Now and then a printing job had a save in parchment paper which required a special kind of printers' ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would take you to the largest press in spite of the fact he always opened an outside door to lessen the odors on the room itself.

and then... One day not long after I started to get to

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you making out Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily. He thought the remark pretty good and whole.

Sometimes the gasoline engine, a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "fix-it" man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. Max would then stand back and come over dramatically then he would immediately start working. "See," he would say, "all it needed was a bit of fixing."

On other occasions when some people would say, "all it needed was a little more dirt" for the seed, and seemed to be brokenhearted, I would say, "use a little oil" and vice versa, after that is said. They often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac," of four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1958 got together just before dark one evening and decided to infiltrate the newly built outdoor Pools Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, so in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool the swim-

Mac" inferred to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Scouts Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the boys? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars (second world war), Kenneth, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist; for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale importer and bank and myself.

As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was told to write about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions of the man who was found marooned on a beach at some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Duxbury County. When found this man's torso and legs were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel later that morning, all for some mysterious reason.

"Joe" appeared to have been a man of some considerable social standing and, possibly, of some considerable wealth. However the only thing that could or would ever say after being found and buried for by some family in the French shore was something that sounded like the name "Joe". He either could not, or would not, say anything about who he was or why he was left there. The only thing it was, and is, one of Digne County. Fish Plant Burns — Homes Saved

Fire Saturday afternoon destroyed the fishmeal plant of National Sea Products Ltd., in Digby's North end. The blaze which is believed to have started near a blower in the plant, spread rapidly through the building and within a short time of its discovery, had engulfed the whole structure.

For a time it was feared the fire, fanned by a strong westerly wind, would spread to a number of homes adjacent to the plant. The roofs of several nearby houses were ignited by flying embers, but Digby firemen were quick to extinguish these, and contained the blaze in the fishmeal plant.

At the height of the fire, much of the town's north end was covered with a heavy pall of dense, black smoke from the burning building and from tons of fishmeal which were also destroyed. Four workmen, on duty at the plant at the time the fire broke out, escaped uninjured. Before leaving the burning building, the plant foreman opened valves on steam boilers to prevent their exploding.

The fire also burned a stack of hardwood for smoking fish, that was stored alongside the plant, and destroyed a high voltage electrical transformer used to power the plant and several other plants in the area, including the elevators at Digby wharf. Due to lack of power to operate wharf elevators, the CPS Princess of Acadia was delayed in unloading. She was one hour late leaving Digby for her return trip to Saint John.

A simple, forceful story of adventure on the fishing grounds by a Digby County boy has won first prize in the Kiwanis Club of Liverpool. Final judging was by Dr. Thomas H. Raddall, of Liverpool, one of Canada's foremost men of letters. His first choice among the 112 entries was "Killer on the Ledge", by Bruce Outhouse, of Islands Consolidated School, Freeport, N.S. Dr. Raddall described it as "a fishing adventure that had every mark of a personal experience, related in a simple but effective way". The first prize is \$100.00, and in addition the story will be published in the Atlantic Advocate, at regular rates.

The second prize of \$50.00 was won by Nancy Corston, of Queen Elizabeth High School, Halifax, for her essay "On Going to the Theatre".

Robert Young, of Pictou Academy won third prize of \$25.00 for his short story "If You Are Thinking of Yelling at a Barking Dog . . . Don't".

The second and third prize winning entries will also be submitted to the Atlantic Advocate for consideration.

Dr. Raddall expressed praise for the quality of the writing in the entries which were submitted to him for final judging. He said young writers were apt to be derivative or frankly imitative, "it is not undesirable, it is a natural process".

Officials of the Kiwanis Club of Liverpool expressed satisfaction at the response to the contest which drew entries from thirty high schools throughout the entire province. It is hoped that, because of the good response and the quality of the entries, the contest can be continued on an annual basis. Supervisors and English teachers in many of the schools submitting entries expressed praise for the contest, which encourages students to write to the best of their ability on subjects of their own choosing. Literary merit was the sole criterion in judging. The Kiwanis Club of Liverpool has expressed appreciation to the authorities of the schools which participated for their part in making the contest a success.

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Turn Down Sewer Proposal

By a vote of 30 to 27 ratepayers of the town at a meeting in the Court House, Digby, on Thursday evening, turned down a proposal to lay a trunk sewer line along a number of the town streets. The ratepayers were asked to sanction the borrowing of a sum not to exceed \$50,000 for the purpose. Plans prepared by professional engineers were shown by Charles Haliburton, chairman of the sewer committee, who also indicated that a sewer system in the town cannot be established until a main sewer is constructed. Sections of the town not served by sewers cannot be served until a main sewer is laid, he said. He explained that the plan was made as presented because of drainage. Deputy Mayor D. E. Lewis, also on the sewer committee, supported Councillor Haliburton on the health angle. Costs and means of financing were discussed at length.

Those who argued in favor of the sewer question did so on the grounds of sanitation, industrial development and an incentive to build homes in lesser developed areas. Those who argued against the sewer proposal expressed concern about mounting taxation.

The proposal to borrow \$30,000 for the purpose of constructing, acquiring, purchasing, altering, extending, improving or adding to electric works or electrical system for the town went through on a vote of 29 for and 13 against.

Pipe Band Visits Digby

The Kiwanis Junior Pipe Band of the Saint John Kiwanis Club visited Digby on Sunday. The trip was made to mark the season's first Sunday crossing of the CPS Princess of Acadia. The band was under the direction of Norman Seales. In place of D. N. Cormick the group was accompanied to Digby by A. Bishop. Arrangements for the trip were made jointly by the Kiwanis Clubs of Digby and Saint John. The band played during the crossing, for the pleasure of the passengers.

C. M. Levy, Glen Smith and Rev. H. S. Hartlin, Digby Kiwanians, greeted the band as they disembarked from the Acadia, and members of the club led a parade to the band stand where an hour-long concert was held. A welcome was given by Councillor Charles E. Haliburton, and following the concert thanks were expressed by Glen Smith. The Kiwanis Club later entertained band members at the Cornwallis Cafe.

Business Good

Motels in the Annapolis Valley report registration of tourists from the United States double the influx for June last year.

Lloyd K. Hill, director of tourist promotion for the Affiliated Boards of Trade, said, after a trip from Digby to Kentville, that motels and hotels he visited reported the same boost in trade. One motel had 28 American travellers booked in for one night.

Mr. Hill said fine weather may account in part for the early rush of tourist traffic. "But you must remember we have been doing a lot of promotion in the United States to boost the Annapolis Valley for several months now and the promotion is, we believe, showing results."

Mr. Hill said new tours were being lined up for 1966 and more than the usual numbers of tours was expected this summer.

Starting the first week in July, the Affiliated Boards will sponsor a tourist of the week project. A visitor and family will be given free lodgings for one night "special" treatment to mark the occasion. Method of selection has not been finalized.

Some new tourist bureaus are opening this week. A highlight of the season will be the opening of a bureau in the Municipality of Clare, built at a cost of over \$4,000.00.

Another boost for the Annapolis Valley is a regular weekly program over a New York City radio station that deals with the history, past and contemporary, and various aspects of life in the Valley.

W.C.S. Holds Graduation Exercises

The graduation of Weymouth Consolidated High School took place on Friday evening in the auditorium.

Rev. Father R. Deveau, School trustee, was chairman, and in his opening remarks said that the purpose of Education was the ability to act when the opportunity arises.

He said that work, is the key to the treasure of success.

Supervisor L. C. Stockdale gave his report, saying that the enrollment was slightly down this year, and that it had undoubtedly stabilized itself following the war years. He spoke highly of the support of the teachers during the past year, and expressed regrets that so many were leaving. Those leaving this year are Marina Hill, Lois Kinney, Mrs. Muriel Cosman, Chester Sabean, Mrs. Clothilde Comeau, Barry Kaye and Mr. Thimot. Several new teachers have already been hired but there are still several vacancies in the school. Mrs. Rose MacNeill will fill the capacity of music teacher next year. This will be a great asset to the community and has been one of the major needs here since the consolidation.

Mr. Stockdale spoke highly of the Driver Education and also of Mr. Sabean's work in co-operation with Mr. Gordon Campbell with the Army Cadets. The cadets ranked 9th out of 43 units in Nova Scotia. Mr. Stockdale stated that this would be his last official act as supervisor of the school and hoped that co-operation would be given to Mr. Layton, who will be taking over the supervision for the next year.

Rev. Father Deveau, on behalf of the trustees, Home and School and those present, expressed thanks and appreciation to Mr. Stockdale for the untold numbers of extra hours he had worked for his loyalty to the school and fulfilling his duty so well. Mr. Powell exclaimed that Weymouth was a wonderful place to live, perhaps it has not reached the prosperity of larger metropolitan areas. Greater employment, he said, is the need here, but we must keep the small businesses going, until we can replace them with something more modern and adequate.

Changes are continuous, he told the graduates, life work should be both interesting and challenging. Hard work is better than illness. "Don't be a clock watcher", Mr. Powell to the class that as they apply for positions - their prospective employer will assess them for their ability and financial returns to himself. He urged the graduates to use their abilities in Western Nova Scotia. In past years Weymouth was outstanding in its ship building industries. It is time, said Powell "that we put ideas, industry and ability into this area." He spoke of procrastination as being the stop block of all good things that we must not put off until tomorrow, what we should do today. On finishing his speech, he told the class not to let the material progress of life blind them to progress of their country life. Be moderate in all things, and keep congenial atmospheres in the home, in order to have congenial relationships in the world. "It is to these graduating classes" Mr. Powell said, "that we look for the future leaders of the area."

Mr. A. E. Adelaar thanked Mr. Powell, extending his own congratulations to the graduates. He told them that throughout the past year they had proved themselves stable and worthy of the leadership of the future. He said that unless the parents and students make their educational institutions pay off, they are of little value. He thanked the

teachers and students for their loyalty and devotion to the school.

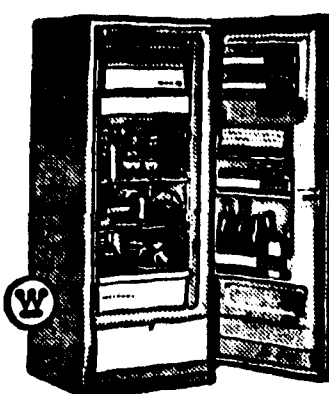

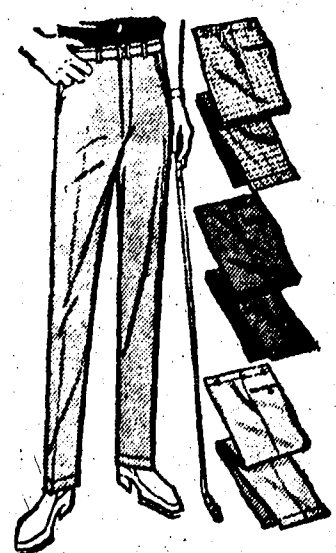

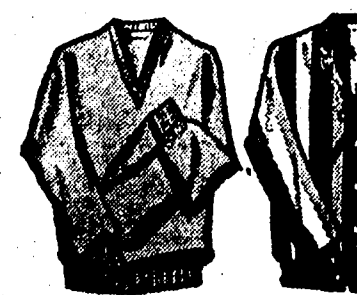

DIGBY TOWN COUNCIL DISCUSSES FIRE FIGHTING PROBLEM

Dissatisfaction concerning fire protection for an area up to a few miles from the town of Digby was brought to the attention of the Digby Town Council at the July meeting held Monday night at the town hall.

The fire contract which has been annually renewed for the past several years was not renewed for the year 1965 by the Municipal Council, it was stated. The town council of Digby is concerned about the situation because of the difficulty of turning down pleas for help when fire strikes. At the same time the cost of fire protection has been rising through the last few years to the place where the average cost to the citizens of Digby is in the vicinity of \$300. per call. In 1964 the cost reached a total high of \$9,975.00. This figure includes hydrant rental to the Digby Water Commission. It has been figured that the average cost necessary for fire protection to the area served, up to the end of 1964, under the contract would be near 10c per \$100. for each home-owner, or \$1,500. total. The first contract was for \$700. for the year 1959. This figure was raised to \$1,000. in a subsequent contract; and the last contract, and the one not signed by the Municipal Council was for the sum of \$1,500. The Digby Fire Department personnel is entirely voluntary, and the monetary loss to them and their employers is not taken into consideration in these figures. However, the firemen and their employers throughout the years have been happy to donate their time and efforts whenever calls for help have come in from outside sources.

The area served by the department under the contract was to (approximately): Victoria Bridge; Jordantown; head of St. Mary's Bay; down the Neck Road to the Culloden road; Culloden road to the old school; Voorhees property on Shore Road and to Bremner's on the Lighthouse Road. This area was as far from the town as it was considered possible to efficiently service. However, the department has attended fires from outside this area, at times, in answer to the pleas of homeowners. The town cannot legally service the foregoing area without a proper contract and adequate compensation, it was pointed out. The department is also a member of the "mutual aid" arrangement whereby the department stands by to service neighboring areas when their fire equipment is called outside their area.

The streets committee reported that during the month of June the men spent 12½ hours on repairs to tractor at a cost of \$15.00, 42½ hours cleaning dump at a cost of \$44.00, 65 hours putting up flags for Apple Blossom Festival and hauling rubbish away from rink at a cost of \$67.80; 698 hours on streets, patching hard surface; spreading chloride on gravel streets; removing stump by Hazelton's; cleaning ditch on Victoria Street and Warwick Street; hauling rocks off Mount Street and Shore Road; repairing sewers; painting lines on streets and sidewalks; mowing grass on sides of streets; repairing road shoulders and culverts and cleaning up streets. Four additional men were hired for haying. During the month the men spent 370 hours at a cost of \$379.20 on water services.

The Police Committee reported that during the month of June a total of 14 complaints (Please turn to Page 8)

Three Buildings Burn; Home And Woods Catch Fire

Early Friday evening a fire broke out on the property of Jeffrey White, Lighthouse Road, which destroyed a large barn, a garage and another building. A portion of the White home was also damaged by the fire and the rest by water and smoke. Mr. White first noticed the flames burning in grass near the barn but could not extinguish them before they reached the building.

Volunteers of the area, under the direction of local forrester, Donald Brown, fought the blaze. The Digby Fire Department was called in to help when it appeared the fire would spread to the nearby woods and properties.

The efforts of the Digby Fire Department and the fire-fighters succeeded in extinguishing the house fire, but the blaze spread to the woods. This was brought under control by firemen using back pumps and running a hose line.

Voluntary workers managed to save all of the furniture in the White home before it destroyed the north end of the building.

No estimate of the damage has been made, but it is believed to be extensive.

Board Looks Into Parking Area

Reporting at the regular meeting of the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening, president Charles Haliburton said that he had correspondence from the Irving Oil Co. regarding the property on Water Street formerly occupied by Central Motors which the Digby Board of Trade had been looking into as a parking area. The correspondence indicated that the company was prepared to tear down the building to street level and the town would be asked to absorb the taxes on property for at least five years and from year to year after the five year lease. Reservation for cancelling the Board's lease on a months notice was also contained in the correspondence.

The Board furthered plans at the meeting for renting of the property.

Regrets were read from Hon. H. J. Robichaud, federal Minister of Fisheries, because he was unable to accept the invitation to meet with the Digby Board of Trade.

It was decided to provide the Board's membership list to each member of The Digby Board of Trade.

Under civic affairs the Board discussed the redistribution of federal constituency boundaries, the turning down by ratepayers of the proposal to construct a trunk sewer line in the town, the wisdom of having a town manager and salaries for town councillors.

Heaf Test Successful

The success of the recent Heaf Tuberculin Testing Clinics held at the Lions Club Hall can be directly attributed to the organization and individuals who sponsored the house to house canvass prior to the clinics and provided assistance in any form. Over sixty canvassers gave of their time to this worthy cause and the results reflect the fruit of their efforts. 1796 persons or 64% of the population were tested and 403 x-rays were taken.

Following is a list of the organizations who, through their cooperation, have made possible to the people of Digby this free public health service: Lions Club, Ladies Hospital Aid, Local Branch V.O.N., Red Cross Society and Rebekah Lodge.

Authorities in charge were grateful to Miss Louise Daley, who divided the town into districts, and the four captains, namely: Mrs. Helen Anthony, Mrs. Victor Cardozo, Mrs. A. G. Connelly and Mrs. Elliott VanTassel.

Nearly 240 Barristers Meet At Pines

Registration of barristers for their convention at the Digby Pines last weekend numbered nearly 240, the largest number of lawyers ever to attend the annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society which is usually held at the Pines at the opening of the season. Guests at the convention were Hon. Mr. Justice Ronald Martland, of the Supreme Court of Canada, and Mrs. Martland, and Hon. H. P. MacKeen, Q.C., Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, and Mrs. MacKeen.

L. P. Daley, Q.C., Halifax, was elected president, succeeding R. A. Knigsberg, Halifax. John Dickey, Q.C., Halifax, is first vice-president and David Waterbury, Q.C., Kentville, second vice-president. Honorary president is W. D. Withrow, Q.C., Wolfville.

An interesting paper was presented by Gordon S. Cowan, Q.C., Halifax, on estate planning and the role of the lawyer in estate planning. Mr. Cowan said that an estate without a plan or one that is poorly planned and unwisely implemented can bring disastrous results to both the client and those whom he employs. Mr. Cowan said that not only the wealthy but every adult should have an estate plan, no matter how simple it might be.

Among the items of business discussed at the Nova Scotia Magistrates' Association which met in conjunction with that of changing the Motor Vehicle Act as it affects persons convicted of impaired driving. The barristers favored a change because they felt the act which calls for the automatic suspension of licence for one year, following a conviction for impaired driving, imposes an injustice in many cases. It was their opinion that the registrar of motor vehicles should continue to suspend driving privileges for one year, but after three months the County Court should be permitted to recommend restoration if circumstances warranted it.

Charles LeBrun, Q.C., of Bridgetown, was elected president of the magistrates who called for an extension of the family court system in Nova Scotia.

Nowlan Fund In High Gear

The drive for a George Nowlan Memorial Fund has shipped into high gear here with Senators Frank Welch of Wolfville, and Wallace McCutcheon of Toronto dividing the nation between them as campaigning grounds.

Senator McCutcheon takes Montreal and area west of that city, and Senator Welch takes the territory east of Montreal.

And Senator Welch has made his initial move in the attempt to raise \$30,000 to establish a fund to bring lecturers to the late Mr. Nowlan's alma mater, Acadia University. He has sent a call out to eastern Canadians who wish to honor the memory of Mr. Nowlan, telling them that if they wish to contribute they may do so by sending their offerings to "Hon. George Nowlan Memorial Lectures, Acadia University, Box 1060, Wolfville, Nova Scotia."

The funds drawn in the campaign, over which Nova Scotia's Premier Stanfield is chairman, will be used to secure interest which will in turn be used to hire special lecturers, from all over the world to come to Acadia and lecture to students on policies and government.

The main aim of the project is expressed in one paragraph of a circular letter sent out by Senator Welch: "Hopefully we would attract young men and women to a more active role in all political aspects which are necessary if we are to have an informed electorate and increasingly good government."

Speculate On Digby Pines

Speculations and rumors regarding the future of the Digby Pines hotel have been going the round of Digby since the Kentville Advertiser appeared last week with the boldly bordered question on its front page "Nova Scotia Government to Buy the Pines?"

Some sources in Digby have been viewing such prospects with a hopeful eye. The speculation is that such a move would automatically relieve transportation problems in the area.

To date The Digby Courier is not prepared to answer the Advertiser's question with any degree of knowledge on the matter.

The intimation of the Advertiser was that if the government bought the hotel it would be operated in the same manner as the province's other tourist resort, Keltic Lodge, in Cape Breton.

Valley Plans For Centennial

Prepares Board's Brief

Charles Haliburton was represented at the Digby Board of Trade meeting held on Tuesday evening by the appointed preparation of a summary to go before the hearing to be held in Halifax regarding the study of the feasibility of an additional ferry service between Nova Scotia and New England. The brief to be presented on behalf of the Digby Board of Trade was given endorsement at the meeting on Tuesday.

Mr. Haliburton pointed out the advantages of using the shortest route between the New England States and Nova Scotia for a second ferry, which route he observed was from Digby. He named several alternative routes such as to Campbellville, Lunenburg, Eastport or Jonesport. All these possibilities along with those of ferries from Yarmouth and Shelburne should be given careful consideration, the brief stated.

Mr. Haliburton noted the need of new docking facilities at Digby and stated that a terminal should be constructed in such a manner as to accommodate more than one ship each day and to service them quickly and efficiently. Such a project would minimize the overhead chargeable to each ferry service with mutual advantage.

The approximate short distance from Digby to towns in Western Nova Scotia, including Shelburne with the completion of the national park, was brought out in the brief. Other advantages mentioned were the Digby Pines hotel and the ice-free harbour area to accommodate large ships.

Mr. Haliburton brought out in his report the advantages of choosing two Canadian ports, such as Digby and Campbellville, in relation to customs expenses.

The report also suggested the possibility that the additional service might well be instituted between the port of Digby and Saint John.

The need of better transportation in western Nova Scotia for the tourist and for shipment of produce was stressed. The economic needs of Digby were emphasized as well as the need to have something to boost the morale of the people.

The hearings were called by A. D. Margison and Associates Limited, a firm of consulting engineers of Halifax and Toronto, engaged by the provincial and federal governments to study the feasibility of a second ferry service between Nova Scotia and New England. Representatives from various points in the New England States are attending the hearings, a number of whom had, in the past, met with the Digby Board of Trade regarding a second N.E.N.S. ferry.

Electoral Boundaries Hearing Here

The federal Electoral Boundaries Commission on re-drafting Nova Scotia's federal electoral map, will hold a public hearing in Digby on July 20, it is learned. Digby is one of several seats, including Halifax, Sydney, New Glasgow and Liverpool, where the public can hear submissions placed before the commission. All hearings are to be held in the local courthouses in the areas.

Chairman of the commission is Mr. Justice Vincent J. Potter. According to the preliminary maps drafted by the commission and released on May 22, the electoral district of Digby is to be included with Shelburne-Yarmouth instead of with Annapolis-Kings as previously. Further reports from the commission are expected by October 1965 and a new electoral map is expected to be released by the end of January, 1966.

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About This And That

Do We Give Enough Time For Thought?

Snap judgements are not always wrong. We admire people who have the ability to think quickly and clearly. It is indeed a rare and valuable gift. There are many smart people who think and act quickly and are not members of the majority. They need to be considered in our deliberations.

Take for instance the ratepayers' meeting last week. Certainly the agenda was not too far from the mark. Many of those who did attend were there meaning for the first time the why and wherefore of spending the enormous sum of \$50,000 for sewers. Naturally some had done their thinking, but not a town councillor for instance. Were they to do so, the question of whether or not to spend the \$50,000 would be a moot point. We are the ones who made the plans and the money, and we are the ones who are responsible for the results. It is our duty to think and act wisely. We should not be so quick to spend or not to spend \$50,000 within one hour on Thursday. Not everybody has that quick and clear thinking mind. We know few people decide within an hour whether or not they will build a \$50,000 house — money on hand to do it or not.

Some ratepayers, it was evident, were against borrowing money for the purpose of constructing sewers because taxes are already more than people feel able to bear. We won't argue with that. We all find taxation of any source burdensome, we'll admit. We also feel that those who have the burden of paying the frontage fee, too, have some cause for concern. Our question is, how many weighed the other side of the coin? How many considered the effect of a good sewer system on the sanitary condition of the town? How many thought of the system influencing industrial expansion which would improve economic conditions? Its influence on the general living conditions of the town.

The vote on the sewer question has been taken. It turned out "nay." We have no intention of arguing whether the vote was right or wrong. That is not our purpose here. All we wish to do is to suggest that a bit more preparatory education should be given before people are asked to decide on important questions. People should have time to think. Not all can make intelligent snap judgements.

Possibly the newspaper editor falls down on some of these issues. On the other hand, the newspaper columns are open to all for discussion, i.e. for discussion and not to slander. A bit of discussion through the newspaper columns on any subject can be beneficial and give ratepayers something to think about in advance.

Visitors Miss A Bus Depot

Sure there's a certain sense of satisfaction for us at The Digby Courier when two perfectly strange ladies from Toronto look over at the honest faces in our shop and say, "Let's see if we can leave our luggage at the newspaper office. It will be safe there." The two perfectly strange ladies from Toronto got off the Princess of Acadia, went to the bus stop, had time on their hands to look over our fair town before proceeding by bus to see the Grand Pre of which they had heard so much.

Honest to goodness, we love visiting strangers. We have many at the shop and they usually go away being friends. We do our best to accommodate the people who ask to leave suitcases with us (more than one instance, to be sure) but we are just not fitted with that kind of accommodation and we are sometimes a bit embarrassed. But, why should we be more embarrassed than anyone else? After all, such accommodation isn't expected of us in the newspaper business. What worries us even more is the story the ladies might tell other Torontonians when they return to that aristocratic city. We can guess what it might be. Like — "Don't stop in Digby. They don't have accommodation there for visitors."

Other bus traveling carsters had last week left their luggage stand unattended at the bus stop while they took a change of position and scenery by going down town. They were trusting souls, too. You know, maybe everybody in Digby has an honest looking face.

But with all going aside — it's poor publicity for the bus line, Digby and this part of the province. Visitors miss a bus depot even more than our own people.

Occasionally commercial printing jobs have come to our plant from various places like New York, Chicago, western Canada, as well as many parts of the Atlantic provinces. On Saturday, we had our first job from the Yukon. For financial reasons, we appreciate work from every quarter of the Continent as well as from within the home town and county, but one of the most pleasing aspects is to know that people who move so far away do not forget their old home town printing establishment and news media. It is a joy to do the work.

Menu for a Sunday in July:

Applesauce Meat Balls
Mashed Potatoes
Buttered Corn
Whole Wheat Bread and Butter
Celery and Radishes
Devils Food Cake and Ice Cream

Applesauce Meat Balls

2 lbs. ground beef
1 cup crushed cereal flakes
1 chopped onion
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. pepper

Mix thoroughly all ingredients except the tomato sauce. Shape into small balls. Place in shallow baking pan or casserole. Pour tomato sauce over top. Bake one hour in 350° oven. Makes about two dozen small balls.

Garnish the potatoes with fresh parsley. If you have no fresh parsley how about mixing a couple of teaspoons of dry parsley into the potatoes!

Even if you have not been able to get fresh corn yet, frozen corn is delicious hot and buttered. For my money, frozen corn is vastly superior to those tasteless items which pass for fresh corn in supermarkets during the times when fresh corn is not in season.

Devil's Food Cake

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cups sugar
4 eggs, separated
2 cups flour
4 tsp. baking powder

Cream shortening. Add sugar gradually. Add egg yolks which have been beaten until thick and lemon-colored. Mix and sift dry ingredients, and add alternately with the milk. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into batter. Add chocolate and vanilla. Bake in tube pan or loaf pan 45 minutes in 350° oven.

Rich Coffee Frosting

3 cups icing sugar
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup hot coffee

Beat all together. If too thick, add cream.

This menu is by no means limited to either Sunday, or July, of course. It just happens to be very good eating, in July, August, and January. The cake is baked at the same temperature as the meat, so both can be in the oven at the same time, but if mixing time, not oven heat is your main concern, bake the cake a week before. The meat balls take care of themselves. Pop them in the oven, and, if the weather in July is better than the weather has been in June, go out and finish your sun tan.

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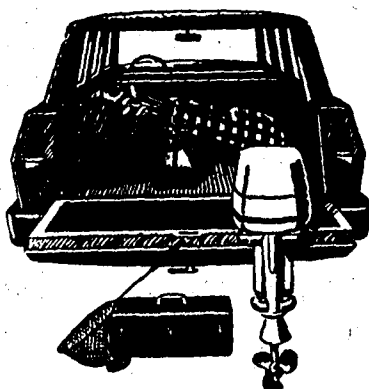

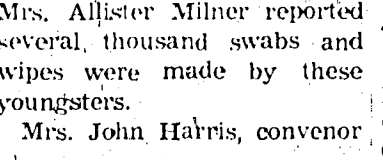

Proclamation

BY THE HONOURABLE E. D. HALIBURTON

Minister of Lands and Forests

To all whom these Presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern:

Whereas the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia deems it necessary for the protection of the forests to make this Proclamation:

Now Know Ye that the Minister of Lands and Forests of Nova Scotia under and by virtue of Section 117 of The Lands and Forests Act doth hereby set aside on, from, and after midnight, the twenty-eighth day of June, A. D., 1965, until the thirtieth day of September, A. D., 1965, unless this Proclamation is sooner revoked, every area of forest land, as an area of forest land upon which no person shall enter for the purpose of travelling, camping, fishing, or picnicking, or any other purposes, without first notifying the local Forest Ranger, or other person duly authorized to receive such notification, of the route, destination, purpose and duration of the trip with dates, and having obtained authorization in writing from the local Forest Ranger or other person duly authorized to issue same: Provided, however, that forest land may be entered upon by the actual owner or occupier thereof or his or their employees as such, and by Forest Rangers, Voluntary Rangers, fire fighters and land surveyors:

Any person found in any area of forest land without a permit whilst this Proclamation is in force is, upon conviction, subject to a penalty of not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars:

Of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

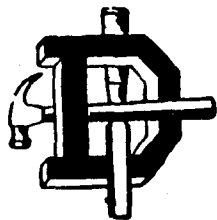

Tuna Match At Cape

The thrill and excitement of landing the mighty bluefin tuna will be experienced by some 28 of the world's finest salt water sports-fishermen when they meet for the 16th International Tuna Cup Match, August 16-21, at Wedgeport and Cape St. Mary.

Four teams representing Canada, the United States, Mexico and the Caribbean are slated to challenge one another for the coveted Sharp Trophy.

The International Tuna Cup Match is being revived this year after a seven year recess, caused by a deficiency of tuna. This year, however, all indications point to substantial numbers of the big fish.

For four days, August 18-21, 18 of Nova Scotia's famed Cape Island fishing boats will ply the waters, off Cape St. Mary and Wedgeport, each with two team members aboard, putting mind against might in a battle to the finish.

A special communication network, from ship to shore and a relay system at Yarmouth, match headquarters, has been arranged to expedite news of strikes and landings.

Scoring will be on the basis of one point per pound of fish taken. Bonus points will be awarded (200) for the team taking the largest number of fish during the match and (200) points to the team taking the largest single fish during the match. The team having the largest number of points at the conclusion of the match will be declared winner.

Committees in Yarmouth and Wedgeport have arranged for entertainment while the match is on. The festivities culminate Saturday evening with a banquet given by the Province of Nova Scotia, where the Alton B. Sharp trophy will be awarded.

were registered with the department, of which 6 required some field investigation. All complaints except one have been terminated to the satisfaction of those concerned. As a result of the investigations of this office, 3 persons were taken to court, and all cases except one have been disposed of, one under the Criminal Code of Canada, two cases under the Nova Scotia Liquor Act. Three motor vehicle accidents were investigated. Fines collected \$101.00. One person was convicted of impaired driving. Police car patrol for month of June 1,261 miles. This includes a trip to Halifax. Gasoline purchased 60.3 gals. Oil purchased 3 qts.

In the Sewer Committee report considerable discussion was had on methods of laying a main trunk sewer from south end of 2nd Avenue to railroad tracks near dump out of general revenue over a period of time. It was pointed out ratepayers expressed disapproval of expense of installing this necessary line by a bond issue. Fear of raise in taxes was thought main reason for vetoing.

Residents of Church Street from Victoria Street to King Street demanded that the road be widened and sidewalks be constructed. The Streets Committee was instructed to do what would be deemed possible within the budget. Surveyors are to be hired to establish lines. The town has 33 feet from centre of road, it was mentioned.

John Raymond appeared before the council demanding to know who sent fish meal and burnt wood to the town dump and causing a fire hazard for dwellers near there. He was informed by council that wood had been sent up but they didn't know anything about fish meal being sent. They advised Mr. Raymond that a new location for the town dump was being sought as rapidly as possible.

William Troupe addressed the council on the possibility of an air strip for Digby. After much discussion a committee consisting of Deputy Mayor D. E. Lewis, chairman, and Councillor Halliburton was named to investigate the possibilities of an airport.

Councillor Halliburton reported that correspondence from Irving Oil Co. Ltd. to the Digby Board of Trade revealed that the company was agreeable to tearing down to street level the property on Water Street formerly occupied by Central Motors and would give a 5 year lease if the Trade Board would pay the taxes. Other parking areas, such as Acadia Coach Lines and First Avenue again came under discussion.

Digby Men Present Briefs

No, the people could not wait, she insisted, and back went their letters so there would be no expectancy followed by disappointment.

Often her admirers and visitors drop into the Courier office and mention their pleasant visit with her and her husband. Digby Telephone Representatives Go To Yarmouth

Maritime Telephone & Telephone Company Limited announced this week that Service Representatives to assist customers in the Digby, Annapolis Royal, Freeport, Sandy Cove, Weymouth, Bear River, Cornwallis areas will now be headquartered in Yarmouth.

The company said that close to 4,500 subscribers in these areas will, effective Monday, July 19th, have four service representatives available to offer help to replace the two previously stationed in Digby. Of the two, one, Miss Margaret Rippey, is taking holidays prior to her scheduled retirement. The other, Miss Edna G. Turnbull, will be taking up her duties with the company in Yarmouth.

The move means the average number of Plant, Traffic and service employees in Digby - 34 - will be reduced by two. Currently summer peak traffic requires 38 employees on duty to carry the load.

Customers ordering new telephones, extensions, and needing service will continue to dial the same number - 245-2561 - but will automatically reach the Yarmouth service office, instead of Digby, at no extra charge.

Payment of accounts can still be made at the Payment Agencies in the various localities or directly to the company at P. O. Box 308, Yarmouth.

Company officials said the consolidation of office keeping records and service practices means economies in telephone service and maintenance of efficiency. Similar consolidations have taken place in such centres as Windsor, Wolfville and Liverpool.

DREDGING CONTRACT LET

Series Of Accidents

Although none were of a serious nature, a series of car accidents occurred within the town over the past weekend.

The first one occurred on Warwick Street on Saturday about 7 o'clock p.m. Kemp Leslie Stanton, White Cove, was proceeding up Warwick Street out of town direction when Joseph W. Amers struck the Stanton half ton truck at the rear. The car crossed the ditch, hit a telephone pole, doing approximately \$100 damage to both cars.

Early on Sunday morning a car driven by Frank Lloyd Crosby, Jr., Smith's Cove, left the road while driving East towards the Pines Hotel. He was blinded by the lights of an oncoming car and losing control, his vehicle went up-side-down in a ditch. About \$300 worth of damage was done. Crosby, who was taken to hospital, was released the next day.

On Sunday morning Leigh Peck, driver of a car, was involved in an accident with a truck driven by Ellsworth Hutchins, of Rossway. The Hutchins truck was proceeding down the hill on Prince William Street and the Peck car was going South on Queen Street when they hit at the intersection near Grace United Church. The truck crossed the street and broke off a light pole. Nobody was hurt. Damage amounted to \$1200 for both.

A \$79,360 contract for dredging at Digby, N. S., was awarded to the J. P. Foster Company Ltd. of Montreal. Public Works Minister George McNeil announced Friday.

According to a letter in the Chronicle-Herald signed by a resident of Digby, H. S. Hartlin, and also from information given to The Digby Courier by Rev. Mr. Hartlin, the serious tie-up of traffic around Victoria Bridge is occurring again since the summer season heavy traffic has started.

The experience of the car from Maryland a few Sundays ago is not the first of its kind on Victoria Bridge, as The Digby Courier has, on several occasions, made mention of similar experiences. Mr. Hartlin witnessed two vehicles, one driven by a party from Maryland and the other, a trailer from Massachusetts, meet on the bridge. The vehicles could not pass and a long line of cars trailed them on either side. Victoria Bridge is a long, narrow, one-lane bridge across Bear River with the approach from the East coming from over a long hill and the approach from the West coming from a series of blindly cornered short hills.

Through the early spring each community organization has been preparing for the programs. The Community Club at Marshalltown raised funds to purchase a piano and for sports equipment and supplies for a vacation school. This is the first summer for the Marshalltown program, which is centered in St. Theresa's Hall. In Acaciaville there had been a program last year. The Association continued a modified form of it through the winter, including operation of a community library at the Community Centre.

The students who are helping out are volunteers and are living in the two communities. Acaciaville participants are Christopher Jens, Bonnie Keith and Roy Smith. The other students, John Devereaux, Richard Feldman, Lenore Levinson and Frederick Thompson, are in Marshalltown. David Marion, a member of last year's group in Acaciaville, is living in Digby and will help out with both programs.

The Acaciaville program, building on the work of last summer and winter, consists in part of a morning vacation school. Sessions for pre-schoolers are held Monday and Wednesday, while the 7-10 year olds meet Tuesday and Thursday. In the afternoons there are nature and recreational programs, with a science exhibit as one aim. Participation in the program has been beyond expectation. Twenty children are taking part in the younger group sessions, and forty arrived on the opening day for the older group. This is about twice the number who participated last year. Volunteers from the community are needed, especially for this program.

A vacation school similar to this is also starting in Marshalltown. It also is divided into two age groups, and has with it an afternoon program of sports and recreation, including baseball and swimming. On its opening day, Tuesday, fifteen children participated, with a number of on-lookers in attendance.

In addition to the vacation schools, other programs are being undertaken. In Marshalltown, a softball group is underway, for men 16 and older. A tutoring program for junior (Please turn to page 10)

Macdonald, chairman for the Fisheries Sub-Committee for the Digby Area Resource Development Committee, Mr. J. J. Macdonald, who presented the report to the Board, and Mr. J. J. Macdonald, who presented a proposed second New England Nova Scotia ferry. We think they made a very good job of it. For the time being, we have no reason to believe that the case is closed. We have not heard enough yet. We have heard that the three briefs submitted on behalf of Digby we see little except engineering figures. We see no need of having retained an engineer to come up with these when capable and honest engineers are already engaged by governments to come up with the proper figures. Naturally, there are also other considerations, but it would seem that all has been done that can be done in presenting Digby's case. It is, now, sort of awaiting "the hand of fate" with us. Others probably feel the same.

Cherry Carnival Time

The Annapolis Valley (practically the town of Kentville, really) has an Apple Blossom Festival which attracts crowds to the Valley. Although on a much smaller scale, we have something just as unique right here in our own area. It could be built up. That is the Bear River Cherry Carnival.

We have never ceased to wonder at the ingenuity, enthusiasm and energy which goes into the Carnival each year by the Bear River people. As a result thereof, the Carnival turns out to be a success each year.

Unlike the Digby County Exhibition, which is held in Bear River, the Bear River Cherry Carnival is specifically Bear River's. Nevertheless, what is good for Bear River is also good for the whole area around, so any assistance given to the Carnival would not only be appreciated by Bear River, but the fruit of the assistance would find its way back home. The Apple Blossom Festival draws help from a wide area but Kentville profits most, we would imagine. The Cherry Carnival could also draw assistance from a fairly wide territory, even though Bear River does and should stand to benefit most. One way to assist is by entering the parade, even though we know from experience that Bear River is capable of putting on fine parades on her own. We've seen them.

For our kids, this was the first experience of a Sunday School picnic. For me, it was the first time in mighty close to twenty years. From my experience in two generations of them, I would say that the Sunday School picnic has altered little over the years.

The kids had been looking forward to it, and talking about it for at least two weeks beforehand. I think it came up to their expectations. There were the usual weird and marvelous races for every age group. The wee ones entered the events for their ages, two and four respectively, and, like everybody else in the race, they won. If the number of two, three, four and five year olds walking around with the colored pinwheels they all got as prizes is any indication of market trends, the pinwheel business is the business to be in this year.

There was, of course, the sack races, and the pie eating contest, which we somehow missed, as well as that inevitable one team softball game played by fortyish ladies in shorts, fifteen men in railroad caps, and ten year old boys. There was a peanut scramble, which proved to a certain small boy what he had been suspecting for a long time, that there is no accounting for the behavior of adults. "You stupid man!" he yelled at the top of his rude young lungs. "Why are you throwing those peanuts around?" I shushed him, and explained that the man was being kind, and that the peanuts were for the children to pick up. He accepted this as one of the vagaries of the adult mind. Throughout the rest of the afternoon, he made guarded references to the kind man who threw peanuts about. This, he figured, ought to please me, but any man with sense who wanted to give children a treat would walk up and pass them a handful.

This was, as it has been for generations, the day of the first swim for many, the first sunburn for most, and for those over twenty-five, an occasion to use muscles they had long ago forgotten they had. Those under thirteen, had their first good, sickening, overdose of pop-corn, ice cream and sweets since Easter.

The picnic was held at a popular camping park, near a very nice lake. The locals gave a certain small boy the opportunity to look for frogs in the mud, and clams in the sand. We found neither, but we did pick up a few mussel shells of some sort, and we did see a real, live turtle. For our family naturalist, this made the day.

I proudly placed my contribution on the table, waiting for the exclamations of delight. They did not come. The table began to reel under the weight of tender, crusty rolls, lemon biscuits, meringue covered pies, and chocolate cakes. My small offering began to become insignificant.

The educated supported the revolt, and are decimated after its success; it is the educated who support the revolution in its formative stages and it is these same dupes who are "liquidated" when the plans have come to fruition; very few survive to enjoy the doubtful pleasures of the new regime. A mystery which defies explanation is the one where men cherish and nurture a movement through which they stand to lose everything, and gain nothing. It cannot be said that the results of this movement are hidden; they are open for all the world to see. These so-called quiet revolutions can at any time become violent and will when their time is right.

Athlism in this country has been given full support by the government of Canada.

A parliament which has sworn an oath on the Bible cannot function in support of those who reject God. "Today civil war is all about us in a thousand manifestations of subversion and conspiracy of stupid acquiescence and cynical resignation. It is the toy of millionaires and the self-abuse of intellectuals. The humiliating degrading emphasis which has been placed on our society is lower than "Mohammedan's Paradise."

It is apparent we have competition for a Ferry site in various places, both on this side and in your area, but regardless of this I believe there is a lot in our favor with regard to the shortest distance between our two places.

According to an article in the Bangor News this morning it mentioned a group formed from Bar Harbor, Ellsworth and Bangor would build a 4 million dollar pier for the Ferry in Bar Harbor for a 2nd Ferry site. Now as I see it a Pier is not so important as the distance, for if two trips could be made in a day very easy, it would offset many other factors; I don't believe a passenger would be so interested in how much a landing cost, rather as how quick could he get to the landing.

The important thing in this matter as I believe you too feel, is how long will the passengers be at sea on the trip. If they want an ocean voyage there are many trips to be had, but where could you establish a Ferry site between Nova Scotia and Maine where a person could travel from Nova Scotia to Bangor, Maine, in 5 hours or less; I believe this would be possible if we are successful in establishing a route between Freeport and Jonesport.

I have been assured of three different locations here in this town for a landing and when and if the time arrives we can start planning for a pier.

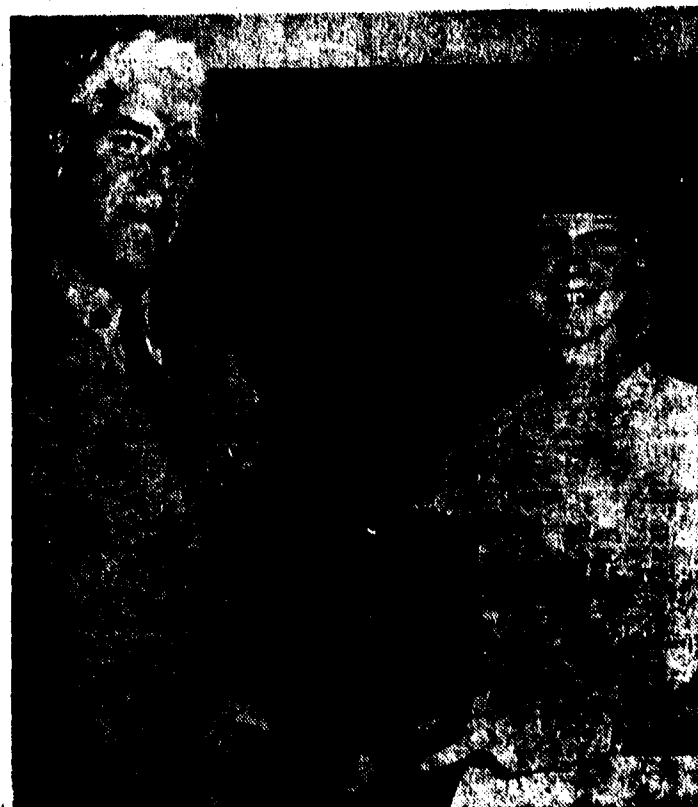

and senior high school students will begin tonight. This will be adapted to the needs and wishes of the students. At present mathematics and French are planned. During the winter a number of books were given to the Club and were organized into a beginning library by Saecla and Shirley Melanson, who will continue to act as librarians and will organize books recently donated by local and Cornell individuals. Additional shelves for the library will be built and installed in the Hall as soon as possible. This library includes books for all ages and on a wide variety of subjects.

A new endeavour in Acadiaville is that of the Agricultural Sub-Committee of the Betterment Association to explore ways of developing agricultural resources. Roy Smith, a student with practical agricultural experience as well as being a student in the Agricultural College is working mainly with this group. He and the committee will meet Saturday to review progress to date and to plan the summer's work. Agricultural representative William LeForte is participating with this group also.

Fred Thompson, in Marshalltown, has also had training and experience in agriculture and in food distribution. While there is no formal group in that community with this as its main concern, several individuals have shown an interest in developing an agricultural program.

Community residents are participating in all of these programs in a variety of ways. In addition to the preliminary preparations, the programs are open to volunteers as participants and as helpers. Further supplies and transportation may be needed. Adults are responsible for the children's arrival at and return from the vacation schools and any assistance during the sessions is warmly welcomed.

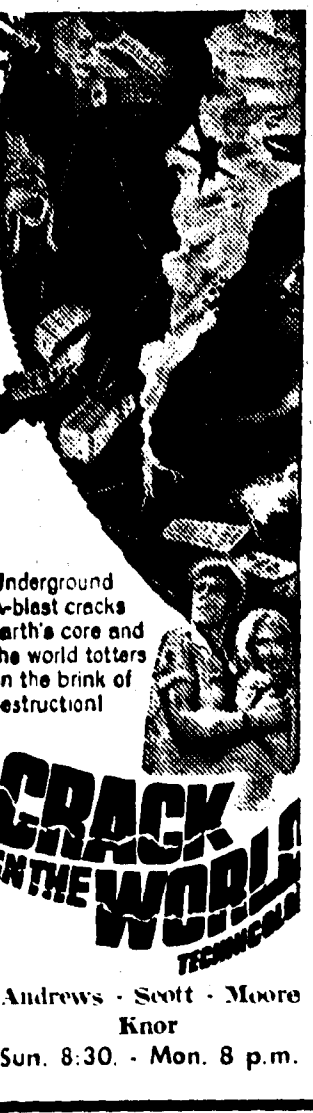
C.Y.O. Elects Officers

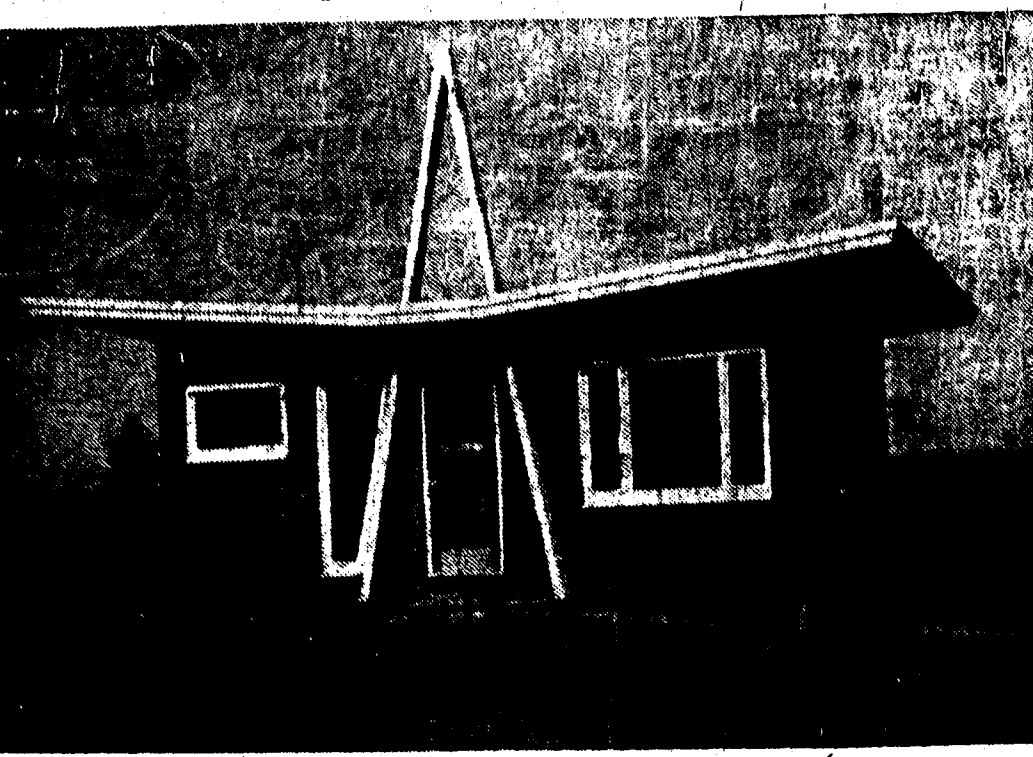

Want Election Boundaries Along County Lines

Professor J. H. Aitchison, provincial president of the New Democratic Party in Nova Scotia, in presenting a brief at a public hearing in Digby on Tuesday, asked the federal electoral boundaries commission to withdraw its redistribution plans. He advocated a scheme which would not "cut across" established county lines but "follow" these wherever possible. He said that boundaries proposed by the commission, headed by Mr. Justice V. J. Pottier, unnecessarily cut across county lines.

The brief submitted by Professor Aitchison mentioned that difficulties are encountered when a departure is made from the municipal unit as a basis of plans.

Mr. Aitchison said that agreement exists both within and between political parties and in all likelihood reflects the views of the majority of Nova Scotians that county lines should be followed and not an inter-county scheme. The Nova Scotia Liberal Association had previously submitted a brief to the commission suggesting that the federal electoral boundaries should follow established county lines.

The NDP president in presenting the brief said that the Electoral Boundaries and Readjustment Act stipulates that the population of each electoral district should correspond as nearly as possible to the electoral quota for the province (quota 67,000) but that it also authorizes the commission to depart from the rule in any case where "such a departure appears to it to be necessary or desirable by reason, among other things, of sparsity or density of population and of any special community or diversity of interests."

Among other divisions suggested by the N.D.P. brief was that Yarmouth-Digby-Annapolis should be a riding.

Artificial respiration was not necessary, though it was said he was going down for the third time.

Frank is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Ossinger. Mrs. Ossinger's comment was, "We can thank God there was someone there to rescue him."

"A man who died medically 11 times in three months told yesterday how it feels.

It was just like fainting, Delroy Outhouse said shortly before he flew home to Halifax. He felt no pain and had no dreams or visions.

"I would feel a tightening sensation that started in my head and worked down my face. During some of the times there was a sensation of being warm. Then I would feel dizzy and I could tell that I was going. Everything would go black."

After an attack he would suddenly become aware that he was in hospital being looked after.

Mr. Outhouse, 45, had three different heart conditions, each potentially fatal. One of his heart valves was partially blocked, he had suffered a coronary heart attack and the heart's natural pacemaker, which controls heartbeat by electrical impulses stopped working.

Dr. Douglas Wigle, director of the Toronto General Hospital's cardiovascular unit, described Mr. Outhouse's case as remarkable.

"I know of no other case where a man has survived at the same time three different heart conditions, each potentially fatal. Judged by all medical criteria, Delroy Outhouse died nine times in the Victoria General Hospital in Halifax during a series of emergencies that arose while he was waiting to be shipped here for a heart examination."

He died twice more in Toronto before surgeons were able to replace a partially blocked valve in the aorta, the main artery leading from the heart, and install an artificial pacemaker to ensure the continued beating of his heart.

Mr. Outhouse's first crisis occurred April 24 in the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax.

Machinery and equipment for the manufacturing of mattresses and springs has arrived at Jack's Warehousing, in Digby, where a factory for the purpose will be established on the second floor of the building.

For a number of weeks it had been rumored that a factory was about to open in the town and now that plans have materialized, it is expected that work of setting up the new plant will get underway shortly.

The new factory, which is to be established by an American firm in co-operation with the warehouse business, is expected to provide employment for eight people at the beginning.

About This And That

Get Out Of This Rut

A Disgusted Citizen, in a letter to the editor of The Digby Courier last week, more or less, told Digbyites off regarding their disinterest and lack of pride in such events as July 1st celebrations. He particularly mentioned the lack of entries in the Digby parade of the past July 1st and also of the lack of midway entertainment. Certainly, we all need a bit of such criticism to wake us up. Such criticism is good but we especially liked the constructive suggestions in the letter. Let's start thinking seriously right now about next year's celebrations. Let's get out of this rut and show we have something to be proud of. Another thing we liked about A Disgusted Citizen's letter was that it did not say "Why don't you?" but it did say "let us" which included A Disgusted Citizen. More of this kind of criticism and the Digby Forum is sure of its \$3900. (We believe it fell short of its goal by \$3100 on the July 1st project and we expect the fate of the Forum still weighs in the balance.)

The success of any venture depends on the co-operation of the citizens and that goes for staging a worthwhile parade. We will admit that much smaller towns and villages such as Bear River and Weymouth, often can manage to put on much better parades than does Digby. Here again, we say co-operation is needed. Anybody who has put a worthwhile float in a parade knows only too well that it takes both time and money to prepare such a float. It is something which is not looked forward to each year although those who manage an annual entry are to be admired. Wouldn't it be nice if each firm down town and each organization in town took the responsibility of making an entry every few years. This would assure a worthwhile parade each year if such events are to continue. We also pass on the suggestion that the committee in charge might offer to supply crepe paper for decorating floats. This is done in some towns and we should add that we haven't seen a poor parade where this is done.

Maybe the biggest rut we are in is that we do not look ahead. We do not plan far enough in advance. In fact, sometimes we forget even to plan. Take, for instance, the 75th anniversary of the town. We might have been attracting tourists here all summer had we started in 1964 to plan for 1965. For example, maybe during one week all the female clerks in the stores might have worn something made off the styles of 1890. Imagine the customers which the stores would attract. Another week in the summer could have featured some other attraction. Of course, none would have the same effect without good advertising for the attractions.

But, this is no time to bemoan our oversights. There's a 90th anniversary and a hundredth coming some day. In the meantime let us take heed of the suggestion made last week by A Disgusted Citizen and "Get Out Of The Rut".

Turtle Fails To Survive



The above large turtle which was found in a weir at Seawall last Tuesday found life here too much for him on Sunday. Hundreds had viewed the animal of summer waters during its stay here.

The turtle was found in the weir belonging to Ashton Lewis Sr., and the three above Fred White, Tony Lewis and Ashton Lewis Jr. It weighed 1500 lbs. and measured 7 and 9 feet. It was the Leatherback variety. Since its death the turtle was frozen at a plant in Digby.

Find Whale In Weir

Another unusual creature has invaded the weirs on the Neck. Early last week a large turtle was discovered in a weir at Seawall. On Saturday afternoon the weir at Gulliver's Cove belonging to True-man Wentzell, Lee Wentzell, John Gidney, and Darrell Lewis produced a 4,000 pound whale.

The whale was reluctant to remain cooped within the weir and, in his effort to escape, tore the seine and twine on the weir. Unable to tow the 18 foot mammal to sea, the men shot the whale and had it on display at the wharf at Gulliver's.

The weir was located about 1,000 feet from shore where at high tide the water is 24 feet deep.

Some four or five years ago a whale, not so large as the present one, was found in a weir at Gulliver's.

Gerald A. Regan Liberal Leader

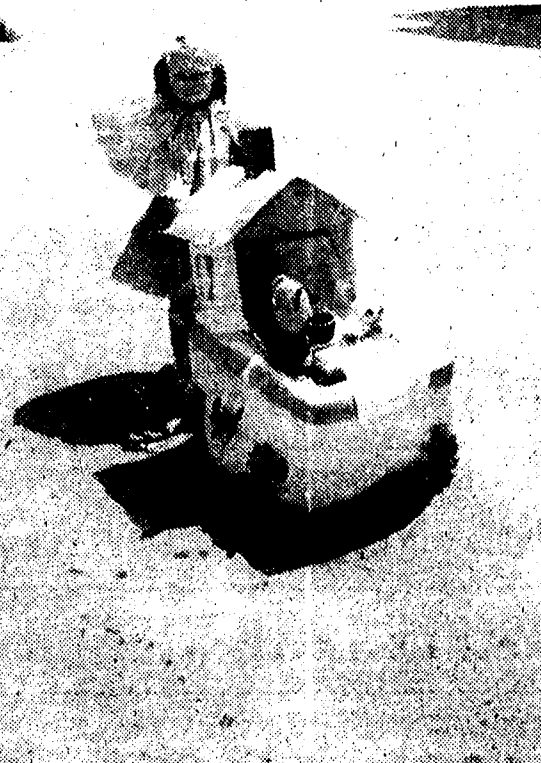

The only yacht representing the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club, the Gwyllan, which means "Seagull" in Welsh, won the Saint John to Digby yacht race held Saturday from the fairway buoy, Saint John, to the bell tower, Digby.

The little yacht, the smallest in the race at 24 feet, 7 inches, completed the race in a total elapsed time of 7 hours, 41 minutes and 46 seconds with a corrected time of 5 hours, 19 minutes, 10 seconds, and thus won the Digby Cup put up for competition by the Digby Board of Trade in 1957. This oldest interprovincial race was organized originally by the Digby Board of Trade and has been raced for officially nine times since the inception of the race. The Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club, one of the Maritimes' oldest, now organizes and supervises the race.

Gwyllan, owned by Kiki Nichols with crew of John R. Nichols, Kelsey Raymond, and Mary Lou Raymond, triumphed over a field of 16 yachts. The Gwyllan finished fourth overall, one hour behind Lady K, the first finisher, but only twenty minutes behind Kora and Nordic of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club which finished in total time second and third respectively. This is the best finish of a Digby yacht in recent years.

The 16 yachts left Saint John under foggy windless conditions at 8 o'clock and the winds were light until 1:15 when they commenced to blow from the southwest at speeds of 15 to 18 miles per hour, with fairly uneven seas. Nine yachts finished in the time allotted at 6 p.m. and others finished later with the assistance of the Digby Lifesaving Station conquering the heavy seas at Digby Gut.

The Gwyllan, an East Wind design built at Industrial Shipping Limited at Mahone Bay, Lunenburg Co., in 1962, is the first of its class to compete in the annual Saint John to Digby race.

This year two new trophies were presented: the McCall

um Trophy for yachts under 28' in length to finish first on corrected time, and the Hamilton Trophy for yachts over 28' in length finishing first on corrected time. The Gwyllan won the McCallum Trophy being the last yacht under 28' to finish and the yacht Nordic, skippered by Bob Logan of the R.K.Y.C., built by Clarence Hooper of Chester, N. S., won the Hamilton Trophy with a time of 6 hours, 14 minutes and 14 seconds.

Commodore Charles McBride of the W. N. S. Y. C., presented the trophies at the closing banquet and commented on the assistance given to this annual race by the crew of the fisheries patrol vessel Lamania and the interested citizens of Digby.

The Digby Cup was won in 1963 by Come - By - Chance, owned and skippered by Kelsey Raymond of Smith's Cove with the identical crew of the Gwyllan. Kelsey Raymond as navigator of the Gwyllan, set the course which enabled the Gwyllan to win over the entire field of larger yachts.

On corrected time the second place was taken by Nordic of the R. K. Y. C., and the third place was won by last year's winner, White Clover, of the Martinon Yacht Club, skippered by Reg Brown.

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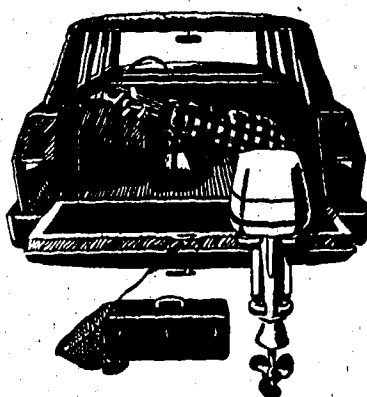

New Pastor At Bear River

Rev. Kinly MacNeal, new in the pastorate of the United Church of Canada, in Bear River gave a most interesting sermon to an attending congregation.

Rev. MacNeal said his sermon was based on a radio program he had listened to, "The World Today", which referred to our present confusion and in reference to this ask this question. What does God require of us as people? What are the demands that he makes upon this church?

Gods requirements according to Rev. MacNeal are found in the Bible in Deut 10-12, and he answered with his sermon in four parts.

First: "Give reverence to God". The Hebrews used here is the same word used in Psalm 11-10. The Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, but does not mean the same thing as we do when we speak of being afraid. It means to stand in awe or to give reverence to God. This is a clear demand that we should always worship and praise our creator.

Second: "Keep company with God". This refers to our personal life, our actions and thoughts in the daily routine. Here is a reminder that God is included in the affairs of this world and requires from us a standard of beliefs. In Genesis 5 we find a list of names about the descendants of Adam, giving us a standard statement. "Enoch Walked with God". In this statement, you will be marked as a different person. Some will think you sneer and may even laugh at the discipline that you may set for yourself.

Third: "Commit yourself to God". Mr. MacNeal said here we find the demand to trust God completely. Love, requires a whole hearted commitment to the other person. The verse goes so far to say with all your heart and all your soul. The outward expression of love always implies commitment even as that in marriage of complete love and trust. Jesus words were "Seek ye first the kingdom of God".

Fourth: "Imitate the Action of God". Serve. The word serve in this reference does not mean much to us alone. What can we do for God? Here we can only turn to the primary action of God. He gave his only son John 3:16 and 17 that the world might be saved. It asked the difference of walking with God or serving God, walking stresses our own personal relationship with God, serve implies our need to be concerned for all people whom God loves, even at the risk of our personal reputation. We note a change of attitude in the young people. They are accepting the challenge of life that gives hope to others attempting to pay the price of making this a better world. They are becoming men in the sense that Jesus was a man, who gives the power to stand with Him, as we attempt His sacrifice.

In conclusion Rev. MacNeal said, we then as Christians are required to Fear, Walk to Love and to Serve God with all our heart and soul.

C.B.C. Plans French Television For Digby County

In a letter to the Clerk of the House of Commons, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation stated plans for a French language television re-broadcasting station at Yarmouth to serve the southwestern area of Nova Scotia. The CBC is presently making changes to its English language re-broadcasting unit in Yarmouth, and it is understood that provision has been made in the design of the new tower to accommodate the new antenna for the French unit.

The corporation stated that if a request for a power increase to permit station CBA-FT, in Moncton, is granted, plans will be made immediately to determine locations for the intermediate microwave relays to deliver the French programs to Yarmouth.

The CBC-owned English language satellite in Yarmouth will move to a new tower site and receive a power increase late this fall. After these changes are made it is expected that the station will be received with clarity in most of Digby County. Programs are expected from CHLT, Halifax.

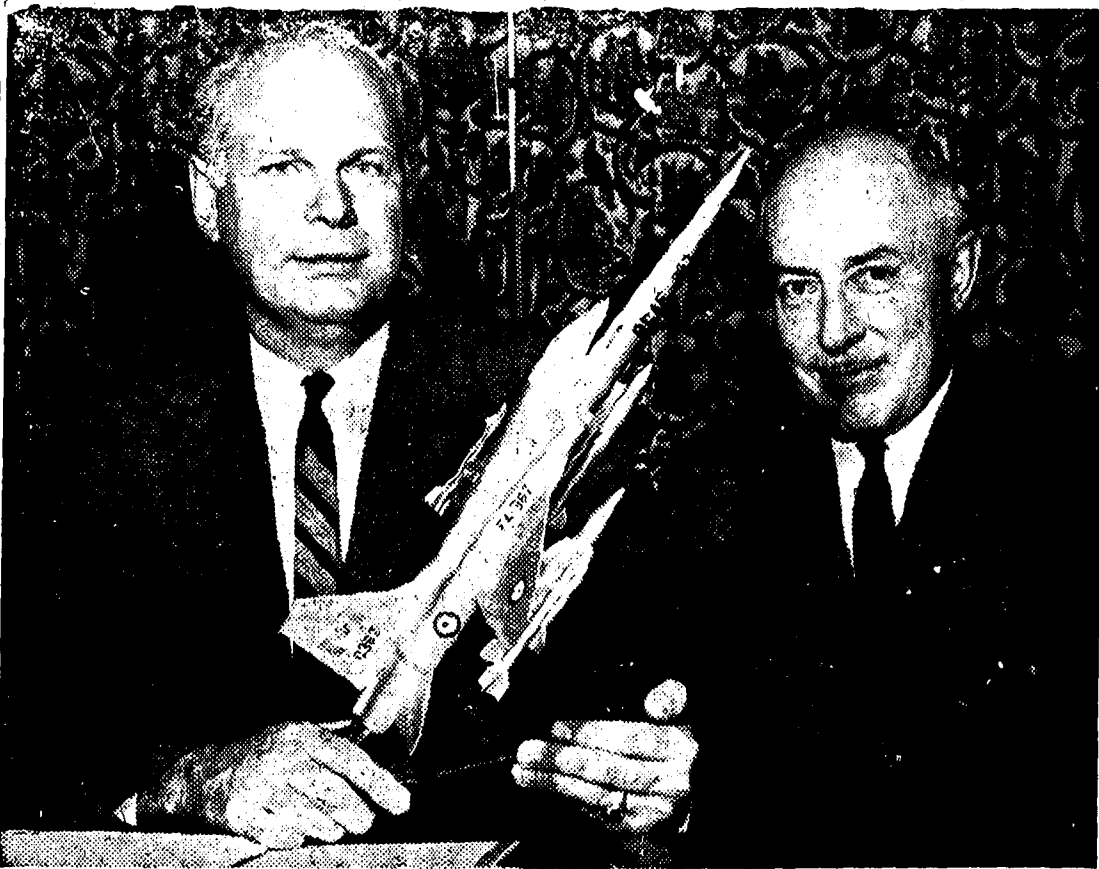

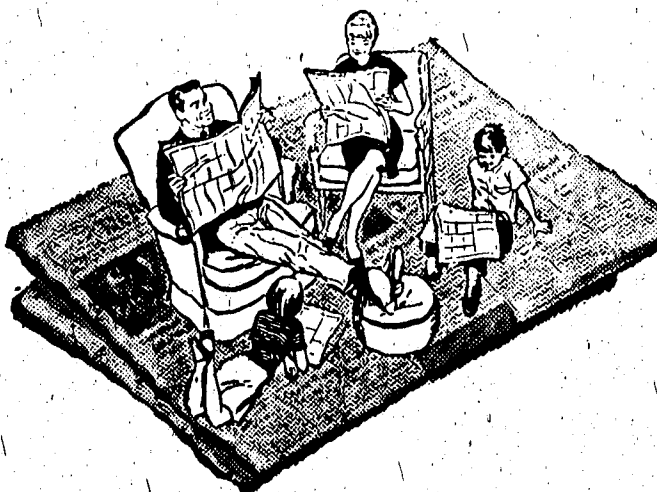
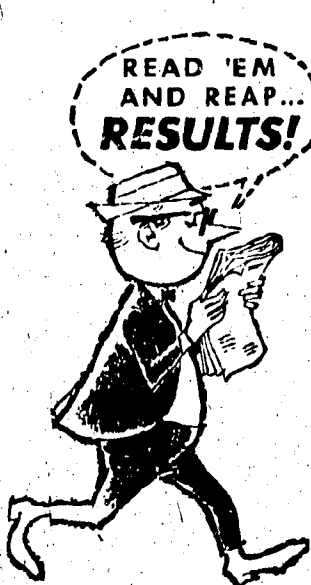

Garbage Disposal & Sewers Occupy Digby Town Council

Garbage disposal in the town of Digby and offensive sewers on the beaches occupied the town councillors for considerable time at their regular meeting on Monday night.

Garbage disposal service actually held out for the longest debate and became rather heated at times when Ernest Balser, a garbage collector in town, and one who has his residence near the town dump, was given permission to address the council.

Mr. Balser complained bitterly and loudly about what he termed 6,000 feet of logs on fire at the dump at the time of the council meeting. He said it caused a fire hazard and he was afraid to go to bed in fear of being burned out at night. He felt the partly burned logs could be disposed of at some other area rather than at the town dump where they are more likely to be set on fire.

Councillor Cowan questioned whether people outside the town should have the privilege of using the town dump. In reply to a question Mr. Balser estimated that the garbage going to the dump from outside of town was double that which came from within the town.

It was decided to advertise re collection and disposal of garbage in the town of Digby.

Sewage draining over the beach, especially from the business district, came in for much discussion. It was felt some restaurants were the greatest offenders. Complaints of obnoxious odors had been made to town authorities. It was decided to make further investigation into the matter along the business district and also to investigate the Carleton Street and Birch Street sewer outlets. It was also suggested that the people involved should be reminded that provincial water authorities will be forcing stricter sewage regulations along the water front.

Nothing new was reported regarding the proposed airstrip for Digby. Application had been submitted to the Department of Transport, it was reported. Discussion of location came up with opinions that five miles out from the previous consideration would be less fog, there would be less danger of noise and expense for the purchase of property would be less.

A letter was read from the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada asking submissions from Digby town and the D.A.R. regarding a proposed by the town to plank or pave between the rails on East Avenue in Digby from Church to Sydney Street.

The town felt that this would widen the street to ease the traffic situation and better the parking facilities. One of the objections advanced was the danger of cars parking on the "rail tracks". The present separation, the letter said, discourages this.

A report on the town water and milk was good in both cases.

Two break and enter complaints were reported in the police report on Monday night. One was at J. Margolian's and the other at Casey's Fisheries. Fifteen complaints were registered during July, eight required investigation, all except four were terminated to satisfaction, 6 cases warranted court action. The last were under the Liquor Control Act. Six motor vehicle accidents were reported.

The need of recapping the main road through town was discussed but it was felt that the town could not afford to share in a recap program. Already there is patch on patch on the main drag and dissatisfaction was expressed by the council on the last recap job. It was noticed shortly after the job was done that the pavement cracked. Since then there has been only patch work as the town can ill afford to recap twice in a short period, it was said.

Complaints had been heard about the town water being turned off for repairs to pipes without notifying residents (Please turn to page 8)

The Fundy Board of Trade in Freeport has come out in strong support of Freeport in Digby County as the Nova Scotia terminus for the proposed second Nova Scotia New England ferry. They also strongly advocate Jonesport, Me., as the U.S. terminus for the ferry.

In a brief to A. D. Margison and Associates, who are carrying on a study of the ferry matter, the Fundy trade board pointed out that the distance between the two ports of Freeport and Jonesport is only about 55 nautical miles. This would make possible a one way crossing in three hours or less.

The brief goes on to point out that the development of the proposed causeway-bridge, harbour complex at Petite Passage between Tiverton and East Ferry will provide direct connection with Nova Scotia and make Freeport the nearest port to ports in the state of Maine.

In the brief the Fundy board stresses a number of facts supporting their contention that the ports of Freeport and Jonesport are the logical terminal sites for the proposed new ferry service. Included in these are the claim that these two ports provide the shortest water link between Nova Scotia and New England; that provision of such a short route would overcome the dislike of travellers for a long, dull sea trip.

The Fundy board further points out that provision of this ferry service would do much to improve economic conditions and provide opportunities for the development of secondary industries in an area of the province that is now depressed. It points out that the development of an at present completely undeveloped tourist area would result from the establishment of the ferry service between Freeport and Jonesport.

Opening Notice Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban Schools will re-open on **Wednesday, September 1st, 1965**, when all pupils of school age are expected to be in attendance. This will be a full school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 2nd.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to August 31st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1965-66. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 18th to Friday, August 20th between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII Commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

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Speech is, after all, the main, and most obvious means of communication which we human beings have. We have a fair degree of control over our speech. Generally we assume that we can say what we please, and that we can keep quiet about anything we do not want known. With speech, we figure, we can paint ourselves and the world any way we would like others to see them.

It is because of this control over speech that the people who know about these things sometimes think that what we say reveals far less about us than what we do, or, for that matter what we dream or the sections of the newspaper we like to read. We are pretty careful with the things we say, that they will convey the best possible impression.

Rooms have been written about the ways we reveal our personalities through other means than speech. I have been thinking for some time about the ways we do reveal ourselves through speech. Have you ever noticed how sometimes just those things which we are trying to cover up slip through what we say and present themselves to our listeners.

Everybody knows, of course, about slips of the tongue. We make them, for instance, when after a boring evening we are taking leave of our guests. "Goodbye," we say, brightly and cheerfully. "I'm so sorry you could come!" We meant, didn't we, to say glad you could come. There was a radio announcer who introduced a much married Hollywood songstress as a "charming young singer," and another who introduced a famous soldier as a "bottleswapped veteran."

But it is not exactly slips of the tongue that I mean. I mean the things we say, trying to convey an impression. You must have, at some time, been in a crowd, watching a ballet, or an ox-pull, a clam shucking contest or an opera, and overheard someone in the crowd say of a third-rate performer "He's good!" The speaker is usually a young man with a young lady. He is trying to convey the impression that he knows a great deal about clam shucking. Instead, he has informed all of us that he does not know the good from the bad.

There is the teenager, who, longing for acceptance, tells the class belle "I had a date last night!" She means for everyone to know she is pretty popular. Instead, she has told them that for her, a date is something rare enough to be mentioned. The woman who spies her conversation with "When I flew to Boston" thinks she is telling us she is an experienced traveler. Instead, we know that one time she was up in a plane.

Once, several years ago, during one of those bouts of World Series fever which hit us all, whether or not we know a baseball bat from a pitcher's mound, there was a very close game which ran into overtime. In the tenth inning, the team for which everybody in our office was rooting, won. I had just figured out what baseball was all about that year anyway, so I considered myself something of an expert. When I tried to draw the bookkeeper into a conversation the next day, she said, with an enthusiasm equal to my newly acquired zeal — "In the last half of the tenth inning too!" She thought I knew something about baseball. She wanted me to think she knew as much. What she told me was that she did not know that her team went to bat during the second half of the inning, and could not have possibly won in the first half.

Once, I remember, when I was a teenager, I was at a dance at Cornwallis. For some reason, which escapes me now, I was trying to give the young new entry I was dancing with, the impression that I had never been to one of these affairs before. He said something which I did not quite hear. I thought he had made some reference to the time. In an effort to show my complete ignorance of naval matters, I put on my most naive expression, and asked innocently "Twenty-two thirty-five? Now what in the world does twenty-two thirty-five mean?" This shattered the sheltered little girl act completely. I could not possibly have asked the question (especially since he had not even mentioned the time) unless I knew perfectly well how to say 10:35 in navy jargon.

More or less on the same subject, did you hear the one about the captain who wrote in his log book "Mate was drunk today." When the mate objected, the captain told him that he entered everything that happened on the ship, no matter how trivial, or who might be affected. When it was the mate's turn to keep the log, he carefully noted "Captain was sober today."

Letter to the Editor

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

We have had quite a bit of publicity in the Bangor News concerning the new Ferry from your area into Maine, but not very much as far as Jonesport is concerned. Several communities, Bar Harbour, Bangor and Ellsworth banded together trying to influence it to be in Bar Harbor where they already have a terminal.

I would like to point out some very important factors in establishing a terminal in these days of very heavy traffic, especially during the vacation period, and I feel quite certain that every one of us like to drive where we can enjoy the beautiful scenery without being in a long line of cars bottled up in a snarl of irate drivers, trying to get somewhere but have to follow the drivers up front for many miles.

Now if the terminal could be in Jonesport, there are two ways to route #1 from here via route #187 - one of which terminates at #1 in Jonesboro (East), the other at Col. Falls (West). Also one can travel on route 1 to Harrington, then via 1A to Millbridge and to route #1 again on West. The other is route #1 all the way or again one may turn off in Cherryfield not only via route #182 to Ellsworth and to Bangor but at (I believe route #193) to route #9 to Bangor approximately the same distance as by #182. In Cherryfield you have a choice of 3 ways to go West. Where can you top that?

We believe with our many routes in this area where traffic can fan out it will be less congested and the traveller will be safer, more comfortable and certainly enjoy their ride much more and make better time to their point of destination.

It is not too far from Jonesport going East via 187 to route #1 to Machias, Calais and one to St. Stephen, Saint John and points in Canada and the highway is very good.

Let's hope the powers that be will give us at least some consideration before they decide to locate the new terminal, and it should be between Freeport, N. S., and Jonesport, Maine.

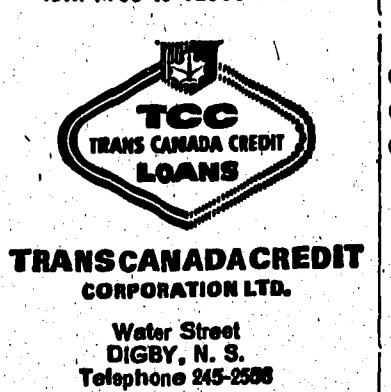

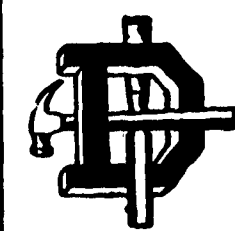

DIGBY YOUTH CHARGED WITH CAPITAL MURDER

Digby, along with every other part of Nova Scotia, was shocked to hear on July 29 of the brutal murder in Yarmouth of a sixteen-year-old Halifax girl, Thais Marie Haskins, of Cunard St.

On Tuesday of this week, Digby was again horrified. This time the horror came with the news that one of Digby's own youths, Robert Randall Comeau, age 20, was charged with the murder of that sixteen-year-old girl.

Robert Randall Comeau, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gustave Comeau, Digby, was charged before Magistrate C. R. Rand, Q.C., in Yarmouth, on Tuesday morning. At the request of Crown Prosecutor, Donald Chipman, Comeau was remanded to jail until 11 a.m. August 16 when a preliminary hearing will be held. The accused will undergo mental examination.

The arrest was made by the RCMP, accompanied by Chief Eugene Nickerson, of Yarmouth, when the longliner fishing boat "Zephyr" came into port on Monday evening. Comeau left Yarmouth on the boat early in the morning on the day the murder was discovered, July 29. The boat did not return from the fishing trip until Monday night.

Thais Marie Haskins left her home in Halifax on Saturday, July 24, to visit her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Haskins, Tooker St., Yarmouth. She is reported to have gone to a dance at the Youth Centre on the evening of July 28 and to have left the dance to go to the Tooker St. home about twenty minutes to twelve.

The nude body of the girl was found by Killam Noah, Yarmouth, while on his way to work around six o'clock a.m. on July 29. The body, with thirteen knife stabs and multiple head injuries, was found in the brush about one hundred yards from the Haskins house in Yarmouth. A pocket knife, believed to have been that used to inflict the wounds, was found near the body.

RCMP were called in to help Yarmouth police and the search for the murderer was one of the widest ever conducted in Nova Scotia, reaching, in its course, to British Columbia. About 150 persons were questioned, nine investigators were in the Yarmouth area continually and a police dog was brought in. Inspector C. R. Doey, officer commanding Halifax sub-division, took charge of the case as it proceeded.

Chosen For British Columbia

Miss Sharon Jefferson, of Clements, was chosen to represent the Nova Scotia provincial 4-H in British Columbia on the inter-provincial exchange program. The announcement was made on the final day of the annual leadership camp held at the Agricultural College in Truro.

Miss Anna LeBlanc, Church Point, was chosen at the same time to go to Quebec on the exchange program.

The names were released at the closing banquet, at which deputy minister of agriculture, S. E. Lewis, was the guest speaker. Mr. Lewis told the delegates that "opportunities today are as you make them, and are limited only by the ambition, the imagination and the ability of the individual."

Chapel Blessed

The newly-built chapel, "Mary, Queen of Heaven," situated at Sea Wall Hill, on Digby Neck, was solemnly blessed by His Excellency, Most Reverend A. Lemsenager, Bishop of Yarmouth, on Sunday afternoon. A number of visitors, some of which were church dignitaries, gathered there for the occasion.

The chapel presents a beautiful picture on top of the famous hill. The land on which it stands was donated by the late Clifford Robicheau. The cornerstone, donated by Reigh W. Jayne, Digby undertaker, was also blessed at the same time.

The parishioners of Mary, Queen of Heaven Mission, have expressed their thanks to the Bishop of Yarmouth and to many friends who provided the extra funds necessary for the erection of the chapel.

Delegation To Ottawa Early In September

Charles Halliburton said at the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening he is hoping that arrangements can be made for a delegation to go to Ottawa early in September regarding new wharf facilities in Digby for the Princess of Acadia docking. He has notified the Maritime Provinces Boards of Trade, the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, the Saint John Board of Trade to this effect. He is expecting Hon. K. S. Jones, Nova Scotia Minister of Trade and Industry, the Hon. L. G. DesBrisay, New Brunswick and other prominent persons to accompany the delegation. A special meeting of the Digby Board will be called before the delegation proceeds.

Mr. Halliburton said that in contact with C.P.R. officials he was given to understand that the run between Digby and Saint John had lost money during the last few years. Also by owning the wharf in Saint John and paying wharfage in Digby the CPR was in contrast to other ferry services on the Eastern seaboard where no wharfage charges had to be paid. He understood, he said, that the wharf proposal was turned down by the CPR because besides the half million cost they would also be expected to pay wharfage rates up to \$75,000 per year.

Vincent Snow reported that dredging of the channel in Digby harbour had started and there were hopes that the port development for fishermen would start this fall. The channel is expected to be widened for the Princess of Acadia. The suggestion by government officials that the spur pier be cut down from 50 feet width to 35 feet was frowned upon.

A letter was read from the Atlantic Development Board concerning the problem of supplying water to fish plants in the Digby area. It advised that consultants were engaged to investigate a list of Nova Scotia locations where significant fishing operations might be in jeopardy because of the lack of suitable water supply to meet the new federal inspection regulations. The letter stated that annual landings of at least 10 million pounds had been regarded as a normal minimum for an area to be included in the surveys of the consultants. The letter informed the Board that Little River on Digby Neck was one of the places where surveys had been made.

The A.D.B. was not aware, the letter stated, that any other sizeable plant in the Digby area was unable to meet the new federal regulations.

President Halliburton reported on a questionnaire he had mailed to all the fish processing plants in the area and of the 15 replies received to date only one seemed to have adequate water supplies.

Discussion also followed on the necessity of Digby town to have greater water supply in case of new industrial developments here. Mayor Snow said there was a large watershed near the town water supply which was not being used. To make it usable would necessitate cleaning it out and putting it into proper condition.

President Halliburton announced that a clinic for Board of Trade presidents and secretaries would be held in Truro on September 19.

Four Cars Involved In Collision

There were no serious injuries in a highway accident which occurred Saturday morning on Warwick Street near the South End Grocery. Four vehicles were involved in the mishap. A large truck driven by Edward Veinot, of Port George, Annapolis Co., went out of control when the brakes failed. The truck, proceeding into town, struck the rear of a car driven by Dr. P. C. Outhouse, of Digby, and continued on to strike a car driven by Sherwin Dakin. Another car, driven by Arlie Merritt, which was being towed by the Dakin car, was not damaged. The truck and other two cars suffered extensive damage. The truck continued to jump a ditch and a hedge eventually coming to rest against the home of Miss Bessie Turnbull. Slight damage was caused to the house, hedge and lawn.

Dr. P. C. Outhouse was the only person admitted to hospital as a result of the accident. He was treated for head, chest and back injuries and was released on Sunday. He is recuperating at his home.

Church Extension Underway

Rev. H. S. Hartlin, pastor of the Baptist Church of Digby, resumed his duties at the church last Sunday, following his vacation. During his absence, services were conducted by Rev. L. R. Atkinson, Rev. Burton Long, and Rev. Frank Smith.

A transformation of the exterior of the Baptist Church has taken place during the last few weeks when the building received two coats of white paint, replacing the buff color that had been used on the edifice for a great many years.

Work on the church extension is being carried out at the present time, and it is expected that all exterior work on the new project will be completed within a short period. Mr. Bernard Bell, chairman of the Trustee Board, is giving direction in the carrying out of the plans for the new addition.

In spite of the summer holidays the young people of the Hill Grove church have been carrying on their regular meetings of the Baptist Youth Fellowship.

At the worship in the Hill Grove church next Sunday evening a beautiful Memorial Window in the church auditorium will be dedicated by the pastor and people. The window is presented by the Vincent family in memory of loved ones.

Fish Plant's Request Survey

The Western Nova Scotia Fish Packers Association, meeting at the Marla Motor Hotel on Tuesday evening, decided to make application to the Hon. Kennedy Jones, Minister of Trade and Industry, to have a survey made of the needs of fishermen in respect to adequate water supplies. The areas designated for the survey are Digby Neck and Islands, District of Clare and the County of Annapolis. The Fish Packers Association also requested the Digby Board of Trade to act, on their behalf, through the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade to have the surveys made in the areas named.

Other recommendations included one which would ask that grants for adequate water supplies be given on a proportionate basis according to the amount of fish processed.

The requests were born out of hardships which seemed to be imposed on some of the fish plants in trying to meet new federal inspection regulations regarding adequate water supply for the plants. The fish plants are endeavouring to get financial aid through the Atlantic Development Board towards meeting the regulations.

Guests at the meeting, presided over by president Keith Raymond, Centreville, were R. B. Powell, M.L.A., and Charles Halliburton, president of the Digby Board of Trade.

Mr. Halliburton requested that forms he had circulated be filled in and returned to him so that information regarding the water supply at the various fish plants could be passed on to the Atlantic Development Board.

Discussion was also held on sewage disposal treatment plants including septic tanks and a chlorinating system as recommended by the Department of Fisheries. No action was taken as an organization, leaving the matter to be dealt with on an individual basis as seen feasible.

Sports Weekend Successful

On Saturday and Sunday the fourth annual weekend of sports activities, sponsored by the Digby East Fish & Game Association, was held at their lodge and premises on Haines Lake.

A midway and water sports and races for juniors and seniors were the main attractions. Club officials report the weekend most successful.

Report On Briefs Beach Dragger Presented At Hearings To Extinguish Fire

Charles Halliburton, president of the Digby Board of Trade; C. D. Snow, Mayor of Digby; and Vincent G. Snow reported at the regular meeting of the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday night on the briefs presented at the hearings held in Halifax regarding a second proposed ferry between New England and Nova Scotia. The hearings were held on behalf of the governments by A. D. Margison and Associates Ltd.

Mr. Halliburton reported that the most serious contender besides Digby seemed to be Yarmouth, which town had engaged specialists for the presentation and had a large delegation from Yarmouth on hand when the presentation was made. An advantage to Yarmouth, he said, was the fact that facilities are present and the only requirement is a boat. On the other hand, he noted the advantage of Digby with its good harbour and short distance to Maine. During his report he also mentioned that by correspondence he has learned that others are interested in the Campbellville proposition.

C. D. Snow in reporting stated that since the hearings he has had correspondence from the Eastport Chamber of Commerce accompanied by an aerial photo showing the wharf in Eastport and an aerial landing strip. He noted the two contacts which might be utilized with Eastport, a ferry and air service since Digby is seriously considering an air service.

V. G. Snow was gratified at the interest he had observed at the hearings in the Digby presentations even by those making "opposing" presentations. He felt that the submissions of shorter distance from Digby and greater traffic potential could not be denied and that terminal costs should not be an opposing factor since Digby has been promised a new terminal wharf. His brief strongly favoured Eastport-Digby as the terminal points and noted that Eastport already has a comparatively new million dollar pier and that Eastport is the beginning and ending point of a motor transport highway running up and down the Atlantic coast and inland.

Mr. V. Snow also said that submissions favoured more frequent ferries so that the practice of reservations in advance for cars and trucks could be dispensed with and the ferries adopt a policy of "first come, first served." The short route from Digby, he declared, would take care of this.

Mr. V. Snow also brought to the attention of the Digby Board (more or less replying to a question from the hearing) that he believed the presently operating but outdated ferry service between Digby and Saint John is the one that most nearly pays for itself, above all the modern ferries in the area, and a modern ferry service between Digby and Eastport should be even more profitable.

Boat Races Saturday

The second running of Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club intra-club races will be held Saturday at 2:30 p.m. Vessels will take part from Digby, Smith's Cove and Annapolis Royal. The races will start at the long wharf in Digby, then to Jaeger's Point, to Bear Island and back to the long wharf. This is a revival of club races last held in 1952. Boats of all sizes are entered.

In last Saturday's races the winner was the "Q.E.", owned by Dr. A. G. Shenstone, of Smith's Cove. Other winners included "Gwynn", John R. Nichols, W.N.S.Y.C.; "Come By Chance", Kelsey Raymond, Smith's Cove; "The Whaler", which was manned by the Digby branch of Royal Canadian Navy Sea Cadets; and "Folly", Capt. James MacPherson, Smith's Cove.

C., three years ago.

The service was conducted by Rev. R. H. Hughes, who chose for his text the words "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; Who comforteth us in all our tribulations, so that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God," from II. Corinthians, chapter 1. Grace United Choir sang two selections, "Meet Me There" and "Safe In The Arms Of Jesus."

At the close of the service the bodies of the two brothers were taken to the Fairview Cemetery, Digby, for interment, while the body of Carol Ann awaited at the church for the reassembling of the procession which was to proceed to Bear River where her remains were interred in the Mount Hope Cemetery.

The accident occurred on the Terrace-Kitimat highway. It was a head-on collision between the two in a passing lane on an incline.

Acadian Festival Opened

These festivities, said Dr. Pothier, are a homage of the awakening of a race, a manifestation of our national conscience and a proof of the determination of the Acadian people to keep their faith, traditions, language with a pleasant coexistence with all other races of the province and Canada.

The Acadian ball proved interesting to both young and old. Mrs. Anty Comeau, aged 92 years, attended the ball as a spectator and Mrs. Comeau enjoyed every bit of it. Mrs. Comeau formerly operated the Riverside Inn at Meteghan River in days gone by when the Inn was situated on the shore side of the main highway, just across from where the present Inn is. The old Inn was destroyed by fire a number of years ago.

Miss Betty Ann Saulnier, of Lower Saulnierville, was selected as Evangeline and Richard Saulnier, of the same village, was chosen as the Gabriel of the Festival. The selection was made from a group of 25 couples, representing most clubs, associations and business firms in the Municipality of Clare. The Evangeline and Gabriel of the Festival selected this evening represented the Royal Bank of Canada of Meteghan. The judges were Mr. and Mrs. Kinsey Clymen of New York and Dr. and Mrs. Jean Eudes Comeau, of Weymouth.

Miss Carol Ann Tidy, Miss Dominion of Canada, attended a reception at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. Julius Comeau, of Meteghan, at 11:30 p.m. Miss Tidy received a tremendous ovation when she entered the high school auditorium where the Acadian ball was held and following the official ceremonies of the opening, she mingled with the large crowd, being introduced to the hundreds of Acadians and visitors to this area.

About This And That

With All Our Sympathy

It is rarely that a family has been called upon to bear such a loss as has been suffered by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Jefferson and all the members of their family, both by birth and by marriage. To part with three of a family at one time would seem almost unimaginable. Yet this is exactly what this family was called upon to bear when a highway accident snatched three lives from the family in British Columbia. Ordinarily it was something which most people could not comprehend until they saw the news of the crash of the United Church of Canada from which the family for many years was in Montreal. Informal sympathy or condolence was given out to the bereaved family and today we are reminded of other deaths which have taken place in the valley and on the shore of the St. Lawrence. We know of no other such tragedy to befall a family from Digby. A tragedy too, which ended in tragedy in that the driver of the car took a three-lane road and the car was in two separate cars.

We extend our sympathy to the family and also hope the realization that the untimely death of this young girl and her two brothers will be a great deal of years to the lives of others. While we do not mean to indicate any carelessness in this particular accident, we certainly do not know the circumstances of many other accidents. We do know there is much carelessness on the highways today. Anyone who witnessed the tragedy through the triple funeral this week cannot help wishing for greater highway safety whether he is a driver of a car or not.

As Others See Us

We appreciate the Letter to the Editor which appears in The Digby Courier today. It sometimes takes a neutral observer to show us where we have been negligent. Too often we are too busy trying to make a living or too close to our problems to even see our faults and errors or to place the problems in the right perspective to find the proper solutions to them. An outsider who shows a genuine interest and offers constructive criticism, such as "Visitor From Toronto," is welcome to space in this newspaper.

We feel the constructive criticism will be kindly accepted, not only by the newspaper but by all our readers and by the business, civic and social organizations of the area. We should all appreciate visitors who are interested enough in us and our problems to want to help.

In further correspondence from "Visitor From Toronto," the suggestion was made that Digby people do not make the best use of the possibilities offered and that our people should be more aggressive. Regarding the ferry service we quote other correspondence from "Visitor From Toronto" — "First of all nobody said a thing (to my knowledge) when the C.P.R. raised the fares on the ferry service in a very steep way for a less than 3 hour crossing, once a day. I must confess that for the return trip we by-passed Digby, and went the land route. . . much as I love the water (for our family)."

We must confess that we have heard of others, some right from Digby town, who because of economical reasons, have made the land trip rather than take a car across the ferry. Some protest about the high rates has been made but generally it has been a mention in some other brief and possibly protest had been made a bit too long after the higher rates had been established to have much consequence.

We would like to mention, here, another observation from our writer and quote — "A splendid bus connection with the South Shore is lacking totally." We'll have to go even a bit further by leaving out two words — bus and splendid. Connection with the South Shore (passenger service) is lacking totally, period. Do you realize that a passenger from Digby to Bridgewater or Liverpool must use private car or similar transportation, otherwise to travel by public conveyance, he must go all the way down the Valley, to Halifax and thence via South Shore to his destination.

Two other suggestions were made by the writer but these are by no means the remainder of the suggestions made. The two were: 1. more advertising, 2. more room in Digby to sell the paintings of the valley and the shore of the St. Lawrence.

We, in Digby, along with many other communities in Nova Scotia, have, in a friendly way, been accused of suffering from an inferiority complex or from apathy. Readers — we have been given something to think about. We have seen ourselves somewhat "As Others See Us." It is for our good. We accept it with graciousness and hope we can profit by it. Don't forget the tour at season 1966 is coming just as sure as 1965 is fading away.

Tourist Season

It has been wonderful. The weather has been perfect for tourism. From all we can gather hotels, motels and all available accommodations have been used at times to endeavour to accommodate the visitors. Even then, according to rumors, some visitors have had to use their own cars for overnight accommodation in the Valley. Sounds like 10 to 15 years back.

However, with the driest season on record, all is not well. Considerable loss has been sustained throughout the province because of forest fires. Just can't have everything our own way.

That Dump

We won't take time or space here to write about the Digby dump. Enough to say that we drove down there on Friday and we didn't like what we saw. We'll be glad, too, when some other method can be found for garbage disposal.

Once upon a time, I enjoyed a brief period of limited fame by being the first person ever to make a mark of 100 in a certain university course on the history of art. With this minor distinction to my credit, I began to consider myself rather an expert in the field of the visual arts.

In those days, as it is now, it was fashionable for university students to try out intelligent sounding philosophical catch words. One of our favorites was "life-space." We used to talk of expanding our horizons, of living in as wide an area as we possibly could. We intended to climb every mountain to gain every first hand experience we could, and what we could not experience first hand, we would read about.

A few days ago, someone who had just come back from Sweden, gave me two books on Swedish art. They came as rather a shock to me. In the first place, I was shocked to discover that I knew nothing at all about the art or artists of that country. It was not that I thought there were no Swedish painters or sculptors. It was simply, I realized as I looked at the books, that the countries north of Belgium and south of the Alps have remained an artistic blank to me.

I was shocked, too, to realize that in the ten or so years since I had made that famous 100, I had failed to grow or increase my knowledge of the subject in any significant way. I had left university with a smattering of knowledge of middle and southern European art from pre-historic times until the 1950's. Here and there, I had a dribble of insight into British, American or Canadian art, and I could tell a Chinese painting from an Indian one when I saw them.

The history of art happens to be a subject in which I did well. It is far from the only one in which I have failed to grow or develop since I left the classroom. I think this happens to a good many of us. We all like to think of ourselves as people with open minds. We tell ourselves that more learning is done outside of the classroom than in it. We are the people who are never going to stagnate. We are going to go on learning forever.

Then, one day, we catch ourselves grunting "You learn sompin new every day," when somebody tells us a new way to clean the oven or wash down the walls, and, with that, we know it has been a long, long time since we learned anything. Our life space, instead of increasing, has grown smaller each year since we left the school-room. We grow cautious. We are afraid of new ideas. We become too old to take courses in advanced physics or elementary basket weaving or to take the works of some author, composer, or artist which we do not understand. At forty, we find we have not lived forty years. We have lived the same year over forty times.

What if, next week, we read a biography of someone about whom we know nothing more than the name. Or suppose we make an effort to meet someone we have never spoken to. Maybe this will be our week to radically change our hairdo, or send to the tourist bureau in Iceland for folders, to plan the trip we probably will never take. Maybe we could become an authority on a local historical site, or call the manager of a local business establishment to ask if he would take us and our kids on a conducted tour.

Meanwhile, I am going to expand my horizons by reading about Carl Milles and Erik Olsen. Then maybe I will forget that the famous course in which I made 100 did not include modern art of Africa, or Australia, Bolivia, Finland, or Russia.

Then, maybe I'll read Hints from Heloise again.

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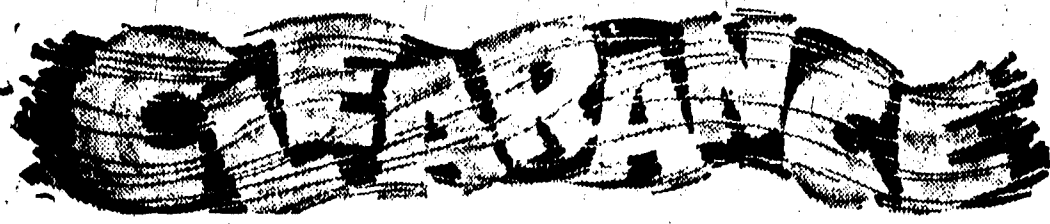

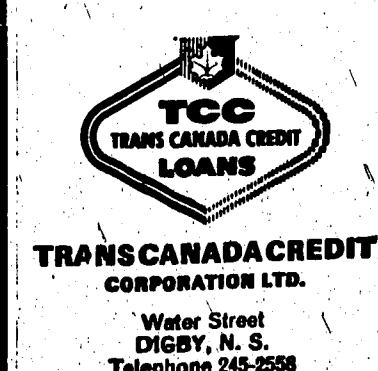

Opening Notice Digby Public Schools

The Digby Urban School, will open on Wednesday, September 1st, 1965, when all children of all ages are expected to be in attendance. This will be a school day with school buses making return trips at 3:00 p.m. Student lunches will be served at the Regional High School cafeteria on September 2nd.

Pupils registering with the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are required to register prior to August 31st. Children who have not attained the age of five years on or before October 1st will not be registered at any time during the school year, 1965-66. The Superintendent's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive advance registrations from Wednesday, August 18th to Friday, August 20th between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Students from the Islands and Weymouth seeking admission to the Grade XII Commercial class must have applications approved by the Municipal School Board. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Superintendent of Schools, Digby, N. S. Immediate application will expedite approval.

For admission to the Academic section of Grade XII a provincial pass of Grade XI or a local pass from the Digby Regional High School will be required. Students seeking admission to Grade XII Commerce must have one full year's attendance at the Grade XI level and have application approved by the school administration before registration in the department may be completed.

Note Well:

Students of Grades VII to X and Grade XI General or Commercial required to write supplementary examinations will report on August 26th at 9:00 a.m. These exams will be written in the cafeteria and NO OPPORTUNITY WILL BE GIVEN TO WRITE SUPPLEMENTARY EXAMS ON ANY OTHER DATE.

All prescribed texts for Grades IX to XII are available at a rental fee of five dollars, payable on the opening date of school. Students wishing to take advantage of the rental plan should come prepared to make this payment.

All pupils must comply with the regulations of the Department of Public Health regarding vaccination before they may be admitted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

To Hold Farm Tour

A tour of several Digby area farms and agricultural projects is being planned for Wednesday, August 25th. The tour is being sponsored by the agricultural sub-committee of the Digby Area Resources Development Committee and will include business men, trade board members, service club members and others interested in agriculture from the Digby, Weymouth and Bear River areas.

The tour is scheduled to get underway at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, August 25, and will begin at the Canada Department of Agriculture Research Branch Digby Sub Station at Hill Grove, near Digby.

Involved in the tour will be a number of fruit and vegetable specialists from the Department of Agriculture who will explain the work being undertaken at the research sub-station and act as resource personnel throughout the tour. They will also take part in the discussion period at the close of the actual tour.

Following the visit to the farm of Harold Simms in Marshalltown, at his farm Mr. Simms and his son are growing strawberries, potatoes and other crops.

After visiting the Simms' farm the group will visit a large scale agricultural development at Sea Brook. This project will involve some two hundred acres for the present. Work is now underway to clear and prepare the land and it is expected to harvest a crop next fall.

At the conclusion of their visit to the Sea Brook farm the group will proceed to the Digby town hall, where a discussion on agriculture and its role in Digby County will be held.

In Hospital With Electrical Burns

Aiden Mullen, Digby, is progressing favorably in the Digby General Hospital after receiving electrical burns last Wednesday at Ashmore. Mr. Mullen, age 27, an employee of the Digby County Power Board, received arm and leg burns when he came in contact with 7,200 volts of electricity while re-fusing a line at Ashmore around two o'clock in the afternoon. The electric current was thought to have entered his arm and thence through the leg.

Paul VanTassel, who was with Mr. Mullen at the time, rushed him to the Digby General Hospital. A few years ago Mr. VanTassel also was badly burned when he came in contact with 7,200 volts of electricity while working on a power line at Tiddville.

The fishing boat of John Outhouse, while fishing off Souris, P. E. I., caught fire and became a total loss.

Capt. Outhouse received burns to his hands. The boat, valued at \$15,000, was insured.

Rev. L. Elias, rector of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, P.E.I., gave the address on Sunday afternoon at the 44th annual memorial service and the 168th anniversary of the consecration of Old St. Edward Church on the Hill, at Clementsport. The service, which began at 3 p.m., was also a service of dedication when a replica of the 1701 English flag, carried by the Loyalists to their new homes in Nova Scotia in 1781, was dedicated by the Rt. Rev. R. H. Waterman, D.D., former Bishop of Nova Scotia, now residing at Smith's Cove.

The flag replica was a gift by the Wallis family in memory of the late Harry and Gladys Wallis of Clementsport. The flag was borne to the altar steps by the armed color party in charge of Lt. Arthur. The colors were received and presented by Rev. A. F. Sheppard, rector of the Clementsport parish who also conducted the service.

Rev. Mr. Elias in delivering the memorial address said that the old St. Edward's symbolizes the loyalty of the Loyalists to their church. Without the inheritance of their church, he said, they might not have survived the hardships they had to endure. When we lose the church and the church heritage, people become uncivilized and unruly, he said. The Loyalists knew this so they built their church.

Rev. Mr. Elias also remembered with admiration the loyal clergy who gave inspiration and leadership to the people in the new land. The clergy must still be a leader in the community today, he said.

The Loyalists, the speaker said, sacrificed all they had rather than to lose their heritage or submit to every movement which would threaten their identity. They gave complete allegiance to the King and homeland. To sever loyalty to the crown was unthinkable for them, he said, so they came to a land of dense forests, a treacherous land and one far removed from a promised land of milk and honey.

Rev. Mr. Elias said it would be a loss to all if the people left the old St. Edward's Memorial Service without capturing the spirit of these brave people. He said the sacrifices of the Loyalists should be remembered with pride and the spirit of the Loyalists commemorated. Yet, he commented, there are people indifferent to the past and who want only to take on the new. The ingratitude of people who occupy land which they forget was settled by sacrifices and hardships of the Loyalists is a tragedy, he claimed.

He regretted the fact that we are living in a country which has been much divested of its rich heritage, inhabited by people of forgetfulness and where gratitude is often replaced by rebelliousness. How can we build a nation if there is no loyalty to the men and women of the past, he asked? The speaker urged loyalty to the crown, to build a commonwealth of nations where each color and each nation has equal opportunity and where each honors and respects the other's freedom and inheritance.

Comeau was charged with the murder on August 10, at Yarmouth, when he arrived in port on the fishing boat "Zephyr" on which he was a crew member.

On Monday, at the preliminary hearing, Dr. G. A. W. Angus, Yarmouth testified that in his opinion the youth, Comeau, is mentally ill. He will undergo the 30 day mental examination at the Nova Scotia Hospital in Dartmouth.

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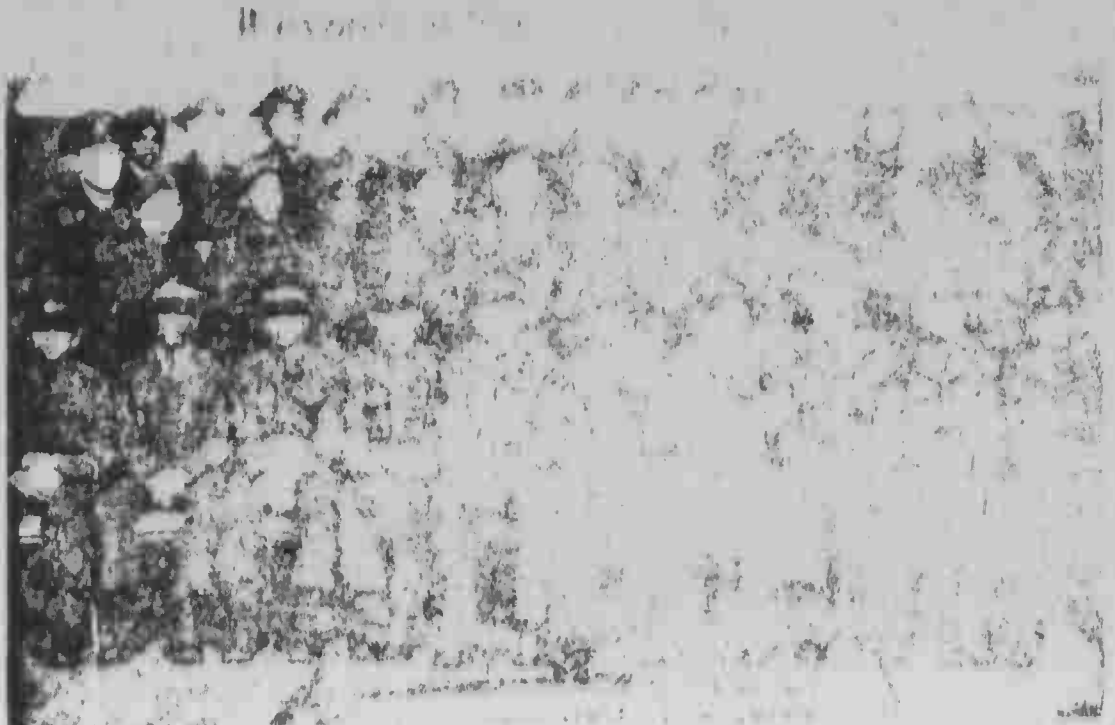
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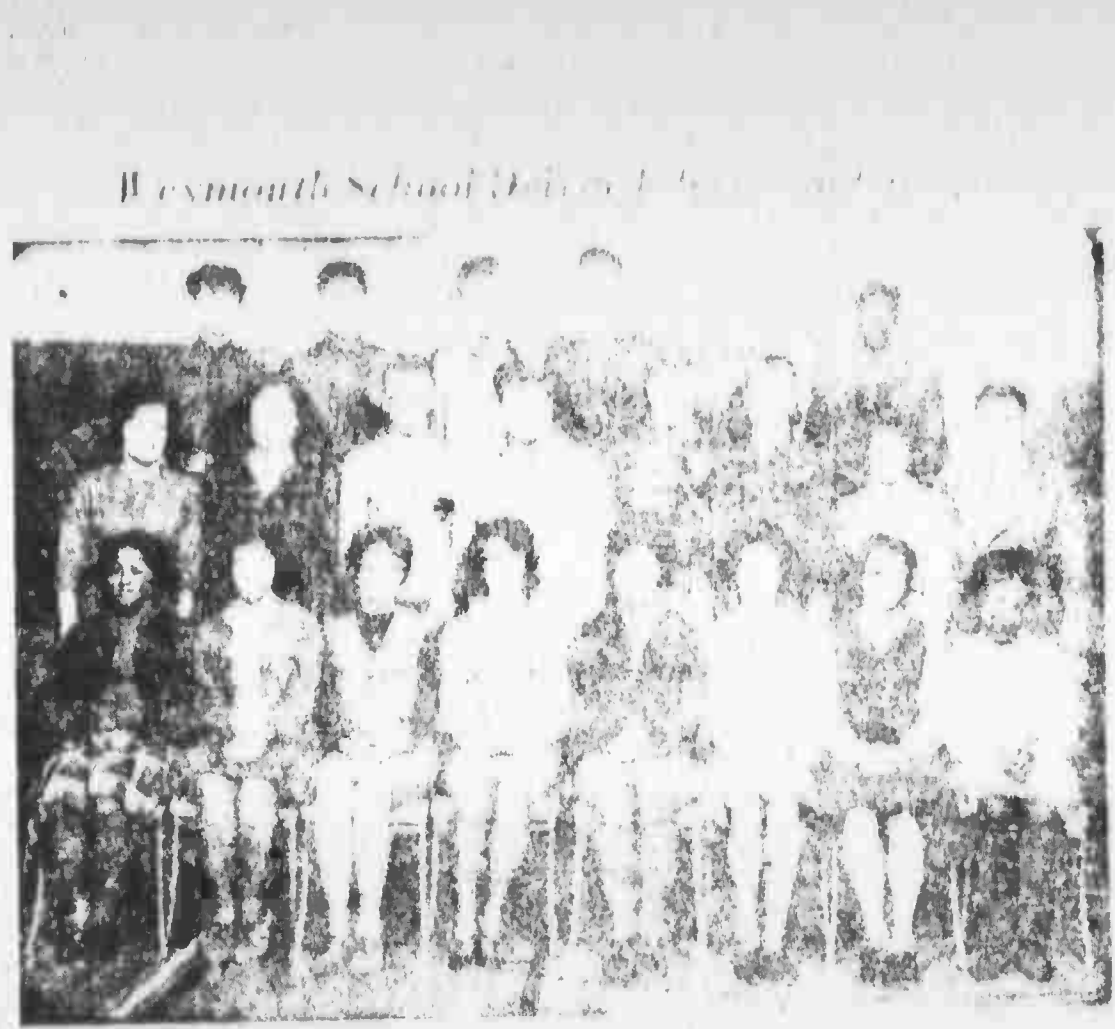

Constructing Senior Citizens Lodge

Warden Malcolm C. Balcom, of the Municipality of Annapolis, has advised that the contract for the construction of "Mountain Lea Lodge" has been awarded to V. C. Woodworth (1964) Limited, Kentville, N.S., work to commence immediately. The building will be located just north of the town of Bridgetown on Church Street, on a very attractive site with the north mountain as a backdrop and surrounded by the lush meadowland on the floor of the valley.

This structure will replace the present "Home" and will provide services and facilities not met by the present institution. The new building, with a capacity of 67 beds, is designed to accommodate senior citizens principally, with space also provided for chronically ill persons and indigents. For the most part, the rooms will contain two beds; however, provision has been made for three family rooms, and ten rooms for the chronically ill. Adequate space has been allocated for living or day rooms, as well as facilities for staff rooms, a doctor's office, and business offices. It is of a modified "H" design, with full basement and main floor.

"Mountain Lea Lodge" is the first of its kind in Nova Scotia, perhaps in all Canada, and therefore the Building Committee under Chairman C. A. Bayliss, of Nictaux Falls, N.S., was faced with the drawing up of an entirely original set of plans. Much assistance was received from the Welfare Department of the Province of Nova Scotia. Acadia University Development Drive \$7,250,000.00 Nova Scotia Heritage

The Acadia Development Fund Drive is \$7,250,000. over a five year period. This amount of money is urgently needed for new buildings, renovations to present buildings, and increased endowment funds.

During 1964 more than \$250,000. was spent on renovations to the dining hall and Willett House which is one of our older residences for men. These buildings are now in excellent condition and similar work will be done in other buildings as money becomes available.

During the present year three new buildings have been constructed. These are a new library, new additional dining hall and a new men's residence. The cost of these much needed buildings will be approximately \$2,500,000.

Other required buildings will be erected as soon as time and money permit.

The next Acadia building project will be a new Physical Education building. The present gymnasium was built in 1920 when Acadia's enrollment was about 400. This fall we will have approximately 1100 students and the present gymnasium is far below today's requirements. A committee is now hard at work on this important project.

In addition to Acadia's physical requirements, faculty salaries require undergirding. There is a fine staff of highly qualified and dedicated professors at Acadia whose salaries are below what many of them could get elsewhere. This is a problem for which the Administration must find a solution.

The support of the Acadia Development Fund so far by Corporations, Alumni and friends has been most encouraging but there is much work yet to be done and the support of many more is urgently needed.

The Development Fund is now approaching the halfway mark and we are confident that the objective will be eventually realized.

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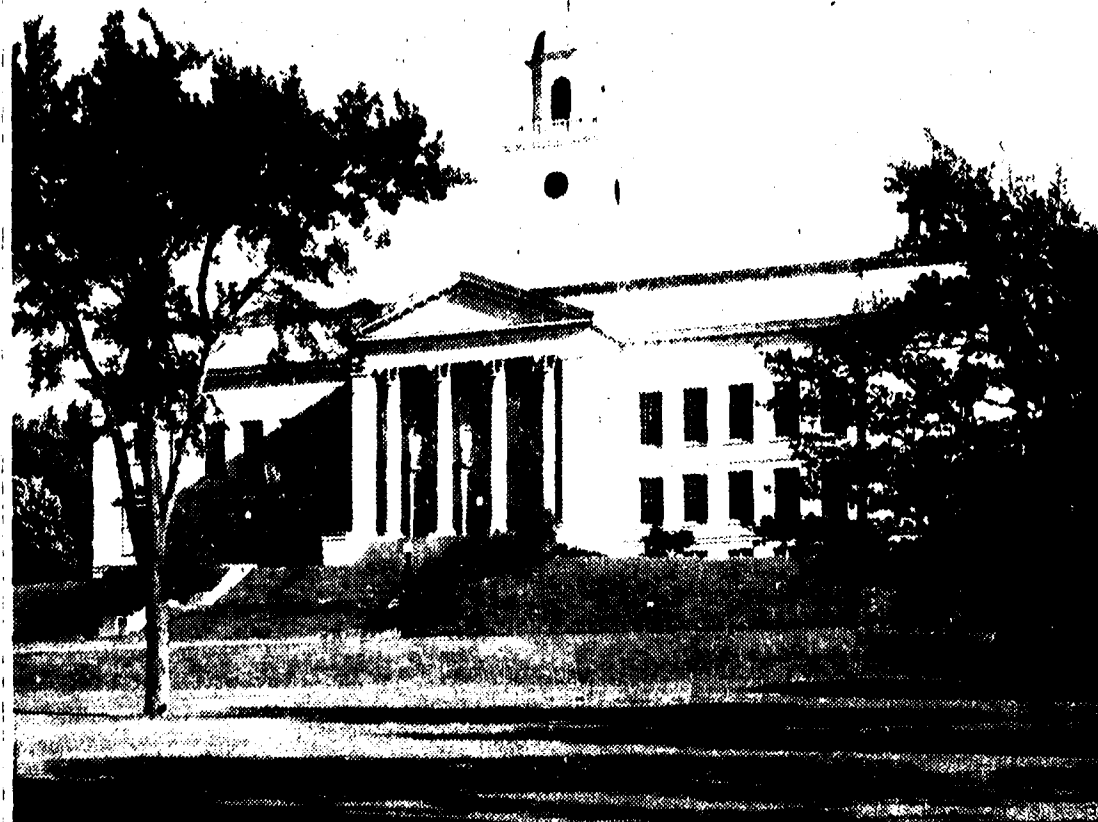

Although I was neither born in Digby County nor attended school here, I feel that I am very much a citizen of this locality. I have been a resident of the county for twenty-five years, and in that time have in some small way helped to direct students to wards further education at Acadia University. It has been my happy privilege to share their enthusiasm and triumphs and to watch many of them graduate.

Many vocations today require a university education.

It is impossible to over-estimate the importance of one's early environment for the wide range of his vocational, educational, cultural, and other interests throughout life. The strong ties which I and my family have with Nova Scotia is best illustrated by the fact that since 1941 we have made nineteen trips from California to Nova Scotia and return, and this year will make it twenty.

But the importance of one's early heritage is far more than a nostalgia or sentimental feeling. It roots down into persons, institutions, and culture patterns and gives life to the whole fabric of one's being.

In Freeport, in my early days, the family, the Church, and the School were the institutions which gave inspiration, guidance, and meaning to my life. The family enabled my life to develop in a context of relative security; the Church, made up of dedicated men and women, was a center of spiritual concern; the School, in spite of some real extramural material to work upon, aided in the expansion of students' horizons in the fascinating world of knowledge.

I believe, further, that Nova Scotia has bequeathed to her sons and daughters an elusive yet real quality; it may be described as honesty, or integrity, but is probably a mixture of many traits of character. At any rate, it is indispensable to persons in places of responsibility. It is a quality which is illustrated by the man at a vegetable stand on Digby Neck who insisted on washing new potatoes before selling them to us! Contrast that with the market places of the big centers of the continent!

As an alumnus of Acadia class of '30 I can speak with conviction on the part played by this institution in the shaping of my life. Coming from the "Patterson era," and with Professors Spidle, DeWolfe, MacDonald, and Hutchins, as teachers in the field of religion, I can testify to the abiding value of four years of learning experience at Acadia. The tradition of sound scholarship, I am sure, still remains; without it education becomes mere indoctrination. The open mind, the right to free, though disciplined and responsible inquiry, is something I have cherished ever since Acadia days.

Since 1944 my lot has been cast in Southern California, where I have been teaching, first at the University of Southern California, and presently at the School of Theology at Claremont. My field is New Testament Studies, an area which, because of its linguistic, historical, and literary demands, makes me feel grateful beyond measure for the sound Nova Scotia heritage so richly bestowed.

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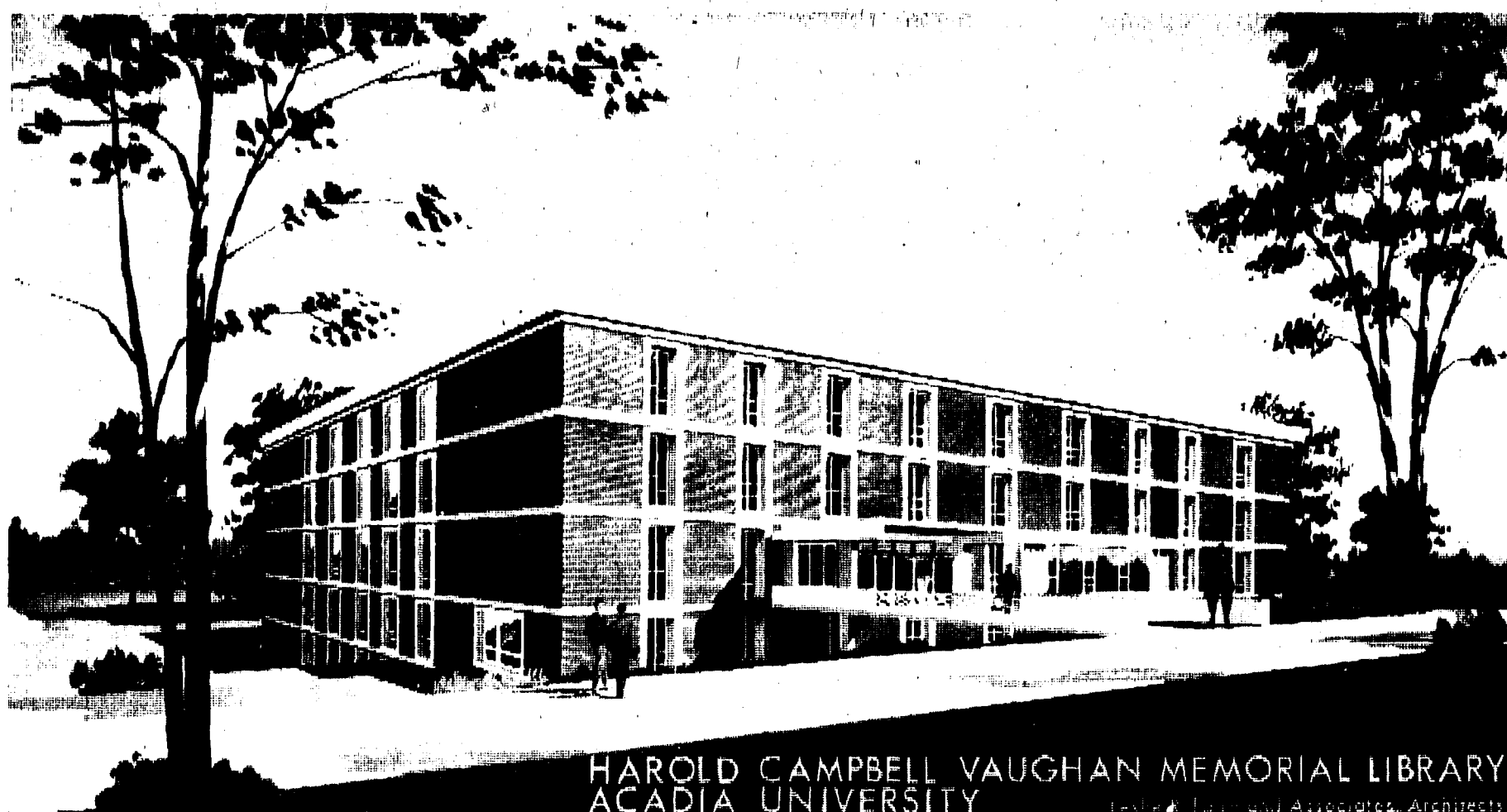

District W.I. Meets At Conway

Mrs. Christina Ramasike, of Basutoland, in Africa, was guest speaker at a regional meeting of Women's Institute branches from Digby and Annapolis Counties, held at the Acaciaville Community Centre on Saturday evening.

Mrs. Bradford Barton, President of the Acaciaville Women's Institute, was chairman of the evening's program and extended a welcome to Mrs. Ramasike and the visiting members of branches of the Women's Institute.

A review of the organizational structure of the Women's Institute and its link with the organization of Associated Country Women of the World was given by Mrs. Willis Buckler, of Bear River, former area director of the Women's Institute. Mrs. Buckler also introduced Mrs. Carmen Inglis, of Tupperville, newly elected area director.

During the evening's program a panel was organized to discuss with the guest speaker, Mrs. Ramasike, matters of interest to the Women's Institute from Mrs. Ramasike's home country of Basutoland. Members of the panel were Mrs. Buckler, Mrs. Inglis, Mrs. Bradford Barton, Mrs. A. G. MacIntyre and Mrs. Eleanor Elms.

In answer to questions, Mrs. Ramasike said that her homeland had a population of some 650,000. She said there were 3,000 members of the Home Makers' Association, which corresponds to the Women's Institute. She said she had been selected to come to Canada by the Associated Country Women of the World because of her activity in the Home Makers' Association in her home area in Basutoland.

Mrs. Ramasike said that conditions were still very primitive in her area of Basutoland. There are few roads, she said, and transportation is difficult. Education, she stated, is not compulsory and is provided through church mission schools which receive government aid. The official language of Basutoland is English. Mrs. Ramasike received her early education at an Anglican mission school and went to Ladysmith in Natal for her high school training. Prior to coming to Canada this summer she had not spoken English for about fifteen years and had to do some "brushing up".

Climatic conditions in her area of Basutoland are much like Nova Scotia, Mrs. Ramasike said. The winters are cold with a good deal of snow and summers are like the present summer in Nova Scotia. The crops grown in her area of Basutoland, which is in the hill-country, are also much the same as in Nova Scotia. In Basutoland they do grow a special variety of potato, she said, which is the size of an adult's head.

Mrs. Ramasike said that in Basutoland menfolk do not concern themselves with women's work and are never found "cluttering up the kitchen". The women do help in the field with planting, cultivating and harvesting and do other work outdoors, she said.

The village in which she and her husband and twelve year old son live is quite far from a population centre, Mrs. Ramasike said.

4th Generation Postmaster

Chester M. Outhouse, postmaster at Tiverton, on Long Island, comes from a family of four generations of postmasters. His father, the late Elbridge Outhouse, was made postmaster in 1910, but in later years his son, Chester, became his assistant and gradually took over responsibility. Chester's grandfather, Milton, and his great grandfather, Charles, were also postmasters.

In 1962 Mr. Outhouse was appointed Nova Scotia director and secretary of the Canadian Postmasters' Association. He also owns and operates a grocery store, a rooming house and a canteen.

Mail deliveries for Tiverton and Central Grove are carried out by Mr. and Mrs. Grafton Outhouse. At Freeport, deliveries are made by Mrs. Harry Crocker.

Chester Outhouse presently is master in a new rural post office which was recently opened.

The new building consists of two large rooms, separated by glass panels, one room containing the mail boxes and the other a desk and post office equipment, as well as two other separate offices, one for the Department of Fisheries Inspector Clifton Outhouse, and the other for the Fisheries Officer Herbert Cossaboom. The new post office, an improvement over the former two-room, poorly lighted, building, was built by B. Alcorn Construction Company, Bear River.

Municipality Refuses Bonuses To Teachers

Only a few exceptions will be granted in the decision of the Municipality of the District of Digby to not give bonuses to teachers of the public schools. A special meeting of the Municipality was called at the Court House in Digby last Wednesday where the decision was made. It was passed at that meeting that the Municipal School Board should be advised that effective August 1st the Municipal Council would not approve the payment of salary bonuses to regularly licensed teachers. Exceptions to this rule were (a) teachers of special subjects (Industrial Arts and Household Science) when in the discretion of the Board the payment of salary bonuses is required in order to staff the special subject departments of the Weymouth and Islands Consolidated Schools and also to (b) teachers who were on the staff of the Islands Consolidated School during 1964-65 and to whom salary bonuses were paid and whose services are available in the year ahead at the same salary bonus. By motion, all previous motions in 1965 in respect to teachers' salaries had been rescinded.

Another motion passed regarding schools was that the Digby Municipal Council would not pay towards the tuition and board of pupils attending vocational schools. The Municipal School Board is authorized to pay tuition and board for pupils from the Weymouth Consolidated School and the Islands Consolidated School who are accepted by the Digby Regional High School for the General Course.

The meeting was presided over by Warden Ronald Morehouse, and was attended by Inspector C. E. Edwards, Bridgetown.

Coming from the discussions was a resolution to be presented to the annual meeting of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities being held in Sydney, Nova Scotia, at the present time. The motion read:

Resolved that a resolution be submitted by the municipality delegate to the Convention of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities that application be made to the Board of Public Utilities of the province of Nova Scotia for amendment of Regulation No. 64 made by the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities pursuant to the Motor Carrier Act which reads, "I, the driver, of a school bus shall not stop the bus for the purpose of taking on or discharging passengers at more than three places in any one mile." The Municipal Council felt the regulation presently in force creates dangerous traffic conditions by the congregating of children at certain spots on or near the highway and creates hardship during certain times of the year because of weather conditions.

Three Million Fleet Tie-up At Petite Passage

(Acute need for harbour facilities, writes correspondent, Mrs. John P. Outhouse)

For quite a number of years during the summer months, 30-50 seining boats of New Brunswick's herring fleet of Campobello and Grand Manan have found harbourage at Tiverton. During this annual period, the fleet carry out seining operations off the Island's area in the lucrative herring grounds of the Bay of Fundy and St. Mary's Bay.

The purse seining method employed by these boats in this area is a night-time operation and is carried on by three types of boats: the seiner, which carries out the operations and the fish carrier and the pumper, which stand by when the net has been pursed aboard the seiner the pumper pumps the fish from the seiner to the carrier. Their catch per night is estimated to be as many as 3,000 hogsheds. The scales of the herring, which amount to 3 or more tons per week, are gathered each night during the pumping operation.

The carrier, when loaded with herring, proceeds to either Eastport, Maine, Black's Harbour or Grand Manan, of New Brunswick, Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, or to the new plant at East Pubnico, N. S., where their fish are marketed. It is understood one boat alone from the fleet recently landed 1,000 hogsheds of herring in one week.

The largest percentage of herring is used in the making of fish meal, also canned cat and dog food. The remainder

is either canned, salted or smoked. A large amount is frozen and used as bait. The scales are used in the manufacture of pearl essence coloring.

During the summer months when the seiner fleet is tied up at the Fisherman's Wharf at Tiverton, their boats and equipment represent an estimated value of \$3,000,000.

Much concern is being expressed by the local fishermen who, of a necessity, attach their boats to moorings anchored in the harbour and those who tie up at the public wharf. There are several tiers of seiners which extend out into the harbour and each boat is tied one to the other. As they swing about with the movement of the tide, they often become entangled in the ropes and mooring cables of the smaller, local fishing craft and sometimes results in serious damage to them.

The local fish draggers, forced to tie up at the public wharf, which, at best, gives protection to only two or three boats during a storm, feel they are being crowded away from their berths.

Captain Kenneth Morse, Campobello, of the pumper "Mary and Earl", said immediately their fleet leaves New Brunswick shores the captains and crews begin to wonder where they will find harbor. He explained this is a matter of great concern to them as the harbors in this area are already filled to capacity. Said Capt. Morse, "We like to tie up in Tiverton because of its central location, but it is a (Please turn to page 5)

More Confidence In Future

Actually, we have not had any official announcement about the sale of the Digby Pines Hotel to the Nova Scotia government although we have read news accounts of the sale and we had heard reports which we deemed reliable enough to use in our own columns. There has been no denial of the reports so we take for granted the deal went through and that we won't wake up some morning with the disappointing news like the wharf that the whole idea fell flat on its face.

The Courier has mixed feelings about the sale. The Courier has enjoyed happy relationships all through the many summers with the management and staff of the hotel under the C.P.R. It gives us a feeling of loss of friendship to think that the Pines is being sold. On the other hand, we look forward to it being only an exchange of friendships and hope to establish just as pleasant relationships under the new ownership.

Despite this, the news of the sale of the Pines to the government has been one of joy. It has created a somewhat more sense of security in the area around and about. Whether grounds for fears or not, there were always those anxieties each year about whether the Pines would open its doors or not. In fact, it had been closed a few summers. This anxiety will be relieved if the government continues to operate the establishment as a tourist resort. Again, tourists will be attracted to the town and there will be the hope of extra summer employment for the people in the area.

Certainly, if there is to be a government operated hotel in our midst, the government will use what effort it can to see that the tourists are able to get into the place. That is a big hope for the people, too.

The purchase of the Pines Hotel by the government (and we now have no reason to think the story might be a rumor) — gives the people here more confidence in the future of the area. The establishing of the park at the Tobetic area should bring new life to the Digby area, too. Then there are such smaller prospects as a mattress factory, community pasture on the Neck to aid in agriculture and rumors of much more strawberry acreage. All these smaller projects exude a bit more confidence and hope for the future of Digby. We welcome these bits of news which affect our area.

Back To School

In less than a week the pupils will have gone back to school. There are still a few days of preparation which can be utilized if the parent is willing to do so. More than likely school materials have been purchased and clothing suitable for school has been bought. Very likely, too, that the vaccinations and immunizations have been taken care of. Fourth interest and confidence in your school child is necessary, to get him started whether it is his first experience at school or he is just at the threshold of another new grade or maybe more especially if he is a repeater.

Happy schooling kids! Happy school year, parents. See that you do your part to make it and keep it happy.

matter of first come, first served! We always wonder when we leave home if we will be one of the lucky ones to get a berth at the wharf.

However, in a storm, Tiverton gives no protection for the fleet and the nearest protection-harbour is 30 miles away, and in that case we might as well head for home.

When questioned as to the reason why herring fishing is only a summer operation, Mr. Morse replied, "It isn't. If there were harbour facilities here at Tiverton you would see us in the winter, too."

With the growing interest in fish dragger type of fishing and in the herring industry, more and larger boats are operating in the area. This has created a dire need for bigger and better harbour facilities.

After 40 years of fishing along these shores, Capt. Morse feels the answer to the harbor problems lies in the construction of the already proposed harbour-bridge-causeway complex at Petite Passage.

"As I see it," said Capt. Morse, "Petite Passage is the only place along these shores where it is possible to build a harbour to suit the present growing needs in this vicinity. There is a most urgent need for a deep water protection harbour and the locality here has a very great transportation problem. Yes, the answer to it all would be the harbor-bridge-causeway."

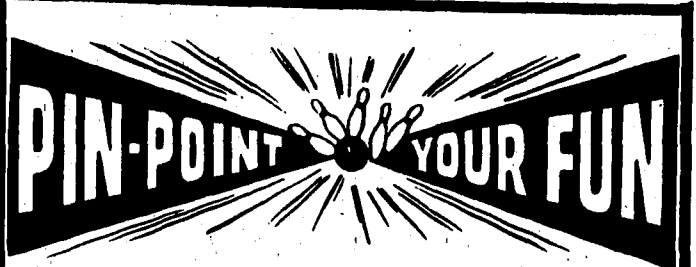

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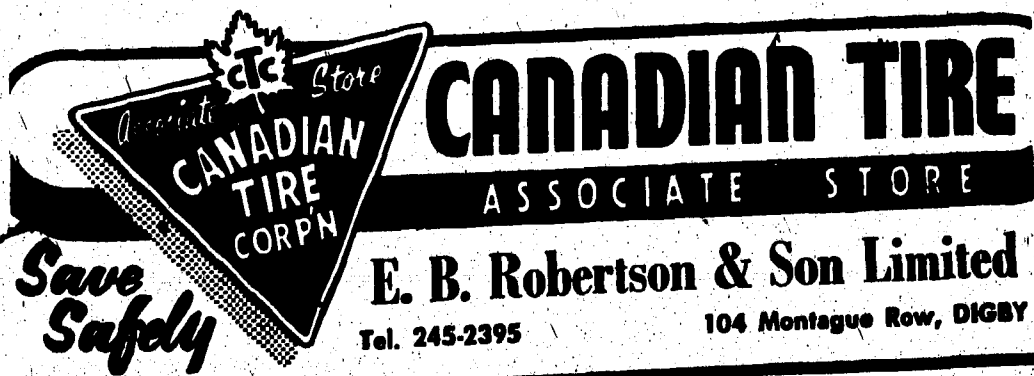

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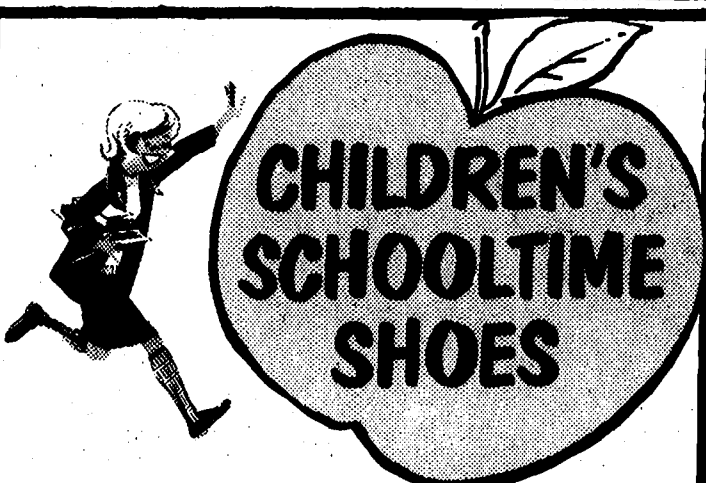

The funeral service was conducted from Riverside Baptist Church, with Rev. C. R. Barkhouse officiating. Interment was in Riverside Cemetery.

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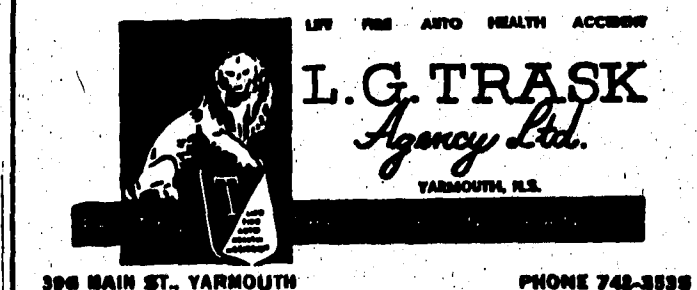
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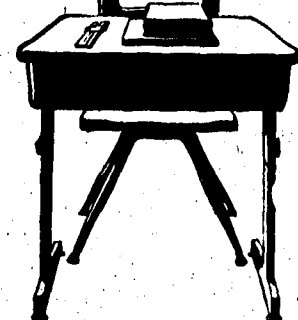

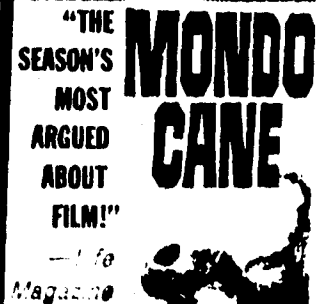

Some two hundred acres of land is in preparation on an area purchased by the Provincial Government for the purpose and with the Florida interests having option of purchase on leases after two years. Furniture Of Great, Great, Great Grandfather



When Joseph Smith, Loyalist with his wife and family, came to Smith's Cove (the village which was named for him) in 1783, they brought with them a few household articles among which were chairs. Above can be seen Oakley Smith, Joseph Smith's great great grandson, sitting on one of these chairs which can still be found at the home of another descendant Miss Ceneth Hope Thomas, Smith's Cove. Oakley Smith is the only "Smith" living in Smith's Cove at the present time. He also has grandchildren and great grandchildren.

The names of the Smiths to the 5th generation from Joseph were Jeremiah, Thomas, John and Oakley.

The story is told that the

Loyalist ship, which brought the Smiths here, lay in the Annapolis Basin all of the winter 1783 - 84. In the spring Joseph Smith walked to Halifax to receive his land grant, 350 acres in Clements. Later he exchanged his land with Joseph Potter for the property in what is known as Smith's Cove.

Besides the chair on which Mr. Smith is seen sitting in the picture, there can also be seen another of the same chairs brought here by the Smiths in 1783. Also can be seen a chest of drawers, the first piece of English furniture in the Cove, brought here by Joseph Smith. The chest of drawers along with a looking glass, also believed to be at the Thomas home,

but not seen in the picture were mentioned in the will of Joseph Smith.

The home of Miss Ceneth Thomas, Smith's Cove, is filled with treasured pieces of the past, such as the large water jug seen beside Mr. Smith's feet and the clock with wooden works on the chest. Beyond the doorway can be seen grandfather's (John Smith Thomas) "spare bed" and her grandfather's spread from the spare bed. Miss Thomas continues to call this the "spare bed".

Among other items on the chest of drawers is a figurine of which Miss Thomas did not venture an age and also her father's first Christmas present in about 1855. It is a shelf ornament of a cow standing in front of trees.

"As far as Nova Scotia is concerned, several towns made only half-hearted presentations to the engineers and the leading contenders for the selection at the moment would appear to be Shelburne and Lunenburg. What! Not even Yarmouth a leading contender? If any town put effort in the presentation it surely was Yarmouth. But we are not inclined to think that the presentations made at the hearings have all that weight either. After all, engineers are engineers. They have eyes and reasoning powers, too. We think Digby has a favorable chance along with others. We think that building a double purpose wharf here has much soundness about it and feel that the engineers would take that into consideration even if Digby's presentation hadn't mentioned it.

According to the article above, Gloucester would appear to be favored as a USA terminal for the ferry. Quoting, "Early indications seem to be that Gloucester is leading the field and few people would be surprised by the selection of this North Shore community." And we add, "We wouldn't be surprised if a terminal were chosen in the state of Maine. So much for speculation. Let's await the engineers' report. Facts are facts. We hope the port will be chosen from facts and not from pressure. However, if sympathy is to be a factor, then Digby has every right to do some shoulder weeping.

Get Acquainted And Support The Farmers

Getting the urban business men acquainted with the work of the rural farmer was a project carried out in Digby last week when the business people of the area were invited to visit farms in Acaciaville, Marshalltown and on Digby Neck. Now instead of only being an exhibition and gathering place for farm people, today's exhibition, in my mind, should provide an opportunity for farm people to show their urban neighbours what the agricultural industry of any district, of any province, or any country, means to the over-all economy of the area. Visitors, when they leave such fairs as are carried on in Nova Scotia each season, should go away feeling that they have learned something of tremendous importance concerning the agricultural industry, something of importance of them, and that the multi-million dollar agricultural industry is an industry which must be encouraged, and supported, and assisted all along the line.

"The winning of prize money, important as that may be, must be regarded as being of secondary importance if exhibitions are to perform a useful function. The show, itself, and what it represents and portends, must be the most important consideration of all.

We have just moved into a big, old-fashioned, country farm house. It is old-fashioned, but not old. As country farm houses go, thirty years ago was the day before yesterday. We were in one today, a few miles from here, which is nearly two hundred years old.

Our house was built by Old Paddy, a local character, who even in the nineteen thirties was an elderly, unmarried gentleman. He and his equally elderly, unmarried sister lived here for many years. Evidently they had not much interest in the architecture of the nineteen thirties. The house has the lines, construction, and general appearance of a house two or three times its age.

I have now spent my first week in my new kitchen, the ninth in a long line, if one counts the apartment where we spent our honeymoon, and the single room where we lived for our first two weeks in Halifax. It is a big kitchen, with the exception of one I had in Moncton, the biggest I have ever had. It is equipped with an oil stove, a rocker, a shallow sink, and only one electrical outlet. Until now, I have had electric stoves, no movable furniture except our chrome set (if there was room for that), deep and wide stainless steel sinks, and, including the one on the stove, at least three electrical outlets. Nearly always before, there has been counter space on either side of the kitchen sink. Now I have only room to drain the dishes. Always before there has been all the hot water I needed, from my own, or somebody else's electric water heater. Now, our tank behind the stove heats only when we are using the stove, which, on these lovely summer days is certainly not all the time.

Although the cupboard space in Old Paddy's kitchen consists only of the usual space under the sink, and a small cupboard above it, and an old wooden cabinet in one corner, I now have my first pantry. Because of the single outlet, the refrigerator is more or less limited to one position on the west wall.

Because of the lack of planned work space, I have placed Old Paddy's substantial wooden kitchen table between the wooden cabinet and the refrigerator. The man of the house found a smaller wooden table which fits neatly between the refrigerator and the south wall, on which we are keeping our small electric appliances. Our own chrome set stands with its end to the south wall, between the sink on the east, and the refrigerator on the west.

The whole effect bears no resemblance whatever to those glossy kitchens in the homes and gardens magazines. During this week, in this kitchen, I have cooked a roast, and a good Sunday dinner, one large batch of cookies, a pie, and a few tarts, as well as the usual week's supply of breakfasts and dinners. I have washed a week's supply of dishes, and entertained an expanding list of coffee-in-the-kitchen-drinking well wishers. After one week of this, I have decided that for cooking, eating and dishwashing, at least, homes and gardens kitchens can go hang. There may be bugs to be ironed out, but I have not found them. Never before have I had a more convenient kitchen, or an easier one to keep clean.

I can easily reach the refrigerator, the pantry, and the food cabinet from Paddy's table. The table is large enough that I can work on it, and have an electric kettle, mixer, or toaster plugged into the outlet at the same time. With practically no steps, I can mix the food and take it to the stove. From the cabinet, pantry, fridge, table or stove, the food easily reaches the table where we eat, and from there, it is one more step to the sink for washing up. All my work can be done in a series of three straight lines.

But tomorrow is my first wash day. I must remember to leave the stove on all night, in spite of the heat, so there will be water. The "bugs" may show up tomorrow.



Not at all. (We will admit we did not have a look at that area on Warwick St. before the clean up campaign.) We just hope someone will see this in print and get wise. There's a long time, maybe, until the snow will cover up the refuse even though fall weather has set in while we write this copy. We could still have "Indian Summer," you know.

Firstly, we would try to educate our town people to refrain from littering. The highway or street is not the garbage can. This is your town. Keep it clean. The street cleaner needs to do a proper job but he can use your help in keeping the litter to a minimum.

Secondly, we would, if we could, like to get to our visitors. Never have we seen such a disgraceful display of littering as we saw at the Admiral Sir Robert Digby park area on Saturday afternoon. We are to blame, maybe. We only hinted to the visitors that a clean-up was in order. V. neglected to "order" a clean-up and, on returning to the spot later, the whole mess of ice cream containers, all twenty odd, were still piled on the ground ready to blow over the park. True, they were children but they did have supervisors with them. We look for their future visits to be tidier. Come to think of it, we hadn't checked to see if there was a garbage container available. We'll look another day. In the meantime, you can look, too. We think you'll find one there.

Safe Driving This Weekend

There were over 4,750 traffic fatalities in Canada in 1964. Canada is a big country but the figure 4,750 is also big. Some of those fatalities were Nova Scotians. Some not too far from Digby. Many of those accidents occurred on days when traffic was heavy - holidays for instance.

This weekend brings a holiday weekend. Traffic will be heavy. There will be jams and extremely hazardous conditions. The Canadian Highway Safety Council estimates 6,000, 000 automobiles will be on roads in Canada over the Labor Day weekend. A proportionate number will be on Nova Scotia roads. Drive carefully and watch for danger. Each life lost by accident in 1964 helped to make up the 4,750, but even one life is too precious to be lost by carelessness.

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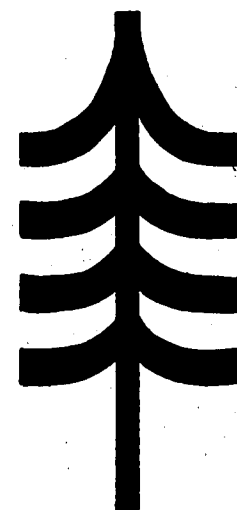
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ATTENTION WOODLOT OWNERS

REGULATIONS FOR ASSISTANCE WOODLOT ROAD CONSTRUCTION

- The intent is to provide assistance to woodlot owners in the construction of roads that will enable them to better manage and develop their woodlots.
- For the purpose of these regulations a woodlot owner is considered as a person owning 1,000 acres or less of woodland. The acreage can be in one block or made up of a number of blocks but the total must not exceed 1,000 acres.
- In order to be eligible for assistance:

- Applications for woodlot road work must be made out in duplicate on official application blanks available from an office of the Department of Lands and Forests.
- The woodlot owner must submit his application for assistance to determine his eligibility and receive approval from the District Forester before work is started.
- Before an application is approved, the applicant must satisfy a representative of the Department of Lands and Forests that:
 - The road is desirable and practical for efficient woodlot management, i.e. harvesting, fire control, etc., and not being built for easy access to cottages or hunting camps.
 - The road is to be suitably located for management purposes.

- All applications for work must be received by the District Forester of the area concerned before November 30, 1965.
- Assistance granted under this policy will not apply to equipment owned by the woodlot owner.
- Maximum assistance under this policy will be limited to a total of forty hours of work during the period of April 1, 1965 to March 31, 1966.
- Assistance will be paid on the rated drawbar horsepower of crawler type tractors.
- The rates of assistance are as follows: Under 25 h.p.—No assistance; 25-38 h.p.—\$4 per hour working time; 38-52 h.p.—\$5 per hour working time; 52 h.p. and over—\$6 per hour working time.
- No assistance will be paid on time spent in moving or maintenance of equipment.

Application forms for assistance may be obtained from your nearest Lands and Forests district office.

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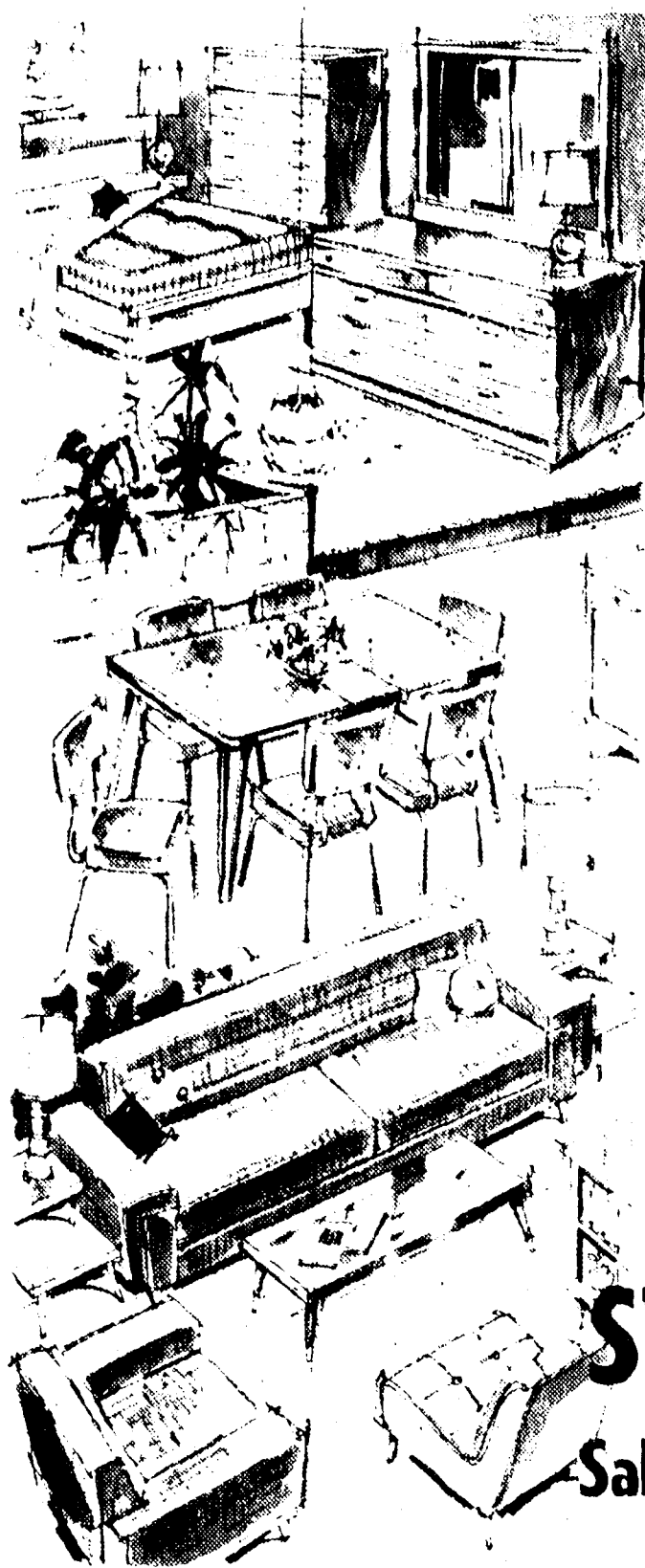

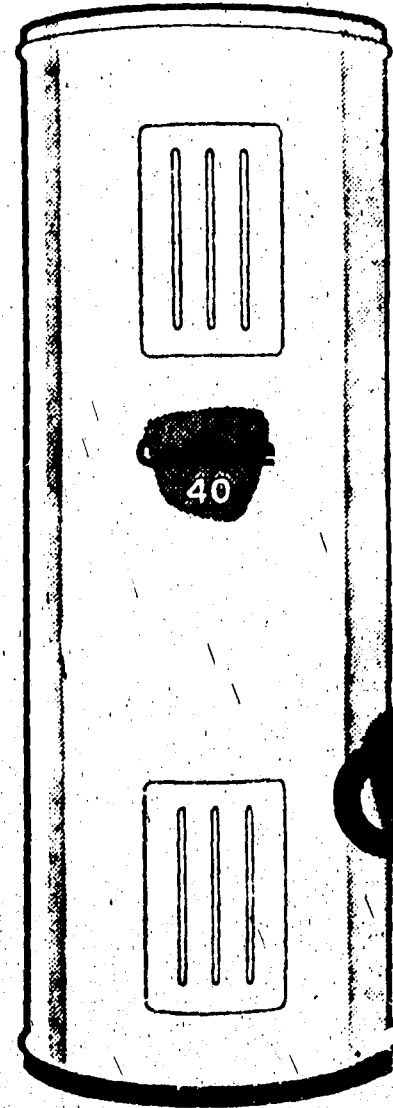

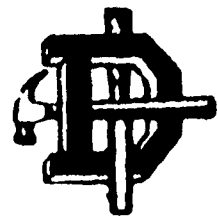

Federal Election Nov. 8th

Prime Minister Lester Pearson, on Tuesday night, announced to all of Canada that a federal general election would be held on November 8.

In his announcement he appealed to the people for a clear majority in order to carry on new policies at a more rapid pace, but also spoke of the great amount of business transacted by his government in nearly two and a half years which have just passed.

The Prime Minister said there were many important problems which remained to be looked after since parliament recessed and some important ones which had developed. In his short remarks to the nation Mr. Pearson said:

"We have policies which I believe will be effective in dealing with these problems, policies to continue Canada's exciting economic expansion, to provide with development of her resources, and especially the greatest resource of all the skills and talents of her people, policies to bring about elimination of poverty in the land, by helping all Canadians to take advantage of improving opportunities. Above all, we have the policies that can reduce tensions in our country, so that we can all go forward as Canadians in unity and strength."

Blood Donors Urgently Needed

A special appeal for blood donors is being issued by E. B. Tufts, district chairman of the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee, in his announcement of the semi-annual Blood Donor Clinic, to be held at the Lions Club Hall, Digby, on Monday, September 13th, from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon and from 6 to 9 in the evening.

Although all Blood Donor Clinics are important, special urgency is always attached to those clinics whose dates fall either before or after a holiday weekend, when the Provincial Blood Bank is so often depleted by heavy accident toll on the highways. Such is the case with next week's clinic in Digby, following soon after the many emergencies of the Labor Day weekend. Blood is always necessary for scheduled operations, as well as the unscheduled accidents, and in order to be prepared for both, the deficit in the Blood Bank must be made up as quickly as possible. The success of every clinic, including that in Digby, is therefore particularly vital at the present time.

Mr. Tufts, as District Chairman, serves to co-ordinate Blood Donor committees in Digby, Bear River, Weymouth, Digby Neck and the Islands. The Digby Lions Club, besides giving the use of their hall for the clinic, are also responsible for donor recruitment in the Digby area, in which they are ably assisted by a committee of the Lionettes, under the convenship of Mrs. David Daley, President. At the clinic room, a group of Red Cross volunteer workers, headed by the Digby Branch President, Mrs. R. B. Lent, will register the donors and provide refreshments, while local volunteer nurses under the direction of Mrs. Sidney Smith, R.N., will assist the Red Cross team of nurses and technicians from Provincial Headquarters.

It is encouraging to note that the spring Blood Donor Clinic, held in Digby last April, was the most successful here in many years, thus the committees are confidently hoping for the same wholehearted response again next week. With the knowledge that a normally healthy person between the ages of sixteen and sixty-five may safely donate blood every six months, the Blood Donor Committee urges that all former donors attend this clinic. In addition, they are also appealing to all high school students who have attained the donor age to join up in this life-saving effort, with a reminder to all, in the words of the well-known Red Cross slogan: "The life that you save may be your own."

Streets Report For August

The following was reported at Tuesday evening's meeting of Town Council:

During the month of August the town men spent 401 hours on water at a cost of \$415.80. Haying along the town streets was completed during the first week in August.

Town men spent 30 hours cleaning off the town dump at a cost of \$32.80 for labour, plus the tractor. 802 hours were spent on streets at a cost of \$825.20. This consisted of hauling hay, cutting hay, patching streets, repairing the road shoulders, cleaning out ditches, grading, cleaning up Water Street, widening Church Street, tending drains in the rain and regular street maintenance.

Police Report For August

The following report was made at the September meeting of Digby Town Council held Tuesday evening:

A total of sixteen complaints were registered with the Town of Digby police department during the month of August, six of which required field investigation. All except one have been terminated to the satisfaction of persons concerned. As a result of the investigation ten cases warranted court action and all have been disposed of before the court. Three of the cases were under the Nova Scotia Liquor Act and seven under the Motor Vehicle Act. Resulting fines amounted to \$90.00. Four motor vehicle accidents were investigated. Police car patrol for the month was 1,268 miles.

A tender submitted by Richard Thomas for the pick up and disposal of town garbage has been accepted by Digby Town Council. This was announced at their September meeting, held Tuesday evening.

Council stated that an incinerator for the disposal of all types of garbage will be installed somewhere in the municipality, and will be owned and operated by Mr. Thomas. It was mentioned that when the incinerator goes into operation, probably within the next two months, the dump situated in the extreme south end of the Town of Digby will be closed to the public.

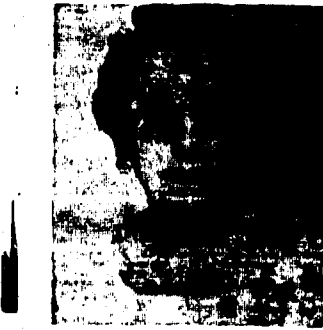
Arriving in Halifax Monday evening, August 23, he spent Tuesday there, moving on Wednesday to Digby and Annapolis Royal.

The process of moving continues. Each day seems to bring its minor disaster, like the time the pump shorted and we were without water, and the day a washer came out of the bathtub faucet, and water gushed all over the place. Both goldfish died under mysterious circumstances within hours of each other. We have nursed the kitten through several crises brought on by its extreme infancy. Our daughter blacked her eye, and the gas line on the potential new car we were test driving broke, about thirty miles from a garage.

Other than that, things are proceeding normally.

Yesterday I bought the material to make curtains for our bedroom. Last night I cut them, and today they are draped, ungathered, and unhemmed, over the curtain rods. That is an improvement. Until now we have had neither curtains nor blinds. The windows had been hung with towels as a protest against getting dressed in the dark.

The new curtains, when they are done, will be quite impressive. They are made of the heavier sort of material usually associated with living rooms and drapes. Huge blue roses are splashed all over them. I have barkcloth curtains and no blinds on the kids' bedroom windows. They seem to give the rooms a feeling of freedom, and a touch of defiance of convention.

Along with the curtain material, I picked up one of those little sucker, tie-in, items clever merchandisers so cannily display for us unwary shoppers. This was a book of decorating ideas, published by the way, by a fabric company. They know the art of tie in too. I may have been a sucker, and I may have done exactly what both the manufacturer and the storekeeper wanted me to do, but the book is fascinating.

It is full of fantastically impractical rooms, not one of which would cost more than a mere two thousand dollars to furnish. Co-ordination, in its flamboyant, overpowering extreme seems to be the theme. Tablecloths, curtains, chair covers, and lampshades match. The same ball fringe which edges the bedspread, repeats itself in the curtains and blinds, and even on the walls. Walls are covered with gingham, or corduroy, or even silk, instead of nice, ordinary wallpaper.

There is one section in the book on rooms with co-ordinating fashions. An evening skirt matches the drapes. The slacks and shirt match the chesterfield, and are trimmed to match the window blinds. Aprons match the kitchen cafe curtains. All this is terribly clever, I suppose. I have already made a shift, before I bought the book, out of a leftover and of drapery material. It is quite dramatic and striking, to say the least. I have, for that matter, curtained windows with coat lining. The suggestion which I have heard that if you do not know what colors to use for decorating, choose a color which is becoming to you, not only makes a great deal of sense, but has a sort of cosy comfort about it. However, thank you, my house is my "machine for living." Not a very efficient one, mind you, but I, not it, am the boss. I cannot imagine anything sillier, or more self effacing than to decorate oneself to go with a specific room. Somehow it reduces a personality to a piece of furniture.

The hostess skirt, made of drapery material, by the way, is quite exciting. Some day, when I am wearing my drapery material shift, I may stop in and buy a few yards. You know, I've always wanted a housecoat made out of one of those striped bedspreads.

Dear Sir:

I would like to have a little space in your very nice paper to give my opinion on the second service between western Nova Scotia and Maine. Mr. Crocker suggests that a ferry service between Freeport and Jonesport, Maine, would be the ideal place for it. I would suggest it would be no good whatsoever because first you can't steer a straight course from Freeport to Jonesport. If you do the St. Mary's ledges will pick you up, and second you have the worst tide rips in the Bay of Fundy, which gets very rough in a gale of wind. I know, because I carried lobsters a good many winters and if Mr. Crocker ever travelled that way in the winter time he would change his mind. Just after one trip. And another thing, if there were a ferry service at Freeport, and people bringing their cars with them, just the one trip would do them because it would take so long to get your car on the mainland at East Port. They have a car ferry that runs between Tiverton and East Port, that carries six cars and can make a trip every half hour. Every hour can take one twelve cars and a ferry coming on board would take at least five hours to get on the mainland. Would you want to wait Mr. Crocker, in a line to get your car across the passage?

I would suggest from Digby to Eastport, would be the place for a ferry service. First you have no tide rips, second, it would be a straight course through water and smooth, and a gale of wind and you could get a straight course from Digby to Head Harbour, which is the northern tip of Campobello Island, and nothing in the way whatsoever. From Head Harbour to Eastport, it is about four miles and you get to Eastport in one hour and a new miller is at the wharf which can be used as a wharf for the ferry. I would like to see the expense of buildings and wharves, and they are already at Digby and Eastport.

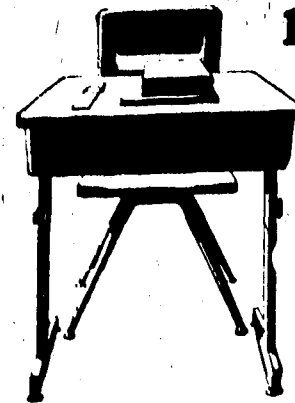

Found Four Other Tivertons

Although Tiverton's main celebrations of the granting of its Royal Charter in 1615 will take place in October, coin- ciding with the visit of H.R.H. Princess Marina, the actual 350th anniversary occurred on Tuesday.

On that day the Mayor of Tiverton (Mr. W. P. Authers) sent the following message to the Private Secretary to the Queen:—

"Today being the 350th an- niversary of the granting of the Royal Charter to the Bor- ough of Tiverton by King James I in 1615, I shall be grateful if you will convey to Her Majesty the loyal greet- ings of the people of Tiver- ton."

The Mayor also considered it would be an appropriate time to send greetings to other places named Tiverton in vari- ous parts of the world. To establish how many and where they are, he consulted the Central Office of Information, the Royal Geographical So- ciety, and the High Commis- sioners for Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Assistance was also given by Lord Amory of Tiverton, a former High Commissioner for the U.K. in Canada.

These inquiries revealed that four other Tivertons exist, and the messages were accordingly sent to: the chairman of Tiverton Parish Council, Cheshire through the Tarvin Rural Council; the Hon. Richard P. Paquin, president of the Town Council, Tiverton, Rhode Island, U.S.A.; the Reeve, Tiverton, Ontario, Canada; Coun. Eugene Outhouse, Tiverton, Digby County, Nova Scotia, Canada.

The message asked them "to convey to the residents of your Tiverton our friendly greetings."

The letter to Rhode Island, U.S.A., recalled the recent visit of their Town Solicitor, Mr. William B. Sullivan, and Mrs. Sullivan.

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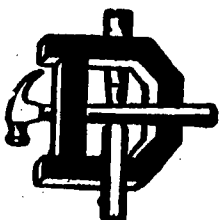

The Canada Pension Plan and its benefits

Here is what the Canada Pension Plan will do for people like Mary Todd, a 22-year-old nurse who earns \$310 a month (\$3,720 a year).



If Mary's earnings continue at this rate until she reaches age 65, she will receive a retirement pension of \$77.50 a month from the Plan plus \$75 a month Old Age Security.

Because Mary will have the opportunity of contributing for 43 years, she can have as many as 6½ years of lower or no earnings and still be entitled to the same pension.

Actually, Mary's retirement pension will undoubtedly be more. This is because as Mary advances in her profession and her earnings increase so will her pension. Furthermore, to ensure that all benefits under the Plan maintain their value, they will be adjusted to meet changes in living costs and wage levels before they are paid and changes in living costs after they become payable.

If Mary continues to work and becomes disabled at any time after 1970, she will be entitled to a disability pension of \$83.12 a month until she reaches age 65. From then on she will receive her retirement pension as well as \$75 a month from Old Age Security.

If Mary dies any time after 1967, having contributed until her death, a lump sum payment of \$465 will be paid to her estate.

What will the Plan cost you?

If, like Mary, you are employed and have earnings of \$3,720 spread evenly over the year, you will pay at the rate of \$4.68 a month. Your employer will pay the same amount.

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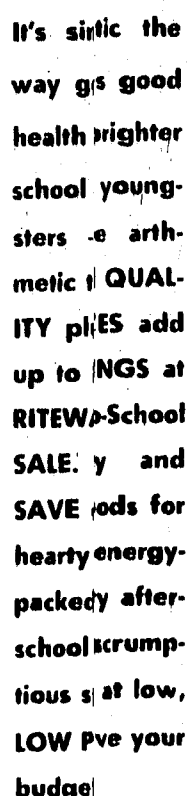

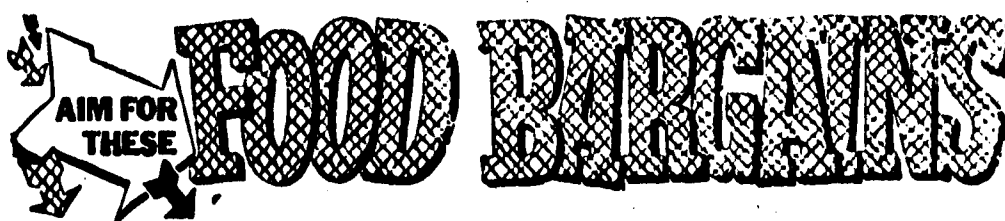

Capital Charge Hearing Postponed

Twenty-year-old Robert Randall Comeau, of Digby, was remanded until September 20, when he appeared in Provincial Magistrate's Court in Yarmouth, Tuesday, for preliminary hearing on a charge of capital murder.

Comeau is charged in the July 28 death of 16-year-old Halifax school girl Thais Marie Haskins. The girl's nude, stabbed body was found in a clump of bushes on the outskirts of Yarmouth about 7 hours after she had left a dance hall. She had been vacationing in Yarmouth at the time.

Magistrate C. Roger Rand, Q.C., granted the request of Crown Prosecutor Donald L. Shipman for the postponement. Mr. Chipman stated that he had heard "no word whatsoever from the powers that be at the Nova Scotia Hospital where Comeau was committed on August 14.

On September 20 a further postponement will probably be requested to prepare evidence for a preliminary hearing. Acting in defence of Comeau was Philip R. Woolaver, of Digby. Comeau was taken to Yarmouth jail where he will remain until the hearing next Monday.

Giant Sea Turtle Drama Ends At Acadia

By Frederick A. Leighton
(Frederick A. Leighton of Joggins Bridge and Millbrook School, Millbrook, N. Y., secured the body of the huge leather-back turtle which was caught this summer in a weir at Sea Wall and arranged for its dissection in the interests of science. Below is his account of some of the findings as a result of the dissection.)

The story of the giant sea turtle caught at Sea Wall has finally come to a close. The turtle was hauled from O'Neils' fish plant in Digby to Armstrong's Frozen Foods' cold storage plant in Middleton. On August 23, it was trucked to a field in the town of Gaspeau where Professor J. S. Bleaknes of Acadia University and two students did a complete dissection and removed the skeleton.

The dissection revealed many interesting facts about this strange animal. The measurements alone are impressive. Weighing 1240 pounds, the turtle measured seven feet from beak to tail and four feet from shoulder to shoulder. The extended fore-flippers were approximately 9 feet from tip to tip. Despite the massive size, however, the brain of the turtle was only the size of two or three human thumbs. A very efficient brain it must be thought, for the

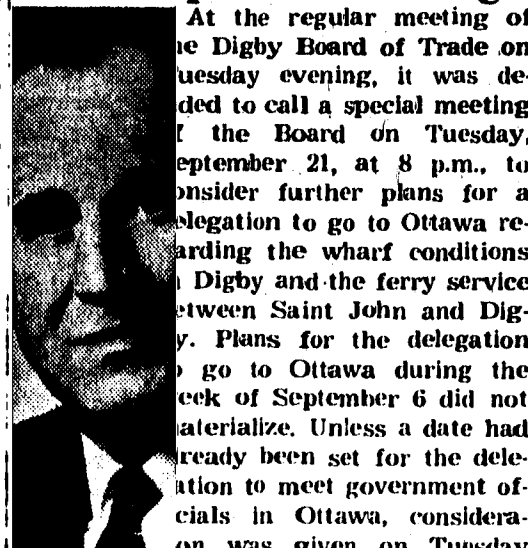

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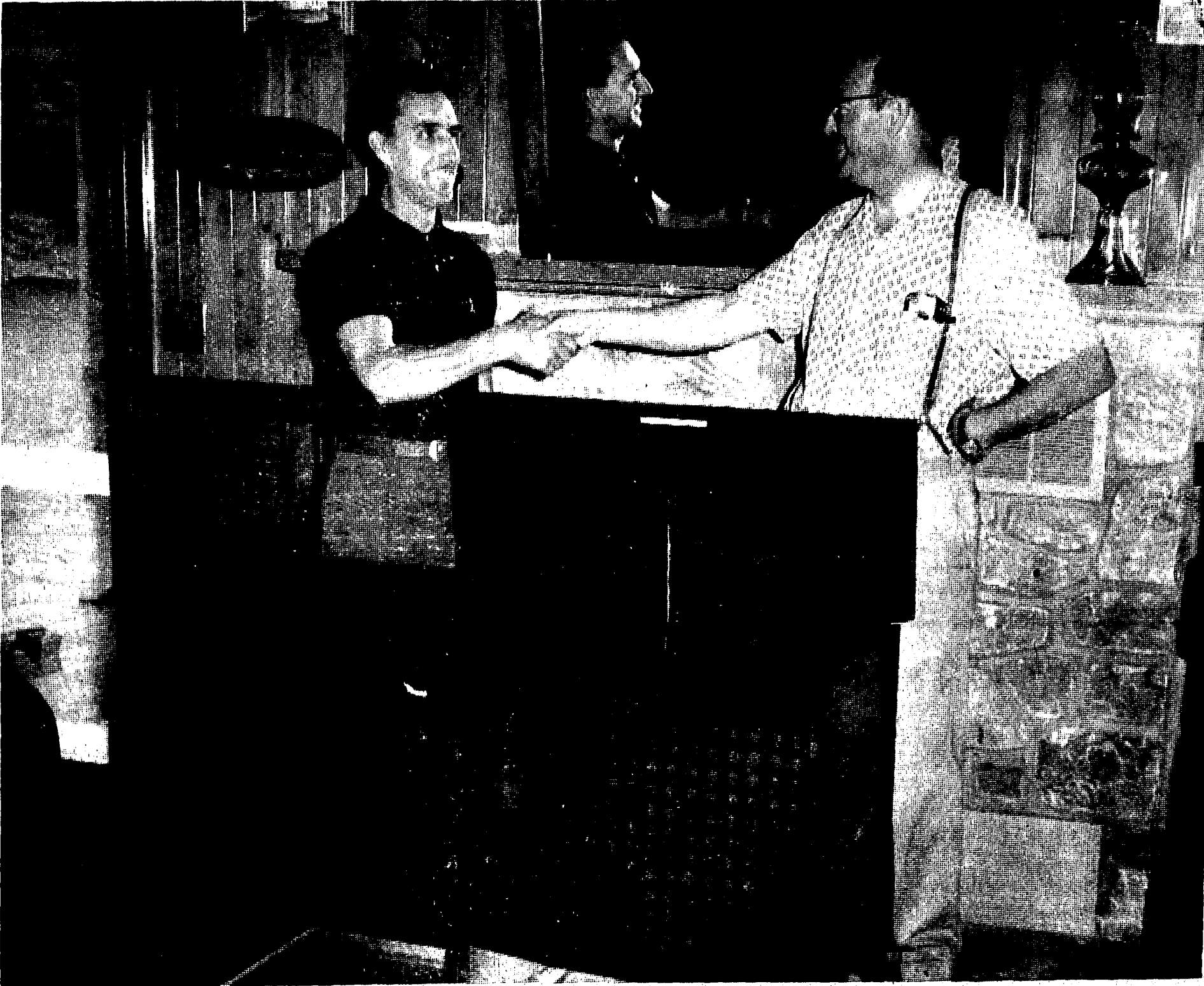

He said that the Parish was most grateful for these gifts and also for the red frontal, which was given earlier this year by the congregation and Guilds. A complete set of frontals is now at Trinity Church for all the Church's seasons.

The Rector was happy to welcome a number of visitors to Trinity Church from the U.S.A. and other parts of Canada. He was especially glad to extend a welcome to several new citizens of Digby who have taken up residence here. Among them was a new family from India who are here due to teaching commitments at Digby Regional High School. He assured them of a warm welcome by Trinity Church and the people of Digby.

As it was Labour Sunday, the rector, in his sermon, reminded the congregation of the church's place in the field of labour today and urged all Christian people to make every effort to ensure a peaceful way of life for all men. If the Church does not take an interest in man's work, he said, other people will, and, sometimes, as in the case of Communism, people will be led away from God.

Mrs. Lillian Nichols presided at the organ in the absence of Mrs. Harry O. Turnbull who is away on vacation.

Youth Groups Start

The first of the Fall meetings of the Christian Youth Council of the Baptist Church of Digby was held last Sunday evening. The pastor, Rev. H. S. Hartlin, presided at the meeting.

Among the matters considered was that of providing leaders for youth groups and Sunday School classes where required. Vacancies in leadership have occurred recently because of the loss of leaders who have left Digby. The Council hopes to fill all of these vacancies within a short time.

This, he stated, provided both an opportunity and a challenge.

Retired Minister Dies In Hospital

Rev. William Fermer, retired minister of the Church of Christ Disciples died at the Digby General Hospital on Monday, September 16th.

Born at Tunbridge Wells, Kent, England, 75 years ago, he was a son of the late William and Margaret Chapman Fermer.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mamie Tucker, of L'Etete, a half-sister, Mrs. Mobsby, of Guildford, England. A sister and brothers predeceased him several years ago.

Mr. Fermer was ordained at Leithbridge, Alberta, in 1921. He retired from the active ministry in 1955. He held pastorates in the Atlantic Provinces, was ten years in Ontario and one year in the United States. Before coming to Canada he was a Social Worker in slum

Conference President Guest Speaker

Rev. R. H. Hughes, Digby and Lay Minister Mr. Wood of Weymouth attended a meeting of the newly formed Valley Presbytery of the United Church of Canada held at Kentville on Tuesday. The meeting was presided over by the chairman, Rev. Kenneth Sullivan, Kentville.

Guest speaker was Dr. A. E. Kerr, president of the Maritime Conference, United Church of Canada, who spoke on a recent meeting in Toronto called by the M. and M. committee of the church. He gave figures showing the givings to M. and M. from the Maritimes as having decreased from 1926 at forty per cent to only twenty per cent in 1965. Church extension and improvements at home churches were given as reasons for the drop in M. and M. but Dr. Kerr reminded the Presbytery that the need had increased for M. and M. too. He said "Consider how much you spent on yourselves in comparison to what you give to M. and M."

Dr. Kerr deplored the great lack of religious education of the United Church people when compared to the Jews and the Roman Catholic people. Speaking about the United Church new curriculum he said the most trouble came from ignorance and closed minds. The curriculum he said is meant to increase and improve the education of teachers and strengthen their Christian faith rather than destroy. He asked the delegates to approach it with an open mind.

Dr. Kerr spoke about the shortage of ministers in the United Church. In 1963 there were 718 students for the ministry, in 1964 there were 641 and in 1965 there were 574. Other denominations are suffering a similar shortage, he said, and he asked that ministers keep the challenge before the congregations and encourage parents to talk about it in the homes.

Rural and urban populations have changed in proportions in the last twenty years Dr. Kerr said. Total populations have increased but in 1941 103 per cent lived in rural districts, now only 80 per cent live in rural areas.

Speaking on the proposed church union with Anglican and United, Dr. Kerr said that the union would be of benefit to the whole church across the nation. He remarked that the United Church was pleased that the Anglican Church had set up a committee but this does not mean that they have accepted union. Union will not come about, he said, by legislation of higher powers but by the two churches growing together and not feel that they are thrown together.

Rev. Mr. Sullivan presented Rev. W. H. Forsythe (formerly of the Digby Neck charge) to Dr. Kerr, who presented him with a Conference certificate to recognize his 40 years of service. Rev. Mr. Forsythe has retired.

Rev. P.M.C. MacIntosh gave a report on the British and Foreign Bible Society and asked that all collections be continued by the end of 1965.

Expressions of regret and sympathy were extended to Rev. Calder Fraser whose son, Allan, was critically injured in a car accident. Allan's friend was killed in the same accident.

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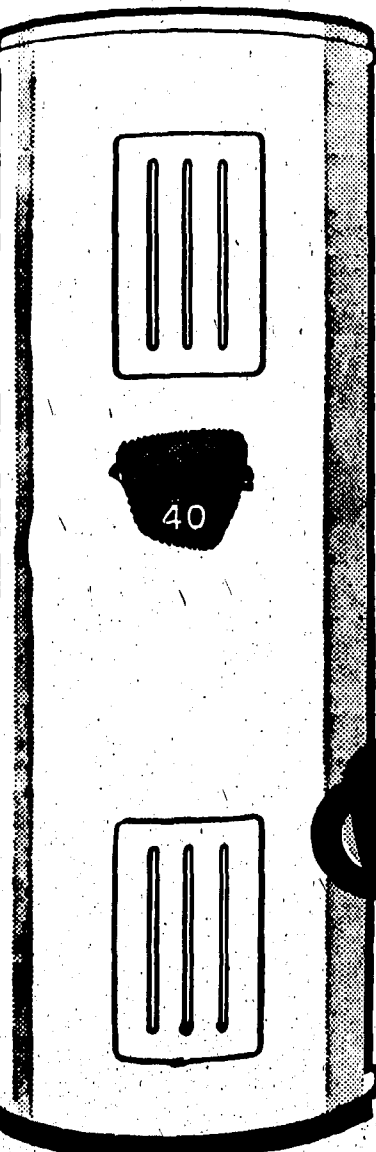

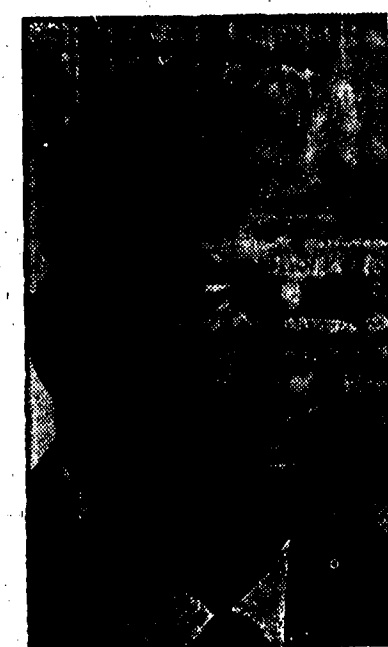

Baden Powell, Digby's representative in the Provincial Legislature; Clayton D. Snow, Mayor of the Town of Digby, and F. Hartlin, of the Digby United Baptist Church, will deliver the invocation. Father L. Gaudet, of St. Patrick's Parish, will also take part.

Trade Board Drafts Resolutions

Five resolutions were passed at a special meeting of the Digby Board of Trade on Tuesday evening and will be forwarded to the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade annual meeting for consideration when it meets in Kentville on October 16. Nine were at the meeting on Tuesday evening when the resolutions were presented by V. G. Snow and Charles Halliburton.

The first resolution passed appealed to the A.V.A.B.T. through the manager, Captain Lloyd Hill, to immediately act to solve the long standing transportation problem in Digby by respecting the Saint John-Legby ferry service. It was requested that a meeting be arranged immediately with Federal Minister of Transportation, the Hon. J. W. Pickersgill.

A similar resolution requests the A.V.A.B.T. to appeal to both federal and provincial ministers of fisheries to take steps to solve the fishery problem in Digby caused by inadequate harbor facilities.

Another resolution dealt with the matter of a Nova Scotia-New England ferry service. It requested the wholehearted support of A.V.A.B.T. in the Digby-Eastport, Maine, proposal as such a service between these two nearest ports has the greatest potential and capable of rendering the greatest service to Nova Scotia, the rest of Canada and the U.S.A. at the least possible cost.

A fourth resolution advocated a causeway across Bear River to replace Victoria Bridge. Advantages of a causeway were set out in detail showing that it would provide a large body of fresh water for industry, a lake for recreational facilities and deep water terminal facilities for cargo ships.

The last resolution dealt with restrictions against herring seiners. It was noted that in New Brunswick there were restrictions placed on seining of herring over a large area of the Bay of Fundy which granted considerable protection to weir fishermen, while in Nova Scotia there were no such restrictions and the weir fishermen were placed at a disadvantage. The resolution urged that the federal and provincial authorities be contacted to correct the situation so that the Bay of Fundy fishermen in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia be treated equitably. The resolution further requested the closure of St. Mary's Bay and the Annapolis Basin to seiners on a permanent basis, these bays constituting inland waters.

Voting delegates from Digby appointed on Tuesday night to the annual meeting of A.V.A.B.T. in October were Vincent Snow and Charles Halliburton, with C. D. Snow, H. M. Warne and Mrs. J. M. Wallis as alternates.

Included in the purchase are the hotel, cottages and the 160-acre golf course. The property contains 300 acres.

The hotel site contains a 94-room hotel, 30 cottages, two staff buildings and several other smaller buildings.

The resort hotel operates from the end of June to September. The building was constructed between 1928 and 1937.

It is located on the outskirts of Digby, and overlooks the Annapolis Basin. It is approximately 150 miles from Halifax and 65 miles from Yarmouth. A C.P.R. car and passenger ferry operates between Digby and Saint John, N.B.

Facilities include a dining room with a capacity of 285 persons, meeting rooms, a heated freshwater swimming pool, an 18-hole par 71 golf course covering approximately 210 acres, tennis and shuffle board courts.

About This And That

What Type Structure

The report in this newspaper last week that definitely a start was being made toward replacing Victoria Bridge over Bear River on highway number 11 was indeed good news. Any news which would give promise to relief from that dangerous bottleneck at that particular point of the highway would have to be "sweet music to the ear." Generally, there seemed to be the idea, in these parts, that a bridge only was in the minds of authorities, and, although, no one was going to be ungrateful, there were harboured these fears that the proposal by the Bear River Board of Trade was not being considered. This proposal supported by other Boards, was for a causeway, which would also dam up the waters for boating and sporting facilities in Bear River. A real tourist mecca had been contemplated as well as providing industrial facilities.

This week we understand that while consulting engineers have been engaged, there has been no particular type of structure—causeway or bridge—decided upon. It is conceivable that the causeway as proposed by the Bear River Board of Trade could become a reality.

The other purpose of replacing Victoria Bridge is to eliminate a hazard and to facilitate transportation. This would require at least a two-lane road structure of some sort with proper approaches. Whether a bridge or causeway would be the most economical to construct is now the business of the consulting engineers to find out. Should a causeway be less expensive or on a par with a bridge in costs, then there should be every possibility of consideration to the proposal of the Bear River Board of Trade. And why not make the most of our potentials at the same time as eliminating hazards?

To us the Bear River proposal looks like a good one. However, there are, no doubt, many problems to face in such a venture. Take the matter, for instance, of eliminating water pollution in a dammed up area which seems to have occurred in other places. Again, these obstacles are matters for the engaged engineers and we have every confidence that they will be thoroughly considered. In the meantime, there is no reason why the Bear River Board of Trade and its supporters should not keep their proposition before the engineers.

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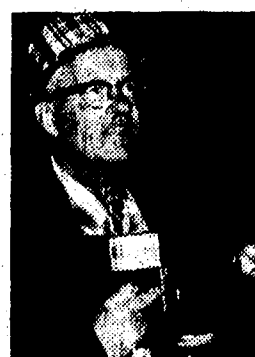

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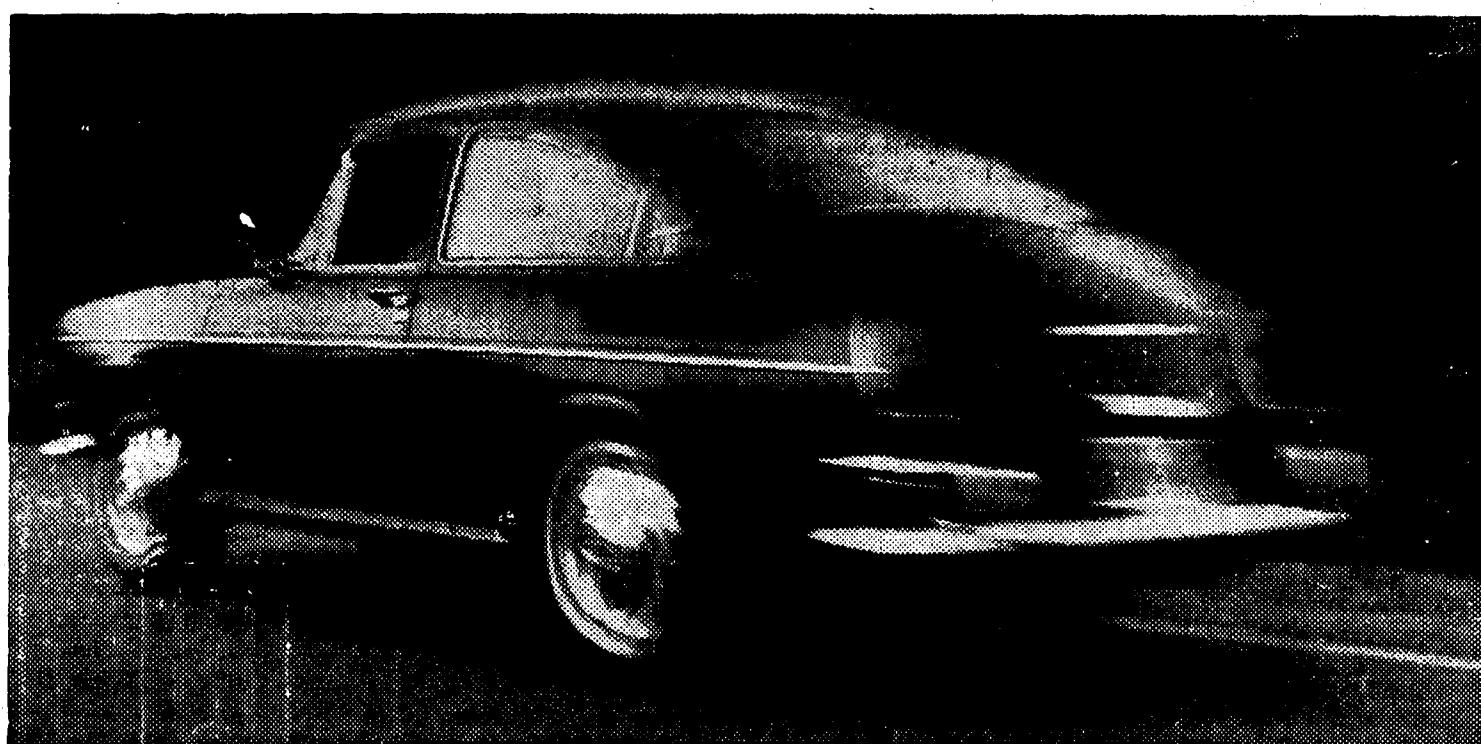

HEADCHEESE

3 pounds veal shank and 2 pounds pork hocks; 7 cups cold water; 2 onions sliced; handfull celery tops; 1 carrot sliced; 2 allspice berries; 2 cloves garlic sliced; 1/4 cup parsley sprigs; 2 whole cloves; 1 bay leaf; 6 peppercorns; 1 tsp. salt; 1 cup white table wine; 2 tsp. caraway seed.

Method: Cover meat with water. Add all ingredients but wine and caraway seed. Cover. Simmer 3 hours. Drain. Remove meat and any soft fat under skin. Chop quite fine. Discard skin and bones. Add wine and caraway seed to strained broth. Simmer 1 hour, or until broth is reduced to 3 cups. Mix meat with broth and pour into an oiled 1 1/2 quart mold. Chill thoroughly. This recipe calls for quite a bit of time and energy. For those who would like to make "Instant Headcheese" so to speak, the following recipe for "Creton" (a French dish) is ideal:

CRETON

2 pounds lean pork, ground; 2 small onions; 2 small pieces garlic; salt, pepper; pinch of summer savory.

Boil slowly for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Mash. Put into molds. Chill.

P.S. — Delicious on toast.

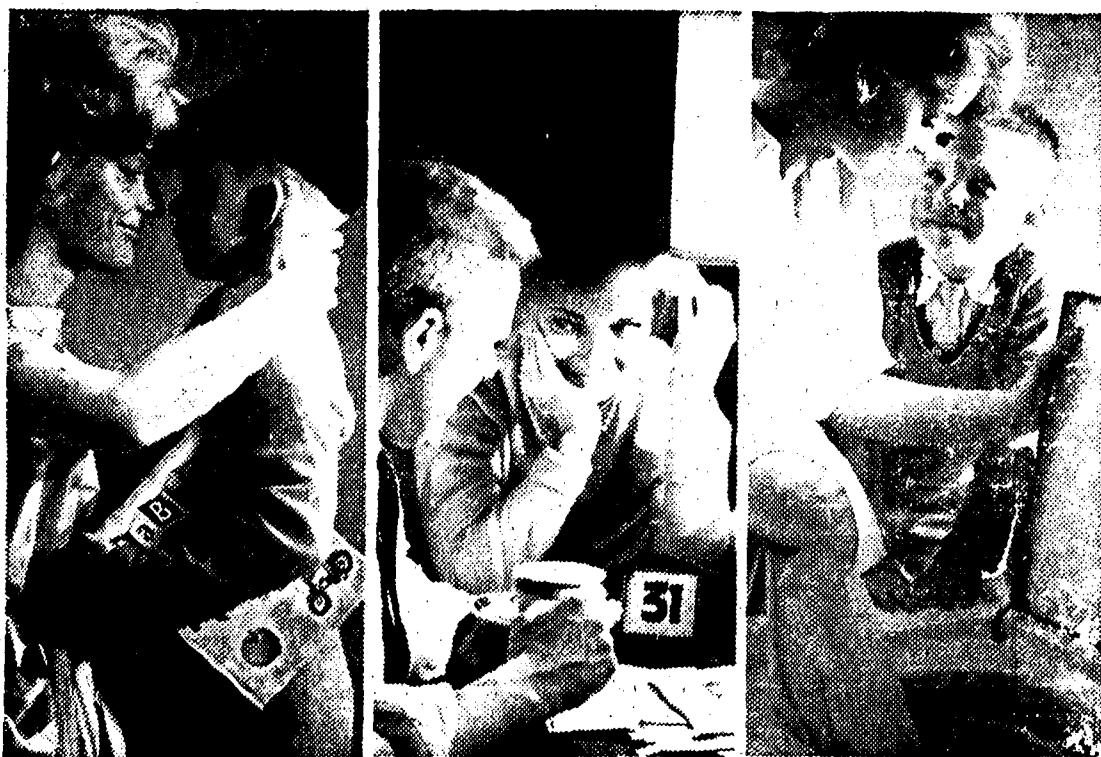

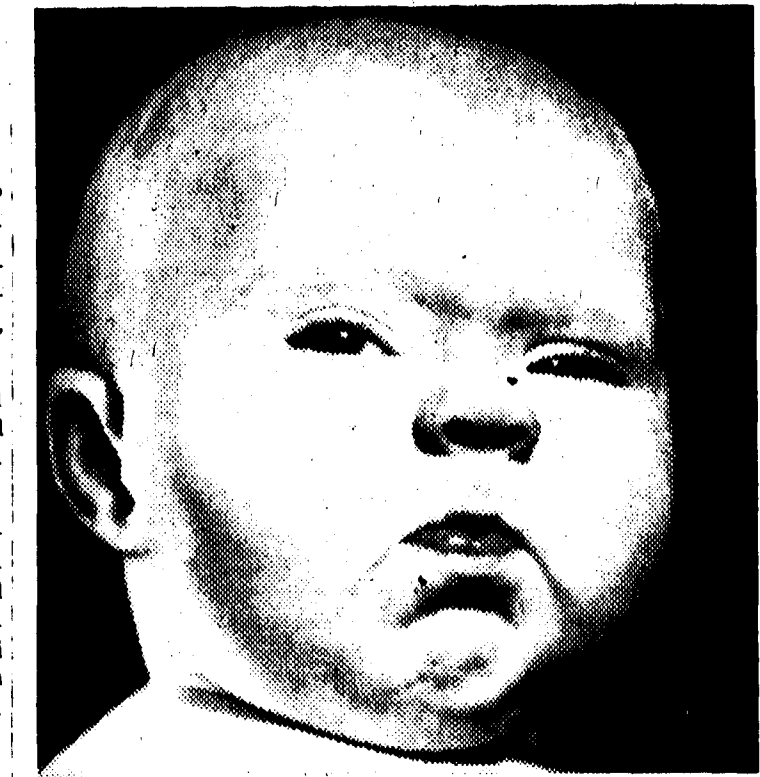

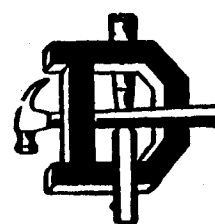

With a vote of 300 out of 370 cast, J. Patrick Nowlan, Wolfville, son of Mrs. Nowlan and the late Hon. George Nowlan, was nominated to contest the Digby-Annapolis-Kings riding in the November 8 election. He was opposed in the nomination contest by David J. Waterbury, Q. C., Kentville, who moved that the convention choice be made unanimous. The nomination convention chaired by Gordon Goucher, Middleton on Thursday night was held in the Bridgetown Regional High School and was attended by more than 800 people.

Nowlan's nomination moved by Dr. Paul Kinsman, MLA, and seconded by Mrs. A. J. Dillon, Digby, was unofficially endorsed by a jubilant outburst of cheers from a number of Acadia University students.

The nomination for Waterbury was moved by LeRoy Taylor, Kentville, seconded by Edward Twohig, Digby.

Filled with emotion, Patrick Nowlan spoke of his father and said "I will not attempt to fill but to follow the steps of a man admired by so many." He expressed the hope that he would have the capacity to unite the constituency as did his father, not for himself or the party but for the constituency and the country.

In his acceptance speech, Nowlan also criticized the federal government on a telegram from Hon. Mr. J. W. Pickersgill read at the Liberal nominating convention in Middleton on Wednesday evening which said no more than had previously been said that the service would be kept going on the same basis — the government did not intend to

Hospital Officially Opened

Honorable R. L. Stanfield, Q. C., L.L.D., Premier of Nova Scotia officially opened the new 90 bed, Digby General Hospital at an impressive ceremony on Monday afternoon. Previously to pronouncing the hospital open, Mrs. A. J. Dillon, president of the Digby General Hospital Ladies Auxiliary passed the premier the scissors with which he performed the ribbon cutting ceremony. The ribbons were held by two nurses, Miss Joan Hattie and Mrs. Yvonne MacIsaac.

The Premier commended the Board Chairman, F. C. Purdy, the citizens of Digby and all those who were responsible for the progressive step in establishing such a fine hospital. He went on to marvel at the size of the hospitals today as compared with those at the time of the First World War which seemed more like large homes.

The Premier was introduced by R. Baden Powell M.L.A. Guest speaker for the day was Hon. Richard A. Donahoe, Q.C., Minister of Health, who congratulated the hospital board for setting aside a special day to recognize the satisfaction and fulfillment of a worthy objective. It is right, he said, to bring to the attention of citizens what has been done. He said the board and the communities are deserving of the highest praise and congratulations for their accomplishments of which the benefits would flow to reach all areas of the communities.

He referred to the hospital as an industry but one administered in such a way as will be a healing fount of mercy and one of which the people of the area will be justly proud. It is a memorial, he said to the good service, good citizenship and good will of the people of the area.

Speaking on the general hospitalization program in the province, he said the government had wanted each citizen to have access to care at ward level. But, he said, they could not say to every community "here is a sum of money to build yourselves a hospital". The hospital could only be built if the people themselves came forward to provide necessary facilities. Hon. Mr. Donahoe said that now it is a real thrill to realize how right it was to place confidence in the citizens of the province. The citizens came forward, made the sacrifice and made possible the facilities for relieving suffering and caring for the health of the people. He stated that in a short time no person in Nova Scotia will be far away from proper hospital facilities.

In dealing with the federal plans for medicare to bring clinical help to the homes of citizens, Hon. Mr. Donahoe said that this would mean renewed sacrifices on the part of the people of Nova Scotia. The government, he said, has no innumerable resources except the pockets of the people. He said he believed the people of Nova Scotia would want to embark and participate in such a plan but "it won't come lightly". He said Nova Scotia would have to

bear a large part of the medicare load for the province but there would have to be a large measure of assistance to the province. He said that we in this province have less capacity to carry a load of equal size to the federal government which has so much greater capacity.

Hon. Mr. Donahoe was introduced by Mayor C. D. Snow, Digby.

The ceremonies were presided over by Mr. Purdy who welcomed the guests making special mention of Dr. H. L. Roberts who had come from Springfield, Mass., to attend the opening. Dr. Roberts was one of those who were responsible for hospital development in Digby, having been especially interested in the first hospital in Digby at the time of his early practice here. Dr. Roberts was accompanied here by Mrs. Roberts.

A special welcome was also given to Captain and Mrs. J. M. Paul, H. M. C. S. Cornwallis, who have always taken a personal interest in the new hospital.

Mr. Purdy also acknowledged the efforts of those who gave financial assistance and devoted many hours of work to realize the completion of the new Digby General Hospital. In reviewing the building financial planning he made special mention of \$25,000 which was contributed by the Hospital Ladies Auxiliary. Other finances included \$600,000 in federal and provincial grants, 650,000 from civic and municipal contributions and 105,000 from citizens and friends which included the \$25,000 mentioned above. He remarked that he hoped the hospital would soon be able to operate as a debt-free institution.

Special tribute was paid by Mr. Purdy to the late Dr. L. F. Dolron who had done so much toward the planning of the new hospital and who had attended the cornerstone laying in 1963. Mr. Purdy sincerely hoped, he said, that an area of the hospital might be dedicated in memory of Dr. Dolron.

Others who spoke briefly were His Worship Mayor C. D. Snow; E. J. Turcotte, architect; J. F. Rafuse of the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission and Seymour Kenney, building contractor. Mr. Rafuse, in congratulating Mr. Purdy said the hospital was among the top ten in the province in size and second to none except the teaching hospitals.

The invocation at the beginning of the ceremonies was given by Rev. H. S. Hartlin and the benediction pronounced by Rev. Father L. Gaudet. Afternoon tea was served by the Ladies Hospital Auxiliary when Mrs. C. D. Snow and Mrs. Sidney Smith presided at the tea table.

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About This And That

Can We Expect Utopia?

Prime Minister Pearson launched his party's election campaign with a pledge that he would not indulge in "sneers, sneers, slander and scuttlebutt." Three cheers for the P.M. We admire him for his stand. We hope he sticks to it and we would like to ask as much from his opponents. There is nothing we would like better than to attend a forthright political meeting and hear from either side a straight forward account of what has been accomplished and what the honest intentions are if elected. Nothing more is really necessary. We are, as we have so often professed before, all for a cleanly fought election and once in a while we must say we do get them.

But somehow, without wanting to be pessimistic about the matter, we are wondering if this particular election is one in which we really can expect to have what one might call a "clean," fought election without any (as the Prime Minister has put it) "sneers, sneers, slander and scuttlebutt." After all, this is a different situation. For one thing, despite the Prime Minister's pledge, the type of campaign which Lester B. Pearson tries to run might not be the type of campaign a majority of voters will run. The same for John Diefenbaker. But an even greater threat is the fact that if the Liberals and Conservatives and the splinter parties give an accurate account of themselves since last election, then the Rivard case and the subsequent inquiry will surely have to be mentioned. No matter how innocent or guilty the candidates themselves might be, here is the one spot where we fear for frayed nerves, hot tempers and rash words which will have reached the boiling point on all sides by November 8. This is the one spot which is likely, if any, to bring on "sneers, sneers, slander and scuttlebutt" for charges and denials will no doubt be rampant. Can we really expect the Utopia of clean election campaigns this fall?

Despite all this, which is bound to be part of the campaigning (it just can't help it), we feel that the voter should avail himself of every opportunity to hear all sides from the candidates. We sincerely believe this to be best. In what other way can one really arrive at a sound judgment in casting a ballot?

In our own constituency of Digby-Annapolis-Kings (by what we understand) there will be only the two candidates. John Shaffner for the Liberals and Patrick Nowlan, for the Conservatives, are two qualified men. We urge our readers to avail themselves of every opportunity to hear both whether or not your grandfather was Liberal or whether or not your grandfather was Conservative. It is **your** hand that casts the vote, it is **your** mind which is to be made up and to be intelligent about the matter, you must be informed.

Can we expect Utopia? While no situation really hands out a license to "sneers, sneers, slander and scuttlebutt," maybe it is really too much, owing to circumstances, to expect the Utopia in this regard in the present campaign. We can hope and try.

I do not like horror movies. I flatly refused to see Psycho, even though my husband was longing to see it. So far I have steered clear of even such widely acclaimed spine-chillers as Whatever Happened to Baby Jane? and Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte. The odd thing is, that whenever silent movie versions of Dracula, or The Hunchback of Notre Dame, or other horror classics are shown on television, I watch with delighted relish.

The real folk music buffs are the people who can appreciate some ninety year old lumberjack singing the songs his great grandfather taught him. I admire and envy those who can appreciate the truly indigenous songs of the people. It is their effort which is slowing down, if not stopping the inevitable loss of this important part of our culture. But, thank you, I like my folk music with a touch of sophistication. I will listen to the lumberjack's song when it is recorded by Peter, Paul and Mary, or The Brothers Four. I used to listen, though, for years, each Sunday afternoon, to a radio program of lumberjacks and fishermen's wives singing folk songs.

I happen to intensely dislike the commercial variety of cowboy music, but I caught myself listening with intense interest to some snatches of western music which were part of a memorial program to one of those singers who get themselves killed in aeroplane crashes with surprising regularity.

That was the first time I was aware of these incongruities. I wondered if I was suffering from a kind of snob-busness. Until then, I had thought that my particular brand of snobbery was directed to other snobs, bigots, and people who did not know anything I had learned prior to the day before yesterday. Now, I was in danger of being a radio station status snob as well. The program was coming over my favorite radio station. Perhaps I would have turned it off if the station had less prestige value to me. I dismissed these charges against me as false. After all, I religiously turn off a program of cowboy music which comes on that station at noon.

The plump woman on the blue screen was expounding on some religious interpretation my house guest and I did not share. My guest gestured toward the TV set with the end of the pillow over which she was pulling the case, and through the teeth which were clenched around the other end, asked me to turn off the set.

I listened for a while longer, congratulating myself quietly on my broadmindedness. I may not agree with the plump lady, I told myself, but by golly, I was willing to listen to her side. With the air of one who has achieved wisdom and maturity, but with a sort of patronizing deference to the young lady who had not, I walked slowly to the set and turned it off.

The guest settled in on the chesterfield, which is still our only spare room, and I wandered off to my bed. I had just turned down the blankets, and was about to crawl in, when I had one of those flashes of insight. The plump lady, the cowboy singer, the lumberjack and the horror movies fitted together. I wasn't, I decided, quite as broadminded and willing to listen as I had fancied myself, nor was I really a station prestige snob.

None of these people, I suddenly realized, had been talking directly to me. The plump lady was part of a documentary. She was speaking in person all right, but the producer was telling me that this was what she thought. The producer kept her from telling me that I ought to think the same thing. The cowboy singer was dead. I was hearing him on a record. This was how he had sounded, this was how his life had been. He was neither singing to me, nor asking me to listen to, or to like his song. Somebody else was telling me, as I listened to the folk songs that these were the words, and that this is the way the song is sung in its pure and true state. Even the old horror movies do not ask my particular spine to tingle. These are examples of what caused somebody else's hair to stand on end. I can watch and listen to all these things with detached interest. My ego is not involved.

Having solved this, I could not think of any practical application for my discovery. According to a recent news report, the only thing Canadians do more than watch television, is sleep, so I drifted off to the nation's second most popular activity.

What do you do on your birthday? You get up to the strain of Happy Birthday from the household (that could be just you), you admire the cake some kind relative was good enough to provide, you open your gifts and, if you are a woman, probably try hard to forget that this all means you are one year older. But, woman or man, there is one thing you just shouldn't forget. That is to sit down that very day and make application for your driver's license.

We heard at least two women say within the past week that they had forgotten their driver's license for two months and more after their birthday had passed. Maritime Cement Opens

Canada's most modern cement plant which is now in operation at Brookfield, N. S. was officially opened by Premier Stanfield of Nova Scotia on Wednesday, September 29.

This large \$14 million industrial complex is the first cement manufacturing plant ever to be built in the Province. The Maritime Cement Company Plant is the result of an agreement made between the Canada Cement Company, Ltd. and Industrial Estates Limited in June 1963.

The annual productive capacity of the new plant is 5,600,000 bags of cement which is being marketed under

The new plant at Brookfield is one of the most compact and modern mills of its kind. It features the latest equipment for both cement manufacture and the control of dust. Following modern industrial process trends, operation of the heart of the plant from raw material bins to cement storages is controlled from a central control room. Latest design X-ray equipment is used for chemical control.

Many of the buildings feature precast and prestressed concrete while most of the other structures are of conventional reinforced concrete. The construction of the plant called for some 60,000 cu yds of concrete and 6,300 tons of reinforcing steel. The steel mill plant which was erected to supply concrete for all structures was provided and operated by Atlantic Building Materials Limited.

The plant is located in one of the most scenic and beautiful sections of Nova Scotia near Shortt's Lake. Maximum advantage has been taken of this outstanding location and the natural beauty of the surroundings has been retained to enhance the appearance of this industrial complex.

The provincial road joining Brookfield and the plant property is now being paved in concrete by the Department of Highways of Nova Scotia; the work is well advanced and should be completed in the near future.

The operation of the plant requires approximately 25 million kilowatt hours of electrical energy each year. This power is supplied by the Nova Scotia Power and Light Co. Ltd. All equipment and supplies for the construction and the operation of the plant have been purchased locally wherever possible.

Over 750 men were employed during construction and approximately 100 permanent workers have been recruited locally.

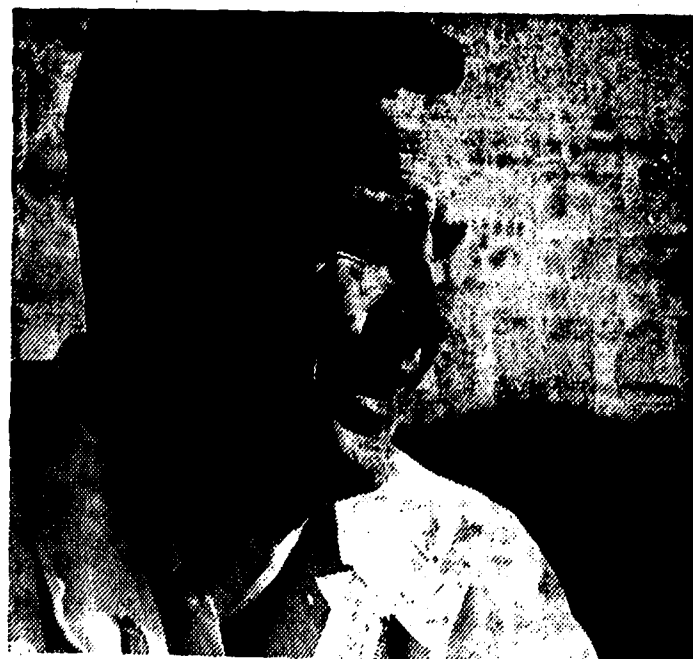

MANY CONGRATULATE NEW HOSPITAL

Statement By F. C. Purdy, President, Board of Directors Digby Hospital

The official opening of the new Digby General Hospital on Monday, September 27th, attracted a large group of interested citizens from Digby and the area served by the hospital. While everyone present must have experienced a feeling of quiet satisfaction over our recent achievement in the hospital field, a note of caution was sounded by the Honorable Richard Donahoe, Minister of Health, who indicated that the operation of the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance plan involves heavy sacrifices on the part of all the people of Nova Scotia. He stressed that caution must be exercised to insure hospitals are not constructed on a scale beyond the financial ability of the community to support. While generous capital construction grants have been made available from Provincial and Federal sources, nevertheless, it has not been government policy to completely relieve local communities of their responsibility with respect to these capital charges. Mr. Donahoe also indicated that plans for the future with respect to medical care may involve even greater sacrifices for the people of this province. Unfortunately, it is not generally understood that all services rendered by hospitals are not necessarily insured services nor is it always understood that non-insured services are the direct responsibility of the individual concerned. When individuals fail to meet their obligations, then the local hospital authorities must pick up "the tab" not the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission as is commonly understood. This places a

heavy burden upon hospital administration and makes it difficult, if not impossible, for hospital Boards to meet their capital obligations. The general public seems to operate on the premise that the 5% Hospital Tax covers all services rendered or required of local hospitals. This is definitely not so and unfortunately many segments of the public still refuse to accept assurance that certain services are not insured and must be paid for by the individual himself. Mr. Donahoe's remarks at the official opening should help to clarify current misconceptions that exist concerning hospital services that are or are not available to the public without cost.

In the operation of the Digby General Hospital every care is exercised to keep operational costs in line with those estimated and approved in our annual budget. To date we have been fairly successful in holding expenditures close to the line of Commission approvals. Nevertheless, considerable concern does exist, lest, inadvertently, our operational costs may exceed those expenditures that may reasonably be expected to be approved by the Provincial Rate Board. Since the per capita tax and differential revenue of the Digby General have been fully committed to those municipalities that provided capital assistance, the Hospital Board is left without adequate working capital and is restricted in its ability to reduce its current bank loan within a reasonable period of time. While public support of the hospital has been generous and gratifying, there is still

an urgent need for further financial assistance. Sponsorship of rooms in the hospital has provided substantial sums of money, nevertheless, the Board stresses an urgent need of greater financial assistance. It is the Board's earnest hope that many of those who are now more fully aware of our needs and who have not as yet contributed to the hospital construction fund may now feel impelled to do so. We would again remind our friends that they have need of hospital services and that the Digby General Hospital stands ready to provide these services at a high level of patient care. You need the hospital and the Digby General Hospital needs your support.

Medical Staff Extends Thanks

On behalf of the medical staff of the Digby General Hospital I wish to express our appreciation to all those who in any way made the New Digby Hospital an established fact.

To those whose contributions of cash helped pay the bills and particularly to the members of the Hospital Board and Building Committees who worked long and arduous hours.

Because of the pooling of their resources of money and effort we have in this area an up to date hospital with facilities second to none.

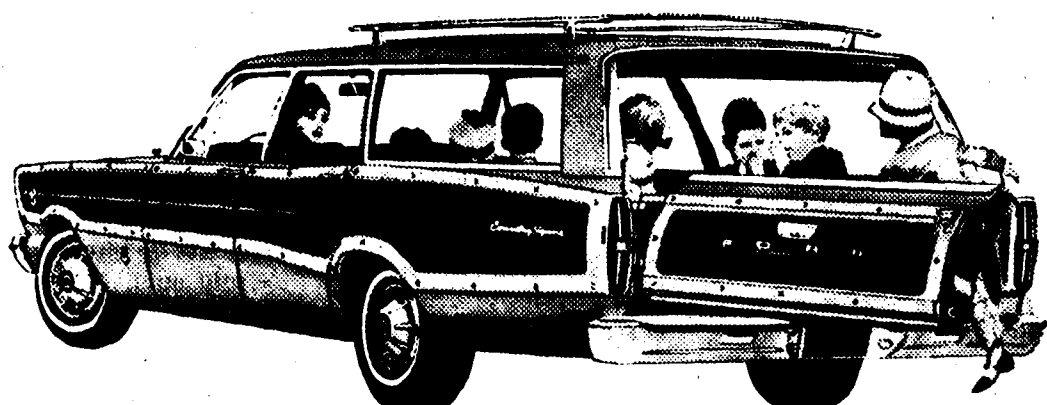

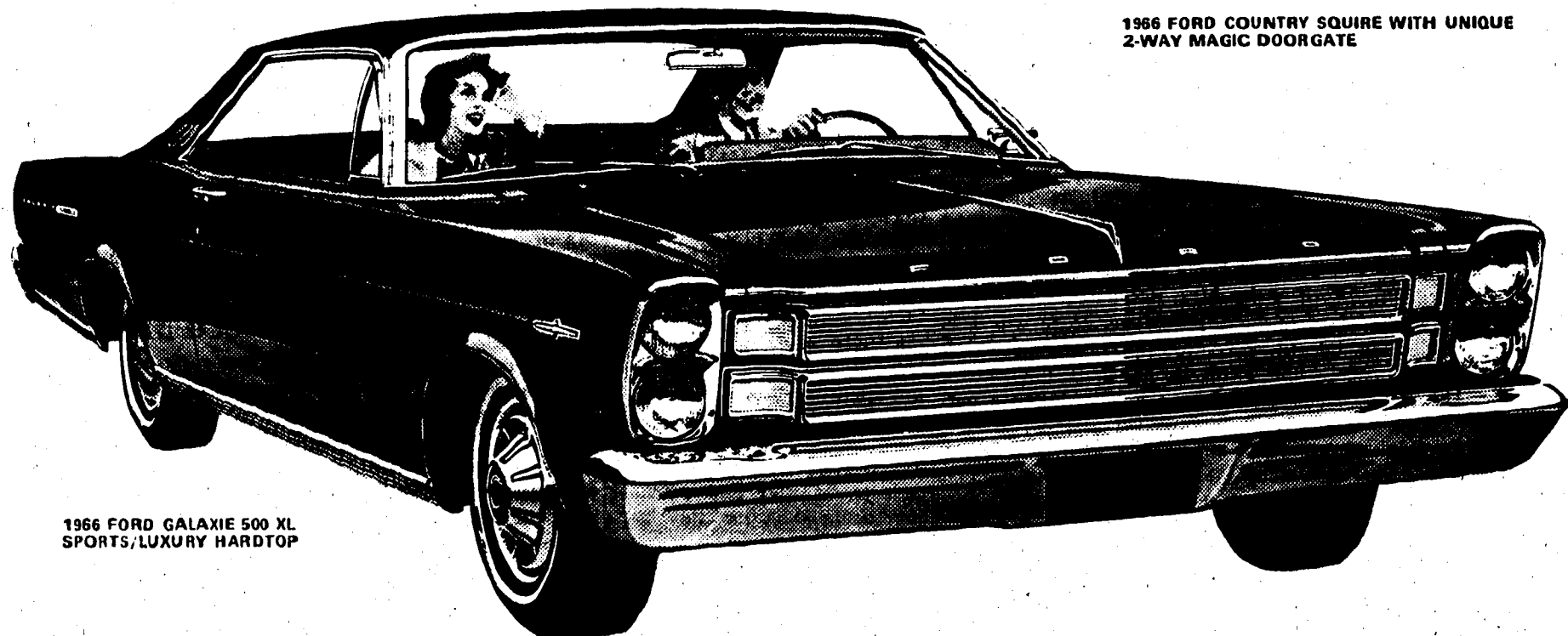

permit the service to be discontinued. In a jovial mood Nowlan pulled a scrap of paper from his pocket which he referred to as a telegram saying "The government is prepared to let a tender to build a barge to help the passengers get from the ferry to the land in Digby." He went on to say that it is not so much a ferry problem as a wharf problem.

Special speaker for the evening was National P. C. president Dalton Camp. He criticized J. J. Greene, who spoke at the Liberal meeting, for saying the opposition impeded legislation of the last government. Camp said no one so obstructed the business of the last government as did the government itself. The challenge of the opposition was to find what the policy of the government was.

The opposition forced the government to appoint the Dorion Commission because the Prime Minister was reluctant to act and forget what he was told, the speaker commented. It wasn't the opposition which made the Dorion Commission necessary. The opposition forced the government to face responsibility, Mr. Camp said.

Some of the P. C. policies were outlined by Mr. Camp. They included further increase per capita grants to universities and special consideration to universities whose enrollment is substantially increased by students from outside the province. He promised increased grants for scientific and medical research, new facilities for medical, dental and nursing training, to establish a capital fund to build teaching hospitals; extend family allowances to students at universities; reduce the cost of education to the home owner by permitting deduction of municipal property taxes from federal income tax and restrain chronically unemployed through the technical and training program and A.R.D.A.

Plans Made For Cottage Hospital In 1924

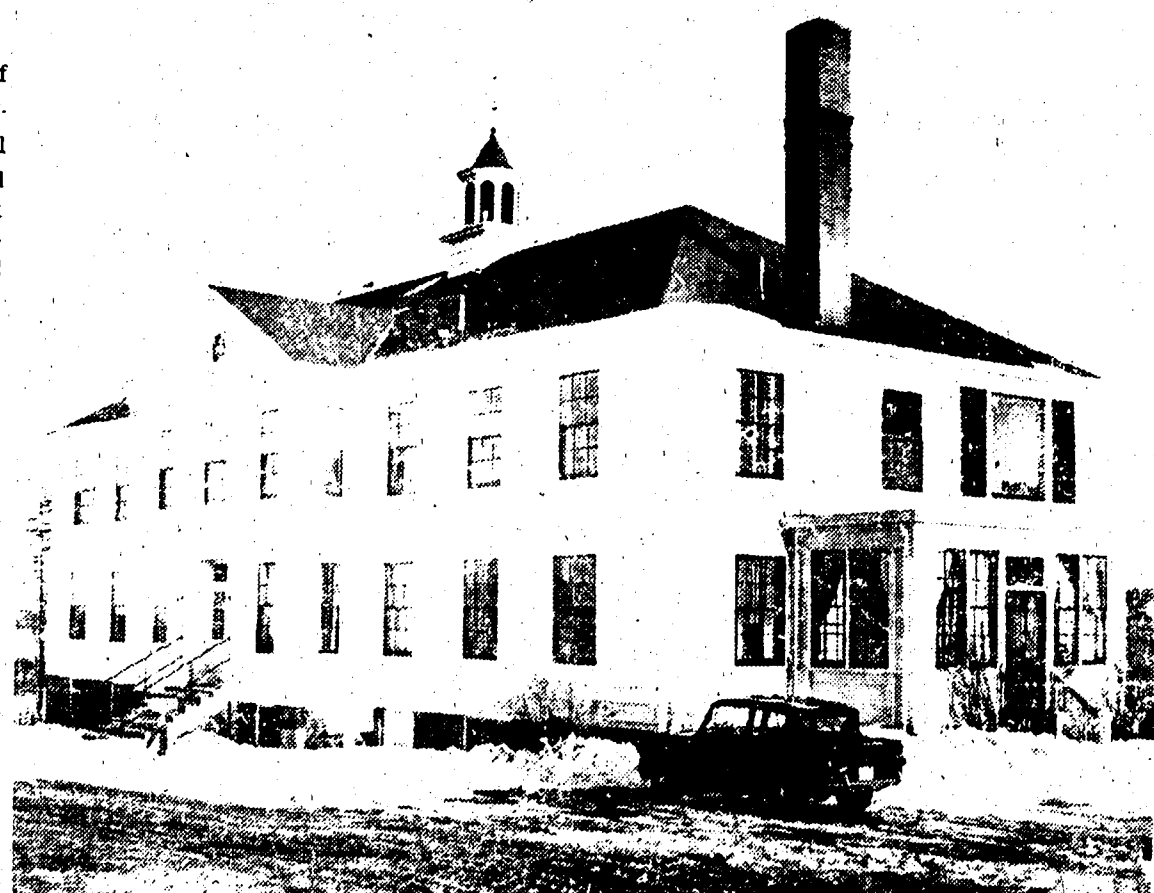
Seek To Establish Hospital

A delegation composed of the medical men of Digby appeared before Town Council on Monday, April 28, 1924, and outlined the scheme to start a semi-private hospital in Digby. The medical men received a sympathetic hearing. Dr. W. F. Read claimed that a small cottage hospital for the town of Digby was now a possibility. The need of such an institution is apparent to all, he said. It would be a most desirable step towards saving operations. The matter had been discussed a great deal by the medical community and the cooperation of the citizens of Digby was needed. Just how much support that would mean, he was not in a position to say, but they would have to get moral and financial assistance.

Miss Hill had decided to offer her home to be used as a cottage hospital. The lady was willing to put the place in condition for a hospital, and would do all she could to establish it, and was not asking for any guarantee in the shape of money. The doctors claimed that all they wanted was a responsible trusteeship appointed by the council so that a start could be made to establish a medical centre in Digby. A holding committee from the Town Council to handle donations was what the medical profession wanted, declared Mr. Roberts.

Decide to Open Hospital on Trial Basis

A meeting was held at the Court House on Tuesday, May 20, 1924, to discuss the advisability of establishing a private



Construction for Digby's second hospital, above, was started during the summer of 1930, and as far as possible local firms were given the work. Under the supervision of M. C. Denton, the work ran smoothly and well. Matron of the new hospital was Miss Hill, the same lady who had generously offered her home to be used as a semi-private medical centre in 1924.

Mr. C. Purdy, President of the V.O.N., said, "If we could only save one life by having a hospital here, then our labour would be well repaid, he continued. The only way to find out whether a hospital could be a success in Digby would be to give it a trial of six months or a year, declared Mrs. George Turnbull, secretary of the V.O.N. A motion to this effect was carried almost unanimously. An appeal for funds to equip and run the Digby hospital was solicited by the committee.

Digby hospital opened on Saturday, August 2, 1924, on a rented basis. Miss Catherine Mac Campbell, of Whycomagh, C. B., a graduate of Victoria General Hospital, was in charge. The operating room was on the ground floor and was well equipped. The bedrooms above were large and airy and everything was in readiness for the care and comfort of patients. It was the intention of the committee to hold a formal opening but the first patient admitted was critically ill, so the opening for the public had to be postponed.

A Man To Be Remembered



It was Dr. Linus F. Doiron, M.D., C.M., vice-president of the Digby General Hospital Board, who put the mementos into the strong box which was placed behind the cornerstone of the new Digby General Hospital on November 20, 1963. Honourable R. L. Stanfield, Q.C., I.D., Premier of Nova Scotia, officiated at the laying of that cornerstone.

This week another ceremony took place when the Premier cut the ribbon to officially open the same new Digby General Hospital. But there was one who participated in the cornerstone laying who was not here to participate at the official opening. Dr. L. F. Doiron's death occurred suddenly in the winter of 1965.

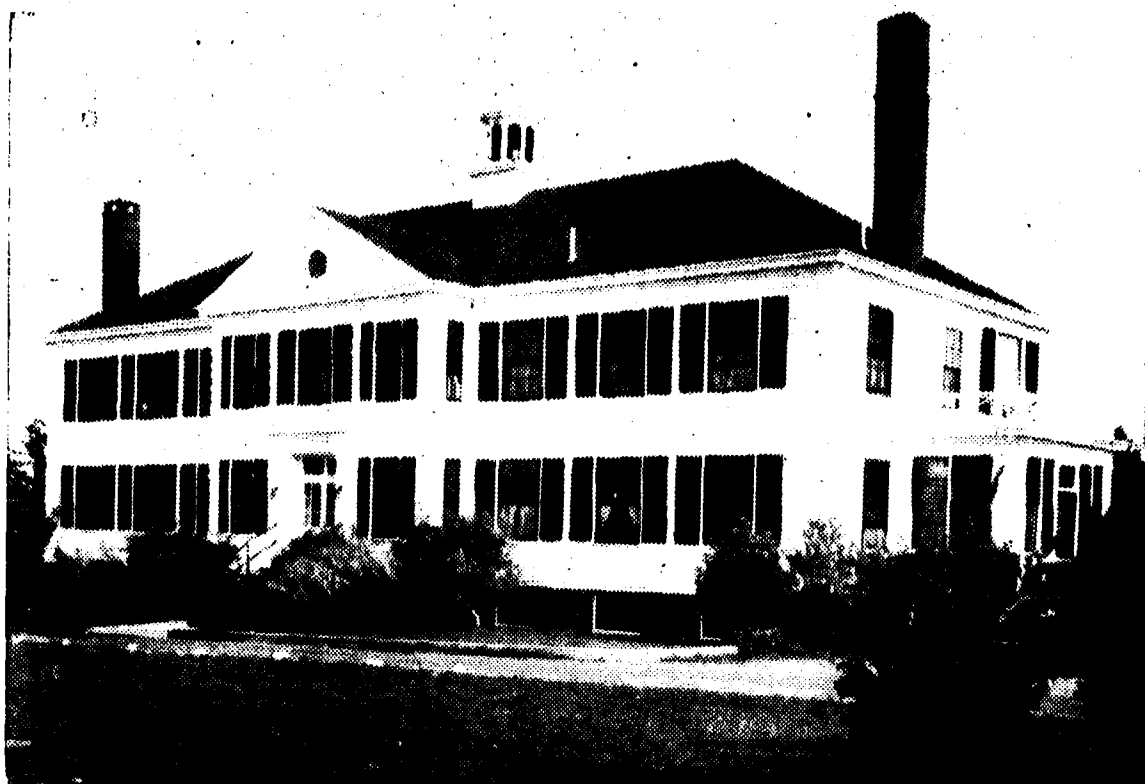
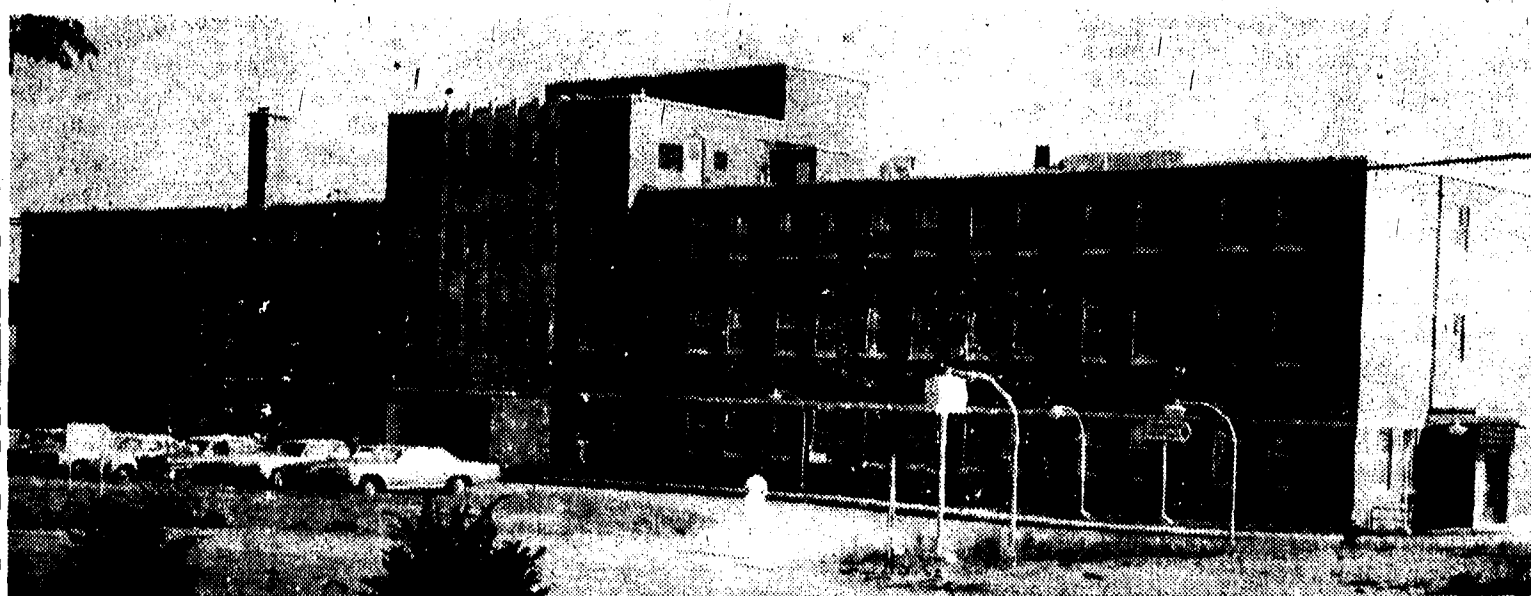

It is a prime example as to what can be accomplished through joint effort of all people when the need of such service is recognized and the effort applied to fulfill the need.

The finalizing of the plans has been the responsibility of the Digby General Hospital Board. Great was their task and great has been their accomplishment. Throughout the years, from the time of the formation of the first hospital board to the present day, great has been the benefits to the public from their dedicated service. The people are indeed grateful for the service rendered by the hospital board of the Digby General Hospital and the N. S. Hospital Commission shown by such a large attendance at the official opening. Another organization worthy of recognition and has given service beyond the call of duty is the Ladies Hospital Auxiliary. We are not only proud of our new hospital but proud of the people with such foresight and determination to fulfill the need of hospital care for all people needing such service.

The New . . . And The Old . . .



From the above pictures you can easily compare the old and new medical facilities in the Digby area. The top photo shows the new 90 bed Digby General Hospital which was officially opened Monday,

September 27, by Nova Scotia Premier Robert L. Stanfield. The structure will serve the 16,000 population of Digby, Annapolis West and East Clare. So far costs have amounted to approximately

\$1,600,000.00. The centre photo shows the old 28 bed hospital which was opened in 1931. This building is now being used as a nurse's residence. The bottom photo shows the old nurse's residence, built in

1944, and made possible by a gift of \$10,000.00. The donor of the gift was Harry F. MacLean, a millionaire contractor from Ontario who had erected the naval base HMCS Cornwallis.

F. C. Purdy Urges Greater Support For Hospitals By Governments

"Greater support and participation by Municipal and Provincial Governments must be forthcoming immediately if volunteer hospital boards are to maintain adequate hospital services and facilities at an acceptable standard and quality," declared F. C. Purdy, President, Nova Scotia Hospital Association.

Mr. Purdy, in a brief presented to a Joint Meeting of Directors of the Hospital Association and Members of the Nova Scotia Hospital Insurance Commission, made the following observations:

Unless local communities were able and willing by voluntary contributions to supply the capital costs and operating deficits of hospitals then Government at both Provincial and Municipal levels should now be concerned with the financial problems confronting volunteer members of hospital boards.

Text of Mr. Purdy's brief was as follows:

"We of the Hospital Association should very much like to introduce a topic which we feel is worthy of serious attention, namely, 'The duties and responsibilities of board members with respect to the provision of adequate and essential hospital services and more equitable methods for financing these services, than those already provided for in Hospital Insurance Act.'"

It is most essential that we should keep in mind that board members are voluntary workers who usually have full time commitments in the field of their normal vocation. These members must largely rely upon the advice and direction they receive from their hospital administrator. Cost projections and staffing patterns are brought to board attention through the proper channels, viz.: administrative recommendations. Boards have a major responsibility for devising ways and means designed to meet present and future capital costs and the amortization of existing obligations. Acting upon the advice of our administrative staffs we frequently approve expenditures for essential services only to learn at a later date that substantial portions of these expenditures have been assessed by the Hospital Commission as unsharable. Many boards are already faced with heavy commitments with respect to debt charges, often in excess of \$10,000.00 per month which must be financed at the local levels. How are these additional charges to be met when boards have committed their per capita tax and differential revenue to Municipalities which advanced monies to cover construction costs? It must be kept in mind that these additional expenditures were contracted, not as the result of irresponsible management, but rather to provide essential services for our patients, services which could not be provided within the frame of reference contained in approved budget. Local conditions determine salary rates for non-professional workers which cannot possibly be reconciled with existing provincial norms. Our hospitals, faced with heavy operational deficits, must either receive greater assistance through Government sources or reduce services below an acceptable minimum standard. This the public will not accept and a vehement public reaction can be expected in any area where hospitals attempt to curtail services to their patients.

Indeed, we are already approaching a stage where hospital boards are giving serious consideration to the possibility of mass resignation or turning the responsibility of hospital administration over to the Commission. As an association we are well aware that a very substantial portion of the funds raised by the 5% Hospital Tax is going to other areas than the support of our local hospitals. How then, can we reasonably state that there is not sufficient funds to

adequately finance the operation of our local hospitals?

This problem is not being raised merely as an expression of dissatisfaction over limitations placed upon our local autonomy, or because of disappointment over budget decisions but rather as an honest and constructive approach to a solution of a grave and urgent problem directly concerned with our hospitals' inability to meet commitments arising out of decisions of the Hospital Insurance Commission assessment of expenditures as unsharable costs. It is our well considered opinion that local boards are being gradually squeezed out of the picture through very arbitrary rulings of the Hospital Insurance Commission which fail to give proper consideration to those local conditions which render it impossible for our hospitals to operate within the framework of fixed norms operative in the Province as a whole or which apply only to our larger and more affluent boards," concluded Mr. Purdy.

Commenting on Mr. Purdy's remarks, Dr. G. G. Simms, Executive Director of the N. S. Hospital Insurance Commission, observed that the Provincial Hospital Act pays for insured services only. The Hospital Insurance Commission has no responsibility with respect to the matter of capital financing of hospitals. "We are responsible for the approval of Provincial and Federal construction grants," he said. Dr. Simms pointed out that in 1964 hospitals received \$893,000.00 from preferred accommodation. "This money," he observed, "could be used by hospitals for any purpose they chose." In addition, he noted that the per capita tax distributed to hospitals in 1964 amounted to \$704,000.00. Dr. Simms cautioned hospital boards against attempting hospital expansion programmes beyond the limits of the community's financial resources.

Michael Macdonald, Executive Director of the N. S. Hospital Association, pointed out that notwithstanding present government assistance in the form of grants, etc., hospital boards still had to find over 60 percent of construction cost for new hospital facilities.

Another matter of concern to hospitals is the apparent over-staffing of nurses in some provincial hospitals. Dr. Simms informed the Joint Meeting that this matter was of real concern to the Commission as well. He announced that an Institute would be held shortly in Halifax in an attempt to find a solution to this problem. Hospital board members, administrators, and directors of nursing will be invited to attend the Institute. He revealed that at the present time some Nova Scotia hospitals were giving the greatest amount of nursing care per patient day in Can-

ada. "We do not want the quality and standard of patient care lowered in this Province, however, because nursing services represent the highest single salary cost in the hospital, it is imperative that we keep our standards in line with the national average," he concluded.

Joint Meetings of the two bodies were instituted three years ago. The purpose of the meetings is to effect a closer liaison in matters of mutual concern in order to find solutions to many of the problems of providing hospital services throughout the Province.

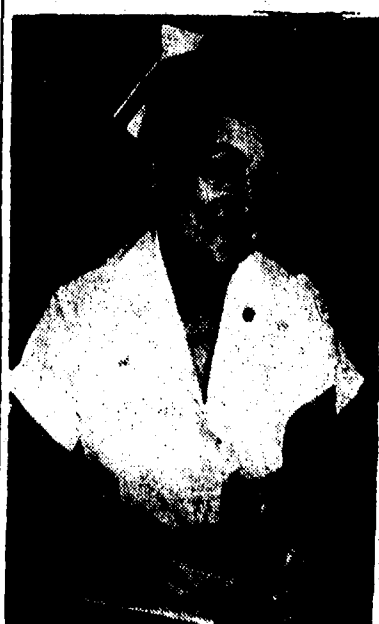
J. D. McClearn, Chairman of the Pension Committee, reported that the Committee were presently studying changes required in the present Plan in order to co-ordinate the Hospital Plan with the Canada Pension Plan.

John D. Mosher, Chairman of the Joint Salary & Personnel Policy Committee, presented a report covering the setting up of a salary guide for all hospitals. The report will be reviewed by the Joint Meeting on October 2nd.

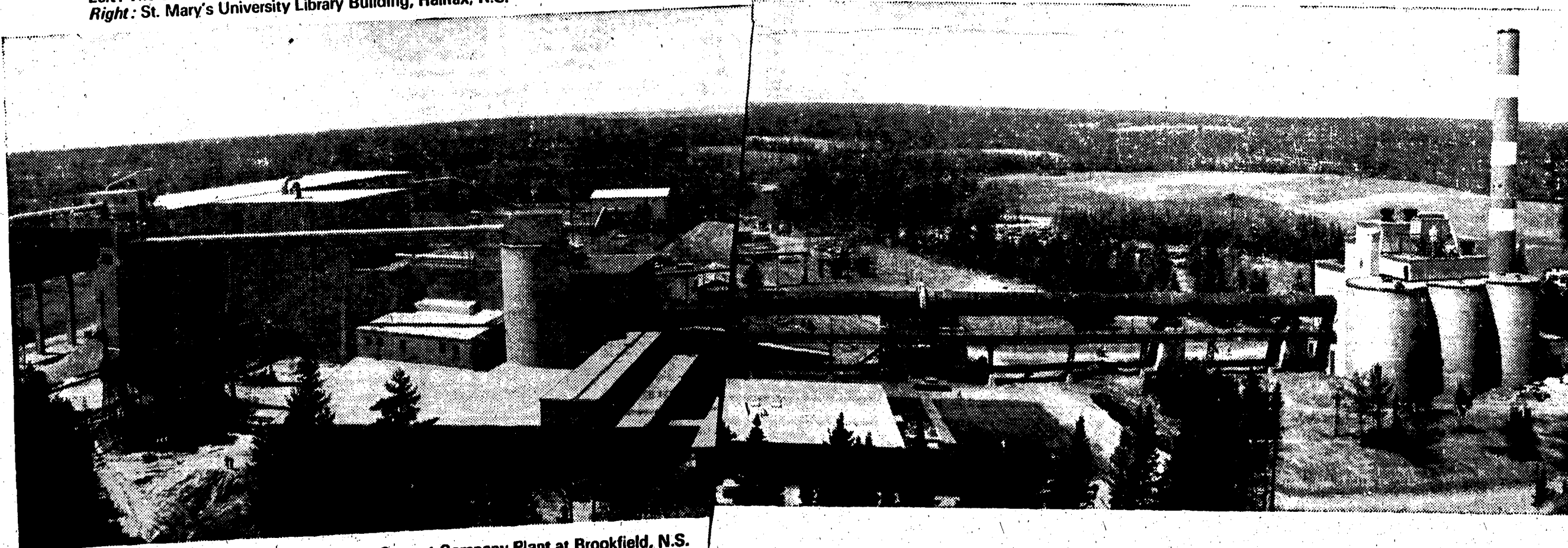
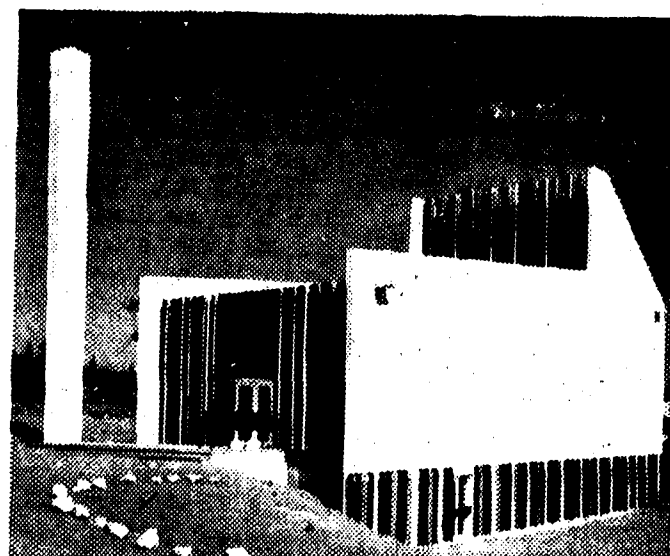
