Digby, July 7, 1899.

The first and fourth of July are two days of the greatest importance to the Anglo-Saxon race who dominate the North American Continent. The union in both cases, was the natural result of that energy and expansive force which exists wherever they are gathered in large numbers. Thirty-two years ago the proclamation was made, which united the four provinces into the Dominion of Canada. By successive steps the other provinces came into the union, until only the province of New Brunswick remained isolated without. Any change which is proposed in the political condition of a people is sure to call forth a determined opposition, no matter how great an advantage it can be shown to result finally. This was the case when these provinces were considered, and there are yet those who look back with regret to the times which preceded confederation. The British North American Act, which is really the Canadian Constitution, is something of which we are justly proud. It was the joint product of our able statesmen and admirably adapted to the circumstances and needs of the country. Under its provisions and within its limits we have become a nation. Our great success has led to the initiation of similar movements elsewhere, and our act of confederation is the model on which others are based. Prior to 1867, we were only a bunch of isolated provinces with different laws, hostile tariffs and little intercommunication, until only our common loyalty and allegiance to the British crown. Our trade and business relations were all with the United States. We sent all our raw products for manufacture and money to New England. Everything from a cloth to a rocking stool came from there. Cheese, hams, lard, all our groceries and even apples, were imported from the United States, and the land who had been reeking in it went there in search of employment and a better life. The old motto, "Confederation changed a great deal of this, although the emigration continued. We could not find employment for all our people. The energetic, restless, self-reliant nature of our people prompted them to seek in the United States the employment they could not obtain at home. They were discouraged by the barrenness and bareness of life on a farm, they were glad to exchange it for the excitement and variety which awaited them across the water. The emigration to the United States had been a decided success. It has made us homogeneous, given us a greatly increased influence and added immensely to our material prosperity. We have doubled our imports and trebled our exports. By successive additions, all the British possessions on the main continent of North America have been added to the Dominion, and it is probably only a matter of time when we shall include Newfoundland and the Antilles. The Dominion of Canada is a vast maritime province, and the Canadian Pacific besides opening up fertile prairies and boundless lands, gave us connection with the Pacific. The Canadian Pacific railway must ever remain a monument to the far-sighted statesmanship and faith in our country of those who conceived it and who carried it to completion. Its construction was absolutely necessary. Without it we could never have united the East with the West, the resources of the country could never have been developed, no emigration maintained. Under capable and efficient management it has opened up trade with the Orient and had successfully for the traffic of a continent. If every man has a right to his liberty and the pursuit of happiness, then no where on this earth are these conditions more fully met. We are an influential factor in the greatest of empires, and with greater than Roman pride we can say, "I am a British citizen." As yet we have contributed nothing towards the expenses of that army and navy which protect our shores and guarantee our commerce. We enjoy all the advantages of British connection without paying anything for it. This is not at all to our credit, we cannot but so it is. We have a pure administration of justice in which all have confidence, a rigorous but kindly climate and facilities for obtaining a comfortable livelihood. Other things which go to make up the comfort or discomfort of living, are what we elect to make them.

What has the future in store for us? If any political change takes place it will be along the lines of closer connection and more intimate union with the mother country. We will never be annexed to the United States. After years go by we become more firmly united to the parent stock. Imperial federation is not a dream, but a scheme which is practically attainable, and with diversified interests and greatly varied conditions, but patience and careful statesmanship can bring it about and when it does become a fact it will be a confederation with young nations having infinite possibilities and a great future before them. If the United States are so rich in all the elements necessary to prosperity, happiness, and if we do not enjoy both, can we thank no one but ourselves for the result.

How readily we become accustomed to the comforts and conveniences which multiply so rapidly. Some change of this kind comes into our daily lives making living easier and pleasant, and in a short time we wonder how we ever got along without it. Tennyson was thinking of this when he said: "Better fifty years of such than a few of such a better life." Wonderful things have happened since Queen Victoria came to the throne. The various ways in which steam power is made available, the manifold uses to which electricity is applied, the ease, comfort and speed of ocean travel, the development and improvement of the railway systems and the speedy and frequent conveyance of mails. The free school system and consequent general diffusion of education, are all included in the progress made during her reign. Let a generation or two more people thought they were getting along very well. If they were a month in crossing the Atlantic, or paid one shilling and sixpence postage on a letter, they knew it was nothing unusual and accepted it without much grumbling. It took two days to go from Digby to Halifax, less than fifty years ago. During the last century, when the "Trent Affair," as it was called, threatened to bring on war between the two countries; British soldiers in order to reach Quebec, had to make a long and toilsome journey, walking in winter, every foot of the way. During the eighteenth century, men moved along in pretty much the same old way, but had done in the preceding hundred years. The way in which they travelled, communicated with each other and lived generally, differed from that of the present. We would need to go very far back in imagination to those days, if we would understand what it was to be without the comforts and conveniences of the present. There was no electricity and ventilation were of crude kind, and none of that progress had been made in sanitary reform which is now so essential to the preservation of health. The many methods now used for relieving pain were unknown. If a man's leg or arm had to be amputated, he was strapped to a table, left in the agonies of the moment, his struggles could interfere with the success of the operation. The discovery of the last ten years alone, in the realm of medicine and surgery, have saved many thousands of lives. Perhaps the most unhappy of all who then toiled for an honest livelihood were the men, women and children who worked in the mines and factories of Great Britain and the continent. They were far worse off than the agricultural laborer. No light came into their homes, and their burdens were terrible to carry. Then as if in mockery, they were taught that it was their duty to remain in the condition of life where Providence had placed them. As it is for the most part, intended a human being to be little better than a beast of burden, when he might attain to nobler things. Wars were fought for territory, and the wars were consequently more frequent, and also more sanguinary. No companies of uneducated nurses were found to face the terrible sights and smells of military hospitals, and to care with kindly ministrations for the sick and wounded. It is little more than forty years since the Crimean War, and heretofore we started for the front in a grand array of military equipment, and in which Christian women are not found ready to volunteer for similar service. Military enterprises may be said to have had its birth in this country. The wilds of Africa, the dark places of China, and everywhere to the utmost north, the light of the gospel illuminating benighted heathendom. Criminal laws were enacted and carried out without regard to mercy a century ago, and the death penalty was executed and men were hung, for what are now looked upon as minor offences. "Whether we are, on the whole better or worse than we were in our great-grandfather's time, it is not for us to hazard an opinion, but we do know that the conditions under which we live are immeasurably better, and that it should be easier for us to live better lives than it was then. The age we live in, is the "golden age," and one who is fifty, is really a baby of life, as it was in Tennyson's "Cathay."
