"Mac" intended to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Swims Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Earl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world war, Ketchikan, was awarded the Victoria Cross; Sargent L. Kottman, was awarded the Victoria Cross; for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby Wholesale Importer and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day I was asked to contribute about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did and read at least two somewhat different versions of the man who was found marooned out at sea off some point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Dublin County. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students and myself, which was "J.J.'s" daughter, Florence, that Mrs. Morton of Tibet, Prescott, Digby Co. With a majority of some 1161 votes, Joseph Casey won the Digby constituency over Jack Nichols in the provincial election on Tuesday. Latest reports showed 3523 votes for Casey, Liberal; 1580, Nichols, Progressive Conservative and 234 votes for Caleb Haight, New Democratic Party. Liberals in Nova Scotia obtained 31 seats, P.C.'s 12 and N.D.P. 3.

In the Clare district Benoit Comeau, Liberal, defeated Vincent Doucet, P.C. The N.D.P. candidate was Jean Belliveau. Scott MacNutt, Dartmouth, a former Digby native, lost the liberal seat in that constituency to Roland Thornhill, P.C.

Building Booms In Digby

With seven building permits granted at the regular meeting of the Digby Town Council on Monday evening there is indication that Digby is in for another building boom. Permission was given to Murray Trask of the Stelmur Manor to erect another apartment building on St. Mary's Street across from the Evangeline Shoppers Mall. It will be electrically heated.

Douglas French, proprietor of Admiral Digby Inn, was granted permission to erect a three story, eighteen unit apartment house across from the Digby R.R. School playing field. The building will be of brick veneer.

Fraser and Bell Contractors were given permission to build a house on Queen St. other building permits granted were to Mrs. Olive Hazellon, Second Avenue, on a lot 75 by 117; Lloyd Thibodeau, 83 Sydney St., pre fab house on a lot 83 by 125ft., Co-Op Housing; Arnold Trask on Lighthouse Road on property referred to as W. Hayden Property and to Arthur Johnson to erect a home on Queen St. 24 by 44 ft. on a lot 67 by 113 ft.

The seven permits were granted under existing conditions and in compliance with the National Building Code.

The new set of by-laws in relation to building in the Town of Digby was approved by the Council on Monday night and is awaiting approval by the Department of Municipal Affairs. The by-laws expect the building inspection to report to Council on a monthly basis rather than annually, new buildings must be connected with adequate water, sewer and electrical systems and commercial buildings have special fire protection clauses. The building inspector, it is understood is in authority on the building in the town.

Much discussion arose on the habit in Digby to begin excavation and building before permission has been granted by the Council. The new by-laws provide a maximum fine of \$5.00 per day for that purpose.

Council approved of an agreement with the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and the provincial government to erect another Senior Citizens apartment building of twenty units on Victoria St. A waiting list of tenants for the Senior Citizens homes exists, it is understood. By regular motion the town will loan \$10,000.00 to the Town and Municipal Housing Corporation which controls Tidewater Terrace, the Home for the Aged and Infirm in Digby. The municipality and town, each had advanced \$10,000.00 when the Home was constructed and this will be renewed to

assist the finances of the Home presently. There are now 44 guests of the the maximum 55 at the Home until complete physical accommodations can be supplied but the staff accommodation is ready for the maximum number of guests. It is understood that there will be an increase in the diem rate for accommodation.

Our plane left Halifax on Tuesday, March 18. Seventeen Digby Regional High School students and our chaperone, Mr. Clyde Boudousingh were on our way to Paris! Jocelyne Le Blanc, Joy King, George Woolaver, Bruce Marshall, Debbie Van Tassel, Anne Comeau, Dale Simpson, Brenda

Walker, Barry Parker, Meredith Cleveland, Willis Payson, Mitchell Ryan, Willeen Henshaw, Glen Hall, Linda Jayne, Ricky Amero and Penny Height made the group. The students said the most exciting feature of their plane ride was dawn filling the sky with pink and blue streaks as they flew over the Atlantic.

"We arrived in Paris on a gray Tuesday morning. The group stayed at Hotel de la Cite Rougemont, a comfortable but dreary old building, as are most of the buildings in Paris. On the first day we had a little trouble to get our travellers' cheques cashed, because the banks were on strike. Eventually, we discovered an American Express office and our money worries ceased.

On Wednesday morning we went on a bus tour and visited Arc de Triomphe, Tour Eiffel, Notre Dame, Obelisk of Luxor (Egyptian needle). We drove down the famous Champs Elysees, Place de la Concorde and many other places. In the afternoon, we had a cruise up the Seine river. We saw the French Mint, Pompadour's palace, the smaller Statue of Liberty, the place where Marie Antoinette was kept imprisoned before she was beheaded in Place de la Concorde, and we saw many historical bridges as our guide told us the history of each.

On Thursday we went to Chartres Cathedral. The high, stained glass windows and forms of architecture were very interesting. On the walls and ceilings were paintings and sculptures. Our guide explained that each represented a story taken from the Bible, which she related to us.

In the afternoon we went to Versailles. This was a highlight of the trip. Because of the gold fixtures and priceless items, gigantic tapestries, we came to better understand how the French Revolution came about. The waste yet glory of the palace was fascinating. The gardens were magnificent, in

the middle of which were two artificial lakes!

Friday we visited Les Invalides. This was a hospital Napoleon Bonaparte built for his soldiers who could never lead normal lives. We saw a light show with taped voices that re-enacted some events in Napoleon's life, in which Napoleon himself was telling us as he was lying in his tomb next to some of his famous soldier heroes - Marshals: Hugo, Voltaire and other Kings.

On Saturday we visited Le Louvre. We saw many priceless works of art, including Winged Victory and the Mona Lisa! Although we spent four hours at this great museum, we couldn't have hoped to see it all. Our guide informed us that if we spent every day of our life studying at the Louvre, perhaps we might see everything!

On Sunday we visited Fontainebleau, a hunting palace that was used by Napoleon. This excursion was an hour and half drive and we saw a good deal of the countryside. Strangely, we saw a lot of farm land, yet no farmhouses or homes for the farmers!

The group did not really enjoy French food, as they do not believe in cooking their meat very well. It seems the rarer the meat is, the more nutritional value it has!

On our last day, we took the Metro (subway) to the Champs Elysees and strolled past Place de la Concorde, the Tuilleries Gardens, fountains, etc.

Every one of us has learned a lot from this experience. History may be learned out of a book, but actually seeing the history enables us to understand the facts, and creates an impression that will never fade, especially when our books are closed.

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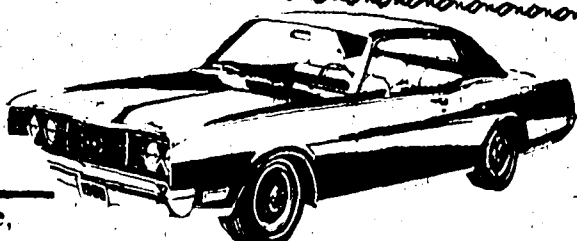

Grant For Treatment Plant Assured

Assurance that a provincial grant of \$111,000 for the sewage treatment plant for Digby will be forthcoming, despite an extension of the town's deadline for project completion, has been given by Environment Minister, Hon. Glen Bagnell, it was stated here by Joe Casey, former provincial member.

Mr. Casey stated he had received a copy of a letter to the Digby Town Clerk from Mr. Bagnell, stating the grant of \$111,000 will still be available for the construction of the town's project during the next fiscal year.

The letter from Mr. Bagnell is as follows:

Dear Mr. Pitman:
With reference to your letter of March 7, concerning your proposed sewage treatment plant, this is to confirm that I have been in communication with the Department of Municipal Affairs to authorize the extension of your deadline to complete your sewage treatment project.

This grant of \$111,000. will be available for the construction of your project during our next fiscal year ending March 31, 1976.

The Premier has personally announced recently that an extra \$6.00 per capita will be available to be applied towards capital projects in every municipality so this will provide some additional assistance to your community as well.

In the Premier's most recent announcement, you will have learned that a direct rebate will be made to the municipalities to be applied towards property taxes which will reduce them 25 percent and in addition, over the coming three years, the balance of the cost of education, about 65 million dollars, will be removed from the property tax payer at the Municipal level. This will free up and provide additional monies for such projects as you are now planning with the sewage treatment project.

As the result of the special fisheries grant, the Municipal Affairs grant and the additional monies which you are to receive, your community will have received by far the largest special consideration of any municipal unit in this Province towards its proposed sewage treatment plant.

Thank you for the tremendous co-operation which I have had with your Town during all of our negotiations and I look forward to serving you in the future.

Movie Review

JESUS CHRIST SUPERSTAR

The last days of Christ on earth were the basis for the successful rock opera on Broadway which ran nearly two years. Tim Rice provided the gives "Superstar" much more eye appeal. Jewison as director (he also produced the film with Robert Stigwood) let the youthful cast interpret the gospel in an exuberant way. All of the dialog is sung by performers who are unknown to film audiences. Three of the original cast members repeat their roles: Hawaiian-born Yvonne Elliman (Mary Magdalene), Bob Bingham (Caiaphas) and Barry Dennen (Pontius Pilate). While there obviously is a ready market for the Universal release, more conservative patrons may have to be sold on the film's merits. Several of the songs have become standards - the title number, "Everything's Alright" and particularly "I Don't Know How to Love Him" - and most are performed with large production numbers. Only Joshua Mostel's "King Herod's Song" can really be called irreverent. Ted Neeley is a visually perfect Christ.

The rock opera tells of the last seven days of Christ (Ted Neeley) as interpreted by a group of young people who arrive in the Holy Land by bus. There are modern touches in the weapons used by the soldiers, but the dress is traditional. Jesus is chastised for his kindness to prostitute Mary Magdalene (Yvonne Elliman). High priest Caiaphas (Bob Bingham) and aide Annas (Kurt Yaghjian) realize that Jesus is a threat to their existence with His Teachings. A disciple, Judas (Carl An-

derson), is persuaded to betray Jesus and feels he's really helping to fulfill Christ's Destiny. King Herod (Joshua Mostel) ridicules Jesus, who is flogged by orders of Pontius Pilate (Barry Dennen). The crowd demands that Christ be crucified and Pilate washes his hands of the matter. Judas hangs himself.

HIGH PLAINS DRIFTER

For his second starring and directing assignment, box-office champ Clint Eastwood has attempted a western with psychological - if not mystical - overtones. The Ernest Tidyman screenplay combines plot elements used notably in Audie Murphy's "No Name on the Bullet" (1959) and harking back as far as William S. Hart's "Hell's Hinges" (1916) and the violence associated with today's oaters. With a strong cast and Eastwood in full stride as an avenging angel (or devil), the Malpaso Company production looms as a big moneymaker for Universal. The small town which was constructed on the edge of California's Lake Mono - near the Sierra Nevada Mountains - has the right feel to it, that of a community which sprang up overnight to cash in on a lucrative gold mine. The violence borders on the sadistic, as a marshal is bullwhipped to death in a recurring scene, but there is an allegorical point to the film which more discerning viewers will appreciate. Eastwood has a fondness for familiar old faces, giving particularly good roles to mid-

get actor Billy Curtis and old "Rawhide" (TV) teammate Paul Brinegar. There is no wasted footage, as Eastwood systematically destroys the town. In Panavision and Technicolor.

Clint Eastwood rides into the oceanfront community of Lago, controlled by gold mine owners Jack Ging and Kitchell Ryan. The townsfolk share in the guilt of Marshal Buddy Van Horn's death by bullwhips wielded by Geoffrey Lewis and cousins Anthony James and Dan Vadis. The three, troubleshooters for the mine, are now in jail. Eastwood kills the three new hired men, then rapes volatile Mariana Hill. Since Lewis is due to be released, the citizens ask Eastwood to protect the town from his vengeance. Taking over, Eastwood makes fools of everyone: he replaces ineffectual Sheriff Walter Barnes and Mayor Stefan Gierasch with midget Billy Curtis, rapes Verna Bloom - wife of hotelkeeper Ted Hartley - and prepares a welcome for Lewis. Ging tries to kill Eastwood, but meets death at Lewis' hand. Although drilled by Eastwood, the citizens allow Lewis to take the town - now painted red and renamed Hell. Eastwood kills Lewis and men and Curtis saves him from Hartley. Leaving, Eastwood tells Curtis he is the reincarnation of Van Horn.

Fury," which may cause a bit of confusion. NGP has another Lee epic on its schedule, "The Iron Hand," which was previously distributed by Pagoda Films as "Fist of Fury." It was decided to use that title for this film, which ironically is nowhere near as entertaining as "Hand" - "Fists." Reasoning behind this move may just be that "Fists," the current release, is bound to do good business and "Hand," a better picture, will benefit that much more when the market is apt to be overcrowded with Oriental fisticuffs. Regardless of the artistic merits of these films, Lee emerges as a strong personality who will build up an equally strong following. Produced in Hong

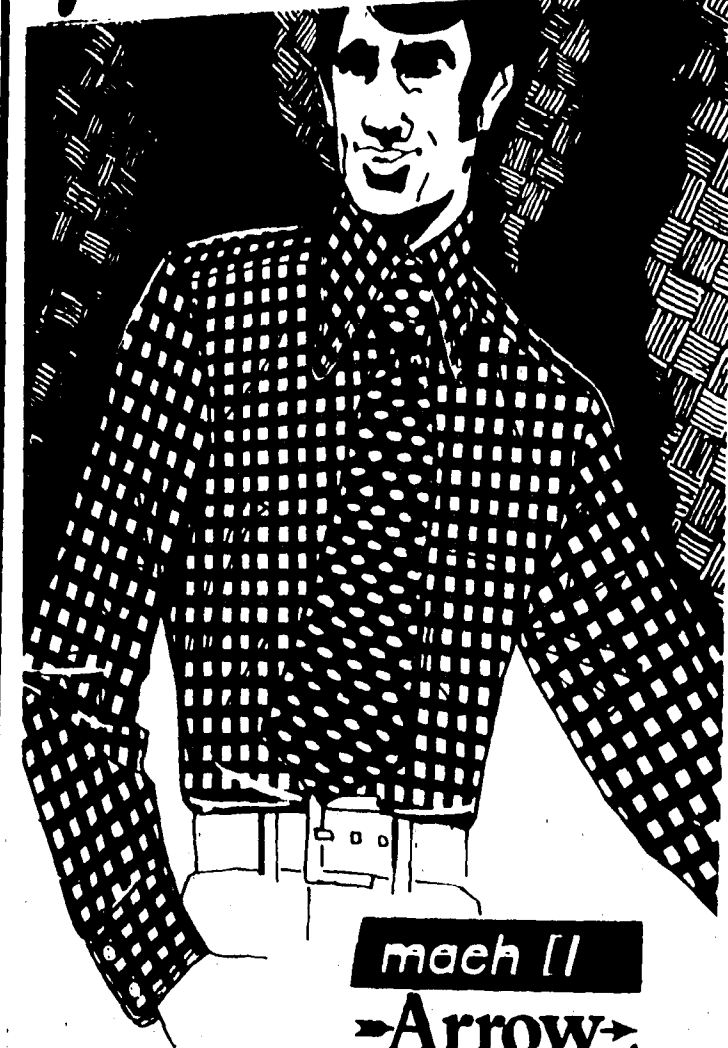

(And, at that, it's coming from an area which should be leading in progress.) The announcement seems to take the edge off the purpose of our Digby "clean up" project.

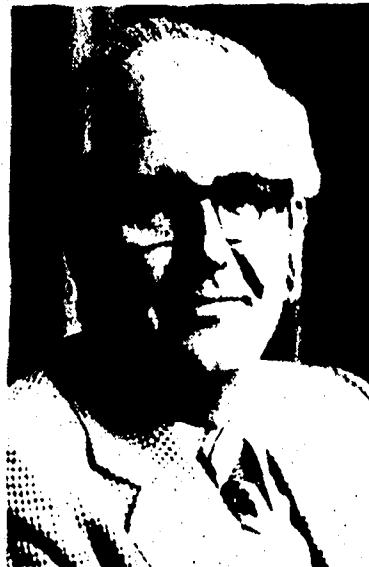

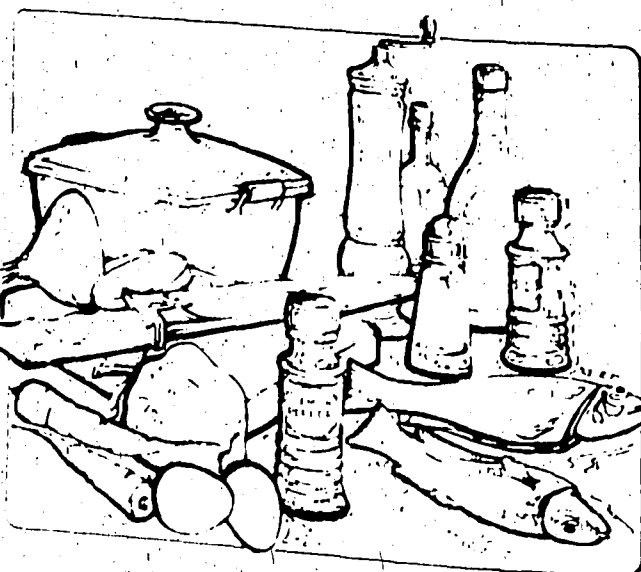

Fire Protection Trustees Named

John Campbell, Adrian LeBlanc and "Chub" Connell were three trustees named on Thursday evening when citizens of the Marshalltown area organized for fire protection. The area embraces the west side of the main highway from the town limits at Seafood Car Hop to main highway 1 and 101, including the Cross Road to Digby Neck at Alden Smith's both sides 101 to west end Marshalltown at Catholic Church, both sides Marshalltown Road to main highway at underpass, also Digby Neck Cross Road at Perry's Canteen and all of the old highway 1 in Conway area to the south, all Jordantown, both sides of the Hillgrove Road from Hillgrove to Fred Haight's and Acacia Valley.

Nine were present at the meeting called by Councillor Helen MacNeil to explain that the Digby Volunteer Fire Department would give the area fire protection in 1974 for \$800 and the following year it would be raised to \$1000 per year. With a government grant to offset eighty percent of the \$800 cost and approximately 277 families in the area, Mrs.

MacNeil figured this would amount to only one dollar per person per year. She explained further that besides the money there must be a petition that at least seventy-five per cent of the households want the fire protection. Most persons present felt that one dollar per person was very low cost "fire insurance" and most people would be agreed to have the protection. Some said they were willing to pay more than the one dollar.

Those who were named to do the collecting and circulating a petition were Mrs. Wilfred Sibley, Mrs. John Weir, Mrs. Lillian Robinson, Mr. LeBlanc and Robert Wilson. Jack Nichols acted as secretary of the meeting presided over by Mrs. MacNeil.

Mrs. MacNeil advised that after this year the money for the fire protection could be done by taxation on residences and collected by the municipality who will pay the town for the services. Usually, Mrs. MacNeil said about two percent is figured for collection purposes. Any extra money can be used to provide water dams, it was noted.

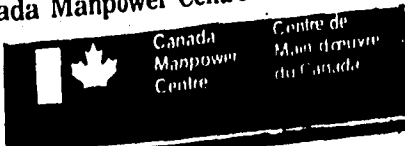

Developing Use of Uncommon Fish

The Nova Scotia Department of Fisheries is actively promoting the development of several underutilized sea products, Fisheries Minister A.M. (Sandy) Cameron announced today. He stated that preliminary surveys indicate that potential markets exist for Silver Hake,

Sea Snails, Mussels and Rock Crabs.

Silver Hake, also known as Whiting, is a member of the Cod family and is presently being by-passed by the province's fishermen. The minister said a chartered trawler recently returned from the Scotian Shelf and that samples taken by it are being studied and evaluated for potential product lines in both domestic and export marketing. Foreign trawlers have been harvesting Silver Hake with the Russians taking an estimated quarter million tons in 1973. "Sea Snails (Welks) are also showing promise. Marketing research by the department indicated the existence of export potential to Japan and the Far East," Mr. Cameron continued. "Brined Canned Snails recently tested in Japan have met with encouraging response and commercial processing activity is expected once Federal inspection studies pertaining to harvesting are completed," he added. Canned Nova Scotia Mussels are now undergoing marketing survey in Toronto. Raised and harvested at the Musquodoboit Harbour Provincial Experimental Station, these Blue Mussels are "pearl free" while "unfortunately the natural growing stock in our coastal waters are not." "It is interesting to note," Mr. Cameron said, "all mussel brands on the Canadian Market have a foreign origin." Referring to the Rock Crab the minister stated that both quality products and markets are being sought. The department's research programs are being co-ordinated by J. Stuart Macphail, Director of Resource Development.

Get Contracts

Anna Enterprises Ltd., Deep Brook and J. Philip Belliveau, Belliveau Cove, were granted federal contracts for the repairing of furniture at CFB Cornwallis. The Deep Brook contract is for \$20,000 and the Belliveau Cove one is for \$10,000.

The Inquiry team divided their probe into a two-pronged look at non-prescription drugs. The first part of the research aimed at the over-the-counter drugs that may be harmful to human beings through self-abuse or

because the product is improperly doing more than it might be saying. The second part of the research tests the efficacy of the products.

On the list of drugs that are investigated are: A.S.A., possibly, according to Jack McGaw, the most potentially dangerous non-prescription drug available on the market today, nasal sprays, kidney pills, cough medicines, sedatives and mouthwashes.

They are all part of a multimillion dollar a year business. "Too many people," says Jack McGaw, "are popping pain killers, night time sedatives, cold remedies, using nasal sprays and laxatives and are psychologically if not physically addicted to the use of these pills and potions, yet these products are sold over the counter. We can safely say that some of the drugs on the market are potentially dangerous and we are questioning why they are so freely available and being sold in variety stores, supermarkets, and department stores as well as drug stores, and why, at the same time, many other products that don't do a thing are being sold in the market."

"We are providing a sharp focus for some information that has been around," continued McGaw, "and we are bringing it together with our own intensive original research because I suspect there is a large social injustice here. Many people are being duped."

Invisibility involves Dean Jones in various misadventures during the course of this Swiss-made comedy, an Italian-German-Spanish co-production dubbed in English for the American family trade. The star of many Disney films in the last decade Jones is an

engaging light comedian whose name will help sell the K-Tel presentation. Screenplay by Oscar Saul and Mary Eller, the film is set in Geneva and provides a fresh background for the slapstick doings. Jones has a nude scene when he returns to visibility at one point when his clothes don't become visible, and later, garbed in a dress he put on as the first available piece of clothing, he explains, "I'm only trying to keep up with the times." Anthony M. Dawson (Antonio Margheriti) directed at a fast pace. Produced in Techniscope and Technicolor, the film has an international cast: Ingeborg Schoener is the shapely heroine, co-producer Carsten has a supporting role, Gastone Moschin plays a broad comedy part and Alan Collins (Luciano Pigozzi) displays a Peter Lorre-like presence as a comic menace. The film has some solid laughs for adults, offering even more for the small fry.

At the Geneva Institute, American Dr. Dean Jones is researching a cure for the common cold when a colleague from India sends him a bottle of liquid with the power to turn any human or animal invisible. With an accidental dose, Jones is able to follow his rich rival Gastone Moschin and the girl they both love, chemist Ingeborg Schoener. By annoying Moschin at a night club, Jones causes a fight among the patrons which leaves the place a shambles. The effects of the liquid wear off after awhile, so Jones makes sure that he stays invisible long enough to investigate a plot to steal the formula for Virus D. Behind it is Amalia De Isaura, a tiny woman who is Moschin's mother. Schoener is told by Jones that Prof. Roberto Camardiel, developer of the virus, is a prisoner in De Isaura's museum. Insp. Franco Ressel pursues as Schoener is taken prisoner and Jones uses his invisibility to help round up the gang.

Class Of '44
If "Summer of '42" was one of 1971's top hits, then its sequel has a good chance of making it one of the better releases for '73. As sequels go, the new film-produced and directed by Paul Bogart—is rather quiet and uneventful at times. It does a good job of recreating the late war years and the PG rating can open up a brand new audience which may have missed the R-rated original. The three leads are the same as before: Gary Grimes, sensitive and intelligent; Jerry Houser, the comic type as girl crazy as ever and Oliver Conant, the misfit. Only the latter seems to

be progressing as a character and here he's incidental to the plot. Herman Raucher, author of the first film concentrates his screen play on Grimes' adjusting to college life and finding a girl his own age, Deborah Winters. The ending leaves the way open for yet another sequel, one dealing with the boys as returning veterans. As a picture of College life, "Class of '44" is a nostalgic reminder of our not so distant past. Grimes and Sam Bottoms (younger brother of actor Timothy) are both maturing as performers. STARRING: Gary Grimes, Jerry Houser, Oliver Conant, Deborah Winters, William Atherton, Sam Bottoms.

In the graduating class of 1944 are buddies Gary Grimes, Jerry Houser and Oliver Conant. A shy, introverted type, Conant joins the Marines as a means of

asserting his manhood. Rather than enlist, Grimes and Houser enter college. Grimes meets Deborah Winters, a rich girl who immediately begins an affair with him. Ever the comic, Houser joins the inept football team and then learns his much older girl friend is a prostitute willing to share her income with him. For this, he's expelled. Grimes neglects his studies for the love of the hedonistic Winters. For her, he joins a fraternity he has no interest in and cheats on exams for the first time. Everyone else cheats, he learns. Having trouble with unwanted roommate Sam Bottoms, Grimes learns that his father has died of a heart attack. After the funeral, he and Houser—stationed with the army in New York—drink to Grimes' father. A fight ensues in one of the bars

V.O.N. FOR 53 YEARS

It would be impossible to keep up with writing about every week of the year which demands observance and so we slipped up on Health Day and Health Week which was recently observed. In fact we might call April health month.

In recognizing Health Week, though past, we think of the many institutions of health care in our midst, medical centre, hospital facilities, mental health, retarded children care and other services. Among the other services has been the care given for 53 years by the Digby Association of the Victorian Order of Nurses. Such a long term of service deserves recognition and the work done by this organization deserves some publicity.

True, in Digby Town and County the V.O.N. work since February 1973 has been integrated into the Public Health service. This integration was a pilot project for the province designed to provide family centred care and continuity of health services. We understand the project is quite successful. Nevertheless, the Digby V.O.N. continues to operate with a band of a few faithful workers constituting the Board and who have seen fit, after years of financial hardships, to extend services into Annapolis County as far as Middleton. This area contributes its share to the overall financial obligations of the Digby Victorian Order of Nurses. Despite the pilot project in Digby under government sources, there are expenses which must be met by the Board so contributions are always gratefully received.

What does the V.O.N. service offer? It is chiefly a service of nursing care in the home and of nursing supervision of patients in the home. The nurse counsels and directs the formulating of nursing care plans so that the family can cope with situations between the nurse's visit or after it is discontinued. Fees for service have always been based on ability to pay and this arrangement continues in the Annapolis section of the Digby V.O.N. territory.

Nursing care in the home consists of bath care, daily activity, exercising, crutch walking, injections, dressing, blood pressure and pulse readings and other services under family nursing care. All nursing service, of course, is under supervision on knowledge of the doctor in attendance but calls are accepted for nursing service from the doctor, hospital, minister, welfare department etc.

There is an increase in referrals to V.O.N. from hospitals of post-operative patients needing dressings for incisions. This trend to ambulate and send home earlier from hospital is good, and where nursing care and supervision is available it assists both the patient and the hospital (and the taxpayer) according to a report given by Phyllis Brennan, one of the nurses serving for the Digby Board.

V.O.N. visits a fair number of chronically ill. They are usually young or middle aged, whose illness and resulting complications can restrict the patient and the daily activities of the whole family.

The nurse visits the mentally handicapped when they become ill as it is easier for them to accept treatment in their home environment than away from home.

There are elderly citizens who take advantage of the V.O.N. nursing services although it is understood that more of this type of citizen can be accommodated by the V.O.N.

Quoting from Mrs. Brennan "Bedside nursing is not glamorous and we are not often in the lime light, but there is a bond of mutual respect and gratitude that grows between the patient, family, nurse and doctor, in finding a solution to a health problem within the home."

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

Having just read a letter in your issue of April 11th, concerning the ferry Joshua Slocum, I feel that I must again write you in the interests of accuracy.

Pride in one's home community is a very commendable thing and the desire to have the name of the new ferry, Joshua Slocum attached to Westport is also to be applauded.

Nevertheless, as was pointed out in a previous reply to a letter from a disappointed Westporter, there is a need to place the whole matter in perspective and to realize that, in fact, Westport is only one of a number of communities that could be recognized in connection with Captain Slocum.

There is also a need and here is where the matter of accuracy enters - to be factual in presenting information in support of a claim or contention.

The writer of the most recent missive from Westport maintains that Joshua Slocum and his family moved to Westport, Briar Island, "where he spent most of his boyhood and early manhood". In actual fact, the Slocum family moved to Westport in 1852 when Joshua was eight years of age. It is recorded he was put to work in his father's cobbler shop at the age of ten and two years later ran away to work aboard the fishing schooners in St. Mary's Bay. In 1860 when his mother died he left for deep sea sailing.

Insofar as the recent writer's claim that the Spray "was built mostly by himself (Joshua Slocum) at Westport, from where he started his voyage", the actual facts of the case are that Captain Slocum secured from an old friend at Fairhaven, across from New Bedford, and antiquated sloop

called the Spray, which he proceeded to rebuild, at Fairhaven.

After he had rebuilt the Spray, Captain Slocum spent a season in his new craft fishing on the coast but found he was not a very successful fisherman. He then decided on a voyage aboard the Spray alone around the world. On the morning of April 24, 1895, he set sail and filled away from Boston harbour where the Spray had been moored snugly all winter. He stopped at Gloucester for stores and stayed there for a couple of weeks, fitting out.

On May 7, 1895, Captain Slocum sailed out of Gloucester and put into Round Pond Harbour on the 8th, staying a day there. On the evening of the 8th the Spray made Gannet Rock, thence shaping a course for Briar Island. At Briar Island Captain Slocum overhauled the Spray again, made a short excursion to St. Mary's Bay, then set out for Yarmouth.

It was at Yarmouth the Captain bought his famous tin clock, the only timepiece he carried on his long voyage. It was from Yarmouth also that, on July 2nd, 1895, Captain Slocum, according to his book, "Sailing Alone Around the World", "let go my last hold on North America".

This letter has not been written to detract from any claims which loyal Westporters feel they have on Captain Slocum and the Spray, but merely to set the whole situation more in perspective so that there might be a greater willingness to share the memories and exploits of this great navigator and his trusty little sloop with other communities, thus ensuring these memories are the longer recalled. "Historicus"

Hodge Podge

— Watch those suffixes. It might not be safe to have the name of Harman, Woodman, Whitman, Mailman, Wightman, Freeman, Kinsman or even Nicholson. That might be considered discrimination and they better be changed to Hartperson, Woodperson, Mailperson etc. That could be a little far fetched but we wonder if the Postmaster General (excuse us, we mean the Post-person General) should need a postmaster or a postmistress for any post office if the advertising will call for a postperson. One could scarcely ask for a postmaster, male or female or a post-mistress, male or female. It all came about when our attention was drawn last week to the fact that you can show no discrimination in advertising in the "Help Wanted" columns. You can't, for instance, (and we appreciated being reminded) advertise for a Girl Friday, a scrub woman, a charwoman, a canteen girl, a waiter, a waitress, foreman, forewoman. It is permissible to advertise for a waiter waitress, or a foreman woman (even though you know you need a foreman who can carry 500 lb. packages). We were just getting puzzled about how to deal with all the male replies when advertising for domestic help when we were assured that there are exceptions for private individual advertisement. This rule applies only to more public advertisement like business firms. So if you want your advertisement to read "Woman wants domestic to be a companion and assume light housekeeping you are not compelled to add "Male or Female", to comply with the Human Rights in relation to advertising.

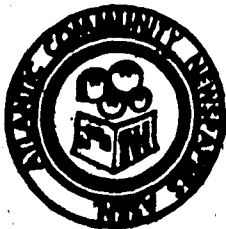

The HMCS Preserver landed approximately 150,000 pounds of medical food and school supplies in the Caribbean country of Haiti on March 19 as part of a programme aimed at developing the southwest of Haiti. Warrant Officer, Eldrek Thibodeau, Digby, directs the loading of the landing craft while the ship is anchored in the Bay. W.O. Thibodeau is seen standing over the railing and wearing glasses.

The supplies included some 300 school desks, 54 cases of books, electric generators, 35 lamp posts, and medical supplies including a portable X-ray machine. The materials were received mostly in Quebec where that provinces government is closing smaller hospitals to make way for complexes which will house all social services. Supplies were retrieved from these buildings as well as school desks from smaller schools which are being destroyed.

Canadian Forces Hercules aircraft enroute to Puerto Rico stopped off in Haiti on February 27 and 28 to offload their cargo of about 90,000 pounds of canned meat received from a Central Canada packing company. HMCS Preserver delivered another 18,000 pounds of meat.

The supplies landed in the town of St-Louis du Sud. A severe drought last summer, followed by torrential rains in October 73 have caused widespread sickness and a severe shortage of food. A Canadian non-profit Corporation is co-ordinating the relief supplies.

The Corporation was founded by a Canadian Forces Roman Catholic padre, Captain (Father) Andre Legault of Montreal. Father Legault, President of the Catholic Community Development Center, has successfully co-ordinated three shipments of medical supplies to Haiti in the past three years.

Father Legault's interest in Haiti began when he was a missionary there before joining

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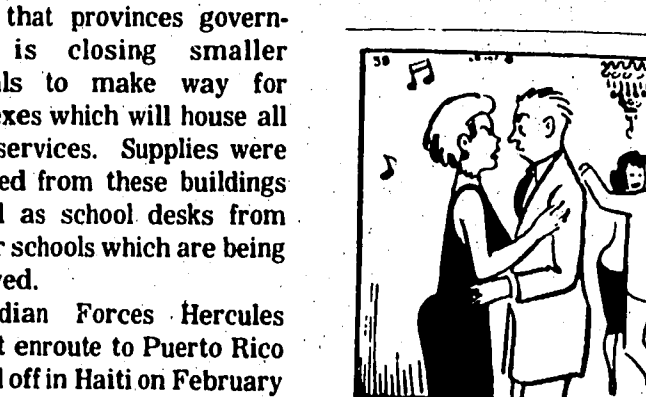
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Heirloom Recipes
Genealogical
Workshop

A reprinting of A Treasury of Nova Scotia Heirloom Recipes has just been finished and published by the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing.

Cooking hints, old and modern are included as well as recipes depicting the ethnic influence or locality in Nova Scotia. There are French influenced recipes as might be found in the French districts of Digby County. The seafood section has two recipes on Digby scallops. Similar traditions of food on food typical to other localities are found in Heirloom Recipes.

Foods for every regular meal of the day or for special occasions can be found among the recipes, including appetizers and candy.

The original edition of "A Treasury of Nova Scotia Heirloom Recipes" was published in 1967 as a Centennial project of the department. The recipes had been compiled by Mrs. Florence M. Hickey who had been Supervisor of Home Economics. Some of the recipes were borrowed from old cook books, scribbled and note books and taken from relatively new, and older books on today's pantry shelf or book store.

The Genealogical Committee of the Nova Scotia Historical Society is conducting a Genealogical Workshop at the Public Archives of Nova Scotia, Halifax, on Saturday, April 20, from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. As a result of financial assistance from the Department of Recreation it is probable that experienced genealogists from around the province will be available to answer questions and assist the general public in methods and procedures for preparing family trees. 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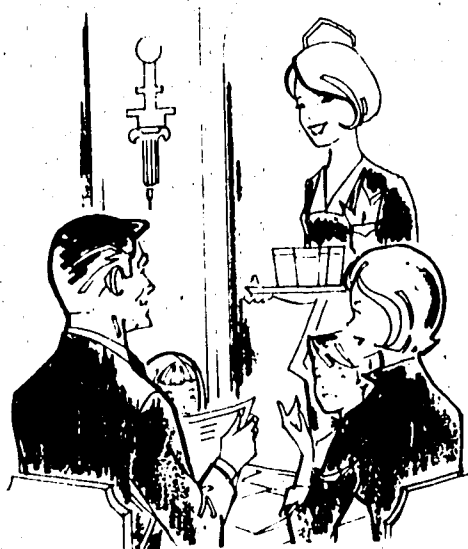

Michael Newton told the Nova Scotia representative that he would utilize a full-length feature article on the unique approach as the lead item in a future edition of the Associated Council of the Arts monthly publication, which covers the entire United States.

Recreation Deputy Minister W. Hugh Conrod told the C.C.A. meeting that in less than four months the Nova Scotia Department of Recreation had contributed financially to the establishment of almost 200 Little Red School House projects.

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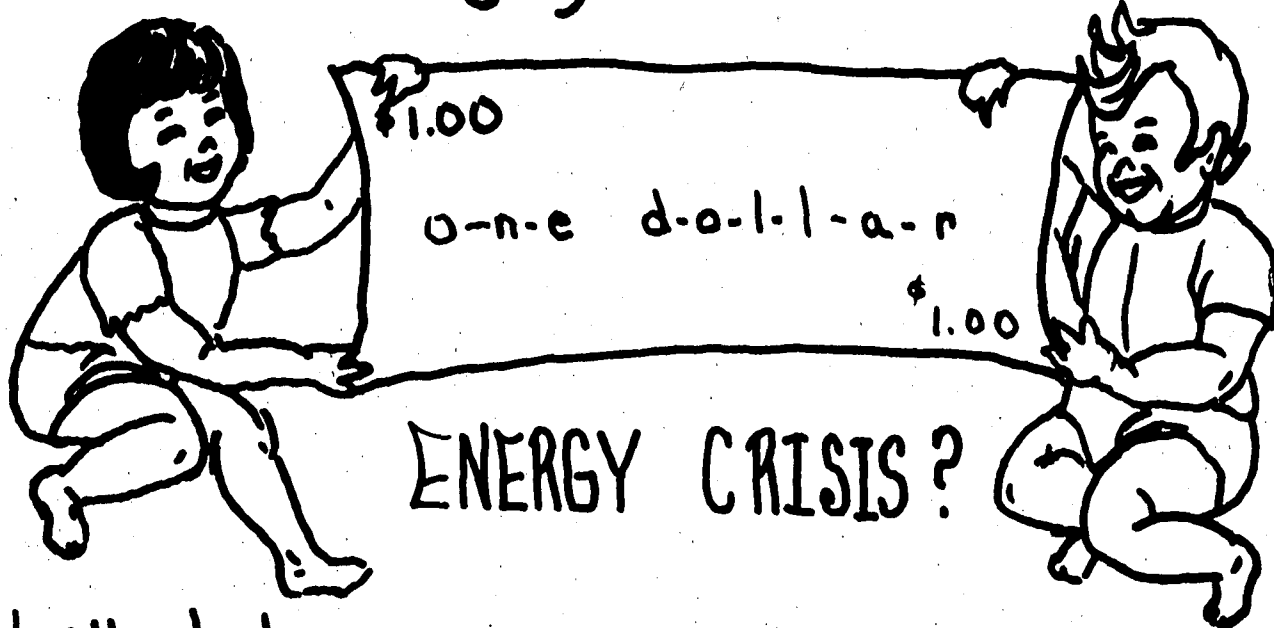
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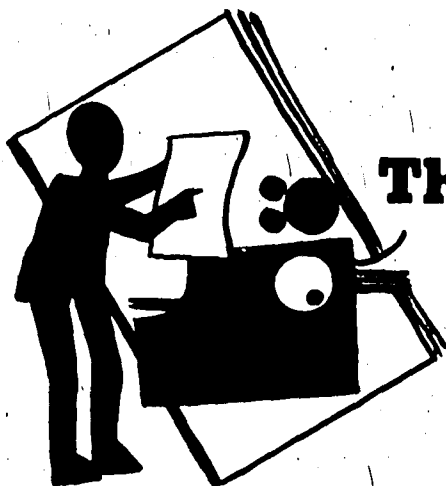
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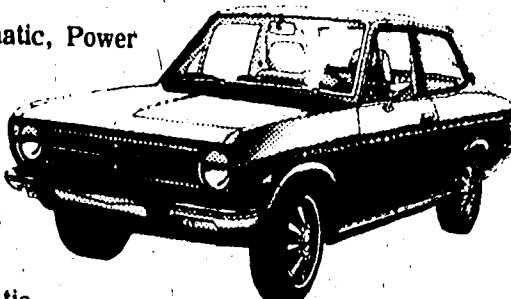
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Elect H. G. Yorke, Chairman

At the Annual meeting of the ratepayers of the Bear River Fire Prevention District, Howard G. Yorke was elected as a fire commissioner, and later appointed Commission Chairman by the Commissioners. Mr. Yorke was one of the early organizers of the Fire Prevention District and served two three-year terms as Commissioner. In 1960, he was appointed Secretary-Treasurer to the Commissioners, which position he held along with that of assessor and tax collector until 1968 at which time R. K. Purdy succeeded him.

Commission Chairman, Morris Cox, reported on the work carried out during the year.

With the help of the Federal Winter Works Program, a small concrete dam was built to replace the wooden one at the water supply on the Bruce Road property. The fence at the Hubley reservoir was repaired and painted, and a new fence built and painted at the reservoir on the John MacLeod property.

Paint and varnish were supplied to redecorate the North and Middle Fire bays.

In 1971, a loan of \$1,000 received from the firemen was repaid in full, leaving the rate payers free of debt.

\$510.00 worth of new hose was purchased with a powerful portable pump costing \$1800 and capable of pumping 400 gallons of water per minute.

The most important work done by the Commissioners missioners aided by Warden A. Denton of Annapolis County, was to bring the ratepayers the benefits of the Municipal Services Assistance Act.

Each county tax levy was set at \$1800 for a total of \$3600. Two thousand of this will be collected from the Provincial Government leaving \$800 for the ratepayers of each county to pay. As may be readily seen, the Fire Tax rate was thus lowered to less than 50 per cent of the 1973 levy.

Since all of Annapolis County received fire protection from recognized Fire Departments this \$800 is included in the county rate. In Digby County the ratepayers in Div. (1), outside the Bear River Fire District petitioned the Council to be included in the local Fire District. This was granted. Accordingly all of Councillor Byard Marshall's division will pay a Fire Tax Levy of 10 cents per \$100 of county assessment. Since only Div. (1) ratepayers are included in this arrangement, the fire tax can only be collected from them and not the whole county. This makes it necessary to show the Fire Tax as a separate item on tax notices sent to Div. (1) ratepayers. Bear River ratepayers were advised that no Fire Tax bills will be issued by the Commissioners. It is hoped that all the County will be included in a Fire Prevention District within the year.

Fire Chief A. Milner, reported a total of 53 calls, 20 more than in 1972, and the largest in the Department's history.

Damage of \$750 was sustained in the village, \$7225 in Digby Co. and \$31,600 in Annapolis Co. Two fires, where arson was suspected, were investigated by the R.C.M.P. Firemen worked over 600 man hours in 1973.

The successful Cherry Carnival, sponsored by the firemen yielded a net profit of \$3000, more than double that of any previous year. The 1974 Carnival will be held July 27.

The motor in one tank truck failed last fall. Another truck with a good engine but no transmission, was purchased from the Annapolis Fire Dept. and the B.R. transmission installed in it, giving a much better truck than originally.

A new 1500 watt portable generator, complete with flood lights, has been obtained, on loan, from the E.M.O. This will be most useful in lighting fire areas especially for out of town calls.

The Fire Department's new \$22,000 pumper is due to be delivered April 18, two years after placing the order.

In closing the Fire Chief thanked the Commissioners and Firemen for their work and cooperation.

O.T. Wright, auditor, reported the books, papers, and vouchers to be in order and correct.

Highlights of the year were tax collections of both arrears and the current levy as well as the fact that the balance of the

loan from the firemen was paid in full.

All arrears of taxes were collected and only three accounts amounting to \$29.15 of the 1973 levy remained uncollected, that is 99.14 per cent of the 1973 levy was collected.

The Commissioners are now free of debt with \$5050.26 cash assets invested in the Reserve Fund.

R.K. Purdy, treasurer, reported receipts of \$3803.26 which with balance on hand March 1973 totalled \$4137.11. Expenditures were \$3747.15 with balance on hand of \$389.96 as of March 5, 1974.

He also presented the 1974 budget calling for a levy of \$3600 of which \$1000 is to be placed in the Reserve Fund. He noted that in the past three years, capital expenditures amounted to nearly \$10,000 mostly obtained from reserve funds.

O.T. Wright was again elected auditor for 1974 and thanked for his past work.

The other Commissioners for 1974 are Ross Parsons and Byard Marshall.

Votes of thanks were also extended to the Fire Chief and Firemen, M. Cox, retiring Commissioner; A. Denton who chaired the meeting, and to R.K. Purdy, secretary.

It was announced that the Annual Banquet for the firemen will be in the Oddfellows Hall on Tuesday, April 30, compliments of the Ratepayers and Commissioners.

Interested In Recreation Senior Citizens?

Hundreds of Nova Scotia's senior citizens have been contacted by mail during the past week as part of a major research project being carried out by the Nova Scotia Department of Recreation.

They are being asked what they are doing now for recreation, what they would like to be doing and if there are many major obstacles

preventing them from participating in existing recreation programs.

"One of the motivating factors behind the decision to create our department was the need to provide an equal opportunity for all segments of society to get involved in activities which could enrich their lives," said Recreation Minister A. Garnet Brown, in a letter accompanying the four-page questionnaire.

Interviewed yesterday, Mr. Brown said the survey was only one aspect of the senior citizens research project being carried out for the department by Dr. Seymour Hamilton.

He said Dr. Hamilton had travelled throughout all regions of the province interviewing senior citizens.

He has also carried out research into existing programs for senior citizens in other parts of Canada in other countries.

"His research has already shown us that there are many thousands of retired men and women in Nova Scotia who want and need balanced recreational programs," he said.

Mr. Brown added, however, that more information is necessary to round out the study and has called on a broad cross-section of senior citizens to help the department identify and determine recreational opportunities for this age group.

"This is a people-oriented department and its success will depend on its ability to respond to the needs of all Nova Scotians," he said.

Researcher, Dr. Hamilton, said the information will prove invaluable to his work. In less than a week, he reported 20 percent of the questionnaires had already been returned. He noted that the public at large can send comments and obtain a questionnaire, if desired, by writing to him at the Department of Recreation, Post Office Box 864, Halifax.

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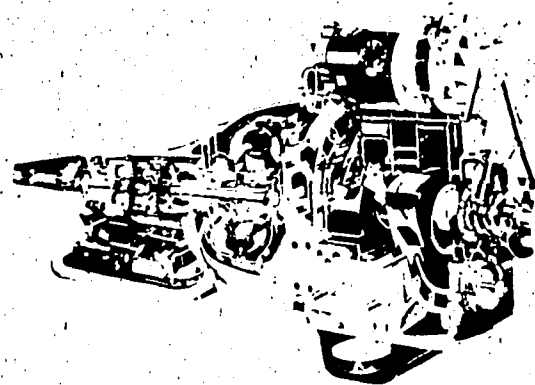
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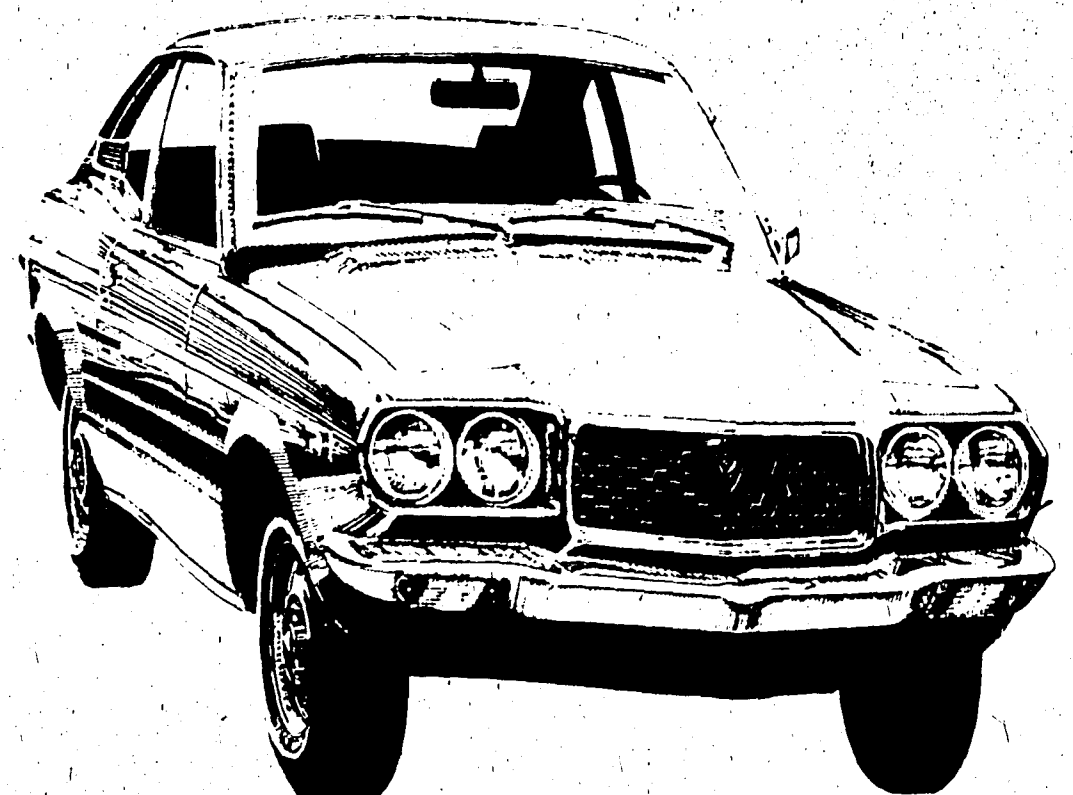

The happy couple will live in Newport. The groom is employed with the Metropolitan Stores in Windsor.

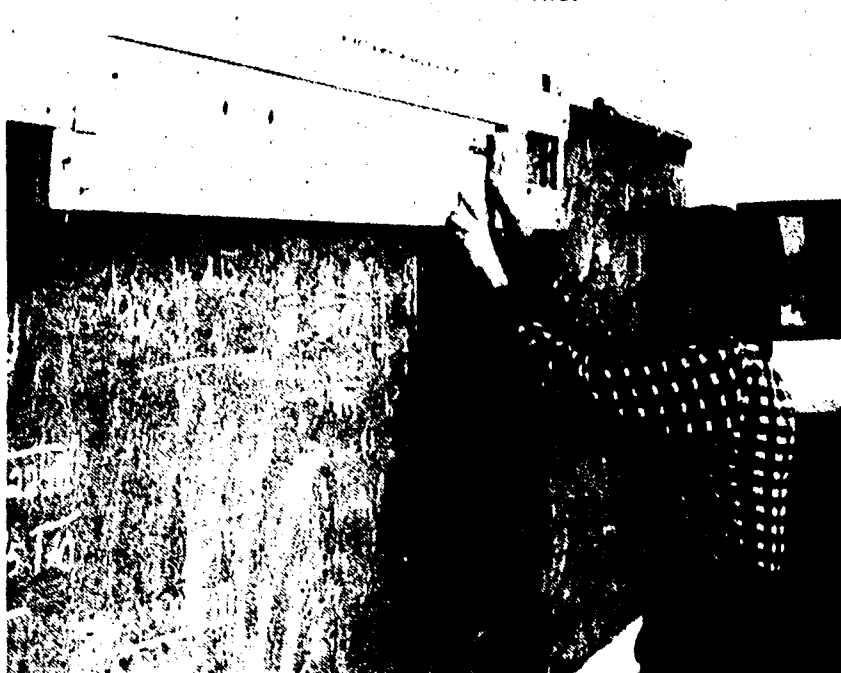

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Math Education At D.R.H.S.

MATH DEPARTMENT EXPANDS CHOICES

The Digby Regional High School Math Department will be offering increased choice of course for the 1974-75 school year. The new courses are designed to meet the needs of students with varying interests and capabilities.

An exciting aspect of next year's program at the Junior High level will be the introduction of fully metric textbooks for Grades seven and eight. This will serve the purpose of preparing these students for full metrication in Canada by 1980, and will be a continuation of the program already begun in elementary schools. A workshop for elementary and Junior High teachers, on the metric system, was recently held under the direction of Jack Ritey, Supervisor of Curriculum. It involved training and practice in the use of metric aids and materials, as well as a multimedia exposure to the metric system.

Starting next fall a new type of math course will be given in the place of the present adjusted course for grades eight and nine. It will take the form of practical math experiences, integrated into wide ranging shop and life styles courses, as part of the intermediate Industrial program. As well, the academic and modified academic courses will be offered.

At the Senior High level courses in business mathematics and shop mathematics will be made available to all students, and will count for credit in place of the present general math option. At the grade twelve level, a computer course will be offered as an option to business math. Most other students will take the regular academic curriculum of algebra, geometry, and trigonometry. However, an honors course will be made available to top students at each grade level, and will include

extra topics such as calculus, statistics, and computer technology, at the senior level.

At any grade level in the math program a student who falls the course may repeat it the following year while going ahead in the other subjects. Also there is provision for a student to advance by one grade level should he be able to do so.

The overall goal of the present math program is the preparation of students to take their various places in the increasingly complex world of today, where mathematical technology is of prime im-

portance. The New Math, or rather, new way of looking at math concepts, has become a part of every day life for the students of today.

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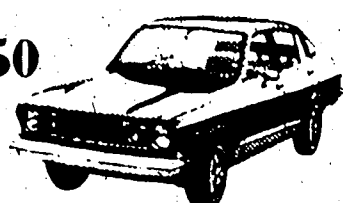

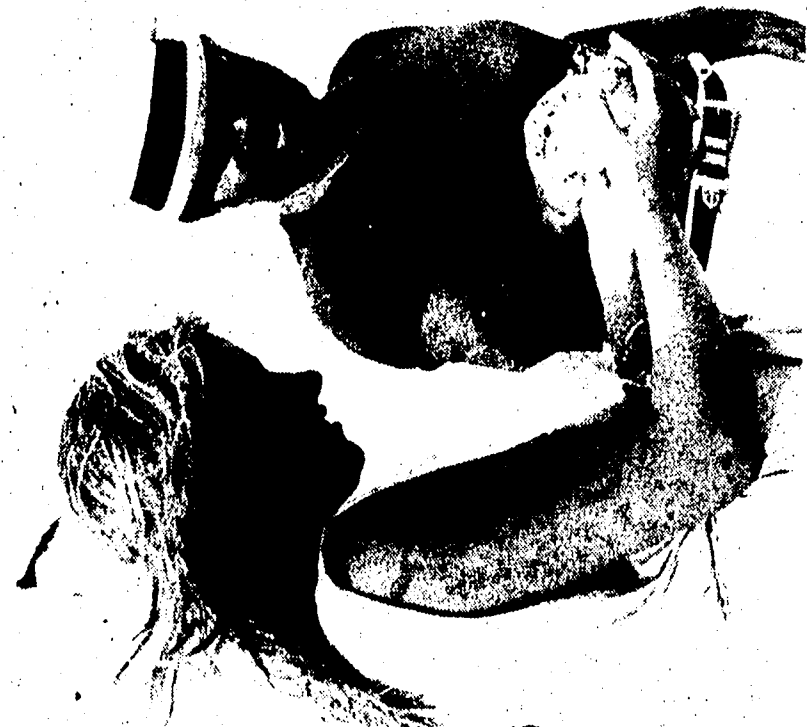

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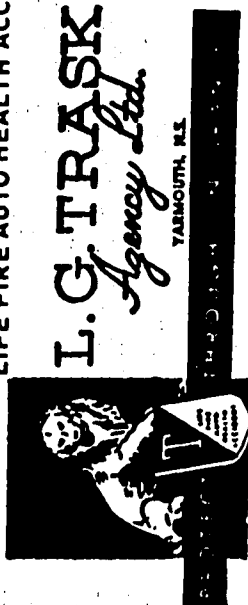

The Swiss Family Robinson

Having commenced shooting the exterior scenes for the new production of "The Swiss Family Robinson" in December, production crews and the cast have already totalled five weeks in Jamaica, and thirteen weeks on location at the Toronto International Film Studios, near Kleinburg. The Jamaica location is on a private estate called Langling Waters where the cast and crew found miles of beachfront, coconut groves, citrus trees, a river, waterfalls, plains and deep jungle foliage. "This one area," said Executive Producer Vern Furber of Fremantle of Canada, "has almost every conceivable type of terrain that we can use. We needed a mixture of settings for exterior and interior filming which included huge expanses of greenery. The green set we've constructed in the Toronto studios is expanded from its original concept. Right now we have a full time gardener who is tending the greenhouse plants, which are all under ultra-violet lighting."

Not only has the green set, which includes bamboo plants, tropical plants, palms and ferns and even original thatching material, been duplicated to resemble the Jamaica site, but so also has the cliff set. Even the animals used for the coral near the trehouse have been matched for use here in Toronto. This duplication is an ideal situation. With an environment studio here in Toronto, controls can be kept on weather and lighting. The concepts designed and executed by Jack McAdam are proving not only innovative and exotic but very workable. "The concept," added Mr. Furber, "is working better than any of us could have hoped for, including the man most responsible for it, Gerald Robinson." In this production that I've seen in few others. The whole staff from the producers to the technicians seem to sense it. We've gathered the best crews in Canada for this series and to date we've only lost one and half days of shooting because of a torrential downpour. Even we couldn't hope for more."

Movie Review

Class Of '44

If "Summer of '42" was one of 1971's top hits, then its sequel has a good chance of making it one of the better releases for '73. As sequels go, the new film—produced and directed by Paul Bogart—is rather quiet and uneventful at times. It does a good job of recreating the late war years and the PG rating can open up a brand new audience which may have missed the R-rated original. The three leads are the same as before: Gary Grimes, sensitive and intelligent; Jerry Houser, the comic type as girl crazy as ever and Oliver Conant, the misfit. Only the latter seems to be progressing as a character and here he's incidental to the plot. Herman Raucher, author of the first film concentrates his screen play on Grimes' adjusting to college life and finding a girl his own age, Deborah Winters. The ending leaves the way open for yet another sequel, one dealing with the boys as returning veterans. As a picture of College life, "Class of '44" is a nostalgic reminder of our not so distant past. Grimes and Sam Bottoms (younger brother of actor Timothy) are both maturing as performers. The story

In the graduating class of 1944 are buddies Gary Grimes, Jerry Houser and Oliver Conant. A shy, introverted type, Conant joins the Marines as a means of asserting his manhood. Rather than enlist, Grimes and Houser enter college. Grimes meets Deborah Winters, a rich girl who immediately begins an affair with him. Ever the comic, Houser joins the inept football team and then learns his much older girl friend is a prostitute willing to share her income with him. For this, he's expelled. Grimes neglects his studies for the love of the hedonistic Winters. For her, he joins a fraternity he has no interest in and cheats on exams for the

WHITE LIGHTNING

Modern moonshiners are the opponents of Burt Reynolds in the muscular star's latest action entry, which is very likely to heat up the boxoffices during the summer months. Filmed in and around Little Rock, Ark., the film boasts an original screenplay by William Norton which affords Reynolds the opportunity of showing his athletic prowess as well as his lovmaking ability and his flair for the comic aspects of his characters. Adopting an okay drawl and appearing without his mustache, the star makes the most of his role as a moonshiner who earns a release from jail in exchange for evidence against the crooked sheriff who killed his brother. The main villain is Ned Beatty, one of Reynolds' pals in the hit "Deliverance," here creating an offbeat portrayal of a squat, bespectacled lawman whose appearance belies his deadly nature. While there are no major names in support, director Joseph Sargent has gottenable work from a large number of more than capable performers. Producers Levy, Gardner and Laven have been supplying expert thrillers for UA for more than 20 years and "White Lightning" proves that their formula is still valid. A demolition derby adds realism. Deluxe Color. Hal Needham directed the fast action sequences.



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

With the budget as planned and the tax rate set, the Digby Regional High School Board, the Digby Municipal School Board and the councillors of the Municipality of the District of Digby find themselves in an awkward position, said Councillor Erwin Marshall when the Council was confronted with the proposition of paying their share of a Digby Regional High School proposed capital expenditure of \$18,800 for furniture and supplies. The amount proposed was to be divided proportionately according to the number of students between the D.R.H.S. Board and the Municipal School Board with the province taking up the tab for the greater part of the expenditure in each case (79 percent of municipal). The Digby town council had approved of the \$18,800 expenditure but it is understood the municipal council passed the capital expenditure in this case to only \$3663.86 reducing the proposed amount by \$15,000.

Appearing before the Council of the Municipality of the District of Digby on Monday were Glen Pitman, town clerk; Mrs. Shirley Woolaver, chairman of the D.R.H.S. school board and C.C. MacInnes, school superintendent. They were accompanied by Dean Pyne, Thomas Chmiel, Lister Hannah and Rupert Haley.

Mr. Pitman said their visit was to ask the reason they did not pass the proposed budget which now would restrict the 1974 D.R.H.S. program so much. Councillor "Bud" Winchester, chairman of the municipal finance committee replied that it was strictly a matter of finance.

Mrs. Woolaver in her presentation to Council felt that the requests were modest and particularly mentioned the needs of the Business Education Department and the TCR program which has been begun. She remarked that the school has a high reputation and there

are teachers and it would be a shame not to use them. She compared the incident with that of hiring a carpenter to do a job and not giving him tools and materials with which to work. She said that the tax burden is heavy but the future of the area depends on the students so the program must be kept up.

Mr. Pitman in a repeat appearance before Council reminded the Council that both the town and municipality had money in an old building fund which had been allotted for furnishing and equipping the Composite Wing at D.R.H.S. and which had not been used. The councillors had not been aware of this and told the delegation that in the light of the information they would take a second look at the proposition.

In Mr. MacInnes' presentation he reminded the Council that there are 630 municipal students at D.R.H.S. while there are only 200 town students. Councillor Helen McNeil reminded the delegation that there were other schools besides D.R.H.S. in the municipality which had proposed budgets cut and the D.R.H.S. budget for capital expenditure was not looked on lightly by the councillors. Councillor Parker Thurber felt that \$700 which had been used for sports could better be used to purchase some of the necessary equipment. On the Islands, he said, students pay their own way in sports. Councillor Winchester told of Smith's Cove school being turned down on the purchase of equipment and the school took it upon itself to raise \$1500 for playground equipment. He said that if council authorized such capital expenditures for all schools the tax rate would be unbearable in a County like Digby where the average income is below \$5,000.

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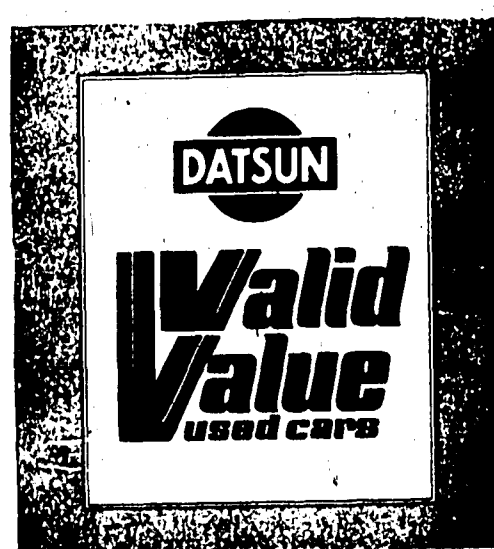
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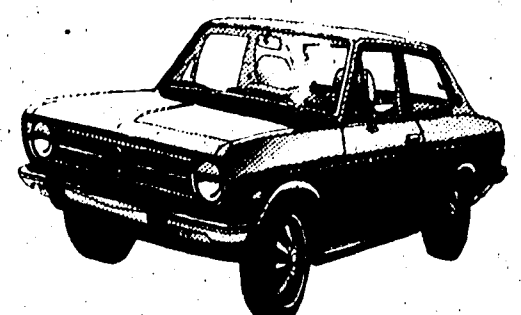

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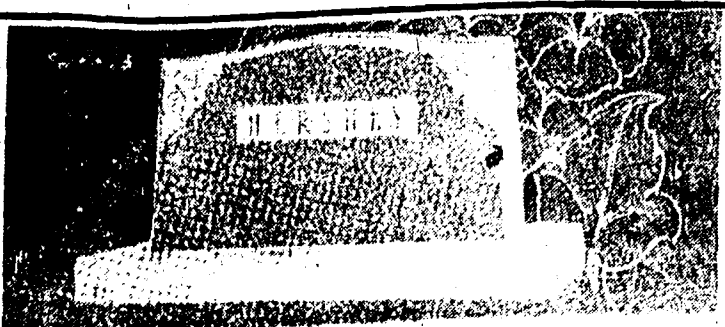

Since the day when the Wright brothers made their first flight, man has been developing a new phobia, the fear of flying. The FEAR OF FLYING...AS IT IS, Wednesday, May 1st, 11 p.m. looks into the nature and cure for this fear.

Guests on the program include Nate Cott, an engineer who was once afraid to fly, but overcame his phobia through determination and psychiatric help. The Last Tribes of Mendahao

The most southerly island in the Philippine archipelago - Mindanao - is covered with dense rain forests and virtually impenetrable highlands. Mt. Apo reaches upwards to nearly 10,000 feet. Volcanic cones testify to the continuing upheaval of the land. Since the arrival of Magellan in 1521, most of the population of this island nation has been under constant pressure to westernize. In the interior of Mindanao, many tribes have remained untouched by the forces demanding progress. Today, the Mansako, the T'boli, the Ubo and the landless sea gypsies, the Bajao, face the cultural extinction that comes when a modern society's insatiable need for raw materials develops.

On Sunday, May 5, 7:00 - 8:00 P.M. AST, the ATV System re-telecasts the "National Geographic Society Special: The Last Tribes of Mindanao". This documentary centres on Manuel Elizalde Jr., one of the richest and most powerful industrialists in the Philippines. The 34 year old Harvard Harvard educated Elizalde has set out to help the last tribes of Mindanao adapt to the modern Philippines and hopefully maintain their own identity, customs and pride.

For more than a thousand years the rich, fertile valleys provided life for the tribal peoples. Pushed out by settlers they today scratch out a livelihood in the mountains or in the forests. This National Geographic Special follows Elizalde as he travels throughout the region by helicopter in a determined effort to help these people survive and make the transition to the twentieth century. Because of his convictions, Elizalde is revered and loved by the tribesmen and feared by others. To protect himself he must travel with a small private army. He feels that the progress of his nation must not be at the expense of the tribesmen. "The conservation of the wilderness," he says "should also include the preservation of natural man."

King of Animals Helpless Victims of Own Size in a World too Small

A hundred years ago the African continent harboured the richest and most varied animal population in the world. Now this wilderness domain has been reduced to a few thousand square miles of national parks. There were once over a million of the principal inhabitants, the African Elephant. By 1960 this giant was approaching extinction, but today in the shelter of parks the elephant population is on the rise. Sunday, April 28, 8:00 - 8:30 P.M., ATN's "The Unnamed World" re-broadcasts "The African Elephant". One of the most peaceful animals on earth, with few natural enemies, the adult elephant can weigh up to six or seven tons. A quarter of a ton of food a day is required to maintain health. An adult female might give birth every five to seven years. All cubs in a herd treat all calves with the same patent consideration - a maternal full growth until the age of twenty-five, but will mate at twelve. Elephants exert a great influence on their environment, wherever they go. In days of unlimited space, herd movements were often beneficial to the land and animals; however, in the

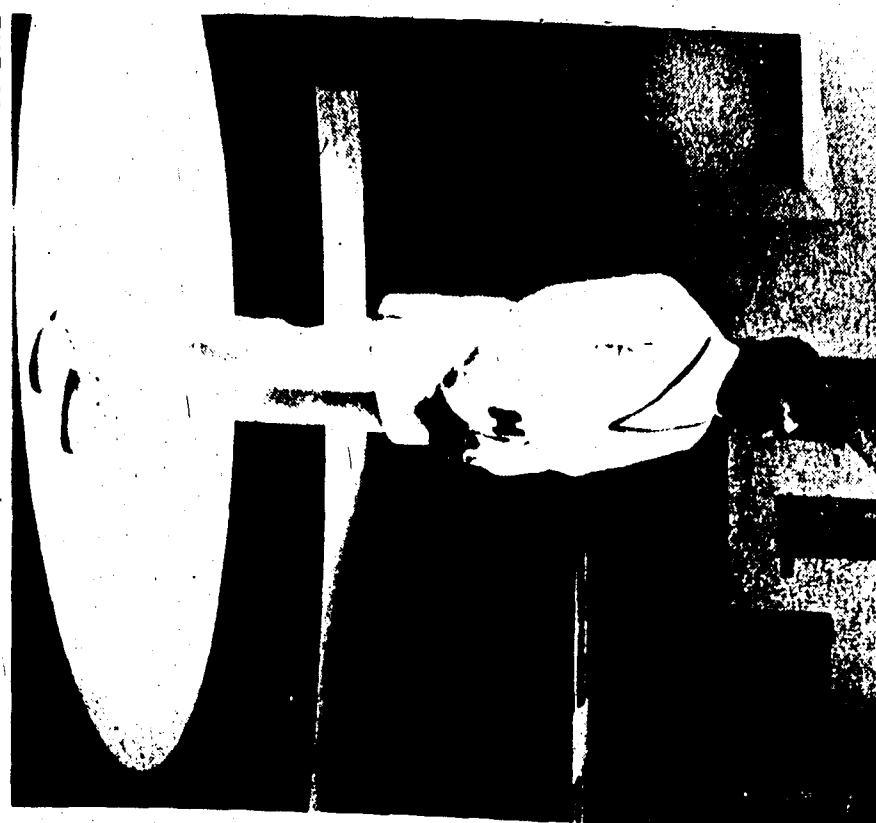

firemen and did not cost the taxpayers a cent, said Chief Milner. Presently they are building tables in the one area of the fire hall to facilitate fund raising functions.



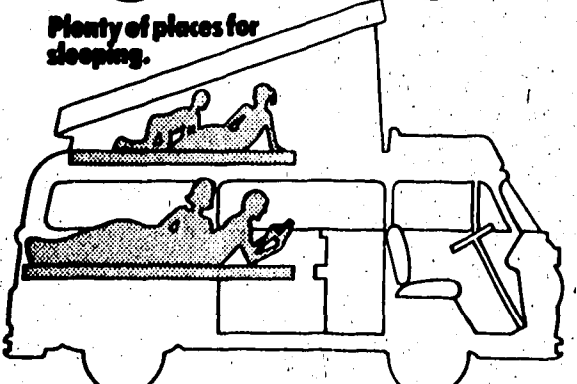
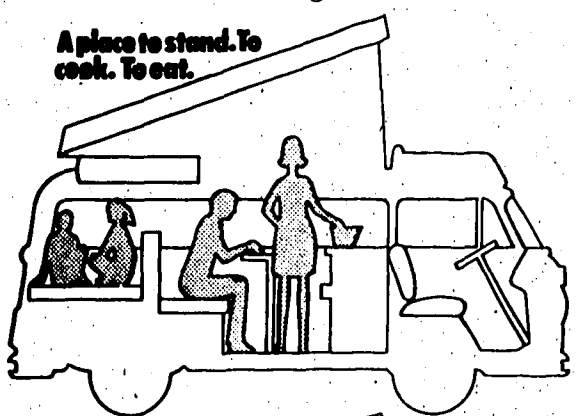

PRINCESS OF ACADIA INCREASES FARES

New fares for CP Rail's Bay of Fundy service went into effect May 1.

"Higher rates are necessary to offset sharp cost increases," said B.D. Margetts, general manager of CP Rail's coastal marine operations.

The one-way fare for adults increased to \$5 from \$4, while the regular return fare went to \$8.75 from \$7.50. The return rate for same day travel moved

to \$7 from \$6.

Children between the ages of five and 12 continue to travel at half-fare levels. Children under five travel free when accompanied by an adult.

The flat rate for automobiles and the minimum rate for trucks arose to \$22 from \$17.50. The bicycle rate increased 25 cents to \$1.75 and the motorcycle rate went up 50 cents to \$3.

Agricultural Representatives Address Digby Federation

The semi-annual meeting of the Digby County Federation of Agriculture was held in the Conway Co-Op Hall, Monday evening, April 29, with president Leonard Boudreau in the chair.

Mr. Boudreau gave a report on meeting with cabinet members in Middleton.

Farm taxation was discussed and the meeting objected to high tax on farm land bordering the highways.

The president introduced the new agriculture representative, Bruce Gilliat, who had worked in Kings County for two years. Mr. Gilliat explained the new beef policy, effective as of April 1, 1974. A farmer owning 15 breeding females is eligible for a grant of \$100 on a heifer of breeding age on 50 percent of his herd (example: a farmer having 15 females can get a

grant of \$100 per animal on purchase of 8 heifers). He must keep records on animals purchased. Applications for grants must be made to Agriculture Representative. Animals will be inspected by the Provincial Livestock Department. After some discussion of said policy some farmers thought having to have 15 females, before obtaining a grant to purchase, was too high to be a help to small farmers. A resolution was passed requesting the number of females in herd be lower to obtain the grant to assist the small farmer to get established.

Earl Maberly, Asst. Secretary-Treasurer of N. S. Federation of Agriculture, Truro, addressed the meeting. He stated it was encouraging that more young people were attending farm meetings

Town Council Enlightened On \$4200 Bill

Keith Graham, Halifax, architect, was present at a special meeting of Digby Town Council on Monday evening to explain the services rendered by his firm which resulted in the town receiving a bill of \$4200. Mr. Graham had with him plans which his firm had drawn up (by request) of renovations and extensions to the old tourist bureau near the bandstand on Montague Row which was to be developed into a Digby Town Hall. The construction of the renovations and extensions were estimated at \$44,000.

Mr. Graham said that while the job in question was not one of their biggest jobs it was one of the nicest and he had been disappointed that the project

had not continued to develop. He was most interested in the restoration aspect of the project.

Detailed plans were shown as had been drawn up by the Graham firm and showed crib work, a promenade, placing of the cannons, linking the bandstand with the main building, office space, vault location, wash rooms, benches, shrubs, etc.

The special meeting with Mr. Graham was called because the matter which had resulted in the \$4200 bill had never been presented to Town Council, it was alleged, and few, if any of the present town councillors had knowledge of what proceeded. Mr. Graham was under the impression that the town council had authorized the plan drafts to proceed. According to Mr. Graham's presentation on Monday evening, he dealt with the Town Planning Committee which he felt was by authority of council and five or six meetings were held.

One of the councillors especially interested in the project was the late Councillor Charles McBride and both Deputy Mayor Paul Winchester and Councillor Gordon Ellis had recalled the late Mr. McBride having mentioned the decision of having plans done but the impression left was that there were to be no costs involved. Correspondence of November 5, 1971 and January 1972 which was read at Monday night's meeting had been addressed to the former mayor, Glen Smith. Mr. Graham, in reviewing the

case said that he had been advised by F. C. Purdy (a member of the planning committee) that Mayor Smith wanted to see him and all went through normal procedures. Sketches were made of the town hall to be, they were approved, tendered and priced and changes had been made. Pressure, he said, was put on him to complete the plans and he did so but by the Fall of 1972 he noticed the enthusiasm was cooled off and he heard rumors that the Liquor Store was being investigated for a town hall. He noted that the Tourist Bureau building project was being pushed aside and he tried to get dialogue going again but without avail. It was then he rendered his account to be paid.

The meeting was presided over by His Worship Mayor Willard Kinney who thanked Mr. Graham for coming from Halifax to enlighten the council on the subject.

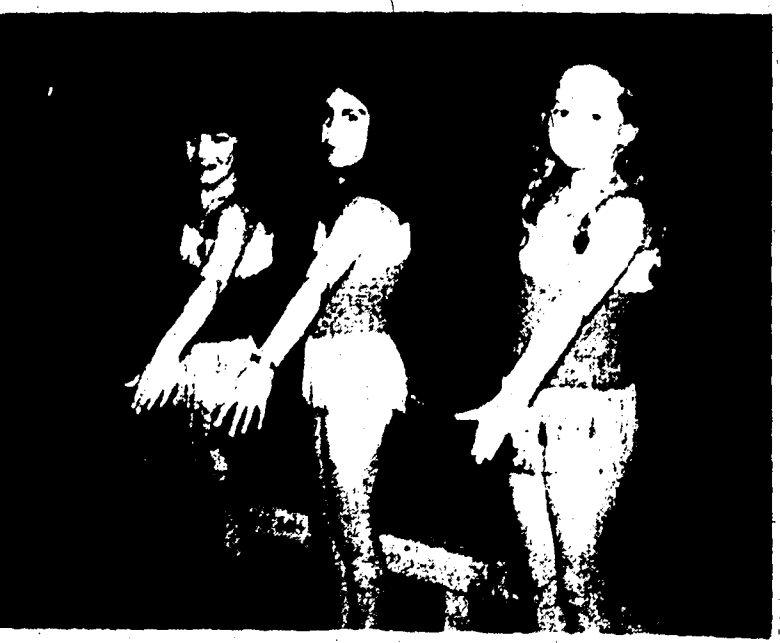

Digby Mental Health Group Has Impressive Record

A review of the accomplishments of the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association, made in preparation for the marking of the 1974 Mental Health Week in Canada, indicates that Mental Health Digby has an impressive record of activities undertaken or sponsored in the field of mental health in the local area.

Over the past year, the branch has been extremely active in the development of what could be termed primary prevention projects, designed to

assist people in coping with situations and conditions that could adversely affect their mental health and emotional well-being.

For the most part, Mental Health Digby has in its recent past played a catalytic role in the sponsorship and stimulation of programs and projects designed to assist in the promotion of mental health as these relate to groups and

EDITORIAL

MENTAL HEALTH WEEK (Contributed)

Mental illness is still dragging its 19th century stigma into the 20th century. Few realize just how enormous the problem is, and what is being done about it.

For example, did you know that mental illness hits more Canadians annually than all other diseases combined - including cancer, heart disease and tuberculosis.

Did you know that nearly half the hospital beds in Canada are occupied by the mentally or emotionally ill. That suicide is now the second most frequent cause of death among young Canadians between the ages of 15 and 30.

Did you know that there are over one million children in Canada with emotional and learning disabilities. Many problems are undetected; many are inadequately helped.

Are you aware that upwards of one third of the population has suffered some temporary disability because of emotional disturbance. Did you know that the cost of mental illness to the Canadian economy reaches many millions each year.

Did you know that Canada is woefully short of trained and experienced mental health workers, psychologists, occupational therapists, social workers, nurses, psychiatrists and others.

Perhaps the greatest obstacle to progress in the fight against mental illness has been the stigma and shame attached to it. Too often the mentally ill are shunned and avoided by friends, family, employer and community. Too often mental illness is thought to be mysterious, shameful and difficult to treat. This gloomy picture is not accurate today. Attitudes are changing and much is being accomplished.

The Canadian Mental Health Association is a voluntary, charitable organization concerned with the mentally ill, the mentally handicapped and their families. It works nationally and through 170 branches to challenge ignorance and apathy, to promote research, to focus attention on the special educational and emotional needs of the one million children, to help those who are hospitalized because of illness and help their families, to provide rehabilitation and to mobilize voluntary support in the community.

One of the important aspects of the work of the Association is volunteer service. Some 20,000 to 30,000 Canadians from all walks of life, all age groups, give of their time and talents as well as of their substance. In terms of changing attitudes, one enthusiastic volunteer is worth a hundred pages of printed literature or a dozen public speeches.

The number of long term patients in mental hospitals today is declining - thanks to new understanding and new methods of helping, and to the growth and use of community facilities for treatment, rehabilitation and support. This does not mean the need for volunteers is lessening. It simply changes the direction; there's a need - a growing need - for volunteers in community activities. The need is not only for volunteers to work with patients or ex-patients but also in community programs for prevention, aimed at groups at high risk or at ameliorating noxious social conditions that can adversely affect the mental health of the community generally.

Everyone needs to get involved - it can make a difference! Everyone has skills that can be used in the fight against mental illness and in the promotion of mental health. Contact your mental health association to determine where you can best help - they'll be glad to hear from you.

This week marks the start of The Salvation Army's Red Shield Campaign across Canada. Thousands will be sharing what they have with those who have less, through this great National Campaign. I remember at the time of thinking of driving the Huns out of the Lands they had taken over, only to come home and find ones own Beaches taken over in another fashion with the almighty dollar.

What I do not remember is if this is the same Land as the Property that Mrs. Wood owns or not but since there are not many 11 mile tracts of beaches in Queens, it probably is.

As far as offending our Friends to the South by this action and certain reprisals being taken; the situation is the very opposite, as the ones that come in Campers etc. have often inquired why there is so much of private ownership of beaches which we and they could enjoy.

Queens county has been much exploited by money groups in the matter of land ownership, and the strangle hold "the Bowater Paper Co." has on this unfortunate County has put a crimp on the great fishing and hunting that was part of the county's heritage. The Mighty Mersey, always a great Salmon and Grilse, Eel and Kiack River in the days of my youth is now only a depository for Pulp wood and marine life is limited mostly to Lampner Eels.

I do hope our government does take action to see that the many lakes in that County are kept so that future generations can enjoy them, and not all circled by summer camps, with the roads all private, residents only. However, even beaches open to the public must have some control as our local tourists often are the worst kind of litter-bugs and some Nit-wits think they are the only ones that matter.

I remember especially of a

Motorcycle Club in 1948 who tried to use the Summerville Queens Beach for a drag strip and the R.C.M.P. had to drive them out. I also was hit in the head there with a softball, they tried to make a ball field out of it.

Witness Attend Conference

"Confidence in the future, is it realistic?" This was the question discussed by Mr. John Didur, Maritime Supervisor for Jehovah's Witnesses, with the 2376 delegates assembled at the Sackville High School near Halifax on Sunday (April 28). The event was a two-day regional convention of Jehovah's Witnesses attended by Digby delegates.

segments within society that might be considered to be at risk.

Included in these undertakings was the sponsorship of the multi-cultural conference which served to create a greater understanding between peoples resident within the area of different cultural and ethnic origins and backgrounds.

Assistance in promoting and carrying through this very successful conference was received from the Department of the Secretary of State. As a result of concerns expressed at the conference, an on-going steering committee to deal with matters relating to multiculturalism was set up and has been active in exploring ways and means of developing more effective ways of creating greater understanding among all the various groups that go to make up the local population.

An example of this was the inter-faith program that was sponsored in connection with Brotherhood Week.

The inter-faith program was a successful venture and served to create a greater appreciation of the basic beliefs of the peoples of different religious faith in the area. Many misunderstandings were laid to rest and the underlying brotherhood of mankind was demonstrated through the presentations made during the program, both through the medium of films and verbal discussion.

It is of interest to note that, so far as can be determined, the multicultural conference and the inter-faith were the first such projects to be carried out in a rural area of Canada.

In addition to the sponsorship of the inter-faith program, the on-going committee on multiculturalism has also been working toward the development of an information and referral service, designed particularly to meet the needs of people unfamiliar with dealing with the many problems that have to be faced in coping with the present fragmented system of services in our society. This program will be available, not only to newcomers and minority groups and individuals, but also to others seeking help.

Dr. A. Samad, chairman of the multicultural committee, recently attended a national

conference in Ottawa which dealt with many problems concerning the development of programs in multiculturalism.

Another project sponsored by Mental Health Digby recently has been the formation of the Digby Horizons program. This project, designed to help keep retired and elderly persons actively engaged in worthwhile and rewarding programs of benefit, not only to themselves but also to the community at large, has so far resulted in the formation of a local Horizons Club which has received a federal grant to assist in the development of their programs.

Already the newly formed club has undertaken a number of activities, including the development of crafts classes, a birthday program for the elderly and retired, attendance of representatives at seminars and conferences and other activities.

One of the problems facing the club since its inception has been the securing of premises that could be used without interruption for arts and crafts programs, social and recreational activities and other programs. In an effort to assist in meeting this need Mental Health Digby secured a building from the former Digby Horticultural Project farm and has been attempting to get the building re-erected and properly equipped with facilities so that it may be used by the club.

Despite many unforeseen difficulties, delays and other problems, including financing, progress is being made in readying the building for use and it is expected programs may be underway in the structure within the next few weeks. Heating, plumbing and lighting have now been installed and interior redecoration is underway. The building, which is completely insulated including floors, walls and ceiling, has been placed on a cement block foundation. Three entrances have been provided, with a ramp entry for handicapped included. Exterior redecoration will be undertaken to harmonize the structure with the mental health centre, on whose grounds the building has been re-erected.

In a follow up of its concerns for the elderly, Mental Health Digby within a short time of the

opening of Tideview Terrace sponsored the formation of an auxiliary for the residents of the home. An initial organizing meeting was held under the auspices of the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association, at which officers and committees were elected. It was pointed out at the inaugural meeting the auxiliary should serve not only those people resident at Tideview Terrace but elderly throughout the area, particularly the housebound and the lonely. It was also stressed at the inaugural meeting the auxiliary should concentrate on programs such as arts and crafts, visiting and personal assistance to the residents, rather than on the provision of things secured through purchase and presentation.

In order to assist in the securing of extra training needed for teachers who work with children with emotional and learning difficulties, Mental Health Digby this past year provided three bursaries for teachers in the county to help them attend summer school to upgrade their skills in this direction.

Over the past year, members of the Digby Branch of the Mental Health Association have also been actively involved in the program and work of the Valley Mental Health Planning Council. This council has been successful in securing of additional funding for the clinic service in order to extend and expand services in the areas of Digby and Annapolis Counties served by the clinic board.

The Valley Mental Health Planning Council have also secured a grant to undertake a study to determine the need for halfway houses and group homes in the Valley area. Studies are also being undertaken with regard to the extent and adequacy of services in the area for children and for the elderly.

In addition to its active participation through sponsorship and direct involvement in mental health programs such as those mentioned, the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association has also continued an active program of education and public information. A film, "Only Human", has been purchased by the branch and has been used as a discussion starter for

meetings on mental health and related subjects by a number of church organizations, service clubs, youth groups and other organizations in the area.

Pamphlets, brochures and other informational and educational material have been distributed on request by Mental Health Digby to schools, health agencies, youth groups and others. These have included material on drug abuse and other subjects and some of this material has been used by speakers as background for addresses to groups throughout the county.

An important part of the work of the branch has been aimed at changing attitudes toward mental illness and encouraging support for improved and expanded treatment services. It is felt by the branch that some degree of success is being achieved but a great deal more needs to be done. To further expand its efforts, Mental Health Digby needs increased public support for its programs, not only through provision of additional funds, but also through greater involvement of more people in the work of the association.

The theme for Mental Health Week observance this year is, "Get involved - You can make a difference." It is a fact that mental illness is now the most urgent health program in Canada. If it is to be successfully fought on all fronts then there must be involvement of more people from all walks of life, all professions and skills at all levels.

Parliamentary Commentary

TO THE NEWSPAPERS:

This week my message is very brief. The only thing predictable about the House of Commons is that it is entirely unpredictable. For some weeks there seemed to be an agreement that the House would stop sitting over an Easter Recess which was to start yesterday and continue all through the week of April 15. That agreement evaporated like the snows of spring and so, we're still here.

Practically all the M.P.'s are here, in spite of other plans or commitments because of a curious situation which has developed. I think I've described before in this column the matter of Opposition Days, and the fact that there are a certain number of Opposition Days of Allotted Days, which are provided for under the House rules. Those Allotted Days normally come up once or twice a week, but because of an uncertain atmosphere here no Allotted Days have been provided in the last two weeks. Accordingly our Party asked that one be provided in the first week after our return from a recess and the Government House Leader has declined to designate an Allotted Day. He has also refused to indicate exactly when the Budget will be brought down.

There is a great deal of speculation here among House of Commons staff (they have a knack of knowing things before anybody else) that there is some likelihood of an election being called within the next few days.

There are some pros and cons from everybody's point of view. From the point of view of the

conservatives, the latest Gallup poll indicated an up-trend all across the Country but chiefly in the Province of Quebec with, of course, a corresponding down-trend in Liberal standings and in N.D.P. standings. Public opinion polls aren't very trustworthy and it's not safe to place any bets on the basis of them but it does serve to encourage some of our Members to be noisier and more anxious to create an atmosphere here which would promote an election.

Some extremely bad news has been reported this week from the point of view of Canadians: Canada has now achieved that dubious honour of having a rate of inflation which is expressed in two figures. The cost of living has risen by 10.4 per cent since last year this time. Food leads the trend with a cost increase of over 18 per cent and of course, things like inflation with its high cost of living, the unemployment which seems to be associated with it and tight money policies when they're associated with it always seem to hit the Atlantic area before it affects the more affluent economies of other parts of Canada.

With those cost-of-living figures now reported and with increased energy costs, they work their way through the economy and thereby creating higher cost-of-living figures. Over the next two or three months the Liberal government is, of course, very anxious to avoid any situation which might bring about an election. The Conservatives are naturally buoyed up by that reaction of the Liberals and the N.D.P. Party finds itself caught in a very difficult political squeeze.

They have managed to swallow themselves several times on matters of principle, or at least matters which they said were matters of principle, on one day but which on another day they were able to vote against in the House. They have been able to display a great ability to alter their principles to permit them to support the government at any crucial time in order to avoid an election. At the present time, however, they seem to be particularly em-



barassed by the cost-of-living figures, by the refusal of the government to review the corporate tax measures, by the failure of the government to introduce a budget as early as usual and an apparent feeling amongst the public is reflected in the public opinion poll that they are not performing just as well as they ought to. These things may prompt them to join with the Conservatives in defeating the Government if an opportunity should arise in the next couple of weeks.

That feeling may in turn prompt the Prime Minister to call an election so that he will be able to campaign without having the little bit of a black eye that he would get from being defeated in the House.

The up-shot of that is that next week I'll be back here in the same old stall when in fact I could be home planting my garden and doing a little pre-campaign cultivating.

Wade Addresses Bear River Fire Department

I am a disillusioned Canadian as I see the turmoil and conflict of interests when I visit various parts of our country, said Beverley Wade of New Minas, International Fire Chief, who addressed the annual banquet of the Bear River Fire Protection Commissioners on Monday evening. Inflation is hurting us, he declared, and people look for more pay for fewer hours and less production. Unless people look at reality we are headed for disaster. He said hundreds of jobs are open but nobody wants to fill them.

He also became discouraged, he said, to see good farmlands being destroyed and wondered where the food will come from for the population who head for the concrete jungle in the cities with their high rise apartments. He said it is in the country where the real life is and where people can work together.

Mr. Wade, who visits the U.S.A. frequently in his Fire Chief duties, spoke highly of that country as being one of the most generous countries in the world. He referred to their aid in restoring Europe and Japan after World War II and the aid given to Latin America in the floods. They have given their wealth away in service, he declared, but some people seem to be out to crucify the country to the south of us, and the communists want to destroy the

democratic way of life. These elements he remarked infiltrate in the schools and universities in the U.S.A. and Canada in the form of both student and faculty. Even in Nova Scotia they do not respect the laws, he repeated.

Another discouraging feature, Mr. Wade referred to was the comedy played in Ottawa rather than the government getting down to grips with problems. He said our country is upside down and he is disillusioned.

Mr. Wade, who was introduced by Bear River Fire Chief Allister Milner, is also Fire Chief at New Minas and president of Western Nova Scotia Firemen's Association. He was elected International Fire Chief at the 100th anniversary of that organization held at Baltimore, U.S.A., in October. The international organization includes 43 countries and 8000 fire departments.

Regarding fire protection he felt in many cases this is still in the stone age. He referred to the unsafe construction by developers of high rise buildings. Soon, he said, 28 percent of our people will be living in the air because high rise apartments are more economical to build. It is high time, he said, that the government take responsibility to protect the people in high rise

and demand a sprinkler system. He urged the fire chiefs to take responsibility in this regard also and stand up for what is right.

Mr. Wade spoke of the benefits of the smoke detection system but he said we go on in the same way when we could be saving lives. The almighty dollar, he remarked, seems more important than service.

Mr. Wade congratulated the Bear River Fire Department for the service they render to the community and for the advancement made in their department.

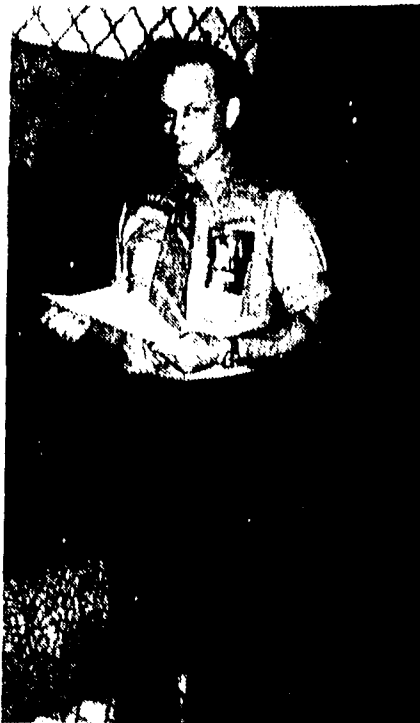
Expands Business

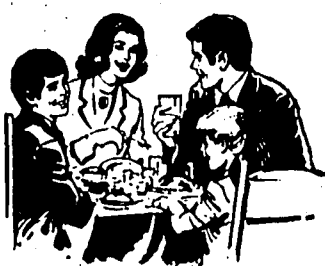

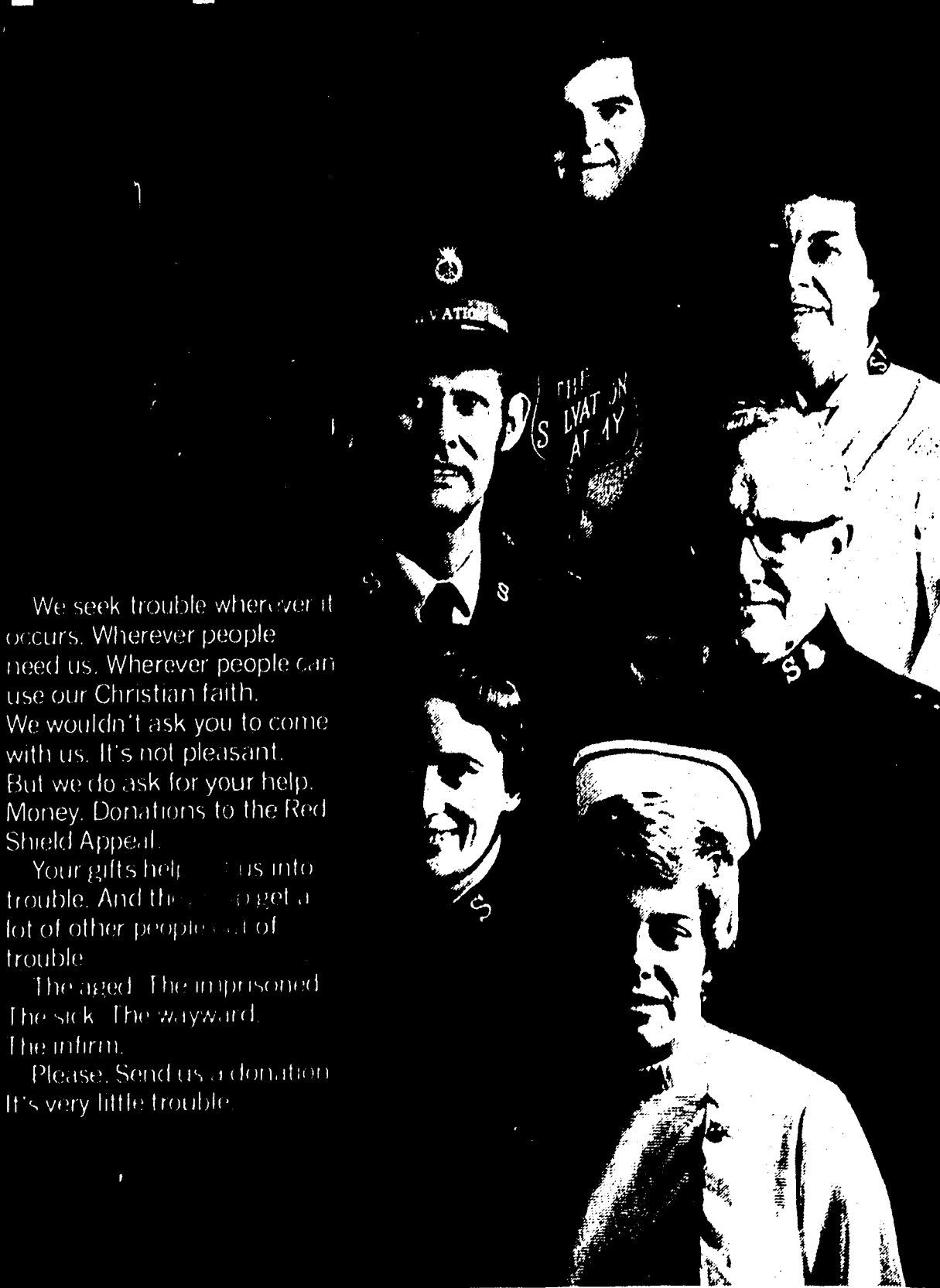
Attend College Function At P.E.I.

The Last Tribes of Mendahao

The most southerly island in the Philippine archipelago - Mindanao - is covered with dense rain forests and virtually impenetrable highlands. Mt. Apo reaches upwards to nearly 10,000 feet. Volcanic cones testify to the continuing upheaval of the land.

Since the arrival of Magellan in 1521, most of the population of this island nation has been under constant pressure to westernize. In the interior of Mindanao, many tribes have remained untouched by the forces demanding progress. Today, the Mansako, the T'Boi, the Ubo and the landless sea gypsies, the Bajao, face the cultural extinction that comes when a modern society's insatiable need for raw materials develops.

On Sunday, May 5, 7:00 - 8:00 P.M. AST, the ATV System re-telecasts the "National Geographic Society Special: The Last Tribes of Mindanao".

For more than a thousand years the rich, fertile valleys provided life for the tribal peoples. Pushed out by settlers they today scratch out a livelihood in the mountains or in the forests. 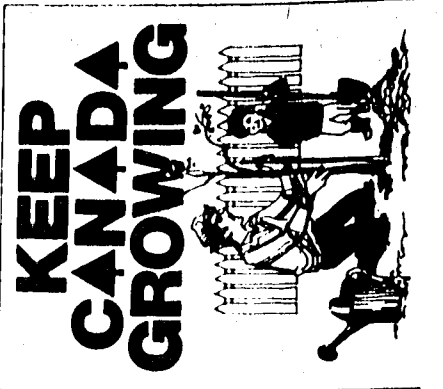

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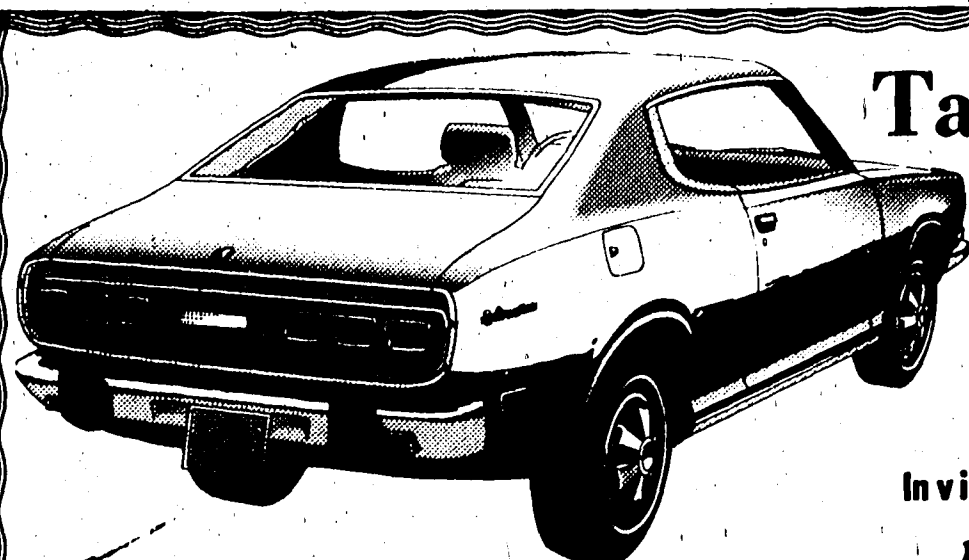

RUN STRANGER RUN
The first film of actor Darren McGavin as a producer and director has an American cast in a New England setting, although shooting was done in Nova Scotia and the co-production company McGavin's Taurean Films, is incorporated in Switzerland. Academy Award winners Patricia Neal and Cloris Leachman provide the marquee lure, along with singer-turned-actor Bobby Darin. Real stars of the suspense thriller are young Ron Howard, 19, and Tessa Dahl, 16, Miss Neal's daughter, in her film debut. TV fans will remember Howard as the son on Andy Griffith's show. 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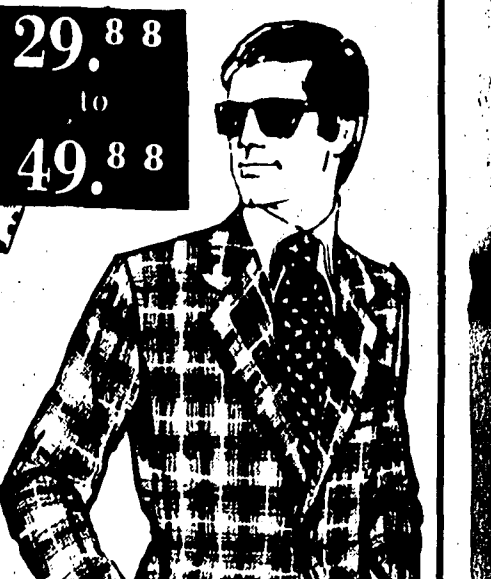
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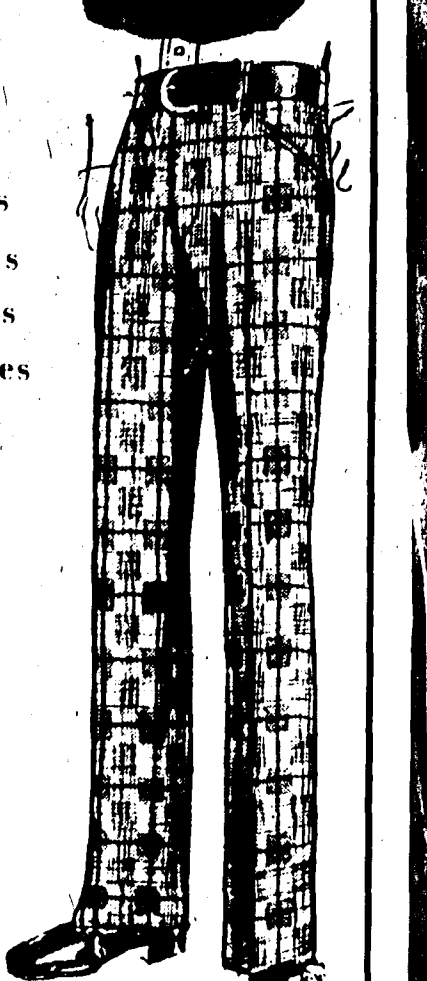
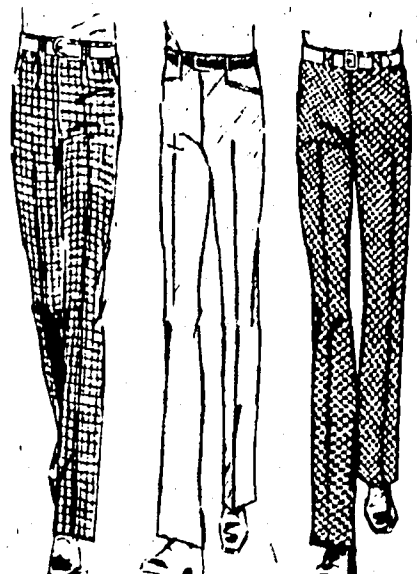


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TOWN BORROWS \$46,000 TO PAY D.C.P.B.

Digby Town Council on Monday night by regular motion decided to borrow \$46,000 to pay the Digby County Power Board that sum which has been owing to the Board by the town. By request of the council's representative on the D.C.P.B., Councillor Joseph Hattie, the superintendent of the Power Board, Stuart MacNaughton, and Milton Atkinson were present at the Council meeting. Mr. MacNaughton explained to the council where the indebtedness had arisen taking note of the amount over expended on capital investments from 1968 to 1973.

Mr. MacNaughton noted that the year 1973 was the most profitable of the past ten years for the town's electrical utility because of the increase in load but this again put capital expenditure up to \$27,000. Estimated capital expenditure for 1974 is \$21,200.

It was mentioned that with sewers there is charged a frontage fee of \$2.50 per foot while such frontage costs cannot be charged for electric installation. It was also counted unfair that the DCPB has to pay seven percent health tax while the Nova Scotia Power Commission is exempt.

Bills for the month of April presented by the finance chairman and amounting to \$19,837.74 were passed for payment. Of this \$9,788.44 was for the balance of phase two of the sewer project.

An up-to-date report on proceeding with phase three of the sewer project was read from W.H. Horner Associates.

A resolution was passed by council limiting the number of taxes in town to 11 for the year of 1974.

Councillor Phillip Robertson presented the report for welfare services showing 21 recipients, nine of which were special care. Total welfare costs for welfare in April for the municipal unit was \$773.

Twelve fires were reported for April, ten of which were outside the town of Digby.

The resignation of Mr. Vitito as dog catcher was read. Praise for his work in the past was voiced and it was hoped that he might be persuaded to reconsider if he got assistance in his duties from the police.

In his report Glen Pitman, town clerk, said that all the tax bills have been sent out for 1974 but there still is nothing settled about the twenty-five percent rebate by the provincial government. His report also showed that a credit agency had collected \$5800 of \$21,000 outstanding taxes.

Mr. Pitman reported that the sewer grant of \$111,000 had been

received and use to reduce interim borrowing and interest costs.

It was decided to charge the Digby County Power Board \$85 per month for space rental in the old fire hall and that the water and police departments would be charged proportionately for space.

Councillor Joseph Hattie was named to the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Board.

Mr. Pitman and Miss Jackie Connelly were each given permission to attend a seminar and write examinations at Dalhousie University, Halifax.

Issues Statement On Ferry Rate Increase

The recent rate increase for passage on the C.P. owned ferry, the Princess of Acadia, could prove to have crippling effects on industry situated in the Annapolis Valley and southwestern regions of Nova Scotia. It is appreciated that the industries of this area use the facilities as a most convenient and economical means of reaching the New England and upper Canadian markets, those regarded as most significant areas within the grasp of route. The rates which in fact have doubled over a period of two years, no longer complement the original goals, that the ferry service was designed to help develop.

The vast amount of money spent by the federal and regional governments to promote the tourist industry in the Atlantic Provinces is an appropriate allocation itself but if no careful attention is maintained towards the rising costs of entry into the province we may well attract fewer and fewer tourists each year and be wasting the precious funds of the taxpayer. Consider, the family of four who will pay more than \$40 for a one way passage including his car on the Saint John Digby ferry. The tourist will undoubtedly reconsider his route when travelling to or from Nova

20 O.F.Y. Projects Approved

Charles Haliburton M.P. for South Western Nova, has been advised by Hon. Robert Andres, Minister of Manpower and Immigration, that of the fifty-one applications for Opportunities For Youth projects in South West Nova, twenty have to date been approved. Of these four are in the Digby area and four in the Annapolis area.

The grants for the 20 projects in S.W.N. amounts to more than \$98,000 and will create 120 jobs representing more than 1000 manweeks.

Establish Recreation Committee

Lister Hannah and Bernard Bell, on behalf of the Digby Recreation Commission on Monday night appeared before the Digby Town Council with the proposal of establishing a Recreation Committee under the town council. A motion of intent to establish such a committee was made by Councillor William Reid and seconded by Councillor Philip Robertson. The details and by-laws will be drawn up at a later date.

Mr. Hannah, the spokesman, in presenting the proposal, said that such a committee was necessary to take advantage of grants offered by the governments. The function of such a committee would be to promote recreation in the town and/or municipality and to co-ordinate all organizations' efforts in recreation. It was suggested that the committee consist of five members made up from council, school and residents. All transactions of the committee would be subject to town council approval.

Councillor Gordon Ellis brought up the financial aspect of the move but it was pointed out that it did not cost a cent to form the committee and it is hopeful that later facilities might be provided, this would be entirely up to council. There also could be money raised outside the council.

It was noted that recreation is becoming a major aspect of modern times and most councillors fully agreed that a concerted effort should be made in regard to the town's recreational future. The vote of intent passed unanimously.

CFB Cornwallis To Be Retained

Charles Haliburton, M.P. for South Western Nova recently received a letter from the executive assistant of the Minister of National Defence, Hon. J.A. Richardson, a portion of which follows: "With regards to the future of C.F.B. Cornwallis, I am pleased to inform you that current base planning in this department includes the retention of this base for the foreseeable and predictable future. It will continue in its primary role as an anglophone recruit training centre with no

significant change in function."

While this comment from a member of the Minister's office is more encouraging than any previous information, we have obtained from the department, the letter, nevertheless, goes on to condition that comment, said Mr. Haliburton. It is encouraging, however, he continued, that at least for the time being there is no consideration being given to a closure on phasing down of the activities of the base.

Board Of Trade Disturbed At Price Increase

The Digby and Area Board of Trade is very disturbed by the latest exorbitant increase in fares on the Digby to Saint John, N.B. ferry service, it was stated by president, Ernest Ryan, in a telegram regarding increases in rates on the C.P.R. Bay of Fundy ferry, Princess of Acadia.

These increases, we feel will be detrimental to the Tourist Business in this area: Also this will have adverse affects on travel by local Nova Scotians and New Brunswickers between these two points, he added.

The Board asks that this service be taken over by the Canadian National and operated on the same basis as other ferries in Atlantic Canada; Furthermore they suggest that the Dominion Atlantic Railway which serves this area of Nova Scotia, be taken over by the Canadian National as well in order to provide a more efficient transportation service for this area.

The Board feels that the subsidies being paid by Public Funds to operate various Ferries and Transportation facilities, could be extended to this service as well, in order that Western Nova Scotia, might enjoy the same transportation advantage as counter parts in the other sections of the Atlantic Provinces. This will not happen, as long as they must depend upon a private Transportation

Company for service to this area.

The Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade, fully endorse this proposal, in fact a twelve page Brief regarding this matter has been presented to the Hon. Gerald Regan, Premier of Nova Scotia By the AVABT.

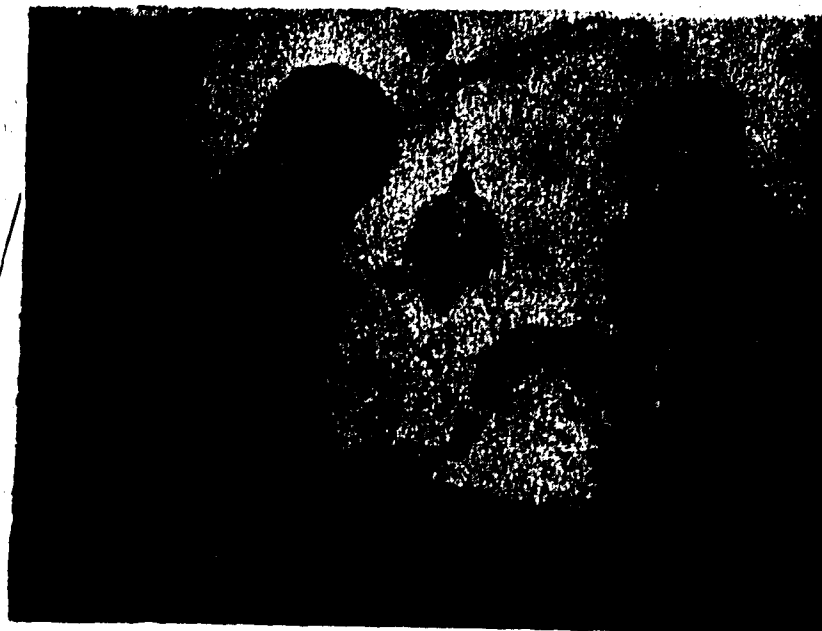

STRUCK ANOTHER BLOW

Digby and all Western Nova Scotia was struck another blow last week in the announcement of the rate increase on the Bay of Fundy service, the Princess of Acadia. A jump of \$4.50 from \$17.50 to \$22.00 for automobile transportation each way is a big hike, making a sizeable difference in the cost of a return fare. Nor does this fare relieve the passengers of transportation fees. Adult fares which were \$4 for crossing are now five dollars. Similarly rates for other vehicles have increased.

How does this effect the tourist trade in Western Nova Scotia? One factor to be considered is gas conservation and also the high price of gas. Reasonable ferry rates (lowered, if possible, from 1973) would have been a part solution to the shortage and high price of gas and an incentive to tourists to enter Nova Scotia, particularly western Nova Scotia. With the excessive rates we are simply inviting people to stay away and find a more modest way to enjoy a vacation.

Hopefully, it is not too late to turn the rate clock back for the 1974 summer season but, if it is, some long term plans should be started immediately. These would include higher government subsidies to compensate the C.P.R. for lower rates on total operation of the ferry service by C.N.R. Digby and Western Nova Scotia are as deserving as other parts of Canada and of Nova Scotia.

ARBOR DAY IN FOREST WEEK

This week, May 5 to May 11 is Forest Week all across Canada when the theme "Your Forest—Your Future" tries to impress on all Canadians their responsibility of preserving the forests.

Governments, tourist industries, forest companies and a wide variety of others are directly responsible for managing and using Canada's forests. All people who enjoy out-door travel and sports have an impact on the forest environment. One way or another, every Canadian citizen has a stake in the proper use and stewardship of this valuable resource.

In 1974, backed by forestry associations across Canada, Arbor Day is being observed mainly during the Week of National Forest Week. This is a day that for years was mostly forgotten by a few grandparents remembering the school-yard clean-ups and the tree planting ceremonies. It is well to have this observance returned or more notably emphasized.

Arbour Day came into existence in Nebraska where it was first developed in 1872 by J. Sterling Morton. The idea was picked up across the United States and Canada and over the years gained popularity until the late 1940's when it disappeared except in a few regions.

to sponsor a Digby princess for the Annapolis Valley Apple Blossom Festival. Mr. Pitman was requested to contact organizations.

Councillor Patrick Comeau suggested that if the town is in earnest about the Tourist and Industrial Development Committee of which he is chairman, then he should have some terms of reference. He felt if there would possibly be an industry coming to town, the committee should know about it. He hoped the town and municipality might get together on regional planning. He felt as chairman of the committee he

would be empowered to contact such bodies as Industrial Estates, Halifax for information on behalf of the town.

Reports for streets and water were given by Frank Robinson, superintendent and Police Chief Wester Dunn reported for his department. Twenty-five complaints were laid with the police with all but seven terminated satisfactorily. Fifteen needed court action, nine under liquor control, four criminal code, two motor vehicle and one impaired driving. Five motor vehicle accidents were investigated. Ninety dollars was collected in fines. There were three break and enter incidents in April and four thefts.

Budget

People here are saying that the hardest hit people are oil executives in the west, who drive Cadillacs and drink a lot of Scotch on their way to work, smoking big cigars. Those are the people who are paying all the noticeably increased taxes under the budget. It has several aspects that aren't very helpful, it does nothing for farmers, it does nothing for inflation, it includes increased taxation for individuals. The ordinary guy on the street is going to find himself paying a highertax after the dust clears than he is now, even though there is an additional fifty dollar exemption at the lower end of the income tax scale. Nevertheless after inflationary pressures are taken into account he is going to be paying a higher tax.

Some of our conferees here from Alberta, point out that it is going to give foreign oil companies in the exploration business substantial advantages over domestic Canadian Companies. In that U.S. based companies are permitted to write-off all their losses where as under the new guide lines which the minister announced, Canadian Companies will have to write-off their losses over a period of time, that is where they've drilled that exploration work and failed to find oil or gas.

I was disappointed that there is nothing in the budget for exporters. One of the difficulties that we are facing in Nova Scotia is that a substantial portion of our production is in export trade and we are having difficulty exporting because of the high value of our dollar, viz a viz the American dollar.

Nothing has been done to rectify that and that taken with the amount of inflation that we can expect to experience will put our exporters in a difficult position meaning less profitability for them.

There is a substantially increased corporation tax, and a substantially increased tax on banks and other service industries holding deposits, that will undoubtedly be passed on to the consumer who really pays all that type of tax in the end. Where a corporation or a producer is not in a very competitive industry obviously, any increased costs, increases in taxation are simply passed on to the consumer who really pays the whole bill in the end.

It is disappointing too, that they didn't announce an end to the tax on building materials. We had rather expected that Turner would announce something like that in view of an

impending election. The results of some good news, there are some good things included in the Budget, it wasn't all black. Small businesses are going to get a bit of a break under the old rules.

There is a break for people who have modest savings in that the first thousand dollars interest accumulating on their savings will not be taxable. The removal of the tax on clothing I think was a worthwhile thing.

The real critical thing that I would say about the budget is that it does nothing to curb the rate of inflation in Canada. In fact the way the minister has put his comments and the way he has positioned the budget it would appear that he anticipates that the rate of inflation in Canada in the next year is going to be between 10 and 15 per cent.

The government is going to spend 23 percent more in the coming year than they've spent in the past year, and it's forecast expenditures are up something over 5 billion dollars to some 29 billion.

The government expects to collect increases in taxes in the following proportions, that is the 74-75 tax as compared to the 73-74 tax, this is the gross revenue. Personal income taxes will yield 10 percent more; Corporate taxes will yield 35 percent more; Customs and excise taxes will yield 10 percent more; sales taxes will yield 7 percent more; other taxes will yield 20 percent more and of course there is the new oil export tax that is going to have a substantial yield. The only tax that hasn't increased at a rate at least equal to the anticipated inflation is the tax on non-residence. The total anticipated tax receipts from non-residence is 5 percent higher for 74 than it was for 73.

Farm News

Wireworms - How Do You Control Them?

Wireworms will be the main topic of discussion at a meeting on May 16, 1974 at the Conway Co-op Hall, Conway, Digby County. This meeting is open to all Digby County farmers and other interested persons. Hopefully, the discussion from this meeting will provide some of the answers to the problems of wireworms in this County.

Wireworms are often numerous in land that has been in sod for several years. Wet, heavy soils usually have the highest infestation of this pest.

To discuss wireworms and their control, Mr. Charlie Fox, Entomologist with the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, Kentville, will be speaking. Charlie has had many years of experience dealing with wireworms and their control. Plots have been maintained on some farms over the years trying to learn more about them.

The best method of control is to treat infested fields with a chemical insecticide, then keep fields clean with rotations. Several insecticides are registered for use against wireworms, these are Chlordane, Lindane and Furadan.

For more information on Wireworms and Their Control plan to attend the meeting on May 16, 1974 to be held at the Conway Co-op Hall, Conway, beginning at 8 p.m.

This meeting is being sponsored by the Extension and Economics Branch, Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing, Weymouth Office, Digby County.

A meeting will be held on May 13th, 1974 for all Home Gardeners interested in the techniques and problems associated with vegetable gardening. Mental Health Group Has Long History

The Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association has a lengthy history. First organized in the early 1950's, the branch was then known as the Digby County Mental Health Society and was a strictly local organization, not directly affiliated with the provincial or national association.

Among the earliest activities of the Digby County Mental Health Society were the distribution of information concerning mental health and mental illness; support for the psychiatric clinic, established in Digby by Cornell University in 1951, and the provision of comforts, birthday and Christmas remembrances for the patients in the County Home in Marshalltown and to patients from the area in other homes and hospitals elsewhere in the province.

Although the active core of the society was small, it did have a sizeable membership roll. In 1955 the association sent letters throughout the county, urging people to join. The aims were stated to be "to acquaint people of our county with matters concerning mental health, the work being done in Nova Scotia and throughout Canada to combat mental ill-health and the part we in this county can play in this fight."

The Society sponsored a

number of public meetings, seminars and panels where prominent speakers in the field of mental health were heard and problems of particular interest of the county were discussed. At the annual meeting in 1957 it was decided the Digby County Mental Health Society should affiliate with the Nova Scotia Society for Mental Hygiene and a public meeting was held later for this purpose. Affiliation, however, was not made a formal accomplishment until a reorganization of the local association in 1961.

It was in 1957 that the Digby County Mental Health Society helped spearhead a successful effort to maintain the psychiatric clinic in Digby. In the previous year a local group had been organized under the name of the Western Nova Scotia Mental Health Group to take on the active management of the business affairs and policy of the psychiatric clinic in Digby and its part-time satellite service in Yarmouth.

The Western Nova Scotia Mental Health Group Inc. continued until 1961 when there was a reorganization of the mental health services for the area with a new organization, the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Services Board, taking on responsibility for the clinic services in Digby and the new service, opened in Bridgetown

in 1959. The Yarmouth representatives on the Western Mental Health Group formed the nucleus of a new board for the provision of clinic services in Yarmouth and Shelburne.

In 1961 the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association was formally organized and became the first branch in the province to receive a national charter. The branch quickly assumed responsibility for the financial support of the psychiatric clinic, exclusive of the professional salaries and other costs met by government and entered into an agreement regarding this. The branch continued its direct support of the psychiatric clinic until the financing of the mental health centre services was taken over in its entirety after the advent of M.S.I. in 1969. In the interim the branch had been active with the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board in the securing of permanent quarters for the mental health centre in Digby and the branch took on the financing of the operating expenses including the mortgage

repayment, insurance, etc.

Despite its heavy involvement in the support of the mental health centre, the Digby branch of the CMHA did carry on a number of other important projects and programs in support of mental health during the period 1961 to 1969. These projects received additional support after the branch was relieved of its commitment for direct financial support of the clinic operation.

Included in the programs undertaken by the Digby Branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association, either on its own or in conjunction with the Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board or other groups, was the development of the first series of resource handbooks, the sponsorship of the community service council project, the development of a local unit of the alcoholism research foundation, later the Commission on Drug Dependency, and the continued distribution of informational and educational material regarding mental health and mental illness.



Presenting the program were Mrs. Mary Billard, Mrs. Sherry Coldwell, Mr. Robert Potts, Supervisor, all of the Clark Rutherford School, CFB Cornwallis, and C.E. Edwards, Inspector of Schools for Annapolis-Digby counties, each of whom has been involved in screen education since its inception in Canada. The program was under the direction of the Program Chairman of the Association, Mrs. L.R. Denton.

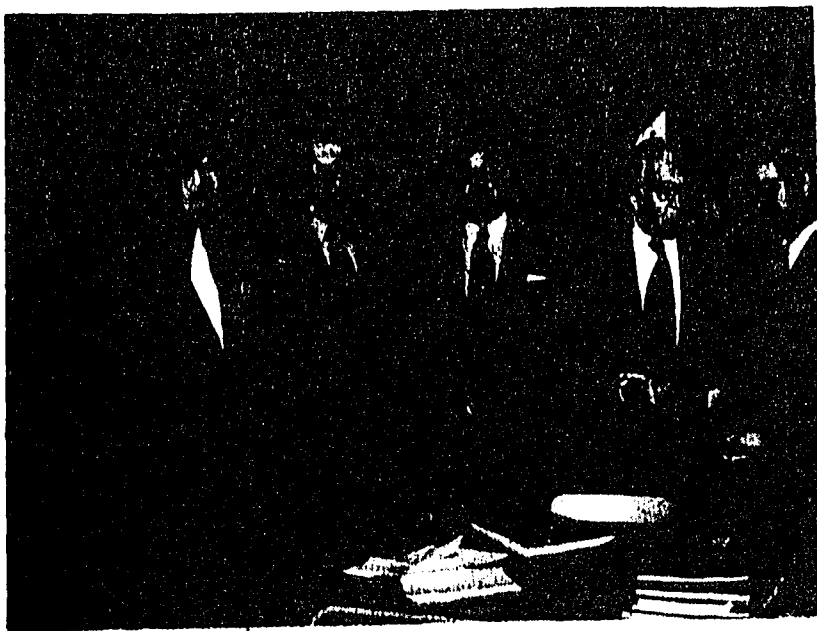
In introducing the program Mr. Edwards stressed the positive aspects of the media, and their potential in helping to bridge the gap which exists in education today. "Children today are born in an electronic world," he said, "We can no longer take them out of this world to educate them. The alternative is the extensive use of the media in the classroom. In

schools where the media is used there is an air of excitement which helps

develop the concept of the happy school, the school where children learn by doing and learn by discovery. Mr. Edwards interprets education as "Experience": "We learn what we live and we live what we learn," he said.

Instead of talking on the use of the media as he was invited to do, Mr. Edwards said that he brought along with him "living proof" of the value of the media in the attainment of excellence and relevancy in education.

The various presentations made included: **Outdoor Education** by Robert Potts, who also related the history of the development of a screen education in his school; **The Grist Mill** (early Annapolis County history) came alive as students in costume of the period re-enacted the building of the first grist mill in North America and the accompanying ceremonies; **Drug Education** (a film created as part of the school's drug education program) by Mrs. Sherry Coldwell; **The Loyalists** (first settlers of the Clements area) by Mrs. Billard. Brazilian Ship Grounds Off Westport

On Sunday morning May 5 a large freighter was sighted N.W. of Brier Island. It was first thought to be waiting for an abate in wind, but later approximately 11:15 a.m. North Point lightkeeper Richard Thompson reported to C.C.G. 102 that the boat was drifting toward the island. Immediately answering the call Capt. George Garron with crewmen, Franklin Gower and Gordon Thompson got under way and as they steamed toward the freighter they could see that the stern section was around on the Long Island shore about two miles from Cow Ledge. As they arrived the freighter got her engine to go enough to push the boat from the shore. Her engines failed again with the result that the C.C.G. 102 and fish dragger "Lady Cindy" with

Capt. Henry Prime had to put out lines and guide the ship down into Westport Harbour, where she anchored. The ship "Solimoes" registered from Belem, Brazil, flying the Brazilian flag is 378 feet long, 2800 tons, with Capt., 29 crewmen and one woman. The trouble with the Solimoes was that the water pump to main engines would not function properly. Destination of freighter was New York and at time of disable was on the way out of Bay of Fundy from Saint John, N.B. A number of fishing boats from Westport and Freeport were on hand to help if needed. Later in the day a tug boat "Irving Birch" arrived from Saint John, N.B., and will tow the freighter back to port of Saint John.

Deep in the jungles of South America exists a primitive tribe, at least ten thousand strong, which lives in a state of total war with its neighbours.

Untouched by western civilization these Yanomama Indians see themselves as a powerful and special people, The Fierce Ones, and according to their legends it is in the nature of man to fight.

The jungle provides their food and products such as vines for hammocks and rope, edible mushrooms and insects. One of its most important products is curare poison. It is essential for the Yanomama hunting system and obtained from the wild liana vines.

Curare, after it has been prepared very carefully by special members of the tribe, is used in hunting. The effect of the poison is to relax the muscles of the victim until he dies.

Particularly effective with monkeys, a favourite food, they fall from the trees rather than dying from wounds in the upper limbs of the branches.

Through the centuries these people have responded and adapted to pressures of their harsh environment by shaping a culture that is imaginative and highly complex.

This Yanomama culture demands aggressive behaviour but provides a regulated system of duels and club fights through which violence can be controlled.

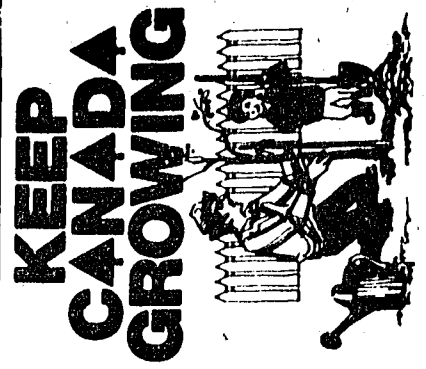

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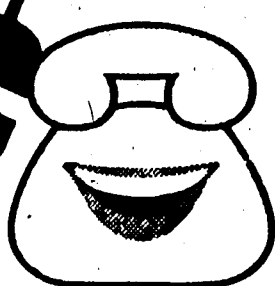
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Board Passes Resolution On Legal Strikes

MacInnis Speaks On Bill 7 (c)

A meeting of the Hopefellowship Association for the Mentally Retarded was held at the Adult Services Centre, Conway, May 9th with a good attendance. Articles made at the Activity Centre were on display. There are presently six trainees at the centre.

A presentation of Bill 7 (c) of the Education Act by Mr. C. MacInnis, Superintendent of Schools, Digby area, followed the business meeting. Bill 7 (c) of the Education Act states "Each Municipal School Board and Board of School Commissioners shall provide for all pupils resident in Municipality, City or Town who are qualified to pursue the studies in the grades or courses for which they are enrolled. This includes

instruction for physically and mentally handicapped persons between the ages of five and twenty-one residing in the area under jurisdiction. Enthusiastic discussion followed the presentation.

Possibilities of developing a Day Care centre for Mentally handicapped in facilities available in the Children's Training Centre provided by the Department of Social Services were also discussed.

The need for a survey in the area was clearly demonstrated. Such a survey would properly indicate the need for Day Care services and special classes in our schools.

Services in Digby for Mentally Retarded are:

1. Digby Training Centre - formerly known as Digby Children's Home.
2. Adult Services Centre.

Children's Training Centre provides services for severely retarded children up to 16 years of age. This service is funded totally by Dept. of Social Services.

The Adult Services Centre in Conway provides services to retarded adults. It is a service provided by the Hope Fellowship Association for the Mentally Retarded Digby Branch.

The association hopes to provide and develop a community residence when funds are available. A building was made available to the association. Added expenses have to be incurred to register and meet government regulation.

Funding of the associations activities is entirely by generous donations of service clubs, organizations, individuals, and grants.

The association hopes to see more services implemented for the mentally retarded and handicapped by the school system, as Dept. of Education is now responsible for the education of all children by legislation of Bill 7c.

Adult services centre will be able to continue and develop programmes for the graduates from schools, N.S. training Centre; Truro - Where do these graduates go now when they no longer are able to have services available in Truro?

Six trainees are now at the centre with basic skills and arts and crafts.

It is the hope and desire of the association to expand the programme as the need is there.

Ferry Rising Prices

Rising prices on the Bay of Fundy Ferry services was chief concern at the May 8th meeting of the Digby-Annapolis Tourist and Recreation Council held at the Ward Room at CFB Cornwallis.

The Council, prior to the increase just announced, had written to the Minister of Tourism regarding the CPR Ferry prices and service and replies were read. The twenty members at the meeting on Monday night concluded that the time had past to do letter writing and send telegrams on the matter and stronger action of protest is required.

Boycotting and advertising campaigns to inform the public was suggested. A motion was passed requesting William Troupe, president, to contact the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade and persons in the immediate area to determine what could be done in co-ordinated effort to get some specific action. The tourist operators and business people were pessimistic about the effects on tourism of increased prices but felt with an election coming it would be difficult to get a roll back on prices for the coming tourist season.

A discussion on boating and a Digby Marina was held with Joseph Casey MLA who was present at the meeting. Mr. Casey agreed to contact the Department of Development or

Department of Recreation as to meeting with the Council on promoting small boat activity in the area. A special meeting will be called when something definite is arranged.

It was also suggested that Council meet with other interested parties to promote historical sights and to attend to the possibility of having local theatre groups present historical plays at Fort Anne. Rural Beautification Seminar

Mrs. Eleanor Elms, Conway, secretary of the Digby County Rural Beautification Committee and her daughter, Heather, were in Middleton on Monday evening to attend a seminar and hear Mrs. Eric Meek, Canning, provincial vice-president, as speaker.

"Make Nova Scotia Beautiful" is the aim of Rural Beautification this year, and the time has arrived to do just that. This organization is sponsored by the "Women's Institute", Federation of Agriculture and is funded by the Department of Tourism.

Nearly every county in N.S. has formed a Rural Beautification Committee, to promote the programme and competition. The competition is open to anyone living in the rural area of Nova Scotia, including villages not towns or cities.

The competition is divided into seven categories.

Section I of the competition is community improvement. This is a community effort and includes everything that will contribute to the beautification of the community.

Section II Community services which is the cleaning up and beautifying of publicly or a privately owned facility: e.g. church, hall, cemetery, park, etc.

Section III Rural homes and buildings improvement is open to people living in rural areas and whose chief occupation is in that community and in a resource industry: e.g. farming, fishing, lumbering or mining.

Section IV Rural residences improvement is open to residents in rural areas, whose chief occupation is other than farming, fishing, lumbering or

mining.

Section V Mobile home improvement by making lawns, planting flowers, shrubbery etc. would all add to the beauty of their surroundings.

Section VI County option. This could be a mailbox, poster or essay contest. This is something for the county committee to use their ideas on promoting beautification.

Section VII Youth group competition. 4-H clubs, church groups, C.G.I.T., etc. groups who are responsible for improving a picnic area, monuments or park area may enter this group.

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Minister Mooney Outlines Tax Reduction Procedures

HALIFAX - Municipal Affairs Minister J. Fraser Mooney has issued instructions to all municipal units in the Province, outlining the procedure to reduce residential property taxes by 25 percent for the year 1974.

The reduction applies to homeowners and tenants of residential property.

The province will pay to each municipality, 25 percent of the 1974 property tax bill, up to the maximum of \$200.00 per residential property taxpayer or tenant.

Guidelines are contained for municipalities that have already billed their taxpayers as well as for those that have not as yet sent out their tax bills.

Following is the text of the minister's letter to all the mayors and wardens in Nova Scotia:

As you are aware, the Government of Nova Scotia has undertaken to reduce residential property taxes by twenty-five percent during the 1974 year, and this reduction is to apply to homeowners and tenants of residential property.

It has been determined that the Province of Nova Scotia shall pay to each municipality, on behalf of each residential property taxpayer and each tenant, twenty-five percent of the 1974 tax bill, up to the maximum of \$200.00, per residential property taxpayer or tenant.

Residential property tax means tax that is paid to the municipality in respect to residential premises and includes occupancy tax.

Residential premises includes any house, dwelling, apartment, flat, tenement, mobile home, mobile home park, or other place that is occupied or may be occupied by an individual as a residence, or that part of any such place that is or may be occupied by an individual as a residence, and further includes real property upon which a simple family residential premise is being constructed or for which a building permit has been issued at the date the tax bill was or is sent out by the municipal unit.

Mobile home space means a plot of ground within a mobile park designed to accommodate one mobile home.

Residential property does not include non-residential property or the portion thereof used for non-residential purposes and does not include property owned and rented to a person by the Department of National Defence, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the Nova Scotia Housing Authorities, nor does it include boarding homes nor nursing homes nor universities. The farm property eligible for the refund means that piece or parcel of farm land assessed by the municipal unit upon which the residence of the farmer is situated. The size of the lot is immaterial so long as it is one piece of property assessment and has constructed thereon the residence of the farmer.

In the case of owner occupied single family dwellings, if the municipal unit has not as yet sent out its tax bills in respect of residential property tax, then it may either deduct from such bill twenty-five percent of the tax up to the maximum of \$200.00, and bill the person levied for the balance, or it may send out its bills and inform its taxpayers that they will obtain a receipt for payment in full upon making payment of the greater of seventy-five percent of the tax bill or the tax bill minus \$200.00. If the municipality has already sent out its tax bills, then it should inform its taxpayers that they have paid the bill in full upon having paid the greater of seventy-five percent of the tax bill minus \$200.00. This action may be taken in respect of residential real property tax, occupancy tax and personal property tax.

In the case where the residential property tax is paid through a Mortgage Company, legislation will be introduced at the next session of the legislature to deal with the matter of the mortgage companies responsibility.

In the case of multiple family units where there is a landlord-tenant relationship, legislation will also be introduced which will set out the procedure to be followed here, including the matter of the responsibility of the landlord.

In the matter of separating commercial and industrial assessments from those classified as residential, guidelines will be issued to the regional directors of assessment and town and municipal clerks within the next few days.

To enable you to implement this program immediately, we are enclosing a cheque, in the amount of \$ (Municipality Allocation), representing the first installment on anticipated claims. Further installments will be made in due course.

A total of nine students left the city on May 11 for the Eastern Caribbean not for a fun in the sun holiday but to spend the summer months providing some technical know-how to three developing islands.

The contingent of students will work on the islands of Barbados, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent in a variety of fields such as: architecture, agricultural, civil, mechanical, electrical engineering, and auto mechanics. The group will spend from a minimum of six weeks to four months.

Known simply as Short Term Overseas Assignments, this year's program is a continuation of last year's pilot project to the islands, which was originated at Nova Scotia Technical College.

Funding for the project is split three ways with the island governments and the college contributing 50 percent and Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) providing the remaining 50 percent.

The pilot project, which cost \$50,000 involved five participants. This year the program will cost an estimated \$104,000 and involves nine people of which Civil engineering student Lewis F. Landers, of Digby, will also assist the Ministry of Education on Barbados in preparing



engineering surveys and drawings associated with the school building program. Initially the Caribbean Islands were picked because they are the closest developing nations to Canada but Professor Nelson Ferguson feels the program will grow and perhaps involve more countries farther afield.

As long as there is a need for technical input, Professor Ferguson said, the universities of Canada can play an important role in aiding developing nations.

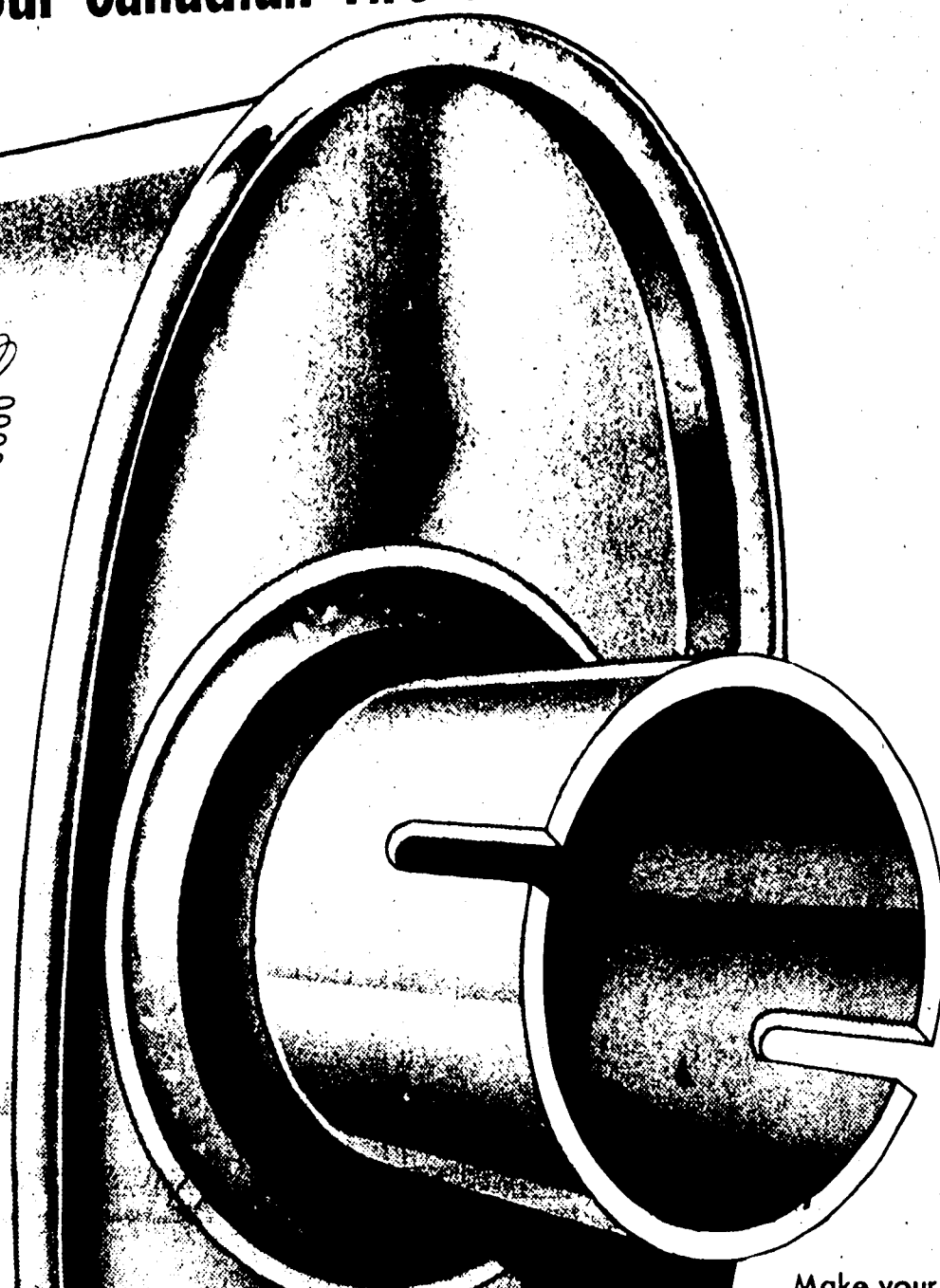

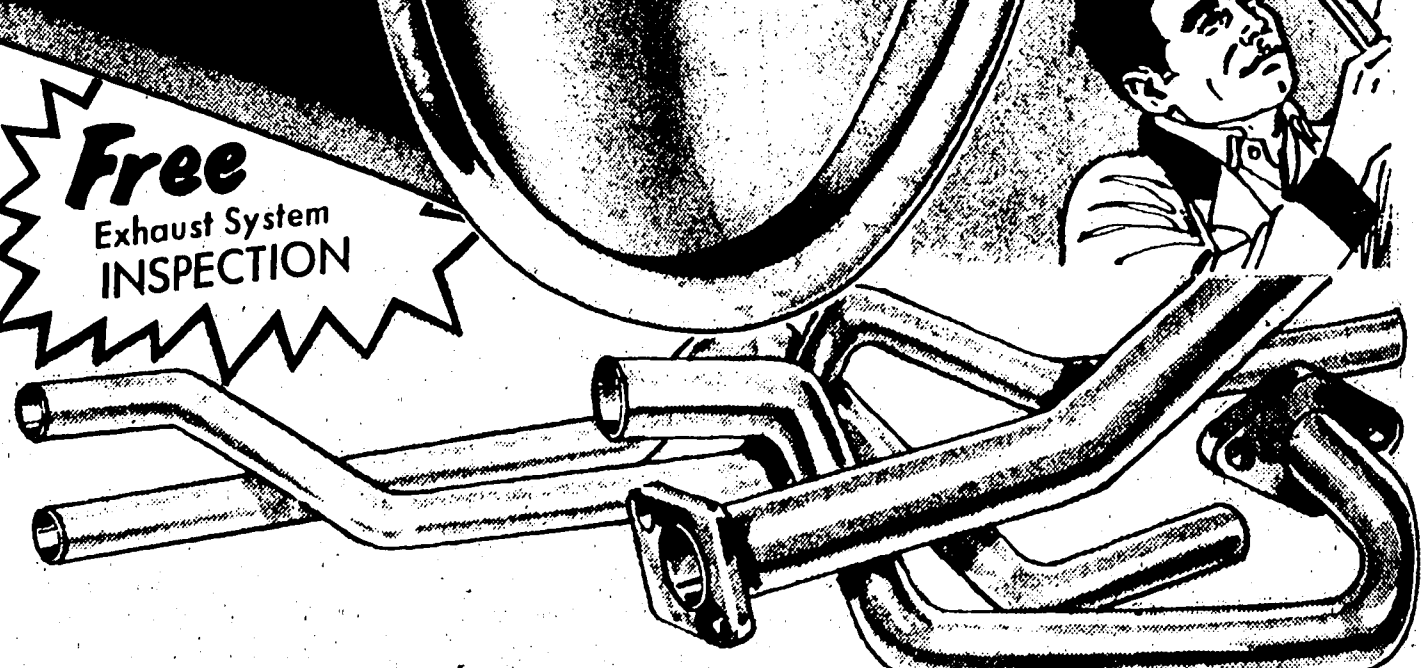

Spring Blood Donor Clinics Announced

Wednesday, May 22nd, has been announced as the date of Digby's Spring Blood Donor Clinic, which is to be held at the Lions Club Hall, Queen St., under the joint auspices of the Digby Red Cross Branch and the Lions Club. E.B. Tufts, Red Cross Area Chairman, states that arrangements have been made for three sessions of the Clinic: 10 to 12 in the morning, 2 to 4 in the afternoon and 6 to 9 in the evening. The usual assistance for the Red Cross Blood Donor Team from Halifax will be provided by local nurses under the convener'ship of Mrs. C.D. Snow, R.N., and other Red Cross Branch members who will register donors and serve refreshments.

An improvement in the method of registration has been made by the Canadian Red Cross Society, which announces that it has joined the "computer Age". This is outlined in the following statement from the Nova Scotia Blood Donor Service:

The new system complete with plastic identification plates and computer memory banks, is now being introduced in Nova Scotia. As mobile blood donor clinics are held in the province, donors will become a part of the change. It will take about three months to re-register blood donors to the new computer system. When a donor goes to the next clinic, he will be processed under the new system.

The reasons for the change from hand written cards to computer data are linked to the efficiency of retrieving information about donors and the expanded data needed on blood technology and making the Blood Donor Service a truly National Programme throughout Canada.

In a matter of minutes the computer will be able to print out what donors are eligible to give blood, what group they are and where they live. Matched to an emergency need for blood in any part of the province - donors can be quickly contacted to meet the urgent demand.

The updating of the Blood Donor Service is hailed as good. But it is NO good without you, the Blood Donor - and this means you, and YOU and YOU! The Red Cross committee urges everyone to think seriously about the vital need for blood and to attend the Clinic. Nature soon replaces the pint of blood for the donor, but only the donor can provide the blood for the accident victim or the hospital patient whose life depends on a transfusion.

The Digby Clinic serves all the surrounding area from Bear River, Digby Neck and the Islands. Donors may obtain further information regarding the Clinic or transportation from any of the following members of the Committee and Area Representatives: E.B. Tufts, Area Chairman; Stewart MacNaughton, Vice-Chairman; Harold Emerson, President Digby Red Cross Branch; Miss Linda MacIntosh, President Red Cross Youth; Robert Ellis, President Digby Lions Club; Mayor Willard Kinney, all of Digby; Lawrence Henshaw, Bear River; Ralph Cosman, Weymouth; Mrs. Ivan Moore, Freeport; Sgt. 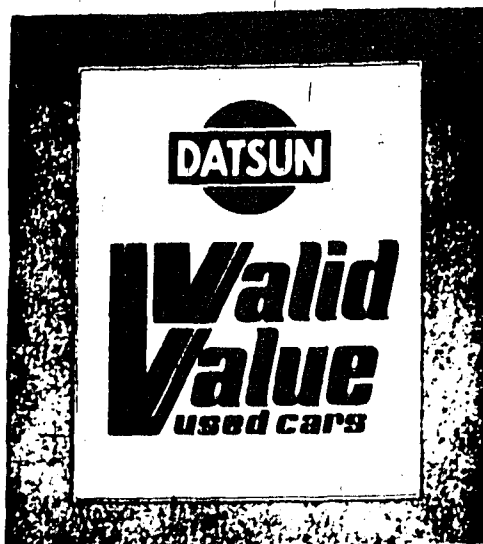

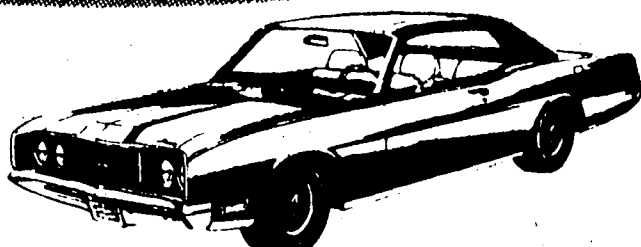

CAHILL, UNITED STATES MARSHAL

The new John Wayne western, "coming close on the heels of 'The Train Robbers,'" is one of his best in the action class in some time. It stands with "The Cowboys," a good film which didn't do the business it should have, as his most outstanding achievement so far in the Seventies. The screenplay by Harry Julian Fink and Rita M. Fink was filmed in the familiar Durango, Mexico, locale under the title "Wednesday Morning." Director Andrew V. McLaglen used a veteran cast to delight the heart of any "movie buff," starting with some of the surviving members of John Ford's stock company—Harry Carey Jr., Hank Worden, Denver Pyle, Paul Fix, Chuck Roberson—who also acted as stunt coordinator—and including Jackie Coogan, Royal Dano and Marie Windsor in a rare leading lady appearance. George Kennedy and Neville Brand have strong roles, while young Gary Grimes and Clay O'Brien provide adolescent and teenage appeal. The plot appears to be a variation on Wayne's "Big Jake" (1971), even to the casting of Brand in the role played by the late Bruce Cabot. Familiarity may breed contempt with other films, but with Big Duke the formula always seems right. Produced by Michael Wayne, the Batjac production is in Panavision and Technicolor.

SHOWDOWN Universal

Two stars who've made an impact on TV are paired in an average Western produced and directed by George Seaton, his first feature since "Airport" (1970). Dean Martin, who has a top-rated TV variety show, and Rock Hudson of "McMillan and Wife" are the leads in "Showdown", with Susan Clark as the object of their affections. Screenplay by Theodore Taylor, from a story by Hank Fine, uses a constant flashback technique (employing a black & white negative dissolving into color)

to show the relationship between Martin and Hudson, lifelong friends now on opposite sides of the law. The time is just before 1900 and a realistic flavor is added by historical references to the Rough Riders and the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight and the use of an early hand-cranked washing machine. The story combines action, drama and comedy and is at its best with the action content. Shot in Todd-AO 35 and Technicolor, the Universal release has an interesting climax in Sequoia National Forest. Scenes of the forest fire were stretched out from a smaller ratio movie. Production delays didn't hurt the film's slick professional look. In the action market, the star names will draw.

THE NEPTUNE FACTOR

The ocean is regarded as the last unexplored frontier on earth and Sanford Howard's production of "The Neptune Factor", subtitled "An Undersea Odyssey," indicates that the depths hold many beautiful and mysterious wonders. Topped by a cast headed by four name actors, the Canadian-made adventure should ring up healthy grosses as one of 20th Century-Fox's major summer releases. The picture was one of six discussed recently in the company's series of marketing seminars. Exhibitors are therefore aware of what aids are available to help sell the film while innumerable tie-ins are obvious. As directed by Daniel Petrie, the Jack DeWitt script concerns the efforts to locate an undersea lab which has been swept to the bottom of the sea by an earthquake. Ben Gazzara is the commander who leads the search operations, having his own ideas on priorities. He adopts a Southern drawl while co-star Yvette Mimieux uses a Canadian inflection. The story isn't necessarily the thing, since the actors and the plot have to take second place to the creatures around them. It isn't a large scale epic, but rather solid

THE WAY WE WERE

This Barbara Streisand-Robert Redford comedy-drama is excellent entertainment and may wind up as the company's most successful film of 73. Directed by Sydney Pollack, the film is the third Columbia-Rastar-Streisand production (following "Funny Girl" and "The Owl and the Pussycat") and was adapted by playwright Arthur Laurents from his first novel. Shot in Manhattan, Upstate New York and Hollywood, the film spans a period from 1937 to the early '50s. Three's a lot for the nostalgia buffs: the songs and styles of those years, a Marx Brothers costume party in which nearly everyone does a

takeoff on Groucho (Streisand comes as Harpo), even a bit by '40s teen star Marcia Mae Jones. Historically, there are: World War II and the death of FDR, an, most interestingly, the house Un-American Activities Committee investigations, a previously taboo subject. For women's libbers, Streisand's very strong character, a woman with the courage of her convictions, contrasted with Redford's likeable but weak and inconsistent role (at one point, she seduces him). Other elements include a good love story, comedy and the message that radicals can be decent people. In short, something for everyone.

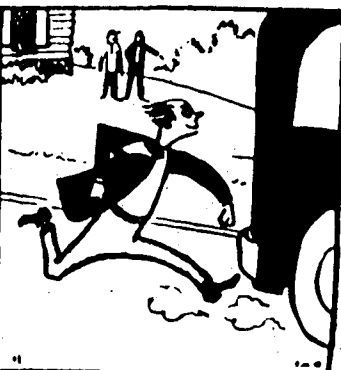

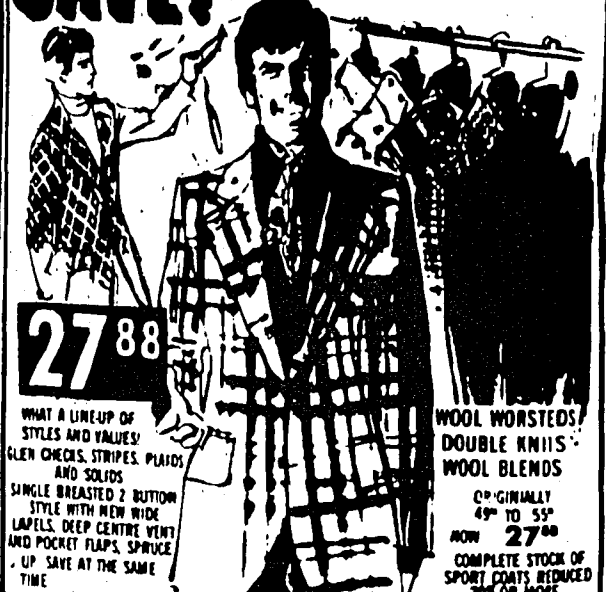

Clam Depuration Plant At Digby

Hon. A.M. (Sandy) Cameron, Minister of Fisheries, today announced a joint project between his Department and the federal Fisheries Service involving an experimental clam depuration plant to be tested at Digby in July and August and again in March and April, 1975, during the period of greatest fresh water runoff.

Depuration is a means of

cleansing clams contaminated with bacteria from sewage pollution. This will be accomplished by purifying sea water from Annapolis Basin by passing it under ultra-violet lights which destroy the bacteria, leaving the clams in this purified water for 48 hours in which time the bacteria are eliminated from the clams by the process of digestion.

The pilot plant operation will be set up at Alan Fisheries Ltd. on a comparatively small scale to handle 20 bushels of clams per day. All five major closed areas in the Basin will be sampled in a systematic manner. The depuration process and bacteriological assessment will be carried out under the supervision of the federal Fisheries and Marine Service.

Mr. Cameron noted that large areas in Annapolis Basin are closed because of sewage pollution and if the results of this experiment are positive, a substantial increase in earnings would be available to the industry in 1975. Controlled and systematic harvesting of these closed areas would prevent the serious depletion of clam stocks which is now prevalent throughout the non-polluted flats, presumably from over-digging.

Mr. Cameron also noted that commercial depuration was not planned for the Annapolis Basin until the experiment is completed in spring 1975 and the results are found to be satisfactory.

The swimming pool purchased by the Digby Kiwanis Club is expected to be in Digby soon, according to information received from a representative of the company who was present at the regular meeting of Kiwanis on Thursday.

Program for the evening was a film "Better Odds For A Longer Life". The program was in charge of Sam MacKay.

C.M. Levy reported the Easter page sponsored by Kiwanis in The Digby Courier had brought in a revenue of \$500.

Improve Local Airport

Twenty men along with bulldozers, backhoes and other equipment arrived early on Saturday at the Digby Municipal Airport at Hill Grove where they spent the entire day constructing a driveway, digging a well, improving the existing runway and continuing a cross-wind runway which got its start about two years ago. The driveway leads to building site for new facilities or terminal.

The entire force on Saturday was from the newly formed Digby Flying Club who are giving their services in improving and upkeeping of the airport. Another crew and repeaters also worked on Sunday. Construction plans were made by Lewis Wyles assisted by Club members.

THE IRONY OF IT ALL

While twenty or more women met at the Knights of Columbus Hall on Wednesday evening with a representative from the Department of Recreation to study what can be done to provide for the leisure time to be "inflicted" on women, the men of the community were so busy that a quorum could not be scared up to carry on the important annual meeting of the Digby Recreation Commission. True there happened to be the two meetings, mentioned, a Marshlands meeting, a Teachers meeting and several other meetings, but, even so, the ironic situation still exists in that on one hand we are so busy we can't attend to all the organizations we have and on the other hand we are making ourselves busy planning up something for our future leisure on the possibility of a four day work week.

Not that the women's recreation meeting didn't have a right to be held. It could very well be that this supplying of a fill-in for women's leisure time could turn out to be an important part of their lives. But, what about now? It is like robbing Peter to pay Paul. Should the women have more stake in the Digby Recreation Commission? Nothing has prevented their participation, so far as we know, yet few have participated. In fact, we heard the remark by women that women should be included on the new-to-be-formed Recreation Committee. Maybe that is the secret and we have every reason to believe that women would be welcomed on the committee.

Again, we do not mean to dampen any enthusiasm for recreation or useful occupying of women's leisure time but we do want to draw attention to the fact that we were so busy planning for leisure-time that we couldn't rightfully attend to the "busy-time". There must be an answer or a satisfactory solution somewhere.

THE QUIET REVOLUTION OF HOPE FOR RETARDED

Normalization.

The word may not mean much to you.

You may not even find it in your dictionary.

Normalization, simply put, means letting the mentally retarded person obtain an existence as close to the normal as possible.

It means for example, that the mentally retarded person be given the chance to do things we've long denied him, because our expectations of him were so low.

It means we must free him to live in more normal settings. Sleeping in wards of 50 or more, taking every meal in huge cafeterias, or bathing in mass showers will never produce normal behaviour. So we must change that.

It means we must free him to move and communicate in ways typical for his age; to use typical community resources be they recreational, religious, medical, social or whatever. Being isolated in remote institutions or hospitals where one is labelled as a patient or inmate, and where one cannot mix with other community residents or enjoy community amenities, is hardly conducive to normal behaviour. So we must change that.

For too long, we have reduced the potential and normalcy of the mentally retarded person, and have further retarded his development. We have stressed the negative, not the positive. We have pointed out his

"differentness" not his likeness to the rest of us. The mentally retarded person, for his part, being neither vocal nor articulate, has accepted his fate quietly. The Canadian Association for the Mentally Retarded and its nine provincial and 350 local associations are trying to change that. And we all must help.

It's time we revolutionized our thinking. It's time we raised our expectations of the mentally retarded. Old attitudes and fears die hard.

But let's give normalization - and the mentally retarded - a chance.

Donate to the Flowers of Hope when the packages containing seeds of hope arrive in the mails and support the mentally retarded.

Hodge Podge

A group of women in discussing women's recreation last week tried to think up Digby's outstanding needs. One suggestion was good even sidewalks so that you don't have to walk on stones. And she didn't live on Birch Street either. Have patience. There's a sewer project on right now.

Wonder if the Red Cross ever advertises for volunteer help for Women's Work if they'll have to use the words "Wanted, volunteers for Red Cross Women's Work, male or female." Any male replies, we are sure, would be accepted for quilting, sewing, knitting, etc.

A paradox. While youth organizations cry for leadership and mother participation, adults and mothers wonder what they'll do with leisure time.

Campaign To Date Success

The Salvation Army's Red Shield Campaign is well on its way to being a success in the Digby area. To date more than a thousand dollars has been collected, approximately half the quota of \$2200. Campaign chairman, Captain William Moore says he is pleased with the response he has received. Collectors have been as far as Beaver River and have covered the main road to Little River and most villages through to Concession.

Although collectors are out every day, there will still be more time, probably to the middle of June, before the entire district is finished. Bear River, the Neck and Islands, Digby's main street and Warwick St. have not yet been canvassed. Donations may be left with Captain Moore or Fabian O'Neil at the Bank of Commerce.

Success with the Digby Salvation Army Red Shield Campaign means that Digby's men, women, boys and girls who need encouragement, counselling, help in many ways, can look forward to 1974 with more hope, more assurance that they will not be forgotten by The Salvation Army.

There is not an age or social level untouched by The Salvation Army's workers. But how much practical help can be offered rests with those who support the balance of the Red Shield Campaign. It's not over yet, and it won't be until every person who wants to help has had a chance. When yours comes, remember that the need is great, and it takes people who are big in heart to answer it.

"If you don't need our help, we need yours." is the Red Shield Campaign slogan.

University Degree Not Be-All

While a university education is an important goal, a university degree is not a be-all and it is just as important to get a trade as a degree. There seems to be a prejudice toward university and many students stay in academic courses who are not suited for such courses. These were some of the sentiments expressed on Thursday evening when Digby Regional High School teachers met Grade 10 students and their parents at the DRHS multipurpose room to acquaint parents with the various courses offered at DRHS and to give them some understanding about how the school operates. Approximately twenty responded to more than one hundred invitations sent out.

The meeting was chaired by Lister Hannah, principal and other DRHS teachers present were: Rupert Haley, vice-principal; Ronald Fraser, guidance counsellor; and Mr. Glancy. Present from the Vocational School in Middleton were: Jack Rodda and G. MacDonald who showed slides depicting the operation of the vocational courses.

Mr. Hannah explained the three different programs offered at DRHS viz university, inclined program, non university and business

education. The minimum subjects required are five but six subjects are encouraged. Presently 80 per cent of the students take six subjects and it is hopeful that next year will see 100 per cent of the students carrying six subjects. Subjects can be from either of the three programs or the subjects chosen can be from the courses integrated. By Grade 10 it was felt that students should become aware, with the help of the parent and guidance counsellor, about his choice of occupation or profession in life. Three quarters of the problems of students are won, it was found, when there are interested parents.

Mr. Hannah spoke of the Business Education courses, including English, business math, accounting, banking, office practice and shorthand. This year there was introduced an introductory course in Grade 10 but the main courses are in Grades 10 and 12. The rate of obtaining jobs is high, he remarked, and some of the students have now accepted positions. A one-year course, secretarial 300, is also offered for students who have completed grade 12 and wish to take advantage of the course.

The teachers explained that the school operates on a six-day cycle rather than certain subjects on any particular day of the week. There are seven periods a day which makes 42 periods in the six-day cycle. Of these the student has 38 periods inclass and four periods of study area such as library use. Students are not permitted to hang around corridors or deface property but the senior students are permitted to go down town on errands during study periods or use the break for collecting thoughts. Junior high school study periods are under supervision.

Parents were advised that the grade system is going out and a continuous progress program used to meet the needs and interests of every student and give him an opportunity to progress at his own rate. Those who plan university on

technical education might be required to consider certain compulsory subjects for his particular field. Mr. Fraser said his guidance department tries to motivate the students into thinking of their future by the group method but they make no effort to push students or pigeon-hole them for a career. The prime purpose of education, it was noted, is to prepare for life.

The vocational school staff members gave a list of vocational courses available at Middleton where students must have a grade 9 education to enroll but Grade 10 is preferable. It is becoming acceptable, they remarked to go back to school at any age to continue an education.

Reading was considered important. A low reading level was considered a serious handicap and caused many drop-outs.

Mr. Haley advised parents of the student's timetable which provides flexibility in the program. Students can repeat subjects but not necessarily repeat grades.

Request Dyke Reinforcement

The St. Mary's Bay Marshlands committee which met at the Conway Co-Op on Wednesday evening passed a resolution requesting the Nova Scotia government to reinforce the dyke on the shoreline at the

marshland and that assistance be given for drainage to help get the land in production. Present at the meeting was David Milligan, Marshland Engineer with the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture, who explained the condition of the dyke which is much in need of repairs in some sections and will have to be rock faced on the shore side to prevent erosion.

The meeting presided over by Chipman Chisholm, Bear River, president, discussed the value of marshland in relation to livestock production in the area and the future potential of the land. During the past few years 250 or more cattle have been pastured and thousands of bales of hay harvested. The salt is now being bathed out to a degree where grain can be grown on the land.

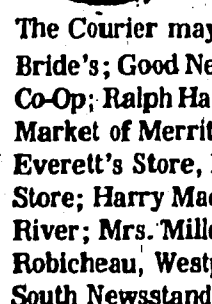

Mrs. Lister Hannah volunteered to call the next meeting dealing with Women's Recreation in Digby to be sponsored by the Nova Scotia Department of Recreation. Mrs. Hannah volunteered on Wednesday evening when Mrs. Fulton (Kathryn) Logan, Halifax, Research Officer Women and Recreation Study for the department made the request at the first meeting held in Digby to discuss the subject. More than 20 women assembled at the Knights of Columbus Hall when Mrs. Max (Daneen) Robbins of the Department of Social Services chaired the meeting and introduced Mrs. Logan, formerly of Digby, who led the discussion.

Mrs. Logan said the government singled out women for the

study because statistics indicate that women do not operate nor participate in recreation the same as men even from a child up. She said another reason is that recreation used to be sports only but now it is looked at for the aged, the handicapped and others. Seventy-five percent of the Senior Citizens she said are women. She said that the third reason has to do with equal rights for women. This is not to change the role of women but to enhance their role. Statistics, Mrs. Logan continued, show that seventy-five percent of Nova Scotia women do nothing constructive with their leisure time and surveys show that programs are structured to the male population and also not to the adult and aged.

In discussing the needs of Digby, it was noted that Digby does not have swimming facilities, not sufficient parks to sit in the shade, no community centre on place for individual recreation. While Plympton delegates and New Tusket lacked meeting places and transportation the Islands representatives regretted that the schools there has no physical fitness program.

All representatives felt that better use should be made of school facilities and that the community should be made aware that the school is theirs and likewise the school buses. The suggestion was also made that C.F. Bases might also be more fully utilized. Schools, it was said in discussion, should be the centre of the community and have four r's, reading, writing, arithmetic and recreation. The representatives had regrets that there is nothing replacing the village school in the community. Revival of the community spirit was advocated.

Recreation was considered by the women to be an important part of life in women's future and it is well to prepare for it. Self improvement and cultural opportunities were considered important in the recreational discussions. The consensus of opinion was that women should be active on the new recreation committee in the process of being formed in Digby.

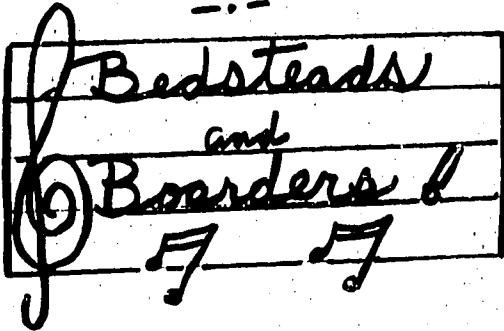

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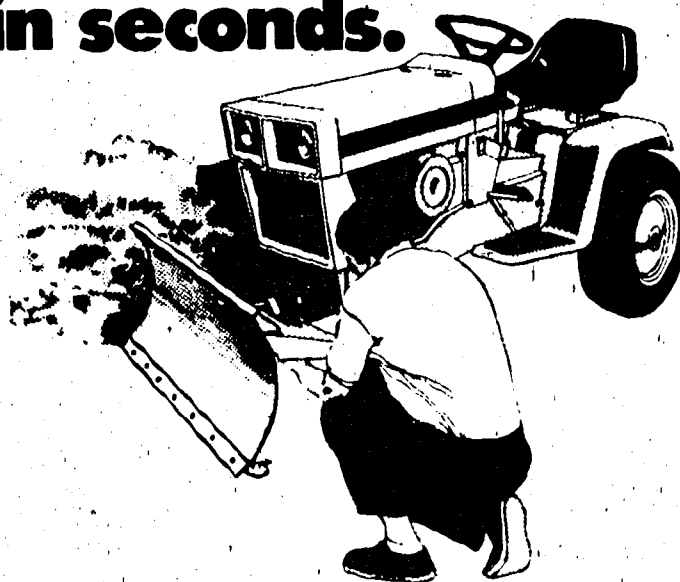

Parliamentary Commentary

This letter should perhaps be headed "Final Report" from the 29th Parliament. There has been a gradual breaking down of relations between the Liberals and the N.D.P. for the past few weeks. Among the bad news were back on it but nevertheless it was there. On Monday night Finance Minister Turner brought in a budget which had a mixture of good and bad news concerning about taxes on

corporation, the unfortunate aspect of these taxes is that it places many of our important operations at a disadvantage if compared with U.S. corporations or others in the world. The result of that is that it will be far easier for American corporations to operate in certain fields in Canada than for a Canadian firm to operate.

From the partisan point of view, the chief criticism of the Budget which I would levy is that it did not in any way attempt to attack the problems of inflation and indeed would likely make inflation a good deal worse since the government is anticipating increased expenditures of a 29 per cent over last year. It is generally felt here that if inflation is to be curbed, and if the cost of living is to be brought under control, the first sector of the economy which has to be brought under control is government spending.

There was some legislation given Royal Assent this week in a flurry of activity: Bill C-4 was passed which is the Export and Import Act; Bill C-6 amending the National Parks Act, Bill C-14 an Act to amend the Farm Improvement Loans Act, Small Business Act and Fisheries Improvement Act; Bill C-27, Railway Relocation and Crossing Act; Bill C-27, an Act respecting Electoral Boundaries and Bill C-281, an Act respecting Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act.

There was of course a good deal of legislation proposed for this Session which died with the Parliament. The Government made much of the fact that it was the action of the Opposition Parties that was bringing about that unhappy result, however, it's not something that we should worry too much about because any of the good legislation which was proposed will obviously be re-introduced at the next Session whether the Government is formed by the Liberals or by the Conservatives.

The final 2 days of the Session were very exciting. The first time in history that a Government was defeated on its Budget and this is only the fourth time since Confederation

that a Government had been defeated in the House. Prime Minister Trudeau made a very long and passionate speech on Tuesday during the course of which he gave the N.D.P. Party a pretty hard time. We thought that was rather uncharitable since they had been so much helped to them during the Session. I must say that the nature of his speech was different from anything that I had seen him do before and obviously if he commits himself in that manner during the campaign it will be a very different campaign than the 1972 one. He was less the philosopher and more the street brawler.

Mr. Stanfield was, by general agreement, at his best on Wednesday when he spoke refuting any arguments which Mr. Trudeau had raised the day before and assuring the people, that an election in the House, and the Canadian people, that an election in the House, was in the best interest of the Canadian people.

Only time will tell what the outcome will be. Members with more experience than I have tell me that this has been a very difficult Session for M.P.'s because of the necessity of being here all the time, giving little opportunity to stay in personal contact with people in their ridings and placing an unusually work load on all members. You people as voters may think that's all for the best.

My senses tell me that the Conservative Party, who was jubilant in the House on Wednesday, believes that we will be returning after July 8th to form the Government in a Majority.

To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I have read and reread recent press statements, reported to have been made by a cabinet minister of the government of this province.

I am appalled. Expropriation has been an ugly word in my dictionary for as many years as I have watched the last of this unbridled whip sear and destroy the rights, the freedoms and in some cases involving the elderly, the very lives of its defenceless victims.

The recent expropriation assault levelled upon a South Shore property owner, Mrs. Dorothy Wood, has been fittingly described as "a shameful chapter in the history of Nova Scotia" written by the Minister of Lands and Forests, Dr. Maurice Delory.

Are we to assume then, that in an ugly trail of ill-will across the nation and throughout the United States, leaving in its wake the scars of injustice that will long remain a monument of shame to its author and to the government of Nova Scotia.

Mrs. Wood is an American who has owned property in Queens County for 22 years, and during the past five years her son has been a permanent resident, with landed migrant status.

Characteristic of Americans who own property in Nova Scotia, the Woods have protected the land from the destructive development so prevalent today among local land owners (who are often encouraged with the blessing and assistance of government), and have preserved all the original character of the beaches, islands and forests within its boundaries. The land has not been restricted and some of the local residents are said to have camps on the property.

Why, then, has the Wood family been selected as the target for this Gestapo-type of short-gun approach by a government with no determined plan for the use of the site? Dr. Delory's explanations so far represent little more than contradictory and evasive mutterings.

He reportedly admits that at no time did the government indicate to the owners that it would expropriate it an earlier request to purchase was refused. "We didn't feel it was proper to threaten them with expropriation," he said, "you don't threaten people like that."

Then he added, it was his opinion the department had made the right approach. "We offered to buy, they refused, and we had no alternative but to expropriate."

He attempts to justify his act by pointing out that only one family was involved, and that to get the same amount of land in any other part of the province the government would have had to disrupt a larger number of people.

It is understandable that a small group of nationalists and developers might applaud this artificial strategy.

The lower he man or beast, has little recourse when attacked where larger numbers of people are involved, the opportunity for self-protection is strengthened, as was witnessed on the Eastern Shore of Nova Scotia last year, when hundreds of threatened and battered residents were able to save their homes from expropriation for a park, only after long and arduous, organized collective efforts.

At the same time, the Minister is quoted as saying, "The government will continue to look for opportunities to purchase more shore-front property when it becomes available."

Are we to assume then, that in its dealings with other (perhaps native) property owners in future, purchases will be made only when the land becomes available through the more civilized and democratic channels of mutual consent, rather than the Fascist type of dictatorship employed in dealing with the American family?

Dr. Delory's alleged statement in the daily press of April 24, suggesting there were no immediate plans for developing the site into a park, bears resemblance to a story published in the Bridgewater Bulletin in August 22, 1973, headed, "Lands and Forests Minister Delory says no immediate local park plans." On this date the reference was made to the area covering the shoreline from Penz to Cherry Hill in Lunenburg County, some 40 to 50 miles along the coast from the Wood property in Queens County. This area, from Penz to Cherry Hill, of about 150 sq. miles, was said to have been surveyed, photographed and catalogued, with a view to its possible use as a national park, though residents claimed their representative, Dr. Delory, had told them nothing of this matter which, if pursued, could mean a mass expropriation of their homes and destruction of their communities.

Another chapter of the Delory memoirs was dramatized on a cattle-grazing island in Guysborough County in June 1972. Only after Grassy Island was sold at a municipal tax sale to a Maine farmer, for \$12,200, did the provincial government indicate an interest in it, though as far back as 1942 residents had petitioned the government to prevent the island's sale because of its use as a cattle grazing area. Dr. Delory later told the House that the island was advertised along with another island, and not clearly indicated by name, it was sold to the American organization, Ducks Unlimited, because of "misrepresentation by the seller." He rejected a

call by the Guysborough municipal clerk to withdraw these charges, and to publicly exonerate Guysborough municipal officials, though a legal opinion, prepared for the Lands and Forests department, from T. Daniel Trambel, solicitor for McNamara, Meenan and Trambel of Antigonish, concluded that the sale was legal and could not be set aside. On February 21, 1973, the Chronicle Herald reported that Rex Varnum, the American who purchased the island, had donated it to the province.

An editorial entitled "No Panic," which appeared in the Kentville Advertiser on May 3, 1973, leads on further into the maze of bewilderment as it ironically reveals the contradictory nature of the Minister's performance.

It reads in part, "Recent sale of about 60 acres of Nova Scotia land in Boston received a good deal of publicity, generated no doubt, by the touchiness (one might almost say hysteria) with which land sales to foreigners are viewed in some quarters. Lands and Forests Minister Delory made some reference to the sale and the moderate tenor of his remarks should not escape notice."

"Americans have been buying land here since 1900," he said, "so why throw them out now?"

The editorial continued, "As a matter of fact the Minister might have gone back considerably farther. Huge chunks of Nova Scotia real estate, including virtually all of Horton and Cornwallis townships, were practically given to New Englanders in 1760 or thereabouts."

The Editor added, "The Minister termed it 'rather strange' that people should make a fuss over land sales while at the same time they say 'let's have more tourists.' Most of the Americans now interested in buying land are looking for summer homes and the Minister is quite right to point out that there is very little difference between those who come to stay in their own places and those who come with no fixed abode."

The Advertiser concludes, "Dr. Delory doesn't say there are no problems about land ownership. His remarks simply reduce the question of foreign purchases to something like a proper perspective."

With relation to the government's intended seizure of the Wood property, the daily press recently posed the question, "What assurance have we that following expropriation, a few years hence the wildlife will not be gone, the beaches lined with hot dog stands, the shoreline studded with campsites and bulldozers roaring away as they scrape up the sand for construction purposes?"

And now, as the time approaches for the much coveted "invasion" of foreign visitors, an attractive blue, black and white brochure, bearing a South Shore address, stands proudly on my desk reminding me "How

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To Buy Land In Nova Scotia." It tells me of 2,000 acres of rugged, wooded beauty, providing several hundred secluded and unpolluted waterfront and water view lots to choose from, while islands provide a limited number of very special locations - on the South Shore. It assures me that I will encounter no poisonous (?) snakes, but many deer, rabbits and chipmunks. If I am a cost-conscious, enterprising vacationer, I can obtain a cottage as a pre-cut package or a master shell to complete at my convenience. . . and my Nova Scotia host will rent my dwelling in my absence, insure its upkeep and share the revenue with me!

Oh to be an American, now that tourist time here!

Movie Review

THE WAY WE WERE

This Barbara Streisand-Robert Redford comedy-drama is excellent entertainment and may wind up as the company's most successful film of 73. Directed by Sydney Pollack, the film is the third Columbia-Rastar-Streisand production (following "Funny Girl" and "The Owl and the Pussycat") and was adapted by playwright Arthur Laurents from his first novel. Shot in Manhattan, Upstate New York and Hollywood, the film spans a period from 1937 to the early '50s. Three's a lot for the nostalgia buffs: the songs and styles of those years, a Marx Brothers costume party in which nearly everyone does a takeoff on Groucho (Streisand comes as Harpo), even a bit by '40s teen star Marcia Mae Jones. Historically, there are: World War II and the death of FDR, an, most interestingly, the house Un-American Activities Committee investigations, a previously taboo subject. For women's libbers, Streisand's very strong character, a woman with the courage of her convictions, contrasted with Redford's likeable but weak and inconsistent role (at one point, she seduces him). Other elements include a good love story, comedy and the message that radicals can be decent people. In short, something for everyone.

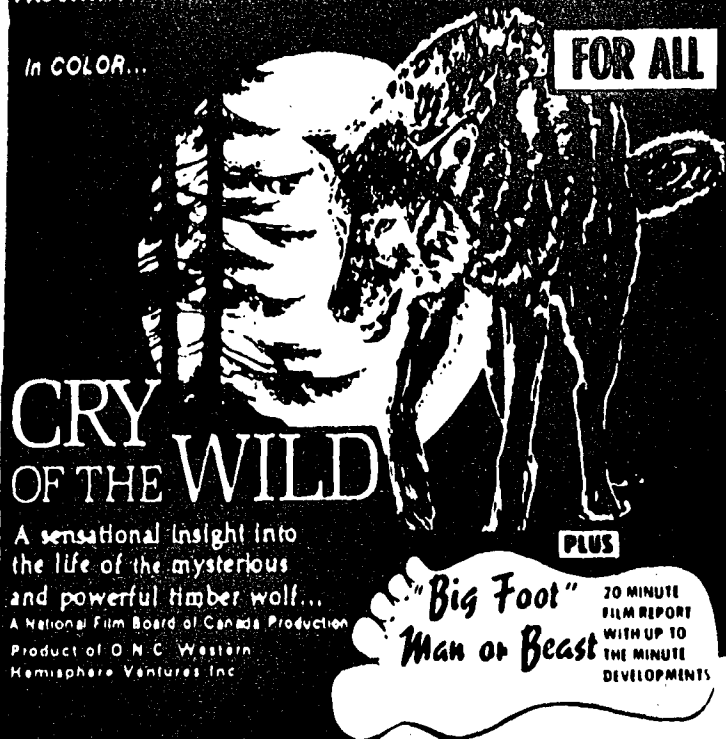

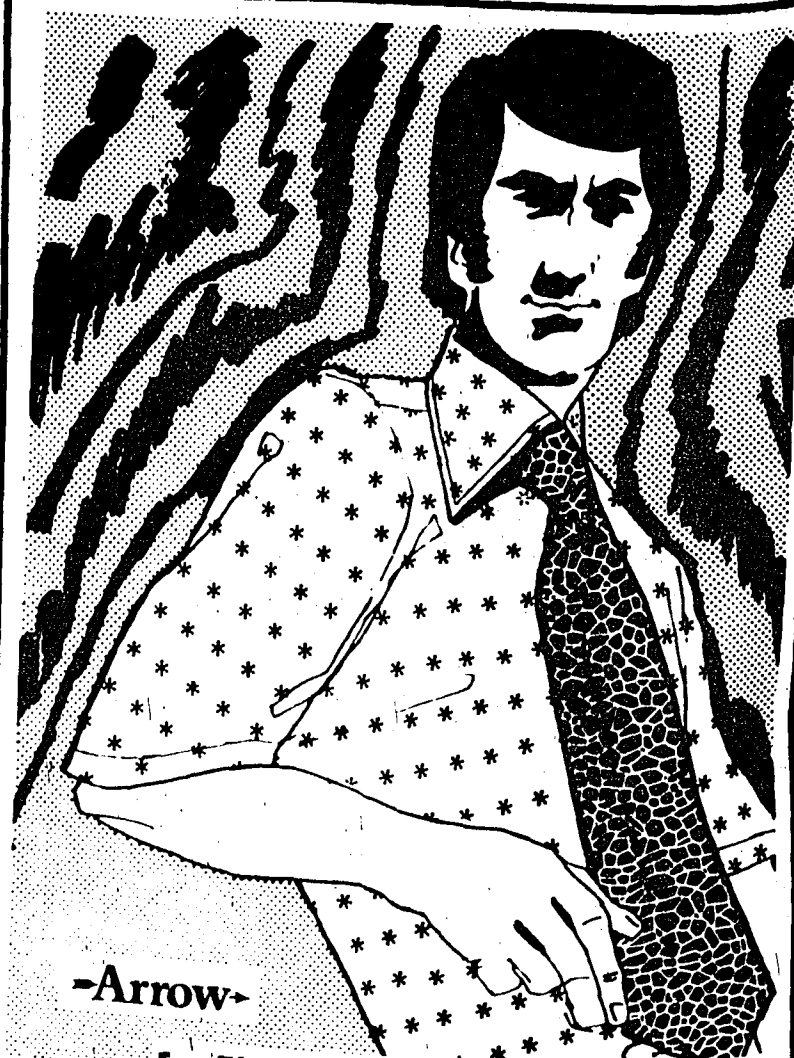

TO UPGRADE FERRY SERVICE PLAN 4 TRIPS DAILY

McNeil, McAlpine, Swift New Airport Committee

Warden Wilfred Sift, by regular motion at the Digby Municipal Council session on Monday was charged with the responsibility of selecting a committee from the Council to act as the municipal airport committee. He appointed Councillor Helen McNeil, Marshalltown and Councillor Walter McAlpine. Warden Swift is an ex officer member of the committee.

The newly appointed committee relieves to negotiating committee consisting of Councillors R.L. Winchester, Walter McAlpine and Eric Van Tassell.

There was a difference of opinion as to the number of councillors to serve on the committee. In a vote taken on the subject, five were in favor of only three members and four, including the Warden, were in favor of five members to the committee. Councillor Ronald Morehouse was absent.

By regular motion Louis Wiles was given a letter authorizing him as fixed base operation to go ahead in upgrading the municipally owned airport at Hillgrove at no cost to the municipality and in close liaison with the committee named from the municipality. Mr. Wiles appeared before Council because he understood there had been some controversy over what he had started to do at the airport. He requested the Council give him a letter to the effect if they wished him to continue as he had felt he was supposed to do, to upgrade the airport at no cost to the municipality.

Councillor McAlpine felt one "controversy" was that of tearing down the barn when none of the councillors knew about it. This was explained in that it was necessary to use machinery and manpower when the opportunity presented itself.

Councillor McNeil felt it was marvellous that Mr. Wiles and the Digby Flying Club would give their services free of charge but also reminded that it was the taxpayer's money that purchased the airport and the councillors have to answer to the people they represent.

Other councillors felt much more must be done to the airport before it can be licensed and without the work of the Flying Club the property would be only a strip of land. It was felt, however, that the impression which is found in some instances that the airport is owned by the Digby Flying Club must be corrected.

In reply to Warden Swift's query as to stipulations for joining the flying club, Councillor Winchester said it is open to any interested person. There are now 25 members and 30 anticipated by summer. Membership fees are \$30 per year or three dollars per month. Associate memberships are \$15 per year. Flying time is \$16 per hour for the plane and \$5 per

hour for an instructor. Minimum flying time is 45 hours and flyers must be medically fit. Dr. Ian Anderson is medical examiner. Officers are Louis Wiles, president; Michael Casey, vice-president; Mrs. Charles Haliburton, secretary or R.L. Winchester, treasurer. By-laws for the Digby Club are not yet completed.

Coline For The Liberals



Coline M. Campbell, a legal aid lawyer in Yarmouth, won a three-way contest for the Liberal nomination for South West Nova at a nominating convention attended by well over 800 people in Saulnierville on Saturday.

Miss Campbell, who is a bilingual native of Digby, and a former school teacher, won out over Jack Rogers of Yarmouth and Oscar Smith of Shag Harbour to take the nomination on the first ballot.

Miss Campbell's name was placed in nomination by Joe Casey, Digby M.L.A., and seconded by Hugh John Fraser, Yarmouth lawyer.

In her acceptance speech, Miss Campbell pledged, that if elected, she would give full time representation and full consideration to the needs of the area and its people. She said area needs included those of the fishing industry and transportation as well as lumbering, agriculture and industrial development.

She said she would work to develop better lines of communication between South West Nova and Ottawa. The needs of many of the people of the area are being neglected, she said, and these people should be getting more than they do.

Guest speaker at the overflow convention was Romeo LeBlanc, M.P. for Westmoreland-Kent. He told the audience a new hope is blossoming in the Atlantic area. Due to the efforts of the Liberals in the past few years, young people no longer have to

leave the region to secure employment, he said.

Mr. LeBlanc questioned the need for the election at this time, especially when the government was working well and unemployment was dropping. Canada has faced an energy crisis, he said and survived better than any country in the Western world.

The Westmoreland-Kent M.P. praised Nova Scotia Premier Gerald Regan for his clear, loud voice at the energy conference and said this had played a vital part in his receiving a resounding mandate in the provincial election.

Mr. LeBlanc reviewed some of the provisions of the federal budget such as additional aid to war veterans and their families, tax relief, increased corporation levies and the like. He said the Progressive Conservatives and the N.D.P. must explain why they defeated the government on the budget and deprived so many Canadians of the benefits they would have received had the budget been adopted.

The simplistic approaches being advocated by the Tory leader will not serve to solve the complex problems facing Canada at this time, Mr. LeBlanc said. He said the Liberal party is dealing with inflation and the policies of Prime Minister Trudeau will prove to be effective in the long run. He said the P.C.'s are already in difficulties within their own ranks due to differences with regard to the policies being advocated by their leader.

Other speakers included Senator Al Graham, President of the Nova Scotia Liberal Party; Senator Ernest Cottleau of Yarmouth and the Hon. Fraser Mooney, Minister of Municipal Affairs. Present on the platform were Hon. Peter M. Nicholson, Hon. Harold Huskisson, Hon. Benoit Comeau, Fred Armstrong and Loran Baker, both former M.P.s. Presiding over the convention was Mrs. Shirley Bradshaw, President of the Liberal Association of South West Nova.

Only Candidate

Charles Edward Haliburton, representative for South West Nova in the House of Commons, Ottawa, since October 1972 is expected to be the only candidate seeking nomination tonight at the Progressive Conservative Nominating Convention to be held in Yarmouth.

Speaker at tonight's meeting at the Yarmouth Regional High School will be Heath MacQuarrie, chairman of the caucus committee on health and welfare and a former professor of Political Science at Queen's University.

Mr. Haliburton, son of Hon. E.D. Haliburton and Mrs. Haliburton, Falmouth, has taken an active interest in elections and general politics since 1949. He is a graduate of Dalhousie University, obtaining his degree in law in 1962. He was admitted to the Bar the same year and opened law practice in Digby in 1962.

Mr. Haliburton, while serving

his constituency in the last two years has been active on House Committees such as the fisheries committee, the public works committee and the Post Office committee.

On the public works committee he made a point to investigate the lack of wharf facilities and conditions of fishing harbours and why the public works budget for such facilities should have dropped from \$12,000,000 per year to \$8,000,000 per year in the last ten years. This was all in the face of approved projects, Mr. Haliburton said, but there were no funds. Besides, the value of the dollar dropped to half in that period, he intimated. The committee, he said, recommended to the Treasury Board that the budget be increased to thirty million a year until the situation was under control. It actually was increased to \$24,000,000 he concluded.

Mr. Haliburton in making public his intention of re-offering for the P.C. candidate in South West Nova for the July 8 federal election, said he would never have believed it to be so difficult to keep in touch with the people and still be in Ottawa to do the job. The week, he intimated, is absolutely filled and he comes home exhausted on the weekends to enjoy the family.

He added that regarding fishing and public works he has stressed the need of having someone with power to make changes and there should be consultation with the segment of the population affected by changes in regulations. He said the Department of Environment is now making a start on this method.

The band and its leader have given freely of their time for benevolence and for the pleasure of persons who might otherwise not have access to concerts. Barry D. Margetts, general manager of coastal ferry operations for Canadian Pacific Railway, denied that CP Rail is negotiating with the federal government to end their involvement with the Saint John to Digby ferry operations.

In a prepared statement, Mr. Margetts gave a detailed breakdown of CP's plans to increase the use of the 48-mile Bay of Fundy ferry service.

Mr. Margetts stressed that CP was "aggressively developing" use of the ferry and as a result he said traffic is up 10 and 20 percent since the new rates went into effect.

To further increase traffic on the ferry, CP is planning to use more advertising, offer reduced

combined rates for use of the Digby-Saint John ferry and North Sydney-Port aux Basques rate, appoint a sales manager to promote inter-model use of the ferry, and hold dances on the weekend ferry trips during the summer.

Also under consideration "if and when traffic warrants" is an increase of one trip daily during the summer months to four trips daily.

Mr. Margetts said during the summer months the ferry operated at a profit, but during the winter months the loss was so heavy it cancelled the summer profit. The result he said was that CP lost more than \$1-million on the ferry during 1973.

A successful Blood Donor Clinic was held last week at the Lions Club Hall under the joint sponsorship of the Digby Red Cross Branch and the Lions Club of Digby. Also assisting in the effort were members of the Red Cross Youth Group under the convensership of Miss Linda MacIntosh.

The new computerized system of registration was introduced for the first time at this clinic and, except for a bit of extra concentration required this once on the part of the registrars, it promises to be a much more efficient system when it is in full operation. Donors were advised that it may be at least two months before their new plastic Blood Donor cards are received, owing to the computer process which the registration forms will have to undergo. In future clinics the new cards will be stamped automatically, and only new donors will require detailed registration.

An item of interest in connection with this clinic was the fact that there were three donors from England in attendance. These were Miss Molly Igoe and Mrs. Dorothy Cutler, Middlesex, and Mrs. Kathleen Cramp, Nottingham - all sisters of John Igoe of Roxville, formerly of Digby. Mr. Igoe's daughter Susan, a graduate of the Digby High School, was also in attendance at the clinic as a Red Cross Technician with the Blood Donor Unit. Miss Igoe reports that she is enjoying her work with Red Cross and finds the clinics interesting.

Owing to the new registration method, no lists are presently available for the usual breakdown of donor attendance by districts. However, it was evident at the clinic that there was a particularly good attendance of high school and younger age donors, and much credit for this fact was given to the work of the Red Cross Youth Group. There was also a splendid response from the Freepoint area, as well as in-

creased registrations from the Cornwallis area. A particularly encouraging feature of the clinic was the large number of new donors registered, which augurs well for future clinics in this area.

KEEP IN THE SWIM

NATIONAL WATER SAFETY WEEK
JUNE 2 - 8, 1974

Back in the good old days—before new math and Dr. Spock—there were rules and regulations covering just about every activity people did. And like the Ten Commandments, most of the rules began "Thou shalt not" or "Don't" or "Never".

Red Cross Water Safety rules were like that too. "Don't swim alone." "Don't dive into unknown waters." "Don't overload your boat".

Psychologists said this was the wrong way to approach the problem. They claimed that "don'ts" and "Nevers" turned people off.

"Don't swim alone" became "Always swim with a buddy." "Don't dive into unknown waters" became "Investigate unknown water before you dive in." And so on. We sugar-coated the instruction pill.

Last year 1339 people drowned in Canada—an increase of 173 over 1972. Most of the increases occurred in the age group 16 to 30, people in the prime of life.

Has the sugar-coated pill become a placebo?

No one wants to go back to the time when people feared the water. Swimming and boating are good, healthy activities. But a little more respect for the dangers is certainly indicated.

Next week, June 2-8, is National Water Safety Week in Canada. Al Thiessen, national director, Red Cross Water Safety Service says "Any sport is more fun when you know the rules. The more skilled you are, the more fun you have; the more skilled you become, the safer you are. The Water Safety Service wants people to enjoy aquatic activities in safety. Common sense goes a long way, but you need skills too. Common sense doesn't tell you how to perform rescue breathing or teach you how to throw a ring buoy. These are not difficult skills to learn, but they are skills which must be taught by an expert.

Learn to swim, learn to swim better, learn to handle small boats, learn the rules of water rescue and self-survival.

"The Red Cross Water Safety slogan is "Keep in the swim". There is a programme for every ability level, any age group. "Come on in."

Hodge Podge

We just don't let those Cape Bretoners get ahead of us. If they could have snow on Friday we could have it Tuesday. Date May 28. We think that date should be recorded, if nowhere but Hodge Podge. And this weekend brings the Apple Blossom Festivals. We shiver!

We thought the Post Office strike was over. How then could a letter mailed in Springhill on Thursday not arrive in Digby until Tuesday.

We have no Canadian National service in the Digby area but many have heard of their public relations chief in the Atlantic provinces, Douglas V. Lacombe of Moncton. Doug retires at the end of June. Seldom do we go to a conference or convention without seeing Doug and Ruth. We hope these retirements do not change those looked-forward-to renewals of friendship. Doug and Ruth are splendid people and true friends in every sense of the word.

A lady got a notice to be in Halifax. The notice was mailed Tuesday. It arrived in Digby on Saturday. We often smile when at a highway construction scene you see the sign "Slow Men Moving". We would be in order to post highway signs "Slow Mails Moving".

With all those "caterpillars" and their "cocoon" which infested the trees and stripped the leaves in the fall of 1973, who ever expected to see apple and cherry blossoms in 1974. But here they are as beautiful and as plentiful as before. Which reminds us, the Bear River road is a beautiful scene right now with the fresh green leaves and wild pear blossoms. Three inches of snow in Cape Breton on Friday. No wonder we've had morning frost and cold days. Not the best weather for blossoms, to be sure.

"Wood Tick" Problem Not Cured

Despite recent reports that hormones may be used to alleviate south-western Nova Scotia of its American dog tick problem, entomologist C.J.S. Fox says that no synthetic juvenile hormone is even registered for use at this time in Canada.

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing employee stated today that a more complete examination of the use and effects of the hormone method is required.

"Toxicological tests are necessary to determine what hazards, if any, the compounds present to man and other

animals," he said.

The juvenile hormone, mentioned as a possible tick control, regulates growth of the insect but not to maturity, hence it can produce no offspring.

Mr. Fox said that one of the disadvantages of the junior hormone treatment is that the spray is effective for only a few hours or less in open air. He added that it also must be applied when the target pest is in a susceptible stage.

Mr. Fox concluded that the hormone method will be restricted to small areas for research purposes.

OPEN LETTER TO DIGBY
MUNICIPALITY SCHOOL
BOARD

Dear Members of the D.M.S. Board:

I am grateful for having the opportunity to be present at the meeting of the Board on the 11th May. Prior to the meeting I had respect for the Board, who in my mind had to deal with so many problems, big and small. As you know, I was coming to you representing the wishes of the parents to reconsider your decision about Mrs. L. Nordeen and Miss M. Leger, who lost their teaching position in Weymouth C.H.S. As they are two very good teachers, loved by children and parents, they were recommended highly by all the Trustees of our community, our two Members of the School Board and parents. I, however, have now found out, that against the advice of these Weymouth people the other members of the Board refused to let us have the services of these 21 teachers involved.

1. That these two ladies, like most of the teachers, didn't always approve the actions of the School Administration. Is this a crime?

2. When the teachers came to the Board with their complaints, in December, the Board gave their assurance that there would be no reprisals against any of them, and before any would be dismissed because of this, he would be allowed a hearing.

3. To Mrs. Nordeen and Miss Leger, the Board did not renew their contract, they lost their job without explanation.

4. As soon as Mrs. Nordeen lost her job at Weymouth School, she was offered a teaching post in Digby School. It makes me wonder.

5. Apparently you may lose your job if you are related to somebody not tolerated by the Administration. Because your relative has a permanent contract, you lose your job because you do not have it. Manifestly, the Board punishes the one who has no defense. In my opinion:

Members of the Board are selected by the people to serve them, at least they are promising this when canvassing for position of councillor. They should listen to the people and try to please them. If a teacher is good, loved by children and parents, he should not lose his job just because the Board listens only to one sided opinion of the Administration.

If the Board agrees to hear the opinion of the parents, it is not necessary to invite somebody for 7:30, make him sit near the door like a third class citizen and make him wait for 3 hours before listening to him. Even the Queen treats her citizens better.

The members of the Board are not elected because they are qualified to judge a teacher, in most cases they are not, but to try to give decent staff and facilities for better schools.

We want for our children, good teachers, good administration and a Board who will give just exactly that. There is no need for a stubborn Board, unable to change a wrong decision.

I would also like to know of what use are the Trustees? They are blamed by the parents and teachers for every problem which arises in the school while the Board is grossly disrespectful toward them. They have to sit 20 feet away from the members of the Board, admiring their backs, not able to hear half what is said and to shout their answer across the

room, if the Board finally agrees to ask their opinion. This is not the way to treat people. There will always be problems, hate and mistrust if a minority, from Weymouth, is systematically ignored.

In normal democratic procedures local problems should be investigated by the Board of Trustees hearing both sides of a situation including teachers and Administration. Their recommendation should be made known to the local Board members who in turn present it to the School Board. At this point their proposal should not be interfered with by Administration or teachers neither voted down by members of the Board who are unfamiliar with the situation.

One of the members of the Board asked me where the problem is. I hope that he found the answer in my letter.

Dear Mrs. Wallis:

Information presented to those persons present for a Digby Recreation Commission meeting May 15, showed a considerable sum of money is needed for repairs to the publicly owned Forum building, and, for replacement of some machinery.

Operation of the Digby Forum provides varied recreation for many people in the Digby area and, is at least as much benefit to people outside Digby town as to town people. The tax payers of Digby town, through their town council, over a period of about 25 years, have invested close to \$135,000. in capital, interest on borrowed money and, operational grants.

Because of the current financial need it is hoped by some people that the Digby Municipal (county) council will give serious consideration to the benefits offered and given through operation of the Forum to people of the whole Digby area. Will the Digby County Council not give, at the earliest possible time, some worthwhile financial support to alleviate the financial burden for continued operation of the Forum?

However, it is the strong opinion of the writer of this letter that, any program or activity taking place within any part of the publicly owned Forum should not, as a general rule, conflict with church services and programs on Sundays, for sake of all people, especially for the good of the young, in the whole community, local and beyond.

I wish to submit that all church people should support this stand because it is a matter of priority. I submit that it is just as important to protect the proper and best use of our Lord's Day as it is to protest the wrong use of our Lord's House of worship, prayer and praise, for which our Lord took strong action nearly two thousand years ago and for which, I believe, He would take similar action in our time.

Let us duly consider the following true statement, made not too long ago, by the noted Rev. Ralph W. Sockman of New York, U.S.A., "The Church is more than a community institution to be supported. It is part of the body of Christ and it helps to support the community."

Certainly, according to the word of the Christian's Bible, in order to have high standards of morale and morals in any community, there must be greatest respect and highest priority for religious programs

and observance, especially on one day in seven (Sunday being the Day for Christians) and, of course, it must start and continue in the home and spread into the whole community.

A Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

I am writing this letter to your paper on behalf of Nova Scotian repatriates and other receivers of Social Security from the United States.

I wrote a letter to the Mr. Haliburton M.P. in regards to Canada taking American Social Security. He said if enough pressure was put on Ottawa they may be forced to take action.

First let it be understood that Social Security in USA is not taxable in U.S.A. because we had our payments deducted from our pay every week but were taxed on our full income at the end of the year. Not so, the Canadian old age pension or the Canadian pension plan, the old age pension was never paid for by the recipients, and the Canadian pension plan, the payments were deducted from the income at the time of payment therefore it is taxable when paid out.

If there are enough persons in Nova Scotia who are interested I would like to hear from them and we can start a petition and put pressure on Ottawa to amend that law. If not a letter to The Internal Revenue Service in U.S.A. may cause the U.S. to revoke the United States Canada Reciprocal Tax agreement. Article 6 v.i.a.

There are lots of Canadians who would like to return to Nova Scotia or Canada who will not do so as a landed immigrant they can come here on a visit and leave their money in U.S., return there once in awhile and pay no tax to Canada at all. I think this is an unfair and greedy act on Canada's part. Also the expropriation of American property on the South Shore. I am submitting my comments if the paper wants to print it OK, if not I will forward a letter I have written to U.S.A.

Destruction Of Cattle By Dogs Getting Worse

Destruction of cattle by dogs in the Digby municipality is getting worse, it was voiced at the Council session of the Municipality of the District of Digby on Monday. The Council went on record as supporting the dog warden, Ivan Bain, who appeared before council by request of Councillor Helen McNeil. By regular motion, it was decided to give notice by news media to the effect that owners must keep dogs on their property as the by-law states and that the permission for the dog warden to shoot stray dogs is upheld by council.

It was reported by Councillor McNeil that Lloyd McNeil, Marshalltown, lost a calf about two weeks ago, the calf having been destroyed by a dog on his property. This is the second animal lost in this way by Mr. McNeil, one having been destroyed two months ago. It is understood the two animals totaled a \$500 loss for Mr. McNeil, his stock being of high grade with the Scott Horshorn Bull being sired by a bull from Virginia. Councillor MacNeil said that cattle are now being

put out to pasture and she, herself, had ten head of cattle only a short distance from Mr. McNeil's pasture. It was understood that if advertised a property owner could shoot a stray dog on his property. It is further understood that a watch out is being kept from 11 p.m. to 2 a.m. to protect the cattle.

Difficulty with dogs in the Bear River area and on the Islands were reported by councillors. A deputy dog warden will be appointed for the Islands and stricter measures will be taken at Bear River. It was again emphasized that people should be made known that their dogs can be shot and the time has come when sentiment cannot be recognized. It was noted that the dogs not only destroy the cattle but a case on the Islands was cited where a woman was badly bitten. If someone had not rescued her she would have been "torn to pieces", the informant said.

Mr. Bain reported he had driven 1057 miles on dog complaints alone besides mileage for picking up licenses.

The matter of taxi licenses was also brought up and a decision made to enforce the payment of licenses for anyone taxi driving within the municipality. It was mentioned that taxi drivers from the municipality are not permitted to taxi in town and the town taxi, therefore, should not be permitted to operate in the municipality without a license.

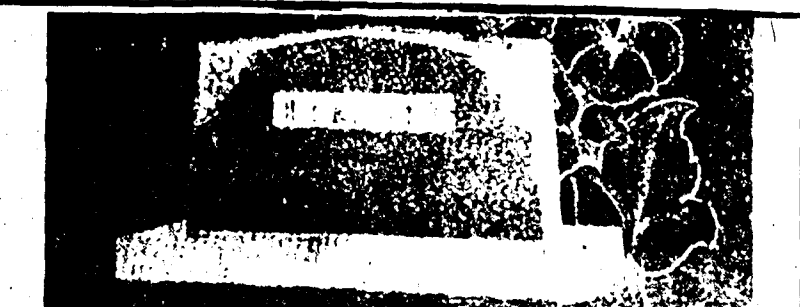
Donald J. Thibault died at the Digby Hospital following a lengthy illness.

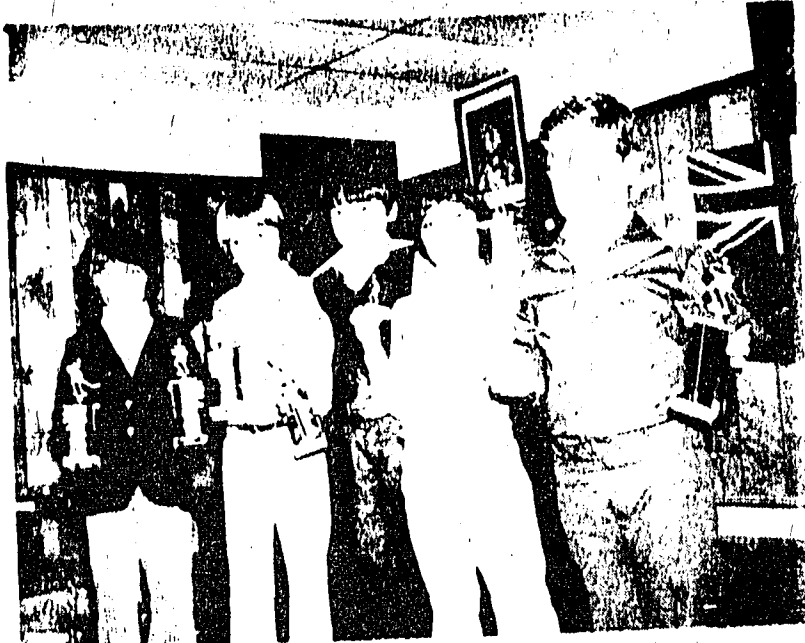

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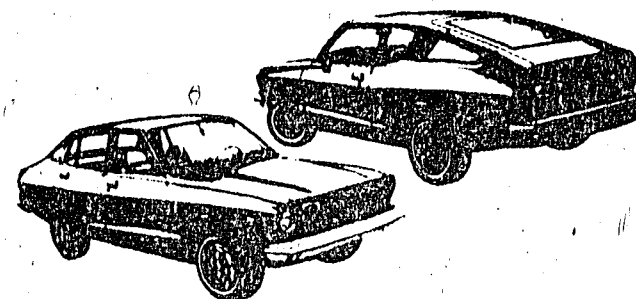
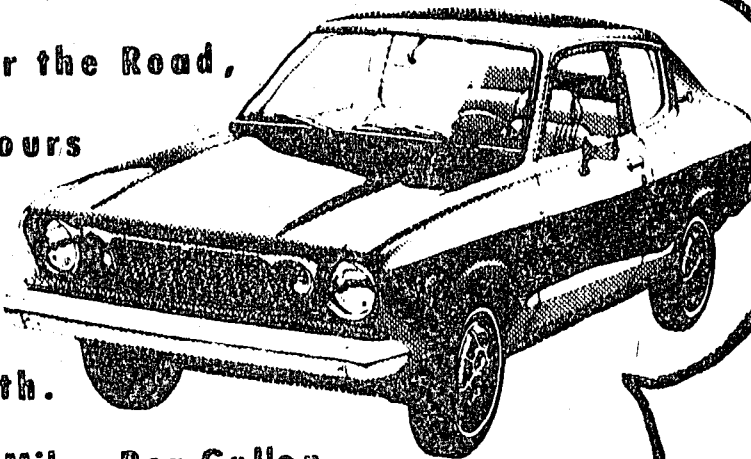
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Lodge Member Honored

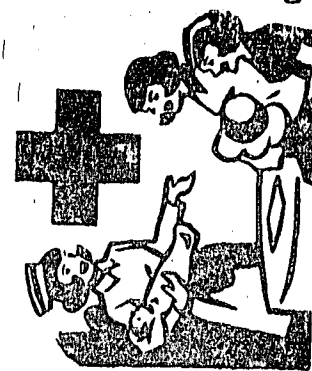
Dr. Morton Beiser of the Harvard School of Public Health who is well known in this area of Nova Scotia, having been involved for a number of years with the Harvard Programme, has been named as recipient of the Josiah Macy Jr. Foundation Faculty Scholar Award for 1974-75.

Dr. Beiser will undertake a study of the impact of urbanization on physical and mental health in an under developed country. He will spend the coming academic year in Dakar, Senegal and in Paris, where he will continue his urbanization impact studies. The studies are being carried out as a collaborative venture between the University of Harvard, the World Health Organization and Harvard.

At present Dr. Beiser is Associate Professor of Psychiatry on the faculty of the Harvard School of Public Health. He is also on the staff of the Massachusetts General Hospital, Tufts New England Medical Centre and the Children's Hospital.

Dr. Beiser is also a member of the American Psychiatric Association where he is Chairman of a Task Force in Mental Health Problems of the American Indian. Previous awards received by Dr. Beiser include an appointment as Maitre de Recherches, Premier Echelon, by the National Institute for Health and Medical Research of France.

The Macy Awards are designed to recognize and further the development of academic excellence and support a period of concentrated research and scholarship at an institution of the candidate's choosing.

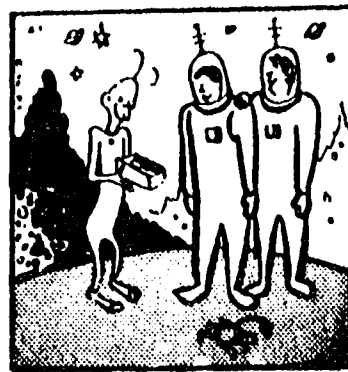

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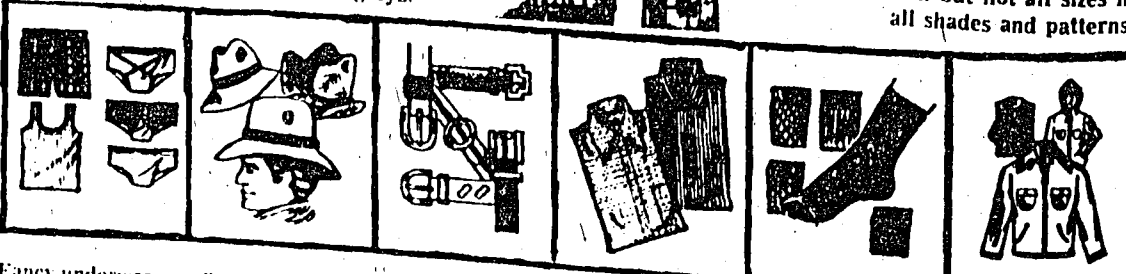

Jean Marchand requesting that before making a decision on the Acker Report of a new ferry for Yarmouth that the department re-examine the Margison Report of May 1966 which recommended Welshpool, N.B., to Digby as the most viable route from U.S.A. to Nova Scotia, it being only 56 miles as against 110 miles to Bar Harbour. The trip the resolution stated could be made in three hours as against six hours and both operating costs and capital investment would be less. Two on three trips a day could be made and the ferry would be fully Canadian operated.

Twenty-Five Percent Rebate Cheques Going Out

Digby Town Clerk, Glen Pitman, in his report to Town Council on Monday evening revealed that cheques were now being issued for the twenty-five percent rebate on 1974 taxes paid by single family owners and occupiers of residential dwellings and for occupancy taxes paid. To those whose 1974 taxes are not paid the rebate is given as a discount on payment.

The present twenty-five percent does not apply to properties rented or paid through mortgage. Further legislation, it is understood, is needed to cover this.

Mr. Pitman reported taxes paid to date in 1974 amounts to \$260,000 or 63.8 per cent of the 1974 levy which is caparable to

previous years.

Mr. Pitman gave a financial report from the Digby County Power Board which showed a net gain from January to April 1974 to be \$2101.84 as against \$1550.21 for the same period in 1973.

Mr. Pitman asked council to review the policy of culvert replacement to establish who is responsible for payment and give some direction regarding installation of private sewers where the contractor is required to have council permission and be responsible for any damage which occurs.

Charlie Nominated P.C. In South Western Nova

Charles Haliburton, Digby, known to many as Charlie, was on Thursday evening nominated by the Progressive Conservative Party as their candidate to contest the seat in South Western Nova in the July 8 federal election. Mr. Haliburton will be opposed by Coline Campbell, Digby, for the Liberals and Yvonne Coe, Weymouth, for the N.D.P. Mr. Haliburton has represented S.W.N. in the house of Commons for the past two and a half years.

Guest speaker at the well attended nominating meeting held at the Yarmouth Consolidated Memorial High School auditorium was Heath MacQuarrie, Conservative member for Hillsborough, Ontario in the last parliament. Mr. MacQuarrie said inflation must be controlled before it ruins the economy of the country. The problem of controlling it, he said, should be put into the hands of Robert L. Stanfield as next Prime Minister. He said the Trudeau government's biggest sin was surrendering to inflation. He charged that the Liberals have let as victim those who need help the most - people on fixed incomes and on pensions.

In a country as rich in potential as Canada, one out of five persons is at or below the poverty line, Mr. MacQuarrie said.

Japan is the only developed country with a higher rate of inflation than Canada, he said.

The Conservative MP said that he had never seen such reluctance against the calling of an election. The democratic process, he said is based on the people's decision of which government they want to serve them.

"The country wants and needs an election," Mr. MacQuarrie said.



Commenting on inflation, Mr. Haliburton said that Prime Minister Trudeau is of the opinion that nothing can about inflation, "but actually they have tried both monetary and physical restraints and both have failed."

Inflation is now 10 per cent, but the Liberals say that when it gets "too bad" they have a contingency plan involving wage and price controls, said Mr. Haliburton.

"Government interference with the law of supply and demand means the end of a free economy and in the end, the end of a free society," the Conservative MP said.

A serious lack of confidence in business institutions is being created by inflation, Mr. Haliburton said. If inflation cannot be curbed these institutions will fail, he said.

Mr. Haliburton came to Digby in 1962 after graduating from Dalhousie University and being admitted to the Bar the same year. He has continued his law practice since his arrival in Digby.

P.C.'s Assistant

Grant Stonehouse, Digby, assistant to Charles E. Haliburton M.P. for the past year, has been appointed to Progressive Conservative National Headquarters in Ottawa as the Atlantic Regional Co-ordinator for the Election Campaign '74, it was announced.

His responsibilities are the liaising between National Headquarters and all Conservative M.P.'s and candidates in the Atlantic Provinces, Co-ordinating national campaign efforts in the Maritimes and assisting in the Stanfield Tours in the Eastern Region.

Mr. Stonehouse is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Stonehouse, Digby.

Mr. Robinson reported the town had switched over to the dam for water where there presently is 106 1/2 inches.

A new dimension was added to police control to police control when six streakers went through Digby streets.

Mileage for the police car was 2527 in May and fines amounted to \$95.

It was decided to request the firemen to hose down the streets so the lines can be painted.

ENCOURAGING FERRY NEWS

The fact that the Canadian Pacific Railway has reduced the return car fare on the Bay of Fundy service, Princess of Acadia, gives some encouragement to the business people of the Annapolis Valley. Some weeks ago this fare along with others had been raised from \$17.50 a single trip to \$22.00 a single trip making the return trip \$44.00. The reduction of nine dollars to \$35.00 return trip means a considerable saving for local business people and an incentive to use the ferry more frequently than otherwise.

While the raise in price some weeks ago was disturbing to those who depend on tourist traffic the roll-back to the former price on the return fare is advantageous especially to local business people who definitely want to get back home as quickly and as reasonably in costs as possible when business has called them away.

Another bit of encouraging news from the same transportation service is the possibility of four trips daily in the summer instead of three. This would, indeed be a giant step forward, especially in view of the fact that a scare existed that the three trip daily of last summer might be curtailed.

While we could not see favorably toward the suggestion of a local organization to boycott the Princess of Acadia service in protest of the higher rates the idea which came up at a recent Digby Town Council meeting is worth consideration. In view of the fact that government is giving thought to another ferry between Nova Scotia and the United States, it is well as Town Council has done, to remind the powers-that-be of the short link by ferry which could be established between Westpool, N.B. and Digby. Reviving the Margison Report interest is a happy and commendable thought. We hope government will see fit to lend ear to the suggestion and issue further encouraging ferry news. As reminded in the Town Council's resolution, the service would be totally Canadian and distance and costs lower.

We look forward and can only hope for more encouraging ferry news for the Bay of Fundy.

Seven early one morning of May 20th I had a call from a friend saying her yard was alive with Warblers. It wasn't ten minutes when mine was the same, they were flitting from tree to tree. It reminded me of the migrating days in Brier Island, only better, because they were coming to spend the summer with us.

There were all kinds, myrtle, blackburnian black and white bay-breasted, chestnut-sided, magnolia and lots of our yellow warblers around this year.

A pair of ruby-crowned hummingbirds are enjoying the Oregonally that is in fully yellow bloom now.

Baltimore Orioles have been reported from all parts of the town. If you see your cherry blossoms falling look up in the tree for an oriole. I have heard a few half hearted songs but they like hot weather and we surely haven't had any yet.

Had a brief visit from a Brown Thrasher one morning. They are lovely songsters similar to a mockingbird. They are not common around towns, they prefer thickets. They are

slightly larger than a robin with long tail and conspicuous eye.

This is bad weather for the swallows but luckily it is a little early for the young ones. Remember one year we had a similar spell of weather and lots of young died in their nests.

When it is wet and cold there are fewer insects flying and as birds eat their weight in food in a day you can see how hard the parent birds have to work to keep three or four wee ones satisfied.

Had a report of a male Indigo-bunting in the South end of town. These are beautiful blue with darker wings, female resembling our common sparrow. Several years ago I banded five males, and three females came several days later.

Had a visit from a couple of birds from Kentucky a few days ago, poor dears were enroute to Brier Island then were joining the Spring N.S. Bird Society's walk at Mt. Unacke. I'm afraid they won't take back a very good impression of our climate.

You could almost see the credits rolling past as the men sat around the table for an Order of Good Cheer banquet.

G.L. Wade Incorporated presents "A Day In The Life of the Order of Good Cheer". Produced by Grade 6, Smith's Consolidated School, directed by Harry Brittain, cinematographer. Cindy Robbins.

The Smith's Cove Consolidated School Grade 6 class taught by principal G.L. Wade has been making 8 mm movies since the first of the year and has had a great time learning a lot of things in the process.

The students were well versed in the field of study for the day. Costumes, props and approach were well thought through. 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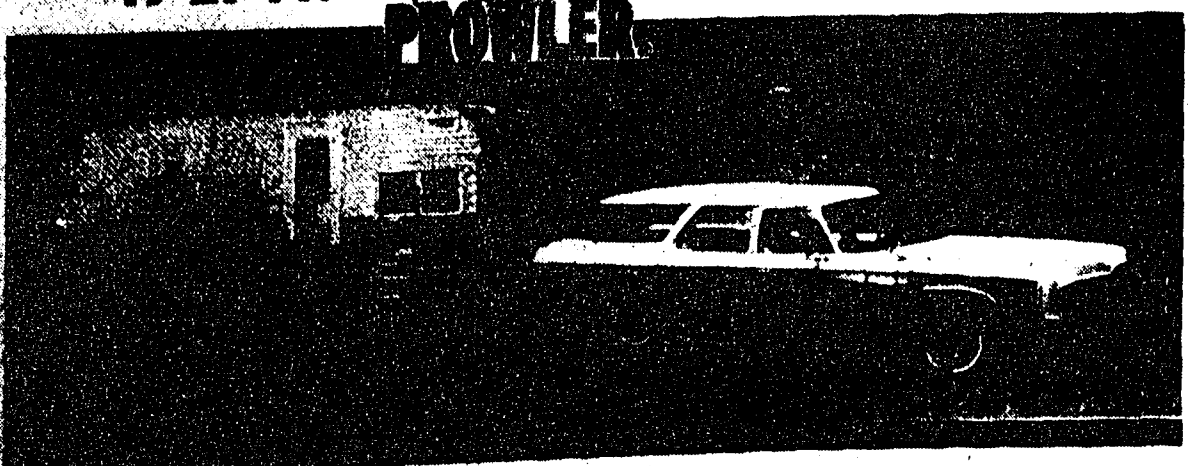

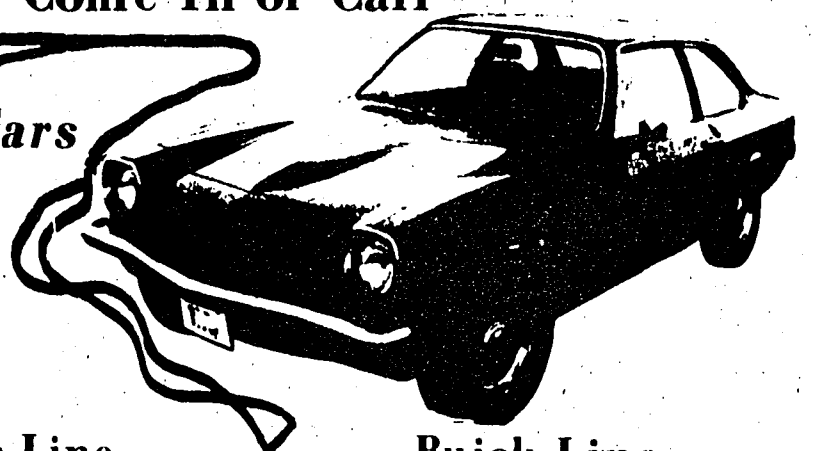

Canada Manpower New Training in Digby

Discussions between Canada Manpower Centres in Digby and Yarmouth, the Atlantic Regional Training Consultant, the Nova Scotia Area Manager of Canada Manpower in Halifax and Senior personnel of the N.S. Training facilities, instructions and instructors, are supplied by the Province of

Nova Scotia. Canada Manpower (Federal Government) purchases the training from the Province. Mr. Pottier was pleased that these new courses would be taught here in Digby. They would fill a need which has been prevalent in the area for some time. The Digby C.M.C. has had a backlog of persons recommended to take these courses, but often, distance from home to place of training prevented excellent prospective clients from taking the courses.

Mayor Willard Kinney and councillors informed Mrs. Chipman and Mrs. Young that a definite decision on the location had not yet been made but the Town Council and Kiwanis Club committee had met with engineers who felt the location in question was in their minds the most feasible for drainage, wind factors, and providing for future school expansion if necessary.

Councillor Partick Comeau favoured the best possible investigation be made for location before a contract is entered. He felt less disturbed on realizing that it was not the entire piece of land under objection but only the South East corner.

A correction and an addition were made to the minutes of the May Council meeting. Councillor Gordon Ellis requested that his discussion with Lister Hannah on the new recreation committee at that meeting be included in the minutes. Councillor Patrick Comeau

Council decided to call tenders for paving of St. Mary's St. from King Street to the McCleave Medical Centre and out to Warwick Street.

The Digby Fire Department was given permission to have the Thomas Shows at the Cannon Bank of three days and Little League Baseball was given permission to hold a tag day July 12.

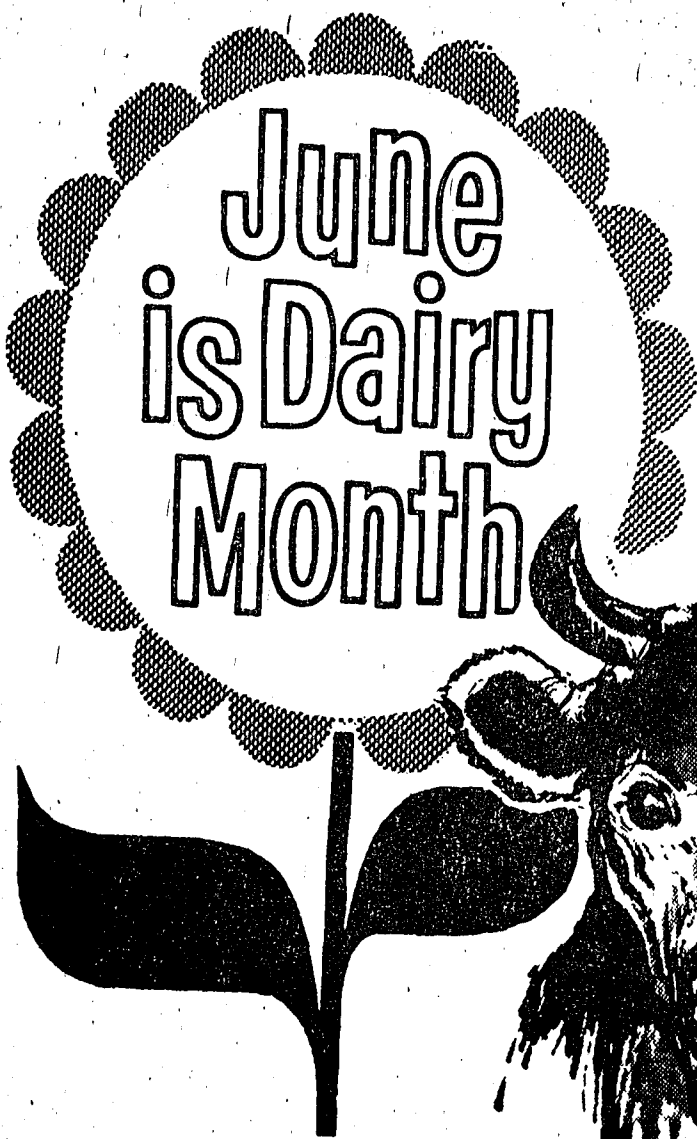

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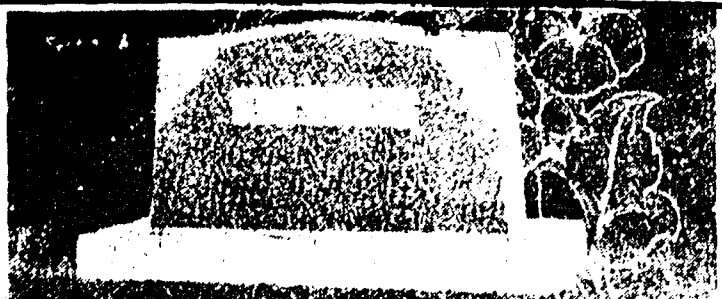
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Major Harbour Improvements At Meteghan

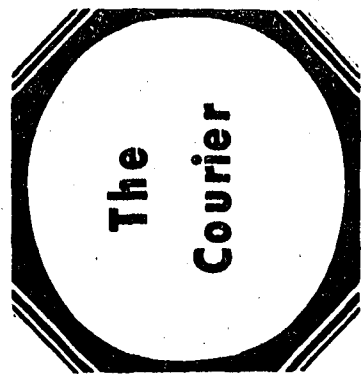

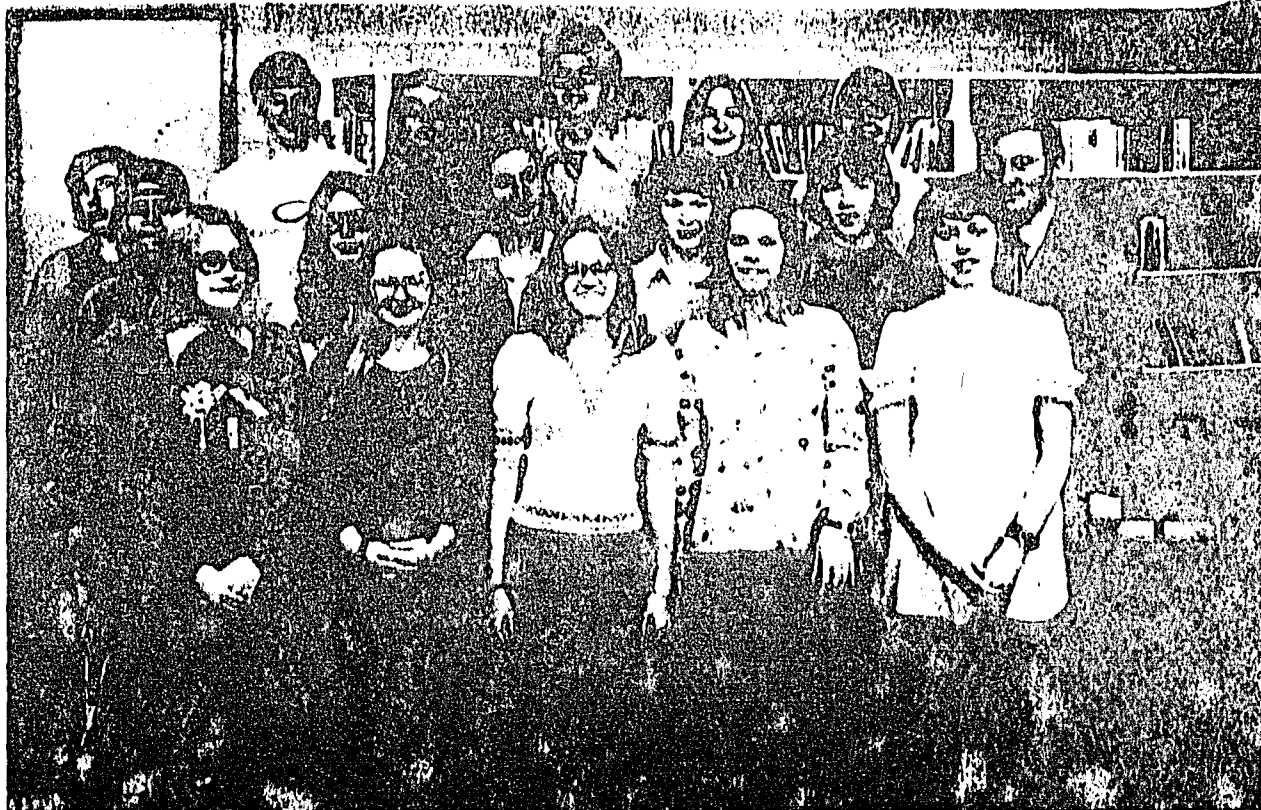

Almost all students now in school will drive a car. Driving is a complex skill, and good training is necessary while a person is young to develop good driving habits. Few skills now taught in school are as useful in later life as the ability to drive a car. It is a strange paradox in the fact that we spend millions of dollars to educate our children, then, let them loose on a potentially dangerous highway with no preparation whatsoever. Every week the equivalent of one graduating classroom of high school age young people are killed on the nation's highways."

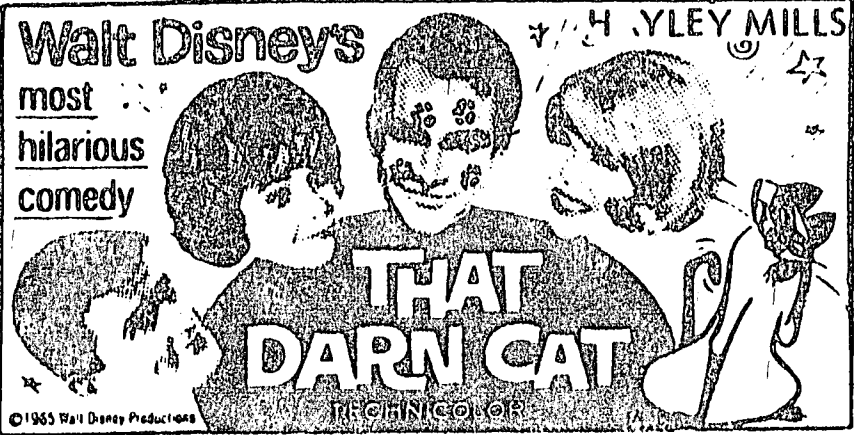

THAT DARN CAT

Released by Buena Vista. A comedy STARRING: Hayley Mills, Dean Jones, and Dorothy Provine. Produced by Ron Miller and Bill Walsh. Directed by Robert Stevenson.

The story about a Siamese cat that inadvertently goes to work as an undercover agent for the FBI. Family entertainment. In color. Rated General.

McQ

For his first non-western since "Hellfighters" (1968), big John Wayne essays the part of a toned-down Clint Eastwood type. Opening scenes are similar to the "Magnum Force" theme: a policeman committing murders. Motivation here, in Lawrence Roman's original screenplay, is pure greed. At the end, most of the characters seem either corrupt or tainted—even Wayne isn't above beating prisoners or bribing information from assorted shady people. Seattle is a fresh location choice, the story bringing in a wealth of characters to keep the action moving. There are a number of excellent actors in support, from Eddie Albert on down and three leading ladies to grace the proceedings: Diana Muldaur, Colleen Dewhurst and Julie Adams (as the ex-Mrs. McQ).

Black angle hasn't been overlooked, with Jim Watkins as a detective and Roger ("Sweet Jesus, Preacherman") Mosley playing an informer. Masterfully directed by John Sturges. Executive producer was Michael Wayne. Panavision and Technicolor. "McQ" has all the markings of a big hit. STARRING: John Wayne, Eddie Albert, Diana Muldaur, Colleen Dewhurst, Clu Gulager, Al Lettieri.

Seattle police detective William Bryant kills two officers and then is shot by an accomplice. Friend and fellow officer John Wayne knows that exporter Al Lettieri, a big dope dealer, is involved. Wayne's heavyhanded tactics cause his dismissal from the case and a decision to resign as police lieutenant. After comforting Bryant's widow Diana Muldaur, Wayne contacts private detective David Huddleston. He obtains information from blackhustler Roger Mosley and hooker Colleen Dewhurst, who is attracted to Wayne, is murdered and Wayne nearly killed when his car is battered by two trucks. Although Capt. Eddie Albert and Sgt. Jim Watkins are suspected by Wayne, sym-

pathetic officer Clu Gulager turns out to be Bryant's partner and Muldaur's sweetheart. Wayne machine guns all of the villains, turns Muldaur over to Albert and accepts reinstatement. In color. Rated PG.

THE SACRED KNIVES OF VENGEANCE

Among the holiday releases from Warners is the latest kung fu epic from the studios of Run Run Shaw, featuring two Chinese heroes equally adept at all forms of self-defense. For the climax, both take on a master swordsman and emerge the winners after a bloody battle. The English dubbing here has emphasized some ridiculous dialog, which will be interpreted by audiences as good-natured fun. If the fight scenes weren't so gory, the whole film could be taken in the same vein. As one of the more violent of its type, "Sacred Knives" stacks up as a solid entry and should be even more successful than Warners' earlier film, "Five Fingers of Death." Tsung Hua receives third billing officially, but is the real star as he proves his prowess in scene after scene. Two things set him apart from the usual kung fu hero: he's probably the most arrogant yet in believing in his own abilities and his gimmick is that he's as handy with his fists. Co-star Chin Han proves to be as skilled as Tsung, even matching his knack of catching knives in mid-air. The female lead, Wang Ping, is pretty and has a pleasant singing voice. Director Chu Yuan favors zoom shots, which don't always keep the principles in center stage. Technicolor, widescreen.

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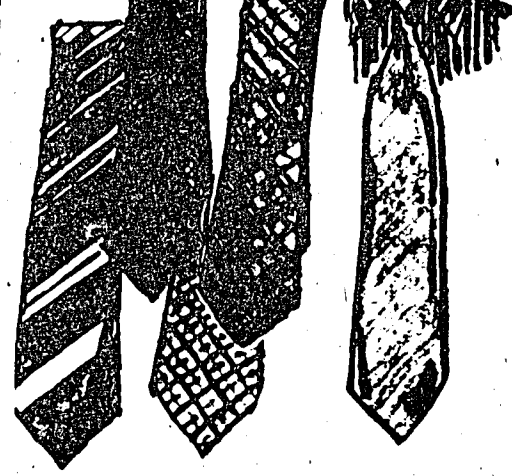

TOWN EXPECTS PROJECT COMPLETED BY FALL '75

Complaint About Length School Bus Hours

Barry Jennings, teacher, on behalf of the teachers of the Digby Elementary School, the St. Patrick's School and the Urban School Board requested the Digby Municipal School Board at its regular meeting on Tuesday evening to shorten the hours each day required for small school bus children to attend school. Mr. Jennings presented a formal brief in which he said the students are being adversely effected by the length of time they are required to spend at school awaiting classes to begin or waiting for transportation home. He requested a better bus procedure to eliminate unnecessary hours.

The brief continued that children have to be up early to catch their bus. At five years old, some children are putting in a longer work day than their fathers.

Children arrive at school and have to spend up to fifty minutes waiting for classes to begin and they do not have the facilities to accommodate them. There seems to be three choices that a child can choose from, Mr. Jennings said.

He can run and play, thereby expending his energy, and entering the classroom too tired to work, he can sit and wait; becoming more bored by the minute and brightening this time a little, by eating his lunch but feeling neither enthusiastic nor responsive or he

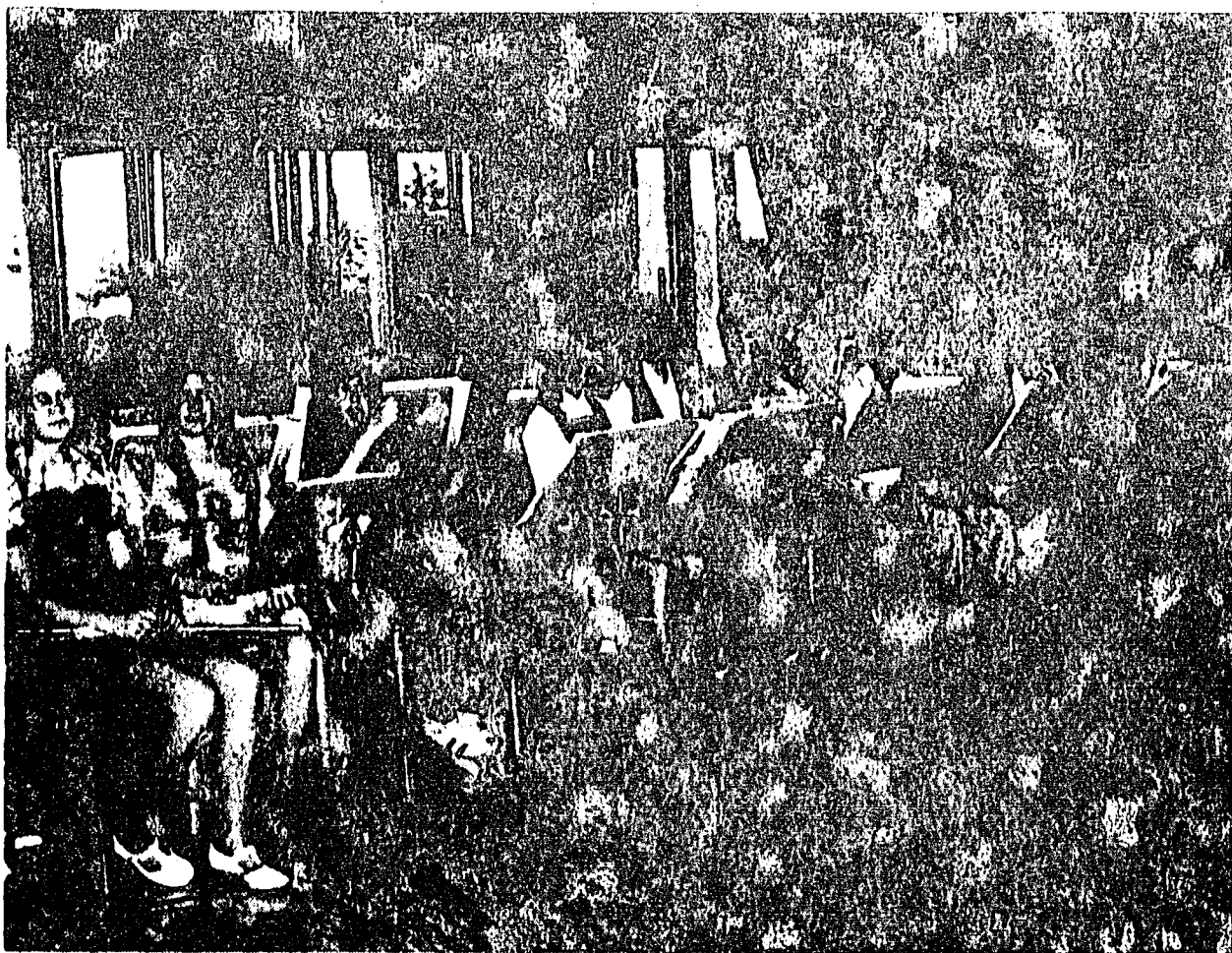
can strive for attention by breaking rules. These result, he said, in an unsatisfactory encounter with the teacher, and a reprimand before he even enters the classroom. Certainly this does not help to create the open, accepted type of relationship that is so necessary for a proper learning situation, the brief stated.

Noon hour and after school see this situation repeated, Mr. Jennings claimed and these children develop a negative attitude toward school and create a rather large proportion of under-achievers in our schools. Further, he argued that young children sleep at their desks, cry for no apparent reason, become irritable as the long day wears on.

The majority of the school board members agreed with the facts of the brief and requested the supervision of buses, Roger Hankinson, to look into the prospects of a better bus procedure and report to the Board.

The Digby Regional High School Board asked to purchase a bus from the Municipal School Board to use for sports events transportation. It was found that none of these used buses would be available until Spring.

A request from the South Range Church of Christ to hire a bus to use for a conference to be held August 10 was left in the hands of Mr. Hankinson.

Participates In Summer Study Program

Victor Cardoza, President of Mental Health-Nova Scotia participated in the summer study program on mental health at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, Wisc. last week.

The program, which was a week-long project, covered a number of subjects having special relevance to rural areas in the field on mental health services. Attending and taking part were mental health workers, representatives of mental health centres and health professionals from all parts of the United States.

During the program papers were presented on a variety of topics related to mental health services and the needs of rural areas. Included also were discussion sessions, institutes and special interest groups in mental health services, programs and projects.

Mr. Cardoza acted as discussion leader for two institute sessions on Public and Community Education in Mental Health during the week-long program. Presiding at the first of these sessions was Catherine Henry, Chief, Information-education Section, Wisconsin Division of Mental Hygiene. Presiding at the second session was Michael Walke, Learning Centre

Director, Unified Services of Western Wisconsin, Baldwin, Wisc.

A mid-week "break" during the program featured a delightful half-day tour of areas of Wisconsin adjacent to the state capital. Included in the

tour was a visit to "The House on the Rock", built on Deer-shelter Rock overlooking the Wyoming Valley by Alex Jordan, a pupil of the famed Frank Lloyd Wright. Also included was a visit to the Cornish restoration, Pendarvis and Mineral Point.

Council Continues Marina Push

Art McDermitt, project implementation manager and Harvey Doane, chairman of project implementation, visited the Annapolis Basin Tourist and Recreation Council on Monday evening and discussed with the members prospects for a Marina in the area and offered assistance with such a project. It was generally agreed that the area needs a place for launching small boats. Plans were made to have a group go out on Tuesday to inspect and discover prospective sites.

The meeting held at the Hedley House was presided over by William Troupe, president.

Criticism was launched on the fact that nothing concrete had evolved about the C.P.R. ferry, Princess of Acadia except that return fares for automobiles had been reduced. Mr. Troupe said he had been in touch with the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade which had made contacts with authoritative persons and had scheduled a meeting with Premier Gerald Regan about the high ferry rates. The council felt this end of the province should make itself heard and push the matter and urge the government to take over the ferry operation.

Disappointment was voiced on the report from Hon. Glen Bagnell that no grant was available to finance the publication Basin. Joe Casey, M.L.A. expressed the hope that other ways might be found to obtain funds for the Basin. The publication this year is faced with distribution costs which it did not initially have.

Ed Knowlton offered to prepare a brief to present to the A.V.A.B.T. requesting financial support. They also felt that it must be put across to the municipalities that the A.B.T. and R.C. provides a means to the only and greatest industry the area needs.

Draws Up Flying Schedule

Highlight on the program of the Digby Flying Club meetings held on Monday evening at the Smith's Cove Fire Hall was the visit of Max DeLong, instructor, who drew up a schedule of flying hours for instruction which is hoped to start on July 1. There were eighteen present at the meeting presided over by Lewis Wyles, president and two new members joined the club. Sale of tickets and up-gradings of the airport at Hill Grove were discussed.

90 Years

Mrs. Mabel Dakin, Centreville, who was 90 years old on June 10, 1974, received what she considered the best birthday present she could get. Her daughter Ruth Jago and husband John Jago, New Jersey, came home to Centreville to live.

Mrs. Dakin's birthday was celebrated by the Women's Missionary Society holding a party for her at the Baptist parsonage. Games and songs entertained and the usual birthday refreshments were served.

W.H. Horner and P.E. Rowlands from the W.H. Horner Associated Ltd., advised the special meeting of Digby Town Council on Monday evening that they expect to complete the town's sewer project by the fall of 1975. They displayed 75 drawings representing about 95 percent of designing for the third phase of the project to be completed. These designs will go to the Water Resources for approval within two weeks and they hope to call tenders in about three weeks. Delays by suppliers and site locations had caused some hold up in progress but it is expected work will begin in July.

Changes in the point of outfall discharge were made after the first drawings had been submitted in order to comply with the new regulations re environment and public health. The new location will require some fill which will add a small amount to costs as will rising prices. The Council planned to devote one night to peruse the drawings with W.H. Horner Associates and to get information from the town solicitor on easements.

The matter of a bill from Keith Graham, architect, Halifax, for \$4200 for work on designing a town hall from the

local information bureau was discussed but tabled to be referred to the town solicitor for advice. Council felt that they had not ordered the work done and questioned authority to use town monies for payment.

The Council decided to advertise for attendants at the local tourist bureau for the months of July and August and some of September 1974. A grant of \$3000 will be received by the town as reported by Councillor Gordon Ellis. Two men were expected to start repair work on Tuesday at the bureau.

An agreement between the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Town to establish a boundary line of premises was tabled for measurement of the street.

Mrs. Earl Armstrong appeared before Council to endeavour to establish rights of a property in which her parents, Mrs. Dudley Winchester and the late Mr. Winchester had occupied and kept up for some 35 years. A search of deeds was to be made.

Names to be submitted to Digby Town for Citizen of the Year 1974 will be solicited through advertising in the local news media and radio. The Council will choose the Citizen of the Year from the names and qualifications submitted. A Natal Day meeting is scheduled for tonight at eight o'clock.

Council increased the welfare budget by \$3500 so that cost sharing through the Department of Social Services could be obtained should the welfare exceed the \$10,000 previously budgeted.

Councillor Gordon Ellis brought up the matter of posting taxi fares in the taxi vehicles as he had been informed of a variance in charges by taxi drivers.

Approval for the Pentecostal Church to hold special services at the Cannon Bank on Friday, June 21, at 7 p.m. and Saturday, June 22, from 2 to 3 o'clock p.m. was given provided they could obtain permission from the C.P.R. for use of the property.

An effort is to be made during the coming weekend to re-paint the town crosswalks and parking zones. Increased and stricter fines are planned for motorists who do not observe the markings following the re-paint.

The Recreation Committee By-laws had not been returned to Council to date so on action on these could be taken on Monday night.

An offer from Ruth Graham to sell her residential property the town was not considered as presently there appears to be no use to the town for the property.

To Engage Reading Specialists

The Digby Municipal School Board on Monday evening decided to include in the 1975 school budget provision for two reading specialists if approval is obtained from the Department of Education. The request for a reading specialist came from the Westport Home and School. The Westport request was on behalf of the Islands and Digby Neck School. In Westport alone, the request submitted, there are 12 students with serious reading problems and 24 who need help. Weymouth School supervisor, James Hanscomb, made a similar request and a decision was made to endeavour to get a reading specialist for each area.

Reports were heard from supervisors, C.C. MacInnis, Digby; Mr. Hanscomb and Keith Manzer from the Islands Consolidated School. Mr. MacInnis reported that Head Start under the Department of Social Services would be meeting this summer at the Acaciaville-Conway Community Centre and would not need the Smith's Cove School

for their program. Mr. MacInnis in giving the 1974-75 school time schedule noted that school would close in 1975 on June 28, Saturday. This if approved would give the students better opportunity for employment and teachers for summer school schedules.

Mr. Hanscomb, after presenting his report, was given authority to negotiate at the best possible prices for completion of a well at the school, to have ceilings and corridors at the school painted and to have the causeway to the school paved.

Permission was given for the students to develop a Tennis Court on the Weymouth School grounds at no cost to the Municipal School Board and if it did not interfere with present or future school facilities.

A request for financial assistance with the Weymouth School Year Book was not granted on the grounds that it would not be fair to other schools.

Mr. Hanscomb recommended a night watchman for the Weymouth school property.

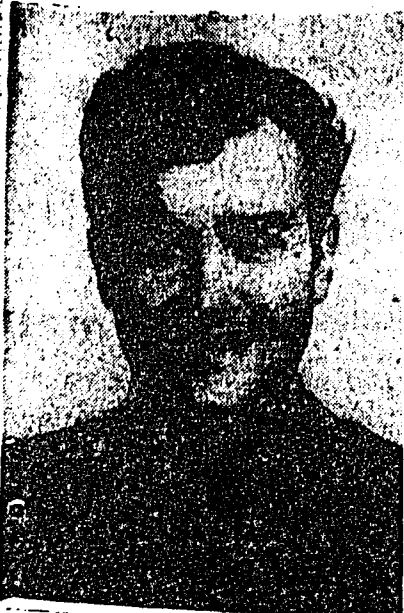

Editorial

DO YOU HAVE A VOTE?

Do you know for sure if you have a ballot waiting for you in the July 8th general election. Unless you check, you could be deprived of the right to vote.

The time to check is now - either on the publicly posted list of voters in your neighborhood, or on the printed copy of the list mailed to each urban elector enumerated last month.

If your name is on the list, you are assured of a vote.

If it is not on the list, or if there is an error in the listing of your name, address or occupation, it is up to you to do something about it to avoid the risk of losing your vote.

Procedures differ between polling divisions in urban areas and rural centres. Those with a population of less than 5,000 are rural.

In rural regions, eligible voters missing from preliminary list of electors should contact the enumerator who prepared the posted list.

In urban areas, omissions and corrections can be taken care of by calling the returning officer for the electoral district in which you live. The telephone information operator will help you obtain the number of your returning officer.

This must be done before June 19th, when the period of public sittings begins for the revision of preliminary lists of electors.

The urban lists are revised by a revising officer, who is usually the senior district judge, or representative appointed by that judge. If you are an unregistered elector entitled to vote, you may appear before the revising officer June 19th, 20, or 21st and apply to have your name put on the official list of voters.

The hours and address where the sittings for revision are held may be obtained from your returning officer. It is also at the top of the printed preliminary list of voters.

If it is inconvenient to appear before the revising officer, you may ask the returning officer to send the two revising agents to your home to obtain the necessary information.

The preliminary list assembled following enumeration and the statement of changes and additions following revision comprise the official list of electors. Urban residents whose name does not appear on that official list will not be allowed to vote.

In rural polling divisions, each enumerator revises his or her preliminary list. Applications for changes to that list may be made up to June 19th. Unlike urban voters, the unlisted rural voter is able to vote July 8th by being vouched for by a registered elector.

However, if you wish to take advantage of the June 29th or July 1st advance poll for this election, you must be on the official list, whether you are an urban or a rural voter.

The advance poll is for any qualified voter, who for any reason, cannot cast their ballot on July 8th.

My Dad

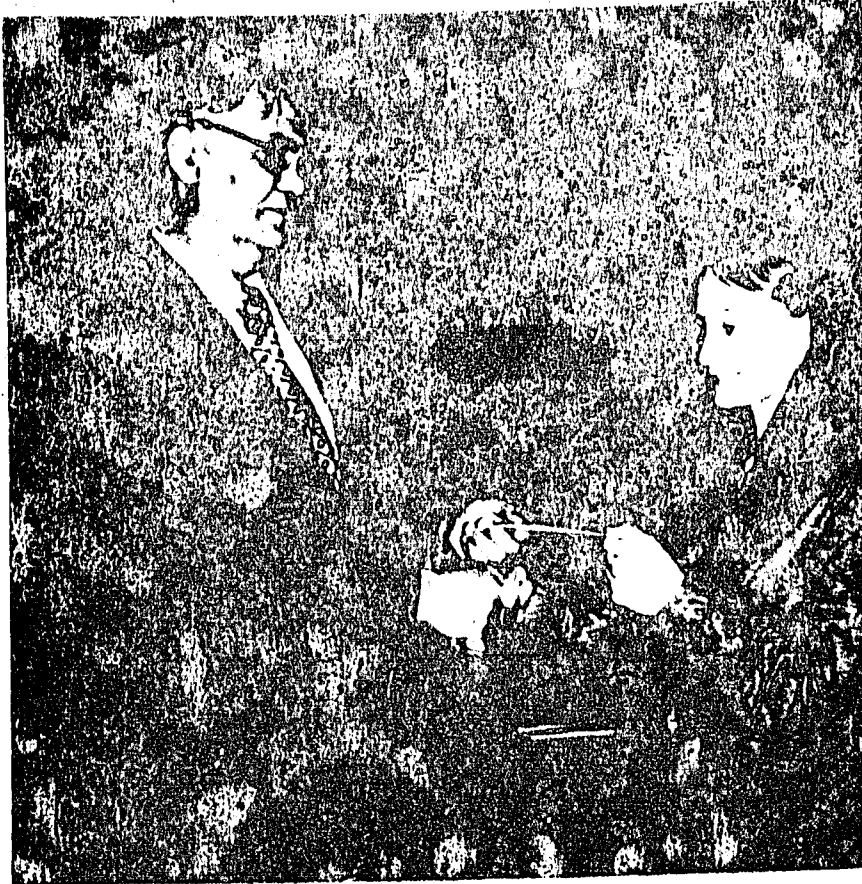

Symposium On Trails Ends

Today At Pines

A symposium on Nova Scotia Trails which began on Tuesday ends today at the Digby Pines Hotel, Digby.

A number of American and Canadian trails experts, including Gunnar A. Peterson, Chairman of the National Trails Council, have been participating and acting as resource people.

In addition to recreationists and conservationists, the three-day meet, a first of its kind for Canada, has attracted people involved with pulp and paper and tourism industries, as well as municipal leaders and economists.

The recreation department's co-ordinator for special projects, Allan Clark, is chairing the series of 12 sessions. The Department of Lands and Forests and the Department of Tourism have lent assistance to the project. Topics discussed included:

philosophy of trail systems by Gunnar A. Peterson; trails associated with historic waterways, by Dr. Fred Cooke, Queen's University; trails, a planning process by Brian Kregosky, Parks Canada; trails in an urban setting by Peter Jacobs, University of Montreal.

Discussions also were held on national trails council Chicago open lands project, led by Gunnar Peterson; Trail Legislation - Easements by Professor Stan Makuch; Trail Planning Guidelines by Bart Deeg of Parks Canada and Byways and Special Places by Ron Maslin, chief planning branch, Parks Canada.

Panels were held on special use trails, the role of government and volunteers in trail development and trail financing.

Both Recreation Minister Brown and Lands and Forest Minister Dr. M.E. Delory addressed the symposium.

The study committee is concerned with all facets of driver and safety education but representations to the Royal

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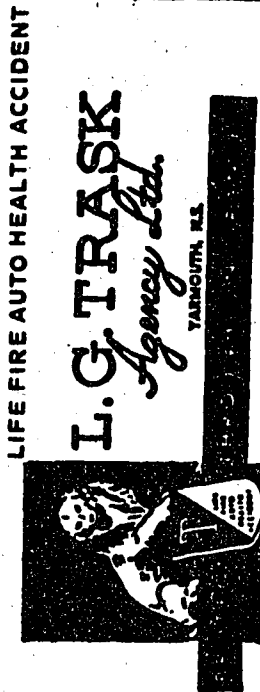

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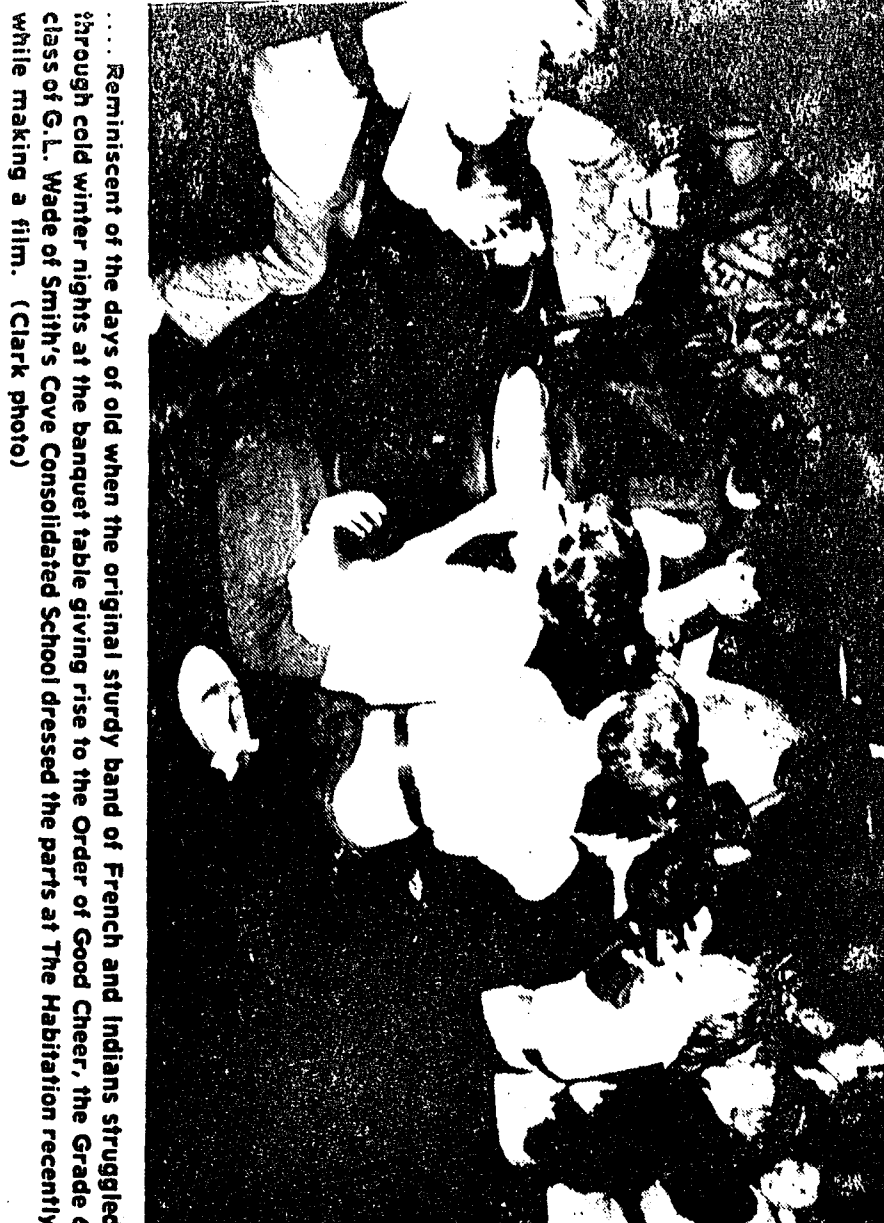

Not Spared Of Caterpillars

"Forest Tent Caterpillars will get the upper hand and the pests again be present in large numbers in the Annapolis Valley this year," said R.L. Horsburgh, Entomologist with the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture and Marketing. "Observations show that parasites and disease organisms caused a significant population reduction last fall. But these were not sufficient to prevent a further outbreak this spring," said Mr. Horsburgh. The caterpillars hatch mid-May and normally feed on deciduous foliage. In apple orchards they are easily controlled by spraying, but they frequently develop unchecked in some of our woodlands, particularly in poplar trees. When food becomes scarce, the caterpillars will move out of the woods in search of a further food source. In their migration they often damage other crops. For example, damage last year included strawberries, tobacco, etc. Farmers equipped with sprayers can control the insects by use of insecticides. Inland or Guibon. For the small home owner or home gardener who does not have such equipment, there is little he can do on his own. However, if he is prepared to organize with his neighbours, they should be able to contact a custom sprayer to do the job. If the insects are left unchecked, they will develop parasites and disease which will

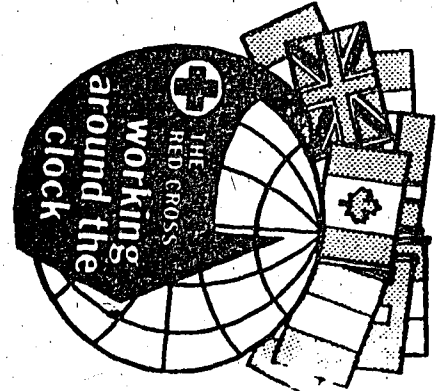
Drugs Provided for 65 Years Old And Over

Health Minister William MacEachern introduced a bill in the Nova Scotia Legislature this morning which would provide prescription drugs for residents 65 years and over. The bill would enable the Health Services and Insurance Commission to establish, implement, and carry out an insured prescription drug plan. The commission would prepare the necessary regulations for approval by Governor-in-Council.

A cost sharing agreement with the federal government would be possible under the bill. Residents entitled to coverage under other federal or provincial legislation (e.g. The Workmen's Compensation Act), would be excluded from the program.

The bill is an amendment to the Health Services and Insurance Act, establishing a basic framework for an insured drug plan which can be expanded by regulation of the Governor-in-Council to include other coverage and categories. The plan covers drugs, biologicals and related preparations prescribed by either a doctor or a dentist and including the prescription fee.

At a media briefing, the Health Minister told reporters that the plan would be operational no later than October 1, and earlier if possible. It will cost the province about \$7 million dollars, and 74,000 residents will be covered. The objective of the bill is to make prescription drugs free to all Nova Scotians, however, this goal will be achieved in stages, he added.



Annapolis Regional Vocational School

The Graduation Exercises of the Annapolis Regional Vocational School will be held on Friday, June 14th, at 8:00 P.M. in the auditorium of the school. The guest speaker will be C.E. Edwards, Inspector of Schools for Annapolis-Digby counties, N.S. Dept. of Education.

There will be approximately 160 graduates in some 22 occupational areas plus some 20 Canada Manpower students from the Steam Engineering Program.

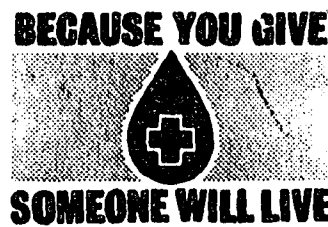
All members of the public are extended a most cordial invitation to attend.

The employment outlook for graduates in all trade areas this year has been excellent. In many of the trades, there were far more employment opportunities than there were graduates to fill the need. This was particularly evident in Carpentry, Plumbing, Electrical, Electronics, Motor Vehicle trades, both Mechanical and Auto Body, Brick & Tile, Machine Shop and several others. It appears at this time that most graduates

will find good employment opportunities in all trades when they have the opportunity to apply.

New enrollments for the 1974-75 school year at this time is higher than in previous years but there are still some openings in some excellent trade areas such as Industrial Electricity, Steam Engineering, Drafting, Business Education, Secretarial, Electronics, Dining Room Services, Machine Shop, Motor Vehicle Repair - Body and other areas. Interested applicants should apply at once for enrollment or have their names placed on a waiting list for possible vacancies in the trade of their particular interest.

For females, the one year Secretarial program appears to be finding favour among employers and as students have been reaching graduation standards, they have been released into employment which seems to be at a very high level. Also there is an extreme shortage in Nova Scotia and elsewhere of hairdressers, waitresses and sales personnel in the retail fields for which good employment poses no problem for well-trained students. There also seems to be a growing demand for females as Architectural Draftsmen in the Maritimes.

It was his hope, he said, that the facilities be used not only for activities for the elderly but that the entire community might benefit in programs and projects.

Invocation was given by Rev. Ronald Stevens and the dedicatory prayer by Rev. Father Maillett. Rev. Isaac Butler gave a resume of the New Horizons activities since its inauguration and thanked Mental Health, Digby, for their interest and assistance.

Other speakers included George Matthews of the N. S. Social Services Department; William Spurr, Department of

Recreation; Roy McIsaac, chairman, Digby-Annapolis Mental Health Service Board; Paul Stelheim of New Horizons program and Joseph Casey, M.L.A. for Digby.

Refreshments were served by ladies of the New Horizons Club.

The New Horizons building was obtained by Mental Health, Digby, from the N. S. Horticultural property at Marshalltown and moved to the Digby Mental Health Clinic premises. Here it was winterized and renovated making a reception room, two work rooms, kitchen and wash rooms.

The exterior of the building is white with red. Brown wall panelling, gold wall to wall carpeting and harmonizing furniture complete the reception room. Work rooms where the New Horizons members displayed their completed work had tiled floors in harmony with the yellow decor.

Crook Dispels Myths About Mental Illness

Andrew J. Crook, executive director of Mental Health, Nova Scotia, was guest speaker on Wednesday evening when the annual meeting of Mental Health, Digby, was held at the newly opened New Horizons building sponsored by Mental Health, Digby.

The meeting was presided over by V. G. Cardoza, president, who in his report reviewed the highlights of the year's work which included the formation of the New Horizons Club, the New Horizons building, a multicultural conference and setting up of a multicultural association, forming an auxiliary for Tideview Terrace and granting of scholarships.

Mr. Crook in his address attempted to dispel some myths associated with mental illness.

Fortunately we know differently. It is true that in some cases a predisposition towards mental illness may be inherited, but from case histories we know that mental illness sometimes develops in people who have been deprived of love, sympathy and understanding in the important years of childhood.

It is possible to recognize early emotional disturbances and do something about them. Symptoms don't usually begin all at once; they are commonly present over a long period of time, Mr. Crook said.

Myth number 2 is that MENTAL ILLNESS IS MYSTERIOUS AND DIFFICULT TO TREAT, Mr. Crook said. But in every community there are many successful men and women who were at one time desperately in need of

help, perhaps even diagnosed as mentally ill. They found the help they needed - perhaps in individual psychotherapy, group therapy, family group therapy, or recreational and occupational therapy.

The earlier help is sought, the greater the opportunities for recovery, he remarked. In well-equipped and well-staffed clinics, outpatient departments and hospitals, such help is readily available.

Myth number 3 he continued is that MENTAL ILLNESS IS SHAMEFUL AND SHOULD BE HUSHED UP. He said many people still have a moralistic attitude towards mental illness. They feel it is something shameful... something that grows out of weakness and the person "should pull himself together". Luckily this view is being replaced by common sense. Mental illness is no more disgraceful than a fractured leg or acute appendicitis, he argued. Furthermore, such medically respectable conditions as ulcers, high blood pressure and skin disease are sometimes closely related to mental and emotional problems.

Myth number 4 is that IT'S A PROBLEM FOR THE PSYCHIATRISTS, Mr. Crook said. Professionals in many fields can play an important role but friends, family, the employer and the community have perhaps the greatest contribution to make in rehabilitation he felt.

In considering some causes of mental illnesses, Mr. Crook noted that the standard of living, measured in economic

terms, has risen but it has brought with it high rise living, smaller family units, segregation of the old from the young, more family break up, more and more people questioning the whole purpose of life in the constant striving to keep ahead of the game while it is true more Canadians are earning more than ever before but the economic gap between the rich and poor remains. We are also forced to be more mobile. Many children before reaching adulthood have been faced with many moves, being uprooted from communities and neighbourhoods and friends - the very things which strengthen family life and enhance mental health.

He claimed that in searching for a meaning in life children, youth and adults today are constantly bombarded with advertising and news over the media which makes it difficult - impossible for some - to adjust, to cope and maintain one's sanity. We are encouraged to buy more; and, if we run up bills, to borrow and consolidate our debts through gimmicky loans, which for many means never getting out of debt. The offices of psychiatrists and mental health workers, social agencies are loaded with people whose worries and anxieties are associated with not being able to cope financially.

Inadequate housing and lack of what many of us regard as ordinary amenities of living - adequate space for raising children, proper playgrounds cause family conflict, quarreling and poor mental health, he told his audience.

Introduced by Joe Casey, Digby, M.L.A., Miss Campbell stated that the people of Southwestern Nova are not receiving benefits that are rightfully theirs because of the lack of communication between this area and Ottawa.

She stated that, if elected on July 8th, she will give her undivided attention to establishing and maintaining the kind of two-way communication necessary if this area and its people are to secure the assistance, both technical and financial, which is necessary to the improvement of the economic life of the area.

Touching on the subject of the Cornwallis Forces Base, Miss Campbell said time was probably ripe for the spreading of rumour about the future of the Base. She told the audience that she had checked into the matter with federal officials and there rumours could be laid to rest as she had received assurance the base would be continued.

Hon. Allan MacEachern told the audience the opposition parties had denied pensioners increases under the Canada Pension Plan, and had prevented pension raises to veterans by forcing the election before this beneficial Liberal legislation could be enacted. He said the anti-profititeering bill which provide for roll back in price increases in certain cases of overpricing, was also prevented from enactment because of the anxiety of the opposition Tories and NDP to force an election.

Mr. MacEachern paid high tribute to Coline Campbell, the Liberal candidate for Southwestern Nova, and said her grasp of the problems of the people of the area and her great concern for their welfare ensured that she would give positive and active representation.

Digby, M.L.A., Joe Casey also praised Miss Campbell and assured the audience he looked forward to working with her. Mr. Casey spoke at some length of the fishing industry and said he was hopeful the 200 mile limit being proposed by Canada would be accepted.

Among these from various parts of the constituency present for the meeting were Senator Ernest Croteau of Yarmouth and Mrs. Shirley Bradshaw, also of Yarmouth, President of the Liberal Association of Southwestern Nova.

Following the short and informal program a social evening, during which Miss Campbell was introduced and talked with all present, was held.

Charlie Haliburton's Boat Tour is now underway. Charlie cast off from Clyde River, Shelburne County on Tuesday, June 18th and is presently progressing up the south west shore of Nova Scotia. During the tour, Charlie Haliburton hopes to visit every public wharf in the South Western Nova riding so that he can better acquaint himself with the many problems facing the local fishing industry. Charlie has expressed his concern in the past Parliament when he acted on many committees concerning the fishing industry and was chairman of a committee dealing with small craft harbours.

Charlie's boat is scheduled to arrive in Meteghan on Saturday afternoon, June 22. He will leave there Sunday morning and during the day, Charlie Haliburton's tour will visit the St. Mary's Bay area stopping, among other places, at Tiverton, Westport, Weymouth, Little River and New Edinburgh. Monday and Tuesday will find Charlie in the Annapolis Basin and on the Bay of Fundy shore. The tour will conclude Wednesday night at Annapolis Royal. From there, Charlie will travel to Bridgetown where a joint rally will be held for himself and Pat Nowlan. Times for that rally will be announced at a later date.

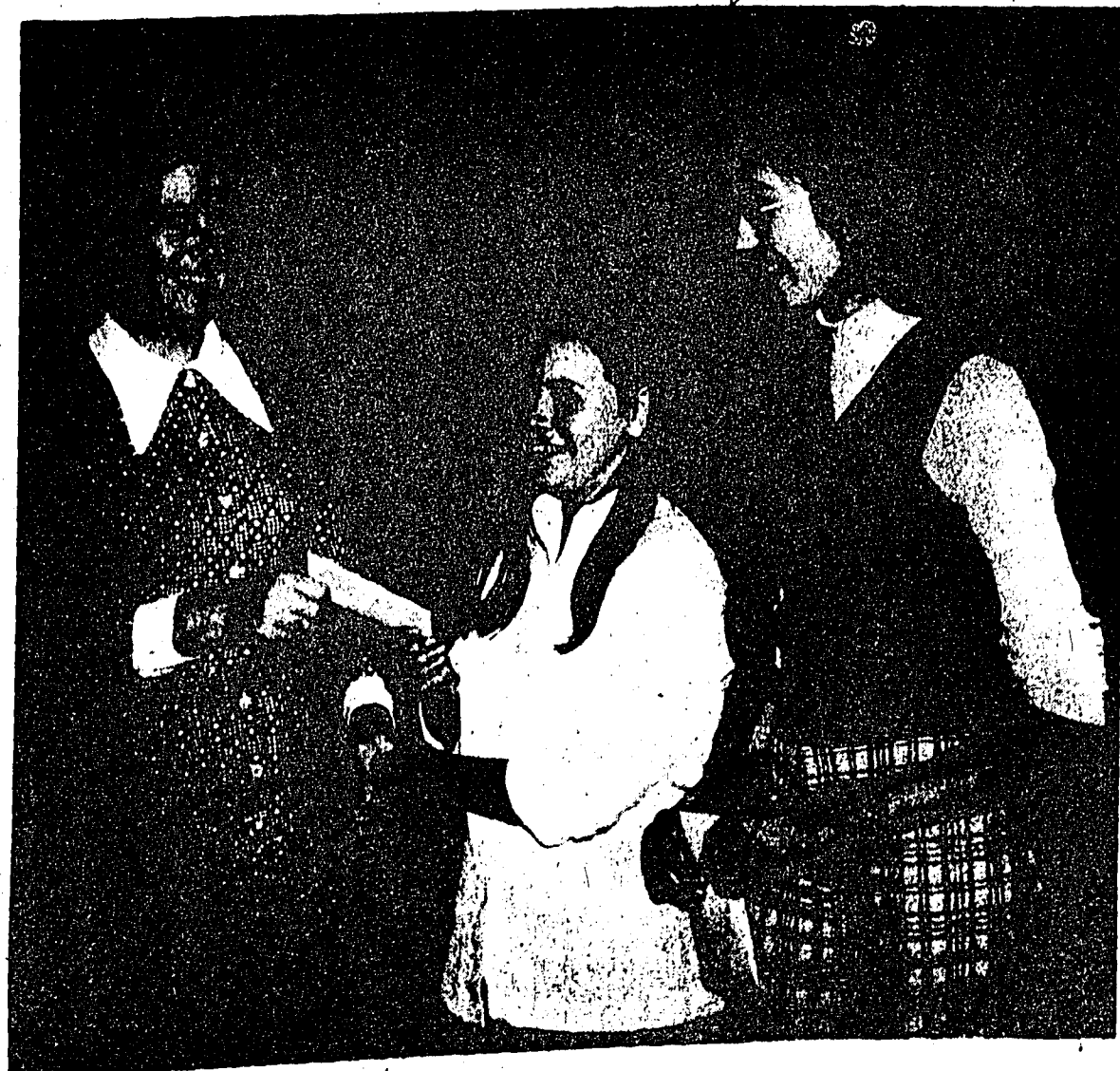

AMERICAN DOG TICK
(Contributed)

The American dog tick, *Dermacentor variabilis* (Say.), sometimes called "Wood" tick, is a problem in western Nova Scotia, particularly Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne and Queens counties. Ticks feed on the blood of various animals, including humans, and are of concern because of their bites, and the possibility of infection.

Adult of the American dog tick may be found from early April to early July. They crawl up the stems of grass and shrubbery and drop onto the animals that are passing. After mating and engorging themselves with blood, the female drops to the ground and lays several thousand eggs and later dies. The eggs hatch in 1 or 2 months and the tiny larvae climb up on grass or shrubbery and attach themselves to passing animals. Both larvae and nymphs feed on small animals such as mice, squirrels, chipmunks, groundhogs, etc. After feeding, they drip off and moult. This sequence is repeated twice before they reach the adult stage. Hence it is called a three-host tick. It may take 2 or more years to complete the life-cycle.

For personal protection in tick-infested areas, secure the trouser legs inside boots to prevent tick entrance. Apply a tick repellent to the outer clothing. After walking in a tick-infested area, remove and examine clothing. Also examine the person for attached ticks. Remove any found with the fingers or, preferably, with tweezers, pulling slowly and steadily to avoid breaking off the mouth parts. After removing ticks, the bites should be treated with an antiseptic.

Repellents suggested for skin application - Diethyl-M-Toluamide, dimethyl phthalate (DMP), diethyl carbate, ethyl hexanediol (Rutgers 612), and indalone are among the most effective repellents for mites, ticks, and biting flies. Mixtures of repellents are usually more effective against a large number of insect species than any one compound mentioned above. A mixture known as 6:2:2, consisting of six parts of dimethyl phthalate, two parts of Rutgers 612 or diethyl carbate and two parts of indalone, is one of the most effective repellents for general use against biting flies.

Pour about 1/2 teaspoon of the repellent into the hands and spread it uniformly over the face, neck, hands, and other exposed skin. Use about half this amount (1/4 teaspoon) for supplementary applications. Do not allow the repellent to contact the eyes or lips as it will cause temporary irritation. Several of the repellents dissolve paint, and plastics. Therefore care should be taken to prevent them from contacting such materials.

Repellent applied to clothing - The repellents, for application to the skin may be applied by hand or by sprayer to the outside of the clothing, especially across the shoulders, around the waist, and the seat of the trousers and on the socks. On clothing, they retain their effectiveness for much longer periods than on the skin.

An insecticide containing rotenone is suggested for treatment of animals. Wash or dip animals in a 5 per cent water emulsion or water suspension. It may also be applied in powder form, containing 1 per cent active rotenone. Rotenone is non-toxic to humans and animals except swine. Methoxychlor is also suggested for treatment of animals. It should be used according to directions on the container.

Spray infested outdoor areas with Sevin 4 oil at 3 pints of concentrate per acre, or diazinon 4E at the rate of 1 pound active diazinon per acre. Particular attention should be given to trails, pathways, the margins of roads and other places where the ticks may congregate. The insecticide may be applied with a hand-operated, compressed air or knapsack sprayer, but a portable, power mist sprayer is the most satisfactory.

Other measures of reducing the numbers of ticks include controlling rodents that serve as hosts, and clearing away underbrush weeds and grass to reduce the prevalence of ticks in infested areas.

Care must be exercised in using insecticides because, in general, they are poisonous to all forms of animal life including humans. Always read and follow the directions on the labels of the containers.

In case of accidental poisoning, contact the local Poisons Control Center listed in the front of the telephone directory.

Notes From Bird Haven

GREAT HORNED OWLS

During a visit to my nieces in Walpole Mass., became very familiar with two young great horned owls being mothered for the Audubon Society. These birds have to be fed much longer by their parents than other birds, the mother bird apparently had been killed.

They had been fed young chicken, rats and mice and were supposed to return to their feeding station when released until they were old enough to feed for themselves.

However, this was not the way of life these two followed when she released them they flew to high trees and were immediately attacked by crows. It is believed a crow has a particular caw to warn other birds of an owl in the neighborhood and believe it inside of no time there were at least twenty five crows tormenting them.

After a couple of days they were lured back to their cage

and fed and the crows went off about their business.

The birds are mostly nesting now and there soon will be young ones found on the ground and if you find any please leave them where they are, but if you don't notice the old birds around them for an hour or so that is time enough to rescue them.

If your cat isn't wearing a bell please get one for it, as they will give a little warning to a bird.

Have you ever seen a crow bathing? There is one in the South end of town that goes regularly to a pond.

Things are very dry now so please put out some water for the birds.

Orioles are reported from all sections of the county. Put out short bits of colored yarn and you will likely see them woven in a hanging nest next fall after the leaves fall.

Accident Claims Two Lives

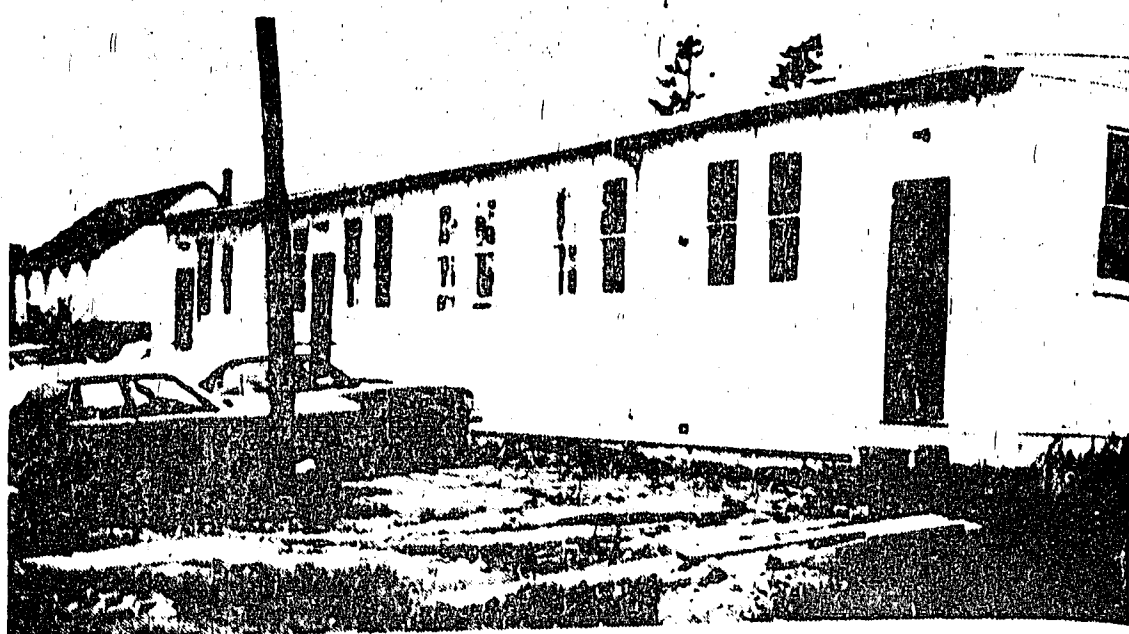

Throne Speech Reply

Address in reply to The Speech from the Throne, the First Session of the 51st General Assembly of The Province of Nova Scotia, by Joseph Casey, Digby.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to congratulate you on your appointment to The Speaker's position. To date, you have done an excellent job and I know that you, like good wine with time, will constantly improve.

I would like to compliment all members who were elected or re-elected and would like to welcome them on board.

I most certainly will miss the ones who did not return as I had become very good friends with them all, regardless of which side of the house they occupied.

Unlike the previous members who have spoken and singled out individual Ministers for special mention, I would like to say they are all of exceptionally high calibre and so will congratulate The Premier for his excellent choice of members for appointment to this Executive Council.

AGRICULTURE

Mr. Speaker, I would like to compliment the Minister of Agriculture on the new programs he has brought forward during the past year which will be of great assistance to farmers.

With regard to the beef production policy: I wonder if the minimum head of cattle required by a farmer in order to qualify could be reduced somewhat from the number which is now set at 15.

In my constituency there are quite a number of farmers with herds below this qualifying figure. There are some farmers, especially younger ones, that would like to get started in beef raising but just can't seem to get off the ground.

So many of our farmers do not have large land holdings so probably would never be able to have large herds but with say 10 head of cattle along with some mixed farming, could make a decent living, but without this subsidy, they never seem to have a base to take off from.

TRANSPORTATION

Mr. Speaker, I would like to bring to the attention of the Premier, The Minister of Tourism and Minister of Development, the increase in fares on the Digby - Saint John Ferry, Princess Acadia. This recent increase is the third increase since the new ferry came on the run three years ago. I realize this ferry is operated by a private company, namely the Canadian Pacific Railway, but their rates are higher per-running-mile than any major ferry operating in the Atlantic Provinces.

When we compare the rates across the Bay of Fundy to the rates across Northumberland Strait, we are always told that the Island of Prince Edward Island was given preferential rates under the terms of Confederation.

If a province needs to be an island to qualify, I would suggest that we dig the

Chignecto Canal and make Nova Scotia an island so that we could enjoy similar benefits. This canal would also give better water transportation from the Bay of Fundy ports to ports along the Saint Lawrence River and Great Lakes, so it may not be such a bad idea after all.

LANDS & FORESTS

Mr. Speaker, I would like to bring to the attention of the Minister of Lands and Forests, of the increase in the bear population in Digby County, (and I don't mean streakers). It is becoming quite a serious situation.

Just last week a constituent had a steer killed by a bear. This animal was worth well over \$200 which is a loss too great to be suffered by any farmer. This is not the only incident in recent months where losses of livestock have occurred.

Several months ago, a constituent related the following story which I have no reason to disbelieve:

Saturday nights, his brother was in the habit of returning home at a late hour after having imprudently indulged a little too freely at the local tavern.

This particular night, he heard a commotion in the brook near his home whereupon, he went forth to investigate, he found, what he thought was his wayward brother stumbling along in the brook. So thinking only of the welfare of his brother, he grabbed him by the back of the neck, at the same time ordering him into the house. He was immediately looking into a mouth lined with some very white teeth and had a near miss from a very large paw.

Immediately forgetting all brotherly love, he beat a hasty retreat into the safety of his home.

All jokes aside, Mr. Speaker, I have had complaints from some parents who are afraid to let their children play out of doors.

So would strongly recommend that a bounty be placed on bears at least in my constituency.

FISHERIES

I would like to compliment our Minister of Fisheries. He is putting much effort in the developing of his department.

I have a few thoughts I would like to pass along regarding the long term future of our fishing industry in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Speaker, you no doubt realize that fishing is the largest and most lucrative industry we have in this province. I don't know the exact figures but I do know that Nova Scotia's landings are almost equal to the total landings of the combined Atlantic Provinces and Quebec. So it is imperative that we consider its future.

Our chances of getting control of the 200 mile limit off our coast looks very promising indeed. Our fate will be decided at the law-of-the-sea conference to be held in Caracas next month. If we lose this vote, our future is very bleak indeed as the fish plants in this province, at this

time, are only working to 30 percent of their capacity and additional landings are desperately needed to keep them going.

Unfortunately, and I say this with all sincerity, it is most unfortunate that the Federal Election was called at such a crucial time during our negotiations with the fishing nation of the world. Our federal minister of Fisheries and Environment, Mr. Davies, has assured us that everything will be done in spite of the election to see that we are properly represented at this conference, but, I would be much more at ease if I thought he could give his undivided attention to this.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to urge our government to speed up plans to take advantage of these new possibilities for increased fish catches I am reminded of a story of a preacher who called his congregation together to pray for rain during a very dry season and then gave them the devil because not one of them had brought an umbrella.

We cannot afford to be caught unprepared.

Much larger refrigerated ships will be required and time is needed to get them off the drawing board and into the building stage. These ships must have greater capabilities for winter fishing than many of our present fleet. Comfortable living accommodations for the crew is of prime importance. At best, their job is not an easy one and anything to improve their lot must be given top priority.

Safety at sea for our fishermen is a must. When I look back over the years, I remember many tragedies at sea with much loss of life, to mention a few: over 30 fishermen lost in one storm from one village in Bae Saint Anne; 20 from the Town of Lockport in one night; a more recent one when the dragger Coville Bay sailed this winter from the South Shore and both vessel and crew vanished without any trace.

We have a Memorial Bell in Digby, erected near the Federal Building, on this bell are the names of well over one hundred fishermen who failed to return from this small port.

Mr. Speaker, I am not saying that this was due entirely to the lack of adequate boats but it is needless to say that the larger the boat, the greater the chance of survival in a gale or hurricane, so, if we are sending our fishermen to sea, it is only fair that they have the best equipment available, after all, they are fishermen, not Kamekaze pilots.

Each year, the per-ship-capital-investment increases; each year, more and more sophisticated equipment is installed in these ships until it is becoming a highly specialized profession. We should step up our training programs so that young and aggressive men can be attracted into the industry.

Of course, all of this takes money so we would hope the fisheries budget be increased substantially and I am fully confident that with our minister, his deputy and competent staff, we could well imagine ourselves with the most modern and progressive fisheries department in Canada.

And now, Mr. Speaker, that we are on the subject of money, the building of these proposed ships will be costly, probably 6 million dollars per ship. This kind of money is not going to be easy come by, especially by the smaller fish processors and basically, these are the people who need them most because there are long periods during the winter months when their plants are closed down for the lack of fish.

It will take large infusions of government money (both Federal and Provincial) to get this program under way and the lead time would probably be two or three years before the first one could be launched.

Maybe a consortium of businessmen could be formed to

supply the private capital necessary and these people could contract to sell fish to the processors; one ship supplying several plants.

Back in the sailing ship era this type of risk capital was easily available from Nova Scotian investors. But, in recent years, they seem more apt to invest in business ventures outside the province. It may seem far more glamorous to own shares in oil wells, etc., but I still think our greater opportunities in the long term, is in the harvesting of fish along our Continental Shelf.

This is a renewable resource (if properly managed) highly labour intensive much of which would be sold on foreign markets, thereby, helping to balance our payments with these nations and bringing in new money.

Our landings of fish in Nova Scotia was just under 7 million dollars last year.

Several months ago, I had the opportunity to talk at some length with Mr. Davies, the Federal Minister of Environment and Fisheries and he said it was not unrealistic to assume that if the management of the 200 mile limit was secured for Canada, that our fish landings at the end of 10 years could be increased 7 times.

Mr. Speaker, I can't use the new mathematics but by the old system, I would say that would be approximately 490 million dollars per year. These figures are only landed values. The actual selling value, after processing and packaging, etc., would be at least double this amount, and that isn't peanuts.

It would take some highly productive oil well to beat that and you must remember there would be no arguments with Ottawa about royalties.

Mr. Speaker, even in the event of an agreement being late in coming at the Caucus conference, I might say that in the interim, we could make good use of these ships.

According to the Federal Department of Fisheries there is 400 million pounds of unexploited fish available to Canadian fishermen (such as hake, Squid, Mackerel and Whiting) that are not being commercially harvested at this time. So there would be no need for any of these ships to lay idle.

Mr. Speaker, last fall when the fuel crisis was looming on the horizon, I went to the Minister of Tourism and Mr. Lloyd Hill, the Executive Director of the Annapolis Valley Affiliated Boards of Trade with an idea.

This idea was a way of giving people from the Eastern Seaboard of the U.S.A. into Nova Scotia.

I suggested that a cruise ship be chartered and put on a run from New York to Digby. The passengers would be picked up from the heavily populated area with a potential of many million of prospective customers many of them almost with in walking distance of the point of departure. These passengers would not be bringing their own cars. So they would be off-loaded and allowed to travel around the province until the ships return several days later.

To conserve fuel, I suggested the ship run at a reduced speed, what is the difference when you are on cruise whether the ship runs at half speed or full speed? After all, getting there is half the fun and the other half could be supplied in Nova Scotia.

I suggested Digby as the point of arrival for many reasons, namely: (1) It is in my constituency. (2) There are good docking facilities both at the government wharf and the Princess Acadia Terminal. (3) These docks are one mile from our Pines Hotel which, by the way, has one of the best golf courses in Eastern Canada.

(4) We also have, besides the Pines, many other hotels and motels which have excellent accommodations in their own rights.

Drive-yourself-cars and bus

tours could be made available so that trips could be taken to Port Royal Habitation and other points of Historical and Scenic interest. In fact, trailers could be rented so that some time could be spent by the guests in our Kejimikujik National Park, fishing and canoeing, etc.

Sail-yourself sailboats and row-yourself row boats could be available for rent.

In fact, this is not just an idea to promote business in Digby but these people would fan out all over the province and be a boon to business in the whole area.

Both the Minister and Mr. Hill have given this much thought and hopefully, they will come up with a solution. If not this year, possibly next.

Mr. Speaker, you may not know but we had cruise ship sailing from both Boston and New York to Digby thirty-five years ago. Let us hope history repeats itself once again.

If any money becomes

available for environmental cleanup, I would suggest it be used for removing old car bodies from the sides of our highways and beaches. As the price of steel increases, I would think it would become more economically feasible to return these to our Sydney Steel Plant. I cannot think of a place where our money could be better spent than in removing these eyesores from our otherwise beautiful country landscapes.

People Look For Simple Basics In Life

A world renowned expert on trails systems told the first Nova Scotia Symposium at the Pines Hotel, Wednesday, the Nova Scotians don't seem to recognize what they have in natural recreational resources.

Gunnar A. Peterson, Executive Director of the United States National Trails Council Open Lands Project was speaking to about 100 federal, provincial and municipal government recreation representatives and private individuals from various outdoor hiking, camping and trails associations in Canada, Nova Scotia and the United States.

"As people are looking for a place in this worried and busy

society, they are looking for the simple basics of life. Trails for people like this in Nova Scotia may be the answer," Mr. Peterson said.

The Trails Symposium, sponsored by the Provincial Departments of Recreation, Tourism and Lands and Forests, opened its first of two full working days with a welcoming speech by Dr. Maurice Delory, Minister of Lands and Forests. Dr. Delory said that he hoped the sessions would help determine Nova Scotia's future course of trails development and put forward the basis for government decisions in this area.

Mr. Peterson, from Holmwood, Illinois, is noted for his work in preserving urban open lands in the Chicago area.

Speaking about Nova Scotia government programs for setting aside recreational land for public use, Mr. Peterson, said:

"Quality of life through the enrichment experience of outdoor activities may be the answer for Nova Scotians as their leisure time increases. A trails system suited to all age groups may be the answer."

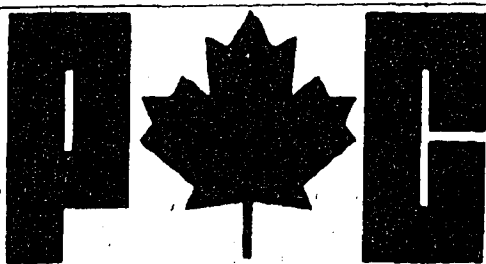

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Election Time — Busy Time

A general election in Canada is not only a time of political rhetoric. It is also a period of intensive work, behind the scenes, by thousands of people performing an essential function in Canada's electoral procedure — the process of compiling complete and accurate lists of electors eligible to vote.

Working under the direction of the Chief Electoral Officer of Canada, Jean Marc Hamel, more than 230,000 people share the direct responsibility of ensuring efficient operation of the complex administrative procedures leading up to the July 8th vote.

You also share that responsibility, indirectly, as one of about 13 million Canadians eligible to vote in this election. Your responsibility is to check for your name on the preliminary list of voters compiled from the May 20-25 enumeration.

Printed copies of the list have been posted publicly in each of the nearly 63,000 polling divisions across Canada. In addition, copies are being mailed to the residence of each enumerated voter in urban polling divisions.

This is the revision phase of the electoral process. It is a time to catch omissions, duplication and errors in the listing of eligible electors. The deadline for changes is June 19th.

In urban polling divisions, the revising is done by a revising officer, assisted by two revising agents.

If you live in a population centre of more than 5,000, you are an urban voter, and must contact the returning officer of your electoral district if your name is not on the preliminary posted list. If you wish, you may ask the returning officer to send the revising agents to your home for the information required to have your name included in the official list of electors.

In rural polling divisions, the person to contact is the enumerator who prepared the preliminary list.

Compiling and preparing lists of eligible voters is the direct responsibility of the returning officer in each of the 264 electoral districts in Canada. The lists are used for only one election, then discarded.

It is estimated that approximately 98 per cent of all eligible voters are registered for each election. You can do your part in maintaining that high standard by making sure you are on the official list of electors for the July 8th general election.

Because this election is being held at a time when many Canadians will be on vacation, there is greater than usual interest in the advance polls.

They are held June 29th and July 1st, and are available for anyone who will be away from home July 8th, for any reason.

However, unless you are on the voters' list, you may not take advantage of the advance poll. Qualified urban electors lose their vote if they are not on the official list after June 21st. Rural electors may still vote July 8th, if someone on the list vouches for them.

To be eligible to vote, you

must be at least 18 by July 8th, and a Canadian citizen. If you are not a Canadian, but are a British subject, you may vote if you have resided continuously in Canada since June 25th, 1967 and were at least 20 years old on that date.

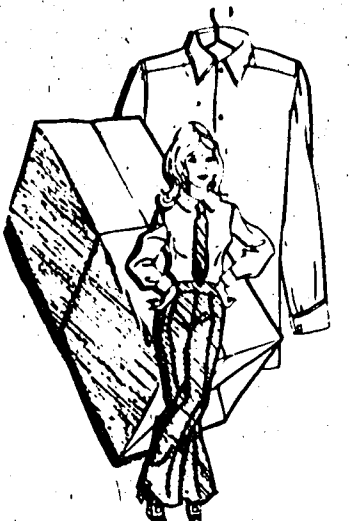

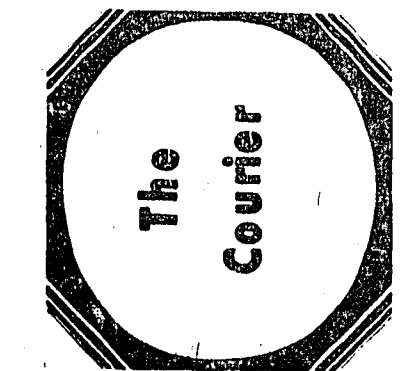

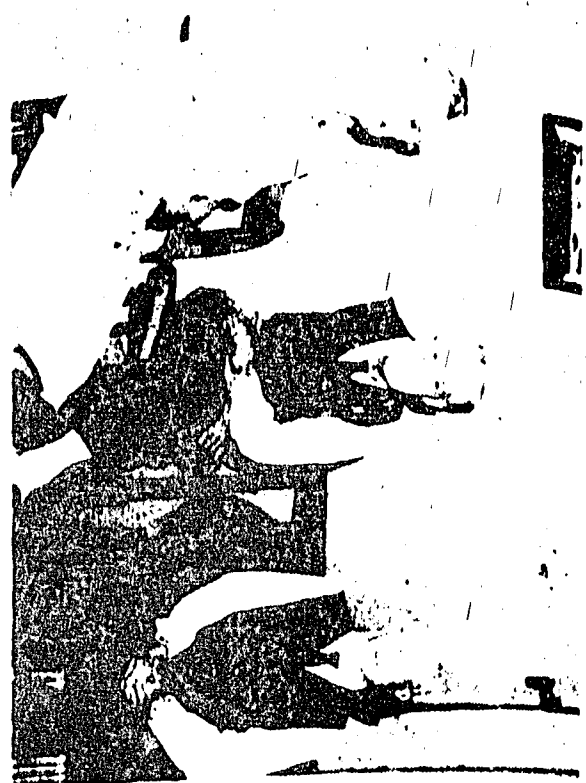

important. The Home is modern, in that it has sprinkler systems, chair lifts, wheelchairs, walkers and all the facilities to take care of the needs of guests. There are wide porches with comfortable chairs where guests can sit and enjoy the sun and the view.

I would like to tell our readers a little about each of the guests of honor, who have led full, interesting and sometimes quite amazing lives.

JOSEPH LOURNE BELLIVEAU: He is the Grand Old Man of the Home. He will be 100 in the Annapolis Royal Nursing Home for two years. At the age of 26, he married Anne Burke. 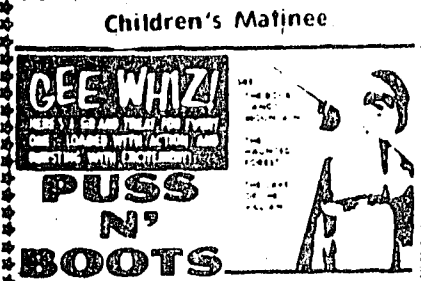

Movie Review

THE SEVEN UPS

Released by 20th-Fox
Producer-director Philip
D'Antoni wowed audiences
several years ago with "Bullitt"
and "The French Connection"
and breathed new life into the
"police-procedural" type film.
In "The Seven-Ups" he has
utilized some gritty New York
locales to good effect: death in a
sodden junkyard while slow

Mr. Jordan went on to relate
how much has been done in

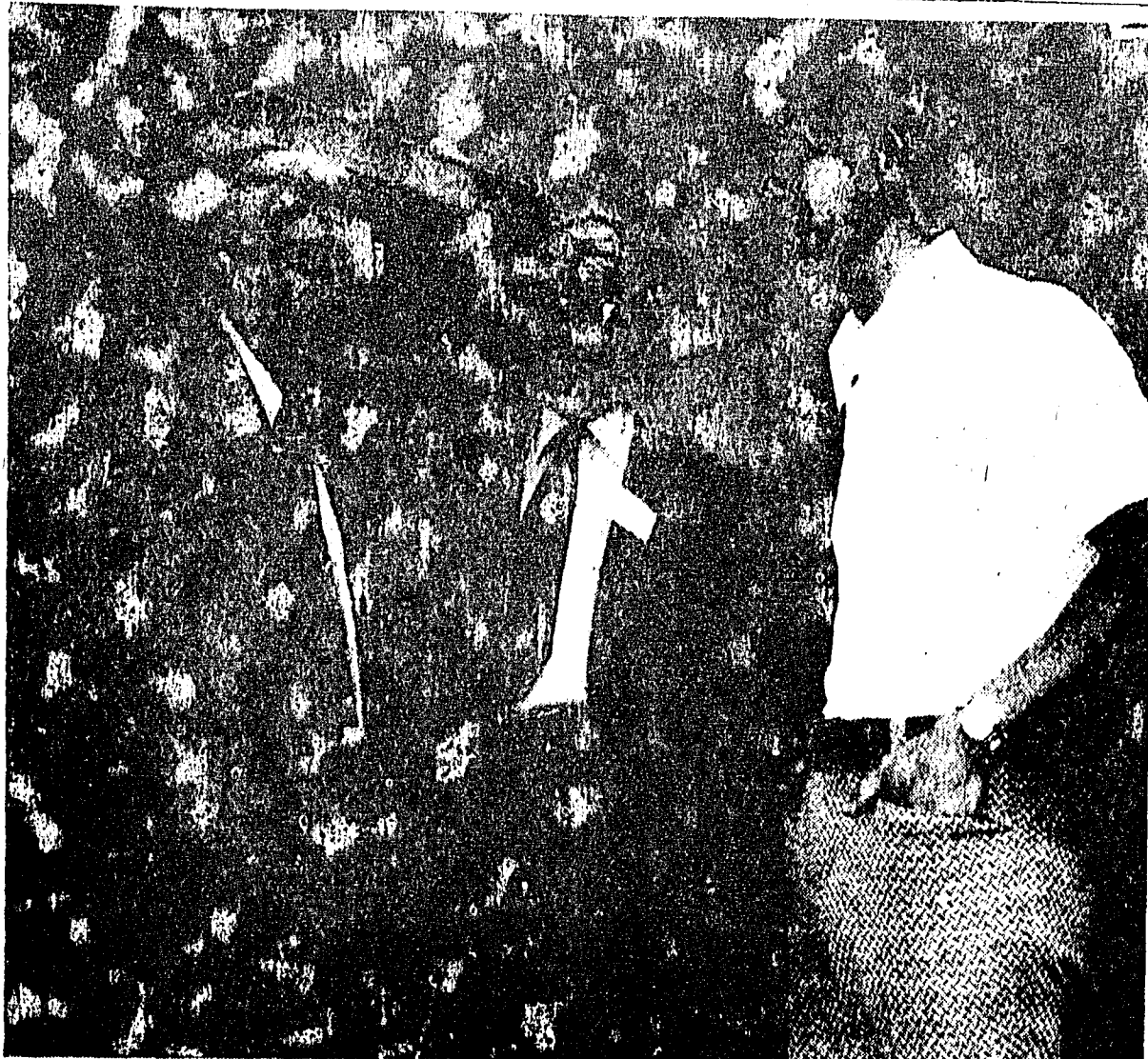

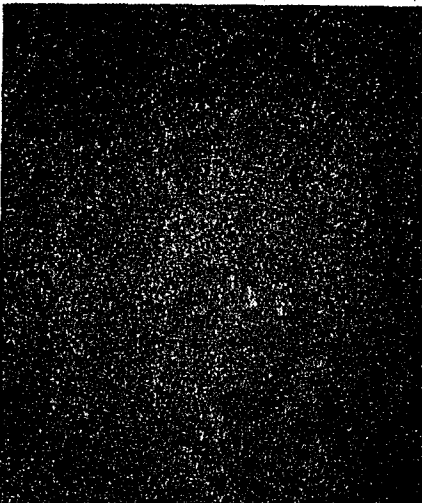
\$800.00 Renewable Scholarship

SIGNS AND FINES FOR GARBAGE

Garbage dumped on the Broad Cove wharf and the Broad Cove Road at Culloden and other areas of the Municipality of the District of Digby came up for discussion at the regular Digby Municipal Council meeting on Monday morning. It was suggested by some councillors that signs be posted and fines imposed on anyone guilty of causing unsightliness with garbage.

Further, the council discussed the necessity of having special space available for municipal people to dispose of garbage. By regular motion it was decided to contact the municipal garbage collector, Preston Andrews, to see if he would make the dump available for a short time two nights a week for this purpose.

The garbage by-law committee, Councillors Art Rice, Byard Marshall and Mrs. Helen McNeil were named on the Garbage Committee.

A general discussion on the municipal airport at Hill Grove arose regarding land fill and

general process of work being done at the airport by the Digby Flying Club. Because he was not near enough to the location of the airport, Councillor Walter MacAlpine resigned from the municipal airport committee, Councillor Eric Van Tassel was appointed in his place by Warden Wilfred Swift. On the committee with Van Tassel are Warden Swift and Councillor Helen McNeil.

On motion of Councillor Ronald Morehouse seconded by Councillor McAlpine resolutions were voiced to present to the Digby County Power Board and the Board will be requested to meet with the municipal hydro committee and the municipal finance committee.

It was generally agreed that expenditures must be curbed and such items as the cost of moving poles when highways are widened were discussed at length. Escalating wages and material costs also were factors considered.

The finance committee was authorized to contact whatever

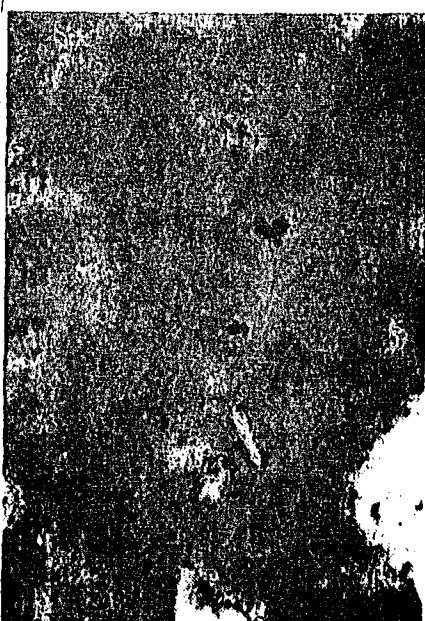
chartered bank deemed feasible to arrange a loan of \$120,000 to pay a debt to the Digby County Power Board and allow for necessary capital expenditures.

It was moved and passed that the municipality request the Department of Highways to pave the Old Post Road at Smith's Cove in 1975. Their earlier request brought a reply of "no money available now" from the Honorable Leonard Pace. Councillor McNeil also brought up the Jordantown road which had been expected to be paved.

Councillor Parker Thurber introduced the subjects of a swimming pool grant for the Islands, school maintenance, workers and a dog catcher for the Islands. The grant was not passed for the swimming pool. Costs of school maintenance and methods will be looked into by municipal representatives on school boards. Warden Swift said he had inquiries on where to obtain dog license. Plans will be finalized immediately to

have the dog catcher for the Islands begin duty.

Council authorized an advance of \$1500 to the Digby County Ambulance to so that a worn out vehicle could be replaced in the immediate future.

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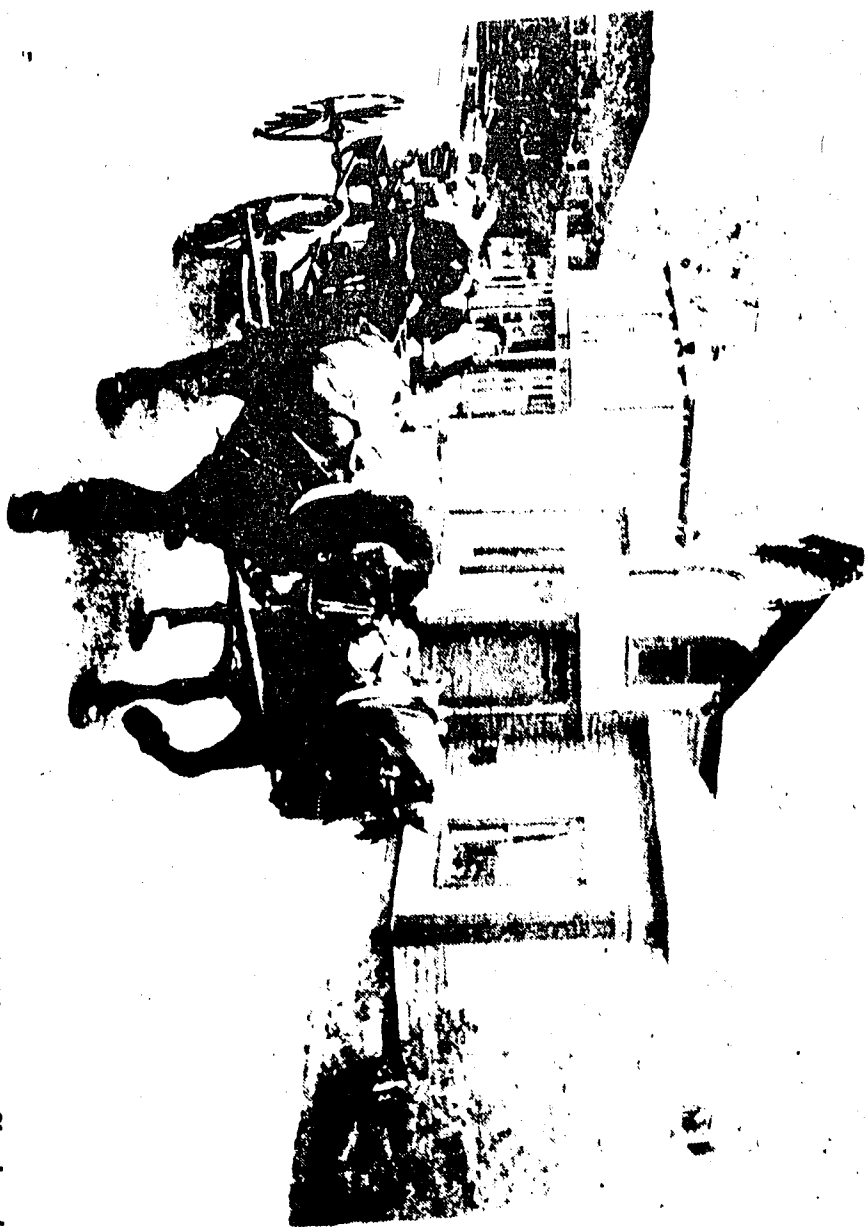
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Historic Sherbrooke Village

Nestled on a bank of St. Mary's River in Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, is the historic village of Sherbrooke where more than 12 buildings have been restored to the architectural design and decor of the golden age of 1860 to 1880.

A quiet haven in a fast-paced society, this "living" village, with a population of about 350, is a monument to the romantic and prosperous period when Sherbrooke was at its peak as a timber and ship-building community.

Built on the site of a 17th century French fort, Sherbrooke was an isolated pioneer settlement in 1800. It became a gold-rush town with a population of 1,200 by 1871, ten years after gold was discovered nearby.

The village, situated about 120 miles from the province's capital, Halifax, and 39 miles from the Highland Games centre of Antigonish, was named in honor of General Sir John Coape Sherbrooke, Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, 1811-1816 and later Governor-General of Canada.

The days of the gold rush are gone. But St. Mary's River, the valley and the surrounding area are well known as a sportsmen's paradise. Many people come each year to hunt moose, deer, rabbits and other small animals and birds. Others come to fish for salmon, trout, striped bass and shad in the pools and quickwater on the river and in a chain of lakes.

Thousands of travellers stop to rest in this tranquil village where even time seems to have paused in its journey. Here they can see and touch relics from an age of sailing ships and steamers, hardy seamen and shipwrights, gold miners, lumberjacks and fishermen.

Because Sherbrooke is a handicrafts instruction centre, visitors can watch or actually participate in the creation of 19th century styled handicrafts. They may tour restored buildings, guided by villagers in period dress who relate the local history people.

Other restored buildings include Remora Cottage, used as a tea room called "What Cheer House" after a Sherbrooke today are those of a blacksmith's hammer on an iron anvil, woodworkers' saws, waterfalls, hummingbird fishing reels, children, birds, prancing horses and an old school bell mungling with the nostalgic peal of the bell in a small white church on a hill overlooking the village.

Only local vehicles are allowed to enter the main village road so traffic is slight. The air is so clear that the scent of flowers and evergreen trees is very noticeable. Trees and bushes grow in every yard and field - fir, pine, spruce, birch, maple, hemlock, lilac, rose and many more.

The village is lit by mercury vapor lamps set on metal posts

At the entrance to the village is a stately courthouse, a wooden building with a gabled portico supported by four Doric columns and with tall windows set near the ground and reaching above the second story.

Here, elegance is conspicuously combined with the simplicity of American colonial decor, a style combination seen throughout the village with fine-threaded moldings and variously shaped windows enhancing the architectural design of most buildings.

The courthouse, built in 1868, is still used by villagers and in a side office the Registrar of Deeds carries out her work. A plaque near the front door notes that the nearby site of Fort Saint-Mary, established in the 17th century by Sicut Dela (Grandfather) and named by the English in 1680.

The historic Sherbrooke Village project is part of the Nova Scotia Museum complex administered by the provincial Department of Education through a Sherbrooke Village Restoration Committee.

Basic restoration procedures are planned for completion by 1975 and total cost of the project to date is over \$500,000.

Plans for future development include the restoration of more buildings, and arranging of programs such as boat tours on the river.

Most of those employed in the project are local people. The blacksmith, woodworkers and other craftsmen making replicas of antiques often use the original methods, materials and designs.

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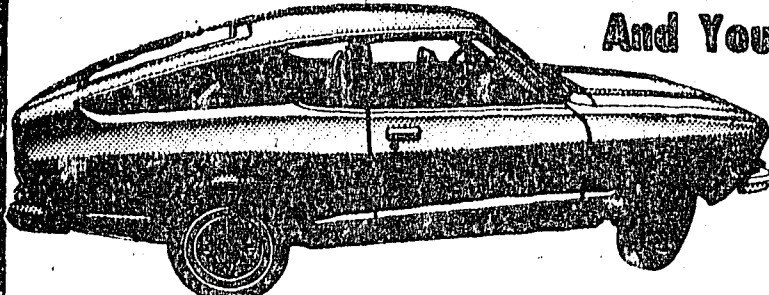

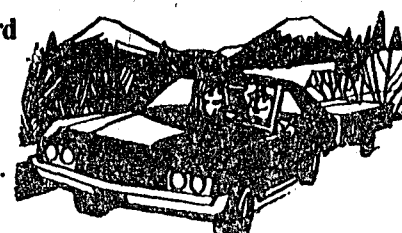

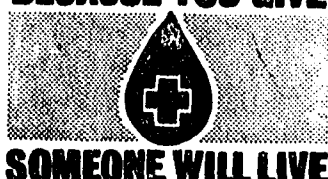

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EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1974

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The Children's Dental Plan is available to all children currently resident in Nova Scotia, born on or after January 1, 1967. Once a child qualifies under the plan, his or her coverage will continue automatically.

Do I need to register my children?

No registration is necessary. Your up-to-date MSI card is proof of eligibility. The year of birth shown on the card will identify for the dentist those children eligible for the Children's Dental Plan. Make sure you bring your MSI card with you.

May I select my own dentist?

Yes. You continue to have free choice of any qualified dentist who is willing to accept you as a patient.

May the dentist make a charge to me for his service?

Yes, if your dentist wishes to make a charge for his services, which is in excess of the MSI tariff allowance, he may do so. However, he must notify you if he intends to make this extra charge and inform you of the amount. You must also sign the claim to indicate your agreement to this arrangement.

What about dental service outside the province?

If your child is temporarily away from Nova Scotia, such as during a vacation, and the services of a dentist are required, payment should be made directly to the out-of-province dentist and an itemized receipt obtained. This receipt should then be sent to MSI for reimbursement, according to the insured tariff.

Where can I obtain further information?

MSI offices in Halifax, Amherst, Bridgewater, Kentville, New Glasgow, Sydney, Truro and Yarmouth, will provide you with answers to any of your questions about the plan. Free brochures giving full details of the plan are also available from your dentist or from any of the eight MSI offices.

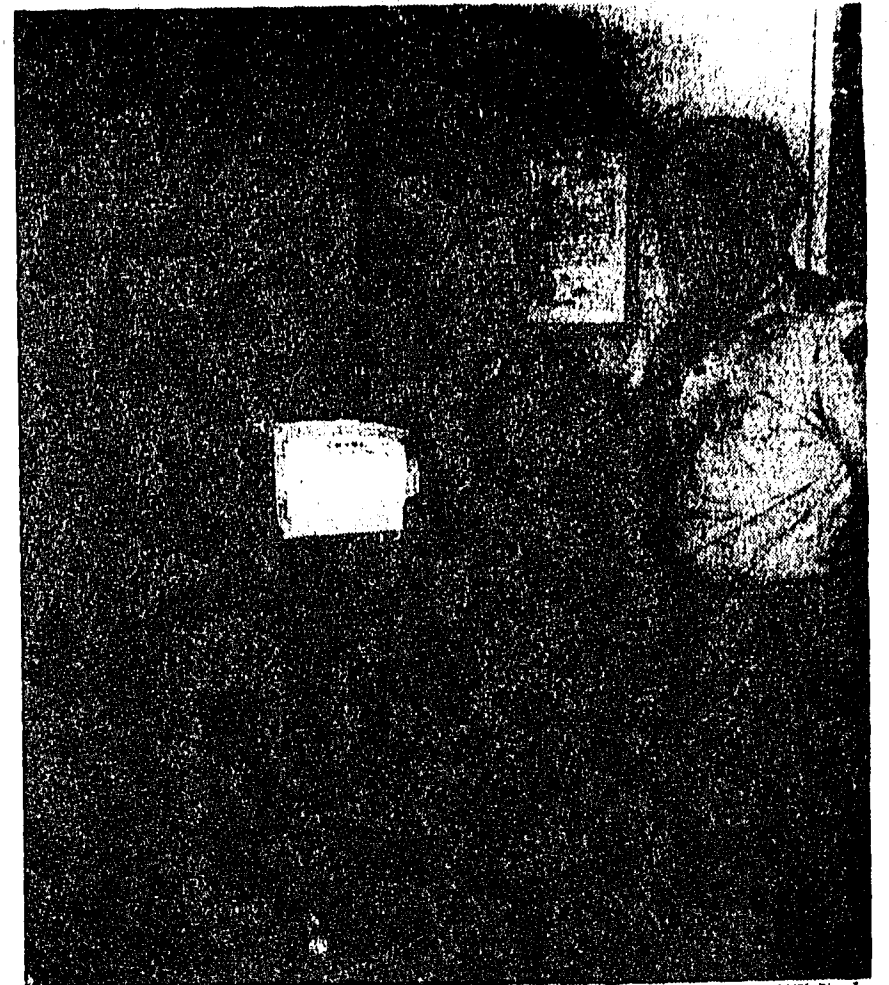

Canadians Have Priority

Canadians are getting priority over foreign temporary workers for farm jobs according to Mr. J. Pottier, Manager of the Digby Canada Manpower Centre.

Mr. Pottier did not rule out, however, the total elimination of the use of such temporary help.

"When Canadian workers are not available," continued Mr. Pottier, "farmers will be able to hire those workers who are part of organized and approved worker movements."

These worker movements include the Caribbean Seasonal Workers Program; Mexican Seasonal Workers Program; International Student Summer Employment Exchange Program; International Young workers Employment Exchange Program; Tobacco Workers from U.S.A. and other programs approved by the Minister.

"Only as a last resort, can individual temporary workers from outside Canada with

proper employment visas, take work in Canada," he said. "There should be evidence that neither Canadian workers nor those from approved movements were available."

Special arrangements with countries supplying seasonal workers assures Canadian employers of seasonal farm workers when Canadians are not available. These programs offer a virtually unlimited labour supply and can respond quickly to sudden changes in labour market demand.

Under these special arrangements workers can be transferred readily between employers according to demand. The programs also act as safeguards, preventing foreign workers from being employed under unacceptable conditions.

The movement of such temporary workers to Canada for harvesting of crops is being closely controlled," Mr. Pottier emphasized.

Immigration regulations

make it mandatory that foreign temporary workers have an employment visa when they arrive at a port of entry, and without this visa they will be returned immediately to their country of origin.

Mr. Pottier said that "farmers knowingly employing foreign workers who are in Canada illegally will be subject to prosecution. Teams of investigators will be visiting farming areas this summer."

No Unemployment At Tiverton

While some areas are faced with unemployment problems, the small village of Tiverton is experiencing an unemployment rate that is practically nil.

With the close of the lobster season in May, the summer fishing season began. Already the sea has yielded a bountiful supply of fish to the trawl fishermen and druggers. As a result Small Brothers ground fish plant and the Pirates Cove Fisheries herring plant have been operating steadily from 7 o'clock a.m. until 8-10 p.m. Consequently, this has provided work for available school students, housewives, men in the area as well as several from the mainland.

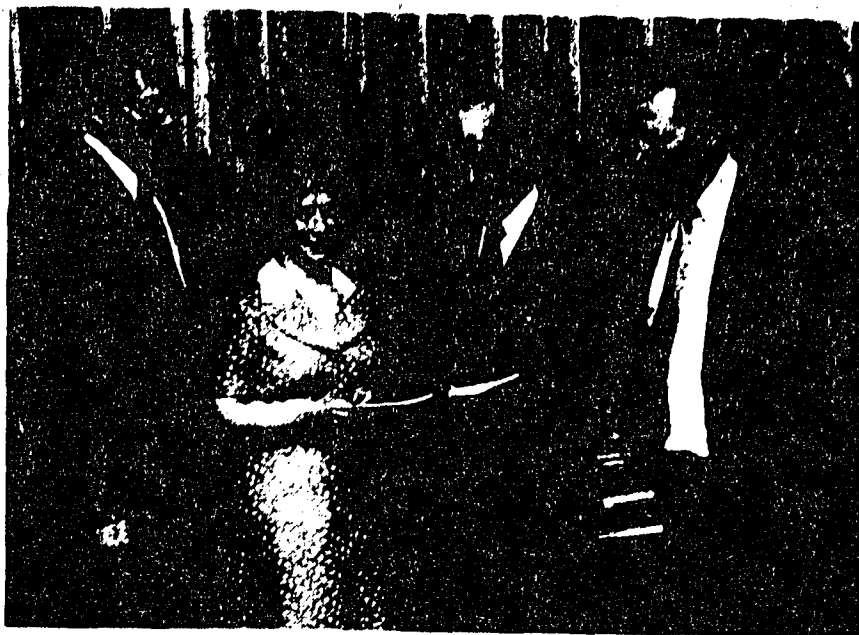
Rev. Donald Trivett Resigns

Movie Review

THE MACKINTOSH MAN

A mackintosh is another name for raincoat, but a Mackintosh man is not a spy in a trenchcoat or raincoat. He is, however, an operative working undercover for a man named Mackintosh (Harry Andrews) of British Intelligence. As played by Paul Newman, he is first seen as a criminal railroaded to prison and then helped to escape. It develops that his imprisonment is merely a device to smash an international ring, headed by respected James Mason, which aids unsavory types in breaking jail. Involved in the proceedings is pretty Dominique Sanda, the model turned actress. A Newman-Foran Co. John Huston production, the suspenser reunites star Newman and director Huston, following their "The Life and Times of Judge Roy Bean." Screenplay by Walter Hill is based on Desmond Bagley's novel "The Freedom Trap" and was shot on location in London, Ireland and on the island of Malta. Film is the type of involved, yet audience-pleasing, spy thrillers of yester-year, part of the enjoyment derived from guessing for which side the characters are really working. Lending in Panavision and Technicolor is slick. STARRING: Paul Newman, Dominique Sanda, James Mason, Harry Andrews, Ian Bannen, Michael Hordern.

THE STORY

In London, Paul Newman is briefed on the advantages of sending diamonds through the mail, by importer Harry Andrews, who then instructs him on the further advantages of robbing same. drives an old Citroën; he's the intellectual of the bunch.

— Big John Milner (PAUL LE MAT) roars to a stop in a '32 custom Ford duce coupe. He's 22, the local drag champion, something of a ladies' man, and the envy of the others.

As we follow these four characters and their girl friends (CINDY WILLIAMS, MACKENZIE PHILLIPS and CANDY CLARK), the passing chrome-flashing cars become a dance to the music of Wolfman Jack's broadcast, and cruising, a vehicle of fate which causes relationships to shift, form and separate by chance.

THE STING

Three of the top talents that previously collaborated on the classic "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" (1969) are reunited to make the b. o. hum again. Stars Paul Newman and Robert Redford and director George Roy Hill have given a new look to an old con game in an original screenplay by David S. Ward. Film cashes in on the nostalgia craze by being set in 1936. This isn't overdone, the costumes and backgrounds being authentic looking without resorting to drowning out the soundtrack with Thirties tunes. The old Universal trademark of the mid-30's, in b & w, provides a good mood-setting opening. The story is divided into six segments and concerns the two stars' efforts in swindling racketeer Robert Shaw out of a small fortune. Newman's role is actually secondary to that of Redford, who is constantly being beaten up, shot at and pursued. It's the kind of film an audience really responds to: the plot has two major twists, the climatic one being so neatly done that an invited perview crowd bursts into spontaneous applause. Few movies today can boast of such ingredients. Tony Bill and Michael and Julia Phillips produced the Richard D. Zanuck-David Brown presentation, in Technicolor. In all, it's one of the year's funniest.

SOUNDER

The children's films of producer Robert B. Radnitz have won innumerable prizes and his latest, following close on the heels of NGP's "The Little Ark," should reap more awards and critical acclaim. The film is based on the award-winning novel by William H. Armstrong and tells of a poor black sharecropper and his family in the South during the Depression. Although the title refers to the family's hunting dog, the screenplay by the noted Lonne Elder III concentrates on young Kevin Hooks, eldest son of Paul Winfield and Cicely Tyson. "Sounder" is warm and human, but its acceptance solely as a children's film might take an extra bit of selling. Really young patrons may not appreciate the quietly effective story, while more mature adolescents and particularly adults should find the Radnitz-Mattel production an engrossing and enriching film. Director Martin Ritt has received the full cooperation of his cast, with fine performances from the black actors, especially young Hooks. Only Carmen Mathews escapes stereotype as a sympathetic widow. John Alonzo filmed the story in rich De Luxe Color and Panavision in the East Feliciana and St. Helena

Parishes of Louisiana. To Mahal, featured, did the music. STARRING: Kevin Hooks, Paul Winfield, Cicely Tyson, Paul Mahal, James Best, Carmen Mathews, Janet MacLachlan.

THE STORY
In the Depression-torn Deep South, black sharecropper Paul Winfield struggles to feed his family. When he's forced to steal food, he's arrested. Hunting dog Sounder is wounded by a deputy and eldest son Kevin Hooks determines to visit his father. When Winfield is sentenced to a year at hard labor, Sheriff James Best refuses to reveal where he's been sent. Sounder returns to the family just before widow Carmen Mathews learns Winfield's whereabouts. Kevin bids goodbye to his mother Cicely Tyson and younger sister and brother Yvonne Jarrell as Eric Hooks and sets out to fix the prison camp. Unsuccessful, the boy is taken in by teacher Janet MacLachlan when she happens by her all-black class. He returns home and shortly thereafter Winfield is released because of an injury suffered in an accident. Although MacLachlan realizes Kevin's potential and wants him to study with her, the boy insists on staying with his family. Winfield has to persuade his son that he must better himself for everyone's sake.
