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Funny Things About Crops and Such Like.

It is estimated that over 10 per cent. of the potato crop of southwestern Michigan was lost in the ground by frost. The loss was not due to the frost, but rather than stand the cold of feeding horses through the winter, farmers in sections of the north have killed and then disposed of the carcasses to feeding factories.

As a result of continued wet weather throughout the state of Nebraska, the corn crop is estimated to be a failure. The market price for corn is only 9 cents a bushel, and it is expected to fall further.

Scott, twenty-five farmers of Essex County, Ont., have received registered letters containing checks for hog slaughter. The checks are for the amount of \$1.00 each, and are payable to the order of the Department of Agriculture.

The wheat crop of New South Wales is estimated at 1,200,000 bushels below the colony's requirements.

Veterinary Inspector McEachern says the reports of losses among stock are exaggerated. He says that the cattle and sheep are doing well, and that the loss of food on the ranges is not so great as reported.
