

A new 98 foot longliner, as a training unit. Following sea training recruits may elect to take further training at the fisheries training centre in Pictou, The Judy and Linda IV was built at Snydereae in Dayspring and underwent initial sea trials early last week. The essel sailed from **Yarmouth** Sunday with an eight man crew for another trial run. It is expected to take its first complement of trainees to sea later this month. One of the most modern of its type, the vessel can be adapted to dragging and purse seining. Powered by a 540 horsepower marine diesel engine, it is equipped with an echo sounder, radio telephone, two loran sets, two radar sets and a

United. States as a pro. His experiences are a staggering indictment of i's thoughtless inhumanity to man.

How much, I wondered, as I looked at the woman ass the table, of racial, religious, and moral prejudice erpetuated by kindly bigots like her ,and perhaps like and you, rather than those others, the deliberately al bigots. Did you ever hear anybody ascribe any racteristic, good or bad, to the whole of the group to ch he belongs? We all belong to a group of individ-. The "they" who cannot be trusted, or who have moral standards, or who are avaricious, or carefree, are somebody we are not. "They" can be Chinese, or 's, or Australians, or New Brunswickers, or Baptists, he family down the street, as long as they are not us, as long as they are someone we do not particularly at the present time.

A good deal of this kindly bigotry is, or used to ew years ago, provided by the schools. I remember ng my school days, several incidents which drove ne the lesson of bigotry quite effectively. On one ocon, I remember, some incident involving race prece occured on the school grounds. I have long ago jotien the incident, but I will never forget the teachwho, in what she thought was a display of tact, waituntil one day when the two Negro children in the m both happened to be absent. "You know," she an the lecture which was supposed to chide us for misdeeds, "everybody envies the white people."

Since I was about twelve, I have wondered about Negro boy who applied for a course in Latin. The ming voice of authority came slowly, as if pondering subject. "No, lad, I don't think so." it said. The boy I nothing. It was, I think, his first day in a new school. knew, and I know, and maybe some others in the s knew, that a door had been very effectively closed him by the hand of a prejudice which I do not think, nded to be cruel.

One of our teachers told us, as a fact, that all proes were musical, but had not artistic talents, while North American Indians were artistic but had no underiding of music. Armed with a glossary of similar misrmation, we kindly bigots set out in the world. When meet a tone deaf Negro, we say, how strange, his ple are all musical. When we meet a generous Scotsn ,we say he isn't stingy like other Scotsmen, and, with confidence in the exception which we think proves rule, we go our kindly, bigoted way.

Oh well. Once a year comes Brotherhood Week, when all us kindly bigots, of whatever persuasion get a chance to show all those odd people who are not us, that we really do think they are as good as we are.

This year I am not sad about the coming of autumn. We have had a long hot summer, a lovely summer, e cept for the brief week when the well went dry. We have eaten sumptiously of our own peas and beans, corn and onions, radishes and lettuce. A winter's supply of potatoes squast, and pumpkins has been laid in the cellar. The cucumbers have been made into pickles, and the crab runtes shine in their jelly glasses like pale, shimmering rubies. There is a feeling of warmth and security about the impending winter.

The fall fairs are over. We have been to them in nounced by the Honourable L neighbouring villages, up and down the road. Our village held its one hundred and sixteenth annual fair. The ladies of the village preen themselves in simulated modesty, and gloat about the prizes they wo. \ Mrs. Logan entered eleven ifems, and got eleven prizes. "I didn't think that was too bad." She says. Mrs. Sands cannot imagine what went wrong with her angel food cake this year. Well, next year she will rally from the disaster. Our children ought to get some sort of prize for being the children who had the most rides on the farris wheel.

We were invited to the Judges Dinner on the opening night of the fair. This dinner, which is one of the highlights of the social year in the village, dates as far back as the fair does. Long ago, after discharging their duties, the judges used to retire to the inn for a hearty feed. There is no inn now, but the judges still retire to a building on the fair grounds, inexplicably named The Aberdeen, where me ladies of the C.W.L. cook and serve a meal which must equal, if not surpass the repasts served in that forgotten inn during the last century.

Now, one by one, the winter activities are starting. School, of course started weeks ago. University in the nearby town is beginning. Children are going back to Sunaday school and music lessons. Ladies call each other up to remind their friends of church groups, and Women's Institute. "Are you going to curl this year?" is the standard greeting.

In the last place we lived, there was a bowling al ley in the basement of one of the churches. Bowling, there, was the local sport. Every one took it deadly seriously. Everybody knew who was good and who was awful, Hanging in her hair. which teams were easy to beat, and von the required extra effort, Here, the attitude oward curling is just about like that. The curling rink is one of the centres of social activity. For a small community, our rink, and the club rooms, are quite smartly turned out, well decorated, and comfortable. There are two pleasant lounges. In the lower one there is a small canteen, and a glass wall through which you can see the activity on the ice without even getting your feet cold. The upper one is large, spacious enough that long tables can be put there for suppers. When the tables are cleared out, ladies groups hold teas, and those other functions ladies like. The greatest delight of this curling club, which is situated on the fair grounds, is that the ice surface is reconverted to the purpose for which the building was erected - - a cattle barn.

The fall catalogues are getting dog-eared. We check the clothes we think the kids will need for the winter, and then cross out the checks as we find that somebody's last winter's jacket will do for somebody else this winter, and the relatives come across with a new set of hand-medowns. Then new check marks are made, as we find that the clothes we were sure would fit have shrunk an inch at wrists, ankles, and waists. Even my messy little three year old, who usually looks like a refugee from a flash fire, likes to show me the clothes she would like. It is encouraging.

And, I am still looking for a pattern gorgeous! enough to make up that beautiful, autumnal, blue, grey, and rust tweed His Nibs bought me.

We are betting that should officials not see fit to come, then, a delegation will hang around doorsteps in Ottawa and Haiifax until they are given an opportunity to speak their piece.

All of these students missing one day a week are children too old to content themselves all day at home with mother cutting paper dolls or building castles with plastic blocks. They are students who are too young to occupy that day by getting a paying job to fill in the day. (And where would there be jobs anyway?) Other than Saturday there are not the organized sports to fill in a whole day for these students. In other words, they are pretty well left to drift the day away. Does a situation like this make sense, we ask you? We want a forum to keep the children busy, out of mischief, and to provide wholesome, healthy recreation for their growing bodies. On the other hand we let them idle a day away. This has been a concern of ours since we realized that some students were missing one day a weak. Yet, this, we were given to understand, was the best and only solution the school authorities could devise to overcome the dilemma of shortage of space.

There is one thing certain, in a situation such as this, if we need the extension at all we need it desperately. When it comes to crowding to the extent of missing classes, then, an extension is necessary cost it what it will. We have this to consider - if the absence from school for classes has been made necessary by space shortage, how long will such a situation have to continue in case of nonconstruction? What year hence will the decline in school population rectify such a situation? At least the ratepayers are entitled to all the arguments for and against and it could be found that an extension is imperative. Any alternatives, anybody?

Special DEER HUNT

Cumberland County NOV. 10th - 30th

Chignecto Game Sanctua >

Since the extreme winterkill of 1960-61, at which time as many as 30 deer per square mile were found dead from malnutrition and related causes, the number of deer wintering in the Sanctuary has been increasing

annually. To prevent continuing range damage and recurrence of the 1960-61 tragic resource waste a special hunt in the Sanctuary has been recommended for November 10-30 for 75 hunters per day.

This hunt will serve three major purposes.

1. Provide additional hunting opportunity to resident big game hunters. 2. Reduce the over-wintering population thus benefitting both deer

and range.

3. Provide important biological data on the herd in the area.

For this special hunt the Sanctuary has been divided into three zones. Zone One will support 15 hunters per day and Zone Two 20 hunters per day entering through the check station at the Chignecto Base Camp on the Boars-Back Road between River Hebert and Halfway River East. Zone Three will support 40 hunters per day who will be entered through the check station at the Harrison Settlement entrance.

Permits to hunt on the Sanctuary will be issued daily on a first come basis in accordance with regulations.

The regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 8th day of October, A.D. 1958 pursuant to the provisions of Section 154 of the Revised Statutes, 1954, the Lands and Forests Act, are amended by adding thereto the following regulation:

8 (1) Notwithstanding any other provision in these regulations, the Minister may by written authorization permit not more than seventy-five hunters to enter the Chignecto Game Sanctuary each day, except Sunday, to hunt deer and bear between the 10th and 30th days of November in the year 1966.

(2) Every person hunting in the Chignecto Game Sanctuary shall (a) apply for a permit at, and enter the Sanctuary through, the check stations located at Base Camp No. 1 on the Boars-Back Road and Harrison Settlement.

(b) possess a valid Resident's Big Game License and a tag; (c) obtain and wear an identifying marker to be issued at the

check stations. (3) Every person authorized to hunt in the Chignecto Game Sanctuary during the said period shall

(a) follow all instructions with respect to hunting in the (b) comply with all provisions of the Act and regulations with

regard to hunting; (c) report not later than 5:30 p.m. to a checking station before leaving the Sanctuary on the day for which a permit is issued

and file a report as required by the Regulations. (d) turn over to authorized personnel, the reproductive tract

and lower jaw of any deer killed or taken within the Sanctuary. (4) (a) No person authorized to hunt within the Chignecto Game Sanctuary shall kill or take more than one bear and one deer within the Sanctuary

(b) The bag limit specified for deer under Section 120 of the Act shall include any deer killed or taken pursuant to a permit issued under this Regulation.

(5) A permit to hunt in the Sanctuary shall be valid for the day on which it is issued,



"In Flanders fields, the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row That mark our place . . ."

This year on November 11 at countless numbers of war memorials and cenotaphs across Canada thousands of people will be gathering for the traditional Remembrance Day services. Once again, the mournful notes of the Last Post will sound throughout the land. Again at eleven o'clock the sounds of a busy and industrious national will become quiet while the country observes the traditional two minutes of respectful silence. Once more the honour roll will be read and for one short day Canadians will pause to remember the supreme price that thousands of young more and women paid that we might enjoy the privileges of a democratic society today.

> "Take up our quarrel with the foe To you from failing hands we throw The torch: be yours to hold it high."

As these soldiers laid down their lives they left with us an immense responsibility, a responsibility that too many people take too lightly. They put their faith in us. They trusted in us to carry on where they let-off. They trusted in us to continue the battle against all that Hitler and his secret service agents stood for: police states, racial and religious intolerance and wars.

The battle did not end with the defeat of the Axis powers as many of us like to think. Everywhere, in all parts of the world, the things our soldiers died to eliminate still exist. It is now our turn to fight, not with guns and bombs but with works and principles. They have thrown us the torch of freedem when they could carry it no further. However, I fear that we have neglected our duty and let that torch burn so low that it may well be in danger of becoming extinct.

> "If ye break faith with us who die, We shall not sleep though poppies blow In Flanders fields."

Certainly, Remembrance Day should be partially devoted to remembering past battles and past victories. BUT should it not also be an occasion for some real soul searching? Should we question ourselves, "Did our soldiers die in vain? Are we letting them down?" Our war dead gave up their lives that we might continue the battle. We owe it to them, to ourselves, and to our descendants to carry on the fight for all.

Therefore, let us not dwell in the past but look to the future. Would they not have wanted it that way? The best and most fitting memorial service that we can offer up would be one of dedication in which we pledge our full strength and resources to continue to 'fight the good fight' until all racial and religious prejudice. bigotry, and strife are wiped from the surface of the earth.

In the past our soldiers had no alternative but to use weapons of destruction to insure the right. Now we must take up our weapons: love, tolerance, and understanding. Our soldiers in the past have done their share; now it is up to us. So on this Remembrance Day and on all Remembrance Days to come let us remember the dead and truly honour them by concentrating ourselves to the fight until all are free.

ANNAPOLIS - DIGBY ASSESSMENT REGION The following is an excerpt from the Assessment Act

Chapter 3 - 1966. Sec. 41 — Household furnishings and personal effects in any real property occupied for residential purposes shall not be

(2) Notwithstanding any other Act of the Legislature, the occupier of real property occupied for residential purposes shall be assessed an occupancy assessment in the amount of twenty per cent of the assessable value of the real property wholly or partly occupied by him for residential purposes, which assessable value shall be determined in the manner

provided by the following subsections. (3) If the real property is a house and land connected herewith, with or without out buildings, the assessable value of the real property so occupied is the assessment of the house and the land reasonably connected therewith as determined by the assessor pursuant to this Act.

(4) If a real property so occupied is part only of a property that has been assessed as an entirety, the assessor shall determine the assessable value of that part which is the place so occupied and the land reasonably connected therewith, but no reduction shall be made merely because rooms or space under the control of the occupier are not used. (5) If a real property is partly occupied for residential

purposes and partly occupied for other purposes, the assessor shall determine the assessable value of that part of the real property that is occupied for residential purposes, (6) If a real property is occupied for residential pur-

poses by more than one occupier, the assessor shall determine the assessable value of that part occupied by each of (7) There shall be an occupancy tax which shall be pay-

able by every occupier of real property for residential purposes and shall be calculated by applying the tax rate determined under Section 135 of the Town's Act and Section 144 of the Municipal Act, to the occupancy assessment determined under this section.

(8) The word "occupier" as used in this Section mean; (a) the husband where a husband and wife live to-

(b) the father or other head of the family, where a family lives together; (c) an individual occupying premises by himself: (d) each of the individuals occupying premises to-

gether under circumstances other than those which clauses (a) or (b) would apply; (e), executors, administrators, guardians, trustees or other persons who would have been assessed for the household furnishings and personal effects but for

this Section. (9) Except for the method of assessing and rating, an occupancy tax shall have the same effect under and for the ourposes of the remaining provisions of this Act as if it were a tax based on the assessment of personal property made n the normal manner. (R. S. c15 s18 r4A.)

S., and Port aux Basques, Nfld., to handle the increasing flow of freight across the Cabot Strait. The Canadian built ship preriously plied between Florida and Cuba, and was purchased by the Department of Transport ove the Newfoundland freight service. She was extensively modified for the Cabot Strait service and re-named the Patrick Morris to commemorate a leading figure in Newfoundland's drive for self-government who was a colleague of Dr. William Carson. The ship carries containerized freight between the two terminals. She is 435 feet long, 70 feet wide and has a draft of 16 feet. Her twin screws are powered by 10,000 h.p. reciprocating steam engines, and she has a bow thruster for greater manoeuverability. She has accommodation for a crew of 65 officers and men.

3 Where will the 200 high school students go for recreaion area?

Many of the difficulties which have placued the Wey-r nouth School stem from the fact that insufficient thought as given to its location in the first place. The site is cold and exposed to the full blast of the north wind, inaccessible ipart from a dangerous causeway, and there is not a level pot in all the 13 acres for a sports or playground area. If he new building has to be located on this site, then it may e that a better location would be near the bus garage which should never been built where it is') A careful con ideration of just which grades will be housed in the new lassrooms is necessary. Indeed, it may well be that what he school really needs is not plain classrooms at all, but a cience laboratory, a music room, a stage, more changing noms, and so on.

Unless care is taken with the building programme the result will be a school that is inconvenient, expensive to perate, and needlessly difficult for students and staff to vork in. Too often in the past considerations of economy 15.2% have turned out to be no economy at all and have led to lifficulties of operation and often needless expense later on.

What better lesson in living than to observe the things of the wildrness and to catch glimpses of the thousands of life cycles in all creatures and plants in the sea and on the earth.)

If the people of Nova Scotia are a special breed of their own, it is because of their heritage. The peninsula offers its nhabitants and those outsiders who are fortunate enough to discover it, a vast store of original beauty . . . one that holds history in its hand and no apologies for it. The very tides bring to mind, twice a day, that nature is the most powerful, force and must not be tampered with by a mere whim.

My cry is to discourage the wanton construction of causeways that take the tides out of rivers, of the smoke stacks and utter lack of planning that blight Saint John, the straightening of too many of the road's curves, the unsightliness of roadside stands that foster trash flying all around that precious countryside, and the general ruin of the place where I hope to live when things work out here.

Doubtless others have felt this same fear at the thought of what "progress" could do to the hills and vales How horrible! Think of living in Florida every year of Nova Scotia. Perhaps you as an editor see the other side . the need for more work for the people, the need for the im-

provement in transportation to encourage tourists, and the need for places to lodge them, which means those ghastle modern type morels, and much more. 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

"Breakfast's ready!" Doctors agree that breakfast is the most important meal of the day, especially in winter, so send your children off to school well fed. Orange juice, scrambled eggs and bacon, hot chocolate, and some of mom's home-made muffins will keep them full of vim and vigour until lunch

Are you a good muffin maker, or does your batch always turn out coarse and dry? The secret of muffin making is in the mixing. Keep it to an absolute minimum—a light stirring for 10 to 20 seconds and positively no longer. There will be lumps in the dough, but don't worry. If you bent the batter too long. the dough becomes tough, producing a coarse muffin full of tunnels. Bake for 20 minutes in a preheated oven at 400°F, Remember, too slow an oven will cause muffins to sink in the middle, too high will give them cracked, wobbly tops. Happy breakfasts!



It was also recommended that these boundaries be prepaired in a paper and that copies would go to all wardens, councillors and fire departments in preparation for the annual meeting of the municipal council in January.

The boundaries as outlined by the association and agreed to by each fire department covers most areas from Bear River to Weymouth, Bear River will be responsible for Bear River, No 1 highway to Smith's Cove at Berry's Brook, all side roads. Their boundary is joined to Digby coverage from Berry's Brook at Smith's Cove where all main highway and side roads are covered from this point to the Catholic Church in Marshalltown. Coverage is also provided by Digby to Hillgrove, Conway, Acaciaville. Acacia Valley, Bay View, Culloden, Mount Pleasant and Digby, Neck Road to the junction of the Culloden Road and all areas in between these points. THE BIRTH OF A BABY

By Mrs. John Outhouse

"For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour who is Christ the Lord" — Luke 2:11.

How eagerly married couples await the birth of a baby -- an addition to the family e. However, the birth of Christ was not, as in the case of most babies, to one family but rather to the whole race - to give light to those who walk in the darkness of sin. and to provide a "way" of obtaining eternal life.

Also, unlike most babies. Christ's birth was anticipated and prophesied hundreds of; years before the event took

Hundreds of years before Christ's lovely birth, the Old Testament was written, as has! been said. "to pave the way for His coming." at 1st, these prophesies were vague and to some of us hold no specific reference to event, Genesis 3:-1 15, and Psalms 110:1. But the golden threads of prediction extended onward until they became more specific, definite and abundant. So by the time one reaches the end of the Old Testament one is likely to feel these references cannot apply to any other person in history but Christ.

Isaiah, Old Testament prophet (of whom the New Testament reveals, "Saw the Glory of Christ and spoke of Him -John 12:14) pointed out in Chapter 2 the law would go forth out of Zion. In Chapter 7:14, Isaiah gave us a more specific donation: "Therefore," the Lord Himself shall give you a sign: Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son and shall call His name Immanuel. (fulfilled in Mat. 1.23) Isaiah further revealed in Chapter 9:6, "For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given: and the government, shall be upon His shoulders and his name shall be called Wonderful, Councillor. The Mighty God. The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace."

Even the herald who was to come before Jesus to prepare His Way was predicted by Isaiah in chapter 40: 3-5, and also foretold in Malachi 4:45 (Mathew 7:10-13).


