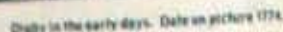

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RAILWAY ACCIDENT

Thirty-Eight Dead and Sixty Injured in Railway Horror.

KNOWLEDGE FLOODED THROUGH SUNDAY

SUBURBAN TRAIN WITH 300 PEOPLE BOARDING, LEAVING A TRAIL OF DEAD AND DYING A MILE LONG—CAUSE OF THE DISASTER UNKNOWN.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—An appalling disaster occurred tonight at the junction of the Washington and Annapolis roads at Terracotta, about three miles from this city, in which about thirty persons were killed and over sixty injured, some of them so seriously that they will die. The accident was caused by the collision of train No. 62, due here at 6:25 p. m. from Frederick (Md.), known as the Frederick special. Over 300 passengers were aboard the ill-fated train.

The official report tonight was unable to assign any cause for the collision. As soon as the news of the disaster reached this city, the public mind was flooded with the news of the disaster. 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Earthquake in Jamaica.

Kingston's Dead Now Estimated at Two Thousand

REFUGES—TERRIBLE STORIES OF DISASTER—ONLY A FEW BUILDINGS REMAINING—NOT A HOUSE AT KINGSTON—MANY OF VICTIMS BURIED UP IN CONFLAGRATION.

Kingston, Jan. 24.—[Delayed in transmission.]—The following is a continuation of yesterday's despatch describing the earthquake at Kingston. The awful devastation caused by the earthquake became more apparent as time passed.

At 11:45 a. m. warning the earth began to shake and tremble at 3:30 Monday afternoon. The shock which came from the westward, lasted exactly thirty-three seconds. The whole city like a choppy sea and buildings reeled and fell. Eastward a dense cloud of dust rose and enveloped Kingston in semi-darkness. The shocks were most destructive along the harbor front where entire streets were levelled and crowds of frightened, shrieking people streamed northwards towards the race course, hundreds with bloody bodies and arms and legs streaming with blood. Those who escaped with slight injuries reported that large numbers of persons were buried under the fallen stores and tenements.

As the dust lifted, pillars of smoke arose in Harbor street, near the park church and soon afterwards flames like a choppy sea and buildings reeled and fell. Eastward a dense cloud of dust rose and enveloped Kingston in semi-darkness. The shocks were most destructive along the harbor front where entire streets were levelled and crowds of frightened, shrieking people streamed northwards towards the race course, hundreds with bloody bodies and arms and legs streaming with blood. Those who escaped with slight injuries reported that large numbers of persons were buried under the fallen stores and tenements.

He was well known to all who knew him and was a very genial and obliging neighbor, one who was loved for some time although during his later years he had not been so much as usual and was bothered considerably with rheumatism.

More than 60 years ago he married Miss Ann Dunham, of Barton, who still survives him. Besides his widow he leaves two sons, Mr. C. A. Abbott, and Mr. J. W. Abbott, and a daughter, Mrs. J. W. Abbott, all of whom are in the service of the Canadian government.

A Terrible Accident.

PROMINENT CLEVELAND MEETS HORRIBLE DEATH ON RAILWAY.

Westbrook, Mass., Feb. 21.—The terrible mutilation and dismembered body of Rev. Dr. Everett D. Burr, a prominent Baptist clergyman of New Centre, Mass., was found today lying beside the east bound tracks of the New York Central railroad, about 30 yards west of the Summer street bridge. The body was found by the crew of a Worcester-bound freight train, was a mass of lacerations and contusions. The face was beyond recognition, the skull was fractured, both arms were broken and both arms amputated. Medical Examiner Charles S. Knight examined the body and gave his opinion that death was due to accident. He said that the victim had undoubtedly fallen from a moving train, passing from one car to another, that his clothing had been caught by some portion of a train and the body dragged over the ties for a distance of about 400 feet, and later by the traces of blood on the sleepers.

Papers and a memorandum book found in the clothing about the name of the victim was Rev. Everett D. Burr, 24 Beacon street, Newton, Mass. The memorandum book contained a list of preaching dates and showed that Mr. Burr had spoken at Cleveland, Ohio, last week, and later in New York City.

Rev. Manfred S. Schub, pastor of the First Baptist church of Westbrook, a personal friend of the dead man, identified the body and left in the car for Newton Centre to notify Mr. Burr's family.

Everett D. Burr was one of the best known clergymen in New England, his nomination in Massachusetts. He was alumnus of Brown University at Providence, R. I., and of the Theological Seminary of Pennsylvania. For several years he was pastor of the Congregational Baptist church in Boston. He was 53 years old, and is survived by a wife and four children.

The Late Timothy Titus.

A SHORT SKETCH OF DIGBY'S OLDEST RESIDENT WHOSE FUNERAL SERVICE APPEARED IN OUR LAST ISSUE.

In referring to the death of our late townsman, Timothy Titus, Esq., it was impossible at the time to give the information we desired. We are therefore in this issue giving a short sketch of the deceased accompanied by a cut of the aged gentleman.

Mr. Titus was born in Watford, Digby Neck, May 10th, 1810, and had therefore nearly reached the advanced age of 88 years. In 1830 he married Catherine, daughter of the late James Boop, of Hillsboro, who survives him, having enjoyed sixty-one years of wedded life.

A few years after marriage Mr. and Mrs. Titus moved to Rosaway, where for upwards of ten years he carried on a successful business.

Wishing to branch out in a larger field of business they moved to Digby where he soon became one of Digby's leading general merchants. His business was not only a vessel owner but could also sell them and, on several occasions, took charge for short voyages.

The late Mr. Titus was a pioneer in Digby's real estate business. He was the first to carry on a business of a general merchant and devoted his time to meat and provisions only.

Twenty years ago he formed a partnership with his son Stanley W. Titus, under the firm name of T. Titus & Son, this firm having carried on meat and provision business up to the present time.

About eight years ago the father retired from business his son continuing under the name of Stanley W. Titus.

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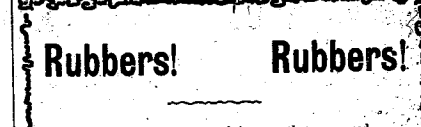
