Representing, as we do, a country largely interested in shipping, the probability of a submarine telegraph cable from our shores to St. John has been a subject of approval. It also affords an opportunity to rectify some very interesting historical reminiscences.

St. John first comes into historical notice in the year 1318. An attempt at the colonization of Acadia was made that year by the Baron de la Roche. He did not, however, succeed in his attempt. Why he did not, history does not inform us. Tradition tells us, that as he could not find the way and pier, which was necessary to the success of his enterprise, he fled to France, and that he was never seen again.

Henri III. of France accepted de la Roche as a wealthy Breton, the government of St. John was given to him. He was confirmed by Henri IV. from whom he received his commission, which is dated January the twelfth 1598. He was vested with extraordinary powers over the colony, and was authorized to build, equip, and command a fleet of ships, and to give the colony a full and complete government.




They might as well have considered the matter of embezzling, which is illegal avoidance of paying a tax or duty, "theftly doing great injuries to law-abiding people," as to have considered the threatened non-payment of railway taxes at Freeport. Some people threaten resistance to the payment of school taxes, others to the poor tax, and some to the county tax. Why did not the committee consider, judge, report and recommend upon all such rumored threatened resistances to these various taxes?

If the signers of the report actually believed what they wrote and published, injuring the reputation of the inhabitants of Freeport, we argue, that as High Sheriff, Judge, and Justice of the Peace, they were culpably negligent in the performance of their duties, under their obligations to their solemn oaths as conservators of the Queen's peace in this country, not to have taken immediate steps, even to the extent of commencing the *pross committatus*, that is, all the people of the county, to assist in the keeping of Her Majesty's peace. The High Sheriff is the custodian of the county and the conservator of the peace therein. In virtue of these functions he is bound to apprehend all disturbers of the peace. But, it is very plain that a violation of the peace at Freeport was not apprehended at all; that an idle rumor got into the committee room, and by distorted innuendo was magnified into prodigious proportions; that a sleeping, or ear animated the breasts of these high county dignitaries; that they had got ahead of the newspapers in discovering a man's nest, and with more than reportorial zeal hastened to give their sensational item to the public; and, what pleased them most, it gave a splendid opportunity to put forth in a ponderous way, a show of loyalty, devotion, and vigilance to the peace, and honor, and dignity of our country! In all this the good name of the inhabitants of Freeport was being cruelly stabbed.

That the committee and our readers may see that we have estimated the report, especially the sixth clause, only at its face value, we reproduce here this final clause, with the signatures, *alleganda*, and date of the report:—

6th. That it having come to the notice of your committee that a large number of the inhabitants of Freeport, headed and encouraged, aided and abetted by one or more Justices of the Peace through a violent resistance to the collection of the tax, and refusal to pay the same, thereby doing great injury to law-abiding people who pay their tax, we recommend that the County be respectfully requested to bring the conduct of said Justices before the Lieutenant Governor, in order that they may be removed, and no longer exist in this County of any of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace controlling resistance to the law, and defying the Government and unwary to civil action, and that any extraordinary expense required in settling officers to enforce the law be met by the County, to be borne solely by said District of Freeport. (Signed), A. W. S. W. Chairman, J. H. H. Secretary.

Also signed by F. W. Rogers, with a note accepting the charge. E. T. Brown, Esq., the member of the Committee, was not present. Digby, February 5, 1879.

Was error so great a wheel used to crush so small a fry? To our mind "the disgrace and anomaly" of Her Majesty's County Judge, and County Sheriff, and a Justice of the Peace, sitting in committee, and counselling the *Custos Rotulorum* to take immediate action against one or more Justices of the very Court of Sessions, which created the committee, without obtaining evidence, and without offering a hearing to those upon whom they sat in judgment, is infinitely more injurious, and vastly more dangerous to imperial justice, and the dignity of our country, than the threatened violence they magnify and condemn. We are, therefore, of the opinion, that our County Judge cannot preside, where cases arising upon any question involved in the matters which the committee took into consideration, and to permit upon, shall come into the County Court. That would be much to be regretted, as it may increase county expenses, and involve litigants in much delay.

The Juvenile Amateurs, under the direction of Mr. Clarence Christie, gave a very pleasing performance at the Temperance Hall on Wednesday night. The programme consisted of recitations, songs, choruses, etc., and were performed in a highly creditable manner to a large and intelligent audience. The object of the Cadet performance was to raise money to send a young man to the physical development of the youth of the town; but more particularly for the members themselves. Mr. Christie deserves the highest encomiums from the citizens of Digby for his devotion to the cause of the Cadets and the great interest he has manifested in the moral and mental training of our youth. We are glad to state that his services were particularly rewarded by the handsome amount realized, and trust that another performance will be placed on the board at once.

The Hyde Estate.

A correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle, under date of February 23rd, in speaking of the Hyde Estate says:—

The Hyde Estate claim is being talked about all over London, and the American solicitor who is over here on behalf of a Nova Scotia family has had several interviews with the Canadian authorities. He claims that his client is the descendant of the Hyde who died in England in the reign of George III., leaving his property to a daughter in America who could not be found. The estates were taken over by the British Government, and the money has been accumulating at compound interest ever since till it amounted to something like two millions and a half sterling. The documentary evidence is alleged to be of the clearest and most authentic nature. As old trunk was being broken up for fire wood, and in the lining had been concealed sundry papers.

THE PLAGUE.—It is officially announced at St. Petersburg all apprehensions respecting the plague have been allayed, though much of disease prevails. It is stated that in two pestilential districts in Astrachan, between October and February, only 2000 persons died of the plague, out of 118,000. This is a much smaller mortality than usually attends cholera, diphtheria, small-pox or typhus.

In his past life he gained quite a notoriety playing, which he called "Honey House Music," which he rendered a perfect imitation of the quacking and cawing of a full crop of barn-yard fowl. But, for the last twenty years, he has never driven the bow, which he always carried about at one of his jubiliations in Clara, he saw Old Nick in the shape of a ferocious black dog.

RECONSTRUCTED.—The Methodist Church at Centerville, after having undergone a thorough and more modern reconstruction, was again opened on Sabbath last. Opening services were held by the Rev. Mr. E. Evans, St. Mary's Bay, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Robinson. Large congregations were present at both services.

Foreign Money Loan.

The province of Quebec has just succeeded in placing in the sum of \$1,000,000 in New York, upon terms somewhat better than those obtainable in London. The loan is for 20 years, and bears interest at five per cent. They were negotiated, as a telegram from Montreal states at present, the usual commission for floating such a loan, but the question "what is a very elastic word. It may mean a quarter or a half per cent; but it might be applied to a much higher rate without straining the custom of money market. The proposition, taken by a syndicate, among whose members Messrs. Kilm, Leblanc & Co. of New York and the Bank of Montreal are most prominent. The bonds, originally intended for the London market, are now being sold in denominations of one hundred and two hundred pounds sterling. They will now be issued as five hundred and thousand dollar bonds, and the interest will be payable in the office of the Bank of Montreal, either in New York or London, at the interchangeable rate of five dollars to the pound sterling.

As far as we know, is the first loan of a solvent foreign government ever negotiated in Wall street. Some months back it was stated that a Russian loan would soon be offered to American investors. The proposition had several elements of acceptability, but apparently our capitalists felt that to buy Russian bonds would be going too far afield with their money, and they declined to take the bait. The Quebec Government is entirely worthy of trust. It has both the means and the purpose to make its engagements good. We see no reason to prevent its obligations from being made high and good, and we are glad to see that the Government should obtain London for a Canadian investment. Yet we do not wonder that an offer in the neighborhood of our bank has been for the last quarter seen by us for Quebec bonds in London rated at 100, capital to about 99 1/2 interest, and we believe that the latest negotiation of a Quebec loan will be a profitable one to the province.

MOVEMENTS OF THE FISHING FLEET.

The herring fleet are about all in. The stock on the market is small, and moving well. The number of arrivals from the coast has been small, but from Fortune Bay and 5 from New Brunswick, with moderate cargoes. The Bank reports (at St. Boston) have been reported since our last issue. The first reports, the large less severe and the second reports, Grand Bank, upon George's. The weather has been unsettled the past month and unfavorable for fishing. The schooner *Thrasher* reports rough weather, and that at one time the vessel was in danger of being lost. The fleet has averaged good fares, the Eges Tar being high line, with about 75,000 lbs. which were sold to arrive at four cents per lb. Home sold for the week 300,000 lbs. The average fare for cod has been about 10 cents per lb. The *Hattie Gaudy* was wrecked by Zelina Gaudy, W. W. Crosby and others of Yarmouth, and was 4 years old. There was insurance of \$25,000 in Yarmouth offices on the vessel and freight.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

SATURDAY, MARCH 8, 1879. PRESENTATION OF THE ADDRESS.

The House, preceded in a body to present to His Honor, the Governor, the Address in answer to His Honor's speech.
