Anderson, veteran of two wars (second World War), Kenneth, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sidney L. Smith, now prominent druggist; for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale hardware merchant, and myself.

As a young treasurer I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was told to write about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". ## — ABOUT THIS AND THAT —

### A Proper Balance

Today is October 5. Today Premier Gerald Regan will be in Wolfville at the Atlantic Provinces Transportation "Crisis" Seminar. Nobody knows for sure but some are expecting an announcement today. Didn't Mr. Regan (with a little urging, maybe) make the statement on Digby's Natal Day that he would be giving an announcement about Digby on October 5. We all wait with bated breath.

The announcement is speculated to be about an industry. We should not have too many worries about over-industrializing Digby. Certainly, Digby has been devoid of any manufacturing industry while other places have had jobs provided through industrialization.

Nevertheless, a note of caution would seem wise and there should be heeding to many of the arguments brought forth in the Man and Resources Hearing in Digby. Digby is yet unspoiled and proper planning, a proper balance of industry for the sake of economy and of environment for the sake of "living" should be met. As one man put it, "There is more to life than the economic aspects of making a living." Who would deny his child bread? Yet, to misuse the good earth is to deny our children and our children's children what should be their heritage. We hope our planners will keep this in mind. Their job will not be easy but they might keep in mind "a proper balance."

### Guidelines To Planning

Writing on the subject of "A Proper Balance" reminds us that guidelines for the preparation of municipal development plans were released by the Honourable J. Fraser Mooney, Minister of Municipal Affairs. The brochure gives practical step-by-step advice on ways in which communities can do much of their planning, using their own ideas and resources. The heavy local lay input represents a fundamental exercise in community thinking and learning.

Community interest is seen by the department as an important part of planning. Municipal and provincial officials are confident that the growing general concern for the future of our living environment will help to ensure, throughout the province, a genuine local desire to participate.

The brochure details the need for planning, the current position in municipal planning, and carries a suggested format in which comprehensive planning can be carried out. It is being distributed by the Municipal Affairs Department to municipal authorities.

Looking over the guideline booklet one is convinced that Digby town and municipality hide their lights under bushels in the table showing the status of planning and development control in Nova Scotia municipalities we find both the town and municipality to be nil. Nothing appears in the Digby town and Digby municipal blocks for Planning Advisory Committee; District Planning Commission; Development Officer; Municipal Development Plan, Zoning

By-law; Subdivision Regulation, Sub-division By-law; Mobile Home By-law or Ministerial Order.

Again we say that though these blocks are left blank in the guidelines, there has been something done in planning both in town and municipality and it wouldn't be a bad idea for the planning committee to let the public and the department know just what has been done to date. There are two other towns in the nil category in the guidelines booklet. They are Oxford and Parrabro and in the municipalities Argyle, Barrington, Chester, Shelburne, Clare, St. Mary's and Yarmouth. Shelburne town has a mobile home by-law to its credit.

The booklet says the power and responsibility to plan for the future is perhaps the most important function of municipal government. Councils are elected to manage and guide the common affairs of the community; particularly the provision of public services of all kinds. But there are many decisions made by others — individuals, groups, businesses, industrialists, house builders — whose decisions also affect the development and character of the community. Although Councils are not responsible for and have no direct control over all decisions, they do have the responsibility for guiding the overall development and well being of the entire community. Unless Councils provide the necessary leadership and guidance, no community will be able to cope successfully with the many changes facing the community and the people living in it.

Hide And Seek, Fish  
Where are they now? Some  
of the most perplexing fish  
that anglers pursue are walley-  
es. You can never tell where  
they'll turn up next. And with  
increased stocking by fisher-  
ies departments the number  
of streams and lakes contain-  
ing walleyes continues to grow.  
Today more anglers than ever  
have a chance to catch this  
popular species of fish.

Since they're so unpredictable,  
fishermen for walleyes should  
appeal to the gaudy in-  
stincts of most men. Some-  
times they are found in shall-  
ow water, other times in deep  
water. They could be near shore,  
or in the middle of the lake.

But wherever you find walley-  
es, Rod Fisher, the angling  
expert at Mercury outdoors,  
advises that chances are you'll  
have good feeling. For they  
are schooling fish and will  
usually stay in one place long  
enough for fishermen to catch  
a limit.

In lakes, start searching for  
them near shore where they  
water depths quickly, leaving  
a shallow shelf running  
back to the bank. Walleyes  
will lay right along the edge  
of the shelf, waiting for a tasty  
minnow to come their way.  
Avoid muddy bottoms, weed  
beds, reeds and gravel.

In streams, fish the swift,  
fast water, especially where  
an eddy forms alongside a fast  
run. Walleyes will hang  
near minnows or other natural  
food to go by, especially in the  
eddies and rapids.

In spring, walleyes spawn  
near sand and rocks, not stay-  
ing on the mud. Later, in mid-  
summer, they are likely to be  
in water up to 50 feet deep,  
and trolling is the only way  
to locate them. When you get  
a strike, continue fishing the  
same way in the same place.  
It's sometimes possible to col-  
lect a limit in a short  
period.

Walleyes are prized as table  
fare. With a sharp, thin-  
nosed knife fillet the fish, dip  
the fillets in milk, not them in  
cream, then fry them in a  
ground skillet over a hot fire.

## Relates Life Story



Bringing over a cup of tea at the Hefley House, Smith's Cove, Niven Miller related the story of his childhood and his career to The Digby Courier.

With Mr. Miller is Mrs. Clara Grace Emerson, president of the Senator Emerson Foundation, which sponsors the religious concerts presented by Mr. Miller.

On Sunday evening, Mr. Miller presented the concert "Sing A New Song" to a full house at the Digby Baptist Church sponsored by Digby Church and Deep Brook-Smith's Cove Baptist. His selections were Open The Gates of the Temple, The Holy City, I Am The Light of Life, The Lord's Prayer, Be Still and Know That I Am God, His Father, He Dwells in The Secret Place, and as an encore he rendered Somebody Bigger Than You and I.

Mr. Miller captivated his audience with his rich baritone voice and won their hearts in the sincerity of his testimony and explanation of God's Word as he interpreted it before each rendition in song.

Niven Miller was born in Scotland in a village smaller than Digby town but one which resembled Digby in being a fishing community. There were twelve church denominations in and round about the village, all more or less rivaling with one another.

Mr. Miller's father, a fisherman, was a missionary in China and his desire was to follow his footsteps but his father, a boat builder, won out in having his son enter university to study engineering.

Niven was not happy in this situation and influenced by his mother's Christianity, he found a way to follow his desire to a Canadian tour by Mr. Miller and Mrs. Emerson.

For two years his ministry in song has been supported by the Senator Emerson Foundation but Mrs. Emerson, who has contributed in TV, one of the most rewarding countries to visit, he said, feels the financial burden is too great unless assistance comes from contributions by the public at large. The work, she remarked is so rewarding and so joyous, especially his contribution to the Asian people, that she hopes to make more people conscious of what Mr. Miller has done and the need which exists for his ministry. 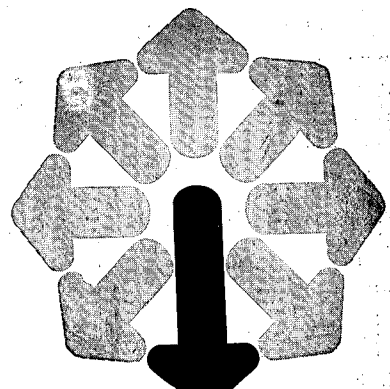

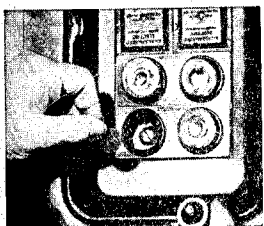

## NO FISHERIES CONSERVATION CHARGES HALIBURTON

Charles Haliburton addressed a meeting of Progressive Conservative workers in the Annapolis West end of the South Western Nova on Tuesday evening and visitors in fisherman on the wharves from Victoria Beach to Digby. Mr. Haliburton charged that there has been no provision made by the federal minister of fisheries, Jack Davis, for conservation.

He referred to the announcement made by the minister some two weeks earlier while on a whirlwind tour of South Western Nova that certain charges in the scallop fishing regulations were being made. Mr. Haliburton charged that Davis reviewed the restrictions which previously applied while he suggested some steps would be taken for future regulations.

but nothing was spelled out. He added that no provision was made for conservation and there had been no prior consultation with either industry or fishermen.

Mr. Haliburton revealed that Mr. Davis suggested the fishery be controlled on the basis of the size of the scallops taken but it is not clear to anyone whether it will be the size of the shells or meats which will be the governing factor. He felt there would be serious problems by either method. He ventured that if the size is to be 140 scallops per pound then the control is totally inefficient and scallopers would be out of business before the regulations went into effect.

## Hospital Gets New X-Ray Machine — First In Canada



The key to a \$14,000 new mobile X-ray machine was passed over on Friday morning by James Stuart of General Electric Medical Systems Ltd. to Ralph Stacey, Digby General Hospital administrator. The machine was installed on Friday and put into work immediately. In the picture, left to right, above are Dr. Spencer, head of the X-ray department, Mr. Stacey and Mr. Stuart during the short turning over the key ceremony.

The last X-ray machine in the hospital was 20 years old and just gave out, said Mr. Stacey and for the past three months they used a borrowed machine.

The new machine is battery operated and rechargeable. It need not be plugged in a wall for power. The batteries are

nickle cadmium. The mobility of the machine saves moving patients. It is bigger than the old machine, more powerful and gives clearer and better quality pictures. It is a new type of mobile machine and Digby General Hospital was the first in Canada to get this type of machine. At present there are orders for eight more delivery.

The 3 x 3 foot machine is capable of taking test exposures, in most cases faster than the patient can move. It is a saving to the hospital, its new battery system allows the machine to move on its own power without pushing, in this way being easier on the staff.

Those operating the machine under Dr. Spencer will be Richard Moore, Miss Carol Marshall and Mrs. Rita Cosman.

This is National Newspaper Week when we are given an opportunity to blow our own horn. We expect later to write about The Digby Courier so for National Newspaper Week we'll just give a few facts about community newspapers in general.

They are just what they say. They are community newspapers reflecting the lives of the people in the communities nearest to them. World-shaking events are left for the big city dailies, in most cases, while the community paper, so close to its people, serves best the villages and towns.

The community newspaper takes a deep pride in the home territory it

serves and also reflects the pride that the citizens of the communities take in their home town or village. Lack of pride, on the other hand, can be reflected as well. The community newspaper then becomes your newspaper, the paper of the community good or bad. It serves the people and in return the people serve it by co-operating in informing the newspaper of events in the community and by expressing views through the columns of the paper as Letters To The Editor. A truly community paper is an asset to that community. It can only perform its function by receiving co-operation in news and advertising.

### The Mental Health Campaign

The Digby County Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association is launching its 1972 financial campaign this week and it is appropriate that some thought be given to the work and aims of this worthy organization.

In the last few decades we have come a long way in the knowledge and treatment of mental illness. Not too many years ago, the mentally ill were hidden away, locked in jails or sentenced to a living death in isolated asylums. Even more recently, many children with emotional disturbances or learning disabilities were dismissed as "mentally retarded" and virtually abandoned to a life of deterioration.

Now we know that mental illness, like physical illness, is a disorder of the body, affected by stress. We also know that with early and proper treatment there is hope for recovery from most of the mental and emotional disorders. We know also something of the causative factors that operate to produce mental illness and emotional disorder. Already efforts are underway toward the elimination of these factors and toward the creation of conditions con-

ducive to mental health rather than illness.

In all of this, it has been the work and concern of interested people, operating through such organizations as the Canadian Mental Health Association, which has brought changes in attitudes toward mental illness and the mentally ill, which has supported the development of more effective treatment services, which has financed studies and research aimed at more clearly defining the causative factors and which has spearheaded preventive programs designed to reduce the terrible toll which mental illness exacts from everyone it touches.

It is these interested, concerned and involved people who are at present appealing for our support through the current Mental Health Association campaign. They and their organization are deserving of support, not only through financial contribution, but also through personal involvement in the work of the association. We commend the efforts of the Canadian Mental Health Association to your attention and solicit the support of our readers in this worthy cause.

### Questions To Answer

Are the fuses in your electrical distribution panel the right size? Do you use gang plugs in wall outlets? Think of what can happen when circuits are overloaded. Are extension cords placed under rugs where they are subject to damage by being walked on and the insulation being destroyed?

Is the heating equipment checked prior to the heating season? How close are the smoke pipes to combustible materials? Are they deteriorated to the point where they need replacing?

How about flammable liquids? Where do you keep unused paints and thinners, and the gasoline for the lawnmower? In far too many cases, gasoline is stored in glass or unapproved plastic containers in the basement. Did you know that gasoline properly mixed with air has the potential explosive force of dynamite, and that it can be ignited by an electric spark from a switch, furnace, motor or appliance, all found in our

homes? Would you place dynamite in your home in such a way that it could be exploded by the act of turning on an electric light?

How many of us smoke in bed, or are smoking in bed strictly against the rule in your home? Are there plenty of large, deep and non-combustible ashtrays available for those who do smoke? Do you check upholstered chairs before you retire and is the contents of ashtrays kept separate from other combustible wastes? Do you know that smoking materials caused 54 fires in Nova Scotia last year?

Are you prepared for an emergency? You plan your vacation months in advance, but do you have an emergency evacuation plan worked out for the members of your family? Have you a second means of exit from every room in the home? Does your family rehearse this plan? Are you guilty of saying, "It can't happen to me"? It can, remember fire hurts.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:  
While some people are accusing the Furdy Board of Trade for our transportation problems, others are asking the question "why are they so quiet about it?" I would like to give a brief account of what the Furdy Board of Trade has done in the past.

Approximately ten years ago when the traffic across Pettie Passage was increasing so rapidly that it was surpassing that of the Yarmouth and Digby ferries combined. The Furdy Board felt that to handle that amount of traffic with the antiquated system that was used for horse and buggy would either end in tragedy or serious problems. After many months of study and surveys it was the opinion of the Board that the only solution to the problem would be a permanent crossing. At no time did they press for any type of ferry. Two years ago while a delegation from the Furdy Board of Trade was attending an Affiliated Boards of Trade meeting, they were informed by a local government official that the paper of the community good or bad. When the delegates approached the Hon. Minister to determine how much progress had been made in regards to our problem, they were informed that he had never heard of Pettie Passage. When asked the second time he recalled negotiations between himself and a group in Grand Manan regarding a permanent crossing, and wondered if that would be the same one. He was informed that there was a vast difference between Grand Manan, New Brunswick, and Pettie Passage, Nova Scotia.

A year ago the Furdy Board of Trade was informed that they were having a makeshift barge constructed. After much discussion and reports from other areas where these types of barges were operated, a public meeting was called, with our Government representatives in attendance. At that time the Furdy Board of Trade presented a brief and went on record as protesting this type of barge, stating that it could serve to down grade our already out-dated ferry service.

The Department of Highways was pleased to develop such a list to starboard that it came within inches of sending twenty-seven of our residents to a watery grave. A public meeting was immediately called with our local M.L.A. Joe Chase, present. The public and Board of Trade was asked "if they would be patient for three weeks until necessary alterations were made. This they agreed to do. Five months have gone by and still no ferry. We have been informed unofficially that it will be at least three months yet before sea trials are completed. When a person considers that it took only one month sea trials for a makeshift barge across four hundred feet of water (with foul weather rapidly approaching)?"

We are still being serviced with a scow that was constructed by the Department of Highways years ago and has already sunk once with a load of vehicles and has drowned a flock of sheep. This is not considered safe transportation for our citizens, particularly in winter. Taking this into consideration, I am requesting the Furdy Board of Trade immediately go on record as opposing this type of service.

If you were to summarize this information received from Government officials it would read like this: If this ferry works in Grand Passage it will go in service at Pettie Passage. If it worked at Pettie Passage we will build a larger ferry. Then they say this will only be temporary until we build a permanent crossing. It doesn't make

## much sense to me, how about you?

Two years ago the residents of the Islands were left with no doctor. This was a serious situation compelling many of our senior citizens to sell their homes and move to areas where they could be assured medical service after community groups and Government officials were unsuccessful in obtaining a doctor. The Furdy Board of Trade was asked if they would accept the responsibility. Within a month a doctor was on the island. It was but a short time when the doctor informed the Board that he was deprived of privileges in the Digby General Hospital because the citizens of the Islands could not properly be serviced without proper equipment. A year ago appearing was called in which the Minister of Health and Welfare, Mr. McNutt, was present. It was brought to his attention of the Hon. Minister that without proper medical equipment, it would be impossible to keep a doctor on the island. The citizens of the island were assured at this meeting that equipment would immediately be made available. As of this date no equipment has arrived. Two months ago the doctor, being fed up with promises, decided to leave, so we are now left again with no doctor to service the medical needs of our residents.

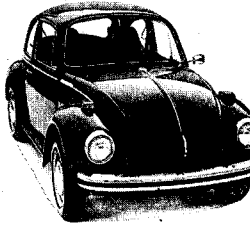

## Looking Into Adult Educational Needs

Identifying the educational needs of adults and then finding ways of meeting these needs is the primary concern of John H. Doucet, regional representative of the Continuing Education Program for Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queens Counties.

Commenting on plans for the next season's activities, Mr. Doucet said, "In order to fill this function, I need to be aware of the educational requirements of adults and to help them become aware of what kinds of learning experiences are available to them."

To do this, I welcome the opportunity to meet with such organizations as community councils, boards of trade, school organizations, labour unions and others.

As field workers for Continuing Education, much of the Regional Representative's time is spent in visiting various parts of their territory.

Mr. Doucet is one of six Regional Representatives, covering Nova Scotia. Other offices are located in Halifax, Bridgetown, Truro, Sydney and Antigonish.

An important aspect of the regional representative's job is consulting with school boards, who make a great many courses available to adult learners. Public school adult education courses are operated by local school boards, with the Department of Education assisting with grants for administration and instructional costs.

"People rarely know the wide range of opportunities available to them through this arrangement between the department of education and school boards," Mr. Doucet said, "in addition to academic classes, there are opportunities for correspondence study and retraining activities in fine arts and handicrafts."

Another service is planning and conducting learning opportunities to develop the skills required for group and individual approaches to community development. Courses

are available in discussion methods, effective meetings, public speaking, problem solving and decision making and related topics. On the nature of their jobs, they are out of their offices a good deal, people requiring this kind of service should make an appointment through the Continuing Education office.

He said the DRE programs are designed to bring improvements to living standards in a region over considerable length of time and not necessarily with instant result.

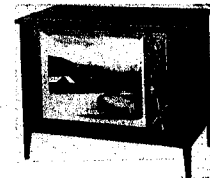

## 93 Year Old Journal

Paul Cyr, North Branch, brought to The Digby Courier a copy of the Maritime Journal, April 1, 1879. The Journal is one of the most complete, mining, finance and insurance and contains interesting advertising and items on these subjects.

In the editorial section it is noted that Woodside across the harbour from Halifax was to be a sugar refinery. A bill had been passed four years prior which would exempt the refinery from taxation for 21 years. They advocated two major refineries in Halifax. Another item in the editorial decried the abolition of the city ordinance making the weighing of flour and meal obligatory. This, it said, would throw some men out of employment and would result in loss by fraud and negligence. A property owner had advertised a free site for a knitting factory and the Journal supported this, saying that there was a large future in Nova Scotia for this type of business. Their editorial said that Nova Scotia owned only six wooden mills and no knitting factory, yet it grew so much wool for the population at Ontario.

Evidently, invitations had been extended to American manufacturers to establish branch works in Nova Scotia, but there had been shown no eagerness to accept the invitation.

Another editorial advocated converting wool into clothing, hardwood and pine into the

## Preservation ... Or Desecration

An army of highway workers with mechanized equipment, slowly and deliberately moved into battle along the road shoulder of one of Nova Scotia's previously unpaved areas of natural wonders.

Half stunned, I watched the glistering spray descend upon green foliage and wild flowers, and pondered over the wisdom of man. I had seen the seared remains of this modern massacre on other highways, but had not witnessed the "killing" before.

In a short time, all of nature's glorious display in the path of the deadly chemical, would be abraded, and the despoiling greens and pastels pinks and purples, which year after year had brought renewal to the rural landscape with their fragrance and beauty, would no longer gladden the passer-by.

Instead, a silent wasteland would be marked by the crisp, skeleton skeletal standing in the scowled earth.

Wildlife would no longer find nourishment in the swath of desecration, and the

jewelled melody of birds would not be heard.

None would argue that highway safety be sacrificed for roadside beauty or that view-obstructing vegetation should not be controlled. The method of control, however, is becoming one of increasing concern of those who would preserve and protect our world of nature from destructive forces.

In defiance of the chemical method, government departments have, from time to time, pointed out that the cost of mechanical or manual cutting would far exceed the modest \$150,000 expended for spraying.

While appreciating this necessary concern, there are many who would question the prudence of the continued use of a method which disfigures and robs our province of much of its unique allurements.

And unpleasantness is not the only adverse effect. These near spray zones are often weakened or diseased. The lethal sprays are absorbed by the soil and water, and find their way into plants and the flesh of plant-eating animals, and some are so insidious

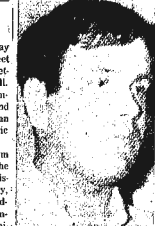
## WINDS UP CAMPAIGN

## TRUDEAU OUTLINES THREE ATLANTIC FRONTIERS

Development of the resources beneath the ocean floor will mean the start of a new age for the Atlantic Provinces, Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau told an overflow crowd of 1,200 people in Yarmouth Friday night.

Mr. Trudeau said that the long Atlantic coast with its vast continental shelf has become an important frontier to the future.

The means to exploit and develop the territorial sea are now within our reach because technology has provided us with the competence to work and live in alien environments such as the hostile depths of the sea.

At the rate that scientific knowledge is progressing, the development of the land under the sea will not be long in coming, Mr. Trudeau said. It is predicted, he went on, that in 80 years' time, 95 per cent of all the scientific knowledge in the world will be knowledge not discovered now.

This rapid advance in technology constitutes another frontier to the future, he said. It means the Federal Government must invest huge sums in education. In the last four years, his Government

has had to increase by 100 per cent the amount of post-secondary education. This figure was \$876 million.

The prime minister pointed out that education cannot be confined to technological study. Equally important is the knowledge which enables us to better understand ourselves because we have learned that material benefits alone won't make us a contented nation.

Social development was the third frontier outlined by Mr. Trudeau. He warned that all three must develop together so that balance is maintained, saying that this was the equilibrium he had been talking about in this campaign. "All

of these frontiers provide a challenge of immense opportunity and a magnificent future for the Atlantic Provinces."

The prime minister was introduced by Fulton J. Logan, Liberal candidate for South Western Nova. He praised Mr. Trudeau's determination "to make government work closely with people as well as for the people."

Mr. Logan said that Mr. Trudeau had sought to understand the particular problems of each region of our country and of all ethnic and cultural groups that comprise it.

To meet these problems, Prime Minister Trudeau has set in motion a number of reforms and his Government (Please turn to page 2)

## Opening Date For Lobster Season Changed

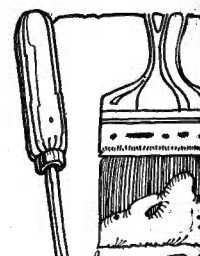

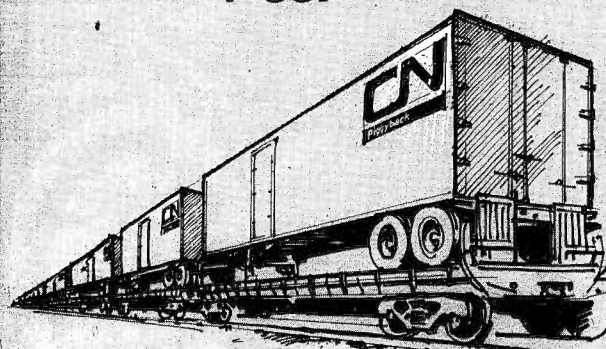

## Clam Beds Opened

Changes in hydrographic conditions in the Bay of Fundy have decreased the abundance of the cussative organism that resulted in a closure of shellfish areas earlier this year Fisheries Minister Donald Conneau has announced.

Mr. Conneau said the changes, confirmed by scientists at the Bedford Institute of Oceanography, have reduced toxicity levels to a point where clams taken from these areas are now safe for human consumption.

The fisheries minister said he had been advised by the federal Department of Environment that areas declared safe were opened last month.

Mr. Conneau stated that the

Pandy shore of Nova Scotia from Brier Island to Point Prim and from Victoria Beach to Cape Split remain closed until tests indicate safe toxicity levels. At the present time, few clams are to be found in these areas, he said.

The fisheries minister pointed out that federal fisheries personnel maintain a regular monitoring service on shellfish toxicity levels in the Bay of Fundy on a year-round basis and now that areas have been declared open there is no need for hesitation on the part of the public to eat shellfish harvested from these beds.

## Repairs To Breakwater

Phase II of repairs to the breakwater at Saint-Nicolas, N. S., will consist of pressure grouting or sealing under an \$81,222 contract awarded to Intrusion-Prepakt Ltd. of Thornhill, Ont. Public Works Minister J. E. Dube announced recently.

The Thornhill contractor submitted the lower of two tenders. The other bid was \$383,438. Saint-Nicolas is about 30 miles south east of Digby on the southwestern shore of Nova Scotia.

It was here that one of the first structures incorporating the principle of a perforated breakwater-shelf was built by the Department of Public Works in 1964. The structure consists of concrete cribs

with hollow chambers separated from the exposure of the sea by perforated walls.

Due to damage in the reinforced concrete and to normal wear over the years, certain repairs and improvements are being undertaken.

In the recently completed first phase of the project steel sheet piling was driven around the wharf. Under the present contract with an expected completion date of January, work under the concrete crib will be pressure grouted and sealed to provide a firm foundation for the existing breakwater.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Halifax office of the federal Department of Public Works. Project manager is J. D. Balg.

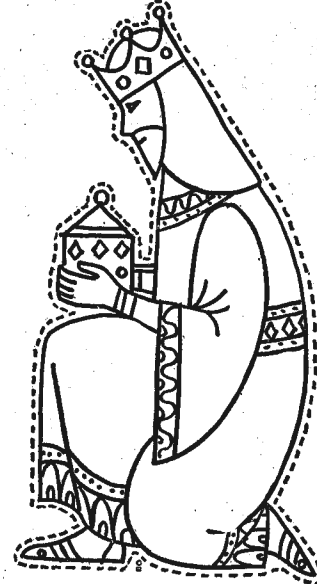

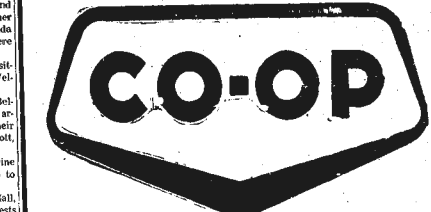

## — ABOUT THIS AND THAT —

### Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day comes on Saturday, November 11. It is a time to remember those who lost their lives so that others might live better. It is a day when we remember those who served their country in either or both world wars. The blood-red poppy, symbol of war, makes us remember those who lost their lives and also those veterans still living but who are maimed and aged. It is these veterans who construct the poppies and wreaths which help the ongoing work of the Legion. The Legion through the poppy fund, cares for the needy veteran and his family,

supplies emergency food, shelter and medicine. They also provide bursaries for education in some cases.

The Legion looks after its own financially through the poppy fund and in providing social life for its members. They do not neglect the youth and other areas of society. The Digby Legion, for instance, makes sports for children one of its projects.

Wear a poppy this week in recognition of the sacrifices made and the excellent performance of those who remain to carry on, some with incapacitated functioning.

### Community Planning For Everyone

Community planning has been on the lips of many in Digby town and municipality for some time but little action has been taken except to get rid of a few barges from beaches, tidy up a few rubbish piles and, of course, the planning of the sewer system in Digby. We were pleased to hear the subject brought up at the Digby Municipal Council on Tuesday when they considered garbage collection throughout the municipality, tidying up by force of unsightly premises, other residential, commercial, industrial and recreational living.

Community planning simply means to remedy problems of today and planning to avoid problems of the future. The leadership and guidance for community planning comes from town or municipal councils or special planning boards. The responsibility, however, does not end there. Community planning is for the future welfare of all the citizens so it is, therefore, the responsibility of all the citizens to take an interest in the total planning project both for themselves and for future generations.

We were fortunate at the Atlantic Community Newspaper Association meeting held in Halifax on Saturday to have a speaker from Harbourside Ltd. to address the gathering on the subject "How

Valuable is History." In the course of his remarks he mentioned things in Halifax which should have been retained in their original form and those which are still intact and which they anticipate keeping as they are. In other words, the word modernization should not be the only word in the community planning and leadership vocabulary. History also plays a part. Some areas within Digby County are doing just that. There are others which might take more pride in historical value.

The trend today, particularly with young people, is a yen toward the old and simple rather than sophisticated new. This year toward the yesterday fashions and the old in general can be capitalized upon by merchants who have the happy or unhappy lot (as they wish to view it) of operating in aged buildings. These can be used to create an atmosphere and result in a benefit. For instance, if the hill goes modern the town might create its own atmosphere to attract customers.

Yes, community planning is for everyone under the leadership of councils or special committees and includes besides modernization and zoning of areas some preservation of the past. It is not too early to start community planning and set out some ideas.

### Hodge Podge

— Hon. Allan E. Sullivan, Minister of Education, granted it, so the school and teachers take a holiday on Monday. So do some others. Remembrance Day really is not a holiday in the sense of the world as we know it. It is a day to meditate and remember those who fought and died so that we might have the privilege of working in a free society.

— How it is reasoned. If you ordinarily work on Saturday, O.K., then if Saturday is a holiday you have your share of holiday and that is it. But, if you ordinarily do not work on Saturday you just got to get that holiday you lost because you don't work on Saturday anyway. So we add another holiday to the holiday. Ye gods. Me thinks when Christmas falls on Saturday some year and Boxing Day on Sunday we'll have to have Monday and Tuesday declared holidays so that those who ordinarily do not work on Saturday nor ordinarily do not work on Sunday won't have to lose

their holidays. So then we have four holidays in a row. And what about Easter. It's always on Sunday so we just have to have a holiday. Some declare Easter Monday. One of these days we'll be counting the days we work instead of counting our holidays.

— Where's the white line in front of service stations. There are yellow lines marking the centre of the road but in front of service stations there rarely is marked how far right the vehicle goes or the right of the pedestrian. Cars travelling past the service station yard too far right often end up in a ditch as they exit off the service station yard pavement. So we've been told. We'll check it out, too.

— Visitors from Springfield last week were quite taken with Digby's downtown shopping area. We sometimes don't appreciate our own worth and in this connection it is nice to see ourselves as others see us.

## Notes from Bird Haven

### THE BIRTHDAY PARTY

We are having a birthday party this week. Junkie has been with me for eleven years and has just had his been a little year old as he was in full bloom at the time. He has been very happy, singing a song and playing policeman when he thought some new-comer was being too cocky.

A knock at the door the other day brought an angel-faced little boy. He handed me a box nearly as big as himself and asked me if I would please take care of the dear little ball of fluff huddled in one corner. It turned out to be a Magnolia Warbler. Unfortunately, it had been badly injured and lived but a short time.

Another casualty was brought in by three very young men who were most interested in their patient and called several times to inquire about his condition. This was a Bay-breasted Nuthatch which undoubtedly had broken his neck against a picture window. These large windows are a hazard to birds especially when they are opposite as the birds think they can fly right through. Many hitting these windows are only stunned and in a short time are able to resume their flight. Others are not so fortunate and die where they fell or are picked up by wandering cats.

I don't know why I go wandering around the country looking for birds when I have so many in my own yard. Yesterday a friend and I went to an old orchard and hoping perhaps to find one uncommon bird and all we found were a great number of Myrtle Warblers. Coming home between four and seven o'clock I had counted seventeen species, one of them being a beautiful female Scarlet Tanager.

The only way I can account for this is that they find all kinds of food here. Over the years I have planted trees and shrubs that would attract them.

The large evergreens make good feeding fields, the oaks' acorns for the Bluejays. Among the shrubs and trees are Mulberry, Black Thorn, Hawthorn, Bush Honey-suckle, Bitter Sweet and Deadly Nightshade (a vine with bright red and green berries, good for birds but not humans.)

I have left tangles of Barberry and Wild Roses and a good supply of weeds for the seed eaters. A good old brush pile left through the winter makes a good hide-out on a cold night for a stray bird that should happen to be around.

Had a nice visit from a Birder from Ohio last week. The visit was all too short as she had to catch the boat. She is connected with the Audubon society and, does a bird count every month, so she is able to inform Birders where to look for certain birds.

Watched a mother Hummingbird feeding its baby (which by the way was as big as herself) from my nestrium patch the other day. They should be well on their way to South America by this time. How those were things fly so far is a mystery.

No Orioles have showed up in the yard so far. Hope they have left for warmer climes. So long for this time.

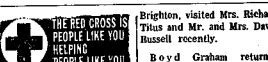

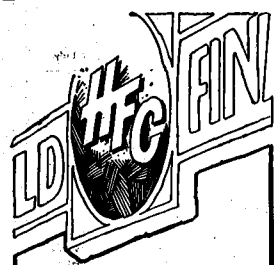

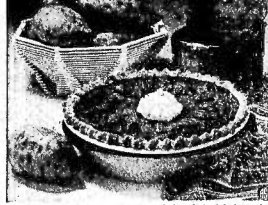

## Make Native American Pie With Luscious Yams



Southern cooks are justly famed for their fabulous desserts. Perhaps the most original is Yam Pecan Pie, moist and mellow, with the crunch of pecans for contrast. A native treasure among American desserts, this pie is easy to make, even for a beginner, as simple as making jams. Now is the time to try your hand with this great dessert. Luscious, sugary-meat, golden yams from North Carolina are in peak supply at market. Make it once, and you'll make it again. It's irresistible.

To choose good quality yams, look for those that are clean, smooth, well-shaped, firm, with copper-colored skin. Do not refrigerate except after cooking as cold is harmful to this potato.

**Yam Pecan Pie**  
1 cup mashed cooked fresh yams (3 yams) 1/2 cup dark corn syrup  
1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened 1 cup pecans  
5/8 cup packed dark brown sugar 1 unbleached 9-inch pastry shell

To prepare yams, bake in 350°F. oven 40 minutes or cook in boiling water to cover for 30 minutes, until soft. Cook, peel, and mash until smooth. Set aside. Cream butter with brown sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time, blend in corn syrup, vanilla and mashed yams. Stir in pecans and form into unbaked pastry shell. Bake in 400°F. oven for 10 minutes. Fill with yam mixture and bake 30 minutes longer, until filling is set and pastry browned. Cool. Garnish with additional pecans and serve with whipped cream or ice cream. Makes 8 servings.

## News Of 1929

Mrs. Jeffrey White, Light-house Road, brought The Digby Courier a copy of The Digby Weekly Courier of March 8, 1929, just over 44 years ago, volume fifty-five, number thirty-one.

Subscriptions were \$2.00 a year and four cents a single copy. A special for \$1.00 per year was on. Robert Mills was editor.

Headlines of the 1929 edition were "An Appeal Court Sets the Price Valuation at \$73,500. W. S. Troop entered an appeal against the verdict of the Appeal Court. William Oliver and Mr. Troop applied on the grounds that the real property is valued only one seventh of its actual cost and the personal property at only one third of its value."

Another item reported the town had received a cheque of \$12,452.50 proceeds of the sale of Town Bonds to cover the extension of the water service from the storage dam to Lily Lake. T.E.O. Lunch was mayor.

Much prize was displayed for the Digby Ravens Hockey team which had won its way to the finals. The value of the publicity which the Ravens brought to town was not over-looked.

Y. This man has unlimited talents. He not only teaches handicapped and retarded children, but he also teaches teachers to work with these children. Fran is giving his time and talents freely this summer to assist in any way possible, to help the children of the Children's Home of Digby. He works individually with the children and also group therapy. Fran also plays the piano and back in Buffalo he plays the organ and is a choir leader.

Now we also have a young man of the group, a premed student, of the University of Buffalo, called Mike. Although Mike has not had previous training with this type of child, we find him to be a very fine young man, who is endowed with unlimited patience and uses the therapy of T. L. C.

Loretta is another member. If you have not met this young lady you perhaps have seen her on the highways of Bear River, near the Hullman camp, strolling about picking wild flowers, and admiring the sunset and beauty of the countryside. This young lady is a music therapist, from Utica, N. Y., who works with emotionally disturbed children. Loretta is

spending her days at the Children's Home of Digby, and not only is she working with our kiddies but, she has volunteered to strip and rebind our piano. Loretta has become so attached to our area that of late I understand she would stay in Nova Scotia if there was an opening in the schools for a music therapist.

We are also more than fortunate to have in our midst a young man whom we all know as Lee. Lee has worked and studied for eleven years in Receptive Language and Perceptive Skill Development, with severely retarded, emotional care, children. He works with the Association for Retarded, in Buffalo, N. Y. It is most interesting and very rewarding, to sit in on a morning session when Lee

is working with the children on an individual basis in our class room. Our children are learning and so are we.

During the past few weeks many have come and gone, each in their own way leaving fond memories of an established friendship. Hulthman camp at Barnes Lake, Bear River, is the temporary home for all these people. A haven in the beautiful area of the countryside of Bear River, a lake, gorgeous sunset views and above all, peace and quiet. Jim and Gail are the host and hostess at camp. They have a two year old son called Jim. Jim is a young man of many talents. He paints, writes poetry and sings and plays the guitar and sings. At present Jim is extremely busy doing a series

of children's books which he hopes to have published in the fall. Apart from this he finds time for the occasional visit to the Children's Home when he entertains them with music and song. Gail has a full time job of being wife and mother but like all others she too often comes to the Home and assists in any way she can. It is quite apparent from the response the re-

es from the kiddies that she does an excellent job.

Next year this group plan to return to Hullman, with extended facilities, they then are planning on working with our children at the camp.

Our sincere thanks goes out today to a wonderful group of people who are so willing to give of themselves to help the less fortunate.

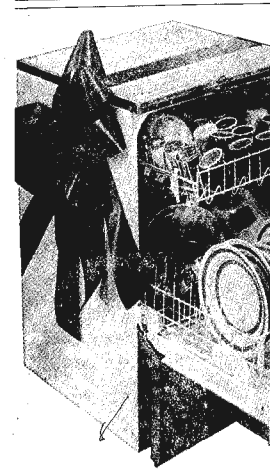

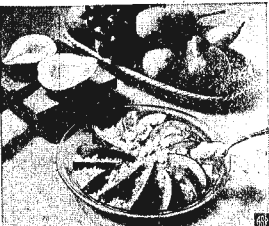

## Fresh Pear Kuchen Warms The Winter Table



Slices of juicy ripe pears topped with spiced, buttery crumbs make Fresh Pear Kuchen a grand finale to any meal. Serve it slightly warm with whipped cream or with a wedge of pungent cheese such as Roquefort or Bleu.

Pears reach their peak of goodness after they are picked. To ripen pears at home, place in a paper or foil bag with a damp sponge or wad of cotton to supply humidity. Hold at room temperature until pears are fully ripened. If a firm bag is used, it should have some holes.

Take advantage of the good supplies of winter pears in the market now. They're ideal for easy salads, for preserves, baking or freezing. Only 100 calories in a good size pear 2 inches long by 2 1/2 inches in diameter, 182 grams, which is welcome news to the diet conscious.

## Fresh Pear Kuchen

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon plus 1/2 cup sugar, divided  
1/2 cup milk  
Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and 1 tablespoon sugar. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or two knives until mixture resembles coarse meal. Stir in milk. Spread dough in the bottom of a buttered 9-inch pie plate. Arrange sliced pears on top of dough. Combine spices, remaining 1/2 cup sugar and lemon juice and mix with butter or margarine to form crumbly crumbs. Sprinkle over pears. Bake in 375°F. oven 30 to 35 minutes or until pears are tender and a custard center is visible. Cut into wedges. Serve warm, cut into pie shaped wedges, with whipped cream if desired.

Makes 6 servings.

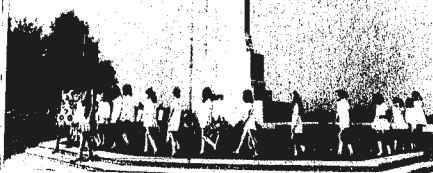

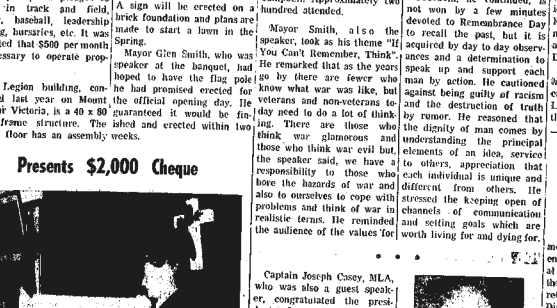

#### No Honor, No Respect?

We stood at the Cenotaph in Digby on Saturday with very few others except those connected with the parade of veterans. Each year the number who attend this Remembrance Day service gets smaller and noticeably so this year, so noticeable that persons from another town who visited remarked on so few present.

Immediately we began to make excuses. Many went to the Remembrance Day service on the preceding Sunday. After all, too, the day was a bit cold. But our visitors would not pass those as legitimate excuses. Those who gave their lives for their country had to endure more than the cold and breeze of that half hour or less on Saturday in remembrance at the Cenotaph. And how true they were and how real the service was to them. It was plain to be seen they remembered. Yes, they remembered even though it was thirty years ago since the Second World War ended and more than 50 years since the First World War ended. Their explanation was that there is not left any honor and respect.

While wars have been going on in other countries and the armed forces are kept up in Canada, still our children and youth, young men and maidens of today have not been brought up to the ravages and heartbreaks of war. In many cases, being in the armed forces is just dad's "job" to young people, for they know little of active service. Those who remember back to the First World War are not so young any more and even many of those who remember only the

Second World War are now grandfathers and grandmothers. Neither their children nor grandchildren can really comprehend the horrors of war as the older people knew them. Life for this generation has been good. Never had it been so good.

And so one reason for there being so few out to Remembrance Day service on Saturday could be that the older people are growing still older and not in such robust health for November outdoor services. Many who witnessed the anxieties of war have passed on and the younger of the war cannot be expected to "remember" what they have not experienced. Honor and respect for the war dead? Yes, even the younger people have it to some degree but the deepest feeling is absent because the experience has been absent.

Another reason for so few out to the service could be that we have made "Armistice Day" a holiday instead of a remembrance day. And, what are you likely to do or where are you likely to go on a holiday? Probably not to the Cenotaph.

We extend compliments to the various branches of the Canadian Legion who do a magnificent job in preparing a suitable service in recognition of Remembrance Day and congratulate the Digby Legion on their fine new building and their outgoing program. Honor and respect are paid to the war dead and honor and respect are paid to those like the Legion members who continue those ideals for which the heroes died.

#### Look For Courteous Driver

Digby has decided to recognize Safe Driving Week in this manner, according to a motion at the last Town Council meeting and

the mayor and police will be looking for a safe driver. Courtesy involves many aspects of safe driving. They can add up the points to make their selection with consideration of driving habits throughout the year. We commend the Council for entering the campaign to make Digby a safer place in which to drive and by a safer place in which to drive and consequently Nova Scotia a safer place to drive. We shall anxiously await the decision of mayor and police. The award winner can justly be proud to be chosen, first place in this important effort of life saving and preventing injury.

Recent statistics have revealed that there are fewer accidents during Safe Driving Week than at any other time during the year. "If the public would consistently drive as well as is reported during the Safe Driving Week," says Mr. Delbridge, "the accident rate in Nova Scotia for the year would be appreciably lower."

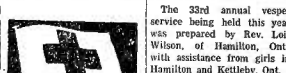

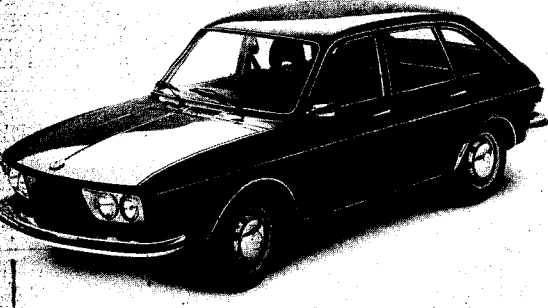

## Choral Group Bright Singing Future

David Keith, minister of the United Baptist Church, sees a bright singing future for the newly organized group, the "Hera and Hums".

The group, organized by Mr. Keith, is comprised of 11 High School students from Westport, Prescop and Tiverton who attend Island Consolidated School at Freepoint, N. S., where they met each Wednesday afternoon to rehearse and discuss plans for future presentations.

There are about ten or twelve members in the group whose voices range from alto to soprano, but Mr. Keith said he hopes to expand their singing ability to include other parts of harmony as well as solo roles.

Mr. Keith related, "These young people have great talent. At first they seemed shy and reluctant to try singing new songs or to attempt new arrangements, but now they are very keen and anxious to go on. I hope to assist them in developing their potential. I am real pleased to see them so enthusiastic; it's a real pleasure to work with them."

When asked if he'd had any special training in the field of singing, he replied, "No, but I've been working on the fringe of Gospel music for about six years and I have accompanied several groups with my guitar."

When questioned about the type of singing the group would do, Mr. Keith said, "We are hoping to take some new and some old Traditional Gospel songs and develop our own particular style of singing. We are planning to listen to other groups, pick out the best in the way of arrangements and, after them to suit our own style, and perhaps add different instruments to create a new sound. At present our only musical accompaniment is provided by my guitar and Lou Outhouse of Tiverton, the only other male member of the group, who plays guitar, who we would like to have a pianist, one who could be available to accompany the group on personal appearances or on tour if the opportunity presented itself."

The group has made one personal appearance. They were guest singers at a recent R.O.C. service held in the United Baptist Church at Westport.

When asked if he had taped any of the groups' singing, Mr. Keith replied, "No, not yet. I am waiting until we have a greater repertoire, until we have arranged more numbers. Then we'll record perhaps six numbers so that we can hear ourselves, correct our mistakes or make any other necessary changes."

Mr. Keith feels the group need not be confined to the island's churches. Their performances should be good enough by the latter part of Spring '73 to present a concert in areas outside their own. The speaker said he had contacts with churches in the Halifax and Saint John N. B. areas and he felt they would be welcome there. He further added, "We will do eight or twenty numbers, then choose fifteen or sixteen - those we feel are our best, then present a concert. We are working out solo parts for the girls and a bit of bass harmony for Lou who is also a soloist. Yes, with their singing versatility, I think they will be capable of presenting an inspiring, enjoyable complete concert. I also hope to take our own P. A. system set-up with us when we do the concert."

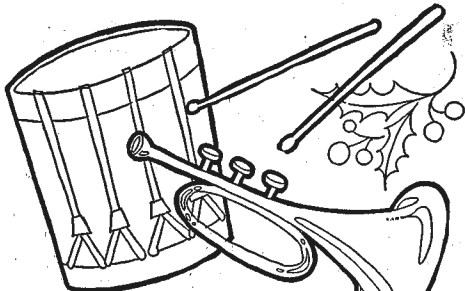

## Notice To Motorists

(Owners Or Drivers) WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS DIGBY, N. S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic, and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, I am of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I do declare:

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 100 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, I make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated thereon and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 137 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Meters and dated the 30th day of November, 1963, and amendments thereto:

(a) No owner or driver or persons having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the vehicle on any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.

(c) The provisions of Clauses (a) and (b) hereto shall not apply to:

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(6) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(7) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time after referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any person who is liable to a penalty provided by Section 286 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations.

5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December, 1972 until the 31st of March, A. D., 1973.

### Youth Give Encouragement

"Try, try, try again, you'll succeed at last." The Digby County Exhibition had spent many years at trying to make a "come-back" after a very long year, but the going was slow and discouraging. The experienced workers displayed marvellous determination and amid all appointments in their plea for more hands to help carry the load, plodded on with hopes of a break-through some day. The result of their labors and that of new blood was seen in this year's exhibition program and by the reports at the recent annual meeting. Our congratulations go to Lesley Warner, who has been appointed president for the fourth year, and his colleagues in the organization. A steady improvement has been noticed each year of late and hopes are high that the Digby County Exhibition is really on its way up to take an equal place with some of the best exhibitions in the province.

While we look the situation over and admire all that has been done by the old hands and the middle age workers, we are convinced that the one most encouraging feature of the Digby County Exhibition Association is the participation of youth in the exhibition planning. These young men do not sit back in utter silence, but take their place in planning the exhibition's future. What is most gratifying is the fact that these young men are often asked for advice and their response shows sound reasoning. Furthermore, the youth of the Digby County Exhibition Association not only offer suggestions, but they are the kind who roll up their sleeves and go to work with a smile. Such response from the young people must be encouraging to the officers. We hope it continues and a bright future for the exhibition can be forecast.

### Nearly 65 Or Over?

If you answer the above question in the affirmative, then you should write to the Canadian Red Cross Society for a booklet just released entitled "Financial Facts For Senior Citizens" (resident in Nova Scotia). Just address the letter to Services For Seniors Committee, Nova Scotia Division Canadian Red Cross, 1940 Gillespie St., Halifax. The book was produced with the fact in mind that some retired persons over 65 have little knowledge of the financial assistance available to them and how to manage their affairs to get maximum benefits and to pay out the least in income tax. Addresses are found in the booklet where the "over 65" can write for information on any phase of the OAS, the G.I.S., Canada Pension and other questions which might confront the retired.

Retirement is not always the perfect answer for the "65 or over". The Joint Committee of the Senate and the House of Commons on Old Age Security, according to the booklet says "The Committee believes that increasing emphasis should be placed on efforts to remove from people's minds the idea that there is any set or accepted age for retirement. Each individual in the nation's population should be encouraged to continue as long as possible in gainful employment."

### Beware Of Dogs

An old example used to distinguish a news story from one which wasn't news was this — If a dog bites a man, that is not news, but if a man bites a dog, that is news. Either could become news if it occurs today, for there happens to be cases of rabies in the province.

### Violence

The argument over whether in movies and the media promotes violence — or merely reflects it — is futile.

Violence is a human condition as predictable as life, death, and taxes. The trick is not to cultivate ground where violence flourishes.

A society which teaches its young to aggressively "kill" the competition shouldn't squawk too loudly about where it finds violence. People who think this is a dog eat dog world where people must be pitted against each other instead of being valued for their own worth — promote violence.

Violence is taught, not only by movies or TV, but by parents too wrapped up in business or personal worries to find time for concern, tenderness and caring. It is taught by those who can't show love; it is taught by people who

inced. Beware of all dogs at all times.

Just a word of advice to dog owners and cats: vaccination against rabies for warm-blooded animals and even birds is a protection. A word of caution, too, keep dogs at home where they can be tied and watched for signs of rabies.

And all these people are helplessly entangled in a system of violence to their own personalities which tells them to deliver or die. They stand to lose their income, house, car, prestige, their very reason for living.

Violence flows from a way of living which no longer finds dignity in people, but through acquisition and possessions — making slaves of us all.

There are no Pollyanna solutions. It would be nice to begin by repairing relations between English and French Canadians on a large scale — or between labor and management.

But people must begin in their own families — giving them the gift of time, care and love.

Bits & Pieces from Bird Haven

Hurrah, the winter birds are back with us — Evenings and Pine Gnatcatchers, Hairy and Downy Woodpeckers, Nuthatches, nine White Throated Sparrows and one Song Sparrow.

I now have five Baltimore Orioles in a large cage for the winter. They will be released in the spring. There is still one beautiful male outside. He visited the shelter and ate suet and grapes, but so far he hasn't ventured in the cage. He must be caught, as they can't possibly live through the winter.

There have been so many that have stayed in Massachusetts that the Audubon Society have caught them and flown them south. Why have they stayed here so late?

A few Robins are still feeding around. Does it mean a mild winter, or are they retarded?

Now is the time to fix chunks of suet on the tree branches. A good container for scratch grain is made from a plastic vinegar jug. Just cut a piece about five inches square about two inches from the bottom and hang it on a limb. The small bird can feed from this and it is not large enough for pigeons if you are troubled with them.

My dear little Hermit Thrush died since last writing. He had been singing almost up to the last few days and just snuggled down in the moss and went to Bird Haven.

I now have ten wrens in my kitchen cage. One I feel very sure is a rare one for Nova Scotia — a seaside sparrow.

Several Pine Grosbeaks have been brought in by thoughtful children, mostly snatched, but released after a few hours. Thanks children for saving them from cats.

noted that most exhibitors were from Annapolis County and without them there could be no Digby County Exhibition.

Mr. Harris reported that advantage had been taken of the L.I.P. program to improve the exhibition grounds and buildings. For capital expenditures and repairs an amount of \$4,000 was spent in the year.

A vote of thanks was moved to the Digby County Exhibition Society president, officers and workers.

The financial statement of the Federation showed receipts for the year of \$308.94. This included membership fees of \$50 for five members at \$10 a membership. Expenses were \$221.04 in 1972, leaving a balance of \$87.90.

Mr. Boudreau and sons again presented the Digby County Federation of Agriculture with a cheque of \$50.00 for the provincial federation on assessment is \$855 for assessments in arrears and 1972 assessments.

Mr. Boudreau, in his report for the Clave Shipping Club, compared reports from 1970

and 1971. On the commercial farms there had been raised 7,162 hogs in 1971 with a revenue of \$319,283. In 1970 these figures had been 5,282 and \$202,949. For the first nine months of 1972, the hogs numbered 5,148 with revenue \$303,017. There were a total of 5,686 pigs in both commercial and non-commercial farms in 1970; 7,541 in 1972 with values of \$268,024 in 1970 and \$333,740 in 1972. The rise in price for hogs boosted the revenue for the nine months passed in 1972.

particular plant which had been expected to be announced on October 5. Mr. Casey said that before the federal or provincial government spends the money they want to make sure they are on solid ground. (Further announcements from the office of Premier Gerald A. Regan are found in this issue.) The Pander Corporation of Vienna, Austria which proposed to erect the plant would employ some 400 people. Property on Digby Road, it is understood, has been purchased to accommodate the plant. The plant will take high of any kind, grind them up and make them into a fine powder. It might be called spines and subjects them to great pressure. A synthetic is added and eventually the product emerges at high speed and is saved off to be made into siding. Other types of products are also manufactured for the building trade.

Another highlight of the program on Saturday was an address by G. B. Lawson, member of the Atlantic Provinces Transportation Council and executive of the K.C. Irving companies in New Brunswick. His subject was transportation and said that the Atlantic area need a transportation system of coasts that can be lived with or we take the unpopularity of the home for developing the region. Control Containers  
Flammable Liquids

Regulations controlling types of containers for transportation and storage of flammable liquids and setting standards for portable fire extinguishers have been announced by the Nova Scotia Fire Marshal's Office.

Fire Marshal Robert Kerr said that a government regulation has been passed to control the type of container permissible for the transportation and storage of flammable liquids and associated petroleum products which has been found to be the cause of an increasing number of unnecessary fires, fire injuries and, in some instances, loss of life.

"One of the most dangerous practices involves the use of glass or unapproved plastic type containers to transport and store these products," Mr. Kerr said. He went on to point out that the majority of those who will be affected by the regulation are people who use flammable liquids when refueling lawn mowers, snow blowers, snow mobiles and in some cases as cleaning agents.

The first bridge of its kind connected North America. Other highway improvements are being made at the intersection of Highway 101 and at the Racquette enroute to the ferry terminal. A small bridge is being replaced at the Racquette.

A \$50,000 reconstruction at the fishermen's wharf is expected to begin soon.

Other federal provincial and/or municipal construction underway or planned are the Digby Children's Home, Home For The Aged and Infirmed, a second Senior Citizens' Home. The \$300,000 Children's Home is expected to be opened about February. It is understood.

Private building construction includes a shopping mall near the Digby General Hospital, a funeral home, grocery store, motel units, restaurant and private homes.

The half-million dollar shopping mall, being built by Rocca Construction, of Saint John, is expected to be ready for Easter.

The funeral home being built in the same vicinity, across Warwick St., estimated at a cost of \$50,000, is for Rae McEwen.

In the same area the building housing the Department of Welfare offices and belonging to The Macdonald Motor Company Ltd., is being extended.

Also on Warwick St., on the former South End grocery property, Vincent McCarrie is extending and renovating the building to house a chain store. Mr. McCarrie and his father-in-law, Robert Marshall, lost their grocery store down town through a fire last winter.

One of the largest private construction programs is that of Mountain Gap Inn where the proprietor, Mr. Price, is constructing 10 additional motel units to be ready by February. On the Shore Road a new motel, the Admiral Digby, has been started, while the Kingfisher, on Warwick Street, is adding a restaurant to their establishment.

A number of homes are being built within the county and renovations and additions are being made to homes within the town and without.

Wants Sidewalks  
Through Clare

A delegation on the parish of Saint-Jovite, comprising the villages of Saint-Jovite, Lower Saint-Jovite, a portion of the Meleghon Station Saint-Jovite Station (including an area commonly called Bangor), have suggested to the Clare Municipal Council the construction of sidewalks in Clare.

The committee was composed of Rev. Robert Desjardins, pastor of Saint-Jovite church; Hubert Gaudet and Camille Mellet.

In presenting his brief to the council, Rev. Desjardins, on behalf of the parish council, outlined why it was necessary to have sidewalks constructed in Clare. One of the first reasons is due to the narrowness of the main highways and the danger for pedestrians walking on the shoulders of these roads. Increased traffic on our highways is making it very dangerous for both adults and children to even walk on the shoulder of the highway.

Too many pedestrians are being injured and also killed on our highways, stated Rev. Desjardins. Even car drivers are caused a certain amount of anxiety due to pedestrians walking on the shoulder of the highway, he stated. The pedestrians have no place to walk but on the shoulders in most areas and they should be able to walk in safety on sidewalks. There need not be paved, especially initially, but could be made of gravel and crushed stone.

Rev. Desjardins mentioned in his brief that the municipality had a surplus last year and the question may be asked why the administration of the Municipality felt it was necessary to have a surplus or would it have been better to have given more services to the citizens of the Municipality.

The province offers the following services: Community Planning, District Planning Commission and Municipal Development. Plan, stated Rev. Desjardins. The group suggests that the Municipality establish priorities for the construction of such sidewalks, as it is evident that they could not be built in one year, especially where the school has does not pick up students, College-St. Anne, school and post office at Church Point, for example.

The Warden, Bernard L. Blane, thanked the delegation for showing interest in the Municipal undertakings and mentioned that their suggestions will be carefully studied. He mentioned that the project, which would have to be done by areas, would have to have the area taxed where the sidewalks would be installed by having an area tax. The question of last year's surplus was due to the expenditures being made in anticipation according to revenue received during the year 1971. This surplus is being used for the 1972 budget, the tax rate for 1972 could

have risen if this had not been done.

Warden LeBlanc had developed to a preliminary design stage that would detail the extent and siting of sewage collection systems, the specific types of treatment to be applied, the treated sewage effluent, discharge or outfall formation regarding rates for construction and operating costs for each remedial measure proposed.

The question of dumps in the Municipality was discussed. It was stated that the dump in Groves Coques and 15 cents per one-fifth mile should be closed to the public on four-party line service as early as possible. Dumps added to the base rate, states the company.

The company goes on to state that they plan to eliminate the "mileage charge" in these areas in the fall of 1973 when the present base rate will be extended to include these areas.

The Council went on record in favouring a study of potential sewage disposal and other pollution problems. The study would be made in two phases by the Municipal Council with the first phase being against the establishing of a general in nature and would garbage disposal unit on the basis of an overall survey of the Point. The petitioners stated that such a garbage disposal unit could cause pollution to a small stream and to several summer camps on Lac-Ben.

attended High School there, and upon completion of his schooling, enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force. Following a number of postings in Canada, he was sent to Germany to serve with one of the Canadian NATO squadrons.

On August 23, 1961, Brian was involved in a motor vehicle accident in Germany, suffering a fracture of the spine, which resulted in paraplegia. Additionally, he had the added misfortune of losing his hearing due to a skull fracture which damaged the hearing nerves.

After some weeks, Brian was transferred back to Canada, where he was treated at Camp Hill Hospital, and later in the Nova Scotia Rehabilitation Centre. Later he obtained employment in the book-binding plant operated by Kelsey-Whitely Limited in Liverpool, and acquired an automobile of his own, which he proceeded to equip with hand-controls and learned to drive again.

In 1967, Brian moved to Westmount where he went to work at the Bedford Institute of Oceanography as a film data recorder, later enrolling at the Nova Scotia Institute of Technology and took a course in water repainting to prepare himself for advanced work in instrumentation repair. Following a successful completion of the course at N.S.I.T., he enrolled in the instrument repair course at the Bedford School in New York City, where he did very well in his class. Early in 1971, he returned to Nova Scotia and began to look for employment in his new line of work. Five months later, opportunity knocked for him in the form of the tender, the problem will be laid aside for the present.

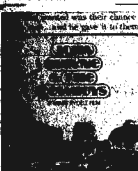

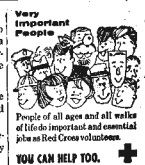

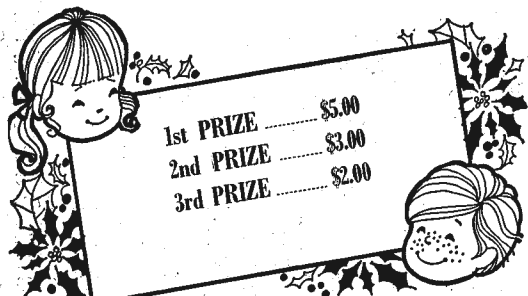

### SPEAKS ON COMMUNITY SCHOOL BUDGETS \$666,800 AND \$288,000 NEWSPAPERS

Community newspapers, their value to the public and their operation, was the subject of an address given by the editor of The Digby Courier.

Mrs. Edith Wallis, to the XI Alpha chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, Halifax, on Wednesday, Mrs. Sheldon Carson, Clayton Park, Halifax Co., was hostess for the evening and Mrs. Maryam MacDonald, president, presided. Mrs. Wallis, who was special guest of Miss Dora Little, Halifax, formerly of Smith's Cove, was introduced by Mrs. William David. The address was in keeping with the group's series of studies on creative writing.

A newspaper editor, the speaker said, must have a grave sense of responsibility. He has a sacred trust just like the man in the pulpit or a doctor with a scalpel. The new salary scale for secretaries will also come into effect January 1, 1973.

Jack Ritey, supervisor of curriculum for Digby schools, presented his budget for supplies for 1973 of \$7,280 which was \$280 above the budget for 1972 of \$6,900. ### Disappointed People

Over industrialization is not good for any place but Digby is a long way from a state like that. Digby needs another industry, one of a fairly good size. Presently, it has precious few to boost the economy of the area. There is no wonder there are disappointed people in Digby after hearing that the Austrian Funder Corporation has decided to bypass Digby with their hard board plant. For three years this has been a dream of Digby, a dream that had grown to be a reality, almost. At least, it was real in the minds of the citizens even to the end of October 1972. The month of November seemed to bring the unanswered questions until the blow struck home last week that the deal is off indefinitely.

There have been mixed reactions to the news. There are those who feel there have been enough losing propositions in the area and should this have turned out as another loser then it is better to be without it. There was the thought that the company was not prepared to pay the going price for production material. Maybe a compromise could have been met on the strength that half a loaf is better than none at all. There was a question in the minds of some whether or not enough resource

material could be found to keep such a plant in operation. That answer should have been easily obtained. And could the men be found to labor in the woods and factory. That could even be answered in the negative if unemployment insurance benefits would intervene.

We can console ourselves with the might-have-beens but the fact remains that there are hundreds of people left disappointed, those on the inside of negotiations as well as those on the outside. The down-town merchants are naturally disappointed. Especially at a time when they have fear customers might be drawn away to the hill, a new industry, they felt, would provide something for the work. The new shopping centre, too, would imagine, expected to draw customers from the extra 400 to be employed.

With a strawberry farm having petered out, a fish processing plant gone by the wayside recently and the fibre board plant not reaching the sod turning stage, we might all turn more of our attention to supporting the businesses and merchants in our own town and County. And Christmas isn't a bad time to begin doing just that. It would leave fewer disappointed people here.

### Highway Safety Your Business Always

Would you believe it if I told you that the number of highway accidents in Nova Scotia from January to the end of June, 1972, was 6,814? That number is 603 more than for the same period the year before. Those injured in that period in 1972 were 1,625, or 194 more than 1971. Fatal accidents were five by five and traffic deaths down by five. While the figures showing the number of accidents in 1972 are disappointing, the deaths by accident have decreased and we venture to say that fastened seat belts might have done something towards reducing that figure.

When accidents happen, who or what is to blame? Is it the car, the highway or the driver? In a survey of 409 fatal single car accidents, it was found that 18 per cent or 119 were caused by mechanically defective older vehicles. Most of the crashes occurred on straight, level, dry roads in clear weather on rural highways. Most of these were caused by speeding. In the 409 single car accidents surveyed, 58 per cent of the drivers were intoxicated.

Calculating from the survey, the driver is the culprit in most of the fatal single car accidents. He is responsible for the condition of his car, straight, level, dry roads and clear weather. He put the car on the driver and definitely only the driver is responsible for his state of intoxication. We are convinced that these same reasons are the cause in many multiple car accidents, too. To these can be added, carelessness, inattention, impatience and other faults. They all add up to the word driver.

And who is affected by these car accidents? Both the innocent and the guilty. That is why we say that highway safety is your business. ### Seriousness Or

#### Threat Not Known

Men does not really know how serious a threat to life on this planet DDT may be if we keep adding to what already exists. Dr. A. D. Pickett, noted ecologist, told the annual banquet session of the Digby District Air Board Council at CPRI Cornwalls.

Many nations have discontinued the use of DDT, Dr. Pickett said, but a few years ago the annual world production was 150,000 tons per year. He noted that, if as is claimed, one part per billion is destructive to some organisms, and DDT is practically indestructible, the reserve must be building up very rapidly.

Dr. Pickett, who was introduced to the meeting by R. Melanson Rogers, Q.C., said that the Council, noted that the question of the use of pesticides is a many-sided matter. The problem is not one that has a simple answer.

He noted that, while he is usually classified as being with the anti-pesticide group, this is incorrect. He said rather that he is a "right-rope" rider in this matter and that he is far more difficult than joining forces with those who believe unreservedly in the chemical ethic or with those who reject it.

Dr. Pickett said he made no apologies for advancing the point of view that society is responsible for the use of pesticides. He said the quality of life we have achieved would deteriorate if the use of pesticides was completely abandoned. Pesticides are not an unmitigated blessing, however he stated one that has a simple answer.

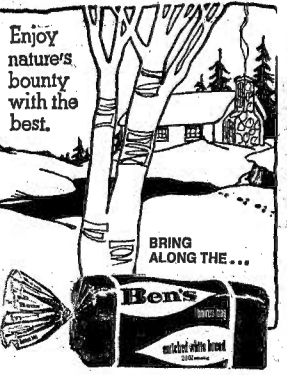
It is necessary to consider, Dr. Pickett said, not only the side effects of the use of pesticides but also the effects of their use. The destruction of pests is often accompanied by the destruction of useful organisms such as pollinating insects, parasites and other things that help to keep injurious pests under control. Destruction of the beneficial insects of the soil lowers species that are seldom pests to increase so that they cause much damage.

Dr. Pickett noted the difference between wide and narrow spectrum insecticides and said that DDT is one of the wide spectrum type. This means, he said, that it is a general killer while narrow spectrum type usually only attack a single pest or a few closely related. It is the wide spectrum pesticides that are most likely to cause serious disturbances in the environment.

The pesticide DDT, Dr. Pickett said, is practically indestructible and is carried from place to place. This is why it is found almost everywhere in the world. It is carried by DDT travels in air currents in very small particles.

DDT is a nerve poison like most of the organic pesticides. Dr. Pickett said. Man seems fairly tolerant to it and most people in North America carry 8 to 12 parts per million in their tissue. # "STOP" — "LOOK"

#### —Observe These Ten Steps—

1. Keep both hands firmly on the wheel at 10 and two o'clock — and both eyes on the road.
2. Never tailgate — allow at least one vehicle length for every ten miles per hour of speed.
3. On wet, snowy or icy roads, reduce speed well below posted speed limits, depending on the severity of conditions.
4. Always signal intentions — turns, lane changes, passing.
5. Curves require special attention — slow down before entering, then apply power to wheels. Be alert for oncoming cars; they often cross the center line.
6. Never pass on hills or curves. On straightaways, pass only when positive the way is clear.
7. Don't drive after heavy drinking. If you have been drinking moderately, allow one hour for each one-ounce drink of beer (12 ounces) consumed, before driving.
8. Keep the car in good operating condition, especially brakes, tires, steering and front end suspension, front and rear lights, mirrors, turn signals, wipers, muffler and exhaust pipe.

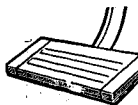

## Your Doctor, Your Health And You

Dr. W. R. Gillis in an article released to the news media reminds his readers that a medical emergency is a frightening situation no matter how well equipped you are to handle it. Tragically, many families, when faced with a medical emergency, do not know what they should do or where they should turn.

If you have never contacted a general or family physician or if you have recently moved to a new area and have not yet got around to contacting a physician, you should do so immediately, before sickness or injury occurs. Attempt to contact a physician who practices in your residential area. Your previous doctor, the Medical Society of Nova Scotia, neighbors, relatives or friends may be sources of reference.

Your next step is to arrange to see the physician at his office.

During this preliminary office visit, you may decide if you wish the physician to help you and your family organize medical care to ensure good health and prompt, efficient treatment. Ask him if he is willing to assume the role of your family physician.

The basic steps to good personal and family health care are fairly simple. First, establish a relationship with the family physician of your choice. Follow his advice, and

ask him to acquaint you with the special medical emergency facilities in the community. If you don't understand his instructions or the reasons behind them, simply ask. He will be happy to explain.

Your preliminary visit will be more productive if you ask the physician to clarify anything which you do not understand. You should ask the physician or his office staff where, outside you should take in an emergency situation if he is not immediately available, and what other doctors he works with on nights and week-ends. Many doctors work together in groups or by a "call system". Either procedure will assure you of continuous service for urgent medical needs.

## Special Week At Digby Baptist Church

From Wednesday to Sunday, November 22 - 28, the Digby Baptist Church was the scene of a renewal experiment.

Rev. Richard Coffin, of First Baptist Church, Dartmouth, was the renewal director. Mr. Coffin chose as his overall theme "Stumbling Blocks in the Christian Life". "Doubts", "Success", "Pride" and "Criticisms". Evening services were held from Wednesday to Friday, with open unity for "talk-back" afterwards. He shared in a very honest and moving way his own pilgrimage in the Christian life and how faith in Christ had enabled him to find meaning and purpose and direction in his life, even when the way led through some very critical and heart-searching experiences.

As the men left the church approximately the same number of young people arrived. This was the Youth Rap. Special music was provided by "The Musical Friends", a group of eight teen-age girls from Bridgetown, who specialise in religious folk music. Mr. Coffin spoke briefly to the young people and divided them into cell groups for discussion. Following another time of lively singing with the group from Bridgetown, a time of refreshment was enjoyed.

The Sunday morning service had many highlights, including special music by "The Musical Friends" and a solo by Margie Levy. A child dedication service was held for baby Robyn Terra-Lyn Page. Mr. Robertson based his children's story on the moving story of Daniel, using an illustrated drawing. Mr. Coffin challenged all present with his provocative message "Super-Christian Me". Mr. Coffin also spoke at the Hill Grove Baptist Church and the Acaciaville Baptist Church. At Acaciaville, the choir of 25 young people provided a time of joy-filled singing. Mr. Coffin shared in personal testimony the way in which God had worked through his life.

The Renewal experiment had proved for all who participated in it a time of growing and deepening in the Christian faith.

## Week-end Storm Hits Westport

Sunday Nov. 26, will be remembered for a time in Westport as a hectic day, because there were happenings along the water front. South-east winds up to 60 miles per hour hit the island after noon and really stirred up the harbour.

With the wind and the high tide, the seas and spray were flying over the roads and hitting the houses on the water front.

Fishermen who had loaded their boats with lobster traps in readiness for Monday setting were on pins and needles watching their boats as at times the seas would crash over them. Around 4:30 p.m. Ray McDermott saw that his boat was taking in water. As it was too rough to row out in the p.m., the C.C.G. 102 was called and Ray, in company with Jim McDermott, were out aboard the boat, got the engine to go and started to take the boat to the Government wharf. When starting out, the boat tipped in the rough water and nearly turned over, shipped water and started to fill. The Coast Guard was standing by and managed to get a rope on the boat and towed it to the wharf. By the time they arrived the boat was levelled out with water.

Fishermen gathered around to help untangle the traps and with the use of the Fire Department pump and the Coast Guard they pumped out the water, and worked on the engine to get it ready on Monday. While this was going on the C.C.G. 102 got another 200 to see what was wrong with the fishing boat of Edwin Frost. When they arrived they found the water up to the jobbers and water going in over the stern. They were more fortunate with this one and not as much damage resulted.

The captains and their crews of the C.C.G. 102 are to be commended for the

quick and orderly way in which they work. Everyone of the fishermen on anyone who has men on the water can say that the Coast Guard is the best thing that ever happened to Westport. Since coming here it has been on call and on duty sometimes day and night.

While towing the boat ropes from traps that went overboard got caught in the wheel of the C.C.G. 102. Tim Jorys, got them clear. The boat in trouble was a brand new boat, never having been fishing before. The men worked all day Monday to get the engine working but could not. Ray had to have the other and made for a new engine placed in the rougher trip, it is understood.

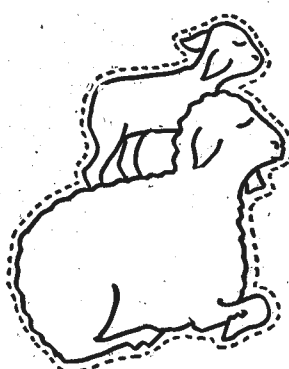

Misses Jessie and Madeline Comeau visited friends in Southville under the name of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, 1 make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated hereon and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 137 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Meters and dated the 30th day of November, 1968, and amendments thereto:

(a) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from the highway or streets.

(c) The provisions of Clause (a) and (b) hereof shall not apply to:

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(6) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(e) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a penalty provided by Section 296 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations.

5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December, 1972 until the 31st of March, A. D. 1973.

## Notice To Motorists

(Owners Or Drivers)

### WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS DIGBY, N. S.

WHEREAS due to the congestion on the streets of the Town of Digby caused by vehicular and pedestrian traffic, and the limitation on the free use of the streets liable to be caused by the presence of ice and snow thereon, in view of the opinion that an emergency and a special condition exists, and I so declare.

THEREFORE under the authority of Section 180 (1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, as Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby, 1 make the following temporary regulations:

(1) Notwithstanding that certain traffic signs have been erected in the Town of Digby prohibiting or permitting the parking or leaving standing of vehicles upon sections of the highway during the hours stated hereon and notwithstanding the provisions of the Regulations made by the Traffic Authority for the Town of Digby pursuant to Section 137 (3) of the Motor Vehicle Act respecting Parking Meters and dated the 30th day of November, 1968, and amendments thereto:

(a) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave standing the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby between the hours of 12:01 o'clock in the morning and the hour of 8 o'clock in the morning of the same day.

(b) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in the Town of Digby in such manner as to hinder, inconvenience or prevent the proper removal of snow or ice from the highway or streets.

(c) The provisions of Clause (a) and (b) hereof shall not apply to:

(1) The motor vehicle of a physician or surgeon parked reasonably near his office or residence and immediately available for professional calls.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by a physician or surgeon who is actually engaged in his professional occupation and reasonably near where he is so engaged.

(3) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(4) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

(5) Commercial vehicles parked by an operator for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise.

(6) No owner or driver or person having control or custody of any vehicle shall during the period from one hour after any snow storm has commenced to two hours after such snow storm has stopped park or leave the same standing and unattended by a person authorized to move and capable of operating the same upon any highway or street in that area in the Town of Digby.

(e) The provisions of Clause (d) shall not apply to:

(1) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a police constable or a member of the Provost Police.

(2) Motor vehicles parked by an operator who is actually engaged in discharging his duties as a member of the Fire Department.

2. The time above referred to shall be the time from time to time legally in effect in the Town of Digby.

3. It shall be an offence for any person to fail to comply with these regulations and any such person will be liable to a penalty provided by Section 296 of the Motor Vehicle Act.

4. Any peace officer may seize and remove any vehicle with which an offence has been committed under these regulations.

5. These temporary regulations shall be in full force and effect from the 1st of December, 1972 until the 31st of March, A. D. 1973.

# Mayor Smith Issues Statement Re New Industry



Mayor Glen Smith

This is a time for cool heads and cooperative action, stated Mayor Glen W. Smith in commenting on the news that the Funder wood products firm is not at this time going ahead with plans to establish here.

Mayor Smith said he had responsibly waited to make a public statement until he

had been able to discuss the best of the industry with the Premier and others who had been involved in the negotiations and discussions.

It was my feeling, he said, that any statement I made should come not in the first flush of bitter disappointment, but after a time for serious assessment and reflection on what we should

now do in the light of what has happened. One thing we must not do, he said, is to engage in useless recriminations and name calling. "I am satisfied that everyone involved tried very hard," he said. "Everyone is disappointed and maybe very disappointed, it is even kinder than that of others." "It has been hard to accept that something we felt we had

reason to believe was assured, has now become an uncertain prospect."

Despite this, he said, we have to acknowledge that the final decision was the right of the company. That came as an apparent reversal of their previous intention was a disappointment, but nevertheless it is the firm that has to determine its own course. We

must take heart the door has not been totally or permanently closed according to the news reports.

In the meantime we should express to the company our continued interest and concern that they will at some point follow through on their initial intention. We need also to acknowledge the time and effort put forward on this matter by such people as the Legislature Member for Digby, Mr. Chagnon, the Board of Trade, Mr. A. L. Robinson and many others.

The fact that it seems for the moment all to have come to naught must be as galling to them as to us." Mayor Smith said he had discussed the problem with the Premier and had expressed the keen disappointment felt by everyone here on the

outcome of the negotiations with Funder. "I have been assured by Premier Regan, Mayor Smith said, that Digby will be given priority in consideration for future possible industrial location. The province now owns property here that is suitable for development, the Mayor said, and we should press for its utilization for this purpose.

### SECOND SENIOR CITIZENS HOME FOR DIGBY

Digby will have a new Senior Citizens Home on the former Corduroy property at the corner of St. Mary's and King Streets. The Mayor, Glen Smith, made the announcement at the regular meeting of the Digby Town Council on Monday evening. The Nova Scotia Housing Commission has purchased the property on which a twenty-one unit building will be erected. Plans have been drawn up and tenders are to be called shortly.

The Home For the Aged and Infirmed is close to re-open. Mayor Glen Smith said the town Council is hoping to come to agreement with the first architect engaged his services were terminated and the Board of Management invited Webber, Hamilton and Wells, architects and contractors, to submit plans. The Board of Management consisting of three from Digby town and three from Digby municipality are hoping to have final approval of plans during the week.

A resolution was passed on Monday evening approving the Nova Scotia Housing Commission to proceed with plans for constructing

twenty new housing units similar to the present Public Housing complexes in town. The present arrangement seems to be paying well, it was reported and taxes run around \$4000. There is an acute shortage of housing in Digby.

It has been found and the restoration permits the N.S. H.C. to include the units in their budget in case Digby decides definitely to go ahead. On the public housing Committee are J.J. Brittain, Gerald Connelly, Audrey Fran-

kland and Regional Turnbull. Already 39 applications are on hand for the units. Council approved of plans for a new home on Queen St., requested by Frank Collins providing approval is given by the building inspector.

Warren Wang was given permission to erect a removable doorway shelter on his premises on Water St. Miss Dorothy Halliday was granted permission to open a beauty salon on Queen St. A letter was read from the Digby Kiwanis Club requesting the council to consider a one-way street going North on Montague Row at the intersection of Montague Row and Water St. at the corner is dangerous for traffic. The matter was left for the police and streets committees to work out. Mayor Smith expressed appreciation of the interest taken by clubs and organizations to write letters and suggest town improvements.

Mr. Gillis said such meetings were necessary and important in order to hear first hand the concerns of people and to make the people acquainted with the purpose and objectives of the Human Rights Commission. ### Approve School Capital Budgets

Capital budgets for the Digby Regional High School and the Board of School Commissioners were approved at the town council held on Monday evening and presided over by Mayor Glen Smith. The budgets require the approval of town council, municipal council and the minister of education.

Mayor Glen Smith said they were trying to give a little different type of education instead of having just a four wall school and parrot fashion reciting when the D.R.H. II capital budget of \$28,835

12 cents was presented. In the budget were included estimates of \$350 for householders; \$2240 for Industrial; business education \$300; calculation \$800; power \$5500; motor mechanics lab \$12,000; cameras \$3000; video tape and camera \$1000; handicapped children requirements \$5000. All are shorable costs regionally and provincially. The budget for the Board of School Commissioners was approved at \$131. Teachers' salaries were estimated at \$542,310 for 1973. Mayor Smith announced

that the Minister of Education would be in Digby on December 12. Councillor Gordon Ellis presented the finance report when lifts to the amount of \$9750 were passed. Taxes written off were \$2431.

In her November report for welfare, Councillor Mrs. Ella Dillon said eight received welfare with the cost to the town of \$94 and seven patients received nursing care with cost to the town of \$388. No action was taken on street lights to serve the Mount Pleasant district until some concrete figures could be obtained on the number of lights required and the cost. Aubrey Forest had approached Councillors Williams and Kennedy and Joseph Hallie (Rights committee) to have the lights installed.

Councillor Gordon Ellis complained that three new streets had been opened in town while existing streets and sidewalks were neglected. He advised to get one thing done before going on to other work. Deputy Mayor Paul

Winchester gave his report for the great commotion stating that grading, ditching, repaving, painting holes and shoulder repairs had been carried out during the month.

The report of the fire committee revealed seven fire calls in November, four in Digby and three outside. Estimated loss \$3000.

Mayor Glen Smith gave a short report on the Annapolis Valley Affairs Board of Trade Council which met in Windsor. He reported that Digby had the largest percentage of unemployment figures. The resume of tolls and panels and stated that millions of dollars are being spent on areas with 60,000 people while the Valley with 120,000 people gets neglected.

But - a wooden ship, a 37 foot Cape Island boat, the "Fuddy Mist" and an iron man - Captain Joe Casey, pilot of Victoria Beach, proved the wisdom of that quotation in the black hours of Saturday morning, when he went out in 20 mile an hour gales to pick up two young men whose boat ran aground on the rocky ledges of Goose Island.

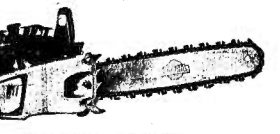

for the South Western Nova with an office in Digby and Miss Carmen Comrau.

Visitors at the meeting were members of the Human Rights Commission of the New Brunswick, viz. Dr. Noel Kinsella, chairman; Michael O'Brien; Father Clement Corrie; Fred Hodges and Janet Colman.

David Hill, Bear River and Digby, felt that the black communities of Acadia, Weymouth and Lequille should organize and go to Human Rights with a united front for improvement in housing, employment, culture and education. Such an organization, he said, could prevent riots to the government and apply pressure where necessary.

Mr. Hill said that the Human Rights Commission was one of the best things developed in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Hill charged there is discrimination of the type in Digby against black persons and he had proved it by applying for rent. When he was refused rent, a white couple who applied directly after him was considered. He made the same complaints about business in Digby and counted possibly three full-time black employees in the town. Mr. Hill is the son of the late Vernon Hill of Bear River, who was well known in Digby and who had for years been employed at a local garage.

While no action was taken to organize on Tuesday, the chairman remarked that he would like to explore the possibility and Mr. McKay emphasized that the organizing would have to be by the people themselves but the Commission would assist in every way possible. Mr. Hill agreed that the Human Rights Commission can act only within the act to help people but people must help themselves.

Mr. McCarthy referred to the Human Rights Act as not a body of laws but a set of principles.

Paul Gaudet of the Acadia Federation, Halifax, agreed that the black race had difficulties as a minority group but he also said before the meeting the degradation which comes the French minority group, particularly in losing their cultural identity and destroying of their self-image.

Mrs. Eleanor Elms of Acadiaville hunted up the question to the chairman: "How far are you prepared to go on a limb to bring the black community up to first class citizens?" The chairman felt they had a responsibility and were willing to go out on a limb for it. Mr. Gillis said as far as he was concerned the aim is one class of citizens and he would do everything he could to bring that about. He named the areas of housing, employment and education as being important to change.

Mrs. Emma Frances and Victoria Pette were present from Acadiaville Royal and questioned the strength of the Human Rights Commission and made suggestions for change in the act.

The afternoon session got away to an interesting start when Jack Ritzy, supervisor of curriculum, related the Human Rights to the educational field and saying that

He felt the community students should have a say in what they need. C. C. MacEneaney, supervisor, spoke of meetings held in Acadiaville where the parents gave suggestions as to subjects of benefit and suitability to their children.

Mr. McCarthy assured the educators that the Human Rights Commission's plan is to work with teachers to cultivate the parents' needs in a multi-cultural and racial community. He spoke of the work being done to preserve the Indian culture. His aim is to dispel prejudice, discrimination and poverty for all groups of people.

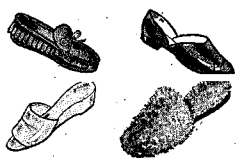

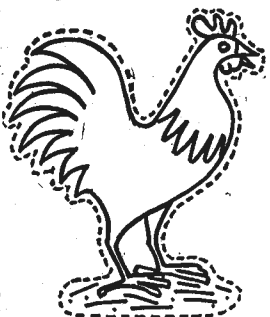

## General Facts On Christmas Trees

This year Nova Scotia expects to export 1.3 million Christmas trees at a value of approximately \$3 million. (Log No. 389) Christmas trees are generally cut manually by cutters who select trees suitable for sale, cut them and carry them to a nearby wood road or field where they can be picked up by a truck or tractor and hauled to a concentration yard.

The trees are not generally replaced by planting a new tree but Christmas tree growers are gradually beginning to plant young trees (two to three years old) in abandoned hay or pasture fields. Most of the trees that are being cut, up to now, have been replaced by natural reproducing in wild stands, but once the young wild trees have attained a height of 3 to 5 feet, many are semi-cultivated by the grower. That is, they are fertilized and sheared, competing shrubs are killed by spraying or are cut. The tree's branches regenerate double the number of twigs cut off. Over a period of several years this makes a much thicker tree which is the most popular type of Christmas tree. It also helps to bring the tree into a cone shape. Also, crowding of young trees is controlled by thinning. So actually the wild stands under semi-cultivation keep yielding trees year after year whereas plantations having trees all of one age will generally have the crop taken off at the same time or with a second of a few very years. The semi-cultivated wild stands will be in existence for some time to come.

Christmas trees are cut at a height of from 3 feet to 12 feet but the 5 to 8 foot size is far the most popular. This represents an age of 7 to 10 years.

Trees for plantation stock are available from some tree nurseries and also some growers gather young wild trees in the woods that is little trees from 6" to 12" in height that can simply be pulled from the soil and transplanted, preferably into transplant beds for root development.

ment, and then into plantations. Although a good many wild trees are still being sold, this practice is disappearing. As the popular Christmas tree is a cone shaped, thickly needled tree, this type of tree can best be produced by fertilization and shearing, starting about 4 to 6 years before the tree is cut.

Trees are usually tied in holes of one to five trees depending on size, but as the density of the trees are increasing due to cultivation, the singly banded tree is becoming popular. It is enclosed in a nylon netting and quite often goes from the retailer to the consumer home without being unwrapped. This is becoming a very popular method of merchandising.

As natural Christmas trees face stiff competition from the artificial tree, anything that can make them more attractive to the consumer is conducted, and packaging is not an important item in this respect.

As there is a great variation in the quality and desirability of Christmas trees, it naturally follows that some sort of segregation or grading system is in existence. The province of New Brunswick has established an official Christmas tree grading standard a number of years ago and the training and setting. (M.L.B. Grading Administration)

Christmas tree graders come under the direction of the M.L.B. New Brunswick, officially graded Christmas trees are sold on a voluntary basis and as the effects of shearing and fertilization are beginning to bear fruit the number of high quality Christmas trees is steadily increasing. (M.L.B. Grading Administration)

## BRIDGE OPEN TO TRAFFIC



The unique \$3.5 million Bear River Bridge, linking Digby and Annapolis counties opened to vehicular traffic on Monday afternoon.

The new bridge, said Nova Scotia Highway Minister Honorable Leonard L. Pace, is an integral part of the new Trunk 101 Highway construction program between Halifax and Yarmouth. It not only replaced the obsolete 72 year old one-lane Victoria bridge which was designed for a horse and buggy era, but has been able to cope with the demands of modern day traffic.

Contract for the bridge project was awarded by the Nova Scotia highways department to Beveer Marine Ltd., with the firm's tender of \$3,362,570 being the lowest submitted. Funding of the project was jointly shared by the province and the federal department of regional economic expansion.

At precisely 11 o'clock on the morning of April 30, 1971, a dynamite blast on the west side of the river between Annapolis and Digby Counties marked the construction of the new 2,000 foot Bear River Bridge.

Less than 20 months later, the \$3.5-million bridge is a reality. The bridge also includes a modern highway approach system which is part of the new Trunk 101 Highway construction program between Halifax and Yarmouth.

Technically known as "pre-cast, post-tensioned segmental construction," the Bear

## Shopping Center Open March 21

— Realize \$27,000 Taxes For Town —

Mr. Bernstein, treasurer of National Leasholds Ltd., told Mayor Glen Smith on Monday evening that the new \$1,500,000 Shopping Centre, known as the Evangelical Shoppers Mall, would realize \$27,000 taxes for the town, amounting to a quarter of a million and more in ten years.

Mr. Bernstein made the remarks at a press conference where he announced the official opening of the Mall on March 21, 1973. He emphasized that a Shopping Centre of this magnitude creates a major industry in itself for the town of Digby and the counties of Digby and Annapolis. In a few weeks staff-recruiting will commence for the new stores, he said, and it will create new permanent jobs for over 100 people.

Further he stated that it has been proven that a Shopping Centre such as the Evangelical Shoppers Mall will help all the downtown merchants because it will bring in large numbers of new shoppers from a 50 mile radius. He felt that competition always breeds better business. Today's consumers are looking for variety and tends to shop in an area that offers greater variety and services, he said, and it is for this reason that all the merchants of Digby, as well as the town of Digby, will benefit with the opening of the new shopping complex.

Digby was always known as the "Hub of the Service" and retail trade for Digby and Annapolis Counties and also for the thousands of tourists and transient population travelling from Nova Scotia to New Brunswick by the new CP ferry Princess of Acadia. This new Shopping Mall, he

stated, will give to the town of Digby an added impetus which will not only be an asset to the local people of Digby County but also to the town, thousands of tourists that will frequent the town of Digby.

The town of Digby with its 1,500,000 Shopping Centre, one-quarter of a million and more in ten years, will bring back many of the shoppers who are now travelling long distances to other shopping centres in Nova Scotia, he ventured.

During the construction of this Development a figure in excess of \$20,000 will be paid out in wages, which, he felt, will reflect in an improved economy for the town of Digby.

## Mental Health Centre To Continue Operation

Mr. B. MacLeod Rogers, Q.C. Chairman of the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board, stated this week that arrangements have been made to continue psychiatric services through the Digby Community Mental Health Centre following the departure of Dr. R. A. Armstrong, who has resigned to take up a position as Executive Director of the mental health centre in New Glasgow. He will be leaving at the end of the month to take up his new post.

Until a permanent replacement has been secured for Dr. Armstrong, arrangements have been made for the services of psychiatrists from the staff of the Nova Scotia Hospital to come to the Mental Health Centre in Digby one day each week on a rotational basis, Mr. Rogers said.

In order to provide for this service, he said, the mental health centre in Digby will be open each Saturday, beginning on January 13th. Appointments are under commitments to see the psychiatrist on his attendance at the centre on Saturday, the assistance being provided will be made through the Nova Scotia Hospital during the week. In addition to this, Mr. Rogers said, patients seeking assistance through the centre will see their psychiatrist in secure

referred to their own personal physician.

The services of a psychiatrist have also been sought for the centre. Mr. Rogers said, so that patients on medication may have their prescriptions filled as in the past through the centre. This arrangement would apply to those patients who qualify under provincial regulations for the dispensing of their medicine needs through the centre.

The psychologist, Miss Susan Burns, and the social worker, Mr. William MacLean, will also continue their services through the mental health centre in Digby and appointments may be arranged by contacting the centre, either in person or by telephone. The mental health centre will continue to operate on regular office hours, Mr. Rogers said.

Mr. Rogers said the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board is actively seeking a replacement for the psychiatrist and a number of applications are under consideration. CHRISTMAS 1972

"All are safely gathered in, ere the winter storms begin," was what I sang when the beautiful male Oriole was caught last week. He was caught in a canary cage but the first time he went in he knocked the water dish out and away he went. The second time all was safe and he is now very contented with the other five. In 1969 I caught one on the 18th and one on the 19th. The first one I ever had was caught on New Year's Day, but it was too far gone to survive.

Now I am worrying about two Robins that are still at the feeders eating apples and grapes. They look so cold and are sitting down on their feet.

The annual Christmas Bird count takes place on one day between December 16th and January 1st.

Don't forget to put out your discarded Christmas tree for the birds. Pours some melted suet over the branches and it will serve as a feeder and a shelter.

Keep lots of scratch grain and sunflower seeds out and you will be well rewarded. The local stores are well supplied.

A gentleman called the other day saying he had found a black and white bird in the woods by a brook that couldn't fly, but it didn't seem injured. It turned out to be a Dovekie. The little bird that looks like a baby Penguin. Their wings are very small and they have to be on water to take off. It was taken to the waterfront and released.

In closing my notes for 1972, I would like to add these little verses by Margaret Murray:

# WHAT IS CHRISTMAS?

**"Living Together On Earth"**  
By Lt. Col. B. M. Kholkar  
(Ret'd Indian Army)  
Atlantic School of Theology

First things first. Raise a question and then try to answer it as best as possible. What is Christmas? The question may be best answered in the words of the 20th Century Asian Saint, Sadhu Sunder Singh, about whom the world renowned ecumenical leader, author, missionary, and the former Anglican Bishop of India, Stephen Neill, wrote: "The most famous of all Indian Christians, Sadhu Sunder Singh, by his wandering life of extreme simplicity and by direct appeal of his devotional writings had convinced many for the first time that India had something new to contribute to the knowledge of Christ. Interest in the work of Sadhu continued long after his disappearance in 1928." Sir Francis Young, husband, the first British of India, led an expedition Delegates at the Second Vat-

to Tibet, mentioned in his book, "Dawn of India" (1930), that at the turn of the century there were four great men in India who were known in the West — the poet Tagore, a Noble Prize winner; Dr. Radda Krishnan, the Hindu teacher and philosopher and later retired as the Second President of India; Mahatma Gandhi, the Father of the Indian nation; and the Christian mystic, Sadhu Sunder Singh.

"How do Christians expect to live together in Heaven when they cannot live together on earth?" asked Sunder Singh again and again during his addresses in East and West. He longed for the day when men will live as one human family in the global village.

Pope John XXIII expressed the same feeling in these poignant words: "The whole world is my family. This sense of belonging to everyone must give character and vigour to my mind, heart and my actions." Addressing the Observers Delegates at the Second Vat-

"As long as my brothers remain oppressed and deprived, I shall continue to ask for their natural rights and human hopes."

St. Luke mentions the brotherhood of mankind in his Gospel in these beautiful words: "Glorify to God in the high, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

St. John recorded the mystery of Christmas in these penetrating words: "God so loved the world 'all' human beings: Hindu, Muslim, Buddhist, Jew, Christian, Alchemist, Pagan — Red, Black, White, Yellow, Brown, that He gave his only begotten son to whomsoever believe in him should not perish but have everlasting life." The Galilean whose birthday is celebrated on December 25 once interpreted the principle of brotherhood in these words to the rich young ruler: "Go and sell all you have and give money to the poor. Together we can come and share things with others."

Expressing the grass-roots to brotherhood, the versatile ecumenical leader, Richard Cardinal Cushing, said to hundreds of Protestants and Jews who wished him well on his appointment as Archbishop of Boston: "I have realized so often and so well that whenever I showed myself a brother to another human being, there it was that I showed myself as another Christ to another person: then it was that I received a brother's response; then it was that I saw Christ in my brother."

The writer's first Christmas (1971) in Canada was a lonely one in Ottawa. This Christmas he hopes to be in India with his family. Between the last Christmas and this one, a significant event happened one night at Lawrenceton Exhibition Grounds, in the enchanting Annapolis Valley, about 114 miles from Halifax, in the Province of Nova Scotia. The writer had a dramatic experience of seeing Christ in a man. Corina Jones (10), a blonde Canadian boy from Weymouth, and I, were stranded at the gate of the exhibition due to non-availability of transport through unavoidable circumstances. We

had to return to Weymouth, about 50 miles. It was midnight and the exhibition was closed. On account of the rush, it was difficult to get a cab. Hundreds of fan-joying spectators passed by us on foot and in cars, but none was sensitive to enquire why I, a stranger and an Indian, was standing at the gate with a white boy, at the late hour. It was cold and the boy wore my jacket and I stood in his shirt, shivering from head to toe. Suddenly a "Samaritan" came from near by. Kingston and took us to his fine big house and gave me wine to drink and milk to my young friend. His wife opened two beautiful guest rooms and gave us cozy beds to sleep.

An experimental module has been constructed at the Dartmouth Regional Vocational High School and is intended for early installation at Little Harbour, Halifax Co.

## New Bridge At Bear River Had Two Predecessors

The new Bear River Bridge had two predecessors. Little is known about the first bridge, a wooden structure which was located quite near the northern side of the existing railway bridge. It was removed in the late 1800s when the existing one-horse steel structure named after Queen Victoria provided quick access across the wide span of Bear River for the light traffic of the era. Its arrival on the scene came before the motor vehicle made its impact on Nova Scotia's roads, but while designed for horse and buggy, the quality of its workmanship was evident in the fact that it has lasted steadily increasing traffic for almost three-quarters of a century.

The old Victoria Bridge was partially rebuilt in 1904-1905 as a result of damage caused by tide-driven ice jams in the river. It was of simple truss construction and consisted of a 168-foot "swing" span plus two fixed spans of 125 feet and one of 100 feet. The swing span was necessary to allow vessels' passage to the upper reaches of Bear River.

Nova Scotia's geographical location made the river a natural "highway" for many years, but the advent of motorized travel and the increasing number of settlements springing up along the coastline made it necessary to build roads to provide a safer and more rapid means of transport.

Only a few miles from the site of the present Bear River Bridge, on the Annapolis Basin, the first road of any sort in North America — other than Indian trails — was built by Samuel de Champlain's men.

In a description of his winter at Port Royal in 1606, he wrote:

"During the winter, in order not to idle, I undertook to construct a road along the edge of the woods leading to a little river. I asked the Sieur de Portneuf, or three men, whom he gave me, to assist in making the road. It extends as far as the

little river and is nearly 2,000 paces long."

The new Bear River Bridge would leave Champlain's men standing in awe. The physical achievement in its construction has attracted the interest and visits of many top engineering authorities from throughout North America.

Two films are being compiled about its construction, and it will be a main feature of discussion and the Roads and Transportation Conference to be held in Halifax next year. Some highlights of the project include the following:

Because of the horizontal and vertical curvature of the new Bear River Bridge on Trunk 101 between Annapolis and Digby Counties, each precast concrete unit was positioned according to a computer read-out rather than by conventional building methods.

Each concrete unit used in building the new Bear River Bridge weighed an average of 85 tons. A specially adapted float was equipped with a front-end dolly and aircraft jacks to haul the units around the site.

Approximately 10,000 cubic yards of concrete used in construction of the new Bear River Bridge between Annapolis and Digby counties was supplied by a local firm, Clyde B. Everett Limited, of Bridgewater.

A total of 850 tons of reinforcing steel, supplied by Enamel and Heating Products Limited, of Amherst, was required to complete the new bridge.

During the final stages of construction on the Bear River Bridge, it was necessary to extend the workday to 16 hours to lengthen the limited erection time while working over water and combating the 30-foot Bay of Fundy tides.

A 100-foot by 60-foot sectional screw was employed by Boston Marine Limited, general contractors for the new Bear River Bridge, to float a 200-ton capacity crane.

## CLARE LEARNS NEW HORIZONS PROGRAM

A general meeting of pensioners was called for Tuesday, December 5 at College Ste Anne at Church Point for the purpose of studying the feasibility of organizing the retired people of Clare in the New Horizons program which is meeting with some success in other areas. The meeting was called by Jean R. Doucet, regional representative of the Continuing Education program of the Department of Education. He was assisted by Eddie Comeau, of Information Canada and Louis R. Comeau, president of College Ste Anne.

Due to a snow storm during the night and dangerous driving problems of slippery roads, many who had prom-

ised to attend the meeting were unable to do so. Twelve persons were in attendance, mostly from Bellevue Cove and Church Point areas. Mr. Doucet explained what New Horizons was and in short it may be summed up briefly as follows: It is an organization of retired pensioners, male and female, and is mainly to stimulate participation in the community life of a larger number of retired people. It will assist them in procuring the means to equip them to take part in useful and creative occupation for themselves and others. It would enable pensioners to present their service in the community. It would also create a link of friendship with his or her member pensioner and to assist one another.

Projects submitted by the New Horizons must be conceived by themselves, the pensioners. It is up to them to organize a group who would be interested in hobbies in various crafts or whatever lines of interest to the group.

The meeting, stated Mr. Doucet, was for the purpose of letting the people know what the New Horizons program offered by the Federal Government was and to the retired pensioners would be aware of grants available for such a project. "It will be up to you, whether you will organize or not," stated Mr. Doucet.

Due to inclement weather, which prevented many from attending the meeting, Mr. Doucet set another date for a meeting of retired persons to be held at the Knights of Columbus Hall at Concessionville Road on December 14, a Thursday, at 1:30 p.m. Everyone who is retired and a pensioner may attend. It would be wise to go to this meeting, at least to find out what New Horizons is all about and what may be done in the area.

Mr. Jean R. Doucet announced that a leadership seminar will be held at the Bluefin at Meteghan, January 7, 1973 for South Western Nova Scotia. There will be speakers on nutrition, mental health and what you can do for your community.

## Blames Unemployment Insurance

"The bluntest truth is that we are finding it increasingly difficult to compare for 14-hour for the fishing industry against two government-financed programs — welfare and unemployment insurance," said Fisheries Council of Nova Scotia president Denis Monro, of St. John's, Newfoundland, here today.

His remarks came at the close of a two-day session of the council's director, Council representatives from coast to coast had deflected instances of jobs going begging for lack of applicants. "Unemployment figures are a joke," the president maintained; "and government policies on welfare and unemployment insurance are fast eroding any lingering willingness to work among an alarming and growing — percentage of our labour force."

Mr. Monro said that the problem has been with the industry for years, but the lowering of the eligibility period and the increase in benefit rates "has created a situation bordering on the ridiculous — a society with one of the highest artificially created unemployment rates in the western world. Unless the government wakes up — takes corrective measures in time, this industry, among others, faces a trying time."

"Make no mistake," the president added, "assistance to fishermen and to shore workers is very necessary at times. But, surely, there must be a better way to achieve the desired result."

In the way of immediate corrective action, the council president recommended that the eligibility period be more closely related to industry's practical needs and that the whole administration of unemployment insurance be tightened up. "Canada generally, who have to foot the bill for the whole-sale abuses in the present system, are fed up with the whole business," he concluded.

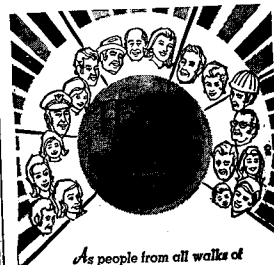

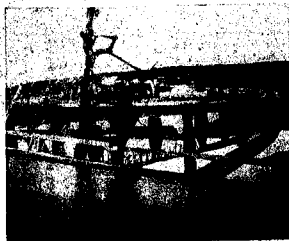
