## DIGBY TRADE BOARD CRITICIZES USE OF BARGE PROPOSAL

A proposal being prepared by Lloyd K. Hill, executive manager of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, for the use of barges to carry trucks from Port Williams across the Bay of Fundy to Miramichi came in for criticism at the Digby Board of Trade meeting this week.

Reidar Bevenen, a former ship's engineer with many years experience both on the Bay of Fundy and on the shipping lanes, said a long time active member of the Digby trade board, he had the proposal as being "far fetched and impractical" because of tide and weather conditions and the cost factors involved.

Russell Simons, President of the Digby Board of Trade, stated the AVABT would be better advised to consider some of the projects it already has underway, such as the proposed barge project, before embarking on such a proposal as the barge project. He said he failed to understand why the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade would propose this project when there has just been established a new and very adequate service across the Bay of Fundy between Digby and Saint John. He said he also felt the barge scheme is impractical and would, even if it were feasible, be in competition to a service which the AVABT did much to promote.

The Digby trade board president said that he felt the AVABT should be getting ahead with its support for a permanent crossing for trucks, the St. John's and Miramichi River crossing and other like proposals, which its member boards have long endorsed, before embarking on a new proposal such as the barge project.

## RALPH JARVIS REVIEWS COMPLEX HISTORY AT OFFICIAL OPENING AT WEYMOUTH FALLS

(Complete text)

As President of Weymouth Falls Community Council it gives me great pleasure to welcome you all to the opening of our Recreation Complex. I say this, not without a feeling of pride and joy but also with a sense of responsibility. This complex is a landmark in the history of the town. In 1945, a few of us assembled together and formed a Community Group and renovated a small school house which was later found to be inadequate. We decided to construct a much larger building. In 1947 we borrowed \$30,000.00 and built our Community Centre which in 1948 was named the St. Lawrence School. In 1958 our membership was doubled and the name of our group was changed from Weymouth Falls Community Group to Weymouth Falls Betterment Association. After the introduction of the Consolidated School system in 1963 the building was turned over to us. From 1963 to 1967 our building was used mainly for Community meetings, however, within recent years our group has become much more active.

It was unfortunate that government did not introduce Social Development prior to 1966, however, in 1968 we introduced a change which many of us were not aware of. We saw a change in the progress of our people for the first time. This 14 young people have indicated that they are desirous of entering Universities and Colleges after graduating from High School. Early this year four members of this group formed a Combo Band. In order to acquire the necessary musical instruments they borrowed \$600.00 from the Royal Bank of Canada on the strength of their own character to repay. At present they only have \$82.00 outstanding. This summer our young people participated in the Scottish contest. Our Council has sponsored a home-exchange programme. In July

sored three successful leadership training courses. We have purchased 100 chairs, a P.A. system, seven tables and a pop-cooler. As donations from Social Development Division we received a large refrigerator and a four burner electric stove. Over 600 volumes of books were donated by CFB Cornwallwall and well over 300 volumes by Adult Education Department, Halifax. To help raise money to implement our projects we purchased a complete set of Bingo games, opened a Canteen and through the Youth Group sponsored weekly dances.

Also in 1968 we organized a Youth Group. During the winter months of 1968 the group sponsored a personality development programme and during the winter months of 1969 and 1970 cultural and educational programmes. For the past three Christmases the youths embarked upon organized Christmas Carol Campaigns. The money raised from each campaign provided needy families with Christmas Cheer. From the youth group we have two students who are attending Universities, one at Technical College and one at a Nursing School. This year we have Henry Bishop, President of the group who will be attending the Nova Scotia College of Art. Prior to 1969 the rate of school drop outs from our community was high. This year we have 14 members of our youth group who are in the grade XI Academic Class.

As you have noticed during the quarter of a century of operation the name of our organization has successfully changed. At birth we called ourselves the Weymouth Falls Community Group, after the baptism, the Weymouth Falls Betterment Association. As our Community became more united in 1969 we changed from Weymouth Falls Betterment Association to Weymouth Falls Community Council. This came about because of the constant drive for personal and community improvement and the changes which were constantly taking place around us.

As the stage was set in the late 60's a continuation of our project was carried out in 1970 as well as new projects undertaken. These projects implemented in 1970 were community beautification through personal property improvement. In regard to the Royal Bank of Canada, Weymouth, has donated a trophy. The beautification of our cemetery, this has now become an annual affair. Finally, together with a grant of \$300.00 from the Digby Municipal Council, we purchased 4 acres of land and thus we were able to fulfill the first phase of our long awaited with, the development of a Recreation Complex.

Our projects for 1971 were to provide necessary facilities in our Community Centre and to develop a year around physical fitness programme. At the beginning the mere idea of tackling these two major projects somewhat scared us, however, with determination and dedication we found that they were not that difficult at all. We approached these projects by first applying for a grant of \$2000.00 from the Federal Government to develop our Recreation Complex and by borrowing \$1500.00 to renovate our Community Centre. In our building we now have two bedrooms, which will be used by the summer workers of Social Development, two toilets, a bathroom, a kitchen, a new stage and we have repainted the inside. Further plans for indoor recreational activities include a pool table, table tennis and possibly chess facilities. At present arrangements are being made with Acadia University to organize a drama group.

The product of our efforts for which we are gathered here today speaks for itself. Earlier this year we had several setbacks. We did not start clearing the land until late April. Our grant from the Federal Government was not approved until late June. How-

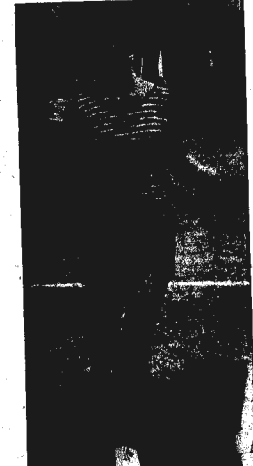

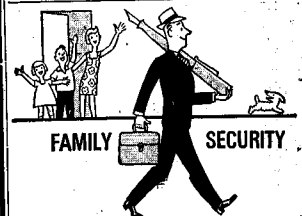

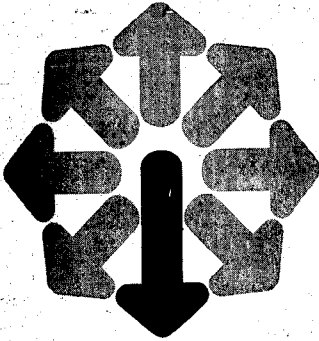

A delegation of Nova Scotia government M.L.A.'s representing the four Western Counties in the Nova Scotia Legislature will meet in Ottawa Wednesday with officials of the Government of Canada to discuss Federal Programs with respect to Public Works and the Fishery in this area of the Province.

The delegation is led by the two Provincial Cabinet Ministers from the Western Counties, Fisheries Minister Benoit (L-Clare) and Finance Minister Peter Nicholson (L-Annapolis West) and includes Harold Huskinson (L-Sheburne), J. Fraser Mooney (L-Yamouche) and Captain Joe Casey (L-Digby).

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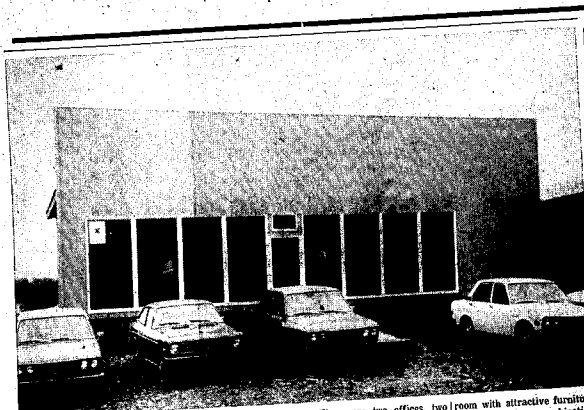

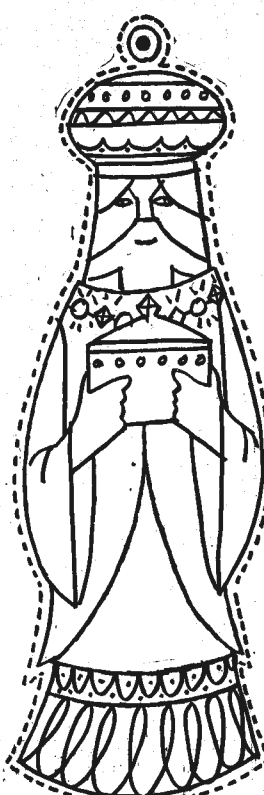

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# Must Deal With Total Person Says Marvin Burke

Marvin Burke, Executive Director of the Nova Scotia Research Foundation, who was recently given the appointment by the Minister of Health, Honorable Scott MacNeil, was guest speaker at a special meeting of the Digby Committee of the Nova Scotia Alcohol Research Foundation.

Mr. Burke's topic dealt mainly with the proposed reconstruction of the Nova Scotia Alcohol Research Foundation, which is a ten year old organization. In the reconstruction, Mr. Burke said, consideration must be given to the fact that it is the total person which must be

dealt with in alcoholism. He felt that the alcoholic has a right to receive help at the local level and as near as possible to his family. Alcoholism, he said, should be treated as a disease. The alcoholic needs a total kind of help, not a fragmented set of help, and this will be taken

into consideration in the reconstruction of the organization. Mr. Burke also stressed the importance of after-care. He said people are often ready to respond to crisis but forget after care. First alcoholism clinics should be maintained, but must not be dropped.

He suggested, there must be an effective delivery of service at the local level. Mr. Burke expects that the Department of Education, through the school curricula, will provide communication on alcoholism and studies. He felt that young people of various types should be included along with adults on the work of alcoholism and committees in relation to the Foundation. These, he suggested, should include those "off streets" and others. The speaker suggested a possible grant of \$500 for the Foundation work in Digby. (Please turn to page 2).

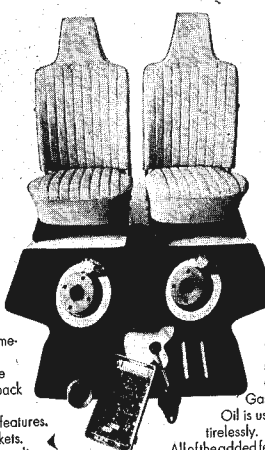

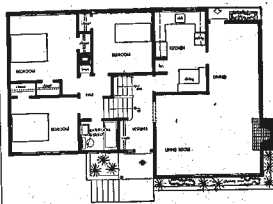

James Outhouse was on Tuesday evening elected president of the Digby Board of Trade, succeeding Russell Stonehouse, who held the office for two years. Elected first vice-president was Ernest

Ryan and second vice-president, William Reid. Mrs. Rosemary Ross was re-elected secretary and the new treasurer is Jack Parent. Fifteen were present at the annual meeting on Tuesday evening to hear reports and

participate in discussions, chief of which evolved around a proposed new shopping centre for Digby. The treasurer's report showed a credit balance in the vicinity of \$100, however, the president reminded the Board that new brochures would have to be printed for the coming season to help take money.

In his report Mr. Stonehouse reviewed accomplishments of the Board but scored the lack of interest by the Digby citizens, especially the business men of the town. He emphasized the need of secondary industry. By regular motion it was decided to write a letter to the Hon. Garnet Brown, Minister of Highways, requesting that Route 101 from Bear River to Annapolis be given priority in highway construction and that work begin at an early date. The provincial government will also be requested to schedule the opening of the Digby to Shelburne

road as a winter works program. Only 12 miles of new road is needed to continue the road as now exists to Shelburne. A. L. Robinson presented the report of the transportation committee in which he revealed the part played by the Trade Board in obtaining two Princess of Acadia trips per day and lower fares. Other projects were road repairs and a move for a wider entrance to Victoria St. from Warwick St.

### TAX INCENTIVES RE SHOPPING CENTRE BECOMES ARGUMENTATIVE FIGURES LATER CHANGE UP TO \$300,000

The matter of tax incentives requested of the town for a proposed shopping centre for Digby has been argued on two occasions and the subject was also discussed at a meeting of Digby business men and citizens held at the Fundy Restaurant on Wednesday evening. The proposal first came before a special meeting of the Digby Town Council held at the Town Hall on Wednesday, November 10, and attended by some 35 to 40 interested visitors. The second public motion by Councillor Gordon

Ellis, seconded by Councillor Victor Halliday, was in favour of taxes at one percent of the total value of a \$500,000 assessment for the first five years and two percent for the next five years, after which full taxation rate would be levied on the property. The total taxes planned for the town in the first ten years would amount to seventy-five thousand dollars. After much discussion Deputy Mayor Paul Winchester moved an amendment to the motion, seconded by Councillor Willard Kinney,

that a decision on the matter be postponed. Voting in favour of the amendment were Winchester, Kinney and Councillor Mrs. Ina Dillon. Voting against the motion, making the vote were Ellis, Halliday and Councillor Charles McBride. The tie was broken by His Worship Mayor Glen Smith voting in favour of the amendment, defeating the original motion. The date set for the next special town council meeting to consider the matter again is November 24.

The proposition as placed before the Digby Board of Trade by president Russell Stonehouse on Tuesday evening changed the former figures considerably. According to Mr. Stonehouse National Leasehold Ltd. assured that all merchandise and equipment on the premises would be taxable at regular taxation on an \$800,000 mall. This would be approximately \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year and over a period of 10 years would amount to approximately \$120,000. On a million dollar mall, which would have more tenants and more merchandise, the town of Digby would receive approximately \$12,000 to \$18,000 yearly for 10 years, making approximately \$180,000 in ten years. The taxes which the town would receive on an \$800,000 mall itself would be at 1% an amount of \$8,000 yearly and it would be \$16,000 yearly or \$80,000 for 5 years. Total taxes for ten years on equipment, merchandise and mall for 5 years \$40,000 and at 2% (Please turn to page 4)

### Remembrance Day In Digby



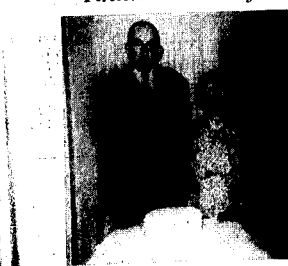

#### Former Digby Teacher Supervisor

Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission has opened a Western Region office at Digby. The office will be responsible for the western part of the Province from Highway No. 10 (between Bridgewater and Middleton) to Yarmouth.

Supervisor for the Western Region is Harry Gesner, who was transferred from the position of Human Rights Officer at the Halifax office. Mr. Gesner had been employed with the Royal Bank of Canada and the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company Ltd. before he went into school teaching. Two of his teaching years were spent at the Digby Regional High School. He taught in Shelburne before he took a teaching post overseas on the island of Borneo.

The office is located in the Fundy Restaurant building on Water Street in Digby. Personal letters have gone out from the Supervisor to groups and individuals in the Western Region encouraging residents to use the office for supplying speakers at meetings, dealing with complaints, and developing or assisting with Human Rights program, so on. Readers in the Western Region are invited to contact Mr. Gesner to discuss their interests in the Human Rights field.

The work of Human Rights Commission includes: enforcement of the Human Rights Laws of the Province; studies in the field of Human Rights in Nova Scotia and elsewhere; advice and assistance to the government; work with groups or individuals with interests in Human Rights; and public education meant to broadcast the fact that every person should be free and equal in dignity and rights, regardless of his race, religion, colour, creed, national origin, or ethnic origin.

## Remember 21

One of the chief complaints we heard regarding the special meeting of the Digby Town Council which dealt with tax concessions for a proposed new business establishment was that there was not enough notice of the meeting to the general public. The local newspaper carried a small front page story which because of the Thursday holiday had to be moved to the front street on Wednesday morning. Radio also made comment and heads got together. The next meeting to deal with specific tax incentives is scheduled for November 24 and we expect that the town council expects all who have an interest to be on hand to state their views pro or con. Whether business men or home owners the issue seems to be one of general interest to all. The word tax seems to have a vital spot in every human being. The date of the next meeting is now well publicized and every person will have an opportunity to voice an opinion.

There is little which can be written about the subject other than found already in the news columns. The bone of contention was not that a shopping centre might be coming to town but that already established businesses would be subsidizing the opposition they might have to buck should the town decide to grant tax incentives to a company establishing a shopping center. Their query is "Why shouldn't we enjoy the same privileges?" As far as we can gather from down town chatter their thinking is that this could be considered differently if it were the case of an industry not creating competition with already established businesses which have striven to keep the town operating through the years.

The Town Council has no easy decision.

## Completely, Utterly Disgusting

We all know the weariness and discouragement which comes over one when you've tried so hard to do what you feel is good and best for an organization or a group of persons or an individual. "Completely, utterly disgusting" might be a hopelessly sounding utterance in the extreme but there are precisely the words heard at the close of the last Digby District Home and School Association. And these were not from an ordinary member. The reason? There were 49 people present (a good percentage teachers) when there should have been a hundred and forty-nine and more.

Maybe Tuesday was not the best night. There are so many things scheduled for Tuesday nights. Maybe people had already accepted other invitations or appointments. Maybe notice for the meeting wasn't given far enough in advance. Whatever the cause for so few, the small number of 49 was disappointing to those who had reluctantly, though hopefully accepted the reins of office.

A Home and School should be concerned with all problems that relate to the welfare of the child in the home, school and community. In fact, it should be active and alert in preventing prob-

lems to make it of its moral obligations to all of its constituents to heart. There are pros and cons to be weighed, as can readily be seen. The decision is a difficult one for the town council and there are those who wonder if the responsibility should not be thrown on the taxpayers themselves.

There are risks for the town council to run. The council can see X number of dollars in taxes to be derived from a shopping centre in the next ten years and more, there is the possibility of drawing more people to town from further distances, there is an opportunity for more employment in the retail business and businesses which connect. All these are assets unless other established businesses are thereby put to a disadvantage. This is a major consideration for conscientious council members and one which will need pencil and paper to aid in the decision. The proposed shopping centre might prove to be in no way detrimental but rather an acceleration to other similar downtown businesses. That is anybody's guess. Pencil and paper cannot answer all the questions. Psychological considerations also enter the picture. These are some of the risks to be encountered in the business world of today.

The decision is held to the town council before it can be placed before the Department of Municipal Affairs for final approval. We feel the council has acted justly in giving the people, especially the business men, an opportunity to study the situation and express views. The Council members then must decide according to the dictates of their reasoning powers and consciences.

Remember 24. That's the date.

We are all aware that problems can arise. An ounce of prevention by Home and School is worth a pound of cure anytime. Parents should realize that. It is at H. & S. that the parent learns first hand about the school conditions and community conditions which affect his or her child and it is at H. & S. where the parent is encouraged and influenced in the growth and safety of the child and his future. The H. & S. is designed to discuss interests and give assistance no matter what age or at what level of school the student might be.

The child does not make the H. & S. The teacher, no matter how faithful in attendance, does not make the Home and School. The parent alone does not make the Home and School. It is the parent and teacher together with a common concern for the child which makes the Home and School. Take any one of these away and the effort is lost. And generally it is the parent who is missing.

Parents, don't let it be said again by the heads of the Digby District Home and School Association "Completely, Utterly Disgusting". We hope you are given lots of advance notice, make your plans early and turn out in droves.

flowers on the Cenotaph in memory of fallen comrades. He said they would expect much more than this from us, they would expect us to continue on their behalf to carry the torch that must still be carried in peace as well as in war. In other words, they would expect us to be involved in the battle of winning the peace, he continued.

The younger generation — the ones who will have the responsibility for running the show within a few short years, are looking to us for guidance and counsel, the speaker ventured. This is where we need to hold the torch — we cannot afford to let them down, he remarked. If we do, we are in a way not only letting them down but also the fallen comrades.

Give our young people a chance and they will fight and do for us try to channel their fervor, their energy, their drive for truth toward fighting the war that must be fought against poverty, the battle for a better world and a greater spread of the love of our fellow men around the world.

There were three veterans present from the First World War, while five are hospitalized.

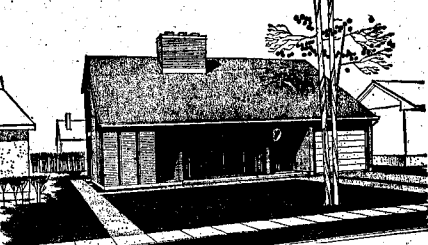

## IEL To Assist Small Businesses

Following Legislative authority granted to Industrial Estates Limited by the Nova Scotia Legislature, this Corporation has been established to assist the formation of small business financing divisions in the province. The primary aim will be to stimulate the initiation, development and expansion of local industry. Any existing or proposed enterprise engaged in secondary manufacturing or processing, and selected service industries, and which is related thereto, and which job creating potential in Nova Scotia, can qualify for IEL assistance, provided the original sales volume of the enterprise does not exceed \$750,000.

IEL assistance to small businesses will take the form of short, medium and long term loans, guarantee of loans from other sources, and minority equity positions.

The purpose of this program is to fill "gap" areas where these exist and to provide funds supplementary to those available from conventional sources. This program will apply to any worthwhile business purpose, provided the direct effect is the creation or sustaining of employment.

Security for this financing will take the form of Real Estate and Chattel Mortgages, Fixed or Floating Charge Debentures, corporate or personal guarantees, assignment of business assets, etc., and repayment terms will be adjusted to suit the needs of the individual case.

The significant factor in qualifying for financial assistance is that the business must have expectations of profitability. The individual merits of each case will be considered primarily on the basis of need, and on the ability to repay. At the same time, there must be a tangible investment on the part of the owner and a reasonable degree of protection for IEL.

Borrowers will be required to prepare annual operating budgets, as well as regular interim operating reports so that they can move effectively

to create a Small Business Financing Division that will put special emphasis on this aspect of industrial development. In this connection, the following guidelines have been established for the Small Business Financing Division.

1. Eligibility: Existing and proposed enterprises (either incorporated or unincorporated) engaged in secondary manufacturing, processing and related service industries directly related thereto, located in Nova Scotia with a job-creating potential to be eligible.

2. Small Business Definition: For purposes of this program, "small business" shall be defined as those enterprises with an annual sales volume of not more than \$750,000. Also the total loan involvement or commitment to be considered under this program will be limited to up to \$100,000 and there will be limits on the amount IEL will participate for each enterprise. ## Special Highways Agreement

A special Highways Agreement providing \$20 million in federal assistance for highway construction and all-weather standards paving on trunk roads in Nova Scotia was announced today by the Minister of Regional Economic Expansion, Jean Marchand, and by the Premier of Nova Scotia, Gerald Regan.

This Special Highways Agreement complements the existing Special Areas and Highways Agreement between the two governments and covers projects to be constructed by the Province of Nova Scotia in 1972-73. All special areas and projects will be completely financed by the federal government.

Among the six projects in the new Highways Agreement are:

1. Trunk 101, Halifax-Kentville. The project included will complete the upgrading and paving of this section of Highway 101 together with the building of the new Peter River Bridge and its approaches in the Digby area.

## Notice To Motorists (Owners Or Drivers)

### WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS DIGBY, N. S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic, and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, I am of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I so declare.

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 180 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, I make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway designated by signs upon sections of the highway designated by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 187 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act of November, 1963, and amendments thereto.

(a) No owner or driver or persons having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing on any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.

(c) The provisions of Clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not apply to:

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is to engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(6) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(7) The provisions of Clause (6) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a penalty provided by Section 206 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

4. Any person who after pay set and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations.

5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December, 1971 until the 31st of March, A. D. 1972.

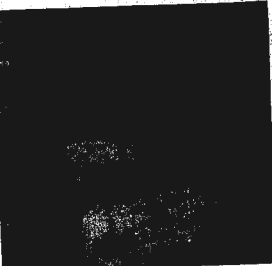

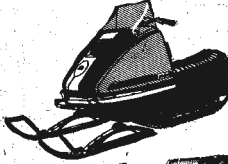

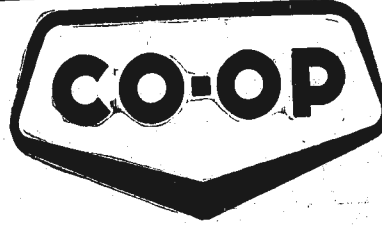

long. They will either die, he said, or become as vegetables. He said that addition to alcohol and other drugs is practically inoperable. He criticized people without proper experience trying to treat people "on a drug trip".

He went into all the dismal effects of drug use, the hepatitis danger, the short time to become addicted, the fact that effects appear at a later date, but ended on a more positive note when he claimed the poison of youth has not changed greatly and that there is an overwhelming number of youth who also have good sense.

By means of specimens such as the lung, brain, liver and other parts of the body Dr. Harlow attempted to show the effects of cigarette smoking, alcohol use and drug abuse on the body. He went on to say that it is not the drug to be blamed but the people. He advocated getting back to basic foods, exercise and a condition of physical fitness as well as mental readiness to help keep in a healthy condition.

Dr. Harlow felt the adults alcohol use, and that no matter how little you take it will affect a person's reason first, then his ability to coordinate and the nerve control, heart and lungs with greater quantities.

Dr. Harlow felt the adults of today were poor examples to kids but advised that the kids be cautioned not to be caught in the same trap. He stressed education and felt that if young people could go to hospitals and see for themselves the condition of alcohol and drug abusers, they would realize they are not being fooled.

Regarding marijuana, he said it does damage the brain and does affect particular people.

## URGES CLARE DEVELOPMENT BY CLARE PEOPLE

Mr. Leo Potier, of Meteghan, was elected as president of the Clare Chamber of Commerce at a meeting held at the Little Brook Municipal Court House before a very large gathering of interested persons. Mr. Louis R. Comeau, president of Collette St. Anne, of Church Point, and federal member for Southwestern Nova, was guest speaker for the evening.

What do we have in Clare? asked Louis Comeau, and he went on to say that things have to change because the people of Clare (Municipality in Digby County) want better jobs, particularly better paying jobs. They are neither rich nor poor, but the majority in this area lead a pretty good life. This may be the reason why we are not developing the area as we should. We don't want to rock the boat, Mr. Comeau said, but some people say that our businesses are taking every means to see that no new industry comes to the area. I do not believe that one bit. I congratulate our local businessmen for the effort and initiative they take. People in Southwestern Nova Scotia and particularly in Clare have the knack of discouraging one of their fellowmen to do something for the betterment of the economy. The people would rather see a complete stranger

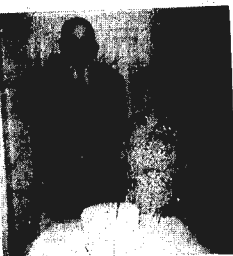
than to see one of their own go ahead in this world. We have things to do in Southwestern Nova Scotia and if we don't invest and take certain risks, then somebody else will. These may be Americans or Upper Canadians. Hardly a week passes without someone looking over our lake and beach properties or anything they can buy. I'm glad to see some interest in our area. The point is, if these people can make some money, why can't we, said Mr. Comeau.

Tourism is a very important industry and it has a tremendous potential in this part of the province. We have not half the facilities to meet the influx of tourists in our area, said Mr. Comeau. Tourism has only scratched the surface and with increased sailings of ferries and construction of larger ferries a great change will take place. The Chamber of Commerce can be a tremendous asset with the Industrial Committee of the Clare Municipal Council in proper planning of the area, thereby attracting small industry here. It can continue to press for improved harbours, highways, particularly by Route 101 and the Chamber should continually be asking for the development of the Cape St. Mary area. There is a fantastic beach in that area (com-

monly called Maville beach) and there is no reason why it cannot be developed in much the same way as Cavendish in P.E.I.

With the college in Church Point the Chamber should insist upon the Municipality and the Provincial Government that proper planning be conducted in that village. A street should be built a few hundred yards from the main road, connecting to the station road. There is a great potential for Church Point and much better facilities and services are needed. ## WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS

DIGBY, N. S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, I am of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I so declare.

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 180 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, I make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated therein and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made pursuant to the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 187 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Motors and dated the 30th day of November, 1963, and amendments thereto:

(a) No owner or driver or persons having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the vehicle upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 11 o'clock in the morning and between the hours of 6 o'clock in the evening of the same day, the hour of 6 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the vehicle standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.

(c) The provisions of Clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not apply to:

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(6) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the vehicle standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(e) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby. 3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a penalty provided by Section 266 of the Motor Vehicle Act. 4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations. 5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December, 1971 until the 31st of March, A.D. 1972. DATED at Digby, N.S., this 23rd day of November, A.D. 1971. Signed, W. F. Dunn, Traffic Authority, Town of Digby, N. S.

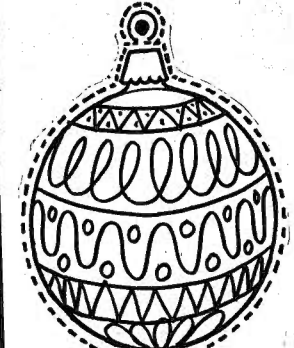

and people to fit the job, which is their basic task. At no time was Manpower in the position to create jobs. Recently the Federal Government of Canada introduced a bill to pump a large sum of money with a program intended to create a healthy and dynamic economy.

One of the programs is the "labor intensive" program in which associations, organizations or groups of people can take part. There is the Special Development Loan program, which is "DRIVE" Loans for new housing, urban renewal, loans to exhibitors and fairs can be obtained, said Mr. Pottier. Our own office, said Mr. Pottier, will have training in the job program, acceleration of regular Manpower programs. We have one hundred and fifty courses available given and which are administered by the Department of Education of the province. Upgrading courses are available in Digby, Yarmouth and Truro. A wide variety of courses are available, practically all trades and occupations to be expanded, said Mr. Pottier.

Mr. Pottier explained how the "training on the job" worked, giving examples. He said that the government feels that people are creative by nature and therefore they can create their own jobs, in many cases. Municipalities and towns can also come within the program outlined, and they would apply through the Department of Municipal Affairs of the province, while local groups, organizations or clubs would apply to Manpower, either in Digby or Yarmouth.

September for 100 ladies. A library, theatre and gymnasium and soon a new administrative building will be needed. Private enterprise should be interested in the ladies' residence project which would leave the other buildings to the college to be constructed, stated Mr. Comau.

We are negotiating with various departments of government for contracts to develop the area both economically and in the matter of education, he said.

Teachers want us to give proper French courses. We lack that public servants become bilingual, therefore, we will train them and much more.

We need better facilities for the staff and students and I say, if you as entrepreneurs do not do it, somebody else will. Mr. Comau has already contacted people outside the area to help to develop our program. I say, how does it go, that if you have an idea, don't worry what the people may say, but stick to your convictions and beat them out.

Mr. Emmanuel Adelaar, of Weymouth, and past president of the Maritime Board of Trade, spoke briefly to the group. The Clare Chamber of Commerce was a very active board with excellent men taking part in the projects. A Chamber of Commerce allows for fruitful discussions to take place, said Mr. Adelaar, and the potential development of tourism as well as lumbering and fishing is very great. He said that he hoped that the endeavors of the Chamber would be successful.

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# Godbole Presents Islands Case To Health Minister MacNutt

There is no wonder doctors do not stay on Long Island and Brice Island, Digby County, Dr. Godbole remarked to Scott MacNutt, Minister of Health, after guests and Board of Trade members, when he presented a case for the Islands at a Ferry Board meeting.

The first problem, he said, is transportation to hospital. A seriously ill patient in Westport has to travel two ferries and miles and is responsible if something happens, he queried. There is no X-ray machine or cardiac

facilities available for use on the islands until a patient becomes ill to be transported 40 miles to Digby. But when the risk, he said, people live in Digby or with relatives in the United States for the winter. While nothing has been finalized, Joseph Casey, M.L.A. for the District of Digby, told the Ferry Board of Trade in Westport Monday evening that it is expected a water jet propelled ferry will be used on the Petit Passage and that a hydro-jet propelled ferry might be expected soon by converting the present row in sailing two outboard motors of 125 H.P. each. The barge, hydro-jet propelled, would have a wheelhouse and passenger accommodation and provide a 24 hour service. Such a service could come into operation in ten days after and it is expected the highway department and premier is given. Preliminary construction would be used. The ferry would have

approach to problems confronting the western counties will, in our judgment, strengthen the way of local communities in defining priorities with respect to federal programs.

The delegation emphasized that the fishery was an extremely important sector of the region's economy, in most cases having a higher land value per fisherman than those in other parts of Nova Scotia.

"The Government of Canada appears to have a policy with respect to regional economic development that emphasizes the stronger, more viable sectors of a Province's economy. The western counties' fisheries meets the test of that criteria, and is thus deserving of careful consideration when setting federal programs affecting the sector," the statement said.

The delegation pressed federal officials on policies relating to the centralization of wharf facilities, noting that such a program is feasible only with respect to the deep sea fishery, where large seiners and druggers are engaged. "It is vital to the long-term viability and prosperity of the inshore fishermen that the federal government pursue a policy that provides a modern and efficient system of public wharves, haul-ups and slipways for smaller vessels," the statement said.

In addressing the importance of adequate wharves for the inshore fishery, the delegation cited the 1969 statistics that show that of the 699 vessels over 10 tons

of a length of 35 feet to 49.9 feet, 733 of them, representing 84 per cent, sail out of the zone western counties. 70 per cent of the vessels over 10 tons with a length of 50 feet to 74.9 feet operate from the same ports. "The Federal

Government has a deep influence on the structure of the fishery through public works programs, and should appreciate local opinion before undertaking wharf projects," the statement added.

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## Speaker Reveals Winds Of Change In Education

"Hardly a gentle breeze greatly affected by the better, but when the winds will come, they will rust and roar, and a tempest and a gale will sweep such as we've not seen before."

Edith Chappell, Supervisor of Curriculum for Annapolis and Digby County Schools, began his talk with the above statement while addressing a recent meeting of the Annapolis Institute in Bear River.

The speaker went on to say that changes have been much more apparent than actual. What happens to the child in the classroom, what is new and improved in the child's curriculum, what is relevant and meaningful to the people—are guests by which to measure change.

Little actually has changed in education for the child over the past few years, he said. Apparent changes consist of schools, amalgamation of schools, amalgamation of administrative personnel, housing of pupils, increased spending—all amount to little unless the child's classroom program is

such as music and art—all require thorough searching before answering. In sum, the teacher needs to know the reasons why he or she is teaching a particular subject.

2. More knowledge about the child—how he learns and how he doesn't learn—more will need to be known about the emotional, the mental, and the psychological makeup of the pupil, the speaker continued.

Some awakenings, some stirrings, are occurring on the educational scene. These include: (1) making the classroom student-centered (not

course-centered); (2) instituting continuous progress with the child progressing at his own rate without repeating or without skipping grades.

New concepts in the whole field of Language Arts are being examined, new approaches in the teaching of health, of social studies, of science, are being employed.

The late M. Gendell once said that the improvement in mankind lay in the improvement not of instituting but of man. We can say that great change in education will come with improvement at the classroom level, the speaker concluded.

## New Snow Vehicle Regulations

Amendments to a number of regulations will be legally proposed under Nova Scotia's new Snow Vehicle Act. The regulations, which were announced today by the Minister of Transportation, will require that all snow vehicles be registered and identified by a number.

This action is designed to encourage safer, provincial snowmobiles and broaden the potential of the sport in the field of winter tourism, said Mr. Brown.

Provision has also been made for the registration of snow vehicle dealers and the issuing of dealer registration numbers for the purpose of identifying snow machines being used for demonstration.

A \$10 fee will be charged annually for a snow vehicle dealer registration and a single registration number assigned to the dealer who must display that number in accordance with the Act if he has a snow vehicle in operation.

An estimated 150 dealer registration applications have now been distributed, and these will be received within the next few days, should write the Registrar of Motor Vehicles in Halifax to obtain the proper dealer registration form.

The change in regulations represents a saving in costs and inconvenience for dealers, and eliminates the need for a double-registration in any one year on sales of vehicles by registered dealers.

Dealers will be required to maintain a record of the name and address of the operator of a snow vehicle each time it is demonstrated, and the name and address of every purchaser of every snow vehicle sold.

The responsibility for registering snow vehicles, whether purchased privately or from a dealer, will continue to remain with the individual purchaser of such machine.

However, Mr. Brown said, the purchaser of a snow vehicle may now legally operate it prior to receiving his certificate of registration.

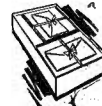

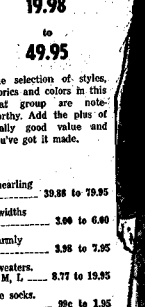

Construction of a new Children's Home for the Town of Digby was announced Tuesday by Joseph Casey, M. L. A. for the area.

Mr. Casey said the province's Department of Public Works has assembled approximately four and a half acres of land facing Weymouth Street in the Town of Digby as the site of the Children's Home.

The Home will be administered by the province's Department of Welfare.

Mr. Casey said that plans are now being completed for the Children's Home with an anticipated tender call for construction early in February, 1972.

Construction of the Home will take eight months and will provide living accommodation for forty-four children and will be staffed by thirty-one people.

The parcels of land for the Home site were assembled through the co-operation of the Mayor of Digby, Glen Smith, and a boundary survey is being carried out.

Mr. Casey added "I would like to take this opportunity to pay tribute to Mayor Glen Smith, the town council and all interested citizens for the work and effort they put into this project."

"This new facility will not only serve to meet the special needs of its inhabitants but the actual construction phase will certainly do much to alleviate the serious unemployment situation in the area," he said.

Construction of the Digby Home represents part of a chain of regional facilities established by the province at Sydney, Pictou, Dartmouth and Truro for handicapped children. Truro is the centralized facility for the province.

## Missionary Sunday

Rev. Hacen C. Parrot, Toronto, former director of the Southern Cross Radio Station, La Paz, Bolivia, was the guest speaker for the Missionary Sunday service of the South's Cove United Baptist Church on Sunday, November 21st. Rev. Charles M. Milbury, pastor, conducted the service.

Special music was presented by the Senior Choir singing, "To The Work," accompanied by Mrs. Alice Black, organist. Members of the Sunday School Department remained throughout the entire service in order to participate in this special service.

Rev. Parent in his message spoke of the challenge and benefits rendered by the Southern Cross Radio Station which was established in 1949 through the ministry of the Canadian Baptist Overseas Mission Board. The station now has a staff of over twenty-five and is under the direction of the United Baptist Union with a Bolivian director. Broadcasts are sent by both short and long wave programs which cover all of Bolivia and reaches Peru, Chile, Paraguay and Argentina.

## Notes from Bird Haven

## BITS &amp; PIECES FROM BIRD HAVEN

10' above this morning and winter is really with us, so don't forget the birds outdoors. I have given the recipe for suet pudding before, but in case you have lost it, here it is again.

Fry out scrap suet over low heat. When all fried out add peanut butter, oatmeal, corn meal, bread crumbs, sunflower seeds, also canary seeds if you have them. Mix well and pour in moulds, or if you have a coconut shell that will make a grand container which can be hung outdoors on the trees. A large piece of suet hung out will be appreciated as well.

Have just had a dear little Pine Siskin brought in with an injured wing. This is a small bird, four or five inches, dark in colour, heavily streaked with bands of yellow on wings and tail. They are usually found in flocks in the thick evergreens. He has settled in with the others very well and is eating well.

Two robins are still with me. They are eating the eucalyptus tree berries. This tree is covered with small eucalyptus berries and the only other bird I have seen eating them was a brown thrasher one New Year's Day years ago. Whether it didn't agree with him or not, I do not know, but I never saw him again. Of course he should not have been here at that time of the year.

The evening grosbeaks are here in full force. The dainty little tree sparrows have arrived at the trays as well. Had a surprise package sent to me from Freepost last week — half a dozen nylon bait bags. These have been filled with suet and hung outdoors. The birds at Bird Haven say thank you.

The little dickcissel has not been seen for the last week. Hope he has gone South instead of down a cat's throat.

Still no word from the English white pigeon. Am hoping we can get some definite word.

- (2) The price will not be changed.
- (3) After the offer expires on January 24, 1972, shareholders may not have the opportunity to receive \$13.00 per share from the Commission pursuant to the terms of its offer.
- (4) Under no circumstances will the Nova Scotia Power Commission enter into negotiations into a higher price.

It was only after careful analysis that our advisors recommended a price of \$13.00 per share. This is 28.4% above the closing market price on the date the offer was announced. This is indeed a substantial premium. To pay a larger premium would be irresponsible, and would create an additional burden on the consumers of electric power and energy within the province.

To negotiate the price or change it would, in my opinion, be wrong. As I have stated, a substantial premium has been offered.

If the Nova Scotia Power Commission does not obtain 51% of the shares prior to the expiry of the offer on January 24, 1972, it is possible that the market price of the shares will fall below \$13.00.

Nova Scotia has benefited over the years by the valuable contribution of thousands of Nova Scotia Light and Power Company's minor shareholders.

I am confident, however, that as good Nova Scotians these same shareholders will be prepared to facilitate the needs of all citizens for the efficiency and savings of one integrated electric utility by selling their shares at a fair price.

These shareholders, along with other Nova Scotians, will benefit from those efficiencies realized in almost all other Canadian provinces by the establishment of one government-owned electric utility.

Therefore, I would urge those who have not already done so, to deposit their shares with Canada Permanent Trust Company so that they will receive their \$13.00 per share without delay.

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## Comeau Plugs For Tourism

Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade tourist committee chairman Paul Comeau of Moncton said in Berwick that tourism this year represented an estimated \$32 million industry in Nova Scotia and there is every indication it will increase next year.

He said the Digby-St. John ferry - Princeps of Acadia would be making three daily crossings from summer and fall.

Changes in the force have been made with new sections being added, such as drugs. For example, there is no doubt that drugs are the cause of more criminal and crime. We find that crime has risen quite noticeably. There is no doubt that drugs and crime go together, said Cpl. Smith. The recent trouble with the police in Halifax has to do with drugs.  
When I left the province to be instructor in the Regina headquarters of the RCMP and returned to the province I noted that there has been a great change in the radio-telephone system which has come into its own, said Cpl. Smith. Now we can call Hants from our car and contact Maritime Crime Index through computerization. Records of criminals can be ascertained in a short time, whether he or she be from the Maritimes or Vancouver. Today administration is being cut down as officers are on the road. We cannot stay in our office and await a call for

assistance. Today we are on the road to prevent trouble from happening before it starts. We are no longer isolated, said Cpl. Smith. People are passing through the area and the criminals are moving fast. We got reports about stores being burglarized in various sections of the province and in some cases it was done by the same criminal.

Ferry Council President Alton MacEachen has announced awarding grants totalling \$600,450 for 26 projects in Nova Scotia.

Financing by the federal

department of manpower and immigration was awarded under the local initiatives program.

Among these projects was one providing 26 jobs and a grant of \$41,342.00 to Weymouth Falls community coun-

ty for community improve- ments.

A \$10,749 grant to the town of Digby to clear bushes and trees obstructing streets will provide another eight jobs.

### DIGBY COUNTY PROJECTS APPROVED

A total of thirty-two projects involving a federal government contribution of approximately \$761,000 were announced by the Department of Manpower and Immigration as part of the Local Initiatives Program (L.I.P.).

These projects submitted from private groups, organizations, and municipalities are expected to provide in excess of 400 jobs before they come to an end on May 31, 1972.

To date Manpower and Immigration, administrators of the L.I.P., have received some 210 projects from interested private parties and municipalities throughout Nova Scotia. Among the projects approved for funding under the L.I.P. are:

— Club Bieleheu, Church Point, Inc., Middleham River Digby County, recreational facilities. The total federal contribution for this project will be \$37,620.

— St. Vincent de Paul Recreation Comm., Lake Doucette, Digby County, recreational facilities. A total of 12 jobs will be created, with the federal government contributing a total of \$13,332.

The L.I.P. was announced by the federal government on October 14, 1971, and is designed to respond to local job creating initiatives as a means of supporting the federal government's coordinated efforts against unemployment.

Organizations and groups wishing to participate in the L.I.P. are urged to contact their local Canada Manpower Centre for information and application forms. Municipalities interested in participating in the L.I.P. must obtain application forms and information from their provincial government offices.

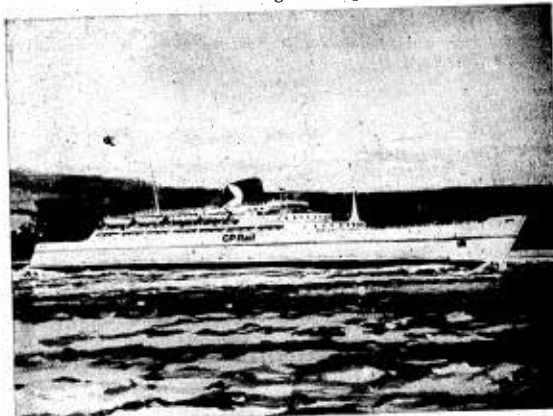

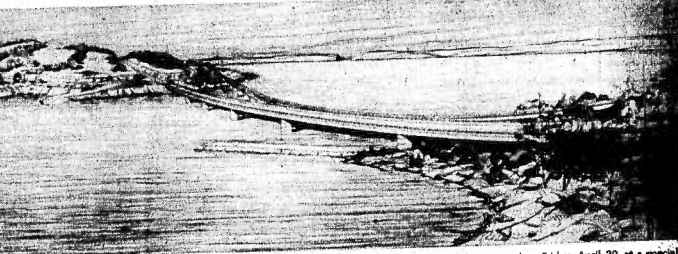

We took back over a year during which it appeared that the wheat at Port Williams might be removed from service permanently. But we were able to bring all of the responsible agencies together with results that I think were quite satisfactory to all.

We are not at all pleased with the lack of progress in the completion of Highway 101. This was to have been completed in 1972 but it is now obvious that it cannot be done.  
 There will be an improvement in the Digby Neck Islands transportation connections but we will not rest there, either. We will continue to press for permanent crossings.

There are encouraging signs that the Shipwrecked Crossing will become a reality. I acknowledge a great deal of co-operation from Acadia University and look forward to a continuation of this in the year ahead.  
 The news media has been most fair in its treatment of our organization. Without the support of press, radio and television, our job would be most difficult.  
 Finally, and probably the most important single accomplishment of the A. V. A. E. T. in 1971 was the engagement of Mr. Lloyd K. Hill as the executive manager.
