# Memo Invoices - Clip & Paste

A friendly warning from your Bet-- ter Business Bureau in Halifax, N. S.

There is a number of Canadian bas ed practitioners of the old clip-and-paste scheme who were and are mailing out so-called 'memo invoices' to thouout so-called memo invoices to thou-sands of business firms.

"Clip and pasters" resort to a var-lety of deceptions to practice their trade.

As the name implies, they often 'clip' advertisements from a legitimate publi-cation, 'paste' them on their own invoic-es' and mail them to the original adveres' and mail them to the original adver-tisers. The recipient, seeing his own 'ad' in print, often pays the amount request-ed without checking further. If he did this, he might find that the 'invoice' emanated from a hole-in-the-

walt office or a post office box leased by a couple of sharp cookles whose total investment in the business was confirmed to some stationery, postage stamps, and a bottle of paste.

This plagiarism of a sort is some-times passed off by an explanation in very small print or by use of the in-creasingly popular expression MEMO INVOICE, whatever that may mean.

In any case, there is every indica-tion that the scheme is paying dividends. Despite inquiries to our office from cau-tious advertisers, there is every evidence that the promoters are becoming affluent and that this flood of spu ind more material by mail will assume even great ons in the future

The sharples behind this scheme are often smart enough to commit them-selves to no publication date for their own directory and circulation figures

Don't commit yourself to an ad-vertising contract without proof of publication and circulation.

If you were born in August, Sep-ber, October, November or Decen-1902, you should send in your appli-on for an Old Age Security Pension ber 1902, you sho cation for an Old Age Security Pension in July, 1968, or as soon as possible thereafter. If you send in your application in July, you should receive your first pension cheque in January, 1969.

The age at which, pension becomes payable is being gradually reduced from

# Shape Up Your Muffins With Blueberries

Here we go round the blueberry season, and advice to muffin makers is to bake them with fresh bluerries for fruitful delights.

ou store the berries in the refrigerator and wash just be-pre using, they'll keep from a week to 10 days.



FRESH BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

Wash 1 cup fresh blueberries, Drain on absorbent paper. Sift togesher 2 cups flour, ¼ cup sugar, 3 trespoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt into a mixing-bowl. Beat 1 egg alightly mix in 1 cup milk, and 6 tablespoons salad oil. Make a well in center of dry ingradients: pour nnilk mature. Sitr gulckly ust until dry ingredients are moistened. Qulckly stir in blueberries. Turn batter into well-greated 2-4-cinch muffin cups. (Cups should be ½ full), Bake in 425°F oven 25 minutes. Remove muffins from cups while hot. Makes about 1.4 muffins.





This operation is usually done when the disease is primarily one-sided and the patient is young and otherwise healthy. The operation, like the medi-cation, often controls the disease for some years.

# Farm Safety Week July 21st To 27th

There are more than 100,000 peo-ple in the farm population of Canada involved in accidents each year, and of hese, about 30,000 receive re than 2,200 lose their

This tragic loss could readily be reduced, says Norman H: Bell, president of the National Safety League of Canada and general chairman of the Canadian Highway Safety Council, which are co-sponsoring the annual observance of Farm Safety Week, July 21 - 27.

Arr. Bell calls on all persons and groups serving or alled with agriculture to intensify efforts to curtail farm accidents, emphasizing the fact that farm safety is a family affair involving everyday hazards in living, working and play-

ing.

Properly maintain equipment. Keep guards and safety devices in place. Stop machines before unclogging, adjusting or servicing. Keep children off and away from working machines. Have fire extinguisher and first aid bit on tractors the control of the contro ing. and other self-propelled machines.

Avoid, tractor upsets; slow down

Avoid, tractor 'upsets; slow down when turning and on rough or muddy ground; watch for hidden hazards; bacatious on alopse or near ditches; when pulling with chair, or cable, hitch only to drawbar set low, keep loads within tractor's capability; ahiff down on grades. Equip tractors with overturn protection, protective frames or crush-resistant cabs. Check (lighting and vise SMV emblems for safer travel on the roads.

Neat orderly farm houses are safer, more pleasant homes. Have a place for everything; keep everything in its place when not in use. Practice safety while doing housework, caring for the family, during periods of relaxation and home recreation.

Check appliances, electrical wiring, power tools, etc. for defects. Look over hearing aystems, chimneys, citoves, portable heaters, to reduce fire hazards. Clear out clutter and rubblish that could cause falls and fires. Work up a home fire escape plan. Take extra care to protect small children and elderly persons. Chemicals are widely used in agriculture; chemical household and drug products are found in every ferm home.

necessary precautions in usage. Keep in original containers and store in suitable places well beyond the reach or access of small children.

Q. I am unemployed at the moment, but fework on kends. May I continue to receive benefit?

A Yes, you may continue to receive benefit, but you must declare your earnings and the days worked in the Claiment's Report you complete every, two weeks.

The Unemployment Insurance Commission has bested on answers to some of the questions that have puzzled contributors. Your question too can be referred to this loature for reply.

Q. Must I obtain my Unemployment Insurance book before filling an application for benefit?

A. No, it is not necessary to have your book in order to file an application for benefit. However, it is important that your deposit it as soon as possible at your UIC office, so that the contributions considered in your book may be contained to the property of the prop

benefit.

Q. May I continue to receive benefit while I am attending an occupational training course and receiving an allowance from Manpower Centre?

A. Under the Adul Occupational Training Act you are not entitled to be paid benefit in respect of any period during which you are receiving a training allowance from the Manpower Centre. You cannot receive Unemployment Insurance benefit and a training allowance concurrently.

Manpower gave nexplanation for the workers leaving the farms, some without even trying the job of picking berries. Manpower gave nexplanation because as they put ft, "we can give no explanation." They according to their response to questions by the press, knew no answer and the impression they gave was that they were as baffled over the situation as anybody.

# ACADIAN TEXTILES EXPANDS Garterless Girdle Now Manufactured At Belliveau Cove

ment of a different type. Three years ago Bernard LeBlanc opened a textile business at Belliveau's Cove where from bolts of tartans and tweeds of many colors and descriptions were made skirts, jumpers, slacks and different types of adults, girls and boys clothing. To-day with a recent \$50,000 expansion Acadian Textiles have gone into the foundation garment production. dation garment production

Above are seen two of the head seamstresses busy at two of the seven newly installed machines of the most modern kind for the particular job of creating sturdy durable foundation garments. In the background is Mirs. Anaesite Martin of Grosse Coques who knows every phase of the business and has complete control when Mr. LeBlanc is away on frequent business engagements. In the foreground is Mirs. Edith Robicheau, Concession, who also is prepared to take over if emergency arises or to substitute or Mirs. Martin or to take charge of a second shift, Mr. LeBlanc carefully scrutinizes the operation.

The large 8 x 16 ft. cutting table, the seven up-to-date machines occupy the second floor of the  $40 \times 60$  ft. building. The tartan industry continues to occupy the first floor and packing and shipping are done below.

Mr. Ledance started the foundation garment business with nine different styles and has recanity added the tenth and most modern garterless girdle which he invented and named the Acadien Lady. The girdles are pullon, medium, long-leg and briefs.

Stretched over the culting table are rolls of elestic of services within up to 84 inches, purchased by Mr. Le-Blanc for which up to 84 inches, purchased by Mr. Le-Blanc from the United Elestic Ltd., Bridgetown, N. S. Large electric cultres are used to cut out the pieces for the various designs as weights and rules bought from frank Larch. Digby, keep the elastic in proper line for the operation. The pieces are then taken to the German made stitching, marrowing and zig-zagging machines which are designed to reinforce, panel, cut, clip and decorate each garment as required. A special machine eithches garfeits to the necessary garments. The large electric cultrer is capable of training out. 28 dozes pieces in one cut while a smaller electric cultrer used for creating new styles and very fine cutting will produce 14 dozen pieces in a cut. Sitting in on the water commit meeting last week gave us a little more insight into the problem which the commissioners have to face and we think more sympathy would be shown if other people, too, could be in on the meetings and get first hand knowledge of the problems.

The commissioners have a responsibility to see that the water is safe from contamination and have a responsibility, without being alarming to advise and protect the town people and visitors, against bacterial aden supply. For this the commissioners must depend on protes from health authorities and if bacterial count is high immediate steps must be taken to counteract this or notify residents to boil the water.

I can usually be relied on to get the paies to the table cold, and to have the mashed potaces lumpy. My fixdge froms out like sugar soup, and, after years of practice, I am only beginning to turn out successful white bread, in spite of this, I have two culinary skills, I can make a heck of a good cup of coffee, and my pie crusts are in-destructable. I make every mistake the cook book wagna against, but my crusts still come out good.

One of my favorite pie crust recipes comes from a book nearly seventy years old, it is a bit surprising, because it uses saled oil, which I had somehow pictured as a modern invention. When I make it, it copies out light and delicate, and you can lift it whole out of the pan. Horcipe in its 1902 version, needs a bit of instinct. You have to sort of feel when it is ready. This is the way it read in 1902:

PASTRY WITHOUT BUTTER

of flour, ? a teaspoonful of baking powder, wineglass full of salad oil, water, salt.

Mix the baking powder and salt with the flour, add the oil, the water, and stir the paste to a consistency for

rolling, Bake without delay.
(Hint for medern cooks: 1 lb. of flour is about two cups.)

Now that you are standing there with a naked-ple crust, I guess it is only decent to find something nice to pull in it. Here is one that is almost overpoweringly seve and rich, but it is very casy, and awfully satisfying to set alone on those days when you feel corry for yourself, it comes, I think, from the deep American south.

2 cups sugar 5 eggs, separated big pinch of salt

Set over, before you start mixing the pie, at 450°. Make pestry, line-pen. Do not prick. Cream-butter until soft and smooth, add the two cups of sugar gradually, and blend thoroughly. Add egg yolk one at a time, and beat in well. Save how egg whilter from others. Beat these two until stiff, and add them, and the next four ingredients to the creamed mixture. 



As these lines are written the en gency in Digby continues to increase. Hopefully as they are read we will have received some of those showers of blessing (but in lesser quantities than Antiish) so that this beautiful summer re've been bragging about will not turn ut to be a bane for us instead of a

Digby people are meeting the emer-gency by co-operation. Only half as much water is being used at the school and household use has also been cut in half through cooperation. Requests to refrain from unnecessary washing of cars and windows and watering lawns have been adhered to. There are institutions and plants, however, where curtailment of use interferes with maintaining use fulness. Also unless rain comes in a sub-stantial quantity the source of supply will in-continue to dwindle even with conserva-tion. And, what if a fire occurred. So while consumers are to be commended for conservation the seriousness is still with us and a study of the whole water fulnets in 10 library bould because it is not account. situation in Digby should begin at once and continue when the present crisis is

over.

There have been suggestions that the hospital and school should each have its own, water supply since they are, the big water users in town. This while an immediate solution and a solution for a stagnant town, will not entirely solve the problem for a town which is looking forward to future expansion.

By all means, adhere to the mayor's emergency regulations — do not wash fars and windows, water lawns and garriags and windows, water lawns and garriags.

Check fau-cits and valves for leaks and delay house cleaning projects. In the meantime do some long-range thinking about the general water situation in Digby. 
