100th Birthday

The hundredth anniversary of the Digby Weekly Courier has brought to mind some fond memories as recounted in the following historical chapter of the paper. For first, I want to congratulate the current editor of the Courier, Mrs. J.M. (Edith) Wallis, for a job well done over the years and still being well done, good service rendered with great fortitude.

According to my recollection, I have at hand, the Digby Courier, in one hundred years of publication, was controlled under the same family management for 42 years, 1836 to 1978, under the control of Wallis Print Limited. The late J.J. Wallis became editor of the Courier in the second time, in 1929, and at the latter time of the second time, in 1929, and at which he had been running for some time previously and which became Wallis Print Limited sometime between 1929 and 1931.

I well remember the last year of the twelfth when I worked in the office with the husband and father of the Digby Courier. Sometime in 1919 or early 1920, the late J.M. Wallis (Mac), son of J.J., engaged me to work every day after school hours, Saturdays, and for some months after for the office of work was in the building of the present Digby town hall on First Avenue. J.J. Wallis then worked occasionally at the print shop but mostly across the street at the Courier office which was then located on land in the general area where The Royal Bank of Canada is now.

Wallis Job Print operated in this building of four consisting of J.J. Wallis, J.M. Wallis, Miss Elva Haynes, who later became Mrs. George Kicop, and myself. I was in the staff in early 1920.

Mac's job was to run the staff in the left upstairs. J.J. occasionally printing plant but mostly at the Courier office. "Mac" worked nearly full-time at all the different jobs at the Job Print, and I worked at various duties most of the time being spent at operating printing presses.

We worked ten-hour days, six days a week. J.J. and "Mac" sometimes worked overtime. I worked only the regular hours being paid a weekly wage which was comparatively good for those times, and my lack of experience. I received five or five dollars a week for working after school hours to six o'clock and on Saturday all day, and nine dollars a week for half weeks after finishing school. A two or three dollar a week raise was offered to me in the fall of 1920 for me to stay on at printing, but I had made up my mind to enter a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, starting salary of \$200. The bank salary started out about the same per hour as for the printing plant those days, and experience however short, were helpful and appreciated to me.

J.J. was very jovial in his occasional trip to the print and did consider the kidding all in good fun. "Mac" was a witty person who noised in a good deal of sarcasm now and then for no reason or another. Elva must always had good answers to all the kidding she was called upon to take, and she usually held her own in a quiet sort of way, always in a setting type. We four all got along very well together. However, I do remember that some days all seem long and weary because of the transitory of some repetitious jobs.

In spite of the great demand for printing those last happy days of the twelfth, business generally being brisk, it looked in his that people had to work long and hard to make any decent profit. There was

however, trials and finger ends were used and I was sent back to work.

Now and then a printing job had to be put on a piece of paper which required a new kind of printers ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would say that it was the largest press, it was at the factory as always against an outside door to lower the risk on the construction.

One of the jobs I had to do, with the paper and printers devil on the staff, was to do a printing job and then, one day not long after I started my job at the printing plant, I decided to show the floor that apparently hadn't been cleaned in some considerable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you getting on Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the floor. "J.J." laughed very heartily, he thought the remark pretty good and amusing.

Sometimes the gasoline engine or a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "Mac" the fix it man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. "Mac" would then stand back and cross his arms, and then he would immediately start working. "Mac" would say, "all it needed was a bit of cleaning."

On other occasions when some piece refused to work for the and, seemed to be broken, "Mac" would say, "use a little oil" and sure enough after that is all it took. How often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and, in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring month of 1920 got together just before dark one evening and decided to utilize the newly built outdoor Fern Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits up to the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Scouts Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the boys? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world and Korea; now prominent druggist, late Mayor of Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale hardware king merchant; and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions about the man who was found marooned on a beach in northern point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Digby County. When I read this man's tale, and then read and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

"Jerome" appeared to have been a man of some considerable social standing and, possibly, of some considerable wealth. However the way the man could or would ever say after being found and cared for by some family in the French shore was, something that sounded like the story of a hero. He either would not, or would not, write anything about who he was or why he was left there. Well, it was, and is, one of Digby County's best kept secrets, and, different ideas have been put forward over the years concerning this man. However, the name of "Mac" was, I felt no urge to write anything about different about this man. Digby 172 Years Ago

From the files of the Courier of January 22, 1861, the following account has been compiled concerning Digby in 1861.

I tried to make several calls around town, spent most of the time at one particular

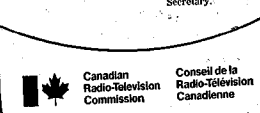

Wharf Repairs To Be Completed This Summer

It took about twenty minutes past the scheduled time of 7:30 Tuesday evening to get the eleven members present to constitute a quorum for the April meeting of Digby Board of Trade. Also, numbers slowly diminished around nine o'clock, primarily because of a televised hockey playoff game, meaning that a quorum no longer existed. It was mentioned by Ernest Ryan, president, that at least five other meetings were being held in town at the same time, which also assisted in the small attendance.

William Troupe reported for the tourist committee. He said a recent meeting in Annapolis Royal with tourist and recreational people in the western valley was well attended and most beneficial. He said there are hopes of the Basin Tourist Committee receiving a government grant and discussed their proposed tabular guide to be circulated this summer.

Troupe thanked the Digby Trade Board for their donation of funds to supply letterheads and envelopes for the Basin tourist organization.

Mike Cane, chairman of the Ports Committee, said that a

Gets Two Years

Preliminary hearings were held in August and September 1972 and the case came before Supreme Court in Digby beginning on Monday, April 2, Twenty-eight witnesses had been heard by the Supreme Court jury, found the verdict on Thursday morning and sentencing was on Monday April 5.

Bridgetown Centre Reopens

Mr. C. Roy MacIsaac, President of Mental Health/Annapolis County, told the annual dinner meeting of the association that he was happy to announce the reopening of the mental health centre in Bridgetown, which had been closed for several years.

Mr. MacIsaac made the announcement in introducing Dr. Kareem, newly appointed Medical Director of the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board, to the meeting. He stated the centre would be open for the present on a one day a week basis.

Dr. P. H. Townsend, Administrator of Mental Health Services for Nova Scotia, who was guest speaker at the meeting, told the gathering the Minister of Public Health had given assurance he would apply for funds to expand the service equally to the two other counties when the Board was able to secure the additional staff required. It was noted efforts are under way to recruit to secure the staff requirements.

Victor Cardozo, President of

Mental Health/Nova Scotia, was also a speaker at the annual session. Mr. Cardozo introduced Dr. Townsend and also spoke at some length regarding the work of the provincial mental health association.

In his remarks, Mr. Cardozo said he believed the efforts of Mrs. Maxine Hennessy, convener of the White Cross Committee; Mrs. Faye Hall, who headed the branch annual financial campaign; and Miss Donald Fraser, information officer for the Annapolis County branch.

In commenting on the presence of a number of young people at the dinner meeting, he stated Annapolis County might establish another "first" by becoming the first mental health association in the province to organize a junior branch or auxiliary.

Digby Music Festival Held

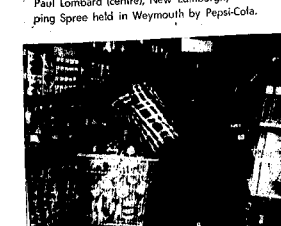

Weymouth Wants Reading Specialist

James Hamscombe, supervisor of Weymouth schools, requested the Digby Municipal School Board, to engage a reading specialist for the school if possible. This was also concurred by Jack Ritchey, supervisor of curriculum for Digby County schools.

Mr. Hamscombe, in presenting his report to the Board on Tuesday evening, reported that only two students had left school this year completed with 19 in the previous year.

The resignation of Mrs. L. Hamscombe, teacher, was respectfully accepted by the Board for the end of the term.

Mr. Hamscombe in his report said that a survey had been made and about 150 of the 700 Weymouth students came from an abnormal home environment. This in some

measure accounted for reading difficulties and for the necessity of two guidance teachers.

Mr. Hamscombe also requested a minor change to the school, especially with the new wing having been recently completed. It is expected to be complete in May.

Mr. Ritchey also requested that another teacher be added to the staff of the Digby Neck Consolidated School.

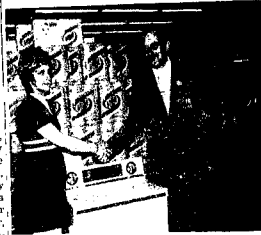

CONTEST FOR JUNIOR HIGH STUDENTS

A province-wide essay contest for Junior High school students in Nova Scotia has been announced in connection with the first annual commemoration of the life of Joseph Howe.

Howe, Nova Scotia's famous statesman, politician and journalist, died in 1873, one hundred years ago.

The essay contest is for the top three essays written by junior high school students on the theme: "Joseph Howe and the Freedom of the Press".

The contest, designed to increase students' knowledge of Nova Scotia's history and the importance of the press, will give them an opportunity to learn more about one of our great Nova Scotians who was an editor, politician and statesman. His vision about the future of our province would enhance the progress of the province and the importance of the press in that area.

First prize for the winner of the essay contest will be a trip to Ottawa for two via Canadian National Railways. Second prize will be \$100 and third prize, \$50.

The essays must be between 1,500 and 2,000 words in length and must be postmarked no later than June 1. They may be either typewritten or handwritten, but all essays should be double-spaced.

Students submitting essays should mail them to: Home Essay Contest, MetroMedia Committee, c/o 1823 Hollis St., Halifax, by June 1. Further information about the contest, as well as basic research material, may be obtained by either teachers or students by writing to the above address.

The life and work of Joseph Howe is to be commemorated in a variety of ways throughout 1973. Tree-planting ceremonies are to be held in June and a Joseph Howe Festival is to be held in Halifax October 5 to 8.

Beta Sigma Phi Chapters of Halifax-Dartmouth are co-ordinating the fall festival under the sponsorship of the Nova Scotia Department of Tourism and the Halifax Visitors and Convention Bureau.

Representatives from Halifax-Dartmouth newspapers, radio stations and television stations have formed the "Freedom of the Press" media committee as part of the Joseph Howe Festival events.

The province-wide junior high school essay contest is one of the media committee's projects for the Joseph Howe Festival. Other projects will include panel discussions in schools and tours of the various media, all centred around the "freedom of the press" theme.

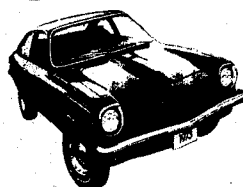

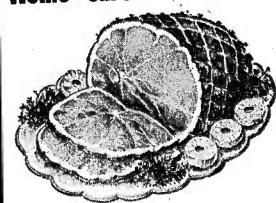

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Casey's Comments

One of the accomplishments of the Liberal government of the province of Nova Scotia during the recent sitting of the House of Assembly was the awarding of special assistance to all persons over 65 who are in receipt of guaranteed income supplement benefits from the federal government.

Under this assistance a single grant will be made in May, 1973. This will be made to persons who were in receipt of guaranteed income supplement for March, 1973. The amount of the grant will be related to the amount of the guaranteed income supplement.

There are 51,000 people in Nova Scotia receiving the guaranteed income supplement because of limited income and resources. It is to help ease the plight of these people that the province of Nova Scotia is giving the grant which will be a single payment amount. It has been estimated the grant will cost a total of \$2.2 million dollars.

I am happy to state that the grant has been called for the paving of two sections of road in the electoral district of Digby. The roads for which tenders have already been called are the Lansdowne road, where 3.8 miles is to be paved, and the New Road at Weymouth North which is to be paved its full length of 1.8 miles.

The sitting of the House of Assembly this year was the

longest in recent history, a total of 62 days. I feel that many items of important and beneficial legislation were passed. Other bills were left for study by committees that will continue to meet between sessions of the House. These will be dealt with by the legislature at a later sitting.

The announcement by the Highways Department regarding the new bridge for Weymouth was welcome news indeed. The new bridge, which will replace the existing structure in the village, will be of reinforced concrete on pile foundations with pre-stressed concrete girders and aluminum railings. There will be four spans of 64 feet each.

In order not to impede traffic while the new bridge is under construction, a Bailey bridge will be provided to carry the traffic while the new bridge is under construction.

The new bridge is to be paved its full length of 1.8 miles.

Several new rose bushes are planned for the Admiral Digby park site for spring planting and petunias will replace damaged roses at the Loyalist Cemetery.

Films were shown by Mr. Morton of different types of the speaker said, as well as the appearance and value of the property.

The answer to a beautiful and attractive home, he said, begins with the landscaping, setting a guide-line to meet the standards of the design with plants, trees, shrubs and materials being carefully chosen.

Suitable trees frame a house and brick and stone-work add a special addition to the overall picture. A medium size home would require smaller trees and shrubs at a back ground, while a larger home would need larger trees and shrubs to give a balanced attractive appearance to the property.

Evergreens and shrubs provide privacy for an outdoor living area or swimming pool, the speaker said, as well as giving shade and color to the surroundings.

To obtain the greatest satisfaction, trees and shrubs should be chosen with the help of an accredited nurseryman, be of the highest quality and be well planted in properly prepared soil with good drainage. The final results will more than repay for the time and expense involved in making a home and property more attractive.

Most shrubs should be transplanted early in the spring, some can be planted in the fall, while evergreens can be done at any time. Good soil is needed, using peat moss or a small amount of bone meal, well mixed with the soil, can be used.

Several new trees and shrubs in various colors have been developed in the past few years, such as an interesting species of maples, and several types of semi-trees and shrubs. March sun and wind will often damage evergreens.

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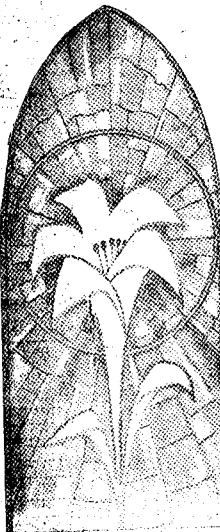

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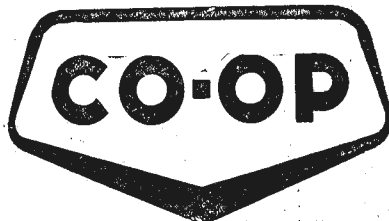

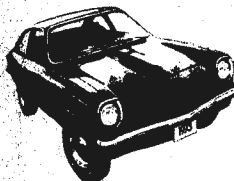

Important

It is important. It is so important that it could involve \$50,000 of your money.

Tonight the ratepayers of Digby will be asked to approve the proposed borrowing by the town of Digby of a sum not exceeding \$850,000 for the purpose of constructing, altering, extending or purchasing materials, machinery, implements or plant deemed required or advisable therefor, or for maintaining public sewers or drains.

About fifty attended an information meeting held last Thursday evening and received satisfactory answers to their questions. With more time to study the issue these same people will more than likely have more questions to pose before they mark "for" or "against" the proposition outlined above. There must be a few hundred other people who are interested in wanting to make their decision by finding out answers to puzzling questions. Tonight is the night to iron them out before the vote is taken. Remember, whoever is there will cast your vote for you no matter how you think. So be there.

The cost factor, of course, is the serious part of the proposition. Unless you are at the meeting you will not hear

that the Provincial government through the Water Resources will give up to twenty percent of the capital cost for collection and treatment of sewage. The federal government will loan two-thirds of that cost and totally forgive 25 percent of the loan. Besides, a special fisheries grant of \$40,000 is obtainable, making an estimated total of \$214,000 obtainable through grants or loans by government agencies. By estimating about \$76,000 for frontage revenue the actual amount to borrow on term financing is reduced to \$560,000.

Against this borrowing must be weighed the evils of raw sewage running in ditches and dangerous to the health of children and adults. Sewage untreated and running into the water at the shore is dangerous for bathing and for the fish industry, particularly the shellfish industry. In fact, a good sewage system is one of the good factors in drawing industry of any type to an area. It is a protection for tourists who visit us as well as ourselves.

These are but a few ideas relating to the meeting to be held tonight to get permission for you to borrow \$850,000 through the town of Digby. Isn't that important to you? You can answer one way only. Yes, important.

Proclaimed Holiday

By order of mayor and town council, Easter Monday, April 23, is declared a civic holiday. "How much weight did those words hold? Why was it proclaimed? Was anyone obligated to keep the holiday or was it immaterial? Then why proclaim it? Why not let those who feel they can afford to take a day off just do so."

Easter Monday holiday in Digby always did seem superfluous and we have mentioned that before. It always made a good day for people to go outside of Digby to shop, for rarely was there another town or village or city where better Monday was declared a holiday.

This is not the first year that some

stores in Digby disregarded the Easter Monday holiday proclamation, but this was probably the first year that the proclamation was disregarded by anyone who helped to proclaim it. In all there were seven or eight places down town beside the entire new Mall which did not observe the 1973 Easter Monday holiday in Digby. We can see their point too. Has anyone ever figured up what a business pays out every year for non-productive holidays and sick leave? Just use an easy figure like ten on a staff. Sure, when a holiday is proclaimed, all employees feel entitled to it. Another year it might be well to ponder the necessity of an Easter Monday holiday before it is proclaimed to be disregarded.

It was Monday, and I was doing the week's wash. My feel, resplendent of being forced into a space too small for them, had burst their confines, and flapped happily beyond the frayed toes of my old blue sneakers. Clothes, sorted into piles of roughly similar colours, haphazardly shared the kitchen floor with hampers, boxes, and sock bags garnered from the bathroom and various bedrooms. Under the washing machine, the usual Monday morning puddle was forming, elongating, and beginning to trickle through the piles of clothes.

Into this state of chaos came the brush salesman. I did not particularly want any of his wares, and I certainly did not have time to look at his catalogue. I told him, "That was alright, he said, 'leave it and come back tomorrow. The catalogue looked like an Easter card, with purple, yellow, and white crocuses. I propped it against the sugar canister on the kitchen counter."

In the afternoon, when the dishes were done and a fair degree of order had come to the kitchen, I set at the table with a cup of coffee, musing on my activities for the coming week. Should I write a column? About what? I allowed my mind to rove the kitchen, free as a sociating, sink, stove, refrigerator, mouse, window, floor, table, dishes, catalogue — a column about this and that.

That, I thought, should dig out his very soul. I fancied posing my cleverly framed questions to him over a cup of coffee in my sparkling kitchen the following morning. Then, to reward him for his co-operation, I would pertinently purchase one of his products, even though I would not want it.

It snowed on Monday night. On Tuesday, the snow was still blowing, and it was bitter cold. Tuesday is ironing day, but I still had a bunch of dark clothes which I had not got around to washing on Monday, snuggling in the bottom of a hamper. I set the ironing board, arranged jeans, socks, and T-shirts in piles around the board, and began running water into the brush salesman. Panic! I remembered my date with the brush salesman that I overheard me. I fervently hoped that whoever it is who protects hard souls in messy kitchens might take pity on me, and not let him come.

The first load was in the dryer when the doorbell rang. In a paroxysm of hope, I went to the front door, knowing that the brush salesman would probably come to the back one. The mailman was coming up the walk. "Did you ring the doorbell?" I asked. He said "No," which was very restrained of him, considering the illogicality of the question, when he had not yet reached the door. I took my mail, and went, reluctantly, to the back door.

(Continued from page 1) If the borrowing is approved the work can be done in three phases or as one complete phase. By the former local businesses could tender for the job.

Others who spoke at the meeting were Dr. Vernon Ridout, Provincial Health Officer; Arthur Cruise, Water Resources; Dr. Robert Cook; John MacNeil, Department of Industry; Dr. John McCleave, local health authority; Joseph Casey, M.I.A. and Deputy Mayor Paul Winchester, chairman of the town sewer committee.

Dr. Cook and Mr. MacNeil both reported on the bacterial index found in the Annapolis Basin area, especially close to Digby, which is detrimental to human health and to the valuable shellfish source both commercially and for pleasure and also for swimming and other water sports.

In answer to a question from C. C. MacInnes, it was found that clams can clear themselves of bacteria in a week to 14 days if the water is clean and no more disease is allowed in the vicinity. Mr. Casey estimated that 1,023 acres of clam beds in the Annapolis Basin had been closed. Mr. Cruise also reminded the audience that treatment requires waste treatment facilities to establish in an area. He said that there are now 300 treatment plants in the province. Training courses are being set up for operators of the plants.

Those expected to be at the meeting tonight are R. Rowe, manager of Nova Scotia Resources Commission; Mr. Casey; Dr. Cook; Dr. Ridout and Dr. McCleave. It has not been confirmed if Hon. Glen Baginell, minister in charge of water resources or Hon. Scott Macbain, minister of health, will be present.

Casey's Comments

Last week, in company with four other Members of the Legislature, two of them Cabinet Ministers, I went to Ottawa to meet with officials of the Department of the Environment (which I still think of a good deal of the time as the Fisheries Department) and with the Minister of Public Works.

We presented a strong case for the fishermen of the province, particularly in connection with repairs and new construction of federal wharves.

In addition, we also urged the reduction of the 50 mile limit for offshore lobster fishing. We also discussed at great length scallop regulations for the Bay of Fundy.

Since our return home it has been announced that there is to be no size limit on scallops in this area. A closed season will go into effect from May 1st to October 1st along a seven mile stretch from Sandy Cove to Parker's Cove. This will leave an area from Sandy Cove to Whipple Point on Brian Island open.

It was felt this could be used by the smaller druggists. It has also not been fished to any extent for a number of years.

The new regulations make it mandatory that the fishermen stow their traps below deck while crossing a closed area. While this is time consuming, it is felt by the people in the Department that it will make for more effective enforcement of the regulations.

I feel our meetings in Ottawa were good. Much was accomplished and they also served to keep the lines of communication open between Halifax and Ottawa.

It was my pleasure a few days ago to attend the official opening of the new Pentecostal Church in Digby. This is a fine structure and the officials and congregation are to be commended for their dedication and resolve. I was much impressed also with the official opening. My good wishes go to Mr. and Mrs. Tapley and to the people of this church.

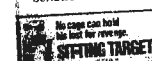

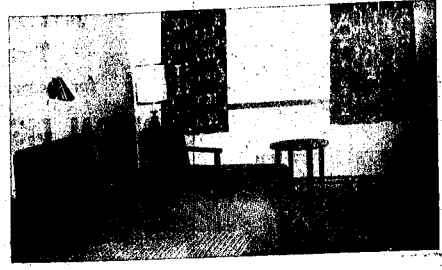
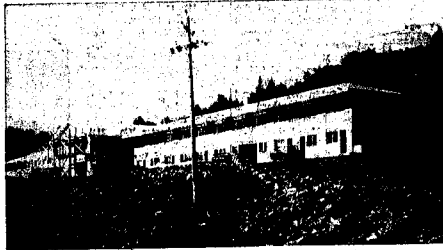

immediately following the council's session to work out plans for garbage disposal.

A letter was read to the Council regarding Capital Grants Program received from Mrs. Garrett Brown, in charge of the program. The Capital Recreation Grants has been in force for the last few years. The first year the sum of \$200,000.00 was set aside for grants and over one and one-half million dollars was requested. The second year the amount of grants available was raised to \$500,000.00 and over two million dollars in grants had been requested and in 1972 one million dollars was set aside for grants. These grants are to be used for developing of facilities such as athletic fields, playgrounds, tennis courts, recreation centres, and community recreation centres. The department is in the measure of need, planning and local support provided.

Clare as a special grant. Other payments will be made in September and November. The total amount to be granted will come out at \$13.00 per capita. 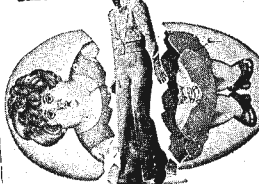

CHANGES, NEW REGULATIONS HEALTH SERVICES TAX ACT

Amendments to the Health Services Tax Act, passed during the recent session of the Legislature, are now in effect. The changes in the Act cover prepared meals during the week-end.

PREPARED MEALS - Effective May 1, 1973, the provincial sales tax is not applicable to the sale price of a prepared meal of \$2 or less. Previously each prepared meal over \$1 was taxed.

INDIANS - Effective May 1, 1973, the provincial sales tax is not applicable to the sale price of goods purchased and delivered to an Indian living on any reserve provided the Indian name is included in the Band list provided under the Indian Act. The procedure for vendors to follow relating to the recording of these sales will be forwarded directly to them by the Provincial Tax Commission.

CHILDREN'S CLOTHING - A Regulation effective April 3, 1973, to alter the definition of children's clothing was passed by an Order in Council which specifically exempts from the provincial sales tax children's clothing up to and including the following sizes:

Safety The Key-word

Several events cause us to turn again to safety as a subject for an editorial. The saddest happening was that of a child being cautiously put into a playpen to protect it from the highway or other difficulty. The playpen unexpectedly and unknowingly became a danger.

Then the cautious driver we saw the other day averted an accident when he slammed on his car brakes to avoid hitting a young child who had unthinkingly passed in front of him.

We attended a meeting of Emergency Measures Organization on Tuesday where evacuating children from a certain burning building was thoroughly studied. It made us think of the recent Weymouth school fire and how tragic it might have been had the practice of fire drill not been so well stepped into the school students. Evacuation in 59 seconds is to be commended and shows the advantage of determined safety measures. Our thoughts went further to homes where children live and we wondered how many parents ever practice fire drill and use of safety escapes for the benefit of the children and others in their homes. This is a practice so often neglected, yet could be the means of saving lives.

Then so frequently we encounter children on bicycles who seem to be all

oblivious of other means of traffic, like automobiles, and merely ride on their way. Here is need of a two-way safety precaution. Both vehicle drivers must be cautious of the other and especially the car driver whose years of experience should have taught him that children so frequently but unconsciously throw caution to the wind and act on impulse.

Another holiday is approaching. Not everybody will use Victoria Day to plant shrubs and trees. Many will take to the highways in a rush to get to a holiday destination. Some drivers will be dangerous to the road because of drinking. R. W. Trollope, president of an automobile association, stated to news media representatives recently that the drinking driver and the inconsiderate driver are the major cause of traffic accidents. He stressed the need for an all out effort on the part of each family member to contribute to highway safety over Victoria Day holiday.

Of course we must also take caution with swimming and boating as these summer pleasures become prevalent once more.

Safety should be the key-word in every instance of work and pleasure at the summer season and holidays approach.

Old Style Fun

Several valley communities have recently added some real old style entertainment to their social calendars. The most popular of these new-old forms of community entertainment is the Box Social.

The Box Social probably originated in the mid-1800's as a Pie Sale. The women of the community would take their social calendars. The most popular of these new-old forms of community entertainment is the Box Social.

Towards the end of the century the community pie sale had grown into a major event in a new format and was called a Pie Social. The new features of the Pie Social attracted the younger, single members of the community as well as the successfully "married" couples. Each woman baked and decorated her favourite pie and donated it to the community. An auctioneer then auctioned the pies to the men. The single men often bid fiercely against each other for the pies baked by the married women. The money earned went to the community, the pies to the men, and the pride of having stimulated exaggerated prices to the women.

The Pie Social changed its format between the two world wars and evolved into the Box Social. The Box Social has remained basically the same ever since.

The women made a boxed lunch, donated it to the community organization sponsoring the social. The men would bid on the lunches that evening at the home of the town elder, usually the eligible bachelor with his grandmother, mortician with the obstetrician's wife. Most of the young men regarded the chance purchase of an unmarried woman's lunch as a pleasant obligation to escort the lady home.

The Box Social is rapidly regaining its former popularity and it is easy to see why. Good cause, good company, good food and good fun can lead to it all.

Board Hesitant On Ritcey's Metric Proposal

Although Jack Ritcey, supervisor of curriculum for Digby County schools, advised the Municipal School Board on Tuesday evening, May 8th, that it would cost only about \$100,000 to start the primary classes in the metric system when school opens in the fall of 1973, the Board was hesitant to make a commitment despite Mr. Ritcey's seeming urgency in the matter.

Eventually the Board approved of the proposal, but felt that he should make a more concrete presentation on detailed plans to introduce the system before committing themselves. Mr. Ritcey urged for Digby school to be pioneers in using the metric system and not wait for these schools which he knew are not interested and show a reluctance to the system.

Several teachers from Digby County schools, along with Mr. Ritcey had recently attended a conference in Halifax on the metric system and found the method much easier than linear measurement. The teachers, he said, are anxious to begin the metric measure in the primary to Grade III.

E. C. Edwards, inspector of schools, attended the Board meeting and advised that leadership would come from the department of education. He remarked that Willie Hall, Halifax, formerly of Digby, is a member of the metric commission recently set up. In his report, C. C. Macdonald advised that Mrs. Katie Daley had been employed full time in the Barton school, which gives greater opportunity for teachers to give more individual attention to students, and more remedial help. Mr. Ritcey felt this could pave the way for the metric system to be introduced in the Digby schools.

Mr. Macdonald recommended an additional teacher for the Digby Normal Consolidated School and the Board authorized the secretary, under guidance of the supervisors, to inform the Department of Education.

(Continued from page 1) vernments play in the Canadian society and in particular to the implications of this for the Maritime Provinces. Thereafter, strong pressures exerted by the larger and richer provinces in favour of substantial autonomy and provincial fiscal independence. This could have serious implications for the Maritime Provinces which depend so heavily on contributions from the federal government.

In explaining the function of the Maritime Council of Premiers, Mr. Gallant made it clear that the agreement provided for the Council to be authorized to undertake operations only if the three governments are themselves authorized to undertake those same operations.

Some objectives of the Council, Mr. Gallant said, are to enable the Maritime Provinces, by pooling their limited resources in certain areas to develop more effective

ive policies and programs based on studies encompassing the region as a whole; to co-ordinate the activities of the three governments in order to eliminate unnecessary and wasteful duplication of efforts where possible so as to bring about better and more efficient public services available in the Maritimes, at lower costs to the taxpayers and to strengthen the voice of the Maritime Provinces in their relations with the federal authorities and other jurisdictions.

Mr. Gallant was introduced by Sister Hannah, vice-president and thanked by Ernest Ryan, president.

Mr. Ryan conducted a short business meeting following the address. Among the items of business it was decided to remove a Board of Trade, Digby direction sign from the old Smith's Cove to the new highway and approval was given to the acquiring of another sign at the cost of five dollars. (Continued from page 1) and international politicians are doing, the most sensational events, activities in the big city halls, and the performance of professional sportsmen in the big leagues," Mr. Gibson noted.

Community newspapers, however, he said, can tell you in detail what is going on in your own neighborhood. New developments in printing technology have removed many of the problems faced in the past and in all, "it must be a very exciting time to be in community newspapers," he said.

The CN assistant public relations manager also spoke of the problems faced by Canadian National in explaining its role in the Atlantic Region.

He said CN has the responsibility to operate as a business and has made an operating profit in all but four of the fifty years it has been in existence. All of the profits, however, go toward paying off the interest on a long-term debt inherited by CN from its predecessors in the early days of Canadian railroading.

On the subject of freight rates, Mr. Gibson said that much of the revenue is pumped back into the regional economy. "In this region we have a payroll of 16,700 and they receive \$140 million annually in wages and fringe benefits. In the past three years, CN has purchased

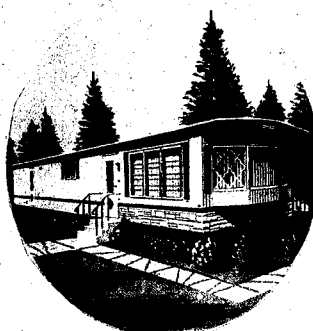

Restrict Haddock Fishery

J. E. Creeper, acting regional director of fisheries, department of environment, Marine Region, has announced that the haddock fishery in the ICNAF (International Convention for the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries) Division 4X would be restricted as of midnight, May 2nd. From May 3rd on for a year to be determined period of time, Canadian fishermen will only be permitted to land per trip catches of haddock not exceeding 15,000 pounds or 10% by weight of their total catch, whichever is greater.

The ICNAF haddock quota for 4X is 9,000 metric tons as of date 4,651 tons, 52% of the quota, have been taken. These landings represent a 70% increase over the rate at which haddock were landed in 1972 when the fishery had in fact closed in late October. It has therefore become apparent to the department that should the fishery continue unrestricted, the quota would be reached in May.

In making this action, the department hopes to delay the need for a complete closure of the fishery and thereby avoid the resulting economic hardship that many segments of the fishing industry in southwestern Nova Scotia would suffer from an early complete closure. It must be recognized, however, that even with the restricted fishery for haddock, the quota will undoubtedly be approached before the end of the year and a closure of the fishery will

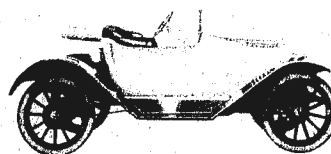

"Let's go to the restaurant at the shopping centre," suggested his majesty as we got back into the car. The restaurant at the shopping centre is big, bright and bustling. The tables, covered in gleaming white cloths, have chairs on only one side. On the other side, they are pushed against immovable benches which line the wall. It is exactly the kind of place which did not appeal to my romantic mood.

"I wonder if that Mexican restaurant is full," I ventured. The man in my life flashed me one of those withering looks husbands reserve for wives who start talking about redecorating the kitchen just at the moment Bobby Orr gets the puck. French-speaking people. This year we had students from 21 different high schools; there are only four French-speaking ones in the province. You cannot build a new college overnight. I asked for five years and the public and governments must give us five years. However, the people of the area must pull together. The college is important to the economic life of Southwestern Nova Scotia and it can be of service to every group in the community. We need to be of service, particularly to the French-speaking communities. The college needs not only

the moral support, but the financial support of the public. One area that we need to increase is our bursary program. We must provide more funds for scholarships and bursaries.

I wish to point out also the need for a closer look at our educational set-up in the province. It has become almost imperative that the government, through the University Grants Committee, or other means, look at too much duplication. One area that the college insists on having a say in is the field of bilingual education. The college wants a say in teacher training as it pertains to language teachers and we are proposing a B.A. in

Education for this purpose.

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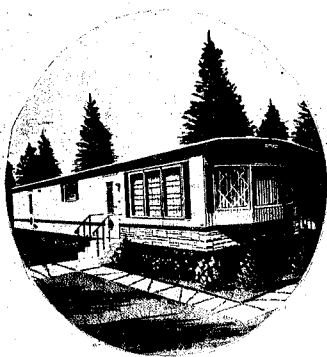

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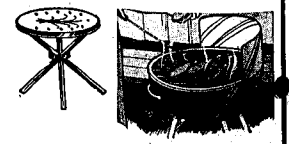

If improvements can be made along this line a higher price can be realized for the ever decreasing supply of fish. The increased selling price should be worth it.

While there we heard an oven bird, several smaller birds, flushed a ruffed grouse, examined a squirrel's nest and a crow's nest.

Several pictures were taken of the flowers, a real rewarding trip.

Sunday is to be liberation day for the six orioles which have been with me all winter. They will be banded and records kept of the numbers on the bands. They have been kept until now so there would be some protection in the trees and more insects flying for food. If you see a streak of gold and black you will know it is one of them. I am going to miss their cheery song.

The beautiful shad-bush, erroneously called wild pear by most of us, is coming out now and for the next two weeks will make our country roads even more attractive. Its reddish brown leaves mixed in with the shades of greens and the striking blossoms of the hobbles form a lovely roadside garden.

Pickles, Pearls & Postcards

My dentist is an admirable man. My children and I. They walk into his office, laughing, with less apprehension than they would have going to the store for a loaf of bread. I regard them with respectful amusement. At their age, I went to the dentist kicking and screaming.

I still kick and scream, not because the dentist hurts me, but because when I come out of his office, I am stripped of both the illusion and the pretenses that I am a young woman.

"It could be that people, like horses, show the age first in their mouths—I suspect that no fashion, make-up, and no coy references to "when I was a child" can conceal a woman's true age from her dentist.

My dentist proved it the first time I went to him. He examined my teeth, ducking as he did so, about the "eight and a half pounds of silver" with which they were laden. He poked at my gums with a sharp and unpleasant instrument. "You have to be careful here," he warned. Keep them cleaned and brushed. At your age gum disease can set in very easily." I realized with a start that I was on the way downhill. That was the first time anyone had ever used the words "at your age" to me meaning as old as you are, not as young as you are.

My mouth has not grown younger during the intervening two years.

I went to the dentist last Thursday to have a tooth repaired. I had broken the tooth, I insisted, somewhat to the dentist's disbelief, on a piece of cheese. His faith in my veracity was in no way enhanced by my claim that I had broken the same tooth, in a different place, only two months before, while eating a piece of fudge.

"Well," he said, a little dubiously, "I've had lots of older people tell me they've broken a tooth eating bread and jam. I used to argue with them, but now I think perhaps just tell them to be careful here," he said. They probably break them on something hard days before the damage shows, then they set something soft and sticky and the piece comes out."

"Teeth weren't meant to carry much weight," he continued, "and you must admit, yours are carrying a pretty heavy load of fillings."

I submitted patiently to this indignity, because I preferred not to have a large chunk missing from one of my teeth. The dentist fixed the hole, then, as dentists do, continued to prod around my mouth, muttering unintelligible comments as he did so.

Finally he said something I could understand. "Have you ever used dental floss?" he asked. I admitted I hadn't. He handed me a mirror so I could watch him show me how to use it. It was a magnifying mirror, which cruelly exposed every enlarged pore, every hair growing under my eyes, and those light blue lines around my mouth, which I had been pretending did not exist. "You have to get down near those gums," the dentist said, manipulating the dental floss. "When you get older, that's where the decay starts."

I nodded. He gave me a friendly pat on the shoulder. "All done for now," he said. "Keep me brushed. Remember they're a lot further apart than they were when you were fifteen."

Casey's Comments

I was privileged last week to represent the Premier in welcoming the Captain and crew of the good ship Holero on her visit to the Port of Halifax.

The Dolero is a good ship and well appointed, a real luxury liner. The only thing I found wrong with her is that she is not using the Port of Digby as her Nova Scotia terminal.

In seriousness, however, we in Digby should be giving consideration in our long range planning for a direct sea link with United States ports. Our present terminal could become a common-user dock, used jointly by the ORP and other lines.

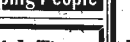

On Shipbuilding

Occasionally today, flaws in the shipbuilding operation will be detected but neither were ships immune in the early 1800's to careless builders. This is evidence in a letter from a marine surveyor in England to Captain J. W. Abbott of Newcastle, N.S., later of Barton, Digby Co. until his death a few weeks ago. The ship Coquitlam City was in question in a letter handed The Digby Courier by Mrs. Bradford Wood, Conway.

The surveyor reporting on the wooden ship, which had trouble and many repairs within the space of two years, gave the reasons (a) that the timber used in building had been insufficiently seasoned (b) six inch spike nails were used in place of three inch bolts giving a general weakness.

The surveyor, in his letter, claimed he had never seen a ship so shoddily built. So strong was the letter that it suggested the party or parties who sent the ship to sea be tried for manslaughter. The letter advised Captain Abbott that if he had experienced a long continuation of rough seas the vessel would have broken up like a pack of cards.

The third neglect was in the caulking. The hull from stem to stern, the surveyor claimed was badly caulked.

He continued "If your vessel had gone to some port in Australia, the builders and those who sent the ship to sea may have got such a pounding by way of exposure that they would never have the face or hide to talk ship-

Leave Fawns Where They Are

There are occasions when kindness kills and instances where this is happening in relation to the province's deer population frequently come to the attention of the wildlife division of the Department of Lands and Forests.

Pawning season in the province is in late May, June and July when some people enjoying a wilderness walk sometimes feel compelled to adopt an "abandoned" fawn or find in the woods. In the vast majority of these instances the fawn is not abandoned but temporarily separated from the mother doe which is feeding in the area.

The fawn with its large eyes, appears as a bundle of helplessness in the woods, but unlike its mother has not developed a fear of humans. When it is picked up and taken home by a well intentioned person it often dies of dysentery or the scours since only a special formula can replace the nutrition and protection from disease that a doe's milk provides.

Staff of the wildlife division, who are often called upon for advice in these situations, advise the public to leave fawns where they are.

Under statute it is illegal in Nova Scotia to keep fawns or any other forms of wildlife in captivity.

A short while ago I was privileged to take part in the god turning ceremonies, marking a start on the construction of 30 more units of senior citizens' housing in Digby. As was mentioned at those ceremonies, the provincial government is assisting financially in this development and will continue to give assistance to the town or the municipality for the development of needed public housing programs.

While I am happy to report that spraying will not be carried out on the railway right-of-way in our constituency this year, I am disturbed that the railway will continue the practise elsewhere in the Valley. The Minister of the Environment has warned, however, that the railway will be held responsible for any damage to private property resulting from the use of the chemical spray.

As readers are no doubt aware, a moratorium has been declared by the province in the use of chemical weed control pending the outcome of in-depth research and study on the effects of the use of these chemicals on the environment. Future developments will be determined by the results of these studies and research.

Scallop Fishery Restrictions Announced

HALIFAX. — A freeze on Canada's east coast offshore scallop fishing fleet and a limit on the size of scallops taken in the fishery went into effect June 1. This was announced by the federal Fisheries and Marine Service. Both measures are intended to protect valuable scallop resources concentrated on Georges Bank south of Nova Scotia. Fishing industry representatives and vessel owners have been consulted on plans for their implementation.

No new vessels will be permitted entry into the scallop fishery after June 1. The fleet now totals 72 vessels, 15 of which are new entrants within the past two years. There has been marked increase in interest in the fishery following a rapid rise in scallop prices. In one area, prices jumped from \$1.08 per pound in 1970 to \$1.75 this year.

Size restrictions on scallop catches are set at a maximum of 60 "meats per pound" (the number of scallops needed to yield one pound of scallop meat).

Introduction of these measures is in conformity with commitments made by Canada to the International Commission for the Northwest Atlantic Fisheries. In the case of scallop sizes, the limit of 60 meats per pound represents the first stage in a planned program to reduce the number of small scallops taken in the offshore fishery.

Canadian druggers had an average of nine million pounds of scallop meat, worth \$15 million, from Georges Bank annually.

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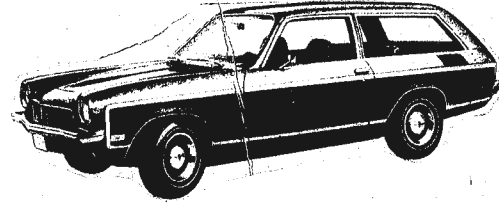

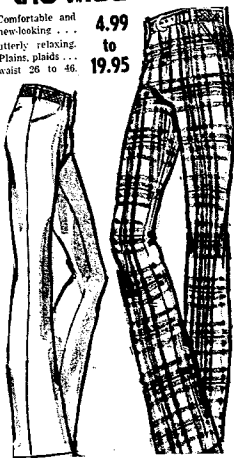

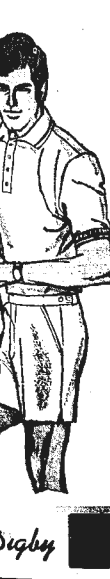

OFFICIAL OPENING OF BEAR RIVER BRIDGE MONDAY

Two years ago in April, a dynamite blast on the west side of Bear River marked the beginning of a new 2,000 foot bridge over Bear River. On Monday at three o'clock p.m., government dignitaries, municipal authorities and the public in general will gather at the bridge for the official opening. It was on December 18th, 1972, when the bridge was completed and first opened to vehicular traffic.

Technically known as "precast, posttensioned, segmental construction", the Bear River Bridge is more simply described as a concrete cantilever bridge that is designed to handle traffic on a long sweeping curve across the river at speeds up to 60 miles per hour.

In addition to two 12-foot traffic lanes, the bridge has a five-foot sidewalk on the north side. Two-foot alum-

um guardrails mounted on an 18-inch concrete base run along each side of the structure.

The construction technique used in building the new bridge is new in North America although the principle has been used in Europe for some years.

The new bridge has 153 interlocking segments which were pre-cast on the construction site early in 1972. These units are comprised of two end spans of 200 feet each and six interior spans each 205 feet long.

The pre-cast units were assembled in pairs, one on either side of each pier. In this manner, the balanced cantilevers extended out from the piers eventually being joined by the casting of a "keystone". Continually cables are threaded through the units and tension to make them act as a continuous span.

It is estimated that the Bear River Bridge project created one million additional man-hours of local employment during its 19-month construction period, with labor expenditure representing 36 per cent of the total cost.

New President Optimistic

Newly elected president of the Nova Scotia Dental Association Dr. D. Alan Stewart said at Mountain Gap Inn, Smith's Cove on Friday evening, June 1st, that Nova Scotia can look forward to a year of improvement in dental services. "Recent announcements of government financial assistance in dental man power and a greater projection of preventative dentistry gives us reason to be optimistic," he said.

Dr. Stewart said from inquiries he has made at this year's graduation dental class he considered that Nova Scotia would have at least fifteen new dental practices established in the province next year.

He added that the association had advocated for a number of years the establishment of a children's dental care programme. "It is a great step for the government to have taken to include free dental care for 5 and 6 year olds. Hopefully additional age groups will be added in the future years."

The association president said that dentistry really is a "drill and fill" profession that will not solve dentistry's dilemma, and that only through patient education and the philosophy of aiding people to help themselves prevent dental decay will dentistry gain significant ground.

Presentations honoring significant service to the association were made to Dr. G. Pente, Halifax, registrar of the provincial dental board of Nova Scotia 1968-1972 and Dr. D.C.T. Macintosh of Halifax, secretary of the Nova Scotia Dental Association from 1967 to 1972.

President of the Canada Dental Association, Dr. D. K. Peters, St. John's, Newfoundland addressed the delegates at a luncheon.

Comeau Relieving In New Brunswick

Mel Comeau, Canada Pension Plan Field Officer for the counties of Digby, Annapolis and Kings, has returned from Ottawa, where he had been invited to consider the position of Executive Assistant to the Director of Nursing in the office of the Deputy Minister of National Health and Welfare.

The position, however, was not enticing enough to encourage Mr. Comeau to leave his present position.

There is the feeling that much needs to be done in Mr. Comeau's three counties to ensure that everyone entitled to apply for Canada Pension Plan Retirement, Survivors or Disability benefits does so.

Mr. Comeau is presently in Saint John, N.B., replacing the two field officers from that district office who have been transferred to other offices. He is also to manage the affairs of the office while the manager attends a Prince Edward Island conference.

It was in 1874 on May 23 that a bill was passed by parliament which created the North West Mounted Police. The bill was given royal assent on August 20, 1874.

Sir John A. MacDonald, Canada's first Prime Minister, defined the North West Mounted Police as a semi-military body whose immediate objects would be to stop liquor traffic among the Indians, to collect customs duties and to perform the normal duties of a police force. Basic pay would be 75c a day and a minimum service would be three years.

At the outbreak of World War I in 1914 the forces strength stood at 1268 officers and men. It was early in that year that responsibility for enforcing all Dominion statutes throughout Canada was invested in the Royal North West Mounted Police which at the same time was given its present name, Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

R.C.M.P. served in duties with customs and excise and with the department of marine and fisheries until 1920 when the force's jurisdiction extended to all Canada including Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

COMPULSORY INSPECTION MOTORCYCLES and TRAILERS Effective Midnight, June 30, 1973

In accordance with subsection (3) of section 179 of the Motor Vehicle Act, the Minister, on December 15, 1972, ordered that all motorcycles and trailers, except mobile homes being towed to retail sales outlets or to permanent locations shall be tested at official testing stations by midnight June 30, 1973.

After midnight June 30, 1973, all motorcycles and trailers must display the appropriate official inspection sticker.

Motorcycles

Motorcycles, due to their unguessed, will be inspected at specially designated stations.

Such stations will carry the word "motorcycles" under the official inspection station sign.

The following parts of a motorcycle shall be inspected by the official testing station:

- (a) horn
- (b) brakes
- (c) steering system
- (d) handlebars
- (e) suspension system
- (f) frame and forks
- (g) exhaust system
- (h) foot rests
- (i) chain or driveshaft protection
- (j) fuel system
- (k) lights
- (l) tires and wheels
- (m) mirrors
- (n) windshield or windscreen (if so equipped)

Following are stations licensed to carry out inspections by county with appropriate "key" indicated on the left as follows:

School Site Selected In Clare

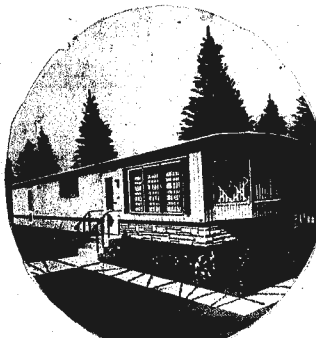

Linemen Reject Offer

Negotiations between the Digby County Power Board and Local Union No. 1770 have come to a standstill over the issue of wages.

At a conciliation meeting held on 22 June, local linemen rejected a package offer of 47 cents per hour over a 24 month period. This would bring a linemen's wages in Digby and area to \$4.22 per hour with a leading linemen getting \$4.57 and a senior reader \$3.83. A linemen with private utilities in the South Shore gets an average of \$3.30 per hour. Existing rates for a linemen in Digby is \$3.75 a spokesman said.

Local linemen are demanding an across the board increase of 46 cents per hour over a 12 month period.

The Digby County Power Board serves all of Digby County and does the construction and maintenance in the Town of Digby, Municipality of Digby including the Islands, and the Village of Weymouth.

There are 3 linemen (including 1 leading linemen) on apprentice and senior level in the Town of Digby, a leading linemen and a linemen on the Islands and a leading linemen, a linemen, an apprentice and two ground men in Weymouth.

Young People Want Meaning And Purpose In Life - Comeau

The population of any region must not be viewed simply as tools in the various phases of the economic process said R. Louis Comeau, President of St. Anne's College, Church Point, when he addressed the Digby Regional High School graduates on Thursday.

He said young people should assure that their lives shall have meaning and purpose and that they count as real persons. Young people's ambitions differ from those of the old generation, because they are tired of conflict and seek above all else to establish warm, sound human relations. They find society at a critical, uneasy point in its history, he continued. They are disturbed by the prospect of a culture. Many of them are seeking the answers to questions that troubled their grandparents. They are asking: How can we get peace, freedom, order, prosperity and progress under the

many states of existence in many nations? How can we enjoy the advantages of a rapidly developing technology without destroying the other values we cherish?

Referring to their graduation day, Mr. Comeau told the students that it is a significant moment when a young person realizes that from here on he will walk his own path and will cope with emergencies as they arise. He cautioned them to make an honest try at finding a purpose in life worthy of you, fitting your intellect and skill. The person who has as his main objectives material things like money, sports cars, deluxe home furnishings and the mass media of Bieck and Ball, has set a low ceiling on his

culture and his intelligence. Having a solid purpose, a sense of wanting to do something to justify your being on the scene, gives your mind unity of drive toward accomplishment. This is fun from the joy-brained idea of a few that think we are here to enjoy ourselves with light pleasures he said. Those phases of life, he remarked, must be brought into balance, physical, mental and moral.

Speaking of education in general and in the South Western end of Nova Scotia, the speaker said that down here in South Western Nova Scotia we do not yet have a total education program.

The people of Digby, he said, just like the people in Yarmouth or Church Point

or elsewhere, must insist that they be served. We must have the facilities, personnel, etc., to provide a comprehensive, educational program. South Western Nova Scotia needs a technical institute which is different than a vocational school and different than a college or university.

Mr. Comeau was thanked by Mary Graham, president of the 1973 graduating class.

Students marched to the platform to strains of music provided by the Digby Regional High School Band under Donald Scott. David Wong presided at the piano as certificates were awarded to the graduates.

Mayor Glen Smith, chairman of the Digby Regional High School Board, presided at the graduation exercises.

He called attention to the fact that this is the 30th graduation at the present Digby Regional High School. Ninety-four graduated in 1973 and in the 25 years more than 3500 students passed through the doors of the building. In reviewing the year the Board chairman noted \$10,000 had been received in scholarships, \$7500 granted to science students under the Department of Youth program, six tours had been taken, five pilot programs carried out, 13 sports championships had been won and Congress prizes received. The Board, he said, is taking a more flexible team approach giving the opportunity of more teacher and student input in the planning.

Kevin also won the Mayor's Scholaristic Cup, the Gidney Memorial Award and the Mathematics prize.

A \$500.00 year renewable Sharp Scholarship and a \$100.00 renewable entrance scholarship to Mount Allison University was awarded to Heather Anne VanVassell.

Heather also won the \$200 and Albert Leslie Fraser bursary of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Linda Louise Ecker was awarded a renewable entrance scholarship of \$600.00 to Mount Allison University. A renewable scholarship of \$500.00 to College St. Anne was awarded to Patrick Kelly. Tony Nelson Kelly was awarded an entrance scholarship of \$350 to Kings College.

Other scholarships included a \$600 scholarship to Phyllis-Bessac for summer school at St. Anne's Church Point. The Nova Scotia Teachers' Union \$200 bursaries

went to Darlene Gayle Sells and Albert Leslie Fraser. Two bursaries of \$150 each from the Knights of Columbus went to Alice Anne Comeau who also won the Dr. Lines Dairon Memorial Award and to Edna Victoria Frost.

the official opening of the Bear River Bridge marks the end of our constituency but we

the completion of a \$3 million dollar highway construction project, upgrading the main highway at the eastern end of the constituency and providing a needed link in the new highway 101.

This new bridge and the recent improvements on the highway from the railway overpass at Marshalltown to the Bear River Bridge have done much to improve highway conditions in this part of the constituency. More needs to be done and will be done in this and other sections of main and secondary highways in our constituency but we

must not overlook the accomplishments that so far have been achieved.

I was pleased to see that the federal Minister of the Environment has taken action to subsidize the building of ice making plants situated in strategic locations around the coast to supply fishing boats as well as fish plants with much needed ice.

I have been pushing for this program for some time and spoke at the meeting of the Maritime Union Committee in Charlottetown on the matter two years ago. This was followed up by a meeting of the three Maritime Ministers of Fisheries and I went to Ottawa where we again took up the matter with the federal Fisheries people.

The Minister of the Environment has stated in his announcement on the ice making subsidy program that it will cost 4.5 million dollars over a two year period. Of the 350 strategic locations selected 32 are in Nova Scotia.

It is my feeling this program is most worthwhile. The

subsidy is to go to fishermen's co-ops, fishermen or fish plant operators and ice will be sold at cost. There is no question we have some of the best fish in the world off our coast. Lack of adequate ice supply has hampered the maintaining of quality throughout the handling and marketing.

The provision of the subsidy can go a long way towards remedying this situation and improving the market quality of our fish as it makes its way to the consumer. This is vitally important as it means not only a better and more attractive product but also the assurance of greater revenue right along the line.

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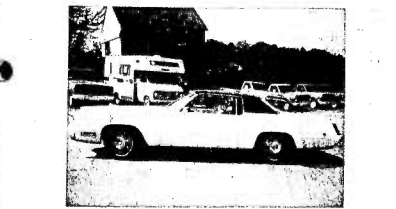

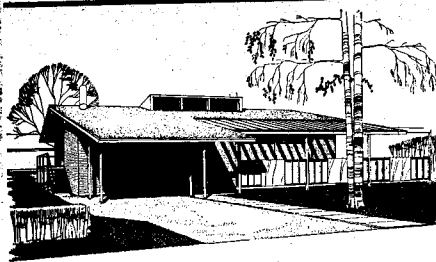

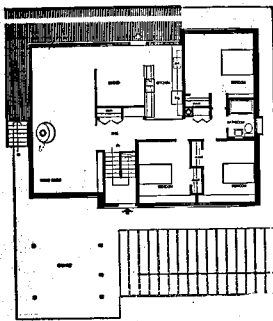

NEW HOUSE DESIGN — This striking bungalow, designed by architect Jacques Vincent of Laval-des-Rapides, Quebec, offers an excellent arrangement of rooms on the upper floor.

The lower level is bright and can be utilized for a variety of purposes. The extension of the roof rafters and a fence in the front of the house provide an attractive outdoor area as does the raised balcony at the rear. The ceiling follows the slope of the roof rafters and a sky light provides a bright bedroom hallway. Because of the flexibility of the use of outside space, the front of the house could face north or south.

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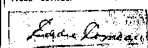
