The first wireless telegraph coastal run in the District was the one between Dighton and New Bedford. The equipment was installed and was seen first in use on the night of December 22, 1914. The new light house on the island was put into service on January 15, 1915. The lighthouse was built by the Federal Government and stood on the island of Dighton.

Loss of the schooner "W. Coombs" is a tragedy. The schooner, of Jamaica, was wrecked on the ship struck the rocks in Cuba Bay some 10 miles from the shore, and was carrying a cargo of iron. All the crew were rescued, but the vessel was shipped. The schooner was estimated at \$10,000.

**Peace in sight in Morocco.**  
SITUATION HAS IMPROVED AND FRANCE HOPES THAT TRUCEMEN WILL ACCEPT TERMS

PARIS, Oct. 24.—The French Government is greatly encouraged by the improvement in the Moroccan situation and strong hope is entertained that the rebellious tribes, with whom the delegates who conferred with General Druce on Sunday are now consulting, will agree to the peace terms which include—

First—The punishment of the authors of the Casablanca massacres and the ringleaders of the movement.

Second—An agreement that no tribesmen shall enter with arms within a radius of 12 kilometres of the city.

Third—The acceptance in principle of the payment of a war contribution, the amount of which will be fixed hereafter by negotiations between the Moroccan Government and France and Spain.

Fourth—The surrender of hostages to insure the fulfilment of these conditions.

It is pointed out that the war contribution has no relation to the indemnities to be exacted from the Moroccans for the loss of life and property, which will be a matter for future adjustment.

It is further arranged on the above terms no further landings of troops will be made and pending the result of the negotiations the orders for the embarkments and forwarding of reinforcements have been rescinded.

The delegates of the Moroccan tribes expected to give the final response of the tribesmen Thursday.

The ultimate outcome of the struggle between the rival Sultans of Morocco is a matter with which the French Government is not concerned, the mandate of France and Spain being limited to the restoration of order and security at the Moroccan ports.

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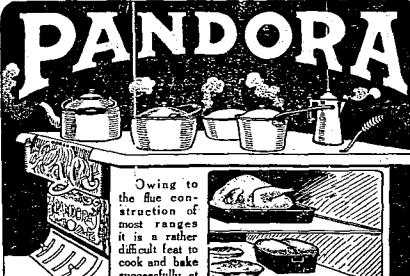
