"I don't know why." Mr. Hawbolt says. "but ticks are spreading very rapidly." He thinks recent warm winters might have

"They have a habit of flourishing in one area for several years, then suddenly dying off for no apparent reason.

He explains the biological difference between the wood tick and the moose tick, which it resembles: "The moose tick sticks to one host, preferably an ailing moose. The wood tick has three hosts and gets around more."

The wood tick hatches on the ground in late summer, winters there, and finds its first host the next May. It eats its fill, falls off and moults. Then it looks for another host until it has lived on three animals. After completing the cycle, the female lays her

eggs and both sexes die. Ticks belong to the spiter fam-lly. The reddish brown male seldom grows a quart finch long. The female is shory blue when empty of blood, and may grow bigger than half an inch. Ridges along their backs are generally mistaken for stripes.

mistaken for stripes. It pays to be choosy about resting spots in the bush. Com-mercial repellents are a help too. But if you're wise, you'll do as the woodsmen do: Go on a tick hunt every night on returning to camp. With luck you won't find more than two or three, and chances are they won't be in very deep. Check Clams For

Plankton Pollution

Seaside holidayers in the Maritimes should be wary before gathering clams along the seashore for a tasty clam chowder, an official of the federal department of fisheries said in Halinax. Commenting that tests are being conducted regularly to deterfor human consumption, the official said that people should heed signs and notices which are posted when an area becomes polluted.

Federal health officials in Ottawa blame a tiny organism in the sea a species of plankton eaten by clams for the recent death of two members of a Montreal family who dined on clams picked from a beach near Rimouski, Quebec.

It was pointed out that the chances of finding poisonous clams are highest in summer on the east coast. The poisonous secretion is described as "one of the very strongest poisons."

They are thin until about Aug-ust and September when the market jumps in full blast. The old story about not eating oyst-drs during months without an "r"-from May to August-has



Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration, Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy, Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces. Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admit-ted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

The Digby Regional High School, Primary and Intermediate Schools will reopen on Friday, September 10, 1954 when all students of school age are expected to be in attendance.

Students attending the Digby Public Schools for the first time, regardless of age, are expected to register prior to the opening day of school. No child will be permitted to register at any time during the school year 1954-55, who has not attained the age of five years on or before the first day of September, 1954. The Supervisor's Office at the Digby Regional High School will be open to receive early registrations from August 30th to September 3rd between the hours of 10:00 to 12:00 A. M. and from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. Students from Regional High School Area or the Town or Digby who wrote the June entrance examinations are also required to comply with early registration regulations.

Any student whose parents reside beyond the limits of the Digby Regional High School Area will be required to pay a tuition fee of \$25.00 to the Secretary of the Digby Municipal School Board prior to registration. Students affected by this regulation should make immediate application for admission to the Regional High School to Mr. F. C. Purdy. Supervisor of Schools, Digby, N. S. 'The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admit-ted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia. BY ORDER OF

SERVICES AVAILA

The first aim of the field work program started by your Department of Trade and Industry in 1953 is to give assistance and information to the man-agement of secondary industries. The standard for admission to the academic or commercial courses of Grade XII will be a pass certificate from the Atlantic Provinces Common Examining Board or a local pass certificate from the Regional High School Promotion Board.

All students must comply with the Department of Public Health regulation regarding vaccination before they may be admit-ted to the Public Schools of Nova Scotia.

Closest But Neglected

Local of municipal government is "closest 45 the people." says The Financial Post, It furnishes our primary protection in police fire and satiliation fonces it provides its with streets, water and sewers. It pooks after much of our education. It furnishes the finest possible training grounds for the country's public servants. And yet in splite of its paramount importance is our daily lives, interest in local government is at a dangerously low ebb in most of Canada and especially in the urban centres where we are most dependent on its

services. The Citizens Research Institute has just completed a survey of the voting turnout in municipal elections in Canada. The results are alarming For all Canada a good deal less than hall those eligible voted for the chief elective office and for some of the larger centres. including Montreal and Torunto only one in three exercised their franchise. That indicates slim general interest indeed in a type of government which in 1953 spent over \$500 millions on current account alone on behalf of the inhabitants.

The School Needs The Home

There has been a remarkable change in the way of thinking about education. The three R's are still an essential part of the child's needs, but they are by no means the whole of it. Education is not only a process by which facts are memorized and knowledge is gained. It is a procedure leading in the direction of the complete development of the individual - physically, morally, spiritually, socially and aesthetically.

A child is seriously handlcapped who does not receive the proper medical attention. Physical defects slow down the mental processes. The best work cannot be expected from one who is not feeling well. Only when the child is in a satisfactory physical condition is he ready to cope with the three R's. It is the responsibility of the school to guide the pupil into the habits of healthy living. A sound body is one of the essential requisites for any development.

What about the moral growth of the child? The school that sends away a student from its walls with a high attainment of marks has failed in its service rendered to that student if he should turn out to be a criminal. It is not enough that he learn what the qualities of a good citizen are, but he must come to possess those qualities. Right attitudes are not common to all children, they must be developed or perhaps caught. A student with a warped outlook, and a hostile and unco-operative attitude in the classroom needs special help. If something is not done to change his point of view he will be a misfit in life even though he masters all the school courses. The aim of the ideal school is to develop the child so that when he leaves school he will not only have a pass certificate, but will have formed proper attitudes, good habits, and will be dependable and honest.

There is a remarkable opportunity for the child to aspire spiritually through a study of nature and through the medium of poetry and music. What an experience it is to go on a nature hike in spring when the countryside is in bloom, or in autumn when there are so many blends and splitshes of color. Wordsworth said:

One impulse from a vernai wood May teach you more of man.

Of mortal evil and of good.

Than all the sages can:

It would be a dull pupil indeed who would not be inspired by a poem like "The Daffedils", or a sonnet like. "This is my Father's World.

To be able to get along with other people is an important asset to any individual. One's family life, work or play brings one in contact with others. The success that a person has in his adult social relationships will be determined to a large extent by his child social development. It is important for the class-member of the Social Studies group to know something about the people of Holland. but it is also important for him to have friendly associations with his classmate from Holland.

To be true to the child the school must create within him a love for that which is beautiful. Aesthetic tastes can be developed through the medium of art and attractive surroundings. Picture study will bring to the pupil a consciousness of the beauty expressed by the artist. Learning to blend color combinations in the sketching of scenes from nature will give the member of the art class a b appreciation of the beauty of nature. Flowers, shrubs, trees, and hedges on the schoolgrounds and on the lawns at home; painted buildings, and attractive classrooms will help create for the pupil a love for beautiful surroundings. Later when the pupil grows up this appreciation of beauty will likely be reflected in his own home The school alone cannot meet all these needs of the child. The school needs the co-operation of the home if the pupil is to attain this full development. The child's education does not begin on his first day of school. It has its beginning in the home when he begins to take notice of things. The parents are his first teachers. It is from his parents that he learns to eat with a spoon, to walk, and to talk. When he goes to school at the age of five his education. broadens. Now he has another teacher -- the school teacher. The child spends about five hours a day at school with his school teacher learning what she teaches him and nineteen hours at home learning from his parents. Is it not important that these teachers become acquainted and get together on various occasions to discuss the child? - his health his problems, or conflicts if he has any, his progress, or lack of progress in the school program, etc. The child may need glasses or a visit to the dentist. The parents have been notified by the school nurse but have failed to do anything about it. When the parents learn from the teacher by a frank discussion that the neglect of the child's eyes and teeth is keeping him behind the other pupils of his class in his school work. then these needs of the pupil will take on new meaning. The pupil lies to the teacher, or steals from the other children. The parents know nothing about these bad habits of their child He may be looking for recognition at school and when honest means fail, uses these methods to obtain it. Perhaps the child is being neglected at home. He is not receiving enough of the parents' attention. Is this not a problem that requires both teacher and parents At recess, Mary sits in her sent and will not play with the other children. She is always by her elf, and seems unhappy. When to solve? other children, she is always by intered the seems unhappy. When the teacher persuades her to take part in group games she is em-barrassed and awkward. The cause of Mary's shyness may be found in the home. Perhaps she is an only child and has never had an opportunity to play with other children. It may be that she is overprotected by the parents. The parents may not knew that she stays by herself and is unhappy at school. By a discussion with the teaby nerself and is thrappy at school. By a discussion with the tea-cher of Mary's problem, the mother will be made conscious of her child's need. The solution may be as simple as the asking of two or three children to come in and play with Mary after school. Whe-ther this is the answer or not is not as important as the act of teacher and parent discussing the child's difficulty and together trades in school to trying to solve it.

It is of little value for the school to teach the pupil to eat a halanced diet and to get ten hours of sleep every night, if the parents do not cooperate with the school to have these health habits carried out in the home.

The Home and School Association serves as a joining link between the school and the home. These meetings provide an opportunity for leachers and parents to become acquainted. The Program of Home and School meetings usually consists of some topic related to the school and the home. In the discussions of these topics the mambers will likely find solutions to the difficulties that they are having with their own children. They will come to understand better the teacher's point of view - her problems and methods. As a resuit the Home and School member will approciate more the necessity of working together with the teacher and other school officials for me best interests of the child.

But a fire caused by a carelessly tossed eigarette butt is just as tragic and destructive one set by a firebug: Fallure to observe the commonsense rules of fire prevention can lead to as tragic results as the deliberate act which loads to fire.

We all have it in our power individually and collectively as part of a community team to prevent 90 percent of all fires. We have it in our power individually and collectively to agitate and to work to make our own community firesafe. We all have an obligation to ourselves, our families, our community and our country to be part of the fire defense team.
