

## Welcome to the Digital DIGBY COURIER 1877-1978

### 100th Birthday

The hundredth anniversary of the Digby Weekly Courier has brought to mind some fond memories as recounted in the following historical chapter of the paper. For first, I want to congratulate the current editor of the Courier, Mrs. J.M. (Edith) Wallis, for a job well done over the years and still being well done, good service rendered with great fortitude.

According to my recollection, I have at hand, the Digby Courier, in one hundred years of publication, was controlled under the same family management for 42 years, 1836 to 1978, under the control of Wallis Print Limited. The late J.J. Wallis became editor of the Courier in the second time, in 1929, and at the latter time of the second time, in 1929, and at which he had been running for some time previously and which became Wallis Print Limited sometime between 1929 and 1931.

I well remember the last year of the twelfth when I worked in the office with the husband and father of the Digby Courier. Sometime in 1929 or early 1930, the late J.M. Wallis (Mac), son of J.J., engaged me to work every day after school hours, Saturdays, and for some months after for the office of work was in the building of the present Digby town hall on First Avenue. J.J. Wallis then worked occasionally at the print shop but mostly across the street at the Courier office which was then located on land in the general area where The Royal Bank of Canada is now.

Wallis Job Print operated in this building of four consisting of J.J. Wallis, J.M. Wallis, Miss Elva Haynes, who later became Mrs. George Kicop, and myself. I was in the staff in early 1929.

Mac's job was to run the staff in the left upstairs. J.J. occasionally printing plant but mostly at the Courier office. "Mac" worked nearly full-time at all the different jobs at the Job Print, and I worked at various duties most of the time being spent at operating printing presses.

We worked ten-hour days, six days a week. J.J. and "Mac" sometimes worked overtime. I worked only the regular hours being paid a weekly wage which was comparatively good for those times, and my lack of experience. I received five or five dollars a week for working after school hours to six o'clock and on Saturday all day, and nine dollars a week for half weeks after finishing school. A two or three dollar a week raise was offered to me in the fall of 1929 for me to stay on at printing, but I had made up my mind to enter a branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, starting salary of \$200. The bank salary started out about the same per hour as for the printing plant those days, and experience however short, were helpful and appreciated to me.

J.J. was very social in his occasional trip to the print and did consider the printing all in good fun.

"Mac" was a witty person who moved in a good way and made me and then for me reason or mother. Elva must always had good answers to all the kidding she was called upon to take, and she usually held her own in a quiet sort of way, always being setting type. We four all got along very well together. However, I do remember that some days all seem long and weary because of the transitory of some repetitious jobs.

In spite of the great demand for printing those last happy days of the twelfth, business generally being brisk, it looked in his that people had to work long and hard to make any decent profit. There was

however, trials and finger ends were used and I was sent back to work.

New and then a printing job had to be set in the printing plant which required a new kind of printers ink which smelled very bad some days. I always dreaded it when "Mac" would say that it was the largest press, it was at the factory as always spent an outside day in lower conditions on the construction.

One of the jobs I had to do, with the paper and printers devil on the staff, was to set a new job at the printing plant. I decided to set the four that apparently hadn't been checked in some considerable time.

"J.J." came along and said, "how are you getting on Vince?" I assured him that I thought I was beginning to see the four. "J.J." laughed very heartily, he thought the remark pretty good and amusing.

Sometimes the gasoline engine or a piece of machinery would refuse to work, and the "Mac" the fix it man had patiently worked for a certain length of time to get it going again, without results. "Mac" would then stand back and cross out dramatically, then he would immediately start working. "Mac" would say, "all it needed was a bit of oiling."

On other occasions when some paper refused duty for the end, wanted to be broken, "Mac" would say, "use a little oil" and sure enough after that is all it took. How often since, have I heard of the value of that remark and the actual need of oil in many life situations, applied at the right time, right place and, in the right way.

Other things that sort of stick in my memory and come to mind now and then are, like the time I told "Mac" of four teenage boys who in the spring month of 1928 got together just before dark one evening and decided to utilize the newly built outdoor Fern Hotel swimming pool which had just been filled with water. Clothes were taken off near the road just out of the pool, nobody else seemed to be around except the four boys, no thought or time for bathing suits up to the pool they went. They stood on the edge of the pool and looked at the chilly water, one soon jumped in. The rest quickly followed and across the pool they swam. "Mac" listened to the story and hardly said anything, but the next "Digby Courier" had a good story on the episode. The heading of the story went something like, "Four Boy Scouts Officially Open Pines Hotel Swimming Pool." Who were the four? Many years later they are known as: the late Dr. Carl H. Anderson, veteran of two wars, second world and Korea; now prominent druggist, for many years in Digby; Clayton D. Snow, Digby wholesale haberdashery merchant; and myself.

As a young teenager I used to like doing some writing about different events interesting to myself and mostly for myself. One day "Mac" said to me how about writing your version of the story told about "The Marooning of Jerome". I did it and read at least two somewhat different versions about the man who was found marooned on a beach in northern point on the French Shore of St. Mary's Bay, Digby County. When I read this man's tale, and then read and his legs quite freshly amputated, were surgically well dressed and bound. He was presumably left by some vessel before dawn one morning, all for some mysterious reason.

"Jerome" appeared to have been a man of some considerable social standing and, possibly, of some considerable wealth. However the way the man could or would ever say after being found and cared for by some family in the French shore was, something that sounded like the story of a hero. He either would not, or would not, write anything about who he was or why he was left there. Well, it was, and is, one of Digby County's best kept secrets, and, different ideas have been written over the years concerning this man. However, the name of "Mac" was, I felt no urge to write anything about different about this man. The story seemed to have been very well explained in the story of many people, and he was a sort of a hero and many people who liked ways he was.

### Digby 172 Years Ago

Compiled by David Lambert

From the files of the Courier of January 22, 1881, the following account has been compiled concerning Digby in 1709.

Among a number of old newspapers kindly sent to me by friends is a copy of the first issue of the Digby Courier, dated January 22, 1881. The issue contains a number of interesting items, and among other advertisements contained in the issue before us is one describing the town and township of Digby, and offering for sale certain lots in the town. In this area we are told the township of Digby extends from the Gulf of Annapolis westward to the township of the province of Nova Scotia, and contains about 124,000 acres. The town plot is thus described:

"The Town Plot is situated at the east of the township just within the entrance to Annapolis Basin, and twenty miles from Annapolis Town, and six miles across. It is from the land of W. Mary's estate. This land was then the water's edge, partly as land ground, and partly as the locality of a modern hill, dry and pleasant, and having with an eastern aspect, a view of the Annapolis Basin and its cultivated shores for twenty miles in where it terminates with the Fort and River's mouth of that name. It was owned by Loyola, from New York in 1702, the most of whom went early to farm, or, moving to other countries, left the whole

free trade with the U.S.A., especially with the New England States. The question was then debated by some Digby High School students one of which was J.J.'s daughter, Florence (now Mrs. Melvin G. There was a taste of trying to sell job printing outside the plant. Work was a little slack one early fall day and so "Mac" said to me, "how about trying your hand at taking orders for printed personalized Christmas cards?" I tried to make several calls around town, spent most of the time at one particular

### Procter End Of Travelling In St. Mary's Bay

The Procter End of Travelling in St. Mary's Bay was ended on Tuesday afternoon.

Some twenty-three trawlers are presently operating in the St. Mary's Bay, as well as five haddock druggers. The trawlers are not to quite the damage the larger druggers do to the fishery, they are not so numerous.

It is about the haddock druggers the trawlers have the greatest complaint. These boats, they say, are completely destroying the fishing grounds in the bay. They bring in up to 15,000 pounds of fish every day for each boat and hundreds of thousands of small fish are thrown overboard dead to pollute the waters of the bay.

The haddock druggers' accounts to the trawlers fishermen. The small boats about the bay and when they find they have struck a good school immediately begin to drag the area, catching most of the fish and driving the school away.

Not only do the druggers destroy thousands of small fish and leave their dead bodies to pollute the feeding grounds, they also often throw overboard thousands of pounds of larger fish when they discover market changes have made them unsaleable. The dragging operations carried out by these boats also so tear up and destroy the bottom that feeding or spawning is no longer possible.

One trawler, fisherman, said here Friday night that St. Mary's Bay has always been considered a spawning ground for fish, but if the operations of the druggers are allowed to continue there will soon be no fish at all there.

More than one hundred trawlers are presently operating in the bay, such as Westport, Freeport, Tiverton, Little River, Sandy Cove and others. St. Mary's Bay is dependent upon the trawling in the bay for their livelihood and they claim there will no longer be any opportunity for them to make a living if the druggers continue. This year a number of the trawling fishermen have decided not to fit out their boats as catches are so small and have turned to odd jobs, road work or are seeking work away from the area in order to earn a living.

One fisherman put it very plainly here Friday night when he claimed that, unless the druggers are prohibited from fishing in St. Mary's Bay, the whole of Digby County would become a ghost area with vacant houses and rotting wharves left by those who had to take their families and seek a living elsewhere.

They claim that the druggers are not only destroying the fishing grounds but also the bottom of the bay, making it impossible for fish to spawn.

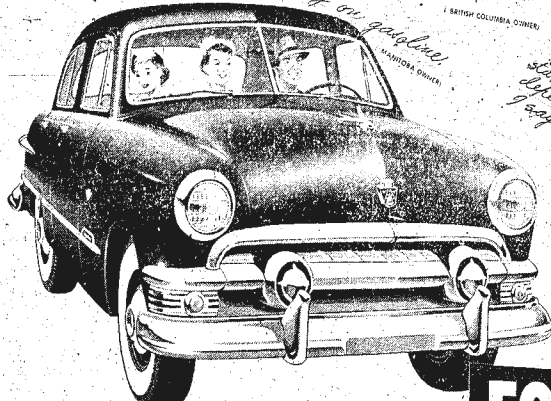

### CANADA THISTLE WAS ONCE VALUABLE GARDEN PLANT

Canada thistle, one of the country's most serious weeds, was once considered a valuable garden vegetable. Introduced in Canada by the early French missionaries, this plant was cultivated by the pioneers and part of it used as a form of yeast in bread baking, states the C.I.L. Agricultural News.

From row planting in early-day gardens, it soon spread into hay meadows and became a general nuisance in cultivated crops. Today it is being successfully controlled by the use of the selective hormone weedkiller, 2,4-D.

### NUMBER FROM GOLDENROD

The common goldenrod, which grows in the fields and along roadsides, is a source of rubber.

Reporting on tests conducted in the southern regional research laboratory of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, C.I.L. Agricultural News says that scientists produced about 600 pounds of rubber from goldenrod and specially-built plant. The rubber gave good service in such manufactured goods as hot water bottles, shoe heels and bicycle tires.

### SCHOOLS URGED TO TEACH ALCOHOL FACTS

Up-to-date facts about the damaging effects of alcohol should be given by the schools as a protection to the young and the school authorities should themselves set an example in accordance with their teaching.

Dr. Joseph Thinnann pointed out these conclusions from his experience in handling thousands of inebriates at the Washington Hospital in Berlin, the oldest institution for alcohol addicts in the country. Dr. Thinnann is its medical director.

"Facts and figures are worthless if they do not involve young people," he says. "These are natural experiences, are understandable only if we explain it. It is essential that we teach temperance, mental cultivation, and the use of alcohol or other narcotics."

Youth should be given adequate information about the use of alcoholic beverages at an age when it is still possible to make the choice about drinking or not drinking. Interpretation of the facts should be brought up to date and put on a scientific basis, changing the modern findings.

### The Christian Science Monitor

quotes Dr. Thinnann as saying that the schools must accept the responsibility for protecting youth.

"It will be necessary for us to understand that youth want to have copy grown-ups. We cannot make the youth believe in and follow our explanations and theoretical evaluations as long as we do not apply them to our own lives."

"Finally" public opinion should consider all the glamour of social drinking out of moving pictures, stage plays, novels, magazines, and ads.

If alcoholism is a disease, as distillers have declared it to be, on authority of their scientific researchers, then they must admit that the stuff they manufacture is detrimental to health, as the use of it produces disease, therefore the distiller, by his product, is a detriment to health and a menace to good citizenship, and should be dealt with accordingly. Were a merchant to sell meats or other articles that caused a serious disease or even temporary illness, he would be promptly handled by the health authorities or other proper officials. These poisoners of human beings should be made to pay for the wrecks they cause. — Morgan MESSENGER (Berkeley Springs, W. Va.), 1-34-47.

biggest and richest piece of public ownership in the world, outside Russia. We can't get at the true value of this property if we measure it by the volume of wood that grows there at this hour. We cheat ourselves that way. The real reckoning appears when we look at the forests as a permanent harvest-field, giving manifold crops in endless rotations. This country is undergoing heavy pressure from a wood-hungry world. Canada's paper mills already have to furnish three out of five pages of all newspapers published in the two hemispheres. We're only in the first stage of international demands for our forest products and in a few years the second and third stages will have to take the bulk of the "cheap forest" and put it in the shelves. — Canada's valuable resources were put here for some better purpose than to burn.

The purpose of this National Forest Conservation Week, May 19-26, is to draw attention to the importance of the forest in every single citizen of Canada.

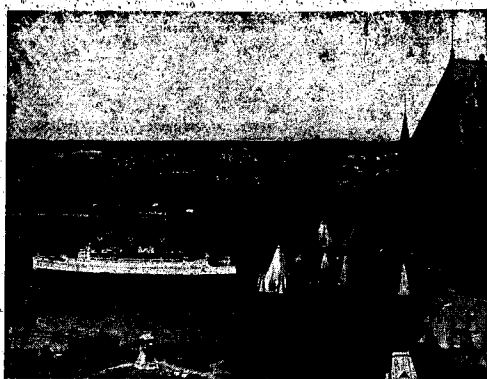

In assessing the situation, it is the opinion that our present difficulties may be attributed to a combination of factors, among which number:

- (1) A serious reduction in number of patient days.
- (2) Substantial wage and any increases.
- (3) Increasing operation attributed to recent price increases.
- (4) Extensive repairs to the facilities-plumbing, heating, etc.
- (5) Failure of patients to pay their bills.
- (6) Collections dropping 61.2% in April.

All the above factors with the possible exception of the item beyond the Board's control.

It has become increasingly apparent that substantial increase in rates coupled with a possible reduction in patient days will not be a very effective in placing the hospital in a sound financial position. Indeed, unless more adequate revenues are immediately forthcoming the hospital will be forced with bankruptcy.



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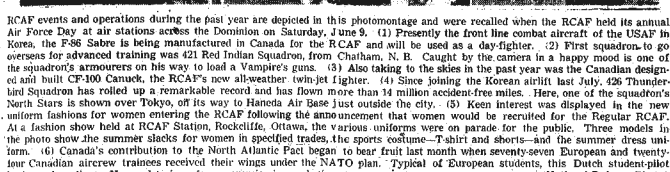

Lt. Col. E. K. Eaton, honorary superintendent of Fort Anne and Port Royal National Historic Parks, died suddenly at his home in Clementsport Saturday morning at the age of 73 years.

Col. Eaton has been Honorary Superintendent of Fort Anne National Historic Park since September, 1933, when he succeeded the late Loftus Norton Fortier.

He was publicly appointed Honorary Superintendent of Port Royal National Historic Park by T. A. Cramer, Minister of Mines and Forestry, on the occasion of

The opening of the Port Royal Habitation in July 4, 1941, was a happy occasion for all.

Col. Truro Eaton was born at Toronto in 1878 and was one of the seven sons of J. K. and Anna King Pithblado Eaton. His father was a civil engineer and a surveyor in railway construction. He was educated at Truro Academy, Normal College, Truro, and the Royal Military College, Kingston.

He joined the Canadian Infantry Service, attached to the Infantry Battalion, which was sent overseas while carrying out wounded men to safety in the Gothic Line in Italy in August, 1941, and whose bravery was commended by the King in 1942. He was transferred four years service overseas in the Third Canadian Division 22nd Army Group, Western Europe.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Eaton.

In 1897 he was appointed to the Royal Canadian Regiment at which he served continuously until his retirement in 1922 due to injuries received while serving in France. During service in the R.C.R. he was appointed interchange officer to the United States Army in the 1st Cavalry Division in 1911 and became the District Major.

After returning to Canada, Col. Alfred attended the Staff College, Fort Rieuhauser, during and in 1914 left with his regiment for Bermuda, then, thence to England, and France where he served as second in command of the 1st Battalion. Officially in command he was transferred to the staff, invaded home to Canada, appointed Brigade Major to the Nova Scotia Regiment, and then to the 1st

Highland brigade, fought from Seattle to Canada and appointed as C. at Windsor in 1918-20, returned to regimental duty and retired in 1922.

Col. Eaton lived several years in Bermuda and later in Windsor, N. S., and has made his home in Annapolis Royal since 1933 with summer home in Clementsport in which he has permanent residence in 1949.

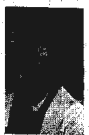

### R.C.A.F. Operating Air Lift

Air Force Day, this year fielded the RCAF's 4th Bombardment Squadron in the largest aircraft show of the world's largest aerial lift of troops and supplies to the Arctic.

Since last July, the Thunderbirds have carried more than 2500 troops to reinforce the United Nations in the Far East. In addition, close to a 1000 tons of vital war supplies including medical blood plasma, ammunition and small arms have been flown across the Pacific for the U.N. forces. Russian planes should the RCAF planes in the air have not been limited to these numerous important efforts.

The four-engine North Stars used by the Canadians have proved themselves even more work horses in the rugged Arctic sky. Starting from McChesney Field, near Tuktoyaktuk, the Canadian planes fly to the Arctic, to Alaska, and back to the Northwest.

Prima in the Arctic is a far more rugged place of work than the tropical Pacific. From the Aleutians, the Thunderbirds head down to Alaska and across to the Yukon. Sometimes when the RCAF aircraft stop at Massey, in Northern Canada, before heading to the Arctic, they return flight for the Arctic.

Return flight for the Arctic is usually through Wake Island, Honolulu, and San Francisco. It is a long flight, but the Canadian and American planes come home the same way. They went out. Overall distance for the round trip is 15,000 miles and the Thunderbird squadron

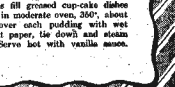

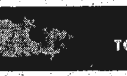

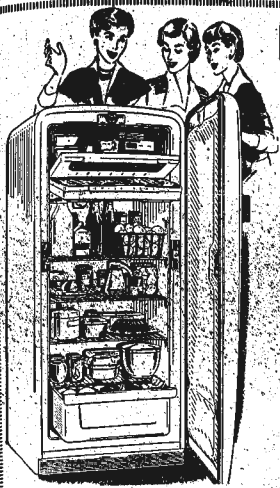
