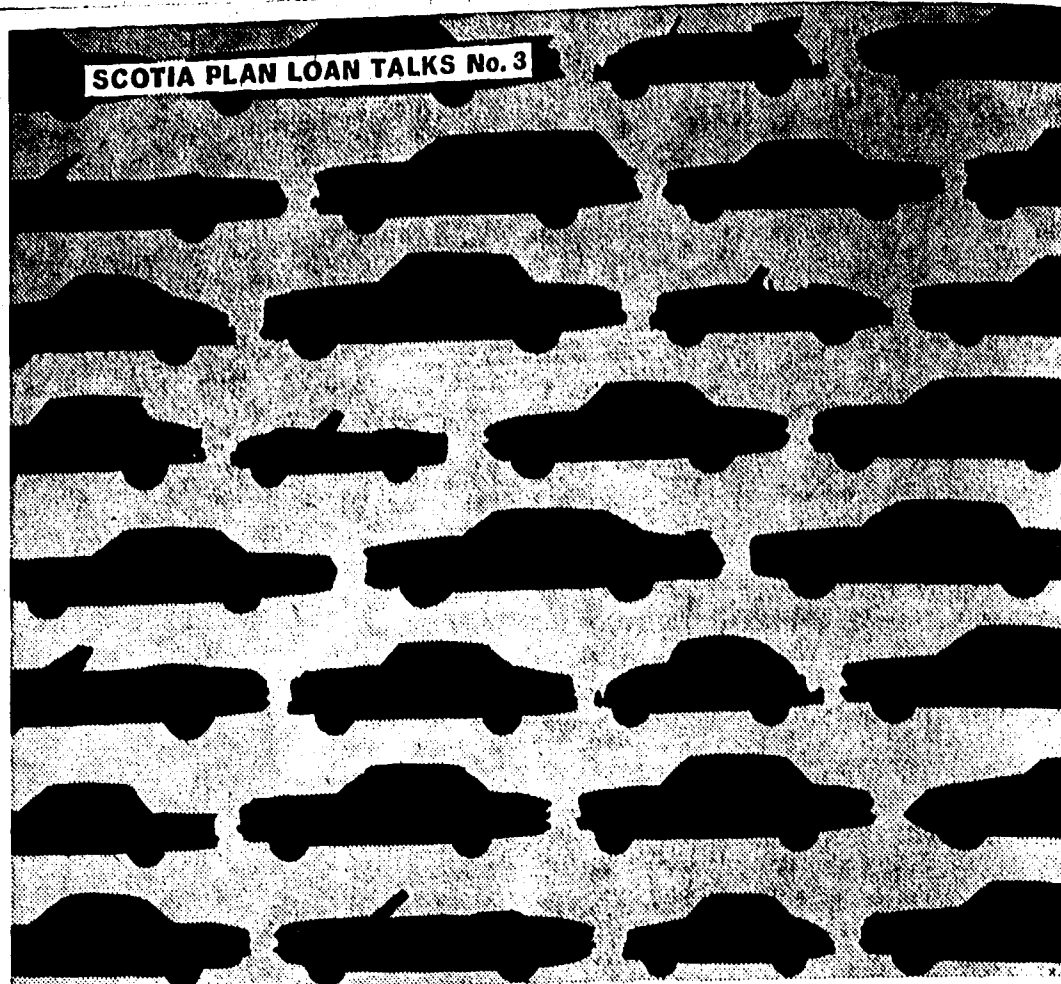

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## Women's Corner

Rather than disappoint the women who were making scrap books from the recipes and who looked forward to the recipes and this column, we shall endeavour to carry it on. Actually, we'd appreciate any contribution which other women wish to make in ideas for women in the home on in general, in cooking or wearing apparel. Sometimes women come across a good idea which they wish to share. This could turn into an exchange of ideas column. How about it?

Anyway, the editor in chief of The Courier has a recipe or two she would like to pass along this morning. It happened like this, "Wheat" and Chet Murley sent the editor a nice bag of leaf lettuce from their garden last week (it happens each year). Then while shopping at a local grocery store (after having bought a bottle of sweet cream for strawberries) the editor heard the clerk say, "We have no more sweet cream, there are three bottles which have turned sour." We think the clerk must have thought we had flipped our lids, when with an excited inflection we asked, "Oh, may I buy the sour cream?" We assured her we had not gone crazy and that we had been given this nice bunch of lettuce and we needed the sour cream for it. Of course we had to explain how we used it. (And by the way, some people like sour cream better than sweet cream for strawberries). So to give you the recipe we shall copy the one submitted to the Dutch Oven cook book by Catherine (Mrs. J. A.) M. Creighton, Lunenburg.

DRIVE CAREFULLY

### Lettuce and Sour Cream Salad

Wash 1 bunch of leaf lettuce and cut in thick shreds with scissors. Make a dressing of 3 tbsp. Vinegar  
1/2 cup sugar (scant)  
1/2 cup sour cream  
Mix well and pour over the lettuce. Mix slightly. Here again more or less sugar and vinegar may be added to suit individual taste.

Sounds queer you say? Just try it with any dinner for a side dish. Tastes grand with a nice salt fish and potatoes dinner or steak, pork etc. We recall the days when if you were told you were having "salad" on the menu with dinner that no thought was given to Tossed Salad or any other name a salad was "salad" as above.

Then while we are handing out recipes with sour cream, let us have a similar one, again by Mrs. Creighton in the Dutch Oven.

### Cumber Salad

Peel 3 medium sized cucumbers. Sliced very thin and cover with 1 tsp. salt. Press with heavy weight for two hours. One small onion (cut fine) if desired may be added to the cucumber before pressing. Drain liquid from cucumbers. Add 4 tbsp. cider vinegar, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 3/4 cup thick sour cream. Mix well with the drained cucumbers. Tastes differ, so more sugar and vinegar may be added to suit taste. Recipe will serve 8-10.

## Savary Property Camp Site

One of the objectives of the Nova Scotia Department of Lands and Forests is to have roadside parks at intervals of 25 to 40 miles along main highways in the province.

Hon. E. D. Haliburton, Minister of Lands and Forests, said the department's parks division has a master plan that includes the location and proposed location of approximately 55 roadside parks, 35 picnic parks and 18 camping sites.

Three types of parks are included in the new policy of the department. They are: camping sites, with an acreage of 4 to 100 acres or more, part of which must be wooded; picnic sites, 10 acres or more, and roadside parks or smaller sites adjacent to highways replacing the so-called "picnic tables". One of the camp sites is to be located on the Savary property at Joggin Bridge, near Digby, and two of the picnic parks will be at Upper Clements and Meteghan.

The department's parks division already has begun to relocate picnic tables, as part of this plan, said Mr. Haliburton.

"The number of picnic table sites is being reduced, but the number of tables that will be available on each of the new sites, to be known as roadside parks, will be increased."

Mr. Haliburton said that these new sites will be developed into small roadside parks where water and sanitary facilities will be provided.

This would enable a standard of cleanliness and sanitation to be maintained by department personnel.

## Captain Parry Passes

Captain George Radcliffe Parry, RD, RNR, retired general superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Lines and former Commodore of the CPS Flagship Empress of Britain, died at the Digby General Hospital, Monday, after a lengthy illness.

During the Second World War Captain Parry served as deputy minister of transport with the British government. Born in Beaver River, Yarmouth County, in 1884, Captain Parry was a son of Horatio and Gertrude Iola (Saunders) Parry of that place. He first went to sea at 16 as an apprentice to the master of a sailing ship.

In 1911 he joined the Canadian Pacific Service as fifth officer of the Empress of Ireland. In 1912 he was promoted to fourth officer of the Empress of Britain and became third officer later that year.

At the outbreak of the First World War he was recommended by the Earl of Athlone as an officer for the Royal Navy and went to gunnery school at Whale Island where his marksmanship records have never been bettered. During the Battle of Jutland he was in charge of the after guns of HMS Vanguard. He later was promoted to command a group of destroyers and was also working on an attempt to salvage HMS Hampshire in which the famed Lord Kitchener was lost.

At the close of the war he was in charge of a flotilla of minesweepers whose task was to clear German mines from the fjords and waterways of the coast of Norway.

He returned to the Canadian Pacific Service after the war and in 1920 was second officer of the Prinz Friedrich Wilhelm. In 1921 he was promoted to first officer of the Empress of India and became chief officer of the Empress of France in December, 1922.

In 1930 Captain Parry was appointed marine superintendent at Glasgow and spent the next three years ashore at various posts in Great Britain. His first command was the fast freighter Beaverhill, in 1933, and subsequent vessels under his command have been the Melita, Duchess of York and Duchess of Bedford. He relinquished permanent command of the Bedford to take over the Empress of Britain and become Commodore of the CPS fleet in 1936.

In 1937 he was appointed general superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Lines and with the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939 his services were requested by the British war department as a deputy minister of transport.

## Channel 6 Sometime Soon

Contrary to popular belief Digby's Channel 6 will go on the air ... sometime. This is the latest word from the CJCH crew working at the tower site in Bay View.

It seems that getting a broadcasting licence is a long, complicated process. At their May 29 sitting in Ottawa the Board of Broadcast Governors gave approval for CJCH-TV rebroadcasting stations at Digby, on channel 6, and Amherst, on channel 8. Their approval, however, was in the form of a recommendation to the Department of Transport, which has the job of issuing the licence.

It was learned Friday that D.O.T. has issued the licence, but before things become final, the document must bear the signatures of five cabinet ministers. To make procedure still more complicated these ministers must be gathered in a body at the time of actual signing.

To quote one member of the CJCH team, when asked when they would be on the air — "Your guess is as good as mine! It could be tonight, it could be a month from tonight. But within minutes from the time we receive the signed documents we can be on the air."

This colorful ceremony, of forty minutes duration, is often presented as a separate attraction.

## Weather Bad For Tourist Trade

Valley hotel and motel owners are feeling the bite of an unusually wet summer, and fear a worsening of the situation. In this area two motels reported costly losses.

In the Annapolis Valley and Digby County the Paramount Hotel, in Wolfville, and the Mid Valley Motel, in Middleton, said business was poorer. The Paramount claimed to be 25% behind June and July of last year. However, business at the Royal Anne Motel, in Annapolis Royal, Harbor View Lodge, in Sandy Cove, and The Digby Pines, in Digby, was better.

The most prevalent complaint was that tourists were becoming discouraged by the weather and leaving ahead of schedule. Traffic figures showed as many cars entering Nova Scotia this June as last — the number was down .001% — but motel owners said many were leaving as soon as they got a sample of the weather.

During June this year the sun shone only 35% of the possible time and the average temperature was one degree below normal. July has had two weeks of rain, cold and fog.

## Weather Outlook 40 Days Of Rain?

An ancient legend says that July 15, St. Swithin's Day, determines the weather forecast for the next 40 days. There is little to look forward to. The area was blanketed with fog and rain on Sunday.

According to the legend, there is a superstition dating from the 9th century regarding the burial of the patron Saint of Winchester, Cathedral.

Monks attempting to remove the saint's body, and bury it inside the Cathedral, were prevented from carrying out their task by 40 days duration of rainy weather. St. Swithin's Day if it doth rain,

For forty days it will remain; St. Swithin's Day if it be fair, For forty days 'twill rain na mair.

## Number Of Entering Cars Fewer

In June this year there was an increase of Canadian traffic of 425 cars through Caribou, Digby, North Sydney, and a decrease of 498 cars at Amherst and Yarmouth. Hon. E. A. Manson, Minister of Trade and Industry for Nova Scotia, said the total this year for June was 24,753. June's total last year was 25,128, a difference of 375. Mr. Manson said there were 73 fewer Canadian cars and 302 fewer United States and other foreign cars in June of this year as compared with the corresponding month of 1961.

United States and other foreign traffic in June 1961 totalled 6,062, and June 1962 5,760, a decrease of 302 or 4.5 percent. Cars from the United States and other countries showed a decrease of 348 cars at Amherst, Digby and Yarmouth, and an increase of 46 cars at Caribou.

Mr. Manson pointed out that the number of New Brunswick cars entering Nova Scotia this year is 266 fewer than in 1961.

## Sport Fishing Craft In Port

A 40 foot Cape Island craft, Cape Glooscap, under command of Capt. Raymond Wilkie, Bridgewater, was in port last week for the benefit of those interested in salt water angling.

The boat, one from the Department of Trade & Industry, is set up as an example of a well equipped sport fishing craft meeting requirements as set down by the department. The boat was fitted by regulation for carrying passengers and included life saving and fire equipment. Only after these requirements are met is a certificate for operation issued.

The Cape Glooscap has visited ports from Baddeck, Cape Breton, to the western part of the province and the South Shore district.

About thirty visited the craft in Digby.

The cost to a commercial fisherman who wishes to equip his craft as the Cape Glooscap for tourist trade and starting from scratch would be between \$350 and \$400. This price would include the necessary safety and fire-fighting equipment, a toilet, a raft and a number of rods and lures. Fishermen interested in equipping boats for sport fishing are eligible for assistance from the fisheries loan board, it is understood.

The Cape Glooscap, registered in Weymouth, N. S., is an eight year old boat.

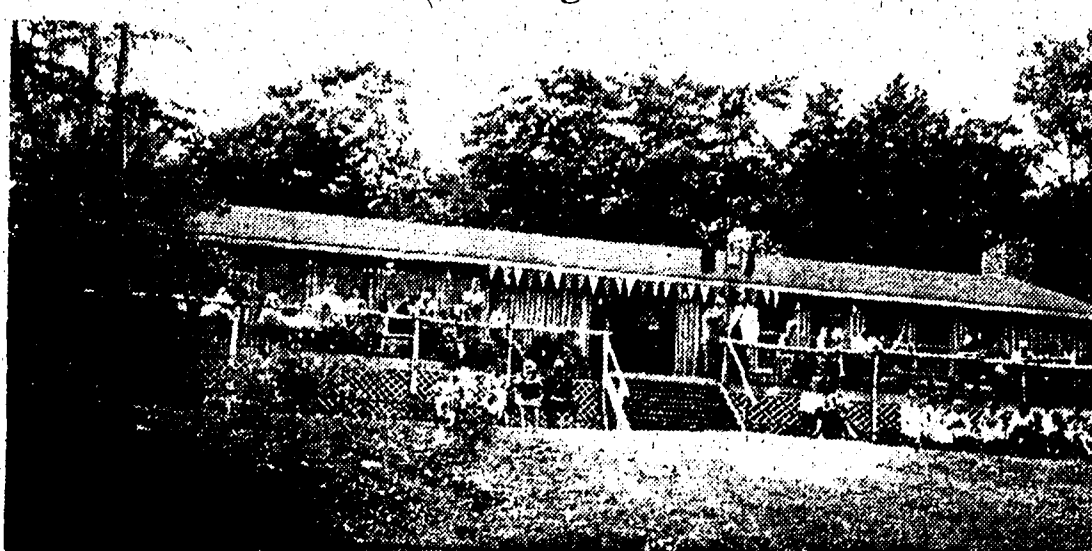

## About This and That A Difficult Situation

As noted by the news columns last week a committee from the Digby Board of Trade was formed known as the Port of Digby committee. Their immediate duty, it would seem from reports, is to gather data which might convince authorities that Digby is the most logical port for the terminus of a 2nd New England-Nova Scotia ferry service if one is established. Other than that, a decision as to a port must be left to higher authority — that decision to be based on the merits of the port, it is felt.

Under the circumstances it would seem that is a sensible way of handling the situation. Five Nova Scotia ports have bid for the favor of the ferry terminus should a ferry be established between Gloucester, Mass., and Nova Scotia. Other U.S.A. ports (one in particular) have been looking toward a ferry service to Nova Scotia, but the five-Nova Scotia town bid is inclined toward the proposed Gloucester, Mass., ferry.

A delegation of six very fine and reasonable men came from Gloucester, Mass., to look into the ferry situation. They are most anxious that a ferry be established or they certainly would not have made the trip or would not have done so much preliminary planning and consulting. One thing however, is fixed in their minds — Gloucester and only Gloucester is to be considered as the port in the U.S.A. They are not working for "A" ferry to come out of U.S.A. whether that port be Eastport, Bar Harbor, Portland, Boston or any other port. Their mission is a ferry out of Gloucester, Mass., and their brochure points out definitely why Gloucester should be the port. They visited Halifax (to see the premier and others), Lunenburg, Liverpool, Shelburne, Yarmouth and Digby with seemingly no choice as to where the ferry should dock in Nova Scotia. And why should they have a choice? Their concern is the American port and they are definite on that port — it is Gloucester.

Here in Nova Scotia the story is a bit different. Five points are bidding for the favour. This in itself is indication that Western Nova Scotia wants a ferry service. We feel Western Nova Scotia is united on that score by the very fact that so many towns want the proposed ferry terminus. We doubt if anyone could think, for instance, that Shelburne would rather see no ferry than not to have the ferry come to that town. The same applies for Digby, Yarmouth, Liverpool, Lunenburg. But the question still remains — will it be one of these or some other?

It is a difficult situation but not one which can't be solved. It is up to the towns involved to lay their cards on the table and let each be judged on need and merit. We think Digby has taken the only course reasonable. The other towns involved will likely do the same. We do not think there will be any bickering. But somebody must decide if the matter comes to a deciding point and those who decide must have information on which to make their decision.

Events, so far, we feel, indicate that Western Nova Scotia wants a ferry. We are not looking for arguments but if Digby merits the terminus, then why not Digby? The same applies to the other towns concerned.

## A Special Gift

We noted with interest the letter in this newspaper last week from Rev. Claude Olmstead in which he deservingly complimented Warren Wong for his good meals and special courteousness at the Cornwallis Café. Mr. and Mrs. Olmstead claimed that this was better advertising than all the money that can be spent on advertising in the interest of the tourist business.

We agree with the Olmsteads and feel many can take a leaf out of Warren Wong's note book when it comes to making people feel at home and for being able to entice people to return to his place of business. We agree with the Olmsteads that this is better advertising than all the money that can be spent on advertising in the interest of the tourist business; but we go one further. We would say that good advertising and good courteous service go hand in hand for the benefit of the tourist business. People must first of all be brought into the country or particular area by advertising. They can then be brought back and enticed to stay by the treatment of satisfaction plus which they get. And, of course, the satisfied tourist, too, will spread the good word and other tourists will follow to a certain extent. We cannot discount, however, the advertising worth by the usual means.

We must realize that much good advertising is often counteracted by discourteousness or downright misleading. The advertising good of a store keeper can be undone when one customer finds the goods advertised does not fit the description given. Or, one discourteous clerk can undo all advertising value. The same thing could happen when the government, some other group or private concern advertises to bring tourists to the country. The advertising brings the tourist but it is then up to the people, the proprietors of business and their staffs to show friendliness and courtesy in order to help keep the tourists here and have them make return trips. We must have the goods in exchange for the money the tourist leaves — that goods includes good food, comfortable sleeping quarters, entertainment, kindness and courteousness.

There was one particular sentence in Mr. Olmstead's letter. Referring to Warren, he said, "He recognized us and called us by name." While other restaurants and business houses in Digby might also show courtesies there is one special gift which has been endowed on Warren that has not been given to most of us. Once Warren has met someone, he rarely ever forgets the face or name. Warren has been admired time and time again for this asset. It is an asset advantageous to any business. It is an asset with which not every one is endowed as is Warren. It is an asset which many others earnestly wish they could possess or acquire. It seems to be a special gift.



### Serve Fresh Vegetables Every Day

Nova Scotia Farm News usually comes up with good ideas to benefit home and farm. We note that they are reminding us this week to serve fresh vegetables. They suggest salads and get the idea from the Canadian Horticultural Council which is conducting its 12th annual salad promotional campaign.

The Farm News says "Canada's food guide recommends that, in addition to a daily serving of potatoes, we eat two servings of other vegetables -- preferably yellow or green ones. What better way to consume such vegetables than in a tasty and eye appealing salad!

Fresh vegetables are easy to prepare and cook, and are so good to eat since they form such excellent sources of minerals and vitamins. Actually, the summer season, which is the time for fresh vegetables, is all too short, so we should enjoy them while we can. This, we can do by serving several kinds every day."

Then, we expect strawberries will still be in season by the time The Digby Courier comes out on Thursday. The weather has not been so good for strawberries, i.e., the weather has not been good for ripening, we understand, although there have been some beautiful berries on the market this year. We have seen a good many but the

only ones we have been able to pin-point were those from the farm of H. M. Warner. We happened to be at a dinner when these berries were served. Were they ever delicious? Yum, Yum! But there have been strawberry growers who have told us that the wet weather prevented picking and there would be a surplus at the end of the season. Never can tell. You might pick some up quite low in price for jam. With that in mind we give you what look to be excellent strawberry jam recipes. We hope you can use them and like them.

**Strawberry Jam**  
Yield: About 10 medium glasses (5 lbs. jam)  
3 1/2 cups prepared fruit (about 2 quarts ripe strawberries)  
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar  
1/2 cup lemon juice (2 lemons)  
1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin  
First, prepare the fruit. Crush completely, one layer at a time, about 2 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Measure 3 1/2 cups into a very large saucepan. Squeeze the juice from 2 medium-sized lemons. Measure 1/2 cup into saucepan with fruit.

Then make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin.

**Pineapple, Rhubarb and Strawberry Jam**  
Yield: About 7 medium glasses (3 1/2 lbs. jam)  
4 cups prepared fruit (1 ripe pineapple, about 1/2 lb. rhubarb, and 1 pint ripe strawberries)  
5 cups (2 1/2 lbs.) sugar  
1 box (1 1/2 oz.) powdered fruit pectin

First, prepare the fruit. Pare 1 fully ripe small pineapple. Chop very fine or grind. Slice thin or chop (do not peel) about 1/2 pound rhubarb. Crush thoroughly about 1 pint fully ripe strawberries. Combine fruits and measure 4 cups into a large saucepan.

Then make the jam. Measure sugar and set aside. Add powdered fruit pectin to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by

## Granville Bridge Dismantled

After three days of dynamiting, cutting with acetylene torches and the powerful pulling force of bulldozers, the first of four leaning spans of the Annapolis Royal-Granville bridge finally collapsed Monday.

Highway department crews began dismantling the bridge Friday by blasting it with two charges of dynamite. One of the blasts hurled a small piece of steel from the span through the side of an unoccupied house trailer 1,500 feet away. The trailer's owner, Max Feener, of Annapolis Royal, discovered the steel splinter in a washing machine.

Saturday three more blasts were set off. The span wedged itself between the shore and the first pier. Monday it was attacked with torches, bulldozers and four light charges of dynamite before it fell.

Highway officials say as much of the bridge will be salvaged as possible and sold for scrap. Probably the first span on the Annapolis side of the river and the standing spans on the Granville side can be almost completely salvaged. The iron from the middle span can be salvaged down to the asphalt road bed, which will be left in the river. They said the job may take three months.

The first span collapsed in June 1960 when the slow closing of a gap in the causeway above the bridge increased the water's current against one of the piers from 8 to 16 knots when the tide was going out. The other four fell during a wind storm last October.

Frequently we hear such an expression when a tourist is delighted with our scenery. And then think of all the good advertising which the camera can do for us. To this public relations man we could only say "We're glad you didn't have your camera." We could see that the pictures he would have taken would have been far from good advertising and most remote from good public relations.

The public relations man and his party were going to spend only a few days around here so they thought they'd take in a dance or some amusement. Excellent way to learn about our people, to know the habits and customs of our population, in other words an excellent way to meet the people and get acquainted. What we heard about the place they happened upon would be far from good publicity for Digby or its vicinity. And how would we be able to spread the word "Digby really isn't like that, don't judge us by a few." Drunkenness, fights and all the accompanying misery are not the usual camera opportunities for our visitors. Gave us an idea though. Instead of being ashamed to have visitors see the worst, it might be wise to import a few such visitors and plant them at the places that are rumoured for boot-legging and drunken fights. At least, we'd know if the rumors are true and then a little cleaning up could be done.

"What a shame for those young sailors", said our public relations man. "They are only teenagers", he said, "but then, where can they go? what is there for them to do?" We might say that our new bowling alleys might help in that respect. The boys do need some decent place "off the base" for recreation and to meet people. There are some well run dances and recreation places around. Sorry, the public relations man got in at the wrong spot. Or did he? Maybe it is to our benefit that he happened where he did.

## Serve Fish, Eat Fish

We drove through a village between Bridgewater and Mahone Bay this past weekend and blazng outside the small but attractive eating house were these few words only (other than the name of the business) — Scallops and Chips. For a minute we wondered if we were back in Digby and then the thought occurred to us — Digby has been known as the scallop country for a long time yet never have we seen a small business like an eating house, even during the summer months, especially featuring scallops. Folders have gone out saying "where the scallop is King", yet few have capitalized on the slogan. Your answer to the riddle is as good as ours.

And since we are mentioning fish let us recall a quote we repeated before — "We can eat our way out of the fish problems." Right now fish seems to be the most economical on the menu for the family dinner. Besides, if we can listen to what we hear and read, we might live longer by eating fish. We recall reading from an address by Dr. J. L. Kash, Ottawa, to a Fisheries Council meeting, some interesting observations regarding fish and fish products. They were that

"Fish possess some rather important and essential constituents for human nutrition which only a few other edible products contain.

"Fish possess some therapeutic qualities that are only now becoming understood and which are still being actively explored and may prove to be unique in the prolongation of human life and health.

"Fish contains some of all of the essential nutrients but its protein, its fats and its vitamins have some characteristics that are shared by few foods of comparable availability and cost.

"Fish oils or fats contain generous portions of what chemists and nutritionists call "unsaturated" fatty acids — it is this highly unsaturated nature of most fish oils that keeps them liquid — and helps to keep fatty injurious particles from forming in the blood serum and becoming lodged in the walls of the blood vessels. This factor is very important to people who have a tendency to hardening and narrowing of the arteries which leads to cardio-vascular trouble, which in turn is the cause of one-half the deaths of all adults in North America and two-thirds of our adult males.

"If we include in our diet a reasonable amount of fish oils, their characteristic types of unsaturated fatty acids are said to inhibit cholesterol formation in the blood serum and even to encourage lessening of its amounts in the blood and on the artery walls. This is a very important therapeutic property and gives further reason for rating fish high in the human diet."

## Belt-Tightening

When your family finds it has been living beyond its income too long and can no longer buy things on credit, it must tighten its belt and perhaps switch from porterhouse steak to hamburger.

And when the businessman discovers that for the same reason he can't get anyone to put money into his firm, he has to take steps to put his operations in order.

To some degree this is what happened to Canada's economy and it's the reason for the austerity measures announced by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

As a nation we have been living beyond our means and it has finally caught up with us. The national belt-tightening is a little more complicated than for the spendthrift family but it's basically similar.

The federal government has been spending more than it has received in taxes and other revenue for several years. It had to borrow millions of dollars each year to make up the difference.

Our national production has been rising each year but the rate hasn't been great enough to produce sufficient tax money to keep up with the increasing cost of government. If you've been spending more than you have been

earning and if your salary doesn't go up as fast as you had expected, you must cut down. That's what the government is doing in paring \$250,000,000 from its spending this year.

Another way to help balance the budget is to stay home rather than go downtown shopping for things you don't really need. This has its application in our growing fondness for travel abroad.

The value of goods we'll be allowed to bring back duty-free from trips to other countries is being cut. This means we'll probably spend less on these trips or perhaps not go at all. The government hopes things will reach the point where we'll get more from visiting tourists than we spend on travel to other countries.

This, along with higher duties on all but essential goods that we import from other countries, should mean fewer dollars leaving Canada.

The outward flow of those dollars is one reason our currency already devalued and pegged at 92½ cents in terms of U.S. funds, has been under downward pressure. By cutting the flow, it should be easier to keep the dollar where it is pegged.

Our dollar was once in great demand by foreign investors who wanted it in order to invest elsewhere instead of here. Along the way they began investing elsewhere instead. Now we've raised our interest rates to make Canada more attractive to those investors.

Canada is doing what the businessman does when he offers prospective investors a better deal and demonstrates that he's trying to put his operations on a sound basis. The difference is that we're now doing it on an international scale. (The Red River Echo)

The feu-de-jole (huge bonfire) will be set afire at 10:30 around which groups will gather to sing French folksongs. This has attracted a large attendance and is also very popular.

Sunday, August 12, will see the annual festival parade starting from St. Bernard Consolidated School and winding its way through the various villages and ending on the campus grounds at St. Ann's College, at Church Point. Les Dames Patronesses de Clare, who are interested in the summer camp for boys at Victors Lake, in Concession, under the guidance of Rev. Lantegne of St. Ann's College, will organize a bazaar in the afternoon of the parade on the college grounds. A well known band will also be in attendance, which should assist to make this day a very interesting one.

Monday, August 13, is reserved for a field and track day at the Clare District High School at Meteghan River for the Youth Organization of Clare. The field and track meet will be held in the evening commencing at 6:30 p.m., with various youth movement groups participating in competition. This is the first such affair held during the festival and will assist in rounding out the program.

Tuesday, August 14th, will see the annual festival banquet held at St. Ann's College dining room, with the famous French dish, la pate-a-la-rapure, as the piece-de-resistance.

Wednesday, August 15th, will see religious services in all the churches of Clare being held. This will end this year's Acadian Festival.

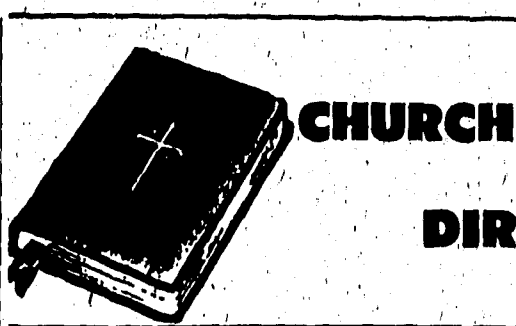
How much the Acadian Festival is attracting tourists to Clare is difficult to estimate but it is known that the festival has made this corner of the province known to many thousands of people. It has been noted that more cars with the Quebec provincial license plates are being seen in this area. It was not too long ago that the French Canadians of the province of Quebec did not even know that there were settlements of French speaking people in this area.

The Acadian Festival has been featured on television, radio and in many newspapers in Canada, especially eastern Canada. Possibly the visit of Princess Margaret at Church Point during the festival several years ago gave the festival the greatest boost in publicity when the Princess' visit to these parts was shown throughout Canada.

The festival is not only an attraction for tourists from other lands but also for the Maritimes and even our own province. It also is an outward manifestation in which the local people of Clare may participate. This year's festival is expected to be bigger and better than in former years. The organizing committee is working on the plans for the festival. In fact work first commenced last January when the initial meeting was held to draw up the main program. A recent meeting ironed out the kinks and the details of the program were formulated.

The organizing of the festival and its various items on the program is in charge of various committees under the overall supervision of the central committee and this has worked out well in other years.

The Acadian Ball committee is headed by Dr. Julius Comeau, of Meteghan, and he is assisted by Edmond Comeau, Alain Doucet and Miss Jacqueline Comeau. The barbecue committee consists of three separate committees, the barbecue committee chairman is Kenneth Weaver, grounds committee, Emile O. Theriault, of Bellevue's Cove, games and amusements, Gustave Doucet, Bernard LeBlanc, Benoit LeBlanc, Benoit Comeau and Andre Blinn; fiddling contest, Alain Doucet; bonfire (feu-de-jole), Bernard Bellevue; parade committee, Albert P. Melanson, Bernard LeBlanc, J. Medric Comeau; Louis Thibodeau, Desire Comeau, Gerard d'Entremont. The banquet committee is made up of Gerard d'Entremont and J. Marcel Valotaire.

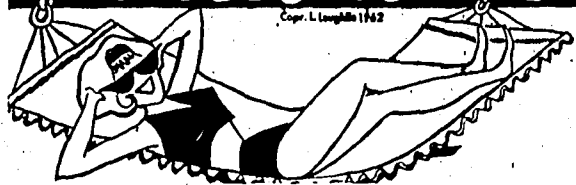

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## About This and That I Wish I'd Had My Camera

"I Wish I'd Had My Camera", said a public relations man here from an Upper Canadian city. Note we said a public relations man. Frequently we hear such an expression when a tourist is delighted with our scenery. And then think of all the good advertising which the camera can do for us. To this public relations man we could only say "We're glad you didn't have your camera." We could see that the pictures he would have taken would have been far from good advertising and most remote from good public relations.

The public relations man and his party were going to spend only a few days around here so they thought they'd take in a dance or some amusement. Excellent way to learn about our people, to know the habits and customs of our population, in other words an excellent way to meet the people and get acquainted. What we heard about the place they happened upon would be far from good publicity for Digby or its vicinity. And how would we be able to spread the word "Digby really isn't like that, don't judge us by a few." Drunkenness, fights and all the accompanying misery are not the usual camera opportunities for our visitors. Gave us an idea though. Instead of being ashamed to have visitors see the worst, it might be wise to import a few such visitors and plant them at the places that are rumoured for bootlegging and drunken fights. At least, we'd know if the rumors are true and then a little cleaning up could be done.

"What a shame for those young sailors", said our public relations man. "They are only teenagers", he said, "but then, where can they go? what is there for them to do?" We might say that our new bowling alleys might help in that respect. The boys do need some decent place "off the base" for recreation and to meet people. There are some well run dances and recreation places around. Sorry, the public relations man got in at the wrong spot. Or did he? Maybe it is to our benefit that he happened where he did.

## Serve Fish, Eat Fish

We drove through a village between Bridgewater and Mahone Bay this past weekend and blazing outside the small but attractive eating house were these few words only (other than the name of the business) — Scallops and Chips. For a minute we wondered if we were back in Digby and then the thought occurred to us — Digby has been known as the scallop country for a long time yet never have we seen a small business like an eating house, even during the summer months, especially featuring scallops. Folders have gone out saying "where the scallop is King", yet few have capitalized on the slogan. Your answer to the riddle is as good as ours.

And since we are mentioning fish let us recall a quote we repeated before — "We can eat our way out of the fish problems." Right now fish seems to be the most economical on the menu for the family dinner. Besides, if we can listen to what we hear and read, we might live longer by eating fish. We recall reading from an address by Dr. J. L. Kash, Ottawa, to a Fisheries Council meeting, some interesting observations regarding fish and fish products. They were that "Fish possess some rather important and essential constituents for human nutrition which only a few other edible products contain."

"Fish possess some therapeutic qualities that are only now becoming understood and which are still being actively explored and may prove to be unique in the prolongation of human life and health."

"Fish contains some of all of the essential nutrients but its protein, its fats and its vitamins have some characteristics that are shared by few foods of comparable availability and cost."

"Fish oils or fats contain generous portions of what chemists and nutritionists call 'unsaturated' fatty acids — it is this highly unsaturated nature of most fish oils that keeps them liquid — and helps to keep fatty injurious particles from forming in the blood serum and becoming lodged in the walls of the blood vessels. This factor is very important to people who have a tendency to hardening and narrowing of the arteries which leads to cardio-vascular trouble, which in turn is the cause of one-half the deaths of all adults in North America and two-thirds of our adult males."

"If we include in our diet a reasonable amount of fish oils, their characteristic types of unsaturated fatty acids are said to inhibit cholesterol formation in the blood serum and even to encourage lessening of its amounts in the blood and on the artery walls. This is a very important therapeutic property and gives further reason for rating fish high in the human diet."

## Belt-Tightening

When your family finds it has been living beyond its income too long and can no longer buy things on credit, it must tighten its belt and perhaps switch from porterhouse steak to hamburger.

And when the businessman discovers that for the same reason he can't get anyone to put money into his firm, he has to take steps to put his operations in order.

To some degree this is what happened to Canada's economy and it's the reason for the austerity measures announced by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

As a nation we have been living beyond our means and it has finally caught up with us. The national belt-tightening is a little more complicated than for the spendthrift family but it's basically similar.

The federal government has been spending more than it has received in taxes and other revenue for several years. It had to borrow millions of dollars each year to make up the difference.

Our national production has been rising each year but the rate hasn't been great enough to produce sufficient tax money to keep up with the increasing cost of government.

earning and if your salary doesn't go up as fast as you had expected, you must cut down. That's what the government is doing in paring \$250,000,000 from its spending this year.

Another way to help balance the budget is to stay home rather than go downtown shopping for things you don't really need. This has its application in our growing fondness for travel abroad.

The value of goods we'll be allowed to bring back duty-free from trips to other countries is being cut. This means we'll probably spend less on these trips or perhaps not go at all. The government hopes things will reach the point where we'll get more from visiting tourists than we spend on travel to other countries.

This, along with higher duties on all but essential goods that we import from other countries, should mean fewer dollars leaving Canada.

The outward flow of those dollars is one reason our currency already devalued and pegged at 92½ cents in terms of U.S. funds, has been under downward pressure. By cutting the flow, it should be easier to keep the dollar where it is pegged.

Our dollar was once in great demand by foreign investors who wanted it in order to invest elsewhere instead ada. Along the way they began investing elsewhere instead. Now we've raised our interest rates to make Canada more attractive to those investors.

Canada is doing what the businessman does when he offers prospective investors a better deal and demonstrates that he's trying to put his operations on a sound basis. The difference is that we're now doing it on an international scale. (The Red River Echo)

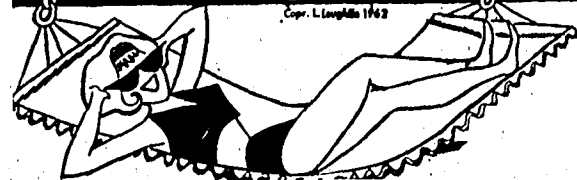

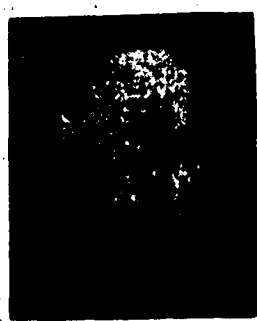

## Women's Corner

Goodness, all the nice fruits which can be obtained this week! Strawberries are still on the market as we write these lines, cherries are much in evidence, we've had a box or two of blueberries and coming through the valley on Sunday we noticed raspberries for sale. Naming them in that order does not mean that we are taking sides in a friendly debate we heard the other day about which fruit becomes ripe first, the blueberry or the raspberry.

But all those nice fruits and the Bear River Cherry Carnival makes us think about fruit pies. Why? Because, naturally, cherry pie was served at the carnival luncheon on Saturday. Several of us these lemon meringue pie and were considered a little, shall we say, odd, for doing so when after all this was a cherry carnival. The lemon pie was good, too, we assure you and our critics didn't even utter a sliver of their cherry pie, we expect they found that too good to share.

Anyway, if you want to make a fruit pie while the berries are in season, how about trying this one —

Lemon Cherry Pie: Place with mixer 1/2 cup sugar according to taste and one tablespoon margarine. Top with one of the following fruits — strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, blueberries with pastry and flour. Bake at 375 degrees F. for 20 minutes. Then reduce heat to 375 degrees F.

Whoever wrote the above recipe surely could not have lived near Digby or Bear River for cherries were not mentioned among the fruits. We take for granted that a cherry pie could be made the same way but we did so much want to find a recipe for cherry pie to see whether or not it said to take the pits from the cherries. Flavor is added to preserved peaches by leaving a few pits. A few pods in the peas when boiling is supposed to add flavor. We remember, as a child, when cherry pies at our house had to be made with cherries which had the pits removed. We also recall the day the minister and his wife called at our home and readily accepted an invitation to stay to supper. That was not an unusual happening at our house but this particular time our mother was away. One item on our menu happened to be preserved cherries. Only one thing brings the incident to mind — we made a blunder. When mother came home we learned we had served the wrong cherries. The ones we served, with the pits intact, were for the family and the ones with the pits removed were for company. We're still wondering. Do you remove the pits? We'd say "no". It might detract from the flavor and/or it makes too much work.

Frequent Stops Help Beat Highway Killer

Many people who drive a lot have a pleasant way of averting fatigue, one of the principal killers on our highways.

Salesmen, transport drivers and others, have what they call a pop stop, dropping off periodically at a roadside stand or service station for a soft drink.

One such salesman says these stops are very helpful both as a stimulant and an opportunity to relax. He warns, however, that there is no substitute for sufficient rest, and the driver who travels long hours with no sleep is inviting trouble.

WHAT TO PACK

If you're planning to spend your annual vacation in Nova Scotia this year, here are some summer wear tips for the women in the party.

The days are sunny and warm but when the moon comes up, the air cools and is conducive to a good night's sleep.

A partial list of clothing to bring with you might include: one or two pairs of shorts (depending on your youth, figure, plans and comfort). These, with tops and slacks, could be mix and match outfits.

Two pairs of slacks (one of wool advised if you intend to sit on the shore in the evening, a jacket or bulky sweater, four blouses or poptops (three

sporty to match shorts and slacks, with one slightly dressy to be worn with a skirt).

One skirt (pleated in easy care material are best slim enough to look dressy, loose enough for movement and style right for most figures, two bathing suits (one will do if you don't mind sitting around with it wet when you get out of the water.), bathing cap, lingerie (Judge according to what you will wear as outer garments. A full slip looks better under a thin blouse, and don't forget a strapless bra if your sun dress has spaghetti straps). Washable fabrics are best. You may find yourself away from an iron.

One sweater (two, if you don't have a jacket), three easy care dresses (perhaps a shirtwaist, a sundress, and a spaghetti strap dress with jacket). One dance dress or cocktail dress (this could be glazed cotton or chiffon) if your plans might necessitate it, one hat, one headscarf, belt, one rain coat and rain bonnet (could be foldable plastic type). Gloves (keep dresses and coats in mind when choosing). Purses (keep shoe colors in mind). Make-up kit containing travel-size toiletry needs. Towel and facecloth.

Other non-essentials you might consider adding to your list are:

Brimmed sun hat. Light coat and evening wrap. Sunglasses. Disposable or crushable rubbers. Beachtowel.

Miniature Garden Yours For The Planting

It might be too late for this season but we might bear in mind for future that window boxes can bring color and life to an otherwise drab room. They are a touch of beauty which is appreciated by the occupants of the room and passers-by alike. But more than that, they can be a rewarding hobby... a hobby that doesn't require too much time or effort but which, nonetheless, has to be started in the proper way.

Whether of food or metal, window boxes should measure at least eight inches in depth (inside measurement) and from eight to twelve inches in width. Length is determined by the length of window sills but a long box is less convenient for handling and could be made in shorter lengths to be placed end to end.

Holes drilled in the bottom, three or four inches apart, will permit drainage and place pieces of stone or broken flower pots over the holes will prevent loss of soil. To further improve the drainage, add an inch of coarse gravel or cinders and then the soil. You can also buy metal boxes with false bottoms built into them to provide drainage.

Flowering plants require a sunny location, while foliage plants grow better in shade or subdued light, so the amount of sunshine your window receives will act as a guide to the type of plant which will grow most successfully. Your nurseryman or florist will also be able to give you expert advice on choosing plants which have similar watering needs and temperature requirements.

Geraniums, petunias and pansies are known to thrive well in window boxes. Easy to care for, they add a lively splash of color. On the other hand, you may prefer all greens such as ferns, palms, aspidistra, sansevieria and umbrella plants. Climbing plants could be smilax, philodendron and wax-plant.

Just as any garden requires fertilizer as food, the soil in your miniature garden will need to be re-nourished about once a month. Prepared tablet fertilizer can be applied or, better still, borrow from your husband's supply of Evergreen fertilizer — the lawn will never miss the small amount you need, and your window garden will really thrive on it.

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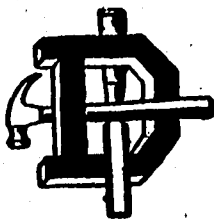

## Want United Front

At time of going to press representatives of the ports of Digby, Shelburne, Yarmouth and Lunenburg are in session at Hotel Champlain, Digby, in an effort to formulate a plan of action to endeavour to get an additional New England-Nova Scotia ferry in operation.

Some weeks ago the Digby Board of Trade formed a Digby Port Committee, headed by Vincent G. Snow, and immediate steps were taken by the committee to request representatives from other Western province boards of trade and committees to meet with them. On the Digby committee with Mr. Snow are Mayor V. L. Bent; Warden Ronald Morehouse; Digby Board President, Mrs. J. M. Wallis; Ralph McIntyre; Edward Twohig; V. G. Cardozo; A. L. Robinson and Keith Potter.

The idea for such a meeting was born after a Gloucester, Mass., delegation, headed by Leo Dionne, visited Digby some weeks ago regarding a ferry. The Gloucester delegation strongly urged a unified effort of the Nova Scotia ports to bring about the realization of a second Nova Scotia-New England Ferry, with the idea that no matter where the ferry terminus would be located everybody in Western Nova Scotia and Nova Scotia as a province would benefit by the second ferry.

A full account of Wednesday's meeting will be carried in these columns in the next issue.

## Celebrates 50 Years

Tonight the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club will celebrate its 50th anniversary by having a special anniversary dinner at the Pines Hotel, with Commodore Charles McBride presiding. Surviving charter members are Fritz Dakin, C. F. McBride, Sr., M. C. Denton and G. D. Dunn, most of whom are expected to be at the dinner tonight.

The Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club was incorporated in 1912 but previous to that there had been a Digby Boat Club which dated back to the eighteen eighties, as far as can be recalled.

Original club rooms of the Boat Club, as far as can be learned, were where the Canadian Tire Corporation building in Digby now stands and which was the old Masonic Hall. The club house later was the building on Water Street which is now occupied by Fidele's Beauty Shoppe.

It is of interest to know that the present Town Council table and chairs were originally furniture belonging to the yacht club and were presented to the town before the reorganization in 1937. At that time a club house was built on the property of the Gilpins, now that of Miss Charlotte Gilpin, and later moved to the shore at the Joggins, where it now stands. The impressive looking building is one which catches the eye looking along shore on the approach of town by way of the Valley. For many years Percy Weir took a personal pride in the building as general overseer of the property.

Yachting in Digby in the early years was doubtless a much sought pleasure and participation in races evidently keen. Two sterling silver shields with the crest of the town and inscription showing they had been presented by the town to the Digby Yacht Club can be seen at the club rooms. One of the town crests, uniquely, it is understood, is on a separate plate. Commodore C. F. McBride, Jr., is anxious to learn of other trophies or materials around town which have connections with the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club.

It is expected that besides local members many American summer visitors and members will be on hand for tonight's celebration. Commander George Shay had sent word that he will fly here for the occasion.

## Mrs. Buckley Addresses Delegates

An appeal for the Women's Institute to combat prejudice was made at the 49th convention of the Women's Institutes of Nova Scotia held at Wolfville. Addressing more than 350 delegates attending the convention, Mrs. Willis Buckley, Bear River, convener of legislation and citizenship, said there was legislation against discrimination, but government was powerless to act against prejudice.

"Only we as individuals can fight prejudice," she said. "We are able to do much on the national and world level, but are we?"

Mrs. Victor Davidson, of Salmon River, who was re-elected president of the organization, urged women to reaffirm their faith in the importance of home and the need of the child for love and parental care.

Speaking on the convention's theme "Building Today for a Better Tomorrow," Mrs. Davidson said the educational role of the institute lay in continuing to encourage communities to participate in educational expansion programs.

A panel discussion at the convention concluded that parents must take a greater interest in education. Panelists also agreed that minimum standards for teachers needed to be enforced.

Panelists were Mrs. Duckworth, adult education division of the department of education; Mrs. John Aldous, curriculum advisory committee of the department; W. D. Mills, director of the vocational education division; and J. Stirling Dorrance, president of the Nova Scotia Education Association. Moderator was Mrs. John McLean, of Eureka, Pictou County.

Mrs. J. M. C. Duckworth, of Halifax, and well known in all H. & S. work in the province said it was necessary to convince the general community of the need for high standards of education. The prevailing attitude was that "what was good enough for me is good enough for my children," she said.

Parents have an irreplaceable role in the education of their children, said Mrs. Duckworth. We have to cope in the home with the changes in society. What is needed in society is a revolution in the thinking about education.

The early childhood is a most important time, she said. What happens then is fundamentally important. It is then that the roots of a general attitude towards education take hold. Then children develop the courage to face new situations and an open mind to receive new ideas.

## French Shore Sticks To Traditions

Traditions die hard in Nova Scotia where modern generations still cherish and cling to heritages endowed by pioneering forebears.

As a result, there is much more than historical evidence of the contributions made to present day Nova Scotia by French, English, Scots, German and Irish settlers.

Accents in speech, and even customs vary in sections of the province indicating the ancestry of the inhabitants. Many place names, in addition to their practical functions often reveal a long ago longing for a far away homeland.

The two groups that have clung probably more closely than any others to the culture and traditions of their ancestors are the French and Scots.

The French association, with Nova Scotia goes back to the earliest days of the province's history. It was the French who made the first attempt to colonize the province back in 1605 when it was called Acadia. Initially, the French settlers made their homes in the lush Annapolis Valley. In 1755, after refusing to swear allegiance to the English authorities who controlled Acadia, they were driven from the Valley and taken aboard British ships to locations along the Atlantic seaboard of the United States.

It wasn't long after this that many undertook gruelling journeys and made their way back to Nova Scotia. They found their old lands occupied by settlers from New England and consequently took up their lives in other parts of the province. Today, the south west shore of the province, roughly from Digby to Yarmouth, (better known as the French Shore), and the north west coast of Cape Breton, from Margaree to Cheticamp, are the two areas with the largest number of French Acadian descendants.

In both areas, many of the traditional crafts of the old Acadians flourish and weaving and rug hooking have been developed into minor art forms by present day craftsmen. Names like Saulnier, Bellevue, Aucoin and LeBlanc are as common as Smith and Jones in other parts.

The Scots were relative new comers to Nova Scotia. The movement of Highland Scottish to Nova Scotia began at the turn of the 19th century and in 30 years nearly 50,000 Scots settled in Cape Breton Island and in the mainland counties of Antigonish and Pictou.

The descendants of these immigrants have never forgotten their highland heritage and even to this day, the music of the bagpipes and the soft sing-song of the Gaelic are not unusual sounds in Nova Scotia.

The fun loving Scots provide many of the most popular tourist attractions. With their highland games and gatherings, they give authenticity to the province's Latinized name which means "New Scotland".

Local arrangements for the band were in charge of Corporal R. Douglas. Present for the occasion was RCMP Inspector J. A. Couillard, Halifax, and Superintendent E. J. Lydall, ATCM, LFCL, who was band director.

Local guests for the occasion were His Worship Mayor V. L. Bent and Mrs. Bent; Deputy Mayor Helen Anthony, the town councillors and their wives. The march past was taken by the Mayor.

The first RCMP Bands came into existence three short years after the establishment of the Force itself. They were organized by Major G. D. Dorothea and

The Maple Leaf Agricultural Society members met at the Agricultural building in Conway on July 17th, with Mr. Lloyd Jefferson, president, in the chair. Mr. Roger Freeman, secretary, took the minutes of the meeting. At the roll call twenty members were there to continue the efforts that a few of the farmers were still interested in organization.

The first item discussed at the meeting was the possibility of relocating the regular Community Fair which had been held at Conway for the last twenty or thirty years. Those present did not think that they could put on a Fair like it used to be done in the past. Instead it was believed that efforts of the Maple Leaf Agricultural Society should be centered on trying to help 4-H Club members. It was suggested at this meeting that the 4-H Club members should plan to hold a 4-H Club Show sometime in the latter part of August. A tentative date was mentioned for the 22nd of August. This question of dates was to be left for the 4-H Club members to decide at their monthly meeting, which was held on Saturday, July 28th.

The other item of business was the possibility of getting farmers to grow vegetables and small fruits in the Digby area. It was thought that due to the climate and the small farms, the above crops could be grown in a profitable way. It was mentioned that due to the fact that the Research Station of Kentville was interested in doing some experiments in the area that the farmers who could possibly grow vegetables and small fruits should do their utmost to cooperate with the authorities of the Federal and Provincial Department of Agriculture. It was mentioned during the discussion that a meeting of all farmers interested in growing small fruits and vegetables would be called in the near future, probably the second week in August.

Some of the members present that they were surprised that no reports had been given. The study groups were supposed to send reports of their activities to the secretary of the Federation, who in turn would have sent a newsletter to all members. So far, no report has been given. This lack of information is in many cases the reason for failure in anything that is started in Digby County, it was said.

The 4-H Club members from Bear River were on a tour to the Research Station of Kentville on Wednesday. Four cars left Bear River with twenty-two calf and garden club members to visit the farm in Kentville. The group was in Kentville at eleven o'clock and took charge of the picnic grounds till one o'clock. During this time the members had their lunches and had time left for a few games and some investigations, so well done by teenagers. At one o'clock the group was put on a big truck and visited the different projects carried on on the farm. Host was R. P. Longley, of the Experimental Farm, who explained to all the different experiments done with fruits and vegetables. Some of our members were disappointed not to find any cattle or horses on the farm. The reason for the lack of animals is that Kentville farm is more of an Horticultural Research Station than anything else. Most of the experiments done with cattle is done at Nappan Experimental Farm.

The group left Kentville on its way back at three o'clock in the afternoon and were back safe and sound in Bear River for the five o'clock T.V. program.

## Far Away Hope For Ferry

The editor of the Lunenburg Progress-Enterprise sees only a far away hope for a second New England to Nova Scotia ferry. We know such a thing will of necessity take time but the only way to overcome the time element is to keep beating the drums. As we write these lines we are looking forward to a meeting in Digby on Wednesday (yesterday by the time you read this) at which meeting Lunenburg will have representatives as will other Western Nova Scotia towns.

From the Enterprise —

"According to the Digby Courier the local Board of Trade has formed a Port of Digby Committee to dig up some enthusiasm for the Gloucester-Nova Scotia ferry."

Lunenburg is mentioned as one of the towns for the honour of the ferry.

For the purpose of the ferry, several months ago the Progress-Enterprise printed a detailed analysis prepared by the Department of Transport that revenue from such a ship would not be enough to pay for the operation without a heavy subsidy.

The report held out one ray of hope that no figure could be complete without a detailed study of the amount of commercial freight traffic available. This study we presume is now being taken. Summer traffic, both passengers and cars, is no problem. The big question is What Will The Winter Business Be?

The Progress-Enterprise will always take a strong stand on any economic development that will generate more business expansion either in Lunenburg or some other part of the province.

As we see it a new ferry service would only serve to increase the federal payroll by several hundred people at a heavy cost of taxation and increasing public debt.

The Gloucester-Nova Scotia ferry project shouldn't be forgotten entirely but no one should get too enthusiastic about it until such time as it can be proven that the available traffic will pay for a very large proportion of the operating costs 12 months of the year. Otherwise it will be just another government aided project that will provide jobs out of proportion to the value returned.

This is how the Enterprise sees it and one must respect its only too true comments even while we keep the drums beating.

## Even From Germany

Pardon us if we mix our position as president of the Digby Board of Trade with that of being editor of The Digby Courier once in a long, long time. We are always reluctant to take such advantage or to use this column to inflict on our readers the business and work problems concerning the Courier and for the publishers. Once in a while this happens if we feel it is to your advantage.

Right now we feel that it is to your advantage to know that many people are interested in Digby and some of them from far away places. As president of the Digby Board of Trade your Courier editor has been in a position to know this that otherwise would not have been. As president of the Trade Board we have been thoroughly convinced that Digby should never be without a Board of Trade. Digby is essentially a tourist town, and if our impressions are right it is to the Board of Trade in any town to which potential visitors look for general information about a place. Possibly the newspaper ranks second but we've certainly changed our minds on first place.

To give you an example the president of the Digby Board had this card from Braunschweig, Germany, this week — "Planning to visit Nova Scotia. Would you kindly help me plan my trip by sending me some information about points of interest at and around your city and how to get there. Maybe with a map of Digby if obtainable. Thanking warmly in advance, I remain,"

The world is small isn't it? Numerous letters of similar content come to the Board of Trade. All that can be done is to answer them to the best of one's ability. Granted, many

such letters come from school children from all parts of the U.S.A., and Canada, but even to ignore these would be cutting off potential tourists of ten, fifteen or twenty years hence, maybe. And Rome was not built in a day, you know. Besides, what parent can resist being interested in Digby if the school age child has become interested. Leave that as it may be, the question is, what do we have in ready supply to forward to these people to inform them of the town of Digby? At present, simply nothing. While we do not mind sending literature on Nova Scotia or the whole Annapolis Valley it is Digby in which these potential visitors are interested. Think it over and maybe 1963 will come up with some good literature on Digby.

Then, what shall we say we have to offer them when they come. Are boats available for fishing trips? Just last week a man came to the Courier seeking information on available sports fishing boats. We could only think of two in the area which we felt were properly equipped to government standards. One we felt was ready for business and the other, as we had heard, would oblige someone if they couldn't find other means but other interests of necessity took preference. To make sure we were not mistaken we called the Information Bureau — our answer was "There are only two registered. Now the South Shore has a great many but we seem to have only two in the whole area." The question in our minds is "Are we missing the boat? or is there no profit in such a venture?"

And while we are on the subject, and as a follow up of previous editorials, only courtesy will keep our tourists coming to Digby. We must remember that Digby is a strange town to the tourists just as new towns are strange to us. We do not know where it is best to turn or are not familiar enough with streets to be able to use them without taking time to think. For example, we saw a most discourteous Digby light truck driver one day last week. An American car, no doubt saw others doing it, decided to turn on Water Street near the post office. It took him just a little longer than most to manoeuvre his car for he was not too familiar with the layout. Our discourteous truck driver was scarcely two feet away from the American car, not by accident but with the expression and movements of "I'll show you smart alec". Doubtless, there are smart alecs among visitors as well as among our own, but tourism wise it might pay to give the visitor the benefit of the doubt.

Many other detrimental discourtesies might be added to the list but time does not permit our writing them. You think of them. Take for instance, over-charging. A lot is being written in other weekly papers about killing our tourist business with exorbitant charges. The only complaint we've had so far was a comparison of a seven dollar a night accommodation in Truro, N. S., with a seven dollar accommodation in Digby. Better watch out — standardized prices require standardized accommodation. Of course, the seven dollars figure was far from the exorbitant prices we read about. Treat the tourists right and keep them coming.

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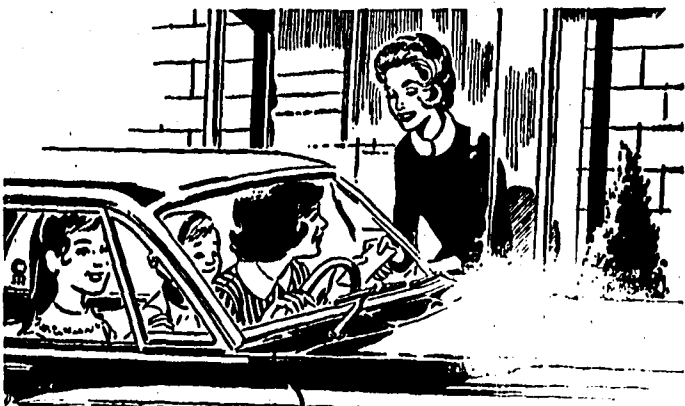

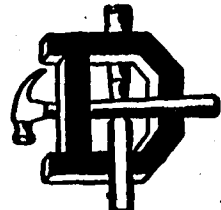

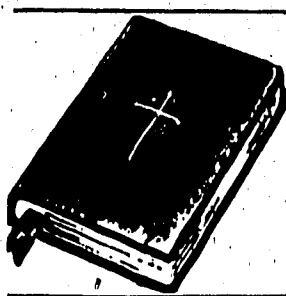

**Offers Confidential Information**  
European General Manager Joseph C. Kendel told members of the Halifax Board of Trade last week he would make confidential European market information available to them if they called on him at his headquarters in London. He said the railway was anxious to see Maritime businesses send representatives to Europe to increase trade, and added that the trans-Atlantic tour made by the Halifax-Dartmouth trade commission last spring has stimulated two way trade tremendously. "We have been carrying out market research since 1957," said Mr. Kendel, who directs the company's operations in 25 overseas countries. "We can perhaps arrange business contacts for you, and can also recommend you to British and European businesses that want contacts here."

He said part of his organization's duties was to arrange contacts for European businessmen who didn't have the capital to make investigations in Canada for themselves. Mr. Kendel made the remarks at the end of a Maritime tour that saw him visit Moncton, Saint John and Halifax to meet regional CN officers and assess transportation facilities.

## Miraculous Escape

A miraculous escape from the pleasure craft "The Posidon", owned and operated by Dr. Alexander Leighton, of Smith's Cove, was watched with great interest by the residents of Port Wade on Saturday, August 4th.

The explosion was noticed ashore almost immediately by Gordon Snow and Carl Sabean who summoned Mr. Horace Snow, who with his boat and Carl Sabean went out to the rescue of the Posidon's party. They were brought ashore where they were taken to the homes of Gordon Snow, Alton Hayden and Robert McGrath, where they were made more comfortable with dry clothing and a hot supper.

Other than a few minor cuts along with singed hair and eye-brows, the party escaped any serious injury from their harrowing experience.

The party consisted of Dr. and Mrs. Leighton, their son and daughter, who come from New York State, and Dr. Leighton's father, who is 82 years old and from Penn. Along with them were three visiting guests, and all had started out from their summer cottage at Smith's Cove to spend an afternoon of fishing on the Annapolis Basin. Around 6 p.m. an explosion occurred from the area around the engine. Those in the cabin at the time got out through an escape hatch and swam away from the burning boat, while others got into the dingy, only to find the oars missing. However, those in the water soon got hold of the dingy and pushed it away from the burning craft.

The Posidon has only been recently refitted with new engine, stove, tanks and fire extinguishers, and was on a trial run before taking a longer cruise along the Bay of Fundy coast. The craft burned until it sunk off the Port Wade pier.

Mr. Alton Hayden and Mr. Owen Haley drove the eight survivors to their cottage at Smith's Cove.

Dr. and Mrs. Leighton spoke gratefully to Mr. Horace Snow and Carl Sabean for rescuing them so quickly and to all who made them more comfortable and returned them to their homes.

## United Front

Delegates from Digby, Shelburne, Lunenburg and Yarmouth met at Champlain Motor Hotel, Digby, on Wednesday in what they termed a united front for a second Nova Scotia New England ferry service. The meeting, sparked by the port committee of the Digby Board of Trade, was presided over by the committee chairman, Vincent G. Snow. Others attending were Rayburn Tanner, president of the Lunenburg Board of Trade; John Powers, of the Trade Board Council, Lunenburg; R. J. Killam, of the 2nd Ferry Committee, Yarmouth; Mayor W. J. Cox, Shelburne, and W. W. Archibald, president of the Shelburne Board of Trade; Mrs. J. M. Wallis, president of the Digby Board; Ralph McIntyre, vice-president, Digby; V. G. Cardoza, A. L. Robinson, John Nichols, Mayor V. L. Bent, Edward Twohig, and Keith Potter, members of the Digby committee.

A resolution was unanimously passed and directed to be sent for consideration to all western Nova Scotia boards of trade, municipal and town councils, asking that they urge that "the province of Nova Scotia immediately complete the survey on the need for a second Nova Scotia and New England ferry and that the results of the survey be implemented in the inauguration of a second Nova Scotia and New England ferry."

A resolution moved by E. Twohig, Digby, and seconded by Mayor Cox, Shelburne, was also unanimously passed, asking that "the effort of the various boards of trade in western Nova Scotia be directed to the provincial and federal governments and the Canadian Pacific Railway supporting the need for improved transportation facilities across the Bay of Fundy between Digby and Saint John, N. B., and asking that immediate steps be taken to improve the existing ferry between Saint John and Digby."

A supper meeting was held at the hotel when greetings were extended on behalf of the town by Mayor Bent; on behalf of the Digby Board of Trade by the president, Mrs. Wallis, and by V. G. Cardoza, M.L.A.

The meeting in Digby on Wednesday resulted from meetings of a previous week when a delegation from Gloucester, Mass., attended various western Nova Scotia Trade Boards urging a unified effort of the Nova Scotia ports to bring about the realization of a second Nova Scotia-New England ferry, with the idea that no matter where the ferry terminus would be located everybody in Western Nova Scotia and Nova Scotia as a province would benefit by the second ferry.

Following the meeting of the delegation on Wednesday the Digby Port Committee met and decided to request a meeting with the Saint John Board of Trade regarding a Digby-Saint John ferry.

Plans call for the compliment of the visiting club to hold a competitive race back to Saint John on Sunday, August 19th.

## Paving Plans Progress

Seven different companies have responded to the tenders put out by the Digby Town Council for the paving program planned recently at a ratepayers meeting held at the Court House in Digby. At this time, the ratepayers had given the councillors permission to borrow up to \$75,000 for paving of different streets with 3 inch pavement, 20 feet wide wherever possible.

Councillor Bruce Baxter, chairman of the streets committee, reported at the Town Council on Monday night that he had gone over the Digby streets four times with different engineers from different companies. All expressed themselves as finding Digby streets in condition for paving and that at least four miles should be able to be paved for the money voted. The only difficult street, Councillor Baxter said, would seem to be Victoria Street where, as he expressed it, there would need to be extensive ditching for drainage. No difficulty is anticipated on other streets. Mr. Baxter said there was a difference of opinion with front street merchants as to First Avenue. Some considered the street at present too high and others felt that the flooding conditions were caused by the street being too low. In this case, he said, it would be necessary to follow the engineers' instructions. The immediate problem, he said, or at least as soon as a tender has been accepted, will be to procure an engineer.

## School Resumes Car Course

Supervisor F. C. Purdy, Digby, announced last week that the teenage car driver education course which had at one time been carried on at Digby Regional High School would be resumed when school opens for the fall term. Because of costs, the car course in which Digby school was pioneer in Nova Scotia, was discontinued at the Digby school after several years.

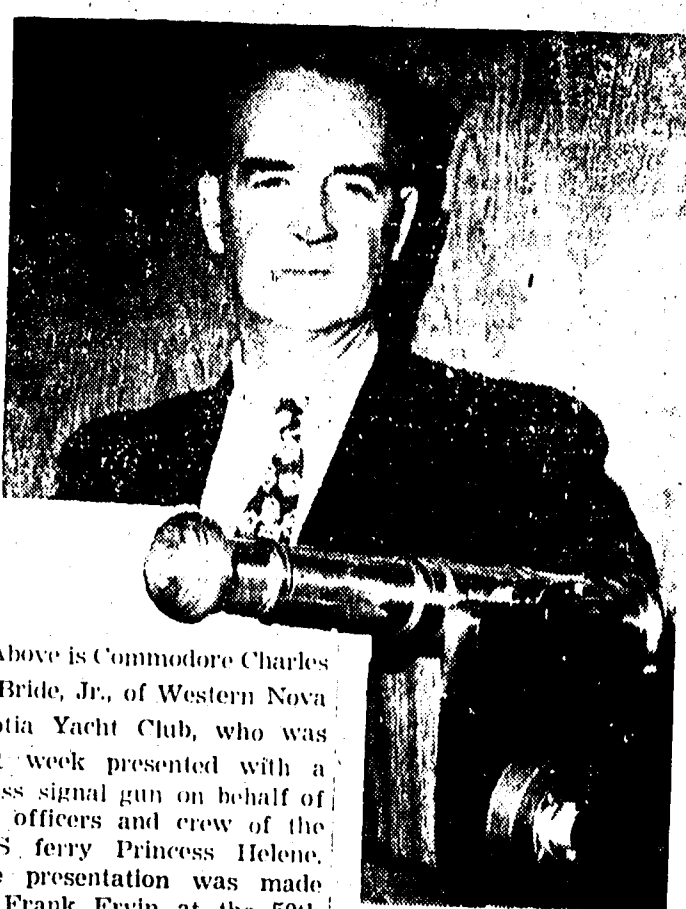

## Urge Plans For Pumper

Eight men of the Digby Fire Department, including Fire Chief George Humphrey, and with Reginald Turnbull as chief spokesman, appeared before the Digby Town Council on Monday night requesting that steps be taken to increase the charge to the outside area served by the Digby Fire Department from \$700 to \$1,000. It was pointed out by Mr. Turnbull that since the \$700 fee was set that the boundary had been extended and that costs had also risen considerably.

The other matter which Mr. Turnbull placed before the meeting was the fact that the pumper which serves the outside area is now in the vicinity of twenty years old and plans should be made immediately to prepare for its replacement within the next few years. Mr. Turnbull advocated setting up a reserve fund by the town council for this purpose. On inquiry, the firemen had also been informed that the \$700 which had already been remitted by the municipality for services last year was now in a reserve fund. The firemen and councillors felt that other means besides the \$700 would have to be budgeted for if new apparatus was to be purchased within a few years. The councillors, however, felt that nothing could be done definitely on the firemen's requests during 1962, but the matter would be kept under consideration.

Additional services provided outside of town since the inauguration of the municipality's services has been to three properties in Smith's Cove, Acacia Valley and the Shelburne Road. Much discussion ensued by the councillors on the most economical means of replacing the No. 2 pumper when it is considered that such should be done. It was also considered that before new equipment could be bought that greater water pressure should be provided for the south end of town; in fact, that such pressure should be provided before the completion of the new proposed hospital.

Highest compliments were paid by the councillors to the Digby Volunteer Fire Department. It was considered that their services are the best and that any project which they endeavour to put into effect is always successful. It was also noted that the greater part of the money they earned by various projects goes into fire fighting equipment.

### DIGBY WITNESSES SHARE CONVENTION WORK

2,500 delegates from three Maritime provinces are expected to meet in Moncton, August 24-26, to attend a District Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses scheduled for that time. This was announced in Digby today by Thomas Holmes, Presiding Minister.

Mr. Holmes said that the convention will be one of eleven arranged by the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society for Canada and that others would be held in many of the 185 lands in which Jehovah's Witnesses carry on their missionary work.

In his comments Mr. Holmes said that some preliminary arrangements such as the appointment of convention officials and the assigning of certain ministers to handle portions of the program have been made.

He said that the convention theme would be "Courageous Ministers" and the program would provide information on findings of Bible scholarship in the field of exegesis, doctrine and Christian principles; that it would offer practical suggestions and counsel, then encouraging the delegates to pursue their purpose in life as ministers of Jehovah. He added that the minister of God needs courage to preach the truth and to stand firmly for right principles. He added that the Watch Tower Society has consistently shown such courage in war and peace, and that it is thus in a position to give Jehovah's Witnesses a strong lead and good direction.

Mr. Holmes felt that, especially in view of the world situation which, he said has steadily worsened since 1914, the primary role of religion must be to direct the attention of all people to a sure hope, one which would not lead to eventual disappointment.

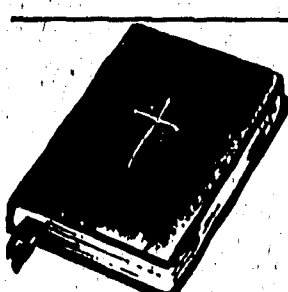

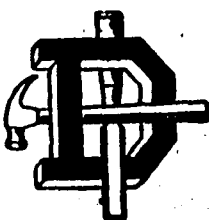

Date-Banana Ring Cake

If you are spending your vacation at home you might find that relatives and friends will be dropping in to see you. **Lime Coconut Pie**  
(Makes 9" single-crust pie)  
38 vanilla wafers (about 1 1/2 inch in diameter)  
3 tablespoons melted butter  
1 pkg. (3 oz.) lime-flavoured jelly powder  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup boiling water  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1 cup undiluted evaporated milk  
Toasted flaked coconut  
milk

Crush all but 13 wafers. Mix crumbs with butter and spread in bottom of 9-inch pie pan. Line sides with 13 whole wafers. Dissolve jelly powder and sugar in boiling water. Add lemon rind and 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Chill evaporated milk in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges of tray (15-20 minutes). Whip until stiff (about 1 minute). Add remaining 2 tablespoons lemon juice; whip very stiff (about 2 minutes longer). Fold in jelly mixture. Spoon over cookie crumbs. Garnish with coconut. Chill until firm (1 to 2 hours).

Or you might try this tempting Date-Banana Ring Cake.

As the name itself suggests, the main flavour ingredients of this cake are bananas and dates, with just a dash of ground cinnamon to add a touch of spiciness. The cake has a rather light texture, reminiscent of a loaf cake, and it keeps very well if stored in a covered tin. Although it is certainly flavoured enough without added garnishments, a lemon or vanilla glaze gives the cake a party air for those special entertainments.

**Date-Banana Ring Cake**  
Yield: 1 deep ring cake  
1 1/2 cups once-sifted all-purpose flour or 2 cups once-sifted

pastry flour  
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1 cup fine granulated sugar  
3/4 cup chopped pitted dates  
1/2 cup soft shortening  
2 eggs  
1 cup mashed ripe bananas  
2 tablespoons milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Grease a ring cake pan, 8 inches in diameter. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. (moderate).

Sift together twice, then sift into a bowl the all-purpose or pastry flour, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and sugar; add and mix in dates. Add shortening, eggs and half of the mashed banana; stir to combine, then beat with a wooden spoon for 300 strokes or with an electric mixer, set at medium speed, for 2 minutes. Add milk, vanilla and remaining banana; beat batter for 150 strokes or 1 minute with electric mixer. Turn into prepared pan and spread evenly. Bake in preheated oven 1 to 1 1/4 hours. Stand cake in its pan on a cake rack for 15 minutes, then turn out cake and allow it to cool completely on rack. Store in covered tin.

safety education will change this fact, just as it can't take the poison out of furniture polish or the scalding property out of boiling water.

The facts are simple and most of us know them by heart. Plastic film is air tight. The very thin kind has the added ability to attract static electricity, allowing it to cling to the face. These facts put together spell suffocation if the fabric is misused.

After all the warnings by safety groups in Canada over the years, it is difficult to understand how a parent could carelessly put a used dry cleaning bag in a crib, carriage or playpen. One might more easily see the possibility of a child finding one in a garbage tin or a drawer and trying it on. But of the eight children who have died since the beginning of the year, six had plastic right in their cribs or carriages used as mattress covers. Sheets which had covered the plastic were in every case pulled away to expose it.

The Nova Scotia Federation of Home and School Associations warns parents again that this plastic in the crib, in the carriage or playpen, or in the house at all, is a suffocation threat to their children. Find it now, and destroy it.

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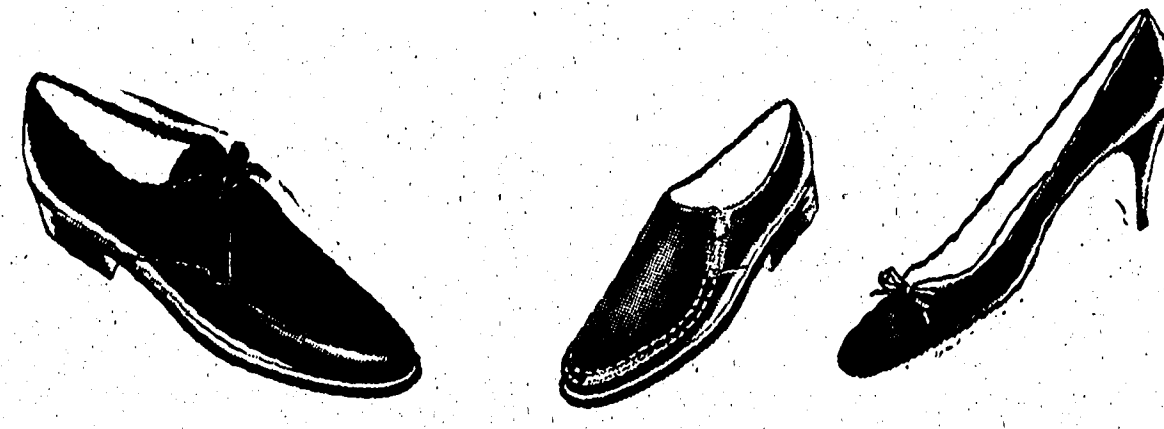

## Dorothy G. Snow Sails From Shelburne



On her first voyage in 1911, the Dorothy G. Snow sailed out of Shelburne harbour after she was launched from the Joseph McGill Shipyards in Shelburne. The Dorothy G. Snow was built for the late Captain Joseph E. Snow, Digby, and was named after his daughter, Dorothy Greeley Snow, now Mrs. William Joseph Sullivan, Lynn, Mass.

The first captain of the vessel was Capt. Joe's brother, Capt. William Snow, Digby, whose widow and some of his family still reside here.

In the picture above, taken on board the vessel when she sailed out of Shelburne in 1911 are (left to right) George Tidd, Digby; Stephen VanTassel, Digby; 3rd unknown; Captain William Snow, Digby; Joseph McGill, builder; next two unknown; Floyd Snow, son of Capt. Joseph; Capt. Joseph and Delbert Tidd, Digby.

The Dorothy G. Snow slid off the docks and sailed out of Shelburne just the day before the 1911 election when the big issue was reciprocity. This was a big issue with the owners of fishing vessels and dealers in fish.

Those who have read the Roving Fisherman by Frederick William Wallace will read of the Dorothy G. Snow and her then Capt. Ansel Snow in 1916.

Interest in the Dorothy G. Snow, now known as Maria Sony, was aroused here when the above picture of the ship and a story by Bill Fox appeared in the Shelburne Coast Guard and The Halifax Chronicle-Herald. The Coast Guard and Chronicle-Herald carried this story by Mr. Fox —

"A letter received here from far-off St. Vincent, Cape Verde Island, in Portuguese West Africa, said in part, that the owner of the two masted schooner, Maria Sony, 'Are joyful to announce that the Maria Sony, formerly known as the Dorothy G. Snow is still in existence.'"

The letter signed by Cecilio Andrade and now in the possession of John McKay, master-builder of Shelburne, brought to light that the Dorothy G. Snow, built in Shelburne in 1911, is, despite her fifty years, still making sea history.

Shelburne boat-builders, present and past with those rugged men of Bluenose stock that have sailed in those of the type of the Dorothy G. Snow, and yes, not only of Shelburne but all the Maritimes can feel justly proud of this sturdy lady of the seas.

Ninety-eight foot long with a beam of twenty-three feet and her draught is nine point eight feet. The Dorothy Snow was built in the now defunct Joseph McGill yards for the late Captain Joseph E. Snow of Digby County.

At one time Lawrence Sweeney, Yarmouth fish dealer and skipper, owned and operated the sturdy vessel and she carried on board during several voyages the noted writer William F. Wallace, author of popular Canadian sea stories who was gathering material for his yarns. Today, over fifty years after her birth in the McGill yards at Shelburne she is still performing beautifully from her home port of St. Vincent, Portuguese West Africa.

It is fortunate indeed to find in Shelburne three veteran craftsmen of the boatbuilding trade of yester years in the persons of the Messrs. Frank Dexter (who has reached over the ninety milestone), Dave

Deschamp and James Harding.

These three all worked in the McGill yard at the time of the Old Girl's construction, and when asked by all remembered her well.

"She was speedy — that one" said Mr. Deschamp "and she was a beauty" he continued. Mr. Harding practically echoed Mr. Deschamp when he said "The Dorothy G. Snow was a very fast vessel," she was built at the time when the captains of those days seemed to have plenty of money and wanted fast sailers."

Apparently the Dorothy has not lost much of her speed and sea-worthiness over the long years of pounding against the elements of the Atlantic, for Mr. Andrade writes in his letter dated this past June:

"I am quite happy and proud to send pictures of her taken in June of this year, after she spent nearly ten months in a Bermuda dry dock having repairs made to damages she suffered during a fierce 14 day Atlantic storm. She was sailing on a home bound voyage from New Bedford, Mass., to Cape Verde Island in 1960."

Her present owner, said in his letter, for her splendid sailing and sea worthiness in this fierce storm she is to be chronicled in the pages of a story to be published in book form in the English and Portuguese languages.

Her wounds included broken beams, and practically her whole deck was broken, but after repairs in the Bermuda drydock she once again proved the original craftsmanship and the sturdy fibre of her original construction in the Shelburne boat yards, was still there in her old frame.

Mr. Andrade writes that after her wounds were healed the Dorothy G. Snow set her toothpick round bow and with all sails trimmed she won a seven hundred mile race against two masted schooners and beat her nearest rival at the finish line by 18 hours.

"She is indeed a lovely boat and very fast" her present owner writes. "In 1959 she showed that she still had the speed somewhere in her old body for her log has recorded that she made the run from Cape Verde, West Africa, to Nantucket in the remarkable time of 12 days, a distance that would measure for a vessel under canvas over 3200 miles. It is pointed out this fast trip was made entirely under sail. According to official records this time lapse compares favourably with similar distance runs of the famous Clipper Vessels."

Veteran boat-builder, Mr. Deschamp said he thought the late Amos Pentz who was the master builder in the McGill yards back in 1911, was the designer of the Dorothy G. Snow.

He said — "She was built in the heyday of boatbuilding in these parts, when the turning out of 25 vessels in a period of 5 years was taken for granted, but the Dorothy G. has, I believe, outlived them all, it is amazing she is still going strong. We should have her back here," Mr. Deschamp concluded.

The McGill yards where the Dorothy G. was built is no more and the McGill family have all departed, but the Dorothy G., through a letter received here from far off Africa suddenly crossed the years away and many oldtimers all at once it seemed were remem-

bering the hustling, bustling days at the McGill yards on Commissary Island, Shelburne, during 1911.

Many that were spoken to by the writer while doing a bit of research for this yarn, in fact practically all said, "why here is the boat Nova Scotia should have for a Museum, she is a worthy representative of all the best of the boat-building days of yore."

Doctor R. W. Campbell, M.D., a recognized authority on wooden vessels, and their construction, especially those vessels long since gone, said "this vessel, the Dorothy G. Snow is well known in Nova Scotia. She is mentioned in Wallace's book 'The Roving Fishermen.' There was a news story about her in the Shelburne Coast Guard in 1959, and the National Maritime Museum have a number of photographs of her in their extensive collections."

"Surely" the Doctor went on, "the return of such a vessel, Nova Scotia built and with more than fifty years history of fame behind her, would be better than the building of a replica. This is a matter the 'Bluenose' and 'Bounty' committee might well consider."

Many will concur with Dr. Campbell's remarks and possibly an equal number will disagree; regardless of what side one might take surely there is not one that would not agree the Dorothy G. Snow has cut quite a niche for herself and her builders in the pages of 1900 sea history. It is difficult at the time of this writing to dig up anything concerning the old girl when she was known as the Dorothy G. Snow, except as written those words that extol her speed and sturdiness and these compare with her later years as she wears the name Maria Sony.

For the time being maybe it is just as well to cease adding further comments to this brief narrative of one of Nova Scotia's fine schooners but, rather leave the rest to the photos that accompany the article.

After all, was it not Confucius that said "A picture speaks a thousand words." Speaking of pictures it is worth more than a passing thought to mention that as the Maria Sony, laid in a Bermuda drydock badly battered she did not go unnoticed.

An alert photographer on board of one of Canada's Navy ships in Bermuda waters on manoeuvres, spied her and shot a number of exposures, which vividly shows the heavy damage she sustained.

These interesting pictures with others that were taken a number of years ago when she was known as the Dorothy G. Snow, are in the valued collection of the Maritime Museum at Halifax.

So the sea veteran is still a subject for photographers which is an interesting point, and no doubt many words of gripping interest could be found of her activities during her over a half-century of life.

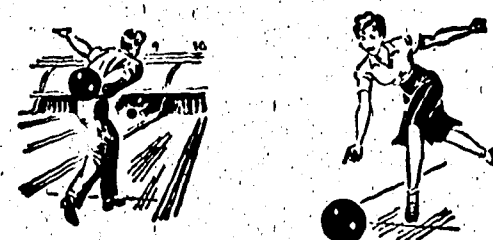

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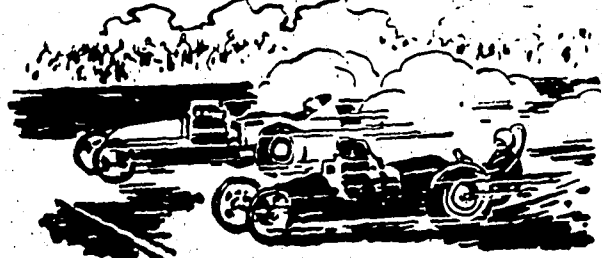

## Seriously Consider Air Strip

The Airstrip Committee of the Digby Board of Trade, headed by John Nichols, will meet with H. M. Warne to seriously consider proposals and suggestions made by Mr. Warne regarding an airstrip in the area. A decision to meet with Mr. Warne followed the reading of a letter at the regular meeting of the Trade Board on Tuesday night from the Saint John Flying Club. The Flying Club stated that it was becoming more and more difficult to get use of the landing field at Greenwood air base and requested the Digby Board of Trade to express an opinion on a landing field in the Digby vicinity. According to the letter a strip 4,000 ft. by 150 would be adequate to handle present day executive type twin engine aircraft. Such a strip, it was stated, would not need paving and could be constructed for \$5,000 or by use of road machinery at a much less cost. The letter referred to one such \$2500 field which, by use of road machinery was done for \$500 excluding the purchase price of the land. Mr. Warne mentioned parcels of land near Digby with which he was familiar and which might serve the purpose.

Another letter read at the August meeting of the Digby Trade Board was from Harry Thomas, program chairman for the Halifax Board of Trade in which he mentioned one particular tourist activity which might be used in the Digby area. He referred to summer study conferences which are being held in various parts of Canada and thought that Digby might make an excellent location for such conferences. He felt the publicity and advertising which accompanied such conferences was good and indirectly the conferences were a tourist attraction. Mr. Thomas' letter was handed to the New Business committee headed by Ralph McIntyre for further action. A letter of thanks was to be sent to Mr. Thomas in appreciation of his suggestions and for the interest he took in his home Board of Trade at Digby.

A letter of thanks was to be sent to Champlain Motor Hotel for the recent use on two occasions of a room for Board of Trade purposes.

A report of recent meetings of the Digby Port committee was given by V. G. Snow, chairman, and John Nichols. Ratification of the committee's action in requesting a meeting with the Saint John Board of Trade regarding ferry service between Digby and Saint John was given. Further to the report Mr. Snow elaborated on plans which he felt should be undertaken. Either a direct route from the Digby vicinity to Shelburne, N. S., or a replacement of the Victoria Bridge by a two-lane bridge and elimination of the curves near the bridge so that greater use could be made of the newly paved road between Liverpool and Annapolis Royal, he felt should be an aim. He also felt that the Board should continue to urge for a larger ferry for carrying trucks between Saint John and Digby and to urge that plans and blueprints for dock facilities be started.

The Board on Tuesday night endorsed the resolution passed at the 1962 show was the representation of a famous quotation.

## Swimming Program

Approximately 2,000 people are involved in Red Cross swimming and water safety programs in five Annapolis Valley Centres. This was disclosed by Jim Bayer, Assistant Director of the Red Cross program in Nova Scotia, on his return from an inspection of the area.

At the Royal Canadian Air Force Greenwood station, with its two large and two smaller pools, a total of 1,300 people participate in the swim program. Of these, 600 are enrolled in Red Cross instruction courses at all levels.

The Lions Club supports the Red Cross program at Bridgetown where classes are held in Bloody Creek.

As well as the regular swim program at HMCS Cornwallis, under CPT4 Joe Carisse, summer pool time is generously made available for a supplementary Red Cross program. Mrs. Peter deWaard, assisted by Mrs. Reginald Pitt, is instructing 300 swimmers from surrounding communities. They come in daily by bus and average 70 a morning.

Al Peppard, a voluntary Red Cross Supervisor-Examiner, assists with the year-round swimming program in the Valley.

Mr. Bayer also included camp visits on his itinerary. He paid calls at Camp Arcadia for girls, in the Digby area, where Mrs. Susan Berry is waterfront director; Camp Champlain for boys, whose director is M. Montin and Camp Aldercliff, also for boys, at Weymouth North.

Kiwanis Club at Journey Lake, Bellevue's Cove, was commended highly by the Red Cross Director for the effort it had made to provide swimming facilities. "They have made an excellent waterfront by clearing the site, cleaning and pouring cement on the bottom, building a retaining wall and marking off a special area for beginners," Mr. Bayer said.

## Channel 6 To Be Better

A CJCH spokesman told the Courier Wednesday that Channel 6, Digby, will shortly provide much better reception to its viewers than at present.

It was stated that a portion of the installation at the tower at Bay View is defective and as soon as this piece of equipment is received better service is assured.

The station is presently operating at full power.

However, it has been suggested that viewers have their receivers checked for the Channel 6 circuit. It was mentioned that with sets in this area tuned constantly to Channel 4 other portions of the selection apparatus could be badly corroded so as to provide poor reception.

The hilly countryside at Bear River may be partially to blame for distorted reception in that area.

## Exhibition Feature

According to Mrs. Chipman Chisholm, the Digby County exhibition to be held at Bear River in September, will feature a musical contest. Last year saw the musical contest as an innovation at the exhibition and the success of the venture at that time has encouraged the exhibition committee to sponsor the contest again this year.

Mrs. Chisholm, who was in charge of the musical hour last year is again receiving the entries for September, 1962. Mrs. Chisholm contemplates arranging the contest into categories, probably vocal and instrument and each in age groups. Another interesting feature of the musical hour this year is expected to be a sing-song in which all can participate.

Although far removed from music, Mrs. Chisholm told the Courier on Tuesday that many enquiries have been received on behalf of the tourists about the ox pulling contests. She stated that the exhibition at Bear River seems to be not for that particular phase of the program.

## Dredging Job Completed

Dredging of the Church Point harbour by Bernard & Gerard Lombard, contractors from Corberrie, N. S., has just terminated. Fifteen hundred cubic yards of sand and mud was removed from the harbour entrance and along the channel at the wharf. The deepening of the channel will enable fishing boats to enter or leave the wharf somewhat later than was possible previously.

A considerable number of herring carrying boats using the Church Point wharf during the summer months. These boats are from forty to fifty feet long and draw more water than the ordinary lobster fishing boats and several larger type draggers also operate from here.

The herring curing plant of Frankland Canning Co. Ltd., at Church Point, handles over fifty carloads of pickled herring during the summer months, when the herring are schooling in St. Mary's Bay, besides the smoking of herring, a business that is fast improving.

Fishing is Clare's main industry in late years. Wharves that were constructed for the 35 foot fishing boats of yesterday are becoming inadequate for today's fishing boats. New problems have cropped up regarding the wharves due to larger fishing boats being employed. Deeper water at the wharves is a necessity.

The rock mound constructed a little over a year ago at Church Point has kept the gravel from endangering the harbour entrance. A light has been placed atop a cement block for navigational purposes due to a portion of the mound being below water level at high tide.

Work is slated for the repairing of the cribwork of the wharf. A portion has been roped off as being dangerous and unless repaired shortly it may fall into the harbour. At least two sections of the wharf have become dangerous due to rotting cribbing and posters advising of the danger to that portion of the wharf have been posted.

## Canada's New Finance Minister



George C. Nowlan, who represents the constituency of Digby, Annapolis and Kings in the federal parliament, succeeded Donald Fleming as Minister of Finance in a cabinet appointment meeting last Thursday.

Fifth Nova Scotia to hold the office, Mr. Nowlan, 64, faces the task of framing policies geared to provide buoyancy to the Canadian economy at a time when austerity measures have been deemed necessary by the government, as well he is charged with the responsibility of helping preserve commonwealth preferential trade policies which make it easier for goods from the dominions, Canada, New Zealand and Australia, to find their way to the United Kingdom's market place.

Mr. Nowlan, a native of Havelock, Digby County, who has been in the Commons since 1949, got off to a flying start, parrying reporters' questions about the possibility of tax cuts by saying: "No, no, I have no plans for cutting taxes at the moment." He told reporters later he plans no basic changes in Canada's present financial policies and said that the government's austerity program, including surcharges on foreign import, will be lifted "as soon as possible". The dollar would remain pegged at 92½ cents at U. S. funds.

By way of coincidence all five Nova Scotia ministers were of the Baptist faith. "I don't say that offers any special spiritual omen," Mr. Nowlan commented, "but it is interesting."

There's another interesting feature in the appointment of Mr. Nowlan — one that residents of the Annapolis Valley have been watching for years. His predecessor in Parliament for the Valley seat of Digby, Annapolis and Kings is Mr. Ilsley, 68, now chief justice of the Nova Scotia supreme Court.

Mr. Nowlan has been "shadowing" Mr. Ilsley for a long time.

Mr. Ilsley graduated from Acadia and Dalhousie universities; so did Mr. Nowlan, a few years behind. Mr. Nowlan recalls that it was Mr. Ilsley who persuaded him to enter the law profession.

Both returned to Acadia as lecturers after their graduation.

Mr. Ilsley, a Liberal, represented the Valley in Parliament; he was followed by Mr. Nowlan.

Mr. Ilsley's first portfolio was minister of National Revenue — the same appointment Mr. Nowlan received when he joined the government.

Then Mr. Ilsley assumed the duties of minister of finance — the portfolio taken over Thursday by Mr. Nowlan.

In 1946, Mr. Ilsley became minister of justice, retired from politics in 1948, and became a Supreme Court justice in 1949, and chief justice in 1950.

Mr. Nowlan has frequently been mentioned in speculation for a seat on the court bench.

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## About This and That

### Yes, Go Back To School

In but a few weeks you will have made your decision either to go back to school to finish the high school grades or to quit school, mid-stream, to work or idle away the years. While there are these few weeks left to do so we want to pass on to you high school students reasons why your decision should be "Yes, I'll go back to school. We take our answer from The Fundy Fisherman published at Black's Harbour, N. B. According to them, the following message to all high school students was issued by Murray E. Goggin, manager of the National Employment Service, St. Stephen, N. B. It applies not only to N. B. students but to N. S. students as well. We hope students who read The Digby Courier will get some valuable information from the message and will decide "Yes, go back to school."

Attention, A. S. Students —

To those of you who have decided to leave school this year and become wage earners — or to those of you who are perhaps toying with the idea — it might be useful to find out first what's going on in the mind of the person who will interview you when you apply for employment. Some follow on the other side of the desk who assesses what sort of money you should earn; what job you should be doing; and perhaps, what sort of career is in store for you.

You've probably never met him before and he's never met you, so about the only thing he has to go on apart from your general appearance bearing and attitude are your educational qualifications. It probably sounds like a very impersonal way of judging an individual. Nevertheless, your educational qualifications will likely be the final clincher to your finding an adequate job.

Let's look more closely at the attitude to education found in all major organizations. The employment factors outlined are basically standard in all large industrial concerns.

One of the major problems and most significant tasks in industry is that of recruiting well-qualified personnel. This is true at most levels and in most areas of the industrial organization. It is particularly true in the employment of young people who are expected to assume the basic jobs in a company — and more important — who are employed with a view to eventual promotion within the company to supervisory or senior positions. This is basic to a company's long range plans for staff development, and this is where an applicant's educational qualifications become a factor, with preference generally being given to the applicant who possesses a minimum of high school graduation.

It's difficult, perhaps, for young people to appreciate the effect leaving school before graduation can have on their careers in business and industry later on. But it would pay them to sit down for a few minutes and ask themselves two questions before deciding to make their pre-graduation entry into the business world. They should ask themselves: One — what effect will this have on the kind of work I can expect to obtain? And two — what effect can this have on my long range potential for work of interest, responsibility and greater earning prospects?

These things may seem a little remote now, but in a few years' time, when the student of today is faced with the hard economic facts of tomorrow, such matters are very close to home.

The answer to question number one is very simple — no matter what course the person has taken, and no matter what type of work he looks for, he will NOT get the best job open. In fact, in the area of office and clerical functions, he may not be considered employable at all.

There are, of course, a great many junior jobs which do not require high school level of education. However, and this refers to question number two, most companies do not hire for today's immediate needs. They hire with long range promotion prospects in mind and with emphasis upon the applicants' potential to assume increasing responsibilities. In other words, they must have people who can grow in and with the organization.

One of the chief factors in establishing this growth potential is education. This is not to say that every student who leaves school early is incapable of growth in his job, or other jobs, but generally speaking the high school graduate possesses a sound indication of three qualities most significant in determining advancement in industry: basic skills, ability to learn, and persistence or ambition.

Let's look at these three factors one by one as they relate to a person's job and career in industry. First, Basic Skills: The graduate has proof of ability to absorb and apply specific skills as learned in the use of language, mathematics, accounting, machine shop practice or electrical repairs. With the graduate, employers know what he has covered — that he has qualified for certain job standards and that he can use these skills.

Now we come to — Ability to learn. One of the chief qualities of a promotable employee is his ability to acquire and retain new skills, ideas, and master new problems. A high school graduate has proven that he possesses this ability. Once again, I say that a person who leaves school early is not necessarily completely lacking in this quality, but from the point of view of the hiring company, a graduate has proven he possesses it. The non-graduate has not done so, or only to a limited degree.

And finally, there's Persistence or Ambition. We understand that the student is exposed to a great many temptations luring him to leave school. The chance to earn money; to acquire a degree of independence; a car, new clothes, etc. All of these are real magnets to a young person who has spent 9 or ten years studying with limited funds with what appears to be a long time still remaining before he can enter the world of wage earners. The young person who stays on until he has at least finished high school has demonstrated a degree of persistence and ambition. He has been exposed to the temptation of immediate reward for his effort but has

retained his goal of finishing his education, realizing the long range returns for his investment of time while still young.

To summarize then, the high school graduate is going to get the better job to begin with, not because the skills he has are necessarily of immediate use in his job but because he has skills and attitudes that will be basic to his future promotion and growth in industry."

## OPENING NOTICE

### Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban Schools will reopen on Wednesday, September 5th, 1962, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to September 1st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1962-63. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Monday, August 27th to Friday, August 31st between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands seeking admission to Grade XII academic or commercial classes must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval. Students from the Weymouth area are eligible for admission to the Grade XII commercial class on application as outlined above.

For admission to the academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

All prescribed texts for Grades IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

## Raymond's "Come By Chance" Winner

"Come-by-Chance", a vessel designed and built by Wellington Dittmars of Deep Brook, Nova Scotia and skippered by Kelsey Raymond of Smith's Cove was the winner on corrected time of the yacht race from Digby to Saint John, held last Sunday.

The 24'1" sloop crossed the Bay of Fundy in seven hours, fifty-four minutes and thirty seconds actual time and fifth in the actual finish of the yachts racing for the first time in ten years across the Bay. Under Yacht racing rules in order to permit small and large vessels to race against one another a time handicap is devised to scale each yacht according to sail area and water line length in relation to the largest vessel in the race. "Come-by-Chance" with the handicap allotted by the host club the Royal, Kennebecasis Yacht Club ended eight minutes ahead of the fleet. The following is the corrected times of the yachts in order of arrival.

Come by Chance, 5:20:30; Talsman, 5:28:40; White Clover, 5:31:25; Lady K, 6:11:00; Sally, 6:36:00; Ancient Lady, 6:40:00; Mary J, 7:19:50; Mar-T-E-Jane, 7:23:50; Dovekin, did not start; Sea Dawn, 7:25:45, did not sail course; Gannet, returned damaged equipment.

The race was an attempt by the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club and the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club to revive an annual race from Saint John to Digby which was sponsored and inaugurated by the Digby Board of Trade. The race had not been held since 1952 and the eleven boat entry for the 40 mile course was evidence of the great interest of racing yachtsmen in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

Saturday night in Digby the visiting yachtsmen were entertained by the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club with refreshments and a dance. Prior to the reception the yachts sailed around Digby Harbour and though the weather was inclement the yachts under canvas made a beautiful sight in Annapolis Basin.

Sunday morning at 7 the race commenced from the long wharf and by four o'clock in the afternoon the yachts returned to Saint John Harbor through rough north westerly winds and seas with the yachts Gannet the only casualty of the race having a torn mainsail.

The yacht "Come-by-Chance" skippered by Kelsey Raymond had as her crew, Wellington Dittmars of Deep Brook, Mary Lou Raymond of Smith's Cove and John R. Nichols and Kiki Nichols of Digby, Nova Scotia.

## Agriculture Meeting at Conway

Under the auspices of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture, the prospective small fruits and vegetable growers met at the Agricultural Building in Conway, Wednesday, August 8th. Mr. Burtis Freeman, president was in the chair. The purpose of the meeting was outlined by the chairman, being to get the farmers interested in growing small fruits and vegetables together to find out what could be done with the project.

William LeFort, agricultural representative, gave an outline of what had been done in the past to lead up to this meeting. A group of leaders had met in Digby last fall to study the possibility of developing a worthwhile farmers' project in the Digby area. Some of the leaders had also met with representatives from the Kentville Research Station to find out pros and cons of fruit and vegetable growing in this area. Reports of all meeting were favorable for growing of such crops in this area. Our climate is highly suitable to such projects.

Mr. LeFort introduced Mr. Charles Douglas, director of Extension from Truro, who in turn introduced panel members, Gordon Kinsman, Director of Horticulture Division from Truro, Walter Grant, director of Farm Management from Truro, Dale Ellis, Marketing Representative, Truro, and Eugene Chipman from the Research Station of Kentville, who are experts in growing and marketing of small fruits and vegetables.

Mr. Kinsman said that he had been working in the Digby area with farmers growing fruits and vegetables for the last twelve or fourteen years. There has been during this time a lot of interest shown by the farmers to grow small fruits. Strawberries being the quickest and best crop to go in. The growing of blueberries will be a four year project. He stated that if the farmers want to co-operate we can work a program to grow small fruits and vegetables advantageously. Our biggest drawbacks are weeds and diseases, but they can be overcome with patience and determination.

Mr. Eugene Chipman from Kentville said that this area has considerable possibilities lending itself to the growing of some crops that could not be grown in any other part of the province. It is pretty hard to do anything worthwhile in growing late varieties of potatoes; because the competition from Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick is too great. Corn can be better grown in the Annapolis Valley. Very early potatoes and the growing of spinach should be good in this area.

The main question is to get a group of farmers together and work as a group to produce and to market the right adapted crop for the area. To buy a hay baler to bail

Many of the blooms were what would be known in slang as "out of this world" and showed that knowledge went hand and hand with care in bringing the blooms to perfection: the book, War and Peace by Lea Tolstoy and entered by Mrs. ren are given an opportunity to develop skill, an interest in nature and on appreciation of thing lovely.

## More Simplicity

Since the above editorial was crowded out of last week's issue we'll jot a few more lines on effective simplicity in a flower show. Our point is that more people can make entries in the flower show if they have a mind to do so. Granted the show itself is to create interest in the beauty of nature and our opportunities with it and to further skill in horticulture and its more effective use, but none need to say they do not have the skill and materials with which to work. We in this regard refer to a few simple entries which attracted attention at the Weymouth Flower Show. There was the illustration of the book title Gone With The Wind entered by Mrs. Fred Withers. It was a plant (we forget what kind) with which the wind had done its worst or best in scattering the seeds for another year. A. J. Cronin's book, "A Thing of Beauty" was one beautiful and well formed rose in a vase. Other entries which showed imagination and also provided study were The Devil's Garden — a garden made of various kinds of weeds entered by Mrs. K. M. Hankinson — and "A

Good Meal" entered by Martin Adelaar in the children's section. This was a fascinating arrangement of vegetables combined with lobster.

While we are on the subject we also wish to compliment the Weymouth show on its impressive arrangement of the total show — the beautifully arranged stage for the afternoon tea from where the visitors could leisurely admire the whole effect of the show and the general appearance which was viewed as the visitor entered the door. In fact, we believe that the judge for the show found Weymouth to tie 1st place in the 12 shows of which he was official judge.

Again, we admire the skill and cleverness of the more complicated arrangement and the perfectness of bloom. Without these the flower show would degenerate or would lose its real purpose. Just simply want to say there is a place for imagination along with or without skill and ability.

## Something Good From Havelock

Of all the papers which reported the story last week of the appointment of George C. Nowlan as Canada's Minister of Finance, none were more proud to do so than The Digby Courier. All must look with admiration to a man of the capabilities of George C. Nowlan, those within the constituency he represents would feel respect and honor and acclaim would naturally come from many points in Canada where the name of George Nowlan has been read and heard for a good many years through the federal posts he has held.

Time and time again we have heard expressions to indicate that from people who were politically opposed to George but who could not help but respect and admire him. The Digby Courier, too, looks with pride to this man from Digby County in whom the head of the nation has put so much confidence and hope.

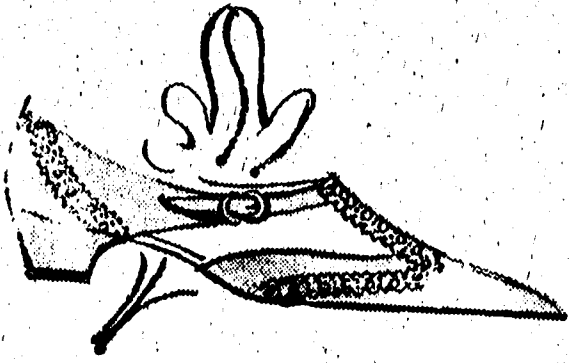

#### HIGH HEELS CAN KILL

"My foot slipped off the brake pedal," was the only defence offered by a young woman whose car killed a young bystander. On her way to a luncheon, she was appropriately dressed, right down to her smooth soled, high heeled shoes. Had she taken the 60 second long precaution of changing to shoes with non skid or ridged soles, 60 years of human life might have been spared.

Canadian shoe manufacturers devote considerable thought to the design of every shoe on the market, the Canadian Highway Safety Council points out. The designer keeps in mind the exact function of the design he produces. Shoes for long standing or walking must have three main features sturdy construction, durable and practical materials and they must provide even distribution of body weight over the foot. On the other hand, an "after 5" shoe with high heels is meant to create an effect of glamor and elegance. With a high heel shoe, the body weight is projected forward on the foot to create a lightness to the step. High heel shoes are worn for short period of time, on special occasions. Shoes suited for recreation, sports, gardening and other summer pursuits are designed with safety factor in mind. Minimum heel heights avoid tripping on uneven terrain, non skid or ridged soles allow faster movement and quicker steps.

Pliable materials give freer foot movement. "The right shoe for the occasion" is a wise policy, claims the Rubber Association of Canada and it becomes logical to assume that suitable, flat or wedge shoe with non skid or ridged sole should be worn for driving.

Dress shoes on the seat beside the driver or in the glove compartment allow a quick change at destination. Those few seconds could mean a lifetime for someone else.

#### SUMMER SEAFOOD SELECTIONS

Summer is easy-on-the-cook time. The warm weather favours dishes that are light, colourful, and simple. Heading the list are attractive salads, sandwiches and easy entrees. Fish and shellfish fit right into this summer menu scheme.

#### WHY NOT FISH SALADS?

Fish, apart from a few canned varieties, are seldom associated with salads. Yet the combination of tender, freshly cooked fish, tangy dressing, and crisp salad vegetables is a delicious one. Escorifier, one of the world's great chefs, knew this and the home economists of Canada's Department of Fisheries say that their experimental cookery has convinced them of it. They offer the following helpful hints on preparing fish for use in salads:

Cook and chill the fish as shortly before serving time as is convenient.

Good ways to cook fish which you plan to serve cold are: baking in a covering of aluminum foil, steaming, and poaching.

Accent the delicate flavour of cooked, chilled fish by liberal use of salt, lemon juice, and fresh garden herbs.

**Fish Salad**  
1 pound fish fillets, cooked and flaked  
½ teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon pepper  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons chopped mint  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
**Lettuce**  
¼ cup mayonnaise  
Cucumber slices  
Tomato wedges  
Flake fish, season with salt and pepper, and sprinkle with

lemon juice. Add herbs, reserving 2 teaspoons of mixed parsley and mint for use as a garnish. Combine fish and herbs. Chill well. Line four serving plates with crisp lettuce leaves. Mould equal portions of fish in the centre of each plate. Coat fish with mayonnaise and sprinkle with remaining chopped herbs. Around the edge of each plate arrange cucumber slices and tomato wedges. 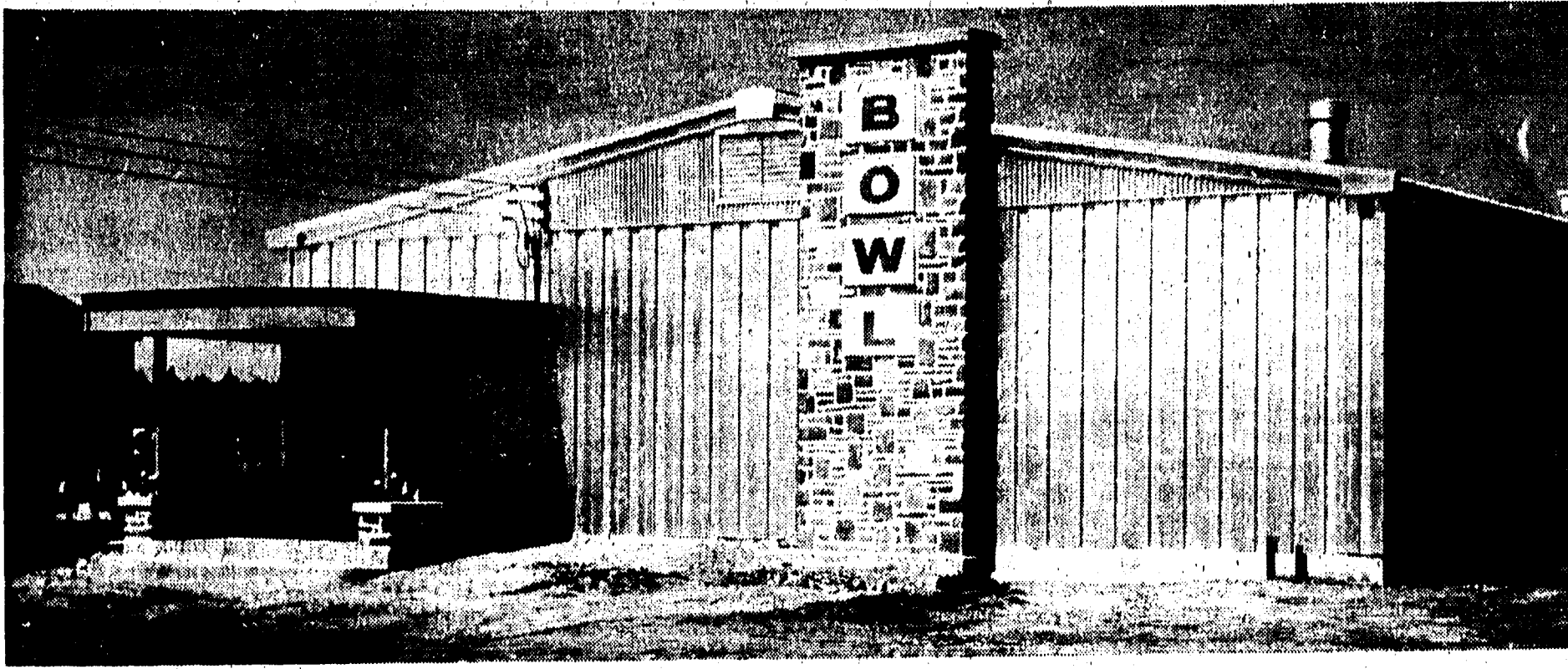

The Scallop Bowl Limited, pictured above, Digby's newest bowling establishment, will be officially opened this Saturday.

Situated in Conway, next to Fundy Motors Ltd., the building, 50 ft. by 120 ft. is constructed of heavy gauge steel and is thoroughly insulated. The canopy entrance is enhanced by stone planter boxes with a gay profusion of flowers. A matching stone chimney, in which the fluorescent letters of the sign are recessed, makes an attractive front. The lobby is paneled in cherry wood, the floor is carpeted with a rosy beige colored broadloom, and the remainder of the floors are tiled. The walls of the bowling area are heavily draped in a beige background with designs that harmonize with the rest of the decor.

The lighting arrangement is most effective. There is a non-glare brightness to the Scallop Bowl produced by ornamental ceiling fixtures in the lobby and over the snack bar, while ceiling recessed fluorescent lights make the lanes as light as day.

Also installed is a well equipped coffee bar.

The bowling lanes, the core of the set-up, eight in number, are modern in every respect. Bowl-Mor equipped, they are one hundred percent automatic.

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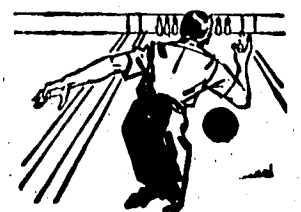

of small fruits and vegetables without a great outlet of capital. To make a profit on strawberry growing you should grow between four and five thousand quarts a year.

Dale Ellis of the Marketing Division said that to increase production the farmers need the right soils and the markets to dispose of the production. To sell what you grow, you must follow the regular marketing channels, and compete with the local markets. The products will have to be packaged, graded, and put on the market in competition with all other parts of the province. We have a population of over 20,000 people to feed in Digby County, we should at least try to supply a portion of what is consumed in the area. We should try to grow crops that are earlier here than in other parts. Small fruits, comprising strawberries, raspberries, and blueberries are among some of the products that can be put on the market quite early. Firms who are buying farm products would rather work through a central organization than to have to telephone all the different farmers of the region.

Early crops will move quickly, but late crops need cold storage and will have to be centralized for packaging and grading.

After a lively discussion by the panel members the meeting was then divided into three groups to study the following questions:

1. Do you think that small fruits and vegetables can be grown in the Digby area profitably? — Main obstacle?

2. Do you think that enough farmers would be interested to make it worthwhile?

3. Are you prepared to do your share in this program? Names of those who are decided to grow fruit and vegetables on a commercial basis. To the first question all groups answered in the affirmative. The main obstacles were weeds, marketing, right type of machinery and irrigation.

To the second and third questions all groups answered yes.

Those interested in growing fruit and vegetables in a commercial way are: H. M. Warner, Reginald Andrews, Lloyd Jefferson, Burtis Freeman, A. Thomas, Arthur MacKay, B. C. Chisholm, Allison Denton, Gerald Chute, Bruce Read, Maurice Milbury, Oliver Belliveau, Kenneth Marshall, Gordon Morine and Guy Porter. Through general discussion it was found that seven farmers present at the meeting were already in vegetables on a commercial basis and four were in small fruits.

It was also mentioned that strawberries from this area go on the local market for the first week and then go on the Saint John market via Princess Helene. It was also pointed out that during the first part of the season the only competition was from Florida. The farmers of the Digby area could sell 15,000 quarts of strawberries a day on the Saint John market for the first two weeks of the strawberry season. If we wanted to sell some of our crops to the United States we would have to make contracts or agreements with some firms who are already putting such crops on the markets. It was strongly emphasized that if farmers from Digby want to profit from their advantageous position of having a good climate for growing fruits and vegetables, they should strongly organize and use their co-operative organization to market their produces.

## Visits Home Soldier's Grave

Miss Patricia Potter who is spending a year in London, England, visited the grave of the late Roger Specht at Bramshott church yard in England. 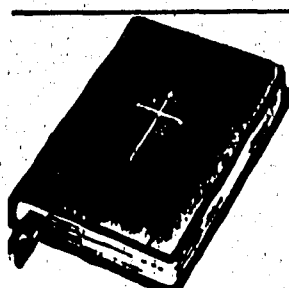

Annual inspection of cadets from University Naval Training Divisions across Canada who have been taking summer training at this sprawling naval establishment will be carried out Thursday, August 30, by Rear Admiral K. L. Dyer, Flag Officer Atlantic Coast.

The cadets, who are striving for commissions in the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve, will be mustered 250 strong on the giant parade square — all of them bearing arms and at their ceremonial best in this formal culmination of a summer of training with the Royal Canadian Navy. The Cornwallis band will provide martial music.

The general public is cordially invited by naval authorities to witness this highlight of cadet achievement.

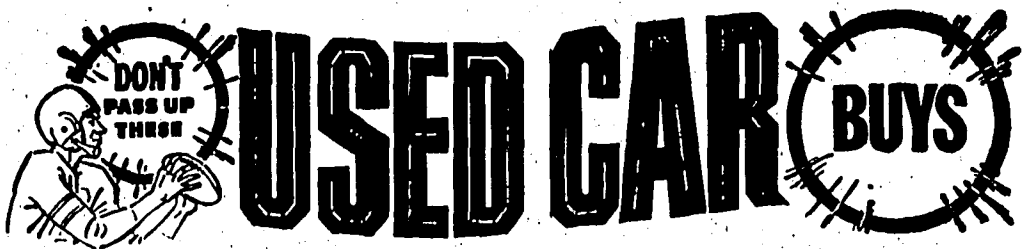

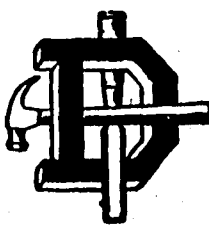

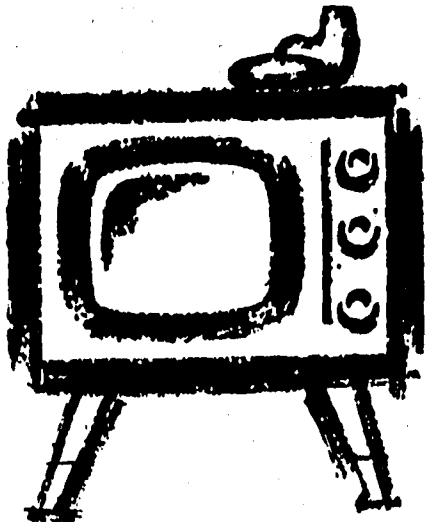

## OPENING NOTICE Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban Schools will reopen on Wednesday, September 5th, 1962, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to September 1st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1962-63. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Monday, August 27th to Friday, August 31st between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands seeking admission to Grade XII academic or commercial classes must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval. Students from the Weymouth area are eligible for admission to the Grade XII commercial class on application as outlined above.

For admission to the academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

All prescribed texts for Grade IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

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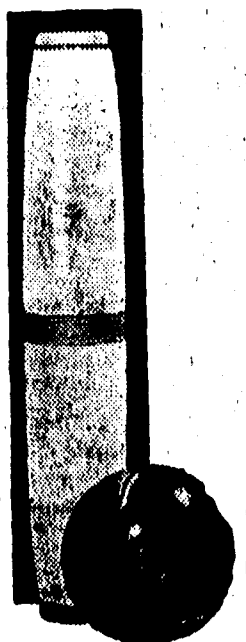

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### Greenwood Show Thrills Spectators

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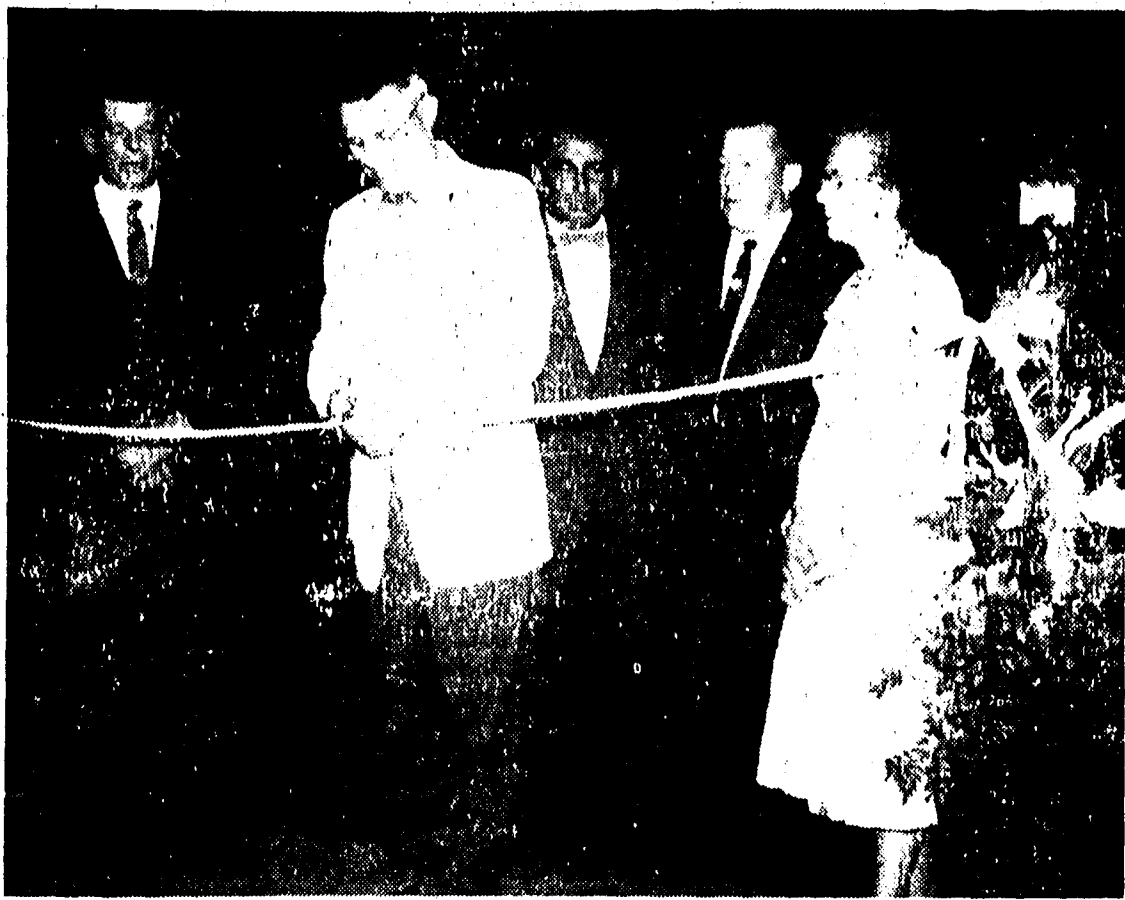

## Plans C.D. Program

Thomas Cleveland, director of Civil Defence for the town of Digby, presided at a meeting of Digby C.D. chiefs on Tuesday night to line up a program for the next ten months. Mr. Cleveland reported that Donald Macnam, of Wolfville, Zone Co-ordinator in C.D. had visited Digby last week and requested a general outline of plans by September 5.

William MacLeod, head of the C.D. general welfare program for Digby, stated that he has planned a meeting of the chiefs of committees for September 18 and thereafter it is expected they will meet monthly. He reported that his branch is still in need of a convenor for the housing committee to take the place of Mrs. Evelyn Patterson, who had resigned.

Mr. MacLeod also informed the meeting that he intends to hold three whole day courses in Welfare before June 1963. Each course is expected to be six hours long, and the complete course should train about 45 or 50. Lectures will be given by the committee chiefs on feeding, housing, etc., and others under other committees will be invited to attend. In the meantime, his committees will be planning equipment and supplies which will be needed and present a budget. Mr. MacLeod said that one necessity is a filing cabinet and a place to keep the welfare kit when it arrives. He also requested signs to designate the welfare quarters directions.

Graham Saunders, who heads the committee on Radiation Monitoring said he has planned courses for three weeks, two or three nights a week, totalling about 20 hours. He expects to accommodate ten in each class. It was also suggested that the firemen might wish to take advantage of the radiation course. Mr. Saunders' problem was some place to store the containers of radioactive substances weighing 350 lbs.

Earl Anderson of the rescue committee expects to have an 8 week course, according to his report. He considered eight to be a good number for a successful class. ## DR. LEIGHTON ADDRESSES KIWANIS



Above, standing is Dr. A. H. Leighton, Ithaca, N. Y., and Smith's Cove, N. S., who on Thursday last addressed the Digby Kiwanis Club on the Cornell Program in Digby County embracing the field of psychiatry. Tracing the history of psychiatry, Dr. Leighton said that after the last war many people throughout North America became concerned about the prevalence of psychiatric disorder. Problems had arisen in the armed forces but, it was also evident that there was much mental and emotional disturbance in the general population. Government, industry, medical schools, universities, foundations and institutions concerned themselves because, among other reasons, the economic aspects of caring for nervous and mental disorders was cause for concern.

A study to find the cause of mental disorders sprang up and a number of research projects started. The study in Digby County was one of the earliest on this continent and was followed by studies in New Haven, Connecticut, and in the city of New York. Dr. Leighton is responsible for the New York study and also for the Digby study.

Dr. Leighton said that psychiatric disorder is unbelievably common but we must keep in mind that there are various degrees of mental ill-health. There are a few people, the speaker continued, who have no mental or emotional disturbance of any kind. There are also the severely disturbed who are psychotic, who have delusions and hallucinations and who require hospitalization or special care at home. Most people, however, he said, are in between these two extremes. Most everyone gets depressed at times without reason, has spells of anxiety without circumstances to warrant them, prone to general nervousness or has high blood pressure or an emotional nature. But, not everyone, Dr. Leighton said, is handicapped by these disturbances. The answer to how many people have mental ill health to a degree which inter-

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## Resolution Referred Back

The municipality of Digby resolution which would ask government permission to tax Nova Scotia Power Commission holdings in the county was referred back to committee Tuesday at the meeting of Nova Scotia Municipalities in session at Sydney, N. S. The Digby submission said the government operated Power Commission had "recently acquired and will probably further acquire substantial holdings of land, as well as assets of the Digby County Power Board hitherto taxable and has in addition made large expenditure for construction of hydro-electric plants".

It asks amendment to the Power Commission Act. Warden Walters of Lunenburg, for the resolutions committee, said: "The committee does not recommend this resolution. This operation is incurring a loss, thereby being subsidized by the people of Nova Scotia generally and we should not ask them to increase the subsidization by having the government pay grants in lieu of taxation."

Coun. Gordon Crossley, of West Hants, claimed the commission should not be subsidized, and should be assessed the same as others. Coun. Angus B. MacDonald of Glace Bay, said the government should pay subsidy or taxes. He said Glace Bay's Caledonia Light & Power Company had to go to the government for permission to meet its budget. "Why should the power commission be subsidized?"

Coun. Wendell Coldwell, of Groves Point, a member of the resolutions committee, said private power companies had taken best paying areas, had scooped up the cream, and that the commission was providing service for people in previously abandoned areas — because no profits could be made.

He said the resolution was in effect taxing the people for services which were their just due.

It would tend to add to cost of rural electrification, especially in areas where private enterprise will not go, because there is no money to be made, said Mr. Coldwell.

Mayor Kauffman, of Amherst, charged acquisition of the Maritime Electric Company by the Power Commission two years ago had not yielded any benefits to consumers although tax revenue had been lost. The assets should remain taxable, he said.

Mayor Hill said the committee should consider representations from communities which own and operate utilities.

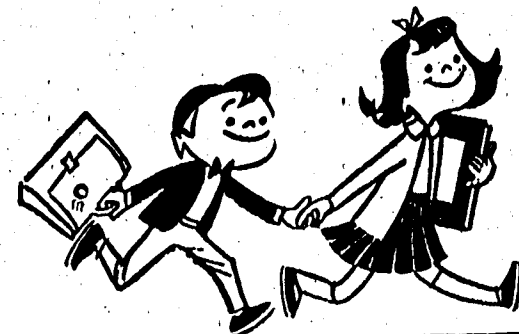

fers with their work and family life was not known before the psychiatric surveys got underway 10 to 15 years ago. Surveys, he said, have given similar results in the populations studied.

The results of the survey in Digby County show that three percent of the population are in the severely ill bracket with such conditions as schizophrenia and senility, Dr. Leighton stated. Sev-

enteen percent are less ill but somewhat impaired as people with low grade chronic psychoneurosis, he continued; 37 percent have symptoms of nervousness and related disturbances but are not impaired to any significant degree; the doubtful and those who have no evidence of disturbance. These results are based on a random sample of over a thousand adults from all parts of Digby County. Dr. Leighton stressed the fact that the

great majority of people represented in the percentage figures of illness are affected only in a mild degree and that the findings in Digby County are very similar to those of other areas studied, especially the New York City area.

The young are relatively free from mental disturbances, the speaker said, and we are more likely to develop disorders until around 70 years when there is some tendency of drop off. At that age, he said, many people seem to develop a sort of detached philosophy. Women, he noted, are more prone to psychiatric disorder than men and types of disorder are different. Women lean to psychoneurotic disturbances while men tend to disorders that involve drinking and delinquent behaviour.

Psychiatric disorders, Dr. Leighton intimated, are not a privilege of the rich but are a burden of the poor. Those in the low income bracket have a greater prevalence to disorders. Education also seems to be a factor for good mental health, those without at least high school education being more susceptible to mental illness.

Disintegrated communities have a high frequency of psychiatric disorder, Dr. Leighton remarked. Indeed, he said, there is a feeling that community disintegration is one of several major causes of psychiatric disorder. He stressed leadership, fellowship, stable families and groups active in church and community affairs as being important for good mental health.

Dr. Leighton said that the co-operation he received in Digby was splendid and he is grateful to the leaders of Digby County and the people. One reason that Digby was chosen for the study was that it offered a wide range of different living conditions in a small geographic space. It also happened that both the Federal and Provincial Governments were interested in the problem and willing to foster research in various ways. Interest by Acadia and Dalhousie Universities provided additional resources, he said. And finally, he continued, through long acquaintances with Digby County — 46 years this month — I have the privilege of knowing many of its leaders and all the different parts of the county who understood the work and offered co-operation. This perhaps was the most determining factor in considering the area.

Dr. Leighton said that funds come from four main sources: the Dominion-Provincial Mental Health grants, the Province itself, the Milbank Memorial Fund and the

Carnegie Corporation of New York.

The Cornell Program has expanded, he said, and since the work began here some fourteen years ago, the field has expanded greatly. Studies are now going on in Denmark, Iceland, and the United Kingdom. Small projects have been conducted in Mexico, Alaska and Southern France, and a major one has just been concluded in Nigeria. Another is being conducted in Sweden. What of the future? Dr. Leighton asked. Although sweeping psychotic disorders are no commoner than one might expect, the mild and chronic type are exceedingly prevalent. The fact that they are mild should not obscure the fact that they exact an enormous toll in human suffering and in community inefficiency. It is clear, he said, that psychiatric treatment as it is practiced today cannot take care of all the important aspects of the problem. Despite the multitudes of people who are munching Miltown and other taking sleeping pills and tranquilizers, and despite the numbers getting treatment from psychiatrists, medical resources are not enough. This puts emphasis on prevention. Prevention in psychiatry means involvement in projects of community development the study seems to suggest. "The way is long and twisting, however, and the lighting dim, hence the reason for research to provide illumination," he said in conclusion.

Dr. Leighton was introduced by Dr. J. R. McCleave and thanked by C. M. Levy. The meeting was presided over by president, Edward Twohig. Charles Hall was in charge of the program.

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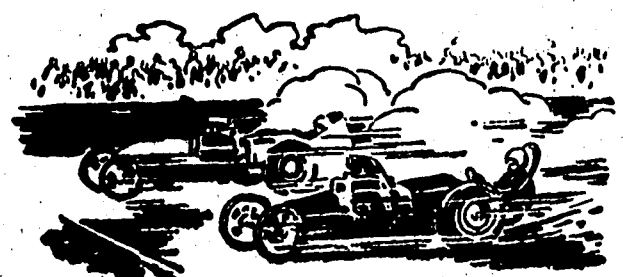

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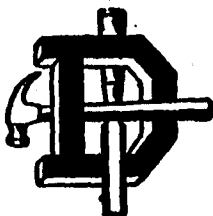

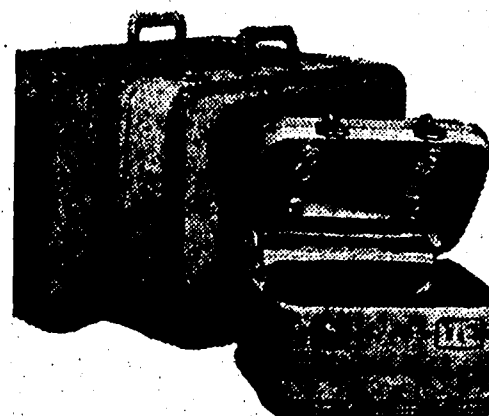

## Drivers Don't Know Meaning Of Crosswalks

Digby Chief of Police Webster Dunn charged on Tuesday night at the Digby Town Council meeting that drivers of cars do not know what crosswalks mean. People who know they are being protected by the crosswalk start across but cars fail to see their responsibility and continue on with pedestrians just having to take the chances. He advocated a program of education in this regard so that motorists would become acquainted with the clause on pedestrian's right of way in section 107(1) of the Motor Vehicle Act. The section reads —

"The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a marked crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk at the end of a block, except at intersections where the movement of traffic is being regulated by peace officers or traffic control signs."

The above section is going to be strictly enforced.

The discussion arose from the police report which said that a coroner's jury recently had advocated a crosswalk and signs on Warwick St. after the inquest into the recent death of a child on Warwick St. This was the first fatality of its kind in Digby for the past ten years and every effort was being made to protect the children from future fatalities. One at the council meeting described the speed in some sections as "out of this world" and the area as "a speed race track." Warwick St. was mentioned as being most vulnerable as there are many children living on the busy street and many who must cross the street.

Several suggestions were made such as another blinker sign on or near the hospital hill, bring in a motor cycle or hire a radar. Awaiting further investigation on these, it was decided to mark a crosswalk near Brad's General Store and at the King St. corner and also to erect signs warning motorists about children and speed zones.

## Town Council Meets

Among the items of business transacted at the regular meeting of the Digby Town Council on Tuesday night was the granting of a licence to Mrs. Brenda Campbell to operate a taxi in the town of Digby.

A permit was granted to Avarad Collins to build a house on the corner of West Street and Prince William Street. Action was also taken to have the corner surveyed in order to note the line of property.

It was decided at Tuesday night's meeting to ask the Department of Highways to share in the work which is planned for Victoria Street in the town's paving program. It was noted that this street was used for through traffic and most of this traffic could be classified as heavy.

The Chief of Police, Webster Dunn, said that two valves on the sidewalks on the front street were protruding from the ground and recommended that they be attended to immediately.

The subject of the parking meter posts without heads from the residence of Fred McBride to the Post Office came in for discussion. It was decided to leave them for the present, as several councillors favored parallel parking and thought that possibly the town might revert to this some time in the future. Two-hour, one-hour and half-hour zone parking was also discussed.

Stabilization of roads by means of a salt application was brought up before the councillors, but was left for future investigation. The process would involve digging up the street to a depth of 3 or 4 inches and applying salt to mix with the dirt. This, according to the circular letter would relieve dust, relieve bumps from frost and in time, have an effect like pavement.

A letter from the Department of Municipal Affairs drew to the attention of the town that chartered banks would not be allowing advances of money by over-draft after September 1st and that borrowing would have to be done by note when required. The letter issued practical advice on not borrowing greatly in excess of requirements.

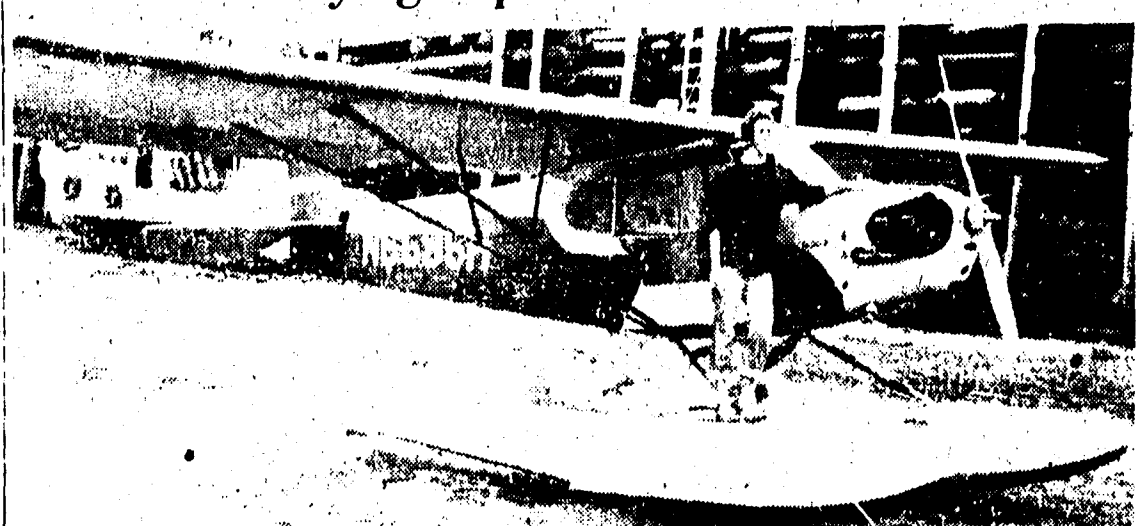
The police report given by Councillor Morrell showed that twenty complaints had been laid in August. Twelve required investigation and all but two terminated to satisfaction. Eight cases came before the courts — two under the criminal code and six under the Nova Scotia Liquor Act. Four motor vehicle violations were investigated. He stated that the police reported being happy to have been able to find those who have been doing so much of the breaking and entering in the past few months. Mr. Morrell also placed before the council the matter of considering a police car for the town. He noted that in one week the Chief of Police had used his car for town purposes to the extent of 300 miles. With a police car, he stated, much better patrol of the town could be maintained. It was decided that the police committee bring in further details at the next meeting.

Rev. H. S. Hartlin, pastor of Digby Baptist Church, was the preacher of the sermon on the Baptist Convention Sunday for members of the convention and people of surrounding areas held in Wolfville in the auditorium of Acadia University administration building.

"Baptists have a singular opportunity to present the world with a picture of true brotherhood; witness cannot be effectually made, however, behind a wall of partition."

## Flying Reporter Safe At Home



Miss Anne Wyman, Cambridge and Boston, Mass., shown above with the Piper J-3 Cub she was flying, is flying back to her home town and city after vacationing in Nova Scotia. An ordinary vacation tour does not usually cause so much concern but Anne Wyman's was just a bit different and when her friends at the Boston Globe had not heard of her safe return, they became alarmed, made known their concern and were ready, it is understood, to send out a search and rescue. Anne's vacation was different in that she manned and travelled solely by seaplane above.

Miss Wyman's last port of call, before leaving Nova Scotia, was Digby. Here Miss Wyman, who was guest of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Snow, had made in her short stay some sincere friends who were disturbed greatly when word came on Thursday that she was reported missing. A few phone calls relieved anxiety when it was discovered the woman flyer had, because of fog, landed at Seal Harbour, Maine, instead of Rockland, where she had intended to land.

Miss Wyman, who is a valued member of the Boston Globe staff, occupying the suburban desk, had been flying the seaplane above for only two weeks but had been operating planes since 1955.

She did not take a special flying course but learned from friends and then applied for a license. The seaplane she brought to Nova Scotia belonged to Rodney S. Gorham, flying instructor, Boston, formerly of Wood's Harbour, N. S., and a member of the flying club in Beverley, Mass. Miss Wyman had during her flying career done acrobatic flying in England. She had also visited Scandinavian countries but not for flying purposes.

Anne, a former student of McGill University and a B.A. graduate from American colleges, arrived in Digby on Monday afternoon after leaving Haverhill airport the previous week. She came across Cape Split, landed at the Strait of Canso, visited Pictou, St. Margaret's Bay, Wood's Harbour and then Digby, where she was delayed because of fog. She left Digby at 2:30 on Tuesday with the intention of landing at Rockland, visiting friends at Pulpit Harbour for a few days, proceed to Haverhill and drive by car to Boston. Her change of landing plans, because of weather, caused the consternation. After being out for about 20 minutes over Grand Manan she found the weather alarmingly uncomfortable and flew at 2,000 feet above the clouds, landing at Seal Harbour.

Only one difficulty was experienced by Miss Wyman. Someone had put the cap on backwards when filling the gas tank and the gas would not feed through. She was forced to land in Shelburne. She also had difficulty in finding Peggy's Cove as it wasn't marked on her chart. She had promised to meet friends at Peggy's and tried to locate the place by asking a couple whom she had seen sitting on the balcony at their home. The couple, evidently disturbed by the approaching plane left for shelter within the house so she taxied away not getting the information she needed and, no doubt, leaving a curious and wondering couple. She then decided to "yell" to men in a fishing boat. They advised her to go down a certain direction, look left and she'd see a lighthouse. That would be Peggy's Cove. Anne found Peggy's Cove but was unable to find a landing so she still did not see her friends.

Anne spoke most highly of the courteousness and hospitality of the Nova Scotia people. She said they had given her food, helped with her plane, found gas, and many other hospitable gestures. Digby climaxed the Nova Scotia hospitality, Miss Wyman said, when interviewed by the Digby Courier editor.

Another booth which had been complete in judging was the fruit and as previously, the judges pronounced the peaches exhibited by Russell Henshaw, of Deep Brook, as superior to any grown in Nova Scotia.

Another booth which has shown marks of improvement during the past few years is that of the 4H Club. This year seemed to excel all previous years in fancy work, garments, displays of vegetables, and other exhibits. Present were 4H Clubs from Bear River, Weymouth Falls and St. Bernard. The press was advised that the number of entries from 4H Calf Clubs exceeded other years and numbered 13. All other booths including art, domestic booths, school booths, vegetables and flower were considered equal to previous years or surpassed and in the latter case, the cooking particularly applied.

## Capt. Wormell, Scallop Pioneer, Passes

Capt. Roland Albert Wormell, who pioneered the development of the scallop fishing industry in Digby, passed at the Digby General Hospital Thursday, at the age of 86.

Born in Grand Manan, a son of Albert and Abby (Hynden) Wormell, Captain Wormell started going to sea at an early age and soon became captain of his own fishing boat.

In the early 1920's Captain Wormell decided to explore the commercial possibilities of the scallop beds which he felt existed on the floor of Digby harbor and the Bay of Fundy. With a scallop rake he borrowed from fishermen in Chester he conducted experimental scallop fishing in the Digby area and found that there seemed to be large beds. He found that the Chester equipment was not suitable for dragging these beds and designed and patented his own scallop dragging rake, the basic design of which is still in use today.

First shipment of Digby scallops to the Boston market by Capt. Wormell was made about 1922 and consisted of 55 pounds. Since that time the scallop industry in Digby has grown to an average total seasonal catch of some three-quarters of a million pounds, most of which go to U.S. markets.

At the time that H.R.H. Princess Margaret visited Digby in 1958, Capt. Wormell was one of the special guests presented to her. He, in turn, presented the princess with one of his rare totally blue scallop shells. When the Digby Scallop Queen was selected each year, it was Capt. Wormell who was usually chosen to crown the queen.

Capt. Wormell is survived by his wife, the former Laura Costley, of Massachusetts; a son, Harold, of Digby, and a daughter, Hilda (Mrs. Joseph MacDormand), also of Digby, and two grandchildren, Margaret and Barry MacDormand.

The body rested at Jayne's Funeral Home in Digby until Saturday, when funeral services were held from Grace United Church at two o'clock. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, Digby.

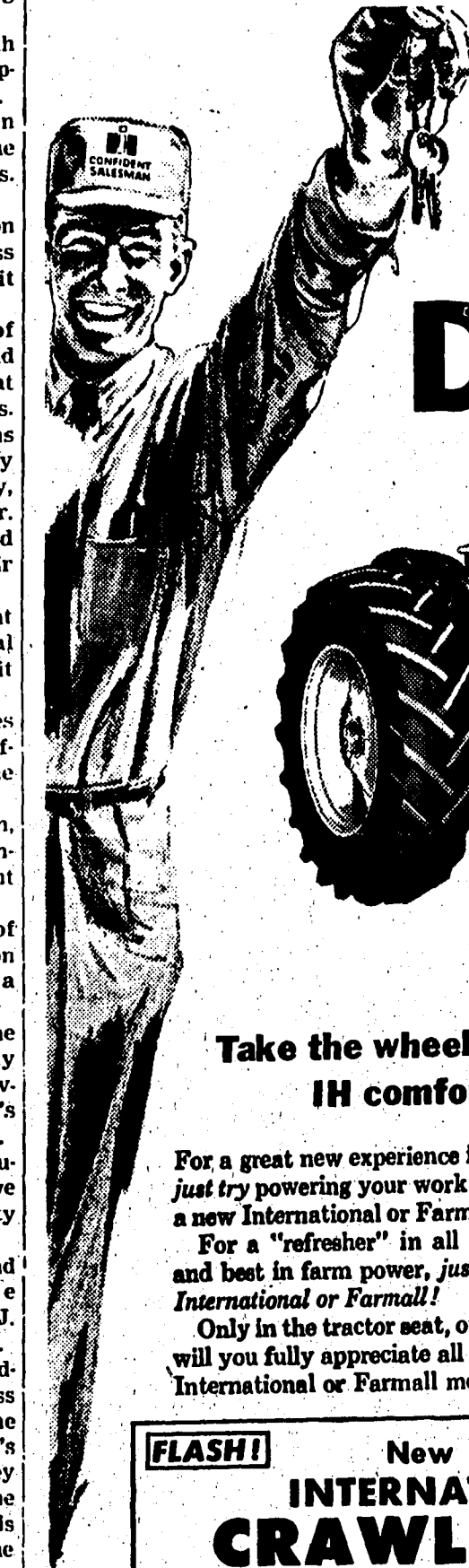

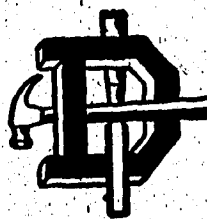

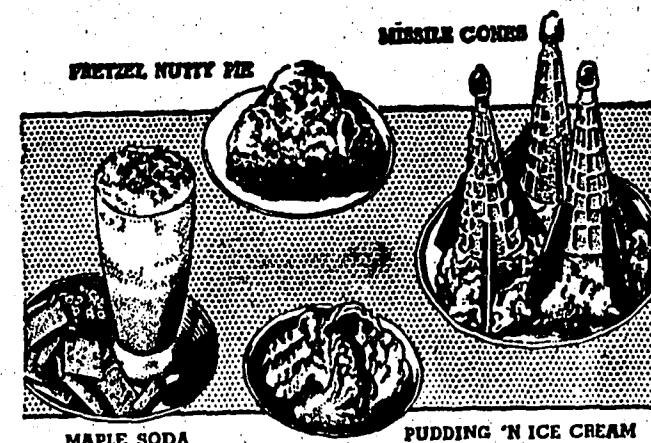

The solicitor's services were obtained in the first place by the builder and he'll have to stand by his client. Remember, most legal actions are the result of misunderstandings rather than deliberate attempts to cheat. You may buy a house and have no legal difficulties, but if you happen to run into trouble it is comforting to know you have a lawyer to advise you on your legal rights.

## HOUSING HINTS

Question — Do most new homeowners buy rather than build their own houses?

Answer — Yes they do. By far the greatest number purchase ready built houses and there are several reasons for this. First of all the prospective homeowner sees exactly what he's paying for and he knows definitely what it's going to cost him. It's a much less complicated transaction for the purchaser and he is sometimes able to move into his new home immediately. More important, perhaps, is the fact that the house will probably cost less than if he were to build one of the same size and quality of construction.

## HOUSING FOR AGED

Premier Stanfield announced today that the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia is prepared to assist sponsoring groups in providing low rental housing for senior citizens.

The Premier said that assistance by the province together with assistance under the National Housing Act should enable community groups in Nova Scotia to provide comfortable low rental housing for citizens in the older brackets.

Mr. Stanfield further stated that community interest and financial participation was essential to the successful construction and continued operation of housing for elderly people. These elderly people, he said, needed not only housing, but also the knowledge that their own community and its citizens were interested in their welfare.

The sponsoring group in order to qualify for provincial assistance must:

Be established on a non-profit basis (that is the contributors will receive neither repayment of nor interest on their contributions);

Raise 10 per cent of the cost of the project;

Arrange for a loan under the National Housing Act in an amount equal to the difference between the cost of the project and the total of the contributions by the sponsoring group and the province.

The province will contribute \$500.00 for each unit of housing accommodation or 10 per cent of the cost of the project, whichever is the lesser amount.

## CAN WE FALL OFF THE EARTH?

We cannot fall off the earth, no matter where we are on its surface. The earth is round a great ball, and if we were to journey in the same direction forever, we should simply continue to go around and around it, as a fly walks around and around a tennis ball. We should not come to any place where we could fall off.

## Visits New York

Miss Brenda Thurber, Freeport, delegate to the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth sponsored by the Oddfellows and Rebekahs of Canada and the United States, has returned and reports on her trip as follows:

"I left Digby on the Princess Helene on Saturday, 7th July, and when I arrived in Saint John I joined the other delegates from the Maritime times who were accompanied by Mrs. Helen Giddens, as chaperone. We travelled by bus throughout the night and arrived in New York at 3 p.m. the following afternoon. We were assigned rooms at the Shearson - Atlantic Hotel and in the evening joined 176 delegates and their chaperones from all parts of Canada and the United States to get acquainted.

"Each day from 8:45 a.m. until approximately 4 p.m., was spent in the United Nations buildings. We were taken on guided tours of buildings and attended sessions of different councils of the U.N. Each delegate had the opportunity of listening to discussions by various representatives of nations through earphones translating in five different languages. We had interviews with various ambassadors and it was my privilege to talk with the ambassadors from the Netherlands and Russia.

"We were taken on a boat trip around Manhattan Island and viewed many points of interest such as Yankee Stadium, George Washington Bridge, Empire State Building and the Statue of Liberty. Other recreations were a visit to Radio City Music Hall where we were entertained by a most interesting and enjoyable program which included the Rockettes, Orchestra and Organ selections, stage show and movie, "That Touch of Mink". We also had the privilege of attending a performance on stage of My Fair Lady.

"All delegates had an opportunity to shop one afternoon and evening. We had dinner at International House and met and talked with students from many different countries. An Hawaiian girl entertained us here with her native dances which were much enjoyed.

"Each delegate was required

to give a three minute speech stating what was most impressive about the United Nations and this contest was won by a girl from Alberta, a boy from Iowa, and a boy from Vermont. "I would like to express my sincere appreciation to all those who made my trip possible. I shall never forget it and I have many wonderful memories and friends I shall cherish always. "I hope through this report I have shared these wonderful experiences with you and that we realize more fully the important role the U.N. plays in the world today.

## URGE SALES TO NORTHERN BASES

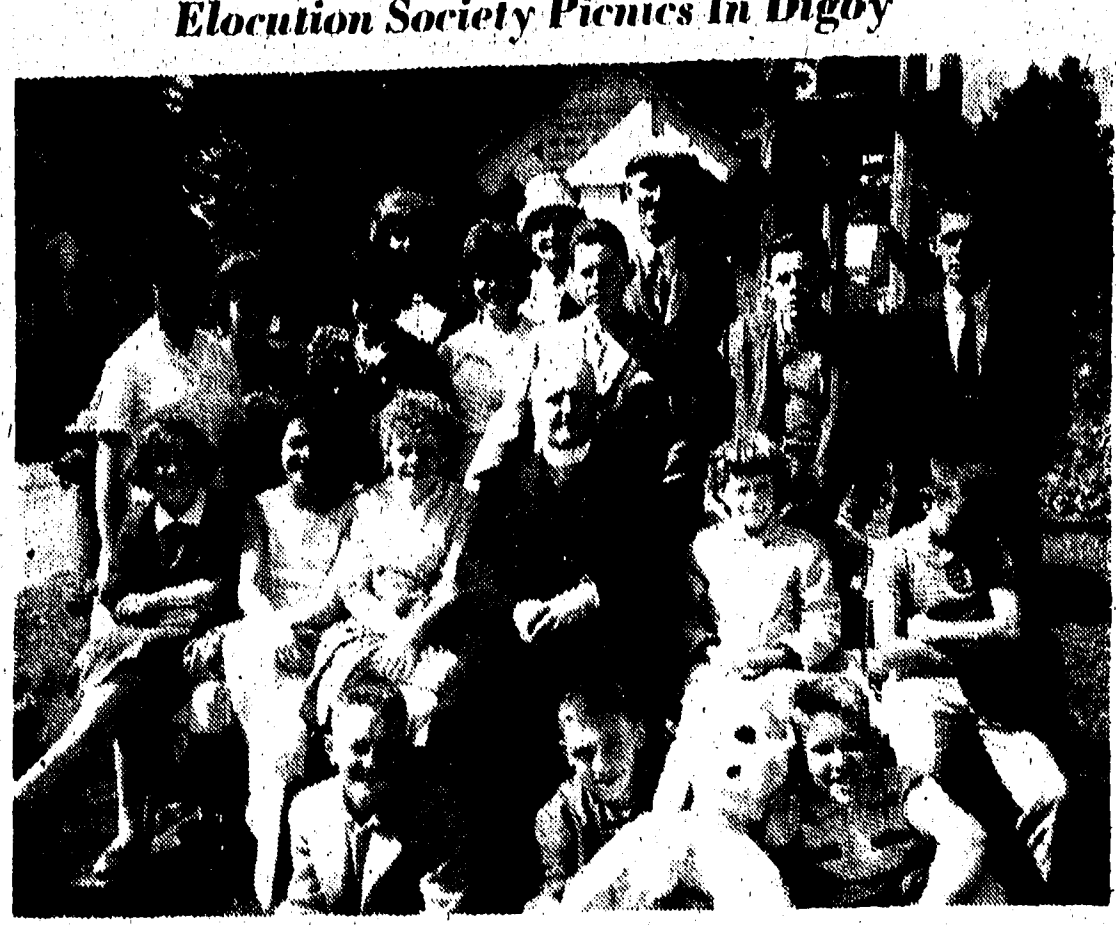
The Northern Trade Committee of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council reports that present conditions offer excellent opportunities for Atlantic Provinces producers to sell to American Defence Bases in Northern Canada.

The APEC committee under the chairmanship of R. M. Scott, Moncton, noted that Washington officials, in the light of favourable American-Canadian exchange rates, have instructed their procurement officers at bases in Canada to take advantage of this discount by buying from Canadian suppliers whenever possible.

But, states APEC, "The initiative to sell must come from the Atlantic Provinces suppliers themselves. Selling to these base exchange stores is not much different than selling to any other large retail outlet. They must be made aware of products available".

The committee also advised that these bases are anxious to have Canadian businessmen visit them and display their wares.

Information concerning sales and contact procedures for entry into the lucrative market is available through the central APEC office in Halifax.

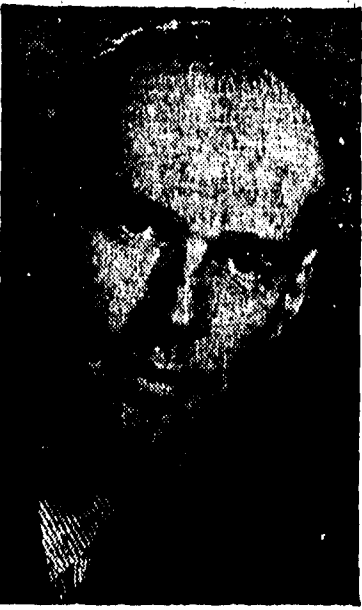

## Addresses Convention



Premier Robert Stanfield, in addressing the Maritime Professional Engineers Conference at the Digby Pines Hotel on Friday night, compared politicians with engineers. Politicians, he said, work in the realm of ideas and their plan of action is from ideas. Engineers, he said, on the other hand, work with things, materials. Both, he said, are builders. Politicians have to rely on judgment for results, while engineers have something more concrete and tangible to work on. Both, he said, must work with people and he suggested that neither the economic or human relations should be ignored in making decisions. He said that politicians are striving to build a better society and called on scientists and engineers also to use their knowledge and skills for betterment of society. He said they are free to take part in the process which determines man's way of life.

In many parts of the world, the premier said, man's body has become the mere servant of the country in which individual freedom of choice has disappeared. However, he said, that history shows that the possession of a man's body does not mean possession of a man's mind. The mind of man is a stubborn factor. He said there was a great day ahead for engineers, the door has just been opened, the key in the lock of knowledge has just been turned. He warned against over efficiency at the expense of their sense of man's humanity.

## Another Brief Presented By Air Strip Committee

It was decided at the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday night to request the Airstrip Committee of the board, to prepare another brief to present to the Digby Municipal Council at its fall special meetings. A brief, presented by the Digby Board at the Spring Municipal meeting, asking endorsement of a move to establish an airstrip, was voted down. In view of further developments it was decided to present the brief again.

A number of areas in the vicinity of Digby were mentioned as being suitable for an airstrip. One area which had been previously mentioned was in Lansdowne. Another was the Rufus Connor property at Lighthouse Road, which had been granted a franchise in the nineteen twenties. Either of these properties members of the board considered would be suitable locations for an airstrip and have room for expansion. The consensus of opinion was that the airstrip if and when established should be within Digby County.

At the meeting on Tuesday evening the airstrip committee was asked to contact the Fundy Flying Club to have figures on requests for charted flights to present before the Digby Municipal Council. Revived interest in a Digby airstrip came about after a letter from the Fundy Flying Club was read at the August meeting of the Digby Board of Trade. At that time H. M. Warne had intimated that he had a proposal to make to the airstrip committee of the Digby Board and John Nichols, chairman of the committee, was asked to investigate the proposition.

A letter from the Saint John, N. B., Board of Trade was read on Tuesday evening stating that the executive of the Saint John Board would be happy to meet with the executive of the Digby Board in October regarding ferry transportation between the two towns. (Please turn to page 10)

## Takes Action Re Closing Life Saving Station

The Digby Board of Trade in regular session at the town hall on Tuesday evening moved the ratification of the action of the Board president, Mrs. J. M. Wallis, in sending a telegram of protest, on behalf of the Board, to Hon. George Nowlan regarding the closing of the Life Saving Station at Bay View. The motion also requested the president to write to the minister of transport, Hon. Ler Balcer, requesting that should some other more modern Life Saving plan be used or equipment installed, in case the present is considered obsolete that such new installation be located in the area to compensate for the loss if the present station is closed.

By closing the Life Saving Station at Bay View, it was stated, seven men with families would be affected and merchants with whom these families dealt would also suffer economic loss. More pronounced than these would be the loss of protection for fishermen and water craft in the area. It was felt that the fishermen and operators of water craft had a right to know what sort of protection they would be getting in the area should the Life Saving Station be closed. In discussion it was pointed out the present boat was small, the same model and size as had been used when the service was established in 1911. At that time fishing was done by dory in many cases, and in short distances from the Basin. Today the fishing craft is much larger and fish from much greater distance. While no one was prepared to give the answer to the reason for closing the present Life Saving facilities, it was thought that possibly the present facilities might be considered inadequate and obsolete and something more modern and more efficient was being planned to take its place.

## Panel On Effect Of United States Of Europe



A panel of distinguished Nova Scotians Friday were in agreement that, while the coming United States of Europe might not force a political union between Canada and the United States, it would bring about a strengthening of economic union between the two countries.

The panel, chaired by E. T. Cosgrove, standing above, was part of Friday morning's program at the ninth Maritime Professional Engineers conference at the Digby Pines Hotel. Others taking part (from left to right, sitting above) were Dr. Henry D. Hicks, Dalhousie University; R. J. McCleave, M.P.-elect for Halifax; Dr. J. B. Stewart, St. Francis Xavier University and M.P.-elect for Antigonish-Guysborough; and Dr. W. J. Dalton, St. Mary's University.

Mr. McCleave by request of the chairman, opened the discussion by giving the background of the European Common Market based on the Treaty of Rome in 1957. The purpose of the E.C.M., he said, was to establish a larger economic growth and eliminate internal customs duties on the imported and exported goods between the countries included in the C.M. It was expected, he said, that by 1969 they would have a common front to present to the world.

The panel in answering the chairman's questions as to whether, because of E.C.M., they could force a political union of Canada and the U.S.A. in reasonably near future gave an unanimous "no". Dr. Hicks thought that the E.C.M. may hasten Canada's interdependence with the U.S.A. somewhat but he did not believe that a political union would have to be entered. He felt that the two countries might have to grow more and more allied in defence, matters of trade, etc. He also felt that we in Canada should consider carefully arrangements in regard to U.S.A. capital coming into the country. In Scandinavian countries, he said, directors of firms must be nationals of the country in which an industry is located. He stated that Canadians are a terribly conservative people in the development of our own resources but we are often ready to criticize when others develop them for us. He charged Canadians are too security conscious and not enough conscious of national development. In such an event of union with the U.S.A. he did not foresee much difference in the culture of the people than at the present time.

Mr. McCleave said he did not think that the E.C.M. was such a force as to cause a political union with the U.S.A. but other things were stronger factors. There is still the problem with Russia, Com-

munist China and new groups of non-democratic relations in parts of the world. In regard to culture Mr. McCleave said that in Canada we have two cultures and he was not sure the Quebec culture would last in a political union with the U.S.A. In answer to the question if Canada would be better off as part of the U.S.A., Mr. McCleave answered firmly in the negative. Dr. Dalton referred to the difference in population of the United States with its 108,000,000 people and Canada's 18,000,000 and the imbalance of power in a political union. As far as culture was concerned Dr. Dalton thought the question a bit premature as culture is something which takes hundreds of years to develop. To preserve culture or lose it cannot be done by legislation. French culture in Canada, he said, is predominant and has made a great contribution because it is more different and more interesting.

Dr. Stewart posed the question as to whether we would have more money in our pockets by an economic union with U.S.A. He questioned whether the Canadian economy might suffer seriously of centralization effects but he stated further that closer economic ties of the two countries might result in a closer parity of the dollar value of the currencies.

Charles McBride, commodore of the W.N.S.Y.C. appeared before the Board requesting that new and more suitable regulations regarding the cup be drawn up as the existing ones were impossible to follow today. The race which was run in August of this year could in the end only be considered an exhibition race as none of the yachts had complied with the regulations as set down in the deed. ## About This and That More Exhibits At Exhibition

The Digby County Exhibition is over again for another year. That is, as much as it will be over for right now those in charge are busy tidying up, checking up finances and many other post exhibition chores. Then, there is still no let-up for meetings will be soon held, review made and plans underway for the exhibition of 1963.

The exhibition got away to a good start this year with twenty-five more exhibits than the previous year. Unfortunately the weather wasn't too attractive for exhibitions and if gale receipts were down (we have not checked) the fair could be readily found with the weather. Truly there were some sunny hours but again because of the inclement weather all summer, hay fields had not been mowed and crops in general had to be neglected. The result was that many of the farmers for whom the exhibition is principally held and who ordinarily participate in the program, had to remain at home to do up the allsummer neglected chores. Even an ox and horse pull had to be postponed for this reason.

We were pleased to see that the Honorable E. A. Manson was able to be present and officially open the exhibition. While taken principally as a project for improving the agricultural, domestic and handicraft pursuits, the exhibition should also be a tourist attraction and this phase lies neatly in with the Honorable Mr. Manson's department. Unfortunately most of the tourists visiting Nova Scotia return to their abode before the Digby County exhibition is on, but one only needs to work in a newspaper office or tourist bureau to know how many tourists are interested in local county fairs and enquire about them.

The committees in charge of the Digby County exhibition are to be commended in the effort put forth to make the most of the exhibition. Certainly the weather being uncooperative cannot be counted against their effort. For some time the Digby County exhibition has worked up interesting and most competitive ox and horse pulls. This year the Digby County exhibition has put itself on the map for ox pulls — possibly the highest ever recorded in Nova Scotia we understand. This in itself should be a booster for future exhibitions and good publicity on which to work.

We had hoped that one of Digby's primary industries, the fishing industry, would be represented by a booth at the exhibition. At the Fisheries Exhibition there is to be a man demonstrating scallop shucking. Where Digby had become such an important scallop fishing port it would seem that the Digby County exhibition would be a good place to keep reminding the people of this important phase of the County's industrial life. Of course as we were so graciously reminded by an exhibitor last week — the Digby County Exhibition has as many or more exhibits from Annapolis County as from Digby County. Geographically, this could easily and naturally happen. These exhibits, we are sure, are appreciated and it is we, that they should be there. But there is plenty room for Digby County to participate down to the last village in Clare and to the most westerly point of the Neck and Islands if they will only do so.

There were one or two booths added to this year's exhibition we noted and both were attractive and enhanced the beauty of the show. The more glamorous the booths can be made, the more people they are going to attract. The booths we mention in particular were in the Commercial building and were most attractive. Firstly, we refer to the H. H. Dale by the Bear River Garden Club and then the Smith's Cove Home and School booth. Possibly a few people missed seeing these booths and if the committee doesn't mind a suggestion, the name of the building and the list of booths inside might be displayed on the outside for convenience and to attract attention to them.

There was one new side show this year which was most worthwhile and different from many of the money grabbing shows at fairs. It was the "Snakes Alive" show. For twenty-five cents a fine lesson in animal and bird nature could be learned. The couple who had the show were really animal lovers and took any amount of time in informing children and adults alike about the animals in the cages.

Right now, while exhibitions are fresh in mind, while there are still neighboring exhibitions to see, is a good time to start planning for the 1963 Digby County Exhibition. And certainly a project of this nature takes planning and co-operation. The real purpose of the exhibition must not be forgotten but there must also be borne in mind that those who are interested in seeing and learning from the exhibits will not alone make an exhibition. Others must be attracted by entertainment. This applies particularly to the younger set. To see how the youth gathered for the talent and dance contests and sing-along shows that they must be "up-and-doing" at an exhibition.

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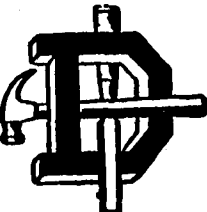

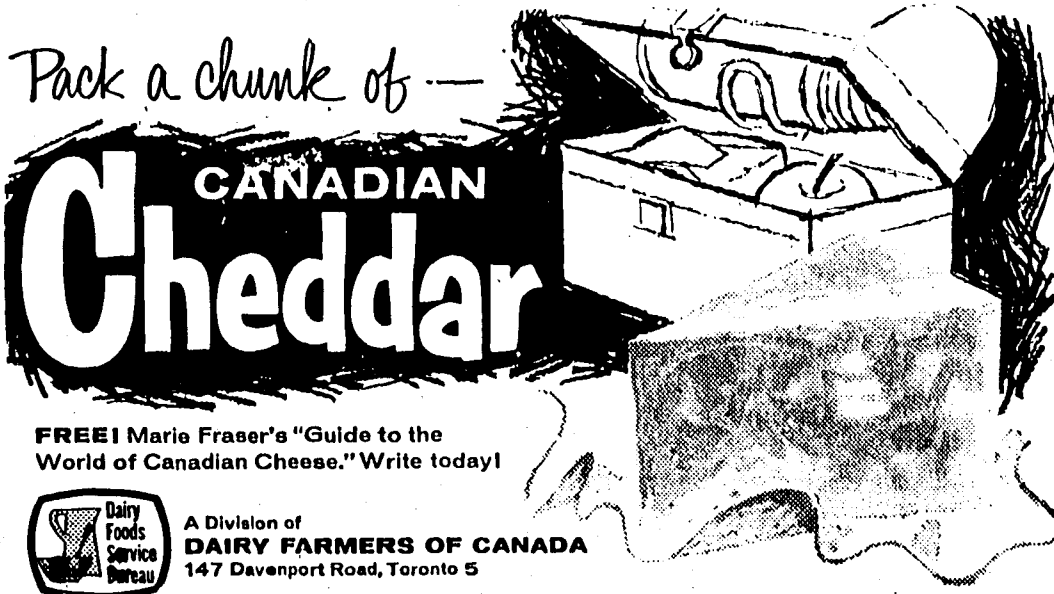

## \$1,000 For Digby Anglican Church

A cheque for \$1,000 has been received by Trinity Anglican Church in Digby from Mrs. George Ambrose, of Halifax, wife of the late Canon George Ambrose, for many years hospital chaplain in Halifax, in memory of the Ambrose family which had a long association with Trinity Church in Digby.

Canon Ambrose's father, the late Dr. John Ambrose, was appointed rector of Trinity Parish in Digby in 1870 and continued in that office until 1892. It was during his term that the present Trinity Church was built.

Dr. Ambrose was also responsible, while rector of Trinity Church for the first steps to provide free pews to the congregation. In 1872 he proposed that "after the church bell has ceased all pews in the church still vacant be made available to those who wish to use them." Prior to this pews had been sold at annual auction and were available only to those who paid for them.

It was also during Dr. Ambrose's rectorship that a dispute between "high" and "low" elements in the Digby church split the church and brought about the creation of a Reformed Episcopal Church in Digby. The dispute arose over the use of a cross on the altar of Trinity Church. This cross had been presented to Dr. Ambrose for use in Trinity Church but some members of the congregation objected to its being placed on the altar.

Dr. John Ambrose's son followed his father into the Anglican ministry and served for many years with distinction in the diocese of Nova Scotia. A daughter, Catherine entered an Anglican religious order and served the church until her death.

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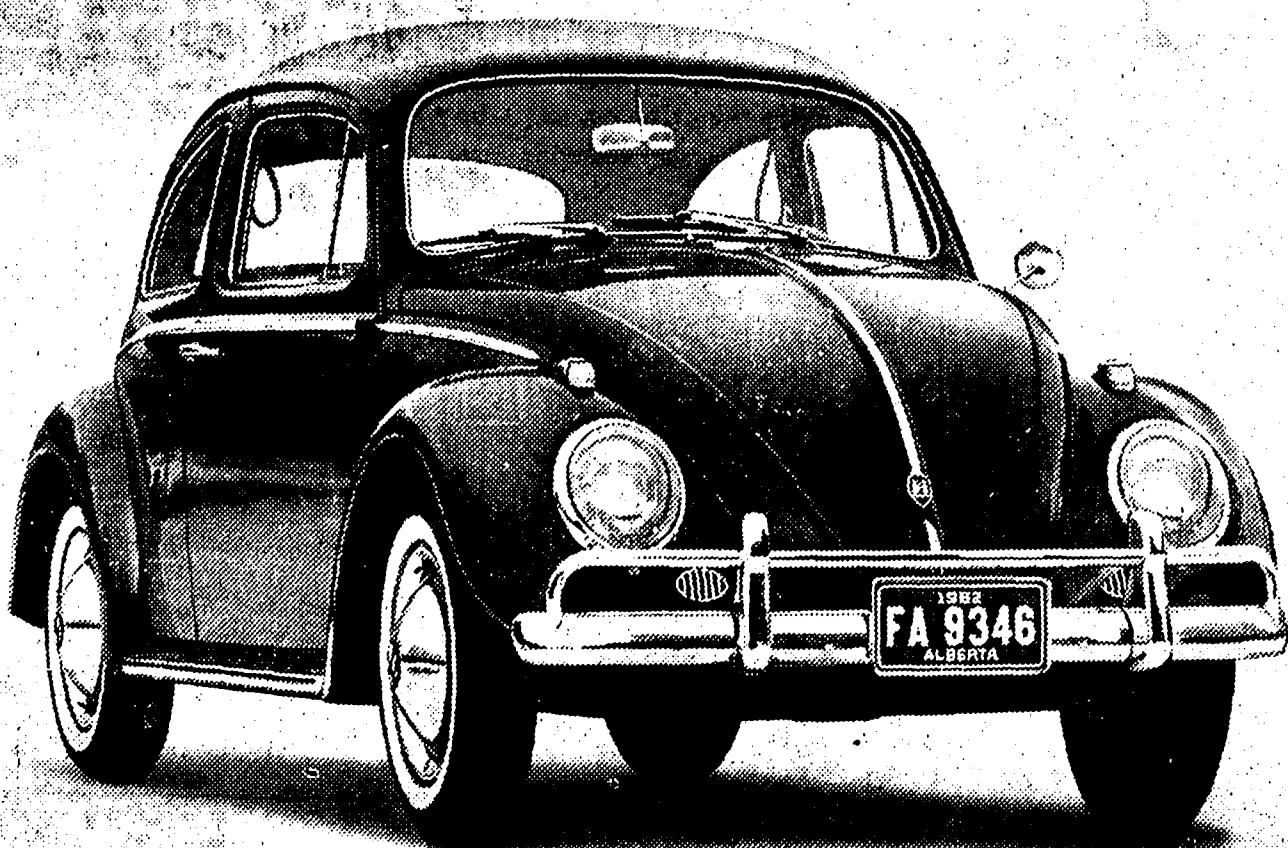

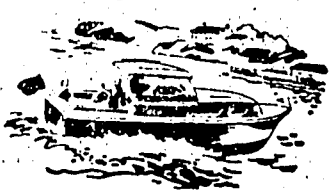

One of the highlights of the exhibition was the record breaking ox-haul. All records for the Digby County Exhibition and possibly throughout Nova Scotia were broken on Friday when Darrell Watkins' team from Hebron pulled 17,550 pounds, 5.55 times its own weight, in the province wide free-for-all contest. The team, weighing 3,224 pounds, pulled all the weight available and 33 men had to add their weight to the drag before the team reached its limit.

Second place in the free-for-all heavy ox class went to the team of Oran Veinot, of Caledonia. This team weighed 2,936 pounds and pulled 13,305 pounds, 4.49 times its weight.

Third place was won by Emil Belliveau, of St. Bernard, whose team weighed 2,899 pounds and pulled 12,610 pounds, 4.36 times its weight.

In the light ox class Darrell Watkins' team also took first place. Weighing 2,480 pounds, his team pulled 7,400 pounds for 2.82.

Second place was won by Hector Allwright, of Caledonia, with a team weighing 2,000 pounds and pulling 5,650 pounds for 2.82. In third place was Gordon Lohnes, of Upper North Beach. His team weighed 2,552 pounds and pulled 7,050 pounds for 2.76.

A pair of Hereford steers, entered by Demetrius Amiraull, of Weymouth, took top honors this year as best matched pair on exhibit. First prize for the best pair of oxen five years and up went to a team entered by Emil Belliveau, of St. Bernard. In the four year class first prize was won by a team entered by Chester Watkins, of Hebron. A team entered by Charles Savary, of Bear River, took first in the three year class. In the two year class first place went to a team entered by Ralph Pierce, Bear River while in the under two year class first place went to a team owned by Gerald Oickle, also of Bear River. Mr. Oickle also took first place for best yearling steer.

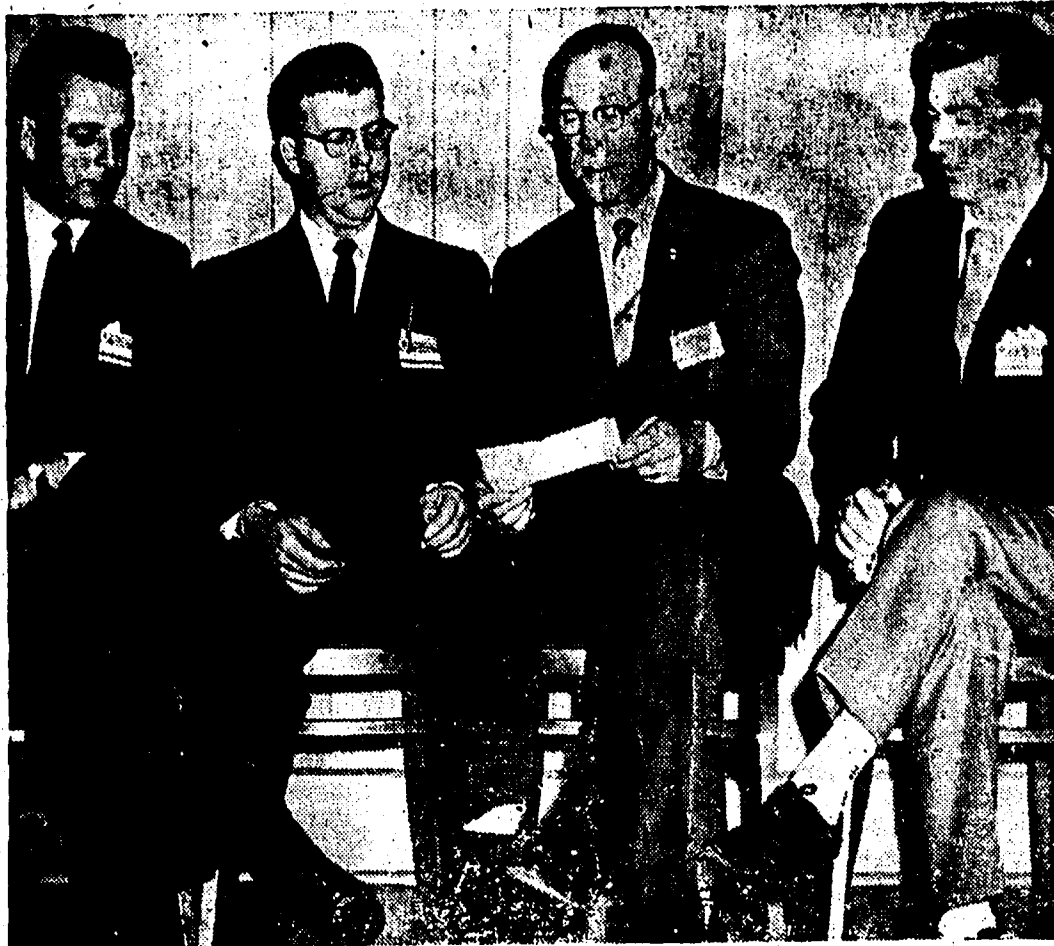

## Polio Program Postponed

It has been announced by Hon. R. A. Donahoe, Minister of Public Health, that the Oral Sabin Polio Vaccine Program, which was to have started in areas of Nova Scotia outside Halifax County on Monday, has been postponed.

The postponement came as a result of a recent meeting of a Special Scientific Advisory Committee in Ottawa. This Committee is made up of eminent medical scientists from across Canada and is advisory to the Minister of National Health and Welfare.

Before mass immunization programs using the Oral Sabin Vaccine were started several studies involving thousands of persons were carried out under the direction of the Committee. One of these studies was carried out in the Wedgeport area of Nova Scotia in 1961. All such studies indicated the safety and efficacy of the Oral Vaccine. Similar studies were carried out in the United States and other countries involving millions of people there did not appear to be any unfavourable results.

The Oral Sabin Vaccine was licensed for use in Canada early in 1962 after extensive examination by the Laboratory of Hygiene. Most, if not all of the Provinces then made the vaccine available and several million doses have been used to date. The Special Committee, as a result of information made available by the Provinces, recently undertook a preliminary study of the results of some immunization programs in 1962. This study indicated that one person per million taking the vaccine had subsequently developed an illness. Some of these cases have been diagnosed as poliomyelitis. There is one such case under study in Nova Scotia.

In order to be sure that the Oral Sabin Vaccine is not the cause of the illness it has now been recommended that all Oral Sabin programs be stopped until the study of the cases is completed. It may well prove that there is no causal relationship between the Sabin Vaccine and the cases under investigation. Statistics indicate that in any year in Canada there are many more than one case of poliomyelitis per million population (1960 - 631 cases; 1961 - 124 cases).

Since it will take some time to complete the necessary investigations it has been decided to postpone the present program. No further Oral Sabin Vaccine clinics will be held until further notice.

Mr. Donahoe emphasized that there is no danger to those who took the Sabin Vaccine in Halifax County in the Spring of 1962. All suspected cases have developed within a few weeks after taking the vaccine. Again, it is emphasized that there is yet no proven cases of poliomyelitis due to the vaccine. The present steps are being taken in order to provide time for a further scientific investigation.

Mr. Donahoe also emphasized the importance of Salk Vaccine which is given by needle. It has been noted that all of the few suspected cases of poliomyelitis in Canada this year did not have previous Salk Vaccine. It is felt that all persons should take Salk Vaccine which has been of proven value and safety. Salk Vaccine is available through private practitioners and clinics. Until Oral Vaccine is available, all persons are urged to obtain protection from poliomyelitis through Salk Vaccine.

## Service Awards

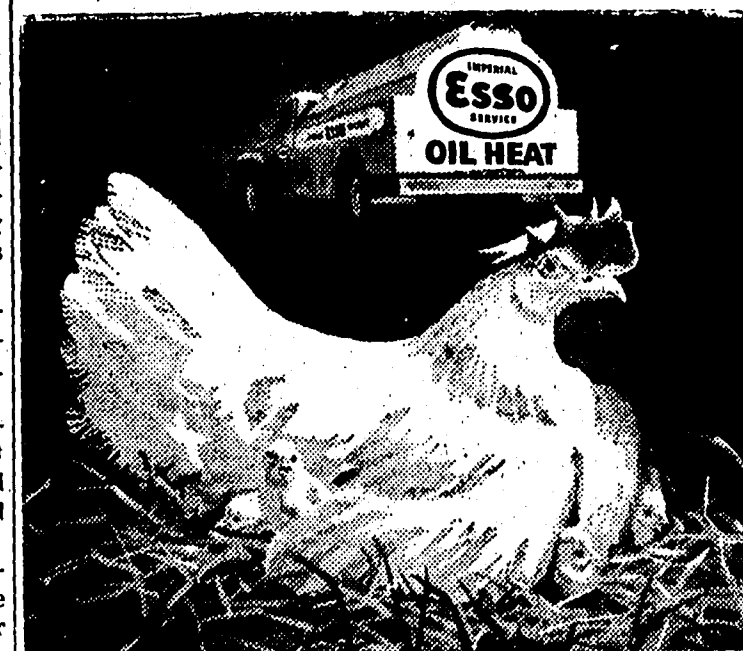

Why every one of us here could and should have a booth in our own County exhibition!" Sounds encouraging, don't you think so?

## The Retarded Child

By the time this issue appears on the street, the Canadian Conference on Mental Retardation will have been held at the Nova Scotian Hotel in Halifax and we shall have had some news on the discussions and business. We regret that we were unable to attend the press conference held in connection with the above conference for this is a phase of social welfare in which we are keenly interested simply because we think it is a phase which has been too, too long neglected. It is really appalling to think of the wasted years, the unhappiness which might have been relieved if through ignorance so many people had not just thought that "nothing can be done". So few people realized that something could be done to aid the retarded to make better use of their lives and become happier and more useful citizens. A lack of understanding seemed to be the reason behind the neglect of the retarded and so we reprint for our readers the material just released by the Canadian Association For Retarded Children, 317 Avenue Road, Toronto 7, Ontario —

### What is Mental Retardation?

Impaired mental ability. The retarded child learns more slowly; at maturity his capacity to understand will be less than normal.

### What Causes Mental Retardation?

An imperfect or damaged brain. A genetic accident, injury at birth, or accident or illness during infancy can cause mental retardation. More than 70 different causes have been discovered.

### Who Are Immune?

No family is immune. An accident of nature, birth injury, or a disease in infancy, can strike any home. Mental retardation strikes families, rich and poor, learned and ignorant. It respects neither class nor race.

### Is It Curable?

No, because mental retardation is not a disease. It is a chronic handicap. But the mentally retarded child can be

treated and invariably does need treatment. Often he and his family need expert help in adjusting to the handicap. Frequently there are emotional or physical disabilities as well which can be corrected.

### Is it Hopeless?

No, not at all. Quite to the contrary, 29 out of 30 mentally retarded children can be trained and helped to grow into useful, happy members of the community with considerable degree of self-sufficiency.

### How Prevalent is Mental Retardation?

It is the most prevalent of all child disabilities. It handicaps twice as many children as polio, cerebral palsy, rheumatic heart disease and blindness all together. Three out of every 100 children born are mentally retarded. There are more than half a million mentally retarded in Canada today. One is born every 25 minutes.

### Can Mentally Retarded be Educated?

The mildly retarded — those who have not suffered more than about 25 per cent mental impairment below normal intelligence — can with proper schooling master academic work in the second to sixth grade range. These are the "educable" retarded. They represent nearly 83 per cent of all mentally retarded — 25 of every 30 retarded children are educable and can be taught to be fairly self-supporting as adults.

### What About the Others?

Another 13 per cent of the mentally retarded — another four out of every 30 — are moderately retarded. They are the "trainable". With proper training facilities and supervised "sheltered workshop" provisions they can become self-supporting to some degree. They can be trained to do much for themselves. One in 30 is severely retarded and generally needs hospitalization.

### What Schooling is Provided?

Urban school boards in the larger centres generally provide special classes for the "educable" or mildly retarded. There is still considerable need for such provisions for mildly retarded children in rural regions. Local associations for retarded children provide special day schools for the "trainable" or moderately retarded. Some 5,000 moderately retarded children are now accommodated in schools run by some 220 local associations.

### Is Schooling the Only Service?

No. The local associations also provide sheltered workshops, recreational programs, family counselling, home care help.

Sheltered workshops have already been established in 15 Canadian centres.

On a provincial level — through provincial associations — and nationally through the Canadian Association for Retarded Children, these locals are stimulating research into all aspects of mental retardation particularly toward its prevention.

## Have Ready The Cash

This week we have our first advertisement announcing the restriction on credit, due, we think, to the new policy of banks not allowing overdrafts to their customers. We felt maybe The Digby Courier or Wallis Print Ltd. might have to be the first in town to make such an announcement but the Esso dealer, Earl VanTassell, has started the ball rolling and we would not be surprised to see others follow in his footsteps. With no bank overdrafts to current accounts (and there never were any to savings accounts) business firms have to have the money ahead before they attempt to write cheques. The other solution is to borrow to pay. What a nuisance this would be when small sums only are needed frequently. So we see the stricter credit as a necessity for all businesses and we would not be surprised to see many follow Mr. VanTassell's announcement. Indeed, we are noticing that this is happening in firms with which the Courier deals and so we, too, will likely be forced to demand stricter credit than before.

The new overdraft policy will in a sense slow up business, we feel. However, in the long run it will probably be an asset in that business management will have to think twice before transacting business in either direction and more "tidy" accounts receivable and bills payable ledgers will result. In the end these might mean a much more profitable business.

## Traffic Deaths: Let's Get Tough

(A guest editorial by Tam Dachman)

When we slaughter thirty, fifty, one hundred or more valuable, warm-blooded, and very human men, women and children on our highways each weekend, and maim countless others, it is customary to devote Monday to deploring, and muttering about the necessity for safe driving, before settling back to the everyday grind. After all, what else can you do? That's the way it has been for every weekend of every summer for almost as long as you can remember.

But the fact is, something can be done. We have proved that certain steps can be taken to bring about drastic reductions in the predictable number of deaths.

The sword most likely to defeat the man with the scythe has two edges; one, vigorous enforcement of the law; two, stiff penalties for offenders, including jail sentences and lengthy permit suspensions or even cancellations.

This is not just idle theory. When tough policemen combine with tough magistrates, when retribution is known to be swift, sure, and stunning in its severity, accident "by invitation" virtually ceases. Only true accidents remain, if such there can be.

Now if we know this to be so, and we do, then there may be some kind of an ugly word to describe an apathy or a neglect which results in death.

Let me ask a brutal question: When we neglect to take dangerous drivers off the road permanently, or at least give them a jolt in jail to bring them to their senses, how far are we from criminal negligence?

Section 191 of the Criminal Code says: "Everyone is criminally negligent who (a) in doing anything, or (b) in omitting to do anything that it is his duty to do, shows wanton disregard for the lives and safety of other persons. For the purpose of this section, 'duty' means a duty imposed by law."

Let me spell it out further. We are accustomed to seeing charges of criminal negligence laid against motorists, particularly when they cause a fatal accident. But I am now asking: whether our police, our magistrates, our civic and provincial administrators and society itself are not open to charges of criminal negligence when we KNOW how to cut the traffic toll and do nothing about it?

I do not believe for one second that any policeman, magistrate or administrator is being deliberately negligent. But I do feel they have not, in all their wisdom, properly related their actions to their duty under the law, which is primarily to protect the lives of all citizens. In short, I don't believe the police are consistently and vigorously enforcing the laws, nor are magistrates consistently and vigorously making the punishment fit the potential enormity of the crime.

I am not arguing here for over-protection, or for narrowing of existing regulations. Theoretically it would be possible to legislate the elimination of many accidents; we could reduce all speed limits to 20 miles per hour, for example. But that would place a heavy and senseless imposition on the majority in order to curb the irresponsible minority.

No, I suggest simply that those charged under the law with enforcing existing traffic laws do so with every means within their power, and that those charged with handing out penalties take a more serious view of the nature of the infraction and of their own responsibility to society, and act accordingly.

For some reason we have been resisting a "get tough" policy. There seems to be a national belief that a man who aims a gun should go to jail, but it is all right to let a man who aims a car off with a light fine. We believe it is not cricket, for police to patrol in unmarked cars. Speed traps are actually the subject of indignant protests to the press. We feel righteously entitled to drive up to 10 m.p.h. over the posted speed limit. And magistrates who have the good sense to impose severe penalties are compared to the "hanging judges" of the old West.

Who are we kidding? Driving illegally is not a game to be played with the law, like buying an illicit sweepstake ticket or over-parking. It is a deadly Russian roulette, played with other lives as well as our own.

Let us now abandon all hope regarding the effectiveness of Monday's armchair editorializing about "the other fellow's" bad driving habits, altruistic though it may be. The clowns, the smart-alecks, the fools, the half-wits and the drunks who cause too many of today's accidents don't absorb editorials nor do they respond to safe driving slogans. It is now time to face the fact that, when lives are at stake, the law must take over. Appeals to reason just don't work.

Let us put the case to our police and provincial legislators to urge those within their jurisdiction to take the steps we know can reduce the toll. Let us ask our newspapers, radio and TV stations and other media to mount an active campaign to bring about broad public support of the law and its enforcement in this vital area.

For if we continue as we are, knowing a great part of the solution yet doing nothing about it, then we must, in all conscience, re-read the definition of criminal negligence and start asking ourselves some very embarrassing questions.

## Makes Statement

R. D. Mulholland, president, The Canadian Bankers' Association, has made the following statement —

"On behalf of the chartered banks I have been asked to make it clear beyond all doubt that the elimination of overdraft privileges is not connected in any way with prevailing monetary policy. Furthermore, this change in the method of borrowing will not affect in the slightest degree borrowing arrangements with customers — even the smallest borrower.

It will be better and more efficient both for banks and bank customers if a regular loan is made and a note signed for the amount even if only a few days or weeks are involved. The supervision and control of overdrafts in the branches of the banking system have become increasingly difficult and the decision to discontinue such privileges is the outcome of a study of this matter which has been going on for many years. Current progress in methods of handling cheques which would have been made more difficult by the retention of overdrafts has been a contributing factor to the decision. The new policy is really the old-fashioned idea that those who issue cheques should have the money on deposit to cover."

When government pays out so much, often for what appears to be a trivial reason, it seems wrong that men loyally performing a useful job should be removed and the task abandoned.

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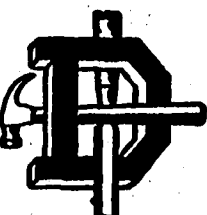

## Old Paper And Journal

Everett Chalmers, of Bear River, handed the Courier a copy of The Church Record, June 10, 1863. The Church Record was a Church of England (now Anglican Church of Canada) paper the size of the present Digby Courier and 6 columns in width.

The name of Rev. Dr. J. Ambrose was mentioned in the publication. The late Rev. Mr. Ambrose had been rector in Digby from 1870 to 1892. A sum of \$1,000 was recently donated to Trinity Church, Digby, in memory of the Ambrose family by Mrs. George Ambrose, wife of the late Canon George Ambrose, son of the late Dr. John Ambrose.

The Church Record not only contained church news and religious stories but also contained advertisements for looking glasses, shingles, dry goods, stoves, drugs and the general run of newspaper advertising. It advised on agriculture and many other day to day topics.

Mr. Chalmers, who recently repaired a roof on his house, found the paper along with a copy of the Nova Scotia Education Act of 1864 under the roofing. The booklet contained the copy of the act and comments on it; regulations for the guidance of officers and people generally together, with explanations concerning superior schools and academies. The booklet was prepared by the Superintendent of Education and sanctioned by the Council of Public Instruction.

Duties of teachers and privileges were plainly spelled out and requirements of school houses mentioned. In one place it mentioned that "it is the unvarying testimony of experienced teachers that children living farthest from the school-house are the most

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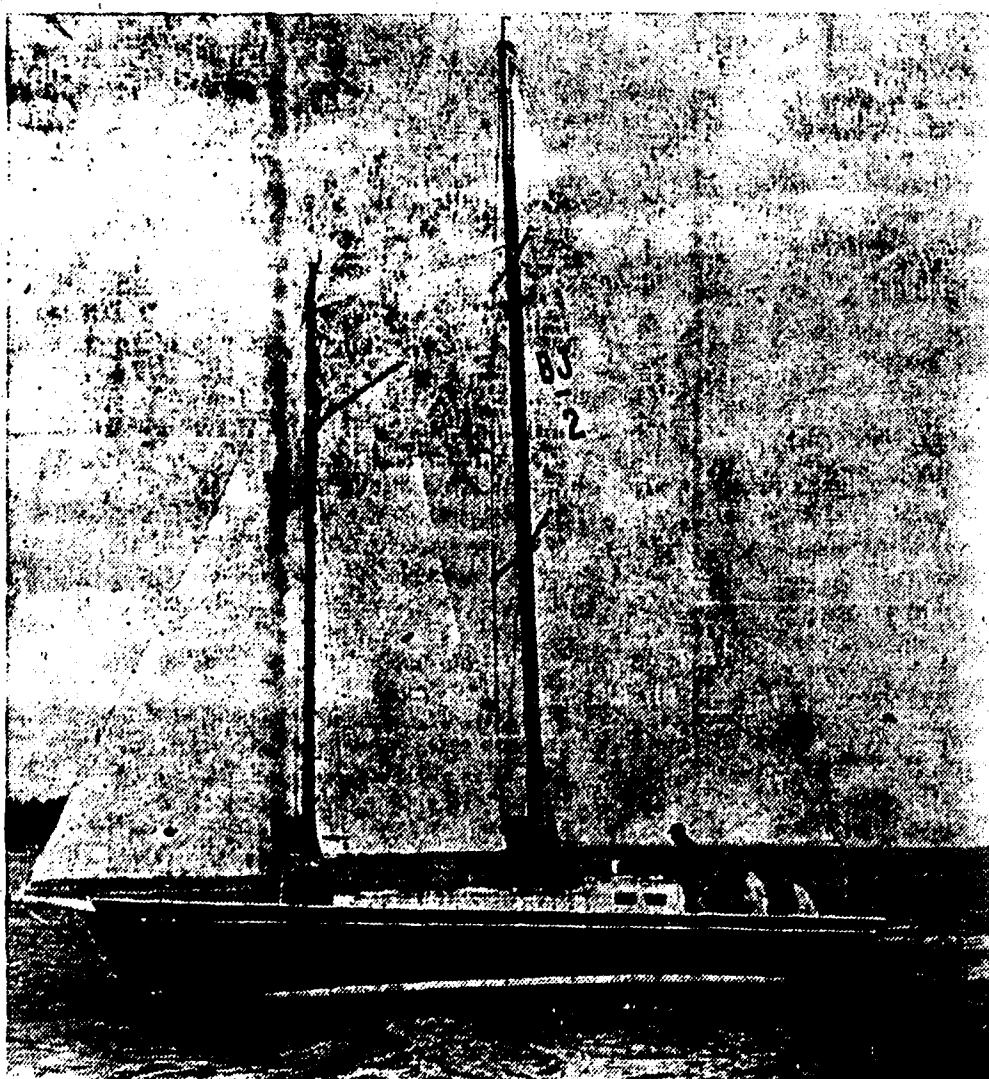

## Schooner Interest Renewed



Nova Scotians once again are going down to the sea in schooners.

Originally a fishing boat, the schooner took its place in history with the famed Bluenose, a Grand Banks schooner that was successful in almost all its races and finally was lost on a reef off the coast of Haiti.

Since the days when diesel engines began to edge their way into use, popularity of the schooner as a fishing boat has steadily declined. But recently, there has been a upsurge of interest in it as a family pleasure boat.

Averaging 38 feet long, the schooner is relatively easy to handle, large enough to carry the family (a crew of five is needed in racing), safe, and because it was designed and

built to withstand the ocean waves, extremely seaworthy.

To promote the interest in Nova Scotia built schooners, the Nova Scotia Schooner Association was formed last year. A number of members own what is called the Tan-cook Schooner, a small schooner compared to the Bluenose, averaging about 35 feet. The overall length of the original Bluenose was 143 feet.

For the last few years, two week cruises of various types of boats set sail along the western shore of Nova Scotia from the Armada Yacht Club. Last year, when the boats stopped at Hubbards (30 miles from Halifax) a schooner race was arranged between 12 Nova Scotia built schooners. Captain Angus Walters, skipper of the famed Blue-

nose, donated one of his trophies, the Colonial Fisheries Trophy, to go to the winner of the race, planned as an annual event. (Last year's winner was a woman, Mrs. Willa Creighton, skippered the Arlie).

Following last year's race crews of the 12 racing boats met and formed the association.

Mr. Donald Halliburton, secretary treasurer of the schooner Association says.

"We're trying to get United States sailing enthusiasts to have their boats built in Nova Scotia. It's less expensive than in the U. S., and since the builders here have been schooled in the ways of the sea, the boats are certain to be the best quality."

#### Bird Hunting Regulations

The bag and possession limits for migratory birds in Nova Scotia remain unchanged from last year in the 1962 Migratory Bird Regulations. Details were released by the Canadian Wildlife Service, Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources. There have been changes in season dates.  
Nova Scotia hunters will again be able to hunt wood ducks this year with a bag limit of 1 and a possession limit of 1. The bag and possession limits for ducks are 6 and 12, 5 and 10 for geese, and 8 and 16 for woodcock. The bag limit for snipe is 8, with no possession limit.  
Anyone who has a permit to keep migratory birds must not allow the birds to come within one-quarter mile of any waterfowl hunting area. If migratory birds held under permit are found within that limit, it is assumed under the law that they are being used as live decoys. Baiting regulations have been changed across Canada and it is now permissible to hunt within one-quarter mile of an area which has been baited, whereas previously the limit was one-half mile.  
Local season dates are:  
Annapolis and Digby Counties, Ducks and Geese (other than Brant): October 8 to December 16.  
Digby and Annapolis Counties, Woodcock and Wilson's Snipe: Oct. 8 to Nov. 11.

## Bluenose Begins Winter Sailings

Despite the wet, uninviting summer, the number of passengers carried aboard Canadian National Railway's MV Bluenose during July and August was surprisingly close to that carried during the peak of the tourist season in 1961.

The figures were released in Moncton by Area Manager Eric P. Stephenson, who announced that the Yarmouth-Bar Harbor ferry would be going on her tri-weekly winter schedule Monday, September 17. She will remain on that schedule until June next year.

Mr. Stephenson said 29,553 passengers were carried in August, compared to 30,184 during the same period last year. "That's a decline of 631, actually a small percentage of the total."

Car traffic was up in August. Some 8,416 passenger vehicles were carried on the ship, as compared to 8,395 a year ago, a gain of 21.

The slight decrease in passengers also prevailed through July, when 26,616 persons booked passage on the ship, as compared to 27,343 in July of 1961. The decline was 727. Vehicle figures showed a decrease in July too: 7,638, as compared to 7,791.

The winter schedule released by Mr. Stephenson is as follows: leaves Bar Harbor, Tues., Thur., Sat.; arrives Yarmouth, Tues., Thur., Sat.; leaves Yarmouth, Mon., Wed., Fri.; arrives Bar Harbor Mon., Wed., Fri.

## Statement By Hon. Douglas S. Harkness

2. There are approximately 2,000 fallout reporting stations spotted across Canada and a number of Nuclear Detonation Reporting Posts have already been established. ## Letter to the Editor

The Boston Globe, Boston 7, Mass., September 14, 1962.

Editor Digby Courier, Digby, N. S.

Dear Mrs. Wallis,

Thanks very much indeed for the two copies of the Digby Courier, and for all your kindness to me while I was in town.

It was a wonderful article but I was definitely awed to have taken up so much space on page one.

Even without the excitement, I shall never forget the town of Digby, with its lovely tree-shaded streets and flower gardens and its beautiful hillside views of the Annapolis Basin.

But the beauty of the town itself was far outshone by the kindness of everyone in it — from you and Mrs. Vincent Snow who both offered me shelter in your own homes, to the Irving dealer who gave me 15 gallons of gas on credit for nearly an hour (maybe he knew my plane was grounded out on the mud), a fisherman named "Bunkie" who helped me put the gas into the plane, the police officer at the ferry slip who got hold of the ferry mate on the "Princess Helene" for me, the mate himself who gave me one of the best weather reports I've ever received, the wife of the lighthouse keeper who kept a weather-eye on the fog from the edge of the Digby Gut, to the telegraph operators who later enabled Mr. Snow to find out where I was and thus saved me from being in the embarrassing position of having my obituary written by my colleagues in Boston.

I wish I could thank them all personally, but if you have a chance to extend my deep gratitude to these people for me I would appreciate it very much.

My trip home was much less eventful than you must all have imagined, but it did have some worrisome moments.

When I left Digby on Tuesday, August 28, I found the conditions in the Bay of Fundy exactly as the mate of the Princess Helene had described them.

A blanket of fog lay 50 feet thick on the water, except miraculously around Grand Manan, which stood alone in the haze. The sky gave me enough of a horizon to fly by and two thousand feet below I could see a glint of the leathery-calm sea.

There wasn't a breath of wind and in 45 minutes I was leaving the Island for Eastport.

By previous experience, I knew there were no facilities there, so, when I saw a corridor of relatively clear air extending up the coast, just back of the shore, I decided to push on without stopping.

For two hours I followed the road from port to port.

As it was, I had to turn back and fly over a channel about 50 feet off the water, with the fog billowing in right over my head, and 15 minutes after I landed you couldn't see your hand in front of your face.

Indications were that the weather was getting definitely worse, and would continue to do so for the next few days. So, when I woke up at 6 a.m. and was able to see my plane from the shore, I decided to make a last bid for home. In the hurry of getting away, I ran the plane right into the monstrous tree trunk my cousins had kindly invited me to tie to. The metal propeller gave a few horrid clunks and the motor stopped. But neither the blades nor the mooring appeared to be damaged so I cast off and started all over again.

It was not only foggy, but windy and rainy and I had to look out through the open window and doors to see anything.

It seemed a good deal less hospitable than the Bay of Fundy, but by flying a landing pattern from island to island, I was able to grope my way back to my family by breakfast time.

It was five or six days before I could take off again to finish the journey to Boston. But every minute of the trip was worth it.

My only concern is about the worry and trouble I caused to people who couldn't have been kinder in Nova Scotia.

I hope you will all forgive me, and I hope that if any one of you ever comes here, you will let me know.

## Takes Oath Eighth Time



Finance Minister George C. Nowlan, above, this week officially became a member of Canada's 25th Parliament. He represents the Nova Scotia constituency of Digby - Annapolis - Kings.

He became the 161st M.P. to take the oath of allegiance within recent weeks. Administering the oath was Leon J. Raymond, clerk of the Commons.

This marked the eighth time Mr. Nowlan has taken the oath to Queen and country. Twice as a member of the Nova Scotia Legislature after winning election in 1925 and 1928, he took the oath in Halifax. Six times since 1948 he has sworn allegiance at Ottawa.

Mr. Nowlan won a seat in Parliament in 1948 in a by-election. In the general election of 1949 he lost his seat by four votes to Liberal Angus Elderkin, but the outcome was declared void by the Nova Scotia Supreme Court. Mr. Nowlan returned to Parliament in a by-election in 1950, and retained his seat by running elections in 1953, 1957, 1958 and 1962.

It was decided to have a grand opening in the fall of 1962 as in previous years, and a committee was to be appointed to look into the matter.

The bank balance showed an amount of \$563.89, and many of the outstanding bills were passed for payment, including interest on what is known as the Princess Margaret Day Note and the Floor Note.

It also assists in other preventative programs in mental health. This year's fund raising drive by the Mental Health Association will cover all segments of the population, chairman Moldevan said. Special bowling nights will also be sponsored and plans are being made for film nights, a mental health poster contest will be held in the schools and local service clubs will be asked to sponsor programs in aid of the association's campaign.

A two-car collision at an intersection in Digby's South End, Monday, resulted in badly damaged vehicles. Driver of one, Alan Nichols, of Digby, received minor cuts. The other driver, Guy VanTassel, also of Digby, was uninjured.

A truck, driven by Leon Fiske, of Bridgetown, went out of control coming down a steep hill leading into the village of Bear River and crashed into the side of a house, moving it four inches. Loaded with salt the vehicle went over the steep bank on the river side of highway one, just west of Victoria Bridge. Mr. Walker escaped injury but the truck was badly damaged. Had the truck not lodged against a tree it would have plunged eighty feet into the tidal waters of the Bear River.

## Addresses Board

Victor Cardoza, Digby MLA, in addressing the Bear River Board of Trade at their recent annual meeting, stressed the need for co-operative action in carrying out trade board projects. All segments of the community should be involved, he said. Local organizations, however, were often hampered in carrying out programs designed to improve the local economy because many factors involved were beyond their control.

He said governments and government agencies at all levels must accept and be willing to acknowledge that they have a major part to play in any efforts aimed at community development. If plans for community development were to become anything more than ideas impinged on the community there must be organization of the local people themselves and participation in the program, the speaker stated.

Efforts of the Board to present dumping of refuse into the river which runs through the village will be intensified. Members were told recent high tides had carried large quantities of refuse up into the village area and created an unsightly and offensive condition. Complaints were also registered at the meeting concerning dumping of refuse along the roadside on the Digby County side of Bear River. It was decided to ask the highways department to erect warning signs along these roads and to enforce non-dumping regulations.

The Bear River board will also continue its campaign to have government wharves in the village repaired. Some confusion existed, it was stated at the meeting, as to wharf ownership. Public works officials will be asked to visit Bear River to inspect the wharves.

## Estimate Damage At \$50,000.00

A fire, believed to have started during acetylene welding, completely gutted the premises of Digby Motors Limited, one of Digby's oldest and largest automotive centres, on Prince William Street.

The fire began shortly before five p.m. Tuesday and was kept from spreading to nearby buildings only by the quick response of the Digby Fire Department. At the height of the blaze personal belongings, equipment and furniture were removed from a service station and homes in the immediate area.

Some fifteen cars stored in the garage at the time were lost in the fire, together with other auto equipment and a large quantity of stock. For rest Eisner, president of the firm, estimated damage in excess of \$50,000, only partly covered by insurance.

## Conference On Mental Retardation

Representing the Canadian Home and School and Parent-Teacher Federation, Mr. Edwards, Inspector of Schools, spent the greater part of the past week attending this year's annual Canadian Conference on Mental Retardation, which was held in Halifax. Highlighting the Conference, which was attended by some four hundred delegates from across the nation, were keynote addresses given by authorities in the field on mental retardation from England, Sweden, USA, and Canada. Included in the USA participants, was Dr. Rich Hober, Director of Research, President Kennedy's panel on retardation.

Mr. Edwards feels strongly that classes for educable retarded children constitute a very real need in the Inspectorate of Annapolis and Digby Counties. This has been indicated by the results of a test program carried out in selected areas of both municipalities during the past two years.

Three Auxiliary classes, for pupils needing individual attention, have been organized this year at Middleton and area, and one class has been set up at Lawrencetown. Annapolis Royal's first Auxiliary class came into existence last year. To provide facilities for this program, the Municipal School Board of Annapolis County and the Middleton School Boards have co-operated in a school building program which now nears completion. The three teachers of these classes received special training at this year's Teachers' College Summer School, Halifax. Auxiliary classes are also part of the Digby School system.

## T.V. Classes Underway

In a brief statement on the occasion of the first educational television lectures in provincial schools, Premier Robert L. Stanfield said it is fitting that Nova Scotia should be the first province in Canada to make use of educational television on this broad and extended scale, since it was the first province in Canada to use radio as an aid to teaching. He said the decision to provide the program came after careful study of the use that is now being made of educational television in other countries.

The value of educational television, as I understand it, has been pretty well established in countries where a great deal of money has been spent in experiments and in evaluating the usefulness of television in education. A great deal of work and energy have gone into the preparation of our programs. The cooperation received from the teachers' union, the urban and municipal school boards and others has been excellent. The real value of the programs, however, will depend upon the care and effort devoted to making use of the excellent instruction the lessons will offer.

Daily classes in Grade XI science and mathematics are produced by CBC-Halifax, and seen locally on Channel 6, Digby. The Digby Regional High School has decided to make use of the program.

C. C. MacInnes, principal of the high school, told the Courier that approximately sixty pupils attend each of the TV classes, and said in his opinion this form of program will be a teaching aid. He made mention of the fact that, since these classes take place at Dalhousie University, pupils are able to witness experiments with equipment not available in most schools.

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## About This and That Know Your Mushrooms

We are nearing the season when so many people get out of bed bright and early in the morning to be the first in the fields where mushrooms abound. With the wet summer, although not so dry fall, the season should be good for this table delicacy, found abundantly in many parts of Digby County.

To thousands mushrooms add an epicurean touch to a meal but, much as they find this food titillating to the palate, the majority of those who enjoy mushrooms shy away from gathering wild forms and, usually, says K. A. Harrison, a recognized authority on mushrooms who is on the staff of the Canada Department of Agriculture's Research Station at Kentville, "the reason is that mushroom lovers can't tell the edible ones from the poisonous ones — often called toadstools . . ."

The Canada Department of Agriculture has available for distribution a very fine, illustrated bulletin on mushrooms which is available upon request from the Information of the Canada Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

There are a succession of mushroom species that may be gathered throughout the year, with the earliest kinds being found during May, and others appearing during summer and fall, although fall is the season of greatest abundance. Consequently, mushroom enthusiasts should find the illustrated bulletin of particular interest, and of value, in assisting them to determine which species they may eat safely, and which they should leave strictly alone.

## National Immunization Week — September 23rd - 29th, 1962

(Sponsored by the Health League of Canada in cooperation with Departments of Health across Canada)

This is the 20th consecutive year in which NATIONAL IMMUNIZATION WEEK has been observed in Canada. This annual event is designed to call public attention to the fact that there are communicable diseases which may be prevented by immunization. The most outstanding of these are: smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and poliomyelitis.

**SMALLPOX:** Canada's record in connection with these diseases is, on the whole, very good. For example, there had not been a case of smallpox in Canada since 1946. Ten days ago, however, a boy from Brazil arrived in our country, suffering from this dread disease. He is now hospitalized in Toronto and a search is being made for all who may have come in contact with him — in order that they may be vaccinated immediately. Too many Canadians are not vaccinated or a time lapse has occurred since their vaccination.

**DIPHTHERIA:** In 1959 there was not a single death from diphtheria in the whole of Canada for the first time in history. Eternal vigilance is the source of success and any let-up in that vigilance is proven by the fact that in 1961 there were 93 cases and 5 deaths.

**POLIO:** Poliomyelitis, with the advent of the Salk vaccine, has shown a rapid decline, but nevertheless there were 909 cases in Canada in 1960 with 83 deaths. Some now have had the Sabin oral vaccine. Together, Salk and Sabin vaccines offer hope of complete eradication of polio from our country. Immunization should begin early, if possible at three months of age — in order to protect the very young against whooping cough and "booster" doses or reinforcing doses at intervals during pre-school life.

**ADULT PROTECTION:** But adults need protection from some of these diseases — tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis. Few adults, except those who have served in the armed forces, or worked in special industry have had tetanus toxoid. Booster shots for adults are needed about every five years to maintain immunity against tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis.

The safety of the individual depends upon his community and his country, and our country has played its part. But the safety of our community depends upon each individual member — if we take advantage of the facilities developed and available to us.

CANADA'S NATIONAL IMMUNIZATION WEEK is an opportunity for each of us to consider whether we have taken our share in protecting our children, ourselves, our neighbors and our community.

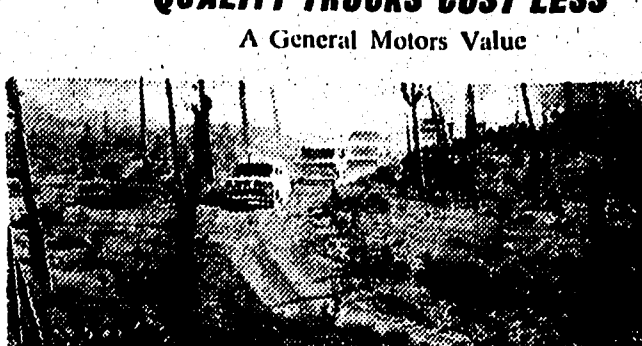
