It was our intention to make something of the event as we turned something of the event as we turned the century figure but being busy with other special issues, short of staff and encountering other interferences, we felt it would be wiser to delay any special issue until taler. After all, we will still be in our 100th year until we, roll into the 101st in August, 1974. It is expected the Digby Courier will recognize its own anniversary somewhere within the next fifty-one issues.

to the mountime it is of interest to in the meantime, it is or integres to go back to September 18; 1874, when the Digby Weekly Courier, an independ-ent newspaper, was founded by Richard S. McCormick, native of Bridgetown. S. McCormick, native of briggetown Unfortunately, Mr. McCormick was kill-ed in an accident and for a short time the paper was carried on by Mrs. Mc-Cormick so that the present editor is the second woman to become editor of The Digby Courier as it is now known. Other editors were Charles E. Farnham, W. T. Ford, Aubrey Fullerton, Oakes Dunham, George Chisholm, Eugene Stratton, R. C. Mills, J. L. Wallis (with J. MacNaughton Wallis fassociate editor) and presently Edith M. Wallis.

The Digity Courier is not the oldes The Digby Courier is not the Jobas weekly paper in the province, nor was in the first newspaper in Digby although it can bosst of the only newspaper in Digby County which continuously published for any great length of time. The first newspaper in Digby was the Digby Athenaeum, established by David Nichol-Athenaeum, established by David Hollandson in \$857, seventeen years earlier. It failed. The Acadian followed in 1859 with Albert Dodge of Annapolis Royal and Ingram Goldney of Sandy Cove as editors and publishers. The Acadian ran until 1863, four years, when fire destrayed the premises.





Monday is Labor Day, the day when school children usually, though reluctantly, say good-bye to summer holidays. It is the weekend that usually finds people making their trek back home. It is the last long weekend for mom and dad before the children's school routine.

Few, if any, will let the day go by unnoticed. Anny will be conscious of Labor Day. The family who had planned these last two weeks for vacation but met up with a railway strike instead will hardly let Labor Day 1973 go by without a thought. Motels, hotels, camping grounds and other catering services, hoping for a bang-up two weeks are too disappointed to forget the name Labor Day and its first intention. There are tourists whose return home trips had to be inconveniently changed. There are those who disappointed with the early unpleasant weather had hoped to benefit during fine weather only to have transportation hindrances. There are businesses dealing in perishable goods who have lost money and other stores whose stocks diminished as the railway strike held up goods. None of these can let Labor Day go by without some serious thought given to the situation and its effect on the entire economy.

The railway strike is not the only sign of labour-management problems on dissatisfaction in the country. In our own little town we've had workers at the Digby County Power Board on strike and forming picket lines. There was a similar instance in Bear River last year. The railway workers had picket lines at the ferry terminal and near the Racquette Road within town. So the dissatisfaction is near at hand. People are expecting that post office employees might go on strike and nurses in Halifax are dissatisfied with their lot. Further away, in Ontario they have a garbage collection strike and likely there are more we haven't read about. Forget Labor Day? It is right before us.

Then there are others who won't forget. Labor Day, Memories are too vivid. They are the people who in 1972 or 1971 or before lost loved ones or friends in a Labor Day weekend highway accident. Highway accidents which kill or main are not forgetten as the anniversary of the tragedy reflects once more the sorrow.





HISTORY MIGHT BE FORGOTTEN

HISTORY MIGHT BE FORGOTTEN

If it were not for humble little publications like community newspapers much of our small town and village history would be forgotten. We were reminded of this most vividly on Friday when someon hand du a clipping from the Digby Weekly Courier of September 1910, just 63 years ago.

The clipping contained a story about the 50th wedding anniversary of the late Captain and Mrs. William Ellis who at that time had been in charge of Point Prim Lighthouse. The part which was most significant to us and which tied in with history was this "It was the subject of this sketch who invented the Automatic Time Steam Whistle, the second one ever manufactured still in use at the Point Prim son shore and on board many ships". The article continues "In July 1887 he discovered a comet which is now known by all astronomers the world over as the Ellis Comet."

is now known by all astronomers the world over as the Ellis Comet'?

Descendents of William Ellis, the inventor, and Mrs. Ellis are living in the area and without a doubt they have heard of their grandfather, great-grandfather or great-great-grandfather and his in-vention of the automatic time steam whistle and his discovery of the Ellis Comet. There are others who have not heard of the Ellis invention. It was almost a

have not heard of the Ellis invention. It was almost a hundred years age for William Ellis took command at Point Prim on March 8, 1875.
Captain Ellis was born in New Brunswick and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ephraim Ellis of Digbv. The anniversary story gives some family geneology and names his sons and daughters (15 in all) and states that in 190 there were 28 grand children and two great grand children.

Another bit of history kept alive through a community newspaper. Otherwise it might be forgotten.

The first issue of The Digby Courier in offset (except for about three issues some five or six years ago) came off the press last Thursday. Several people called to tell us how they liked it. Some did, some didn't. That was to be expected. It had departed somewhat from its usual look but so had The Digby somewhat from its usual look but so had The Digby Courier of the past 25 years departed from the look of those in the early 1900's. We got used to it and we'll do it again. The back pages of Marie Nightingale's OUT OF OLD NOVA SOTTA RITGHENS, published in 1970, contain a wealth of recipes for the kinds of tonics, restoratives, and cures some people were conoccting in their own kitchens, back in the days when others were buying Warner's Safe Cure, and O Glory Oil.

But homemade medicines were not at all peculiar to this part of the world. I was leafing, the other night, through my dog-eared copy of CHINESE COOKING MADE EAST by Isabelle C. Chang, when I happened upon a section of remarkable recipes for Chinese transcs. N.S. Municipalities Support Ferry Resolution

The Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities in conference at Halliax during the past week supported a resolution placed by Mayor Gles Smith, Digby deploring the reduction of service proposed by the Canadian Pacific Railway for the Princess of Acadia ferry across the Bay of Fundy to Digby.

Digby.
The CPR had announced its intention of reducing the trips to one a day effective October 28. one a day effective October 28. The move was an effort, the CPR reported, to reduce substantial losses (one million per year), which have occurred since the shop went in operation in 1971. There was fear that the ferry service between Dighy and Saint John might be cancelled entirely. The Acadia has

been running three trips a day during the summer seasons. The resolution passed at the Union of Nova Scotla Municipalities Conference was as follows: "whereas it appears that the present Digby-Saint John Ferry Service may be curtailed and whereas any such redwork would have disastrous cuthack would have disastrous scotla, by it resolved that the Union of Nova Scotla Municipalities deplores any such reduction in service and unges the CPR and the federal and provincial governments to take all necessary steps in clake all necessary steps in the service and ungest the CPR and the federal and provincial governments to take all necessary steps in clake all necessary steps in the service and the serv urges the CPR and the federal and provincial governments to take all necessary steps in-cluding subsidization to maintain the present lack of ferry service between Digby and Saint John'. Attending the meeting were Mayor Smith and town cour-

ciliors Mrs. Ina Dillon, Willard Kinney and Joseph Hattle.
The federal government has not been paying a subsidy to the CPR to operate the Princess of Acadia while it does pay subsidies to other public and privately-owned ferry services. The federal government built both terminals at Digby and Saint John when the new Princess came into service in 1971.

Warden Ronald Morehouse, on behalf of the Digby Municipality, forwarded a delegram to the Minister of Transport, urging that sub-sides for the CPR be con-sidered in the operation of the Princess of Acadia on the Buy of Pundy service from Digby to Saint John.



CP Rail To Change Transport System

Several from Digby attended a transport meeting in Summerside, P.E.I. when Federal Minister of Transport, John Marchard emphasized that the ferry service between Saint John and Digby on the Bay of Fundy would be maintained. The CPR service is being examined and the lindings made known in a few weeks. The amouncement came after concern was felt he week previous that the Princess of Acadia runs between Digby and Saint John would be cut back to one trip a day and possibly cancelled endicely. The Princess of Acadia has been making two trips a day during the winter and three trips during the summer.

Mr. Marchand also announced the revised system of freight rate subsidies on the west-bound fleight. The subsidies west-bound fleight. The subsidies very continued to the existing 30 per cent. The extra subsidy will be paid through primarily fish and approxibural products and manufacturing goods. The existing 30 per cent will remain for commodities not qualifying for the 50 per cent.

A new transportation system which will provide better service for shippers and receivers throughout most of Newa Socialia is being designed by Canadian Pacific Railways, a CP spokesman announced. Starting in mid-December of this year, Dominion Atlantic Railways and CP Rail customers will have a choice of two through-systems, each via a single mode of transportation. G. E. Benth, CP Rail's Atlantic region vice-president said the new arrangement means that traffic which previously arrived at Saint John, N. 

EDITORIAL

EMPHASIS ON CHILDREN WITH LEARNING DISABILITIES

On October 18 to 20, the Association for Children with Learning Disabilities for Nova Scotia will hold a conference in Hallfax. The Conference is open to all who want to learn to understand, recognize and help the learning disabled. This includes parents, teachers, social workers, guidance counsellors, physicians, psychologists, administrators and students.

physicians, psychologists, administrators and students.

Children with learning disabilities have, during the past few years, received more attention and rightly so. In Digby special emphasis is being put on this phase of education by giving teachers an opportunity to prepare to cope with these disabilities which are really not related to retardation as we think of it. The Mental Health-Digby organization has taken a forward step in preparing teachers for their special task by sponsoring a conference here a year ago and also by providing three bursaries for teacher training in this special field of education. They are to be commended. They have seen the potential of each child who has had his disability recognized and ability are sometimes wasted because no one has ecognized some area of disability. It is well then that parents and teachers in particular make an effort to understand these children by attending conferences and reading material related to this special area of child education.

Quoting from the Association for Children with Learnine Disabilities. "From 10-20 necroent of our

and reading material related to this special area of child education to the Association for Children with Learning Disabilities. "From 10-20 percent of our children impossible with the special properties of learning disability, the kind of thing that is still often called "Jaziness", "lack of attention", "stupidity", or just sheer "badness". We should know enough now to understand that these are often symptoms of a learning disability which is no fault of the child. Often it is quite subtle. For instance, word blindness, or dyslexia, has nothing whatever to do with a child's intelligence, but is an inability to relate the written word to the object it represents."

As these disabilities are recognized and attended to there will be less waste of human resources and the whole country will share in the benefits from greater contributions made by each to society. Recognition and attention to these disabilities lessens the hardship of the individual himself in attaining his goals in life which is the important factor to be considered.


