



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Tire Studs Work Best At Freezing Point

Suppose you are driving along at 20 miles an hour and find yourself on ice. You put on the brakes. How far will your vehicle slide?

Here are the answers, according to

Here are the answers, according to Bus & Truck Transport Magazine:
About 170 feet, if you have typical highway tires all around. And just about the same distance, if you have regular snow tires on the driving wheels.
About 140 feet if you have studded snow tires on two wheels, and about 115 if you have studded snow tires on all four wheels — a skid reduction of 33 per cent or about three car lengths.
But there's a "buit." These figures apply only to skids on ice close to 32 degrees Fahranheit.
Research shows that of the half-

degrees Rese is Fahrenhelf. esearch shows that of the half-or so factors which bear on the e effectiveness of studded tires, the temperature of the ice is at the op of the list.







Heavy Water.

For several years now, we ha been flinging around the words "heav water," Some of us have been disturbed about what might be financial los the province (all of us, really) in operation at Cape Breton. We know operation at Cape Bration. We know this thing can hit our pocket books, which is always a disturbing factor, but so few of utilities and the street when this thing really was out therefore could scarcely talk intelligently on the subject. This writer, for one, was only vaguely informed on the subject so appreciated the information gleaned from the last issue of The Progress-Enterprise in Lunenburg. It says:

"Heavy water, or deuterium oxide, is a naturally-occurring component of ordinary water. About one seven-thousandth part of natural water is heavy water."

water.

A Canadian gellon of heavy water weighs eleven pounds, one ounce; compared to natural water, which weighs ten pounds per gallon. This is where it gets its name. The appearance of pure heavy water is identical to pure ordinary water colourless. - colourless, transparent, same taste. At least for a short while, people can drink least for a snort while, people can drink heavy wreter without permanent ill ef-fects. At a current market price of about fifteen dollars per glass, no one has done, extensive experiments to find out the longer-term effects of continuously drink-ing pure heavy water."

We are sure there were many of our readers just as vague as we were and because we found the editorals "A Second Look" in the Progress Enterprise so enlightening we hope they do not mind us sharing it with our readers. Here it is —

The Glace Bay heavy water plant, like all other heavy water plants, is not a manufacturing plant. It does not make heavy water. It is a separating and concentrating plant. It takes heavy water in centraling plant. It takes heavy water in a very dilluced, impure form and separate and discards the inpurities, while keeping the purified, concentrated heavy water. The impurities are partly removed in stage one, more are removed in stage how, and so on through the plant. The plant has been designed and built with five processing units, or stages. The raw water is passed through each stage five, with an increase in concentration at each stage.

with an increase in concentration at each stage. In the plant is planned to produce a product of better than ninety percent purity at the output of stage five. It has been recently reported that the plant will produce a product of ten to fifteen percent purity at the output of stage three.

This sounds just awful. The natural This sounds just swful. The natural former can that is drawn runs something like this: If the plant can only produce a len percent pure product after it has gone through three stages, how can it be expected to produce a ninety percent pure product in only two more stages? Tornance. It helps in the understanding of this evaluation if something is known about the general process used in the plant to produce heavy wester. Where does the plant get its supply of impure heavy water for processing? From ordinary natural water. The water we all use is not a single substance; it consists of a mixture of two kinds of water. If you went out and hired a 7,000 gellon tank truck, and pumped it full of water from any natural source, you would then have in that tank truck one gellon of heavy water mixed in with 6,999 gallons of ordinary water. You could fill the mink from any sources salt water from the Alfamilia, or fresh water from the Alfamilia, or fresh water from the Leve River or Oskahrd Lake, or from a well, or any other source, and for each well, or any other source, and for each seven thousand gallons you pump, you will get noughly a gallon of heavy water. A gallon of heavy water weighs eleven pounds, one ounce, and is worth about times hundred dollars on Index's market. 
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

Dangerous Winter On Ice

This has been a dangerous winter This has been a dangarous winter in terms of ice-safety. There has been as men extreme cold to treaze lakes, rivers and ponds but there has been much mild weather to weaken the trozen areas. This is dangerous to unsuspecting children and dangerous to unsuspecting children and dangerous to unsubjecting children and dangerous for unthinking grownings. The ice which was safe yesterday does not necessarily prove safe to the contract of the contra

The importance of ice thickness as a safety factor cannot be exaggerated. Remember, ice thickness of up to two inches is definitely dangerous and three inches of ice thickness is yery risky. For absolute safety always ensure the ice is at least four inches thick.

Then, too as winter nears its end the first hints of spring usually bring the


angers of old and unstable ice. The structure of the ice changes as the warner weather approaches and, unfortunately the changes take place underneath the ice where they cannot be seen, ice where they cannot be seen, ice may look perfectly solid yet it may be so honeycombed that the slightest weight upon it will cause it to crumble. Staters should be particulally careful when the ice begins to break up. One cannot be TOO careful at this time of year. Always state in, supervized areas, preferably shallow ponds or takes in which the water is not more than waist deep.
Children should have special attentions.

Children should have special atten-tion. Parents and guardians should en-sure that their charges are under con-stant supervision when on the ice. Never-let them skate alone or after dark unless the area is floodlit.





The coal miners of Cape Breton now have a federal-provincial safety team at work for them which has been ssembled through the co-operation of the Minister of Labour for Canada and the Minister of Mines for Nova Scotia.

The inspectors of the Nova Scotia
Department of Mines will continue to
provide expert inspection services, now
financed by the Government of Canada. The federal members of the team will include the Mine Safety Officer in Sydney and the Regional Safety

Officer in Halifax. In addition to regular inspections the total safety program will include educational activity, general informational material, research projects and other services to promote employee safety.

The man at work has the right to safe orking conditions and the Canada working conditions and the Canada Department of Labour, through these new regulations, is determined to safeguard this right with the co-operation of both management

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

Safety In The Home Today And Tomorrow

Are homes of today safer for the tamily than the homes of yesterday?

Designers and engineers are coming up with new ideas in furnishings and equipment. But the key to safety in the home still lies with the family itself, ac-coffing to the Council on Family Health in cording to the Council on Family Health in Canada, a non-profit organization spon-spred as a public service by leading mem-bers of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health.

For the bathroom, site of many cidental falls in the home, there is a va-riety of designs in grab bars, decorative as well as useful. Placed at the tub and shower areas, and on the wall where they gan be grasped to help maintain balance, gan be grasper at resp manifest beaters, by a serious fall in the bathroom. I. — y have to be installed. And the fam. — is to make a point of dising hem. Ru — suction mats or skid-proof tracks on the bottom of the tub are important safety adjuncts. mporant salety adjuncts.

Child-proof storage areas can be de-signed for household chemicals and me-dicines, but it still will be necessary for responsible adults to close containers tightly and put them away, out of reach of children, immediately after use.

Skid-proof tiles and kitchen carpet-ing help prevent slips, but mother must be sure that walkways are kept free of clutter and in good repeir.

Kitchen stoves may have glass cook-ing panels instead of open-burners, auto-matic controls that can be set to protect cooks against their own negligence, and ovens which automatically clean them-selves at high temperatures.

However, pot handles still must be turned to the back of the stove so chil-

turned to the back of the stove so chif-dren cannot pull het food down on them-selves. Morn must remember to use pol holders or padded gloves when reaching for a hot cooking utensil on the stove. Designers have come up with a safety start button on automatic clothes dryers to prevent a child from climbing inside and starting the dryer by closing the door. Mother must still keep children away from the dryer as well as the wash-ing machine. ing machine.

Freezers have been designed with built-in locks to keep out little children. But adults must prevent a discarded freezer from becoming a trap for playful children. The doors must be removed, asys the Council on Family Health in Ganada, so children cannot hide inside.

Unrest In Education - Change To What? Opening Doors

So radical have been the change in our attitude toward education since World War II, that we can now say that adjuration is becoming truly demo that education is becoming truly demo-cratic. As programs to meet the needs of all our young people become avail-able, doors to new opportunities in education are opening rapidly. This revolutionary change we have wit-nessed in our own lifetime.

To say that Nova Scotia's Com-prehensive School program is now well on the road toward implementation, is certainly not an over-statement beginning of the program dates back to the early 60's with the formal in-troduction of a Ceneral Course pro-gram in the Middleton Schools (one of four selected in the Province.) whose four selected in the Province, J whose supervisory staff, teachers, and Board of Trustees had the vision and the courage to experiment. To its credit the Digby School System experimented earlier with outstanding success.

Schooled in the old tradition that education to be worth its salt had to education to be worth its saft had to be scadenic, many teachers and adbe scadenic, many teachers and administrators at the outset had little, if any regard, for the General Course program. Others did nothing and said nothing I for the boy and girl who showed little interest in scadenic sub-tects, hely in fact said, "The school has nothing to fefer you. We recom-ment that you get out and get at Job."

We learned, too, that the school must not make failures of youth, and not even contribute toward their failure. Our experiment with General

To supplement the General Course program in the Senior High School grades, we have since experimented successfully on the Junior High level, with Agusted, Modified, Remedial, and Auxiliary programs. Such classes are now an excepted and impospent part of the program of our good schools. The result? Our High School enrollments, have increased, and this over and above the fact that some one hundred fifteen Annapolis Courty students this year are enrolled in the Annapolis Regional Vocational School. In other words, we are finding a solu-To supplement the General In other words, we are finding a solu-tion to the High School drop-out prob-lem, a problem which has plagued us through the years. Good teachers re port that the new program is both challenging and rewarding, and say that they derive a new manuscript challenging and rewarding, and say that they derive a new measure of satisfaction from their dedicated work. "What nobler employment or more valuable to the State, than that of a man or woman who instructs the ris-

Pockets of resistance to change, however, still continue to exist. But under the pressure of parents, as new knowledge becomes available, the walls of resistance are crumbling. Boards are adopting new policies, dis-regarding section boundaries, and providing open doors for children, regardless of place of residence, rural or urban, to enrol at no added cost, in those schools where they can ob-lain the programs they need. This is as it should be.

Other changes lie ahead, and with School Board amalgamation, the making of these changes will become less, difficult. The result will be a stronger program and far greater returns from our investment. By way of example, a few years ago it was of example, a few yeart ago it was reposed that the Middleton Regional High School Offer an Honors Course in Senior High School Science, At a meeting of supervisory staff and Dieparinent officials, called to confide the proposal, the cost of the program was determined. Undoubtedly our greatest achievement in the Annapolit-Digby Impectorate, on the elementary school level during the past two years has been in the field of Reading, made possible through the work of our Supervisors of Curriculum. Our testing program reveals that many pupils, as a result of the every program, have made gains in reading of from one year to three years. gets progressively worse as the child

Specialists are likewise needed in other areas of the elementary curriculum, in fact; the centinued pregress plen as we envision it, is virtually impossible without the assistance of specialists, We, of course, shall continue to need those excellent jeachers who have understanding and sympathy, who are not ited down to tradition, who will not be repelled because of a deviation from their own standards, and who will not be discourged and because of apparent shortcomings of ecause of apparent shortcomings of their pupils

Our lock step grading system outdated promotion policies and outlated promotion policies, when students are promoted on the basis of a required average or some other such standard, is on the way out. The complete abolition of this system

we advocated repeatedly as far back as the late 50's, for it is a system which caters principally to the so-called average child, it permits the above-average child to use only two of his five talents, and as a result the of his five talents, and as a result the below-average child often becomes frustrated with failure. Under such a system we cannot develop the poten-ialities of all our boys and girls, and conditions of neuroses and psychoses in many instances result.
