How often since have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the June 1941 "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring season of 1941 got together just before dark one evening and decided to initiate the newly built outdoor Pease Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around and the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits, up in the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pease Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars (second world and Korea), was awarded the Vietnam Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent draughtsman for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale importer and bookshop; and myself.

As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was told to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Bay, and thence runs from Annapolis Town, and six miles distant east from the head of M. May's Bay. This laid out first, the water's edge, partly on level ground, and partly on the declivity of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having on an eastern aspect a view of the Annapolis Bay, and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in extent. It terminates with the Fort and River's mouth at that name. Valley Boards President Encouraged By Hearing

Bernard LeBlanc, Bellevue's Cove, president of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade was spokesman for a 21 man delegation which met with federal government officials last week, submitting a brief in reference to more modern transportation facilities between South Western Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The delegation had representatives from both provinces.

In issuing a statement on the meeting Mr. LeBlanc had this to say, "We are confident that our request for improved ferry service between Digby and Saint John will be met and we have every expectation that a specific proposal will be put forward very shortly by the Federal authorities."

We are also encouraged by the interest shown in this matter by the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; this augurs well for the type of co-operative participation which is necessary of a project of this nature to be of constructive results.

We feel that with a continuing indication of support from the Provincial authorities, we will be able to work out substantial improvement in this vital and essential transportation link.

We are very heartened by the interest shown by the Federal Government as witnessed by the presence of 4 Cabinet Ministers, Messrs. Pickersill, MacEachen, Winters and Robichaud. We are particularly grateful to our own Cabinet representatives, the Honourable Allan J. MacEachen, for the personal interest he has taken in this project and for the strong support he has given to the objectives set up in our brief."

The brief stated that the logical and proper link between Southwestern Nova Scotia and New Brunswick is the ferry service from Saint John to Digby. The present service between Saint John and Digby is completely inadequate, the brief stated. The brief continued "The ship makes only one return trip per day, operating only six days of the week. It is completely unable to handle bulk carload shipments; it is of only limited value to the tourist trade. Small freight and express shipments and packaged carload quantities are handled, on the ship, but costs are high due to excessive handling, and delays more than offset the advantages that should exist over such a short route. This situation is one of the reasons for the retarded economic development of the area and proof of this statement is to be found in the fact that very few of the new industries being lo-

cated in Nova Scotia during recent years have come to Western Nova Scotia, despite all federal incentive programs. The problems of transportation into and out of the area, as they now exist, are unreasonable.

People in Western Nova Scotia have been awaiting impatiently for more than ten years believing that the terminal at Digby was to be modernized. In point of fact, however, the years have gone by and nothing has been done. The patience of the people is becoming exhausted and they are beginning to lose faith and confidence in the future of the area unless adequate transportation is provided. This lack of confidence has a depressing effect on business and investment and thus a tremendous potential which could be derived from the character of the people in Western Nova Scotia, and from the otherwise favourable geographical conditions, climate, soil, fishing ports, and so on, will not fully be developed until better transportation facilities are provided.

The New Brunswick representatives in supporting the brief maintained that a modern Bay of Fundy service is vital to the industrial expansion of their province as a whole and specifically its major growth centre of Saint John.

Traditionally the brief stated, the Saint John — Digby service has played a significant role in the tourist industry to the advantage of both provinces. This role will only be exploited to its full potential by a modern and efficient frequent daily crossing. The potential of American and Canadian tourist trade is unlimited, the brief claimed.

The brief signed by Mayor Arthur L. Gould, Saint John, N. B., and Mayor C. D. Snow, Digby, specifically asked that the Government of Canada give a definite commitment to the following: "The provisions of the necessary modern terminal facilities and that such facilities be constructed to meet present and foreseeable requirements of the operating company;

"The encouragement of the operating company to proceed immediately with the construction or acquisition of a modern vessel providing fully integrated service for the varied traffic that will be handled between the ports of Digby and Saint John.

"That the construction of such docks, cargo and passenger handling terminals be designed so as to provide the facilities for a multiple daily service on the basis of a seven-day week and on a year-round schedule;

"The brief further proposed

that a service be fully integrated to accommodate all types of transport and vehicular traffic including the carriage of trucks and tractor-trailer combinations with or without power units;

"That adequate provision be made for the comfort of the travelling public including stateroom facilities, overnight accommodations, restaurant and other amenities demanded today;

"That the rate and fare charged to the public should be maintained at a minimum charge in order to stimulate traffic and eliminate the deterrent factor of high transportation costs to industry."

Cornell Students Volunteer Services In Digby County

Student volunteers from Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., are in Digby county again this summer to assist local community organizations in the conduct of summer programs for the young people of these communities.

The student volunteers are members of the Cornell United Religious Work organization, an inter-denominational and inter-faith group at Cornell University, which, among other things, sponsors and promotes the involvement of its student members in community programs in a number of areas of North and South America.

This summer will mark the fourth year that student volunteers from C.U.R.W. have been in Nova Scotia communities. In the summer of 1964 a group of students from Cornell spent six weeks in Acadiaville, a coloured community near Digby, where they assisted the Community Betterment Association with the operation of a vacation school and a sports and recreation program for the young people of the community.

In the summer of 1965 two groups from C.U.R.W. were in Digby county: one in Acadiaville and one in Marshalltown, also near Digby. In Marshalltown the group worked under the sponsorship of the Community Club. Two groups were also in the county in 1966, again in Acadiaville and Marshalltown.

This summer two groups of the student volunteers from Cornell are in Digby county. One of these groups is again in Marshalltown, while the other is in Plympton. In Plympton the student volunteers are working under the sponsorship of the Parish Council. No student volunteers from Cornell are in Acadiaville this summer as the provincial Department of Welfare is conducting a "head start" program in that community.

The program with which the student volunteers from Cornell will assist in both Marshalltown and Plympton include vacation schools, sports and recreation programs, tutoring for youngsters who may have to write supplementary examinations in the fall, swimming and water safety programs and other activities involving children and young people.

The group from C.U.R.W. who are in Marshalltown this summer includes David Rothwell, Susan Graetz, Sandra Birabaud and Daniel Hlong. In Plympton the student volunteers are Barbara Torrest, Ralph Kammell, Edward Bump and Judith Fersb.

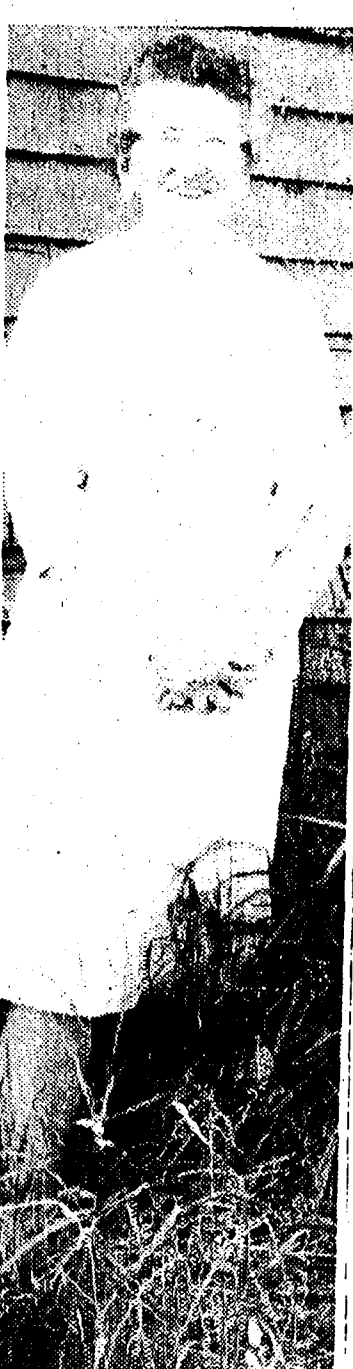

Seek Solution Wharf Parking Problem

Granddaughter Of Confederation Father



Miss Ada Johnson, Sandy Cove, Digby County, has more reason to be thrilled about the Centennial celebrations and the recognition being given the Fathers of Confederation than most people in Digby County. Miss Johnson (above) is a granddaughter of one of the Fathers, Hon. John Mercer Johnson. The late Hon. Mr. Johnson had been Attorney General for New Brunswick and was one of the Fathers who sailed to England to sign the necessary documents prior to Confederation.

On July 1st, Miss Johnson's brother, R. K. Johnson placed a wreath on the grave of his grandfather in the vicinity of Newcastle and Chatham, N. B. Mr. Johnson and Mrs. Johnson will be presented to the Queen Mother, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth on July 12, when she will be in New Brunswick to inspect the Black Watch (RHR) of Canada.

In 1936 Miss Johnson's father was presented to King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, now the Queen Mother, on their visit to Canada. Miss Johnson was presented to Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II and to Prince Philip at Saint John, N. B., when they visited Canada some years ago. Miss Johnson was then president of the Professional Women's Organization.

Recently Miss Johnson's sister, Miss Yvonne Johnson, Ottawa, was at the opening of the Samuel Broutman collection of miniature portraits of the Fathers at Ottawa's centennial Art gallery.

A delegation of fishermen and town officials will meet with Mr. Hartlin, Marine Services Superintendent of field operations for the department of transport when he is in Digby July 10-14. They will discuss possible solutions of problems which have arisen regarding recently enforced parking regulations on the government wharf in Digby.

The discussion will include the possibility of a lease being drawn up whereby the Town of Digby would control traffic on the wharf. This was reported by Mayor C. D. Snow at the July meeting of Town Council held Tuesday evening. He said for one dollar per year the Town could lease the wharf. The practice has been carried out in other areas, the mayor said. The Town would be responsible for collecting wharf fees and other charges normally carried out by the wharfinger, and would take over the responsibility of police and parking problems there. This includes all of the wharf except the portion presently leased by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The government would continue to maintain the wharf, the Mayor said.

Conditions on the wharf became a matter of concern early this spring when a heavy volume of traffic there forced a parking ban to fishermen and other wharf workers. R.C.M.P. enforced parking regulations applicable to all government wharves and imposed several fines in their efforts to ease the congestion.

The sewer committee will investigate the possibility and costs of a sewage outlet at the Joggins to serve a proposed system on Victoria Street. Investigation will also be made into a sewer extension to serve a portion of First Ave.

Police Chief W. F. Dunn reported that to date 141 dogs have been licensed with the Town. He stressed that laws regarding the remaining unlicensed dogs will be strictly enforced. Only two complaints concerning stray dogs were received during the month of June, the Chief said.

Councillor Gerald Hoare explained a proposed sign to be erected somewhere in town by the Lions Club. He said that the Lions decided at a recent meeting to erect a sign containing crests of the various service clubs in town showing their meeting times. Representatives from a number of these organizations were present at the meeting. The sign will probably be erected near the band stand and tourist information centre, Mr. Hoare said. Flood lights will be installed and shrubbery will be planted at its base, council was told.

Building permits were granted to Casey Fisheries Ltd., to erect a building on their private wharf and to Digby Motors Ltd., to construct a cement-block paint room at the rear of their garage. Permission was also granted to the RCMP to build a 48 foot radio tower near their headquarters. (Please turn to page 8)

The article on Digby Residents Protest Dust on Streets has my sympathy, although I do not live in town, but out in the country where we put up with Dust Storms all summer long, every summer.

It seems as if we are one of the forgotten communities of Digby County, as seldom does a road grader go through, so we have pot holes by the hundreds.

After the summer is well advanced a bit of chloride is sprinkled very sparingly on our roads but strictly in the ruts, when they can find them, and just in front of each house, and not over the whole road, nor between the houses like they do down the road a mile and a half away.

What is so great about the other end of the community, I'll never know. It can't possibly be because they have that much more traffic.

We pay our taxes. Worship God, and are as decent a people as those on the other end of this road, but when we want roads graded, or chloride, or anything else done, the head fellows say, "No Money." Wouldn't you folks think, just once in a while, they would fix up our end of the road nicely, while there was still money to work with, if for no other reason than to give us the desire to live on here and pay our taxes on time.

Maybe I'm all wet on where the money comes from to fix roads, but I still think the powers to be could be a little kinder to us here.

Another grievance we have here is no phone. Why do you suppose we can't get phones up here? Well I have no idea. But we would certainly like to have phones put in and there is certainly a great need for phones from house to house and to the outside world. I'd say more need for phones way back here than right in town. After all we are surrounded by woods in summer, that sometimes catch on fire, the men folk to work, not many wives have a car, nor can drive if they had one; besides the accidents that can happen, and help is needed.

Then in the winter there are always the storms that manage to leave us helpless, sometimes without heat for days at a time. And there has been times when some one was sick, heat off, roads closed and no one outside the wiser of our plight.

There is much more to be said on this matter, but if I don't stop soon, I'm afraid you won't have room in your paper for it all. So I thank you for space in your paper.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

May I suggest that a new (to Digby County) industry be started in the form of "Dew Worms for trout fishing bait. If I remember correctly this idea has been brought forth before, but I have never heard anything lately about it. Some one suggested some time ago that the golf courses would make a good Dew Worm picking place. I might also add that all moved lawns will also give forth many Dew Worms in the run of an hour or less of picking.

All that is required is a flash-light, sharp eyes, a strong back and a quick firm grasp of the fingers.

Personally I get more "kick" out of picking Dew Worms than I do of fishing. I wonder who would be interested in buying these Dew Worms, and how much should be charged for them.

Many children, although too young to earn pen money for their spending needs, may feel they are really working if they could pick and sell Dew Worms to the tourist or local fisherman.

Dew Worms will keep quite well if properly cared for in humid soil in an old pail that is sprinkled with water every second day and given a bit of food.

Years ago when we lived in Ontario near the Simcoe Lake,

Dew Worms were a big industry. I'm not sure now, but I don't think there were trout in that lake. If so they were never mentioned. White fish seemed to be the main fish caught so I can presume Dew Worms were used as bait for them.

Last year I was lucky enough to catch a salmon on a Dew Worm, so why couldn't a Dew Worm be used for most any fresh water fish.

Maybe some of your readers would write in on this subject. I may add that children and grown ups get a big kick out of outwitting a Dew Worm for while my neighbour's children often come to help, we spent as much time, laughing, and having innocent fun about the ones that got away, and comparing who could catch the most in a set time. Last night I went out and caught about 50 in a matter of about 20 minutes.

1. TURN VICTIM FACE UP. RAISE neck with one hand and TILT head fully back with the other hand.

2. OPEN victim's mouth. PULL lower jaw to full position. PINCH nostrils shut to prevent air leakage. MAINTAIN downward pressure on forehead.

3. PLACE mouth tightly around victim's mouth and BLOW IN. The victim's chest should rise.

4. REMOVE your mouth. RELEASE victim's nostrils. LISTEN for air to come out of victim's lungs. LOOK for the fall of the victim's chest. PINCH nostrils and BLOW IN AGAIN.

REPEAT steps 3 and 4 continuously. IF AIR PASSAGES ARE NOT OPEN: CHECK neck and head positions, CLEAR mouth and throat of foreign substances.

Start immediately. Don't give up. Send someone for a doctor.

For infants and children, cover entire mouth and nose with your mouth. Use small puffs of air about 20 times per minute.

Apply rescue breathing in case of DROWNING, CHOKING, ELECTRIC SHOCK, HEART ATTACK, SUFFOCATION and GAS POISONING.

90 Years Back

FROM EARLY FILES OF THE DIGBY COURIER

July 6, 1877 —

"Street Evils — One of the many encroachments on public rights that exist in this community is the delapidated and broken sidewalk that runs along the side of the street in front of the buildings in Jew Cove, so called. Parties who have built in that vicinity have made traps which are extremely dangerous to all pedestrians and especially strangers who visit our town. Is it not the duty of our Street Commissioners to have proper and safe platforms, instead of the ones that now exist. It was only a short time ago that a gentleman fell through one of them and received a severe bruise; yet still no action has been taken to have them put in a proper state, and probably will not be, until heavy damages are claimed, which will certainly have to be paid by the District. Who will make a move in this matter?"

"The stores of W. T. Nichols, I. D. Vroom and Mr. Falconer, Bear River, were broken into Tuesday night and the sum of \$50.00 stolen. A person living in an adjoining county is suspected and steps are being taken to bring him or her to justice.

The calling system changed from manual operation to electrical operation a number

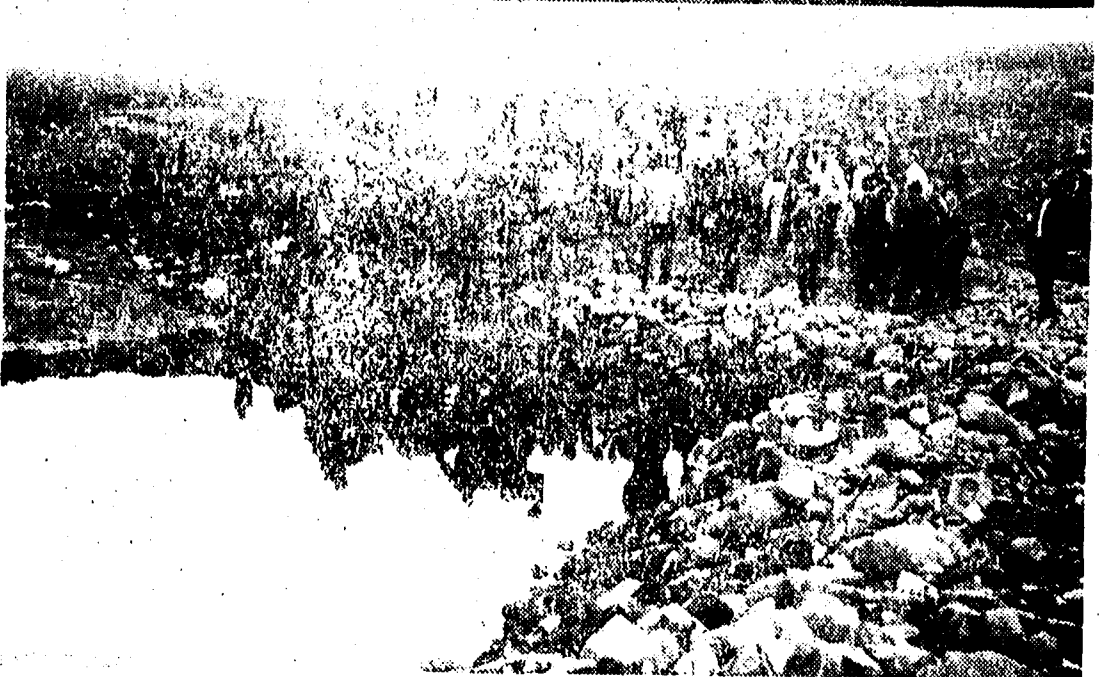
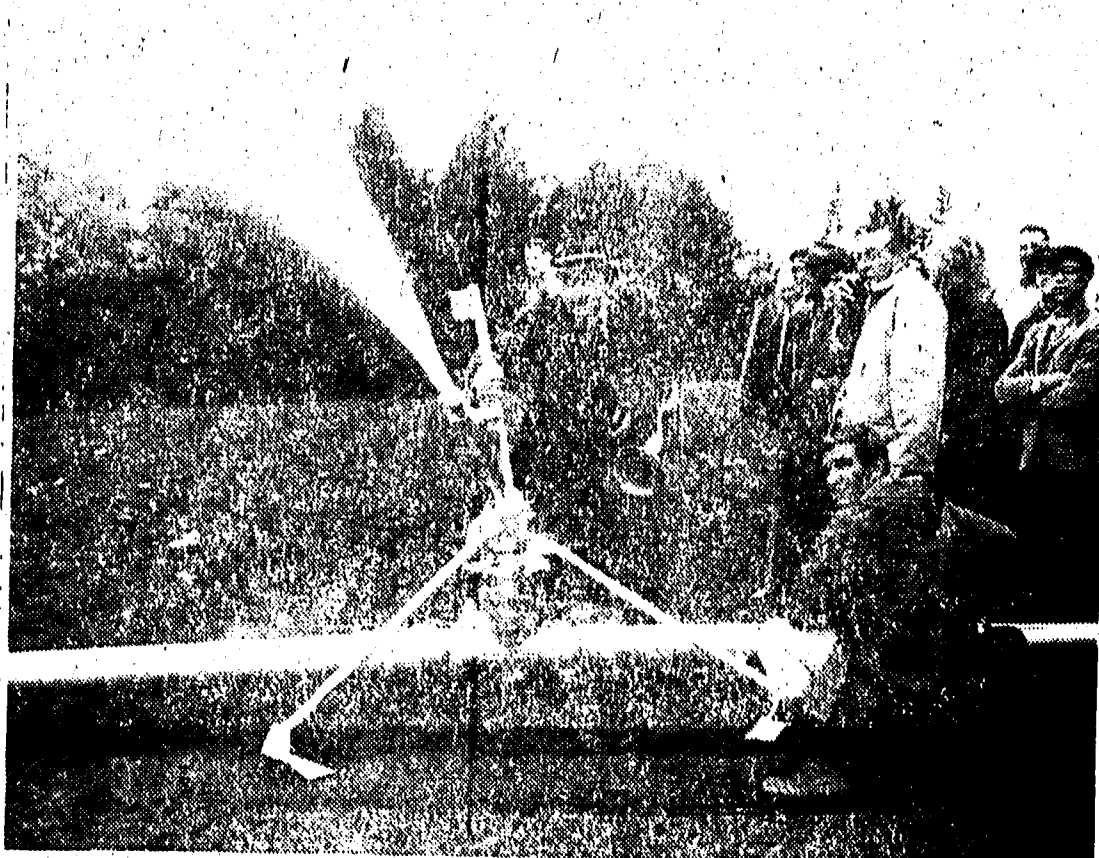

About one hundred and thirty farmers from Cape Breton to Yarmouth attended an irrigation demonstration at Beaverbrook Farms recently. Shown above is a Rainbow pumper pumping the water from one of the four dams on the farm.

The long pipe can be seen trailing up the hill, while the top picture shows the gun spreading the "rain" over all parts of the field.

More than 130 from many parts of Nova Scotia from Cape Breton, Pictou and Cumberland Counties through to Yarmouth County descended on Beaverbrook Farms recently to see a demonstration of the 550 Rainbow Volume Gun used for irrigation purposes. The demonstration carried out by E. W. Mann, Fitzgerald, Georgia owner of Rainbow Manufacturing Co., showed a machine similar to the large

type of which the farm is equipped with eight.

The \$3695 machine demonstrated is capable of releasing 1600 gallons of water a minute and capable of water ing 3 1/2 acres equivalent to one inch of rainfall in one hour and fifteen minutes.

Four dams were built on the Beaverbrook Farms last Fall giving a supply of about 1,000,000 gallons of water.

The purpose of the demonstration was to show farmers that any size farm owner can buy an irrigation system to the size his farm requires at a reasonable outlay. M. E. Jamerson, manager of the Beaverbrook Farms, has information to impart and is willing to discuss system within the means of the farmer. The demonstration was a one-man operation. Guns can be added as needed in order to do twice as much work. The largest size re

leases 2,200 gallons per minute.

A two and a half hour discussion followed the demonstration, after which refreshments were served by Mr. and Mrs. Jamerson. Among the guests were Gordon Kinsman of the Agricultural College, Truro, and agricultural representatives from various counties in the province.

Beaverbrook Farms set out 433,000 new strawberry plants this year and expect to be picking off 132 acres in the 1967 season. Twelve acres of new blueberry bushes and seven acres of raspberry canes were also planted this year. Other crops include corn, tomato, pepper, Florida squash, celery, onions, Kentucky Wonder pole beans (stringless) and okra. There are now 460 acres under cultivation at the Farms. It is expected that an expansion of 200 more acres will be made this summer.

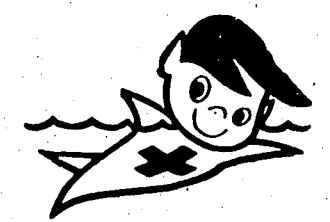

Children's Float

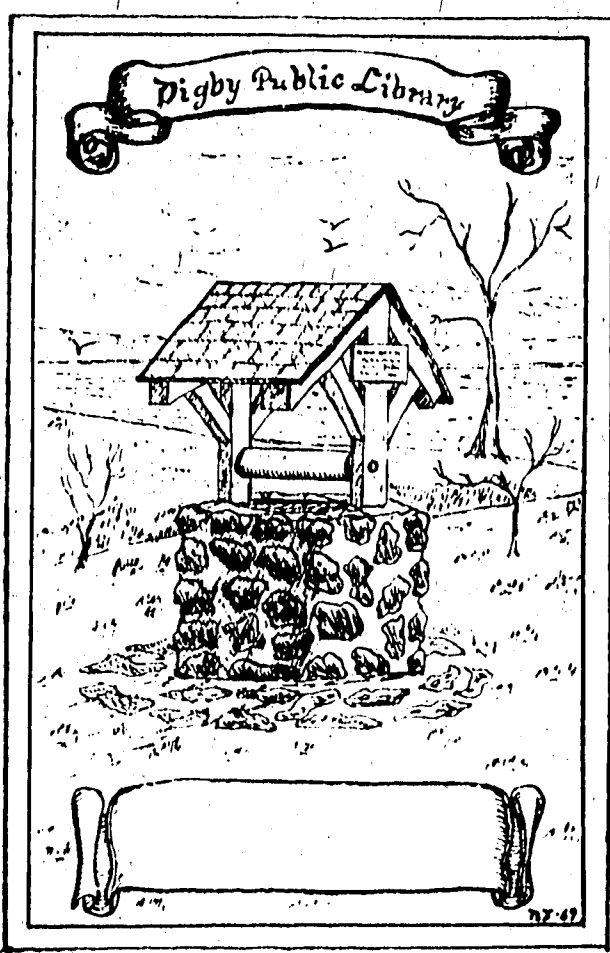
The Library float seen in the recent parade in Digby's centennial celebration was planned by children during their Saturday morning story telling hours.

Strawberry Crop Underway

Strawberry pickers from local areas and from distances of 30 to 40 miles around descended on the Digby area field within the past week.

Among the more advanced and largest of the "small farm" class are those of H. M. Warne at Hillgrove, Acaciaville and Marshalltown. Mr. Warne has fifteen acres in strawberries and has no immediate intention of expansion although his shipments this year have been larger than any previous year. Prices and production would be higher he felt if the weather had not been so retarded.

Mr. Warne employs 60 to 70 persons each day in the berry fields, all from the local area. Shipments have been made to local stores and to his old established markets in Halifax. Mr. Warne expects the high bush blueberry crop to be ready by about another month.

Strawberries from Beaverbrook Farms Ltd., brought forty cents a pint their first day on the market.

M. E. Jamerson, manager of the farm told the Courier they expect to ship 6,000 12 pint flats daily until the end of the season. A total of about 200,000 flats will be shipped by special refrigerated trucks and air to New England markets.

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About This And That

Encouraged By Hearing

Bernard LeBlanc, president of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, was not the only one encouraged by the hearing the delegation received in Ottawa regarding transportation between Southwestern Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. While many people in all parts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were pleased with the reception accorded the delegation, Digby, which is so close to the Princess of Acadia activity in a small town and whose livelihood practically depends on this transportation, was greatly encouraged by the response to the brief presented. Yet, with the encouragement, one can at times hear the undertone "Could this possibly be another delusion wrought by delays, unfulfilled promises, indecisions and disappointments to which we have grown accustomed?" We prefer to think that this representation was deeply in earnest and that the response was just as deeply sincere. We feel the requirements set forth in the brief were well thought out. We could not add anything to the requests and feel that if these requirements are met, the transportation between Southwestern Nova Scotia (Digby, to be sure) and New Brunswick would then be adequate for some years to come. Construction of docks at Digby is an absolute necessity as found for the past number of years even with the present type of ferry service. Then, to facilitate industrial improvements and tourist trade a ferry service should be provided to accommodate different kinds of traffic including trailers and trucks which presently cannot be accommodated.

We are encouraged to say the least. We hope no political or other interference will come between the meeting last week and the realization of new ferry and docks.

Rabies Scare

So far we have not heard of a definite case of rabies in Nova Scotia but since it crept into New Brunswick last Fall we have had it on our minds. Others, evidently, also had been a bit troubled about the disease which attacks animals and can be transmitted to human beings. A number of pets had been inoculated against rabies by a veterinarian at Smith's Cove during the late fall and winter months. This was a wise practice rather than to wait until an outbreak of rabies occurred to have pets inoculated.

With summer travel the disease could so easily be transmitted from domesticated animal to animal or a rabid undomesticated animal from another province could readily find its way into Nova Scotia. We recall mention last Fall of a suspected fox in the area which evidently and fortunately was not found to be rabid. We understand there have been more recent scares. While we fail to know why the sudden and recent all-out excitement about rabies in Nova Scotia we still think it a wise move to have animals protected. A rabid animal can be either ferocious or unduly inactive and attack a child suddenly. Children should be cautioned against any strange acting animals and protection given animals by inoculations.

Centennial In Digby

The centennial events in Digby went over well. The committee in charge is happy, to be sure. From the Sunday in which the impressive Bell cairn dedication and interfaith service to the close of the special week, all went well.

We were afraid that much of the celebration might get over without reference to the Centennial Year but our fears were groundless. Entries in the parade were in many cases significant for Centennial. Centennial was referred to in the Sunday program and to help matters windows down town as well as some managers, clerks and business staffs were dressed to suit the occasion, commemorating the year 1867.

We should also make mention of the gesture of the flower shops in providing corsages for the downtown clerks and office staffs.

More Lupins

Except because of a little reluctance on account of those who might suffer hay fever from lupins, we'd advocate more of our ditches be planted with this brilliant array of color. A recent ride down Digby Neck to Sandy Cove was made more enjoyable because of these patches of beautiful blooms along the roadside.

Unfortunately we have not made it as far as East Ferry since summer began. We are not sure if that vacant lot formed by the bend of the road to the ferry dock has been planted with lupins or not. We always visualized that spot made attractive with lupins which seem to require so little care.

parish record book, is dated May 29, 1849. It states that a chapel hath been erected at Rossway in the said Parish of Digby for the worship of Almighty God according to the rites of the United Church of England and Ireland, but that no opportunity hath yet occurred for having the said chapel set apart forever from all profane and common uses and solemnly consecrated and dedicated to the service and worship of Almighty God.

The petition was signed by "Lewis L.M.W. Hill, Missionary" and some of the inhabitants. Among these were Robert H. Timpany, James H. Timpany and George McKay. It is recorded in Wilson's history of Digby County that the land on which the church at Rossway is located was donated by Major Robert Timpany who came to Rossway after the American revolution. He died in Arsyde, Yarmouth County in 1844 at the age of 102.

A copy of Bishop Inglis' consecration of the chapel at Rossway is contained in the original parish record book. The date of the consecration was May 29th, 1849.

Since the time of its consecration a number of eminent clergy have served in All Saints' church. Rt. Rev. John MacKenzie, Bishop of Nova Scotia from 1934 until his death in 1943, began his ministry as a student at All Saints. The late Dr. Norwood, rector of St. Basilomew Church, Park Ave., New York, also began his ministry at All Saints.

A number of splendid memorials have been added to the interior of the church since its consecration. These include a lovely oak altar, a memorial to the Budd family, a prayer desk, altar rails and a lectern.

"How did you like the graduation last night?" Frances asked, as she and I sat lazily in the shade on the second day of the late June heat wave.

"Very impressive," I assured her cautiously. "Everything went quite well." Frances is a teacher.

It had been a graduation like any other graduation, I suppose. There had been a valedictorian, and a guest speaker. The valedictorian, in her traditional white dress, with the traditional corsage pinned to her shoulder, made a teary little speech about what school life had done for her and her classmates; how they could not have done this great thing without their understanding parents, and how wise teachers had led them through gates of knowledge. The phrases "bid farewell," "on the threshold" and "out in the world" were tossed about liberally and frantically. Her audience, consisting of more women than men, listened, dewy eyed, hearing exactly what they came to hear. I tried to dismiss the persistent, unkind little thought which drummed in my mind.

I hope she does not believe a word of it, the thought insisted. If she does, she is much too young to have such a conventional and stereotyped mind. If she really got out of school what she says she did, she has got the wrong things. She has learned to be a conformist, an exam-passer, a non-thinker. Either she does not really understand what knowledge is, or how to get it, or she is not letting us see that she does. Does she really know what that phrase "out in the world" means? She should be rebelling more. I closed my eyes in order to concentrate harder on the speech. One is supposed to be uplifted by noble utterances at graduations.

"I thought," Frances ventured, "that the guest speaker did very well. I don't think I ever heard him speak so well, had you?"

I could truthfully say I had never heard him speak so well. I had never heard him before. He told the graduates that they were passing from childhood to young adulthood. He said they were entering the world of the hydrogen bomb and L.S.D., and that in this world, which is completely unlike any which has gone before, they must carry with them the ideals instilled in them by their schooling. They will be, he told them, the parents of tomorrow. The future rests on their shoulders. It is their duty to clear up the mess the present generation has made of the world.

The unkind little thought which I had tried to silence during the valedictorian's speech crept into the pit of my stomach, where it became a knot of something akin to anger. I had a feeling that I was viewing this performance from the outside. I felt as if, from my detached viewpoint, I was the only one who could really see what was happening.

He's too young too, the thought said to me. A whole generation has now lived under the shadow of the bomb. You, Mr. Speaker, are young enough to have been told that when you graduated. So are the parents of some of these kids. It is horrible. It is one of the facts of life. It could blow up our civilization. But we have all lived under it for a long time now. L.S.D. may be new, but there have been other vices before. There has not been a generation since Adam which was not the parents of the next generation. Every generation has been told that the responsibilities of the world lie on its shoulders, so that, young man, is not exactly a startling new thought. Adam, while we are on the subject, cannot exactly be said to have left the world better than he found it. These kids are not really inheriting the mess from us. We inherited the aftermath of the second world war, and our parents inherited the aftermath of the first world war. Each generation clears up part of the mess which it inherits, not from the generation before it, but from all the generations of time, then leaves its own debris behind for the generation which follows it. And, Mr. Speaker, how do you know that these kids have lofty ideals? And if they have, Mr. Speaker, how do you know that they got them from going to this particular school?

Mr. Speaker, if you really believe that these kids can help save the world, why don't you talk to them about some specific topic like foreign investment in Canada, Canadian politics, the United Nations, your own thoughts on L.S.D., war and peace, the population explosion, or forest conservation, instead of noble generalities.

Frances had just started to say something else when her husband came up the path. He carried his jacket slung over his shoulder. Above his loosened collar and tie he was flushed from the heat. "Well," he asked me abruptly, without greeting me, "What do you think of the younger generation?"

"I dunno," I hedged. "What do you think of the younger generation?"

He lay his jacket on the grass and sat down on it between Frances and me. "I think," he said, after he had chewed soberly for a few seconds on the root of a blade of grass, especially "after that graduation last night that this swinging younger generation which we worry so much about, and which prides itself so much on its rebelliousness, its frankness and outspokenness and its questioning of the old values, this generation of the new morality is just as phony as we were at their age. When they get our age they will be as phony as we are now."

I think he's right. Just like our generation, there are some among them who are radical, different, and non-phony, and they are the ones who will make the history books. The rest of them will be drab, and conformist, and before long they will begin to believe all the trite non-thoughts they utter. They will be the ones who keep the world from falling apart, I suppose. They aren't worse than we were, and we weren't worse than our parents.

Paving Plans Announced

R. B. Powell, M.L.A., recently gave the following information to the Courier concerning work now underway on No. 1 highway from the D.A.R. underpass, Marshalltown to Digby-Clare Municipal line.

The Highway Department has planned a two-year project. This present year, 1967, repaving will be completed from the Municipal line to Ashmore. One mile of this piece of highway, from top of Weymouth North Hill to Ashmore is to be completed to an all-weather standard, increase of present 20 to 22 foot pavement with seven foot shoulders.

It is the intention of the Department of Highways to replace culverts on the balance of the road and lay the base coat of asphalt by the end of 1967.

The Department plans to complete repaving from Clare-Digby line to Weymouth North Hill and construction of an all-weather standard from Weymouth North to D.A.R. underpass at Marshalltown by the end of 1968.

The project will entail considerable work on 13 sharp curves and blind crests. The extensive up-grading of No. 1 highway will, of necessity, cause inconvenience to the travelling public during the period of construction. However it is hoped, Mr. Powell said, this inconvenience will be kept to a minimum through cooperation of contractors and travelling public.

STRAWBERRY MARKETS INCREASE

Strawberry markets for Beaverbrook Farms Ltd. crop in 1967 increased to include Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Washington, D. C., and points in the States of Ohio, North Carolina, Alabama, Georgia and Florida. The only American markets shipped to in 1966 were Boston and New York. No markets for Nova Scotia berries had been open beyond New York previously.

Already Beaver Brook Farms Ltd., is having its second picking for the season from the strawberry plants. The season has been in progress for two weeks and M. E. Jamerson, manager, expects the season will extend for three more weeks.

On Tuesday of this week more than 600 pickers were on the fields and 5000 flats of 12 pint boxes each were picked. On Wednesday more than 3000 flats were picked by 400 pickers. The first day picking brought 673 pickers to the fields.

As high as \$2500 in one day had been paid out to the pickers in the fields this season. Pickers are paid daily with one boy on Tuesday making \$25 for the day. Several pickers had reached \$20 or more for a day's picking. Many of the pickers came from Clare where two extra buses had to be used on Tuesday to transport pickers. Others came as far east as Annapolis causeway and from Digby Neck and Islands.

To date more than 60,000 flats (12 pint) strawberries have been shipped by refrigerated trucks or plane to the American markets. On Friday of this week there will be open market for Beaver Brook berries in the Digby town down stores.

An interesting variety of berries to visitors at Beaver Brook Farms Ltd., is the guerilla variety. These have been planted on four different acres of land for experimentation. In 1967 they have been tested for size and taste. Another year they will be tested for smoothness. The berries are growing to nine and a quarter inches in circumference and two berries have weighed 4 1/2 oz. Five or six berries completely fill a pint box.

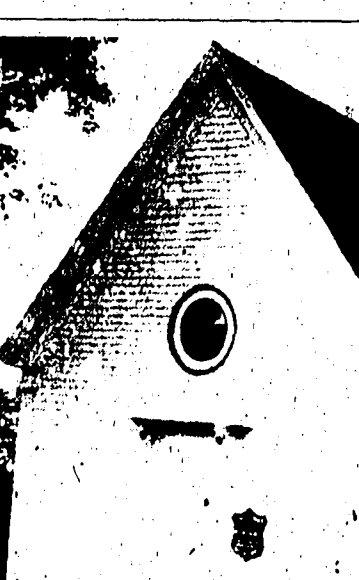

He and his family came from a place named Jedburg in Scotland and were of exemplary character, as was attested from a letter received from the session of that place, and after landing at Halifax made their way to Bayview. For some years the Presbyterian faith was kept alive by meetings being held in private homes. In the early 1870's the people of Bayview

Glimpse Into Past Through Old Letter

Mr. and Mrs. William Burdick, London, Ont., touring Nova Scotia, brought to the Courier Office last Wednesday, a letter mailed from Hillsburgh (Bear River) in 1849. The letter was addressed to Thomas Chute, Malahide, Canada West. The sender was Israel Chute.

Names mentioned in the letter, which had eight different postage marks on it were: George, Walter and Charles Chute, Malahide Township; William and Thomas Miller, Hillsburgh; Ethelena Rice, "recently married to Richard Clark"; Mary Harris, Susan Nichols and Timothy Troop, "baptised following a revival in religion in the area". The letter mentions the death of William Nichols as "dying very happy" and the writer trapping three foxes for which he received the sum of three shillings. A grim note was struck, when, in the letter, Mr. Israel Chute tells of the Indians burning the barn and house of Elisha Woodbury and threatening to kill him. Mr. Chute expected to cut 8 to 10 tons of hay that fall.

From Mr. Bruce Burdick we learned that he is the great grandson of Richard, brother of Israel to whom the letter was addressed. Descendants of the Chute family are still living in Aylmer (Malahide), Ontario on the original homestead.

About This And That

Digby Has Inhibitions?

According to John Fisher, Canada's Centennial Commissioner, Canada has been lifted out of its inhibitions and bashfulness through its Centennial festivities. Canadians now believe in their nationhood. Using The New Standard Dictionary, an inhibition means a morbid reluctance.

Judging from remarks we heard down town recently, Digby must suffer from that curious disease which affected Canada until the Centennial year and known as "inhibitions" according to the diagnosis of Fisher. What we heard about Digby was that it had no faith in itself. Digbyites spread gloom and pessimism, our conversationalist said. In other words, they have a "morbid reluctance" to use the psychology of selling Digby. We doubt that this man was looking for a false economic optimism in Digby's attitude but he did expect an attitude of pride, respect and faith. It's catching, you know. We better try it.

One of the remarks about Digby having so little faith in itself or in its own people referred to the outsider always being the "good guy". "Let me try to sell something in Digby" remarked the other conversationalist "and I can't, but let a stranger come in and he can sell anything". There's a morbid reluctance to support the seemingly ordinary home-town Joe. It must be an inhibition!

Then the other remark we heard about us Digbyites was that when a suggestion is made for Digby's betterment there is always someone against it for the sake of being against. They have a "morbid reluctance" to cooperate. An "inhibition," we suspect.

Well, as for ourselves, we might grieve a bit more about our Digby inhibitions but with being subscribers to a couple dozen or more weekly newspapers we see that most small towns suffer the same sort of inhibitions. (We might add that we notice in American weeklies there's some such sort of attitude in small American towns too. An inhibition might not be a Canadianism!) This, however, does not excuse us from changing our own attitudes if needed be and to shake off any morbid reluctance known as inhibitions. At least a sound analysis of the situation might be well.

Strawberry Market Price Varies

Many parts of Nova Scotia have reported a flooded home market for strawberries.

Even as near as Annapolis Royal area strawberry farmers were allowing pickers to harvest the crops for the payment of the small sum of fifteen cents per quart box.

Some of the N. S. South Shore growers were receiving the price of twenty-five cents per quart before the last weekend. Strawberries were reported to be bought through the Valley area also for 25 to 30 cents per quart.

According to reports the American market had been bringing growers thirty-five to forty cents per pint. This would indicate that it might be profitable for more growers to look into the possibility of exporting the product outside of the province. Naturally transportation and other costs have to be considered but it definitely looks as though some investigation might be worthwhile. Shipping with volume might be more advantageous for berry growers and a wider market would tend to keep the home market price up also. Shippers might get together on this another year to the advantage of all.

Crosswalks

Here is the month of July and few if any of our crosswalks in Digby town are freshly painted. In this regard we seem to have little sympathy for the visitors who drive through our town. Unless the crosswalks really "yell" at you or you are familiar with their location a driver would never know that they are meant to be in existence. Let us not wait until the first accident happens before we get out the paint and brush.

There should be synchronization of thought between pedestrian and driver; but often this is not possible when pedestrian had been accustomed to a crosswalk and a driver hasn't the faintest idea there is supposed to be one marked on the pavement.

And while we are beefing about something in town, wonder if it might be better protection for drivers if flags were used on Warwick St. where the sewer construction is going on for the new motel.

For Sale

We were intrigued with the picture in the Chronicle Herald which showed a For Sale sign on a bridge between Lunenburg and Riverport on the South Shore. We won't hold our breath until we see the results but if there should be a new bridge to replace the out-moded one — well, a "Dutchman" can be just as effective living in Digby County as one living in Lunenburg County. A few For Sale signs for Victoria Bridge might do the trick. There are lots of reasons to sell that one and replace it with a causeway.

Rabies Scare

We do not want to minimize any scare of rabies but we are glad to note that all the frustration of a week ago was unnecessary. Be that as it is, children, without being made unduly alarmed, should be taught not to play with strange animals and especially animals which appear ill, overly affectionate or ferocious.

The Queen Mother

Mothers of sons in the Black Watch went to New Brunswick last week to meet the Queen Mother. Well we know the thrill which must have been theirs. We recall the proud moments when the writer was presented to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Prince Philip and also Princess Margaret. They were days which continue to be cherished.

It was with awe, too, that we saw for the first time, Queen Elizabeth, now the Queen Mother; twenty-eight years ago when she visited Halifax with her husband, the late King George VI. At that time special trains ran to the city to accommodate the crowds. For many, too, we might add, the accommodation on the overnight trip from Digby to Halifax was standing room only. Today, those who went to Halifax from Digby probably travelled by automobile but really we have not heard of many, other than those with special invitation, who made the trip either to Halifax or Saint John.

Those who remember the Queen Mother in her role of 28 years ago, recall her sweet and gracious charm, her radiantly contagious smile and her exquisite beauty. According to reports, she still retains that same charm and beauty which attracted her to the thousands who saw her in Nova Scotia's capital city twenty-eight years ago. One writer put it this way, "Amazingly youthful in appearance, habits and outlooks, she retains in her 68th year the exquisite complexion and serene gaiety for which she was so much admired in her early years of married life."

The spirit of serenity, friendliness, beauty and brotherhood radiated here by the Queen Mother captured the hearts of many Nova Scotians and will influence all their days. Indeed, we can hope that the visits from the royal families in 1967 might do just so much for all Canada.

Examinations

Whether there should be or whether there should not be school examinations of any kind is a controversial subject these days. We have no intention of entering that controversy at the present time. We do just want to say this much — we feel two sets of examinations, local and provincial, so close together in the month of June are more than should be expected of high school students. After all, people do prime up to their very best efforts. If students, after having done their best at the first set of exams, are too tired to do their best on the provincials, their provincial certificate is likely to show this.

Our business is running a newspaper. We don't profess to have retained any of our expertise on school teaching but these two, "mountain-top," sets of exams have always worried us. The students seem to survive but is so much nervous tension necessary to prove a student's ability or knowledge?

Cool Strawberries With Care

It is expected that a minimum of 2,500,000 quarts of strawberries will be produced in Nova Scotia this year, as against 2,100,000 quarts a year ago. Farm News tells us if strawberries are to reach the market in good condition, and if they are to satisfy the preference of discriminating consumers, then they should be pre-cooled just as soon after picking as possible. For instance, C. A. Eaves, Head of the Plant Physiology Section at the Research Station, Kentville, maintains that growers should aim at a fruit temperature reduction of 25° within four hours after picking, although he suggested that fruit temperature should not go below the 55° F. level if the berries are destined for local markets, or for consumption within 24 hours. For distant markets, or for consumption within a three or four-day period, it is desirable to cool the fruit to 32° F. Of course, if the fruit is to arrive at a destination and be discharged in a dry condition, then this temperature must be raised gradually in transit.

A few tips on pre-cooling of strawberries which all persons involved in the production, handling, transportation and distribution of strawberries should recognize are —

1. Fruit subjected to high temperatures and excessive moisture will rot very rapidly.
2. For every 15° F. reduction in fruit temperature, you can DOUBLE the life of the fruit.
3. Fruit picked at noon is often 17° higher than that picked in early morning or late afternoon.
4. Injured berries should be culled out during picking.
5. Putting boxes under leaves in the field will NOT cool the fruit.
6. Remove boxes immediately after picking to shaded place with MAXIMUM VENTILATION, and protect on the sunny side — berries will cool 5° - 8° per hour by this method — an unventilated cellar is unsatisfactory.
7. Within 2 hours of picking, place fruit in insulated cooler to remove field heat.
8. If you have local refrigerated storage, use it.
9. If refrigerated storage is not available in the immediate area, plans for such facilities may be obtained from the Agricultural Engineer, N.S.A.C., Truro.
10. Fruit can only be cooled RAPIDLY by fast moving air over properly spaced flats.

Fishing In St. Mary's

Mr. and Mrs. Clark Spencer of Boyersville, Pennsylvania, were a very pleased couple when they landed one ton and a half of fish with Captain Tom Smith in the Tonar II fishing in St. Mary's bay out of Port Maitland in four trips out. The largest fish landed was a 35 pound cod and a 33 pound pollock. Most of the fish landed were pollock. The Pollock is a fish that puts out quite a fight and is a pleasure to land, states Captain Smith.

Another group of the New York Anglers Association fishing in St. Mary's Bay landed 1,200 pounds of pollock. The group consisted of 10 anglers and fished in three boats, with Captain Tom Smith in the Tonar II, Captain Walter Thomas in the Sherri-Barb and Captain Cecil Smith in the Bonne Chance in their first trip out. On the second day 6 anglers went out with Captain Tom Smith in Tonar II and Captain Cecil Smith in Bonne Chance and landed 1,300 pounds of pollock.

The New York anglers turned to Port Maitland when efforts to land any quantity of fish elsewhere proved not satisfactory. St. Mary's Bay area near Port Maitland and Cape St. Mary's (both fish from the same area) is possibly the best fishing ground for pollock and cod in Western Nova Scotia and the beauty of it all is, that fishing can be started only a few minutes after leaving the wharves.

Offer \$100 Prize For First Bluefin Caught Weymouth

Norman Pothier, of Meteghan, president of the Cape St. Mary's Anglers Association stated that the Association will offer a prize of \$100 to the sports fisherman who catches the first tuna at Cape St. Mary's with rod and reel, in a sports fishing boat registered with the Association. Mr. Pothier stated that the tuna should be on the fishing grounds near the Cape any time now. Last year the first bluefin landed at the Cape was hooked during the last week of July.

Mr. Pothier said that the herring schools have arrived in St. Mary's Bay and are gradually working their way up the bay. Tuna have been schooling around the fishing grounds off the Cape for the last ten years regularly with catches being made usually in early August in most years.

The Cape St. Mary's Association, was organized by a group of business men of Clare, along with fishermen interested in sports fishing, about ten years ago. The Association is a non-profit organization for the sole purpose of encouraging sports fishing in St. Mary's Bay. Mr. Pothier said that the clubhouse at the Cape has been redecorated and made ship-shape for the summer sportsmen.

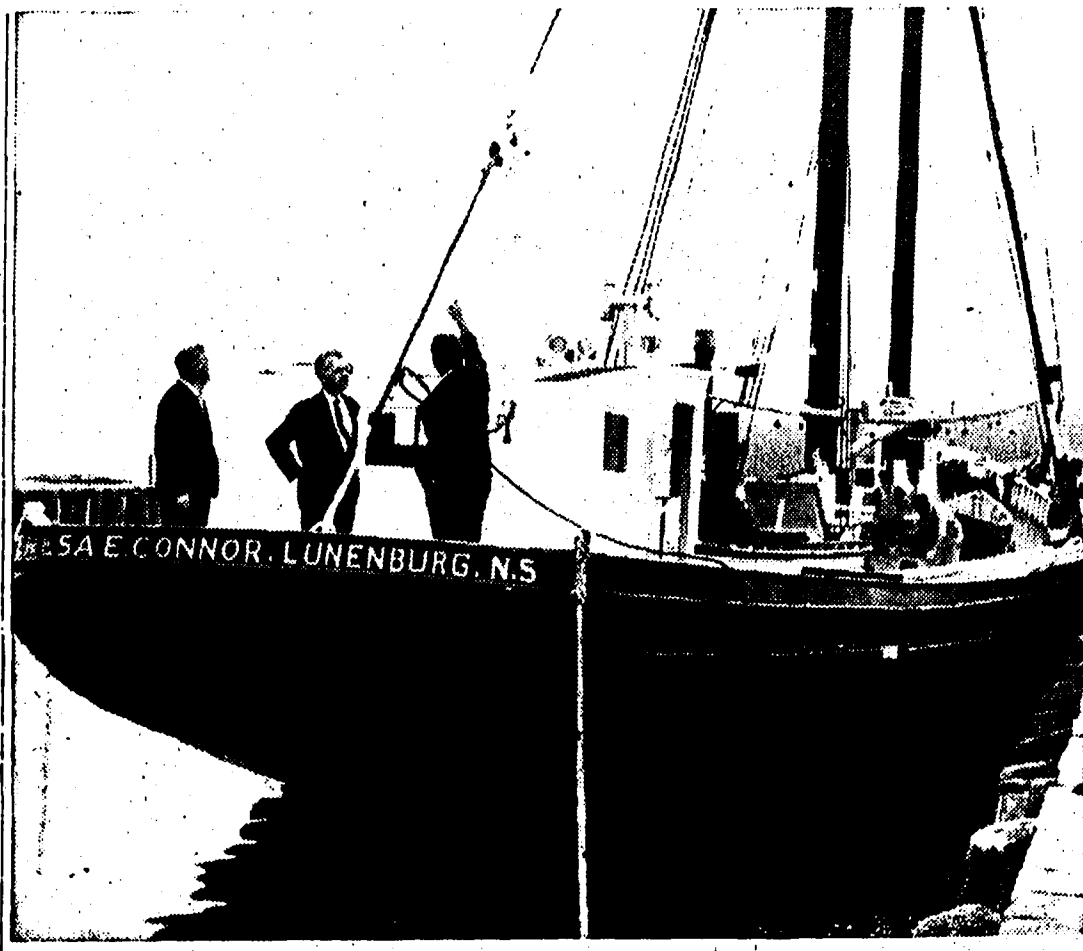
Keen Fishing Competition

July 20, 1877 -

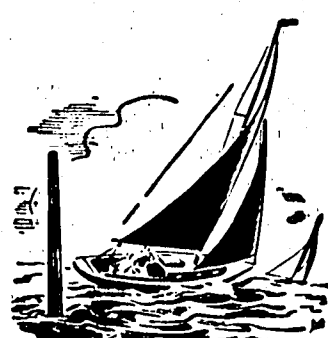

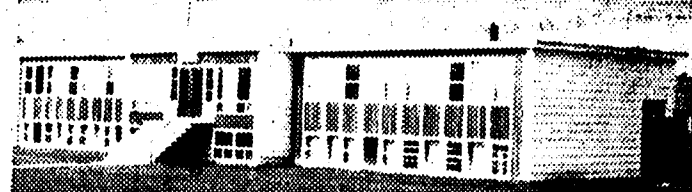

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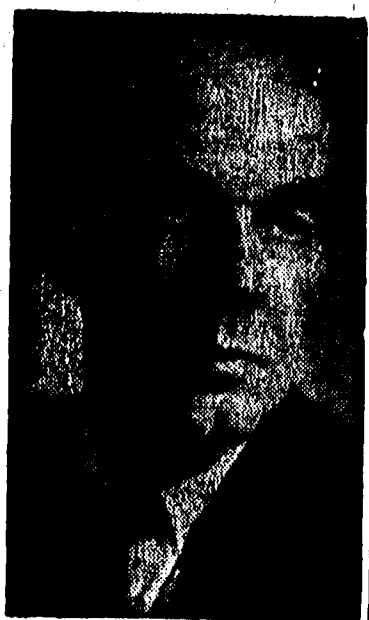

Stanfield Candidate Federal P.C. Leader



Premier Robert Stanfield announced last Wednesday night that he was a candidate for the leadership of the federal Progressive Conservative Party. He stated that his decision was made only after serious consideration. A number of reasons which had come about in the past few months had caused him to come to his decision, he stated.

Since the announcement was made last Wednesday,

pledges of support for Stanfield have come from all parts of Canada. All ten Conservative members of Parliament from Nova Scotia have endorsed Premier Stanfield's candidacy for the national P.C. leadership.

Mr. Stanfield who has been premier of Nova Scotia since 1956 will retain premiership until the P.C. leadership convention is over in the fall of 1967.

Born in Truro 53 years ago, Mr. Stanfield has grown up in a family of Conservatives who have given of their services to governments.

At the age of 22 Robert Stanfield graduated from Dalhousie University with a B.A. degree and being awarded the Governor-General's medal for high academic standing. He graduated from Harvard Law school in 1939. He was elected president of the Nova Scotia P.C. Association at the age of 33 and by 1948 as party leader, he headed an eight-member Conservative opposition in the Nova Scotia House. In 1954 he formed the first Conservative government in Nova Scotia in 23 years.

On Sunday July 23 the Acaciaville Community Betterment Association officially welcomed to the Digby area a group of approximately one hundred Negroes from Saint John, N. B.

The trip across the Fundy to Digby was the closing ceremony of a week of Centennial celebrations by the New Brunswick Association For The Advancement of Coloured People.

The delegation were transported from the boat to the Acaciaville Community Center where they met and fellow-shipped with Negroes from Acaciaville, Conway, Weymouth, Yarmouth and Halifax.

Scout Jamboree

"Jamborees have been a mark of Scouting right from the beginning," Air Vice Marshal J. B. Harvie, Deputy Chief Scout for Canada told an assembly of well over 10,000 before he declared Scoutennial officially opened at Elderbank Sunday afternoon.

Scoutennial, first Nova Scotia Jamboree, and the largest gathering of Boy Scouts ever to take part in a Scouting exercise in Nova Scotia actually began on Saturday, when 1,600 scouts and four hundred leaders registered and pitched their tents in the woods that surrounds Brown's Lake.

AVM Harvie, who will lead the Canadian Scout contingent to the World Jamboree in Idaho, said jamborees are the greatest medium for instilling the spirit of brotherhood in boys.

Representing the Province of Nova Scotia, Hon. R. A. Donahoe, Attorney General told the audience, which included more than 8,500 visitors from all parts of Nova Scotia, that Scoutennial was an approved centennial project and in making the grant the governments had made wise use of centennial funds. He congratulated the leaders on their foresight in buying and developing the big camp.

Master of Ceremonies was the Provincial Commissioner R. W. Phinney, of Kentville, who is also camp chief of the jamboree which continues until Saturday.

The official party for the opening ceremonies included, Dr. H. D. Smith, president of the Provincial Boy Scout Council, and members of the council; Cdr. Gordon Clarke, representing Admiral O'Brien, Maritime Naval Commander; Col. Malcolm Turner, Commanding Officer, Eastern Command; S/Sgt. Allen R. Stevens, R. C. M. P. and Rt. Rev. J. M. Hayes, Archbishop of Nova Scotia, and Arthur L. Price, U. S. Consul in Halifax. The group was later conducted through the training and sleeping areas by Mr. Phinney.

A campfire for the entire camp, which includes troops from each of the Canadian provinces and two from the United States, was held Saturday night, under direction of Bryce Gibson, Halifax.

Largely attended church parades were held Sunday morning and afternoon for Protestants and Roman Catholics, respectively, in the beautiful amphitheatre which separates the headquarters area from the lake. Speaker at the morning service was Rev. George McNeil, pastor of the Bedford Baptist Church. Most Rev. J. M. Hayes, Archbishop of Halifax, conducted the Mass at 4:00 p.m.

The program, divided into five sections, is widely diversified and includes use of Scouting skills already developed and instructions in hobbies, woodcraft, science and history. "Canadiana" covers Scouts and the air, highways, nature, minerals, hobbies, communications and current events. Lt. Cdr. C. H. Humble, CFB Cornwallis is section leader.

"The Loyallists" covers fire fighting, forestry, cooking, and first aid and is in charge of E. Ross Payzant, Canning. "Westward Ho" takes in photography, astronomy, compass, survival, sketching and painting, and George Maston, of Amherst, is project leader.

"Caribou Road" is an adventure which includes an Indian village, gun handling, corral, gun shop and Eskimo Village. This is under the charge of Eric Hagen, of Chester.

"Les Voyageurs" features scuba diving, outboard motors, small boat building, sailboat and canoe handling. Dr. Alex Gyorfi, of Sydney is Scouter in charge.

An auxiliary program of swimming and other sporting activities has been arranged by Gordon Eagle of Halifax. Deputy Camp Chiefs are: Fred Waller and R. D. Evans, of Halifax; program controller, Ron Coell, Dartmouth; Assistant Camp Chief, programme activities, Geoff Wright, Bridgewater; Jamboree coordinator, Ron Iles and Seth Campbell, Halifax.

Fish Plant Wall Collapses

A portion of the outer wall of a herring reduction plant of the Comeau Sea Foods Ltd., of Saultville, collapsed under the weight of herring. The outer wall formed a portion of a herring tank and although a foot thick, it gave way under the pressure of fish and water, stored in the tank.

The collapse of the outside wall struck the sides of a circular rooted storage building nearby collapsing sides of this building and spilling its contents.

The loss is estimated at around \$75,000 which includes the value of herring lost and the cost of salvaging a small portion of the fish catch, which was stored in the large cement walled tank, as well as damages to both buildings.

Clarence Comeau, one of the owners, stated that herring had been stored in this tank, in like quantity, last year, and there appeared no weakening of the walls. The walls were a foot thick with re-inforced iron rods in the cement, when constructed. Mr. Comeau believes it possible that the winter frost, may have weakened the structure.

Herring were strewn between the two buildings, to a height of five or six feet, and along the end of the storage building. An effort was made to salvage the fish but they blocked the drain, making recovery difficult. The plant was shut down, until drainage pipes were cleared out.

It will take some time before the wall can be rebuilt. The storage building for fishmeal, manufactured in the plant, was five feet away from the herring reduction plant, and was constructed in a semi-circular fashion. It had been in use for the first time this summer.

Mr. Smith will have three councils and two clubs in his jurisdiction. Yarmouth Council 2181, Digby Council 5648, Fr. Holden Council, Kentville No. 5030 and Wedgeport and Middleton Columbus Clubs.

The appointment was ratified by the Supreme Knight, Dr. McDevitt of New Haven, Conn., U.S.A. Installation to the office of District Deputy took place in St. Ninian's Cathedral on July 8th at Antigonish. There are only five of the deputies in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Smith has been a member of this order for the past 20 years and assisted greatly in the formation of the Knights of Columbus in the Digby area. He was presented with a certificate by the Supreme Knight which expressed confidence in his leadership and his ability to develop and further accomplishments for the Order and community pride and effort in Nova Scotia.

Murray Joseph Burgoyne, twenty-four year old Digby man, drowned in the Shannon River at Albany, Annapolis County, N. S., on Sunday. Born at Digby, he was a son of Harold and Reta Ward Burgoyne. A native of Yarmouth Co., Dr. Archibald (now of Sandy Cove, Digby Co.) is a graduate of Acadia University, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College and the Ontario Agricultural College of the University of Toronto. The University of Manitoba conferred an LL.D. upon him in 1928 and Acadia University the degree of Doctor of Science in 1930.

Dr. Archibald served on the staff of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College first as herdsman, later as lecturer in agriculture at the institution, and then as professor of animal husbandry during the period 1909-1912. In 1912, he joined the staff of the Canada Department of Agriculture serving as Dominion Animal Husbandman until 1919 when he became director of the Experimental Farms Service, a position he held with distinction until his retirement in 1950.

Dr. Archibald is a Fellow and Past President of the Agricultural Institute of Canada, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He was a Commander of the British Empire (CBE) and, also, Commander de l'Ordre de Merit Agricole, an honour conferred upon him by the province of Quebec in recognition of his leadership in the agricultural sphere. He was further honoured when he was awarded the Star of Ethiopia by Emperor Haile Selassie in appreciation of the leadership and direction he provided to that country where he served for two years as advisor on problems of agricultural production and agricultural education.

Woman 101, Recently Honored, Passes

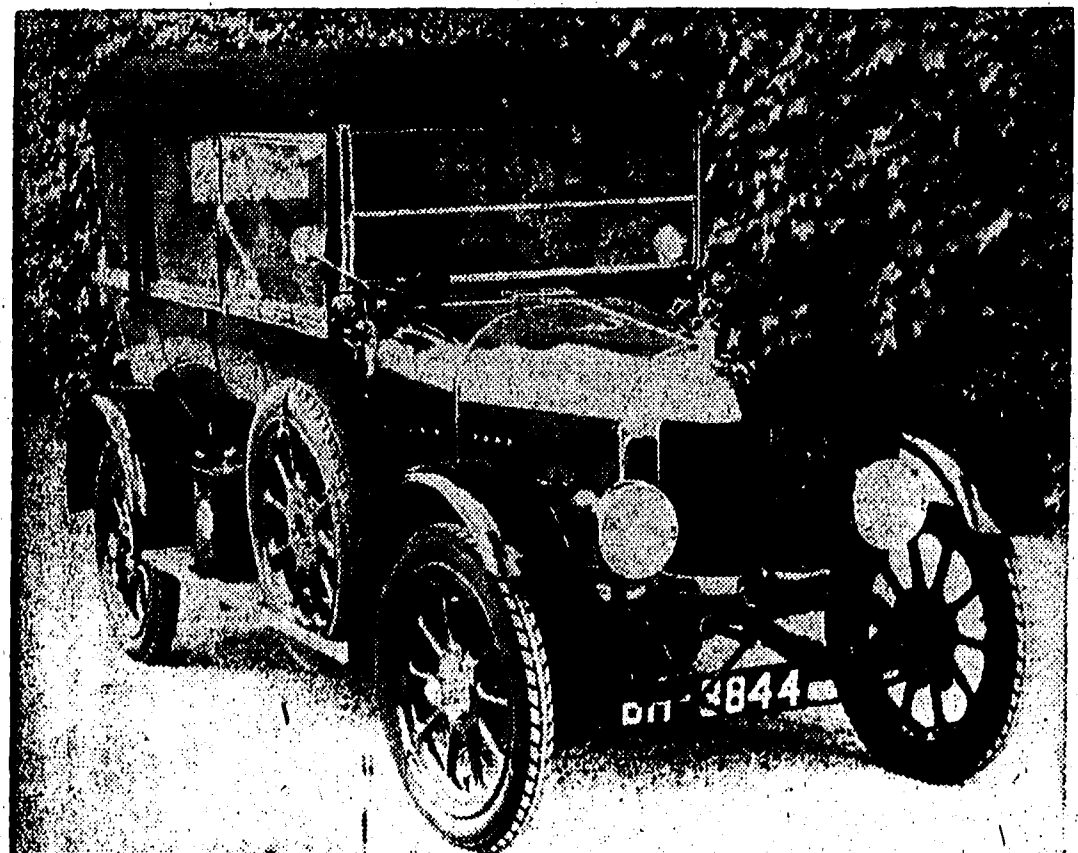

We were still absorbed in figuring how we were going to get out of that "untruthful statement" when we realized that the Mortons had dropped in from New Glasgow and we were greeting them as though they had sauntered down from Queen St. as of yore to pick up the latest Courier edition. We leave our former editorial stand without contradiction.

Like everybody else, Mr. Stanfield had the privilege of changing his mind. This he has done but only, we believe, because he feels called to do a wider service for his country. Mr. Stanfield, we know, did not need to be Premier for the sake of prestige, power or money. His motive was one of unselfishness. This Nova Scotia man has been urged by others and undoubtedly has now seen a need for his quiet, persuasive and commanding personality and obvious ability in a wider field. If successful in obtaining the goal to which he is now reaching we know it is again with nothing but unselfish interest and all Nova Scotians should take pride in his achievements. While we might first have been concerned about a loss to Nova Scotia we might start to gain new pride in the Stanfield unselfish change of mind.



July 27, 1877 —

"A great strike in Pennsylvania has caused millions of dollars damage. Starting in the railway complexes it spread to coal mines and other industry. Troops called in from Washington. 300 wounded in militia forces."

We were in Board of Trade office and we were also printers and advertisers. (Do you see why we are always so reluctant to take on the job of publicity? It is even worse for our business than president or secretary.)

We offer our congratulations to the Board of Trade for their attempt. It was absolutely necessary to produce something. We think, though, that the Board has found home town products can be much more attractive and better done for less cost. Home town printers have learned something, too. They need to be more aggressive in their printing and advertising approach.

It's That Within Which Counts

Church Bell History

Notre Dame de Mont Carmel church in Concession, Digby County, has a bell with a legendary history. The church bell is one which legend says came from Port Royal, hearing of the fate of the Acadians of Grand Pre in 1755 took their money to the village priest for safekeeping. The priest had the bell of the church in Port Royal taken down and placed the money inside the bell and buried it during the night. He was arrested the very next day by the English and taken as prisoner to Halifax. He had not told anyone where he hid the bell and it was not long before the parishioners were also taken and deported.

Twenty years later, Jacob Troop, a colonist from New England, found the bell when plowing his field. It is said that he never mentioned about finding the money in the bell but some of his neighbors did say that he did very little work for several years afterwards and the plow remained where it had struck the bell.

When Mr. Troop heard about the arrival of Rev. Jean Mande Sigogne at Church Point, he brought the bell to the village and presented it to the newly arrived, and first resident priest. It was a very noble gesture. Rev. Sigogne installed the bell which had been silent for 50 years, in a temporary belfry over the only door to the church. This church was situated near the lighthouse at Church Point. A memorial chapel now sits on the site of this church.

During their visit to the Digby area, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis and Mrs. Duncan also spent some time touring scenic spots in the district and spent the weekend at Westport on Brier Island.

Visits Digby

Rev. W. Jack Lewis, Director of Cornell United Religious Work, an inter-faith service organization at Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., was a visitor in the Digby area for several days last week. Mr. Lewis was accompanied on his visit by Mrs. Lewis and by his sister, Mrs. Ruby Duncan.

While in the Digby area, Mr. Lewis visited the community programmes in Plympton, and Marshalltown where Cornell United Religious Work student volunteers are assisting local community organizations in carrying out programmes for the young people in the two communities.

For the past several years student volunteers from C. U. R. W. have been assisting local community organizations in the Digby area in carrying

on such programmes as vacation schools, swimming and water safety instruction for children, sports and recreational activities, tutoring and library development.

The first such programmes in the Digby area in which C. U. R. W. volunteers assisted was in Acaciaville. The programme there was initiated four years ago. Since that time C. U. R. W. volunteers have assisted in the carrying on of youth programmes, sponsored by local community organizations, in Marshalltown and in Plympton. This year marks the third year that a programme has been undertaken in Marshalltown and the first year for Plympton. C. U. R. W. volunteers did not assist with the programme in Acaciaville this summer as the provincial department of welfare have had a "Head

If you are a really good compulsive list maker, the chances are you are a compulsive diary keeper, too. It seems our compulsive list makers just have to have a pencil in our hands. When we are not writing little documents entitled Summertime Outdoor Afternoon Activities, or People to Whom I Owe Invitations, we are penning immortal lines like "went to church in the morning and for a drive in the afternoon." Certainly, as any good compulsive list maker or diary keeper knows, our compulsion does not come, as people who are not seem to think, from a desire to reduce life to a series of neat, orderly packages. Nobody, who spends their days as we do, searching under the mantle clock for one list, and in the knife drawer for another, before we remember we pasted them both on the back cover of a cook book, could live in anything but a state of supreme chaos.

Some people who are not compulsive list makers, or dairy keepers, but who are really, honestly, orderly, like to say that keeping a diary encourages self-discipline. Orderly people, you understand, like to say that doing anything with any degree of regularity encourages self-discipline. The only thing doing things with regularity does for us compulsive list makers is take up time that we could be using to do something more interesting that we do not do regularly.

The kind of diary keeper who works on the self-discipline angle probably uses one of those neat little books with four lines allotted to each day for five years, into which they faithfully record lack-lustre little notes about the weather, or the day's activities, each guaranteed in ten years to make one day absolutely indistinguishable from another. These diaries are safe, of course. If the neighborhood gossip or your fifteen year old son should get hold of it, you will still be able to hold your head up with some dignity.

The compulsive diary keeper uses a notebook. Sometimes he writes one liners every day for a week. Sometimes he writes nothing for a whole month. More often than not, the really significant days in the diary keeper's life are the ones that go unrecorded. Some days the compulsive diary keeper writes two pages of random thoughts brought about by dancing dust particles in a ray of sunlight piercing through a dirty window.

My present series of diaries (journals would perhaps be a better word) has been kept with intermittent regularity, in those large notebooks which fit into ring binders, for something over six years. There have been four moves, three kids, and several summer vacations during these six years, punctuated by days and days of dishes, diapers, and dust. These are the days, the diapers, dishes and dust days, that we compulsive diary keepers really feel impelled to record. If we do not put down somewhere that the middle one spilled apple juice on the livingroom carpet, or that we finally cleaned the kitchen cupboards, that day melts into the day when the oldest spilled grape juice on the bedspread, and we didn't clean the kitchen cupboards.

This series is at least the third of my life. The first one, full of exclamation points, sloppy handwriting, and soul-laid-bare prose of early teens is lying about in someone's attic, waiting to be found some day, and make my life miserable. The second series, which contained all the agonizing emotionalism of late teenhood, was burned with due ceremony when I got married. I felt quite virtuous when I burned it, as if I were leaving my former life behind, but I have regretted it since. The diaries at least were honest, which is more than can be said for the earlier effort. It could, some day, have given an accurate picture of what it was like to be a teenager in the 1950's.

That is the beauty of honest diaries. They give an accurate picture of the time when they were written. An honest diary, too, provides somewhat surprising light reading on sleepless nights. You find so many things which would have been lost if they had not been recorded. You are always surprised, when reading an old diary, how hazy your conception of chronology has grown. "Did that happen," you wonder, "only two weeks after we got there?" After two months you forget that the day you and the children chased a rabbit through the woods was your wedding anniversary. After a year it comes as a surprise to read that the night you took that long walk in the moonlight was the same night your neighbor moved away. And it comes as a shock to realize that the last three times you have been to your favorite restaurant, you have ordered the same meal.

It is not altogether pleasant to discover that you have been promising yourself with astonishing regularity over the past six years to do something about your temper, or to spend more time with the kids, without ever fulfilling your own promises.

Maybe, if we looked at it objectively, us compulsive diary keepers would find that we do not keep a diary to record our uninteresting little lives for posterity, nor do we fancy ourselves undiscovered Shakespeares or Hemingways. Maybe we are really looking for a way to communicate with ourselves. A thought, after all, is not really much good, is it, unless it is expressed. Maybe we are not sure enough of our thoughts to express them out loud, so we try them out on paper first.

Considering Lobster Fishing Problems

Fisheries Minister E. D. Haliburton said the Nova Scotia government is aware that losses of lobster traps by fishermen are serious and widespread in the province as a result of unusually severe storms this spring.

Mr. Haliburton said the government is making conscientious efforts to ensure that lobster fishermen's problems are being dealt with fairly and capably at all government levels.

The minister said the official Nova Scotia government view on the basis of previous experience is that it should attempt to give assistance of a type, and in a manner, similar to that given in the recent past.

He noted that two years ago the province made contributions totalling \$16,000 to fishermen in the Eastern Shore area following trap losses that resulted from unusual ice conditions. The action of local volunteer groups in appealing for and collecting contributions from citizens of the area assisted greatly in the success of that program and

also resulted in a federal government contribution of an equal amount paid by the province, he said.

The fisheries minister said he hoped that a similar arrangement could be worked out on this occasion. At the present time, he said, there are four fund raising campaigns in operation; one for Shelburne County and three covering the Eastern Shore area. When the results of these several campaigns are known, the minister said, the Nova Scotia government will make its contribution and also make appropriate representations to the federal government on behalf of the lobstermen affected.

Mr. Haliburton said the matter of trap insurance for lobstermen is currently being discussed with Ottawa with a view to determining means by which some of the problems associated with storm losses can be alleviated more simply in the future. He noted that under the existing system, lobster trap insurance schemes allow fishermen to insure their traps for 15 days by

paying only 10 per cent of the full season's premium but, for various reasons, very few fishermen have taken advantage of this protection.

The minister said he believes some further investigation of the problem and possibilities will yield suggestions that may well lead to more generally acceptable arrangements. He said he had requested a meeting with federal fisheries department officials to discuss the matter and expressed the hope that both immediate and long-term solutions would be forthcoming for the province's lobstermen.

Fire Department Purchases Building

The Little Brook Fire Department, a voluntary unit, recently purchased the garage building formerly owned by Henry Melanson, at Little Brook to house the fire fighting equipment. The building formerly used by the fire department was too small, especially during the winter months when room is required to dry out the fire hose.

The Little Brook Fire Department was somewhat handicapped following an answer to a fire call in winter months as the department did not have sufficient room in their garage to place the fire hose to dry previously, and it in various garages in the area. Previously, and it caused some inconvenience when they had to be gathered up again when dry or when a second call was made to the department.

The fire department reshingled and repainted the front of the building last week. A house to house canvass in the parish of Church Point and Concession was made and the sum of \$1,180.00 was collected. One area still remains to report on the fund raising campaign.

The Little Brook Fire Department covers the villages of Comcauville, Little Brook, Little Brook Station, Church Point, Grosses Coques, Concession and Lower Concession. The department is a member of the Western Nova Scotia Fireman's Association and is linked up with the Mutual Aid System of Western Nova Scotia.

President Leo O. Saulnier of Little Brook stated that the purchase of the new fire hall is but the first of the several improvements that will be made in 1967 in the fire department. He stated that he was very pleased with the fine response made by the people in the fire district of Little Brook.

Fifth Edition On N. S. Economics

The fifth edition of "Nova Scotia - an Economic Profile" has been released by the Department of Trade and Industry, Hon. W. S. K. Jones announced.

The booklet contains text, statistics, graphs and pictures relating to the various sectors of the economy. Comparative historical data over the last three decades is given to indicate trends.

The purpose of the booklet, as stated in the introduction, is "to present factual, statistical information mainly of an economic nature to a wide variety of users." For those already engaged in business, industry and research activities in the province, the material will be useful in providing perspective on Nova Scotia's economy. For those interested in new development it is intended to provide background information for more specific investigation on an industry or community basis.

The intention is to continue to publish the booklet every two years to incorporate changes in the development of the economy and to bring the statistical information up to date.

The Society of Friends was organized on January 17, 1947.

The main purpose of the meetings besides a social get-together was to learn different handicrafts. However, over the years the handicrafts became secondary and the Club launched into community projects.

From 1951 to 1958 inclusive

a booth was sponsored at the annual Hospital Fair and the total proceeds raised in this manner amounted to approximately \$1300. In 1959 the Club decided to hold a Rummage Sale instead of sponsoring a booth at the Fair.

To date they have raised \$1146.00 which has been used by the Hospital mainly for the purchase of traction equipment.

This year the ninth successive Rummage Sale will be held on Friday, August 4 in the Digby Public Library (former Salvation Army building). The proceeds will again be given to the Digby Hospital towards the purchase of additional traction equipment.

NEW VOCATIONAL SCHOOL TO SERVE DIGBY MUNICIPALITY

Tenders have recently been called by the Nova Scotia Department of Public Works for the construction of the Annapolis Regional Vocational School to be located at Middleton.

This school is part of a general expansion of vocational training facilities for youth in Nova Scotia which will provide for a total of 9,000 to 10,000 student training stations and the construction of 8 new Regional Vocational Schools plus the expansion of some of the existing vocational schools. The construction and equipment costs of the schools will be borne jointly by the Provincial and Federal governments. The Annapolis Regional Vocational School is expected to be completed for opening in September, 1968.

The school at Middleton will serve the western end of Kings County, Annapolis County, Annapolis County, and the Municipality of Digby. 21 courses will be offered for students and will provide for some 672 student stations in the school.

The building is to be of steel and pre-cast concrete construction and will consist of two large wings 300 feet by 92 feet to house 21 industrial shops, 11 academic classrooms, library, conference room, lectures and visual aids

room, laboratory, gymnasium, cafeteria, kitchen, 7 shop classrooms, administration offices, guidance facilities, and other supporting facilities.

The courses to be offered will include carpentry, brick and tile, plumbing, electrical construction wiring, general mechanics, machine shop, welding, motor vehicle repair, mechanical, drafting, architectural, beauty culture, commercial art, retail merchandising, electrical appliance repair, electronics, industrial electricity, and two additional courses that are presently not designated.

The staff of the school will eventually total some 65 to

70 members made up of administration, guidance, industrial and academic teachers, janitorial, clerical, and kitchen personnel. Staff appointments to date are Mr. G. E. Adams, Principal and Administrative Advisor to the Board, Mr. G. E. Emmett, Vice Principal, Mr. G. MacDonald, Chief Guidance Counsellor, and Miss Marie Ryan, Secretary.

All courses will be of two years duration, 6 hours per day, in which the student will spend 5 periods per day undertaking training in the industrial course of his choice, and three periods in English, mathematics, and science classes.

Entrance requirements will vary according to the difficulty of each course and the student's ability to pass entrance tests. However, all students must be 16 years of age by October of the year in which he enrolls. Students in the school are being prepared for the world of work and upon graduation, will move directly into employment.

FOG RECORD AT POINT PRIM

Mariners in general are suffering more than their fair share of fog this summer, and many areas, like Digby, are breaking all records.

Carman Frankland, Lightkeeper in charge at Point Prim told the Courier that the fog horn there blew 586 hours during the month of July, or about ninety per cent of the time. The horn was in operation at some time during every day in July with the exception of the 7th. It blew from July 19-25 without stopping.

According to Mr. Frankland, this is a record month for Point Prim. Data is complete as far back as 1946 when Frank Wilson was in charge of the light and fog horn. The previous records were 378 hours blowing time in July 1964 and 328 hours in 1959. Other summer averages on record have all been less than 200 hours of "horn-blowing". Fog is more prevalent during the months of July and August.

Mr. Frankland brought to the Courier, the log book for 1962, recently found in an old building at Point Prim. Lightkeeper at that time was Leander Ellis. Steam boilers were in operation at the Point at that time and 70 pounds of steam pressure had to be kept in readiness at all times. According to the log, the fog alarm sounded 138 hours during July of 1962.

"de Gaulle Should Have Stayed Home"

"The old man should have stayed home. You cannot quote my disapproval too strongly." Those were the sentiments expressed by Bernard LeBlanc, Bellevue's Cove, Digby County, when interviewed by the Digby Courier on his reaction to the visit in Quebec of the French Republic President, Charles de Gaulle. Mr. LeBlanc is one of French Acadian stock being in the District of Clare where he carries on a successful textile business. Mr. LeBlanc is president of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Board of Trade.

President de Gaulle, while on an official Centennial visit to Canada made remarks which were "not acceptable" (in Prime Minister L. B. Pearson's words) to the government of Canada and Canadian people and was mildly rebuked by the leader of Canada. De Gaulle left Canada without making his scheduled visit to Ottawa. On his return to France de Gaulle further emphasized that France would help the people of Quebec to achieve goals of freedom which they had set for themselves.

Mr. LeBlanc expressed himself as being annoyed, disturbed and upset about the disturbance made by the great president de Gaulle when visiting in Canada and it would have been better if he had not come, he said. He felt de Gaulle had no right to

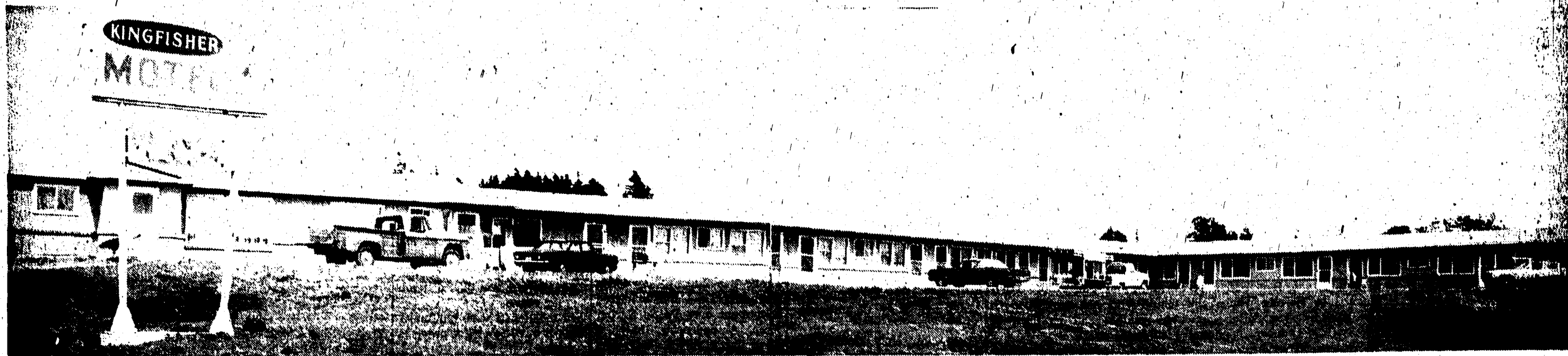

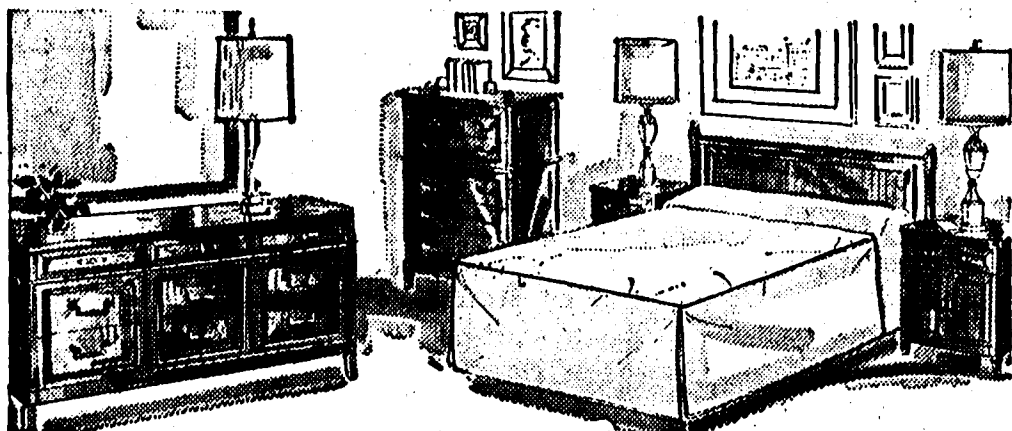

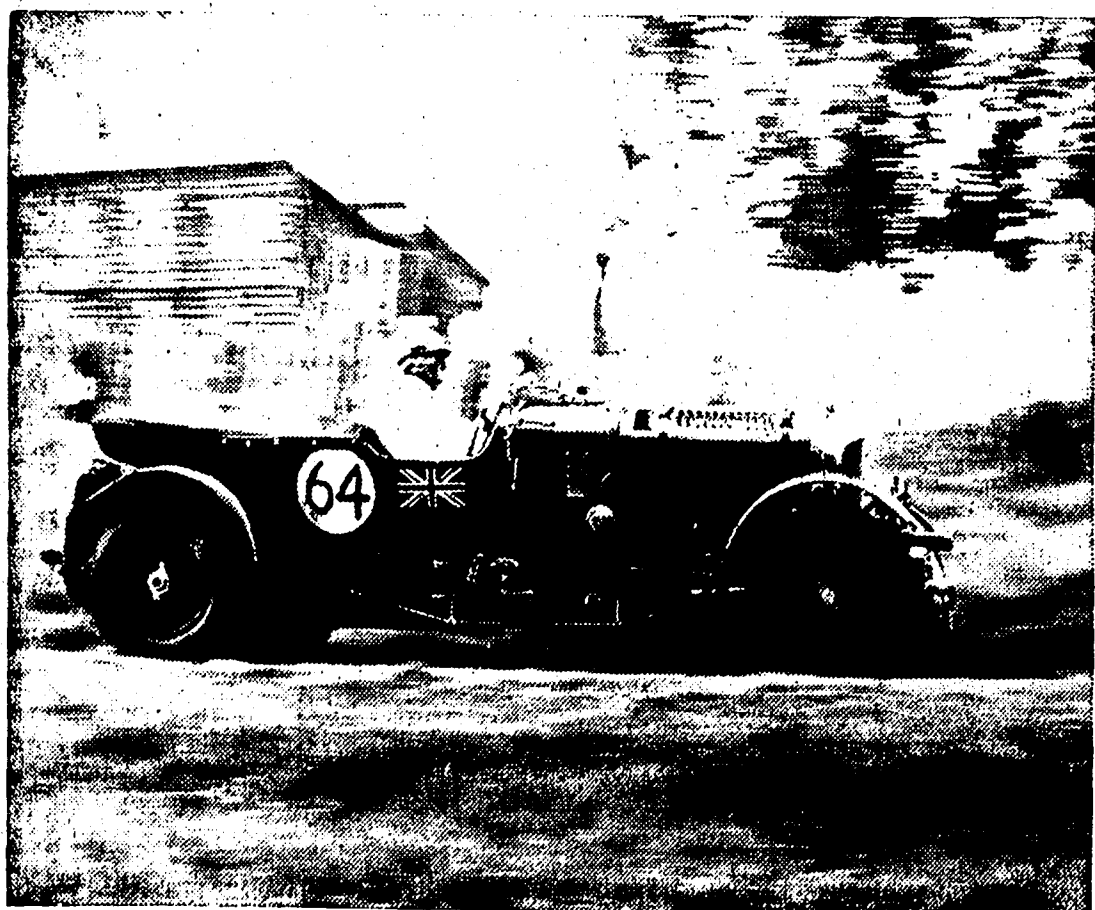

Commission Has Created Scholarships

Expo has provided an unusual means of offering scholarships to students with sufficiently high marks for entering university. A CN Centennial Scholarship Plan has been established by Canadian National to help finance the university education of its employees' and pensioners' dependents.

The plan is financed by the money the company received as commission when it sold to employees, at reduced rates under the payroll deduction plan, Expo 67 passports.

The commission amounted to \$40,000 and it will be used exclusively for the scholarship fund. In addition, CN will match the yearly interest on the fund's balance and will cover, at its own expense, all the administration costs of the plan.

Under the plan, ten \$600 scholarships will be awarded annually over the next 10 years, starting this fall. That's 100 scholarships — one for each year of Confederation. Any student whose parents or guardian is a CN line employee in Canada or pensioner can apply for a scholarship. The scholarship awards will be made to successful applicants entering or enrolled in any Canadian University or college which is a member or affiliated member of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada.

That was my youngest son's enthusiastic reply to my question: "What did you think of Expo?"

He is an assistant city editor on a large metropolitan daily newspaper and former entertainment columnist. I value his reaction. An outright gift of \$500 awaits a bright boy or girl of the Atlantic provinces planning to enter university this fall. There is only one condition: winner must be the child of a member, past or present, of the public fire services, federal, provincial, municipal, volunteer or full-time.

The \$500 will come from the W. J. Scott Fire prevention Memorial Bursary Fund, established in memory of the late Mr. Scott, one of Canada's most distinguished fire fighters. While the winner can choose any university or college, the successful candidate will be selected by the Awards Department of the University of Toronto, Mr. Scott's Alma Mater.

The bursary is administered in trust by the Joint Fire Prevention Publicity Committee Inc., sponsored by the Association of Fire Chiefs Inc. The winner will be chosen after the matriculation exam results are known this summer.

CHARGES NON-COOPERATION

"The long-standing water problem in the town of Digby has gotten to the place where something has to be done," said members of the Digby Town Council in regular session Monday night. "A health problem." "An emergency situation." "An emergency situation." are some of the statements by Council members. It is claimed by council that our Water Commission has the responsibility without the authority and that the time has come to "take steps to correct the problems, even if it's necessary to take steps without the sanction of the Water Utility Board."

Supt. of streets and water, Everett Hall, in his report to the council says "there is four or five times as much chlorine being introduced now into the water system as last summer and still, by the evidence of the last analysis from Halifax, which found high bacteria count, it is not enough to purify the water." In the opinion of Mr. Hall the trouble is at the source and not in the system. He stated no opinions as to how the trouble could be eliminated except to say: "I suggest top authorities in the field of water be found and that we follow their suggestions. The problem is too big for local experts, we must go far-a-field for help. The lake is stagnant, full of algae. Sediment to the depth of 15 feet has collected covering the springs."

Mayor Snow said: "We have had engineers here. We have contacted provincial authorities by letter, phone and in person. Three engineers have looked at the situation here at different times and we have had no report of their findings. In one case, the findings of an engineer were denied to us, the reason being it was a confidential report to the Dept. of Mines."

A motion was finally worded and passed, by the council as follows: "Due to lack of cooperation of responsible authorities with the Digby Water Commission and in view of the serious situation, the council recommends that the Water Commission obtain competent professional advice from other sources and carry out such recommendation without further delay."

SUPT. STREETS AND WATER RESIGNS

At the regular monthly meeting of the Digby Town Council held Monday evening August 7, Superintendent of streets and water, Everett Hall, tendered his resignation. The resignation followed a request by Mr. Hall for Saturday mornings off, asked for at the July meeting and turned down by the committees after study. Reason for the request for the morning off was that Mr. Hall considered he was on 24 hour call and a lot of his work was after regular working hours. The reason for the denial of Saturday morning off was that if Mr. Hall had the morning off then the men were also entitled to the same. In the opinion of the committee, the town, at this time could not afford to do this. (At the meeting Tuesday night of the Digby Water Commission, a motion was passed that "in so far as the Digby Water Commission is concerned, Supt. of Water and Streets, Everett Hall can have Saturday morning off as long as it doesn't effect the work that needs to be done.")

A motion for the town to lease the spur pier and take over the policing, collecting fees for wharfage, etc., was defeated.

Certain changes in town by-laws are being studied and will be discussed at the September meeting.

A letter regarding Acadian Lines bus stop in the town of Digby was read and not clearly understood. Further study and clarification will be sought.

A cost sharing proposal from a provincial department that the town and municipality share in an effort toward control of "noxious weeds" in the municipality was laid on the table.

A letter from Harry L. Baxter requesting better maintenance of St. Mary's street and installation of fire hydrants was read and discussed.

Town Council appointed Luke Dugas a special constable, to give Mr. Dugas necessary authority to police the Knight's of Columbus dances.

In the police report Chief of Police Dunn reported a total of 15 complaints were registered with this department, of which four required some

field investigation of those concerned.

As a result of investigation, 10 cases warranted court action. All except one case has been disposed of before the court. Eight cases under the Liquor Control Act, one under the Criminal Code and three under the motor vehicle act. One death was investigated and found to be suicide. The resulting fines amounted to \$70.00.

Police car patrol for the month of May, 1967, miles. Gasoline purchased 107.6 gallons.

During the month of July the men spent 386 hours on maintenance of the water distributing system. 130 hours on "Capital Water" which included the installation of the pressure relief valve at the chlorine plant. On August 2 the water consumers of the town were instructed to boil all water before using same for human consumption. This notice was issued by the Dept. of Public Health after analysis of water samples taken from various points throughout the town, which proved to have a high bacteria count.

A total of 2,118 hours at a total cost of \$2,398.01 was charged through "streets account" for maintenance, grading, graveling shoulders, applying chloride to dirt streets, cleaning streets and ditches, repairing Racquette bridge, applying asphalt, servicing and repairing equipment. 893 hours at a cost of \$1,009.88 was spent on "capital sewers" which consisted of laying sewer line to the new Kingfisher Motel. The sewer line is now in operation. A few minor connections remain to be made and cleaning up the streets and sidewalks in the vicinity must be completed before figures will be available on the cost of the sewer line.

28 hours was spent on building repairs which consisted of painting inside town hall and laying new stair treads. The Superintendent's car was used 883 miles at a cost of \$98.00.

A tag day for the Digby Mental clinic was granted for September 1, 1967.

Permission was granted by council for the mayor to attend the N. S. Municipalities Conference this month.

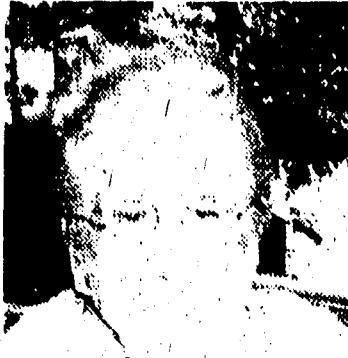

"Call the newspaper today," the radio announcer said, "and a trained want-ad taker will help you write your ad."

I had a momentary vision of a row of aspiring want-ad takers, sitting dutifully on gaily painted stools, like the kind elephants and seals sit on in a circus, while somebody, with appropriate rewards and punishments trained them. That is the kind of picture I always get when people talk about trained nurses, or trained singers, or trained strawberry pickers. Somehow, the thought of a trained human being smacks of something rendered mindless.

But then there is that related word, education. Whenever people these days hear of a college graduate earning more than \$6,000. per year, they nod their heads and cluck knowingly that "You have to have an education to get along these days." To most people, the word education seems to mean a ticket to a higher income bracket. It seems to me that education is the understanding of the beautiful, of the world, and the arts, and men's minds, of atoms, and acids, and physiology, and the strange fascination of all those millions of people, who were so like us, who have caused the making of history. If I were to define the aim of education, I would say it is to instill in us the ability to sit under a tree and do nothing profitably.

Even if education has nothing to do with money, it seems we all have to earn some of it, and we all have to learn how. This leaves a very large place between the training of barking seals and esoteric education. Most likely doctors and nurses, teachers and concert pianists, master plumbers and television repairmen are better at their jobs for being good sitters-under-trees, but the best sitters-under tree in the world, without being taught by someone who is an expert at it could not enter an exacting line of work. I suppose training is the best word to describe this process. If we called it special education; or something, it would be artificial, like that word "homemakers" the magazines keep trying to force on us housewives to bolster our egos. I suppose the word "training" will have to do, as long as the product of the training is not a trained secretary.

I really had not intended to start a long discourse on education. What I meant to talk about was words and their use. You will notice I did not say "usage." "Usage", it seems to me, is a word the English language would be better without. The shorter word, use, is better in almost every instance where people say "usage." What about "packaging" when package will do? And how about silly-cute words like "little girl's room" for bathroom. And if you were eighty-five, wouldn't you rather be called an elderly lady, or even an old lady, than an oldster?

A few weeks ago we saw a not-so-very-old movie on television, in which the highest praise the heroine, a proper lady school teacher who was supposed to have molded the characters of two generations could bestow, was to call someone "genteel." Up until that point, I had thought genteel was such an awful word that nobody ever used it seriously. It conjures up, to me, visions of vulgar social climbers, putting on airs and manners that they do not understand, in order to make themselves appear like their idea of the "upper class".

Now that I have started, I can think of a couple of dozen more words that annoy me. One is that darling of the dilettians, "planned-overs," and another is "culture" when it is used to mean a phony regard for things high-brow. A pox too, on all sports announcers who say "X team are heading down the ice," and on school announcements which claim that Grade IX are having their annual picnic. There is only one team, and it is heading down the ice, and the only grade IX in the school is having its picnic. But I am fighting a losing battle with this one.

However, it is late, and this year's class of "trained typists" are not clamboring at my door. See you next time I put on the coffee.

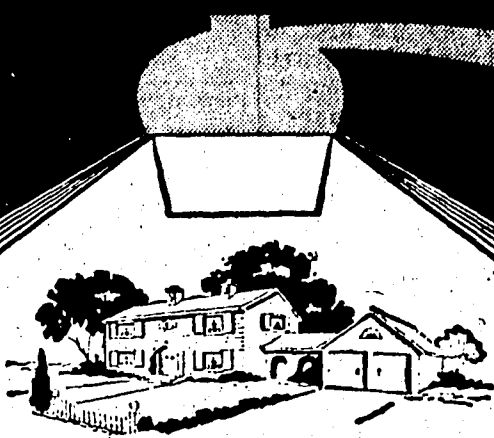

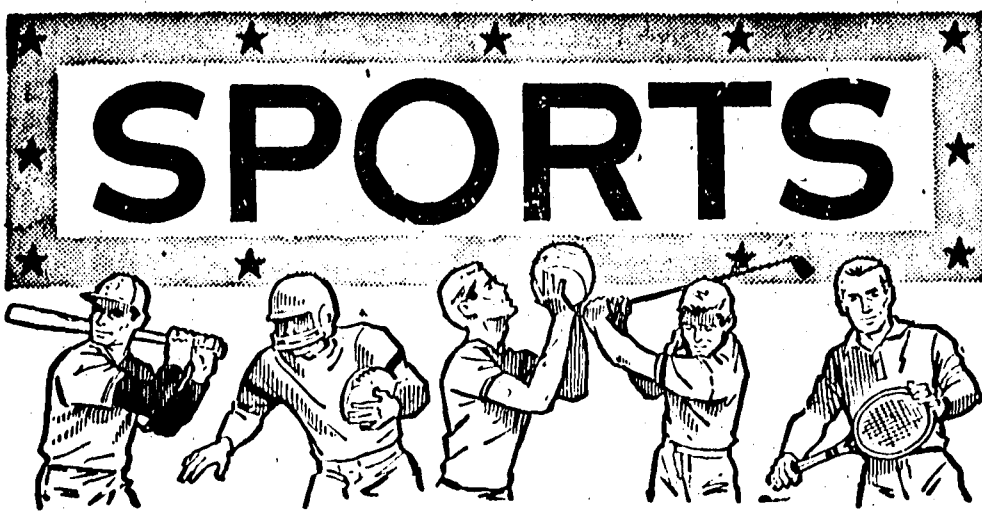

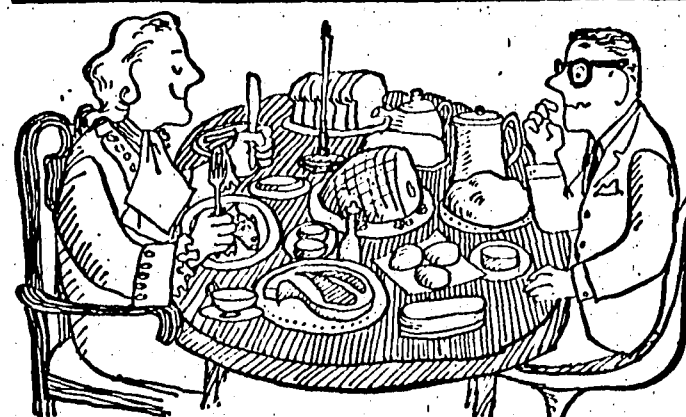

Ever Try An 18th Century Breakfast?



Are you one of the millions of Canadians who dash off to work or school each day with not much more than a cup of coffee under your belt?

Consider the situation had you lived in 18th Century England.

"The English," wrote Jessup Whitehead, "believe in taking a tolerably substantial meal to begin the day." To which the American writer, Irvin S. Cobb added this postscript: "Next to the Magna Carta, an Englishman's breakfast is his most sacred rite."

The great English "sideboard" breakfast is described by Anthony Trollope:

"The tea consumed was the very best, the coffee the very blackest, the cream the very thickest, there was dry toast and buttered toast, muffins and crumpets, hot breads and cold breads, white bread and brown bread, homemade bread and baker's bread, wheaten bread and oatmeal bread; and if there be other breads than these, they were there. There were eggs in napkins and crispy bits of bacon under silver covers; and there were little fishes in a little box, and devilled kidneys frizzling on a hot water dish. Rumours CFB Cornwallis To Expand

Philip Woolaver, head of the "Save Cornwallis" campaign organized in Digby in 1966, said when interviewed that there is sufficient indication to justify optimism for the expansion of C.F.B. Cornwallis. He also commended the citizens of Digby and area in working together on the project without any type of class segments to hinder the campaign progress.

During the year 1966, reports seemed to indicate that the base would be closed. Citizens became alarmed and through sponsorship of the Digby Branch Canadian Legion, a committee was formed to place before authority the advantages of a base at Cornwallis and the economic benefits, which were so sorely needed as a boost to the area should the C. F. B. Cornwallis stay open.

Later developments, when navy women were also brought to Cornwallis for basic training, encouraged citizens of Digby. The reports of the last week which have come down from Ottawa through news media and indicating expansion has given a new boost to the morale in the town and countryside. Although definite word from government officials has not yet come to Digby or Cornwallis, to the knowledge of the Digby Courier, it is presumed that reports of the base expansion to handle men and women of the army, navy and air force might be in the minds of those in authority.

Joint Paving Project

R. Baden Powell, M.L.A. has been advised by J. O. Millard, Halifax, Executive Assistant to the Minister of Highways, Hon. Stephen Pike that a shared project with the Town of Digby on town repaving will be undertaken. The repaving includes Warwick Street from the end of 1964 repaving via Montague, Water, Birch and Carleton Streets to the junction of the Racquette Road, approximately 1.5 miles. The Racquette Road, from Carleton Street to the Town line, approximately 0.5 mile. The Shore Road, from the Racquette Road to the end of paving at Digby Pines Hotel, approximately 0.4 mile.

Negotiations have been completed whereby Eastern Coronet Paving Ltd. will carry out the program.

Mr. Prime, director of wildlife conservation for Nova Scotia's department of lands and forests (formerly of Freeport) said Friday there is no immediate threat of rabies in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Prime and there is always a possibility that the disease can be transmitted to animals in this province, but rabies is not now a threat.

The said disease had been declining in New Brunswick during the past few months.

A directive issued by the department to counteract reports that the spread of the disease to Nova Scotia was imminent says: "Rabies has not been identified in Nova Scotia nor within 150 miles of its borders, and reported evidence in animals in New Brunswick now appear to be definitely on the decline."

There appears to be no imminent threat to this province from this ancient disease of Canadian wildlife.

The report says there is no great urgency for Nova Scotians to have pets or livestock inoculated against rabies until at least one case has been reported in this province. "Appropriate preparatory steps have already been taken by the health of animals branch of the Canada department of agriculture to routinely check out all suspected cases of rabies and to be prepared to organize appropriate action if and when an outbreak should occur in Nova Scotia," the report says.

Since last August we've torn up, thrown out, rebuilt and installed just in a small measure but, even at that, there were points when we would have been happy to turn our backs on the whole process. We just didn't like the commotion, disorder, inconvenience and bills to meet. But here we are, believe it or not, with our heads still above water and, at least, can recognize ourselves in 1967 by the word progress.

There have been favourable comments on the physical appearance of the Courier, the "new look" in style and make-up, we've been praised for content in quantity and quality. We've been praised for accurate reporting but the highest complaint we've been paid for our exceptional community mindedness and contribution.

The last comment is the one which pleases us most for unless we are making a contribution to the life of Digby County, we might as well close our doors. We feel we cannot take entire credit for this feat at the editor's desk. A newspaper, to contribute fully to community life, needs the co-operation of correspondents in the villages, it needs writers of Letters to the Editor, readers, advertisers and all those who pay their bills promptly. These all add up; believe it or not, to the contribution on any newspaper can make, whether or not the editor or publisher is community spirited.

One of the adverse criticisms we have flung at us is that we are never "against anything." This we feel is an unjust criticism for we are against things but not just for the sake of being against. We feel there are plenty who are prone to tear down, but not so many who share the burden of building on to those things which are already good. Those who do nothing more than tear down, also do nothing more than hinder the progress of our communities. A function of a newspaper is to mould and direct public thought and community pride by helpful and constructive criticism when necessary and by trumpeting the merits of the community whatever they happen to be. This we feel we do.

Of course, a major function of any newspaper is to bring the news of the community to the community. Here help is needed from every source. Unless a newspaper knows it cannot publish the facts. A free press must have easy access to news of every kind. Otherwise it is hampered in its function. The local small-town news paper must have the small bits of personal news to properly fill its niche, it must be the community shopping guide and it must be acquainted with leading activity in community life such as school, hospital, town or village governing activity or anything which affects the lives of its readers.

We close volume 92 today. We look forward to volume 93 with the utmost confidence.

Somehow, I had nothing special to talk about this week. I came out doors, to sit under the honeysuckle bush with my typewriter, in the hope that an inspiration might present itself. The children, and some neighbor children were digging a pit over by the woodpile, "to catch bad people and bad animals in." I asked them how they were going to keep good people and animals from falling into it, and they explained that they were going to build a fence around it. This left me at a loss for an explanation of how the bad ones would get in, so I went back to banging dully at the keys.

There is a rustling sound in the honeysuckle, about five feet from me. I turn to look. A tame little Cedar Waxwing took a peck at one of the ripening berries, cocked its head, regarded me solemnly for a minute and took another bite. I realized there were about six of the small, buff colored birds, happily gorging themselves quite unimpressed with my presence.

I was about to call the children over, when I noticed they were no longer at their pit. A few minutes later they emerged from the house. My six year old carried a small red bucket. He, and his entourage of small boys, and one small girl, trooped across the street to show the neighbors his collection of what he calls baby lobsters. We found them in a freshwater stream. They are a sort of greenish brown color. The largest was less than three inches long, and they do look exactly like miniature lobsters. I believe they must be crayfish, although I had never before come across crayfish in the Maritimes. The present plan is to establish a new domicile for them in the brook which runs past our house.

Our six year old is a budding naturalist, I hope. At least I think he would be, if we adults, with our remarkable ingenuity for botching such things do not somehow stifle his interest. At the present time, this family cannot go anywhere, where there just might be a puddle without carrying at least one old soup can. A bucket is better. Our pint sized Charles Darwin loads his bucket with worms, frogs, turtles, or snails, or, barring any of these with tadpoles. Even when we come home from a fishing expedition, he fervently puts his catch in the bath-tub, in the hope that it might turn itself around the right way, and start swimming, and we can keep it for a pet. Two frogs we were keeping for pets disappeared without a trace. For weeks I half expected something shiny and green to jump out at me every time I moved a piece of furniture. The mystery of the missing frogs was solved when frog number three jumped from his ice cream container home directly into the waiting claws of Black Cat. We managed to rescue frog number three, but we have been trying to persuade six year old since that frogs are happier in their own homes than in places where cats chase them.

I cannot remember when our young naturalist began to be fascinated with anything which moves. When he was two he used to bring handfuls of earthworms into the house. Once, when he was gazing at a particularly slithery handful in rapt admiration, I asked him why he liked worms so much. "Worms talk to me," he said, with a dreamy expression, as if he could not hope for me to understand. I think, since then, snakes, rabbits, toads and porcupines must have talked to him as well.

Just a few days ago, I caught him crawling along the rafters in the garage, trying to catch a bird which he insisted had just hatched from its shell, a rather rare phenomenon for August. During the spring, he kept under his special protection, a nest in a nearby tree. Unfortunately, in spite of, or perhaps because of, a small boy's diligent daily climbing of the tree, the eggs never did hatch. In sympathy for a small boy's disappointment, I foster the belief that the cats chased the parents away.

They are coming back now, with the red can full of baby lobsters. The cedar waxwings are still twittering in the honeysuckle bush. I guess it must be time to start supper.

I don't know, do you, how you tell what your kids talents are, and how you encourage them?

Of course the above questions are not new, and they are being asked by a number of laymen like myself, who are very much concerned. When will steps actually be taken to permanently correct what is wrong with our town of Digby water supply? It is necessary that something be done soon.

To a Digby water user like myself, the lack of understanding between the Digby Water Commission, engineers, hired by the town and the Nova Scotia Water Authorities is frustrating.

I abhor letters to the editor that set forth in meticulous detail, and sometimes violent language, faults and at the same time make no suggestions as to how to correct them. Therefore as a layman, and in all humility, I set down the problems, as I see them, with some of their possible solutions. I am hoping that if enough people write about the problems (and their solutions) the problem will somehow go away.

Problems: Algae, lack of water in dry seasons, color of water in lower dam at Lily.

Solutions: Algae: and lack of water—Algae made worse by shallowness of lake due to build up of sediment and diatomaceous earth in lake. Pump lake bottom clear of sediment.

Eels in system — Watch screening carefully in maintenance.

Color of water in lower dam can be controlled by removal of soft wood trees above the lake and filtering through sand or some other medium.

Odor of water. Caused by decaying algae which can be controlled by removal of sediment from the lake bottom. Don't allow water level above rock rim.

Number one problem and the solution most likely to improve water: Pump sediment from lake bottom to a depth to allow 15 feet more water below rock rim. This should clear the springs and allow plenty of depth to prevent algae growth.

In the opinion of Supt. Hall, our water troubles are not in water piping system but in the lake. I agree.

Employ reputable firm of Water Engineers and follow their suggestions whether or not their findings agree with the above, or with the council's opinion.

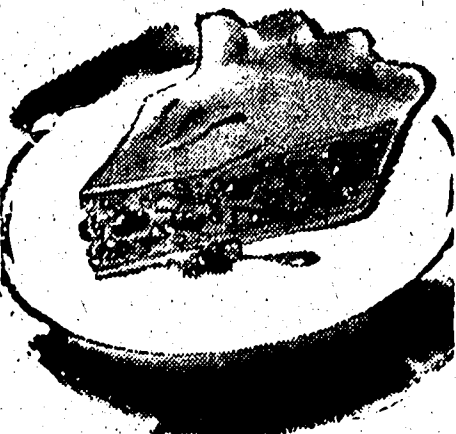

90 Years Back

FROM EARLY FILES OF THE DIGBY COURIER

August 17, 1877 -

"The branch from Halifax to Windsor of the "W. and A. Railway" is being taken over by the Western Counties Railway. Between 20 and 30 employees are notified of their dismissal. Those still retained are notified of reduction of wages."

"Mr. J. M. Constant, Truro, was the purchaser of the "Truro Times" which is still conducted by Mr. Fisher."

The weather in Digby County during the year 1877 was about the same as in 1967 according to items in the Courier of that year. The sun was seen rarely, the atmosphere damp. Hay crops were a failure. Fears were held for potato crops. "Fog like a huge pall has been mantling over sea and land, hiding the sun from view."

The editorial in the issue of August 17, 1877 talked about advertising. R. S. McCormick, Editor and Proprietor, in part said: "What directs the flow of immigration and business to any place? Not silence but, advertising. What attracts the stream of travel? Advertising, either by history, poetry or literature of some sort, but always by means of the press. We may here perhaps venture to violate the proverbial modesty of this county, by the remark that many Americans and other tourists have been thus drawn to the healthful climate and lovely scenery of Digby County, by our own local paper, as we have had good reason to know."

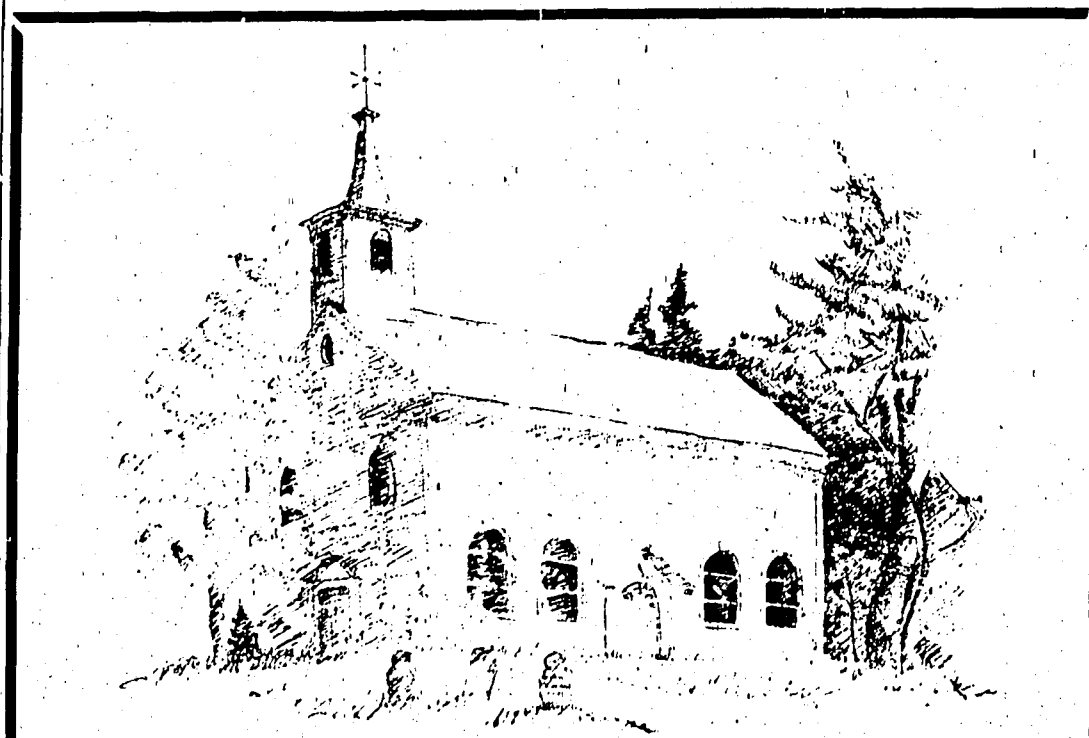

BEAVER BROOK FARMS ANSWERS CRITICISMS

Only 32 flats or 184 pints of strawberries were sold on the local market by Beaver Brook Farms Ltd., M. E. Jamerson, manager at the farm told strawberry growers and government officials at a meeting in Cambridge, Kings Co., last week. The meeting was called by the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing to hear the report for the year on the farm. Total number of flats of strawberries shipped by Beaver Brook Farms Ltd., to out-of-the-province markets during the 1967 season was 35,426. Mr. Jamerson was answering a criticism made at a meeting of strawberry growers, held at Kentville earlier when press reported that Beaver Brook Farms offered tough competition for the other local growers.

The meeting held at Cambridge on Wednesday night was chaired by F. E. Scammell, Director of Market Development for the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and was attended by Hon. E. D. Haliburton, charged that some farmers were wasting time and missing the point of the whole pilot project at Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. He said that the pilot project had no effect on local markets because all the berries go out of the province. He suggested farmers stop quibbling and get out of the farm what they can get. "The project," Mr. Haliburton stated, "was first started five years ago when a Digby man came time and time again with the reprimand that the government was not doing anything for Digby and strawberry growers. The staff of the department went to Digby to help. M. E. Jamerson in

Florida was contacted, and fortunately his services were able to get berries to the consumer. He had demonstrated this year that even with bad weather and muddy fields the project was successful because of methods used. Surely, Mr. Haliburton said, this contribution is worth a lot of money.

Mr. Haliburton said that if the year had been a good one in weather, the strawberry crop would have been fantastic. If dependance was on the local market, the strawberry acreage would have been cut in half.

Mr. Jamerson showed a film on the proper handling of strawberries which he said had been beneficial to the pickers who had seen it. The price of strawberries, he said, depended on the quality. The berries must be firm and not overripe. He also cautioned against over supplying the market if the price is to be kept up.

Mr. Jamerson said there was a great market potential in Boston and other American cities. He gave a breakdown on where he had shipped berries in the 1967 season as follows: 7,639 flats to Boston; 6,896 flats to New York city; 5,512 flats to Philadelphia; 504 flats to Pittsburgh; 5,547 flats to Cleveland; 4,624 flats to Cincinnati; 432 flats to Baltimore; 1,616 flats to Raleigh, N. C.; 662 flats to Charlotte, N. C.; 240 flats to Atlanta, Ga.; 960 flats to Miami; 218 flats to Washington, D. C.; and 576 flats to Indianapolis.

Prices for berries shipped by air were not necessarily higher than those shipped by refrigerated transport truck. Mr. Jamerson said. This summer would have been bad for shipping by air because of fog. Time to Boston, by air from Digby is two to three hours and by truck, 9 hours. The difference in price ranges approximately \$1.00 per flat by air and thirty-four cents by truck.

Mr. Jamerson said that any information pertaining to refrigeration, farming, shipping or any other information at Beaver Brook Farms is open to the public for the asking. He said that strawberry growers should know by now that the Nova Scotia markets are not big enough to take all the berries which can be grown here. He suggested the farmers change their ways of supervision, farming, precooling, trucking and selling.

Several strawberry growers who were present at the meeting and who had shipped through Beaver Brook Farms testified to Mr. Jamerson's remarks and spoke of the high price and satisfaction in shipping which they had enjoyed. Two businessmen from Digby spoke of the noticeable economic benefits of the farm to Digby.

Discussion was also held on the possibility of processing if not up-to-standard berries. The rainfall this summer had been 9 inches and Mr. Jamerson remarked "the government cannot control the weather."

"Fog Bound Tiverton"

Writers who speak of fog bound coasts could be referring to Tiverton.

Murray Outhouse, light-house keeper at Boars Head, tip end of Tiverton on Long Island, Digby Co., said he has been tending the light and alarm for 17 going on 18 years and has never seen so much fog as there has been since the first of July this summer.

During July the whistle blew 660 hours and 30 minutes. There was one day and an occasional hour during the month that it was not necessary to blow the alarm. However from the 13th to 27th, it blew steadily without a break.

During the month of August, to date, the whistle has been blowing 442 hours and 30 minutes. "It looks as though August will reach July's record," said Mr. Outhouse.

Five Of Seventeen From Digby County

Eighty six rural communities in Nova Scotia have entered competition in the Rural Beautification Centennial Project. This project sponsored jointly by the Women's Institute of Nova Scotia, and the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture has been carried on for the past three years, as a Centennial Project.

A new section in this year's program was for commercial or business establishments in rural areas, and 17 entries were received, 5 of these in Digby County.

One of the interesting features of this program has been a special competitive section for Century Farms. A total of 140 entries have been received from farm owners who are operating a farm held in the same family of descendants for the past 100 years or more. A great deal of historical material has been assembled on these Century Farms.

A Provincial award will be made in the Community Project and the Century Farm sections, selected from the top winners in the counties.

In addition to the entries in the Century Farm competition, there are 57 entries for Farm Homes and Buildings.

There are 147 entries in the Small Holdings section, and 39 entries in projects for Youth Groups.

Of total entries, Digby Co. has 32. There are 86 community project entries in all eighteen counties of which Digby County has three entries. Three entries are from Digby County in the 57 Farm Homes and Buildings, seven of the 140 Century Farms, six of the 147 Small Holdings, five of the seventeen Commercial, eight of the 39 Youth Groups and 12 of the 536 Century Farm Plaques. Annapolis County has a total of 24 entries, five in community projects, three in Farm Homes and Buildings, nine in Century Farms, five in Small Holdings, one in Youth Groups, one Commercial and 30 Century Farm Plaques.

Ferry Scow Grounded

— Passengers And Vehicles Stranded

About 15 - 20 cars were stranded at East Ferry on Sunday as a result of a broken reverse gear in the main engine of the ferry boat during transportation of passengers and vehicles from Tiverton to East Ferry. The incident occurred at about 5 p.m. when one of the boat's operators, Welton Ossinger was in charge of the boat. A spokesman said when Mr. Ossinger reached the ramp at low water and attempted to put the scow in its proper position for unloading vehicles by reversing the engine, the gear refused to work. Instead the boat continued ahead and drove the scow so far up the ramp it became grounded there. A dragger at East Ferry was summoned to assist in removing the scow but failed in the attempt. The scow remained grounded until flood tide when it floated free between 7:30 and 9 p.m.

However, because of the lack of sufficient power of the ferry boat and the dense fog together with the heavy pull of the flood tide only one load of vehicles was transported to the island.

Passengers and drivers of the vehicles were forced to leave the vehicles at East Ferry and return to the islands. Long Island and Westport by boat. Regular ferry service resumed Monday morning about 9 a.m. when the spare ferry boat was brought to Tiverton from Westport.

Captain of the ferry boat, David Outhouse and Hilton Sollows said they could not understand what caused the gear to break as it had been recently installed. The ferryman are deserving of a great deal of credit. They walked the length of the line-up of cars at East Ferry explaining to each driver exactly what had happened and apologized for the inconvenience the trouble was causing. They assured everyone that everything possible was being done and then worked late in unpleasant weather conditions to get each passenger safely to the island.

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About This And That

Own Worst Enemy

We are all familiar with the saying "He (she) is his (her) own worst enemy". It is so easy to substitute Digby for he or she. That is exactly what we'll be doing if some one doesn't soon raise a voice of protest to counteract some of the false impressions which are being circulated about one of our newest, most progressive industries in Digby County known as Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. We sat in a meeting at Cambridge, Kings' Colon Wednesday night, attended by intelligent persons when questions were asked, "Is it true?" We heard... is it right?" Fortunately, only a few simple answers to the queries were needed to set anxious minds at ease and the meeting ended with a positive note. Practically everybody at the meeting began to realize that Digby had something worthwhile here and not just a "strawberry patch" or a "that thing in Digby". Minds were relieved of misinformation and strawberry growers right there began to seek advice on proper methods and substances for use in improving their own private farming operations. Some became interested in the possibility of more distant markets and pool transportation. It looked very much as if the project at Digby will benefit farmers miles away when they are given an opportunity to see "the strawberry patch" in its true light. There is no reason either why they shouldn't make use of the Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. facilities and know-how. It is a government sponsored project with its main purpose to benefit all small fruit and vegetable growers throughout the province. Sometimes we think Digby might be the last to get on the band wagon and help to build the industry. We can't seem to get away from being our own worst enemy.

We are all to blame. Far too many of us have been taking the attitude, when hearing uncalled for remarks about Beaver Brook Farms Ltd., of passing it all off with a shrug of the shoulders and the expression, "Take it from whence it came." We recall ourselves passing off adverse criticism on the farm last Spring as just so much usual political propaganda. This was wrong and still is wrong as was noted by questions asked at Valley meetings last week. Seemingly unimportant little statements have a habit of travelling afield and taking on magnitude and impetus in travelling.

Two men, at least, from Digby and unconnected with the strawberry business publicly stood up for the already noticeable better economy in the area due to the Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. strawberry operations this summer. (Figure it for yourself and for easy figuring take 500 strawberry pickers averaging \$5 per day for just 5 days. That is \$12,500 in circulation around Digby in 5 days.) We have every right to scream and yell and tuss and fume and coax and request if we think we are not getting our just share of government attention in Western Nova Scotia (yea, even Digby). We have the same right to rant and rave, against any deliberate misinformation which hinders progress in what is being done in our midst and in all good faith for our benefit. Let's stop being our own worst enemy.

Tell me about Snow White and the Seven Dwarves. I said to my four year old daughter a week after we had taken our children and the neighbor children to see Walt Disney's now classic twenty-eight year old film. She was in the process of climbing over the verandah rail.

"Oh, I can't," she said as she sailed down to earth on the other side of the rail.

"Come on now," I insisted. "Don't you remember the movie? What did you like best about it?"

"I liked everything," she said. She turned a somersault on the grass.

"Well," I asked, wondering if it had been worth while at all to take them, "were there any parts you didn't like?"

"I liked it all," she told me again. At this point she was hanging by the knees from a low tree branch.

"What did Snow White do?" I asked, hoping to prod her memory at least a little.

My daughter picked the head off one of the goldenrod which are beginning to herald autumn around here. "She picked flowers," she said, handing me hers.

"Are dwarves little people, or big people?" I asked.

"Big people," she said, "only they're little big people."

I gave up. They seemed to enjoy the picture when we had them there. There was much talk before we arrived at the cinema about how they would cope with the scenes which showed the wicked witch. When she appeared on the screen, they whispered to each other that they did not have to look if they did not want to, but their curiosity was stronger than their timidity. One remarked, when the hideous old hag began to pole her barge down the stream, that he wished the boat would sink. I could feel the body of the little girl who was sitting on my lap grow tense, but nobody wanted to miss a second of the excitement.

I do not know if they are making kids braver these days than we were in my day, or if I was just innately chicken hearted. In any case, I must have tried to see Snow White about five times when I was a child, but I had to wait until I took my children before I had the nerve to see it through. Always before, at the point where the wicked queen changed herself into a witch, I panicked and either slid under the seat, or left the theatre.

This time, as an adult who was not worried about the outcome of the story, and without the child's capacity to become thoroughly involved with what was happening on the screen, I could view the thing objectively. After twenty-eight years, the print which we saw was a bit jumpy. I scarcely had time to focus on the position of the characters, when they had assumed another position, without, somehow, having moved. Either this improved during the film, or I got used to it, because about half way through, it ceased to bother me. I marvelled at some of the art work, now that I am old enough to appreciate it. I wondered if some of the scenes, like that view of a misty castle seen through a frame of trees, which have since become cliches, may have been brand new and fresh in 1939. I had the feeling they were. That little gem of a sequence, which I even enjoyed in my chicken hearted days where Snow White sings into a well, and her voice makes rings in the water, must rank as one of the most beautiful in movie history. I was terribly impressed this time around by the skillful expression of emotions in the animals, achieved only by their positions, a slumped shoulder, a perked up ear, a head gone heavy.

Maybe they ought to restrict children's films to people eighteen or over. Kids don't get half the fun from them adults do.

Propose Telephone Link

Special voting ballots — green for yes and pink for no are being mailed to some 2,300 telephone subscribers in the Bear River (Cornwallis) and Annapolis exchanges and neighbouring communities this week, to find out whether they want a common telephone hook-up, without long distance charges.

R. T. Cooper, of Yarmouth, Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company Ltd., manager for the area, said how subscribers mark their ballots will determine whether M. T. & T. will apply to the Utilities Commission to inaugurate the new service.

Known as E.A.S., for Extended Area Service, the arrangement will cost householders an extra 25 cents monthly and business either 50 cents or \$1.00, depending on whether they have a private or shared line.

In turn the toll charges between the exchange areas will be eliminated and subscribers will be able to make an unlimited number of free calls throughout a wider area.

Similar E.A.S. plans have been inaugurated or are pending in Kentville-Wolfville, Canning, Brookfield-Truro, Kingston-Middleton, and Pictou-New Glasgow, in recent years.

Mr. Cooper said that Annapolis and nearby centres have 1,216 main telephones with about 200 extensions, and Bear River-Cornwallis and nearby centres have 1,092 main telephones and 64 extensions.

During the past year, a sampling of subscribers' opinion in both exchanges was taken and indications were that most subscribers were in favour of the proposal.

The service, if approved, would commence in early 1968.

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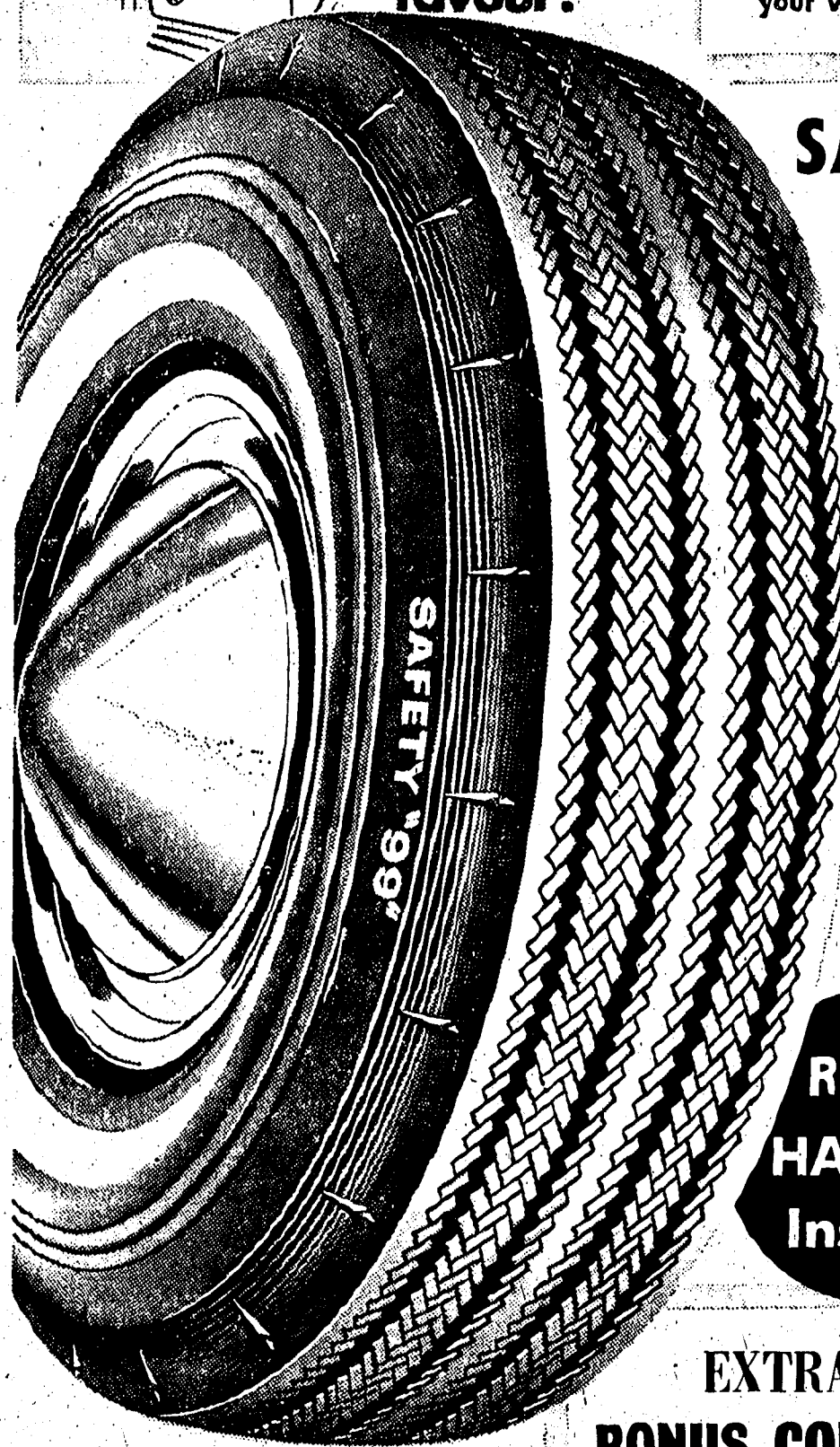

Centennial Project Bear River Women's Institute 1867 - 1967

A Centennial project of the Bear River Women's Institute is to compile a list of the century old houses in the village and surrounding areas.

We have consulted any available data, and an old map dated 1864, on which many of the original houses are shown. Many of the properties have changed hands frequently and the houses have been remodelled — but we welcome any further information as to dates and any errors made.

One farm property, now owned and occupied by Mr. Ronald Purdy, has on it the original house, built in 1827 by his maternal great grandfather, Mr. Wm. Nicholl, an Englishman who came out from the old country about 1800. He was also the first school teacher, and first postmaster. This property has been in the family for four generations.

Another farm property, also on the Sissiboo Road, has been in the same family for four generations. The house was built in 1834, by Boomer Chute, — the great grandfather of Mrs. Gordon Morine (nee Idella Chute), the present owner.

The Obadiah Chute house was built before 1864 — and has also been owned by the same family to the present time — present owner Mrs. Gordon Morine.

The Freeman McDormand property has also been owned and occupied by four generations — with no change of family.

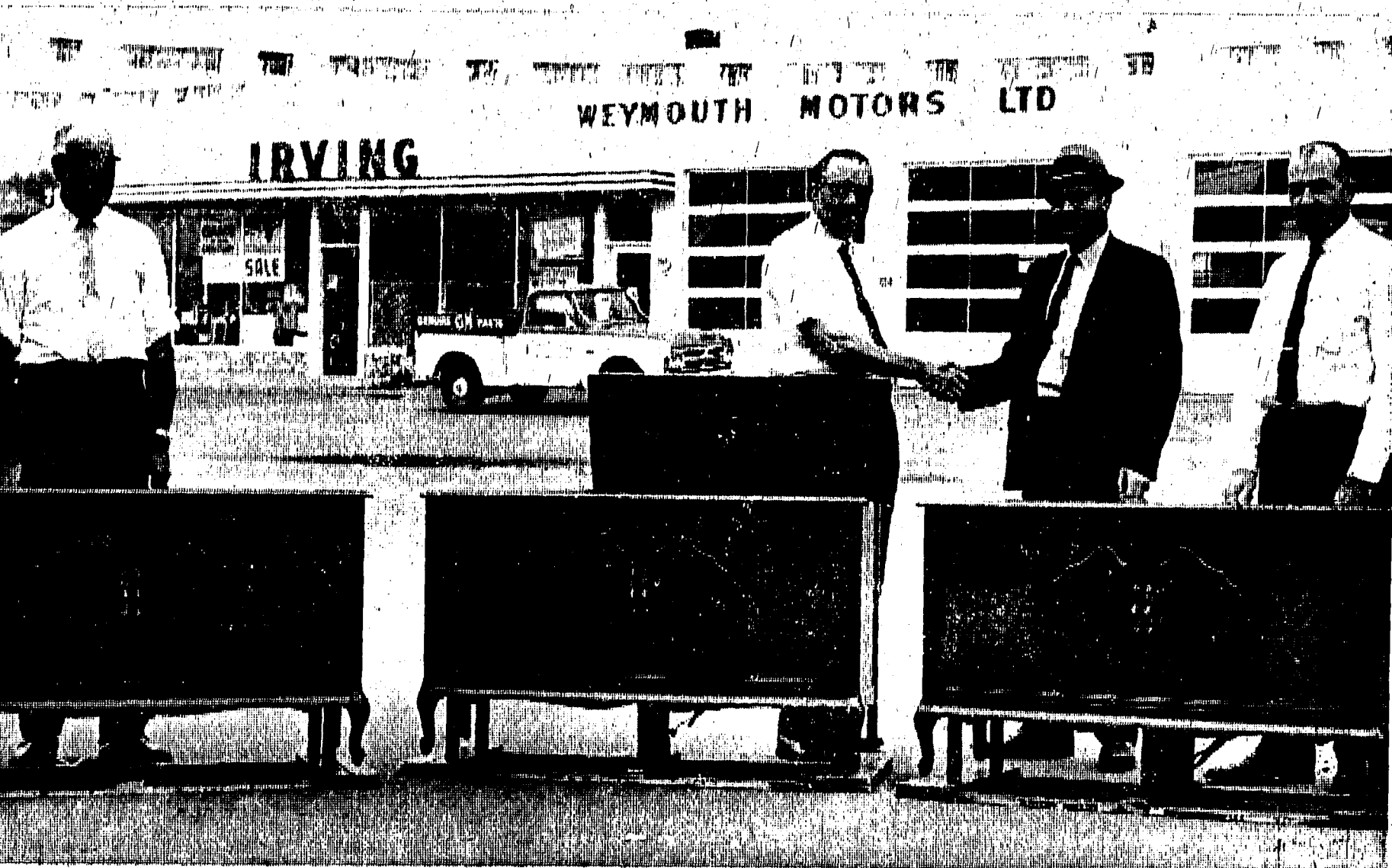

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Federal Government Approval Digby - Saint John Ferry Service

The federal government cabinet has approved in principle the project of a new Digby-Saint John, Bay of Fundy ferry service. This was the big announcement made by Hon. Allan J. MacEachen, Minister of National Health and Welfare, when he addressed a gathering of joint service clubs at Church Point on Tuesday evening. The government will provide the necessary terminals in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick if they can make satisfactory arrangements with the Canadian Pacific Railway and the provinces concerned regarding other phases of the proposition, according to Mr. MacEachen. The federal government is going ahead and trying to reach conclusions with the Canadian Pacific, stated the minister. It was hoped, he said, that the CPR would provide the ship and the provinces would build the approaches on the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia sides.

Considerable progress is being made at the fishermen's wharf in Digby, remarked Mr. MacEachen. He said expenditures for the present wharf project would total one million dollars.

Mr. MacEachen sounded an encouraging note to the fishermen when he said they could look forward to an expanding market for the fishing industry in Nova Scotia. The new trade agreements (Kennedy Round) signed in Geneva give satisfaction to the fishing industry in the Maritimes, the minister said. This more free trade is becoming a reality and has an effect on the fishing industry and other primary products for export. Particularly for Nova Scotia, the United States market is important to fishermen, he said, and here the new tariff arrangements eliminate many duties. More than one million dollars in revenue comes from the fishing industry in the Digby area, the minister remarked, and everything possible is being done to maintain the fishing industry.

Canada is capable of wonderful things, Mr. MacEachen said and referred to Expo as one of the greatest shows of the world, bringing together man's greatest inventiveness. So far, he said, we cannot assess the effect which Expo will have on the future of Canada.

The Pan American games in Winnipeg was cited by Mr. MacEachen as one of the successful feats for the summer in Canada. This was achieved by total community involvement of all the people. Such things make us grateful for citizenship in Canada, he continued. As Canadians, we have reason for thankfulness and thanksgiving and we owe continued loyalty and faith in the future of Canada, he said in conclusion.

Hon. Mr. MacEachen spoke of his recent visit to Moscow, which he said increased his appreciation of being Canadian and living in this part of the world. He particularly mentioned the lack of housing space and privacy in Moscow and said that religion in that country was not very evident.

The honorable minister congratulated the Acadian people on their progress, fine appearing homes and communities and their excellent spirit of progress by working together.

Mr. MacEachen was introduced by Bernard LeBlanc, Belliveau's Cove and thanked by Emanuel Adelaar, Weymouth. Mr. Adelaar repeated the working-together theme and said that if Canadians worked together, put their minds to a project, no matter where, they can reach goals and attain high standards. We either swim together or sink together, and service clubs understand this very much, he stated.

The Hon. Mr. MacEachen was speaking before a Centennial Year banquet meeting sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Weymouth, the Lions Club of Meteghan, the Ritchie Club of Church Point, and the Saulnierville Branch, Canadian Legion. The dinner (Please turn to page 4)

US Wins International Tuna Cup

Eight and a half pounds of bluefin Friday gave the United States victory in the International Tuna Cup Match for an unprecedented fifth time.

A 683½ pound fish landed by R. E. Naffziger, of Beverly Hills, California, at Cape St. Mary, Thursday, ended a fish famine which plagued anglers throughout the week. The fish proved to be the winner by 8½ pounds. It was the first fish caught at the Cape this season and one of two landed during the four day match.

Dr. Norman J. Belliveau of Belliveau Cove, captain of the Canadian team, put Canada into contention for the Alton B. Sharp Trophy, emblematic of the world's championship of tuna fishing, shortly before noon Friday, by landing a bluefin at Soldier's Rip.

Hundreds of spectators jammed the wharf under sunny skies at Wedgeport when the G.A.F. II, flying the blue tuna flag, brought Dr. Belliveau and his crew to shore. Among those aboard the vessel was Hon. H. J. Robichaud, federal fisheries minister.

Tension mounted on the dock as the scales used to weigh the tuna broke down under the tremendous weight of the fish. Fishermen piled oilskins and poured buckets of water over the tuna to keep it from being dehydrated by the warm temperatures. A helicopter from Greenwood used to transport photographers to the fishing grounds, was sent to Cape St. Mary to bring another scale for the official weighing. The fish weighed 675 pounds. The United States team was awarded 883½ points and the Canadian 675. Teams from the British Caribbean and Mexico went scoreless. One point is awarded for each pound of fish. The Americans were given 200 bonus points for landing the year's biggest tuna.

Dr. Belliveau, president of the Canadian Medical Association, shook hands with the American team as W. S. Kennedy Jones, Nova Scotia's trade and industry minister, presented the large silver trophy to Osborn Owings, captain of the U.S. team.

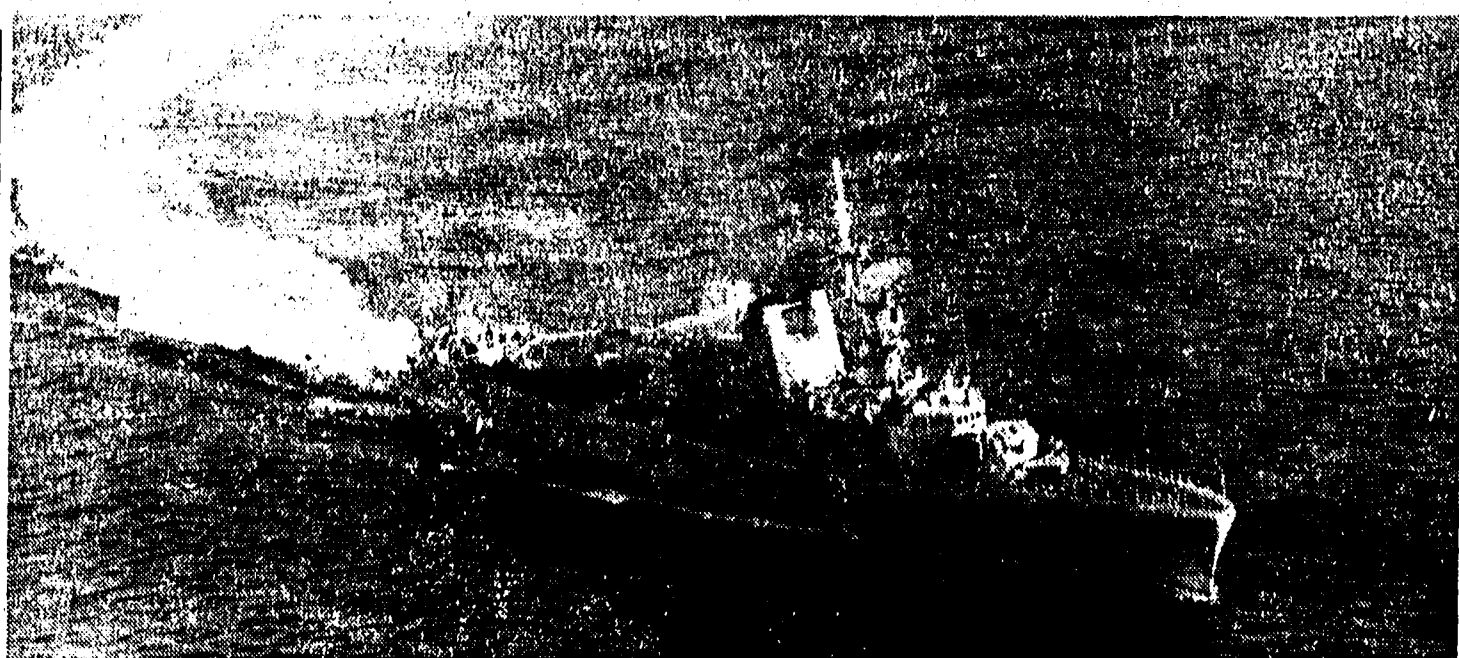
The ceremony officially ended this year's tuna match and left doubts about whether it would be held next year due to the light catch. Only six tuna have been landed during the entire season, five at Soldier's Rip.

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Approximately 2500 persons visited the helicopter destroyer, HMCS Fraser while she lay at Digby wharf from Friday, August 25 to August 28. The Fraser's visit was part of a scheduled Centennial Ship Visit Programme. She left Digby at 6:30 p.m. on Monday for the port of Shelburne after which she will visit Yarmouth.

While in port several functions for the officers and crew of the Fraser were held so that the ship's personnel and the town and area people could meet. Immediately on arrival on Friday, Mayor D. Snow and Commander John F. Watson, C.D., R.C.N., exchanged formal greetings on ship. Later the Mayor and Mrs. Snow entertained at luncheon at their home on King street. Among the guests were Squadron Commander T. E. Connors who was on board the Fraser; Captain J. M. Paul of CFB Cornwall; Bernard Bell of the Digby Centennial Committee and town officials.

A reception for about one hundred persons, including Digby's Centennial Committee, was held on board ship on Friday evening when Commander Watson presented Mayor Snow, on behalf of the town, with a formal picture of the Fraser. At another function Mayor Snow presented Commander Watson with a Yates photograph view of the Joggins Bridge and Acadiaville area.

Saturday afternoon was thrown open to a children's party on board ship when about forty were shown demonstrations, given a tour of the ship and enjoyed refreshments.

Softball games were held when the ship's team lost by slight margins with the Clementsport team on Friday and a police team from town on Saturday. An inter-ship play was held on Monday.

Officers and crew of the Fraser were entertained on Saturday night at a dance sponsored by the Digby Branch Canadian Legion. On Sunday they went to the church of their choice.

Visitors who toured the ship were shown displays and demonstrations of diving, aircraft, radar, gun manoeuvres and were entertained by band music.

The Fraser has a complement of eleven officers and 198 men. Commander Watson of Victoria, B. C., a man in his late thirties, specialized in torpedo antisubmarine warfare, having served on the St. Laurent and Assiniboine and as executive officer on the destroyer escort Fraser.

He was R.C.N. anti-submarine warfare liaison officer at Virginia, U. S. A.; was on the staff of the U. S. Navy's Commander, anti-submarine warfare force and was later promoted to Commander.

He was with the Fraser while she was being converted to a helicopter destroyer and took command on her commissioning, October 22, 1966.

Squadron Commander Connors is remembered in Digby, having been Captain on the HMCS Buckingham when she was in Digby port for two years.

The name Fraser was taken from the British Columbia river of that name and the ship's badge is derived from the crest of Fraser, Lord Lovat, an ancestor of Simon Fraser, the explorer. The name Fraser has also historic connection with the province of Quebec, stemming from the 78th Fraser's Highlanders of 1757 who saw distinguished service in Canada.

When the regiment disbanded many of the soldiers settled in Quebec and descendants in torpedo antisubmarine warfare, having served on the St. Laurent and Assiniboine and as executive officer on the destroyer escort Fraser.

Rev. H. S. Hartlin Resigns



Rev. H. S. Hartlin, who has been the pastor of the United Baptist Church of Digby and Hill Grove for the past nine years, presented his resignation to his congregation on a recent Sunday. The resignation, to take effect at the end of this year, was regrettably accepted.

After eleven years as a pastor of the First Baptist Church in Lancaster, N. B., Mr. Hartlin came to Digby in the fall of 1958. During his long ministry, besides Digby, he has served as pastor of the Lower Granville, Bedford, (New Germany twice), and the Lancaster Baptist churches. During the Second World War, he served as a Chaplain in the Royal Canadian Air Force for three years.

Throughout his nine busy and faithful years in the Digby church, Mr. Hartlin has also given time to community enterprises and to the Baptist denomination. He is presently the vice-president of the local branch of the V.O.N., vice-president of the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association, and a member of the Digby Kiwanis Club. While in Digby he has served on the committee that brought in recommendations that the School of Theology at Acadia University be changed into a Divinity College and affiliated with the University. He is presently Chairman of a Structure Committee that is making an extensive study with a view of formulating some drastic changes in the organization of the Atlantic United Baptist Convention.

Recently he was made a member of the Council of the Baptist Federation of Canada and is the Chairman of the Federation Policy and Practice Committee.

In the years of his ministry at Digby and Hill Grove, he has centered special attention on Christian youth work, and aided by the Christian Education Council of the church which he organized, the church built up one of the largest Christian youth programs in western Nova Scotia.

Following his departure from Digby at the end of the year, Mr. Hartlin has tentative plans to live in his cottage at Port Wade, Annapolis County, and plans to engage in pastoral interim and supply work.

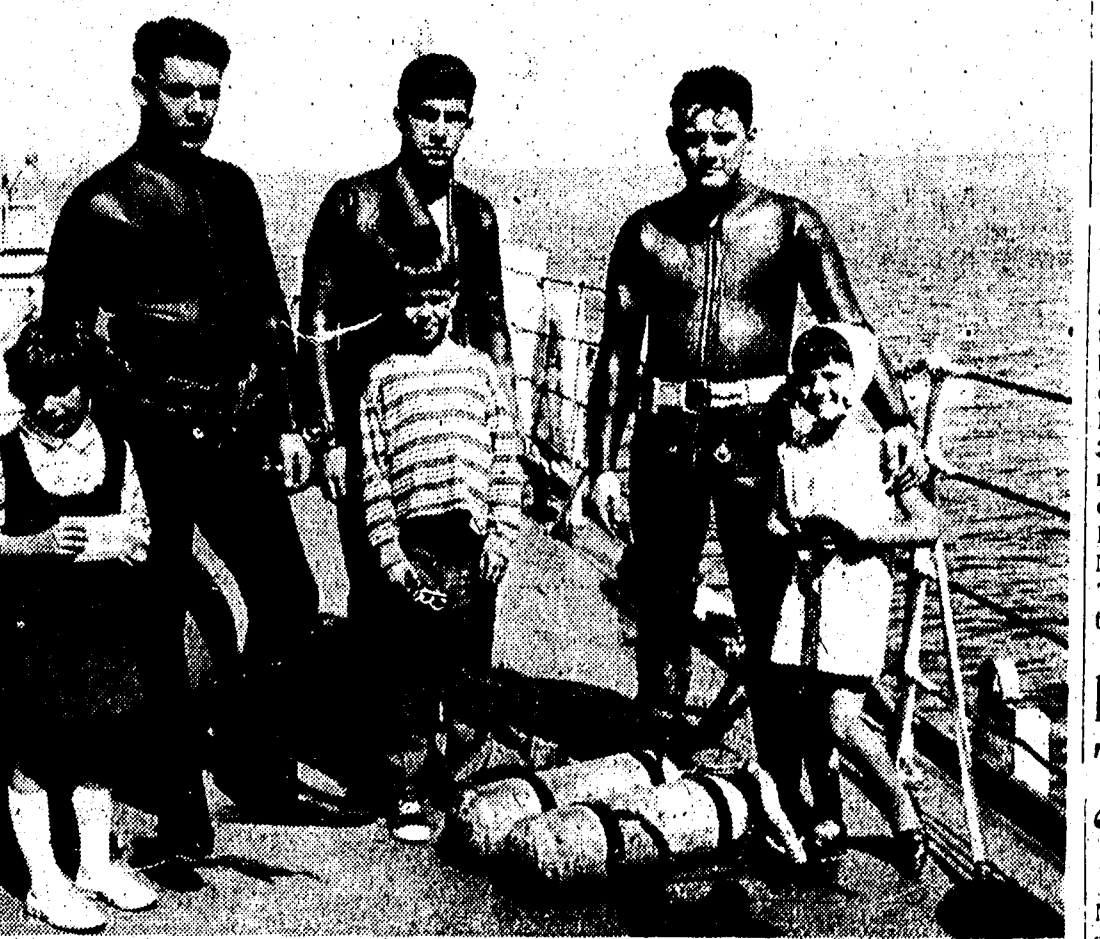
Refuses To Pay Tax

In the meantime we invite opinions from our readers on the Digby County Exhibition. Should it be revived or should we let it peacefully sleep? What was its purpose and is there any more need or reason for that purpose?

Digby Water Pollution

There must be some solution to Digby's water problem. We are not water authorities at The Digby Courier but we do know people are getting tired of water problems in town. Whatever the solution will be, it probably should take priority over everything else if finances are to be involved. There is nothing so important as good water, free from dangerous bacterial count at all times.

During the past week we had the HMCS Fraser in port. Water had to be supplied to them. We have tourists in town. We have shoppers in town. The health of all these people is our responsibility while they are here as well as the health of our own town people. Boiling water in homes for human consumption might not be such a difficult proposition although inconvenient. There are other more public places where boiling all water for human consumption must be quite difficult. Looks as though somebody has to get down to business on this whole affair. It could be dangerous as it now exists.

Where's Our School?

If we wait long enough for our new school extension in Digby we'll be able to get in on this new idea of building adjustable schools. About 30 are planned for Toronto in 1970 and 1971. We understand they are designed in compartments which snap together like a child's construction set, changing in shape to fit the educational needs of the moment.

However, waiting for the adjustable school isn't going to fulfill the immediate needs. We've been given to understand that there are needs and people expressed their wishes to look after the needs. Now, what do we do? Quibble about minor details while opportunity passes us by?

School will be starting in little more than another week. Digby school we expect goes through the same inconvenience with crowded conditions as last year. Possibly conditions have even worsened by this time.

How about getting on with the business?

Disaster Area

Come, come now. It can't be that bad? After one year of not-up-to-standard tourism in the Maritimes, can you call it disaster?

Here we are right on the heels of the farmers in Western Nova Scotia asking government aid because of crop shortage when hotel keepers declare the tourist business under "disaster".

Under the star this has been a poor year for fishermen. All the fog and hindrances but we have not heard them cry "disaster" so far. In Toronto the Canadian National Exhibition must suffer its loss through Expo. We have an idea that besides Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, P.E.I. other provinces in Canada have suffered a decline in tourism because of Expo.

You can't classify Expo as an act of God. It's just one of those things that every business suffers once in awhile because of other market competition. This time it has been Expo competition and we have an idea it will right itself another year with the blessing of good weather for added tourism incentive.

Surely we are all happy that Canada's Centennial and Expo went over so well. Everybody pitched in to help. In fact most people were not able to distinguish Centennial from Expo in the early months of preparation. As to most Nova Scotians felt what was going to be good for Montreal and Quebec was going to be extra good for Nova Scotia. It didn't happen that way. But why cry disaster? This was Canada's year as a whole and definitely Montreal with Expo there. What can be done but to grin and bear it, be happy for other's prosperity and look forward in the Maritimes with greater expectations for another year. It isn't too early now to plan for another year.

Fraser Adds To Centennial

The purpose of the HMCS Fraser visits to three Nova Scotia ports is to help Canada celebrate its Centennial, its 100th birthday. Digby was the first of such ports of call for the Fraser. If in all three ports the same friendly and congenial atmosphere is apparent between the ship's personnel and the town and area folk, the Fraser will have fulfilled the mission on which she was sent, to celebrate Canada's birthday, a time of cementing relations ships in every walk of Canadian life.

Noisy Young Motorists Put Yourselves In Another's Shoes

According to accounts in one newspaper in Ontario, Stratford got fed up with their noisy young motorists. Here is a partial editorial comment from an Ontario paper which we copied from the Liverpool Advance. Quote: "Six drivers, ranging in age from 19 to 23, were convicted of making unnecessary noise with their vehicles and were fined \$35 each. Magistrate W. A. Ehgoetz also ordered 30 day driving suspensions for four of them."

The magistrate's action will be applauded heartily by all sleepers, old people, young people, middle-aged people, anyone whose serenity has ever been slashed to ribbons by the eerie squealing of peeling rubber on hot pavement or the strident sounds of Hollywood mufflers calling to their mates across the way.

It is gratifying to finally see a few prosecutions in the business of making unnecessary noise."

We are not suggesting that our police or magistrates impose any such fines or suspensions. They can if they choose. Our purpose in writing the above is to appeal to the good sense and judgement of some of our young people. Do you never think of persons older than yourselves who might like to enjoy a nap without the sound of screeching tires and screaming brakes? Do you never realize when you use a certain service station yard for car antics that a grieving person is not far away? Do

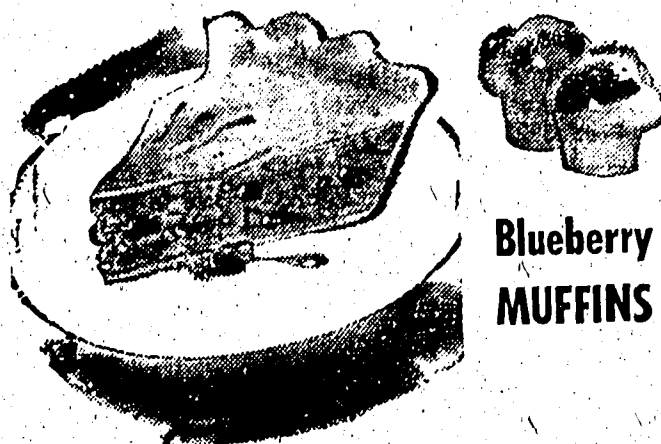

the cadets marched along sec-
tions of the original road
that are still in use but by Mon-
day afternoon they were in
the brush, tracing a blazed
trail through those sections
that had grown up.

There are a number of rea-
sons why this particular cen-
tennial project was undertak-
en. Our major consideration
was the historical aspect that
the trail offers to Nova Scotia
and also to focus attention on
the possibility, so keenly vi-
sualized by the early colonists,
of a direct linking highway
between Halifax on the east
coast and Digby on the west
coast of the province.

The need of such a high-
way, particularly for a wide
limited access route to pro-
vide a faster, uncongested flow
of traffic to city markets, has
long been advocated by Val-
ley residents as well as other
areas involved. Many of these
communities are at present
served only by poorly main-
tained secondary roads which
have hampered development
of agriculture, forestry and
other industries. The bene-
fits to be derived by all areas
of Western Nova Scotia from
construction of an all-weather
highway are limited and it is
understood that a campaign
for support of such a project
by the regional boards of trade
is to be initiated by the tour-
ist committee of the Annapo-
lis Royal Board.

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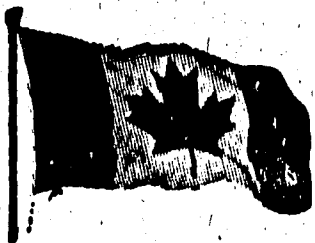
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GET READY FOR SCHOOL NOW.
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COUNCIL DISCUSSES TWO MAJOR PROBLEMS

Two serious problems have confronted the people of Digby for the past few months. The first, serious as well as long-standing, is the situation as regards water. The second is the hold-up in school extension, equally serious. The first problem, of water, the people have known about, but the second, the hold-up of school construction, and its reason, has not been publicized for the following reasons as contained in the following brief read at the Digby town council meeting Tuesday night by Town Clerk J. Whalley:

"School Progress —

Since the approval of borrowing of funds sufficient to build an extension to the Digby Regional High School, the town has been held up by two or three ratepayers of the town.

Very soon after the ratepayers meeting the town of ficers were served with legal papers to hold up the building program. A hearing was set for June to determine if an injunction would be issued against the town to hold up the funds. The town officers pressed for an early court hearing before a Supreme Court Judge which hearing was scheduled for July 14. The town officials made every effort to have the matter settled at this hearing, but the one or two ratepayers concerned requested, and obtained a postponement of the trial. The matter is completely in the hands of the court at this time.

The main question that arises: "are persons assessed for occupancy tax entitled to a vote or not?"

Even if the town wanted to hold a ratepayers meeting tomorrow they would not be able to do so until the question "would a person assessed for occupancy tax be entitled to a vote or not" is settled by a Supreme Court Judge. The town is unable to further the plans of the school construction. The town council is fully aware of the necessity of the school extension and we are all for it. It is their only regret that such a small number of persons can hold up such a building program. Where else could the town obtain a \$750,000 building that would cost them approximately \$65,000.

Regardless of the cost of the operation of the Digby High School the town has to pay its required amount.

This is the equalized assessment as set by the revaluation Committee times and rates of \$1.20 per \$100. of assessment."

Water System Problem

The Town of Digby's long standing problem of water pollution was also fully discussed at Tuesday's meeting.

Reigh Jayne and Glen Smith representing the Kiwanis Club, appeared before council requesting information regarding Digby's two main problems, water and school. Also appearing were Charles McBride, of the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club, and W. Troupe, newly appointed chairman of the Digby Water Commission, as well as Percy Take, Bear River, Water Engineer.

Mr. Take explained the complexities of any town water piping system and especially one that had not kept a complete record of the laying of mains. During the past some weeks, Mr. Take said, they had found mains beneath the streets which were not known of. Mr. Take went on to say "undoubtedly there are other mains which have not been flushed for some time — years possibly. Shut-off valves are either left-turn or right-turn and undoubtedly mistakes have been made of shutting off mains when the desire was to open them. Dead end mains may also be in existence which should be made continuous flowing." It was generally agreed that dredging by siphoning of Lily Lake should be started "being careful to keep the water level up. The soft sediment in the bottom of the lake (some 15 to 19 feet in depth) could be pumped or siphoned out," said Mr. Take.

When asked about pollution Mr. Take said, "no one can guarantee against pollution. There can be dozens of reasons for it, several of which have been found already. One deer can wander on to the water shed above Lily Lake, die, and in a few weeks the system is polluted."

Progress has been made, plans are being carried out. More plans are in the making. The water at the present time is perfectly fit for use according to last reports from health authorities in Halifax. The people need not boil the water at the present time.

Color of Water — At regular intervals and especially for the next while the mains in different parts of the town will be flushed. The home owner can expect discoloration in the water. The natural color of the water from Lily Lake has always been on the brown shade. The engineer who installed the system in 1890 told the people that water from Lily Lake was of a brownish color but that it was perfectly good water, council was told.

Mr. Take said at Tuesday's meeting that "a filtering plant could be installed which would cut down the color and assure that no sediment enter the system."

"Do not blast near the lake" was the warning Mr. Take gave the council. "Any drilling, blasting, or heavy work of that nature could crack the lava bowl in which the water is held. Beneath the lava bowl is a sandstone deposit through which the water could seep away," he said.

Artesian Wells — Mr. Take doubts if a program of artesian wells for the town would have the approval of any engineer. "And besides," he said, "What do you want artesian wells for when you have an adequate potential supply now?"

The impression the representatives of the service clubs carried away with them was that the problem was well in hand, progress was being made in an extremely complicated situation. Something was being done.

Police & Streets Reports For August

Police: During the above month a total of 14 complaints were registered, of which 6 required some field investigation. All complaints except one have been terminated to the satisfaction of those concerned.

As a result of the investigation of police 9 persons were taken to court, all except one case has been disposed of. One is still pending for later date.

During the month of August the men spent a total of 496 hours on the maintenance of the water distribution system at a cost of \$555.25 which consisted of installing new screens at lake and lower dam, cleaning the reservoir on Sydney Street, installing service lines, flushing water mains and installing flushout at Salvia. A total of 1,500.5 hours at a total cost of \$1,715.22 was charged through "street account" as follows: \$1463.84 was spent on streets which consisted of cutting off and grading road shoulders on King and Prince William Streets; widening and ditching that section of Third Avenue from Warwick Street to St. Mary's Street; graveling road shoulders. Cleaning streets and ditches; installing culverts; hauling gravel; hauling garbage; mowing and hauling hay; clearing storm drains; cleaning town hall and barn; servicing and repairing equipment. 42 hours at a cost of \$45.66 was spent on the maintenance of sewers which consisted of digging up sewer main on 2nd Avenue and installing a flushout by Mrs. Anderson's property.

191 hours at a cost of \$206.02 was spent on capital sewers which consisted of the installation of the sewer line to the Kingfisher Motel and cleaning up and removing dirt. To date figures show that a total of \$8,761.94 has been spent on the installation of the sewer line. Estimated cost was \$7,700.00.

The superintendent's car was used a total of 756 miles at a cost of \$75.60.

At a meeting of the police committee recently, the resignation given by Mr. Hall to the council at the August meeting of that body, was withdrawn. Mr. Hall will work a five day week for a one month probation period.

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About This And That

Good News

It was good news to hear last week that the federal government will build terminals on both the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick sides in the project of upgrading the Digby-Saint John Bay of Fundy ferry services.

This is encouraging news and is a start, at least. The federal government hopes that the CPR will provide a ship and that each of the provinces will build approaches.

Would it that we were seeing the actual project in progress. We have been waiting so long now that any wait is likely to make us skeptical of the outcome until we see the finished project. The announcement is encouraging to say the least. The trip to Ottawa with a brief, probably paid off.

Large Blueberries

We sampled the blueberries on Beaver Brook Farms Ltd. With our limited knowledge on such matters we gave them A-plus in taste and size. They graded an average of about three inches. No amount of persuasion would influence us to give up the luscious fruit to be used for golf balls even though the pressure was heavy.

Tuberculosis

TB is still with us. While it is not among the ten leading causes of death last year in Canada there were 4,485 new active cases and 750 deaths.

The high risk groups for this rearing disease include people over 50 and children under 5. The over 50 are susceptible because they were born and reared when TB epidemics were common. In the days before most milk was pasteurized and before TB victims were adequately isolated and treated.

The pre-schoolers, because of their close and frequent contact with their parents, relatives, household help and baby sitters, any of whom may be carriers, are also vulnerable.

Everyone should have an annual checkup in the form of a skin test or chest x-ray. Infants may be tested between the ages of six months and one year.

The skin tests are simple and painless. There are three types: the Mantoux test, the patch test, and the multiple-puncture test. If one of these show TB germs are present, it doesn't necessarily mean the germs are doing damage. It takes an x-ray and sputum test, along with blood and urine studies, to accurately determine whether the bacilli are active.

If active TB is diagnosed, your doctor has a choice of a variety of drugs which effectively suppress the germs while the body builds up its own immunity.

TB is contracted from someone who has it, mainly by breathing air contaminated with TB germs (Mycobacterium tuberculosis). TB germs are air borne and spread by coughing, sneezing, and spitting. Sometimes a person becomes infected when germs enter his mouth from contaminated fingers, food, or eating utensils, or from kissing an infected person.

Going The Second Mile

A great teacher once said to his disciples, "Whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain."

A prominent executive explained this statement in the following manner:

"The business or professional man," he said, "who is content to stop when he has discharged his legal obligation, when he has gone as far as his contract, is a one-mile man."

"The physician at the bedside of a seriously ill patient, forgetting his fee in his zeal to save a life, when he sees the patient has passed the crisis, his greatest compensation is what he has achieved in going the second mile."

"The attorney who, having accepted a small fee for a trifling expenditure of time, but finding unexpected difficulties, throws his whole soul into the case, is the one who goes the second mile and finds his greatest reward in the plaudits of victory that are never heard while trudging the first mile."

"The automobile dealer who, even though the guarantee on that used car lasted only thirty days, offers a reasonable adjustment on complaints received several weeks after the guarantee had expired, receives immeasurable good will from satisfied customers in travelling the second mile."

"The responsible home improvement contractor, who not only adjusts justified complaints without hesitation, but checks back on all his jobs a few weeks after completion to see that the customer is satisfied, is a two-mile man."

"The merchant who cheerfully exchanges merchandise or refunds money even though he may not be obliged to do so, receives customer satisfaction for that 'second mile' he travels."

"The first mile is the mile of obligation, the second mile is the mile of choice and the mile of liberty and pride. The honorable performance of that second mile is the sure route of happiness, success and wholesome respect for one's fellows. It is the mile of 'Service Above Self'." — B.B.B., Maritimes, Inc.

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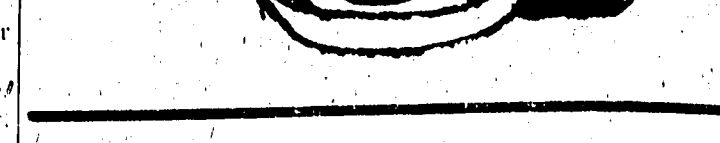

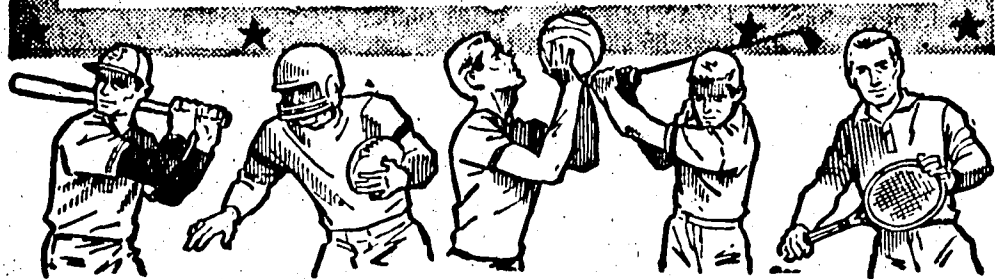

Students Discuss Many Subjects

More than 5,000 students from colleges and universities around the world assembled for a three-day conference at the denominational headquarters of the Christian Science Church in Boston on August 24th.

They discussed everything from premarital chastity and the "identity crisis" to the problems of emerging nations and world peace.

From a modest beginning 12 years ago, these student conferences have developed rapidly into a major biennial event. Chartered buses, planes, and group flights were arranged by many of the students coming from distant points, including England, Germany, and Australia. Previous conferences have also drawn students from countries of Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia, and Latin America — with 887 colleges and universities of 36 nations represented.

During the three-day period, some 18 hours were spent in assembly sessions, with most of this time given to student papers and discussion. One of the objectives was to explore the relevance of Christian insight as a radical healing force in the whole range of human experience. Among the subjects scheduled for consideration were: cheating, drugs, the "new orality," birth control, the "death of God" theology, spiritual values in the creative arts, resolving social conflicts, and leadership in government.

But the Roaring Forties say, "You will never get away 'ere reefing up your mainsail lads."

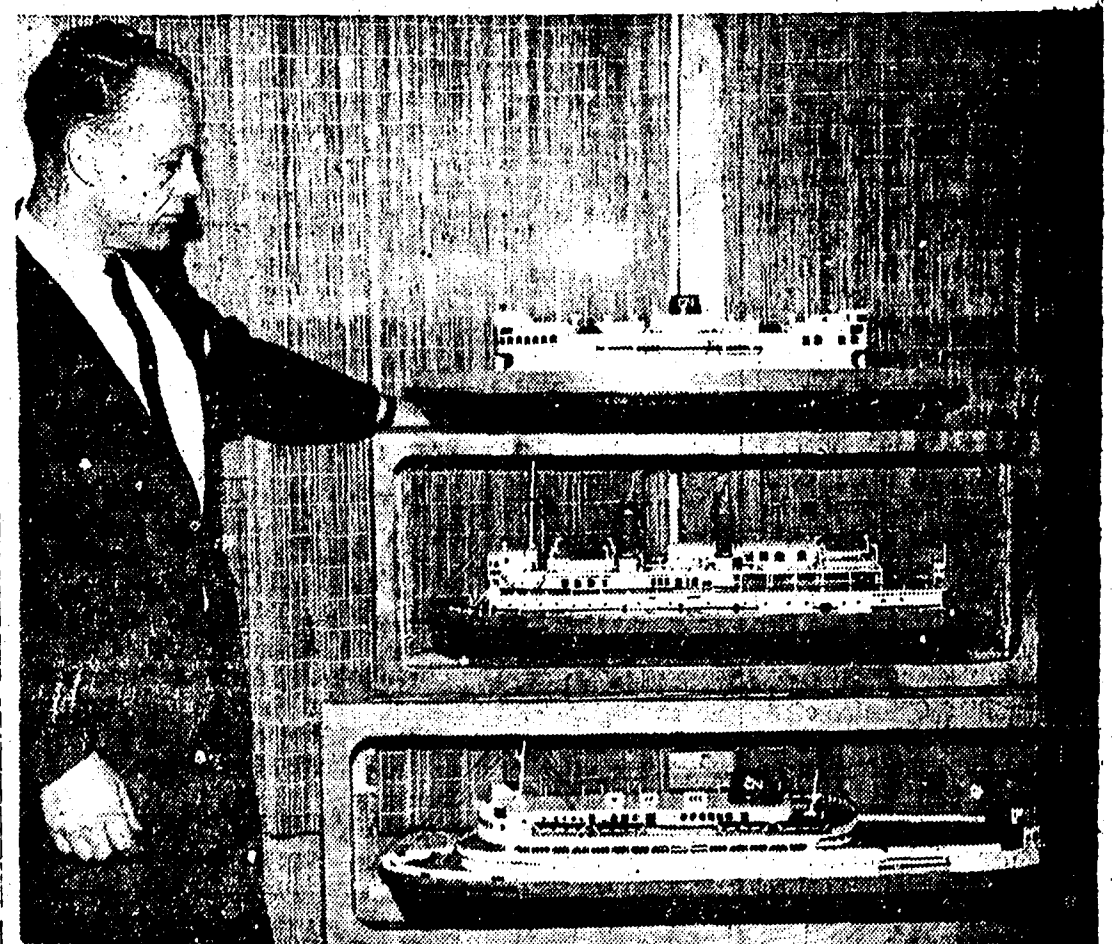

Digby County Lakes Stocked

Lands and Forests Minister E. D. Hahnburn has announced that 68 lakes and streams in the province had been stocked with 110,000 speckled trout of catchable size.

Stocking was done during the months of May, June and July and is part of a program designed to supplement natural stocks of speckled trout in those areas which receive heavy fishing pressure.

Mr. Hahnburn also noted that the trout season had been extended this year from September 15 to September 30, providing opportunity for anglers to harvest this popular fresh water species.

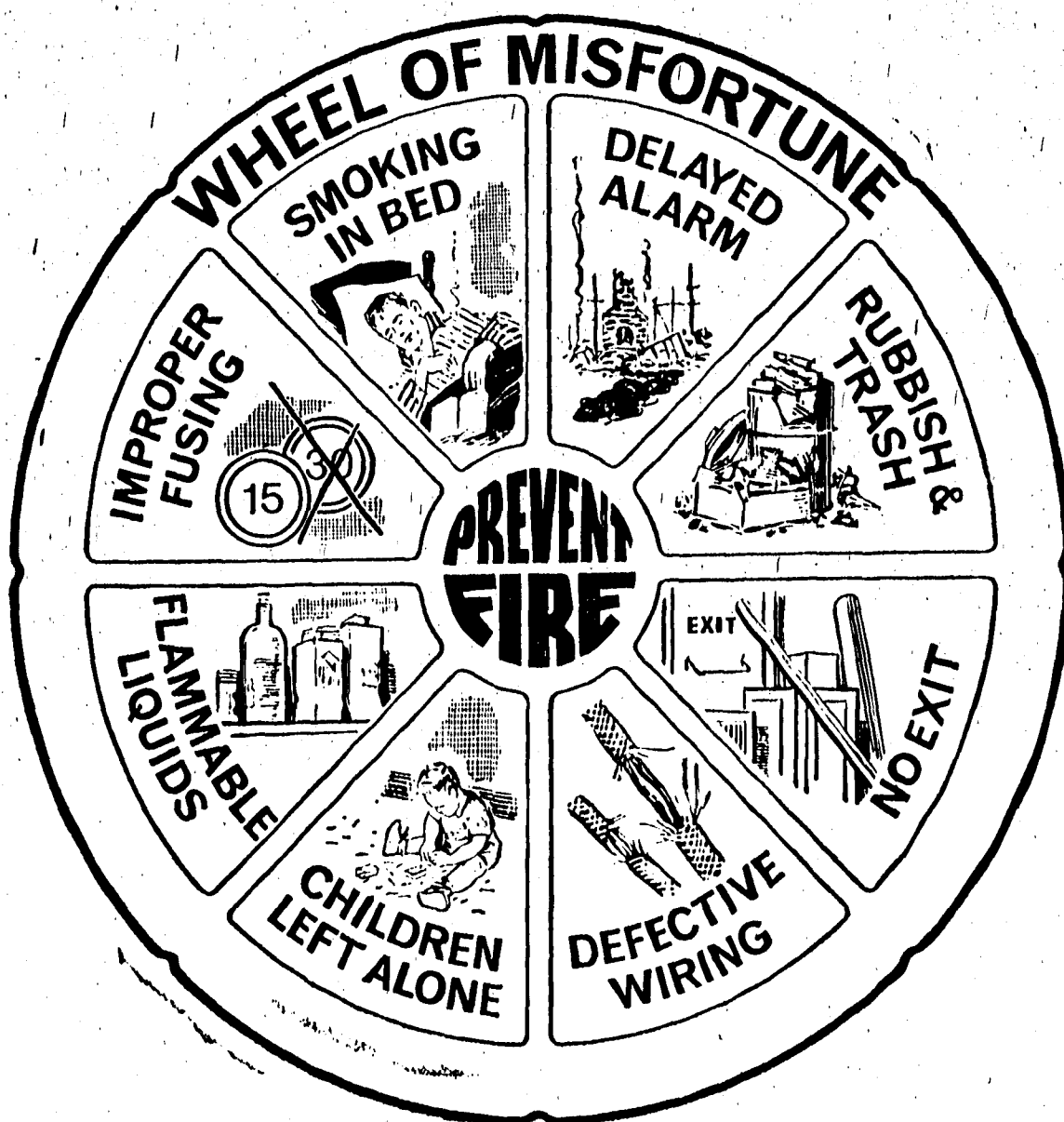
Trout were planted in Antigonish, Pictou, Halifax, Hants, Lunenburg, Queens, Shelburne and Digby counties. They were raised at department rearing ponds located at Mosher's River, Halifax County, and Charleston, Queens County.

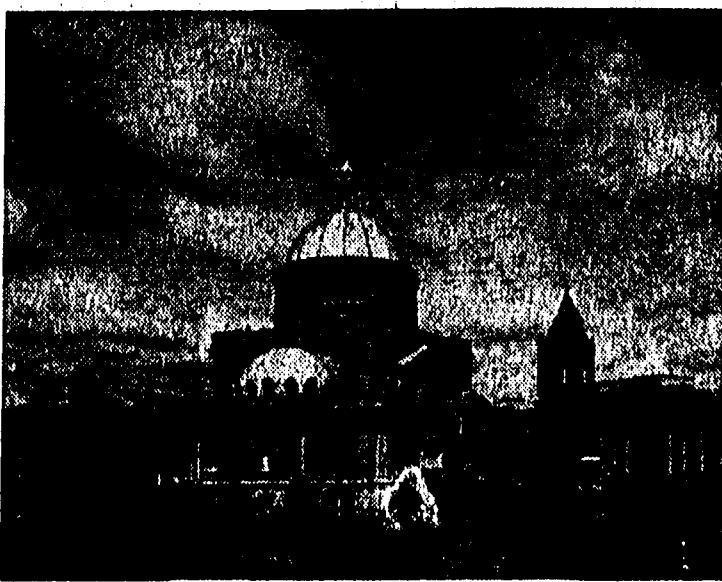

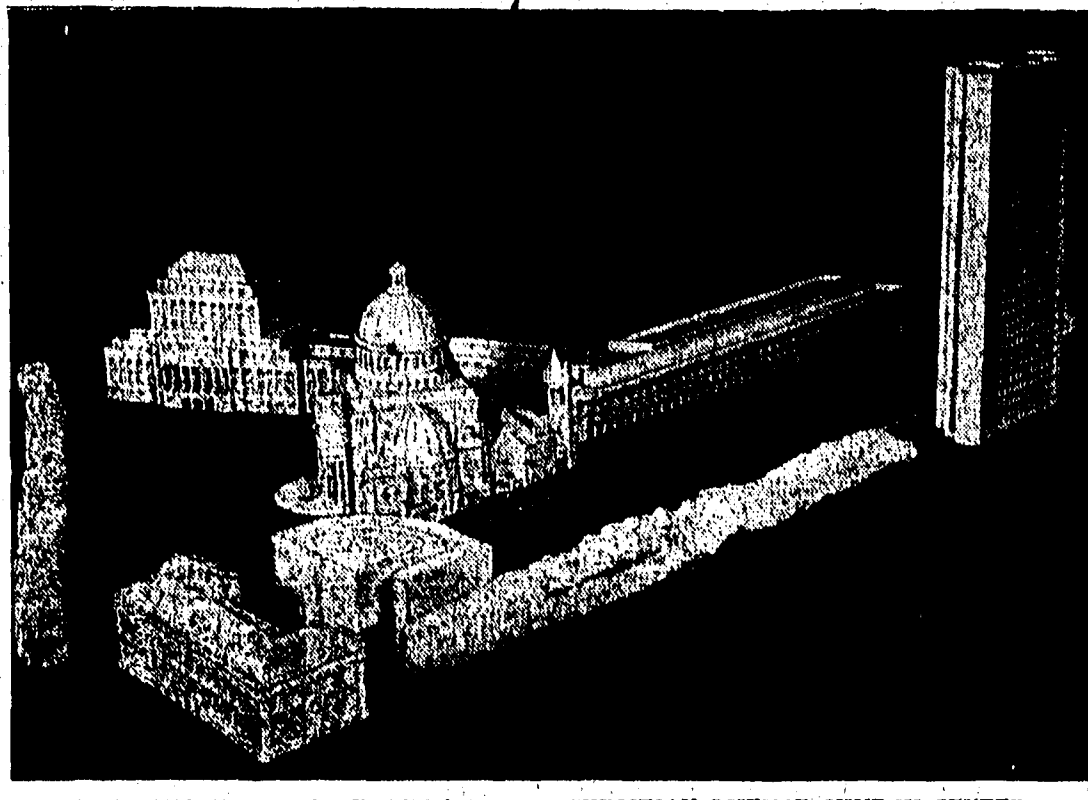

The sitting Member of Parliament, Cyril Kennedy, has submitted his resignation to make way for Mr. Stanfield. Mr. Kennedy had represented that riding for ten years.

At the largest political convention ever to be held in Canada Mr. Stanfield, on Saturday, was elected national leader of the Progressive Conservative party. In an 11-hour contest in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens, his victory over Manitoba's Premier Roblin came on the fifth ballot. He collected 1150 votes, 181 more than Mr. Roblin. Former justice minister David Fulton polled 357 votes on the fourth ballot. In all there were eleven candidates in the race.

Mr. Stanfield, a comparatively unknown politician on the national scene a few weeks ago, won a convention that had heralded him as the man to beat from the first. In a speech to the policy committee, of the party last Tuesday he emerged as the oratorical winner, and never looked back from there.

It was quite apparent from the first ballot that Mr. Stanfield was the favorite. Mr. and Mrs. Stanfield, campaign manager Maurice Fleming, and Sarah and Max Stanfield had to spend the last seven hours under the insufferable and constant heat of glaring television lights, in temperatures that topped the 100 degree mark.

Former PC leader John Diefenbaker, who stayed in the race to demonstrate his opposition to the two-nation policy adopted earlier in the week by the party's policy committee, drew 271 votes on the

first ballot, and only 172 on the second.

More than a thousand cheering Nova Scotians were at the Shearwater naval air station Monday to greet Mr. Stanfield when he arrived from Toronto. A six-mile motorcade escorted him through the streets of downtown Dartmouth and Halifax to the Lord Nelson Hotel where hundreds more turned out at a welcome party.

Prime Minister Pearson and T. C. Douglas have announced that their parties will not contest a byelection, expected soon, for the entry of Mr. Stanfield into Parliament. In this way the new leader could have a voice in the House by the middle of October.

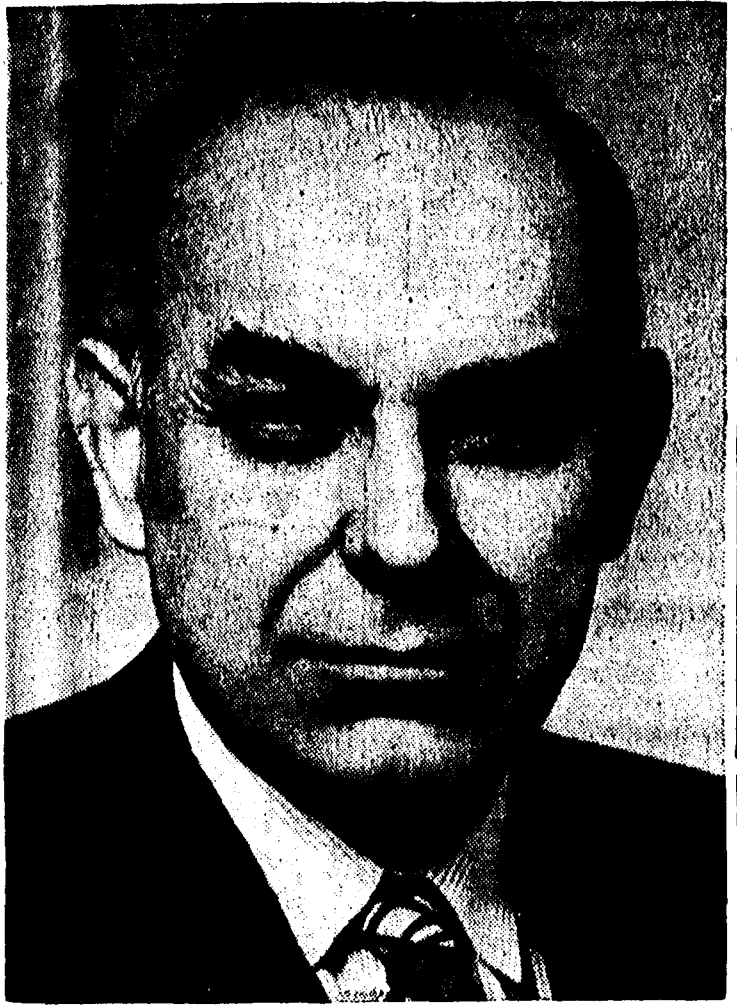
Mr. Stanfield said "on the advice of my colleagues in the government" he had recommended to the lieutenant-governor that Mr. Smith, as the senior cabinet minister, be appointed premier until a new leader is chosen by the Nova Scotia Progressive Conservative Association.

He said seniority in government was determined by the order in which ministers were sworn as members of the executive council and since Mr. Smith was sworn "after me" his choice was in accordance with precedent. "This is not intended in any way to influence the choice of a new provincial leader by the party", he said.

He said it had been a "great privilege" for him to have been Premier of Nova Scotia for nearly eleven years and that he was "grateful indeed for the friendship and understanding that the people of Nova Scotia" had always given him. "While my new responsibilities are national in scope I hope I will be able to be helpful to Nova Scotia", he said.

With regard to his running in Colchester-Hants riding, Mr. Stanfield said the sitting member Cyril Kennedy had "most graciously offered to resign to permit me to enter the House

of Commons. I will be pleased indeed to seek election in Colchester-Hants should I be nominated as the PC candidate in the federal constituency". The seat was held for two terms in the 1940's by the Premier's late brother, Frank Stanfield. Mr. Stanfield said that he would not contest a vacant seat in Alberta because some might interpret it as deserting his own Nova Scotia supporters.

3,200 Pupils Enrolled In Digby School System

A number of changes were noticeable Thursday when schools in the Digby area opened for the 1967-68 term. All schools in the Digby district have been placed under one system with F. C. Purdy in charge as superintendent. There are three sub-systems: Digby, Weymouth and Islands Consolidated, Digby sub-system includes the town and feeder schools. C. C. MacInnes is supervisor. Schools comprising the Digby system are: Digby Regional High (Grades 9-12); Digby Junior School (7 & 8); Digby Elementary Junior, Mount Street (6, 7 and 8); Digby Primary Elementary (Primary to 5); St. Patrick's (1-6); and the feeder schools at Barton, Smith's Cove, Sandy Cove and Bear River. J. W.

Layton is supervisor in Weymouth. The Islands sub-system includes schools at Freeport and Westport. D. MacBeath is supervisor.

Mrs. Ada Jorgensen has been appointed supervisor of curriculum for the Digby system, grades primary to six. She is a native of Lallave, on Nova Scotia's south shore. Director of guidance for the Digby sub-system is Mrs. Nola Jeffrey. Gordon B. Richardson occupies that position in Weymouth.

F. C. Purdy told the Courier this week that enrolments throughout the area are up over previous years. Definitely conditions concerning overcrowding classrooms in the urban schools are critical, Mr. Purdy said. A number of classes are being accommodated in sub-standard areas, he told the Courier.

Total enrolment in the Digby urban and high schools is in excess of 1,675. There are 2,250 pupils enrolled in the Digby sub-system. There are 70 teachers in the urban schools and 90 in the Digby sub-system. Enrolment in the Weymouth sub-system is 780. Enrolment for the Islands was not available.

Digby - Annapolis Teachers Hold Regional Conference

The Annapolis-Digby Fall Teacher's Conference was held September 5th and 6th.

On Tuesday, September 5th, all the teachers of both counties met in Annapolis Regional High School. The program that afternoon was a keynote address by Dr. H. P. Moffatt, Deputy Minister of Education, Province of Nova Scotia. Dr. Moffatt said that one of the aims of the educational system today and one with which educators must all be concerned was the development of persons in an ever changing society of today and tomorrow. The individual being

educated in our schools today must not only have appropriate knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary for today's society, but must develop the necessary qualities of good citizenship. There appear to be at least four main trends in education today. These are summarized as being: (1) Educational instruction is becoming individualized. (2) Research in education has brought into our classrooms an increased number of teaching devices, electronic aides, television, and films, and all other types of communication. (3) The effect of these that is most apparent is increased cost of education, but if we are to continue to meet the changing needs of the individual in a changing society, these costs and rising costs cannot be avoided. (4) Great changes are taking place in the knowledge-learning process so that we as educators may teach more effectively and more efficiently.

"Teachers should never lose sight of the fact that we are dealing with children who are in the process of becoming citizens. We are not teaching subjects, we are teaching persons. Therefore, we cannot sacrifice the child for the system, but must adjust the system to the student," he said.

Further on the program on Tuesday afternoon was a section entitled "Professional Advancement Through Professional Organizations". This part of the program was chaired by Jack Walker, Principal of Bridgetown Regional High School and Resource Personnel from the Professional staff of the Nova Scotia Teacher Union conducted the Program. The teacher's conference was

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About This And That

New Fundy Ferry Overdue

(From the Saint John Telegraph-Journal)

Another summer has slipped away, another winter is just around the corner, and still there is no solid action towards providing adequate ferry service on the Bay of Fundy between Saint John and Digby, N. S.

Indeed, as an editorial in The Halifax Chronicle-Herald notes, a concrete plan seemed closer to realization at the beginning of summer than it does now, as far as official announcements go.

All we have been told is that difficulties have cropped up in negotiations between the federal government and the CPR, operators of the present ferry Princess of Acadia. Cabinet ministers are full of cheery optimism, but you can't move trucks, cars, freight and people on that.

If anything is going to be done in a reasonable time, the public should have knowledge of it now. Specialized piers and vessels can't be designed and built overnight.

Well informed waterfront sources suggest that planning has advanced somewhat farther than official pronouncements have indicated.

The CPR has had a man in Europe examining suitable types of vessels in recent weeks, and sites are said to be tentatively selected for piers — in Digby Gut near the Pines Hotel and at Negro Point near Shed 14 in Saint John.

If this is the case, the sooner the government and the railway confirm an agreement and get on with the job, the better. We will soon be into another tourist season with the same inadequate terminals and the same old second-hand ferry. Added to that, every day that the present situation continues delays the development of the scale of commerce that a proper transportation system would produce.

The potential is there, but the longer action is put off, the more the opportunity fades. Alternative markets and routings will siphon off the trade, and southern New Brunswick and the Annapolis Valley, in a very direct sense, will have missed the boat again.

Patience may well be a virtue, but there comes a time to discard it. Perhaps that time has arrived, when the people of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia should be giving Transport Minister Pickersgill a not-too-gentle push on this long-delayed problem.

School Opening Added Traffic Hazard

Summer vacation ended this month, warns the National Safety League of Canada. With thousands of children returning to school, this means added responsibility for motorists. Grown-ups should remember that children lack the power of concentration and awareness necessary for their protection, especially during the early weeks of school. Drivers are urged to be extremely watchful in residential and school areas, to approach school buses with extra care and to observe provincial laws governing school buses.

The League suggests parents accompany young children walking to school for the first time. The problems encountered may prove very surprising. Changes in street patterns, traffic volume and controls can radically affect safe travel. "A little time given to this part of the child's traffic education will add immeasurably to his safety," advises the League.

To children riding bicycles to school the League offers the following advice: ride single file at a safe distance behind the vehicle ahead; always dismount and walk the bike across heavily travelled streets and highways; carry packages or books in a basket; keep both hands on the handlebars; observe traffic rules and regulations at all times and watch out for cars ahead and behind. Like motorists, cyclists are required to give proper signals when turning and stopping.

"Be sure you do your part!" says the League.

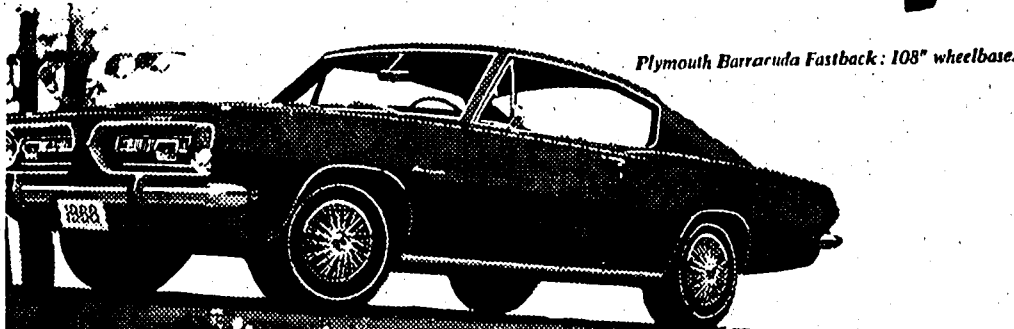

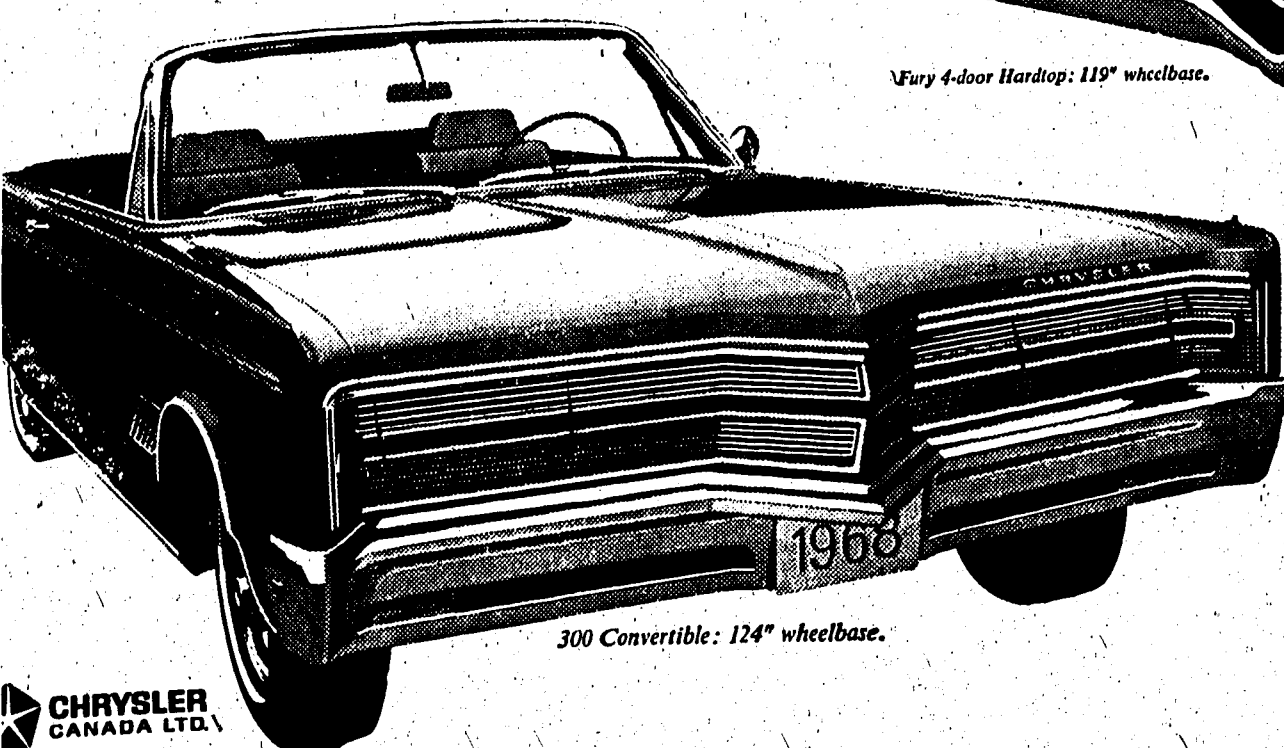

Morris commended these activities noting that the boys were acting in a responsible manner in looking after their own league rather than always depending on adults.

Rev. Father Mills noted that there was excellent sportsmanship and a real sense of christian love shown among the boys on his team. The evening closed with a resolve to expand and strengthen the league next year.

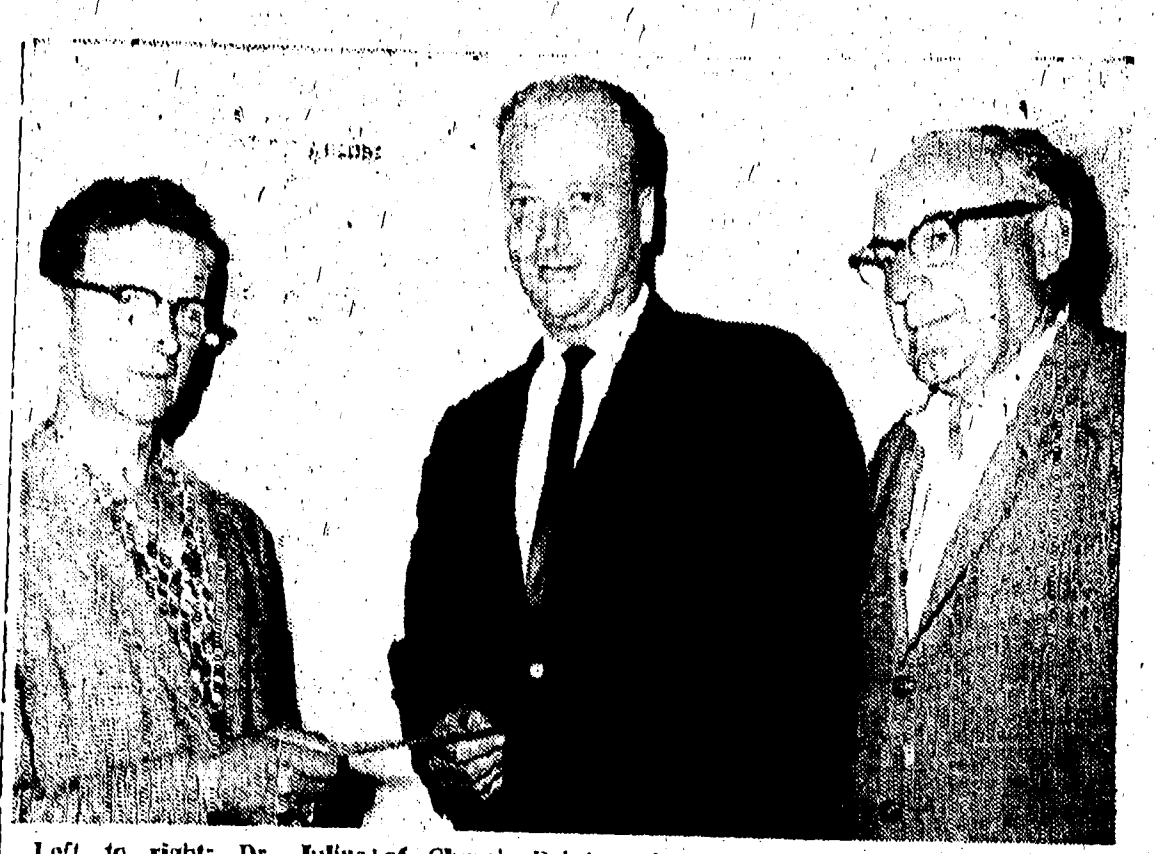

On completion of initial training in HMCS Stadacona at Halifax, he was appointed for duty in the torpedo

In August, 1950, he joined the destroyer escort Nootka and served in the ship during a tour of duty with the United Nations fleet in Korea.

Commodore Christie was appointed assistant command electrical officer on the staff of the flag officer, Atlantic coast in October, 1951, and in September, 1952, he went to

the destroyer escort Gatineau as squadron technical officer on the staff of the commander, Fifth Canadian Escort Squadron. He returned to naval headquarters in November, 1962, as director of weapons systems.

Prior to his appointment to Britain in 1964 for the RCN's Oberon submarine building programme, Commodore Christie was director of submarine production and Canadian naval submarine technical representative at naval headquarters.

On Jan. 3, 1966, Commodore Christie went to Imperial Defense College in London.

He became the director of maritime equipment engineering at CFHQ effective in January 1967 and took command of HMCS Dockyard Halifax, effective in October 1967. He is married to the former Maxine Bailey of Digby. They have three children, Peter, Susan and Andrew.

The Board decided to draw up a new set of by-laws. Possibility of a radio station for Digby was also discussed.

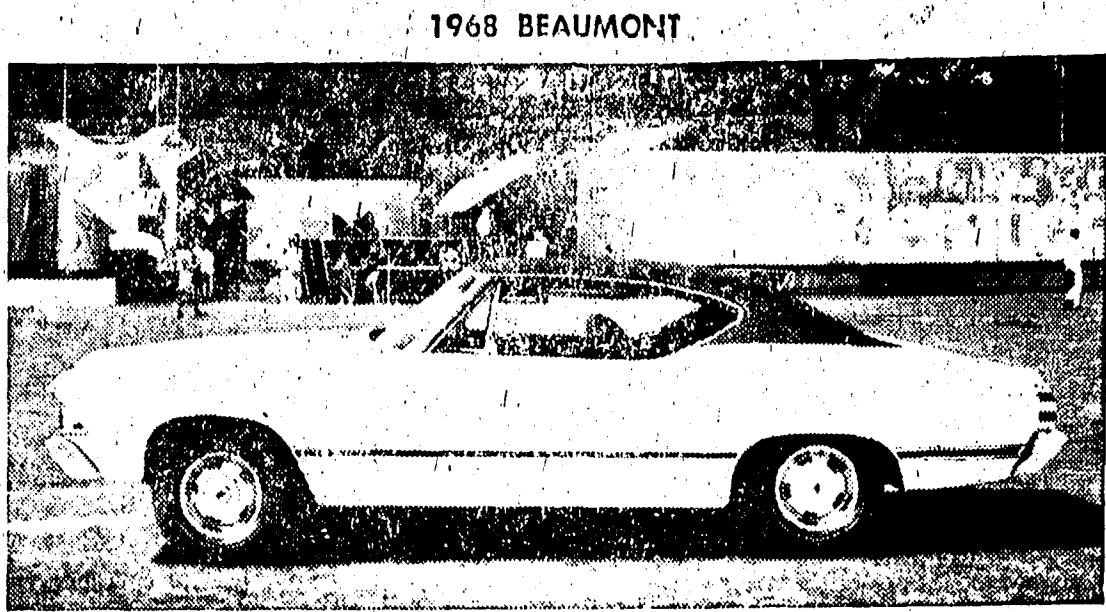
THE DIGBY COURIER WINS AWARD

Danish Gymnastics

Danish gymnastics have grown out of a general Scandinavian tradition. Over the years this tradition has found its own peculiar expression in Denmark and a comprehensive body of principles and methods has been slowly built up largely through the work of the late Neils BURH and other pioneers. The influence of the great Finnish Physical Educator, Ely Bjorksten, on the women's gymnastics has been evident.

Body building and form giving exercises are fundamental in Danish gymnastics. The aim is to develop the entire body into full harmony. Their strength, flexibility and coordination are provided, essential to further achievement in the advanced exercises.

The type of gymnastics which the members of the current touring party are displaying is not the same as in day and competitive gymnastics which are called "German Gymnastics" because they originated in Germany. Danish gymnastics are almost entirely team work. The girls' movement must be graceful and beautiful, the boys' more powerful and decided. In this way they are built up the natural and desirable characteristics of men and women.

Teamwork also provides a fine discipline that is necessary not only in their sport, but also in their daily lives. Apparatus and tumbling are not merely stunts, but exercises in fundamental gymnastics. These routines, summon the resources of strength, nimbleness and dexterity of the body. At the same time they call for determination and courage.

90 Years Back

Coffee at janes



The man of the house finished reading THE CHINESE LOOKING GLASS last night. Now I can get my hands on it to read full time, instead of a few snatches at a time when he lays it down, as I have been doing. He has been reading it for over a week, which, for my rapid reading husband is a very long time, but he has been reading bits out loud to me as we went along. I grab at the book and fill in the places between whenever I dust past the big chair where he does his reading.

THE CHINESE LOOKING GLASS, by Dennis Bloodworth, published this year by Farrar, Straus, and Goroux of New York, is, of all things, a history of China. The author is an English journalist. He was, for twelve years, the Far Eastern correspondent for the London newspaper, THE OBSERVER. During his years in China, he married a Chinese girl. They have three children which he refers to as "Chinese children". The author claims in the forward that his book is not for the expert on China, because he will find nothing in it that he does not already know. It is, he says, for "the ordinary reader who may never have been East of Suez, who has never argued with a Chinese except over a restaurant bill, and who knows even less about them than I do."

Mr. Bloodworth, with his "East of Suez" probably did not anticipate among his readers those of us who have never been east of London, or, for that matter, of Halifax, Nova Scotia. But even to us, to whom Suez is some remote canal that the Arabs and Israelis keep shooting across, and to whom China is that place you will come out at if you dig a hole deep enough, the book is very much worth reading.

Mr. Bloodworth writes in a delightful, chatty style, liberally sprinkled with irreverent humor, which I do not think anybody, ever before, has associated with a history book. There have, of course, been funny history books before. There is that all-Canadian series by Eric Nichol and Peter Whalley, and there is that classic from England, 166 AND ALL THAT, but those are satires, meant to be read and laughed at by people who knew their history. This book is directed to people who know nothing about the history of China, yet it abounds with sly little digs, both at the reader, and at the people whose history it is trying to tell. I think a good many Chroniclers of British, or Canadian, or American history might learn something from Mr. Bloodworth's lucid style.

The book is divided into two main sections, titled From the Outside Looking In, and From the Inside Looking Out. It is this latter section which is the most striking. It is hard to imagine how a man raised in one culture can see what it is like to live in another culture, looking out at his own. Of course it is almost impossible for people like most of us, who have not only been raised in our own culture, but have never lived outside of it, to draw conclusions on how accurate his insights are, but I have the feeling that Mr. Bloodworth can allow us to get as close an insight into the Chinese way of looking at things as most of us ordinary Westerners will ever get. At the end of the book, he lists what he calls "The Cast" in order of appearance, beginning with six undated emperors who ruled before the Asia Dynasty of 1490-1557 B.C., and ending with the beginning of the so-called Cultural Revolution in 1966. He lists a bibliography of ninety-seven books, a formidable bit of reading for anyone writing one book. Seven of these books were written in Chinese.

For my money (without having actually read the whole thing) I think THE CHINESE LOOKING GLASS probably provides the quickest, and the least painful glimpse into the history of one-quarter of the world's population to come around for a long time.

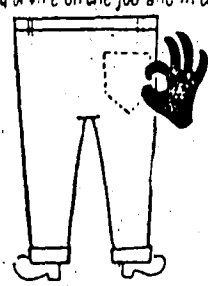

RESCUE BREATHING (MOUTH-TO-MOUTH)

THE CANADIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY

1

TURN VICTIM FACE UP. RAISE neck with one hand and TILT head fully back with the other hand

2

OPEN victim's mouth. PULL lower jaw to jut position. PINCH nostrils shut to prevent air leakage. MAINTAIN downward pressure on forehead.

3

PLACE mouth tightly around victim's mouth and BLOW IN. The victim's chest should rise.

4

REMOVE your mouth. RELEASE victim's nostrils. LISTEN for air to come out of victim's lungs. LOOK for the fall of the victim's chest. PINCH NOSTRILS and BLOW IN AGAIN.

REPEAT steps 3 and 4 continuously. IF AIR PASSAGES ARE NOT OPEN: CHECK neck and head positions, CLEAR mouth and throat of foreign substances. Start immediately. Don't give up. 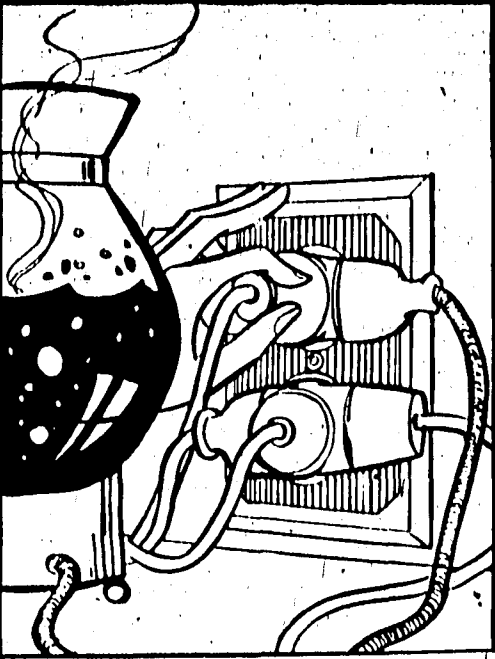

article in Modern Languages,
speaking of the "Tavor"
system.

Ann's college believe that

they can serve the English
population of Western Nova
Scotia by giving them the
opportunity to acquire by
modern technical methods,
a knowledge of the french
language and they hope that
a large number of persons,
adults and others, will re-
gister for the course.

The french course will be
of 90 minutes duration and
Registration must be made
on October 1st starting at
3 p.m. at St. Ann's college,
at the Dean's office.

St. Ann's will also offer
courses in Biology, grade
XII; Philosophy, introduc-
tory course with both courses
being held on a weekly ba-
sis and registration must al-

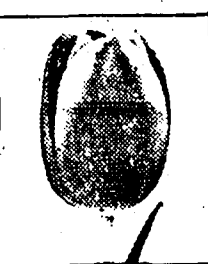

Hill Grove WMS Holds Meeting

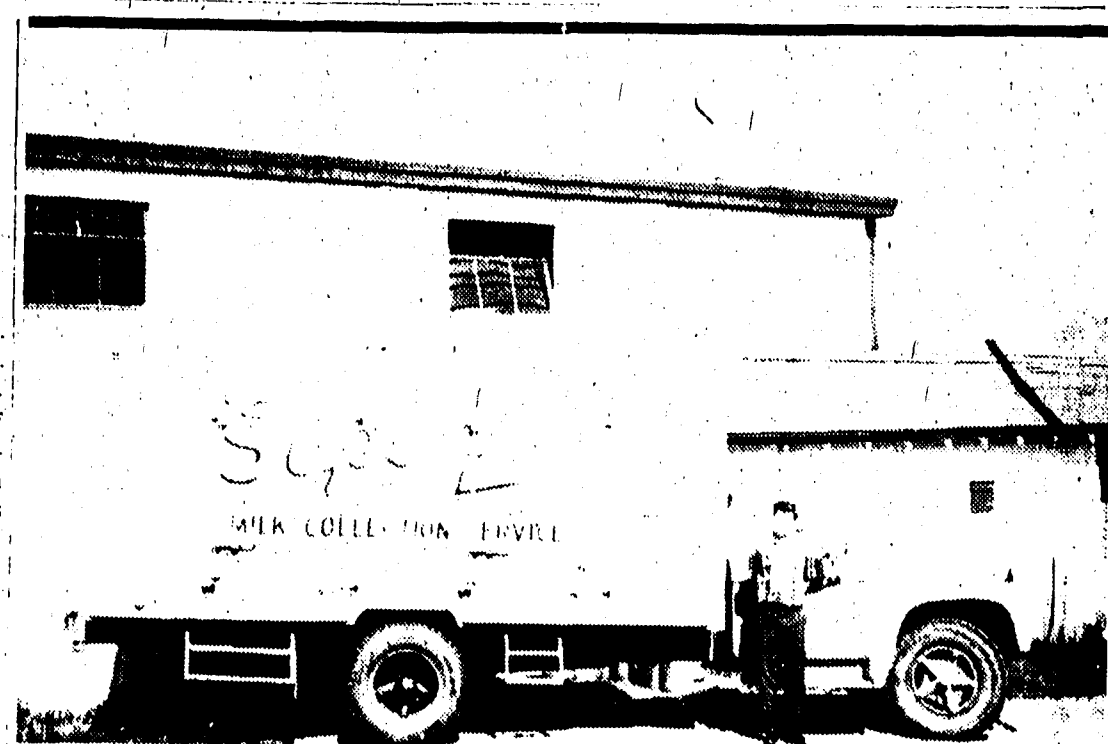

The meeting was addressed by Hon. James Harding,

Minister of Welfare and Housing. He was introduced by Baden Powell, M.L.A. and thanked by Eugene Outhouse, Tiverton. The meeting was presided over by the president, Keith Raymond.

In paying tribute to former premier of Nova Scotia, Robert L. Stanfield, the speaker said that it is a healthy sign in Nova Scotia that in choosing a leader we had chosen so wisely that the whole country was attracted. Nearly everyone has a hobby. Many people collect rare stones, stamps, coins and records. But where could four-leaf clovers be so plentiful that a collection could be made? On the lawn of Mrs. Helen Foley, Victoria Beach, that's where!

Seeking definite proof of the rumour I visited with Mrs. Foley on Sunday. Sure enough, there in a small box, individually pressed, were more than 1,200 clovers, each containing from four to seven leaves. Incredible! We've been busy. We've been so busy that every time for the past several months when we wanted to take an accounting of our circulation we'd be interrupted and would have to start all over again another day, only to have the same thing repeated. Finally we made the complete count. And what do you know? We counted just about 100 more subscribers (newstands and all) than we had a year ago. This was achieved without a special drive, without give-aways or bribes. We believe you when you tell us how much you like our newspaper. A growing circulation is proof you like it.

Maybe you think circulation isn't important. It is. Advertisers like to advertise in a newspaper which keeps accurate records of a genuine paid-up circulation. This very subject was the hottest point and most time consuming subject on the whole agenda of the recent Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association meeting held in Ottawa. The C.W.N.A. was getting fed up with the newspaper which claimed a larger circulation through give-aways. They favored the Audit Bureau of Circulation figures over sworn statement figures for it was found that some unprincipled publishers disregarded the oath of truth.

The Audit Bureau of Circulation requires that no subscriber be more than three months in payment arrears. The Digby Courier has far exceeded the ABC in that regard for any Courier subscriber more than two months in arrears has been cut off. Evidently our system has not endangered our circulation figures considering we have a gain of 100.

We are among those who use sworn statements rather than the more costly ABC. We shall have to change our method. This is not to make our figures more accurate, but, just so we are not under suspicion of being one of those whose claimed circulation figures bear false witness to actual circulation.

In the meantime we are proud of our 100 more subscribers.

Responsible Newspapers

National Newspaper Week is coming soon — October 8 to 14, to be exact. It is not too early to start drawing attention to the importance of a good newspaper in the community. Newspapers are important. They are terribly important. Dwight D. Eisenhower once said, "Only when there is a strong free press, with an unfailing sense of responsibility, can truth flourish and man grow to his maximum capability." Thomas Jefferson said "When the press is free and every man able to read — all is safe." Quoting from Harold Laski, "A people without reliable news is, sooner or later a people without a basis of freedom."

There are two important words in those quotations. Firstly, there is freedom. In this country we are accustomed to freedom. We have freedom of religion, freedom of speech and other freedoms which include a free press. We definitely want to lose none of these freedoms.

Any freedom, however is not license and the greater is the responsibility which must accompany it. An editor for instance who becomes so engrossed in seeking news that reliability is forgotten has severed too much of that responsibility. Definitely news is news when it is news and not when it is history. No good newspaper should deliberately exclude news and the freedom to print should be exercised. On the other hand, there is evidently lack of responsibility when untruths or borderline truths are played up in detriment to community and business. These and similar practices make it insistent that the two words freedom and responsibility go hand in hand at all time. Freedom without responsibility is a curse rather than a blessing.

Report From Parliament Hill

The adjourned session of this Parliament gets under way on Monday, and in many ways it has the appearance of a new session. The reason is understandable, for the Green Chamber will be without it's star. There has been a change in the billing and the name Stanfield dominates the talk along the corridors. Only the coming session will help answer the many questions which have been asked since the dramatic conservative convention in Toronto less than two weeks ago.

In preparation for the coming parliamentary business both the Liberals and Conservatives are meeting in weekend caucus. For Mr. Stanfield it will be his first time before the troops. He met the test of the delegates and it will depend upon how he handles his parliamentary soldiers whether he will be able to meet the ultimate challenge of Canadians as a whole in the next general election.

This is an amazing place, for each session seems to be the important session until the next one rolls around. The lives and political fortunes of many will be defined, detoured or destroyed in the coming parliamentary session. This is the constant of parliamentary drama, only the names of the players change. But seldom, if ever, in British parliamentary history has there been such a dramatic change since Parliament adjourned on July 7th.

Since he assumed office Mr. Stanfield has moved swiftly to sever his political ties in the provincial field and a fast moving succession of events has seen him resign as Premier, Leader of the Provincial Party and a federal seat opened for his candidacy.

And that is just the beginning. All week Mr. Stanfield has been meeting M.P.'s, members of the press and Party workers, all giving advice on how the Leader of the Party should organize his association and House of Commons office. Obviously many lives of the present staff are affected by any and all decisions. Already he has accepted the resignation of the National Director and there is much speculation about a successor. Then you have the technical but distinct difference between Mr. Stanfield's position as Leader of the Party, which he is, and Leader of "Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition", which he is not at present. And both of these positions have staff — the Party pays for the first and the latter is governed by House of Commons entitlement.

While Mr. Stanfield is Leader of the Party he is not automatically Leader of Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition, a post recognized by the Speaker of the House and not created by any Party association. Accordingly, until Mr. Stanfield is elected as a member and then elected by the caucus as Leader of the opposition that position remains with Mr. Diefenbaker unless he resigns, at which time an interim Leader could be elected. This anomalous situation between the Leader of a Party and Leader of the opposition might be clarified by a decision of caucus this Saturday which, if one is made, you will know about by the time you read this column.

There is a division of opinion on the course to be followed. Some think no change should be made until Mr. Stanfield enters the House, while others feel an interim Leader should be appointed now. While this appears to be a technical problem it has practical implications for if you are not the Leader of the Opposition should you then occupy his office space in the House of Commons, a place traditionally reserved for Members and Senators. When Mr. Bracken was elected Leader of the Conservative Party some years ago it was over two years before he became the Leader of the Opposition, assumed his seat in the House and took over the physical part of that position.

At the present time, and most likely for some time to come, Mr. Stanfield is located on the first floor of the Chateau Laurier Hotel where a suite of rooms accommodates his growing office staff, complete with switchboard.

For the full week the former Premier has maintained his hectic pace and tempo which he set for himself prior to, during and after the convention. To date the Press has still been generally receptive to him as he goes about his reorganization tasks. However, the question being asked is whether this traditional honeymoon between new Leader and press can be extended into the Fall session or rather fade like the Autumn leaves. Perhaps it is a blessing in disguise that Mr. Stanfield is not a Member of the House so that he can be somewhat free to make the many and complex decisions which are necessary in the transfer of power. While there is no unanimous agreement on how long the bloom will last all observers are agreed that this is going to be a most interesting Fall and potentially one of the most important for Mr. Stanfield personally since he assumed the reins of office in Nova Scotia — for the reins of national office in this capital city are within reaching distance as long as Mr. Stanfield does not slip on a banana!

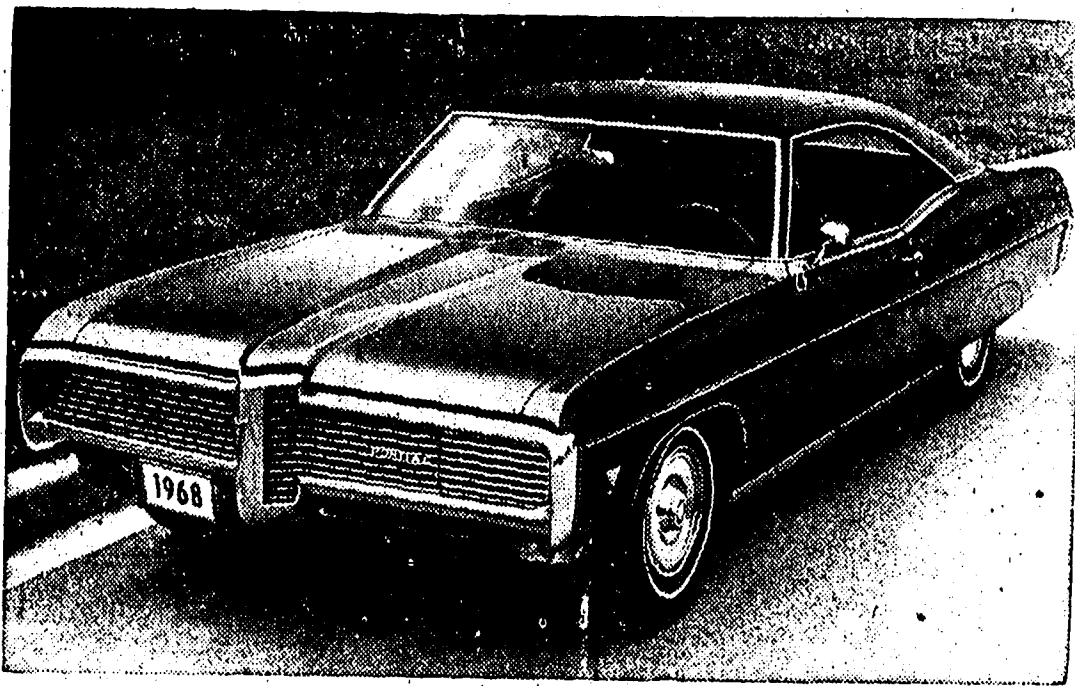

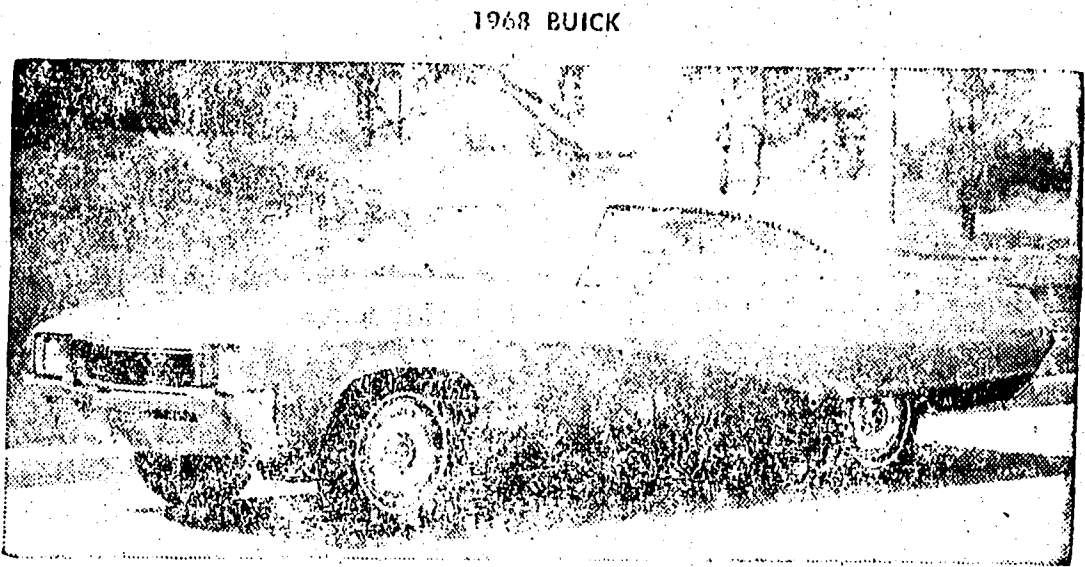

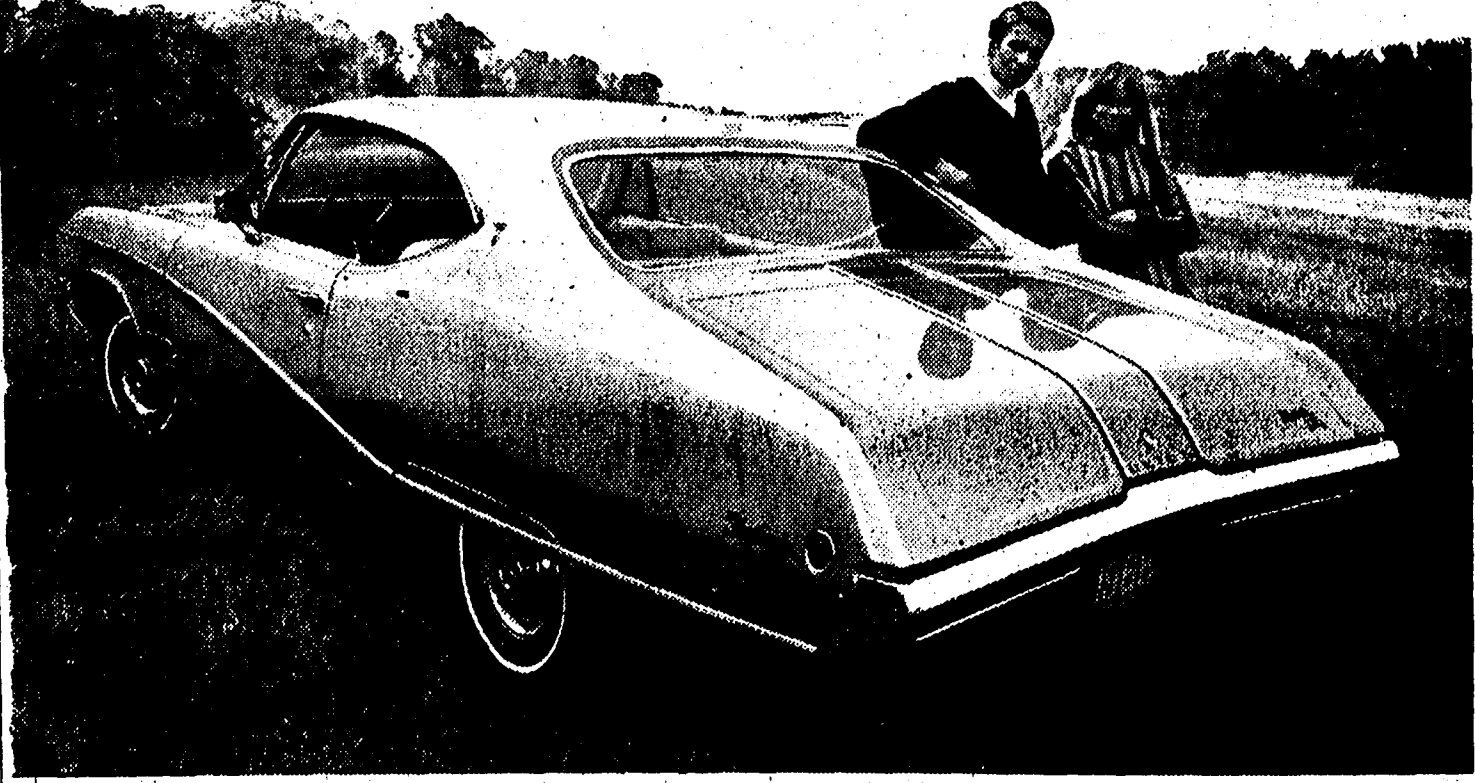

MILK — Nature's Nearest Perfect Food

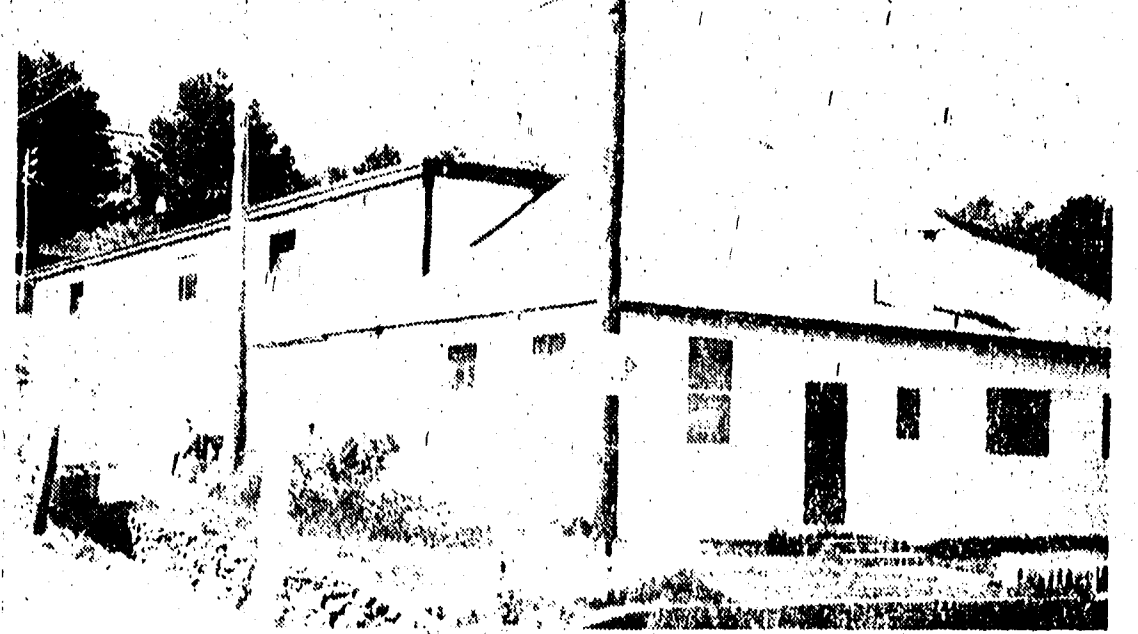
THE FARMER'S ROLE IN THE MILK INDUSTRY

Milk is perhaps the most common word in food language. According to some authorities it is the most perfect food for human beings. In this area we see evidence of lots of farmers, farm investment, land, cattle, most of which gets down to the product which results from this investment in work — MILK.

The MILK INDUSTRY, from the farm to the processing plant to the store, has seen a lot of changes in the last two or three decades. For the farmer, he has to have an economic unit. He has to have cows that will pay their way. He has now become selective with his cattle. He records their MILK WEIGHT. He watches the various breeds. He determines that a cow that has 10,000 pounds of milk a year is the type of cow that he wants. It is the type of cow that will provide him with a living. If his cow goes below that, he is then in the position of supporting, or carrying, as he calls it, a boarder. So with

producing milk he starts in initially in the milk set-up.

The cow's product, MILK, has to conform with health regulations in order that the eventual customer may have a pure product. And this starts right back on the farm. Mr. Farmer has to clean his cattle before milking. His barn and facilities have to conform to rigid health regulations. All his utensils have to be sterile and clean. He can only milk when his barn is suitable for the reception of milk. His product, MILK, is very carefully handled, for milk is easily contaminated. This handling procedure varies a great deal according to the production of the farm and the type of procedure the farmer follows. In some cases it is milked into automatic milkers and piped directly to a tank. In other cases into a milking machine and carried to a tank, sampled, dumped etc. Once a cow is milked the farmer is required to remove the animal heat as quickly as possible, as it is

Action On Better Fundy Service Has Been Delayed Too Long

At the beginning of summer, there was good reason for the hope that a plan for the modernization of the CPR's Saint John-Digby ferry service would be published long before Labor Day. Now, the prospect of early disclosure seems more remote.

On June 28, Transport Minister J. W. Pickersgill indicated to an Annapolis Valley-Saint John delegation in Ottawa that the results of negotiations between the federal government and the CPR might be made public within a few weeks. However, seven weeks later (in mid-August), Mr. Pickersgill referred to "outstanding difficulties" remaining. In letters to Mayor J. A. MacDougall of Saint John and L. K. Hill, secretary-manager of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, he neither described the difficulties nor suggested a date, on which an announcement might be forthcoming.

day. Health and Welfare Minister Allan MacEachen, touring the Annapolis Valley Aug. 30, said merely that the negotiations were continuing. He was nevertheless optimistic about the outcome, as was Mr. Pickersgill in his letters to Mayor MacDougall and Mr. Hill.

Current federal thinking is reported to be inclined toward

federal construction of the necessary terminals and a federal capital grant towards the construction by the CPR of a ferry capable of carrying trucks, as well as cars. Earlier, it had been suggested that Ottawa might retain the CPR on a fee basis to operate a satisfactory service. It has been suggested, however, that the government's present emphasis on spending economies reflected by Prime Minister Pearson at a recent press conference, has eliminated this proposal from consideration.

Discussions between Ottawa and the CPR about the Bay of Fundy service have continued intermittently for a considerable period, dating back to the Diefenbaker years. The wait has been a long one, and regrettably is not over yet.
